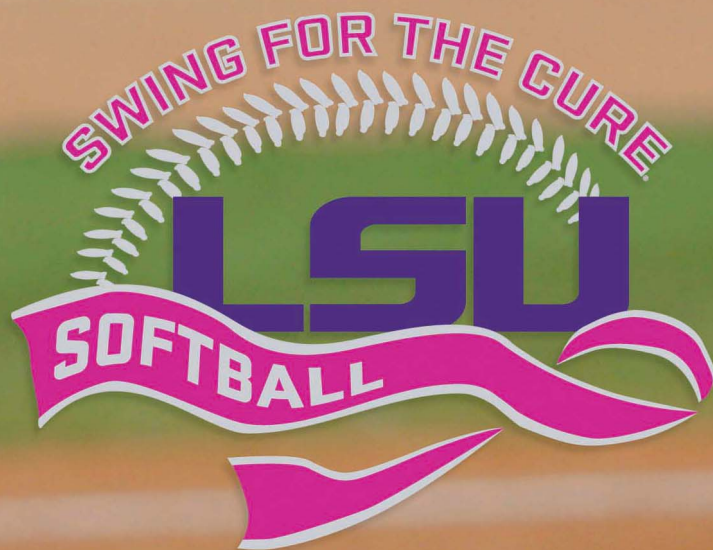

1

WCWS Most Outstanding Player

Kristin Schmidt earned Women's College World Series Most Outstanding Player honors at the 2004 WCWS, making her the only player to not win the national championship and earn the honor.

2

Women's College World Series Appearances

LSU is one of four schools in SEC history with multiple Women's College World Series appearances. The Tigers along with Florida and Tennessee have tallied a winning record in WCWS play.

3

Academic All-Americans

The Tigers have had three CoSIDA Academic All-Americans in the 13-year history of the program, while only one program in the SEC has had more than four.

5

SEC Championships

LSU claimed an unprecedented four consecutive league championships from 1999-2002. Only two other schools in SEC history have claimed multiple regular season titles.

5

SEC Tournament Titles

LSU has won an unrivaled five SEC Tournament titles and advanced to the championship game in eight of the past 11 seasons.

6

SEC Tournament MVP's

Six of the 13 SEC Tournament Most Valuable Player honors have been won by the Tigers, including an unparalleled five straight from 1999-2004.

8

SEC Western Division Titles

LSU has won more Division titles than any school in the SEC. Only the Tigers and Alabama have claimed the division crown.

9

50-win Seasons

LSU is one of only two programs in the nation, along with Arizona, to have posted nine 50-win seasons over the past 13 years.

10

NFCA All-Time Ranking

LSU ranks No. 10 in the NFCA All-time poll, the second highest ranking of any team in the SEC. In addition, the Tigers are tied for the youngest program ranked in the top 10.

11

NCAA Regional Appearances

LSU has racked up 11 NCAA Tournament appearances, including seven-straight from 1998-2004. The Tigers are tied for the most NCAA trips among SEC schools since 1997.

12

All-Americans

The Tigers have 12 NFCA All-Americans in the 13-year history of the program, second most of any school in the SEC.

51

Wins Per season

LSU is averaging 51 wins a season over the past 13 years, the fifth best average in the nation.

101

Weeks Ranked in The ESPN/USA Softball Poll

The Tigers have been in the ESPN/USA Softball poll for 101 of the 110 weeks since the poll's inception during the 2003 season, while spending 44 weeks ranked inside the Top 10.

166

Weeks Ranked in the NFCA/USA Today Poll

LSU has been ranked in the NFCA/USA Today Coaches poll for 166 of the 187 weeks since the Tigers began play in 1997, including a span of 103 consecutive weeks between Feb. 20, 1998, and March 30, 2005. The Tigers also have been among the nation's Top 10 for 93 of those weeks.

LSU has compiled the sixth-best winning percentage in the nation over the last 13 seasons.

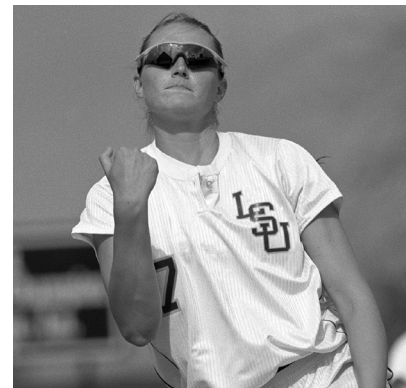

The 2010 LSU Softball Media Guide is produced by the LSU Sports Information Office and has been rated among the top seven collegiate softball publications in the nation for five of the last eight seasons.

The media guide was named third best in the nation in 2007 by the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA). The publication ranked second in 2005, third in 2004, fifth in 2006 and seventh in 2002.





IT'S TIME

The LSU softball program has built its legacy and tradition on two Women's College World Series trips, five SEC championships and 11 NCAA Regional appearances.

Head coach Yvette Girouard is confident that the tools are in place to return to the pinnacle of the sport as the Tigers blend of solid nucleus with talented newcomers for the 2010 season.

"It's time encompasses many facets of our program. It's time to achieve the goals that are always established in this program," Girouard said. "It's time to embrace the community, fill the stadium and win championships. These are all things that LSU softball has done in the past. We understand that to reach these goals we have to win at the highest level. That's why you come to LSU."

LSU also enters its second season in the state-of-the-art Tiger Park. The park has gone through many upgrades in between its first and second season.

"We're always going to try to add something different and exciting for the fans to realize that things will constantly upgrade," Girouard said. "We have new palm trees coming in, a bronze Tiger on the concourse and the SEC flags around the stadium. Our clubhouse also represents the rich history of our program with plaques of every All-SEC and All-American. Our goal is to continue to make Tiger Park one of the coolest and prettiest ballparks in the country."

THE BATTERY

As is the case for any collegiate softball program, LSU's pitching staff will have the biggest impact on the Tigers. LSU boast one of the nation's deepest staffs with five viable options that each possess different weapons.

Seniors Cody Trahan and Kirsten Shortridge headline the staff with junior Casey Faile, sophomore Brittany Mack and freshman Rachele Fico all ready to contribute when their opportunity presents itself.

"It always starts in the circle and I feel that both Cody and Kirsten can be All-SEC pitchers this season," Girouard said. "Their experience is vital. The big question mark for both is if they can stay healthy. We minimized their innings and workouts during the fall so they can be as strong as possible for the spring."

"Cody has very good spin and is at her best when she has command hitting her spots across the inside and outside portions of the plate. Kirsten's biggest asset is that she keeps the ball down. She has a tremendous drop ball, the best on our staff, and keeps the ball in the park. That allows what we feel is a very strong defense behind her to control the game."

"Brittany Mack came on phenomenally during her freshman season and had to endure a stress fracture at the end. Not having her for postseason play really hurt us last season. She has some devastating pitches in her arsenal that are very unique and she's a workaholic who wants to strike everyone out. The future is extremely bright for Brittany Mack."

"Casey Faile gave us some very important innings and saved us in some games last season. She gives us another different look with her change-up and wants to compete at the highest level. During the fall, she polished up her game and is once again capable of producing some great innings for us."

"Rachele Fico comes to LSU as one of the most heralded pitchers since Britni Sneed and Kristen Schmidt. She has adjusted to college life where we're demanding so much of you personally, time management skills, different eating habits and sleeping habits."

"We worked with Fico on a lot of things over the fall to give her more weapons in the circle. She hits her spots as well as anyone I've coached in a long time. If you are afforded the opportunity to always work ahead in the count, the ball's in your back pocket and you have all the power."

Calling the shots for LSU behind the plate will be sophomore Morgan Russell and freshman Lauren Houston.

"Morgan and Lauren are both valuable defensive catchers who have been working hard during the fall season," assistant coach Kristen Hobbs said. "They're working really well with framing and receiving the ball in addition to developing relationships with each member of the pitching staff."

"We've been working with them to take a more of a leadership role even though they're both young catchers. Even though it's a competitive position, their relationship is great. They work really well together, and are not afraid to ask each other questions. We play a lot of games and need both of them. Morgan has used her experiences from last season and has refocused herself to get better. She does a fantastic job of helping Lauren develop."

THE INFIELD

The Tigers return three-fourths of its infield after having to replace 75 percent of the unit in 2008. LSU's infield gained valuable experience last season. Junior third baseman Jessica Mouse and sophomore first baseman Anissa Young paced the Tigers with .991 and .990 fielding percentages, respectively.

"Jessica is a special player and makes third base look incredibly easy," Hobbs said. "Third base is a very hard position because they play so close to the opposing hitters. Her footwork, arm strength and leadership abilities are unbelievable. She's everything a coach could ever ask for and leads by example making everybody around her better."

"Juliana Santos did an awesome job at shortstop for us last year. When looking at the statistics, shortstops usually get the most balls. She's got excellent range and makes every play we've asked her to. You'll see her play a lot of shortstop as well as second base."

"Allison Falcon, one of our freshmen, absolutely lit it up during our fall games. We knew we were getting an athlete with her and she's going to be an immediate impact player for the Tigers this season. We love the fact that she's the type of player that will rise up to a challenge. You'll see a lot of Juliana and Allison all over the middle of the infield."

"Both Heidi Pizer and Courtney Hollier will be in the middle infield mix. Heidi struggled a bit this fall after transferring from Louisiana-Lafayette. She felt that she had a lot to prove and we really just want her to be the natural athlete that she is. Her long legs and arm allow her to get to a lot of balls. She's very well-rounded and can play first base as well."

"Courtney is one of the best defensive players, glove-wise, that I've seen. She was valuable late in games as a defensive replacement last season. We love that she's very scrappy and been working hard on being more vocal in the infield. She's going to make a lot of plays and her bat is getting better each day."

"Having Anissa Young at first base is really comfortable for our infield. To have her vocal abilities out there keeps our unit together. She's not someone you notice all the time but not many balls get past by her. There are times where our first basemen touch the ball just as much as the pitchers and catchers. She does a wonderful job of digging out the throw that isn't perfect."

"Tiffany Shaw and Lauren Capello add depth to our infield. Tiffany has done a great of moving in from the outfield during the fall. She has battled through some injuries, and we wanted to get her to a place where we thought she could best benefit the Tigers. Her quickness and hard work has made the transition easy."

"Lauren sees action at both third and first base. She does a great job receiving the ball behind Anissa at first base. Her bat also is very good off the bench as a pinch-hitter."

THE OUTFIELD

LSU's outfield will once again be characterized by speed, power, experience and depth. Seniors Kirsten Shortridge and Rachel Mitchell will patrol center and right field for the Tigers.

When Shortridge is pitching, Mitchell moves to center which allows junior Ashley Applegate to slide into right field. Applegate also saw a majority of time at designated player when not in the outfield. Sophomore Ashley Langoni is the frontrunner to play left field.

"Kirsten is an elite centerfielder. Her range allows her to make every play," associate head coach James DeFeo said. "She is not afraid to sacrifice her body and makes tough plays look

routine. It's a shame that she is a senior, but we look to her to have an amazing final campaign."

"We're expecting big things again from Rachel. She worked extremely hard during the offseason. I believe she'll remind everyone of her power numbers from her freshman and sophomore seasons. Her swing is exactly where it needs to be and we'll rely heavily in her in clutch situations."

"It's key for us to have interchangeable parts in the outfield because that allows us to give teams different looks with our lineup. Applegate has a strong arm and is very dynamic part of our unit. Her range continues to get better and she is a big part of our offense behind Kirsten to set the table for the heart of our lineup."

"Langoni really came into her own as she was thrown into the fire during NCAA's in the outfield. She took advantage of the situation and took to it like a fish to water. The fall season allowed her to get more comfortable and relax out there after getting more reps. That comfort level will help her swing the bat with more confidence."

"Katie Guillory, Lindsay Price and Jackie Victoriano have been working hard and each have positions where they step in if the injury bug does happen to bite. They have shown great things both offensively and defensively in addition to picking up the necessary skills to be a SEC level outfielder."

THE SCHEDULE

LSU starts 2010 with its toughest non-conference weekend against three national powerhouses in North Carolina, DePaul and host Texas at the Time Warner Texas Invitational [Feb. 12-14].

"Our opening weekend at Texas is one of the better opening weekends in the nation," Girouard said. "It will be a challenge for us to start on the road against three quality programs. We also recruit heavily in Texas and it will be a special weekend for the five Texans on our roster."

The Tigers return to Baton Rouge and open an 18-game homestand against Louisiana-Monroe [Feb. 17] before playing host to the first of three tournaments on consecutive weekends. LSU welcomes Michigan, Oklahoma State and Virginia for the Tiger Classic [Feb. 19-21].

Houston, Jacksonville State and Southern visit Tiger Park the following weekend for the Tiger Invitational [Feb. 20-22]. LSU squares off with Campbell, South Alabama and Syracuse at the Purple and Gold Challenge [March 5-7] to conclude the non-conference tournament schedule.

