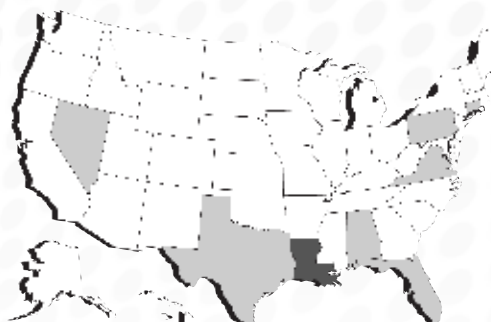

2006 SEASON PREVIEW

Supporting one of the most talented lineups in recent history, the LSU gymnastics team has its sights set on one thing and one thing only in 2006, a berth into the NCAA Super Six team finals. Having missed the championship round by the narrowest of margins in recent years, the 13-member squad, guided by head coach D-D Breaux, has no plans of resting until the elusive goal is achieved.

The hard work began last spring and has continued into fall training where the veteran group that returns eight letterwinners, including a trio of All-Americans and another three All-SEC performers, has been diligent and steadfast in their preparations for the upcoming season.

"We're strong, we're fit and this team is confident in their abilities," said Breaux. "They know what it takes to make the Super Six and I know they won't be satisfied unless they get there."

The Seniors

Leading that march to the Super Six finals is an accolade laden senior class comprised of April Burkholder, Terin Martinjak and Kelly Lea.

Burkholder, the reigning SEC and NCAA Central Region Gymnast of the Year, has been the Tigers' anchor in the all-around each of the past three seasons. She is expected to again serve that role come January.

"The thing that has made April so

successful is her determination and her consistency," said Breaux. "If you can go into competition 100% sure, confident in your gymnastics and with no fear, you are going to be able to master what you are doing. April has done that, and that's what she brings to this team. It's total utter confidence."

Burkholder's confidence is justified as she has earned a total of nine All-America honors and won a team-

leading 18 all-around titles and 59 individual event crowns during her career.

Martinjak, a 2005 All-American selection on the beam, has been a staple in the Tigers' beam and floor lineups the past three years and should again have a dominant presence in those events.

"We feel like Terin is going to be a real steady and mature factor in our lineup," said Breaux. "Her beam is as

solid as ever and while we are asking her to increase her difficulty on floor, we think she can continue to contribute on that event as much as she has in the past."

Lea, the Tigers' leadoff performer on the bars last season, also saw action on the floor in 2005. She has upgraded her tumbling during the off-season and will challenge for positions in both lineups.

The Juniors

Rounding out this year's upper-classmen is the junior trio of Lisa Rennie, Nicki Butler and Kelly Phelan. Invaluable members of the LSU squad over the last two seasons, the three-some accounted for 10 of the Tigers' 24 routines in 2005.

"This group has really been the support personnel in our lineup the last two years," said Breaux. "They are fierce competitors that compete with a lot of difficulty and consistency. They have the possibility of accounting for 12 of our 24 scores. As a coach you can't ask for more productivity than that."

Rennie was one of the Tigers' top producers on the bars, beam and floor in 2005. She garnered 11 individual event titles - six on the beam, five on the bars - during the regular season and capped the year by earning both All-America and All-SEC honors on the bars.

"Lisa is somebody that lives to compete," said Breaux. "We feel like she will be a rock for us in any event we put her in."

Butler emerged as a top all-arounder for the Tigers late last year. She finished the season as a second-team All-SEC selection and has her sights set even higher in 2006.

"Nicki is asking even more of herself than we are asking of her," said Breaux. "She has been training harder and with more focus this pre-season. We fully expect to open the year with her in the all-around."

One of LSU's most dependable athletes, Phelan is a staple in the Tigers' vault, beam and floor lineups, that has been called into all-around action on several occasions.

"Kelly's calling card is that she can hit and that's the bottom line," said Breaux.

Phelan proved that in 2005, hitting a remarkable 51 of her 53 competitive routines.

The Sophomores

A talented duo, in Ashleigh Clare-Kearney and Emily Ellis, make up this year's sophomore class.

Clare-Kearney had a sensational debut campaign, positioning herself as one of the Tigers' most dynamic performers on the vault and floor. In 2005, she won a combined 11 individual events titles on the two events and even claimed an all-around crown in her only four-event appearance of the season.

Due to a bruised bone in her wrist, Clare-Kearney sat out most of September and October, but has since returned to full practices and is training the vault, beam and floor for the upcoming year.

"Ashleigh is chomping at the bit," said Breaux. "She's back and she is eager and anxious to get out there and compete. I have no doubts she'll be ready come Jan. 6."

Ellis sat out all of 2005 after suffering a broken arm during the pre-season. She returns for her sophomore year with a clean bill of health and has the possibility to crack the lineup on any of the four events.

"Emily has worked so hard. She has been training the all-around and looks great," said Breaux. "We are looking at her performance right now as if this was her freshman year. We anticipate that we may have to suffer through some inconsistencies until she finds her groove, but once she gets in it, I think she is going to rock the house."

The Freshmen

The Tigers welcome five fresh faces to campus in Lauren Klein, Amanda Morales, Vanessa Rodriguez, Christina Suhr and Teri Gibson.

"We feel like this freshmen class is going to make some real contributions," said Breaux. "As a group they are wonderful to work with. They are positive, smart, focused and engaged in what they are doing."

Leading the way is Klein, a Level 10 national qualifier, who hails from The Woodlands, Texas. Breaux feels she is the freshman that has the best chance of first breaking into the all-around lineup.

"Lauren is on all-around pace," said Breaux. "We've gotten great training, great commitment to our conditioning and good focus from her and that has transcended into steady progress since her arrival."

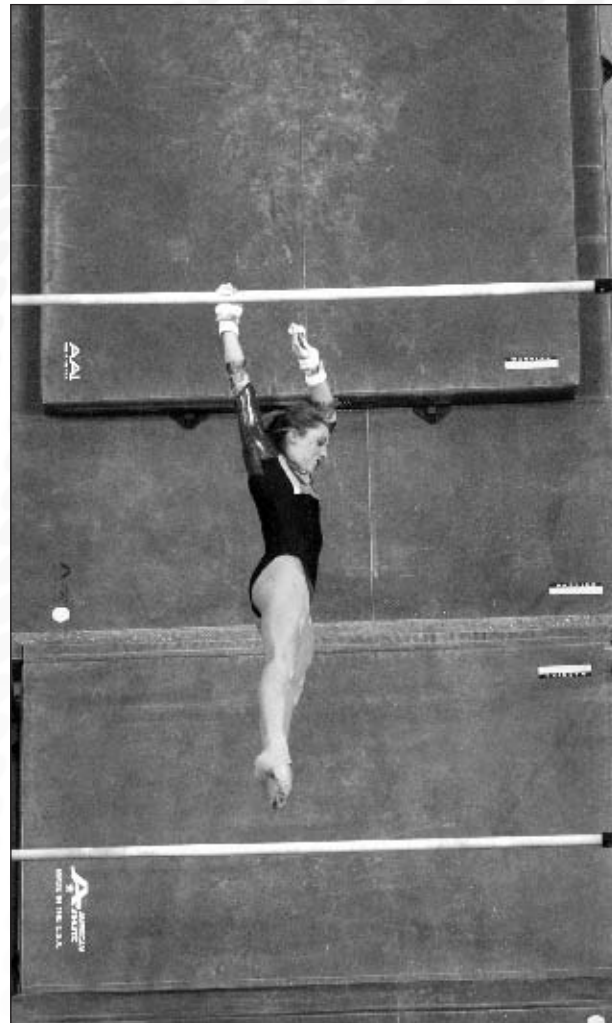
Morales, the freshmen class' only in-state product, joins the Tigers from Covington. A Level 10 athlete at North Shore Gymnastics, Morales was a state and regional all-around champion before tearing the ACL in her right knee during her junior season.

"Amanda is a sleeping giant," said Breaux. "She had a knee injury that required follow up surgery, but she is working hard and with each week she continues to get better and better."

Rodriguez and Suhr both join the Tigers from the Sunshine state. Rodriguez, a three-time Level 10 national qualifier and the 2005 Florida state all-around champion, hails from Homestead where she trained at Universal Gymnastics.

