They followed that up with a 196.350 in the finals, good enough for fifth place in the country – LSU's highest finish since the current format was implemented in 1993. Three Tigers earned All-American honors in 2008 – Susan Jackson in the all-around, vault, beam and floor; Ashleigh Clare-Kearney on bars and floor; and Summer Hubbard on bars. Additionally Jackson capped the championships by winning the NCAA Vault National Championship – LSU's first national champion on that event and the fourth for the program.

The Tigers compete in the nationally renowned Pete Maravich Assembly Center. Our gymnasts train in one of the nation's best facilities as well.

The LSU gymnastics team moved into the newly renovated training area in the LSU Field House in the fall of 2000. Located in the midst of the LSU's state-of-the-art athletics complexes, the gymnastics facility includes a locker room, squad room, and 18,143 square feet of training space. There is an equipment room, sauna, sound room and conditioning/aerobic room. Large glass windows allow onlookers to view the Bernie Moore Track Stadium, legendary Tiger Stadium, the Pete Maravich Assembly Center and the beautiful landscaping of the LSU campus.

Pete Maravich ASSEMBLY CENTER

Paramount to the success of an intercollegiate program is a first-class facility and the Tigers have just that in the Pete Maravich Assembly Center.

For over a quarter century the "PMAC" has been home to some of the finest gymnastics competitions in the nation. The PMAC has served as the host site for three SEC Championships and eight NCAA Regional Championships and is scheduled to host the 2008 NCAA Central Regional Championships on April 12.

Seating 13,215 spectators, the massive \$11.5 million building has competed with neighboring Tiger Stadium as the most

visible structure on the LSU campus since its completion in 1971.

Originally named, "The Assembly Center," in 1988 Louisiana Governor Buddy Roemer signed legislation changing the official name of the building to the Pete Maravich Assembly Center in honor of the former LSU basketball legend who had died earlier that same year.

The PMAC also serves as home to both the LSU men's and women's basketball teams, as well as the volleyball program.

In addition to the normal seating configuration, a proscenium stage can be lowered into place at the north end allowing some 4,500 seats for theatrical

productions. An additional 1,000 seats can be placed on the floor for graduations, convocations, lectures, concerts or other special events.

Several renovations have recently been completed to keep the PMAC as one of the top facilities in the Southeastern Conference. A new multi-million dollar scoreboard/video replay system was installed in November 1999, the upper concourse was remodeled to include exhibits, displays and interactive kiosks documenting LSU sports history in the PMAC in 2004 and new seating was installed in 2006.

Rehabilitation

Graduate assistant athletic trainers monitor the health of LSU gymnasts in rehabilitation rooms.

LSU boasts the largest and most complete athletic training facilities in all of collegiate athletics with both the Operations Center and the Broussard Center for Athletic Training in Tiger Stadium. Both are furnished with the latest in technology and equipment. The Operations Center training room features a full view of the practice fields, two hot/cold jacuzzis and an underwater treadmill. The Broussard Center includes an on-site x-ray room, an in-house pharmacy, as well as the largest hydrotherapy pool in both collegiate and professional sports and is one of the few collegiate training centers with a full-service pharmacy and a full-service vision center.

An integral part of rehabbing and developing LSU student-athletes is the operations center's hot/cold jacuzzis and underwater treadmill in a fully equipped Hydrotherapy room.

Broussard Athletic TRAINING CENTER



The two story, 22,000 square foot facility contains 20 treatment tables with the newest forms of modalities available, 14 taping stations, a 1,600 square foot rehabilitation area which contains the latest rehabilitation equipment including the Cybex Norm, Woodway treadmills and Body Master select rise equipment. LSU's multi-million dollar athletic training facility is named in honor of Dr. Martin J. Broussard (left), the legendary trainer whose career spanned over 40 years at LSU.





Strength & CONDITIONING

Strength and conditioning can be the heart and soul of an athletic program's success, and LSU has taken great strides to improve its strength program and facilities. LSU student-athletes enjoy one of the finest strength and conditioning facilities in the nation with a 10,000-square foot weight room located on the North side of Tiger Stadium. Bo Campbell Auditorium

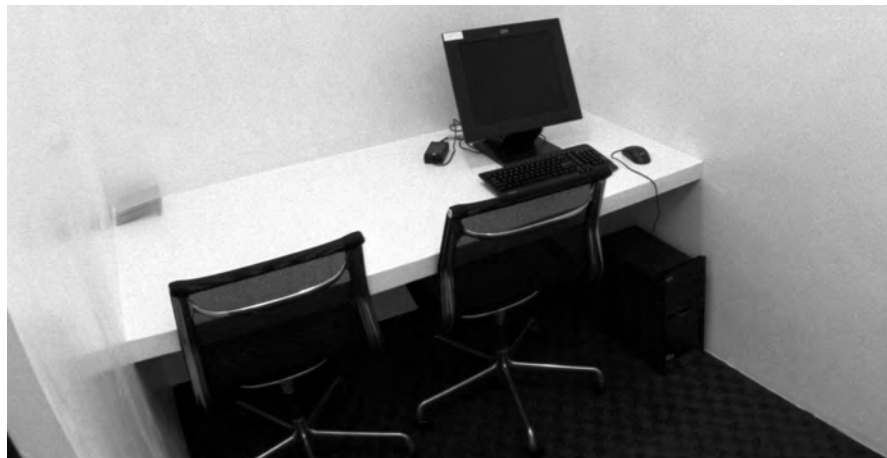

Mike THE TIGER

History of Mike

Few mascots in the country are as admired as Mike the Tiger. LSU's live Bengal mascot serves as the graphic image of all LSU athletic teams. The school has had six mascots, with the most recent, Mike VI, taking over the reign prior to the 2007 national championship football season. LSU veterinarian Dr. David Baker began the search for the young tiger after his predecessor, Mike V, died in May 2007 of renal failure at the age of 17. The two-year-old Bengal/Siberian mix, formerly known as "Roscoe," was donated to LSU by Great Cats of Idaville, Ind., a nonprofit sanctuary and rescue facility for big cats and other large carnivores.

Mike's ride through Tiger Stadium before home games in a cage topped by the LSU cheerleaders is a school tradition. Before entering the stadium, his cage on wheels is parked next to the opponent's locker room in the southeast end of the stadium. Opposing players must make their way past Mike's cage to reach their locker room.

Tradition dictates that the Tigers will score a touchdown for every growl issued by Mike before a football game. For many years, Mike was prompted to roar by pounding on the cage. Objections of cruel punishment brought about the use of recorded growls to play to the crowd before the

games. That practice was discontinued shortly afterward and today Mike participates in the pregame tradition without provocation.

In the mid-1980's, pranksters cut the locks on Mike IV's cage and freed him in the early-morning hours just days before the annual LSU-Tulane clash. Mike roamed free, playfully knocking down several small pine trees in the area, before being trapped in the Bernie Moore Track Stadium where police used tranquilizer guns to capture and return the Bengal Tiger to his home.

The incident was reminiscent of a kidnapping of Mike I many years ago by Tulane students before a Tiger-Green Wave battle.

1936-1956

Mike I

The original Mike was purchased from the Little Rock Zoo in 1936 for \$750, with money contributed by the student body. Originally known as "Sheik" at the time of his purchase, his name was changed to Mike to honor Mike Chambers who served as LSU's athletic trainer when the first mascot was purchased. The first Mike was housed in the Baton Rouge Zoo for one year before a permanent home was constructed near Tiger Stadium. Mike I reigned for 20 years before dying of pneumonia.



Mike's Habitat

In 2005, a new environment (above) was created for Mike that is 15,000 square feet in size with lush planting, a large live oak tree, a beautiful waterfall and a stream evolving from a rocky backdrop overflowing with plants and trees. The habitat has, as a backdrop, an Italianate tower - a campanile - that creates a visual bridge to the Italianate architectural vernacular that is the underpinning of the image of the entire beautiful LSU campus. This spectacular new habitat features state-of-the-art technologies, research, conservation and husbandry programs, as well as educational, interpretive and recreational activities. It is, in essence, one of the largest and finest Tiger habitats in the United States.



Championship Cat

During his tenure, Mike V reigned over a football national championship, five baseball national championships and a remarkable 23 track and field championships.



1956-1958

Mike II

The second Mike served a brief reign, lasting only through the 1957 season before dying of pneumonia in the spring of 1958. He was born at the Audubon Zoo in New Orleans and came to LSU on Sept. 28, 1956. The young tiger was held overnight in Tiger Stadium and unveiled Sept. 29, the opening day of the football season.