LSU also faces McNeese State [March 31 & April 21] in a home-and-home series along with Southeastern Louisiana [March 24] and Nicholls State [April 14] on the road.

"Our home schedule is very exciting for our fans at Tiger Park especially our tournament schedules," Girouard said. "You always want to make sure that the schedule addresses the RPI, and we've done that by playing seven NCAA Tournament teams leading up to conference play."

LSU heads into SEC action at South Carolina [March 13-14]. The Tigers also head to Women's College World Series foes Florida [April 3-4] and Alabama [April 7] along with stops at a pair of NCAA Regional foes in Kentucky [April 24-25] and Tennessee [May 8-9].

LSU takes on Ole Miss [March 17] followed by NCAA Regional participants Auburn [March 20-21], Mississippi State [April 10-11] and Arkansas [April 17-18]. The Tigers wrap up the home slate against Georgia [May 1-2], its fourth 2009 Women's College World Series opponent.

"There are no pushovers in the SEC and the proof is in the pudding as nine teams from our league made the NCAA's last season," Girouard said. "It's a brutal road schedule for us especially having to play Florida and Alabama back-to-back over a span of five days. Tennessee is very tough in Knoxville as we found out in last year's SEC Tournament and Kentucky is a program on the rise."

LSU is sixth nationally and have compiled an impressive 441-137-1 record since Girouard took over the program prior to the 2001 season.

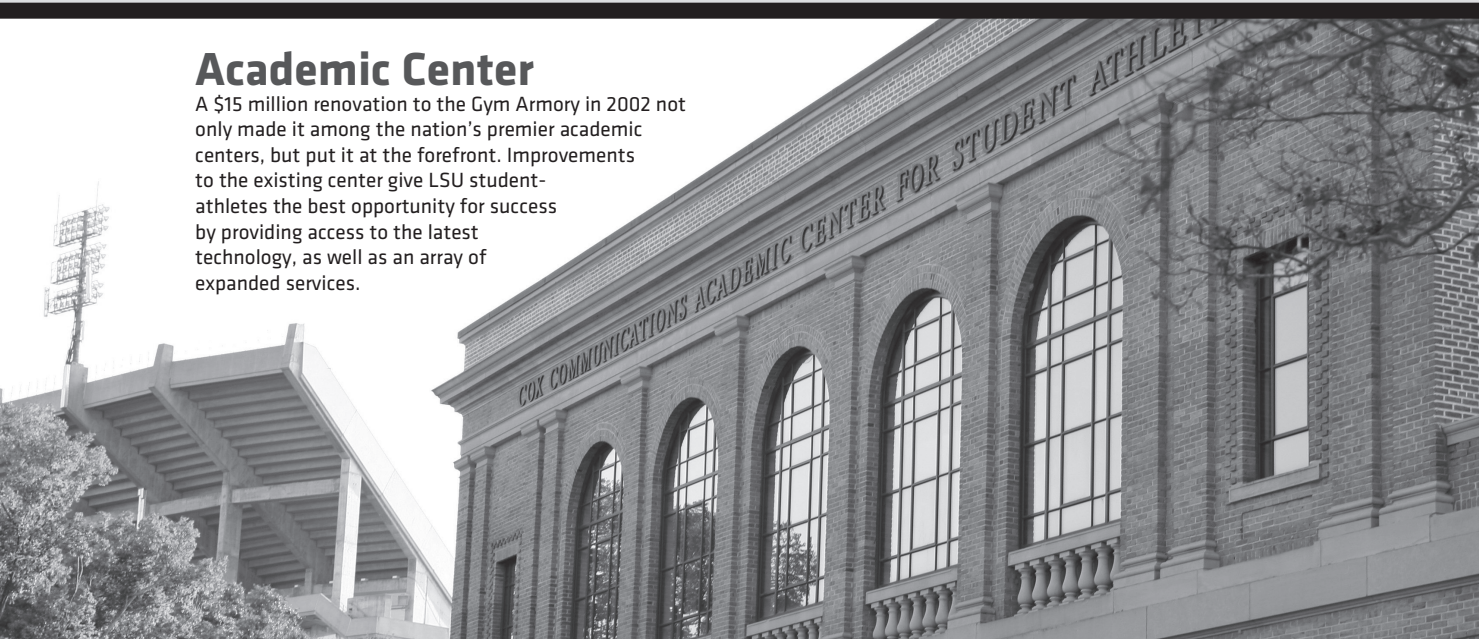


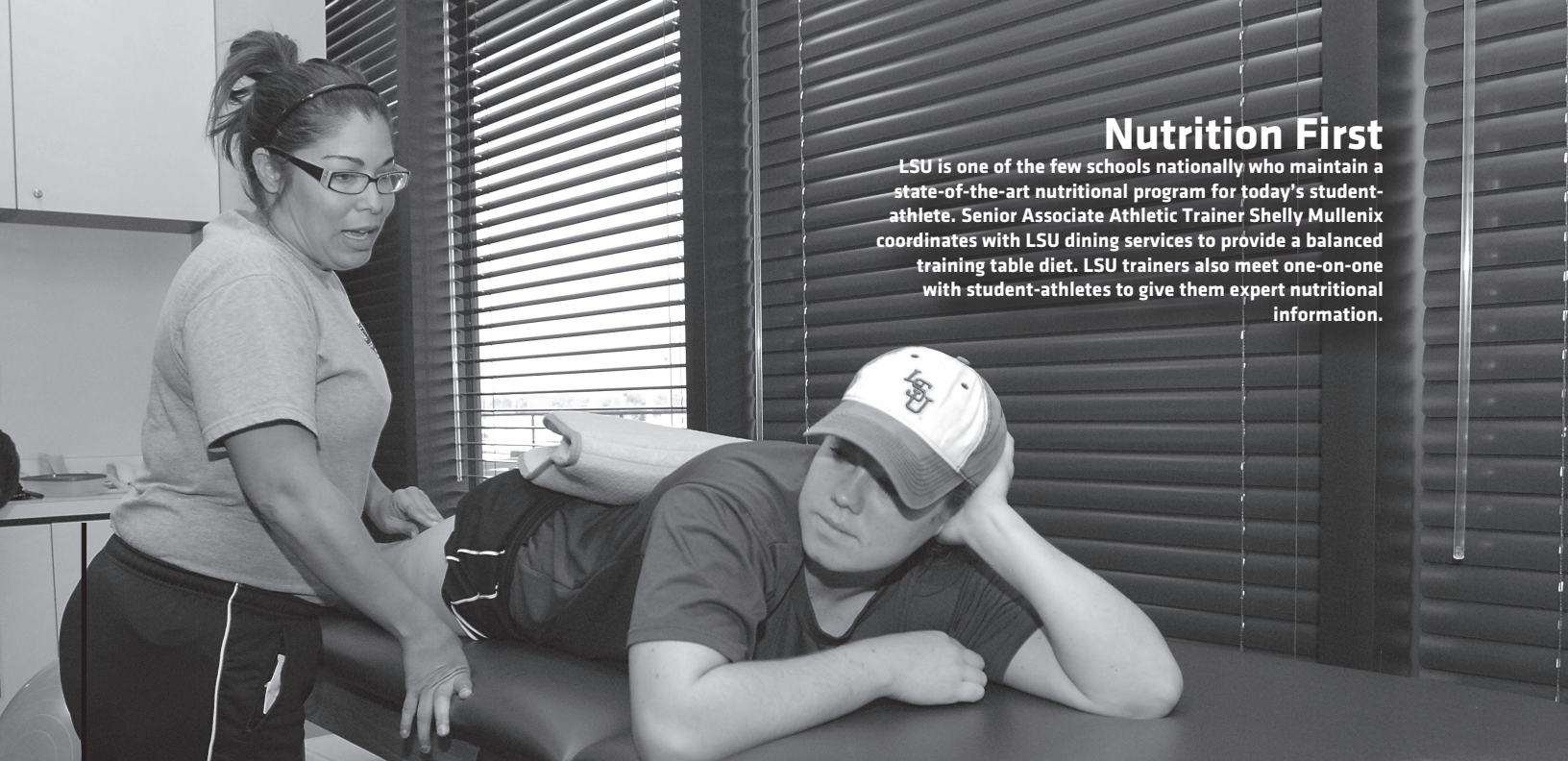
Media Training

LSU trainers also meet one-on-one with student-athletes to give them expert nutritional information.

Athletic TRAINING



LSU boasts the largest and most complete athletic training facilities in all of collegiate athletics with both the Operations Center and the Broussard Center for Athletic Training in Tiger Stadium. Both are furnished with the latest in technology and equipment. The Operations Center training room features a full view of the practice fields, two hot/cold jacuzzis and

an underwater treadmill. The Broussard Center includes an on-site x-ray room, an in-house pharmacy, as well as the largest hydrotherapy pool in both collegiate and professional sports and is one of the few collegiate training centers with a full-service pharmacy and a full-service vision center.



Hydrotherapy Treatment

An integral part of rehabbing and developing LSU student-athletes is the operations center's hot/cold jacuzzis and an underwater treadmill in a fully equipped Hydrotherapy room. The Broussard training center boasts the largest hydrotherapy pool in both collegiate and professional sports.

The two story, 22,000 square foot facility contains 20 treatment tables with the newest forms of modalities available, 14 taping stations, a 1,600 square foot rehabilitation area which contains the latest rehabilitation equipment including the Cybex Norm, Woodway treadmills and Body Master select rise equipment. LSU's multi-million dollar athletic training facility is named in honor of Dr. Martin J. Broussard (left), the legendary trainer whose career spanned over 40 years at LSU.

The LSU strength and conditioning facility, located in Tiger Stadium, was built in 1997 and features the latest in both strength training and cardiovascular training equipment.



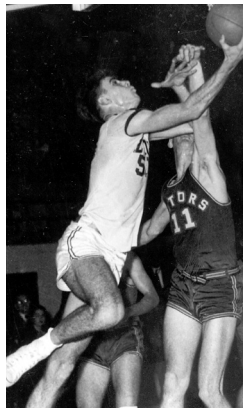

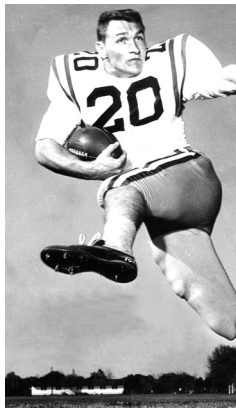

Baseball retired the No. 15 in honor of longtime coach and athletics director emeritus Skip Bertman and the No. 20 for Ben McDonald. Casanova, Macklin and McDonald joined the prestigious list in May 2009.

Bob Pettit

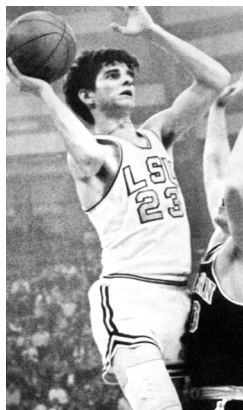

Billy Cannon

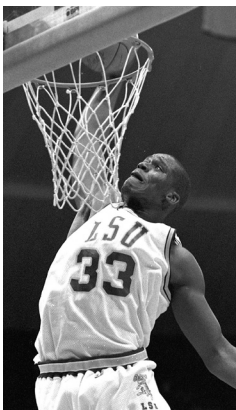
One of the true legends of college football in the South, Cannon was the 1959 Heisman Trophy winner and helped the Tigers to the 1958 national title. Cannon's most memorable performance came in 1959 against Ole Miss when No. 1 LSU trailed No. 3 Ole Miss 3-0 in the fourth quarter. He fielded a punt, broke seven tackles and returned it 89 yards for the 7-3 victory. He went on to a successful 11-year professional career.

Pete Maravich

"Pistol Pete," Maravich still holds the NCAA record for career points with 3,667 and for career scoring average with 44.2 points a game. He was selected the National Player of the Year in 1970 after leading the Tigers to the NIT Final Four. He scored 50-plus points an amazing 28 times. He went on to a 10-year professional career and was selected as one of the NBA's 50 greatest players in 1997.

Shaquille O'Neal

O'Neal was the first pick in the 1992 NBA Draft. He was named MVP of the league in 2000 and was a three-time NBA Finals MVP after leading the Los Angeles Lakers to three World Championships. At LSU, O'Neal averaged 21.6 points and 13.6 rebounds for his career, and in 1991, he was named the World's Amateur Athlete of the Year as well as SEC Athlete of the Year and National Player of the Year. In 1997, he was named as one of the top 50 players in NBA history.

