CHAMPIONSHIP LEGACY

1 WCWS MOST OUTSTANDING PLAYER

Kristin Schmidt earned Women's College World Series Most Outstanding Player honors in 2004. She is the only player to earn the honor outright and not win the national championship.

3 WOMEN'S COLLEGE WORLD SERIES APPEARANCES

LSU is one of five schools in SEC history with multiple Women's College World Series appearances. The Tigers along with Florida, Georgia and Tennessee have tallied a winning record in WCWS play.

3 ACADEMIC ALL-AMERICANS

The Tigers have had three CoSIDA Academic All-Americans in the 17-year history of the program, while only one program in the SEC has had more than four.

5 SEC CHAMPIONSHIPS

LSU has claimed a SEC-leading five regular season championships highlighted by four consecutive crowns from 1999-2002. Only three other schools in SEC history - Alabama, Florida and Georgia have claimed multiple regular season titles.

5 SEC TOURNAMENT TITLES

LSU is tied for the conference lead with five SEC Tournament titles and has advanced to the championship game in nine of the past 15 seasons.

15 ALL-AMERICANS

The Tigers have 15 NFCA All-Americans in the 17-year history of the program, second-most of any school in the SEC.

15 NCAA REGIONAL APPEARANCES

LSU has racked up 15 NCAA Tournament appearances, including seven-straight from 1998-2004. The Tigers are tied for the most NCAA trips among SEC schools since 1997.

825 VICTORIES

LSU has racked up 825 wins, the sixth-most in the nation since reinstating softball in 1997.

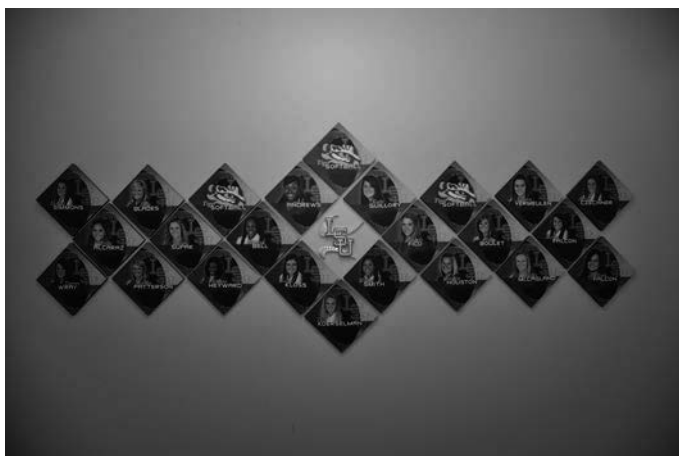

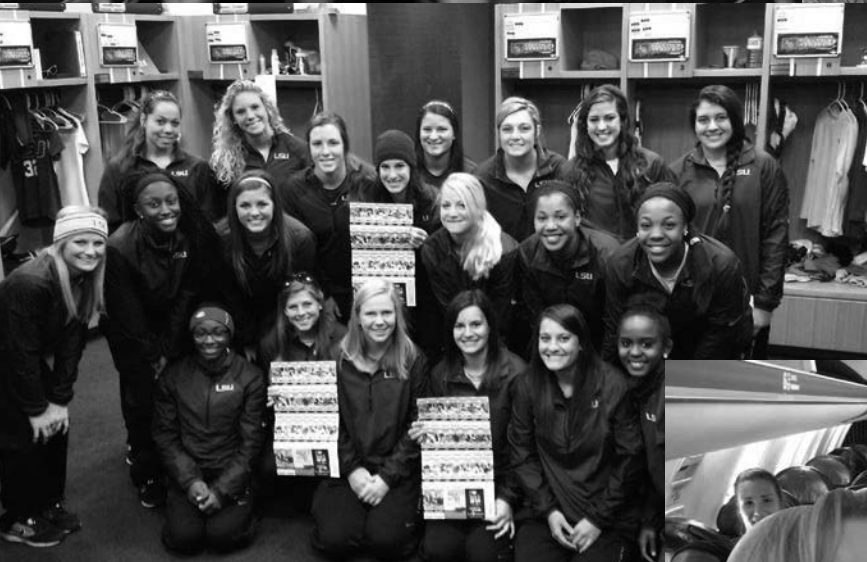

The 2014 LSU Softball Media Guide is produced by the LSU Sports Information Office and has been rated among the top seven collegiate softball publications in the nation for eight of the last 12 seasons. The 2012 media guide was awarded "Best in the Nation" and 2013 media guide garnered "Best Cover in the Nation" status for the first time in program history by the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA). The publication also collected second-place finishes in 2005 and 2011 followed by third-place rankings in 2004, 2007 and 2010, a fifth-place finish in 2006 and a seventh-place showing in 2002.

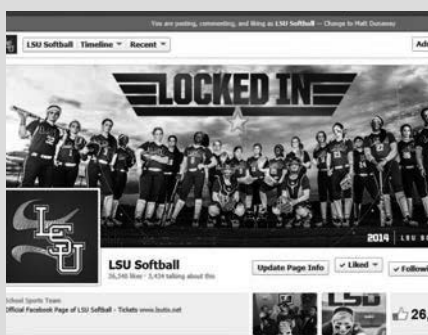

MEDIA TRAINING

LSU is one of the few schools where student-athletes go through media training to enhance their communication skills. Dr. Tommy Karam and Dr. Shirley White are two experts in the field who give training sessions to student-athletes on campus. The team's film room turns into a mock press conference setting to get student-athletes acclimated to giving interview in front of both print and electronic media. Karam and White record the mock interviews on camera and then provide feedback, allowing the student-athletes to become more comfortable and confident when doing actual interviews.



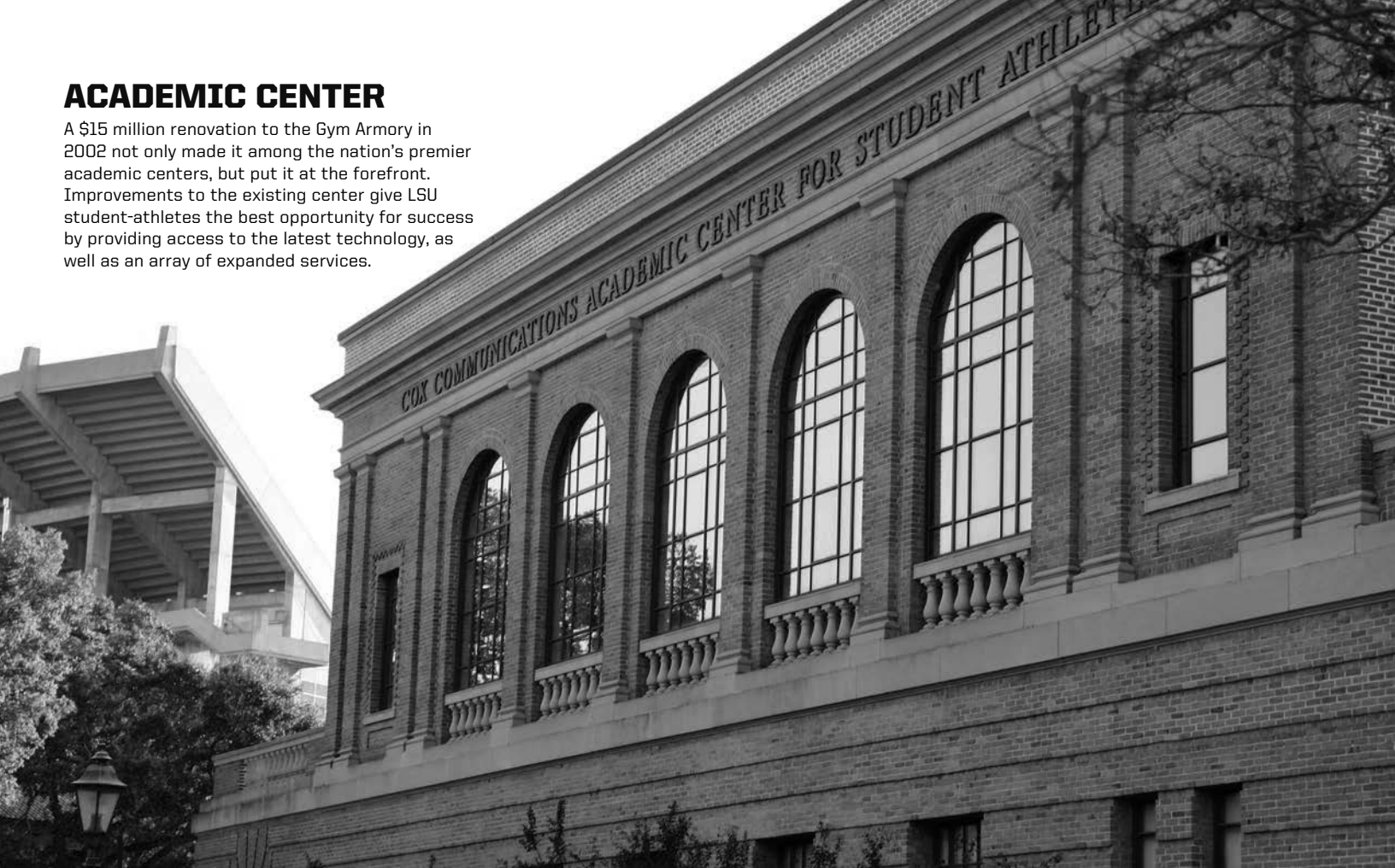
SEC ON ESPN

In 2009-10, ESPN and the Southeastern Conference reached a milestone 15-year agreement. ESPN acquired rights to every SEC home football game, excluding those on the CBS network broadcast package. The ESPN family of networks serves as the exclusive national cable home and syndication rights holder for the conference. LSU has made 28 ESPN appearances since 2010 and had every pitch of the team's run to the 2012 Women's College World Series televised by the worldwide leader.

AND THE SHAQUILLE O'NEAL LIFE SKILLS PROGRAM



CAREER/PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

In order for student-athletes to be truly prepared for their careers, it is the goal of the Student Affairs and the Shaquille O'Neal Life Skills Program to ensure that each student-athlete will leave LSU with a professional resume, cover letter, and interview experience. The program has three phases: career preparation, the "job project" and a career symposium. Many LSU student-athletes gain experience with career-developing jobs in the community during the summer months.

HOW CAN CHAMPS HELP?

The CHAMPS (Challenging Athletes Minds for Personal Success)/Life Skills program was developed by the NCAA to help prepare student-athletes for the challenges of life beyond the playing field. By focusing on "real life" skills and personal development, the CHAMPS program not only assists student-athletes with meeting daily challenges but also enhances their growth in college years and beyond.

HEALTH/WELLNESS

The goal of the Health & Wellness component of the Student Affairs division is to inform and educate student-athletes about the various health and wellness related issues that they will encounter throughout their tenure at LSU and beyond.

DIVERSITY, INCLUSION & CIVIC ENGAGEMENT

The Cox Communications Academic Center for Student-Athletes strives to celebrate, highlight, affirm, and embrace the diversity of LSU student-athletes. They provide an environment that is respectful of cultural, racial, and ethnic differences by acknowledging their individuality and uniqueness. In addition, the programs emphasize the importance of giving back and citizenship by engaging in the University and surrounding community.



The LSU softball team shared the Tiger Cup award which was awarded at the 2014 Academic Gala. The award goes to the team that combined to be the most productive in the areas of on-field success, academic accomplishment and community service participation. Community Outreach



GEAUX PLAY

LSU has had a longstanding relationship with the Miracle League Association at Cypress Mounds in Baton Rouge. Former All-American Brittany Mack created and championed the "Geaux Play" program leading into the 2012 season where she challenged the LSU softball community to share the gift of sports with special needs children. Over the last two seasons, LSU has hosted "Geaux Play Day" at Tiger Park where the Miracle League participants get to be the team's VIP guests. The children are honored on the field before the game, and the Tigers played a special game afterwards.



