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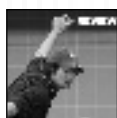

SEC MEN

Men's and women's tennis may be the most consistently dominant sports in the nation's most competitive athletic conference.

Last season brought another slew of accomplishments for SEC men's tennis teams. Three of the twelve SEC teams survived until the quarterfinals of the NCAA championship tournament. Ole Miss and Florida did not advance past there, but Vanderbilt eventually became national runner-up after a 4-3 loss to Illinois in the championship match. Vanderbilt extended the SEC's streak to 11 consecutive years with a team in the national semifinals.

Florida finished the season with a No. 2 ranking. Vanderbilt and Ole Miss were fourth and eighth. Four more teams--Kentucky, Georgia, LSU and Auburn--ended the season ranked in the top-25.

The SEC also boasted six of the top 10 singles players in the nation according to the final poll, led by Vanderbilt's Bobby Reynolds at No. 1. Reynolds was one of eleven SEC players on the ITA All-American roster. Three SEC players appeared in the semifinals of the individual singles NCAA Championship, including Auburn's Rameez Junaid, Florida's Hamid Mirzadeh and Georgia's Bo Hodge.

The last ten seasons have been the conference's most fruitful. SEC teams have won two national championships and SEC athletes have won five doubles and five singles titles. Duos from Florida, Mississippi State and Ole Miss won three consecutive doubles titles from 1993-95. SEC players have been recognized as All-Americans over 200 times since 1990 alone.

"When players are looking at schools there aren't many conferences, if any, to look for if they want to get the best competition match-in and match-out," said LSU head coach Jeff Brown, who became well acquainted with the league's tradition of excellence as a player at LSU from 1985-88.

"Any match you win in the SEC is a highlight because in most years that team is going to be ranked in the top-25 or at least the top 35. It's not like we have matches where half the schedule in conference is going to be weak. Every match is going to be a fight. It's a great atmosphere."

SET FOR Success

The Tigers have all the ingredients this year to have one of the most successful teams in the program's history. All-Southeastern Conference selections **Peter Richman**, **Jason Hazley** and **Bryan Fisher** are joined by freshman standout **Ken Skupski** on a deep roster head coach **Jeff Brown** believes could carry LSU deep into the NCAA post-season.

"We could end up as high as these guys want to, really," Brown said. "Depending on what their goals are, which I believe are the same as mine, we could challenge for the SEC and if you do that the NCAA could come to you."

All of the Tigers' top-six from 2003 are back, including healthy seniors Cory Ross and Sebastian Rutka. Ross was injured over the summer and began playing again in the middle of the fall season while Rutka and Richman had to sit out the fall to undergo surgery. Sophomore Paul White also rejoined the team after the fall semester after playing No. 6 singles for much of last season and being named Louisiana Freshman of the Year for 2003.

"We have depth in singles this year and we have strength at the top of the lineup," Brown said. "Richman played at No. 1 singles last year and was ranked 36th. I think Ken Skupski could be ranked higher than that. We've got guys playing a position down from last season or at least at the same position, so that means our guys at the bottom of the lineup are going to be very strong. We've added some very strong freshmen, too."

"I think this is potentially one of the best teams we've had since our SEC championship teams. We've got firepower at the top and we've got depth all the way through. But the chemistry is what I notice the most. These guys really do like each other and they enjoy practicing. That's the way you're going to make the most improvement."

TIGERS FACING TOUGH COMPETITION IN 2004

Playing tennis in the SEC guarantees the Tigers one of the nation's toughest schedules every year. But the challenges begin even earlier this spring with a non-conference schedule that includes highly ranked teams from Texas A&M, Texas and Tulsa.

Even the Tigers' in-state schedule includes top teams. Tulane was ranked 16th in the first poll of 2004 and UL-Lafayette and New Orleans were tied at 75th.

Ten of the Tigers' 2004 opponents are ranked in the top 25 in the first team poll, including Florida, Vanderbilt, Ole Miss, Texas A&M and Kentucky, who are all in the top 10. All but two SEC teams are in the top 40.

"We have a strong schedule and I think it really pays off," Brown said. "At the end of the year these guys have seen all they are going to see. There won't be any tougher matches or tougher situations than what they will face on our schedule."

The Tigers play nine of their first ten matches at home beginning Jan. 31. They hit the road against Texas on Feb. 21, then return to prepare for a home SEC opener against Georgia on March 5. LSU makes what they hope is the first of two trips to Tulsa in April.

"We are playing Tulsa on the road because that's the site of this year's NCAA Championships," Brown said.

INJURED UPPERCLASSMEN RETURN FOR SPRING

The Tigers were battered by injuries to key players in 2003. Two of their top players, Hazley and Richman, played in the

Tigers' first round playoff loss to South Alabam despite injuries.

Cory Ross, who led the Tigers in matches won in 2003, was also injured during the off-season. He returned in the middle of the fall to post an 8-6 singles record and an 8-0 doubles record with freshman Danny Bryan. Hazley was able to compete by the beginning of the fall.

Richman and Rutka were the only Tigers listed in the ITA's preseason singles poll, but they never got to compete in the fall. Both had surgery to repair their injuries and are ready to lead the Tigers into dual match play.

"Peter (Richman) and Sebastian (Rutka) handled their injuries very maturely," Brown said. "They had surgery and were able to handle the rehab, and the other guys saw that they worked very hard off the court."

Ross and Rutka are the team captains for the second season, which Brown said he believes will help his team mature faster.

"Cory and Sebastian have done a really good job keeping the guys on the same page and helping the freshmen out," Brown said. "We have those younger guys on the team this year and it really is good for them to have good leaders who know how to point them in the right direction."

