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## Season Preview



# ARMED & Ready

*Nicki Arnstad*

The LSU gymnastics team returns a wealth of talent off its 2001 squad, as a new season brings new hopes and dreams, but the same goals that have become the staple of this program. The Tigers return three All-Americans and 11 athletes from a 2001 team that missed the NCAA Championships by an eyelash. The goals are simple for the Tigers in 2002. With the returning talent and a strong crop of newcomers, LSU will set its sites on its fifth NCAA Championship appearance in six years.

D-D Breaux returns for her 25th year as the mastermind of the LSU gymnastics program, fully aware of the potential for her 2002 squad.

"We've got a tremendous group coming back, both form a talent and leadership standpoint," said D-D Breaux. "We've got six seniors and a great deal of experience that will help bring along a talented group of newcomers."

The challenge begins for Breaux and the

Tigers on Jan. 11 when they travel to Gainesville, Fla., for their first appearance in the Super Six Challenge. From there, the Tigers will face the most difficult schedule in the country, as Breaux hopes her team will not only begin the season in the Super Six – but finish it there as well.

### The Returning Squad

The Tigers have no shortage of experience heading into the 2002 season, as three returning All-Americans and six seniors head the list of retirees.

All-Americans Nicki Arnstad, Beth Boudreaux and Shanyn MacEachern lead a star-studded lineup for the Tigers. Marina Degteva, Sharene Mamby and Adrienne Couret help give the Tigers a senior-laden lineup.

Arnstad returns after a breakthrough season in which she earned second team All-American honors on the floor exercise at the NCAA Championships. One of the top all-

around threats in the nation a year ago, Arnstad has spent countless hours on her bar routine in the off-season to round out a solid repertoire. With a near perfect floor routine, Arnstad will be one of the best in the SEC in 2002.

Boudreaux and MacEachern were All-Americans in 2000 and will look to fill major roles for the Tigers this year. Boudreaux has all-around potential and is a consistent three-event scorer, while MacEachern battled through the 2001 season with a host of injuries and hopes to return to the form of her first two years at LSU when she was one of the top all-around threats in the SEC.

Degteva is a three-event specialist for the Tigers, who, if she can perfect beam, will be one of the top all-around threats in the nation this year. Degteva is a model of consistency and posted nine scores of 9.90 or better in 2001.

Mamby returns for the 2002 season after receiving an additional year of eligibility for

missing the 2000 season. With 10.0 ability on bars and an additional year to heal, Mamby's leadership and progress on floor will be critical to the Tigers' this season.

Couret returns as the team's Academic Captain after a breakout season a year ago. Couret gives the Tigers stability on floor, vault and beam.

The Tigers return a number of key underclassmen as well, as Brooke Cazeaux and Rebecca Lightsey return for their third years at LSU, while Lindsay Beddow, Chelsea Richard and Kristin Uransky enter their sophomore seasons.

Cazeaux has developed into a strong floor, bars and beam scorer for the Tigers over her first two seasons, while Lightsey will look to make a full recovery and rejoin the beam lineup after missing most of the 2001 season with a torn ACL.

Beddow made a strong impact in her first season in purple and gold, demonstrating all-around ability with particular consistency on bars and beam. Richard became a staple in the Tigers' floor lineup, as did Uransky on vault. Uransky should pick up an expanded role this season, as she was limited by injuries in her first season at LSU.

**Newcomers**

Despite a veteran roster for the 2002 season, Breaux has added five newcomers that she hopes will contribute to the Tigers' lineup.

Lauren Companioni, Jade Jenkins, Annie Gagnon, June D'Angelo, and Rachel Franzella are all new to the Tigers this season.

Companioni and Jenkins are all-arounders who figure to step in and give the Tigers four solid events, while Gagnon, according to Breaux, will be at her best as the season progresses.

D'Angelo is another solid all-arounder who will work her way into the Tigers' lineup, while Franzella is a Louisiana native who will help the Tigers on floor.

**Schedule**

No one can ever accuse Breaux of ducking the top competition in the country. The Tigers will take on nine teams ranked in last year's final top 25 during the 2002 season.

The season starts on Jan. 11 for the Tigers with their first appearance in the elite "Super Six" competition in Gainesville, Fla., against two-time defending NCAA champion UCLA, perennial power Penn State and SEC rivals Florida, Alabama and Georgia.

"It's as difficult a schedule as we've had since I've been here," said Breaux. "We've got a veteran group returning and a great incoming class that will be introduced to the premier teams in college gymnastics very quickly."

The Tigers' 2002 schedule includes six regular season home dates, while the Maravich Assembly Center will also serve as the host

site of the NCAA Central Regional Championships on April 6.

The Tigers open their 2002 home slate against SEC rival Auburn on Jan. 18, coached by longtime LSU assistant Jeff Thompson. After a dual meet at Florida on Jan. 25, the Tigers return home for a pair of crucial meets in consecutive weeks against perennial powers Utah and Alabama.

After a road trip to 2001 NCAA Championship participant Denver, the Tigers return home for meets at the PMAC against Iowa and Kentucky, both nationally ranked squads a year ago.

On March 8, the Tigers head to Georgia and return home on March 15 for their final regular season home meet against Centenary and Rhode Island.

For the second consecutive year, the SEC Championships will be held in Birmingham, as the Bartow Arena will host the event on March 23.

# What to Look for in 2002

## VAULT

Vaults in women's gymnastics are grouped into four categories, with the various body positions and movements performed defining each category. Depending on the type of vault selected by the gymnast, she must meet the requirements specified in the Code of Points, the official text giving the relevant value of each skill performed. A successful vault begins with a strong, accelerated run. The best vaulters explode off the board, raising their feet up over their head with tremendous quickness during the preflight phase of the vault from the springboard to contact with the horse. During the proper phase (when the gymnast pushes off the horse) the judges are looking for proper body, shoulder and hand position and an instantaneous repulsion.

The second flight phase and the landing are critical areas. Watch for the height and distance traveled, as well as the number of saltos and twists. In addition, gymnasts must "stick" their landing, by taking no extra steps. Usually the more saltos and twists, the higher the difficulty value of the vault.

