# Season Preview



# Building

Building confidence and finding consistency are LSU head coach D-D Breau's first two goals for her 2003 team. Even though LSU is coming off one of the finest seasons in Tiger history, one that saw the team claim their first NCAA Regional title in 16 years and finish the year ranked eighth in the nation, LSU will be without the services of the six-member senior class that anchored the Tigers lineup a year ago. However, what LSU lacks in experience this season it makes up in youthful enthusiasm as the Tigers welcome eight fresh faces to a team that already includes one senior, three juniors and four sophomores.

"We are going to have to be patient with this young team," said Breau. "We aren't necessarily going to put all our difficulty in every time we hit the floor. We intend to start slow and work on building confidence, which I believe will lead to consistency. If we can do that I believe this team has the potential to be very good late in the season when it really counts."

## The Returning Squad

With just four upperclassmen dotting the LSU roster the Tiger gymnastics team will look to lone senior, Brooke Cazeaux, to lead its youthful squad. A co-captain, Cazeaux returns for her final season as one of the Tigers' most consistent bar and floor performers from a year ago.

A trio of juniors will add experience to the LSU lineup as Kristin Uransky, Lindsay Beddow and Chelsea Richard all return for their third season.

Earning All-America accolades on the bars in 2002, Uransky should again be a weapon on that event, as well as the vault, where she averaged an impressive 9.802 last season.

Beddow, a solid two-event competitor for the Tigers last season, should again see action on both the bars and beam.

A floor specialist in 2002, Richard will likely snag a starting spot in the lineup again after averaging a 9.793 on the event a year ago.

All-American and co-captain Lauren Companioni will headline the group of returning underclassmen that also includes Rachel Franzella, Jade Jenkins and Annie Gagnon.

Companioni earned All-America honors after finishing ninth on the floor at the NCAA Championships. Companioni's accolades were not limited to the floor, as she was also a staple in the Tigers' vault and beam lineups. After an impressive fall training session Companioni is expected to add the bars to her repertoire this year which should make her one of the top all-around threats in the SEC.

Countless hours in the gym during the off-season have paid off for Jenkins and Gagnon, who should also be factors in the all-around this season. Jenkins saw action on the vault and beam last year, while Gagnon served in a backup role on the floor.

## The Newcomers

Breau welcomes eight newcomers to the team in freshmen Brittany Brown, April Burkholder,

Megan Durning, Kelly Lea, Rikki L'Heureux, Terin Martinjak, Lindsey Thompson and sophomore Katherine Hilton.

Expected to be an immediate contributor in the all-around, Burkholder comes to Baton Rouge as a three-time Junior Olympic national champion. Brown, Martinjak and Thompson could also figure into the all-around picture, while Durning will be a factor in the vault, beam and floor lineups.

Lea has been hampered by nagging injuries since arriving on campus, but should also be a contender in the all-around when healthy. L'Heureux will be a major part of the Tigers' vault lineup with her 10.0 start value on that event and should also contribute on the other three events. Hilton, the lone sophomore in the group, will most likely see action on the bars and beam for the Tigers.

## The Schedule

LSU will be challenged with one of the most difficult schedules in the country in 2003, as the Lady Tigers are slated to go head-to-head with four teams that finished among the top-five at the NCAA Championships a year ago, and two additional teams that finished in the nation's top-15.

"We have a great schedule," said Breaux. "We are bombarded with top-10 teams. I believe that by going against the best teams in the nation week in and week out it will make us one of the best teams by the end of the season."

On the road for the first three meets of the season, LSU will open up competition Jan. 10 at the Bahamas Breeze Invitational, before traveling to Kentucky Jan. 16 and Auburn Jan. 24.

The Lady Tigers then begin their home schedule with two straight meets at the Pete Maravich Assembly Center as the Tigers host Denver on Jan. 31 and Florida on Feb. 7.

Following the Florida contest LSU begins the toughest part of its regular season schedule as it takes on defending national champion, Alabama, and two-time Big 12 Conference champion, Nebraska, on the road in consecutive weeks.

LSU then returns to the friendly confines of the PMAC for its final two home meets of the season as the Tigers welcome first-year team Arkansas and 2002 NCAA runner-up Georgia on Feb. 28 and March 7, respectively.