Suhr, another three-time Level 10 national qualifier, finished ninth on the beam at the 2005 championship meet. A native of Windermere, Suhr trained at Orlando Metro Gymnastics, the former club of current teammate Kelly Phelan.

Rounding out the list of newcomers is Gibson, who comes to Baton Rouge from Burlington, Ontario, where she was a member of the Canadian Senior National Team.

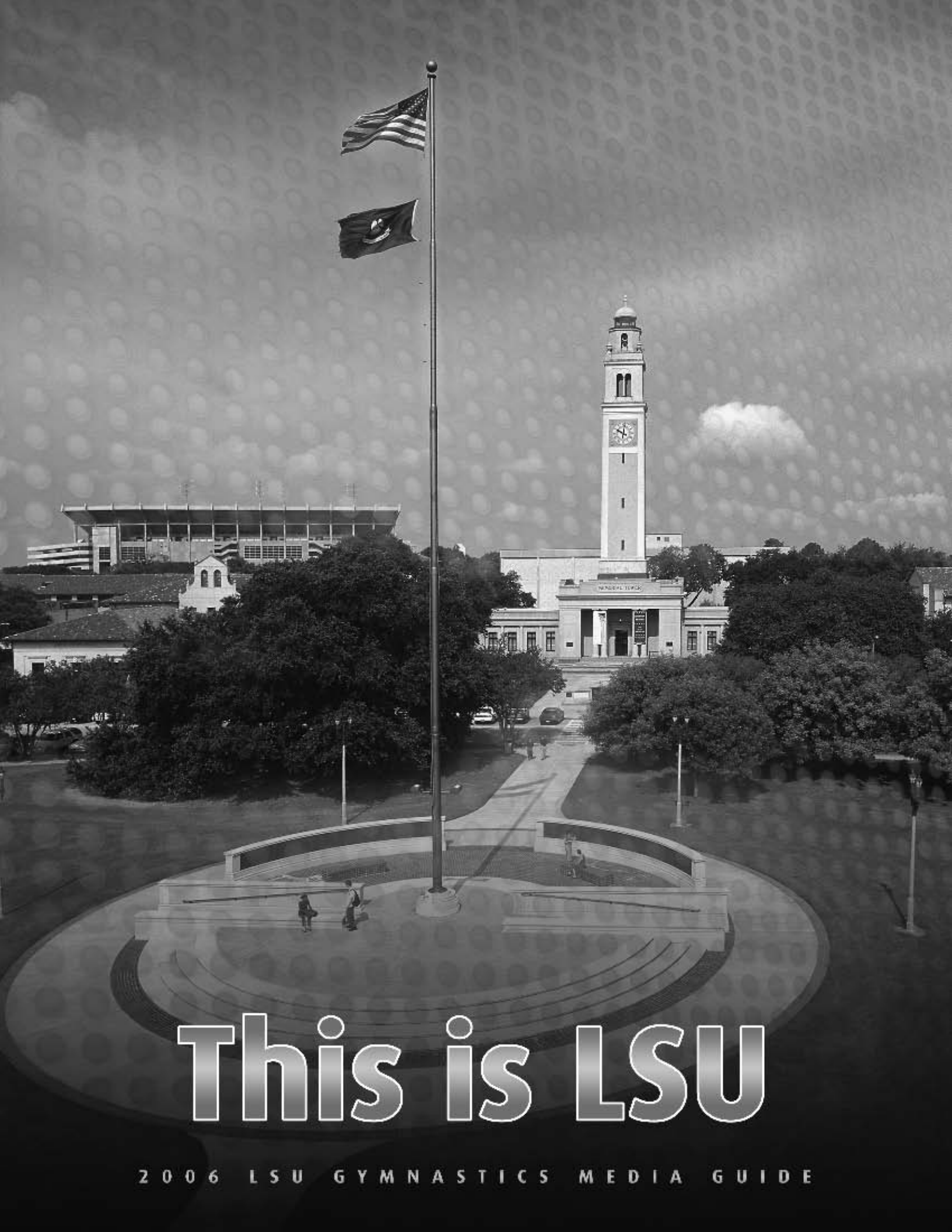

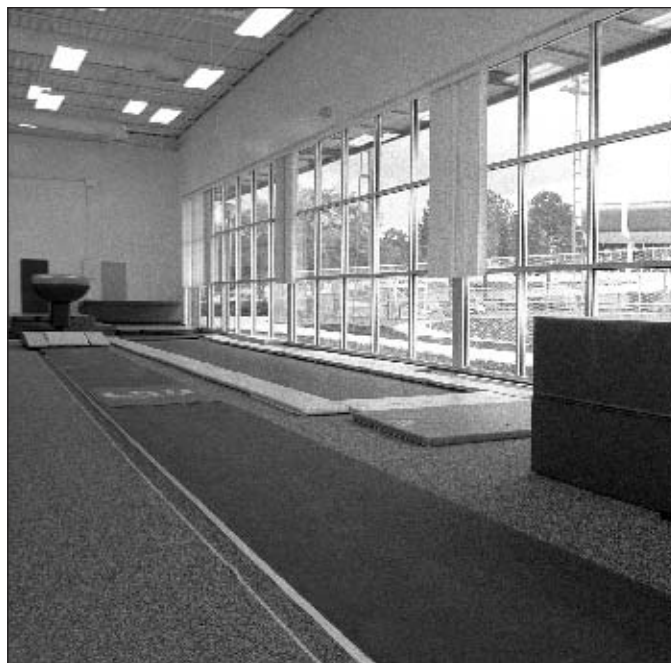
When determining what makes an athletic program successful, many elements factor in. Ask any coach and they will say that quality facilities rank among the most important elements.

The LSU Gymnastics team and head coach D-D Breaux moved into the newly renovated gymnastics training area in the LSU Field House in the Fall of 2000 and immediately reaped the benefits of one of the finest training facilities in the nation.

"It's a dream come true. It's a realization that the commitment by the university, fans and boosters really is all about the student-athlete," said Breaux.

The LSU Field House renovations and expansion created a brand new facility, that includes a locker room, squad room, 18,143 square feet of training space – double the previous space – an equipment room, sauna, sound room and conditioning/aerobic room.

