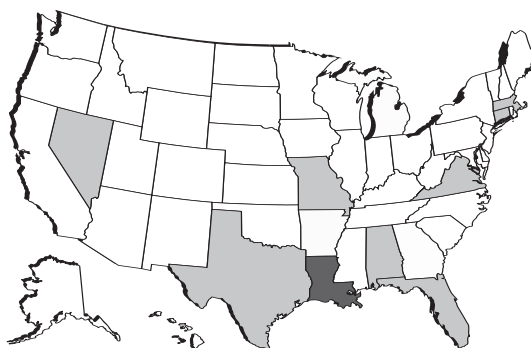

## 2007 SEASON PREVIEW

**W**ith the return of seven seasoned veterans and the addition of an All-American transfer and five talented freshmen, LSU head coach D-D Breaux believes the 2007 edition of her Tiger gymnastics team can be one of the best in the country.

"I am extremely optimistic," said Breaux on her team's prospects for the upcoming season. "This group has worked really hard. They are determined to maintain a positive team force and to have a positive team culture."

Breaux's hoping that positive team energy will translate to the competitive arena where the Tigers, who have finished among the nation's top-12 22 times in program history, will once again strive to excel at the highest levels - the SEC, Regional and NCAA Championships.

"Barring any unforeseen injuries and stumbles along the way I think this team can probably match up

with any team in the country," said Breaux. "I believe this team is strong enough to control their own destiny."

A destiny that Breaux and the team can only hope will lead to another NCAA Championships berth and a spot in the meet's Super Six Finals.

### THE SENIORS

Spearheading the Tigers' quest for excellence this season is one of the most talented senior classes in recent history, in All-Americans Kelly Phelan and Lisa Rennie and All-SEC selection Nicki Butler.

"Since this group arrived in Baton Rouge we have relied on

them to make huge contributions in every single meet and that won't change," said Breaux of her senior class. "These three know their roles and combine for possibly 10 scores in our lineup. That's a lot, but that's what they expect of themselves. We know we aren't asking them to do anything they aren't willing to deliver."

Phelan headlines the group after winning the NCAA Central Regional all-around title and earning All-America honors on the floor last season. She competed in the all-around in all 15 of the Tigers' meets a year ago and is expected to do the same again this year.

Also expected to excel in the all-around is Butler. The Virginia Beach, Va., native doesn't have a weak event and after successful summer and fall training periods should be a regular in each event lineup.

"Nicki has really stepped it up for her senior year," said Breaux. "She's worked hard and I think she feels good about what she is doing."

Rennie, a two-time All-American, returns as the group's most decorated athlete. After earning All-America status on the bars for the second straight year, Rennie is once again expected to be the anchor the squad on the event. She will also be counted on to contribute on the beam where she has been one of the Tigers' toughest competitors over the last three seasons, earning top 25 national rankings and winning 11 meet titles.

### THE JUNIORS

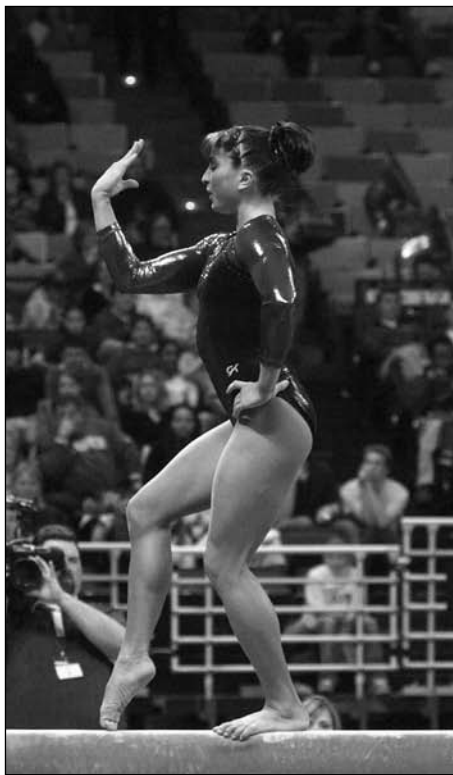
Two proven competitors and an accolade-laden transfer should make this year's three member junior class a dominant force in the competitive arena.

The talented duo of Ashleigh Clare-Kearney and Emily Ellis will finally see the competition floor

together as Ellis missed her freshman campaign with an arm injury and Clare-Kearney sat out last season with a foot injury. Both begin the 2007 season healthy and are expected to make substantial contributions to the lineup.

"It seems like they are two big wheels on the cart and for the past two years one of those wheels has fallen off the cart," said Breaux on the pair's alternating season-ending injuries. "These two are a daunting force together. They are strong and physical and do big gymnastics with lots of amplitude. One of them makes a statement, but together they are just in your face and exciting to watch."

As a freshmen, Clare-Kearney turned in one of the most successful inaugural campaigns in recent history, winning 11 individual event titles and an all-around crown in her only four-event appearances of the year. Once again healthy, fit and recovered from last season's foot injury, Clare-Kearney should see action in all four events this season.

"Ashleigh looks great," said Breaux. "She's fit, she's working hard and she wants to be an all-arounder. At her current pace there is no reason she can't be."

In her first full season of competition, Ellis established herself as a mainstay in the Tigers' vault, bars and floor lineups. The Fayette, Ala. native, should again see action in those three events and could also crack the beam lineup this season.

Adding valuable all-around experience to Tigers' lineup will be transfer Kristi Esposito. The Slidell, La. native, comes to LSU as a junior after transferring from Big 12 power Nebraska.

Esposito is a three-time All-American that also earned All-Big 12 honors. As a freshman she won the Big 12 bars title and followed that with a third-place showing on the beam and a fourth-place finish in the all-around at the 2004 NCAA Championships. She only bettered that effort as sophomore, earning NCAA runner-up honors on the beam.

"Kristi brings a lot of confidence and experience to this team," said Breaux. "She is somebody who has been to the Super Six and proven that she is one of the best NCAA competitors in the country. We hated that she didn't come here her freshman year, but we are happy to have her for junior and senior seasons."

#### THE SOPHOMORES

Returning to the Tiger squad for their sophomore campaigns are Lauren Klein and Amanda Morales.

Klein competed primarily on the floor for the Tigers as freshmen but also saw action on each of the other three events. She's had a impressive off-season and should contend for a spot in each of the lineups, especially on the beam and floor.

"Lauren has had a great summer," said Breaux. "She has upgraded the difficulty in all of her routines and right now she is a standout on the floor and dynamic on beam. I fully expect that we will go to her often on those two events."

Morales will be returning to competition after spending a majority of last season on the sideline following reconstructive surgery on her right ACL. She is training on the vault, bars and beam this season, but will not compete on the floor in order to avoid overuse of her knee during her continued recovery.

"Amanda looks fabulous and is doing great," said Breaux. "With her knee we are trying to bring her around slowly. She looks solid on the beam and extremely tight in what she does on the bars. We will be conservative in the dismounts she performs, but we fully expect her to contend for positions in those lineups."

#### THE FRESHMEN

Five new faces will be added to the Tigers' mix in 2007, in freshmen Sabrina Franceschelli, Susan Jackson, Summer Hubbard, Yvette Triay and Kayla Rogers.

"This is a very competitive and confident group," said Breaux. "I know we will have some growing pains and some hits and misses, but once they get in the groove and get a taste of what collegiate competition is all about, I think they will come alive."

Franceschelli, a native of Roslindale, Mass., trained as an international elite gymnast for five seasons, before dropping back to Level 10 for her senior year. Breaux believes she has all-around potential in her inaugural campaign.

"Sabrina has elite level skills and elite level presentation when she steps on the floor," said Breaux. "She is a strong all-arounder that is good in every event. I really think that she is going to bring an enhanced level of deepness to our lineup."

Jackson comes to LSU from Spring, Texas, where she also trained as one of the nation's top international elite gymnasts for the past several seasons. She is expected to make an immediate impact on three of the four events.

"Susan is powerful, strong and confident. She is everything an international elite gymnast should be," said Breaux. "Right now we are really counting on her to come in and give us big scores on the bars, beam and floor."

