## SEC MEN

Men's and women's tennis may be the most consistently dominant sports in the nation's most competitive athletic conference.

Last season brought another slew of accomplishments for SEC men's tennis teams. All 12 league teams were awarded berths in the NCAA Tournament in 2004, with all finishing in the top-40 in the final ITA rankings. SEC Champion Ole Miss was ranked fifth in the last poll, ahead of No. 6 Georgia and No. 8 Florida. LSU, Kentucky, Vanderbilt, Tennessee and Arkansas also finished in the top-25.

The SEC boasted two of the top 10 singles players in the nation according to the final poll, No. 4 Catalin Gard of Ole Miss and No. 7 Jesse Witten of Kentucky. There were also two doubles teams in the top 10, Bo Hodge and John Isner of Georgia and Simon Rea and Damien Spizzo of Tennessee.

The last 15 seasons have been the conference's most fruitful. SEC teams have won two national championships and SEC athletes have won five doubles and five singles titles. Duos from Florida, Mississippi State and Ole Miss won three consecutive doubles titles from 1993-95. SEC players have been recognized as All-Americans over 200 times since 1990 alone.

"When players are looking at schools there aren't many conferences, if any, to look for if they want to get the best competition match-in and match-out," said LSU head coach Jeff Brown, who became well acquainted with the league's tradition of excellence as a player at LSU from 1985-88.

"Any match you win in the SEC is a highlight because in most years that team is going to be ranked in the top-25 or at least the top-35. It's not like we have matches where half the schedule in conference is going to be weak. Every match is going to be a fight. It's a great atmosphere."

