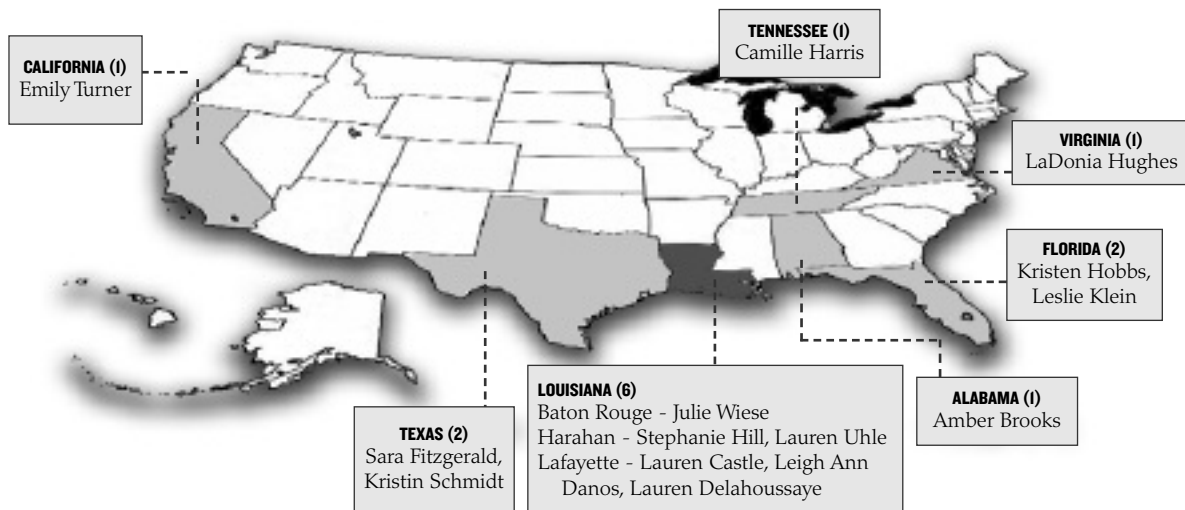

## FIGHT ALL THE WAY

Returning five starters, including three All-Louisiana selections and a two-time All-American pitcher, from a 50-win team a year ago, the LSU softball team has tremendous potential as it heads into the 2004 season.

Along with the return of several key components from a team that played for the Southeastern Conference Tournament championship for a fifth-consecutive year and advanced to the NCAA Regionals for a sixth-consecutive year, the Tigers have six outstanding newcomers that should make an immediate impact and compliment the eight returning letterwinners.

"I really like this team," said LSU head coach Yvette Girouard. "It has tremendous potential. I say that because I see a side that is hard to see, that is the team chemistry."

The strength of the LSU program will be in its pitching, but the Tigers will also have a more balanced offensive attack to provide necessary run support. Coming off a power explosion last season that saw LSU lead the SEC in home runs and rank second in doubles, the Tigers return a large portion of that firepower this season. In addition, LSU will have more team speed and the ability to mix in a short game to keep the Tigers moving on the base paths.

"Our team strength will be pitching," said Girouard, "but I do know that we have much more team speed than we did last year, which is a good thing. At times we were kind of station-to-station. I know that we worked very hard this fall in creating

offensive opportunities. We worked on our short game and moving runners. I expect us to be different in that aspect."

During fall drills, personal and team losses helped spark a spirit and camaraderie between the players and coaches off the field as the team worked to play together as a unit on the field.

"The fall was interesting for us," said Girouard. "We had some attrition and I had some personal loss in my life with the death of my dad, so there were times that I wasn't here. I actually only got to see one game in the fall. It was a time of real bonding and a coming together as 14 individuals. From that experience, I just expect great things for the team."

It is from that bonding and team chemistry that the Tigers have developed the trust necessary to transform from nine outstanding individual athletes to one cohesive unit on the field.

"I think what is going to evolve is a team with heart, one that will find a way to make a situation right," said Girouard. "In that process I envision a lot of wins this season."

### PITCHERS

Pitching will once again hold the key to LSU's success. The Tigers return two-time All-American Kristin Schmidt, while bringing in high school All-American Emily Turner. The addition of Lauren Castle should add a depth to the LSU pitching rotation that it did not have a year ago.

Last season Schmidt (Houston, Texas)

set school records for single-season appearances, starts, complete games and innings pitched while ranking fourth in the NCAA in wins. The senior also threw three complete-game no-hitters and combined for a fourth while being named the SEC Tournament MVP.

"Kristin returns for her senior season as a two-time All-American," Girouard said. "She is a cagey pitcher who doesn't allow herself to get beat."

Turner (Chula Vista, Calif.) was a high school 2002 All-American at Bonita Vista High School. In 2003, she led the Barons to a national ranking as high as No. 1 before BVHS finished with its second-straight Mesa League Championship. In addition to her time in the circle, Turner will play first base for LSU and give the Tigers some added firepower at the plate.

"We have what I consider to be one of the premiere talents in this program in Emily Turner," said Girouard. "Never in 30 years of coaching have I seen anyone work as hard as she has worked. She has the tools and the potential to be a great, great softball player for LSU, not only in the circle, but also in the field and at the plate. We are expecting big things out of her."

Castle (Lafayette, La.) is a sophomore transfer from UL-Lafayette and comes in with Women's College World Series experience. In addition to the different look she gives the Tigers in the circle, she will also see playing time in the outfield and make an immediate impact at the plate.

"Lauren is very happy at LSU and will definitely make an impact somewhere, whether in the circle, on the field or at the plate," said Girouard. "She has different looks that could aid our pitching staff."

#### CATCHERS

The Tigers have two outstanding catchers to choose from this season. The pair excel defensively, while also adding to the LSU offensive lineup. Leigh Ann Danos (Lafayette, La.) returns for her junior season after splitting time behind the plate the last two years. The Tiger career record holder in fielding percentage, Danos recorded four home runs and 12 doubles last year to provide the Tigers with a powerful offensive weapon.

"Leigh Ann seems to just have matured immensely and I really believe that she will come into her own this year," said Girouard. "She seems to have so much more self-confidence and presence about her as an athlete and a softball player and I think that is going to show through. She's learned so much and handles the pitchers very well and has come leaps and bounds behind the plate in her knowledge."

Freshman Kristen Hobbs (Royal Palm Beach, Fla.) will challenge Danos for playing time. With an outstanding arm behind the plate, she was named to the All-Palm Beach County four-straight year while being named a Wendy's High School Heisman selection.

"Kristen is a good looking freshman who was sidelined this fall with a little bit of an arm problem, but we expect her to be at full throttle once the season begins," said Girouard. "I watched her play last summer and I didn't see anyone run on

her. She is a great defensive catcher and has all the attributes that you want a catcher to have -- she is a giver and not a taker."

In addition to Danos and Hobbs, sophomore Stephanie Hill (Harahan, La.) returns for the Tigers. She came off the bench in pinch-hit situations last season and should see time in the offensive lineup.

"Stephanie came to us last January and I expect great things from her this season," said Girouard. "She is just a tremendous young woman and an unbelievable student-athlete that will see some time for us offensively. Her swing has come around and no one deserves the opportunity more than she does."

#### FIRST BASE

Going into the 2004 season, there is an ongoing battle for the starting role at first base, with the Tigers in the enviable position of having a couple of great options to fill the position. Pulling double duty for LSU this year will be Turner, who will see time at first base when not in the circle.

"Emily has cat-quick instincts at first base," said Girouard. "When she is not pitching, she will play there."

Junior college transfer Amber Brooks (Eufala, Ala.) will also see playing time for LSU at first base. She is especially quick and an overall outstanding athlete.

"Amber is an exceptional athlete," said Girouard. We can play her at first base or in the outfield. She has speed to burn."

#### SECOND BASE

For the second-straight season, Sara Fitzgerald (Kingwood, Texas) will start as the LSU second baseman. One of the two Tiger team captains this year, the senior was brilliant in her starting role last season,

recording a career-best .272 batting average with three home runs. In additions, she ranked eighth in the SEC with 15 doubles.

"Second base will be anchored by Sara Fitzgerald, who has been there for us before," said Girouard. "She stepped up and did a great job for us offensively and defensively last year."

Also vying for playing time will be sophomore Camille Harris and freshman Lauren Uhle, adding depth to the LSU infield. A starter in the Tiger outfield last season, Harris (Hendersonville, Tenn.) led the team in batting average and slugging percentage before getting hurt late in the season. She was also only the sixth true freshman in LSU history to earn All-SEC honors, being tabbed for the second team.

"Camille is like dynamite in a small body," said Girouard. "She was one of our biggest surprises last year, coming in to becoming our leading hitter after beginning the season without a starting position. Unfortunately she was hurt at the end of the year, but we welcome her back this year and expect tremendous things out of her."

Uhle (Harahan, La.) will see action in both the infield and outfield this season, while also coming off the bench as a pinch runner. She adds depth to the Tiger roster at several positions.

"Lauren is a great utility player," said Girouard. "She can play some infield and some outfield and will be our first person off the bench in a pinch running situation."

#### THIRD BASE

The anchor of the Tiger infield for the last three seasons, Julie Wiese (Baton Rouge, La.) returns to third base this year. Voted a team captain for 2004, the 2003 All-

Louisiana selection holds the career record for walks and ranks in the top 10 in career home runs, doubles and RBIs in LSU softball history. In addition, she ranked second in the SEC in fielding percentage by a third baseman last season.

"Julie will anchor this team at third base," said Girouard. "She has just done a phenomenal job for us in her four years at LSU. She is a fifth-year senior and really enjoying softball. That is good to see."

## SHORTSTOP

After seeing most of her playing time off of the bench last season, Lauren Delahoussaye will take over the Tigers' starting shortstop role this year. With a proven ability at the plate after providing game-winning hits against Tennessee and Florida in the SEC Tournament, she came back eager to also make a contribution in the LSU field this year. Possessing a tremendous arm, she impressed the coaching staff during fall workouts and should complete the Tiger infield nicely.

"Lauren probably came back in the best shape she's been in at LSU," said Girouard. "I think she had something to prove, so she came back here in great physical shape and impressed me greatly in the fall. Her hitting looks phenomenal so we expect some big things from her this year at shortstop."

## OUTFIELD

In left field for the Tigers, redshirt freshman Leslie Klein (Sunrise, Fla.) should take over the starting role. Returning from a torn anterior cruciate ligament suffered during preseason drills last year, she provides LSU with a strong arm and a great glove. A powerful hitter, she can also be called upon to give a boost to the Tiger short game.

"Leslie returns after being lost before the start of the season last year," said Girouard. "She was penciled in to be a starter last season and just has great potential. She has power and can utilize the short game, has a great glove and a great arm. She will be an added dimension out there."