Expected to be an immediate contributor on the bars and beam is Hubbard. Hailing from St. Petersburg, Fla., Hubbard was a top-10 finisher on the bars, beam, floor and in the all-around at the 2006 Level 10 Junior Olympic National Championships.

"Summer is dynamic on the bars. She is clean, tight, quick and has a big dismount. She also does really pretty work on the beam and has a fun floor routine. I see her as someone that is going to step up and give us big scores on the events she is ready for," said Breaux.

Trai, the lone Louisiana native among the freshmen class, will likely provide depth on the bars, beam and floor. A native of Metairie, she is a three-time Level 10 national qualifier that won the Louisiana state all-around titles during both her junior and senior seasons.

"Yvette is like a little heartbeat. Just a real positive heart beat," said Breaux. "She is a great team person. It takes every level of athlete to make a team and she has proven to be a real positive energy force for us."

Rogers is a five-time Level 10 Junior Olympic national qualifier that hails from Liberty, Mo. She is expected to add depth to the Tiger lineups, primarily on the beam and floor.

"Kayla is physical and strong and does very solid work," said Breaux. "She also has great vaulting potential. This is the event that we feel Kayla needs to excel. I think she will be a solid contributor for us on any event."

Widely regarded as the most dominating gymnastics conference in the NCAA, the SEC has ...

- Won 11 NCAA Championships, with Georgia claiming a league-leading seven titles and Alabama winning four.
- 16 times in the last 22 years the SEC has placed at least four teams in the NCAA's final top 10.
- The SEC has had at least one team finish in the top 10 since the inaugural NCAA Championships in 1982.

**W**hen determining what makes an athletic program successful, many elements factor in. Ask any coach and they will say that quality facilities rank among the most important elements.

The LSU Gymnastics team and head coach D-D Breaux moved into the newly renovated gymnastics training area in the LSU Field House in the Fall of 2000 and immediately reaped the benefits of one of the finest training facilities in the nation.

"It's a dream come true. It's a realization that the commitment by the university, fans and boosters really is all about the student-athlete," said Breaux.

The LSU Field House renovations and expansion created a brand new facility, that includes a locker room, squad room, 18,143 square feet of training space - double the previous space - an equipment room, sauna, sound room and conditioning/aerobic room.

One of the nicest aspects of the facility is the glass wall that allows an onlooker to see the multi-million dollar Bernie Moore Track Stadium, legendary Tiger Stadium, the Pete Maravich Assembly Center – the competitive home of the LSU gymnastics team – and the beautiful landscaping of LSU's campus.

D-D Breaux started to fathom ideas of a new facility years ago, never thinking that one day dreams would turn into realities under her tenure.

"About 10 years ago I started thinking about this idea, and about five years ago I started talking about it. Eventually, (former athletics director) Mr. (Joe) Dean and some board members along with the Tiger Athletic Foundation started listening. They realized that we needed it not only to maintain our top 10 status, but it was also a safety issue. We needed the upgrades to protect the athletes."

As it is with all sports, talent is also a key ingredient for success. A new facility not only enhances training and safety, but is also be a very useful tool in recruiting.

"I think it puts us ahead of some schools if there is a facility race. When girls come to visit our facility they will be impressed. They will be able to look out and see the other athletic facilities, and they will be able to grasp the entire experience they are looking at if they choose to attend LSU.

"Young female athletes are coming to the realization across the spectrum that opportunities are out there for them. They can take scholarships and compete at the collegiate level. So I think this project and other things of this sort are very important."

**P**aramount to the success of an intercollegiate program is a first-class facility and the Tigers have just that in the Pete Maravich Assembly Center.

For over a quarter century the "PMAC" has been home to some of the finest gymnastics competitions in the nation. The PMAC has served as the host site for three SEC Championships and eight NCAA Regional Championships, including most recently the NCAA Central Regional Championships in 2006.

Seating 13,215 spectators, the massive \$11.5 million building has competed with neighboring Tiger Stadium as the most visible structure on the LSU campus since its completion in 1971.

Originally named, "The Assembly Center," in 1988 Louisiana Governor Buddy Roemer signed legislation changing the official name of the building to the Pete Maravich Assembly Center in honor of the former LSU basketball legend who had died earlier that same year.

The PMAC also serves as home to both the LSU men's and women's basketball teams, as well as the volleyball program.

In addition to the normal seating configuration, a proscenium stage can be lowered into place at the north end allowing some 4,500 seats for theatrical productions. An additional 1,000 seats can be placed on the floor for graduations, convocations, lectures, concerts or other special events.

Several renovations have recently been completed to keep the PMAC as one of the top facilities in the Southeastern Conference. A new multi-million dollar scoreboard/video replay system was installed in November 1999, the upper concourse was remodeled to include exhibits, displays and interactive kiosks documenting LSU sports history in the PMAC in 2004 and new seating was installed in 2006.

## DR. MARTIN BROUSSARD

LSU's multi-million dollar athletic training facility is named in honor of Dr. Martin J. Broussard, the legendary trainer whose career spanned over 40 years at LSU, having been appointed to the position of head athletic trainer in 1948. Following his semi-retirement from the day-to-day work as trainer in 1993, he continued to serve LSU as an Assistant to the Athletic Director through 2001, giving him well over 50 years of service to the Athletic Department.

Among his many accomplishments was the formulation of "Quick Kick", an isotonic drink used to replace liquids, vitamins and the electrolytes lost through sweating. He was a trainer for the Pan American Games in 1955 and the U.S. Olympic team in 1960. In 1963, the Rockne Foundation named him Trainer of the Year. In 1978, Broussard was named to the NATA Hall of Fame followed by the Louisiana Athletic Trainer's Hall of Fame in 1982.





**S**trength and conditioning can be the heart and soul of an athletic program's success, and LSU has taken great strides to improve its strength program and facilities. LSU student-athletes enjoy one of the finest strength and conditioning facilities in the nation with a 10,000-square foot weight room located on the North side of Tiger Stadium. The weight room features the latest in both strength training and cardiovascular training equipment.

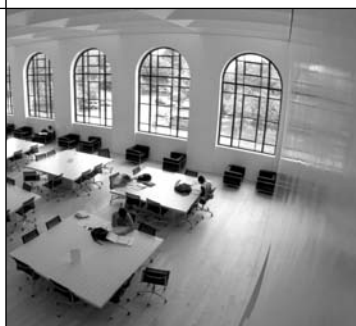
## Computer Stations

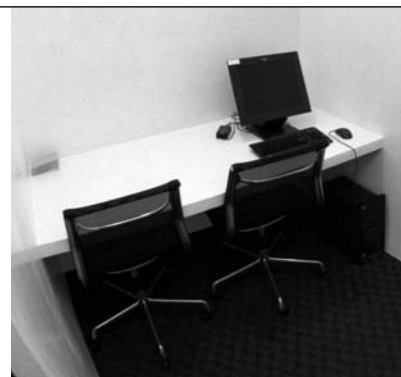


## The Library

Karam's lab is a mock press conference setting to get the student-athletes used to handling themselves in front of both print and electronic media. He videotapes the mock interview sessions and reviews these with the student-athletes to help them become more comfortable in an interview setting.

Dr. Karam teaches LSU's student-athletes to interact with all phases of local and national media by working one-on-one in a press conference setting. The Communications Lab includes a working camera for Karam to review the session with the student-athletes.

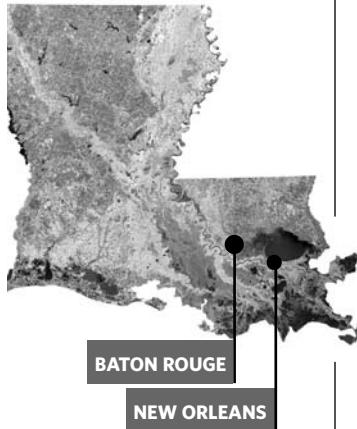

The 2005-06 athletics year was another wonderful one for LSU. The Tigers and Lady Tigers enjoyed success from the fields and courts to the classroom. All in all, it was an exciting year for LSU's student-athletes, coaches and fans.