The vaulting horse stands 120 cm tall and is 35 cm wide by 160 cm long. The runway is 1 m wide and a maximum of 25 m long. All mats surrounding the women's apparatus are 12 cm thick.

## UNEVEN BARS

The most spectacular of the women's events, the uneven bars, demands strength as well as concentration, courage, coordination, precision and split-second timing. Watch for the big swings that begin in handstands on the high bar, incorporating multiple hand changes, pirouettes and release elements.

The routine must move from the low bar to the high bar, incorporating many grip changes, releases and regrabs, flight elements, changes of direction, saltos and circle swings through the handstand position.

The entire routine should flow from one movement to the next without pauses, extra swings or additional supports. Each routine must have two release elements.

The low bar can be adjusted to between 148 plus or minus 3 cm tall while the high bar must be between 228 plus or minus 3 cm tall. The bars can be adjusted to a maximum of 150 cm apart from each other.

## BALANCE BEAM

The beam routine must last between 70 and 90 seconds and cover the entire length of the beam. The gymnast must use acrobatic, gymnastics and dance movements to create high points, or peaks in the exercise, consisting of two or more elements performed in a series. An example of an acrobatic series is a cartwheel into a back handspring into a back salto. A gymnastics series might consist of a turn, followed by a split jump.

There are a few special requirements on the balance beam: one acrobatic series including at least two flight elements; a turn on one leg of at least 360 degrees; a gymnastics leap or jump with great amplitude; one gymnastics / acrobatics series; one gymnastics series; and an element close to the beam.

The overall execution should give the impression that the gymnast is performing on a floor, not on a strip four inches wide. Watch for variations in rhythm, changes in level (from sitting on the beam to sailing high above it), and the harmonious blend of gymnastics and acrobatic elements.

The balance beam stands 120 cm high. It is 10 cm wide and 500 cm long.

## FLOOR EXERCISE

The floor routine must be choreographed to music, lasting between 70 and 90 seconds and covering the entire floor area. The gymnast must use acrobatic and gymnastics elements to create high points in the exercise. These include two acrobatic series, one with at least two or more saltos in different directions; an acrobatic-gymnastics series; and a gymnastics series. Throughout, the gymnast must harmoniously blend these elements while making versatile use of floor space changing both the direction and level of movement.

The quality of grace may be disguised by movements of playful theatrics, but look for a dancer-like command of music, rhythm and space. The gymnastics elements should flow freely into each other while the leaps cover impressive distances and the pirouettes and turns add excitement to the music. The area of the floor exercise is 40 feet by 40 feet.

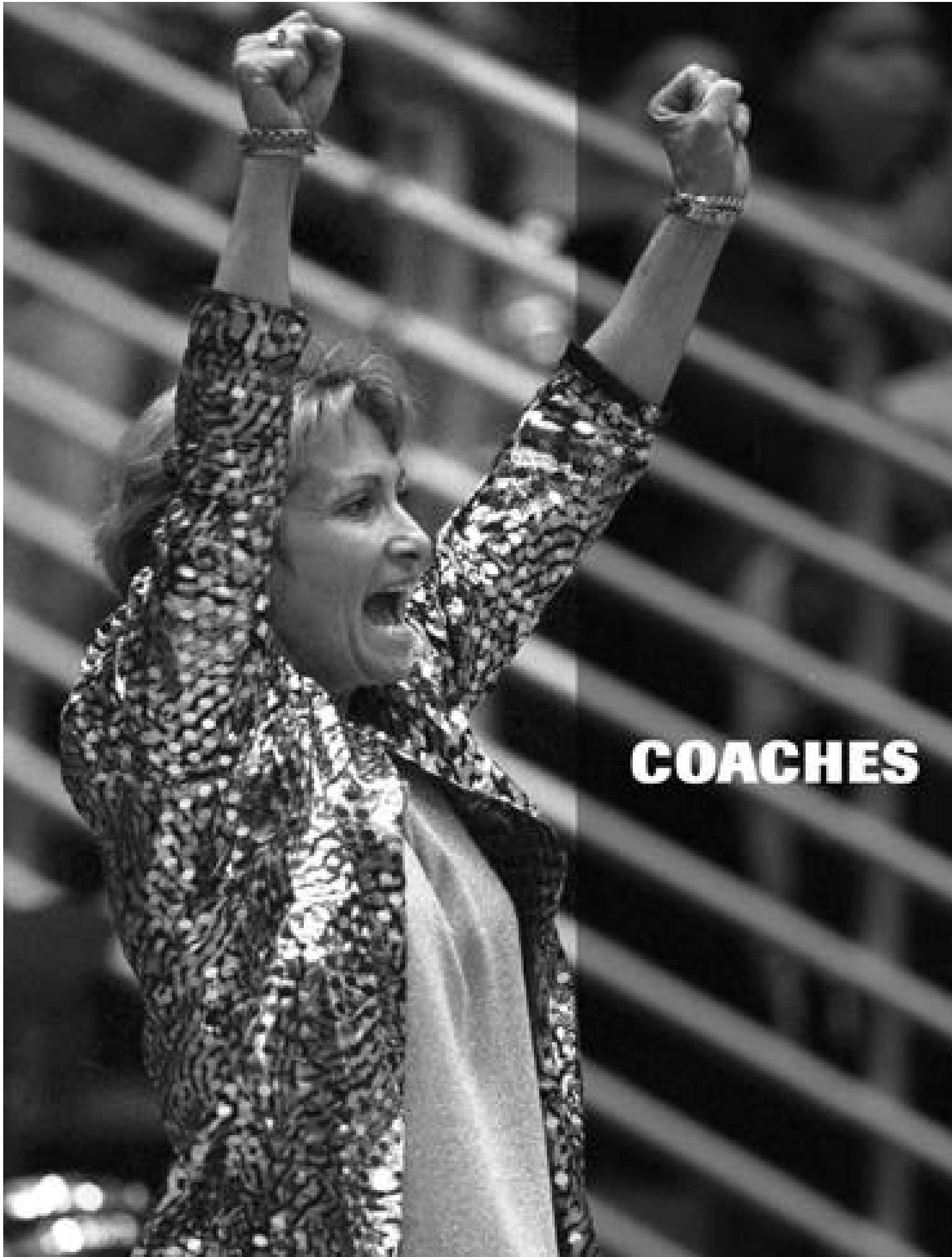

## HEAD COACH

## Sara "D-D" Breaux

In 1978, the LSU athletic department took a chance on a young, up-and-coming coach just two years removed from college. A quarter century later, the gamble has more than paid off. As the "Dean of Coaches" at LSU, gymnastics head coach D-D Breaux has represented the University at the highest level both in the gym and, most importantly, in the classroom for 24 years. Her dedication to the student-athlete on an individual basis has transcended into academic success, community involvement, Coach of the Year honors, SEC Championships and Top 10 national rankings throughout her tenure at LSU.