Senior LaDonia Hughes (Farmville, Va.) will patrol the Tiger center field for the second-straight year. The 2003 Louisiana Newcomer of the Year ranked fourth in the SEC in runs scored last season and was second on the team in batting average. Over the summer, she was drafted by the San Antonio Armadillos of the National Pro Fastpitch League.

"LaDonia will roam center field," said Girouard. "She is one of those athletes that a coach just smiles when she gets an opportunity to coach because LaDonia just tries to get better every day. She has tremendous speed, gets an incredible jump and reads the ball very well off the bat."

In right field, Castle will see action for LSU when she is not in the circle. Uhle and

### LSU RANKED NO. 9 IN ALL-TIME POLL

In seven years, the LSU softball program has gone from its inaugural season in 1997 to being ranked the ninth-best all-time program.

The Tigers are the youngest program to be ranked in the top 10, and are the only team in the top 15 that did not begin competition until after the poll began.

Brooks can also be expected to see playing time for the Tigers.

## SCHEDULE

The Tigers, who have never shied away from tough competition, will once again be faced with a challenging schedule in 2004. With 20 games against teams that participated in NCAA Regional play last season, including six games against teams that advanced to the Women's College World Series, LSU will be put to the test as the Tigers pursue postseason play.

"There is nothing new this year," said Girouard. "We have a challenging schedule, opponent-wise, both at home and on the road."

LSU opens the season with the Tiger Classic. The tournament features WCWS participant Oklahoma and NCAA Regional participant Illinois.

"Our out of conference schedule is a great one," said Girouard. "We bring in Oklahoma to Tiger Park in the first week-end of the season along with a very good Illinois team that played very well in the Alabama regional last year."

The Tigers then travel to Las Vegas for the UNLV Softball Classic. LSU will challenge 2003 WCWS runner-up California.

After the Purple & Gold Challenge, LSU travels to the NFCA Leadoff Classic. The Tigers will have a rematch with California while also taking on NCAA Regional participant Florida Atlantic before beginning bracket play against some of the nation's best softball competition.

"We go out to Las Vegas once again and meet up with California, who was the national runner-up last year," said Girouard. "We have some great games in our out of conference schedule including the Leadoff Classic, which always involves the best teams in the country."

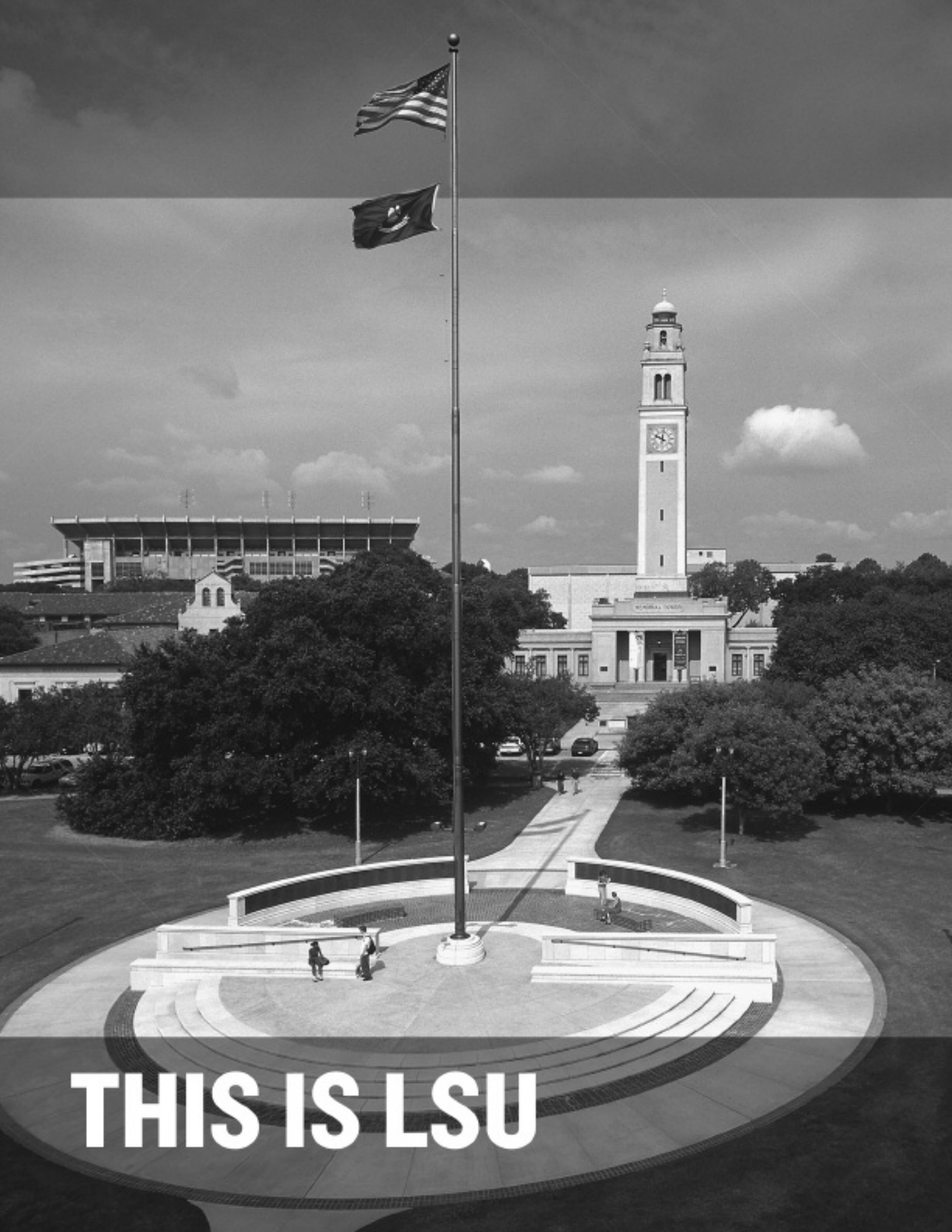
In SEC action, the Tigers open league play at home against Mississippi State. LSU also hosts defending SEC champion Georgia, Florida, South Carolina and Auburn. Of the teams the Tigers host this season, only Auburn did not qualify for the NCAA Tournament last season.

On the road, LSU will take on defending Western Division champion and 2003 WCWS participant Alabama, Arkansas, Kentucky, Ole Miss and Tennessee.

"When you just look at the SEC schedule it's a great one, because as usual it will be a dogfight in the league," said Girouard. "You've got some up and coming young teams."

"Georgia won it all last season and basically lost no one, so they are going to be a powerhouse. Alabama went to the World Series with a young team and Tennessee has a phenomenal young pitcher on their staff. The SEC is a powerhouse as usual."

The 2004 SEC Tournament will be held at the University of Alabama Softball Complex this season, a change from previous years when the conference tournament was held at neutral sites. The tournament site will then rotate between league schools each season.

# Louisiana State University

founded 1860

**L**ouisiana State University and Agricultural & Mechanical College has, throughout its 143-year history, served the people of Louisiana, the region, the nation, and the world through extensive multipurpose programs encompassing instruction, research and public service. The University continuously develops programs of breadth and quality that make it one of the nation's outstanding educational institutions.

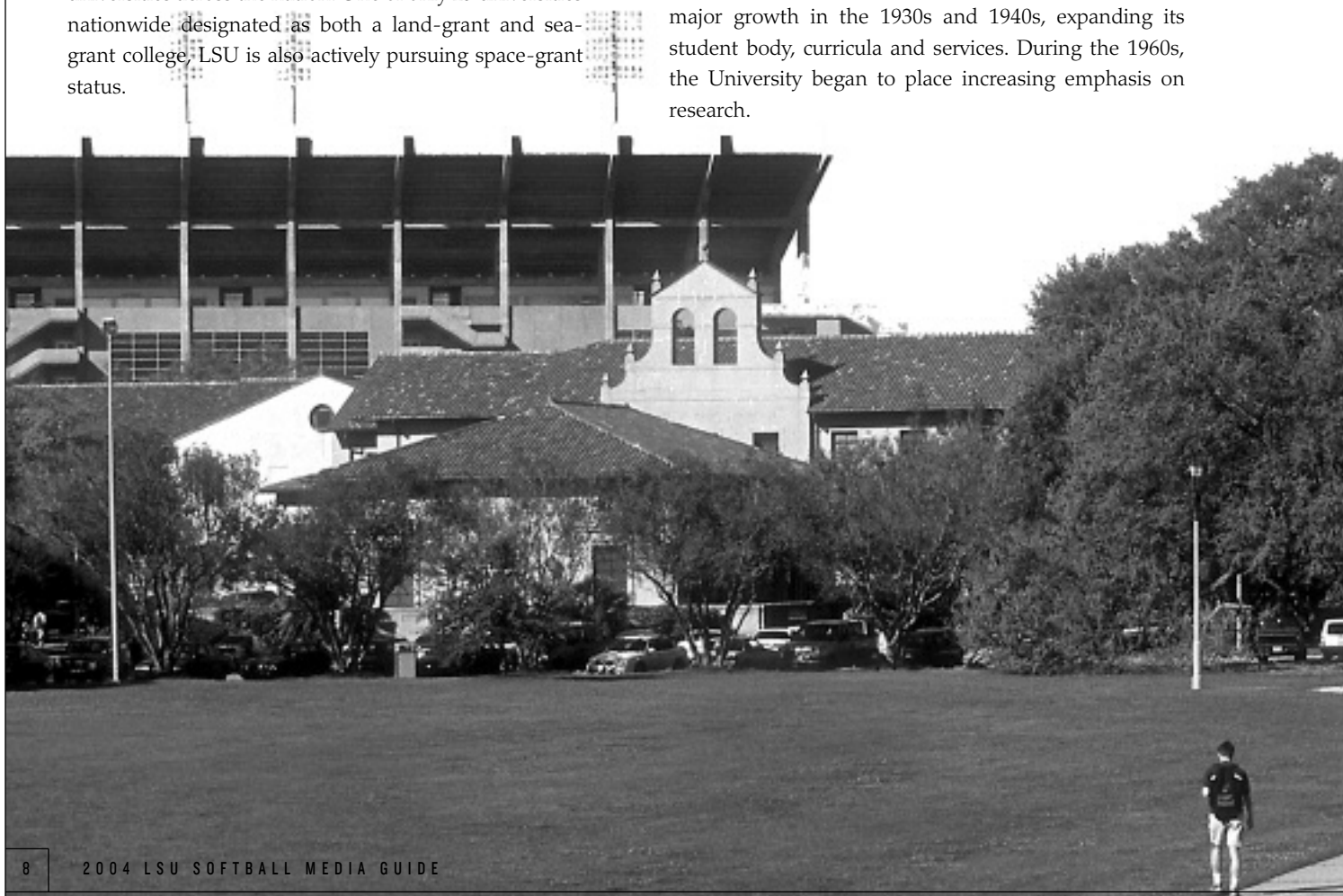
The University influences the educational, economic, social and cultural lives of its citizens throughout the state – indeed, in some way, it touches the life of every person in Louisiana.