1958-1976

Mike III

Just in time for the 1958 national championship season, Mike III was purchased from the Woodland Park Zoo in Seattle, Wash., following a "national search" by then-athletic director Jim Corbett. The student body contributed \$1,500 for the purchase of the tiger. Mike III served as mascot for 18 seasons, dying after the only losing season of his reign, as LSU posted a 5-6 record in 1975.



1976-1990

Mike IV

Mike IV reigned over Tiger athletics for 14 years after being donated to the school by August A. Busch III from the Dark Continent Amusement Park in Tampa, Fla. on Aug. 29, 1976. Born on May 15, 1974, Mike's age and health were determining factors in his retirement to the Baton Rouge Zoo in 1990. Mike IV died of old age in March of 1995 at the age of 21.



1990-2007

Mike V

Mike V was donated by Dr. Thomas and Caroline Atchison of the Animal House Zoological Park in Moulton, Ala. Dr. Sheldon Bivin of the LSU School of Veterinary Medicine traveled to Alabama and brought the baby tiger back to Baton Rouge. Born Oct. 18, 1989, the new tiger was introduced to LSU fans at a basketball game against Alabama in February of 1990. He officially began his reign on April 30, 1990, when he was moved into the tiger habitat across from Tiger Stadium. Mike V died on May 18, 2007, at the age of 17.



2007-

Mike VI

Mike VI arrived in Baton Rouge on Aug. 25, 2007, thanks to the donation by Great Cats of Idaville, Ind. He was officially designated as the successor to Mike V on Sept. 8, when LSU played host to Virginia Tech. Six days later, on Sept. 14, 2007, a ceremony was held to honor Mike V and dedicate the habitat to Mike VI. The two-year-old Bengal/Siberian mix, formerly known as "Roscoe," reigned over a football national title in his first year.

LSU GREATS

The five individuals on this page are the only men to have their jerseys retired by LSU. Basketball has retired the No. 23 for Pete Maravich, No. 50 for Bob Pettit, Jr., and No. 33 for Shaquille O'Neal. Football's only retired jersey is the No. 20 worn by Billy Cannon, while baseball retired the No. 15 in honor of longtime coach and athletics director emeritus Skip Bertman.

Bob Pettit

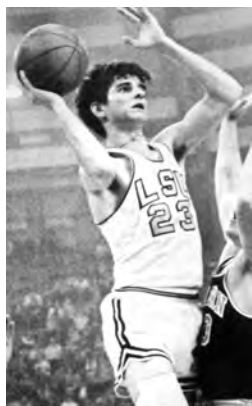
Pettit led LSU to its first NCAA Final Four in 1953 and he later became the first player in NBA history to exceed the 20,000-plus point barrier. Pettit is a member of the NBA Hall of Fame, and in 1997, he was named as one of the top 50 players in NBA history.

Billy Cannon

One of the true legends of college football in the South, Cannon was the 1959 Heisman Trophy winner and helped the Tigers to the 1958 national title. Cannon's most memorable performance came in 1959 against Ole Miss when No. 1 LSU trailed No. 3 Ole Miss 3-0 in the fourth quarter. He fielded a punt, broke seven tackles and returned it 89 yards for the 7-3 victory. He went on to a successful 11-year professional career.

Pete Maravich

"Pistol Pete," Maravich still holds the NCAA record for career points with 3,667 and for career scoring average with 44.2 points a game. He was selected the National Player of the Year in 1970 after leading the Tigers to the NIT Final Four. He scored 50-plus points an amazing 28 times. He went on to a 10-year professional career and was selected as one of the NBA's 50 greatest players in 1997.

Shaquille O'Neal

O'Neal was the first pick in the 1992 NBA Draft. He was named MVP of the league in 2000 and was a three-time NBA Finals MVP after leading the Los Angeles Lakers to three World Championships. At LSU, O'Neal averaged 21.6 points and 13.6 rebounds for his career, and in 1991, he was named the World's Amateur Athlete of the Year as well as SEC Athlete of the Year and National Player of the Year. In 1997, he was named as one of the top 50 players in NBA history.

Skip Bertman

A legend in the college baseball ranks, Bertman created a dynasty at LSU, guiding the Tigers to five national titles in a 10-year stretch from 1991-2000. He also coached the United States to a bronze medal at the 1996 Olympics in Atlanta and was an assistant on the gold medal-winning U.S. squad in Seoul, Korea, in 1988. Bertman retired from coaching following the 2001 season and is the LSU athletics director emeritus. Bertman was inducted into the College Baseball Hall of Fame in 2006.

LSU's success in each of its 20 sports is evident with this outstanding list of former Tigers.



Seimone Augustus

Augustus was the two-time NCAA National Player of the Year, receiving the Wade Trophy, the Naismith and the Wooden Awards as a junior and a senior. Augustus helped lead the Lady Tigers to three-straight Final Fours. She was the No. 1 pick in the 2006 WNBA Draft, and she is a 2008 U.S. Olympian.



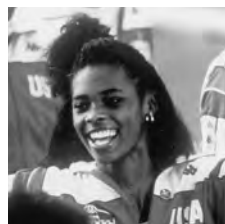
Sylvia Fowles

A three-time All-American, Fowles was a member of Final Four teams all four years of her career. She was the 2008 SEC Player of the Year and the league's all-time leading rebounder. Fowles was the second pick of the 2008 WNBA Draft and a 2008 U.S. Olympian.



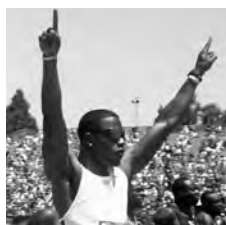
April Burkholder

The 2006 NCAA beam co-national champion, Burkholder finished her career with 14 All-America honors and four All-SEC selections. In addition, she was named the NCAA Central Region Gymnast of the year twice, the SEC Gymnast of the Year on two occasions, and she was also the conference's Freshman of the Year in 2003.



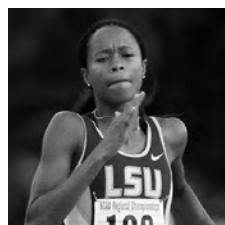
Esther Jones

A 21-time All-American while at LSU, Jones won a gold medal as a member of the United States' 4x100-meter relay team at the 1992 Olympic Games in Barcelona.



Xavier Carter

Carter won a school record-tying seven NCAA titles on the track and earned a total of 10 All-America honors. He became just the second athlete to win four titles at one national meet, joining Jesse Owens. He holds four individual school records and anchored LSU's 4x400-meter relay teams to two school records.



Muna Lee

The most decorated track and field athlete in school history, Lee won 20 All-America awards and a school record seven national titles while helping the Lady Tigers to five NCAA team championships. A two-time Olympian, Lee is the 2008 U.S. Outdoor Champion in the 100-meter dash.



Glen Davis

A 2006 first-team All-American and SEC Player of the Year, Davis helped lead LSU to its first Final Four appearance since 1986. In 2007, Davis was selected by Seattle in the NBA Draft before being traded to Boston. He was a vital member of the Celtics world championship team in his first professional season.



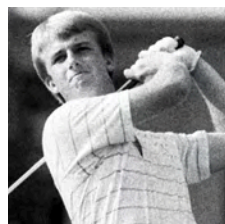
Ben McDonald

McDonald was named the Golden Spikes National Player of the Year in 1989, and he was later the first player chosen in the Major League Baseball Draft by the Baltimore Orioles. In 2008, he was inducted into the College Baseball Hall of Fame.



Walter Davis

A two-time Olympian and World Champion, Davis helped LSU to national titles in 2001 and 2002. The SEC Male Athlete of the Year in 2002, he won six NCAA titles and earned a school-record nine All-America honors.



David Toms

The two-time SEC Player of the Year, Toms has gone on to a successful career on the PGA Tour. Among his PGA Tour victories was a thrilling win at the PGA Championship in August of 2001.



Meredith Duncan

The nation's top collegiate golfer in 2002, Duncan left LSU as the school's best female golfer. She earned first-team All-America honors as a senior in 2002 and won the United States Women's Amateur Championship in 2001.



Todd Walker

Walker capped his LSU career as the SEC's all-time leader in hits, runs, RBIs, and total bases. Walker, who is a member of the All-Time College World Series Team, led LSU to the national title in 1993. Walker went on to a successful Major League career for 11 seasons.