## Postseason Presence

Of LSU's 20 sports, 12 teams advanced to postseason play. Among the highlights: Both of LSU's basketball teams advanced to the NCAA Final Four, the football team defeated Miami in the Chick-Fil-A Peach Bowl, the men's track and field team finished second at both the indoor and outdoor NCAA Championship meets, while the women placed seventh at both meets. The gymnastics team finished the season ranked eighth in the nation and softball was 15th.

LSU had a total of 141 student-athletes named to the SEC Academic Honor Roll in 2005-06. To receive the recognition, each student-athlete must maintain a 3.0 grade point average for the previous year.

## X Factor

Track sprinter Xavier Carter sprinted his way into the record books in 2006. Carter won six NCAA titles and became the first athlete in NCAA history to ever win both the 100 and 400 meters at the championship meet and was the first male to win four titles in one meet since Jesse Owens in 1936. Carter was named the NCAA Indoor and Outdoor Track Athlete of the Year.

## Augustus Again

Seimone Augustus earned women's basketball's National Player of the Year honors for the second straight season. She received the Wade, the Naismith and the John R. Wooden Awards and was named the Associated Press' Player of the Year. Augustus, a Kodak All-American, also led the nation in scoring averaging 22.7 points per game.

## National Champions

Gymnast April Burkholder earned the individual NCAA title on the balance beam. Track star Xavier Carter was a six-time NCAA champion in 2006, winning the 100m and 400m races at the NCAA Outdoor Championships and the 400m race at the NCAA Indoor Championships. He led the 4x100m relay to an outdoor title and both the indoor and outdoor 4x400m relay to titles. The LSU women's 4x400m relay claimed the NCAA indoor and outdoor titles as well.

## Hoops Sweep

LSU's duo of Glen Davis and Seimone Augustus were named the Southeastern Conference Men's and Women's Players of the Year, respectively. Davis helped lead the men's program to its first SEC title since 2000, while Augustus guided the Lady Tigers to a second straight league title. Tyrus Thomas was crowned the SEC's Freshman of the Year as well.

## Tops in the League

Xavier Carter and Seimone Augustus swept the SEC Male and Female Athlete of the Year honors. Carter, the NCAA Indoor and Outdoor Track Athlete of the Year, was a three-time individual NCAA champion, winning the outdoor 100 and 400 meter races and the 400m indoors. Augustus led the SEC in scoring and help guide the Lady Tigers to a second straight conference title.

## Rare Feat

LSU joined North Carolina as the only schools in NCAA history to have its football team and men's and women's basketball teams finish their seasons ranked in the top 5 in the nation during the same athletic year. LSU's football team finished fifth in the nation after a solid victory over Miami in the Peach Bowl. The men's basketball team finished third in the polls after advancing to the NCAA Final Four, while the women's basketball team competed the season ranked fourth after a third straight trip to the NCAA Final Four.

### Bob Pettit

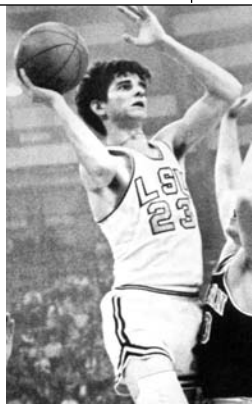
Led LSU to its first NCAA Final Four in 1953 and he later became the first player in NBA history to exceed the 20,000-plus point barrier. Pettit is a member of the NBA Hall of Fame and in 1997 he was named as one of the top 50 players in NBA history.

### Billy Cannon

One of the true legends of college football in the South, Cannon was the 1959 Heisman Trophy winner that helped the Tigers to the 1958 national title. Cannon's most memorable performance came in 1959 against Ole Miss when No. 1 LSU trailed No. 3 Ole Miss 3-0 in the fourth quarter. He fielded a punt, broke seven tackles and returned it 89 yards for the 7-3 victory. He went on to a successful 11-year professional career.



## 23

### Pete Maravich

"Pistol Pete," Maravich still holds the NCAA record for career points with 3,667 and for career scoring average with 44.2 points a game. He was selected the National Player of the Year in 1970 after leading the Tigers to the NIT Final Four. He scored 50+ points an amazing 28 times. He went on to a 10-year professional career and was selected as one of the NBA's 50 greatest players in 1997.



## 33

### Shaquille O'Neal

The first pick in the 1992 NBA Draft, O'Neal was named MVP of the league in 2000 and was a three-time NBA Finals MVP after leading the Los Angeles Lakers to three World Championships. At LSU, O'Neal averaged 21.6 points and 13.6 rebounds for his career, and in 1991, he was named the World's Amateur Athlete of the Year as well as SEC Athlete of the Year and National Player of the Year. In 1997, he was named as one of the top 50 players in NBA history.



## 15

### Skip Bertman

A legend in the college baseball ranks, Bertman created a dynasty at LSU, guiding the Tigers to five national titles in a 10-year stretch from 1991-2000. He also skippered the United States to a bronze medal at the 1996 Olympics in Atlanta and was an assistant on the gold medal-winning U.S. squad in Seoul, Korea in 1988. Bertman retired from coaching following the 2001 season and serves currently as the LSU athletics director. Bertman was inducted into the College Baseball Hall of Fame in 2006.

### Seimone Augustus

Augustus was the two-time NCAA National Player of the Year, receiving the Wade Trophy, the Naismith and the Wooden Awards as a junior and a senior. Augustus helped lead the Lady Tigers to three straight Final Fours and was the NCAA Regional MOP three times. She was the No. 1 draft pick in the 2006 WNBA draft.



### Temeka Johnson

The 2004-05 Lieberman Award winner as the nation's top point guard, Johnson led the Lady Tigers to back-to-back NCAA Final Fours, the 2004-05 SEC regular season title and the 2003 tournament title, and was the SEC's all-time assist leader, finishing her career fifth in NCAA history with 945.



### Nicki Arnstad

The 2002 NCAA floor exercise co-champion, Arnstad became the first LSU gymnast to win a national title. She was a two-time All-American and won the NCAA Central Regional Floor and All-Around Championships.



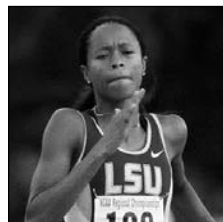
### Esther Jones

A 21-time All-American while at LSU, Jones won a gold medal as a member of the United States' 4x100-meter relay team at the 1992 Olympic Games in Barcelona.



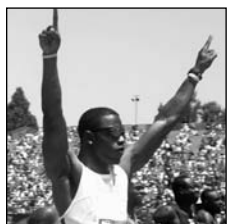
### April Burkholder

The 2006 NCAA beam co-national champion, Burkholder finished her career with 14 All-America honors and four All-SEC selections. In addition, she was named the NCAA Central Region Gymnast of the Year twice (2004, 2005), the SEC Gymnast of the Year on two occasions (2004 and 2005) and was also the conference's Freshman of the Year in 2003.



### Muna Lee

The most decorated track and field athlete in school history, Lee won 20 All-America awards and a school record seven national titles while helping the Lady Tigers to five NCAA team championships during her time at LSU. A 2004 Olympian, she finished seventh in the 200 meters at the Summer Games in Athens, Greece.



### Xavier Carter

Carter won a school record-tying seven NCAA titles on the track and earned a total of 10 All-America honors. He became just the second athlete to win four titles at one national meet, joining Jesse Owens. Holds four individual school records and anchored LSU's 4x400-meter relay teams to two school records.



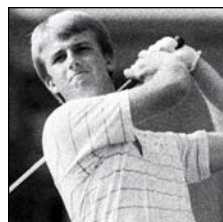
### Ben McDonald

Named the Golden Spikes National Player of the Year in 1989 and he was later the first player chosen in the Major League Baseball Draft by the Baltimore Orioles.