The Tigers will conclude the regular

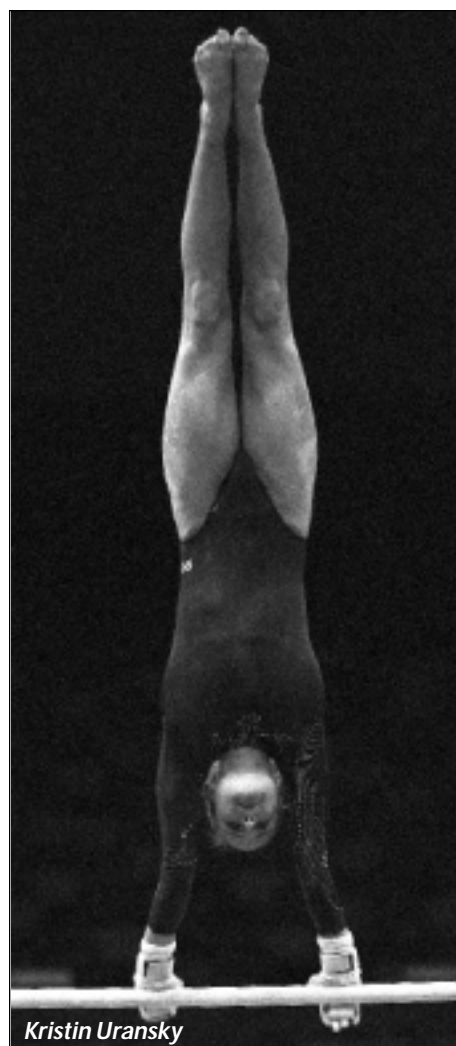
season with two road trips, the first to perennial powerhouse Utah on March 14 and the second to in-state foe Centenary on March 21.

For the third straight year Bartow Arena in Birmingham, Ala. will play host to the SEC Championships. This year's conference meet is scheduled for March 29 and will, for the first-time in SEC history, feature seven teams as the Lady Razorbacks join the conference this season.

The NCAA Regionals are set for April 12 and the gymnastics season will conclude April 24-26 in Lincoln, Neb., as the Cornhuskers host the NCAA Championships at the Bob Devaney Sports Center.

# Scoring Guide

In collegiate team competition, six gymnasts perform on each of the four apparatus: vault, uneven bars, balance beam, and floor exercise. The cumulative team total is a combination of the five highest scores per event.

At least two judges are required to evaluate and score the performances of athletes in collegiate competition; the final mark given is an average of the two. A perfect score in team competition is 200, with top collegiate scores being 190 and above.

The number and difficulty of elements required to rate a performance on a 10-point scale has increased in recent years, thus athletes must insert more difficulty in routines to have a opportunity for a perfect score in 2003.

## BARS, BEAM, AND FLOOR

Judges use a rating system to evaluate each element on the following scale:

- A** - easy
- B** - partial difficulty
- C** - medium difficulty
- D** - high difficulty
- E** - highest difficulty

Routines are required to contain the following to start from a 9.50 value

- 3 - A elements
- 3 - B elements
- 2 - C elements

To score a 10.0, a gymnast can earn the remaining .5 points in three ways:

1. one tenth from a D or E element
2. one tenth from a combination
3. remaining three tenths from additional D or E elements or additional combination

## VAULT

Vaults in women's gymnastics are grouped into four categories, with the various body positions and movements performed defining each category. Depending on the type of vault selected by the gymnast, she must meet the requirements specified in the Code of Points, the official text giving the relevant value of each skill performed. A successful vault begins with a strong, accelerated run. The best vaulters explode off the board, raising their feet up over their head with tremendous quickness during the preflight phase of the vault from the springboard to contact with the horse. During the support phase (when the gymnast pushes off the horse) the judges are looking for proper body, shoulder and hand position and an instantaneous repulsion.

The second flight phase and the landing are critical areas. Watch for the height and distance traveled, as well as the number of saltos and twists. In addition, gymnasts must "stick" their landing, by taking no extra steps. Usually the more saltos and twists, the higher the difficulty value of the vault.

The vaulting horse stands 120 cm tall and is 35 cm wide by 160 cm long. The runway is 1 m wide and a maximum of 25 m long. All mats surrounding the women's apparatus are 12 cm thick.

## UNEVEN BARS

The most spectacular of the women's events, the uneven bars, demands strength as well as concentration, courage, coordination, precision and split-second timing. Watch for the big swings that begin in handstands on the high bar, incorporating multiple hand changes, pirouettes and release elements.