FISHER, HAZLEY GARNER NATIONAL ATTENTION

Bryan Fisher and Jason Hazley beat four top-50 teams last year in doubles competition and earned All-Louisiana and All-SEC honors for the Tigers. The accomplishments earned them a No. 7 national ranking in the preseason and a spot in the ITA All-American Main Draw.

SKUPSKI ENTERS NCAA COMPETITION WITH BIG WINS

Ken Skupski made a big impression in his fall debut with the Tigers. The freshman from Liverpool, England, had to wait a year before competing with the team, but he compiled a 4-2 record against nationally ranked opponents in the fall of his inaugural season.

His first win might have been his biggest, a stunning 7-6, 3-6, 1-0 victory over 18th-ranked William Barker of Rice in the Rice Crowne Plaza Invitational. He also beat Ole Miss' 19th-ranked Paul Ciorascu in the ITA Southeast Regional Tournament.

"Ken embraces the challenges of playing at the top of the lineup in the SEC," Brown said. "He could be one of the most successful players to ever come out of LSU. He's going to be one of our leaders for a long time now."

An unforeseen ruling by the NCAA forced Skupski to sit out his first year at LSU. That ruling has since been reversed, giving Skupski four full years of eligibility.

TALENTED NEWCOMERS GIVE TIGERS BIG HELP

Two freshmen have already made an impact on the Tigers this year. Danny Bryan, a 6'4" freshman from New Orleans, and Colt Gaston, a 6'5" freshman from Rome, Ga., have taken LSU tennis to "a new height," according to Brown.

"Danny and Colt both have real big games and lots of potential," Brown said. "They were two of the top juniors who came out last year. There is no end in sight to (Bryan's) potential. Colt is one of the most talented players we've got on the team."

A third freshman, Kevin Dessauer, walked on to the team in the fall. He will likely redshirt the 2004 season and begin play next year.

Jeff Brown has been a part of LSU tennis for almost half his life, playing a major role in nearly all of the most successful teams in the program's history. Now in his seventh season as the Tigers' head coach, Brown has done more than just maintain the standards of excellence that have characterized LSU tennis since his days as a player here. He has raised the bar substantially.

Brown took the reins of the program in 1998 after serving as an assistant to Jerry Simmons for three seasons. He was an All-American doubles player for LSU in 1988 and spent five years on the professional circuit.

Brown led the Tigers to back-to-back SEC Championships in 1998 and 1999, becoming the first person in league history to do so in his first two seasons as head coach. The Tigers also won the SEC Tournament both years.

He has since proven those feats were more than just beginner's luck. The man who so quickly earned respect in the profession is still early in his coaching career, but you would never know that by judging his list of achievements. Brown has never failed to take his teams to the NCAA Tournament and earned Louisiana Coach of the Year honors in 1998, 1999, 2001 and 2002. He has coached five All-Americans in his tenure, and he likes the 2004 version of the Tigers as much as any of his recent teams.

Last year was the first time one of Brown's squads did not make it to the second round of the NCAA Tournament, but with every starter back from that lineup, this year's team is eager for more.

"This team reminds me a lot more of the SEC Championship teams than some of the other teams we've had," he said. "They have fun practicing. They really enjoy it." More than anyone, Brown himself would like to get back to the top of the conference because he remembers the thrill of being a

part of championship teams.

"The years when we won the SEC and got to the Final Fours set the standard that we want to get back to," he said. "When you have a couple of years where you don't make it you really appreciate it and you're hungry for more. This team is as hungry as I've had in the last couple of years. Early success sets the tone so that you always know what you want."

When Brown took over the program in 1998, he was already well acquainted with the demands of being successful in college tennis. He enjoyed tremendous success as a player at LSU from 1985-88, as evidenced by his two All-SEC awards. He joined the Tiger tennis elite in his senior season when he eclipsed the 100-career victory mark. That same year he captained the LSU's only NCAA finals team. He still has the fourth-most wins of any player in LSU history.

Brown helped lead the Tigers to an 85-35 record as an assistant coach from 1994-97. LSU finished in the top-10 three of those years.

"To be a part of LSU from so many angles, first as a player, then as an assistant and now as a head coach has been wonderful," Brown said. "The tradition that has been here is that we're competing for championships and we're going to fight you to the end. That's the thing that's always been known about LSU in most sports and particularly tennis."

"LSU's overall sports excellence helps because our guys are around other people who are used to winning. Athletes here

run into each other often and it's almost like there's a silent competition amongst the sports. You are pulling for each other of course, but at the same time you're driven not to fall behind the other sports on campus." "Jeff represents what the LSU tennis program is all about," said Hall of Fame coach Jerry Simmons, who coached Brown on the 1988 LSU team that reached the NCAA Tournament championship match. Brown was team captain that year, leading the Tigers to a 27-2 record. Three years earlier as a freshman, Brown won a crucial SEC match at No. 4 singles that enabled LSU to win the conference crown.

"I knew as a player that I probably wanted to be a coach," Brown said. "I could see that it was something that kept you young and kept you around young people. Everyone I came in contact with as a player has had some influence on me as a coach."

Brown came across quite a few tennis legends as a player. He earned his degree at LSU in 1989 while serving as an assistant coach, then left Baton Rouge for the ATP tour. He won the doubles title at the Volvo International in 1990 and advanced to the round of 16 at the U.S. Open by beating the team of Pete Sampras and Jim Courier in the first round. Brown also advanced to the round of 16 at both the Australian Open and Wimbledon. His No. 45 international ranking in doubles is the highest ranking ever for a former LSU player. Brown married the former Deborah Schaeffer of Colorado Springs, Colo., on Nov. 19, 1999. Debi and Jeff are expecting their first child in April.