STRIKEOUT OVARIAN CANCER TEAL GAME

Over the last two years, LSU softball has played hosted to the program's "Strikeout Ovarian Cancer" event. The Tigers hold a pregame recognition where survivors of ovarian cancer and other gyn cancers are recognized at the ballpark. Head coach Beth Torina's mother, Betty Dieter, is an ovarian cancer survivor. In 2013, LSU held the inaugural "Geaux Teal Ovarian Cancer Walk" where close to \$15,000 was raised for research. Torina serves on a committee of women from Baton Rouge to New Orleans with connections to ovarian cancer either as a survivor or lost a family member to the deadly disease. LSU will welcome Georgia on Saturday, April 12, 2014 for this season's "Strikeout Ovarian Cancer" event.



MOVE IN DAY

LSU softball played a major role in President and Chancellor Dr. F. King Alexander's initiative to help the Class of 2017 move into their dorm rooms before the fall semester began in August. The Tigers helped unload cars and greet the incoming students and their families as they arrived on campus.



Athletic Training



LSU boasts the largest and most complete athletic training facilities in all of collegiate athletics with both the Operations Center and the Broussard Center for Athletic Training in Tiger Stadium. Both are furnished with the latest in technology and equipment. The Operations Center training room features a full view of the practice

fields, two hot/cold jacuzzis and an underwater treadmill. The Broussard Center includes an on-site x-ray room, an in-house pharmacy, as well as the largest hydrotherapy pool in both collegiate and professional sports and is one of the few collegiate training centers with a full-service pharmacy and a full-service vision center.

HYDROTHERAPY TREATMENT

An integral part of rehabbing and developing LSU student-athletes is the operations center's hot/cold jacuzzis and an underwater treadmill in a fully equipped Hydrotherapy room. The Broussard training center boasts the largest hydrotherapy pool in both collegiate and professional sports.

BROUSSARD ATHLETIC TRAINING CENTER



The two story, 22,000 square foot facility contains 20 treatment tables with the newest forms of modalities available, 14 taping stations, a 1,600 square foot rehabilitation area which contains the latest rehabilitation equipment including the Cybex Norm, Woodway treadmills and Body Master select rise equipment. LSU's multi-million dollar athletic training facility is named in honor of Dr. Martin J. Broussard (left), the legendary trainer whose career spanned over 40 years at LSU.





Strength AND CONDITIONING

The LSU strength and conditioning facility, located in Tiger Stadium, was built in 1997 and features the latest in both strength training and cardiovascular training equipment.

LSU GREATS

The following nine individuals are the only athletes to have their jerseys retired by LSU. Men's basketball has retired the No. 23 for Pete Maravich, No. 50 for Bob Pettit, Jr., No. 33 for Shaquille O'Neal and No. 40 for Rudy Macklin. Women's basketball retired the No. 33 for Seimone Augustus. Football's only two retired jerseys are the No. 20 worn by Billy Cannon and the No. 37 worn by Tommy Casanova. Baseball retired the No. 15 in honor of longtime coach and former athletics director Skip Bertman and the No. 20 for Ben McDonald. Casanova, Macklin and McDonald joined the prestigious list in May 2009. Augustus became the first woman in LSU Athletics history to have her jersey retired in January 2010.



50 Bob Pettit

Pettit led LSU to its first NCAA Final Four in 1953 and he later became the first player in NBA history to exceed the 20,000-plus point barrier. Pettit is a member of the NBA Hall of Fame, and in 1997, he was named as one of the top 50 players in NBA history.



23 Pete Maravich

"Pistol Pete," Maravich still holds the NCAA record for career points with 3,667 and for career scoring average with 44.2 points a game. He was selected the National Player of the Year in 1970 after leading the Tigers to the NIT Final Four. He scored 50-plus points an amazing 28 times. He went on to a 10-year professional career and was selected as one of the NBA's 50 greatest players in 1997.



20 Billy Cannon

One of the true legends of college football in the South, Cannon was the 1959 Heisman Trophy winner and helped the Tigers to the 1958 national title. Cannon's most memorable performance came in 1959 against Ole Miss when No. 1 LSU trailed No. 3 Ole Miss 3-0 in the fourth quarter. He fielded a punt, broke seven tackles and returned it 89 yards for the 7-3 victory. He went on to a successful 11-year professional career.



33 Shaquille O'Neal

O'Neal was the first pick in the 1992 NBA Draft. He was named MVP of the league in 2000 and was a three-time NBA Finals MVP after leading the Los Angeles Lakers to three World Championships. At LSU, O'Neal averaged 21.6 points and 13.6 rebounds for his career, and in 1991, he was named the World's Amateur Athlete of the Year as well as SEC Athlete of the Year and National Player of the Year. In 1997, he was named as one of the top 50 players in NBA history.



15 Skip Bertman

A legend in the college baseball ranks, Bertman created a dynasty at LSU, guiding the Tigers to five national titles in a 10-year stretch from 1991-2000. He also coached the United States to a bronze medal at the 1996 Olympics in Atlanta and was an assistant on the gold medal-winning U.S. squad in Seoul, Korea, in 1988. Bertman retired from coaching following the 2001 season and served as LSU's athletics director for seven years. Bertman was inducted into the College Baseball Hall of Fame in 2006.



40 Rudy Macklin

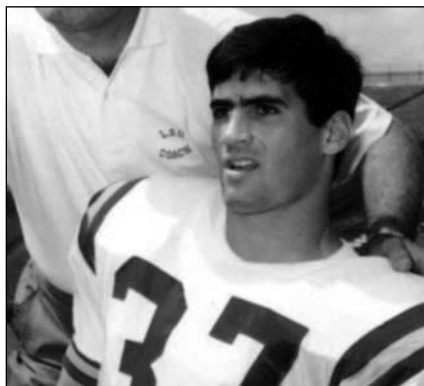
Rudy Macklin was a two-time basketball All-American selection during his Tiger career from 1976-81 during which time he became LSU's all-time leading rebounder with 1,276 boards and the second-leading scorer in school history behind only the legendary Pete Maravich with 2,080 points. He led the Tigers to two Elite Eight appearances and the 1981 Final Four in Philadelphia. He still holds the school single game rebound record with 32, a mark like some of the great records in any sport that may never be broken.

About LSU Retired Jerseys

The retirement of the jerseys of Casanova, McDonald, Macklin and Augustus comes under a new provision of the LSU jersey retirement bylaws that says the retirement of an athlete's jersey in a particular sport does not preclude a current student-athlete in that sport from wearing the jersey number in that or any other sport, subject to the discretion of the head coach. This provision applies only to jerseys retired after January 1, 2007, so the numbers worn by Maravich, Pettit, O'Neal, Cannon and Bertman may never again be worn by future student-athletes in their respective sports. To have a jersey retired at LSU, an athlete must have completed intercollegiate competition for LSU a minimum of five years prior to nomination. Athletes must have demonstrated truly unusual and outstanding accomplishments, exceeding and in addition to all criteria used for Hall of Fame selection. Nominees must have a unanimous vote of support from the Hall of Fame committee.



37 Tommy Casanova

Tommy Casanova is the only three-time All-American in the history of LSU football and is a member of the College Football Hall of Fame. During his Tiger career from 1969-71, Casanova personified versatility for his myriad of talents as he played offense, defense, returned punts and kickoffs. One of just two three-time All-SEC performers at LSU, he played six seasons with the Cincinnati Bengals of the NFL while earning his medical degree.



19 Ben McDonald

Ben McDonald won the prestigious Golden Spikes Award, given annually to the nation's most outstanding player, in 1989 and is a member of the College Baseball Hall of Fame. He led LSU to two College World Series appearances. In 1989, McDonald was named National Player of the Year by Baseball America, The Sporting News and Collegiate Baseball. He was selected by the Baltimore Orioles as the No. 1 pick in the major league draft in 1989 and went on to enjoy a 10-year major league career with the Orioles and the Milwaukee Brewers.



33 Seimone Augustus

Seimone Augustus is the only women's basketball player in school history to earn State Farm Coaches Association All-America honors three times: 2004, 2005 and 2006. Augustus became LSU's first NCAA National Player of the Year and she claimed the honor twice in 2005 and 2006. A 2006 graduate of LSU, Augustus was the 2012 WNBA Finals MVP after winning a world title. She also led the United States to a gold medal at the 2008 Beijing Olympic Games.

Jones became an inspirational figure as a two-time World Indoor Champion and the world record holder in the 60-meter hurdles with a time of 7.72. She competed in both the 2008 Beijing and 2012 London Olympic Games and became the first LSU athlete to ever grace the cover of Time Magazine in July 2012. A 2005 graduate of LSU, Jones is now a two-sport star. She was named to the U.S. National Bobsled Team that went on to claim gold at the 2013 FIBT World Championships.

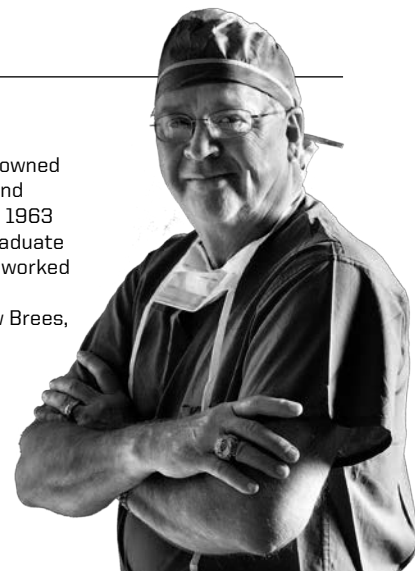


Mike Papajohn

The LSU softball team is "Locked In" for the 2014 season and has its target set on the program's fourth trip to the Women's College World Series under the direction of third-year coach Beth Torina.

Each year before fall workouts begin, Torina and her staff come up with a season theme for the team. In 2012, LSU used "Whatever It Takes" as seven seniors left their mark on the program defeating national seeds Texas A&M and Missouri en route to the WCWS. The 2013 squad "Ruled the Day" and built on LSU's championship legacy with the program's ninth SEC Western Division title.

"Our theme, 'Locked In,' has a lot to do with setting our sights on the College World Series and also the military," Torina said. "They are like fighter pilots. We have done some really cool things this offseason. We were able to train with the Marines, and it taught our players some valuable leadership lessons. They put the players through some really daunting tasks. We saw a lot about their character when they were up against the adversity. We appreciate the Marines helping us out. Around the facility, we have things like the side of a fighter plane. When we beat somebody or accomplish a goal, we get to put a kill logo on the side of the plane."

Torina and her husband, Nick, welcomed two new additions to its family during the offseason. They adopted a daughter, Taryn, during the summer before giving birth to another daughter, Tatum, in January.

"These are very exciting times for Nick and I," Torina said. "The most exciting part for me is that I have been a mother of sorts to these 20 girls for the past two years. It is so exciting to see our players interacting with my two little girls. It has really increased my commitment to this team and these players. I just want to insure their success because of how close they are. It just makes us feel even more like a family."

Once again, LSU has all of the necessary ingredients in place with a solid nucleus of experience, depth and talented newcomers to reach its goals. The Tigers will look to bounce back from a NCAA Regional exit to Louisiana-Lafayette on its home field.

"Last season, of course, did not end at all how we wanted it to," Torina said. "We faced a very worthy opponent in ULL at the end of last season. It's something that when your team doesn't achieve its goals and feels that disappointment. It's something you want to try to help them with and make sure it doesn't happen again. It really has been a great fuel for us this offseason. We think about that moment all the time. We think about sitting in the locker room, standing at that press conference and finishing second. That is something we want to work every single day to make sure something like that doesn't happen to this program again. We want to accomplish our ultimate goal, and that is making it to the College World Series every single year. That is something this LSU softball program truly deserves."