Now entering her 25th season as the mastermind of the LSU gymnastics program, the fire in Breaux's eyes burns as bright today as it did on her first day on the job.

Breaux has been recognized by her peers time and time again, having won SEC Coach of the Year honors four of the past nine years (1993,

1994, 1995, 2000) while also claiming the 1999 NCAA Central Regional Coach of the Year award. She was a finalist for National Coach of the Year honors after guiding the 1988 Tigers to a fourth-place national finish.

Aside from athletic honors, Breaux excels in recruiting quality student-athletes from Louisiana as well as across the continent. She has recruited some of the top Canadian athletes of all time, including several members of this year's team. A Louisianan through and through, Breaux also concentrates on recruiting right here in her native state, annually getting the top talent from the Sportsman's Paradise.

Outside of the gym, Breaux has taken an active role in the academic success her program has achieved in her 24 seasons at LSU. By making academic success her team's No. 1 priority, Breaux's teams have reached the highest scholastic goals she has established over the past decade.

Throughout the country, she is acknowledged as having one of the finest academic teams year in and year out. LSU gymnasts have been named Academic All-Americans 55 times and SEC Academic Honor Roll members on 63 occasions since 1991. During the 2000 season, an SEC-record 12 of Breaux's student-athletes were named to the SEC Academic Honor Roll, an honor reserved for sophomores, juniors and seniors. In 1999, the Tigers posted the third-highest GPA in the nation and the highest of any team in the NCAA Championship field.

Inside the gym, Breaux's Tigers have placed among the nation's Top 12 teams 17 times in her 24 seasons, including a fourth-place showing in 1988, sixth-place finishes in '80, '83, and '90, seventh-place in '87, '91, and '93, eighth in '94, ninth in '78, '86, '95, '98, '99 and '00, 11th in '79 and '81, and a 12th place finish in 1997.

LSU has placed among the top three in regional competition 17 times, winning regional titles in 1979, 1980, and 1986. These teams have included 26 All-Americans and 22 All-SEC gymnasts.

# A TIGER AT Heart

## 25 YEARS OF D-D BREAUX



The “Dean of LSU Coaches,” D-D Breaux enters her 25th season as the Tigers’ mentor, still with the passion of a first-year coach. A great deal has changed since she first stepped into the gym at LSU in 1978. Breaux took a moment to reflect on her 25 years at LSU.

*After 25 years, you still seem to approach the sport and approach coaching with the same fire you always have. It never seems to get old. How do you continue to motivate yourself year in and year out?*

I think it’s because every year is truly different and every team is truly different. I still enjoy working with the student-athletes and the challenge of molding them into great athletes and seeing them develop into great people. It’s the challenge that every year you start from scratch and you keep building and building. It’s the constant challenge and excitement that every year and every team is different in their own way and you embrace each year and each team.

The sports itself still motivates me. We’re measured by a different standard in gymnastics. It’s not just a winning mark or a winning time like in many sports. Our sport is about our performance, our production and our show. We’re measured not just by the final result. We’re measured by the panache of the event, the presentation of the event and whether or not the crowd had fun. The measuring stick is slightly different for our sport.

*Is there any one particular accomplishment or victory that stands out?*

In terms of victories, I would have to say in 2000 when we became the first team in NCAA history in any sport to ever defeat back-to-back No. 1-ranked teams, when we beat Utah and then Alabama. I know how hard our team worked for that and I know what it meant to that team and to this University. One of the things that stood out when we beat Utah was that a good friend and peer, Greg Marsden of Utah, who is an unbelievable coach and someone I have a great respect for, came up to me and congratulated me and the team and told me that he knew what it meant for this program and for our University. That’s meaningful, that’s your peer recognizing an accomplishment.

I would have to say winning SEC Coach of the Year honors four times is something I’m very proud of because of the caliber of the league and the coaches in the league, and also because it’s being selected by your peers. That’s always flattering and every time I win one of those I always acknowledge how hard it is and have a respect for the award because of how great a conference the SEC is.

*What would the 2002 D-D Breaux tell the first-year head coach back in 1978 in hindsight?*

To continue to persevere through the difficult times. It’s not always easy to coach at this level, but it’s such a rewarding profession during the good times. It’s a roller coaster ride with far more peaks than valleys.

I’d also tell her to always remember the cause for the sport. It’s very different coaching women’s athletics now than it was in 1978. Title IX has leveled the playing field so much, but it’s been a battle for equity and respect at times, but we come so far, and we will continue to grow.

I guess when I look back, it really is amazing how far along this have come here. I used to have to set up the gym, I didn’t have full-time assistants, I relied on students. When I look back, it’s just amazing how far things have come. While it was difficult at times, I would tell her to persevere and keep fighting until you win the war.

*Was there ever a point where you thought you weren’t cut out for this profession?*

I don’t think so. I was hired at a very young age, but I think I had an inner fire inside me and I had it in my heart that this is what I wanted to do. There are moments of doubt here and there, but I never thought I was over my head or that there was anything in the world that I’d rather be doing than working with these athletes or working at LSU.

*Do you ever think about how long you will continue to do this?*

I think as long as it’s fun. I think because I have so much fun interacting with the athletes that it keeps me feeling young. I don’t feel like I’ve done this for 25 years, I don’t feel worn out in the slightest, I still get excited looking at the challenges ahead every single year. That passion for this sport and for coaching hasn’t diminished in me at all. As long as I feel great about this sport, which I do, I’m going to keep doing this.