The routine must move from the low bar to the high bar, incorporating many grip changes, releases and regrabs, flight elements, changes of direction, saltos and circle swings

through the handstand position.

The entire routine should flow from one movement to the next without pauses, extra swings or additional supports. Each routine must have two release elements.

The low bar can be adjusted to between 148 plus or minus 3 cm tall while the high bar must be between 228 plus or minus 3 cm tall. The bars can be adjusted to a maximum of 150 cm apart from each other.

## BALANCE BEAM

The beam routine must last between 70 and 90 seconds and cover the entire length of the beam. The gymnast must use acrobatic, gymnastics and dance movements to create high points, or peaks in the exercise, consisting of two or more elements performed in a series. An example of an acrobatic series is a cartwheel into a back handspring into a back salto. A gymnastics series might consist of a turn, followed by a split jump.

There are a few special requirements on the balance beam: one acrobatic series including at least two flight elements; a turn on one leg of at least 360 degrees; a gymnastics leap or jump with great amplitude; one gymnastics/acrobatics series; one gymnastics series; and an element close to the beam.

The overall execution should give the impression that the gymnast is performing on a floor, not on a strip four inches wide. Watch for variations in rhythm, changes in level (from sitting on the beam to sailing high above it), and the harmonious blend of gymnastics and acrobatic elements.

The balance beam stands 120 cm high. It is 10 cm wide and 500 cm long.

## FLOOR EXERCISE

The floor routine must be choreographed to music, lasting between 70 and 90 seconds and covering the entire floor area. The gymnast must use acrobatic and gymnastics elements to create high points in the exercise. These include two acrobatic series, one with at least two or more saltos in different directions; an acrobatic-gymnastics series; and a gymnastics series. Throughout, the gymnast must harmoniously blend these elements while making versatile use of floor space changing both the direction and level of movement.

The quality of grace may be disguised by movements of playful theatrics, but look for a dancer-like command of music, rhythm and space. The gymnastics elements should flow freely into each other while the leaps cover impressive distances and the pirouettes and turns add excitement to the music. The area of the floor exercise is 40 feet by 40 feet.

the 1999 and 2002 NCAA Central Regional Coach of the Year award. She was a finalist for National Coach of the Year honors after guiding the 1988 Tigers to a fourth-place national finish.

Most recently, Breaux led her Tiger squad to its first NCAA Regional Championship in 16 years as LSU won the team title in 2002. Continuing their success that season at the NCAA Championships, the Tigers concluded the season with their best national finish in the past five years, finishing eighth overall. In addition, Breaux guided Nicki Arnstad to LSU's first NCAA National Championship in modern history, as Arnstad won the floor exercise in dramatic fashion with a stunning 9.950 performance.

Aside from athletic honors, Breaux excels in recruiting quality student-athletes from Louisiana as well as across the continent, having recruited some of the top Canadian athletes of all time. A Louisianan through and through, Breaux concentrates on recruiting right here in her native state, as well as at the national level.

Outside of the gym, Breaux has taken an active role in the academic success her program has achieved in her 25 seasons at LSU. By making academic success her team's No. 1 priority, Breaux's teams have reached the highest scholastic goals she has established over the past decade. Throughout the country, she is acknowledged as having one of the finest academic teams year in and year out. LSU gymnasts have been named Academic All-Americans 62 times and SEC Academic Honor Roll members on 68 occasions since 1991. During the 2000 season, an SEC-record 12 of Breaux's student-athletes were named to the SEC Academic Honor Roll, an honor reserved for sophomores, juniors and seniors. In 1999, the Tigers posted the third-highest GPA in the nation and the highest of any team in the NCAA Championship field.



## Sara "D-D" Breaux

In 1977, the LSU athletic department took a chance on a young, up-and-coming coach just two years removed from college. More than a quarter century later, the gamble has more than paid off.

As the "Dean of Coaches" at LSU, gymnastics head coach D-D Breaux has represented the University at the highest level both in the gym and, most importantly, in the classroom for 25 years. Her dedication to the student-athlete on an individual basis has transcended into academic success, community involvement, Coach of the Year honors, SEC Championships and Top-10 national rankings throughout her tenure at LSU.