Shaquille O'Neal

Four-time NBA champion, including the 2006 title with Miami, Shaquille O'Neal, the 2000 NBA MVP, joined the long list of prominent LSU alumni when he earned his degree in general studies in December 2000.



Seimone Augustus

Augustus received her degree in 2005 after just three years at LSU and while earning NCAA Women's Basketball National Player of the Year honors twice. She was the first pick of the 2006 WNBA Draft by the Minnesota Lynx and a 2008 U.S. Olympian.

Named the first Director of U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) for the Department of Homeland Security in 2003, Aguirre, Jr., was appointed the U.S. Ambassador to Spain in 2005.



Dr. James Andrews

A world-renowned orthopedic surgeon, Andrews is a 1963 graduate of LSU and a 1967 graduate of LSU Medical School. While at LSU, Andrews won the SEC indoor and outdoor titles in the pole vault.



Lod Cook

Cook graduated from LSU with a bachelor's degree in mathematics in 1955 and then earned his Master's degree in petro engineering in 1955. Cook served as CEO of ARCO for nine years.



Kevin Faulk

Excelled in both the classroom and on the playing field as he graduated in just three years. Faulk is currently a member of the three-time Super Bowl champion New England Patriots.



Carlos Roberto Flores

The president of Honduras from 1997-2001, Flores helped the nation recover after Hurricane Mitch devastated the country in 1998. Flores is married to the former Mary Carol Flake, also an alumnus of LSU.



Jim Flores

Flores graduated with two bachelor's of science degrees; one in corporate finance in 1981 and the second in petroleum land management in 1982. Flores is currently Chairman, President and CEO of Plains Exploration & Production Company.

The former president of the NFL's Miami Dolphins franchise, the 37-year veteran of the NFL is currently a Trustee of the Bert Bell/Pete Rozelle Retirement and Disability Plan.

James Carville

Carville received both a bachelor's degree and law degree from LSU and gained fame in the 1990s as the chief campaign strategist for Bill Clinton and Al Gore. Carville also penned a best-selling memoir titled "All's Fair: Love, War and Running for President".



Dr. John V. Lombardi

President, Louisiana State University System



Dr. John V. Lombardi is the fifth individual to serve as the President of the Louisiana State University System. As its Chief Executive Officer, Dr. Lombardi oversees 11 institutions, including five academic campuses, as well as 10 public hospitals located throughout the state. He is also a Professor of History at Louisiana State University and Agricultural and Mechanical College.

Dr. Lombardi was born in Los Angeles, California and attended Pomona College where he earned his bachelor's degree. He received his M.A. and Ph.D. degrees in history from Columbia University. He joined the faculty in the Department of History at Indiana University, where he later served as Dean of International Programs and Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences. In 1987, he became Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs at the Johns Hopkins University. From 1990-1999, Dr. Lombardi was President of the University of Florida. Prior to his appointment as President of the LSU System, he served as Chancellor of the University of Massachusetts Amherst.

He is a Latin American historian, with a special interest in Venezuela. Dr. Lombardi is also one of the country's foremost authorities in higher education, serving as Co-Editor of The Top American Research Universities. He is the author of numerous professional publications, and along with his wife, Cathryn, co-authored a teaching atlas on Latin American History. He has taught courses in history, intercollegiate sports, and university management.

Dr. Michael V. Martin

Chancellor, LSU



Dr. Michael V. Martin was approved as the eighth chancellor of LSU by the Board of Supervisors on June 5, 2008. Dr. Martin, formerly the president of New Mexico State University, had served at NMSU since 2004.

In his time at NMSU he was praised for his reorganization of the university's athletic department and physical plant, as well as his fundraising prowess. A 1969 graduate of Mankato State College, Dr. Martin received a Ph.D. in applied economics from the University of Minnesota in 1977 and has since worked in both academic and administrative capacities at universities such as Minnesota, Oregon State University and the University of Florida.

An agricultural economist, Dr. Martin is considered an expert on land-grant universities.

Dr. Martin became president of New Mexico State University on July 1, 2004. An academic leader dedicated to the land-grant mission of teaching, research and extension service, he was awarded the 2008 Distinguished Leadership Award by Leadership New Mexico. Dr. Martin was recognized as a strong voice for education and the agriculture industry in New Mexico. The Leadership New Mexico Distinguished Leadership Award recognizes an individual who has used his/her leadership abilities to improve the quality of life for New Mexico citizens and future generations.

Dr. Martin also was named the recipient of the Justin Smith Morrill Memorial Award in 2007. This national award, named after the author of the bill creating land-grant universities, honors and recognizes outstanding service on behalf of the land-grant mission. Only six individuals have been designated to receive this award since it was first given in 1980.

Dr. Martin established at NMSU the One University concept and called for a five-year plan titled "Living the Vision" to take the university to "the next level." He laid the groundwork for university wide extension and created the J. Paul Taylor Social Justice Symposium.

During his tenure at NMSU, the first capital campaign was established with a goal of raising \$150 million by 2010. The campaign met its goal in the first half of the seven-year fundraising plan. Dr. Martin also oversaw the establishment of a system of research clusters that revolve around five areas in which NMSU scientists and researchers have expertise: 21st century aerospace, information sciences, bioscience, southwest border issues, and natural resources.

Dr. Martin was a recognized leader in New Mexico, being named a powerbroker by the New Mexico Business Weekly in 2006. He continues to be active as a scholar and has written numerous book chapters and articles for academic journals, trade publications and the popular press. He recently has published pieces for The Chronicle of Higher Education and University Business. Named the Outstanding Alumnus of Minnesota State University Mankato in 2006, Dr. Martin

also received the NMSU Social Justice Award in 2005.

Before arriving at NMSU, he served for six years as vice president for agriculture and natural resources at the University of Florida, leading the university's Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences with more than 3,000 employees statewide. He was elevated to senior vice president of the University of Florida shortly before being selected as NMSU's president.

Previously, he was vice president for agricultural policy and the dean of the College of Agricultural, Food and Environmental Sciences at the University of Minnesota. He began his academic career at Oregon State University as a faculty member in the Department of Agricultural and Resource Economics.

A native of Crosby, Minn., Dr. Martin completed a bachelor's degree in business and economics and a master's degree in economics at Mankato State College (Minnesota State University) in Minnesota. He received his Ph.D. in applied economics from the University of Minnesota in 1977. His areas of specialization are marketing, prices, international trade, public policy, transportation and business logistics.

Some of his philosophy is summed up in the following quote: "It is the tradition of land-grant universities to be non-traditional," written as part of a 2001 article titled "The Land-Grant University in the 21st Century," published in the Journal of Agricultural and Applied Economics. He traced the history of the land-grant movement from the mid-1800s and concluded that "the fundamental land-grant principles of accessibility, practical as well as classical education, research and discovery in the public interest, and connectedness to all the people remain powerful and profound."

He has been active in professional and community service organizations, including the Farm Foundation's Bennett Agricultural Round Table, the National Agricultural Biotechnology Council and the Florida Agricultural Resource Mobilization Foundation. He is a member of the American Economic Association, the American Agricultural Economics Association, the International Association of Agricultural Economics, the International Agricultural Trade Research Consortium, the Sigma XI Scientific Research Society and the Economic History Association.

Dr. Martin and his wife Jan have two children, both adopted from South Korea. Amanda, a graduate of the University of Wisconsin-Eau Claire, is a graphic artist in Saint Paul, Minn. Sam, with a bachelor's degree from the University of Minnesota and a master's from Sarah Lawrence College, is a genetics counselor at Beth Israel Hospital in New York City.



Dydia DeLyser

Faculty Athletics Representative

Dydia DeLyser, an associate professor in the Department of Geography and Anthropology, serves in her second year as LSU's Faculty Athletics Representative.

DeLyser, a native of Santa Monica, Calif., earned her bachelor's degree in 1992 from UCLA, and her master's and doctoral degrees from Syracuse University (in 1996 and 1998).

DeLyser arrived at LSU in August 1998 as an Instructor before becoming an assistant professor one year later. She was promoted to associate professor with tenure in August 2005.

DeLyser is a cultural-historical geographer. Her research has been both ethnographic and historical, and most of it questions how different built landscapes can help make the past meaningful in the present.

Much of her published research has focused on two different studies. One was a many-year ethnographic study of a ghost town in California (Bodie State Historic Park) where she examined how images and ideas about the American mythic West became meaningful

to the tourists who visited the town. The second was an historical study that examined a 19th century novel (Ramona) and how it changed the way people understood (and still understand) southern California's past.