This is the best things have ever been here. From the standpoint of our administration, what our Chancellor and President have brought to the University, I think the University is on the threshold of its best years yet and I want to be a part of that. I want to be part of the progress here at LSU. My dad always told me that you’re either part of the problem or part of the solution – I want to be part of the solution and make it better. This is an exciting time to be a part of LSU athletics. I come to work every day excited about what the future holds and glad that I’m a part of what I think could be one of the great chapters in the history of the University.

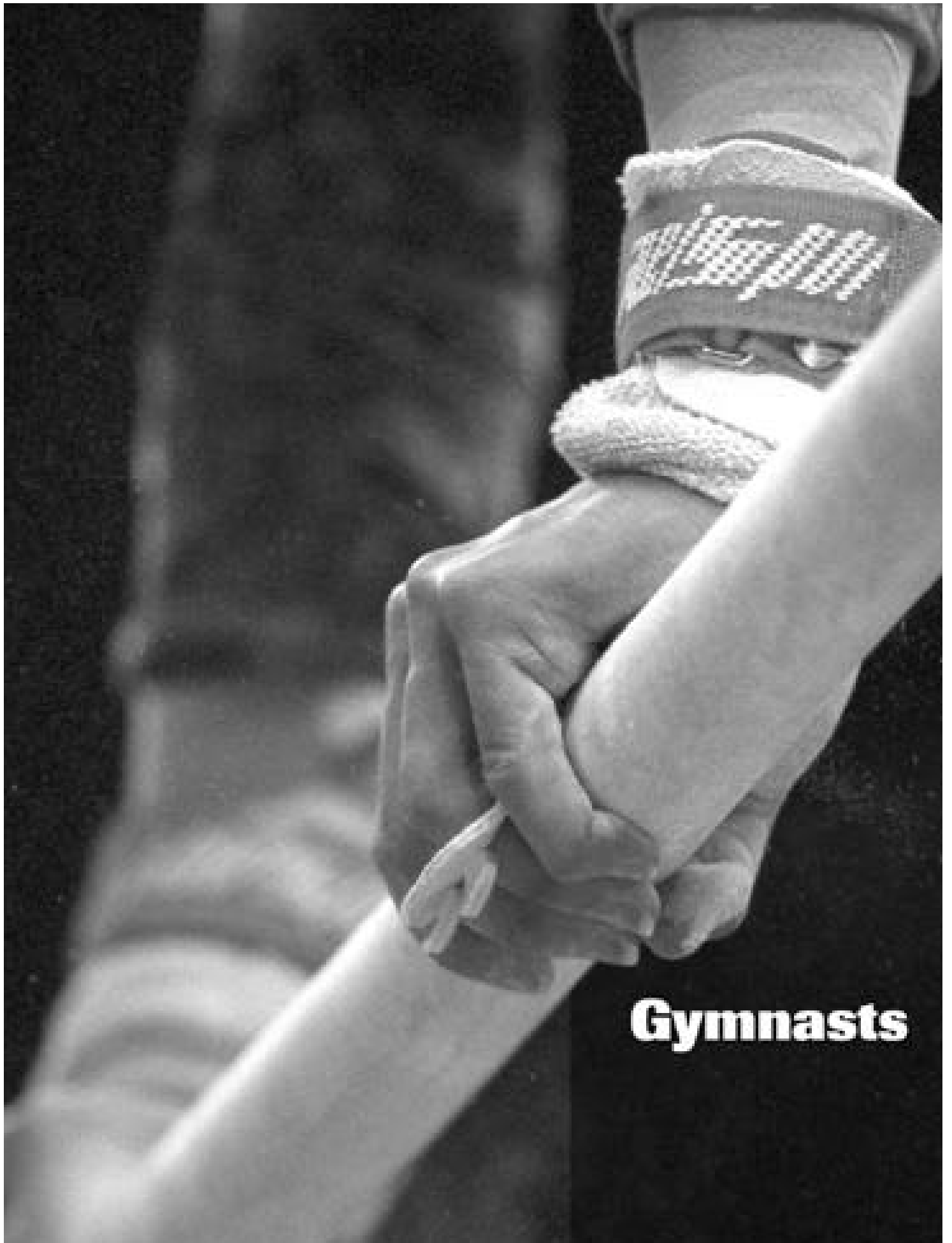
Ogletree came to LSU after spending the previous two years at the Georgia Gymnastics Academy.

The Tigers came up just short in their bid for a fifth consecutive NCAA Championship appearance, finishing third at the NCAA Northeast Regional at Crisler Arena in Ann Arbor, Mich., on April 7. Host-Michigan won the six-team event with an impressive 197.225 while Stanford edged the 18th-ranked Tigers for second place and the final NCAA qualifying spot in a closely contested battle 196.725-196.300.

With Stanford and LSU separated by just .025 heading into the final rotation, Stanford came up with a near-flawless vault rotation, scoring a 49.300, its highest score in any event on the night. The Tigers went punch for punch with the Cardinal for three rotations, but were unable to for a fourth and only came up with a 48.900 on beam.

Nick Arnstad finished third in the all-around to qualify for the NCAA Championships, where she ultimately went on to finish sixth in the floor exercise and earned second team All-American honors.