### Walter Davis

A two-time Olympian and World Champion, Davis helped LSU to national titles in 2001 and 2002. The SEC Male Athlete of the Year in 2002, he won six NCAA titles and earned a school-record nine All-America honors.



### David Toms

The two-time SEC Player of the Year, Toms has gone on to a successful career on the PGA Tour. Among his PGA Tour victories was a thrilling win at the PGA Championship in August of 2001.



### Meredith Duncan

The nation's top collegiate golfer in 2002, Duncan left LSU as the school's best female golfer. She earned first-team All-America honors as a senior in 2002 and won the United States Women's Amateur Championship in 2001.



### Todd Walker

Capped his LSU career as the SEC's all-time leader in hits, runs, RBIs, and total bases. Walker, who is a member of the All-Time College World Series Team, led LSU to the national title in 1993.

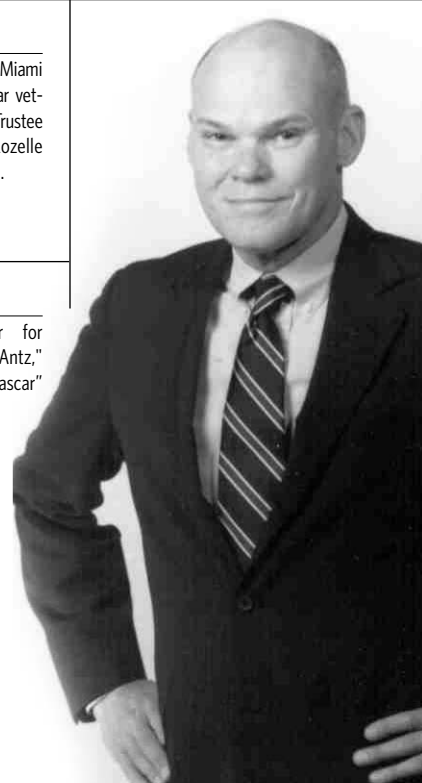

## Dr. William L. Jenkins

President, LSU

Dr. William L. Jenkins is President of the Louisiana State University System, which includes ten institutions on 10 campuses in five cities as well as 10 public hospitals in 10 cities.

A native of South Africa, Dr. Jenkins received his professional veterinary medicine degree in 1958 and specialist credentials in 1968 from the University of Pretoria. In 1970 he received a Ph.D. degree from the University of Missouri in Columbia. After practicing veterinary medicine for four years, Dr. Jenkins joined the faculty at the University of Pretoria, advancing through the ranks to become professor and head of the Department of Veterinary Physiology, Pharmacology and Toxicology in 1971.

In 1978 Dr. Jenkins moved to the United States and joined the faculty in the Department of Veterinary Physiology and Pharmacology at Texas A&M University. In 1988 he was appointed dean of the LSU School of Veterinary Medicine, was named LSU's provost and vice chancellor for academic affairs in 1993, Chancellor of LSU in 1996, and President of the LSU System in 1999.

Dr. Jenkins has taught extensively at both the professional and graduate levels. He also has been active in continuing education and has delivered more than 200 lectures and addresses to diverse groups in both the United States and abroad. He has published more than 60 scientific articles and has contributed 15 chapters to various textbooks. He is co-author of a textbook on veterinary pharmacology.

Over the years President Jenkins has received numerous teaching and service awards and recognitions. He also has served on many boards and commissions at the local, regional, state, and national levels.

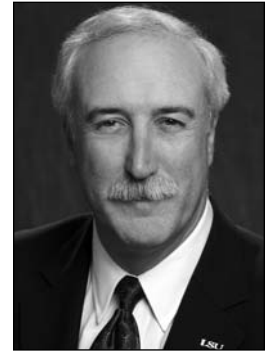

# Sean O'Keefe

Chancellor, LSU

The Honorable Sean O'Keefe assumed the office of Chancellor of Louisiana State University and A&M College on February 21, 2005. Prior to his appointment as LSU's seventh chancellor, O'Keefe established a distinguished career in higher education and United States government service.



Chancellor O'Keefe earned his Bachelor of Arts from Loyola University in New Orleans in 1977 and his Master of Public Administration from the Maxwell School of Syracuse University in 1978. He held an endowed chair at the Syracuse University Maxwell School of Citizenship and Public Affairs and served as the Director of National Security Studies, a partnership of Syracuse University and Johns Hopkins University for delivery of executive education programs. He was also Professor of Business Administration and Assistant to the Senior Vice President for Research and Dean of the Graduate School at the Pennsylvania State University.

He served on four separate occasions as a presidential appointee. Most recently, until February 2005, he served as the 10th Administrator of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration. O'Keefe joined President George W. Bush's Administration as Deputy Assistant to the President and as the Deputy Director of the Office of Management and Budget until December 2001.

Appointed Secretary of the Navy in July 1992 by President George Bush, O'Keefe served as Comptroller and Chief Financial Officer of the Department of Defense since 1989. Before joining then-Defense Secretary Dick Cheney's Pentagon management team in these capacities, he served on the United States Senate Committee on Appropriations staff for eight years and was Staff Director of the Defense Appropriations Subcommittee. His public service began in 1978 upon his selection as a Presidential Management Intern.

Chancellor Sean O'Keefe is a Fellow of the National

Academy of Public Administration, a Fellow of the International Academy of Astronautics, and member of the Naval Postgraduate School Board of Advisors. During his academic postings, he was a Visiting Scholar at the Wolfson College of the University of Cambridge in the United Kingdom, a member of the Naval Postgraduate School's civil-military relations seminar team, and conducted seminars for the Strategic Studies Group at Oxford University. He served on the national security panel to devise the 1988 Republican platform and was a member of the 1985 Kennedy School of Government program for national security executives at Harvard University.

In 1993, President Bush and Secretary Cheney presented him the Distinguished Public Service Award. He was the 1999 faculty recipient of the Syracuse University Chancellor's Award for Public Service; recipient of the Department of the Navy's Public Service Award in December 2000; and has been awarded five honorary doctorate degrees from several prestigious educational institutions. In 2003 and 2004, he was recognized and honored by the Irish American Magazine as one of the Top 100 Irish Americans.

He is the author of several journal articles and contributing author of *Keeping the Edge: Managing Defense* for the Future released in October 2000. In 1998, he co-authored *The Defense Industry in the Post-Cold War Era: Corporate Strategies and Public Policy Perspectives*.

He is married to Laura McCarthy O'Keefe, and they have three children - Lindsey, Jonathan, and Kevin.

## Kenneth E. Carpenter, Faculty Athletics Representative

Kenneth E. Carpenter is in his third year as LSU's faculty representative in NCAA and Southeastern Conference matters.

Carpenter, a professor in the School of Architecture, has taught at LSU since 1986. He received his bachelor's degree in architecture from the University of Oklahoma in 1962 and his master's from the University of Minnesota in 1967. Before joining the LSU faculty, he served at Clemson University as associate professor of architecture from 1967-77; Ball State University, where he was professor and chairman of the Department of Architecture, 1977-81; and, Iowa State

University, serving as professor and chairman, Department of Architecture from 1981-86.

At LSU, he served as the dean of the College of Design from 1986-97; Interim Executive Director of International Programs from 1997-98; and Interim Dean of the College of Art and Design from 2001-02.

Carpenter is a member of Phi Kappa Phi, the American Institute of Architects, and the American Association of University Professors.

Already a Louisiana Legend and one of the greatest college baseball coaches of all time, J. Stanley "Skip" Bertman has made the seamless transition into the athletics director's chair with the same enthusiasm, vision and demand for excellence that were trademarks of his stellar coaching career.

In just four years as LSU's director of athletics, Bertman has already added to his impressive list of on-the-field achievements. Under his direction, LSU enjoyed arguably the greatest athletics years in the history of the institution. In 2003-04 three teams won national championships, nine teams finished in the nation's top ten, and fourteen teams ranked in the top 25 and in 2004-05 14 teams advanced to the post-season. LSU teams also enjoyed improved grade point averages across the board, making the LSU student-athlete experience a success on and off the fields of competition.