Her current research concerns early women aviators and how they used their practices of flying to advance feminism in the post-suffrage era.

DeLyser teaches graduate courses in cultural geography, qualitative research, and academic and professional writing. She has also taught undergraduate courses in cultural, and urban geography, and an introductory world-regional geography course.

DeLyser is a first-generation American -- her parents were Dutch immigrants and English is her second language. She also has language abilities in Russian and Spanish.

DeLyser's hobbies include driving/riding antique cars and motorcycles. She is also a licensed pilot and co-owns a Citabria, which is a two-place aerobatic airplane.



Joe Alleva

LSU Director of Athletics



Joe Alleva officially became the Director of Athletics at LSU on July 1, 2008, after spending the last ten years in the same position at the prestigious Duke University. Under Alleva's direction, the Duke athletic department experienced unprecedented growth and success.

"Joe Alleva brings a wealth of experience and accomplishment to LSU," said President John Lombardi. "I'm confident we've found a new leader for LSU athletics who exemplifies the vision and integrity needed to lead our sports programs to new heights, a champion of student athletes who believes in the highest standards of competition both on the field and in the classroom."

At LSU, Alleva is responsible for the administration and direction of the Tiger athletic program, which has a current annual budget of approximately \$70 million, includes 20 teams and more than 400 student-athletes.

At Duke, Alleva oversaw more than 190 staff members, a \$50 million budget, 26 sports and over 600 student-athletes. Duke athletics flourished under Alleva's direction.

Alleva, 55, has built his professional career on service to student-athletes and the commitment to individual development in athletics, academics and community service. Alleva is well-respected for sustaining high standards of excellence and integrity in the athletics program, the quality of coaches he has hired, and the high level of success that was achieved across athletic programs at Duke under his leadership.

Alleva's tenure as AD at Duke propelled the university into the ranks of America's top all-around collegiate programs. The Blue Devils consistently finished high in the annual Directors' Cup standings, ranking as high as fifth in 2005. Prior to 1998-99, Alleva's first full year as director of athletics, Duke had never placed higher than 21st in the Directors' Cup standings. Since then, Duke has enjoyed seven top 20 finishes, including five in succession (2004-08).

In the 2006 National Collegiate Scouting Association Power Rankings, that combine a school's Directors' Cup finish, its athletic graduation rates and its academic ranking in U.S. News and World Report, Duke was the top-ranked Division I school in the nation. Duke also finished first in this listing in 2005 and second in 2004.

Alleva's outstanding list of accomplishments includes Duke winning more ACC and NCAA championships than in any other 10-year period in school history. Six Duke teams won national championships under Alleva's leadership and 46 Blue Devil teams recorded ACC championships, the second-highest total among ACC schools since 1997-98.

Under Alleva's commitment to education, Duke's graduation rates continued to rank among the best in the nation. Duke regularly led the ACC in Academic Honor Roll honorees as Alleva increased the financial commitment to academic support by ten-fold during his tenure as AD.

While continuing to excel in competition and in the classroom, Alleva instituted a number of innovative community service programs for Duke student-athletes to benefit the community. Duke student-athletes regularly volunteered nearly 3,000 hours in community outreach.

Fundraising under Alleva's guidance reached extensive heights during his career at Duke. Alleva and his fundraising team generated more than \$173 million in gifts and funded more than \$85 million in new facilities or renovations. Annual giving to the Iron Dukes increased 50 percent since the year 2000.

New facilities built under Alleva's supervision include the Michael W. Krzyzewski Center Dedicated to Athletic and Academic Excellence, Yoh Football Center, Sheffield Tennis Center, Schwartz-Butters Athletic Center, Ambler Tennis Stadium, Karcher-Ingram Golf Center, Rod Myers Teaching Center, the

Skandalaris Fieldhouse at Koskinen Stadium and the fieldhouse at Williams Field. Facility upgrades were made to Cameron Indoor Stadium, Wallace Wade Stadium, Jack Coombs Stadium, Koskinen Stadium, Williams Field, Murray Athletic Building, and Brooks Field at the football practice facility.

Alleva is active on the national collegiate athletics scene, having served on the Football Bowl Certification Committee. He sat on several Atlantic Coast Conference committees and served on the NCAA Division I Championships/Competition Cabinet.

Alleva majored in Finance at Lehigh University and received his bachelor's degree in 1975. While at Lehigh, Alleva was the quarterback of the football team and team captain in 1974. Alleva also played on the Lehigh baseball team. He served as a graduate assistant football coach and earned an MBA in 1976.

Alleva began his career at Duke working for the vice president of business and finance in 1976 and joined the Duke athletic department in 1980, as director of finance. He became the assistant director of athletics in 1986 and was soon promoted in 1987 to associate director, before his tenure as

Director of Athletics in 1998.

He played a key role in Durham's community sports scene. He started Little League Baseball in Durham over 20 years ago, and also began the American Legion baseball program

Alleva is a member of the North Carolina American Legion Hall of Fame, Suffern High School Hall of Fame and the Rockland County Hall of Fame.

Alleva and his wife, Annie, have two sons, J.D. and Jeff, along with a daughter, Jenny. J.D. played baseball at Duke and was picked in the 24th-round of the 2001 Major League Baseball Amateur Draft by the Kansas City Royals and is now a professional scout for the Houston Astros. Jeff finished his baseball career at Duke in 2003 and signed a free agent contract with the Royals following his senior season. He recently graduated with his MBA from the prestigious Fuqua School of Business at Duke. Jenny, a four-year letterwinner on Duke's women's soccer team, attends law school at the University of North Carolina.

As the Tigers gear up for another season, head coach D-D Breaux says she sees a confidence in this year's team that she has not seen in previous teams.

- The reason for this confidence? - In 2008, LSU finally broke through at the NCAA Championships and advanced to the Super Six finals for the first time in program history. The Tigers went on to finish fifth overall. This success has carried over to fall practices and inspires a higher level of intensity. "I think our team definitely has a better understanding of the process and what it takes to get where we want to at the end of the season," Breaux said. "The leaders on this team have a real grasp of what they need to do and we'll need them to use that knowledge and confidence to push us this season."

Obvious leaders on this year's team will be senior Ashleigh Clare-Kearney and junior Susan Jackson. The former is the reigning SEC Gymnast of the Year and SEC All-Around Champion. The latter won LSU's first individual NCAA Championship on vault a year ago. They combine for seven All-American honors and have both won individual SEC crowns.

Following the graduation of Senior All American Kristi Esposito, the Tigers will need strong performances from other stand outs like senior Lauren Klein and junior Sabrina Franceschelli. "Lauren is dealing with an ankle injury from last year that has hampered her progress" Breaux explained. "Over the last three years we have focused on skill development. Each year Lauren has become a stronger competitor with our goal being that she competes in the All-Around for her senior year. Sabrina has come in this fall and has been training at an incredible level. She's a junior now and I think she has developed the maturity we need for her to step in and be a leader." Breaux expects Klein and Franceschelli to join Clare-Kearney and Jackson in the All-Around mix.

Clare-Kearney and Klein are the team's only seniors. All-American Summer Hubbard joins Jackson, Franceschelli, and

Kayla Rogers in the junior class while Samantha Engle, Staci Schwitkis, Nicole Lyons and Paige Cipolloni comprise the returning sophomores. Newcomers include freshmen Gloria Johnson, a local product out of Elite Gymnastics in Baton Rouge, and sophomore Kirette Viens, a transfer from George Washington.

The Tigers have several injuries they are looking to overcome, including ankle surgeries for Klein and Lyons. Hubbard, who suffered with back injuries last season, must continue to work on keeping her back healthy.

LSU's regular season schedule is once again a very tough one and features three of the five other Super Six teams. The Tigers will face all three of those SEC opponents again in the SEC Championships in March. They open on the road in the Cancun Classic and then at Iowa, and the first home meet features four-time-defending NCAA Champion Georgia. Road meets at Kentucky and Auburn precede a home meet with Florida and a road clash at Alabama – both Super Six teams a year ago.

The Tigers play host to a non-conference tri-meet before closing out regular-season SEC competition with a home meet against Arkansas. They finish up the regular season with the Etta James Memorial Meet in Baton Rouge followed by a trip to Centenary. "Any time you compete against teams in the SEC you're facing off against teams in the top 10 and teams who have won or vied for national championships," Breaux said. "It's arguably the best gymnastics conference in the country. Having teams like Georgia and Florida competing here will provide a great atmosphere and I expect to have a great home environment all season long."