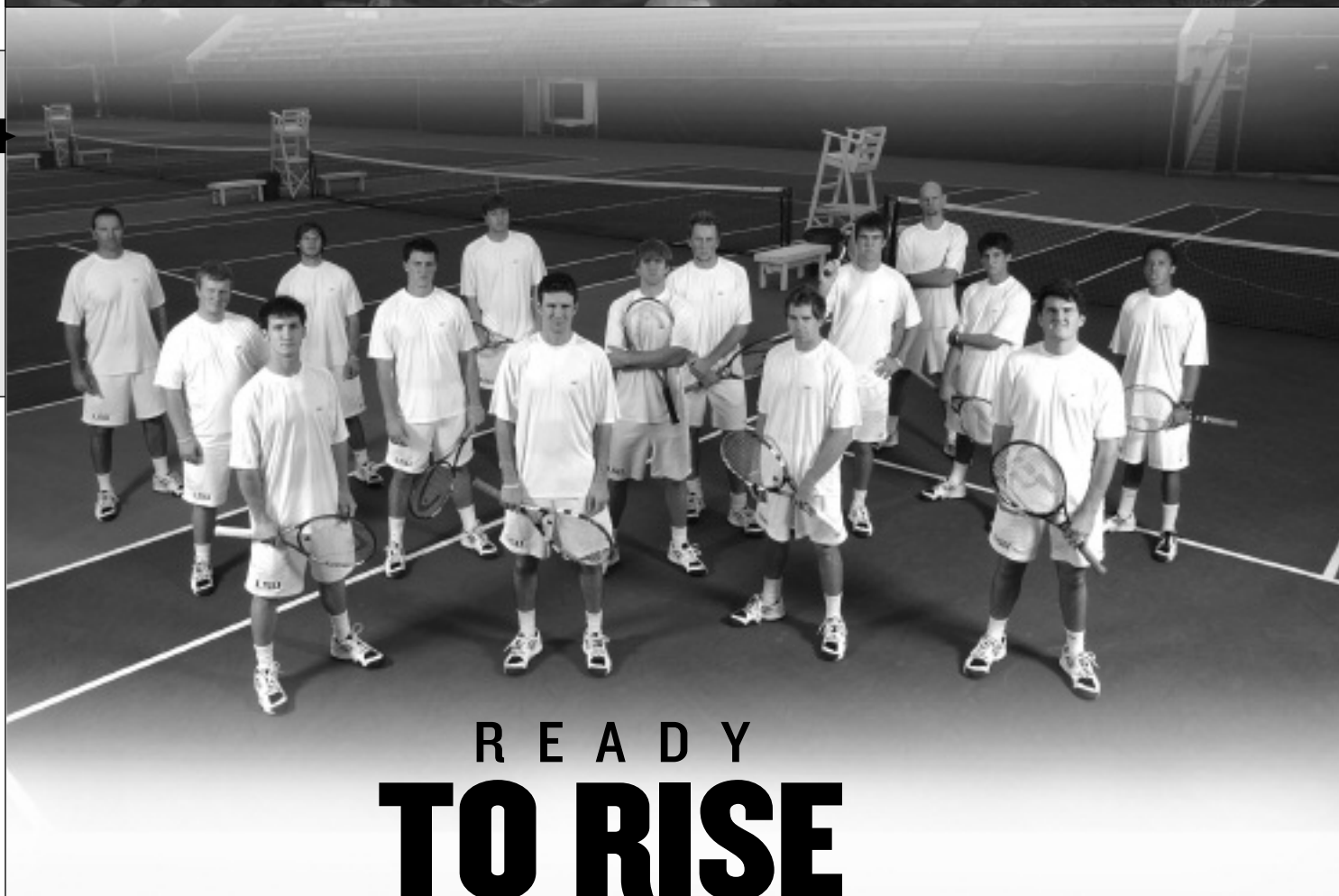

## READY TO RISE

**The big wins and tournament titles the Tigers piled on this fall set the stage for them to make a mark on college tennis in 2005 as any team in the nation**

LSU head coach Jeff Brown is excited to start this season. He can finally put his talented roster on the courts at one time after one of the most successful falls in recent LSU history.

"It's very exciting getting into this season, watching these guys improve and looking into the future," Brown said.

There is no shortage of experience on this year's team. Two seniors, Jason Hazley and Peter Richman, are ready to end their LSU careers on a high note. All-SEC sophomore Ken Skupski has a season of experience at the No. 1 position under his belt and has already used it to boost his performance in top-flight tournaments.

Three of the Tigers' top-six players graduated in 2004, leaving daunting holes to fill in the singles and doubles lineups. But the younger players who watched them last year are hungry to get on the court. There are also four talented newcomers ready to vie for their spots.

"We had some guys that were chomping at the bit to get in there, with Paul White, Danny Bryan, Colt Gaston and Kevin Dessauer," Brown said. "Those three seniors were a big part of our team last year, but we added some strength at the top with Mark Growcott coming in from Tyler Junior College."

Brown watched during fall tournaments as his players took advantage of their new shares of the spotlight.

"We didn't have any matches where you had to question anybody's effort, which every coach knows is not always the case," Brown said. "We had a great fall result-wise and improvement-wise, and you could see it on a weekly basis. I could be gone for a week recruiting and come back and it was noticeable improvement."

LSU players made room for themselves in some of the toughest draws in the country. Hazley and Skupski both found themselves in the ITA All-American Championships singles main draw, with just 64 players in the country. Two LSU doubles teams, Hazley and Growcott and Bryan and Gaston, were among the 32 teams in the doubles main draw.

Hazley would pick up the biggest win of his career there over No. 12 Sven Swinnen of Oregon in the consolation bracket. Skupski played his way into the semifinals of that tournament, the first Tiger to do so in five years.

Just a few days later LSU built on its big fall in the ITA Southeast Regional Championships. The doubles semifinals of that tournament were half LSU players. Hazley and Bryan teamed up for the first time to make a run and a case for national notice. Growcott and Skupski, in their first tournament as a doubles team, won the regional championship and a berth in the National Indoor Championships.

"We did have a lot of guys do very well, with Ken and Mark and Jason and several of the guys really stepping up their levels," Brown said. "It was exciting and trophies come with that and awards come with that."

#### TIGERS TAKING ON THE COUNTRY'S BEST EARLY IN 2005

LSU take its typical tour through some of the top teams in the nation in 2005, but this year their berth in the National Team Indoor Championships will give them more chances to pick up quality victories.

The Tigers were one of 16 teams in the country select to play in the tournament, which will be hosted by Illinois this February in Chicago. It is the first time since 2000 that LSU has earned a berth, before any current Tiger played here.

"It's something that the guys have wanted to do," Brown said. "The two seniors had not been able to do it yet, so they were extremely focused on their individual results to give us a chance to get into the team indoors. It's recognition for your program and it's three or four matches that don't count against your NCAA maximum."

Brown said the National Team Indoors will be a perfect tune-up for their conference schedule, which begins in March. The SEC, usually the strongest conference in the nation, appears headed for a particularly competitive year in 2005.