About LSU Retired Jerseys

The retirement of the jerseys of Casanova, McDonald and Macklin comes under a new provision of the LSU jersey retirement bylaws that says the retirement of an athlete's jersey in a particular sport does not preclude a current student-athlete in that sport from wearing the jersey number in that or any other sport, subject to the discretion of the head coach. This provision applies only to jerseys retired after January 1, 2007, so the numbers worn by Maravich, Pettit, O'Neal, Cannon and Bertman may never again be worn by future student-athletes in their respective sports. To have a jersey retired at LSU, an athlete must have completed intercollegiate competition for LSU a minimum of five years prior to nomination. Athletes must have demonstrated truly unusual and outstanding accomplishments, exceeding and in addition to all criteria used for Hall of Fame selection. Nominees must have a unanimous vote of support from the Hall of Fame committee.

Skip Bertman

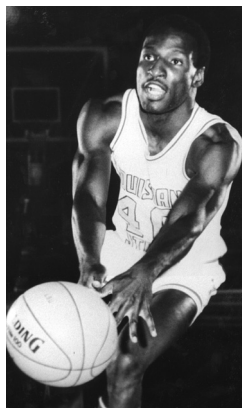
A legend in the college baseball ranks, Bertman created a dynasty at LSU, guiding the Tigers to five national titles in a 10-year stretch from 1991-2000. He also coached the United States to a bronze medal at the 1996 Olympics in Atlanta and was an assistant on the gold medal-winning U.S. squad in Seoul, Korea, in 1988. Bertman retired from coaching following the 2001 season and is the LSU athletics director emeritus. Bertman was inducted into the College Baseball Hall of Fame in 2006.

Tommy Casanova

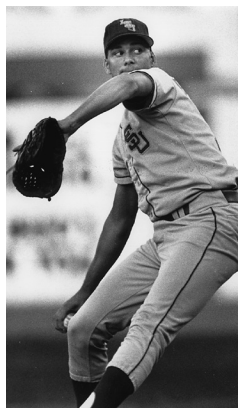
Tommy Casanova is the only three-time All-American in the history of LSU football and is a member of the College Football Hall of Fame. During his Tiger career from 1969-71, Casanova personified versatility for his myriad of talents as he played offense, defense, returned punts and kickoffs. One of just two three-time All-SEC performers at LSU, he played six seasons with the Cincinnati Bengals of the NFL while earning his medical degree.

Rudy Macklin

Rudy Macklin was a two-time basketball All-American selection during his Tiger career from 1976-81 during which time he became LSU's all-time leading rebounder with 1,276 boards and the second-leading scorer in school history behind only the legendary Pete Maravich with 2,080 points. He led the Tigers to two Elite Eight appearances and the 1981 Final Four in Philadelphia. He still holds the school single game rebound record with 32, a mark like some of the great records in any sport that may never be broken.

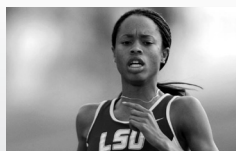

Ben McDonald won the prestigious Golden Spikes Award, given annually to the nation's most outstanding player, in 1989 and is a member of the College Baseball Hall of Fame. He led LSU to two College World Series appearances. In 1989, McDonald was also named National Player of the Year by Baseball America, The Sporting News and Collegiate Baseball as he went 14-4 with an ERA of 3.49 and an SEC record 202 strikeouts. He was selected by the Baltimore Orioles as the No. 1 pick in the major league draft in 1989 and went on to enjoy a 10-year major league career with the Orioles and the Milwaukee Brewers.

She was the first pick of the 2006 WNBA Draft by the Minnesota Lynx and teamed with fellow LSU alum Sylvia Fowles to claim an Olympic gold medal for the United States in 2008.

Sylvia Fowles was a two-time State Farm All-American at LSU before going onto a career in the WNBA with the Chicago Sky. Fowles and Seimone Augustus became the first LSU basketball players to claim Olympic gold when they did so in 2008 for the United States. Fowles returned to LSU to get her degree in general studies in May 2009.

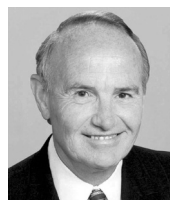

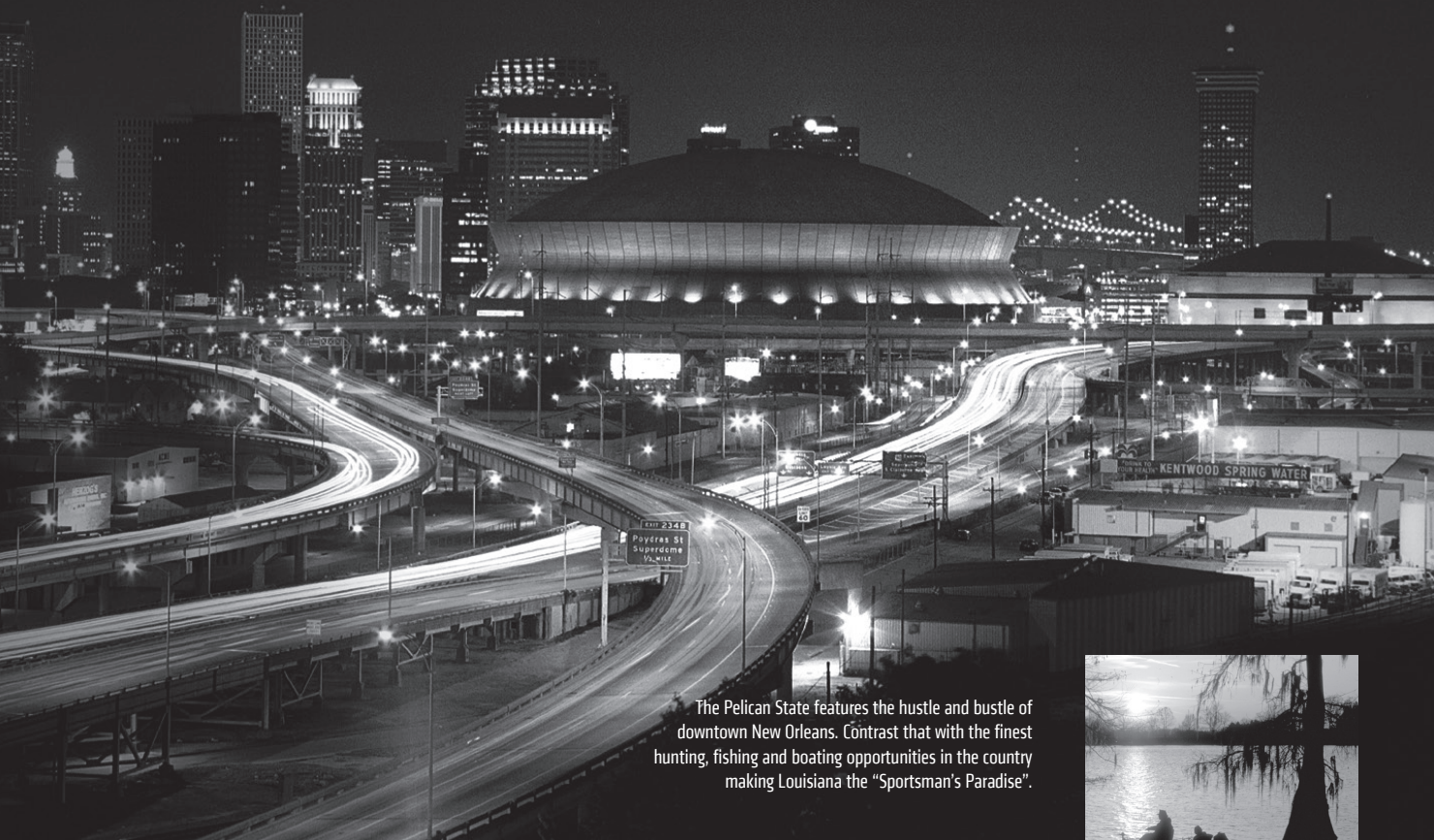

THE GIROUARD PHILOSOPHY

I believe fully in trying to instill in our athletes a knowledge and a love for the qualities and virtues that comprise good character.

Character is what we are inside. It is often revealed by how we act when no one is looking. Winning in our program should occur both on the field as well as in the classroom, in society and in personal lives after Tiger softball.

When our players leave our program, hopefully we have developed successful people that will feel that their Tiger family will always have a unique and lasting place in their hearts.

LSU is a very special place with everything provided for success; from athletic facilities to the very best academic center in the country and a first-class administration all at the disposal of our student athletes.

In addition to having the friendliness of Louisiana people, LSU has one of the most beautiful campuses in the country. Our players will know from their first visit to the LSU campus that their number one goal is to leave this institution with their degree in hand.

In setting our high standards for the athletes that represent this program, the number one characteristic I look for in student-athletes is discipline.

We want disciplined people in our program. It all starts with someone who can control her choices in a respectable way, both on and off the field. The ability to choose right from a wrong should not be a battle. We expect to play for championships here at LSU and every student-athlete who competes for the Tiger softball team will have to have that same discipline and expectations. Our staff is dedicated to LSU, our program and our players.

Concerning the softball side, we will incorporate the 'Tiger Attack' mind set for our games.

I'd like to think that my teams are aggressive and hard-nosed, and that they will play the game hard until the final out. We must attack every inning as if the score were 0-0, always thinking 'it is never enough'. We will always be a fundamental team with high emphasis placed on this aspect of the game throughout the entire year. Playing the game with pride, emotion and respect for tradition and class should be a goal for every LSU team. This team will embody those qualities.



Pick whatever criteria you want to use and you'll get the same result: Yvette Girouard is synonymous with outstanding softball.

A pioneer of the game and one of the greatest coaches in history, the 2005 National Fastpitch Coaches Association (NFCA) Hall of Fame inductee's effect on LSU has been powerful. Girouard's legacy continues to grow as the Tigers have maintained their place among the nation's elite and are one of only six programs to post 49 wins per season since the 2001 season.

Girouard, who also was inducted into the Louisiana Softball Coaches Association Hall of Fame in 2002, heads into the 2010 season among the career NCAA Division I coaching leaders in wins (No. 4) and winning percentage (No. 5) in addition to being listed among the active NCAA Division I coaching leaders in wins (No. 3) and winning percentage (No. 5).

Are team accomplishments the criteria for an outstanding coach? With 28-consecutive winning seasons under her belt, Girouard's teams have won nine conference championships, racked up 10 national Top 10 finishes, earned 18 NCAA Regional appearances and are no strangers to Oklahoma City. She became just the third coach in NCAA history to steer two programs to the Women's College World Series when she led LSU during the 2001 and 2004 seasons after taking UL-Lafayette to a trio of WCWS appearances in the 1990's.

Girouard's first season at LSU ended in storybook fashion as the 2001 squad matched a school record with 59 victories en route to the program's first clean sweep of the SEC's three major league titles (SEC Western Division, SEC Regular Season Championship, SEC Tournament Championship).

Sparked by SEC Player of the Year, NCAA Regional MVP and three-time All-American Britni Sneed, LSU knocked out Girouard's former school, UL-Lafayette, in the championship game to punch its ticket to the WCWS. The Tigers fell to Stanford in the opening round but bounced back to knock off Iowa along with defending national champion Oklahoma before bowing out to UCLA.

Girouard reeled in her 100th win at LSU in just 119 games during the 2002 season, the fastest coach to reach 100 victories in school history. She reached 900 career wins and produced another 50-win season along with a Top 15 finish in 2003.

The 2004 Tigers took it to the next level and were ranked as high as No. 2 in the ESPN/USA Softball poll on two separate occasions. LSU turned in its third SEC titles sweep in four seasons and rolled through NCAA Regional play defeating Illinois to return to the WCWS.

LSU came within seven outs of the national championship game. After defeating Michigan in extra innings in its first game, the Tigers fell to eventual national champion UCLA in game two.

Weather postponed play for a day and forced LSU into the unenviable situation of having to win three games in a single day to advance to the national championship game. The Tigers began the day with a win over Florida State before defeating California to force the "if necessary" game.

Unfortunately, LSU couldn't get past California a second time. The Tigers remarkable run marked the first time since 1984 a school from east of the Mississippi River had advanced to within a game of the national championship. Kristin Schmidt was named the WCWS Most Outstanding Player, becoming the first player to earn the honor who was not a member of the national championship team.

For their efforts, Girouard, associate head coach James DeFeo and assistant coach Lori Osterberg were named NFCA South Region Coaching Staff of the Year during both of LSU's WCWS seasons. She went on to earn her 1,000th career victory against Arkansas on April 6, 2005.

Are All-America selections the criteria? Girouard has coached 22 different players to 41 All-America selections. Five players including Leslie Klein have been deemed three-time All-America picks. She also has guided her athletes to 16 Academic All-America honors, including two-time selection Stephanie Hill.

Perhaps it's giving back to the game by molding successful coaches for the next generation. Girouard has left her stamp as 11 former players/coaches associated with her over the years currently hold Division I jobs, including former All-Americans LaDonia Hughes and Trena Peel. The duo is currently playing professionally for the USSAA Pride



and Philadelphia Force in the National Pro Fastpitch League.