The LSU men's tennis program landed a new addition just before the 1999 dual-match season. The talented athlete and proven leader wasn't a high-ranked junior or a top-notch recruit, but a new assistant coach just a few years removed from the ATP tour. Since then, Mark Booras has been as valuable to the team as any player in his five years here.

"We have been fortunate to have Mark for as long as we have," head coach Jeff Brown said. "He's a super coach and tactician. He's a great role model for the guys and he plays as well as anybody on the team."

In his first season with the Tigers, Booras helped guide LSU to its second consecutive SEC Championship as well as a berth in the Final Four. The 1999 squad also won its second-straight SEC Tournament, becoming the first team to ever repeat as tournament champions.

Booras, a Chicago native, graduated from West Virginia in 1993 and played college tennis for the legendary Terry Deremer. He was a top-20 singles and doubles player throughout his college career.

In each of his final three seasons at West Virginia, Booras competed in both the NCAA singles and doubles championship tournaments. Following his collegiate career, Booras joined the ATP tour and continued his success, ranking as high as No. 240 in the world in doubles. After a three-year career from 1994-96, he retired and decided to further his education. While earning his master's degree in sport psychology at West Virginia he was also the assistant men's tennis coach and a private tennis instructor.

In 1999, he came to LSU to help Brown build on the LSU tradition. His duties as assistant coach include conducting practices, player instruction during matches and recruiting future players.

"Mark continues to lend his knowledge of the game to this team and it is paying dividends," Brown said. "He is a great recruiter and he has incredible knowledge of the game. He is as important as any one person in this program."

MATCHING THE Legacy

LSU's 2003 tennis season seemed likely to fall short of the success typical of Tiger tradition. But the team without a single senior or dominant player finished with a No. 24 national ranking and a 13-11 record in a schedule that included 19 ranked opponents. The young but talented Tigers surpassed many expectations and enjoyed yet another season as one of the elite programs in college tennis with their ninth consecutive NCAA tournament appearance. They ended the season ranked in the top-25 for the 19th time in 20 years.

The Tigers were ranked 32nd in the first team poll of 2003, but by mid-season they leapt well into the top-25. They proved their mettle in March with three huge wins over No. 17 Auburn, No. 16 Texas and No. 12 Kentucky to earn national respect and a No. 17 ranking by the end of the month.

LSU finished 5-6 in the SEC, which included nine of the top-25 teams in the nation in the final ITA poll. The Tigers lost in the quarterfinals of the SEC tournament to Ole Miss, but had already made a strong enough case to reach the NCAA tournament.

"I think we finished as strong as we could for the situation we were in," head coach Jeff Brown said. "Peter (Richman) was injured at the end of the season and Jason (Hazley) also had some problems. I really feel we could have gone further if we could have gotten a top performance out of one of those guys. We were a little bit down last year, but we did our best."

TIGERS PILE UP POSTSEASON AWARDS

LSU's Jason Hazley, Bryan Fisher and Peter Richman landed spots on the 2003 All-SEC roster. Only 26 athletes from the nation's toughest tennis conference were selected.

Hazley and Fisher were named first-team All-SEC, joining the ranks of top talent like Georgia's Bo Hodge, Ole Miss' Alex Hartman and Auburn's Rameez Junaid, all of whom finished the season ranked in the top-10.

Richman was named second-team All-SEC after collecting three wins playing at No. 1 singles in conference dual matches. Richman was named SEC player of the week for March 24-30 after beating 28th-ranked Jean Simon of Texas. He made a big impact on SEC tennis early in the season, beating three-straight ranked opponents including No. 34 Catalin Gard of Ole Miss and No. 10 Junaid in the SEC Indoor Tournament.

Richman, who finished the season ranked 62nd, was a first-team All-Louisiana selection. Fisher and Hazley were named to the second team, along with teammates Cory Ross and Sebastian Rutka. Rutka and Ross were ranked as high as 40th as a doubles team early in the season and each made appearances in singles rankings.

Paul White was named Louisiana Freshman of the Year, the second year in a row the award went to an LSU freshman. White spent much of the season at No. 6 singles for the Tigers and was 6-4 in the SEC. The Tigers were also recognized for

their academic achievements with four selections to the SEC Honor Roll. Fisher, Hazley, Rutka and 2002 graduate Daniel Kiernan were selected.

FISHER, HAZLEY CLIMB HIGH IN NATIONAL RANKINGS

Bryan Fisher and Jason Hazley made a statement even before the dual match season by capturing the SEC Indoor Tournament doubles title in January. The feat secured them a No. 24 ranking in an early ITA poll. They went undefeated for an entire month to begin the spring, winning nine straight matches before falling to Texas A&M's fifth-ranked duo of Ante Matijevic and Lester Cook on Feb. 15. They rebounded in their next match with an 8-4 win over Tulsa's 19th-ranked Ryan Livesay and Dustin Taylor.

As they compiled more wins, national recognition spread for Fisher, then a junior from Nashville and Hazley, a sophomore from Bradenton, Fla. They reached as high as 13th in the national rankings by middle of the dual season.

Three consecutive losses caused Fisher and Hazley to slide back in the rankings, but the two had already established themselves as a top-flight team. They earned a bid to the NCAA tournament where they fell in the first round to first-ranked Richard and William Barker of Rice.

LSU OUSTED IN NCAA FIRST ROUND

The Tigers ninth consecutive trip to the NCAA postseason tournament ended with a 4-2 loss to South Alabama in the first round. South Alabama jumped out to an early lead on Saturday as the Jaguars won the doubles point and picked up a prompt victory in the No. 1 singles match. "We were really rusty during doubles play," Brown said. "They jumped on us early and we could never really rebound in the singles competition."