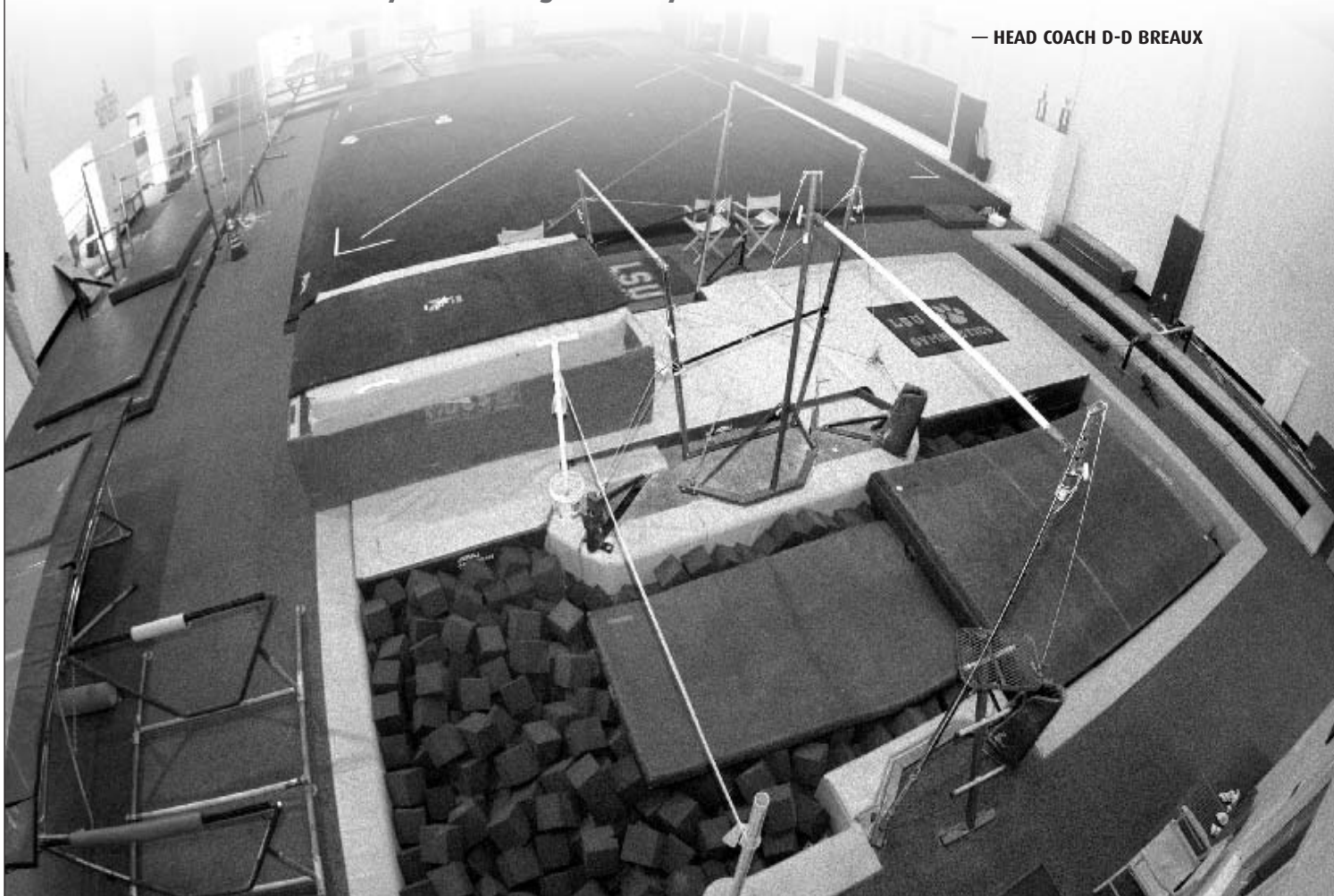

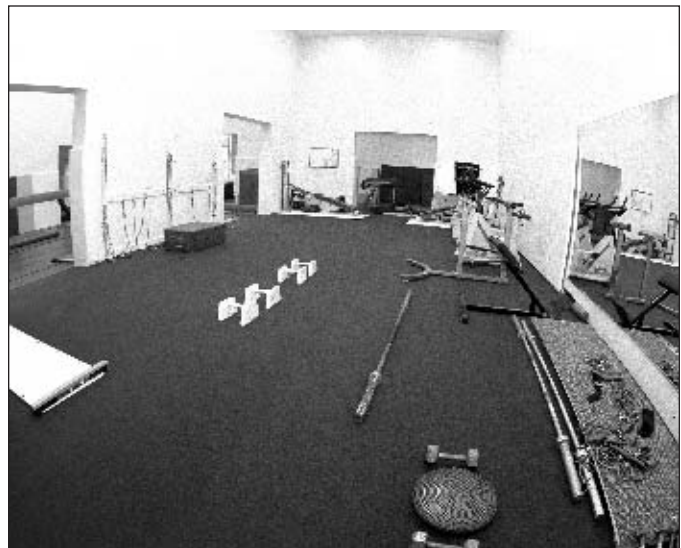
D-D Breaux started to fathom ideas of a new facility years ago, never thinking that one day dreams would turn into realities under her tenure.

"About 10 years ago I started thinking about this idea, and about five years ago I started talking about it. Eventually, (former athletic director) Mr. (Joe) Dean and some board members along with the Tiger Athletic Foundation started listening. They realized that we needed it not only to maintain our top 10 status, but it was also a safety issue. We needed the upgrades to protect the athletes."

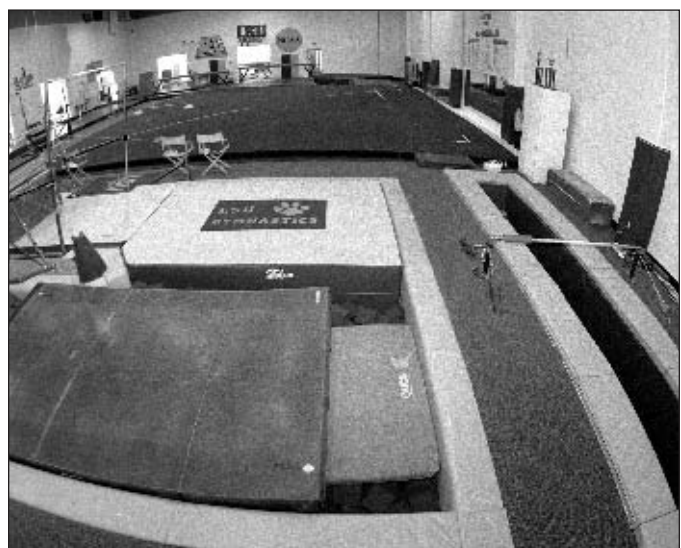
As it is with all sports, talent is also a key ingredient for success. A new facility not only enhances training and safety, but is also be a very useful tool in recruiting.

"I think it puts us ahead of some schools if there is a facility race. When girls come to visit our facility they will be impressed. They will be able to look out and see the other athletic facilities, and they will be able to grasp the entire experience they are looking at if they choose to attend LSU.

"Young female athletes are coming to the realization across the spectrum that opportunities are out there for them. They can take scholarships and compete at the collegiate level. So I think this project and other things of this sort are very important."

Paramount to the success of an intercollegiate program is a first-class facility and the Tigers have just that in the Pete Maravich Assembly Center.

For over a quarter century the "PMAC" has been home to some of the finest gymnastics competitions in the nation. The PMAC has served as the host site for three SEC Championships, seven NCAA Regional Championships and is set to host the Super Six Challenge and NCAA Central Regional Championships in 2006.

Seating 13,373 spectators, the massive \$11.5 million building has competed with neighboring Tiger Stadium as the most visible structure on the LSU campus since its completion in 1971.

Originally named, "The Assembly Center," in 1988 Louisiana Governor Buddy Roemer signed legislation changing the official name of the building to the Pete Maravich Assembly Center in honor of the former LSU basketball legend who had died earlier that same year.

The PMAC also serves as home to both the LSU men's and women's basketball teams, as well as the volleyball program.

In addition to the normal seating configuration, a proscenium stage can be lowered into place at the north end allowing some 4,500 seats for theatrical productions. An additional 1,000 seats can be placed on the floor for graduations, convocations, lectures, concerts or other special events.

Several renovations have recently been completed to keep the PMAC as one of the top facilities in the Southeastern Conference. A new multi-million dollar scoreboard/video replay system was installed in November 1999, the upper concourse was remodeled to include exhibits, displays and interactive kiosks documenting LSU sports history in the PMAC in 2004 and new seating was installed this year.

BROUSSARD

LSU's multi-million dollar athletic training facility is named in honor of Dr. Martin J. Broussard, the legendary trainer whose career spanned over 40 years at LSU, having been appointed to the position of head athletic trainer in 1948. Following his semi-retirement from the day-to-day work as trainer in 1993, he continued to serve LSU as an Assistant to the Athletic Director through 2001, giving him well over 50 years of service to the Athletic Department.

Among his many accomplishments was the formulation of "Quick Kick", an isotonic drink used to replace liquids, vitamins and the electrolytes lost through sweating. He was a trainer for the Pan American Games in 1955 and the U.S. Olympic team in 1960. In 1963, the Rockne Foundation named him Trainer of the Year. In 1978, Broussard was named to the NATA Hall of Fame followed by the Louisiana Athletic Trainer's Hall of Fame in 1982.

Along with the success of the LSU Gymnastics team comes a great deal of media attention and Dr. Tommy Karam, the Director of the Communications Lab, uses his facility, located on the fourth floor of the Cox Communications Academic Center for Student Athletes, to work with LSU student-athletes on their interactions with the media and interview skills. Karam's lab is a mock press conference setting to get the student-athletes used to handling themselves in front of both print and electronic media. He videotapes the mock interview sessions and reviews these with the student-athletes to help them become more comfortable in an interview setting.