Because of its designation as a Research I University – the top category of the Carnegie Foundation's ranking of research institutions – LSU ranks in the top 2 percent of the nation's colleges and universities. The Research I designation is shared by only 59 public and 29 private universities across the nation. One of only 25 universities nationwide designated as both a land-grant and sea-grant college, LSU is also actively pursuing space-grant status.

History and tradition began with LSU's founding in 1853 by the General Assembly of Louisiana as the Louisiana State Seminary of Learning and Military Academy near Pineville, Louisiana. The institution opened January 2, 1860. When the Civil War began, the school's first superintendent, William Tecumseh Sherman, resigned to assume a command in the Union Army. Fire demolished the Seminary in 1869 and the school moved to Baton Rouge.

In 1870, the Seminary was renamed Louisiana State University. In 1874, under the United States Morrill Act, the Louisiana State Agricultural & Mechanical College was established in New Orleans. The two institutions were merged by the Legislature in 1877 to become Louisiana State University and Agricultural & Mechanical College.

Construction on the present campus began in 1922 and the first classes were held in 1926. LSU experienced major growth in the 1930s and 1940s, expanding its student body, curricula and services. During the 1960s, the University began to place increasing emphasis on research.





Recognizing the importance and extent of statewide agricultural activities of units in the LSU System, the LSU Board of Supervisors in 1972 established the Center for Agricultural Sciences & Rural Development. This unit was renamed the LSU Agricultural Center in 1982. Components of the LSU Agricultural Center include the Louisiana Agricultural Experiment Station, the Louisiana Cooperative Extension Service, International Programs and Administrative Services.

The primary mission of the LSU Agricultural Center is to conduct research in agricultural and natural resource development and to provide off-campus extension education that disseminates technological, economic, and management information to Louisiana residents.

In 1977, the Paul M. Hebert Law Center, established as the LSU Law School in 1906, was made an autonomous division of the LSU System. The Law Center provides legal education characterized by an unyielding demand for academic excellence. Its unique curriculum, based on civil law as well as substantial elements of common law, provides law graduates with qualifications and training for not one, but two legal systems.

LSU, located on more than 2,000 acres in the southern part of Baton Rouge, Louisiana, is bordered on the west by the Mississippi River. The University's more than 250 principal buildings are grouped on a 650-acre plateau that constitutes the main part of the campus.

LSU and A&M College is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. The Hebert Law Center holds membership in the Association of Law Schools and is on the approved list of the American Bar Association.

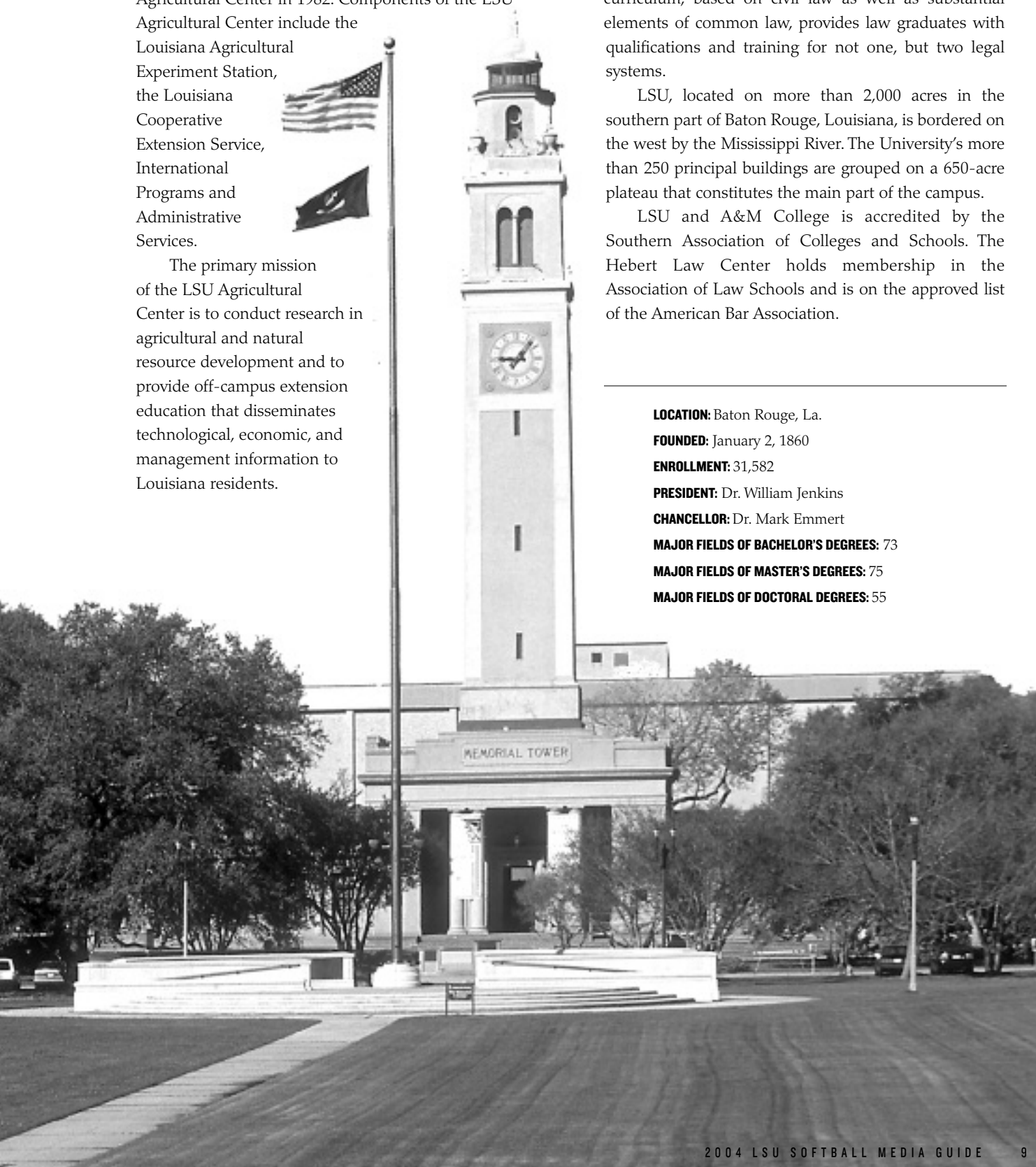

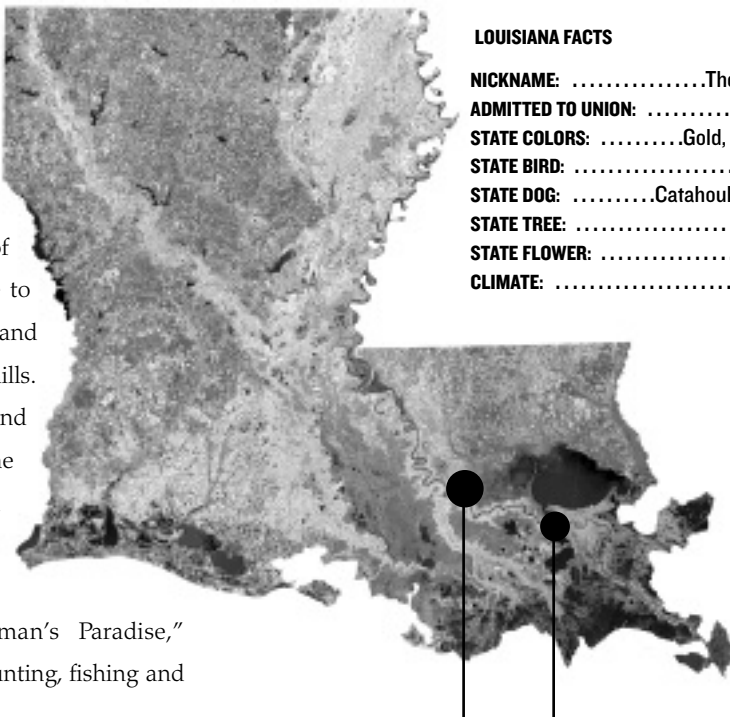

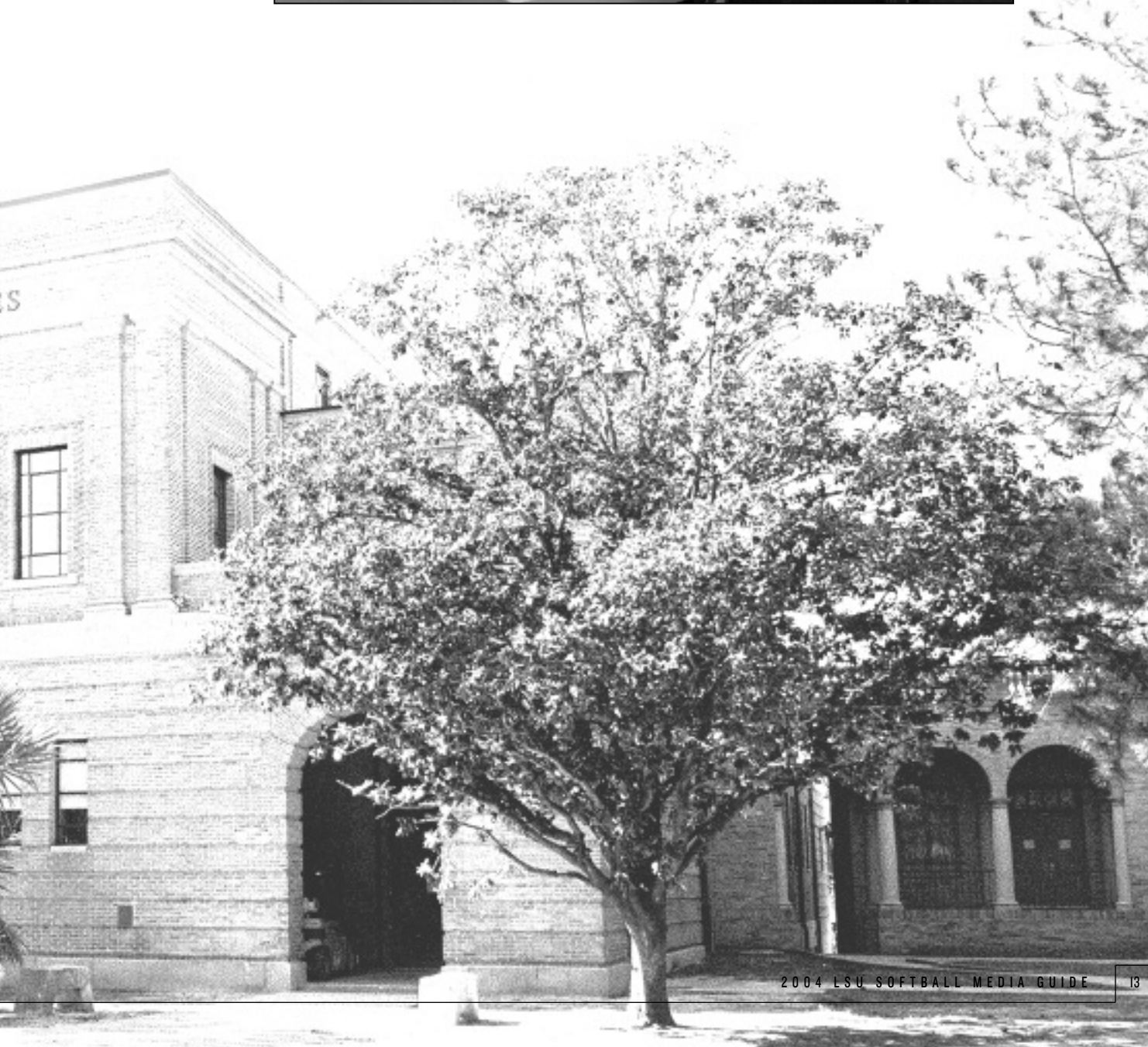

## Retired Numbers

The five athletes on this page are the only athletes to have their jerseys retired by LSU. Basketball has retired the No. 23 for Pete Maravich, No. 50 for Bob Pettit, Jr., and No. 33 for Shaquille O'Neal. Football's only retired jersey is the No. 20 worn by Billy Cannon, while baseball retired the No. 15 in honor of long-time coach and current Athletics Director Skip Bertman.