Now entering her 26th season as the mastermind of the LSU gymnastics program, the fire in Breaux's eyes burns as bright today as it did on her first day on the job.

Breaux has been recognized by her peers time and time again, having won SEC Coach of the Year honors four of the past 10 years (1993, 1994, 1995, 2000) while also claiming

Inside the gym, Breaux's Tigers have placed among the nation's Top 12 teams 18 times in her 25 seasons, including a fourth-place showing in 1988, sixth-place finishes in '80, '83, and '90, seventh-place in '87, '91, and '93, eighth in '94 and '02, ninth in '78, '86, '95, '98, '99 and '00, 11th in '79 and '81, and a 12th place finish in 1997.

LSU has placed among the top three in regional competition 18 times, winning regional titles in 1979, 1980, 1986 and 2002. Her teams have included 28 All-Americans and 24 All-SEC gymnasts.

Breaux's Tigers earned the SEC Championship title in 1981, finished second in '90, '95 and 2000, and third in '82, '83, '97 and '98.

It is this delicate balance between exceptional academics and athletic excellence that has allowed Breaux to keep her team at the top of the national scene year in and year out.

## Bob Moore

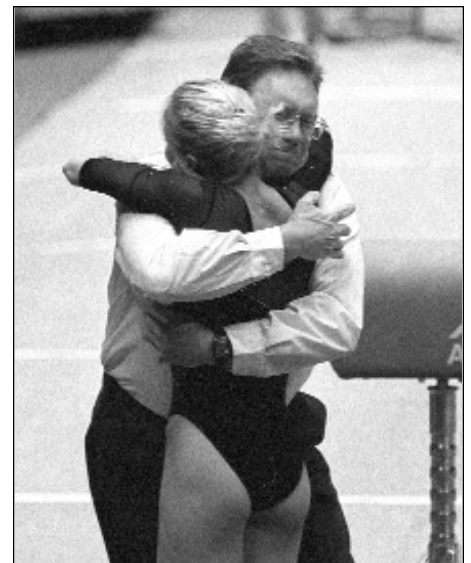

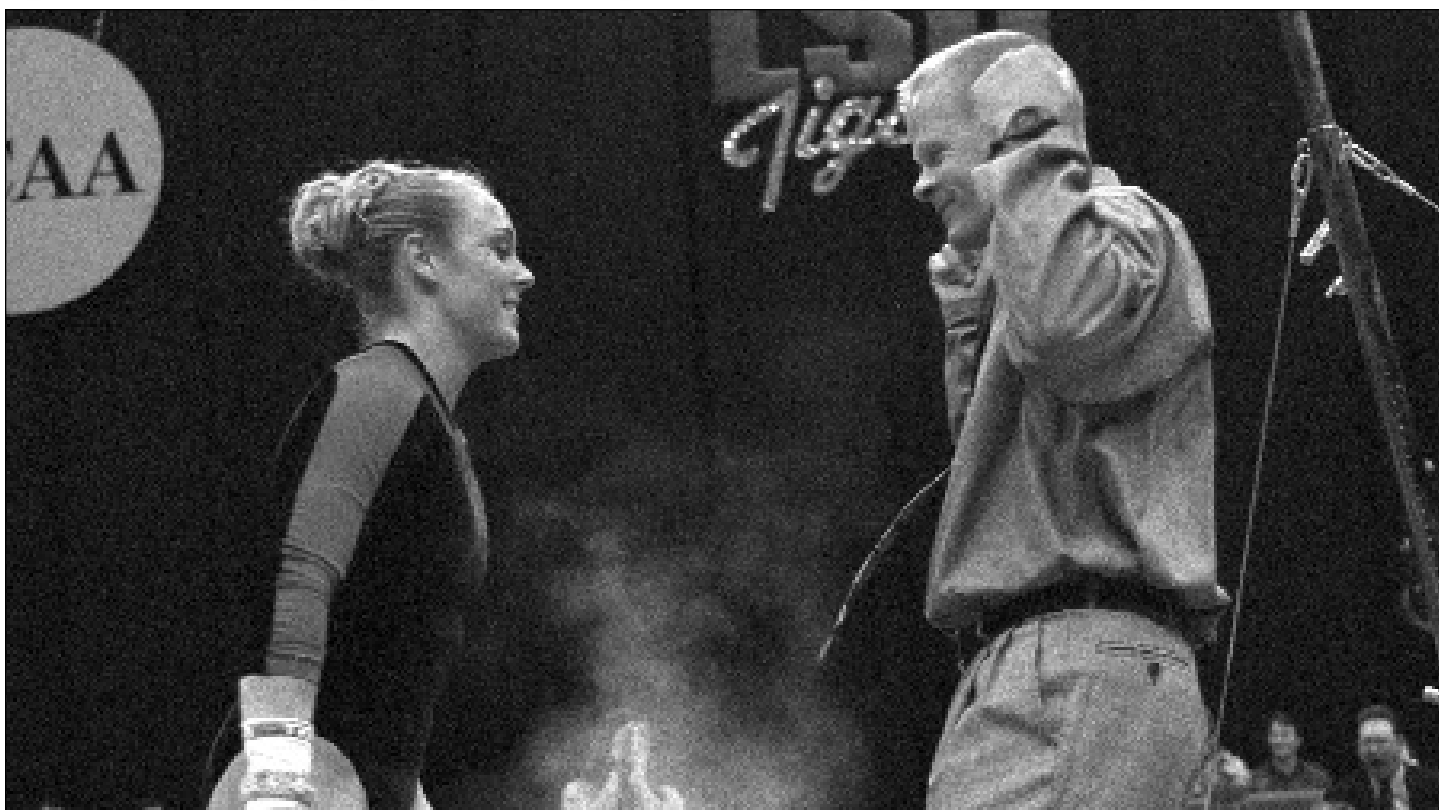

Ogletree came to LSU after spending the previous season at the Georgia Gymnastics Academy.

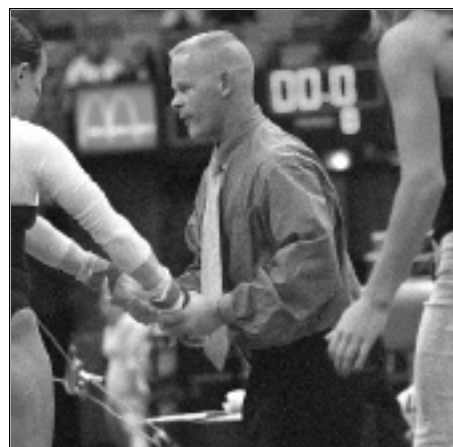

### TIGERS OPEN 2002 WITH FIFTH-PLACE FINISH AT SUPER SIX CHALLENGE

It was a tale of two meets for the LSU gymnastics team on Jan. 11 at the Super Six Challenge. The first half of the meet saw the Tigers struggle having to count a fall on both the bars and beam. The second half of the meet saw the Tigers explode behind a perfect 10.0 on the floor by Nicki Arnstad to record scores above 49.000 on each of the last two events. Add the two halves together and LSU came up with a fifth-place finish at the Super Six Challenge, scoring a respectable 193.825.