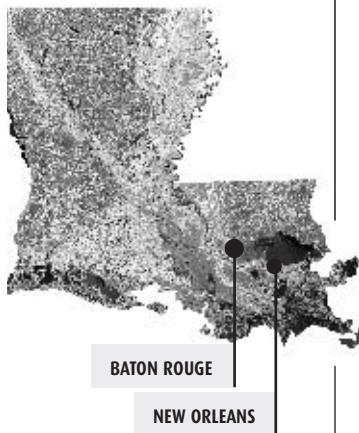

The 2004-05 athletics year was another wonderful year for LSU. The Tigers and Lady Tigers enjoyed success from the fields and courts to the classroom. All in all it was an exciting year for LSU's student-athletes, coaches and fans.

Postseason Presence

Of LSU's 20 sports, 14 teams advanced to postseason play. Among the highlights: the football team advanced to a New Year's bowl game for the fourth straight year ... the women's basketball team won the SEC title and reached the Final Four for the second straight season ... the men's outdoor track & field team finished No. 3 in the country ... and the men's tennis team reached the NCAA Sweet Sixteen ... LSU was one of only four schools in the country to send its football team to a New Year's Bowl game and both of its basketball teams to the NCAA Tournament.



In the Classroom

Seven of 16 sports posted a team grade point average of 3.0 or higher, and 13 of the 16 were above 2.8, with women's tennis leading the way with a team GPA of 3.40.

The women's basketball team won the Southeastern Conference championship and two teams - men's basketball and baseball - finished first in the SEC Western Division.

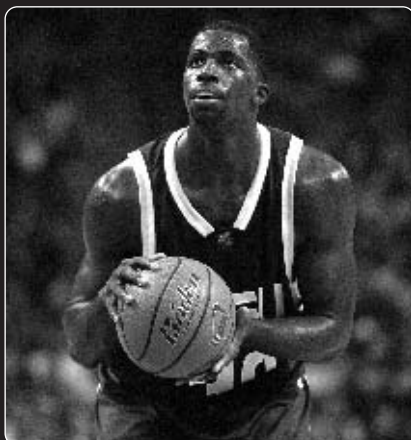
Elite Teams

“Pistol Pete,” Maravich still holds the NCAA record for career points with 3,667 and for career scoring average with 44.2 points a game. He was selected the National Player of the Year in 1970 after leading the Tigers to the NIT Final Four. He scored 50+ points an amazing 28 times. He went on to a 10-year professional career and was selected as one of the NBA’s 50 greatest players in 1997.

Shaquille O’Neal

Was the first pick in the 1992 NBA Draft. He was named MVP of the league in 2000 and was a three-time NBA Finals MVP after leading the Los Angeles Lakers to three World Championships. At LSU, O’Neal averaged 21.6 points and 13.6 rebounds for his career, and in 1991, he was named the World’s Amateur Athlete of the Year as well as SEC Athlete of the Year and National Player of the Year. In 1997, he was named as one of the top 50 players in NBA history.

Billy Cannon

One of the true legends of college football in the South, Cannon was the 1959 Heisman Trophy winner and helped the Tigers to the 1958 national title. Cannon’s most memorable performance came in 1959 against Ole Miss when No. 1 LSU trailed No. 3 Ole Miss 3-0 in the fourth quarter. He fielded a punt, broke seven tackles and returned it 89 yards for the 7-3 victory. He went on to a successful 11-year professional career.

Skip Bertman

A legend in the college baseball ranks, Bertman created a dynasty at LSU, guiding the Tigers to five national titles in a 10-year stretch from 1991-2000. He also skipped the United States to a bronze medal at the 1996 Olympics in Atlanta and was an assistant on the gold medal-winning U.S. squad in Seoul, Korea in 1988. Bertman retired from coaching following the 2001 season and is currently the LSU athletic director.

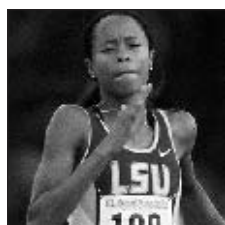
Esther Jones

Britni Sneed

One of three four-time first-team All-SEC selections in conference history, Sneed was a two-time SEC Player of the Year and a three-time NFCA All-American, leading the Tigers to their first Women's College World Series appearance in 2001.



Walter Davis

A two-time Olympian, Davis won the triple jump title at the 2005 World Championships. While at LSU, Davis won six individual NCAA titles, earned nine All-America honors and helped the Tigers to NCAA team titles in 2001 and 2002.



David Toms

The two-time SEC Player of the Year, Toms has gone on to a successful career on the PGA Tour. Among his PGA Tour victories was a thrilling win at the PGA Championship in August of 2001.



Marie Ferdinand

The eighth pick overall in the 2001 WNBA draft by the Utah Starzz. A Kodak All-American in 2000-01 who helped the Lady Tigers to the Elite Eight in 2000 and to the NCAA Tournament three times. She is a two-time WNBA all-star selection.



Todd Walker

Capped his LSU career as the SEC's all-time leader in hits, runs, RBIs, and total bases. Walker, who is a member of the All-Time College World Series Team, led LSU to the national title in 1993.