This year's SEC Championships will be held in the Sommet Center in Nashville, Tenn., and should the Tigers qualify, their journey to the NCAA Championship would take them to Lincoln, Nebraska.

"I'm excited to see if this team that did such a good job last year can put it together, can respond to what we're giving them in practice, and come together as a team to repeat and exceed what they did last year," Breaux said. "I'm excited to see if we can build on that."

The Tigers, who finished ranked second in vault RQS standings last season, behind only Utah with a 49.415, return all six vaulters from the 2008 NCAA Championships. Though all are back for 2009, that doesn't mean next year's lineup will look identical.

"There could definitely be some changes to our vault lineup from last year," Breaux said. "Lauren Klein wasn't in the lineup and

she proved to us she can be a very capable vaulter, she was just up and down all year. She balked on a few vaults in competition, but when she hit she also had some great vaults.”

Breaux also said freshman Gloria Johnson could get into the mix but it will depend on the remainder of her training leading up to the season.

Not only do the Tigers return six Super Six vaulters, but Jackson was the 2008 NCAA Champion on vault. And given the consistent high scores from Clare-Kearney, who boasted the second highest RQS in the nation last year on vault and twice scored a Perfect 10, Jackson and Clare-Kearney could be the one-two punch that will keep LSU as a premier vaulting team. What will really determine the success of this lineup will be the progression of the Nos. 3 and 4 vaults setting up Jackson and Clare-Kearney.

“We really need Kayla Rogers and Sabrina Franceschelli to develop vaults that will consistently give us scores in the 9.8s,” Breaux said. “If that happens we can have two solid vaults go before two potentially higher scoring vaults. Our focus has to be on developing the middle of that lineup. We know what Susan and Ashleigh are capable of doing but we have to make that lineup as a whole stronger.”

Breaux also said not to expect many changes in the vaults from those competed in 2008. LSU instead will continue its focus on perfecting the ones on their current resume.

“For us, the focus on vault is on shaping the body and sticking landings,” she explained. That’s always what (vaulting coach) Bob (Moore) is thinking about and doing. Will we have four kids doing (Yurchenko) one-and-a-halves? I don’t think that’s necessary. Right now we want a lineup that can be consistent week-in week-out.”

The lineup on uneven bars should also feature some familiar faces, as the only missing piece from last year will be Esposito in the leadoff spot. And while her routine was not packed with difficulty or huge release moves, Breaux said it was her consistency that made her so effective in that leadoff position. She named Franceschelli, Lyons and Schwitkis all as possibilities for a replacement. Rogers is also working toward seeing some time on bars.

Franceschelli appears to be on target in fall workouts, while Lyons is recovering from ankle surgery and there is an intense focus to have her ready to go for the season.

“Getting Nikki back on multiple events is pivotal, but we really need her bar routine. She was in and out of the lineup last year because of some inconsistencies with her beautiful double-front dismount, but she is in better shape now than at any point last year so we’re hoping that she can develop a consistent routine that we need to plug into the lineup.”

Breaux also thinks that Klein can come in somewhere in the top half of the lineup and notch in the 9.8 – 9.85 range to set up the back end that includes Jackson and first-team uneven bars All-Americans Hubbard and Clare-Kearney.

Hubbard struggled all last year with a back injury, but was able to put things together at the end of the year to earn All-America honors at the NAAs. Keeping her healthy will be key for the Tigers on bars.

“Summer has beautiful lines and does a great job of hitting handstands and working the top of the bar,” Breaux said. “She also has a huge double layout dismount that she’s capable of twisting, as we saw last year at the NAAs. She’s capable of being at the end of the lineup but prefers being in the middle to support Susan and Ashleigh at the end. Keeping her healthy and hitting on bars is so important for us, and we need her to come in right away and do what she’s capable of.”

Both Jackson and Clare-Kearney are working toward adding difficulty to their bar routines. Jackson is training a Gienger for the beginning of her routine, which would give her three major release moves. Clare-Kearney is working on a Shaposhnikova to bail handstand and moving her Tkatchev to the end of her routine. Both have full-in E level dismounts as well.

BEAM

Expect the beam to be the Tigers' most improved event in 2009 according to Breaux. In nationals last year, the most noticeable gap in scores between LSU and the top few teams was the mark on beam, and she is dedicated to lessening that margin.

"I'd like to think we can pick up the most scoring potential on beam and get that gap to close," she explained. "When you look at teams that beat us and look at their scores on beam and our scores on beam, it's a pretty big gap and we have got to close that gap to be a better team."

The Tigers lose just Esposito from last year's beam lineup, but this may be the event on which her presence is most greatly missed. Esposito was a three-time first-team All-American on beam and a beacon of consistency, as she failed to hit just two of her routines in all of 2008.

Breaux said that Franceschelli is looking so far to be the one to step up and try to fill the shoes left by Esposito on this event.

"With the time and effort and enthusiasm that Sabrina puts in on beam, she really has begun to flourish. Her routines in practice are so much easier to watch now. She flows better and her amplitude is much better. I think she was scored very, very tough

last year, and now it will be easier for the judges to give her a better score. I think this year her scores on beam will help us."

Breaux also praised Johnson's abilities on the beam and said that if she can do what she's more than capable of on this event, she can come in and help LSU not lose any slack from last year. The Tigers coach said that Rogers has a chance to break into the lineup as well. Her routine has been redesigned and she is now practicing it with much more ease and composure.

Jackson returns as an All-American on beam. She spent most of last year as the Tigers' leadoff on balance beam, and Jackson liked this first spot. Breaux hopes she can move her down in the lineup and is hoping to find someone else to fit in the lead spot.

"The fact that Susan was an All-American on beam last year proves that it doesn't really matter where you are, it matters what you do. And her beam routine right now is better than it's ever been. Her leaps and jumps are beautiful, her series is strong, and she has a great E-level dismount. I would like to find someone else to put in that spot to build up to our stronger routines at the end of the lineup. I was forced to put Susan first last year because it helped the rest of the lineup, but she needs to be closer to the end. Clare-Kearney was not an All-American on beam last year, but she was consistent hitting all but three of her beam sets in 2008. She also had five scores of 9.90 or better, including a career-high 9.975 in the NCAA Regionals, and finished ranked 12th in beam in RQS rankings.

Injuries could hamper some of the beam lineup for the Tigers, as both Lyons and Klein are recovering from ankle surgery.

"I could put together a beam lineup today that is experienced and I feel confident about, but two of the people in that lineup have iffy ankle situations at the moment," Breaux explained. "We are teaching Klein a less difficult Gainer full dismount off the side to take some pressure off her ankle. If the two of them can compete at the level they're capable of on beam, I have every confidence that our scores as a whole will see an increase."

LSU has been one of the best floor exercise teams in the nation in recent years, and 2009 should be no different. The Tigers were the fifth-ranked floor team in terms of RQS rankings last year and return all but Esposito in the leadoff spot, a spot Breaux would like to see Rogers work her way into.

"Losing Kristi on floor leaves some big shoes to fill," she said. "I'd really like to see Kayla be able to fill that role. She competed behind Kristi in the second spot most of the year. Whereas Kristi didn't have a tremendous amount of difficulty, Kayla's routine did and we were able to build on that score. We'd like to be able to open with that score from Kayla perhaps and then get to Sabrina and Sam and then to the end of the lineup."

Breaux's "end of the year" lineup is fourth, fifth and six competitors - Klein, Jackson and Clare-Kearney. Klein only competed floor four times last year because of an ankle injury, but she has proven her abilities on the event in years past. In 2007, she posted 10 scores of 9.90 or better on floor, including a high of 9.975, en route to earning All-SEC honors on the event. She had

the third highest RQS in the nation on floor that year.

Jackson and Clare-Kearney both return as first-team All-Americans on floor, while Clare-Kearney also won the SEC floor title in 2008 and scored a Perfect 10 last season.

"Ashleigh is so powerful and when she steps on the floor she's very confident," Breaux said. "At certain points of the season we allow her to do a tremendous amount of difficulty with her tumbling. She also has some back-up passes so we don't have to always use a double Arabian and a double layout. With Susan, her national championship in vaulting causes people to forget the kind of performance she had in all of her events at the championships. She is a very dynamic tumbler and has as much difficulty as anyone in the country on this event."