### Bob Pettit, Jr. • #50

Led LSU to its first NCAA Final Four in 1953 and later became the first player in NBA history to exceed the 20,000-plus point barrier. Pettit is a member of the NBA Hall of Fame and in 1997 was named as one of the top 50 players in NBA history.



### Billy Cannon • #20

One of the true legends of college football in the South, Cannon was the 1959 Heisman Trophy winner that helped the Tigers to the 1958 national title. Cannon's most memorable performance came in 1959 against Ole Miss. The top-ranked Tigers trailed No. 3 Ole Miss 3-0 in the fourth quarter when Cannon fielded a punt, broke seven tackles and returned it 89 yards as the Tigers went on to win 7-3. He went on to a successful 11-year professional career.



### Pete Maravich • #23

Nicknamed "Pistol Pete," Maravich still holds the NCAA records for career points with 3,667 and career scoring average with 44.2 points a game. Maravich was selected as the National Player of the Year in 1970 after leading the Tigers to the NIT Final Four. He scored 50+ points an amazing 28 times. After LSU he went on to a 10-year professional career and was selected as one of the NBA's 50 greatest players in 1997.



### Shaquille O'Neal • #33

Was the first pick in the 1992 NBA Draft. He was named MVP of the league in 2000 and the Finals MVP in 2000, 2001 and 2002 after leading the Los Angeles Lakers to three World Championships. At LSU, O'Neal averaged 21.6 points and 13.6 rebounds for his career, and in 1991, he was named the World's Amateur Athlete of the Year as well as SEC Athlete of the Year and National Player of the Year. In 1997, he was named as one of the top 50 players in NBA history.



### Skip Bertman • #15

A legend in the college baseball ranks, Bertman created a dynasty at LSU, guiding the Tigers to five national titles in a 10-year stretch from 1991-2000. He also skippered the United States to a bronze medal at the 1996 Olympics in Atlanta and was an assistant on the gold medal-winning U.S. squad in Seoul, Korea in 1988. Bertman retired from coaching following the 2001 season and is currently the LSU athletics director.



### Nicki Arnstad

The 2002 NCAA Floor Exercise Co-Champion, Arnstad became the first LSU gymnast to win a national title. She was a two-time All-American and won the NCAA Central Regional floor and all-around championships.



### Marie Ferdinand

The eighth pick overall in the 2001 WNBA draft by the Utah Starzz and a 2002 WNBA all-star. A First-Team All-American in 2000-01 and helped the Lady Tigers to the Elite Eight in 2000 and to the NCAA Tournament three times.



### Britni Sneed

One of three four-time first-team All-SEC selections in conference history, Sneed was a two-time SEC Player of the Year and was a three-time NFCA All-American, leading the Tigers to the College World Series in 2001.



### Ben McDonald

Named the National Player of the Year in 1989 and was later the first player chosen in the Major League Baseball Draft by the Baltimore Orioles.



### Meredith Duncan

The nation's top collegiate golfer in 2002, Duncan left LSU as the best female golfer in school history. She earned first-team All-America honors as a senior in 2002 and won the United States Women's Amateur Championship in 2001.



### Todd Walker

Capped his LSU career as the SEC's all-time leader in hits, runs, RBIs, and total bases. Walker, who is a member of the All-Time College World Series Team, led LSU to the national title in 1993.



### Josh Reed

An All-American, Reed re-wrote both the LSU and SEC record books. The winner of the Biletnikoff Award in 2001, Reed finished his career with an SEC record 3,001 yards receiving.



### David Toms

A two-time SEC Player of the Year, Toms has gone on to a successful career on the PGA Tour. Among his PGA Tour victories was a thrilling win at the PGA Championship in August of 2001.



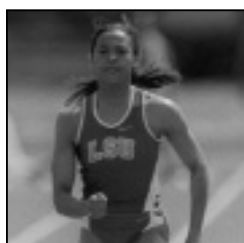
### Esther Jones

A 21-time All-American while at LSU. Won a gold medal as a member of the 4x100 meter relay team in Barcelona in 1992.



### Walter Davis

A track Olympian in 2000, Davis helped LSU to national titles in 2001 and 2002. The SEC Male Athlete of the Year in 2002, he won six NCAA titles and earned a male school-record nine All-America honors.



### Peta-Gaye Dowdie

A 19-time track All-American. Dowdie was a member of three NCAA Championship teams during her time at LSU and went on to compete for her native Jamaica at the 2000 Sydney Olympics.

LSU boasts the largest and most complete athletic training facility in all of collegiate athletics. Focused on aggressive rehabilitation, the Broussard Center for Athletic Training is furnished with the latest in technology and equipment. Some of the features of the 23,000-square foot facility include an on-site x-ray room, an in-house pharmacy, as well as state of the art hydrotherapy pools. The Broussard Center for Athletic Training is equipped with the largest hydrotherapy pools in both collegiate and professional sports and is one of the few collegiate training centers with a full-service pharmacy, as well as on-site x-ray room. LSU is also the only school in college athletics with a training room equipped with a full-service vision center. The facility is named in honor of legendary trainer Dr. Martin J. Broussard, who served as LSU's athletic trainer for over four decades.



**T**he LSU strength and conditioning facility was built in 1997 and features the latest in both strength training and cardiovascular training equipment. Measuring 10,000-square feet, LSU has one of the finest strength and conditioning facilities in the nation.

LSU strength and conditioning team took a new direction in 2000 under strength coach Tommy Moffitt. Moffitt, who was named the 1999 Collegiate Football Strength and Conditioning Coach of the Year by the Professional Football Strength and Conditioning Coaches Society, is in charge of the LSU strength and



conditioning facility, located in Tiger Stadium.

Strength and conditioning can be the heart and soul of an athletic program's success, and LSU has taken great strides to improve its strength program and facilities.







**T**iger Park, located directly behind LSU's "Dub" Robinson Tennis Stadium, has a regular seating capacity of 1,000. The dimensions of the field are 200 feet to both foul poles and 220 to centerfield. A new, elevated, air-conditioned press box was installed behind the home plate bleachers prior to the 2003 season. Tiger Park also features an inning-by-inning scoreboard, message board and a state-of-the-art sound system. With these features, LSU's softball field is one of the most modern softball facilities in the country.

## LSU Softball Locker Room

Measuring 81 feet by 29 feet, the LSU softball locker room is a suite of rooms including a lounge area, meeting room, locker room, showers, sauna and a coach's office.

## LSU Indoor Practice Facility

When the weather prevents the softball team from practicing at Tiger Park, the team moves to the indoor, climate-controlled football practice facility. LSU student-athletes benefit from one of the most modern indoor facilities in the nation. Located at the site of the Charles McClendon Practice Facility, the indoor facility was built as part of a \$15 million upgrade of the LSU physical plant in the late 1980's and early 1990's and houses a full 100-yard football field.

In three seasons at LSU, head coach Yvette Girouard's effect on the Tiger softball program has been powerful. With each year, she continues to add to her legacy as one of the greatest coaches in the history of women's softball by making LSU a national force in the collegiate ranks.

Girouard, who was inducted into the Louisiana Softball Coaches Association Hall of Fame in June 2002, enters the 2004 season among the career leaders in NCAA Division I wins (No. 5) and winning percentage (No. 5) and among the active NCAA Division I coaching leaders in wins (No. 5) and winning percentage (No. 4).

With 22-straight winning seasons to her credit, she has guided her athletes to 32 All-America honors, including four while at LSU, 13 Academic All-America honors and taken her teams to 13 NCAA Regionals.

In 2001, she led LSU to its first appearance in the Women's College World Series, where the Tigers finished third. Under her guidance, UL-Lafayette (formerly Southwestern Louisiana) advanced to the WCWS with a pair of fifth place finishes and a third-place finish in 1993. In 1994, the Lady Cajuns were ranked as high as second nationally, the best national ranking for any team coached by Girouard.

While her influence has been a catalyst for the growth of the game in the state and nationally for many years, her impact in just three years in Baton Rouge has been no less significant. Becoming the first coach in Southeastern Conference history to lead a team to back-to-back tournament championships, Girouard made a clean sweep of the three major league titles (SEC Western Division, SEC Championship, SEC Tournament Championship) in her first two seasons as a Tiger.

In 2003, Girouard earned her 900th career victory,

## THE GIROUARD PHILOSOPHY

"I believe fully in trying to instill in our athletes a knowledge and a love for the qualities and virtues that comprise good character. Character is what we are inside. It is often revealed by how we act when no one is looking. Winning in our program should occur both on the field as well as in the classroom, in society and in personal lives after Tiger softball. When our players leave our program, hopefully we have developed successful people that will feel that their Tiger family will always have a unique and lasting place in their hearts.

"LSU is a very special place with everything provided for success; from athletic facilities to the very best academic center in the country and a first-class administration all at the

disposal of our student athletes. In addition to having the friendliness of Louisiana people, LSU has one of the most beautiful campuses in the country. Our players will know from their first visit to the LSU campus that their number one goal is to leave this institution with their degree in hand.

"In setting our high standards for the athletes that represent this program, the number one characteristic I look for in student-athletes is discipline. We want disciplined people in our program. It all starts with someone who can control her choices in a respectable way, both on and off the field. The ability to choose right from wrong should not be a battle. We expect to play for championships here at LSU and every student-athlete who competes for the Tiger

softball team will have to have that same discipline and expectations. Our staff is dedicated to LSU, our program and our players.