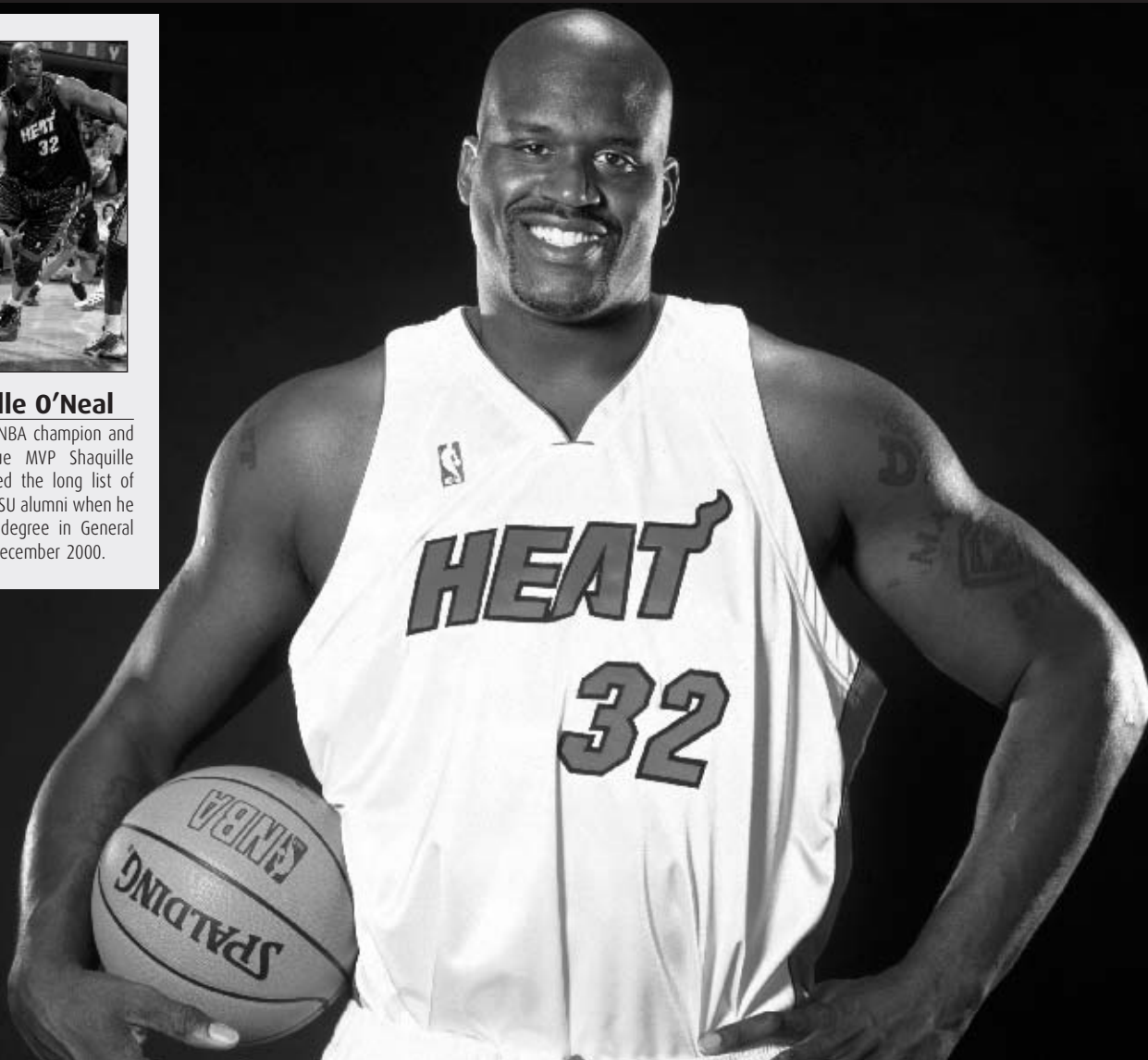

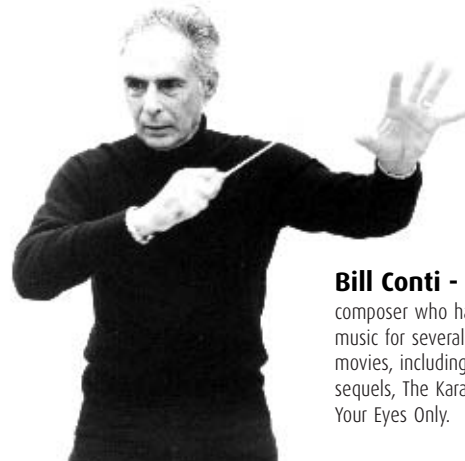

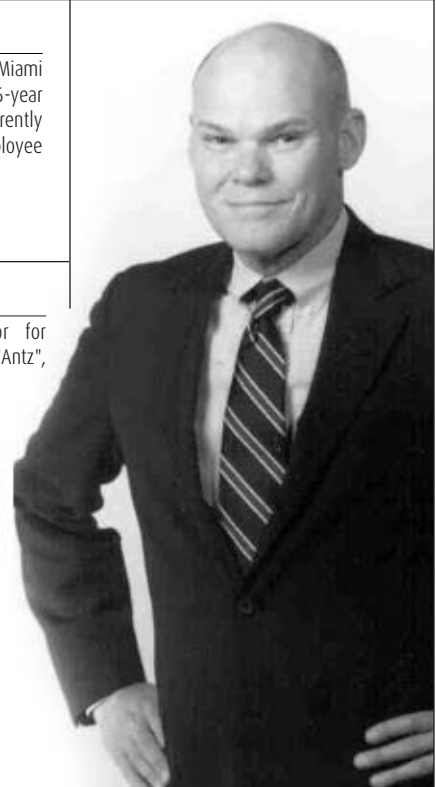

Dr. William L. Jenkins

President, LSU

On April 1, 1999, Dr. William L. Jenkins, formerly Chancellor of Louisiana State University and Agricultural & Mechanical College, became president of the LSU System, which includes nine institutions on 10 campuses in five cities, as well as 10 public hospitals in 10 cities. With the departure of Chancellor Mark Emmert in mid-June, the LSU Board of Supervisors asked President Jenkins to again assume the role of Interim Chancellor until a successor for Dr. Emmert can be selected.

A native of South Africa, Dr. Jenkins studied at the University of Pretoria, where he received his professional veterinary medicine degree in 1958 and specialist credentials in 1968. He received his Ph.D. degree from the University of Missouri, Columbia, in 1970. After practicing veterinary medicine for four years, he joined the faculty at the University of Pretoria, advancing through the ranks to become professor and head of the Department of Veterinary Physiology, Pharmacology, & Toxicology in 1971.

He moved to the United States in 1978 and joined the faculty in the Department of Veterinary Physiology & Pharmacology at Texas A&M University. He was appointed dean of the LSU School of Veterinary Medicine in 1988, and was named LSU's provost and vice chancellor for academic affairs in September 1993.

When he was appointed LSU's fifth chancellor in November 1996, Dr. Jenkins reorganized the campus administration to be more effective and more responsive, and oversaw the development of a strategic plan to guide the University in its preparation for the challenges of the next century.

Over the years, Dr. Jenkins has received numerous teaching and service awards and recognitions, having been named the 1997 Communicator of the Year by the Public Relations Association of Louisiana and a Distinguished Alumnus by the University of Missouri in 1999. The regional chapter of Toastmasters International also presented him with its 1999 Communication and Leadership Award, and he was awarded the Vision of Excellence Award 2000 by the New Orleans Regional Chamber of Commerce and the New Orleans Chapter of MetroVision. In addition, the

University of Pretoria awarded an honorary doctoral degree to Dr. Jenkins in September 2000.

Dr. Jenkins has been active in continuing education and has delivered more than 150 lectures and addresses to diverse groups in both the United States and abroad. He has taught extensively at both the professional and graduate levels. He has published more than 60 scientific articles and has contributed 15 chapters to various textbooks. He is co-author of a textbook on veterinary pharmacology.

Dr. Jenkins has been and continues to be a member of many professional organizations and select committees. Most recently he served on the National Institute of Health's Alcohol Abuse and Misuse on College Campuses Committee and on a special Steering Committee of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools to review accreditation criteria for colleges and universities. Dr. Jenkins also is a member of the National Association of State Universities and Land Grant Colleges' Committee on Food and Society and currently serves on the Governor's Advisory Commission on Coastal Restoration and Conservation.

His current community engagement includes serving on the boards of the Louisiana Endowment for the Humanities, Greater Baton Rouge Chamber of Commerce, Academic Distinction Fund, Council for a Better Louisiana, Arts Council of Greater Baton Rouge, The Nature Conservancy of Louisiana, and the Baton Rouge board of the National Conference for Community and Justice.

Dr. Jenkins and his wife, Peggy, have four children -Sharon, Gwynn, Anthea, and Warren- and nine grandchildren.

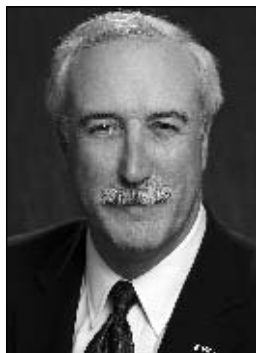

Sean O'Keefe

Chancellor, LSU

Sean O'Keefe has been appointed chancellor of Louisiana State University and Agricultural & Mechanical College, becoming the seventh chancellor to lead the state's flagship University.

Nominated by President George W. Bush and confirmed by the United States Senate, Sean O'Keefe was appointed by the President as the 10th Administrator of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration on December 21, 2001, his fourth Presidential appointment. As Administrator, O'Keefe led the NASA team and managed its resources as NASA sought to advance exploration and discovery in aeronautics and space technologies.

O'Keefe joined the Bush Administration on inauguration day and first served as the Deputy Director of the Office of Management and Budget until December 2001, overseeing the preparation, management and administration of the Federal budget and government wide-management initiatives across the Executive Branch.

Prior to joining the Bush Administration, O'Keefe was the Louis A. Bantle Professor of Business and Government Policy, an endowed chair at the Syracuse University Maxwell School of Citizenship and Public Affairs. He also served as the Director of National Security Studies, a partnership of Syracuse University and Johns Hopkins University, for delivery of executive education programs for senior military and civilian officials. Appointed to these positions in 1996, he was previously Professor of Business Administration and Assistant to the Senior Vice President for Research and Dean of the Graduate School at the Pennsylvania State University.

Appointed as the Secretary of the Navy in July 1992 by President George Bush, O'Keefe had previously served as Comptroller and Chief Financial Officer of the Department of Defense since 1989. Before joining then Defense Secretary Dick Cheney's Pentagon management team in these capacities, he served on the United States Senate Committee on Appropriations staff for eight years, and was Staff Director of the Defense Appropriations

Subcommittee. His public service began in 1978 upon selection as a Presidential Management Intern.

O'Keefe is a Fellow of the National Academy of Public Administration, a member of the Committee on Climate Change Science and Technology, and a Fellow of the International Academy of Astronautics. During his academic postings, he was a Visiting Scholar at the Wolfson College of the University of Cambridge in the United Kingdom, a member of the Naval Postgraduate School's civil-military relations seminar team, and conducted seminars for the Strategic Studies Group at Oxford University. He served on the national security panel to devise the 1988 Republican platform and was a member of the 1985 Kennedy School of Government program for national security executives at Harvard University.