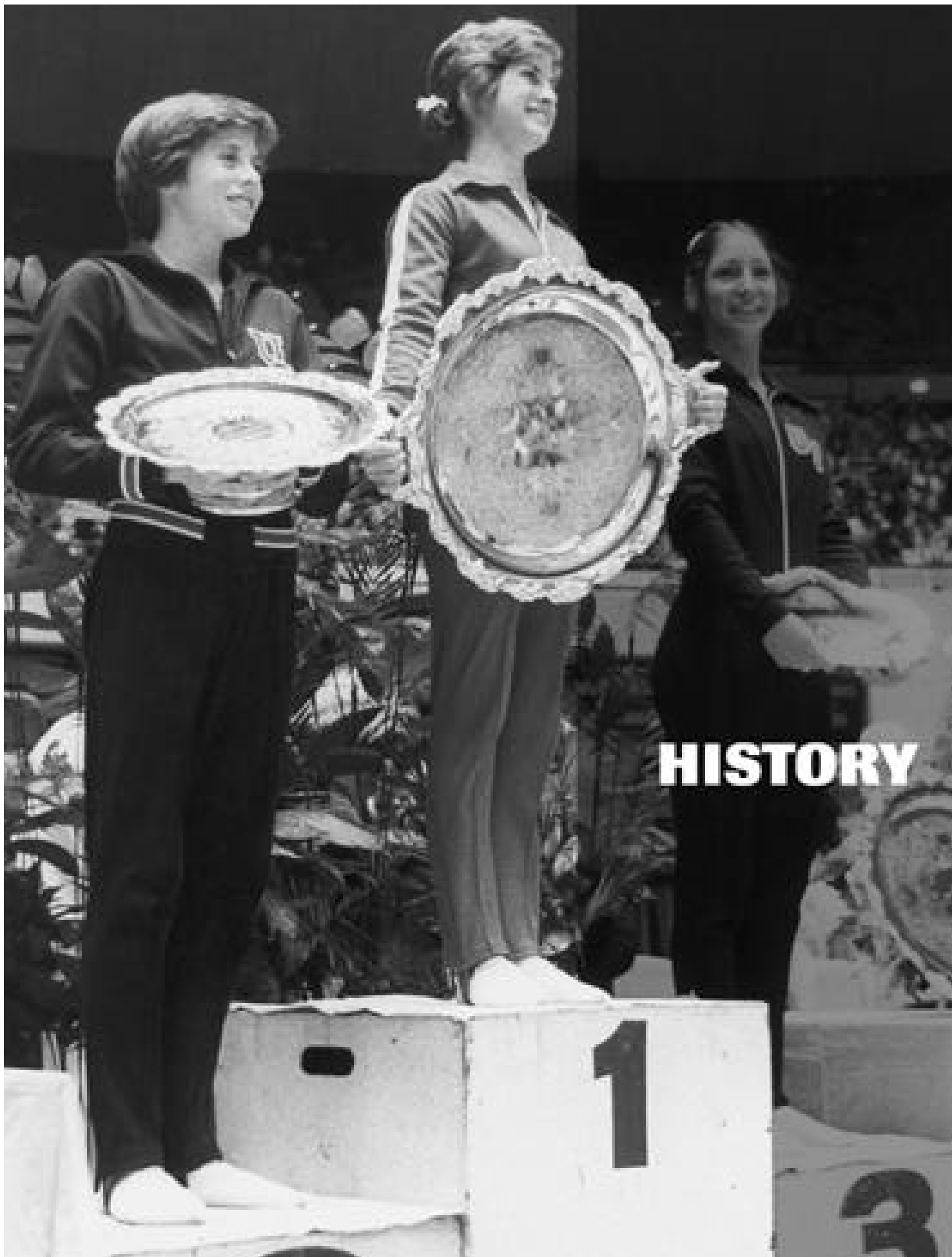

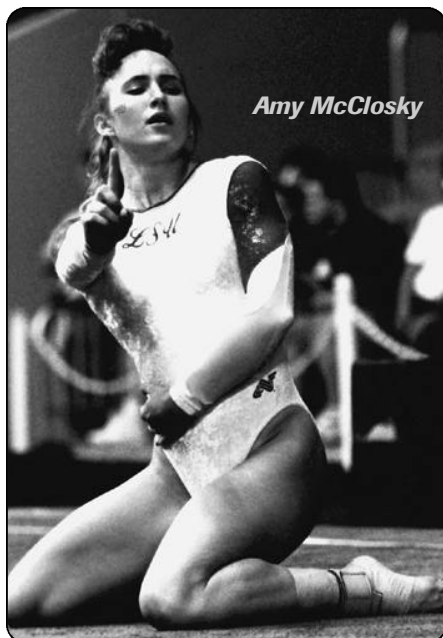

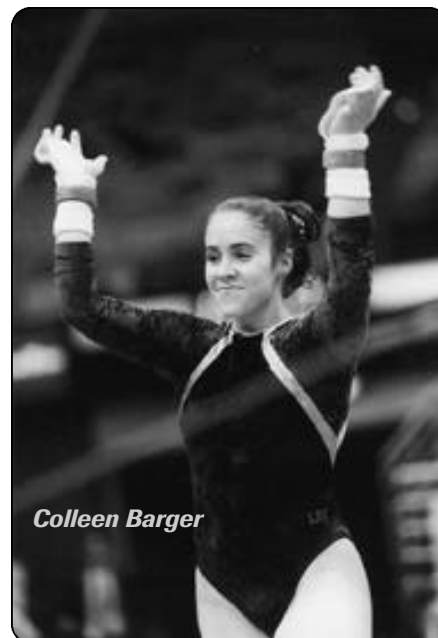

# Scoring Guide

In collegiate team competition, six gymnasts perform on each of the four apparatus: vault, uneven bars, balance beam, and floor exercise. The cumulative team total is a combination of the five highest scores per event.

At least two judges are required to evaluate and score the performances of athletes in collegiate competition, the final mark given is an average of the two. A perfect score in team competition is 200, with top collegiate scores being 190 and above.

The number and difficulty of elements required to rate a performance on a 10-point scale has increased in recent years, thus athletes must insert more difficulty in routines to have a opportunity for a perfect score in 2002.

## LSU Gymnastics Practice Facility

**W**hen determining what makes an athletic program successful, many elements factor in. Ask any coach and they will say that quality facilities rank among the most important elements.

The LSU Gymnastics team and head coach D-D Breaux moved into the newly renovated gymnastics training area in the LSU Field House in the Fall of 2000 and immediately reaped the benefits of one of the finest training facilities in the nation.

"It's a dream come true. It's a realization that the commitment by the university, fans and boosters really is all about the student-athlete," said Breaux.

The LSU Field House renovations and expansion created a brand new facility. There is a new locker room, squad room, 18,143 square feet of training space -- double the previous space -- a new equipment room, sauna, sound room and conditioning/aerobic room.