Arnstad's 10.0 on the floor was only the second in school history on the event and the first since the 1991 season. Other top performances at the Super Six Challenge included a 9.950 on the floor from Marina Degteva, another 9.950 from Shanyin MacEachern on the vault and a 9.925 from Kristin Uransky, also on the vault.

### LSU BREAKS OUT IN VICTORY OVER AUBURN

LSU's gymnastics team was at its best on Jan. 18, taking a 196.200-194.775 decision over No. 22 Auburn. The Tigers delighted the crowd in the home opener scoring a 196 at their earliest point of any season in school history. LSU swept the individual event honors as Nicki Arnstad won the beam, floor and all-around titles, Sharene Mamby claimed the bars title and Kristin Uransky won the vault.

The Tigers improved dramatically on the bars from the prior week posting an eye-popping 49.450. The floor was also a high point for the Tigers as they recorded a 49.150. The win marked the 19th consecutive for LSU against Auburn, a streak that dates back to 1993.

For the second time in three weeks a slow start cost the Tigers in Gainesville, as No. 5 LSU fell to 16th-ranked Florida, 194.925-194.750. The Tigers dug themselves into a hole in the first rotation, scoring just a 47.875 on the bars. Despite following with marks of 48.975 on the vault and 49.000 on the floor the Tigers still trailed entering the final rotation. LSU's solid 48.900 on the beam narrowed the gap but it wouldn't prove to be enough to overcome the Gators who finished less than two-tenths of a point ahead of LSU in the final standings.