"Concerning the softball side, we will incorporate the 'Tiger Attack' mind set for our games. I'd like to think that my teams are aggressive and hard-nosed, and that they will play the game hard until the final out. We must attack every inning as if the score were 0-0, always thinking 'it is never enough'. We will always be a fundamental team with high emphasis placed on this aspect of the game throughout the entire year. Playing the game with pride, emotion and respect for tradition and class should be a goal for every LSU team. This team will embody those qualities."

becoming just the sixth coach in NCAA Division I history and the eighth coach in NCAA history to reach the historic milestone.

After finishing second in the SEC Western Division, the Tigers advanced through the conference tournament to the championship game for the fifth-consecutive year. LSU is the only school in SEC history to advance to the league tournament championship game more than three times, and no other team has played in the tournament final more than twice consecutively.

The Tigers then earned their sixth-consecutive trip to the NCAA Regionals, marking the 13th consecutive trip to the postseason tournament for Girouard.

In 2002, Girouard picked up her 100th win at LSU in just 119 games, the fastest Tiger coach to 100 victories in school history. In addition, Girouard led LSU to its highest regular-season ranking, No. 3 nationally.

After sweeping all three of the SEC Championship titles and advancing to the NCAA Regional finals, she earned her second-straight SEC Coach of the Year honor. She has been named coach of the year by three separate conferences: the Southeastern Conference in 2001 and 2002, the Sun Belt in 2000 and the Southland in 1984, 1985 and 1987.

A fourth-consecutive Louisiana Sport Writer's Association Louisiana Coach of the Year honor followed for Girouard, the 11th state honor of her career.

In her first season at LSU, Girouard was able to accomplish something no other coach had been able to do. She led the Tigers to their first appearance in the WCWS with a victory over her former school, UL-Lafayette, in the NCAA Regional Championship game.

In the WCWS, the Tigers fell to Stanford in the first round, but bounced back to knock off Iowa and defending national champion Oklahoma before losing out to UCLA and finishing in a tie for third place nationally, the highest final ranking for any LSU squad.

For their accomplishments, she and assistant coaches James DeFeo and Lori Osterberg were named the National Fastpitch Coaches Association's National Coaching Staff of the Year. She was also named the Coach of the Year by the SEC and the LSWA. To her credit, she was named the National Coach of

the Year in 1990 and 1993 and has earned five NFCA South Region Coach of the Year honors.

Despite 2001 being LSU's first trip to the WCWS, Girouard was no stranger to Oklahoma City. She became just the third coach in NCAA history to take two programs to the WCWS after leading UL-Lafayette to three World Series appearances in the 1990s.

In her two decades as the Lady Cajuns' head coach, she built the team from the ground floor with no scholarships and a \$3,000 budget to one of the nation's perennial powers. She advanced her UL-Lafayette teams to the NCAA Regionals a total of 10 times, hosting on seven of those occasions. With a record of 463-105 (.815) in the 1990s, her teams posted the third best winning percentage in the nation behind only Arizona and UCLA.

Girouard was born in Broussard, La., and attended Comeaux High School. She earned a bachelor of science degree from USL in 1976 in health and physical education. During her college days, she played on the Lady Cajun volleyball team and was named the school's Female Athlete of the Year in 1976.

Following college, Girouard served as head coach at Lafayette High School where she began the softball program in 1977. In 1980, she coached at her alma mater, Comeaux High School, before beginning the USL softball program in 1981.

Girouard served a three-year term as the South Region Representative on the NCAA All-America Committee and served two, two-year stints on the NCAA South Regional ranking committee. She has most recently been a member of a six-person panel assembled by the Amateur Softball Association and the United States Olympic Committee to develop a set criteria for teaching hitting.

With a list of accomplishments and awards that speak for themselves, Girouard has proven that she can take her teams to the next level and be successful. Her guidance and leadership have carried her through 23 outstanding seasons and hopefully she will continue to build upon her past successes and reach the ultimate goal of bringing LSU its first national championship in softball.

## James DeFeo

**Assistant Coach  
Fourth Year**

James DeFeo enters his fourth season as an assistant at LSU and his fifth season under head coach Yvette Girouard after coaching one year at UL-Lafayette. Prior to joining Girouard's staff, DeFeo was a graduate assistant at Southern Miss in 1999 when the Golden Eagles became the first, first-year program to advance to the Women's College World Series.

After helping to guide the Tigers to their first WCWS appearance in 2001, he, Girouard and Lori Osterberg were named the National Fastpitch Coaches Association's National Coaching Staff of the Year.

DeFeo's main duties include working with the hitters and the outfielders as well as recruiting, scouting and practice management. His work with the hitters has paid off as the Tigers broke the school record, led the Southeastern Conference and ranked 29th nationally in home runs last season, as eight of LSU's 14 players recorded three or more homers. LSU also ranked second in the SEC and ninth in the NCAA in doubles. The Tigers also had the 29th best scoring offense in the nation and ranked second in the SEC in runs batted in a year ago.

In 2002, former Tiger All-American Trena Peel led the nation in triples, while breaking the LSU and SEC single-season records. With 14 triples, she was just two shy of the NCAA record.

In his first season at LSU the Tigers were second in the SEC and 12th nationally with a .293 team batting average. LSU also led the league in scoring and finished ranked 16th nationally with more than five runs per game.

"James brings an incredible passion for studying hitters and molding players into knowledgeable offensive athletes," said Girouard. "I would describe him as passionate, dedicated, loyal and intelligent and he has an unwavering commitment to our student-athletes, our program and to his hitters."

At UL-Lafayette, DeFeo's team hit .310 and finished the season with a No. 22 national ranking and in the top 10 in hitting and scoring. His 1999 Southern Miss team finished the season ranked second nationally in batting and 10th in scoring. DeFeo was instrumental in helping to revive the Golden Eagle team after a six-year hiatus.

For nine years, he has served as sole proprietor and instructor of the All-American Softball Clinics in New Jersey, New York, Florida, Pennsylvania and Mississippi. DeFeo has coaching experience at nearly every level of fastpitch softball, including Under-12, Under-16, 18 and Under and Women's Major. DeFeo also is a member of the National Fastpitch Coaches Association.

A native of New Jersey, DeFeo graduated from Rutgers University in 1996 with a bachelor's degree in sport management. He received his master's in sports administration from Southern Miss in 1999. His sister, Stephanie DeFeo, was a three-time All-American under Girouard at UL-Lafayette and is now the head coach at UNC Greensboro.

On June 17, 2000, DeFeo was married to the former Samantha Rock of Orlando, Fla. They welcomed their first child, Victoria, into the world on March 26, 2002.



## Lori Osterberg

**Assistant Coach  
Second Year**

An assistant for the Tigers during the 2001 season, Lori Osterberg rejoins the Tiger coaching staff in 2004 after two years as a teacher and softball coach at North Scott High School in Eldridge, Iowa.

One of LSU head coach Yvette Girouard's former players, Osterberg brings collegiate playing experience to this Tiger coaching staff. At LSU, Osterberg will work with the Tiger infield and hitters and serve as the recruiting co-coordinator.

"We are absolutely ecstatic that Lori has rejoined our program," said Girouard. "She is the complete package in an assistant coach. She is a fantastic teacher and a great motivator."

In just her first season at North Scott High School, Osterberg guided the softball program to the Iowa state championship in 2002. She then led her team to the state championship game in 2003. For her efforts she was named the East Iowa Regional Coach of the Year both seasons.

During her one-year stint as an assistant at LSU in 2001, the Tigers earned their first berth in the Women's College World Series and finished the season with their highest final national ranking, No. 3 in the NFCA/USA Today Coaches poll. For their efforts, Osterberg, Girouard and James DeFeo were named the National Coaching Staff of the Year by the National Fastpitch Coaches Association.

"Lori did an outstanding job in her first stint at LSU and we expect the same result again," said Girouard.

In 1999, Osterberg served as a student assistant under Girouard at ULL and graduated with a degree in secondary level special education. She then returned home to Iowa where she coached basketball, volleyball and softball and taught special education at North Scott High School for one year in 2000.

Osterberg was the starting shortstop for UL-Lafayette from 1994-97 and was a member of two Women's College World Series teams. While playing for the Lady Cajuns, she earned All-South honors and was a three-time All-Louisiana selection. She finished her collegiate career with a .336 batting average, 12 home runs and 44 doubles.

"Lori was the epitome of the term 'student-athlete'," said Girouard. "She was a joy to coach every day and is a bigger pleasure to associate with as a person on a daily basis in her role as an assistant coach. She is an individual who makes everyone around her better because of the quality person she is."





## Will Jones

**Assistant Strength & Conditioning Coordinator**

Will Jones enters his second year as full-time member of the LSU strength and conditioning staff after being promoted to assistant coordinator in the summer of 2002.

Jones, who graduated with a Master's of Science degree within the department of Kinesiology in May of 2002, served as a graduate assistant in the LSU weight room in 2000 and 2001.

Jones works with the LSU football program and is also responsible for developing and implementing strength and conditioning programs for the volleyball, soccer, baseball and softball teams.