THE BATTERY

LSU has had a longstanding tradition as one of the nation's premier pitching programs as five different players have collected NFCA All-American status over the years. However, the Tigers lose the services of two-time NFCA All-American First-Teamer Rachele Fico but have a bounty of talent ready to step up in the circle.

Fico wrapped up her illustrious career with 797 strikeouts (3rd), 78 victories (4th) and 32 shutouts (4th) to rank among one of LSU's all-time greats. She joined Ashlee Ducote and Britni Sneed as the only players in program history to come away with NFCA All-American honors in back-to-back seasons. Fico will still be involved with

the program as a student coach in 2014.

"It will be wonderful to have Rachele around our program everyday," Torina said. "You don't replace her, but I think we have three young women who are going to do things their own way and be special in their own right. I am excited about the season Ashley Czechner is going to have. She will really be the workhorse for us, and I think she will have a great year. She has worked hard to develop some other pitches and making some things better during the offseason. I think you will a different look from Ashley, but I am excited about the season she will have."

Czechner made hte most of her 15 starts and posted a 12-1 record accompanied by a 2.64 ERA, a .202 opponent batting average and 85 strikeouts over her 98.0 innings of work. She neteced a trio of Top 25 wins over No. 17 Kentucky, No. 12 Missouri and No. 4 Alabama last season.

Czechner racked up a career-high 15 strikeouts and followed up with a two-hit shutout during LSU's victories over Central Connecticut State en route to an NCAA Baton Rouge All-Regional Team selection.

Itching to make an instant impact are freshmen hurlers Baylee Corbello and Kelsee Selman, while Bianka Bell may also get some innings in the circle.

Corbello is the two-time Louisiana Player of the Year and led Sam Houston High School out of Lake Charles to three consecutive state championships. She also was named the LHSAA State Touranment's Most Outstanding Player during all three seasons and was a multiple MaxPreps All-American recipient.

"Baylee is a name that everyone knows in state of Louisiana knows from the things she has accomplished throughout her high school career," Torina said. "I know that there are a lot of people pulling for her, and they should be. She can do a lot of things very well. She is a player that is not only going to help us on the mound, but she will help us in the lineup too. She can really handle the bat and swing it well with power."

Selman prepped at Hudson High School in Texas and pitched her squad to back-to-back state championships in addition to securing a pair of state tournament MVP awards. She was one of 16 players to garner 2012 NFCA All-American First-Team stats and tallied multiple MaxPrep All-American picks.

"Kelsee is an exciting player," Torina said. "She is a hard thrower and power type pitcher. She has a lot of things to learn, but she is learning every single day and getting better. I think she will be a special pitcher to watch as we go down the road."

"Both Baylee and Kelsee are very talented, and I think they're going to do big things for us," Torina continued. "As the season goes on, they're just going to continue to get better and better. The key will be to continue to throw them through game scenarios and situations especially during non-conference so they feel confident and comfortable heading into SEC play. I think you're going to see Kelsee grow by leaps and bounds throughout the course of the season. She is a very confident woman who is not afraid to go against anyone. Baylee is just your ultimate gamer type of player. You can put her in any situation, and she is going to get it done for you. I think the two of them are going to be very important to the success of our season"

Calling the shots for LSU behind the dish will be the tandom of Kellsie Kloss and Savhanna Jaquish.

Kloss, a 2013 All-SEC Freshman Team member, batted .250 with five home runs and 25 RBIs. Her five homers were tied for third on the team. Out of Redlands East Valley High School in California, Jaquish tucked away a pair of MaxPreps All-American

First-Team honors and was the two-time Citrus Belt League MVP. When not at catcher, both players will be in the mix at the designated player spot.

"Kellsie and Savannah are just two players who want to do everything right and work hard," Torina said. "Kellsie is one of the team captains this year and is a great leader for us. She does so many great things for us behind the plate. The same is with Savannah. She has one of the best arms I have ever been around. She is doing some good things and learning a lot behind the plate. She is another one I think you will see in the middle of the lineup providing some good power."

THE INFIELD

LSU's infield will have a veteran presence as all four starters from last year's squad return to the fold.

Bianka Bell, the 2013 SEC Freshman of the Year and NFCA All-South Region First-Team honoree, put together a memorable first campaign logging 51 of her 56 starts at the shortstop position. She turned in a .347 hitting clip coupled with a team-leading 12 dingers and 50 RBIs. The 12 homers were tied for third whereas the 50 RBIs were tied for eighth in program history for a single season.

"There is no question that Bianka will be better," Torina said. "She has worked so hard and is using that last game against ULL to really fuel that fire everyday. Hopefully, we will be able to protect her a little better in the lineup. At shortstop, I think is where you will see the biggest gains from her. She has really grown as a defensive shortstop. She is going to make some great plays that people will love to watch."

Allison Falcon was a mainstay at second base and tallied a .258 batting average to go along with five home runs and 28 RBIs. The five longballs were tied for third on the team, and the Donaldsonville native cranked a team-leading nine doubles.

"Allison is definitely one of those players who bleeds Purple and Gold, no question about it," Torina said. "She has grown up loving LSU. It's great to see her out there competing for school she loves so much. She is the field general and is the one who calls the shots out there. She makes things happen and steady as can be. We rely on her so much just because of her leadership in the infield."

Tammy Wray returns to the hot corner and has started 169 of a potential 181 games over her first three seasons. She registered a team-leading 97 assists and close to half of her hits produced RBIs for the Tigers last season.

Sandra Simmons asserted herself as a LSU's starting first basemen in 57 of 58 games last season. She secured a .270 batting average, four homers and 34 RBIs. The 34 RBIs were second on the team, and she registered a .991 fielding percentage.

"The corners are so special and are unbelievable defenders," Torina said. "They are the top of the top in the SEC defensively. Sandra and Tammy bring so much to us and take away the short game from other teams."

"I am so confident in the entire infield," Torina continued. "It is a nice veteran group to have. I am confident in the entire defense altogether. They say defense wins championships. I hope that is true for us this year because I am really confident in what we are going to do defensively."

Additional candidates to see time in the infield are Kailey McCasland (1B), Constance Quinn (2B) and Haley Smith (3B). Quinn possesses a powerful bat and picked up a trio of all-state selections while at Oak Grove High School in Mississippi.

THE OUTFIELD

LSU's outfield from the 2013 season remains in tact as A.J. Andrews (CF), Jacee Blades (LF) and Simone Heyward (RF) return for the Tigers. A key to the development of all three players is the tutelage of volunteer coach Sharonda McDonald who was a former All-American at Texas A&M.

"All three of our outfielders are such game-changing players," Torina said. "The three of them spark our offense so much. They do so many things for us. They say speed never has an off day, and for those three that is definitely true. We put our outfield up against any outfield in the country. They are so quick and so talented. They have good arms, and they really cover a lot of ground."

Andrews was LSU's first NFCA All-American outfielder since Kirsten Shortridge during the 2010 season. She batted leadoff in every game where she compiled a team-leading .359 batting average to go along with 32 RBIs. The Florida native scored 47 runs, LSU was 27-3 when Andrews scored last season.

After not being an opening day starter, Blades worked her way into the lineup in addition to an All-SEC Second-Team selection. She hit safely in 42 of her 55 starts and batted .354 mostly from the No. 2 spot in the lineup.

Heyward anchored the bottom of the order and came away with a .333 batting average. She paced the Tigers with a .365 mark in SEC play, and all three outfielders recorded double digit steals for the Tigers.

Pushing the three incumbents for playing time in the outfield are Alex Boulet, Alayna Falcon, Bailey Landry, Layna Savoie and Dylan Supak.

Boulet has been a valuable pinch runner for Tigers in late-game situations during her career. Landry, an East Ascension High School product from nearby Prairieville, was a 2013 NFCA All-American First-Team and Max Preps All-American honoree.

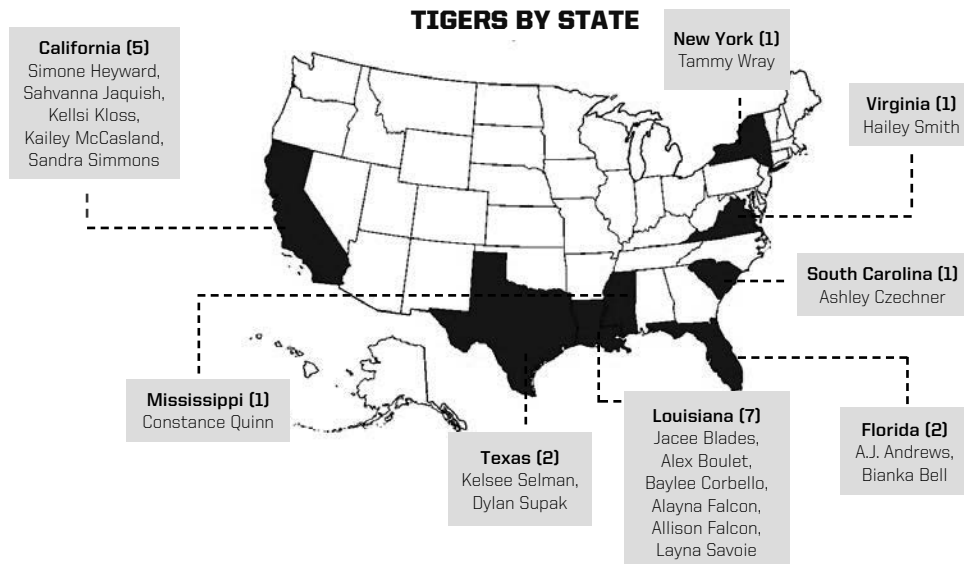

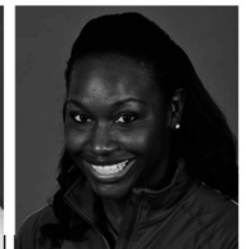

BETH TORINA

HEAD COACH

7TH SEASON OVERALL • 3RD SEASON AT LSU

Beth Torina heads into her third season at the helm of the LSU softball program after she returned the Tigers to national prominence with a pair of 40-win seasons and a trip to the 2012 Women's College World Series berth.

The 2012 WCWS berth was the program's third overall appearance on college softball's biggest stage and program's first since 2004. The Tigers are only one of three teams since the current regional/super regional format that was adopted in 2005 to knock off a pair of seeded teams in No. 8 Texas A&M and No. 9 Missouri on the road to Oklahoma City.

LSU raced out to a 14-1 start in 2013 which was the program's best start to a season since 2007. Playing one of the nation's toughest schedules, the Tigers claimed 12 victories over Top 25 opponents and spent a majority of the season ranked inside the nation's Top 15. It was the LSU's highest win total over ranked opponents dating back to the 2006 season.

LSU returned to the top of the SEC's Western Division and clinched the program's ninth division crown with a three-game sweep over Alabama that featured three one-run victories. The final two games of the series were played in-front of the two-highest crowds in Tiger Park history.

A.J. Andrews and Rachele Fico earned NFCA All-American accolades. The last time LSU had two players garner Louisville Slugger/National Fastpitch Coaches Association (NFCA) All-American status during the same season was 2007.

For Fico, she took home NFCA All-American First-Team honors for the second straight season which enabled her to join Ashlee Ducote and Britni Sneed as the only two NFCA All-American First-Team selections in program history. She was a USA Softball Top 25 Player of the Year finalist, Senior Class Award Top 10 finalists and picked up the NFCA's National Player of the Week award on April 30 after two wins during LSU's sweep of Alabama.

Fico's 24 wins in the circle was the highest total for a LSU pitcher since Dani Hofer tallied 24 wins in 2007. She twirled 10 shutouts to rank tied for 10th nationally. The right-hander racked up 232 strikeouts and matched the SEC's single-game record held by Tennessee's Monica Abbott with 22 Ks against Mississippi State.