In 1993, President Bush and Secretary Cheney presented him the Distinguished Public Service Award. He was the 1999 faculty recipient of the Syracuse University Chancellor's Award for Public Service; recipient of the Department of the Navy's Public Service Award in December 2000; and has been awarded honorary doctorate degrees from several prestigious educational institutions. In March 2003 and 2004, he was recognized and honored by the Irish American Magazine as one of the Top 100 Irish Americans.

He is the author of several journal articles, contributing author of "Keeping the Edge: Managing Defense for the Future" released in October 2000, and in 1998 co-authored "The Defense Industry in the Post-Cold War Era: Corporate Strategies and Public Policy Perspectives."

Sean O'Keefe earned his Bachelor of Arts in 1977 from Loyola University in New Orleans, Louisiana, and his Master of Public Administration degree in 1978 from The Maxwell School. O'Keefe and his wife Laura have three children- Lindsey, Jonathan and Kevin.



Kenneth E. Carpenter, Faculty Athletics Representative

Kenneth E. Carpenter is in his second year as LSU's faculty representative in NCAA and Southeastern Conference matters.

Carpenter, a professor in the School of Architecture, has taught at LSU since 1986. He received his bachelor's degree in architecture from the University of Oklahoma in 1962 and his master's from the University of Minnesota in 1967. Before joining the LSU faculty, he served at Clemson University as associate professor of architecture from 1967-77; Ball State University, where he was professor and chairman of

the Department of Architecture, 1977-81; and, Iowa State University, serving as professor and chairman, Department of Architecture from 1981-86.

At LSU, he served as the dean of the College of Design from 1986-97; Interim Executive Director of International Programs from 1997-98; and Interim Dean of the College of Art and Design from 2001-02.

Carpenter is a member of Phi Kappa Phi, the American Institute of Architects, and the American Association of University Professors.

Already a Louisiana Legend and one of the greatest college baseball coaches of all time, J. Stanley "Skip" Bertman has made the seamless transition into the athletics director's chair with the same enthusiasm, vision and demand for excellence that were trademarks of his stellar coaching career.

In just four years as LSU's director of athletics, Bertman has already added to his impressive list of on-the-field achievements. Under his direction, LSU enjoyed arguably the greatest athletics years in the history of the institution. In 2003-04 three teams won national championships, nine teams finished in the nation's top ten, and fourteen teams ranked in the top 25 and in 2004-05 14 teams advanced to the post-season. LSU teams also enjoyed improved grade point averages across the board, making the LSU student-athlete experience a success on and off the fields of competition.

While supervising the Tigers' progress on the playing fields, he has begun to implement measures necessary to realize his vision of building the LSU athletics department into the best in the country. Bertman's bold and innovative plans promise to keep the Tigers among the nation's elite in all phases of collegiate athletics.

Bertman is now in the midst of upgrading LSU's athletics complex. Working hand in hand with the Tiger Athletic Foundation, Bertman has already overseen the completion of the Cox Communications Academic Center for Student-Athletes while renovating Tiger Stadium and the Pete Maravich Assembly Center, and constructing the Football Operations Center.

It was also Bertman who took the bold but essential move to implement a seat contribution program in Tiger Stadium to fund facility improvements and ensure the financial stability of the LSU Athletics Department for the next decade.

Bertman was named LSU's athletics director on January 19, 2001. With Bertman, LSU gained an athletics director who provides the leadership and experience necessary to manage the Tigers' \$52 million budget.

Bertman guided LSU to five NCAA baseball titles, and his teams drew huge crowds to venerable Alex Box Stadium, as the Tigers led the nation in attendance in each of his final six seasons (1996-2001).

He also served as head coach of the 1996 U.S. Olympic team which captured the bronze medal in Atlanta.

Bertman continues to be honored for his remarkable coaching tenure, as he was inducted in June, 2002, into the Louisiana Sports Hall of Fame. He was inducted into the American Baseball Coaches Association Hall of Fame in January, 2003.

In a Baseball America poll published in 1999, Bertman was voted the second greatest college baseball coach of the 20th century, trailing only Rod Dedeaux of Southern California. Bertman and Dedeaux are the only coaches to win five CWS titles.

He had previously earned recognition as one of the nation's brightest assistant coaches while at the University of Miami (Fla.) for eight seasons (1976-83). Before working at Miami, Bertman was renowned for his coaching excellence. In 11 seasons at Miami Beach High School, he directed the Hi-Tides to a state championship and two runners-up finishes and he was named Florida's Coach of the Year on three occasions.

In 1975, Bertman coached at Miami-Dade Downtown, leaving after one season to join legendary head coach Ron Fraser at Miami. The move was a homecoming of sorts, as Bertman spent his collegiate playing days with the Hurricanes as an outfielder and catcher from 1958-60. He earned his B.A. in health and physical education from Miami in 1961 and received his master's degree from UM in 1964.

Bertman and his wife Sandy are the parents of four daughters -Jan, Jodi, Lisa and Lori. The Bertman's have three grandchildren - Sophie Faith and Isaac Stanley, the children of Emile and Lori Bertman Guirard, and Samuel Aaron, the son of Drew and Lisa Pate.

As the "Dean of Coaches" at LSU, head gymnastics coach D-D Breaux has represented the University at the highest level both in the gym and, most importantly, in the classroom for 28 years. Her dedication to the student-athlete on an individual basis has transcended into academic success, community involvement, Coach of the Year honors, SEC Championships and top-10 national rankings throughout her tenure.

Now entering her 29th season as the mastermind of the LSU gymnastics program, the fire in Breaux's eyes burns as bright today as it did on her first day on the job.

For her dedication, Breaux has been recognized by her peers time and time again, having been named SEC Coach of the Year on five occasions (1993, 1994, 1995, 2000 and 2005) and NCAA Central Regional Coach of the Year three times (1999, 2002 and 2005), in addition to being named a finalist for National Coach of the Year honors in 1988 when she guided the Tigers to a fourth-place finish at the NCAA Championships.

In 2005, the LSU program reached new heights under Breaux's direction as the Tigers made their 17th appearance at the NCAA

Championships, won their third regional title in the last four years and achieved the program's first ever No. 1 national ranking. Named both the SEC and NCAA Central Coach of the Year for her team's efforts, Breaux also coached All-American April Burkholder to SEC and NCAA Central Region Gymnast of the Year honors for the second straight season and helped Annie Gagnon, Lisa Rennie and Terin Martinjak to All-America honors and Nicki Butler and Burkholder to All-SEC accolades.

2004 was a banner year for the LSU program as it won the NCAA Central Regional title for the second time in the three years, before finishing seventh at the NCAA Championships, the Tigers' best finish at the national meet since the 1993 season. Individually, Breaux guided the efforts of SEC and NCAA Central Region Gymnast of the Year April Burkholder and All-American Annie Gagnon. Burkholder became LSU's all-time top performer at the NCAA Championships, finishing second in the all-around to better Jennifer Wood's third-place effort at the 1996 championships.

2003 saw Breaux mold a young and inexperienced Tiger squad into one of the finest teams in the nation, as LSU recorded a second-place finish at the NCAA West Regionals and a top-10 showing at the

NCAA Championships.

In 2002, Breaux guided her team to the NCAA Central Regional title. The Tigers continued their success at the NCAA Championships where they finished eighth overall, LSU's best finish at the national championships in over five years. In addition, Breaux guided Nicki Arnstad to LSU's first individual NCAA Championship in modern history, as Arnstad won the floor exercise with a stunning 9.950 performance.

Aside from athletic honors, Breaux excels in recruiting quality student-athletes from Louisiana as well as across the continent, having recruited some of the top Canadian athletes of all time. A Louisianan through and through, Breaux concentrates her recruiting efforts right here in her native state, as well as at the national and international levels.

Outside of the gym, Breaux has taken an active role in the academic success her program has achieved in her 28 seasons at LSU. By making academic success her team's No. 1 priority, Breaux's teams have reached the highest scholastic goals she has established over the past decade. Throughout the country, she is acknowledged as having one of the finest academic teams year in and year out. LSU gymnasts

have been named Academic All-Americans 77 times and members of the SEC Academic Honor Roll on 98 occasions since 1991. During the 2003 season, a school-record 13 of Breaux's student-athletes were named to the SEC Academic Honor Roll, an honor reserved for sophomores, juniors and seniors. In 1999, the Tigers posted the third-highest GPA in the nation and the highest of any team in the NCAA Championship field.