One of the nicest aspects of the facility is the glass wall that allows an onlooker to see the multi-million dollar outdoor track stadium, the legendary Tiger Stadium, the Pete Maravich Assembly Center where the gymnastics team competes at home,



and the beautiful landscaping of LSU's campus.

D-D Breaux started to fathom ideas of a new facility years ago, never thinking that one-day dreams would turn into realities under her tenure.

"About 10 years ago I started thinking about this idea, and about five years ago I started talking about it. Eventually, (former athletic director) Mr. (Joe) Dean and some board members along with the Tiger Athletic Foundation started listening. They realized

that we needed it not only to maintain our top 10 status, but it was also a safety issue. We needed the upgrades to protect the kids.”

As it is with all sports, talent is also a key ingredient for success. A new facility not only enhances training and safety, but is also be a very useful tool in recruiting.

“I think it puts us ahead of some schools if there is a facility race. When girls come to visit our facility they will be impressed. And they will be able to look out and see the other athletic facilities they will be able to grasp the entire experience that they are looking at if they choose to attend LSU.

“Young female athletes are coming to the realization across the spectrum that opportunities are out there for them. They can take scholarships and compete at the collegiate level. So I think this project and other things of this sort are very important.”

## Pete Maravich Assembly Center

**P**aramount to the success of an intercollegiate program is a first-class facility and the Tigers have just that in the Pete Maravich Assembly Center.

For nearly a quarter-century the "PMAC" has been home to some of the finest gymnastics competitions in the nation. The PMAC has served as host site of the SEC Championships on three occasions, most recently in 1998, while also hosting five NCAA Regionals, most recently in 1999 when the Region 4 Championship was decided in a tightly contested battle between LSU and Stanford. The PMAC will host its sixth NCAA Regional this April.

Seating 14,164 spectators, the massive \$11.5 million building has competed with neighboring Tiger Stadium as the most visible structure on the LSU campus since its completion in 1971.

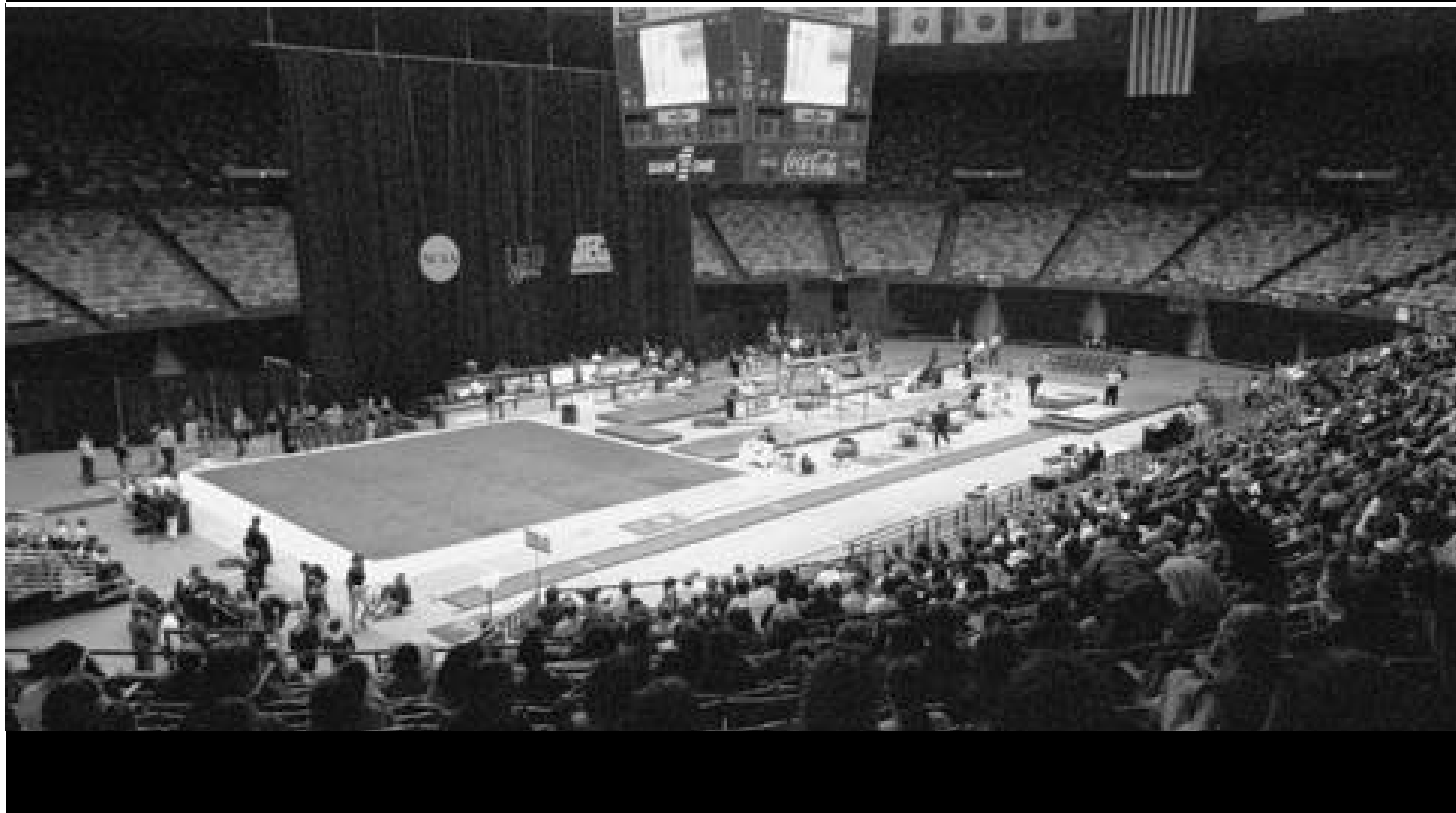
Originally named "The Assembly Center," in 1988 Louisiana Governor Buddy Roemer signed legislation changing the official

name of the building to the Pete Maravich Assembly Center in honor of the former LSU basketball legend who had died earlier that same year.

The PMAC is home to the LSU men's and women's basketball teams, as well as the volleyball program.