The key will be keeping the three of those healthy and hitting routines all season long. If that happens, according to Breaux, the Tigers will have a 1-2-3 punch at the end of the lineup that will be as good as any other team in the NCAAAs.

Breaux also hopes to have others like Lyons and Schwitkis ready to go on floor to push the other performers and to serve as valuable reserves when necessary.

And what will make the 2009 team fun to watch on floor again?

"They're all so different," said Breaux. "Every one of our gymnasts has a different style on floor. This is not a cookie-cutter team. Everyone has her own unique personality on the floor, and that's what makes our lineup so great."

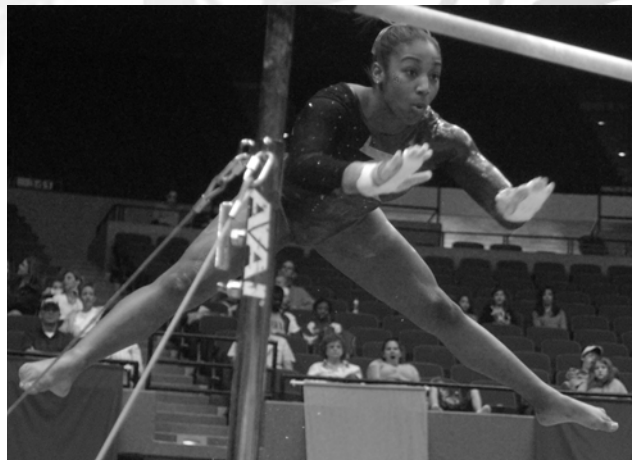
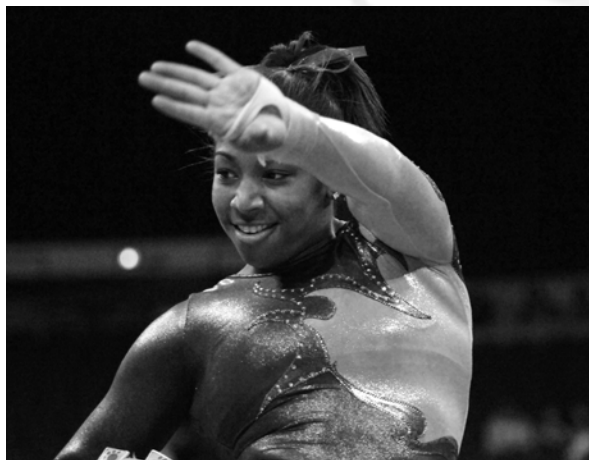

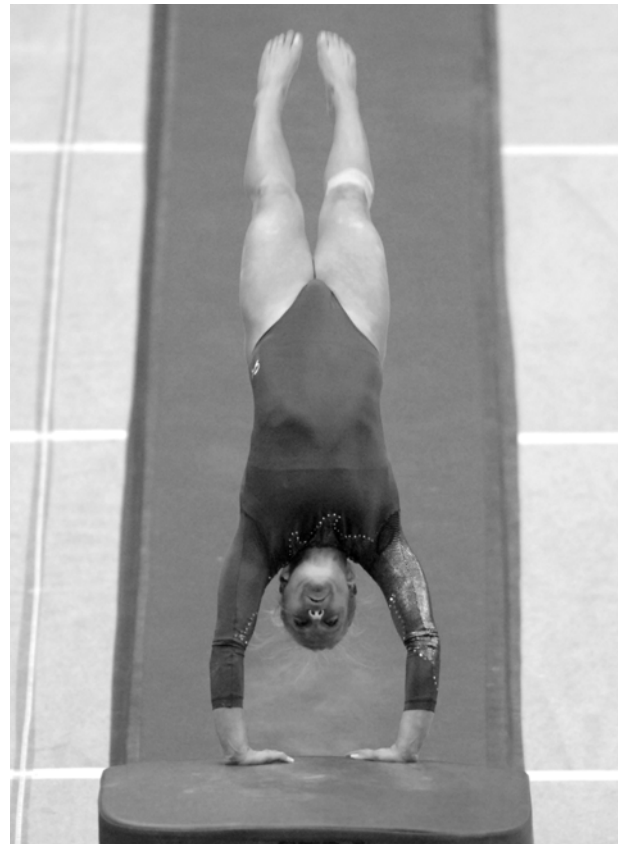

LSU teams are accustomed to BCS Bowl bids, regional NCAA and SEC championships and visits to national championships. Gymnastics is no exception to this tradition as it has achieved all of these accomplishments many times in D-D Breaux's tenure as Head Coach of the Tigers. What made 2008 special is that the Tigers made it to the Super Six after losing a spot in the elite final by hundredths of a point multiple times.

After taking the Tigers so close in the previous years, LSU gymnastics head coach D-D Breaux broke through into the six-team field for the first time in program history to compete for college gymnastics' national championship in 2008. The Tigers finished fifth, beating out rival Alabama, for the best finish since the current NCAA format was implemented in 1993.

As the "Dean of Coaches" at LSU, Breaux has represented the University at the highest level both in the gym and, most importantly, in the classroom for more than 30 years. Her dedication to the student-athlete on an individual basis has transcended into academic success, community involvement, Coach of the Year honors, SEC Championships, NCAA Regional Championships and top-10 national rankings throughout her tenure.

Now entering season No. 32 as the mastermind of the LSU gymnastics program, the fire in Breaux's eyes burns as brightly today as it did on her first day on the job.

Maintaining Excellence

What is so impressive about Breaux's success at LSU is the level of consistency she has maintained in the face of all of the adversity she has faced over the years.

During her tenure Breaux has established and maintained LSU's reputation as one of the premier collegiate gymnastics programs in the country. Under her tutelage, the Tigers have placed among the nation's top-10 teams 20

times in 31 seasons, finishing a program-best fourth in 1988 and sixth on three separate occasions.

LSU has also placed among the top three in regional competition on 23 separate occasions, winning regional titles eight times in three different decades, including last year. Her teams have included four national champions, 85 All-America honorees and 40 All-SEC selections. Additionally, Breaux's Tigers won the inaugural SEC Championship title in 1981 and have gone on to finish second four times and third five other times.

For her dedication to the sport and her teams' numerous accomplishments, Breaux has been recognized by her peers time and time again. She has been named the SEC Coach of the Year on six occasions (1990, 1993, 1994, 1995, 2000 and 2005), NCAA Central Regional Coach of the Year four times (1999, 2002, 2005 and 2006) and was a finalist for National Coach of the Year honors in 1988 when she guided the Tigers to a fourth-place finish at the NCAA Championships.

To this day, the accolades continue to roll in for Breaux and LSU as the program has seemed to reach its zenith in recent years.

Last season, in addition to the team's berth into the Super Six, both Ashleigh Clare-Kearney and Susan Jackson racked up numerous individual accolades. Jackson was the NCAA Champion on vault -- the fourth individual champion from LSU and first on vault. She also was a first-team All-American in the all-around and on vault, beam and floor. Clare-Kearney -- also a first-team All-American on bars and floor -- was named the SEC Gymnast of the Year and also won the SEC All-Around title, the first Tiger gymnast to do so since 1991. LSU earned a total of seven All-America honors and produced two All-SEC selections in 2008.

In all it has been a very productive decade for LSU gymnastics, as the Tigers have finished in the top 10 every year but one since 2000 with seven NCAA appearances. The Tigers also reached all the way to a No. 1 ranking in 2005 and boasted a school-record first-team All-Americans in 2007 -- the same year in which the legendary Breaux picked up career victory No. 500. Three of LSU's four individual national championships have come in since 2000, with Nicki Arnstad on floor in 2002, April Burkholder on beam in 2006 and Susan Jackson on vault in 2008.



An All-Around Coach

Aside from athletic honors, Breaux excels in recruiting quality student-athletes. A Louisianian through and through, Breaux concentrates her recruiting efforts in her native state, but her reach extends to the national and international levels as well where she has been responsible for recruiting some of Canada's top athletes of all time.

Outside of the gym, Breaux has taken an active role in the academic success her program has achieved in her 30-plus seasons at LSU. By making academic success her team's No. 1 priority, Breaux's teams have reached the highest scholastic goals she has established over the years. Throughout the country, she is acknowledged as having one of the finest academic teams year in and year out. LSU gymnasts have been named Academic All-Americans 91 times and members of the SEC Academic Honor Roll on 122 occasions since 1991. During the 2003 season, a school-record 13 of Breaux's student-athletes were named to the SEC Academic Honor Roll, an honor reserved for sophomores, juniors and seniors. In 1999, the Tigers posted the third-highest GPA in the nation and the highest of any team in the NCAA Championship field. Breaux's team won the Tiger Award for 2008 given to the team with the most community service hours, the highest GPA and national placement in postseason competition.