Also active members of the local community, Breaux and her team continually participate in volunteer activities throughout the Baton Rouge area. In 2005, the team was awarded LSU's CHAMPS Community Service Award after logging over 400 hours of community service. Breaux, who is serving as the 2005 Chairman of the YWCA's Pink Ribbon Campaign for Breast Cancer, and her team have also volunteered their time to benefit the Muscular Dystrophy Association, St. Jude's Hospital and the Red Cross among others.

Inside the gym, Breaux's Tigers have placed among the nation's top-12 teams 20 times in her 28 seasons, finishing fourth in 1988, sixth in '80, '83, and '90, seventh in '87, '91, '93, and '04, eighth in '94 and '02, ninth in '78, '86, '95, '98, '99, '00 and '05, 10th in '03, 11th in '79 and '81, and 12th in 1997.

LSU has also placed among the top three in regional competition on 20 separate occasions, winning regional titles in 1978, 1979, 1980, 1986, 2002, 2004 and 2005. Her teams have included two national champions, 27 All-Americans and 27 All-SEC selections.

Breaux's Tigers earned the SEC Championship title in 1981, finished second in '90, '95, '00 and '05, and third in '82, '83, '97, '98 and '04.

It is this delicate balance between exceptional academics and athletic excellence that has allowed Breaux to keep her team at the top of the national scene year in and year out.

Breaux is a native of Donaldsonville, La. She earned both her bachelor's and master's degrees from LSU. She has two daughters, Jewel (23) and Sara (19), a member of the LSU soccer team.

Long-time Southeastern Conference assistant Bob Moore begins his seventh season with the LSU gymnastics program. Moore's presence has been undeniable in the last six years as he has helped the Tigers maintain their status as one of the nation's premier programs.

The Tigers' vaulting team has flourished under Moore's watch, recording nine of the top 10 event scores in school history, including four of those in 2005 alone. Individually, Moore has also guided the efforts of Annie Gagnon and April Burkholder. Gagnon earned All-American status on the vault in 2004, while Burkholder has earned the distinction on the event each of the last two seasons.

Recognized for his work by his peers, Moore was named the NCAA Central Region Co-Assistant Coach of the Year in 2005.

Moore joined the LSU coaching staff in 2000 after a six-year stint at the University of Florida where he served as the program's top assistant. To his credit, Moore coached two national champions on the vault while at Florida, in addition to numerous All-Americans and SEC champions.

"Bob provides us with experience at the highest level, not only within the SEC, but the NCAA," said Breaux. "He knows exactly how tough this conference is and what it takes to take a program like ours that is an established top-10 team and bring it to the next level."

LSU is Moore's third stop within the SEC, as the 2006 season will be his 18th within the league. Prior to his tenure at Florida, Moore spent five seasons as an assistant at Auburn.

In addition to strengthening the Tigers on the vault and with their uneven bar routines, Moore plays a significant role with LSU's Bengal Gymnastics program, a highly successful youth age group program that practices in the Lady Tigers' gymnastics training facility.

A native of Birmingham, Ala., Moore graduated from Samford University in 1976 with a degree in general studies with an emphasis in music. He is married to the former Sandra Ballard.

Philip Ogletree begins his sixth year with the LSU gymnastics program after five already highly successful seasons at the collegiate level. In just five years, Ogletree has proved to be a tremendous asset to the LSU program, working primarily with the athletes on the uneven bars.

Ogletree has guided the Tigers to nine of the top 11 bar scores in school history, including a school-record 49.650 in 2002. In addition, Ogletree helped Sharene Mamby to a rare 10.00 during the 2001 season and Annie Gagnon to All-America honors in 2003.

In 2005, Ogletree's athletes flourished under his watch as Gagnon earned All-America status on the bars for a second straight year and April Burkholder and Lisa Rennie each earned the distinction for the first time.

For his efforts, Ogletree has been recognized by his peers on several occasions, as he was named the NCAA Central Region Assistant

Coach of the Year in 2004 and then shared that same honor a year later with fellow assistant Bob Moore.

"Philip has done a tremendous job for us," said Breaux. "He has been a great addition to our staff, both as a coach and as an administrator. Our team and staff have blended very well with Philip in the mix."

Ogletree came to LSU after spending the previous season at the Georgia Gymnastics Academy.

Ogletree arrived at LSU with 18 years of coaching experience, including 11 with Level 10 gymnasts in Georgia. While his stop at LSU was his first collegiate stop, he was no stranger to LSU athletics. During his time, he tutored future LSU greats Abbey Burns, Kim and Kerry Descalopoulos, all natives of Georgia, during a stint with the Atlanta School of Gymnastics.

During his time in the state of Georgia, he coached six Level 10 national champions on the floor exercise and helped place five athletes on the national team. Ogletree has also coached at the American Classic and U.S. Classic national meets.

From 1980-82, Ogletree was a gymnast at the University of Georgia. He later graduated from Georgia State with a bachelor of science degree in education in 1992.

Ogletree is married to the former Jill Hickok. The couple has two children, Bridget, 12, and Jake, 10.

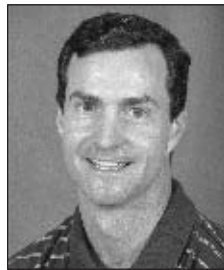

LSU Finishes Ninth at the NCAA Championships

The Tiger gymnastics team maintained its presence among the nation's top-10, placing ninth at the NCAA Championships in Auburn, Ala., with a score of 195.800. The finish marked the fourth straight year, and the 17th time in program history, that LSU has finished among the nation's top 10.

Four Earn All-America Honors

LSU ran its streak of consecutive years with at least one All-America performer to 13, as the four Tigers earned All-America honors at the 2005 NCAA Championships. April Burkholder led all Tiger performers earning All-America status on each of the four events and in the all-around. She was named a first-team selection on the vault, floor and in the all-around and was a second-team honoree on the bars and beam. Annie Gagnon and Lisa Rennie were each recognized as first-team selections on the bars, while Terin Martinjak was named a second-team honoree on the beam.

Rennie, Burkholder Post Top-10 Finishes During Individual Event Finals

By virtue of earning first-team All-America honors April Burkholder (vault and floor), Lisa Rennie (bars) and Annie Gagnon (bars) each qualified to compete in the individual event finals at the NCAA Championships. Burkholder turned in the top finish of the evening, placing third on the vault with a 9.8875 average. She also placed 13th on the floor after scoring a 9.2625. Rennie posted the Tigers' other top-10 finish, placing ninth on the bars with a 9.8250. Gagnon scored a 9.3375 on the event to finish 11th overall.

Tigers win NCAA Northeast Regional Title

A sweep of the meet's team and individual honors catapulted the Tigers to the 2005 NCAA Northeast Regional Championship in Durham, N.H. LSU tallied a 197.125 to knock off No. 10 Oklahoma, No. 15 Arkansas, New Hampshire, Pittsburgh and Rutgers and secure its third regional title in the last four years and the ninth in program history. The Tigers turned in meet-best marks of 49.475 on the vault, 49.450 on the floor, 49.150 on the beam and 49.050 on the bars. Top individual honors went to April Burkholder, Nicki Butler and Ashleigh Clare-Kearney on the vault (9.950), Annie Gagnon on the bars (9.950), Burkholder, Kelly Phelan and Lisa Rennie on the beam (9.850) and Burkholder on the floor (9.975) and in the all-around (39.575).

LSU Staff Sweeps Region Coaching Awards

LSU's coaching staff swept the 2005 NCAA Central Region awards as D-D Breaux was named the Coach of the Year and assistants Bob Moore and Philip Ogletree were named the Co-Assistant Coaches of the Year. In 2005, Breaux saw her Tigers win the NCAA Northeast Regional title, earn their first-ever No. 1 national ranking and record their best finish at the SEC Championships (second) in 10 years, all while posting 26-7 overall record. Moore, primarily responsible for the vault, guided LSU to four of the top-10 vault scores in school history. Individually, he coached April Burkholder to both All-SEC and All-America honors on the event while Burkholder, Nicki Butler and Ashleigh Clare-Kearney each won a share of the regional crown. Ogletree, the Tigers' bar coach, led a trio of athletes, in Burkholder, Annie Gagnon and Lisa Rennie, to All-America honors on the event, while Rennie was also named an All-SEC selection and Gagnon won the NCAA Northeast Regional crown.