Over her career, Girouard has been named coach of the year by three separate conferences: the SEC (2001 & 2002), the Sun Belt (2000) and the Southland (1984, 1985 & 1987). Her UL-Lafayette squads were independent from 1988-1999, but that didn't stop Girouard from taking home NFCA National Coach of the Year honors in 1990 and 1993. She also has collected an unprecedented 13 Louisiana Coach of the Year awards.

The 2009 season saw LSU usher in the next chapter of its storied history with the opening of the new Tiger Park, the single largest monetary investment LSU has made exclusively to any women's sport. Girouard placed her own personal touch by giving the architects many of the ideas for the park's unique features, including the arches at the front of the stadium and the 1,000-seat outfield berm.

Starting as many of six freshmen in 2009, LSU took defending national champion Arizona State to the brink before finishing 34-18-1 with a No. 19 national ranking. The Tigers 10-2 triumph over the Sun Devils earlier in the regional was Girouard's 1,200th career victory. Kirsten Shortridge tallied All-America accolades, while Juliana Santos became LSU's first freshman to notch NFCA All-South Region honors since Stephanie Hastings in 1998.

After missing the postseason with a 31-23 mark in 2005, LSU rocketed back to the nation's upper echelon and returned to prominence in 2006. Girouard guided the Tigers back into the Top 10 nationally after firing out to an impressive 25-3 start. LSU swept through its NCAA Regional in Baton Rouge and advanced to the NCAA Super Regional for the first time.

The Tigers toppled Arizona, the nation's No. 1 team and eventual national champion,

3-2 in the second game of the Super Regional behind All-America hurler Emily Turner and a three RBI performance from Lauren Delahoussaye. LSU became the first program to knock off the Wildcats in a game at home that could send UA to the Women's College World Series and wrapped up 2006 with a 55-14 record.

The 2007 season ran true to form as Girouard kept the Tigers among the Top 10 nationally for the entire year and racked up a 55-12 record. Led by Turner and Dani Hofer, the nation's premier one-two pitching punch, LSU notched series wins from both No. 1 Tennessee and No. 2 Alabama to compile its fourth SEC Western Division crown and fourth SEC Tournament title during the Girouard era.

LSU ran through the NCAA Regional in Palo Alto unblemished aided by the bats of three-time All-America Leslie Klein, Regional MVP Rachel Mitchell and Diamond Sports National Catcher of the Year Killian Roessner to proceed to its second straight NCAA Super Regional. Dee Dee Henderson also earned Academic All-America honors to

give LSU a third consecutive season with an Academic All-American.

Girouard's 2008 Tigers produced another successful campaign as LSU went 44-18 and hosted a NCAA Regional in its final season at the old Tiger Park. Mitchell continued her development into an All-SEC First-Team performer.

In her two decades as the UL-Lafayette head coach, Girouard built the team from the ground floor with no scholarships and a \$3,000 budget to one of the nation's perennial powers. The Cajuns totaled 10 NCAA Regional berths and tacked on three WCWS trips. With a .815 winning percentage, her teams posted the third-best winning percentage nationally in the 1990's behind only Arizona and UCLA.

The daughter of the late Rose Mary and Alton Girouard, Yvette was born in Broussard, La., and attended Comeaux High School. She earned a Bachelor of Science degree from USL in 1976 in health and physical education. During her college days, she played on the Lady Cajun volleyball team and was named the school's 1976 Female Athlete of the Year.

Following college, Girouard served as head coach at Lafayette High School where she began the softball program in 1977. She moved onto to coach at her alma mater, Comeaux High School, in 1980 before beginning the USL softball program the following season.

Girouard served a three-year term as the South Region Representative on the NCAA All-America Committee and served a pair of two-year stints on the NCAA South Regional ranking committee. She also served as a member of the nine-person NCAA Softball Rules Committee.

With a list of accomplishments and awards that speak for themselves, what is left for a woman who has won over 75 percent of her games on the collegiate level? College softball's ultimate prize: Girouard's mind and energy are squarely focused on bringing home LSU's first softball national championship.

James DeFeo Associate Head Coach 10th Season

James DeFeo enters his sixth season as the associate head coach and his 10th season overall at LSU. It also marks his 11th season under head coach Yvette Girouard after serving a year with her at UL-Lafayette.

DeFeo's main duties with the program include working with the hitters and outfielders as well as recruiting, scouting and practice management.

In 2004, he, Girouard and former assistant coach Lori Osterberg were named the National Fastpitch Coaches Association South Region Coaching Staff of the Year after leading LSU to its second Women's College World Series berth. The trio also won the same honor after the Tigers made its first WCWS appearance during the 2001 season. Over the previous six seasons, LSU's offense has not only been a mainstay at the top of the SEC rankings but in the upper echelon of the NCAA. The Tiger hitters as a unit have compiled an impressive 20 NCAA Top 30 team finishes in various offensive categories, including five Top 10 rankings. A remarkable 13 of those 20 feats over the six-year span have been in batting average, runs per game, home runs per game and slugging percentage.

Four Tiger outfielders over DeFeo's tenure have earned Louisville Slugger/NFCA All-American accolades, including Kirsten Shortridge in 2009. Shortridge ranked inside the SEC's Top 5 racking up a .426 batting average on 80 hits. The .426 clip was second-highest in program history for a single season.

Leslie Klein, a three-time All-American pick, placed in the SEC's Top 10 in virtually every hitting category as LSU connected for 58 home runs by 10 different players in 2007. She finished her career as one of the most prolific hitters in both LSU and SEC history. The Florida native currently holds five LSU career records – doubles (64), home runs (32), RBIs (192), slugging percentage (.607) and total bases (467). Her 64 doubles and 192 RBIs also are inside the SEC's Top 5 marks.

LaDonia Hughes and Klein notched All-American selections in 2004 as the Tigers set four school records with 60 home runs, 336 RBIs, 385 runs and 875 total bases. Klein posted three NCAA Top 50 marks in slugging percentage (.662), runs per game (0.78) and RBIs per game (0.84).

LSU also ranked second in five additional categories highlighted by 583 hits on a .310 team batting average during the 2004 season. The Tigers also placed at least two

players in the Top 10 individually in each of the SEC's hitting categories and five players in the league's Top 10 in total bases.

Trena Peel picked up All-America honors in 2002 as she led the nation knocking 14 triples en route to breaking the LSU and SEC single-season marks. She was two shy of the NCAA record.

Four additional Tiger outfielders, Lauren Castle, Camile Harris, Jazz Jackson and Rachel Mitchell, have tallied Louisville Slugger/NFCA All-South Region awards under DeFeo's tutelage. In fact, Mitchell currently holds the program record registering a .443 on-base clip.

Prior to joining Girouard's staff, DeFeo was a graduate assistant at Southern Miss in 1999 when the Golden Eagles became the first, first-year program to advance to the Women's College World Series.

DeFeo has served as sole proprietor and instructor of the All-American Softball Clinics in New Jersey, New York, Florida, Pennsylvania and Mississippi for 12 years. He has coaching experience at nearly every level of fastpitch softball, including Under-12, Under-16, 18 and Under and Women's Major.

A native of New Jersey, DeFeo graduated from Rutgers University in 1996 with a bachelor's degree in sport management. He received his master's in sports administration from Southern Miss in 1999. His sister, Stephanie DeFeo, was a three-time All-American under Girouard at Louisiana-Lafayette and is currently an assistant coach at Ball State.

In 2000, DeFeo married the former Samantha Rock. The couple has two daughters,





Kristen Hobbs Assistant Coach First Season

Kristen Hobbs heads into her first season as an assistant coach after spending the previous two seasons as a student and volunteer coach on the support staff. She works with the Tiger infield and catchers along with assisting with the hitting aspects of the program.

As a student-athlete, Hobbs was awarded the Brad Davis SEC Community Service Scholarship in 2008 for her work with the CHAMPS/Life Skills program and volunteering in the area. She also was a three-time member of the SEC Academic Honor Roll and the SEC Good Works Team.

Hobbs' best season as a player came in 2007 during her senior campaign. She batted .283 and belted a career-best eight home runs en route to being selected Most Valuable Player of the Easton Tiger Classic and NCAA Tempe Super Regional All-Tournament Team. The Florida native also currently shares LSU's career fielding percentage record after having committed just five errors in over 600 changes for a .992 mark.

One of the three team captains, the 2007 squad spent the entire season in the nation's Top 10 and racked up an impressive 55-12 record. The Tigers notched series wins from both No. 1 Tennessee and No. 2 Alabama during the regular season to win its fourth SEC Western Division crown and fourth SEC Tournament title during the Yvette Girouard era.

Overcoming Tommy John surgery that limited her to just seven games and no starts in 2006, Hobbs closed out her career on a high note. She caught both of Dani Hofer's no-hitters against Missouri State and Southern Miss during the 2007 season. She also surpassed her season-bests with 32 hits, 20 runs scored and 22 RBIs.

Hobbs appeared in 34 games and made 19 starts as a freshman

on LSU's 2004 Women's College World series squad. The Tigers were ranked as high as No. 2 in the ESPN/USA Softball poll on two separate occasions and turned in a clean sweep of the SEC's three major league titles (SEC Western Division, SEC Regular Season Championship, SEC Tournament Championship).

Hobbs earned both of her degrees, a bachelor's degree in mass communications, followed by her master's degree in sports management from LSU.

Quinlan Duhon **Director of Softball Operations**

Quinlan Duhon enters her first season as the Director of Operations for the LSU softball program after her exceptional four-year career from 2005-08. She also served as a student marketing assistant during the 2008-09 year.

Duhon will coordinate team travel along with assisting the program with recruiting functions. She also will supervise the academic progress and handle video motivation for the Tigers.

During her playing career, Duhon was a part of three NCAA Regional teams highlighted by the 2006 and 2007 Super Regional squads. She scored the walk-off, game-winning run in a 5-4 triumph over Louisiana-Lafayette in the 2006 NCAA Regional championship game.

LSU spent the duration of the 2007 season in the nation's Top 10 and compiled an impressive 55-12 record. The Tigers tallied series victories over both No. 1 Tennessee and No. 2 Alabama during the regular season to win its fourth SEC Western Division crown and fourth SEC Tournament title during the Girouard era.

Duhon had an outstanding postseason being named to both the NCAA Palo Alto Regional and Tempe Super Regional All-Tournament teams. She cranked three home runs in NCAA play, including a two-run shot as part of a 3-2 win against Cal State Northridge in the NCAA Regional opening round.

As one of three captains for the 2008 team, Duhon posted career-bests in batting average (.333), hits (54), home runs (11), RBIs (38), on-base (.424) and slugging percentage (.605) en route to an All-SEC and All-Louisiana Second-Team honors.

Duhon finished her LSU career ranked third belting 30 career home runs and is listed among the school's Top 10 in walks (68), RBIs (128), total bases (300) and sacrifice flies (13). She is one of only 11 players in program history to score over 100 runs and post over 150 career hits. The Youngsville native also was a four-time SEC Academic Honor Roll selection.

Duhon earned her bachelor's degree in general business and currently is pursuing her master's degree in sports management. She lives in Baton Rouge.



Matt Dunaway **Associate SID/Softball Contact**

Matt Dunaway heads into his second year as an associate sports information director at LSU. He serves as the primary media relations contact for the Tiger softball and volleyball teams in addition to promoting LSU athletics community service efforts.

Carole Walker **Associate Director CCACSA & Academic Advisor**

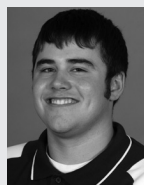

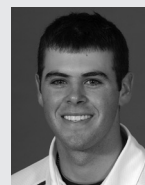
Prior to LSU, Walker served as an Athletic Academic Advisor at South Alabama before becoming an Athletic Academic Services Coordinator at Miami.

Build It: Next Era of LSU Softball Begins

GRAND OPENING: TIGERS BLANK MCNEESE STATE, 6-0

The LSU softball team embarked on the next chapter of its storied history by christening the new Tiger Park with a 6-0 victory over McNeese State on Feb. 11 in front of 2,172 fans.

Prior to the game, LSU honored its softball past and present as former alumni joined the current team on the field for the ribbon cutting ceremony.

Head coach Yvette Girouard cut the ribbon and spoke during the dedication along with Chancellor Mike Martin, Athletic Director Joe Alleva and former Athletic Director Skip Bertman. The 2,172 fans were the second-most to view a Tiger softball game.

Each of the head coaches from LSU's women's athletic teams threw out the ceremonial first pitch, including D-D Breaux (Gymnastics), Fran Flory (Volleyball), Brian Lee (Soccer), Adam Schmitt (Swimming & Diving), Dennis Shaver (Track & Field), Karen Bashnen (Golf) and assistant coach Kenya Larkin-Landers (Basketball).