Individually, Nicki Arnstad won the floor title for the third time in as many weeks, posting her second straight 9.900.

### TIGERS UPSET TOP RANKED UTAH

For the second time in three years the Utah gymnastics team came to Baton Rouge with the No. 1 ranking, and for the second time in three years they left on the short end of an LSU upset. The Tigers used an improbable finish to stun No. 1 Utah by the narrowest of margins, 196.125-196.100.

With the Tiger's top floor competitor, Nicki Arnstad, on the sidelines with a mid-foot sprain, true freshman Rachel Franzella subbed for the All-American in the No. 6 spot. ## LSU Gymnastics



When determining what makes an athletic program successful, many elements factor in. Ask any coach and they will say that quality facilities rank among the most important elements.

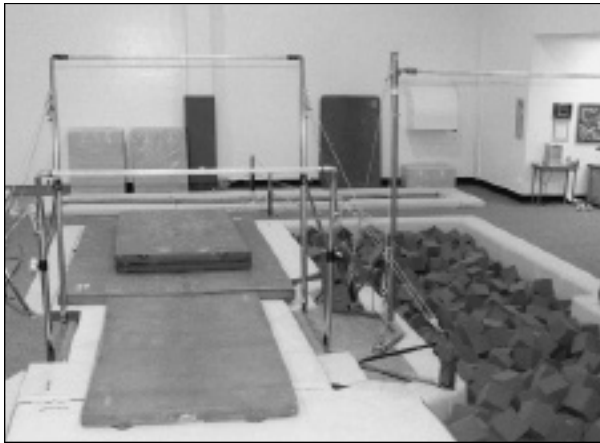
The LSU Gymnastics team and head coach D-D Breaux moved into the newly renovated gymnastics training area in the LSU Field House in the Fall of 2000 and immediately reaped the benefits of one of the finest training facilities in the nation.

"It's a dream come true. It's a realization that the commitment by the university, fans and boosters really is all about the student-athlete," said Breaux.

The LSU Field House renovations and expansion created a brand new facility. There is a new locker room, squad room, 18,143 square feet of training space -- double the previous space -- a new equipment room, sauna, sound room and

conditioning/aerobic room.

One of the nicest aspects of the facility is the glass wall that allows an onlooker to see the multi-million dollar outdoor track stadium, the legendary Tiger Stadium, the Pete Maravich Assembly Center where the gymnastics team competes at home, and

the beautiful landscaping of LSU's campus.

D-D Breaux started to fathom ideas of a new facility years ago, never thinking that one-day dreams would turn into realities under her tenure.

"About 10 years ago I started thinking about this idea, and about five years ago I started talking about it. Eventually, (former athletic director) Mr. (Joe) Dean and some board members along with the Tiger Athletic Foundation started listening. They realized that we needed it not only to maintain our top 10 status, but it was also a safety issue. We needed the upgrades to protect the kids."

As it is with all sports, talent is also a key ingredient for success. A new facility not only enhances training and safety, but is also be a very useful tool in recruiting.

"I think it puts us ahead of some schools if there is a facility race. When girls come to visit our facility they will be impressed. They will be able to look out and see the other athletic facilities, and they will be able to grasp the entire experience they are looking at if they choose to attend LSU.

"Young female athletes are coming to the realization across the spectrum that opportunities are out there for them. They can take scholarships and compete at the collegiate level. So I think this project and other things of this sort are very important."



## Pete Maravich Assembly Center



Paramount to the success of an intercollegiate program is a first-class facility and the Tigers have just that in the Pete Maravich Assembly Center.

For nearly a quarter-century the "PMAC" has been home to some of the finest gymnastics competitions in the nation. The PMAC has served as host site of the SEC Championships on three occasions, most recently in 1998, while also hosting six NCAA Regionals, most recently in 2002 when the

Central Region

Championship was decided in a tightly contested battle between LSU and Florida.

Seating 14,164 spectators, the massive \$11.5 million building has competed with neighboring Tiger Stadium as the most visible structure on the LSU campus since its completion in 1971.

Originally named "The Assembly Center," in 1988

Louisiana Governor Buddy Roemer signed legislation changing the official name of the building to the Pete Maravich Assembly Center in honor of the former LSU basketball legend who had died earlier that same year.

The PMAC is home to the LSU men's and women's basketball teams, as well as the volleyball program.