LSU had five players secure All-SEC accolades with Andrews (First Team), Jacee Blades (Second Team), Bianka Bell (Second Team, Freshmen

Team), Fico (Second Team, Team) and Kellsy Kloss (Freshmen Team). Bell became the second player in LSU history to collect the SEC's Freshman of the Year award.

Andrews registered a .353 batting average on 71 hits, the program's highest totals since Kirsten Shortridge's All-American campaign in 2010. Bell connected for 12 home runs, tied for third-most in program history for

a single season.

In 2012, Torina guided the LSU pitching staff to a stifling 1.58 staff ERA which tied for second-lowest in the SEC. The 1-2 punch of Rachele Fico and Brittany Mack amassed 36 of LSU's 40 victories during 2012 in the circle.

Fico garnered 20 victories, a stout 1.12 ERA, racked up 221 strikeouts, limited opponents to a .183 batting average and tossed 13 shutouts over 230.1 innings. Her 1.12 ERA and 13 shutouts were fourth and fifth, respectively, in the NCAA rankings.

Mack created and championed the "Geaux Play" program where new or gently used sports equipment was donated at home games to benefit the Miracle League Association at Cypress Mounds. She was named a Lowe's Senior Class Award Top 30 Finalist and the SEC's Co-Scholar Athlete of the Year, the first time a LSU softball player has received that award.

Fico and Mack finished their careers as two of LSU's most decorated hurlers. The duo combined for 134 victories and 1,399 strikeouts during their careers. They are two of the six pitchers in program history to account for 600-plus Ks.

Both Mack (2012) and Fico (2013) went onto become the first overall draft picks in the National Pro Fastpitch (NPF) League during consecutive years. Mack played her first season with the USSSA Florida Pride under Torina before the pair was reunited with the Akron Racers in 2013.

Torina spent three seasons with the Pride as an assistant coach (2010)

followed by a two-year run as head coach (2011-12). During her tenure, the organization captured the 2012 Ringer Cup trophy awarded to the league's regular season champion and won the 2010 NPF championship. The Pride roster featured multiple Olympians which includes ESPN softball analyst Jessica Mendoza along with Caitlin Lowe and Natasha Watley.

Before joining the LSU program in June 2011, Torina took Florida International of the Sun Belt Conference to new heights. The two-time SBC Coach of the Year led the Golden Panthers to a 129-111 record in four seasons and directed FIU to its first NCAA Tournament victory in 2010.

The 2010 campaign saw the Golden Panthers sweep the SBC postseason awards as Kasey Barrett was the league's Pitcher of the Year, Ashley McClain was tabbed Player of the Year and Brie Rojas garnered Freshman of the Year status.

Individually, Torina coached 10 players to 14 All-SBC selections sparked by Jessy Alfonso and McClain, who have picked up All-SBC First-Team honors during each of the last two seasons. McClain also has collected 2010 and 2011 NFCA All-South Region First-Team accolades.

Torina spent five seasons as the pitching coach and recruiting coordinator at the University of Houston from 2003-07. The Cougars claimed the 2007 Conference USA regular season and tournament titles. One of her most prized recruits, Angel Shamblin, went on to become a two-time C-USA Pitcher of the Year, an NFCA All-South Region selection and a 2008 NFCA All-American. In addition to Shamblin, Torina saw seven UH hurlers receive All-Conference USA accolades during her tenure.

Torina began her coaching career as an assistant coach at Stetson University from 2000-02, leaving her mark on the Hatters' softball program after helping lead the 2001 squad to a share of the regular season Atlantic Sun Conference championship. Torina's pitchers set a quartet of school records, including wins (45), shutouts (20), strikeouts (385) and strikeouts per seven innings (6.70).

Torina earned her B.S. in health sciences and occupational therapy from Florida in 2000. During her playing career with the Gators, she was a member of the 1998 Southeastern Conference regular season championship team as the squad's top pitcher. She posted 60 career wins, which currently ranks tied for fourth in the UF record book. In the classroom, Torina was a GTE Academic All-America and a finalist for the 2000 H. Boyd McWhorter SEC Scholar-Athlete of the Year.

Torina has established an active community service function within the softball program as the Tigers regularly visit hospitals and schools in the Baton Rouge area. She is personally involved in several philanthropic causes highlighted by the program's annual "Strikeout Ovarian Cancer" event where LSU wears teal jerseys to celebrate survivors and support the cause of spreading ovarian cancer awareness. Torina's mother, Betty Dieter, is a five-year ovarian cancer survivor.

In 2012, the inaugural "Geaux Teal Ovarian Cancer Walk" was added to the event. The walk began at Tiger Park and rose close to \$15,000 for ovarian cancer research. Torina serves on a committee of women from Baton Rouge to New Orleans with connections to ovarian cancer either as a survivor or lost a family member to the deadly disease. The group promoted "Ovarian Cancer Awareness Month" and received a proclamation from Governor Bobby Jindal during September 2013.

Torina and her husband, Nick, were married in January 2010. The couple has two daughters Taryn and Tatum and lives in Baton Rouge.





HOWARD DOBSON

ASSISTANT COACH

3RD SEASON AT LSU

Howard Dobson enters his third season as an assistant coach at LSU. He serves as the program's hitting coach and assists with recruiting.

Dobson returned to the Women's College World Series for the third time in his coaching career with the Tigers during the 2012 season. Ashley Langoni joined former All-American Leslie Klein (2006) and Rachel Mitchell (2008) as the only players to capture the program's triple crown during a single season.

LSU turned in a 65-point improvement in batting average and more than tripled its home run total between the 2012 and 2013 season under Dobson. The Tigers had five players collect over a .300 batting average which included All-SEC honorees A.J. Andrews (first team), Bianka Bell (second team) and Jacee Blades (second team). Andrews was the 15th player in program history to notch NFCA All-America status, while Bell garnered the SEC's Freshman of the Year award after her 12 homers tied for third-most in program history for a single season.

Dobson has been heavily involved with USA Softball over the last two summers. He served as an assistant coach on the USA Softball Elite Team in 2012 and the USA Softball Women's National Team in 2013. He traveled with Team USA to the World Cup of Softball and the Canadian Open.

Dobson spent the previous four seasons as the head coach of Southern Miss. During his tenure with the Golden Eagles, he coached seven All-Conference USA performers highlighted by Megan Hill. The four-time All-Conference USA pick set eight offensive program records, including hits (205), RBIs (151), runs scored (148), home runs (48) and total bases (398). She also garnered NFCA All-Midwest First-Team accolades, the program's first recipient since the 2000 season.

Prior to Southern Miss, Dobson served as an assistant coach at Oklahoma for five seasons. He helped the Sooners continue to develop their reputation as not only a Big 12 offensive powerhouse but a national offensive juggernaut.

OU topped the Big 12 in scoring and also ranked among the league's top two in batting average during all five of his seasons in Norman. The Sooners had seven players secure NFCA All-American honors in addition to 15 NFCA All-Midwest Region selections and 20 All-Big 12 honorees. Norrele Dickson, Heather Scaglione and Kristin Vesely racked up multiple NFCA All-America selections under Dobson.

Dobson played an instrumental role as OU made a pair of trips to the

Women's College World Series trips in 2003 and 2004. The Sooners also made four NCAA Super Regional runs (2003, 2004, 2005, 2007) during their five consecutive trips to the postseason sparked by a 55-win campaign in 2007, which is tied for third in the OU record books.

Before Oklahoma, Dobson contributed to the establishment of Houston's softball program in 2000. The Orange, Texas, native had players notch 10 All-Conference USA accolades in two seasons fueled by Kristen Glowacz's 2002 C-USA Freshman of the Year award. The 2002 Cougars paced C-USA in hits (480), runs scored (279), slugging percentage (.448), RBIs (244) and home runs (47).

Dobson began his coaching career in the Pelican State with stops at Southeastern Louisiana, McNeese State and Barbe High School in Lake Charles. He directed his team at Barbe to a 5A state championship and gained valuable experience working at collegiate skills camps along with coaching on the international level. In the summer of 1999, his international team won the German Open.

A former all-conference performer at Panola College in Carthage, Texas, Dobson went on to finish his collegiate baseball career at McNeese State where he graduated with a degree in health and human performance and English in 1997.

Dobson and his wife, Katharine, have a eight-year old son Trip. They live in Baton Rouge.

ASSISTANT COACH

3RD SEASON AT LSU

Lindsay Leftwich embarks on her third season as an assistant coach at LSU. She is involved with all aspects of the program which include defense, hitting, recruiting, video scouting and camps.

The former Northwestern State standout has been with Beth Torina for every step of her six-year head coaching career which includes LSU's run to the 2012 Women's College World Series.

LSU improved its fielding percentage to a .968 ratio to rank fourth on the SEC leaderboard during the 2013 season. Sandra Simmons tallied 306 putouts, the sixth-most by a position player in program history. She also amassed a .991 fielding clip which sits in fifth place on LSU's all-time list.

The Tigers came away with a .964 team fielding percentage in 2012, the fourth-best defensive clip in the SEC. Ashley Langoni totaled 74 putouts and four assists from her left field post as an All-SEC Defensive Team pick. LSU's catching tandem of Morgan Russell and Lauren Houston gunned down a combined 21 base runners attempting to steal. The total equaled the program's second-highest single season mark.

Before coming to LSU, Leftwich spent four seasons as Torina's top assistant at Florida International. The Golden Panthers collected 14 All-Sun Belt selections sparked by a sweep of the league's 2010 postseason awards where Kasey Barrett picked up the SBC's Pitcher of the Year, Ashley McClain notched SBC Player of the Year and Brie Rojas secured SBC Freshman of the Year. McClain also has come away with National Fastpitch Coaches Association (NFCA) All-South Region First-Team honors in 2010 and 2011.

FIU posted a 38-21 record and claimed the program's second-ever NCAA Tournament bid and first-ever NCAA Tournament victory in 2010. The Golden Panthers improved their win total during three of her four seasons, and she aided Torina to a pair of SBC Coach of the Year awards.

Prior to FIU, Leftwich served as a graduate assistant at New Mexico. She was in charge of softball operations and assisted with daily coaching duties during the 2007 season. In 2006, Leftwich worked as the pitching coach at Wichita State where she helped the Shockers compile a 35-23 record.

Leftwich, a native of Houston, Texas, opened her coaching career as a student assistant at Northwestern State. She aided in coaching the offense and catchers in addition to playing an instrumental role in recruiting, fundraising, alumni relations and camps.

Leftwich enjoyed a three-year playing career with the Demons highlighted by NFCA All-Southeast Region, All-Southland Conference and All-Louisiana Second-Team selections in 2002.

NSU racked up a program-record 45 victories en route to a NCAA Tournament berth during the 2002 campaign. Leftwich drove home 44 RBIs, which are currently tied for third-most in program history for a single season, while her 123 assists on the infield paced the Southland Conference.

During her career, Leftwich added five Southland Conference along with a pair of Louisiana Sports Writers Association (LSWA) Hitter of the Week awards. She finished her career ranked fifth in both home runs and RBIs at NSU after a back injury held her out of her senior season.

An excellent student-athlete, Leftwich garnered numerous academic accolades, including Verizon Academic All-District Team recognition in 2002 and 2004 and NFCA Scholar Athlete recognition from 2001-04. In 2005, she earned a bachelor's degree in psychology and a minor in art and substance abuse prevention.

2ND SEASON AT LSU

Sharonda McDonald, a National Pro Fastpitch (NPF) League All-Star and former Texas A&M standout, heads into her second season on the LSU softball coaching staff. Her responsibilities will include working with the LSU outfielders, the offense's short game and assist in camp operations.