LSU dented the scoreboard in the third inning as Kirsten Shortridge slapped a single to third base. She stole second and third base before Jazz Jackson ripped a double into the right centerfield gap to give the Tigers a 1-0 edge.

LSU struck for five runs in the fifth inning without a hit for the final margin of 6-0. The Tigers capitalized on two McNeese State errors and five passed balls in the frame.

TIGERS OPEN SEASON ON THE BIG ISLE

LSU started the 2010 season at the Oceanic Paradise Classic in Hawai'i. The Tigers visited Pearl Harbor and attended a Luau at the Polynesian Culture Center before the tournament began.

"Pearl Harbor was something that all of us were looking forward to on the trip," Jessica Mouse wrote in her blog for LSUsports.net. "We all wanted to pay respect to the ones who have died serving our country so that we can be doing the thing we are doing now. This was a great experience for all of us and we are thankful that Coach Girouard allowed us to visit there."

MEMORABLE FIRSTS

Freshman Anissa Young's first career at-bat was something she will most likely never forget. In the bottom of the second inning against UAB, Young drilled a 1-0 pitch down the left field line for a grand slam as the Tigers notched a 10-5 win.

Freshman Ashley Langoni nearly duplicated the feat and knocked a solo home run in her second at-bat of SEC play against Kentucky.

MACK ATTACK

Freshman Brittany Mack started her LSU career by winning 10 of her first 11 decisions in the circle highlighted by a stretch of eight straight wins over 16 appearances (Feb. 20-April 7).

Mack garnered wins over NCAA Tournament squads No. 5 Texas A&M and Baylor along with a pair of triumphs against Mississippi State. She also stymied Texas State and tossed a five-inning no-hitter en route to Purple & Gold Challenge Tournament MVP honors.

LSU SAVES BEST FOR CRUNCH TIME

LSU racked up 13 come-from-behind wins during the 2009 season highlighted by seven victories secured in the Tigers final at-bat.

LSU scored four runs in the seventh inning to force extra innings against Hawai'i in the final game of the Oceanic Paradise Classic. Casey Faile ignited the rally with a RBI-double and the Tigers took advantage of two errors to tie the score at 5-5. Two innings later, Ashley Applegate drew a bases loaded walk for the win.

Down 5-1 in the series finale at Mississippi State, Anissa Young jump-started the Tigers with a solo homer in the fifth inning. Later in the frame, Rachel Mitchell knocked a two-out, two-run single to pull LSU back to 5-4.

Jessica Mouse and Kirsten Shortridge cranked two-out hits for the Tigers in the sixth inning, while Young tacked on a RBI-single in the seventh inning to make it 7-5. Faile faced the minimum over the final three innings and surrendered only one hit in the circle.

TIGERS TAKE TWO FROM NO. 2 ALABAMA

LSU defeated McNeese State 6-0 on Feb. 11 to open the new Tiger Park, but the Tigers added a pair of signature wins in a doubleheader sweep of No. 2 Alabama on March 18.

With the score tied at 2-2 in game one, Anissa Young opened the seventh inning lining out to UA second baseman Whitney Larson on a 2-0 pitch. After the out, Girouard went to the home plate umpire to challenge that Alabama coach Patrick Murphy didn't report Larson's substitution prior to the start of the frame.

Young was able to bat again and took two balls for a leadoff walk. After a wild pitch and a sacrifice bunt moved pinch runner Katie Guillory to third base, Jessica Mouse put runners on the corners after getting hit-by-a-pitch.

Two batters later, Jazz Jackson delivered the decisive blow forcing a fielding error that allowed Guillory to cross home plate for the 3-2 win.

Down 5-1 in game two, LSU exploded for five runs in the fifth

Kirsten Shortridge (above) took the SEC and the nation by storm after transferring from Baylor. She ranked among the SEC's Top 7 in hits (80), batting average (.426), multi-hit games (26) and stolen bases (26). Her .426 average was second-highest, while the 80 hits were tied for eighth-most in program history over a single season en route to All-SEC First-Team and NFCA All-America Third-Team accolades.

LSU AMONG NATION'S ELITE IN GIROUARD ERA

LSU has picked up 441 wins, the sixth most in the nation, since Yvette Girouard took the reigns of the program in 2001. The Tigers have averaged 49.0 wins per season to rank ahead of past national champions Arizona State, California, Cal State Fullerton, Fresno State, Michigan, Oklahoma, Texas A&M, UCLA and Washington.

LSU is one of four SEC teams with multiple Women's College World Series appearances (Alabama, Florida and Tennessee). The Tigers advanced through the NCAA Regionals to the WCWS on two occasions (2001 & 2004) and finished seven outs from the national championship game in 2004.

inning as Rachel Mitchell provided three-run double and scored the go-ahead run on an Applegate single. Kirsten Shortridge hurled four innings of three-hit relief to nail down the 6-5 win by retiring eight of the last nine batters she faced.

"This was a dog fight from start to finish," Girouard said. "It's always a battle against Alabama. These were two unbelievable wins for our young team. The aspect of this team that I continue to absolutely love is that they never quit."

LSU 'SWINGS FOR THE CURE'

LSU played host to its inaugural 'Swing for the Cure' against Tennessee on April 5th to benefit the Baton Rouge Affiliate of the Susan G. Komen for the Cure Foundation.

The Tigers held an on-site auction which included the team's commemorative pink jerseys. The donation total eclipsed over \$7,000 after an online auction was complete that included a pair of pink marucci bats signed by LSU football coach Les Miles and baseball coach Paul Mainieri. Denicola's Tiger Den also refurbished two pink chairs from the old Tiger Park and McDonalds made a \$500 donation.

Anissa Young knocked a seventh inning home run as the game ended in a 3-3 tie due to Tennessee's travel arrangements.

"It was amazing to have all these fans come watch us and support this great cause," Young said. "I loved every single second of it."

HOFER CLOSES CAREER WITH MEMORABLE STRIKE

Dani Hofer, LSU's lone senior in 2009, wrapped up her Tiger career in-style. Unable to pitch due to a wrist injury, Hofer took the mound one last time against South Carolina for Senior Day.

She painted the outside corner with a called strike during her only pitch before exiting to a standing ovation.

"It was great," Hofer said. "I wish I could have stayed on the mound the entire game. It was wonderful to see the support of all the fans, my teammates and my family. It has been an incredible honor to be a part of this team for four years."

Cody Trahan relieved Hofer and fired a one-hitter as LSU won a 4-0

decision over the Gamecocks. Kirsten Shortridge, Jazz Jackson and Juliana Santos sparked the offense going 7-for-9 with three runs scored.

TIGERS SCORE EARLY... AND SCORE OFTEN

LSU continued its strong tradition and put together a 25-2-1 record when scoring first in 2009. The Tigers have compiled an impressive 366-32-1 mark during the Yvette Girouard era when reaching this feat.

Although LSU held a 33-24 margin in first inning scoring, the Tigers posted a 16-0-1 record when scoring in the first inning.

LSU also won 19 of 20 games when ripping off six or more runs last season. The Tigers have emerged victorious in 212 of 217 games when scoring six or more runs since 2001.

LSU DOMINATES SEC SERIES

LSU has now competed in 128 series against conference foes and has tallied a league series record of 95-21-12. The Tigers have swept 35 three-game series since the SEC adopted the three-game format in 2001 and taken 25 more series wins in that time period.

Over the last three seasons, LSU 11-1 in mid-week doubleheader games since the SEC changed to a 28-game schedule.

Prior to 2001, the league played four-game series against divisional opponents and doubleheaders against cross divisional rivals. LSU swept nine four-game series and 15 doubleheaders while taking six series, 3-1.

LSU MAKES HISTORY IN GIROUARD'S 1,200TH WIN

LSU earned a bid for the 11th time in 13 seasons to the NCAA Tournament as the Tigers played in a nationally televised regional hosted by Arizona State.

After a 3-2 win over Cal State Fullerton, the Tigers made history as Anissa Young and Ashley Langoni became the first LSU duo to belt grand slams in the same game during a 10-2 rout of the Sun Devils to give Yvette Girouard her 1,200th career victory. ASU rallied to take two games from the Tigers to advance to the Super Regionals.

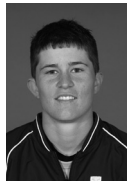

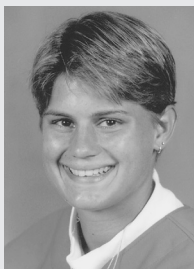

At the end of the 2008 season, the LSU softball program said goodbye to the old Tiger Park.

Built in 1996, the 1,000-seat facility was the softball team's home since its inception in 1997. The old Tiger Park quickly became known as one of the toughest places in the nation for visitors to play.

In 12 seasons, the old Tiger Park played hosted to the 2008 SEC Tournament in addition to five NCAA Regionals.

For the program's history, LSU was 14-6 (.700) all-time in postseason games and won nine of its last 11 NCAA Regional games in the old Tiger Park. The old Tiger Park was home to some amazing feats.

On May 20, 2000, LSU and Southern Miss battled out 12 scoreless innings in a NCAA Regional game before the Tigers plated the game-winner on a Stephanie Hastings sacrifice fly in the 13th.

In 2001, the Tigers advanced through the NCAA Regional tournament dismissing Cornell, Penn State, Arizona State and UL-Lafayette securing its first berth in the Women's College World Series.

The 2006 squad posted a remarkable 34-3 (.919) mark in the old Tiger Park as LSU jumped out to a program-best 14-0 start.

In 2007, the Tigers played host to an ESPN national television audience and No. 1 Tennessee as a school record 2,326 fans packed the old Tiger Park (pictured above). LSU took the final two games of the series from the top-ranked Lady Vols.

In its final season, LSU set a program attendance record for the second consecutive season as 919 fans watched the Tigers win 30 home games for the fifth time in program history.

Over the years, the old Tiger Park drew over 160,000 fans. LSU owned an astounding 338-51 (.873) record at home, including a 140-34 (.805) Southeastern Conference mark.

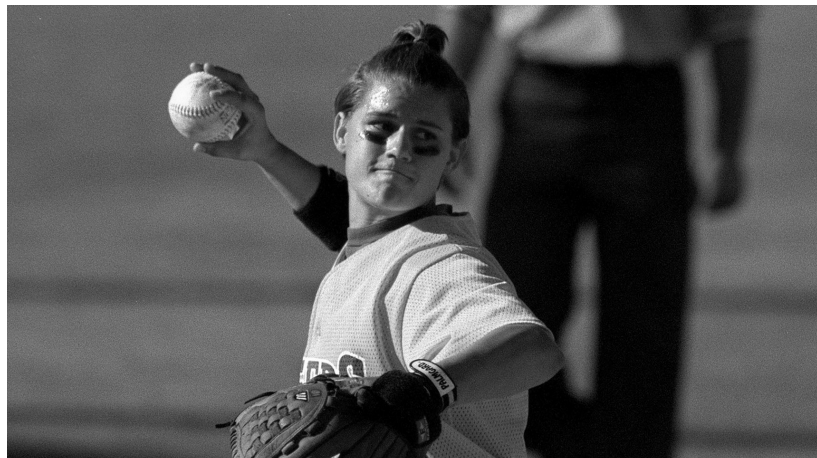

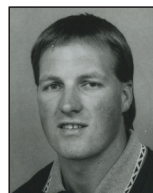

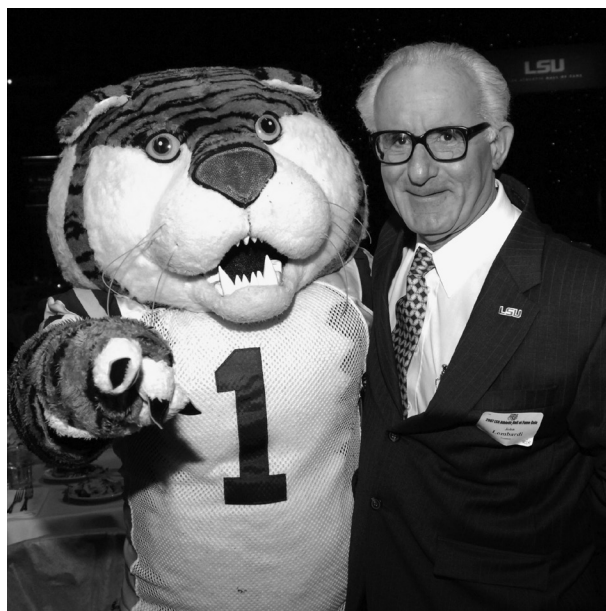
President, Louisiana State University System



Dr. John V. Lombardi is the fifth individual to serve as the President of the Louisiana State University System. As its Chief Executive Officer, Dr. Lombardi oversees 11 institutions, including five academic campuses, as well as 10 public hospitals located throughout the state. He is also a Professor of History at Louisiana State University and Agricultural and Mechanical College.