"Last year 29th was the ranking of the lowest team in the conference," Brown said. "Right now there's probably five teams in the top 14 in the nation in the SEC so our schedule is always going to be one of the top five or so in the nation. Getting in to the national team indoors is only going to strengthen that."

LSU's regular out-of-conference schedule is full of challenges, including a road match against Texas A&M and home meetings with Michigan and Tulane.

#### SENIORS PREPPED TO LEAVE THEIR MARK ON TIGER TENNIS

Jason Hazley and Peter Richman are the only seniors on LSU's roster, but their impact runs deep. Both have been mainstays at the top of the Tiger lineup throughout their collegiate careers.

Richman and Hazley have piled up awards in the past three years. Hazley is a two-time All-SEC and three-time All-

Louisiana selection who has seven top-100 singles wins and 14 top-50 doubles wins in his career.

Richman has two All-Louisiana and one All-SEC nod to his credit. He has 8 top-100 wins, six coming in 2003 when he played No. 1 singles for the Tigers.

"Hazley's got potential to play after college, but he's very focused on what we're trying to do this year and trying leave a good impression on this school," Brown said. "He's very emotional and he's always fighting. We've used his spark to get going for many years.

### NEWCOMERS BOOST LSU'S TALENT LEVEL

LSU added four solid players for the 2005 campaign who could make an impact immediately in the dual season.

Mark Growcott was ranked No. 1 in both singles and doubles at Tyler Junior College, and he has kept the championship play up already in his time at LSU. His doubles win with Skupski in the Southeast Regional Championships is just a taste of things to come, according to Brown.

"Mark not being a first year freshman is big," Brown said. "He's played some tough matches. He knows what it takes to win at that level. It's nice to be able to replace players like the seniors we had last year with a player of Mark's caliber."

The Tigers signed on three new players for the spring. William LeFevre, a Lafayette, La. native, returned to his home state after a season at San Diego State. Two of California's top juniors, Martel Campbell and Jonathan Tragardh, also arrived in January.

Jeff Brown has been a part of LSU tennis for almost half his life, playing a major role in nearly all of the most successful teams in the program's history. Now in his eighth season as the Tigers' head coach, Brown has done more than just maintain the standards of excellence that have characterized LSU tennis since his days as a player here. He has raised the bar substantially.

Brown took the reins of the program in 1998 after serving as an assistant to Jerry Simmons for three seasons. He was an All-American doubles player for LSU in 1988 and spent five years on the professional circuit.

Brown led the Tigers to back-to-back SEC Championships in 1998 and 1999, becoming the first person in league history to do so in his first two seasons as head coach. The Tigers also won the SEC Tournament both years.

He has since proven those feats were more than just beginner's luck. The man who so quickly earned respect in the profession is still early in his coaching career, but you would never know that by judging his list of achievements. Brown has never failed to take his teams to the NCAA Tournament and earned Louisiana Coach of the Year honors in 1998, 1999, 2001 and 2002. He has coached five All-Americans in his tenure, and after young teams fell out of the top 20 in 2002 and 2003, he brought the team back to the national spotlight in 2004.

Last season's final ranking of No. 13 marked the fifth time in Brown's seven years that his teams were among the top 15 in the country. But he's not ready to stop there. More than anyone, Brown himself would like to get back to the top of the conference because he remembers the thrill of being a part of championship teams.

"The years when we won the SEC and got to the Final Fours set the standard that we want to get back to," he said. "When you have a couple of years where you don't make it you really appreciate it and you're hungry for more. This team is as hungry as I've had in the last couple of years. Early success sets the tone so that you always know what you want."

When Brown took over the program in 1998, he was already well acquainted with the demands of being successful in college tennis. He enjoyed tremendous success as a player at LSU from 1985-88, as evidenced by his two All-SEC awards. He joined the Tiger tennis elite in his senior season when he eclipsed the 100-career victory mark. That same year he captained the LSU's only NCAA finals team. He still has the fourth-most wins of any player in LSU history.

Brown helped lead the Tigers to an 85-35 record as an assistant coach from 1994-97. LSU finished in the top-10 three of those years.

"To be a part of LSU from so many angles, first as a player, then as an assistant and now as a head coach has been wonderful," Brown said. "The tradition that has been here is that we're competing for championships and we're going to fight you to the end. That's the thing that's always been known about LSU in most sports and particularly tennis."