Last season, LSU's slappers accounted for 41 percent of the team's hits. A.J. Andrews and Jacee Blades anchored the top of the lineup and were ranked inside the SEC's Top 15 in hits en route to All-SEC First-Team and All-SEC Second-Team honors, respectively.

Prior to LSU, McDonald spent three seasons as an assistant coach at Ohio University highlighted by a 2011 Mid-American Conference (MAC) East Division title and an appearance in the 2011 MAC Championship Game.

The Bobcats belted a combined 82 home runs during the 2011 and 2012 seasons, the top two single season marks in program history. Lauren Gellerman, a 2012 National Fastpitch Coaches Association (NFCA) All-Mideast Second-Team and All-MAC First-Team selection, along with Raven King shared a program single season record with 13 dingers apiece.

During her tenure, Ohio had six different players secure All-MAC accolades. Jillian Van Wagnen turned in a team-leading .362 batting average, 64 hits and 30 stolen bases during the 2012 campaign as an All-MAC Second-Team pick. She finished her career with 69 total steals, second-most in program history.

McDonald began her coaching career in her native city of Houston, Texas as an assistant coach for Texas Southern in 2009. Under her supervision, the Tigers more than double their stolen base output from the season before sparked by Latrece Shello's 17 steals.

McDonald has played six professional seasons split between the Akron Racers (2010-12) and Philadelphia Force (2007-08) of the NPF and a one-year stint with the Fiorini Softball Club (2009) of the Italian Professional League.

McDonald turned in a .331 batting average, fourth-best in the NPF and picked up 13 stolen bases en route to All-NPF honors during her rookie campaign in 2007. She followed that up with a .299 hitting clip and added 16 steals to claim a 2008 NPF All-Star selection. Over her two seasons with Philadelphia, McDonald compiled 84 total hits. She is coming off a .303 season and added 13 stolen bases with Akron and shared the NPF's Golden Spikes award with Amber Patton in 2012. The award is given to the player that leads the NPF in stolen bases.

A standout outfielder during her playing days for national power Texas A&M, McDonald played for the Aggies from 2004-07. In that time, she garnered NFCA All-Region honors three times and a quartet of All-Big 12 selections. She holds Aggie single-season records for runs scored (60) and stolen bases (48) and also ranks as the program's all-time leader in both categories. Her 48 steals in 2005 led the nation and helped her earn the 2005 NCAA Division I Softball Golden Shoe Award awarded to the nation's top baserunner.

McDonald holds A&M's sixth-best career average at .338 and is second all-time with 249 hits. She also boasts the Aggies' top three single-season stolen base marks. After concluding her collegiate career, McDonald spent a year with Texas A&M's strength and conditioning program where she worked the women's basketball, softball and volleyball programs.

McDonald received a bachelor's degree in Kinesiology from Texas A&M in 2008. She lives in Baton Rouge.

Quinlan Duhon moves into her fifth season as the Director of Operations for the LSU softball program after her exceptional four-year career from 2005-08. She also served as a student marketing assistant during the 2008-09 academic year following her playing career.

Duhon is responsible for handling all the behind-the-scenes aspects of the softball program which earned its third trip to the Women's College World Series in 2012. Her responsibilities include team travel, supporting camp operations, supervising player academic progress, ordering and distributing of equipment, organizing recruiting functions and campus visits, as well as serving as the program's liaison to the Diamond Backers Booster Club. She also oversees a staff of three student managers.

Duhon has been instrumental in the direction and growth of the team's footprint in the Baton Rouge community by coordinating the season ticket delivery program, assisting in the development of the program's "Strikeout Ovarian Cancer" event to raise awareness for ovarian cancer and being involved in the scheduling of the team's philanthropy projects.

Duhon has played a major role in keeping Tiger Park as the nation's state-of-the-art softball facility. The team's clubhouse received a complete graphics makeover following its 2012 WCWS run. Updated graphics also were installed on the ballpark's concourse and party deck.

On gameday, Duhon manages the coaching staff's T2 motion video file system from the press box and handles pregame motivational video pieces for the Tigers.

During her playing career, Duhon was a part of three NCAA Regional teams highlighted by the 2006 and 2007 Super Regional squads. She scored the walk-off, game-winning run in a 5-4 triumph over Louisiana-Lafayette in the 2006 NCAA Regional championship game.

LSU spent the duration of the 2007 season in the nation's Top 10 and compiled an impressive 55-12 record. The Tigers tallied series victories over both No. 1 Tennessee and No. 2 Alabama during the regular season to win its fourth SEC Western Division crown and fourth SEC Tournament title during the Yvette Girouard era.

Duhon had an outstanding postseason being named to both the NCAA Palo Alto Regional and Tempe Super Regional All-Tournament teams. She cranked three home runs in NCAA play, including a two-run shot as part of a 3-2 win against Cal State Northridge in the NCAA Regional opening round.

As one of three captains for the 2008 team, Duhon posted career-bests in batting average (.333), hits (54), home runs (11), RBIs (38), on-base (.424) and slugging percentage (.605) en route to an All-SEC and All-Louisiana Second-Team honors.

Duhon finished her LSU career ranked third belting 30 career home runs and is listed among the school's Top 10 in walks (68), RBIs (128), total bases (300) and sacrifice flies (13). She is one of only 11 players in program history to score over 100 runs and post over 150 career hits. The Youngsville native also was a four-time SEC Academic Honor Roll selection.

Duhon earned her bachelor's degree in general business from LSU 2008 and her master's degree in sports management in December 2013. She lives in Baton Rouge.

Matt Dunaway heads into his fifth season as an Associate Sports Information Director at LSU. He serves as the media relations contact for the Tiger softball and volleyball teams in addition to promoting LSU's community service efforts.

RULE THE DAY: 2013 TIGERS WIN SEC WEST

The LSU softball team clinched the program's ninth and the final SEC Western Division title with a series sweep that featured a trio of one-run wins over defending national champion and No. 4 Alabama.

The Tigers accomplished the feat in front of program-record 7,799 fans over the three-game series which included a single game mark of 3,231 spectators during the series finale on Senior Day.

"This day was so special," Fico said after the sweep. "I'm just so proud to be a Tiger. In my heart, I know this is the right place for me, and I'm so glad I made the decision I did. If I had to go back and do it all over again, I absolutely would come to LSU without a doubt. I bleed Purple and Gold now. I never really understood what

this place is all about until I got down here. LSU sucks you up, and it turns you into a Tiger for life. I understand now. I get it now. I get why this place is so special. There's no place like it on Earth. I'm so proud to be a Tiger."

During the series finale, LSU erased three separate deficits before coming away with the 4-3 win.

With LSU trailing by a 3-2 margin during the bottom of the fifth inning, Katie Guillory ignited the Tigers by legging out an infield single deep into the hole at second base with two outs. A throwing error enabled Guillory to scamper into second base.

A.J. Andrews kept the two-out rally alive and ripped a 1-1 offering through the middle to plate pinch runner Simone Heyward with the

FICO CONTINUES LSU'S ALL-AMERICAN LEGACY

Rachele Fico (pictured right) was selected among the nation's elite once again and came away with Louisville Slugger/NFCA All-American First-Team accolades during the 2013 season.

It marked the second straight season that Fico took home NFCA All-American First-Team honors. She is third player in program history to earn two NFCA All-American First-Team selections. The Connecticut native joins Ashlee Ducote [1998, 2000] and Britni Sneed [2001, 2002] on the illustrious list.

Fico, a USA Softball Top 25 Player of the Year and Senior Class Award Top 10 finalist, notched a 24-13 mark. She picked up 14 of her 24 victories over RPI Top 35 opponents and twirled 10 shutouts to rank tied for 10th nationally. The right-hander racked up 232 strikeouts, second-most in the SEC.

During conference play, Fico was one of two pitchers to rank among SEC's Top 4 in wins (11), ERA (2.27), Ks (94) & opponent average (.198) in league games. She tied the SEC's single-game record held by Monica Abbott with 22 strikeouts at Mississippi State and garnered the NFCA's National Player of the Week award on April 30 after two wins during LSU's sweep of Alabama.

"Rachele has left her mark on our program in so many ways," Torina said. "It is a great honor for her to be recognized for what she has done athletically throughout her final year at LSU. There's no doubt that she is one of the nation's best. While she is honored for being such a great student-athlete, she also will be remembered by our team as someone we are proud to call an LSU Tiger. She has represented our program with tremendous character, heart and tireless effort."





ANDREWS ETCHES HER NAME AS ALL-AMERICAN

A.J. Andrews was a member of the NFCA All-American Third Team and is the 15th player in program history to collect an NFCA All-American selection.

The last time that LSU had two players garner NFCA All-American status during the same season was in 2007 when Leslie Klein and Killian Roessner accomplished the feat.

Andrews is the fifth outfielder to secure the honor. That prestigious list includes LaDonia Hughes [2004], Klein [2005, 2006, 2007], Trena Peel [2002] and Kirsten Shortridge [2009, 2010].

Andrews came away with a team-leading .359 batting average on 71 hits. The 71 hits are eighth, while her team-high 47 runs scored are 15th on the SEC leaderboard. She hit safely in 45 of 58 games which included 17 of her 23 SEC outings and was apart of 28 percent of LSU's runs scored for the season.

Andrews produced a team-best 19 multi-hit efforts and drove home 32 RBIs, third-most on team. She collected six game-winning/game-tying RBIs in fifth inning or later in SEC play, five were against Top 25 teams. The Florida native went 19-for-21 in stolen bases, tied for 12th in the SEC.

"A.J. is a spectacular outfielder that shines both offensively and defensively," Torina said. "She is extremely driven and has truly earned this award by all of her hard work, effort and determination. I am excited for her to be recognized, but I am also excited to see everything that A.J. can accomplish in the rest of her LSU career."

game-tying run. A throwing error by Alabama centerfielder Haylie McCleney allowed Andrews to scoot all the way to third base.

Jacee Blades took the first pitch of the next at-bat and deposited a RBI single on a chopper to shortstop to vault LSU to a 4-3 lead.

"It was so cool that Katie Guillory was able to get that hit for us," Torina said. "She is one of our super seniors being her fifth year. She has worked so hard to be in the lineup. She really fought her way during that last at-bat. She really started the offense there. It was a motivating factor for our team to see her do that."

Alabama attempted a comeback of its own in the sixth inning. After a Danielle Richard leadoff single, Tammy Wray used her quick release from her third base post and erased Richard on a fielder's choice ground ball. The Crimson Tide got another single to right field courtesy of Jadyn Spencer, but Simone Heyward fired a one-hop bullet to Wray to gun down Ryan Tamurri for the second out of the frame.

"When I went into right field, I knew the game was on the line," Heyward said. "It was the sixth inning. I know that we needed to make a great play somewhere defensively. The last time a ball came to me like that it tailed off, and I couldn't get a hold on it. This time I was like, 'I've got to get it. I've got to get her out.' I knew I was going to throw to third base, and I just wanted to come up big for my team. I wanted to be the one to make a big play."

Fico retired the final four Alabama batters she faced to wrap up the 4-3 win.

In the middle game of the series, LSU used solid performances in all three phases of the game to secure a hard-fought 2-1 victory.

Ashley Czechner went the distance in the circle for the Tigers and moved her unblemished mark to 10-0 for the season. The South Carolina native scattered one run on eight hits and recorded one strikeout versus two walks.

"Her (Czechner) track record before she came to LSU was she is a big game pitcher," head coach Beth Torina said afterwards. "The more pressure she has, the better she is. I think she is showing us that all the time. I am glad she pitched the entire game tonight. I thought she was fantastic. I felt really confident putting her back out there in the seventh, and she did exactly what we needed her to do."

The Tigers scored their runs via sacrifice flies. On the defensive end, Kells Kloss threw out a pair of Alabama baserunners attempting to steal bases whereas Heyward gunned down a Crimson Tide runner down at the plate.