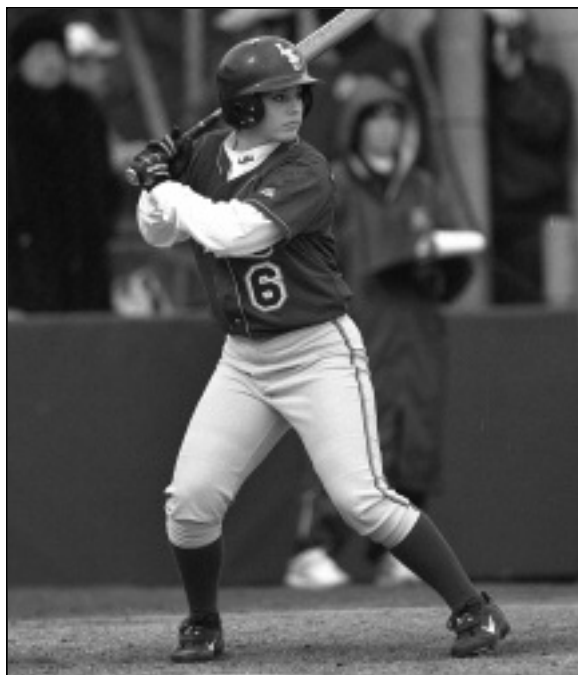

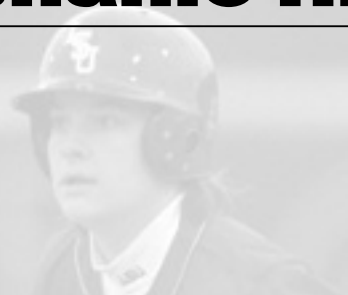

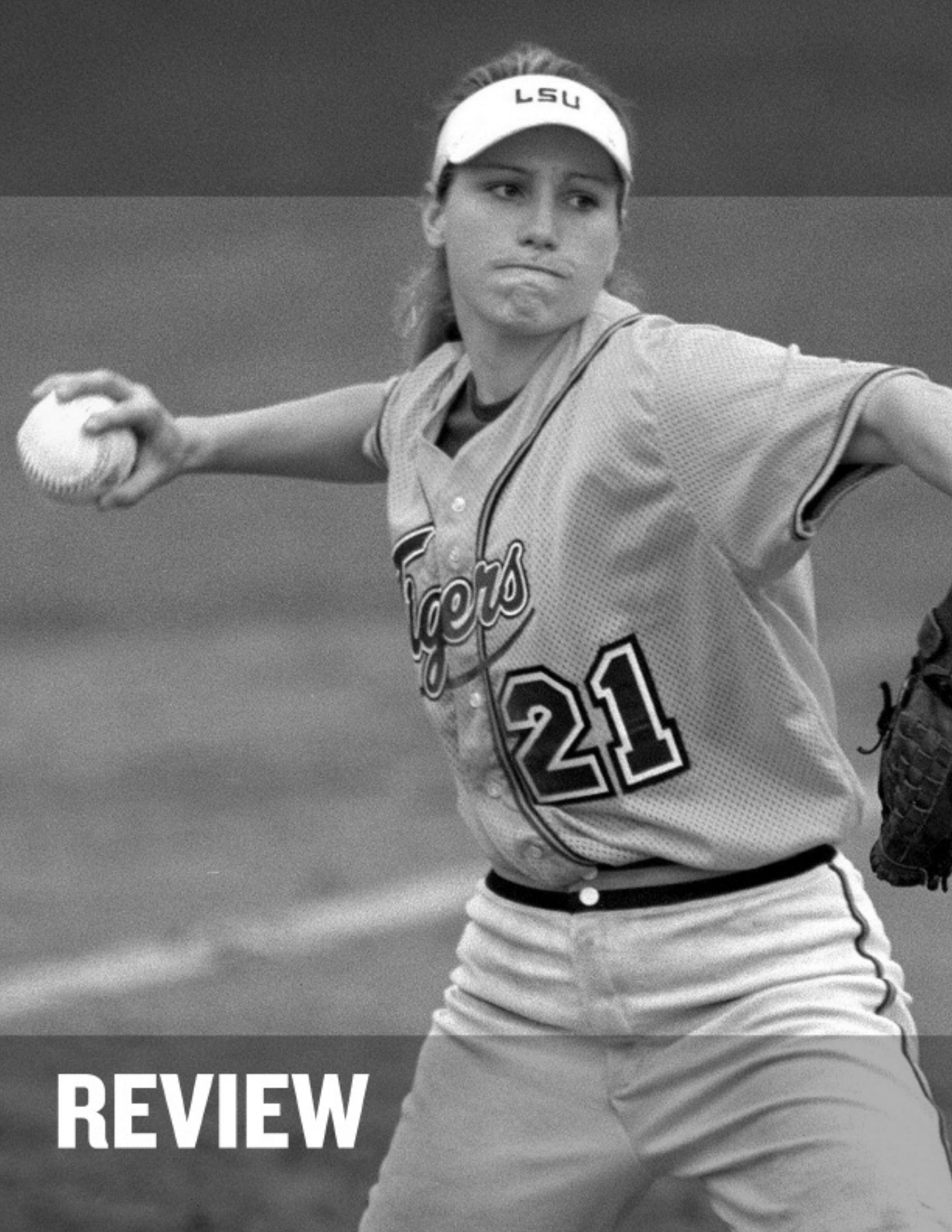

## 900 and counting...

### **GIROUARD BECOMES EIGHTH COACH WITH 900 WINS**

With a 4-3 win over Alabama on March 29, head coach Yvette Girouard became just the eighth coach in NCAA history to record 900 career wins. She also became just the sixth coach in NCAA Division I history to reach that historic milestone and is one of only five active coaches with 900 career wins.

Girouard won 759 games in 20 years while at the helm at UL-Lafayette from 1981-2000. Through three seasons in Baton Rouge, she has won 165 games and is the winningest coach in LSU history.

### **TIGERS FALL IN SEC TOURNAMENT FINALS**

Playing their fourth game in less than 24 hours, the Tigers could not hold off Alabama as the Crimson Tide defeated LSU, 3-1, in the SEC Tournament championship game.

The loss ended the Tiger's bid for a third-consecutive conference tournament title and fourth overall after winning their first title in 1999 and back-to-back titles in 2001 and 2002. Despite the loss, with LSU's fifth-consecutive championship game appearance, the Tigers remain the only SEC team to advance to the league tournament finals more than three times and are the only program to advance to the championship game more than twice consecutively.

### **LSU POSTS SECOND-MOST WINS OVER SEVEN YEARS**

In just its seventh year since reinstatement in 1997, the LSU softball program has proven to be among the elite in the nation. The Tigers have averaged 54.57 wins per year in its seven-year history, which is by far the best in the SEC in that span (Alabama - 46.86). In the nation, the 54.57 wins per year is second to only Arizona, which has averaged 58.00 wins a season over the past six years. LSU also ranks third in winning percentage, behind Arizona and UCLA. The Tigers rank ahead of former national champions Oklahoma, California and Fresno State.

### **LSU HITS 50 WINS FOR SIXTH-STRAIGHT YEAR**

With a 9-4 win over Hawai'i on May 15 in the NCAA Regionals, LSU hit 50 wins for the sixth-straight year. LSU and Arizona are the only two teams in the NCAA to have won 50 games in each of the past six seasons.

### **LSU AMONG THE ELITE IN THE POLLS**

Finishing the season ranked No. 15, LSU has now been ranked in the NFCA/USA Today coaches poll for 81 consecutive weeks dating back to Feb. 28, 1998. In all, LSU softball has been ranked in a total of 83 of the 95 polls that have been released since the program was reinstated in 1997.

ESPN.com and USA Softball began their own poll on Feb. 25, 2003. After coming at No. 8 in the inaugural poll, LSU was ranked in all 13 ESPN polls, finishing the season ranked No. 17.

### **LSU DOMINATES SEC SERIES**

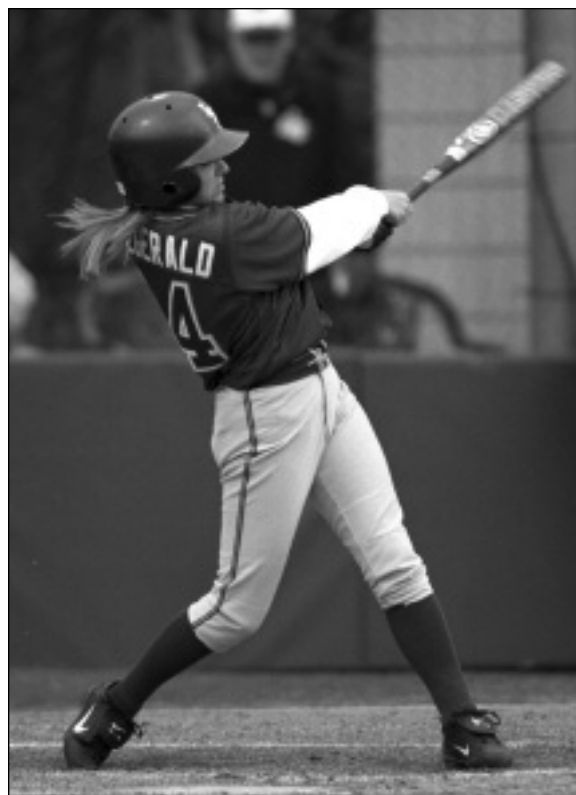
Dating back to the program's beginning in 1997, LSU has competed in 68 series against conference foes and has lost only four. The Tigers dropped a doubleheader to South Carolina in 1997, lost three-of-four to Alabama in the season-ending series in 1998 and lost two-of-three to Georgia and Florida in 2003. The Tigers have split eight others - six doubleheaders and two four-game series. LSU now has an SEC series record of 56-4-8 (.882).

### **TIGER PITCHERS FIRE FIVE NO-HITTERS**

In 2003, LSU pitchers threw five no-hitters, the third most in school history. Kristin Schmidt led the way with three complete-game no-no's and one combined no-hitter. Tessa Lynam also threw one complete-game no-hitter and combined with Schmidt for a second. The Tigers now have 23 no-hitters in the program's history.

### **FITZGERALD HITS FOR THIRD-LONGEST STREAK**

Sara Fitzgerald recorded the third-longest hitting streak in LSU history, hitting safely in 12 games. The longest hitting streak in LSU history remains a 14-game streak by Stacey Newton in 1998. In 2001, Stephanie Hastings hit safely in 13 games. The 12-game streak equals those of Hastings in 1998 and Trena Peel in both 2001 and 2002.





## FOUR TIGERS TIE LSU SINGLE-GAME HITS RECORD

In a 19-0 win over Jackson State on Feb. 28, both Leigh Ann Danos and Tessa Lynam tied the LSU single-game hit record with four. Danos went 4-for-4 with two doubles, one RBI and two runs scored.

Lynam went 4-for-5 with a school-record three doubles and four runs scored in her first appearance in the the offensive line-up for the Tigers after being sidelined with a broken hand for the beginning of the season.

Camille Harris tied the record hits and RBIs in a game with a 4-for-4 performance and six RBIs in a 14-0 win over Southern Miss on April 16.

LaDonia Hughes' record performance came in a 4-0 win over Centenary on April 2 as she went 4-for-4 with two runs scored.

## LSU HAS RECORD GAME AGAINST JACKSON STATE

In the first meeting with Jackson State in the Purple & Gold Challenge, LSU broke the school record for RBIs in a game with 17 and tied the records for runs (19), hits (21) and doubles (7). Leigh Ann Danos tied the record for hits in a game with a 4-for-4 performance, including two doubles, one RBI and two runs scored.

In addition to throwing her first complete-game no-hitter, Tessa Lynam went 4-for-5 from the plate with three doubles, five RBIs and four runs scored, tying the school records for hits, runs and doubles in a game. The day marked her first in the offensive lineup for the Tigers after being sidelined with a broken hand for the beginning of the season.

## TIGERS WIN POOL AT NFCA LEADOFF CLASSIC

In a rain-shortened NFCA Leadoff Classic, the Tigers won their pool with a 2-1 record. LSU defeated Villanova, 6-2, in its first game. In the second game, the Tigers dropped a heart-breaking 7-6 decision to No. 7 Cal State Fullerton after leading 6-4 going into the seventh inning. LSU rebounded to defeat No. 10 Oklahoma, 7-4, in nine innings in the final game. Trailing 4-0 in the fourth inning, Oklahoma walked in a pair of runs before LaDonia Hughes tied the game with a two-RBI single. In the top of the ninth, she knocked in the game-winning run with an RBI double. Sara Fitzgerald then hit a two-run home run to give LSU the 7-4 win.