"LSU's overall sports excellence helps because our guys are around other people who are used to winning. Athletes here run into each other often and it's almost like there's a silent competition amongst the sports. You are pulling for each other of course, but at the same time you're driven not to fall behind the other sports on campus."

"Jeff represents what the LSU tennis program is all about," said Hall of Fame coach Jerry Simmons, who coached Brown on the 1988 LSU team that reached the NCAA Tournament championship match. Brown was team captain that year, leading the Tigers to a 27-2 record. Three years earlier as a freshman, Brown won a crucial SEC match at No. 4 singles that enabled LSU to win the conference crown.

"I knew as a player that I probably wanted to be a coach," Brown said. "I could see that it was something that kept you young and kept you around young people. Everyone I came in contact with as a player has had some influence on me as a coach."

Brown came across quite a few tennis legends as a player. He earned his degree at LSU in 1989 while serving as an assistant coach, then left Baton Rouge for the ATP tour. He won the doubles title at the Volvo International in 1990 and advanced to the round of 16 at the U.S. Open by beating the team of Pete Sampras and Jim Courier in the first round. Brown also advanced to the round of 16 at both the Australian Open and Wimbledon. His No. 45 international ranking in doubles is the highest ranking ever for a former LSU player. Brown married the former Deborah Schaeffer of Colorado Springs, Colo., on Nov. 19, 1999. Debi gave birth to their first son, Connor, on April 6, 2004.

An assistant coach with Mark Booras' capabilities is almost unheard of in collegiate tennis. So after another solid year backing up Jeff Brown in 2004, Booras was given the new title of associate head coach.

"We have been fortunate to have Mark for as long as we have," head coach Jeff Brown said. "He's a super coach and tactician. He's a great role model for the guys and he plays as well as anybody on the team."

Booras was recognized in 2004 as the best assistant coach in the ITA Southeast Region, which holds some of the top coaching and playing talent in the country.

In his first season with the Tigers, Booras helped guide LSU to its second consecutive SEC Championship as well as a berth in the Final Four. The 1999 squad also won its second-straight SEC Tournament, becoming the first team to ever repeat as tournament champions.

Booras, a Chicago native, graduated from West Virginia in 1993 and played college tennis for the legendary Terry Deremer. He was a top-20 singles and doubles player throughout his college career.

In each of his final three seasons at West Virginia, Booras competed in both the NCAA singles and doubles championship tournaments. Following his collegiate career, Booras joined the ATP tour and continued his success, ranking as high as No. 240 in the world in doubles. After a three-year career from 1994-96, he retired and decided to further his education. While earning his master's degree in sport psychology at West Virginia he was also the assistant men's tennis coach and a private tennis instructor.

In 1999, he came to LSU to help Brown build on the LSU tradition. His duties as assistant coach include conducting practices, player instruction during matches and recruiting future players.

"Mark continues to lend his knowledge of the game to this team and it is paying dividends," Brown said. "He is a great recruiter and he has incredible knowledge of the game. He is as important as any one person in this program."

## RAISING THE BAR

The 2004 Tigers entered the season ready to restore their reputation among the nation's best. They returned their entire top six from 2003, which included three All-SEC selections and three proven seniors to lead the way.

The Tigers capitalized on that experience, storming through their brutal schedule and knocking off 12 nationally-ranked opponents throughout the season. They finished tied for third overall in the SEC and second in the Western Division.

The veteran-filled team carried on the LSU hallmark of remarkably solid doubles play, winning the doubles point in all but four matches the entire season. The addition of Ken Skupski to the roster gave them power to compete at the top of the lineup with anyone in the country. They used big road wins at No. 20 Texas, No. 13 Vanderbilt and No. 24 Arkansas to solidify their reputation.

LSU rolled to a 7-0 record to begin the season. They traveled to Austin in their first road match and stunned the Longhorns, 5-2.

"The Texas match on the road was one of our biggest wins," head coach Jeff Brown said. "They were really gunning for us and we had had a really tough match with them the year before. For the guys to go in and start the season on the road with that win was big."

LSU see-sawed early in their conference schedule, handing losses to Tennessee, Vanderbilt and Mississippi State but losing to rivals Georgia, Ole Miss and Kentucky.