Dr. Lombardi was born in Los Angeles, California and attended Pomona College where he earned his bachelor's degree. He received his M.A. and Ph.D. degrees in history from Columbia University. He joined the faculty in the Department of History at Indiana University, where he later served as Dean of International Programs and Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences. In 1987, he became Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs at the Johns Hopkins University. From 1990-1999, Dr. Lombardi was President of the University of Florida. Prior to his appointment as President of the LSU System, he served as Chancellor of the University of Massachusetts Amherst.

He is a Latin American historian, with a special interest in Venezuela. Dr. Lombardi is also one of the country's foremost authorities in higher education, serving as Co-Editor of The Top American Research Universities. He is the author of numerous professional publications, and along with his wife, Cathryn, co-authored a teaching atlas on Latin American History. He has taught courses in history, intercollegiate sports, and university management.

Dr. Michael V. Martin

Chancellor, LSU



Dr. Michael V. Martin assumed the chancellorship of Louisiana State University and A&M College on August 1, 2008. Prior to his appointment as LSU's eighth chancellor, Dr. Martin established a distinguished career in higher education, serving most recently as president of New Mexico State University.

Before arriving at NMSU in 2004, Dr. Martin served for six years as vice president for agriculture and natural resources at the University of Florida, leading the university's Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences. He was elevated to senior vice president of the University of Florida shortly before being selected as NMSU's president. Previously, he was vice president for agricultural policy and the dean of the College of Agricultural, Food and Environmental Sciences at the University of Minnesota. He began his academic career at Oregon State University as a faculty member in the Department of Agricultural and Resource Economics.

An academic leader dedicated to the land-grant mission, Dr. Martin is recognized as a strong voice for higher education. In 2007, he received the Justin Smith Morrill Memorial Award, named after the author of the bill creating land-grant universities, which honors outstanding service on behalf of the land-grant mission. Only six individuals have been designated to receive this award since it was first given in 1980. For his leadership in improving the quality of life for New Mexico citizens and future generations, he was awarded the 2008 Distinguished Leadership Award by Leadership New Mexico.

Other recent awards include his recognition as a powerbroker by The New Mexico Business Weekly in 2006, being named Outstanding Alumnus of Minnesota State University Mankato in 2006, and receiving the NMSU Social Justice Award in 2005.

Dr. Martin is involved in a wide array of professional and community organizations and activities.

An active scholar, Dr. Martin has authored numerous book chapters and articles for academic journals, trade publications, and the popular press and recently published pieces for The Chronicle of Higher Education and University Business.

Some of his philosophy is summed up in the following quote: "It is the tradition of land-grant universities to be non-traditional," written as part of a 2001 article titled "The Land-Grant University in the 21st Century," published in the Journal of Agricultural and Applied Economics. He traced the history of the land-grant movement from the mid-1800s and concluded that "the fundamental land-grant principles of accessibility, practical as well as classical education, research and discovery in the public interest, and connectedness to all the people remain powerful and profound."

A native of Crosby, Minn., Dr. Martin earned a bachelor's degree in business and economics and a master's degree in economics at Mankato State College (Minnesota State University) in Minnesota. He received his Ph.D. in applied economics from the University of Minnesota in 1977.

Dr. Martin and his wife, Jan, have two children, both adopted from South Korea. Amanda, a graduate of the University of Wisconsin-Eau Claire, is a graphic artist in Saint Paul, Minn. Sam, who holds a bachelor's degree from the University of Minnesota and a master's from Sarah Lawrence College, is a genetics counselor at Beth Israel Hospital in New York City.

Dydia DeLyser

Faculty Athletics Representative

Dydia DeLyser, an associate professor in the Department of Geography and Anthropology, serves in her fourth year as LSU's Faculty Athletics Representative.

DeLyser, a native of Santa Monica, Calif., earned her bachelor's degree in 1992 from UCLA, and her master's and doctoral degrees from Syracuse University (in 1996 and 1998).

DeLyser arrived at LSU in August 1998 as an Instructor before becoming an assistant professor one year later. She was promoted to associate professor with tenure in August 2005.

DeLyser is a cultural-historical geographer. Her research has been both ethnographic and historical, and most of it questions how different built landscapes can help make the past meaningful in the present.

Much of her published research has focused on two different studies. One was a many-year ethnographic study of a ghost town in California (Bodie State Historic Park) where she examined how images and ideas about the American mythic West became meaningful to the tourists who

visited the town. The second was an historical study that examined a 19th century novel (Ramona) and how it changed the way people understood (and still understand) southern California's past.

Her current research concerns early women aviators and how they used their practices of flying to advance feminism in the post-suffrage era.

DeLyser teaches graduate courses in cultural geography, qualitative research, and academic and professional writing. She has also taught undergraduate courses in cultural, and urban geography, and an introductory world-regional geography course.

DeLyser is a first-generation American -- her parents were Dutch immigrants and English is her second language. She also has language abilities in Russian and Spanish.

DeLyser's hobbies include driving/riding antique cars and motorcycles. She is also a licensed pilot and co-owns a Citabria, which is a two-place aerobatic airplane.



Joe Alleva

LSU Vice-Chancellor/Director of Athletics



Joe Alleva enters his second year as LSU's Director of Athletics after being hired to lead one of the nation's most powerful athletic programs on April 4, 2008. Alleva joined LSU after 10 years of outstanding leadership as the director of athletics at Duke University. He officially took over at LSU on July 1, 2008.

Under Alleva's guidance in 2008-09, LSU reached new heights in terms of athletic success while continuing to be recognized as one of the top enterprises in college athletics.

The LSU Board of Supervisors approved a promotion on August 28, 2009, expanding his role to the academic side of the university. Alleva accepted the position of LSU Vice-Chancellor while still continuing his role as Director of Athletics.

A veteran leader in college athletics, Alleva is dedicated to athletic and academic excellence. He is committed to providing the opportunities and the resources necessary for student-athletes to excel in competition, in the classroom and in the community.

Alleva, 56, is well-respected for sustaining high standards of excellence and integrity in athletic programs, hiring the finest coaches in the country and the high level of success achieved by student-athletes.

Under Alleva's direction, all 20 LSU sports competed in NCAA post-season play for the first time in school history, and it culminated with the baseball team winning the national championship. In addition, six teams finished in the top 10 nationally. The Tigers hold claim to being the only school in the Southeastern Conference to participate in a bowl game and the men's and women's NCAA basketball tournaments during 2008-09. Furthermore, LSU student-athletes volunteered a total of 2,360 hours for community service projects.

LSU earned a ninth place ranking in the 2009 Learfield Director's Cup, which measures the overall athletic success for institutions across the country. LSU was second only to Florida in the Director's Cup among SEC institutions as the Tigers accumulated points in 18 of a possible 20 categories in the standings, also a first for the school.

Upon being hired at LSU, Alleva immediately made an impact by hiring Trent Johnson to lead the men's basketball program. Johnson, the 2009 SEC Coach of the Year, wasted little time in turning the Tigers into a winner as LSU claimed the 2009 SEC regular season title and reached the second round of the NCAA Tournament.

LSU also had top 10 national finishes in gymnastics, men's and women's indoor track and field and men's and women's outdoor track and field. Thirteen of LSU's 20 sports finished the year ranked among the top 25 in the nation.

The Tiger football team capped their season with a record ninth-straight bowl appearance as LSU closed out 2008 with a 38-3 win over 14th-ranked Georgia Tech in the Chick-fil-A Bowl. During the offseason, Alleva helped secure the funding necessary for the addition of a state-of-the-art artificial turf practice field, which compliments the surface the Tigers have in their indoor practice facility. The addition of the

outdoor artificial turf field gives the LSU football program one of the nation's finest all-around facilities.

Not only did LSU teams set records but so did the fans as over 1.5 million fans filled venues on the LSU campus. LSU set the school record for overall attendance in the sports of football, baseball, and softball.

Alleva oversaw the grand opening of two of the premier baseball and softball facilities in college athletics, Alex Box Stadium and Tiger Park.

LSU also broke ground on a basketball practice facility that will house both the men's

country well into the 21st Century. One of his top priorities is the enhancement of Tiger Stadium and making Tiger Stadium and the North Stadium Drive corridor a showplace for the university.

Alleva's innovative plan is to make a plaza area between the Maravich Assembly Center and Tiger Stadium that would recognize LSU's national championship teams and distinguished alumni. This special area, along with Mike's Habitat, and the LSU SportsShop, would become the focal point for visitors to campus.

Alleva is also pursuing a major renovation to the golf course at the University Club and is developing plans for a new gymnastics practice facility, indoor tennis center and improved soccer and track facilities.

"Joe Alleva brings a wealth of experience and accomplishment to LSU," LSU President John Lombardi said of hiring Alleva. "I'm confident we've found a new leader for LSU athletics who exemplifies the vision and integrity needed to lead our sports programs to new heights, a champion of student athletes who believes in the highest standards of competition both on the field and in the classroom."

Alleva's impressive tenure as director of athletics at Duke propelled the university into the ranks of America's top all-around collegiate programs. Among his outstanding list of accomplishments includes the greatest 10-year period in Duke athletics, winning more ACC and NCAA championships than in any other decade in school history.

Also, his fundraising reached extensive heights providing new facilities or renovations for all 26 sports at Duke, which enhanced the experience for every student-athlete.

Alleva is active on the national collegiate athletics scene, having served on the Football Bowl Certification Committee. He sat on several Atlantic Coast Conference committees and served on the NCAA Division I Championships/Competition Cabinet.

Alleva majored in Finance at Lehigh University and received his bachelor's degree in 1975. While at Lehigh, Alleva was the quarterback of the football team and team captain in 1974. Alleva also played on the Lehigh baseball team. He served as a graduate assistant football coach and earned an MBA in 1976.

Alleva began his 32-year career at Duke University in 1976. He spent 28 years in the athletic administration prior to becoming director of athletics in 1998.

Alleva played a key role in Durham's community sports scene. He started Little League Baseball in Durham over 20 years ago, and also began the American Legion baseball program.

Alleva is a member of the North Carolina American Legion Hall of Fame, Suffern High School Hall of Fame and the Rockland County Hall of Fame.

Alleva and his wife, Annie, have three children, J.D., Jeff, and Jenny.



and women's basketball teams starting in December of this year. The new basketball practice facility will feature two full length courts as well as locker rooms and other amenities for both squads.

In addition, LSU opened a new gift center for its fans - the LSU SportsShop. The LSU SportsShop, a spectacular, free-standing facility that features the latest in LSU apparel and merchandise, is located adjacent to Mike's Habitat.

Under Alleva's guidance, LSU has one of the most lucrative apparel and shoe contracts with Nike while also having one of the nation's most attractive multi-media rights contracts with CBS Collegiate Sports Properties. LSU athletic budget is now approaching \$85 million, which allows the university to compete at the highest level in the nation.

Alleva has a long-term vision for continued improvements to LSU's athletic facilities in order to insure that the Tigers are among the best in the



Verge Ausberry
Senior Associate AD/Operations

A former LSU football standout, Verge Ausberry joined the athletics administrative staff in August 2001 as the Associate Athletics Director for Operations. He was appointed to the position of Senior Associate Athletics Director in May 2006.

Ausberry supervises and is responsible for football operations, football scheduling and new projects.

He also oversees the LSU men's and women's track and field programs, the equipment staff, the strength and conditioning staff, the Dr. Martin Broussard training room, the video department and football game management.

Ausberry, from New Iberia, La., played inside linebacker for the Tigers, lettering in 1986-89. He was part of two SEC championship teams, playing on teams that went to four bowl games.

Before joining the LSU athletic administration, he was very closely involved in the athletic program, first serving for almost seven years as a member of LSU's highly regarded Academic Center for Athletes.

After leaving the Academic Center, he moved in July 1999 to the Tiger Athletic Foundation staff as part of LSU's fundraising arm.

Ausberry received his Bachelor of Science degree in education in May of 1990, his Master of Education degree in administration, supervision and certification in child welfare in May of 1992 and his specialist in higher education administration in 2004. He is presently a doctoral candidate in higher education administration at LSU. He is married to the former Cheri Morial of New Orleans and they have two boys, Austin and Jaiden.



Judy Southard
Senior Associate AD/Senior Woman Administrator

Judy Southard, who had very successful careers as both head women's basketball coach and Director of Athletics, enters her eighth year at LSU having been promoted to Senior Associate Athletics Director in May 2006.

Southard came to LSU from Texas Woman's University, where she served as the school's Director of Athletics for nine years.

As LSU's Senior Woman Administrator, Southard's responsibilities include oversight of the highly successful Tiger Olympic Sports program including 17 men's and women's sports. She has direct supervision of volleyball, women's basketball, softball, men's and women's swimming and diving and men's and women's golf as well as responsibilities in monitoring the athletic department's Gender Equity and Diversity Issues Plan.