In addition to the normal seating configuration,



a proscenium stage can be lowered into place at the north end allowing some 4,500 seats for theatrical productions. An additional 1,000 seats can be placed on the floor for graduations, convocations, lectures, concerts or other special events.

Several renovations have recently been com-

pleted to keep the PMAC as one of the top facilities in the Southeastern Conference. A new sound system was installed in 1994 and a year later the lower level seats of the PMAC were all replaced. In November 1999 a new multi-million dollar scoreboard/video replay system was installed.

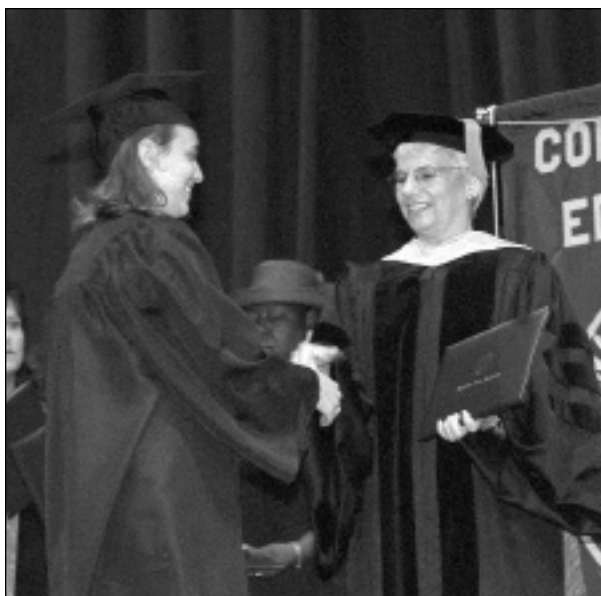

## LSU Greats



### Bob Pettit, Jr. • #50

Led LSU to its first NCAA Final Four in 1953 and he later became the first player in NBA history to exceed the 20,000-plus point barrier. Pettit is a member of the NBA Hall of Fame and in 1997 he was named as one of the top 50 players in NBA history.



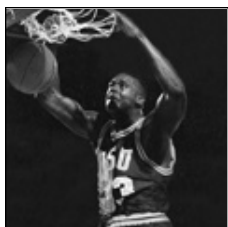
### Billy Cannon • #20

One of the true legends of college football in the South, Cannon was the 1959 Heisman Trophy winner that helped the Tigers to the 1958 national title. Cannon's most memorable performance came in 1959 against Ole Miss. The top-ranked Tigers trailed No.3 Ole Miss 3-0 in the fourth quarter when Cannon fielded a punt, broke seven tackles and returned it 89 yards as the Tigers went on to win 7-3. He went on to a successful 11-year professional career.



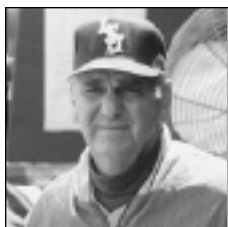
### Pete Maravich • #23

Nicknamed "Pistol Pete," Maravich still holds the NCAA record for career points with 3,667 and for career scoring average with 44.2 points a game. Maravich was selected the National Player of the Year in 1970 after leading the Tigers to the NIT Final Four. He scored 50+ points an amazing 28 times. After LSU he went on to a 10-year professional career and was selected as one of the NBA's 50 greatest players in 1997.



### Shaquille O'Neal • #33

Was the first pick in the 1992 NBA Draft. He was named MVP of the league in 2000 and the Finals MVP in 2000, 2001 and 2002 after leading the Los Angeles Lakers to three World Championships. At LSU, O'Neal averaged 21.6 points and 13.6 rebounds for his career, and in 1991, he was named the World's Amateur Athlete of the Year as well as SEC Athlete of the Year and National Player of the Year. In 1997, he was named as one of the top 50 players in NBA history.



### Skip Bertman • #15

A legend in the college baseball ranks, Bertman created a dynasty at LSU, guiding the Tigers to five national titles in a 10-year stretch from 1991-2000. He also skippered the United States to a bronze medal at the 1996 Olympics in Atlanta and was an assistant on the gold medal-winning U.S. squad in Seoul, Korea in 1988. Bertman retired from coaching following the 2001 season and is currently the LSU athletic director.