In five years of competing in one of the most prestigious invitational tournaments, the Tigers have posted a 12-11 all-time record.

## THE LONG BALL

### LSU BREAKS SINGLE-SEASON RECORD

The Tigers hit 52 home runs in 2003, breaking the school record for home runs in a single season, and were 26-4 when hitting sending one out of the park. Nine players hit at least one home run, while eight hit three or more. Christy Connor led the team with 10, followed by Tessa Lynam and Julie Wiese with nine each.

### TIGERS HIT HOME RUNS IN 11-STRAIGHT

The Tigers recorded a home run in 11-straight games, hitting 23 homers in the stretch. The streak lasted from April 15 vs. Southeastern Louisiana until April 27 vs. Auburn before LSU was held without a home run against Southern Miss on April 29.

### LSU BREAKS NCAA TOURNAMENT RECORD

Against Hawai'i in the NCAA Regionals, LSU broke the NCAA Tournament single-game home run record with five. The Tigers recorded a pair of homers by Blair Smith and Alicia Owen and one by Megann Steege to top the four recorded by Arizona twice, UCLA, Oregon and Alabama.

### TIGERS BREAK SINGLE-GAME TEAM RECORD

Against Cal Poly in the UNLV Softball Classic, LSU broke the school single-game record for home runs with five. The five home runs topped the previous record of four recorded on March 2, 1997 against Kansas in the Arizona Hillenbrand Invitational in Tucson, Ariz. The Tigers then tied that record two more times during the season, including once in the NCAA Tournament against Hawai'i.

### SIX PLAYERS TIE SINGLE-GAME RECORD

In 2003, six Tigers tied the LSU single-game home run record with a pair in a game. Julie Wiese accomplished the feat twice, recording a pair of round trippers against Cal Poly in the UNLV Softball Classic and again against Southeastern Louisiana. It was also the third two-home run game of Wiese's career.

Christy Connor also recorded a pair of homers against Cal Poly. Leigh Ann Danos and Tessa Lynam each recorded a two home runs in games at Auburn. Danos recorded her pair in the second game of the series, while Lynam's pair came in the third and final game of the series.

Alicia Owen and Blair Smith each recorded a pair of home runs in the NCAA Regional against Hawai'i, breaking the LSU record for home runs in an NCAA Tournament game.



Blair Smith tied the LSU single-game record with a pair of home runs as the Tigers broke the NCAA Tournament single-game record with five homers against Hawai'i.

## Game 1 – LSU 9, Hawai'i 4

A pair of home runs each by Blair Smith and Alicia Owen led a record-setting performance by the Tigers as fourth-seeded LSU defeated Hawai'i, 9-4, to open NCAA Regional action.

A home run by Megann Steege gave the Tigers five for the game, breaking the NCAA Tournament single-game home run record. The pair of homers each by Smith and Owen also tied the LSU single-game record for home runs.

Kristin Schmidt earned the complete-game victory for the Tigers, allowing four runs, all in the fifth inning, on nine hits with one walk and six strikeouts.

Smith's first home run, a solo shot in the third, gave LSU the early 1-0 lead. The Tigers then exploded for five runs in the fourth. Owen hit her first homer of the game, scoring Sara Fitzgerald from first. With Tessa Lynam on second after a double off the wall, Smith nailed her second home run of the game to give LSU the 6-0 lead.

In the top of the fifth, Hawai'i led off with three consecutive singles to load the bases. With one out, Denise Dahlberg knocked a two-RBI single to left. Stacey Ported then doubled with two outs, plating two more runs, to cut the Tiger lead to 6-4.

A solo shot by Owen in the fifth stretched the Tiger advantage to three, 7-4, before Steege concluded the scoring with the record-setting two-run blast in the bottom of the sixth.

## Game 2 – Texas 8, LSU 0

A pair of home runs in the fourth inning and one in the sixth lifted Texas past LSU, 8-0, in six innings in the second round of the NCAA Regionals.

Kristin Schmidt took the loss for the Tigers allowing four runs on six hits in three and two thirds innings. Tessa Lynam came on in relief in the fourth and allowed four runs on seven hits in two innings.

The run-rule loss was just the fourth in the program's history and snapped a streak of 343 consecutive games without being run-ruled. The last time LSU had been run-ruled was in 1998 when No. 4 Washington defeated the Tigers, 9-0, in five innings.

The Tigers broke up the perfect game in the top of the third as Blair Smith recorded a one-out infield single. After stealing second, she advanced to third on a throwing error by the catcher. LSU was unable to push the run across, however, as a pair of strikeouts ended the inning.

After the single by Smith in the third, a pair of walks by Christy Connor and Sara Fitzgerald were the only other baserunners the Tigers had for the game.

The Longhorns got a pair of home runs by Tamara Poppe and one by Lindsay Gardner that scored seven of the eight runs in the game. An RBI single by Alexis Garcia in the fifth knocked in the only other Texas run.

## Game 3 – LSU 1, Arizona State 4

Arizona State scored four runs in the third and held on to eliminate LSU from the NCAA Tournament, 4-1.

Kristin Schmidt took the loss for LSU, allowing four runs, two earned, on four hits with two walks and a strikeout in two and a third innings. Tessa Lynam came on in relief to throw three and two-thirds innings of shutout ball. She allowed two hits with a strikeout.

With the bases loaded and Arizona State leading 1-0 in the third, shortstop Blair Smith attempted to make a play at home on a fielder's choice, but overthrew the catcher, allowing two runs to score on the error. With a runner at third, an infield groundout scored the fourth run of the inning as the Sun Devils took the 4-0 lead.

In the sixth, the Tigers attempted a comeback as Jennie Reeves reached on an error to lead off the inning. After stealing second, she advanced to third on a single by Sara Fitzgerald.

A single by Christy Connor scored Reeves and moved Fitzgerald to second. With two outs and two on, Tessa Lynam, representing the tying run, then hit a deep fly ball to left field that fell just short of the fence for the final out of the inning.

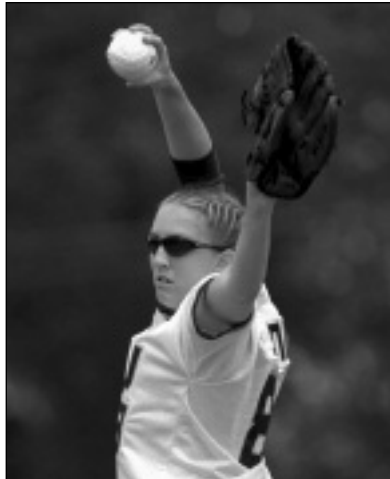

In 2004, the LSU softball team will begin its eighth season of play at Tiger Park. Built in 1996, the facility opened just prior to the inaugural 1997 season.

The 1,000-seat facility, which has been the softball team's home since its inception, is one of the most recent facilities added to LSU's campus.

In just seven years, Tiger Park has already hosted three NCAA Regional tournaments and become one of the toughest places in the nation for visitors to play.

LSU owns an astounding 202-23 (.898) record at home, including an 89-13 (.873) Southeastern Conference mark. In 2001, the Tigers advanced through the NCAA Regional

tournament at Tiger Park to its first berth in the Women's College World Series.

Tiger Park has also been home to some amazing feats. On May 20, 2000, LSU and Southern Miss battled out 12 scoreless innings in NCAA Regional action before the Tigers plated the game-winner in the 13th.

This past season, an average of 664 fans watched as LSU won 29 regular-season home games, the largest average home attendance in Tiger softball history. The SEC leader in attendance in 2003, LSU ranked seventh in the NCAA, marking its second national top 10 attendance ranking in the last three seasons.

## Dr. William L. Jenkins

President, LSU System

On April 1, 1999, William L. Jenkins, formerly Chancellor of Louisiana State University and Agricultural & Mechanical College, became President of the LSU System, which includes nine institutions on 10 campuses in five cities, as well as 10 public hospitals in 10 cities.

A native of South Africa, Dr. Jenkins studied at the University of Pretoria, where he received his professional veterinary medicine degree in 1958 and specialist credentials in 1968. He received a Ph.D. degree from the University of Missouri, Columbia, in 1970. After practicing veterinary medicine for four years, he joined the faculty at the University of Pretoria, advancing through the ranks to become professor and head of the Department of Veterinary Physiology, Pharmacology, and Toxicology in 1971.

He moved to the U.S. in 1978 and joined the faculty in the Department of Veterinary Physiology and Pharmacology at Texas A&M University. He was appointed dean of the LSU School of Veterinary Medicine in 1988 and was named LSU's provost and vice chancellor for academic affairs in September 1993.

When he was appointed LSU's fifth chancellor in November 1996, Dr. Jenkins reorganized the campus administration to be more effective and more responsive, and oversaw the development of a strategic plan to guide the University in its preparation for the challenges of the next century.

Over the years, President Jenkins has received numerous teaching and service awards and recognitions, having been named the 1997 Communicator of the Year by the Public Relations Association of Louisiana and a Distinguished Alumnus by the University of Missouri. The regional chapter of Toastmasters International also presented him with its 1999 Communication and Leadership Award, and he was awarded the Vision of Excellence Award 2000 by the New Orleans Regional Chamber of Commerce and the New Orleans Chapter of

MetroVision. In addition, the University of Pretoria bestowed an honorary doctorate on Dr. Jenkins in September of 2000.

Dr. Jenkins has been active in continuing education and has delivered more than 150 lectures and addresses to diverse groups in both the United States and abroad. He has taught extensively at both the professional and graduate levels. He has published more than 60 scientific articles and has contributed 15 chapters to various textbooks. He is coauthor of a textbook on veterinary pharmacology.

Over the years, Dr. Jenkins has been a member of many professional organizations and select committees. Most recently, he served on the National Institute of Health's Alcohol Abuse and Misuse on College Campuses Committee and on a special steering committee of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools to review accreditation criteria for colleges and universities.

Dr. Jenkins also is a member of the National Association of State Universities and Land Grant Colleges' Committee on Food and Society as well as the Committee on the Future of Coastal Louisiana.

His current community engagement includes serving on the boards of the Louisiana Endowment for the Humanities, Greater Baton Rouge Chamber of Commerce, Academic Distinction Fund, Council for a Better Louisiana, Arts Council of Greater Baton Rouge, and the Baton Rouge board of the National Conference for Community and Justice.

Dr. Jenkins and his wife, Peggy, have four children—Sharon Gwynn, Anthea, and Warren—and nine grandchildren.