In addition to the normal seating configuration, a proscenium stage can be lowered into place at the north end allowing some 4,500 seats for theatrical productions. An additional 1,000 seats can be placed on the floor for graduations, convocations, lectures, concerts or other special events.

Several renovations have recently been completed to keep the PMAC as one of the top facilities in the Southeastern Conference. A new sound system was installed in 1994 and a year later the lower level seats of the PMAC were all replaced. In November 1999 a new multi-million dollar scoreboard/video replay system was installed.

## Campus Life

Louisiana State University and Agricultural & Mechanical College has, throughout its 141-year history, served the people of Louisiana, the region, the nation, and the world through extensive multipurpose programs encompassing instruction, research, and public service. The University continuously develops programs of quality that make it one of the nation's outstanding educational institutions.

The University influences the educational, economic, social, and cultural lives of citizens throughout the state - in some way, it touches the life of every person in Louisiana.

Because of its designation as a Research University I - the top category of the Carnegie Foundation's ranking of research institutions - **LSU ranks in the top two percent of the nation's colleges and universities.** The Research I designation is shared by only 59 public and 29 private universities in the country. One of only 25 universities



as the Louisiana State Seminary of Learning and Military Academy near Pineville, Louisiana. The institution opened Jan. 2, 1860. When the Civil War began, the first superintendent, William Tecumseh Sherman, resigned to assume a command in the Union Army. Fire demolished the Seminary in 1869, and the school moved to Baton Rouge.

In 1870, the Seminary was renamed Louisiana State University. In 1874, under the United States Morrill Act, the Louisiana State Agricultural & Mechanical College was established in New Orleans. The two institutions were merged by the Legislature in 1877 to become Louisiana State University and Agricultural & Mechanical College.

Construction of the present campus began in 1922, and the first classes were held in 1926. LSU experienced major growth in the 1930s and 1940s, expanding its student body, curricula, and services. During the 1960s, the University began to place increasing emphasis on research.

Recognizing the importance and extent of statewide agricultural activities of units in the LSU System, the LSU Board of Supervisors in 1972 established the Center for Agricultural Sciences & Rural Development. This unit was renamed the LSU Agricultural Center in 1982. Components of the LSU Agricultural Center include the Louisiana Agricultural Experiment Station, the Louisiana Cooperative Extension Service, International Programs, and Administrative Services.

In 1977, the Paul M. Hebert Law Center, established as the LSU Law School in 1906, was made an autonomous division of the LSU System. It provides a legal education characterized by an unyielding demand for academic excellence. Its unique curriculum, based on civil law and substantial elements of common law, provides law graduates with qualifications and training for not one, but two legal systems.

LSU, located on more than 2,000 acres in the southern part of Baton Rouge, Louisiana, is bordered on the west by the Mississippi River. The University's more than 250 principal buildings are grouped on a 650-acre plateau that constitutes the main part of the campus.

LSU is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. The Hebert Law Center is a member of the Association of American Law Schools and is on the approved list of the American Bar Association.

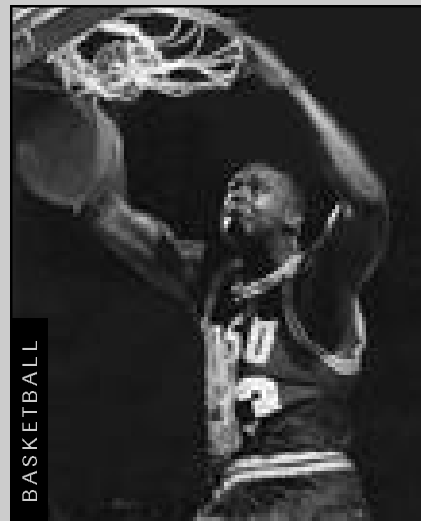
**P** Maravich still holds the NCAA record for career points with 3,667 and for career scoring average with 44.2 points a game. Maravich was selected the National Player of the Year in 1970 after leading the Tigers to the NIT Final Four. He scored 50+ points an amazing 28 times. After LSU he went on to a 10-year professional career and was selected as one of the NBA's 50 greatest players in 1997.

**Billy Cannon**

One of the true legends of college football in the South, Cannon was the 1959 Heisman Trophy winner that helped the Tigers to the 1958 national title. Cannon's most memorable performance came in 1959 against Ole Miss. The top-ranked Tigers trailed No. 3 Ole Miss 3-0 in the fourth quarter when Cannon fielded a punt, broke seven tackles and returned it 89 yards as the Tigers went on to win 7-3. He went on to a successful 11-year professional career.



BASKETBALL

**Shaquille O'Neal**

Was the first pick in the 1992 NBA Draft. He was named MVP of the league in 2000 and the Finals MVP in 2000 and 2001 after leading the Los Angeles Lakers to two World Championships. At LSU, O'Neal averaged 21.6 points and 13.6 rebounds for his career, and in 1991, he was named the World's Amateur Athlete of the Year as well as SEC Athlete of the Year and National Player of the Year. In 1997, he was named as one of the top 50 players in NBA history.

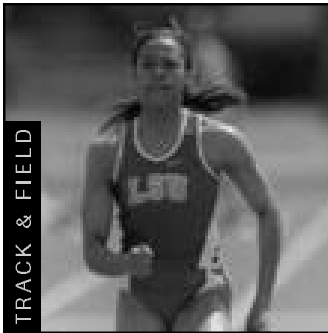

**Skip Bertman**

A legend in the college baseball ranks, Bertman created a dynasty at LSU, guiding the Tigers to five national titles in a 10-year stretch from 1991-2000. He also skipped the United States to a bronze medal at the 1996 Olympics in Atlanta and was an assistant on the gold medal-winning U.S. squad in Seoul, Korea in 1988. Bertman retired from coaching following the 2001 season and is currently the LSU athletic director.