Peter Richman, who played with a nagging stomach injury for the last six weeks of the season, lost a 6-3, 6-2 decision to No. 91 Heinrich Heyl at No. 1 singles. Heyl's win over No. 62 Richman extended the Jaguars' lead to 2-0.

LSU evened the overall score of the match at 2-2 when Bryan Fisher and Cory Ross earned straight-set victories on courts Nos. 3 and 5, respectively.

LSU's rally was short. Paul White fell to David Nylén on court No. 6, giving South Alabama their third point. The Jaguars' Clinton Jacobs earned a 6-4, 6-4 victory over Jason Hazley on court No. 2 to clinch the match. "I think that the three-week layoff from our previous match really affected us and we seemed a little rusty," Brown said after the match. "They jumped out on us early and we could never really rebound in singles competition. We're disappointed today, but we're extremely optimistic about the future. We have everybody returning next season and we will learn from this experience."

The top-seeded Tigers overcame a 3-0 deficit to No. 23 Auburn in the title match for a thrilling 4-3 win to advance to the NCAA's. LSU beat Kentucky in the first round and Alabama-Birmingham in the Regional semifinal. TCU, ranked 4th, bumped LSU from the NCAA Championships in the round of 16 for the second-straight year by a 4-3 count.

Jerry Simmons, LSU's all-time winningest coach, led the Tigers to the NCAA's for the 13th and final time during 1997 after announcing his retirement prior to the start of the spring season. Unfortunately, Simmons' Tigers were upended in round one by No. 10 Duke 4-1, finishing the year at 17-7 overall No. 9 nationally.

In the NCAA tournament, LSU tore through SMU and SEC rival Ole Miss before falling in the semifinals to a Georgia team the Tigers had twice defeated earlier in the year.

LSU shocked the collegiate tennis world by returning to the Final Four for the second consecutive year in 1999. The Tigers, who had a No. 19 preseason ranking, hosted a regional and beat Alcorn State and Tulane to advance to the round of 16 at Athens, Ga. There, LSU beat a gutsy Fresno State team before upsetting second-ranked Duke in the quarterfinal. However, the magic ended in the Final Four as No. 1 UCLA managed to survive the Tiger attack. The Tigers defeated eventual national champion Georgia twice on the season.

After entering the season as one of the favorites to win the national championship, the 2000 LSU squad earned a No. 11 seed in the NCAA Tournament. For the second consecutive season, the Tigers roared through the first two rounds in Baton Rouge with 4-0 victories over both Alcorn State and Clemson. Then it was on to Athens, Ga., and a tough round of 16 match with sixth-seeded Illinois. In a grueling match, the Illini proved to be a little too strong as they claimed a 4-3 victory and ousted LSU from the tournament.

The LSU men's tennis team qualified for the NCAA Championships for the seventh-straight season in 2001 after accumulating a 14-7 overall record during the regular season. The

Tigers rebounded from a 4-3 upset loss against Alabama in the Southeastern Conference Tournament to host an NCAA Regional for the third-consecutive season. In front of a raucous home crowd at the W.T. "Dub" Robinson Tennis Stadium, LSU dropped Marist, 4-0, in first-round action before knocking off 19th-ranked Texas, 4-2, to earn a trip to the NCAA Championships in Athens, Ga. The Tigers advanced to the Sweet 16 for the third-straight year and faced No. 7 Texas A&M at the Dan Magill Tennis Center on the campus of the University of Georgia. In the third-round match, Texas A&M out-slugged the Tigers, 4-1.

2002

Final Rank: No. 29

Despite finishing the regular season with a losing record for the first time in seven years, LSU proved its worthiness of an NCAA Tournament bid by advancing to the round of 32 with a convincing 4-0 victory over the higher-ranked Texas Christian Horned Frogs. The win was a triumphant contrast for the Tigers after the team had traversed a season full of 4-3 losses and had faced 16 top-25 teams in 25 dual-match contests. In the second round of the NCAA Tournament, LSU fell prey to 16th-ranked Texas A&M for the second-consecutive season, 4-0, in College Station, Texas.

The Tigers kept their NCAA tournament streak alive, making their ninth consecutive postseason appearance and finishing the season ranked in the top 25 for the 19th time in 20 years. The Tigers finished second in the SEC West with a 5-6 conference record and 13-11 overall record. They were upset in the first round by No. 56 South Alabama, 4-2, in New Orleans.

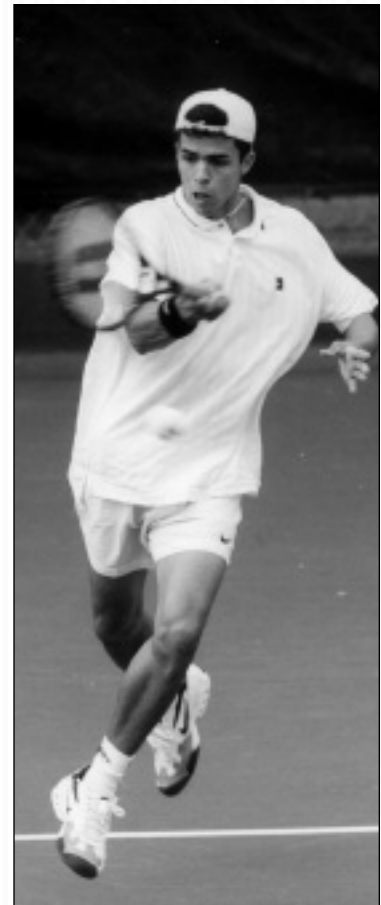

Donni Leaycraft capped off his record-setting junior season by becoming the first LSU player to win the NCAA singles title. Leaycraft entered the NCAA singles tournament as the 13th seed and proceeded to breeze through the first four rounds, winning all four matches in straight sets. In the semifinal, Leaycraft upset hometown favorite Pablo Montana of Georgia in three sets and then beat Steven Jung of Nebraska 6-1, 4-6, 6-3 to claim the title. Leaycraft finished the year with a 42-10 record and ranked No. 3 in the nation.