LSU opened the series with a 3-2 walkoff win courtesy of Sandra Simmons' two-out, RBI single to left field during the 8th inning.

Simmons' heroics were set up by a Heyward leadoff infield single on a chopper to shortstop. LSU kept the rally going as Andrews drew a four-pitch walk. Blades reached on a fielder's choice to put runners on the corners. Alabama elected to fill the bases and issued an intentional walk to Bell.

Two batters later, Simmons cranked a 1-2 offering that deflected off the glove off a diving Danae Hays from her shortstop post and squirted into left field which enabled Heyward to race home with the game-winner.

"I was seeing her (Jackie Traina) well all night," Simmons said. "I knew it was my chance to end this game. We wanted to be done with it. After I started having my intelligence to get on top of the ball more, I knew I could produce it. I had nerves, but good nerves to where I knew I could do it. I just wanted to be the one to end it."

Alabama had an opportunity to take the lead during the top of the 8th inning. The Crimson Tide loaded the bases with a pair of singles and a walk. However, Fico buckled down and got Hays to foul out which kept the score knotted at 2-2.

"That is one thing this team is really good about," Torina said. "That is what I just told them. They never lost hope. They never had a doubt. They never second-guessed themselves. They have a ton of fight and I think that is the best quality this team has."

When Beth Torina was introduced as LSU softball's fifth head coach in June 2012, she vowed to win in everything the program did and return to the Tigers to national prominence.

Torina accomplished just that during her inaugural campaign as LSU returned to Oklahoma City and the Women's College World Series.

Led by eight seniors, the Tigers knocked off two seeded teams and future SEC rivals in No. 8 Texas A&M and No. 9 Missouri along the way.

To get back to softball's biggest stage, LSU embraced the mantra of "Whatever It Takes". Torina gave puzzle pieces to the players ranging from academic success to key performances in practices and games throughout the season. Each piece had different people that had the 'it' factor, and the puzzle was completed leading into LSU's trip to the NCAA postseason.

The Tigers started NCAA Regional play with a dramatic 1-0 victory over Texas State. Juliana Santos capped a three-hit barrage in the seventh inning with a walkoff RBI-single.

Rachele Fico fired her second straight two-hit shutout in as many days as LSU stayed in the winner's bracket with a 2-0 triumph over Texas A&M.

In the NCAA College Station Regional championship, Brittany Mack put together a masterful performance in a 2-1 win over the Aggies. LSU scored its two runs on a pinch-hit sacrifice fly from Kailey McCasland and a Dylan Supak infield single that was followed by a A&M throwing error.

The Tigers opened up the NCAA Columbia Super Regional and exploded for a 6-1 victory by roughing up Missouri All-American hurler Chelsea Thomas. Allison Falcon led the way with a 2-for-3 effort and three RBIs.

After Missouri claimed a 5-1 game two win in 12 innings and overcame a career-best 17 strikeouts from Mack, LSU bounced back in the deciding contest aided by Simone Heyward's first extra base hit of the season. The timely three-run double came in the third inning and erased a 1-0 deficit.

Fico retired 12 of the final 14 Missouri hitters she faced, and Ashley Langoni squeezed the games last out with a runner on second base.

LSU carried the momentum into its opening game of the WCWS and fired out to a 2-0 lead on No. 1 California on a two-run, second inning single from Morgan Russell. The Golden Bears charged back with five unanswered runs highlighted by a three-run sixth inning.

Facing elimination in a 0-0 contest versus No. 19 South Florida, Andrews used alert base running to score the game's only run on a sacrifice popout in the sixth inning.

On a 1-0 offering, Falcon popped up to shortstop Kourtney Salvarola. Since Salvarola was playing drawn in with the bases loaded, Andrews tagged from the third base bag and scampered home. Salvarola's throw was offline which enabled Andrews to slide around the tag attempt head-first safely into home plate. Mack dealt a two-hit shutout to preserve the 1-0 win.

Defending national champion and No. 3 Arizona State ended LSU's run with a 6-0 win. The session attendance was 9,310, the largest number of fans to attend a softball game in program history.

For Yvette Girouard and the LSU softball program, the second run to the Women's College World Series was filled with as much joy, drama and excitement as the original.

Like in 2001, the Tigers accomplished the SEC triple crown and claimed the SEC Western Division, Regular Season and Tournament championships.

LSU also won a heart-stopping 13-inning affair and nearly pulled off an impossible feat at the WCWS.

After starting the 2004 campaign with a 5-3 record, the Tigers strung together a 17-game winning streak. LSU continued its climb up the polls sparked by a three-game sweep at No. 7 Alabama to end March and checked in with a No. 2 ranking heading into postseason play.

A trio of wins over Alabama, Auburn and Georgia, all ranked among the Top 15, allowed the Tigers to win their third SEC Tournament in five years.

Unlike 2001, LSU's quest to Oklahoma City didn't start inside the friendly confines of Tiger Park. Instead, the Tigers were shipped to Waco, Texas and Baylor University for the NCAA Regionals.

After wins over Texas A&M-Corpus Christi and Seton Hall, LSU found itself down 3-0 to Baylor after two innings. Camille Harris kickstarted a three-run third inning with a solo home run to left field. Three batters later, future All-American Leslie Klein belted a two-run triple down the right field line to even the score at 3-3.

The Tigers exploded for a quartet of runs in the 10th inning. Stephanie Hill and Lauren Delahoussaye provided RBIs coupled with a Baylor error and wild pitch.

The next day against Illinois, Julie Wiese jumpstarted LSU with a solo shot in the second inning followed by RBI hits from Delahoussaye in the third and fifth innings.

That would be more than enough run support for two-time All-American Kristin Schmidt. She was touched up for only an unearned run on three hits to go along with nine strikeouts as the Tigers raced past the Fighting Illini 4-1 to return to the WCWS.

Another Big 10 team, No. 6 Michigan, would bite the dust in LSU's opening game in Oklahoma City. After 11 scoreless frames, the Wolverines took a 2-0 advantage to open the 12th inning. In the home half, the Tigers used an RBI-single by Leigh Ann Danos and a passed ball to knot the score at 2-2.

LSU won the game in the 13th on a Harris infield single. After two throwing errors, Sara Fitzgerald crossed home for the game-winning run. In the circle, Schmidt fired all 13 innings and tallied 13 strikeouts.

Following a 2-0 setback to No. 2 UCLA, rain altered the WCWS schedule. The Tigers were faced with the task of winning three games in one day to advance to the championship game.

A Fitzgerald RBI-single in the fourth inning proved to be the game winner as LSU edged No. 4 Florida State 2-1 to start the day. Schmidt provided another 13 strikeouts and surrendered only one run on four hits.

The Tigers fought off elimination for a second time and erased an early 1-0 deficit against No. 5 California. Klein opened the second inning with a solo home run, Harris followed with a two-out, two-run double in the third and Delahoussaye tacked on an insurance run with an RBI-double during the sixth.

Schmidt added eight strikeouts and pitched around trouble to close out the 4-1 victory for her third win of the WCWS.

LSU was poised to finish out the hat trick and carried a 1-0 lead into the fifth inning. Seven outs away, the Golden Bears struck for a quartet of runs to take the win.

"What more could you ask for from your team," Girouard said after the game. "I told the team before we got off the bus this morning that we weren't leaving the park until they turned out the lights on us tonight and we are doing just that. Unfortunately, we came up just a little short.

"This team did everything my staff asked of them. They played with total heart. Kristin Schmidt pitched her heart out and this team never died. If I have ever coached a team that deserved to go to the national championship game, then it is certainly this group of girls."

Yvette Girouard's first season at LSU ended in storybook fashion as the Tigers racked up a school record 59 wins and qualified for the program's first Women's College World Series.

LSU also completed the SEC triple crown for the first time en route to the SEC Western Division, Regular Season and Tournament championships.

After splitting a doubleheader at No. 21 Louisiana-Lafayette on April 18, the Tigers reeled off 12 consecutive victories to climb up to No. 3 in the national rankings.

Girouard refocused her team after a 7-3 setback at Auburn in the regular season finale and fired back with a 6-0 win over Auburn to open the SEC Tournament.

Three days later, All-American Stephanie Hastings belted a solo home run that stayed just inside the left field foul pole to open the SEC Championship against No. 22 South Carolina.

The first-inning blast coupled with a stellar effort from SEC Player of the Year Britni Sneed in the circle were more than enough to avenge a 1-0 setback to the Gamecocks from the season before.

Sneed hurled a three-hitter to complete her undefeated SEC season and recorded a tournament-record 11 strikeouts against zero walks to secure the MVP honor and 1-0 triumph.

LSU opened NCAA Regional action with victories over Cornell, Penn State and No. 9 Arizona State before facing No. 19 Louisiana-Lafayette in the finals.

The Tigers broke through for a pair of runs in the third inning as Hastings and future All-American Trena Peel provided RBIs.

An Alana Addison homer brought ULL within 2-1, but Sneed shut the door on the Cajuns retiring 12 of the final 15 batters highlighted by a strikeout of Heather Bertrand to vault LSU to the Women's College World Series.

Following a 2-1 hard-fought, extra inning loss to No. 4 Stanford, the Tigers bounced back behind a Julie Wiese two-run homer to dismiss No. 15 Iowa and set up an elimination tussle with No. 5 Oklahoma, the defending national champion.

The teams battled deep into the night before LSU emerged with a gritty 2-1 triumph in the 13th inning. An errant throw off an Ashley Lewis ground ball allowed Jennifer Schuelke to cross the plate for the game winning run.

Sneed will her way to an impressive 18 strikeouts, a program single-game record. She escaped multiple jams during extra innings, none more impressive than back-to-back Ks to get out of a bases loaded situation in the 10th.

The game was viewed by 1.57 million fans, a softball record at the time according to NCAA Productions.

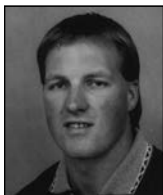

Dr. F. King Alexander

President/Chancellor, LSU

Dr. F. King Alexander was named the president and chancellor of Louisiana State University, which has an annual budget of \$3.4 billion and more than 54,000 students. He was appointed to the position by the LSU Board of Supervisors in March 2013 and assumed the position on July 1.

Prior to being named the president, Dr. Alexander was president of California State University, Long Beach (2006-2013) one of the nation's largest public universities located in southern California.

During his more than seven-year tenure at California State University, Long Beach, Dr. Alexander was twice named the California State University Student Association (CSSA) "President of the Year," which represents all 23 California State Universities and its over 440,000 students.

Prior to becoming president of California State University, Long Beach, Dr. Alexander was president of Murray State University in Kentucky (2001-2005) and was a faculty member at the University of Illinois, Champaign-Urbana, where he was the director of the graduate higher education program.

A Kentucky native who grew up in north Florida, Dr. Alexander received his Ph.D. from the University of Wisconsin-Madison in higher education administration with a focus on finance and educational policy analysis, and a Master of Science degree from the University of Oxford, Oxford, England in comparative educational studies.

As a teacher and administrator, Dr. Alexander has received many honors, including the University of Wisconsin-Madison School

of Education Alumni Achievement Award (2002) and has research university faculty affiliations at the University of Wisconsin-Madison Center for the Study of Postsecondary Education (WISCAPE) and Cornell University Higher Education Research Institute (CHERI).

Alexander is an internationally-respected expert in higher education finance and public policy and frequently publishes in national journals and for organizations in this field. He has served as a reviewer, an editorial board member, and a university instructor and faculty member, teaching courses in higher education finance, law, history and current events.

Dr. Alexander also has been asked to represent public higher education colleges and universities on numerous occasions to the United States Congress on issues of college affordability, student indebtedness, and institutional efficiency and effectiveness in efforts to address many of the growing challenges facing American higher education. Due to his national recognition and involvement on higher education issues, Dr. Alexander has served on numerous U.S. higher education and statewide organizational leadership boards where he remains very active.