Southard just completed a successful tenure as a member of the NCAA Division I Women's Basketball Committee and served in the important role of committee chair for the 2006-07 and 2007-08 academic years. She additionally served as a member of the SEC Executive Committee from 2004-2007.

She was a 2000 inductee into the Coker College Athletics Hall of Fame and was recognized in the fall of 2006 as an inductee in the Marshall Athletic Hall of Fame.

Eddie Nunez

Associate AD/Operations, Project Development

Eddie Nunez joined the Athletics Department in October 2003 as the Director of Game and Event Management and was promoted to Associate Athletics Director for Operations and Project Development in June of 2007.

Nunez's responsibilities include oversight of the men's basketball program, men's tennis program and the women's tennis program. He supervises the Game/Event Management department as well as directs all capital project for the athletic department. Under his

The Southeastern Conference Setting the Standard for Intercollegiate Athletics in Softball

SEC Softball will celebrate its 14th year of existence in 2010 and has established itself as one of the leading conferences in the sport.

The Southeastern Conference qualified a record nine teams for the 2009 NCAA Tournament - Alabama, Arkansas, Auburn, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, LSU, Mississippi State, and Tennessee, as the conference made its 12th overall, seventh consecutive, Women's College World Series appearance. For the second consecutive year, Florida received the No. 1 national seed, while the SEC grabbed four total national seeds: No. 4 Alabama, No. 6 Georgia and No. 13 Tennessee.

The highlight of the season was when the SEC advanced a league record, three of the final four teams, to the WCWS: Florida, Alabama and Georgia. Florida claimed its second consecutive SEC title and tournament title with a 26-1 record. The Gators posted a 63-5 overall record. Florida's Tim Walton was named Coach of the Year while Stacey Nelson earned Pitcher of the Year honors. Alabama's Charlotte Morgan was named Player of the Year and the Tide's Amanda Locke captured Freshman of the Year honors. Tennessee's Lillian Hammond was selected as Scholar-Athlete of the Year.

Softball came under the auspices of the Southeastern Conference in the 1996-97 season. Since that time, 10 different conference teams have made appearances in the NCAA Championship, including six teams earning Women's College World Series berths - one by South Carolina in the inaugural season, Alabama in 2000, 2003, 2005, 2006, 2008, 2009, Florida in 2008 and 2009, Georgia in 2009, LSU in 2001 and 2004 and Tennessee in 2005, 2006 and 2007.

Eight teams (Alabama, Auburn, Florida, Georgia, LSU, Mississippi State, South Carolina and Tennessee) have made Top 25 appearances and six teams have climbed into the Top 10 (Alabama, Florida, Georgia, LSU, South Carolina and Tennessee) of the NFCA/USA Today Poll. At least one SEC team has been ranked in the poll each week since the inception of SEC Softball.

South Carolina is the flagship team of the league with a rich history in softball dating back 35 seasons. The Gamecocks have made 15 NCAA Regional and three Women's College World Series appearances.

Mississippi State played softball for five seasons during the 1980's before resuming the sport when it was added to the SEC. Tennessee added softball in 1995-96, one year before its inception in the SEC. Alabama, Arkansas, Auburn, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, LSU and Ole Miss began softball programs in 1996-97 to give the league 11 representatives (Vanderbilt does not sponsor softball).

The 1999 season was the first in which the conference was eligible for an automatic berth to the NCAA

Championships. As the sport continues to grow in competitiveness and popularity, the SEC has had six different regular season champions and five different conference tournament champions.

- Florida is the first SEC team to claim the No. 1 national seed and earned that honor again in 2009
- SEC teams have been ranked in every NFCA/USA Today poll since the inception of SEC softball
- More than 166,621 fans attended SEC home softball games last season. Alabama led the league in average attendance with 1919 per date, 49,910 total.
- The SEC has made 54 appearances on FOX Sports Net South, including the last 10 SEC Tournament Championship Games. 2010 will be the first year of the new SEC/ESPN TV contract. SEC softball coverage will be seen more than any other league in the sport thanks to agreements with ESPN, ESPN2, ESPNU, FSN and CSS.
- The SEC had five national Player of the Week honors by four different players (two NFCA, three USA Softball)
- The SEC had three teams, a league record, ranked in the top five in both final polls: 2) Florida, 3) Alabama, 4) Georgia
- In 2009, six SEC student-athletes were named NFCA First-Team All-Americans. Overall, a record 14 players were named to first, second and third teams combined. The previous best was 13 in 2008.
- The SEC has earned 109 NFCA All-America honors since 1997. 48 First-Team selections, 38 Second-Team selections, 23 Third-Team selections.
- In 2009, an SEC team held the No. 1 spot in the USA Today/ NFCA poll 17 weeks (13-UF, 4-UA) and the USA Softball/ ESPN.com poll 14 weeks (12-UF, 2-UA).

LSU ATHLETICS Championship TRADITION

The Nation's Elite Teams



BASEBALL

The Team of the 90s returned to the top of 21st-century college baseball as LSU brought home a sixth national championship in its first season at New Alex Box Stadium. The Tigers knocked off top-seeded Texas in the best-of-three College World Series championship series and were sparked by a 14-game postseason winning streak. Third-year head coach Paul Mainieri was the unanimous choice for National Coach of the Year as LSU finished the season with a 56-17 record, a Southeastern Conference regular season title and an SEC Tournament title.

MEN'S BASKETBALL

The LSU men's basketball team captured its fourth SEC Western Division title this decade and won the Southeastern Conference regular season championship with a 13-3 record, winning the title by three games under first-year head coach Trent Johnson. LSU was 27-8 on the year and advanced to the second round of the NCAA championships. Johnson was the consensus choice as SEC Coach of the Year and a finalist for three national coach of the year honors.

GYMNASTICS

The gymnastics team continued to show it is one of the nation's elite programs in 2009 by advancing to the Super Six after capturing the NCAA Central Regional for the second year in a row. The regional championship marked the Tigers' sixth overall, and the Super Six berth was the team's second straight. LSU has now made 25-consecutive postseason appearances.

TRACK & FIELD

The Tigers earned a pair of top-five finishes in NCAA competition with a fourth-place finish at the NCAA Indoor Championships followed by a fifth-place finish at the NCAA Outdoor Championships. The Lady Tigers finished sixth nationally during both the indoor and outdoor seasons while earning a pair of runner-up team finishes at the SEC Championships.

SOCCER

The LSU soccer team continued its rise to national prominence with an outstanding 2008 season in which it captured its second-straight SEC Western Division championship and earned an at-large berth into the NCAA Tournament for the second year in a row. The Tigers recorded program bests with a 14-4-2 overall record and a 7-3-1 mark in SEC play, while they also finished second in the final SEC standings.



Ashleigh Clare-Kearney GYMNASTICS

LSU's all-time leader in career individual titles with 114, Ashleigh Clare-Kearney became the fifth national champion in school history and the first LSU gymnast to capture two individual national titles. She became the Vault National Champion with a 9.9000 average and the Floor National Champion with a 9.9500 score. In addition, Clare-Kearney earned First Team All-America honors on vault, bars and floor.

Trindon Holliday MEN'S TRACK & FIELD/FOOTBALL

Trindon Holliday wrapped up the 2009 season as the NCAA's fastest man as he was crowned NCAA champion in the 100-meter dash while setting a new personal best with the top time in the country at 10.00 seconds in the national final. Holliday also earned a pair of runner-up finishes in NCAA competition during the 2009 season in the 60 meters indoors and 4x100-meter relay outdoors to finish with eight All-America honors for his career.

Tyson Jackson FOOTBALL

Tyson Jackson became the highest LSU defender to ever be picked in the NFL Draft when he was selected as the No. 3 overall pick by the Kansas City Chiefs in the 2009 draft. A second team All-SEC selection, he finished his career with 122 tackles and 18.5 sacks while leading the Tigers to a fourth straight bowl victory in the 2008 Chick-fil-A Bowl against Georgia Tech.

Jared Mitchell BASEBALL

Jared Mitchell became LSU's first Major League Baseball first round draft selection since 2003 when he was taken No. 23 overall by the Chicago White Sox. The junior outfielder was named the Most Outstanding Player of the 2009 College World Series following the Tigers' run to a sixth national title. Mitchell, also a wide receiver on the gridiron, became just the second athlete in school history to win national titles in multiple sports.

Marcus Thornton MEN'S BASKETBALL

The consensus Player of the year for the Southeastern Conference as he led the Tigers to the regular season SEC championship with a 13-3 record. Thornton averaged over 21 points a game and would be among the quickest Tigers to 1,000 points, reaching it in less than two years. Thornton was drafted in the second round by the Miami Heat and traded to the New Orleans Hornets.

From the football team's 2007 Bowl Championship Series national title to the baseball team's 2009 national championship, LSU is the home of the nation's elite teams. The 2008-09 year was no exception.

TWO STRAIGHT TOP 10 DIRECTOR'S CUP FINISHES ►►

Another record-setting and historical season in LSU athletics was capped when the school recorded its second straight top 10 finish in the Learfield Sports Director's Cup with a No. 9 showing among all Division I institutions. The ninth-place finish comes on the heels of last year's No. 8 national finish, which marks only the second time in school history that LSU has posted back-to-back top 10 finishes in the Director's Cup.

Elite Athletes

Brittnee Cooper VOLLEYBALL

Brittnee Cooper racked up All-SEC, All-Louisiana and All-AVCA South Region First-Team accolades after a breakout junior season posting 302 kills on a team-best .336 attack percentage. She was a contributing member on the USA Volleyball Women's National A2 Red Team that captured a silver medal at the USA Adult Championships in May 2009.

Megan Falcon WOMEN'S TENNIS

Three-time All-American Megan Falcon left her mark on the women's tennis program as she ended her college career with a 99-18 record and ranked eighth on LSU's all-time wins list. Falcon finished at No. 14 for her senior campaign and earned first team All-SEC honors for the third consecutive season.

Julius Gloeckner MEN'S SWIMMING & DIVING

The 2009 SEC Male Scholar-Athlete of the Year for his sport, Julius Gloeckner earned three NCAA All-America honors and broke four individual school records last season. The senior swimmer was also a part of two relay records and led the team with 16 event victories during the dual-meet season.

Samantha Henry WOMEN'S TRACK & FIELD

LSU is world-renown for its sprint program, and Samantha Henry continued that tradition in 2009 while earning five All-America honors in NCAA competition. Henry proved to be the most dominant sprinter in the SEC while capturing three conference titles in the 60 meters and 200 meters.

Allison Hightower WOMEN'S BASKETBALL

Allison Hightower became the first player in school history to lead LSU in points, assists, steals and blocks in a single season. A State Farm All-America Honorable Mention and unanimous first-team All-SEC selection, the junior guard guided the Lady Tigers to an 11th straight NCAA Tournament appearance.

Megan McChrystal WOMEN'S GOLF

McChrystal became the first LSU women's golfer in the 30-year history of the program to average less than 73 strokes per round for a full season as she earned first-team All-SEC honors and second team All-America honors. She finished 12th nationally in the NCAA Division I Women's Golf Championships.

John Peterson MEN'S GOLF

The LSU men's golf team enjoyed its most successful season in a decade by winning three team titles in 2008-09, and John Peterson led the way with six Top 10 finishes. Peterson earned his first career first-team All-SEC honor and became the first Tiger to earn All-America honors since 2003 as he was named a PING Second-Team All-American.

Malorie Rutledge SOCCER

Malorie Rutledge was named the program's first SEC Offensive Player of the Year and consensus All-American in team history. Rutledge helped the Tigers to a 14-4-2 overall record and school record 7-3-1 mark in SEC play while scoring nine goals and 18 assists for 36 points on the year.

Kirsten Shortridge SOFTBALL

A NFCA All-America Third-Team selection, Kirsten Shortridge ranked inside the SEC's top seven in hits (80), batting average (.426), multi-hit games (26) and stolen bases (26). She also garnered All-SEC, All-Louisiana and NFCA All-South First-Team picks after her .426 average was second-highest in program history.

Jane Trepp WOMEN'S SWIMMING & DIVING

Jane Trepp enjoyed one of the finest seasons in recent program history, shattering three individual school records in three different stroke disciplines and playing a role on four record-breaking relay squads. The sophomore also earned three NCAA All-America honors, including first-team recognition in the 200-yard medley relay.

Michael Venus MEN'S TENNIS

Michael Venus imprinted his name among the LSU greats in the history books and wrote a new line of his own as he became the first Tiger to capture the ITA All-American Championship in the fall of 2008. The SEC Player of the Year earned both singles and doubles All-America status en route to compiling a team-best 26 victories during the season.