While supervising the Tigers' progress on the playing fields, he has begun to implement measures necessary to realize his vision of building the LSU athletics department into the best in the country. Bertman's bold and innovative plans promise to keep the Tigers among the nation's elite in all phases of collegiate athletics.

Bertman is now in the midst of upgrading LSU's athletics complex. Working hand in hand with the Tiger Athletic Foundation, Bertman has already overseen the completion of the Cox Communications Academic Center for Student-Athletes while renovating Tiger Stadium and the Pete Maravich Assembly Center, and constructing the Football Operations Center.

It was also Bertman who took the bold but essential move to implement a seat contribution program in Tiger Stadium to fund facility improvements and ensure the financial stability of the LSU Athletics Department for the next decade.

Bertman was named LSU's athletics director on January 19, 2001. With Bertman, LSU gained an athletics director who provides the leadership and experience necessary to manage the Tigers' \$52 million budget.

Bertman guided LSU to five NCAA baseball titles, and his teams drew huge crowds to venerable Alex Box Stadium, as the Tigers led the nation in attendance in each of his final six seasons (1996-2001).

He also served as head coach of the 1996 U.S. Olympic team which captured the bronze medal in Atlanta.

Bertman continues to be honored for his remarkable coaching tenure, as he was inducted in June, 2002, into the Louisiana Sports Hall of Fame. He was inducted into the American Baseball Coaches Association Hall of Fame in January, 2003. Bertman was also inducted into the College Baseball Hall of Fame this past summer.

In a Baseball America poll published in 1999, Bertman was voted the second greatest college baseball coach of the 20th century, trailing only Rod Dedeaux of Southern California. Bertman and Dedeaux are the only coaches to win five CWS titles.

He had previously earned recognition as one of the nation's brightest assistant coaches while at the University of Miami (Fla.) for eight seasons (1976-83). Before working at Miami, Bertman was renowned for his coaching excellence. In 11 seasons at Miami Beach High School, he directed the Hi-Tides to a state championship and two runners-up finishes and he was named Florida's Coach of the Year on three occasions.

In 1975, Bertman coached at Miami-Dade Downtown, leaving after one season to join legendary head coach Ron Fraser at Miami. The move was a homecoming of sorts, as Bertman spent his collegiate playing days with the Hurricanes as an outfielder and catcher from 1958-60. He earned his B.A. in health and physical education from Miami in 1961 and received his master's degree from UM in 1964.

Bertman and his wife Sandy are the parents of four daughters - Jan, Jodi, Lisa and Lori. The Bertman's have three grandchildren - Sophie Faith and Isaac Stanley, the children of Emile and Lori Bertman Guirard, and Samuel Aaron, the son of Drew and Lisa Pate.

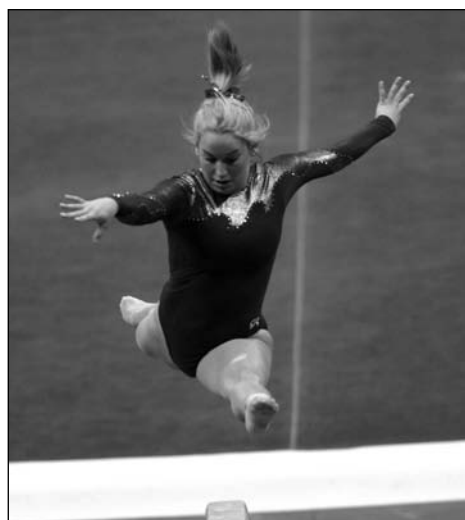

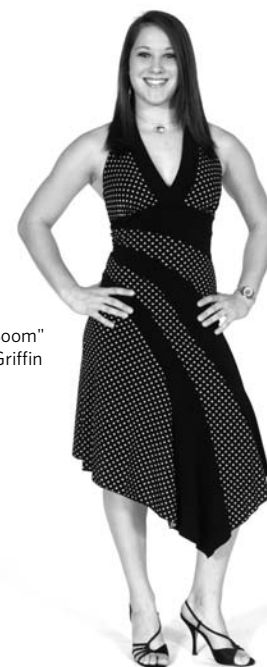

**A**s the "Dean of Coaches" at LSU, head gymnastics coach D-D Breaux has represented the University at the highest level both in the gym and, most importantly, in the classroom for 29 years. Her dedication to the student-athlete on an individual basis has transcended into academic success, community involvement, Coach of the Year honors, SEC Championships, NCAA Regional Championships and top-10 national rankings throughout her tenure.

Now entering her 30th season as the mastermind of the LSU gymnastics program, the fire in Breaux's eyes burns as bright today as it did on her first day on the job.

During her tenure Breaux has established and maintained LSU's reputation as one of the premier collegiate gymnastics programs in the country. Under her tutelage, Tigers have placed among the nation's top-12 teams 21 times in her 29 seasons, finishing a program-best fourth in 1988 and sixth on three separate occasions.

LSU has also placed among the top three in regional competition on 21 separate occasions, winning regional titles in 1978, 1979, 1980, 1986, 2002, 2004 and 2005. Her teams have included three national champions, 73 All-America honorees and 36 All-SEC selections.

In addition, Breaux's Tigers won the inaugural SEC Championship title in 1981 and have gone on to finish second four times and third five other times.

For her dedication to the sport and her teams numerous accomplishments, Breaux has been recognized by her peers time and time again. She has been named the SEC Coach of the Year on five occasions (1993, 1994, 1995, 2000 and 2005) and NCAA Central Regional Coach of the Year three times (1999, 2002 and 2005) and was named a finalist for National Coach of the Year honors in 1988 when she guided the Tigers to a fourth-place finish at the NCAA Championships.

The accolades continued to roll in for the Tigers in 2006 as a

school record-tying five athletes earned All-America honors and April Burkholder won the NCAA beam title under Breaux's guidance. Just as successful as a team, Breaux helped LSU to an eighth-place showing at the NCAA Championships, the 19th top-10 national finish during her tenure.

In 2005, the LSU program reached new heights under Breaux's direction as the Tigers made their 17th appearance at the NCAA Championships, won their third regional title in four years and achieved the program's first ever No. 1 national ranking. Named both the SEC and NCAA Central Coach of the Year for her team's efforts, Breaux also coached All-American April Burkholder to SEC and NCAA Central Region Gymnast of the Year honors for the second straight season and helped Annie Gagnon, Lisa Rennie and Terin Martinjak to All-America honors and Nicki Butler and Burkholder to All-SEC accolades.

2004 was a banner year for the LSU program as it won the NCAA Central Regional title for the second time in the three years, before finishing seventh at the NCAA Championships, the Tigers' best finish at the national meet since the 1993 season. Individually, Breaux guided the efforts of SEC and NCAA Central Region Gymnast of the Year April Burkholder and All-American Annie Gagnon. Burkholder became LSU's all-time top performer at the NCAA Championships, finishing second in the all-around to better Jennifer Wood's third-place effort at the 1996 championships.

2003 saw Breaux mold a young and inexperienced Tiger squad into one of the finest teams in the nation, as LSU recorded a second-place finish at the NCAA West Regionals and a top-10 showing at the NCAA Championships.

In 2002, Breaux led her team to the NCAA Central Regional title. The Tigers continued their success at the NCAA Championships where they finished eighth overall, LSU's best finish at the national championships in over five years. In addition, Breaux guided Nicki Arnstad to LSU's first individual NCAA Championship in modern history, as Arnstad won the floor exercise with a stunning 9.950 performance.

But aside from athletic honors, Breaux excels in recruiting quality student-athletes from Louisiana as well as across the continent, having recruited some of the top Canadian athletes of all time. A Louisianan through and through, Breaux concentrates her recruiting efforts right here in her native state, as well as at the national and international levels.

Outside of the gym, Breaux has taken an active role in the academic success her program has achieved in her 29 seasons at LSU. By making academic success her team's No. 1 priority, Breaux's teams have reached the highest scholastic goals she has established over the years. Throughout the country, she is acknowledged as having one of the finest academic teams year in and year out. LSU gymnasts have been named Academic All-Americans 82 times and members of the SEC Academic Honor Roll on 106 occasions since 1991. During the 2003 season, a school-record 13 of Breaux's student-athletes were named to the SEC Academic Honor Roll, an honor reserved for sophomores, juniors and seniors. In 1999, the Tigers posted the third-highest GPA in the nation and the highest of any team in the NCAA Championship field.