The Tigers took an early break from the SEC to host 13th-ranked Texas A&M. Another loss seemed imminent after LSU lost the doubles point for the first time all season. But they rallied to win five of the singles matches. Cory Ross clinched the win and Skupski iced it with the biggest victory of his career over No. 10-ranked Ante Matijevic.

"It looked like we were going to win the doubles point," Brown said. "We were well ahead and ended up losing it, but we came back and won five of the singles. That was an extremely tough win."

After the up-and-down start, LSU won four of their last five league matches to finish tied for third in the SEC. A disappointing loss to Tulane marked the first time in 81 matches that the Tigers fell to an in-state team. But by the end of the regular season they already had all the national credit they needed.

The Tigers were rewarded for their big wins and tough schedule with a chance to host the first two rounds of the NCAA Tournament for the first time since 2001. They bowed out in the second round to a perhaps under-ranked Rice team.

LSU's final ranking of 13th in the nation marked the fifth time in Brown's seven-year tenure that his team finished in the nation's top 15.

"It was a very successful year," Brown said. "We're obviously looking to build from that platform that these guys created, and most of them are back."

"Last season the team really took a step forward to create an identity for themselves. They did a great job on the road, which is a hard place to play. They were able to compete in any circumstance. They did a good job of keeping themselves in a position to host the NCAA Tournament."

### NO DOUBLE TROUBLE

Stellar doubles play gave LSU an early edge in almost every match it played in 2004.

The pairs of Bryan Fisher and Jason Hazley, Cory Ross and Sebastian Rutka and Ken Skupski and Peter Richman emerged as LSU's 1-3 teams by mid-season. That lineup lost the doubles point just four and only once in conference play.

Fisher and Hazley were mainstays at No. 1 doubles, going 14-8 in dual matches and earning a berth in the NCAA Tournament. They were both named second-team All SEC, second-team All-Louisiana and were ranked 15th in the final ITA poll of the season.

Ross and Rutka were listed 51st in the final poll. The two were 13-1. Skupski and Richman were not far behind at 13-3.

Brown said the LSU tradition of doubles success is something they work hard to maintain in practice.

"We practice doubles more than most teams do and we emphasize it because it's such a momentum point," Brown said. "We don't have enough scholarships to give them to doubles and singles players, so we need guys who can play both. We emphasize those skills."

### SKUPSKI'S DEBUT A SUCCESS

Ken Skupski met every expectation set for him in his freshman season.

Skupski beat No. 18 Richard Barker of Rice in his first match in college and went on to beat 11 nationally ranked players throughout the season. He debuted at No. 33 in the singles poll and rose as high as No. 28 by SEC play.

Skupski took the pressure of his teammates by assuming the No. 1 singles position. He faced some of the top players in the nation at that spot, including four top-10 opponents in conference play alone.

Skupski earned a slew of awards for his play. He was named SEC Player of the Week for his role in the Texas A&M win and first-team All-Louisiana and All-SEC, Louisiana Freshman of the Year, ITA Southeast Regional Player to Watch. Skupski also earned a spot in the NCAA Singles Championships.

"Ken was able to see the whole scope last year playing for the first year," Brown said.

### SENIORS LEAVE BIG RESULTS IN LAST SEASON

The three seniors made sure they would not smudge their legacies in their last season at LSU. Cory Ross, Sebastian Rutka and Bryan Fisher led the Tigers to the most successful season of their college careers in 2004.

"Those three guys mean a lot to our program," Brown said. "They were just like you want young men to be on the tennis court and in the classroom."

Fisher added to his long list of accomplishments by being named the SEC Scholar Athlete of the Year. He led the Tigers' doubles attack with Jason Hazley and was a solid point at No. 3 singles.

Team captains Ross and Rutka were two of LSU's most reliable singles and doubles points. Ross lost just two matches in the dual season at the No. 5 and No. 6 positions. Rutka went 13-8 in dual matches and was also named to the SEC Good Works Team.

"Sebastian was able to raise his level up to anyone and also was a solid doubles point for us," Brown said. "And Cory was our rock. He decided a year after he transferred here that he wasn't going to lose, and he basically didn't. We knew we were going to get that point in most matches."

### ACADEMIC SUCCESS

The Tigers' success on the court in 2005 was matched only by their success in the classroom. The team average GPA of 3.5 in the spring was by far the highest of any of LSU varsity team.