**Eddy Furniss**

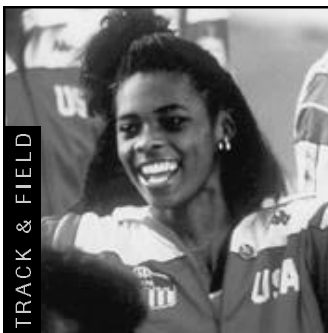

**Ben McDonald**

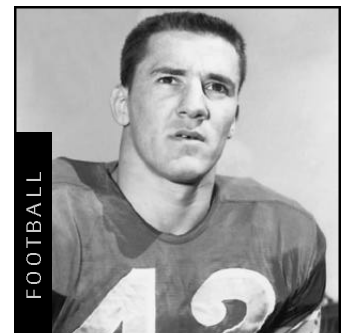
Named National Player of the Year in 1989 and he was later the first player chosen in the Major League Baseball Draft by the Baltimore Orioles.

**Jimmy Taylor**

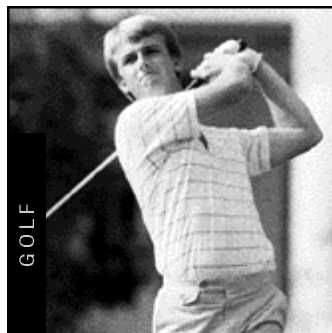

**Y.A. Tittle**

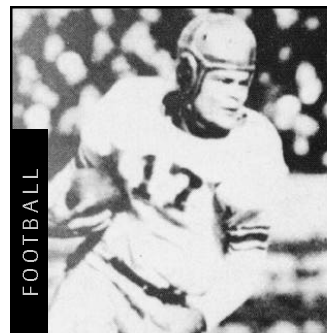

**Reinosuke Hara** who did research at LSU in the 1950's and then later received the honorary **Doctorate of Science** degree from LSU in 1992, is **Vice-Chairman of Seiko Instruments.**



**Jim Flores** graduated from LSU and currently is the **Vice Chairman of OceanEnergy**, the World's Leader in Oil Exploration, based in Houston, Texas.



**Lod Cook** graduated from LSU with a bachelor's degree in Mathematics in 1955 and then earned his **Master's degree in Petro Engineering** in 1955. Cook served as CEO of ARCO for nine years and he currently serves as **co-Chairman of Global Crossing**, a company that boasts 12,000 employees and revenues of \$12 billion.



**Lod Cook** was the lead donor for the **Lod Cook Alumni Center** on the LSU Campus and in 1994 three of his friends, former Presidents of the United States **Jimmy Carter, George Bush and Gerald Ford** came to LSU for the dedication of the Alumni Center.



**Mary L. Landrieu** on Jan. 7, 1997 became the **first woman from Louisiana** elected to a full term in the **United States Senate.**



**Dr. James Andrews** is a **world-renowned orthopedic surgeon.** Andrews is a 1963 graduate of LSU and a 1967 graduate of LSU Medical School. While at LSU, Andrews **won the SEC indoor and outdoor titles in the pole vault.**



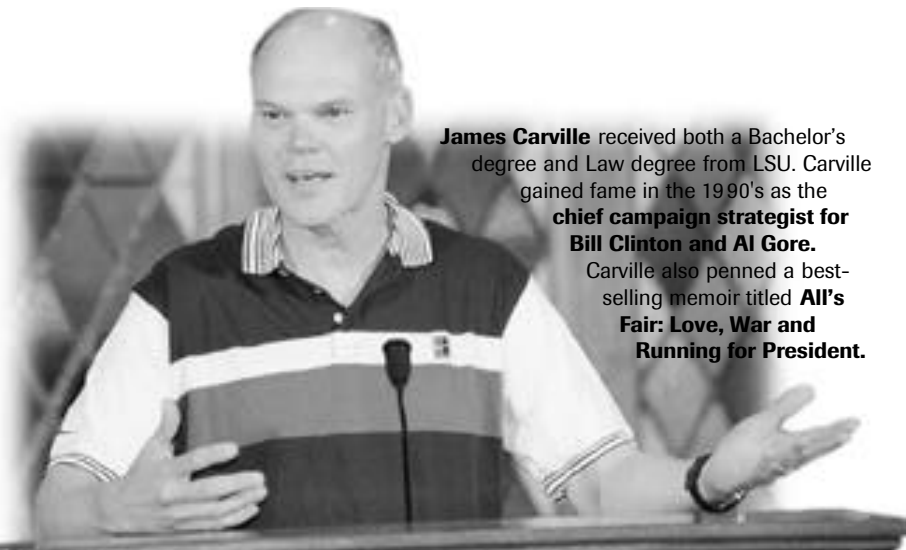

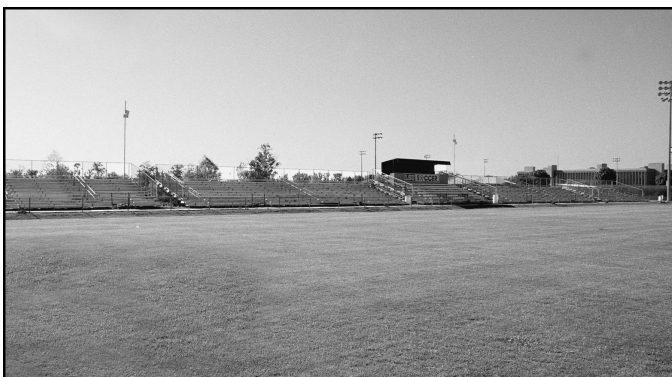

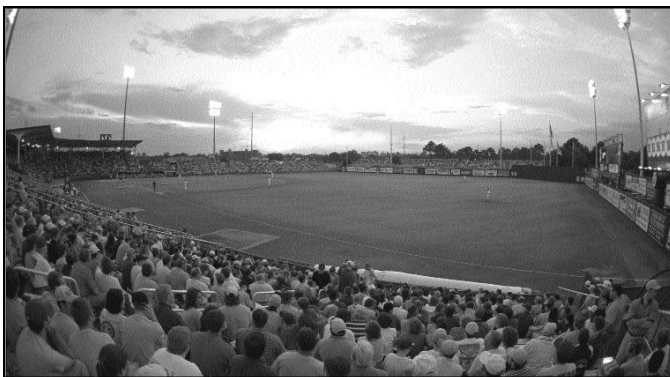