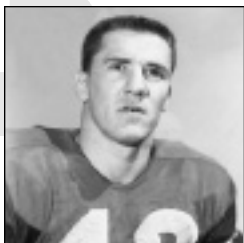
### Steve Van Buren

A halfback for the Tigers from 1941-43, Van Buren was an All-SEC selection in 1943, helping LSU to an Orange Bowl victory. An NFL Hall of Famer who enjoyed an eight-year career with the Eagles.



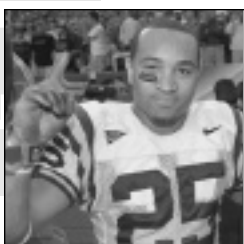
### Y.A. Tittle

A standout quarterback for the Tigers from 1944-47. Tittle went on to a Hall of Fame NFL career that spanned 15 seasons and included two NFL MVP awards ('57 and '62).



### Jimmy Taylor

An All-American fullback in 1957, Taylor became a Hall of Famer with the Green Bay Packers and was on two Super Bowl Championship teams under Vince Lombardi.



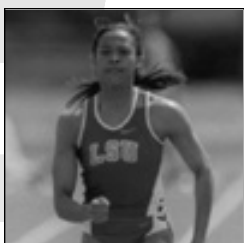
### Josh Reed

An All-American, Reed re-wrote both the LSU and SEC record books. The winner of the Biletnikoff Award in 2001, Reed finished his career with an SEC record 3,001 yards receiving.



### Esther Jones

A 21-time All-American while at LSU, Jones won a gold medal as a member of the 4x100-meter relay team at the 1992 Olympic Games in Barcelona.



### Peta-Gaye Dowdie

A 19-time track All-American. Dowdie was a member of three NCAA Championship teams during her time at LSU and went on to compete for her native Jamaica at the 2000 Sydney Olympics.



### Marie Ferdinand

The eighth pick overall in the 2001 WNBA draft by the Utah Starzz and a 2002 WNBA all-star. Named a first-team All-American in 2000-01, Ferdinand helped the Lady Tigers to three NCAA Tournament appearances, including a trip to the Elite Eight in 2000.



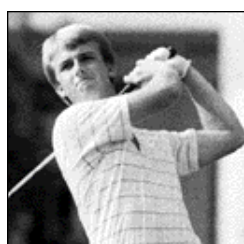
### Ben McDonald

Named the National Player of the Year in 1989, McDonald was later chosen as the first player in the Major League Baseball Draft by the Baltimore Orioles.



### Todd Walker

Capped his LSU career as the SEC's all-time leader in hits, runs, RBIs, and total bases. Walker, who is a member of the All-Time College World Series Team, led LSU to the national title in 1993.



### David Toms

A two-time SEC Player of the Year, Toms has gone on to a successful career on the PGA Tour. Among his PGA Tour victories was a thrilling win at the PGA Championship in August of 2001.



### Walter Davis

A track Olympian in 2000, Davis helped LSU to national titles in 2001 and 2002. The SEC Male Athlete of the Year in 2002, he won six NCAA titles and earned a school-record nine All-America honors.



### Pat Henry

Has led the LSU track and field program to 23 national championships and 19 SEC titles. The only coach to win both men's and women's titles in the same year.

While LSU continues to make its mark on the playing field, winning **38 national titles**, the state's flagship University continues to be a breeding ground for some of the **greatest minds** in the world past and present.

Became the first woman from Louisiana elected to a full term in the United States Senate in 1997.



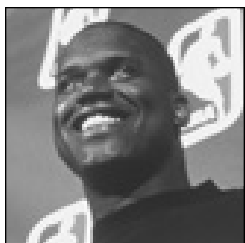
### Reinosuke Hara

A world-renowned orthopedic surgeon. Andrews is a 1963 graduate of LSU and a 1967 graduate of LSU Medical School. While at LSU, Andrews won the SEC indoor and outdoor titles in the pole vault.



### Harry Longwell

Graduated from LSU in 1963 with a bachelor's degree in petroleum engineering and currently serves as the Executive Vice President of ExxonMobil.



### Jim Flores

Graduated from LSU and is currently serving as the Vice Chairman of Ocean Energy, the World's Leader in Oil Exploration, based in Houston, Texas.



### Kevin Faulk

Excelled in both the classroom and on the playing field as he graduated in just 3 years. Faulk is currently a member of the 2002 Super Bowl Champion New England Patriots.