Also active members of the local community, Breaux and her team continually participate in volunteer activities throughout the Baton Rouge area. In back-to-back years (2005 and 2006) Breaux's team has been awarded LSU's CHAMPS Community Service Award

after logging hundreds of hours of community service work. Breaux, who has served as the Chairman of the YWCA's Pink Ribbon Campaign for Breast Cancer for the last two years, and her team have also volunteered their time to benefit the Muscular Dystrophy Association, St. Jude's Hospital and the Alzheimer's Association among others.

It is this delicate balance between exceptional academics, athletic excellence and exemplary community service efforts, that has allowed Breaux to keep her team at the top of the national scene year in and year out.

An excellent athlete in her own right Breaux's affiliation with gymnastics began long before her coaching career. As a club gymnast she was ranked nationally by both the A.A.U. and the U.S.G.F. She was also a Junior Olympic National Champion that earned the S.A.A.U.'s Outstanding Gymnast award. By virtue of her accomplishments Breaux qualified as one of the top-15 athletes in the country to compete at the World Games Trials and was set to compete at the 1972 Olympic Trials before career-ending knee injury forced her to retire.

Breaux, a native of Donaldsonville, La., then attended Southeastern Louisiana University where competed for the Lady Lions gymnastics team for two seasons (1972-73) and helped SLU to a second-place finish at the 1972 AIAW Championships.

Breaux then served as an assistant coach for the Lady Lions for three seasons, where she also became a national level judge and served as the first state director for the Louisiana USA gymnastics program.

In 1976, Breaux then transferred to LSU where she earned both her bachelor's and master's degrees.

She now has two daughters, Jewel (24) and Sara (20), a member of the LSU soccer team, and a grandson, Porter.

As head coach D-D Breaux begins her 30th season at the helm of the Tigers gymnastics program she took some time to sit down and discuss how the sport has evolved since she began coaching, what keeps her motivated to continue coaching and she shares some of the moments that have meant the most to her during her time at LSU.

**What motivates you to continue coaching into your 30th season?**

"I still really like what I do. I even enjoy the recruiting process. A lot of college coaches will talk about how much they don't like it, but I enjoy it. I really like my staff and I really enjoy the people within the department. I just love coming to work."

**How has the sport changed since you first started coaching?**

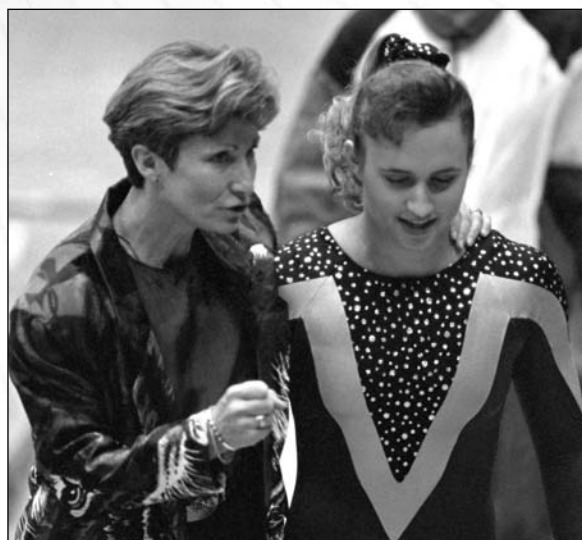
"I think that the natural evolution of the difficulty level of the sport is one of the biggest changes. It has been an ever-changing process since the beginning of the ancient Olympics until now. I think women's collegiate gymnastics as much as any one sport has enjoyed a tremendous amount of positive change largely because of the respect that has come to women's athletics through Title IX. The positive changes that have been made because of all the Title IX demands that were put in place have directly impacted women's gymnastics across the country."

**You mentioned the increased difficulty level of the sport over time, how do you keep up with the skill development?**

"You keep up with it by going to clinics, studying film and you work with your staff. You get one recruit that does a new skill and it is just a natural evolution of the learning process."

**How has recruiting changed since you first started out?**

"When I first started we couldn't pay for kids to come visit the campus because we were under AIAW rules. So we got a lot of local kids and a lot of kids from Texas because it was close for them to come here. At the time Texas, Texas A&M and Southwest Texas State all had gymnastics programs and ours was a good program so if they wanted to compete at a high level they came here. When we became affiliated with the NCAA the complexion of that completely changed because we could then fly kids in and the recruiting game became totally different. Now, the recruiting that we do is the most important thing that we do. Our mission is education, first and foremost, because that has to be our first priority, but then after that it's recruiting. (Assistant coach) Philip (Olgretree) does it (recruiting) everyday, all day. It's constantly recruiting, recruiting, recruiting."



**You were extremely young when you took over as LSU's head coach, were there ever any moments you felt overwhelmed or like you were in over your head?**

"No. I look back at it a lot of times and I think, 'I wish I would have done this different, I wish I would have been different, I wish I would have done this or that,' but I think I was what I was and what I had to be at the time. When I started I was in grad school so I had to split my attention between my team and graduate school. Then when I finished graduate school I got married and started having babies. The first couple of years I was a coach we had success but it was because we had good athletes and I thought we did a pretty good job coaching, but I didn't make the demands early that I could have or possibly should have. I just kind of accepted that this is what I am going to get, so I got what I got. Eventually, I caught on and realized that the 'squeaky wheel gets the grease.' The first couple of years we didn't have a facility and we didn't have a locker room. It was because of the efforts of Pat Newman, our women's administrator, Ernie Hill at the Field House and Bill Bankhead, who ran the PMAC, that we had anything at all. These three people took care of gymnastics and took care of me. They did a great job of supporting us and providing for us, not because they had to but because they wanted love gymnastics."



**What is the best coaching advice you have ever received?**

"When I first started working here Gene Wettstone, the longtime gymnastics coach at Penn State, told me, 'You can know everything in the world about gymnastics and you can know everything you need to know, but the most important thing to know about your team is when to rest them.'"

**If you had to pick one single moment that meant the most to you in the last 29 years what would it be?**

"Nicki Arnstad's NCAA floor title was very special, but the most recent moment that comes to mind was the energy that I felt in Corvallis (Oregon at the 2006 NCAA Championships). April (Burkholder) had the opportunity to compete in the finals in four events and on her last event up she wins a national title. I thought, 'Yep. It was worth it.' Here was this athlete that at first could not get into LSU and people wouldn't even look at her, but she was a great gymnast and academically she worked harder than anybody I have ever seen work. She had to be tutored at 2 p.m. because that was the most optimal learning time for her, when her mind was the freshest and her body was the most rested. So that's when she studied. I think realizing that after four years she was going to graduate and that she had just won a national championship right there, the emotion was like, 'Okay, that is why we do it.' Also, having all three seniors earn All-America honors in their last competition."

**Is there one certain team you have coached that stands out as being particularly special in your mind?**

"I think the team that won the regional championship in New Hampshire (in 2005). They (the NCAA) sent us all the way up there and they went and won the regional championship. They were ranked No. 1 during the regular season. I don't know why we didn't make the Super Six that year. It (the NCAA Championship) was in Auburn and we should have been there. Maybe it didn't end right, but that whole process was right. I think that team was the most fun to be around and the most fun to be with because honestly, when you are winning and doing well, it's fun."

**What is your favorite LSU moment related to gymnastics?**

"I think being with Mary Lou Retton when we were on the football field (LSU vs. Florida, 2005) and gave her an honorary letter jacket. I think a lot of it was her, she just radiates this energy and you can't help but feel it. At that moment when I was standing with her in the football stadium and you could hear her name going up the stands, 'That's Mary Lou, that's Mary Lou,' and then she gets this giant ovation in Tiger Stadium when she puts that letter jacket on. I knew that was what it felt like to be with her in that Coliseum when she won that (Olympic) gold medal. It wasn't just about her athletic ability it was about that amazing 'people thing' that she has that makes people gravitate to her."