Also active members of the community, Breaux and her team continually participate in volunteer activities throughout the Baton Rouge area. The last four years Breaux's teams have been awarded the LSU CHAMPS Community Service Award after logging hundreds of hours of community service work. Breaux, who has served as the Chairman of the YWCA's Pink Ribbon Campaign for Breast Cancer, and her team have also volunteered their time to benefit the Muscular Dystrophy Association, St. Jude's Hospital and the Alzheimer's Association, among others. The Tigers coach also has taken on a new role this year as the chair for LSU's United Way campaign. Just recently, she received the McMain's Community Service Award from the McMain's Children's Development Center, a great honor for the coach.

Last year, the Tigers joined forces with Foundation56 – established by former LSU standout linebacker and current Dallas Cowboys defensive star, Bradie James. James' mother, Etta, succumbed to breast cancer in February 2002. Their Etta James Memorial Meet against Alabama successfully raised \$30,000 to promote breast cancer awareness in the Baton Rouge area.

It is this delicate balance between exceptional academics, athletic excellence and exemplary community service efforts, that has allowed Breaux to keep her team at the top of the national scene year in and year out.

Behind Breaux

The foundation for Breaux's coaching career developed long before her arrival at LSU. An excellent athlete in her own right Breaux's affiliation with the sport began at the club level where she was a nationally ranked gymnast by both the A.A.U. and the U.S.G.F. She was also a Junior Olympic National Champion that earned the S.A.A.U.'s Outstanding Gymnast award. By virtue of her accomplishments Breaux qualified as one of the top-15 athletes in the country to compete at the World Games Trials and was set to compete at the 1972 Olympic Trials before a career-ending knee injury forced her to retire. Breaux, a native of Donaldsonville, La., attended Southeastern Louisiana University where she competed for the Lady Lions gymnastics team for two seasons (1972-73) and helped SLU to a second-place finish at the 1972 AIAW Championships.

Breaux then served as an assistant coach for the Lady Lions for three seasons, where she also became a national level judge and served as the first state director for the Louisiana USA gymnastics program. She later transferred to LSU in 1976 where she earned both her bachelor's and master's degrees.

Breaux is one of eight children and comes from a great family tradition. Her parents, brothers, sisters and their spouses and children have supported the program since the coach's arrival at LSU. D-D has two daughters, Sara, her youngest child, played Soccer at LSU and will graduate in May of 2009. Jewel, also a graduate of LSU and a proud volunteer Coach for the Gymnastic's team, married Beau Fourrier and they are the proud parents of Porter Thomas, D-D's ("Doo-Dah's") two year old grandson.

For nearly a decade, Bob Moore has consistently coached the Tigers to be one of the top vaulting lineups in the nation. And in 2008, he led sophomore Susan Jackson to claim the first NCAA individual vaulting title for LSU.

"It's always nice to have a talented athlete, and Susan Jackson is just that," D-D Breaux said. "But Bob did an excellent job of coaching her and preparing her, and he had her ready to go at a very critical time."

A longtime Southeastern Conference assistant, Moore begins his 10th season with the LSU gymnastics program. Moore's presence has been undeniable. He has helped the Tigers maintain their status as one of the nation's premier programs.

Moore's primary responsibility with the Tigers is the vault where the team has flourished under his watch. In the last nine years, Moore has tutored his athletes to eight All-America honors, including Jackson's first-team honors, and now a national championship after Jackson's a year ago. Additionally, the Tigers' final RQS on vault for 2008 was second in the nation behind only Utah and Ashleigh Clare-Kearney finished the regular season as the country's second-ranked vaulter.

As well as strengthening the Tigers on the vault, Moore plays a significant role with LSU's Bengal Gymnastics program, a highly successful youth age group program that practices in the Lady Tigers' gymnastics training facility.

Recognized for his exceptional work, Moore has twice been named the NCAA Central Region Assistant Coach of the Year, first picking up the honors in 2005 and then again in 2007.

"Bob provides us with experience at the highest level, not only within the SEC, but the NCAA," said Breaux. "He knows exactly how tough this conference is and what it takes to take a program like ours to the next level."

Moore's expertise was fine tuned at two other SEC programs. Before joining the Tigers, Moore spent six years at the University of Florida where

he served as the program's top assistant. To his credit, Moore coached two national champions on the vault, in addition to numerous All-Americans and SEC champions. And prior to his stint in Gainesville, Moore coached for five seasons as an assistant at Auburn.

A native of Birmingham, Ala., Moore graduated from Samford University in 1976 with a degree in general studies with an emphasis in music. Bob is married to Sandra Ballard and they are the proud grandparents to Isabella. "Pops" and Sandra are expecting two more grandchildren in May of 2009.

Philip Ogletree begins his ninth season as an assistant coach with the LSU gymnastics program. He has played a major role in the success the Tigers have achieved during his tenure at LSU.

Working primarily with the Tigers on uneven bars, Ogletree has guided LSU to 11 of the top 13 bar scores in school history, including a school-record 49.650 in 2002. Individually, Ogletree's athletes have flourished under his watch, earning 10 All-America honors on the bars, including a school record three athletes - April Burkholder, Annie Gagnon and Lisa Rennie - in 2005. He produced two more in 2008, as Ashleigh Clare-Kearney and Summer Hubbard were both first-teamers, with Clare-Kearney finishing fourth in the NCAA Individual Event Finals. In addition, Ogletree helped Sharene Mamby to a rare 10.0 on the bars during the 2001 season. The performance marked just the second perfect score on the event in school history.

For his efforts, Ogletree has been recognized by his peers on several occasions, as he was named the NCAA Central Region Assistant Coach of the Year in 2004 and then shared that same honor a year later with fellow assistant Bob Moore.

"Philip does a tremendous job for us," said Breaux. "He is an asset to our staff, both as a coach and an administrator. Our team and staff blend well with Philip in the mix."

Ogletree came to LSU after spending the previous season at the Georgia Gymnastics Academy. He arrived at LSU with 18 years of coaching experience, including 11 with Level 10 gymnasts in Georgia.

While his stop at LSU was his first collegiate stop, he was no stranger to LSU athletics. During his time at the Atlanta School of Gymnastics, he tutored future LSU greats Abbey Burns and Kim and Kerry Descalopoulos, all natives of Georgia.

During his time in the state of Georgia, he coached six Level 10 national champions on the floor exercise and helped place five athletes on

the Level 10 Junior Olympic national team. Ogletree has also coached at the American Classic and U.S. Classic national meets.

In his time as an athlete, Ogletree was a gymnast at the University of Georgia from 1980-82. He later graduated from Georgia State with a Bachelor of Science degree in education in 1992.

Ogletree is married to Jill Hickok and they have two children. Bridget is now 15 and Jake is 13. The family is active in their church and community.

REACHING NEW HEIGHTS
2008 SUPER SIX FINALISTS

BREAKTHROUGH

The 2008 Tigers gymnastics team began the season with many expectations, among them, making the Super Six – something several previous squads had so narrowly missed. They wanted to be the team to finally break through.

LSU's NCAA Prelims session also consisted of Alabama, Arkansas, Florida Oklahoma and Oregon State. The Tigers opened on floor with a solid 49.250 led by a pair of 9.90s from Susan Jackson and Ashleigh Clare-Kearney. On to vaulting. A 49.050. After a bye, LSU was on to bars, nailing routine after routine. A 9.925 by Summer Hubbard and a 9.950 by Clare-Kearney paced the Tigers to a season-high 49.450 on the event – all but sealing a coveted spot in the Super Six.

But the Tigers had one more event, the infamous balance beam. The event that tends to make or break teams in pressure meets. And despite one fall, the remaining five scores were enough for a 48.825 and to secure LSU's spot in the Super Six with a third-place 196.575.

LSU then wrapped up its season with a fifth-place finish in Super Six, beating out three-time NCAA Champion Alabama. Clare-Kearney competed a stellar meet, with a trio of 9.90s on bars, beam and floor and a 9.925 on vault. Overall it was a solid meet by the Tigers, scoring above a 49.00 on three of four events and coming close on beam. But the 196.350 was not enough to challenge host Georgia, which won its fourth straight title.