Johan Kjellsten did not waste any time making an impact after transferring from McNeese State prior to his senior season. At the Clay Courts, Kjellsten, who was the tournament's eighth seed, knocked off top-ranked Malivai Washington of Michigan, 6-3, 6-3 in the quarterfinal and then cruised past fourth-ranked Greg Failla of Southern Cal in the semifinal. In the final, Kjellsten knocked off 12th-ranked Stephen Enochs of Georgia 2-6, 6-2, 6-1 to give LSU the school's first grand slam event winner. Kjellsten went on to post a 38-11 overall singles record and finished the year ranked No. 7 in the country.

North Carolina in three sets in the quarterfinal. El Sawy, the No. 3 seed, then dropped a three-set match No. 1-ranked Chris Woodruff of Tennessee. The El Sawy-Woodruff semifinal match was said to be the best match of the tournament and it was only fitting that it would be the last match El Sawy would play at LSU.

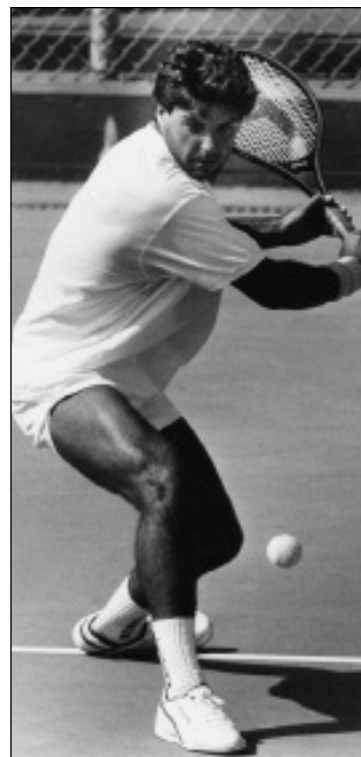

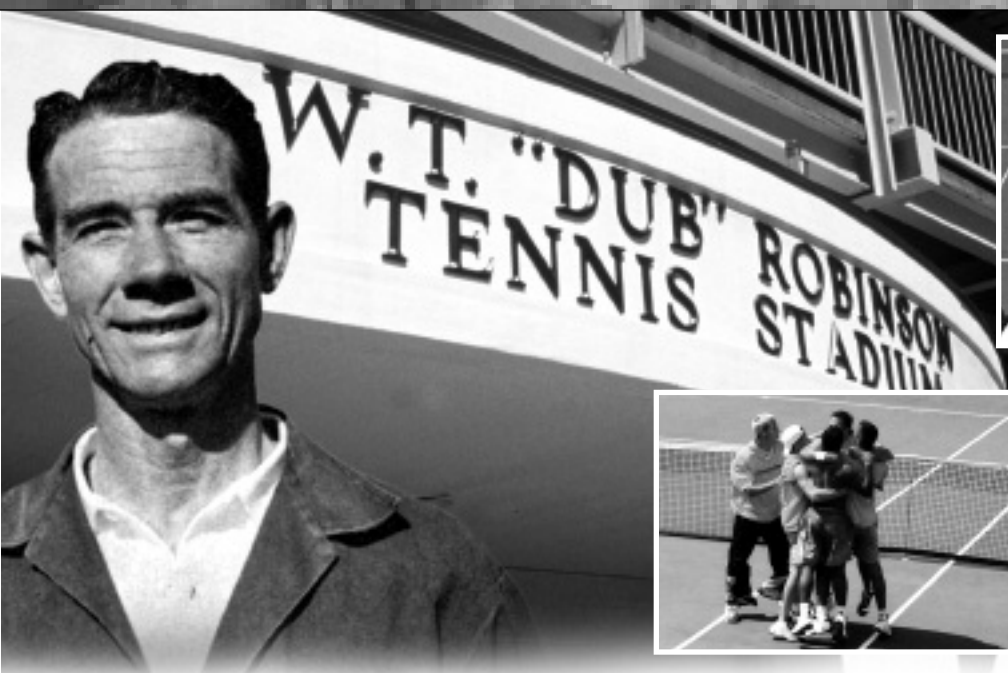

The LSU men's tennis team has called the W.T. Robinson Tennis Stadium home since 1970, but the "Dub," as it is affectionately known, has kept up with newer college facilities through a series of renovations and improvements over the years.

Both the nationally-ranked Tigers and Lady Tigers enjoy state-of-the-art locker rooms, a squad room, brand-new showers and bathrooms. The "Dub" was totally refurbished after the 2002 season to include a media room, an equipment room and a ground-floor viewing area for handicapped tennis fans.

W.T. Robinson Tennis Stadium, named in honor of LSU's former winningest tennis coach, was completed in 1970 and is the site of the Tigers' and Lady Tigers' home outdoor matches. LSU plays its indoor matches at the next-door Carl Maddox Field House.

The "Dub" Robinson Tennis Complex features six varsity courts and six practice courts. The six varsity courts were resurfaced prior to the 2002-03 academic school year, while the six practice courts received new surfaces in the spring of 2001 as a part of the facilities makeover. The varsity courts feature an electronic scoreboard and can accommodate up to 550 spectators.