## Dr. Kenneth E. Carpenter, Faculty Athletics Representative

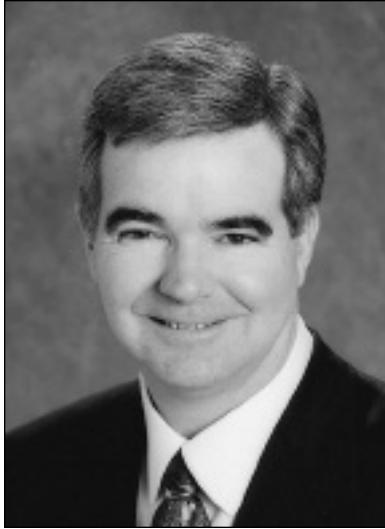
Dr. Kenneth E. Carpenter is in his second year as LSU's faculty representative in NCAA and Southeastern Conference matters.

Carpenter, a professor in the School of Architecture, has taught at LSU since 1986. He received his bachelor's degree in architecture from the University of Oklahoma in 1962 and his master's from Minnesota in 1967. Before joining the LSU faculty, he served at Clemson University as Associate Professor of Architecture from 1967-77; at Ball State University, where he was Professor and

# Dr. Mark A. Emmert

Chancellor, LSU

Dr. Mark A. Emmert was appointed chancellor of Louisiana State University and Agricultural & Mechanical College on April 16, 1999, becoming the sixth chancellor to lead the state's flagship University.

Prior to joining LSU, Emmert served as chancellor of the University of Connecticut, provost and vice president for academic affairs at Montana State University, and held various faculty and administrative positions at the University of Colorado. He has served as a member of numerous academic and civic boards and organizations.

Both the Fulbright Commission and the American Council on Education have awarded fellowships to Emmert. He has also been inducted into the Phi Kappa Phi Honor Society, Alpha Lambda Delta Scholastic Society, Golden Key Honor Society, and the Connecticut Academy of Arts and Sciences. He is active in the American Council on Education, the New England Council of Presidents, and the National Association of State Universities and Land-Grant Colleges, where he served as chair of the Council on Academic Affairs.

A native of Tacoma, Washington, Emmert holds a bachelor's degree in political science from the University of Washington and master's and doctoral degrees from the Maxwell School of Syracuse University. His scholarly work has focused on public policy topics, as well as issues

in organizational theory. He has published his research in leading journals within his field and has served on several editorial boards. He has also served as a visiting scholar and lecturer internationally, working in Australia, Hong Kong, Japan, and Panama.

He is married to DeLaine S. Emmert, a former elementary school teacher, who is active in community, university, and philanthropic organizations. They have two children, Stephen and Jennifer.

LSU's programs enjoyed remarkable success under Bertman's direction in 2002-03, as 16 of the Tigers' 20 sports participated in NCAA post-season competition. That accomplishment, along with improved graduation rates, increased team grade point averages, and the construction of new academic facilities, foreshadow even more significant deeds in Bertman's tenure.

Bertman was named LSU's athletics director on January 19, 2001. With Bertman, LSU gained an athletics director who provides the leadership and experience necessary to manage the Tigers' nearly \$40 million budget.

As head coach of the LSU Baseball program, Bertman guided the Tigers to five NCAA baseball titles. LSU led the nation in attendance in each of his final six seasons (1996-2001) as his teams drew huge crowds to venerable Alex Box Stadium.

He also served as head coach of the 1996 U.S. Olympic team which captured the bronze medal in Atlanta.

Bertman continues to be honored for his remarkable coaching tenure, as he was inducted in June, 2002, into the Louisiana Sports Hall of Fame. He was inducted into the American Baseball Coaches Association Hall of Fame in January, 2003.

In a *Baseball America* poll released in January, 1999, Bertman was voted the second greatest college baseball coach of the 20th century, trailing only Rod Dedeaux of Southern California. Bertman and Dedeaux are the only coaches to win five College World Series titles.

He had previously earned stellar recognition as one of the nation's brightest assistant coaches while at the University of Miami (Fla.) for eight seasons (1976-83).

Prior to working at Miami, Bertman spent 11 years at Miami Beach High School, where he directed the Hi-Tides to a state championship and two runners-up finishes. He was named Florida's Coach of the Year on three occasions.

In 1975, Bertman coached at Miami-Dade Downtown, leaving after one season to join legendary head coach Ron Fraser at Miami. The move was a homecoming of sorts, as Bertman spent his collegiate playing days with the Hurricanes as an outfielder and catcher from 1958-60. He earned his B.A. in health and physical education from Miami in 1961 and received his master's degree in 1964.

Bertman and his wife Sandy are the parents of four daughters -- Jan, Jodi, Lisa and Lori. The Bertmans have two grandchildren -- Sophie Faith and Isaac Stanley, the children of Emile and Lori Bertman Guirard.





**Dan Radakovich**  
Senior Associate Athletics Director

Dan Radakovich enters his third year as LSU's senior associate athletics director after joining the University in May of 2001. He came to LSU after serving as director of athletics at American University in Washington D.C.

As LSU's senior associate athletics director, Radakovich oversees the daily operations of the LSU Athletics Department and serves as Skip Bertman's chief assistant.

Prior to his one-year stint at American University, Radakovich spent six years as the associate athletics director at South Carolina, where he directed the financial operations for the Gamecocks' \$30 million athletics department budget. Radakovich also worked closely with South Carolina Athletics Director Mike McGee in laying the ground work for the new \$70 million Colonial Center in Columbia, which was completed in November, 2002. He also served as the department liaison for marketing and promotional activities with Host Communications. Radakovich was also responsible for home event management, as well as overseeing concessions, football travel and the video department.

During his tenure with South Carolina, Radakovich supervised the finances and logistics for \$33 million in facility improvements.

Radakovich served as the senior associate athletics director at Long Beach State from 1989-94. In that capacity, he managed a \$5 million budget and supervised the nationally recognized men's basketball and baseball programs. In addition, Radakovich reorganized the fund-raising operations and coordinated the production and sales of radio broadcasting packages.

Radakovich began his collegiate athletics career as the athletics business manager at the University of Miami from 1983-85. He worked in the private sector for five years before joining Long Beach State.

Radakovich, a native of Aliquippa, Pa., graduated from Indiana University of Pennsylvania in 1980 with a bachelor of science degree in finance. Radakovich was also a football letterwinner as well as a student coach for the Indians. He then went on to earn his master's degree in business administration from the Miami in 1982.

Radakovich is married to the former Marcie McDonald, and the couple has two children, Christian (13) and Grant (9).



**Judy Southard**  
Associate Athletics Director/  
Senior Women's Administrator

Judy Southard, who had a very successful career as both a head women's basketball coach and director of athletics, enters her third year as LSU's senior women's administrator after joining the department in the summer of 2001.

As LSU's senior women's administrator, Southard serves as the administrative liaison to the Tigers' nationally-recognized Olympic sports teams.

Southard came to LSU from Texas Woman's University, where she served as the school's director of athletics for nine years.

While at Texas Woman's University, Southard initiated a corporate partnership program for the athletics department that tripled the involvement of area businesses and corporations in Pioneer athletics. Southard also established the TWU Intercollegiate Athletics Hall of Fame and played a key role in the addition of softball and soccer to their list of intercollegiate sports. In 2000, Southard served as chair of the NCAA Division II Women's Basketball Committee.

Prior to her nine-year stint at Texas Woman's University, Southard served as head women's basketball coach at Marshall University for 11 years, where she led the Lady Herd to five Southern Conference regular-season titles. During her 11 years at Marshall, Southard was named Southern Conference Coach of the Year three times. Her 178 career wins still stands as a school record for women's basketball victories. Southard also served as assistant athletics director at Marshall from 1983-88, including a four-month period as interim director.

Prior to her tenure at Marshall, Southard spent three years as head coach at Tennessee-Martin and one season as an assistant coach at Tennessee.

As a high school teacher from 1970-77, Southard coached both basketball and tennis, and led her West Florence High School basketball team to the South Carolina 4A state title in 1976.

A native of Columbia, S.C., Southard earned a bachelor's degree in physical education and health from Coker College in 1970, and a master's degree in physical education from Tennessee in 1978.



## Setting the Standard for Intercollegiate Athletics in Softball

In only seven short years, the Southeastern Conference has become one of the premier softball conferences in the nation.

The SEC qualified six teams for the 2003 NCAA Tournament - Alabama, Florida, Georgia, LSU, Mississippi State and South Carolina. Alabama was the lone SEC team to receive a No.1 seed, as the Crimson Tide, along with Florida, hosted regional tournaments. It was the second time that two SEC schools have hosted regionals. With its second Women's College World Series appearance in 2003, Alabama became the first school from the SEC to represent the conference on more than one occasion since softball became a league sport. The six teams from the SEC to qualify was second only to the PAC-10 for the most teams from one conference to make the 2003 NCAA Tournament.

The SEC qualified a league-best seven teams for the 2002 NCAA Tournament - Alabama, Auburn, Arkansas, Georgia, LSU, Mississippi State and South Carolina. LSU was the lone SEC team to receive a No. 1 seed, while South Carolina hosted a regional for the second time since 197. The seven teams from the SEC to qualify tied the Pac-10 for the most teams from one conference to make the 2002 NCAA Tournament.

In 2001 the SEC qualified four teams for the NCAA Tournament. LSU, Alabama, South Carolina and Florida all made yet another appearance in the tourney, while Mississippi State barely missed the field. LSU and Alabama both secured No. 1 seeds and hosted a regional championship, marking the first time the SEC had two schools achieve such an honor.

Trailing only the Pac-10, the SEC qualified a then-record six teams for the 2000 NCAA Tournament, as LSU, Arkansas, Mississippi State, Alabama, Florida and SEC Tournament Champion South Carolina all made the field of 48.

The 1999 season was the first in which the conference was eligible for an automatic berth to the NCAA Tournament. That year, four teams earned bids to postseason, the second most by any conference.

The sport came under the auspices of the SEC in the 1997 season. Since then, eight different teams have made appearances in the NCAA Tournament, including four WCWS berths - two by Alabama in 2000 and 2003 and one each by South Carolina in 1997 and LSU in 2001. The Tigers reached the semi-

finals in 2001 and finished the season ranked third nationally.

Two different teams have won both the SEC regular season and tournament titles in the same season. South Carolina has won both once (1997) and LSU has won both three times (1999, 2001 and 2002).

Seven teams (Alabama, Florida, Georgia, LSU, Mississippi State, South Carolina and Tennessee) have made Top 25 appearances and four teams (Alabama, Georgia, LSU and South Carolina) have climbed into the Top 10 of the NFCA/USA Today Poll. At least one SEC team has been ranked in the poll each week since the inception of SEC Softball. In 2003 alone, SEC teams made 63 appearances in the poll.

South Carolina is the dean of SEC Softball, with a rich history dating back 30 seasons. The Gamecocks have made 13 NCAA Regional and three WCWS appearances.

Mississippi State played softball for five seasons during the 1980's before resuming the sport when it was added to the SEC. Tennessee added softball in 1996, one year before Alabama, Arkansas, Auburn, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, LSU and Ole Miss began softball programs to give the league 11 representatives (Vanderbilt does not sponsor softball).