"Then I would have to say being with Nicki (Arnstad) when she won a national title and then to be with April at that press conference after she won her national title. The coach from Alabama, the coach from Georgia, the coach from UCLA and the coach from Utah were also on the podium with us. You had the five coaches that have been there the longest, have weathered the storm, fought all the battles, and here we were together. I think that was a really neat moment."

**What is your favorite LSU moment not related to gymnastics?**

"We had a party at my house when we won the national football championship. I think that the phone ringing, the people calling from all over the country and the excitement of the day and the whole energy was amazing. I live in a community with lots of LSU people and from my backyard you could hear the screams, hollers, fireworks, and cheering all over the neighborhood for LSU."

**As a coach what are you the most proud of?**

"Persistence. Just being able to hang in and win, when it was hard and when it was real hard. And to be willing to get out on a limb, do it and survive. I think I am proud of the consistency too, because consistency wins. This program has been consistent, it has been there every year and I think we'll continue to work to be there every year."

Long-time Southeastern Conference assistant Bob Moore begins his eighth season with the LSU gymnastics program. Moore's presence has been undeniable in the past seven years as he has helped the Tigers maintain their status as one of the nation's premier programs.

The Tigers' vaulting team has flourished under Moore's watch, recording 11 of the top 12 event scores in school history. Individually, Moore has also tutored his Tiger athletes to six All-America honors on the event, including most recently April Burkholder's first-team accolades in 2006.

Recognized for his exceptional work, Moore was named the NCAA Central Region Co-Assistant Coach of the Year by his peers in 2005.

Moore joined the LSU coaching staff in 2000 after a six-year stint at the University of Florida where he served as the program's top assistant. To his credit, Moore coached two national champions on the vault while at Florida, in addition to numerous All-Americans and SEC champions.

"Bob provides us with experience at the highest level, not only within the SEC, but the NCAA," said Breaux. "He knows exactly how tough this conference is and what it takes to take a program like ours that is an established top-10 team and bring it to the next level."

LSU is Moore's third stop within the SEC, as the 2007 season will be his 19th within the league. Prior to his tenure at Florida, Moore spent five seasons as an assistant at Auburn.

In addition to strengthening the Tigers on the vault and with their uneven bars routines, Moore plays a significant role with LSU's Bengal Gymnastics program, a highly successful youth age group program that practices in the Lady Tigers' gymnastics training facility.

A native of Birmingham, Ala., Moore graduated from Samford University in 1976 with a degree in general studies with an emphasis in music. He is married to the former Sandra Ballard.

Philip Ogletree begins his seventh season as an assistant coach with the LSU gymnastics program. In six years, Ogletree has proved to be a tremendous asset to the Tigers' program, working primarily with the athletes on the uneven bars.

Ogletree has guided LSU to nine of the top 11 bar scores in school history, including a school-record 49.650 in 2002. Individually, Ogletree's athletes have flourished under his watch, earning eight All-America honors on the bars, including a school record three athletes - April Burkholder, Annie Gagnon and Lisa Rennie - that earned the distinction in 2005.

In addition, Ogletree helped Sharene Mamby to a rare 10.00 on the bars during the 2001 season as it marked just the second perfect score on the event in school history.

For his efforts, Ogletree has been recognized by his peers on several occasions, as he was named the NCAA Central Region Assistant Coach of the Year in 2004 and then shared that same honor a year later with fellow assistant Bob Moore.

"Philip has done a tremendous job for us," said Breau. "He has been a great addition to our staff, both as a coach and as an administrator. Our team and staff blend well with Philip in the mix."

Ogletree came to LSU after spending the previous season at the Georgia Gymnastics Academy.

Ogletree arrived at LSU with 18 years of coaching experience, including 11 with Level 10 gymnasts in Georgia. While his stop at LSU was his first collegiate stop, he was no stranger to LSU athletics. During his time, he tutored future LSU greats Abbey Burns and Kim and Kerry Descalopoulos, all natives of Georgia, during a stint with the Atlanta School of Gymnastics.

During his time in the state of Georgia, he coached six Level 10 national champions on the floor exercise and helped place five athletes on the Junior Olympic Level 10 national team. Ogletree has also coached at the American Classic and U.S. Classic national meets.

From 1980-82, Ogletree was a gymnast at the University of Georgia. He later graduated from Georgia State with a bachelor of science degree in education in 1992.

Ogletree is married to the former Jill Hickok. The couple has two children, Bridget, 13, and Jake, 11.

## Burkholder Wins NCAA Beam Title

Senior April Burkholder capped an exceptional LSU career by earning a share of the national beam title at the 2006 NCAA Championships in Corvallis, Ore. The Houston native turned in a near flawless effort as she tallied a 9.9125 to tie Georgia's Courtney Kupets for the title in the Individual Event Finals. The national title was just the third by a LSU athlete in program history and the first since the 2002 season when Nicki Arnstad won the NCAA floor crown. Jeanie Beadle won LSU's first national beam title, claiming top honors at the AIAW National Championships in 1977.

## Tigers Finish Eighth at the NCAA Championships

LSU's presence among the nation's elite could not be denied as the Tiger squad recorded a top-10 national finish for the 18th time in program history, and the eighth time in the last nine years, after placing eighth at the NCAA Championships. LSU posted four event scores of 48.650 or better en route to a 195.650 team score.

## Five Tigers Earn All-America Honors

A school record-tying five Tiger athletes earned All-America honors at the 2006 NCAA Championships. LSU's senior class led the way as each of its three members -- April Burkholder, Terin Martinjak and Kelly Lea -- were recognized. Juniors Lisa Rennie and Kelly Phelan also earned All-America distinction. Burkholder led all Tigers, earning first-team recognition on each of the four events and in the all-around. Martinjak was a second-team selection on both the beam and floor and Lea earned second-team honors for her efforts on the uneven bars. Rennie and Phelan also picked up second-team honors as Rennie earned the accolade on the beam and Phelan was recognized on the floor.

## LSU Has Five Earn Academic All-America Honors

Just as impressive in the classroom as they were on the floor of competition, the Tigers had five of their student-athletes earn Academic All-America honors during the 2006 season, in Kristi Esposito, Lauren Klein, Kelly Lea, Amanda Morales and Kelly Phelan. The honor was the fourth straight for Lea, the third for Esposito, the second for Phelan and the first for both Klein and Morales.

## Burkholder Finishes Career as the Most Decorated Gymnast in LSU History

At the conclusion of her career, April Burkholder will go down in the LSU gymnastics annals as the most decorated athlete in the program's history. The Houston native earned a school-record 14 All-America honors, was a four-time All-SEC selection and capped her career by winning the 2006 NCAA beam title. Recognized for her numerous accomplishments throughout her career, she was twice named both the SEC and NCAA Central Region Gymnast of the Year (2004 and 2005) and was honored as the conference's Freshman of the Year in 2003.

## Burkholder Shatters All-America Titles Record

After earning five additional All-America accolades at the 2006 NCAA Championships, April Burkholder shot to the top of the LSU record books for All-America honors earned in a career, finishing out her four-year stint with 14 awards to her credit. Burkholder finished her career as a three-time All-American on the vault, beam, floor and in the all-around and a two-time honoree on the uneven bars.

## All-Around Honors for Everyone

LSU shared the all-around wealth in 2006 as three different Tigers won individual all-around titles during the course of the season. April Burkholder led the squad with seven all-around victories, while Kelly Phelan turned in three and Nicki Butler had one.

## Tigers Finish Second at the NCAA Central Regional Championships

The Tigers posted a 195.825 to finish second to Oklahoma (196.375) at the NCAA Central Regional Championships in Baton Rouge. By virtue of their top-two finish LSU advanced to the national championships for the fifth straight year and the 22nd time in program history.