Accolades Abound for Burkholder

For the second straight season April Burkholder has been named both the SEC and NCAA Central Region Gymnast of the Year. The Houston native won a total of seven all-around crowns and 21 individual event titles throughout the year, including her second straight regional all-around title. In addition, Burkholder posted perfect 10.00's on three of the four events (vault, beam and floor) and turned in 27 scores of 9.900 or higher.

LSU Finishes Second at SEC Championships

The Tigers tallied an impressive 196.975 at the SEC Championships, but it wasn't enough to hold off eventual champion, Georgia, who used a 49.325 on the beam in the final rotation to secure the victory with a 197.250. Despite the narrow defeat, LSU's second-place finish marked the team's highest at the conference championships since the 1995 season, when they also finished second overall.

Breaux Named SEC Coach of the Year

After guiding the Tigers to one of the most successful regular seasons in school history, head coach D-D Breaux was named the SEC Coach of the Year in a vote by her peers. Breaux guided LSU to a 24-4 regular season record, a mark that included a 10-meet win streak as well as 15 wins over top-25 opponents. The conference honor marks the sixth of Breaux's career.

Burkholder Named SEC Gymnast of the Year, Again

For the second consecutive season April Burkholder was named the SEC's Gymnast of the Year in a vote by league coaches. Burkholder is just the second athlete in conference history to ever win the award on more than one occasion.

Trio Earns All-SEC Accolades

A trio of Tigers, in April Burkholder, Nicki Butler and Lisa Rennie, each earned All-SEC honors for their performances at the 2005 conference championships in Duluth, Ga. Burkholder landed on the conference team for the third straight year, garnering first-team accolades for her third-place finish in the all-around (39.525), second-place showing on the vault (9.900) and third-place effort on the bars (9.900). Butler and Rennie were each named to the conference's second team as Butler finished fourth in the all-around and Rennie tied for third on the bars (9.900).

Tigers Earn First Ever No. 1 National Ranking

Head coach D-D Breaux guided the Tigers to their first-ever No. 1 national ranking in 2005, a position they held for two separate weeks over the course of the year. The Tigers first topped the charts during the week of Feb. 21, posting a regional qualifying score (RQS) of 196.575. They then slipped to second and fourth, respectively, in successive weeks before regaining the No. 1 position during the week of March 15 with a RQS of 196.990.

LSU Wraps Up Regular Season Ranked No. 1 on Floor

The Tigers wrapped up the regular season as the nation's top-ranked floor team, posting a RQS of 49.410. LSU also concluded the regular season ranked among the nation's top-4 on each of the other three events, finishing at No. 2 on the beam (49.335), No. 3 on the bars (49.265) and No. 4 on the vault (49.325).

Tigers Post School Record and NCAA-Best 197.850

LSU was unstoppable in its win over No. 9 Oklahoma on March 11, recording four event scores of 49.325 or higher en route to a school record 197.850. The mark bettered the Tigers' previous record of 197.675 set March 14, 2003, against Centenary and Rhode Island in Baton Rouge. It also tied the Tigers with Utah and UCLA for the top score in the nation in 2005.

LSU Shatters Beam Record

Behind five scores of 9.925 or better LSU also shattered the school record on the beam against Oklahoma, scoring a 2005 NCAA-best 49.725. The mark was a .250 improvement on the previous school record of 49.475 set first on March 6, 1999 and later matched on Feb. 28, 2003. Counting towards the team total was April Burkholder's 10.00, Terin Martinjak's 9.950 and a trio of 9.925's by Annie Gagnon, Kelly Phelan and Lisa Rennie.

Tigers Tally Top Marks on the Bars

LSU was a tough act to beat on the bars in 2005. In 12 of the Tigers' 16 meets a LSU athlete either won outright or shared top honors on the event with a teammate. Topping the wins list for the Tigers was Lisa Rennie with five individual titles. Annie Gagnon followed with four titles, twice sharing the honors with teammate April Burkholder. In addition, Nicki Butler won two titles and senior Katherine Hilton won one.

Home Sweet Home

The Tigers closed out the 2005 home schedule with a perfect 8-0 mark on March 18, defeating Centenary, 196.900-190.375. Throughout the season LSU recorded dual meet victories over Florida, Michigan State, Arkansas and Georgia, as well as a quad meet victory over Illinois-Chicago, New Hampshire and Western Michigan. The Tigers' perfect home slate marked their first since the 2002 season when they went 12-0 at the Pete Maravich Assembly Center.

Perfection

April Burkholder became the first athlete in LSU history to ever record two 10.00's in one meet, posting perfect marks on both the vault and beam in the Tigers' dual-meet victory over Oklahoma. The 10.00's marked her second and third of the season as she also posted a perfect score on the floor against Arkansas, on Feb. 4. Burkholder is the only Tiger athlete to ever record more than one 10.00 on the beam during her career as she notched her first during the 2004 season. She is also the only athlete in school history to have posted more than two perfect scores on the floor. The nine-time All-American has recorded a total of four in her time at LSU.

Rennie Perfecting the Balancing Act

Sophomore Lisa Rennie concluded the regular season ranked fourth nationally on the beam with a RQS of 9.930. The Las Vegas native was nearly unbeatable on the event during the regular season, winning five event titles while posting scores of 9.875 or better in each of those victories. In addition, she notched a career-high 9.975 in her win at Texas Woman's.

A Swinging Success

Once again, senior Annie Gagnon was exceptional on the bars of the Tigers in 2005. The Montreal, Quebec, native won a total of four bar titles during the season, including the NCAA Northeast Regional crown (9.950). She concluded the regular season ranked No. 9 nationally with an RQS of 9.895 before wrapping up her career by earning first-team All-America honors on the event.

Rennie Rocks the Bars

Lisa Rennie also saw tremendous success on the bars in 2005. The sophomore earned both All-SEC and All-America honors on the event after finishing the regular season tied with Gagnon at No. 9 nationally (9.895). In addition, Rennie won a team-best five bars titles during the season and notched scores of

9.850 or higher on 11 different occasions, including a career-high 9.950 against Oklahoma.

Counting on Clare-Kearney

In her inaugural season with the Tigers Ashleigh Clare-Kearney established herself as one of the Tigers' premier performers on both the vault and floor. The freshman from Manchester, Conn., won 11 individual event titles in 2005, claiming six on the vault and five on the floor. She finished the regular season ranked sixth in the country on floor and ninth on the vault with RQSs of 9.920 and 9.910, respectively. Clare-Kearney proved to be remarkably consistent after hitting her stride at the Michigan State meet on Jan. 28. From that point on, Clare-Kearney recorded scores of 9.800 or better on 29 of her 33 routines.

Phelan Claims First Career All-Around Title

Behind a then career-best 39.400 effort, Kelly Phelan won the first all-around title of her collegiate career against Arkansas on Feb. 4. In taking the all-around crown, the Orlando, Fla., native also finished among the top three on both the beam and floor, placing third on the beam with a 9.875 and tying teammate Ashleigh Clare-Kearney for third on the floor with a 9.900.

Dynamic Debut

Ashleigh Clare-Kearney couldn't have asked for a better collegiate debut in the all-around at Texas Woman's on March 13. as the Manchester, Conn., native won the individual overall title with an impressive 39.525 effort. The score ranked as the fourth-best by a Tiger and the seventh-best in the SEC in 2005. Clare-Kearney also posted event wins on the floor (9.900) and vault (9.875) against the Pioneers, and turned in career-highs of 9.875 on both the bars and beam.

Tigers Garner SEC Gymnst of the Week Honors

Four times during the season a LSU athlete earned SEC Gymnast of the Week honors from the conference office. All-American April Burkholder was selected three times, earning the distinction during the weeks of Jan. 25, March 15 and March 22, while sophomore Kelly Phelan was recognized during the week of Feb. 15.