"Last year in the fall we were a little disappointed in our classroom performance," Brown said. "So we had a team meeting and assigned an academic captain. At first it was kind of a joke, but I think the guys got what we were trying to do. After a while the talk kept going and they pushed each other."

The dialogue paid off when the ITA recognized LSU on their list of All-Academic teams. In addition, Paul White and Bryan Fisher were named ITA Scholar Athletes. Two Tiger seniors, Fisher and Sebastian Rutka, received degrees in May.

"The LSU men's tennis team epitomizes the real meaning and goals behind the term 'student-athlete,' said LSU Athletics Director Skip Bertman. "These young men prove that our young people can maintain a high level of success in both athletic competition and their academic endeavors. I am proud of the consistent performance of these young men in the classroom. They represent LSU well."

### NCAA TOURNAMENT

LSU found itself right where it planned to be at the end of the 2004 regular season--at home in Baton Rouge. Their 14th seed in the NCAA Tournament was just high enough to host the first two rounds.

Despite the comforts of home, the challenge LSU faced was immense. No. 14 ranked Rice, South Alabama and Southern all headed to Robinson Stadium to begin their bids for a national championship.

LSU beat Southern for the second time in 2004 in the first round.

Their second-round match against Rice

promised to be a difficult one. Rice brought a powerful lineup, including the No. 1-ranked doubles team and No. 35-ranked singles player in the country.

The Tigers used their home-court advantage to build momentum in the doubles point. They split matches on courts two and three. Bryan Fisher and Jason Hazley were up a break on the Owls' Richard and William Barker, who had not lost a dual match since 2001. The LSU pair was serving at 7-6 when stormy conditions delayed the end of the point.

The match was moved to an indoor facility with only three courts across town. It resumed four hours after it stopped.

Rice was quick to recover after the break. Barker and Barker regained the advantage and won the doubles match to clinch the doubles point. LSU's top three could not slow Rice in singles. The Tigers lost the match, 4-0, to end their season.

"We lost our home-court advantage, which was something we worked for all year," Brown said. "Rice had their best three points on the court. I would have liked to see what we could have done at four, five and six."

Skupski, Fisher and Hazley went on to compete in the NCAA Individual Championships. Skupski was one of only two freshmen in the nation to compete in the singles bracket. He fell in the first round to fifth-seeded Phillip King of Duke.

Fisher and Hazley advanced to the second round before ending their two-year stint as a team in a loss to Pedro Rico and Calle Hansen of Pepperdine.

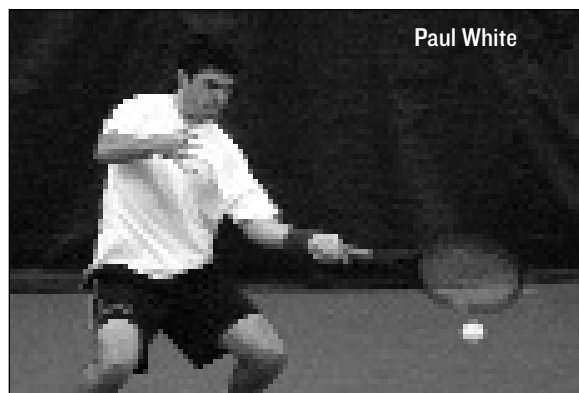

The Tigers entered the NCAA's with a 20-2 record, while riding a nine-match winning streak. However, Pepperdine proved to be too strong for LSU as the Wave rolled to a 6-3 first round win. LSU finished the year ranked No. 12 in the nation.

After a five-year absence from the NCAA's, second-year head coach Jerry Simmons led the Tigers back to the NCAA Tournament for what would be the first of ten-straight appearances at the event. The Tigers were quickly eliminated from the NCAA's, as eventual champion UCLA ousted LSU by a 6-0 count.

LSU reached the finals by recording wins over California in round two, Georgia in the quarterfinal and Michigan in the semifinal. LSU, which was ranked No. 1 in the nation for four weeks during the season, ended the year ranked second.

The top-seeded Tigers overcame a 3-0 deficit to No. 23 Auburn in the title match for a thrilling 4-3 win to advance to the NCAA's. LSU beat Kentucky in the first round and Alabama-Birmingham in the Regional semifinal. TCU, ranked 4th, bumped LSU from the NCAA Championships in the round of 16 for the second-straight year by a 4-3 count.