Dr. Bill DeMastes

Faculty Athletics Representative

Dr. Bill DeMastes, a professor of English at LSU, is in his second year as Faculty Athletics Representative. Dr. Demastes earned his Ph.D. in English in 1986 from the University of Wisconsin-Madison with a Field of Study of Drama as Genre and a specialization in 20th-Century American and British Drama. He

earned his masters in English in June 1979 from the University of Georgia in Athens where he specialized in 19th-Century American Literature.

At LSU, he served as Associate Dean of the College of Arts and

Sciences from 2001-2004 and Director of Undergraduate Studies for the Department of English from 1999-2001 and 2010-11. He has also served as Associate Chair of the Department of English (1998-99); Director of the Master of Arts in Liberal Arts Program (1996-2004); and, Director of Graduate Studies in the Department of English (1992-94; 2005-06).

He was honored with the LSU Alumni Association Faculty Excellence Award in 2000 and in 2002 won the LSU Distinguished Faculty Award. He was named in 2009 an LSU Rainmaker which is given to the top 100 LSU Faculty. In 2010, he received the Tiger Athletic Foundation Undergraduate Teaching Award, and in the summer of 2011, he was named the Harry Ransom Summer Fellowship recipient by the University of Texas.



Joe Alleva

LSU Vice Chancellor/Director of Athletics

LSU

Joe Alleva continues to bring unprecedented national recognition to LSU as Vice Chancellor and Director of Athletics. Under Alleva's leadership, LSU enjoys one of the country's premier athletics programs with success on and off the field of competition. Now in his sixth year at LSU, Alleva is dedicated to athletic and academic excellence, and is committed to providing the opportunities and the resources necessary for student-athletes to excel in competition, in the classroom and in the community. Alleva joined the LSU family on April 4, 2008 after a highly successful tenure as director of athletics at Duke University for 10 years. Alleva's role at LSU was further expanded in August of 2009 when vice chancellor was added to his title by the LSU Board of Supervisors. It is the first time in school history that the director of athletics has also held a vice chancellor position.

Alleva is currently serving a five-year term on the prestigious NCAA Men's Basketball Committee, reinforcing his position as one of the most respected athletic administrators in the country.

Upon his arrival at LSU, Alleva unveiled a strategic master plan for the LSU athletics program – "LSU: Thru and True" – to ensure the advancement and future of LSU Athletics as an exemplary program. The central mission of the plan is to create an environment for student-athletes to reach their ultimate potential, prepare them to be champions in life and to set out goals and values for the entire athletics program.

Alleva's vision will keep LSU among the nation's leaders in athletic facilities. He launched an aggressive fund-raising campaign to replace several hundred windows in Tiger Stadium that were in disrepair, and a new coating to the facade of the structure has given the old stadium new life. A renovated gating system on the west side of the stadium debuted in the fall of 2012 to include a plaza that celebrates LSU's football national championships and recognition walls that honor Tiger All-Americans. A new plaza opened on the north end of the stadium in the fall of 2013, further enriching the experience of visitors to the LSU campus.

A new lighting system was installed prior to last season that turns the upper archways of the north end of the stadium purple and gold and lights the iconic "LSU" on the stadium's north scoreboard. In addition, "Tiger Stadium" in 10-foot tall illuminated letters sits just below the west upper deck facing Nicholson Drive.

Also in the fall of 2012, LSU began construction on an expansion of the South End Zone of the stadium – a project that will add premium seating, general public seating and two state-of-the-art video boards – continuing an effort to augment one of the most iconic venues in all of college sports. The project will be completed in time for the start of the 2014 football season.

Under Alleva's direction, LSU's world-renowned track and field program received a state-of-the-art running surface in 2010 when a new track was installed in Bernie Moore Stadium and extensive renovations to the Tiger soccer facility were completed in the fall of 2011.

Alleva directed a major renovation to the University Club golf course that was completed in September 2010 and allows the LSU men's and women's golf teams to compete on one of the most challenging courses in the country. The renovated course helped prepare Tiger

golfers John Peterson and Austin Ernst, respectively, to win 2011 NCAA men's and women's individual championships, marking the first time both titles were claimed by players from the same school. The LSU men's team in 2013 played host to an NCAA Regional for the first time in the school's illustrious golf history.

Future plans include a new gymnastics practice facility, a new tennis complex featuring indoor and outdoor courts, and a state-of-the-art Nutrition Center for Student-Athletes, a facility that will house full-time chefs and nutritionists and provide the best dietary selections for all Fighting Tiger competitors.

LSU's prominence was evident in the final 2012-13 Learfield Sports Director's Cup standings that recognize the nation's best athletic programs, as the Tigers finished in the Top 20 for the eighth consecutive year.

The year was highlighted by another 10-win season and bowl appearance for the Fighting Tiger football team, which recorded a double-digit victory total for the sixth time in eight years. The men's basketball program was rejuvenated by first-year coach Johnny Jones, who directed the Tigers to a 19-12 mark while placing LSU back into consideration for a postseason berth. Women's basketball continued its rise under second-year coach Nikki Caldwell, who guided the Lady Tigers to LSU's first Sweet 16 berth in five years.

The 2013 Fighting Tiger baseball team established a school record for victories with 57 and earned the school's 16th College World Series appearance while capturing SEC Western Division and SEC Tournament titles. The softball squad won the SEC West and played host to an NCAA Regional in Tiger Park before record crowds. The LSU gymnastics team reached the prestigious Super Six for the third time in six seasons, and the women's track team, led by Bowerman Award winner and national sprint champion Kimberlyn Duncan, placed fourth in the final NCAA outdoor standings.

But the 2012-13 year was about more than just athletic success. Living up to Alleva's mantra of "competition, classroom, community," LSU student-athletes logged more than 4,475 hours in community service work across 20 sports through LSU's *Geaux Givers* program. And a total of 89 proud Tigers received their degrees from the university during LSU commencement ceremonies in December and May.

The Tigers in 2011-12 finished fourth in both the men's and women's Capital

One Cup competition that identifies athletic excellence. LSU was one of only two schools in the country – and the only one in the SEC – to rank in the top four in both categories.

Eighteen of the Tigers' 20 varsity sports participated in NCAA postseason competition in 2011-12. The year was highlighted by the football team's undefeated regular season, an SEC championship and an appearance in the BCS National Championship Game. The Lady Tiger track and field team captured the SEC championship while the LSU softball squad advanced to the Women's College World Series. The Fighting Tiger baseball team won the 2012 SEC championship, and LSU led the nation in attendance for the 17th straight season. The 2011-12 season marked the first time in school history that LSU won both the SEC title in both football and baseball in the same athletic year.

Outstanding performances of the 2010-11 athletic season included the exploits of the Fighting Tiger football squad that posted an 11-2 mark – including a Cotton Bowl victory – and finished the season ranked No. 8 in the nation. The year also featured Top 5 national finishes both indoors and outdoors by the men's and women's track and field teams.

In 2008-09, all 20 LSU sports competed in NCAA postseason play for the first time in school history and the Tiger baseball team won the national championship. LSU ranked second among Southeastern Conference teams in the Learfield Director's Cup All-Sports standings and finished in the Top 20 for the sixth year in a row.

With a strong commitment to academics, Alleva ensures that the Cox Communications Academic Center for Student-Athletes is a first-class facility that provides student-athletes the resources necessary for success in the classroom and personal development. The facility was recently enhanced by the addition of a media training center that gives student-athletes valuable assistance in improving their communications skills.

And with a strong emphasis on community service and outreach programs, the implementation under Alleva's direction of the "Geaux Givers" program fosters a relationship between the local community and LSU student-athletes, who regularly participate in philanthropic events. In addition, Alleva has bolstered the department's L-Club program to reach out and connect with former student-athletes.

Alleva oversees a staff of outstanding coaches and he has made

critical additions to LSU's coaching staff in recent years. He hired former LSU guard Johnny Jones in April 2012 to breathe new life and enthusiasm into the men's basketball program and last year added Julia Sell as the new women's tennis coach. In 2011, he lured the dynamic Nikki Caldwell to LSU to coach the Lady Tiger basketball team and then hired Beth Torina to direct the Tiger softball program, both of whom immediately returned their respective programs to NCAA postseason success.

Alleva is an innovator with bold ideas that benefit not only LSU but all of Greater Baton Rouge. He has been instrumental in the planning of the Bayou Country Superfest, a three-day country music concert and festival held in Tiger Stadium each spring. The event attracts nearly 100,000 visitors to the LSU campus and makes a tremendous economic impact upon the local community.

Alleva has served on numerous national committees throughout his career including the Football Bowl Certification Committee, the NCAA Division I Championships/Competition Cabinet and several Southeastern Conference and Atlantic Coast Conference committees.

He became director of athletics at Duke in 1998 and his impressive tenure there propelled the university into the ranks of America's top all-around collegiate programs. Among his outstanding list of accomplishments includes the greatest 10-year period in Duke Athletics, winning more ACC and NCAA championships than in any other decade in school history.

Alleva, whose hometown is Suffern, N.Y., majored in Finance at Lehigh University and received his bachelor's degree in 1975. While at Lehigh, Alleva was the quarterback of the football team and team captain in 1974. Alleva also played on the Lehigh baseball team. He served as a graduate assistant football coach and earned an MBA in 1976.

While at Duke, Alleva played a key role in Durham's community sports scene. He started Little League Baseball in Durham over 20 years ago, and also began the American Legion baseball program.

He is a member of the North Carolina American Legion Hall of Fame, Suffern High School Hall of Fame and the Rockland County Hall of Fame.

Alleva and his wife, Annie, have three children, J.D., Jeff, and Jenny. Joe and Annie recently welcomed their first grandchild, Harper, the daughter of Jenny and husband Kyle Young.



Vergé Ausberry

Senior Associate AD/Operations and Administration

A former LSU football standout, Vergé Ausberry joined the athletics administrative staff in August 2001 as the Associate Athletics Director for Operations. He was appointed to the position of Senior Associate Athletics Director in May 2006.

Ausberry supervises and is responsible for football, operations and football scheduling. He also oversees the LSU men's and women's track and field programs, the equipment staff, the strength and conditioning staff, the Dr. Martin Broussard training room, the video department and football game management.

Ausberry, from New Iberia, La., played inside linebacker for the Tigers, lettering in 1986-89. He was part of two SEC championship teams, playing on teams that went to four bowl games.

Before joining the LSU athletic administration, he was very closely involved in the athletic program, first serving for almost seven years as a member of LSU's highly regarded Academic Center for Athletics.

After leaving the Academic Center, he moved in July 1999 to the Tiger Athletic Foundation staff as part of LSU's fundraising arm.

Ausberry received his Bachelor of Science degree in education in May of 1990, his Master of Education degree in administration, supervision and certification in child welfare in May of 1992 and his specialist in higher education administration in 2004. He is presently a doctoral candidate in higher education administration at LSU. He is married to the former Cheri Morial of New Orleans and they have two boys, Austin(9) and Jaiden(8).



Bo Bahnsen

Senior Associate AD/Compliance and Planning

Returning in 2009 to serve the department in the Compliance Office, Bahnsen is once again proving to be a very versatile member of the athletic department.

Before moving back to Compliance, Bahnsen served the previous five years, in a valuable role as Associate Athletics Director for Internal Relations, overseeing the ticket office and all customer service operations.

Prior to December of 2003, Bahnsen's primary responsibility for the previous 14 years was to serve as LSU's NCAA compliance officer.

Bahnsen served as manager of the LSU basketball team as an undergraduate at LSU. In 1982, he became the administrative assistant for the men's basketball team, where he worked for five years.