## Phelan Wins NCAA Central Regional All-Around Title

Junior Kelly Phelan turned in one the finest performances of her career at the NCAA Central Regional Championships, winning a share of the all-around title with an impressive 39.400 effort. The Orlando, Fla., native also won the regional floor title outright (9.925) and finished second on the vault (9.875).



### LSU Finishes Among Top-12 in Individual Event Rankings

LSU finished the regular season ranked among the nation's top 12 on each of the four individual events. The Tigers came in at No. 4 on the floor (49.285), No. 9 on both the bars (49.050) and beam (49.005) and No. 11 on the vault (49.095).

### Phelan Earns Nation's No. 1 Floor Ranking

Kelly Phelan was the nation's top-ranked floor worker for two weeks during the 2006 regular season. The Orlando, Fla., native held down the country's No. 1 spot during the weeks of Feb. 27 and March 6 with a regional qualifying score of 9.910. Phelan finished the regular season ranked third nationally on the event. On the year, she posted 13 scores of 9.800 or better, including seven scores of 9.900 or higher.

### Tigers Finish Fourth at the SEC Championships

Behind four event scores of 48.875 or better, the Tigers tallied a 195.900 in finishing fourth at the SEC Championships in Birmingham, Ala. Georgia successfully defended their conference title, scoring a 197.275 to secure the team victory. Alabama (196.975) and Florida (196.275) picked up second and third-place finishes, while Auburn (194.975), Arkansas (194.650) and Kentucky (191.150) finished behind the Tigers.

### Burkholder Earns First-Team All-SEC Accolades

By virtue of a first-place finish on the beam at the SEC Championships senior April Burkholder became just the second athlete in LSU gymnastics history to earn all-conference honors in each of her four seasons, joining former LSU great Jennifer Wood, who did so from 1993-96. Burkholder earned second team honors in 2003 and first-team accolades in 2004, 2005 and 2006.

### Burkholder Claims SEC Beam Title

All-American April Burkholder turned in one the best beam performances of her career at the SEC Championships, winning the conference title with a season-high 9.925 effort. The SEC title, the first of Burkholder's career, marked the first for a LSU athlete since 1998 when Amy McClosky also won a conference championship on the beam.

### LSU Lands Eight on the SEC Academic Honor Roll

The Tigers had eight student-athletes honored by the SEC for their academic achievements over the course of the 2005-06 school year. Upperclassmen Kelly Lea, Lisa Rennie, Terin Martinjak and Kelly Phelan were named to the SEC's Winter Academic Honor Roll. Lea and Rennie were each recognized for the third straight season, while Martinjak and Phelan made the list for the second straight year. Freshmen Lauren Klein, Amanda Morales, Vanessa Rodriguez and Christina Suhr were all named to the conference's Freshman Academic Honor Roll.

### Burkholder Adds to Title Count

Entering the 2006 season, April Burkholder listed a team-best 59 individual event titles and 18 all-around crowns on her resume. The two-time SEC Gymnast of the Year only added to her title count in 2006, claiming seven all-around crowns and 24 individual event titles -- nine on the beam, six on the floor, five on the vault and four on the bars. She finished her career with a total of 82 individual event titles and 25 all-around crowns to her credit.

### Rennie Swings to Success

Junior Lisa Rennie was nothing short of exceptional for the Tigers on the bars in 2006. A two-time All-American in the event, Rennie finished the year with a team-best 9.825 season average on the event. She posted a season-high 9.925 in the Tigers' win over UCLA and notched a 9.875 on two separate occasions. In addition, Rennie won a team-best five bars titles in 2006, claiming victories against Iowa, Kentucky, Auburn, Centenary and UCLA.

### Ellis Vaults to a Pair of Event Titles

Sophomore Emily Ellis established herself as a force to be reckoned with in the Tigers' vault lineup. The Fayette, Ala., native averaged an impressive 9.822 and posted scores of 9.775 or higher on 13 of her 14 vaults, including a career-high 9.950 against Alabama. Ellis also won two meet titles on the event, picking up back-to-back victories against Centenary (9.825) and Alabama (9.950).

### Butler Wins Three Vault Titles

Junior Nicki Butler was known for her stellar contributions on the vault in each of her first two seasons as she earned top 25 national rankings and

won seven individual titles. Butler continued that pace in 2006, picking up more three vault titles - at TWU (9.850); vs. Kentucky (9.900); and vs. Oklahoma (9.950). She finished the year with Tigers' second-best season average on the event (9.835) and did not score below a 9.775 all year.

### Martinjak Perfects the Balancing Act

Senior Terin Martinjak was a rock in the Tigers' beam lineup in 2006. A two-time All-American on the event, she finished the season with a team-best 9.802 average and scored a LSU season-best 9.925 in winning the individual event title against Georgia. Martinjak won a total of three beam titles over the course of the season, bringing her career total on the event to six.

### Burkholder Earns SEC Gymnast of the Week Honors

Twice during the 2006 season senior April Burkholder was honored by the conference office as the SEC's Gymnast of the Week. She was first recognized during the week of Jan. 10 after she won the beam, floor and all-around titles at the season-opening Super Six Challenge. She was later honored during the week of March 21 after claiming the vault, bars, floor and all-around titles in the Tigers' win over UCLA on Senior Night. Burkholder was recognized as the SEC Gymnast of the Week a total of eight times during her career.

### Butler Wins First Career All-Around Title

Junior Nicki Butler captured the first all-around title of her career in the Tigers' win over Iowa. The Virginia Beach, Va., native posted four scores of 9.550 or better to finish with a 38.875.

### Gymnasts Post Best GPA Among Women's Sports at LSU

The Tigers hard work during the fall semester not only benefited them on the floor of competition, but it also paid dividends in the classroom as the Tigers recorded the highest grade point average among all women's sports at LSU during the fall semester. The 14-member Tiger squad averaged a 3.21 GPA with 11 student-athletes earning 3.0s or better. Junior Kelly Phelan and freshman Lauren Klein led all Tigers with perfect 4.0 GPAs, while four others notched GPAs of 3.5 or higher.

## Burkholder Wins National Beam Title to Cap Career

CORVALLIS, Ore. -- Senior April Burkholder wrapped up an exceptional career for the LSU gymnastics team Saturday evening at the NCAA Championships, winning a share of the national beam title and posting a trio of top-eight finishes during the Individual Events Finals at Oregon State's Gill Coliseum.

Burkholder's beam routine was nearly flawless as she notched a 9.9125 to tie with Georgia's Courtney Kupets for top honors.

The individual national title marks the first for Burkholder and just the third in LSU school history as Nicki Arnstad won the NCAA floor title in 2002 and Jeanie Beadle won the AIAW beam championship in 1977.

"I couldn't have asked for a better way to go out," said Burkholder. "I just wanted to come in tonight, have fun and hit all my routines and I am happy I was able to do that."

"April is the kind of athlete that puts you in position to win events," said Breaux. "She has done that and carried this team for the last four years, but tonight it was about her. I just kept telling her, 'This one's for you.'"

Burkholder opened the evening on the vault. Having to compete two different vaults in the finals, the Houston native scored a 9.8125 on her first attempt, a yurchenko with a half twist. She then added a 9.8250 on a yurchenko with a full twist to finish with a 9.8188 average.

The score was good enough for a sixth-place finish, the third top-six national finish on the event of her career.

Burkholder then added a 9.8375 on the floor to finish in a tie for eighth with Florida's Corey Hartung. The finish is the best of her career on the event as the 14-time All-American finished 13th at last year's championships.

Competing in the bars final for the first time in her career, Burkholder finished off her meet with another eighth-place finish after notching a 9.750.

"To place in all four events and be a national champion in one is something very few people have ever done," said LSU head coach D.D. Breaux. "She's had great national championships before but never finished first so I think tonight was a little about unfinished business."

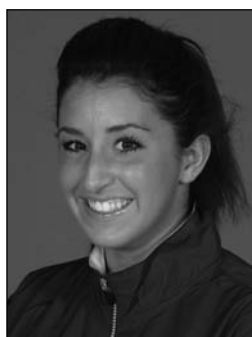