Former men's coach Jerry Simmons surpassed Robinson in 1992 to become the Tigers' all-time winningest coach. The Coach Simmons Era came to a close in 1997, as the Tigers posted an 11-1 home mark en-route to an automatic berth in the NCAA Championships. With Simmons at the helm, Robinson Stadium became one of the toughest venues in the country for opponents to play. LSU tallied an incredible 162-25 (.866) record at home during the last 15 seasons under Simmons.

Since current head coach Jeff Brown took over the reigns in 1998, the Tigers have accumulated a dominant 57-14 (.803) overall record at home in the "Dub" Robinson Tennis Stadium. In his opening season as head coach, Brown notched a perfect 12-0 record at home in Baton Rouge. The Tigers advanced to the semifinals of the NCAA Championships during the 1998-99 season.

Maddox Field House, which can seat up to 3,000 spectators, has four surfaced courts. It is climate controlled and also plays host to LSU track and field meets.

W.T. "DUB" ROBINSON

LSU's legendary men's tennis coach, W.T. Robinson, or "Dub" as he was lovingly known, single-handedly acted as a catalyst in the LSU tennis program's rise to national prominence. In his nearly three decades as the head tennis coach at LSU, Robinson accumulated an unforeseen 189-180-9 overall record and propelled the Tigers to a status among the nation's elite.

Working with limited resources and a financially-deprived tennis program, LSU's rise to the top of collegiate tennis can be traced back to Robinson's warm personality and quick wit. Always a favorite among his players, Robinson transformed a team that had not won a match in three years, into a team that finished with a 12-1 record and a second-place finish in the Southeastern Conference in only his sixth season at the helm.

When the LSU tennis complex was completed in the fall of 1976, it was only natural that it was named after the person that built the program. The complex was named the W.T. "Dub" Robinson Tennis Stadium.

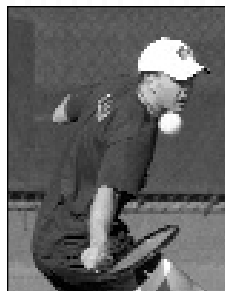

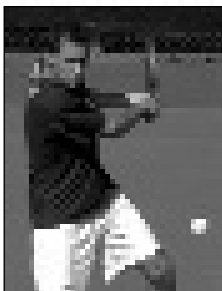

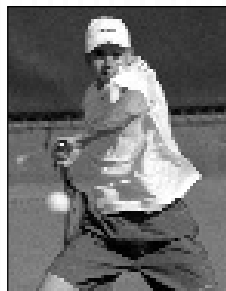

THIS IS LSU



Louisiana State University and Agricultural & Mechanical College has, throughout its 143-year history, served the people of Louisiana, the region, the nation, and the world through extensive multipurpose programs encompassing instruction, research and public service. The University continuously develops programs of breadth and quality that make it one of the nation's outstanding educational institutions.

The University influences the educational, economic, social and cultural lives of its citizens throughout the state – indeed, in some way, it touches the life of every person in Louisiana.

Because of its designation as a Research I University – the top category of the Carnegie Foundation's ranking of research institutions – LSU ranks in the top 2 percent of the nation's colleges and universities. The Research I designation is shared by only 59 public and 29 private universities across the nation. One of only 25 universities nationwide designated as both a land-grant and sea-grant college, LSU is also actively pursuing space-grant status.

History and tradition began with LSU's founding in 1853 by the General Assembly of Louisiana as the Louisiana State Seminary of Learning and Military Academy near Pineville, Louisiana. The institution opened January 2, 1860. When the Civil War began, the school's first superintendent, William Tecumseh Sherman, resigned to assume a command in the Union Army. Fire demolished the Seminary in 1869 and the school moved to Baton Rouge.

In 1870, the Seminary was renamed Louisiana State University. In 1874, under the United States Morrill Act, the Louisiana State Agricultural & Mechanical College was established in New Orleans. The two institutions were merged by the Legislature in 1877 to become Louisiana State University and Agricultural & Mechanical College.

Construction on the present campus began in 1922 and the first

classes were held in 1926. LSU experienced major growth in the 1930s and 1940s, expanding its student body, curricula and services. During the 1960s, the University began to place increasing emphasis on research.

Recognizing the importance and extent of statewide agricultural activities of units in the LSU System, the LSU Board of Supervisors in 1972 established the Center for Agricultural Sciences & Rural Development. This unit was renamed the LSU Agricultural Center in 1982. Components of the LSU Agricultural Center include the Louisiana Agricultural Experiment Station, the Louisiana Cooperative Extension Service, International Programs and Administrative Services.