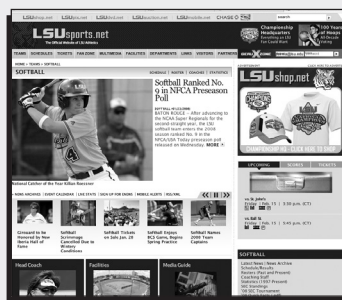

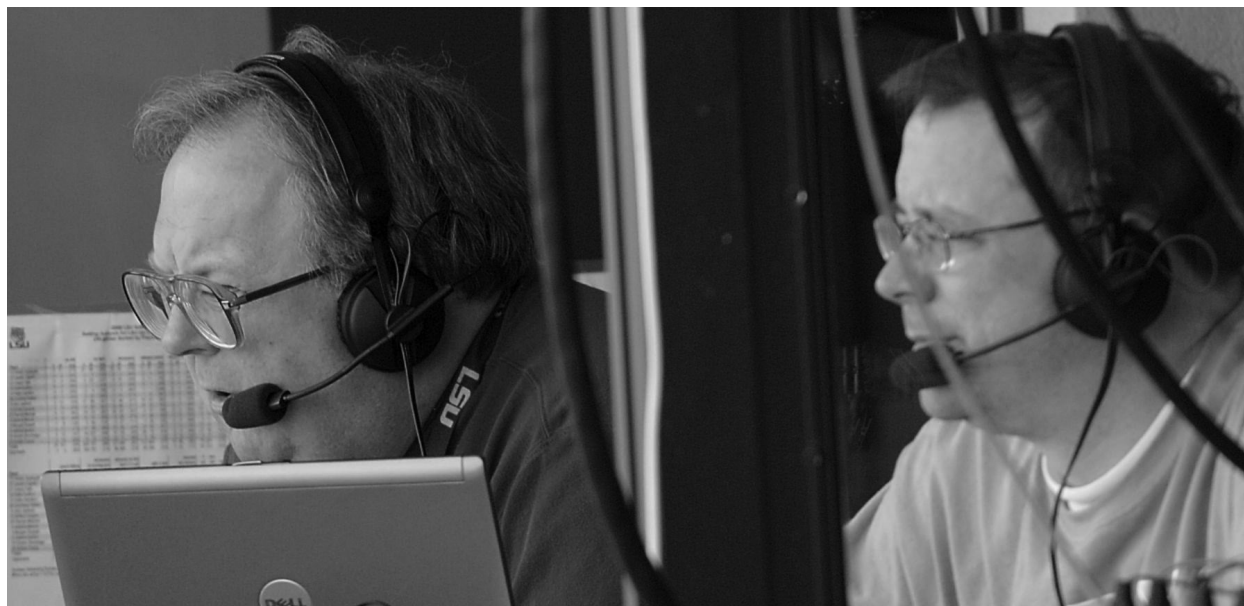

The LSU Sports Radio Network gives Tiger softball one of the most comprehensive audiences across the nation. As Tiger softball begins its 14th season of extensive radio coverage, the LSU Sports Radio Network is scheduled to broadcast 25 of 28 SEC games beginning with the March 13 doubleheader at South Carolina. In addition, the network also will broadcast

four non-conference games, including the Feb. 17 home season opener against Louisiana-Monroe.

The LSU Sports Radio Network brings Tiger softball to its many fans with broadcasts in the Baton Rouge area on 104.5/104.9 FM. This marks the 10th season LSU softball has been on the station.

Patrick Wright, the voice of Tiger softball for the previous 13 seasons, will provide all of the play-by-play action. Wright also is the voice of LSU women's basketball and serves as one of the locker room reporters for radio broadcasts of LSU football games.

For the 14th season, LSU Senior Associate SID Kent Lowe will serve as the color analyst for Tiger softball home games. LSU Associate SID Matt Dunaway joins Wright for his second season on the air during road games.

The LSU Sports Radio Network also covers all of the Tigers postseason games from the SEC and NCAA Tournaments.

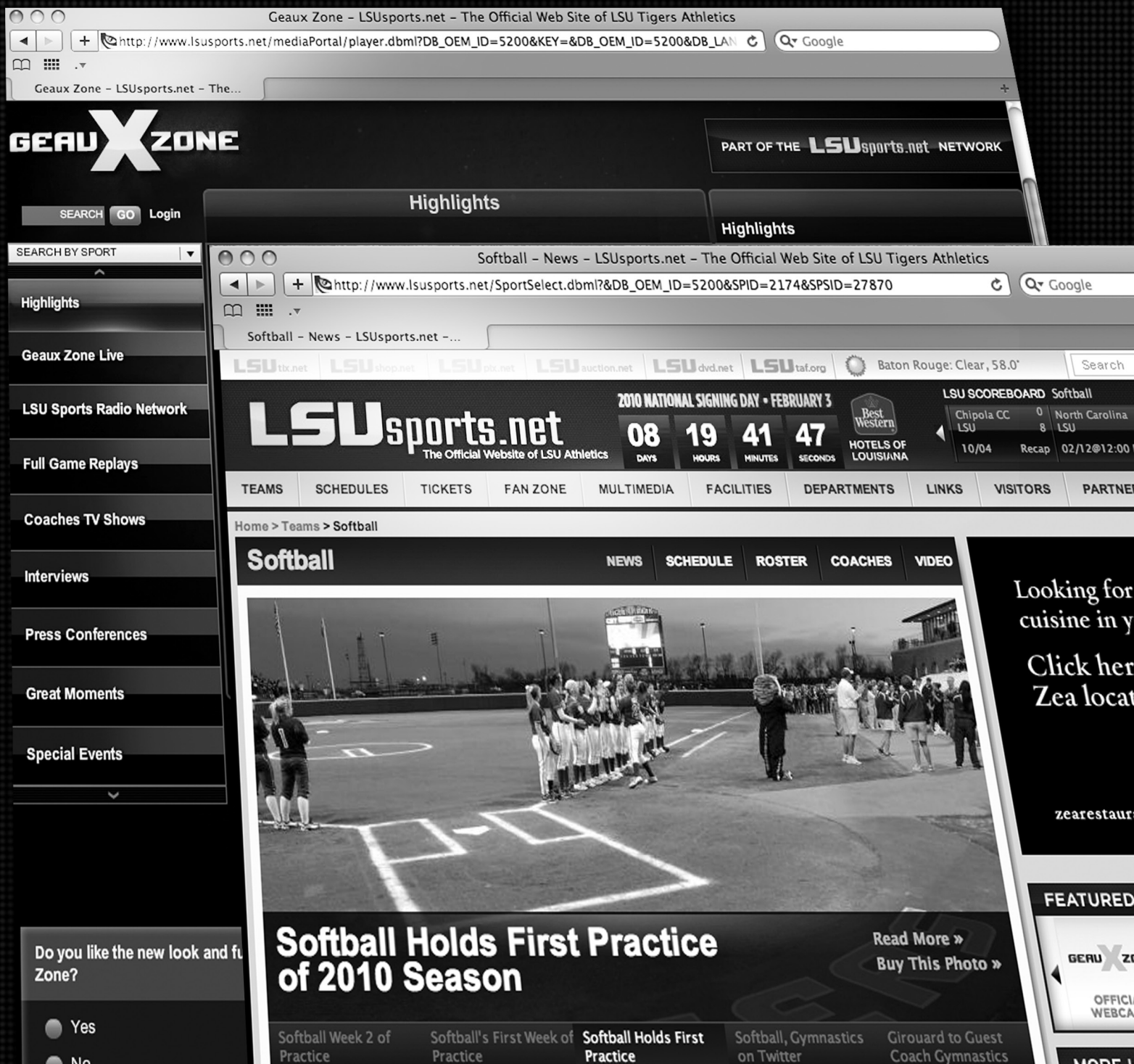

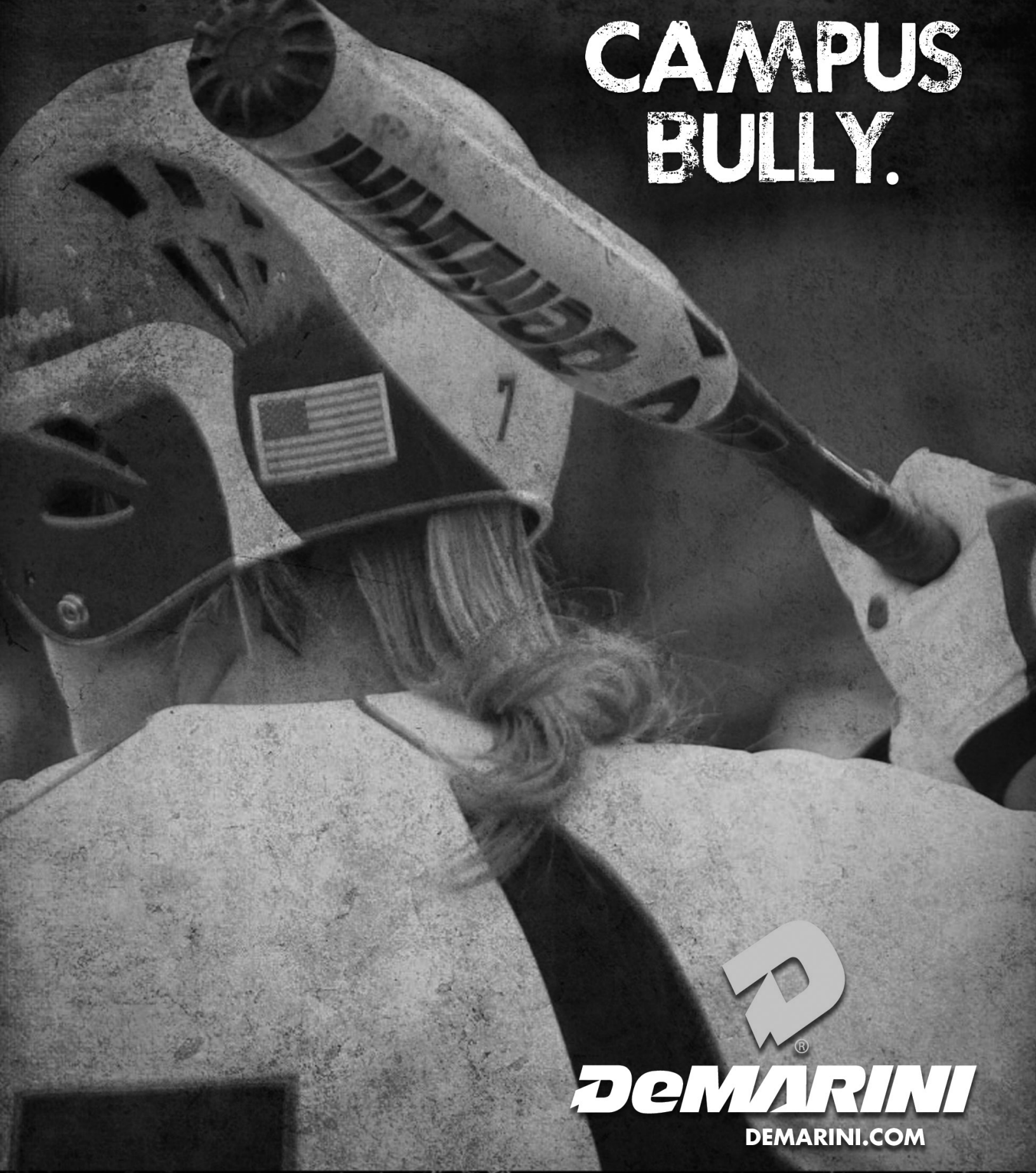

High School Camp • Entering Grades 9-12

The High School Camp is designed for players entering the 9-12th grade ONLY. Campers will be divided into competitive teams and will be coached by a collegiate level coach for all sessions. Sessions will be geared toward team concepts and individual skills, which will prepare players for high school level softball. Campers will participate in a strength and conditioning session, have their swing video analyzed, learn recruiting rules and strategies, and become familiar with collegiate academic standards.

All Skills Camp • Entering Grades 3-8

The All Skills Camp will focus on the development of all fundamental skills of the game. The camp staff will work with all skill levels in the areas of hitting, bunting, base running, infield and outfield play, pitching, catching, and game competition. Included in this camp are demonstrations, drills, and position specific work. Campers will participate in a strength and conditioning session, and each camper will have their swing video analyzed.

Tiger Cup Camp • Entering Grades 2 and Below

The Tiger Cup Camp is open to participants in the 2nd grade and below. This camp is designed to be a great introduction to softball and to refine the skills that young girls have just started learning. Campers will work closely with LSU staff and players learning the ins and outs of softball. This camp will run from 9 a.m. to Noon.

Pitcher/Catcher Camp • Entering Grades 3-12

PITCHERS: Pitchers will be trained by a collegiate level staff as well as former and current LSU players. Pitchers will be divided by skill level and will learn the mechanics of pitching, improve their speed and accuracy, and/or learn and develop movement pitches.

CATCHERS: An experienced catching staff will train catchers on the skills of blocking, receiving, throwing, calling pitches and much more. Catchers will also be divided by skill level.