JACKSON WINS NCAA VAULT TITLE

Susan Jackson followed up her stellar performance in the team competition at NCAAs by claiming an individual title of her own on vault in the individual event finals. Her two scores of 9.900 and 9.8125 averaged a 9.8563, beating out the field for first place. It was the fourth individual title for LSU and the first ever on vault.

THREE TIGERS EARN ALL-AMERICA HONORS

Ashleigh Clare-Kearney, Summer Hubbard and Susan Jackson all scored well enough in the NCAA Prelims to earn first-team All-America honors. Clare-Kearney's came on bars and floor while Hubbard's also was on bars. Jackson earned a team-best four first-team honors, claiming them in the all-around and on vault, beam and floor.

TIGERS HAVE FOUR ACADEMIC ALL-AMERICANS

Five Tigers matched their athletic performance in the classroom and earned Academic All-America status. Ashleigh Clare-Kearney, Kristi Esposito, Sabrina Franceschelli, Lauren Klein and Kayla Rogers all earned that distinction. It was the fifth straight year for Esposito.

LSU CAPTURES NCAA REGIONAL TITLE

The No. 7 LSU gymnastics squad captured its ninth Regional team championship title at the 2008 NCAA Central Regional Championships in Baton Rouge, La. on Saturday, April 12. The team posted a season-high score of 197.625, good enough for the fifth highest score in school history. Stanford finished second with a 197.525, followed by Ohio State (195.125), Missouri (195.100), Kentucky (194.950) and Kent State (193.700). The team posted season-high scores on the vault (49.625) and on the beam (49.325), as well as meet highs on the bars (49.275) and on the floor (49.400).

TIGERS PLACE FOURTH AT SEC CHAMPIONSHIPS

The No. 5 gymnastics squad placed fourth in the 2008 SEC Championships in Duluth, Ga. on March 29 in one of the closest SEC Championship meets in recent history. The Tigers opened the afternoon on the bars with a 48.975. Ashleigh Clare-Kearney led the way with a 9.875. LSU scored a 48.900 on the beam in the second rotation, paced by Kristi Esposito's 9.825 and Clare-Kearney's 9.875. On floor the Tigers notched a 49.275 as Clare-Kearney's 9.950 tied for a share of the event title. The Tigers continued their strong season on the vault, notching a 49.350. Paige Cipolloni, who hadn't competed since early March because of an ankle injury, scored a 9.775 to open things up, and Jackson and Clare-Kearney closed out the rotation with a 9.950 and a 9.925, respectively. Jackson tied with four others for the event title. Clare-Kearney won the all-around title with a 39.600.

CLARE-KEARNEY WINS ALL-AROUND AT SEC'S, NAMED SEC CO-GYMNAST OF THE YEAR

After winning the all-around event title at the SEC Championships, Ashleigh Clare-Kearney was given another award to add to her trophy case. The junior from Manchester, Conn., was named the SEC Co-Gymnast of the Year, sharing the award with Auburn's Lindsey Puckett. The award, which is voted on by the SEC coaches, was given to her after the SEC Championships on Saturday, March 29. It marks only the third time in school history that a gymnast has been given the honor. April Burkholder won the SEC Gymnast of the Year award in 2004 and 2005. Clare-



Kearney won the all-around title, posting a 39.600. She is only the second LSU gymnast to win the SEC all-around title (Rachelle Fruge', 1991).

CLARE-KEARNEY HITS TRIO OF 10.0S

Ashleigh Clare-Kearney joined an elite list in 2008 by scoring three Perfect 10s – two on vault and one on floor. Now with four career 10.0s, only two LSU gymnasts have achieved perfection more – Jennifer Wood (9) and April Burkholder (8). And by scoring two 10.0s in the same meet against Michigan State, she became just the second LSU gymnast to accomplish that feat, as Burkholder posted perfect marks on vault and beam at Oklahoma in 2005.

FINAL RQS RANKS TIGERS IN TOP 10 IN THREE EVENTS

The Tigers' Regional Qualifying Scores were good enough to place them in the top 10 on three of four events in the final rankings. LSU was second on vault with a 49.415, fifth on floor with a 49.325 and seventh on bars with a 49.255. The Tigers were 13th on beam with a 49.065 to rank in the top 15 on all events. Their overall RQS of 196.730 was good enough for seventh place heading into the NCAA postseason.

T ALL-AROUND SCORE IN SCHOOL HISTORY

On Feb. 29, LSU scored a 197.775 against Michigan State for the second-highest score in school history. Thanks in part to Ashleigh Clare-Kearney's two perfect scores on the vault and floor, the Tigers posted season highs on each event. The team scored a 49.525 on the vault, which tied for the third-highest score in school history. On the floor, the Tigers posted a 49.550, tying for the fourth best score in school history. Their 49.425 on the bars was the season-high until it was eclipsed Sunday against Centenary when the team totaled a 49.475. On the beam against Michigan State, the Tigers scored a 49.275.

JACKSON POSTS BACK-TO-BACK-TO BACK 9.975 SCORES ON FLOOR

Susan Jackson just missed a Perfect 10 on floor in three straight meets this year. She scored identical 9.975s against Michigan State (2/29), Centenary (3/2) and Washington (3/7).

FIRST ANNUAL ETTA JAMES MEMORIAL MEET A HUGE SUCCESS

LSU's meet against Alabama on Friday, Feb. 22 marked the first annual Etta James Memorial Meet. LSU gymnastics, with the help of the Baton Rouge community, raised \$30,950 at the meet that will be donated to Foundation56, a breast cancer awareness foundation created by former LSU linebacker and current Dallas Cowboy Bradie James. The meet was named after his mother who succumbed to breast cancer in February 2002. A record crowd of 7,717 donated money for prizes, including pink ribbons, Foundation56 pink bracelets, Foundation56 t-shirts and purple and pink LSU boas.

LSU GYMNASTICS ATTENDANCE RECORD CRUSHED

For the first time in 11 years, LSU gymnastics has set a new attendance record. Thanks in part to the "Pink Meet" on Feb. 22, 7,717 fans attended the meet at the Pete Maravich Assembly Center against Alabama in which the Tigers fell, 196.300-196.125, to the Tide. The previous attendance record was set on Feb. 24, 1995, when 5,076 fans watched the Tigers fall to Georgia, 197.095-196.175.

2006 NCAA Champion - Beam

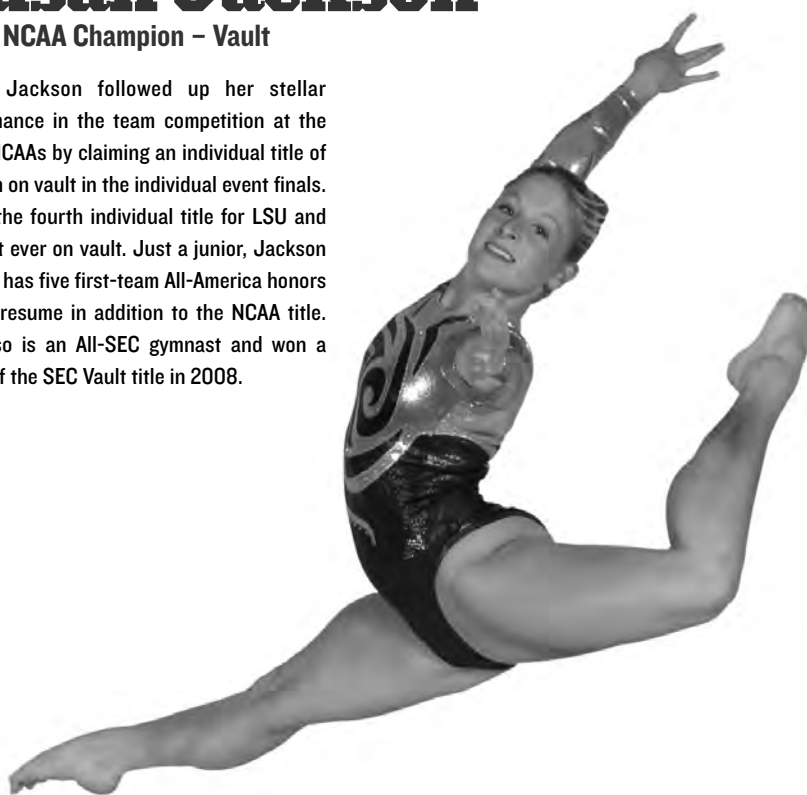