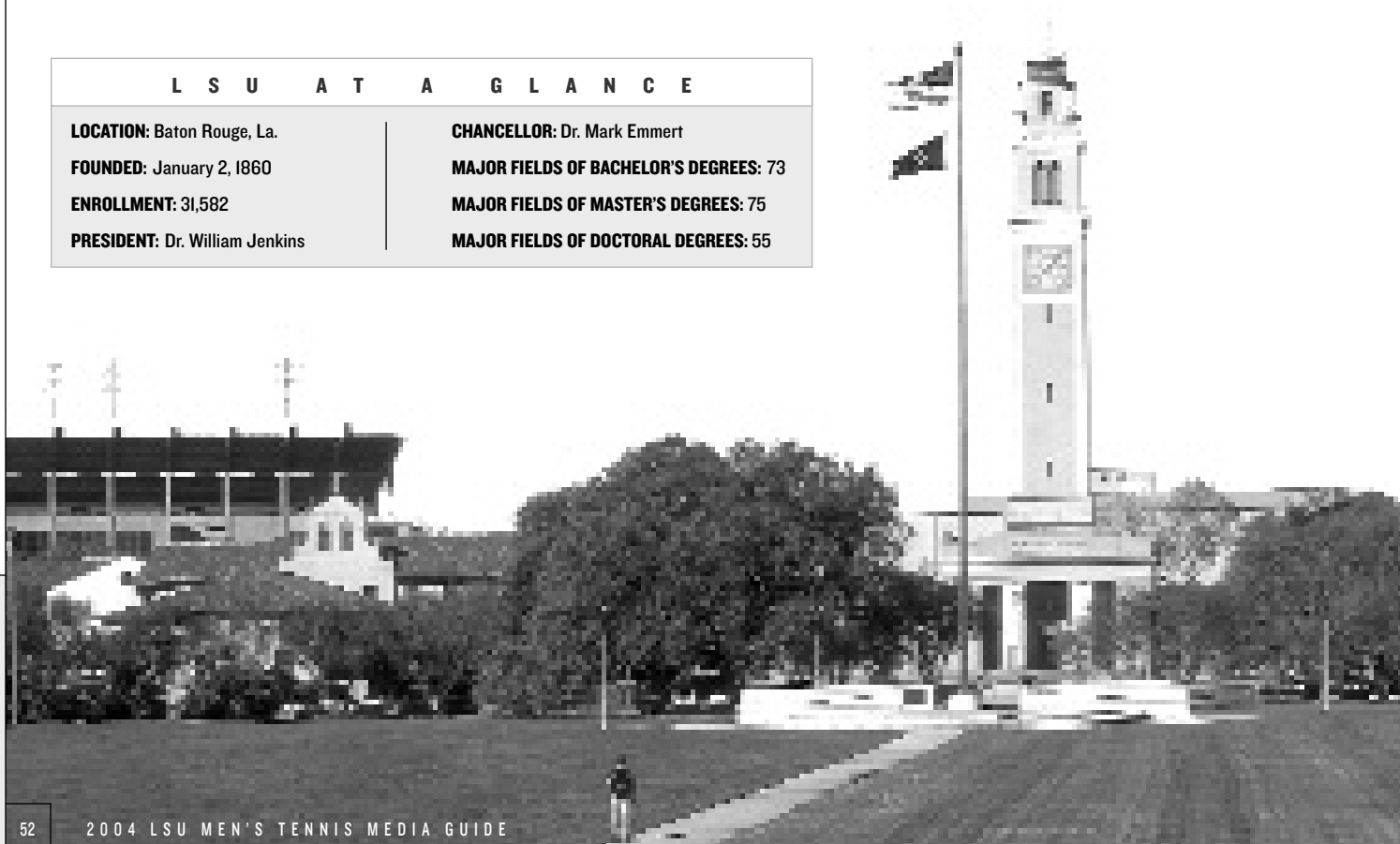
The primary mission of the LSU Agricultural Center is to conduct research in agricultural and natural resource development and to provide off-campus extension education that disseminates technological, economic, and management information to Louisiana residents.

In 1977, the Paul M. Hebert Law Center, established as the LSU Law School in 1906, was made an autonomous division of the LSU System. The Law Center provides legal education characterized by an unyielding demand for academic excellence. Its unique curriculum, based on civil law as well as substantial elements of common law, provides law graduates with qualifications and training for not one, but two legal systems.

LSU, located on more than 2,000 acres in the southern part of Baton Rouge, Louisiana, is bordered on the west by the Mississippi River. The University's more than 250 principal buildings are grouped on a 650-acre plateau that constitutes the main part of the campus.

LSU and A&M College is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. The Hebert Law Center holds membership in the Association of Law Schools and is on the approved list of the American Bar Association.

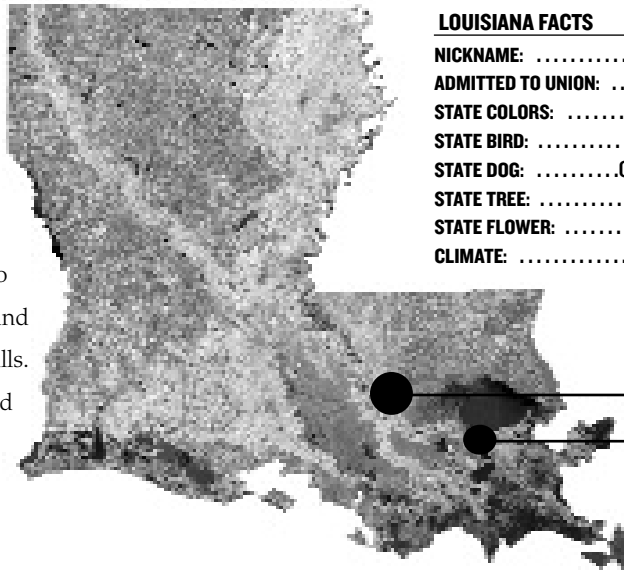

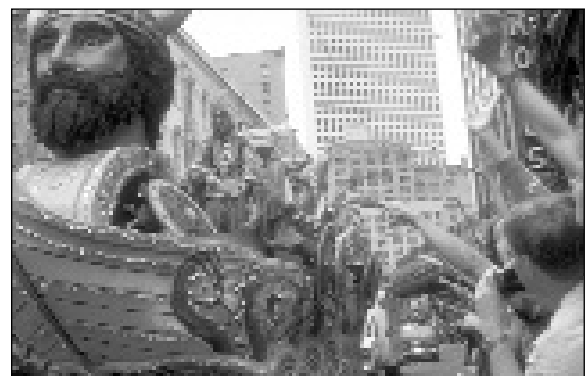

Some of the features of the 23,000-square foot facility include an on-site x-ray room, an in-house pharmacy, as well as state of the art hydrotherapy pools. The Broussard Center for Athletic Training is equipped with the largest hydrotherapy pools in both collegiate and professional sports and is one of the few collegiate training centers with a full-service pharmacy, as well as on-site x-ray room. LSU is also the only school in college athletics with a training room equipped with a full-service vision center. The facility is named in honor of legendary trainer Dr. Martin J. Broussard, who served as LSU's athletic trainer for several decades.