In July 1987, he became administrative assistant to Athletics Director Joe Dean, overseeing the purchasing office and departmental travel operations until his promotion in 1989. In 1989, he was assigned his primary responsibility as NCAA compliance officer as assistant athletics director, and then was promoted to associate AD in 1996.

Bahnsen has been responsible for overseeing the successful implementation of LSU's Tradition Fund Program, a football-seating plan that requires contributions for the right to purchase approximately 45,000 seats in Tiger Stadium. In 2009, he helped organize the highly successful LSU celebration of the 100th anniversary of the Men's Basketball Program.

A native of Wharton, Texas, Bahnsen attended Wharton County Junior College for two years before transferring to LSU in 1979. He earned his Bachelor of Science degree in physical education.

Bahnsen, 54, is married to the former Karen Mayson, a former LSU golfer and current head coach of the Lady Tigers golf program. The couple has two children, Darren and Devin.



Mark Ewing

Senior Associate AD/Business

Mark Ewing, a 29-year employee of Louisiana State University, is in his 13th year with the Athletics Department, and serves as the department's Senior Associate Athletics Director for Business and the department's Chief Financial Officer.

His duties as the department's Chief Financial Officer includes oversight of the departments over \$95 million budget, management of the athletic business office, oversight of all travel, human resources, and purchasing. He also supervises the Athletic Ticket Office and LSU SportShop and serves as the liaison for concession operations. He is responsible for the department's financial forecasting and provides the financial information necessary for funding athletic construction and maintenance projects. He also serves as the department's administrator for men's and women's golf.

Ewing came to athletics from LSU's Office of Budget and Planning. He served as LSU's Budget Director overseeing the development and management of the university's over \$360 million operating budget.

Ewing, who is a native of Pointe Coupee Parish, received a bachelor's degree in finance from LSU in 1978 and a master's degree in public administration from LSU in 1995.

Ewing and his wife, Gail, have three daughters: Andrea and her husband Cody Lee, Arleen and her husband John Daniel, and Molly Sue. He also has one granddaughter - Ainsley Grace.



Ronnie Haliburton

Senior Associate AD/Athletic Facility Management

Ronnie Haliburton, who served as director of facility services in the LSU Athletics Department for three years, was promoted to Associate Athletics Director for Athletic Facility Management in March 2007.

Haliburton came to the athletics department in December of 2003 from LSU's facility maintenance department, where he served as manager for five years. He was responsible for the overall management of custodial operations, special events crews, stock room inventory and equipment repair.

Haliburton played as a tight end for the LSU football team from 1986-89, and was a member of two Southeastern Conference championship teams. He later played for the Denver Broncos for three years.

He first joined LSU in an administrative capacity in 1994 as resident assistant of Broussard Hall, then the school's athletic dormitory, before moving to the weight room as a student assistant strength coach.

Senior Associate AD/Internal Operations

Eddie Nuñez joined the Athletics Department in October 2003 as the Director of Game and Event Management and was promoted to Associate Athletics Director for Operations and Project Development in June of 2007 and Senior Associate Athletic Director in 2009. Nuñez has 13 years of experience working in intercollegiate athletics.

As a member of the Senior Management Team, Nuñez's responsibilities include assisting in the oversight of day to day operations of the athletic department and serves as the program administrator for men's basketball program, men's and women's tennis programs. He also supervises the Event Management department as well as directs all capital projects for the Athletic Department and Tiger Athletic Foundation. Under his guidance, the athletic department has experienced over \$300 million dollars in renovations and construction of athletic facility projects. Nuñez also serves as the Athletic Department's liaison with the Tiger Athletic Foundation as well as assist in fundraising/development. During his time at LSU, he has been appointed to represent the department of athletics on various University and community committees.

Nuñez came to LSU after two and half years as the Director of Game and Event Management at Vanderbilt University. At Vanderbilt, along with directing the Game and Event Management department, he also assisted in construction of numerous facilities from the renovation of Memorial Gymnasium and addition of a new Basketball Practice Facility to the construction of their Baseball stadium. Miriam Segar

Senior Associate AD/Senior Woman Administrator

Former LSU women's basketball player Miriam Segar has been a part of the athletics administration since June of 1995 and was most recently named Senior Associate AD and the department's Senior Woman Administrator after having served as Associate Athletics Director for Student Services since April 2007. She had served as Assistant Athletics Director since 2004.

As LSU's Senior Woman Administrator, Segar's responsibilities include oversight of the highly successful Tiger Olympic Sports program including 17 men's and women's sports. Segar began her administrative career at LSU as the compliance coordinator



where she served for three years. Following that, in 1998, Segar was named the director of the CHAMPS/Life Skills Program where she worked until 2001 when she became the Director of Student Services.

While working with CHAMPS/Life Skills, Segar guided the program to the Division I Athletic Directors Program of Excellence Award in 2001.

Prior to returning to her alma mater, Segar spent one year at the SEC office as the championships assistant and the officiating assistant, assisting in the management of all SEC championships and tournaments and the coordination of women's basketball officials.

Segar, the 2006 Athletic Department Female Alumnus of the Year, was a three-year captain for the Lady Tigers basketball team and received four letters from 1990 to 1994. She earned the 1994 NCAA Post-graduate Scholarship and was a member of the 1994 NCAA All-Academic team.

Segar and her husband Jamie have four children – Grant, Reid, Maggie and Hayes.



Brian Broussard

Associate AD/Ticket Sales and Operations

A 17-year veteran of the Athletics Department, including 13 years as ticket manager, Brian Broussard was promoted to Assistant Athletics Director for Ticket Operations in July 2007 and Associate AD in 2012.

Broussard is responsible for revenue in excess of \$50 million, which includes the management of ticket and parking sales and renewals for all sports, as well as Tradition Fund donations for football, men's basketball and baseball.

Broussard began at LSU in August 1996 as an assistant ticket manager responsible for men's basketball sales and the day-to-day operations of ticket office. In March 2000, he was promoted to ticket manager, becoming responsible for the ticketing in all sports.

Emmett David

Associate AD/Facility and Project Development

Emmett David joined the LSU Athletics Department in 2012 after serving as Director of the Office of Planning Design and Construction at LSU since June of 1996.

He will assist in facility and project development for the athletics department including the new South Stadium addition and future projects for such sports as tennis and gymnastics.

Among his responsibilities for the University was to serve as facility officer for Doctoral I Research Institution consisting of 11.2 million gross square feet with 250 primary buildings. He also was responsible for the 5-year Capital Outlay project planning of some \$484 million, deferred maintenance reporting and funding; and, ADA and Life Safety Code deficiency projects, budgets and tracking of expenditures of some \$200 million. He was responsible for nearly \$800,000 in physical development on campus with projects such as Choppin Annex, Residential College, Business Education Complex, Raphael Semmes Parking Garage and numerous major maintenance, repair and restoration projects.

David developed long range planning of future projects and the impact of associated displacement and monitored and managed space inventory. He served as joint director of facilities for emergency advisory conditions to the University Emergency Operations Center and also served as a Staff Senator.

Prior to his employment by LSU, he served as Project Review Architect for the Louisiana State Fire Marshall (1993-96) and also maintained a private practice

during the time. He also served as project manager and project architect for several Louisiana architectural firms prior to 1993.

David graduated from LSU with a Bachelor of Architecture in 1982 and his Master of Public Administration in 2006. He is a registered licensed architect by the state of Louisiana.



Neal Lamonica

Assistant AD/Fiscal Operations

Neal Lamonica, a member of the LSU Athletic Department staff since January 2000, was promoted to Assistant Athletic Director for Fiscal Operations in November 2012.

His primary duties include monitoring the Athletic Department's over \$100 million budget, and assisting coaches and administrators in formulating budgets for future years. He also serves as the liaison to the athletic department's retail sales operations and Tiger Booster Clubs.

Lamonica began his professional career at LSU in 2000 in the athletic department compliance office before moving to the business office in June 2003. He served as Coordinator of Athletic Business until December 2005, when he was named Business Manager.

Assistant AD/Marketing

Mathew Shanklin begins his third year at LSU serving as the Assistant Athletic Director of Marketing and as the General Business Manager for LSU Sports Properties, the multi-media rights holder for Tiger Athletics. Previously, Shanklin served 20 years as the Associate Athletic Director of Marketing and Licensing at the University of Arkansas.

Shanklin supervises all operations and client services for LSU Sports Properties, while also managing the LSU Marketing efforts. Since joining LSU, he has implemented several new initiatives including the Bengal Brigade Street team and the new Band pre-game presentation for men's basketball.

While at Arkansas, Shanklin was in charge of all department marketing/promotions, corporate sponsorships, advertising sales and coordinated all sales and programming for the football, basketball and baseball video boards. He was instrumental in developing the HogPen, a tailgating area for fans inside Baum Stadium, the Hog Spa hot tub area at Baum Stadium and the RBI Girls. Shanklin was instrumental in establishing the school's first baseball radio network in 1992, one of the nation's largest with more than 25 affiliates statewide as well as creating the first Hispanic radio network for the University of Arkansas. In 1998, Shanklin became the university's licensing coordinator and under his direction, licensing revenues increased every quarter.

Shanklin was assistant marketing director at East Carolina University for a year before going to Arkansas. He had served as an intern at Arkansas for five months before joining the ECU staff.

A 1984 graduate of South Mecklenburg (N.C.) High School in Charlotte, N.C., where he lettered in baseball and soccer, Shanklin earned his degree in communications from North Carolina-Wilmington in 1988.

A graduate of Ohio University's highly respected sports administration program, Shanklin earned a master's degree in that program in the fall of 1989.

An avid golfer, Shanklin married the former Missy Emmerson of Jacksonville, Texas, in 2003. She has a daughter, Jordan (18) who attends LSU, and they are also the parents of Barbara Blake (8) and Isabella Grace (6).

Michael Bonnette enters his 14th year as LSU's Sports Information Director and seventh as an Associate Athletic Director after being promoted to his current position in April of 2007. The Lake Charles, La., native has been around the sports media relations profession his entire life as he is the son of longtime and recently retired McNeese State Sports Information Director Louis Bonnette, a member of the CoSIDA Hall of Fame. The field at Cowboy Stadium in Lake Charles bears the name Louis Bonnette Field. His brother, Matthew, continued the family tradition at McNeese by being named Sports Information Director in July 2012, following his Dad in the position.

Bonnette, who is a 1993 graduate of LSU, is past president of SIDs for the Southeastern Conference and is currently the vice-president for SIDs for the LSWA. He is married to the former Robin Arnaud of Opelousas, La., and the couple has three sons, Peyton (13), Grant (14) and Max (8).

Senior Associate SID

Bill Franques works as the LSU baseball program's media relations director, and he serves as managing editor of LSU's football, men's basketball and baseball Game Programs.

His 2012 LSU football Game Program was voted best in the nation by College Sports Information Directors of America.

The LSU Baseball media guide, written and edited by Franques, has three times been named best in the nation by CoSIDA. His baseball brochures have finished among the top six in the country in 15 of the past 20 seasons, including his 2012 guide which was voted No. 1 by CoSIDA.

The LSU Sports Radio Network gives Tiger softball one of the most comprehensive audiences across the nation. As Tiger softball begins its 18th season of extensive radio coverage, the LSU Sports Radio Network is scheduled to carry 31 games which includes 21 of the team's 24 SEC contests.

The LSU Sports Radio Network brings Tiger softball to its many fans with broadcasts in the Baton Rouge area on 104.5/104.9 FM.

Patrick Wright, the voice of Tiger softball for the previous 17 seasons, will provide all of the play-by-play action. Wright also is the voice of LSU women's basketball team and serves as one of the locker room reporters for radio broadcasts of LSU football games.

LSU Associate SID Matt Dunaway joins Wright for his sixth season on the air during home and selected road games.

The LSU Sports Radio Network also will cover all of the Tigers postseason games from the SEC and NCAA Tournaments.