The LSU strength and conditioning facility, located in the North end zone of Tiger Stadium, was built in 1997 and features the latest in both strength training and cardiovascular equipment. Measuring 10,000-square feet, LSU has one of the finest strength and conditioning facilities in the nation.

Dr. Mark A. Emmert

Chancellor, LSU



Dr. Mark A. Emmert was appointed chancellor of Louisiana State University and Agricultural & Mechanical College on April 16, 1999, becoming the sixth chancellor to lead the state's flagship University.

Prior to joining LSU, Emmert served as chancellor of the University of Connecticut, as provost and vice president for academic affairs at Montana State University, and held various faculty and administrative positions at the University of Colorado. He has served as a member of numerous academic and civic boards and organizations.

Both the Fulbright Commission and the American Council on Education have awarded fellowships to Emmert. He has also been inducted into Phi Kappa Phi Honor Society, Alpha Lambda Delta Scholastic Society, Golden Key Honor Society, and the Connecticut Academy of Arts and Sciences. He is active in the American Council on Education, the New England Council of Presidents, and the National Association of State Universities and Land-Grant Colleges, where he served as chair of the Council on Academic Affairs.

A native of Tacoma, Washington, Emmert holds a bachelor's degree in political science from the University of Washington and master's and doctoral degrees from the Maxwell School of Syracuse University. His scholarly

work has focused on public policy topics, as well as issues in organizational theory. He has published his research in leading journals within his field and has served on several editorial boards. He has also served as a visiting scholar and lecturer internationally, working in Australia, Hong Kong, Japan, and Panama.

He is married to DeLaine S. Emmert, a former elementary school teacher, who is active in community, university, and philanthropic organizations. They have two children, Stephen and Jennifer.

Already a Louisiana Legend and one of the greatest college baseball coaches of all time, J. Stanley "Skip" Bertman has augmented his impressive list of achievements in two seasons as LSU's director of athletics. While supervising the Tigers' magnificent progress on the playing fields, he has begun to implement measures necessary to realize his vision of building the LSU athletics department into the best in the country. Bertman's bold and innovative plans promise to keep the Tigers among the nation's elite in all phases of collegiate athletics.

LSU's programs enjoyed remarkable success under Bertman's direction in 2002-03, as 16 of the Tigers' 20 sports participated in NCAA post-season competition. That accomplishment, along with improved graduation rates, increased team grade point averages and the construction of new academic facilities, foreshadow even more significant deeds in Bertman's tenure.

Bertman was named LSU's athletics director on January 19, 2001. With Bertman, LSU gained an athletics director who provides the leadership and experience necessary to manage the Tigers' nearly \$40 million budget.

Bertman guided LSU to five NCAA baseball titles, and his teams drew huge crowds to venerable Alex Box Stadium, as the Tigers led the nation in attendance in each of his final six seasons (1996-2001).

He also served as head coach of the 1996 U.S. Olympic team which captured the bronze medal in Atlanta.

Bertman continues to be honored for his remarkable coaching tenure, as he was inducted in June, 2002, into the Louisiana Sports Hall of Fame. He was inducted into the American Baseball Coaches Association Hall of Fame in January, 2003.

In a *Baseball America* poll released in January, 1999, Bertman was voted the second greatest college baseball coach of the 20th century, trailing only Rod Dedeaux of Southern California. Bertman and Dedeaux are the only coaches to win five CWS titles.

He had previously earned stellar recognition as one of the nation's brightest assistant coaches while at the University of Miami (Fla.) for eight seasons (1976-83). Before working at Miami, Bertman was renowned for his coaching excellence. In 11 seasons at Miami Beach High School, he directed the Hi-Tides to a state championship and two runners-up finishes. He was named Florida's Coach of the Year on three occasions.

In 1975, Bertman coached at Miami-Dade Downtown, leaving after one season to join legendary head coach Ron Fraser at Miami. The move was a homecoming of sorts, as Bertman spent his collegiate playing days with the Hurricanes as an outfielder and catcher from 1958-60. He earned his B.A. in health and physical education from Miami in 1961 and received his master's degree from UM in 1964.

Bertman and his wife Sandy are the parents of four daughters -- Jan, Jodi, Lisa and Lori. The Bertmans have two grandchildren -- Sophie Faith and Isaac Stanley, the children of Emile and Lori Bertman Guirard.



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WIMBLEDON IN MARCH

Wimbledon in March is an exciting way for patrons and corporate organizations to get involved with the LSU men's and women's tennis teams.

The fundraising and social event is held each spring on the courts of the W.T. "Dub" Robinson Tennis Stadium and features live music, food and drinks from local restaurants.

The first Wimbledon in March was held in 2003. The event brought out LSU players, Tiger supporters and LSU officials such as athletics director Skip Bertman. The success of the inaugural Wimbledon in March ensured it would become an annual part of LSU tennis tradition.

"Everyone had a good time," said head coach Jeff Brown. "From the great food, to the live band, the whole night was very enjoyable."

Wimbledon in March is part of a fund-raising effort to upgrade LSU's tennis facilities in the coming years. LSU, like many other top-level tennis programs in the NCAA, depends on corporate partnerships and private donors to reflect their national standing.