## 1997

**Final Rank: No. 9**

Jerry Simmons, LSU's all-time winningest coach, led the Tigers to the NCAA's for the 13th and final time during 1997 after announcing his retirement prior to the start of the spring season. Simmons capped off a much heralded 26- year coaching career, 15 coming at LSU, as his Tigers earned an automatic tourney bid. Unfortunately, Simmons' Tigers were upended in round one by No. 10 Duke 4-1, finishing the year at 17-7 overall No. 9 nationally.

## 1999

*Overall Record: 20-7*

**SEC Champions**

**SEC Tournament Champions**

**Final Rank: No. 4**

LSU shocked the collegiate tennis world by returning to the Final Four for the second consecutive year in 1999. The Tigers, who had a No. 19 preseason ranking, hosted a regional and beat Alcorn State and Tulane to advance to the round of 16 at Athens, Ga. There, LSU beat a gutsy Fresno State team before upsetting second-ranked Duke in the quarterfinal. However, the magic ended in the Final Four as No. 1 UCLA managed to survive the Tiger attack. The Tigers defeated eventual national champion Georgia twice on the season.

## 2000

*Overall Record: 20-6*

**Final Rank: No. 12**

After entering the season as one of the favorites to win the national championship, the 2000 LSU squad earned a No. 11 seed in the NCAA Tournament. For the second consecutive season, the Tigers roared through the first two rounds in Baton Rouge with 4-0 victories over both Alcorn State and Clemson. Then it was on to Athens, Ga., and a tough round of 16 match with sixth-seeded Illinois. In a grueling match, the Illini proved to be a little too strong as they claimed a 4-3 victory and ousted LSU from the tournament.

## 2001

*Overall Record: 16-8*

**Final Rank: No. 13**

The LSU men's tennis team qualified for the NCAA Championships for the seventh-straight season in 2001 after accumulating a 14-7 overall record during the regular season. The Tigers rebounded from a 4-3 upset loss against Alabama in the Southeastern Conference Tournament to host an NCAA Regional for the third-consecutive season. In front of a raucous home crowd at the W.T. "Dub" Robinson Tennis Stadium, LSU dropped Marist, 4-0, in first-round action before knocking off 19th-ranked Texas, 4-2, to earn a trip to the NCAA Championships in Athens, Ga. The Tigers advanced to the Sweet 16 for the third-straight year and faced No. 7 Texas A&M at the Dan Magill Tennis Center on the campus of the University of Georgia. In the third-round match, Texas A&M out-slugged the Tigers, 4-1.

## 2002

*Overall Record: 11-14*

**Final Rank: No. 29**

Despite finishing the regular season with a losing record for the first time in seven years, LSU proved its worthiness of an NCAA Tournament bid by advancing to the round of 32 with a convincing 4-0 victory over the higher-ranked Texas Christian Horned Frogs. The win was a triumphant contrast for the Tigers after the team had traversed a season full of 4-3 losses and had faced 16 top-25 teams in 25 dual-match contests. In the second round of the NCAA Tournament, LSU fell prey to 16th-ranked Texas A&M for the second-consecutive season, 4-0, in College Station, Texas.

## 2003

*Overall Record: 13-11*

**Final Rank: No. 24**

The Tigers kept their NCAA tournament streak alive, making their ninth consecutive postseason appearance and finishing the season ranked in the top 25 for the 19th time in 20 years. The Tigers finished second in the SEC West with a 5-6 conference record and 13-11 overall record. They were upset in the first round by No. 56 South Alabama, 4-2, in New Orleans.

## 2004

*Overall Record: 18-7*

**Final Rank: No. 13**

LSU's three seniors, Cory Ross, Sebastian Rutka and Bryan Fisher, ended their time at LSU with their most successful years here. The Tigers finished in a tie for third in the SEC. They earned the right to host the first two rounds of the NCAA Tournament for the first time since. Despite losing in the second round to 14th-ranked Rice, they finished ranked 13th in the nation, the fifth top-15 finish in Jeff Brown's career. Ken Skupski entered the lineup at No. 1 singles and became one of two freshmen in the nation selected to play in the NCAA Singles Championship. Fisher and Jason Hazley finished their highly successful career as a doubles team ranked No. 15 in the nation. The 2004 Tigers compiled a 3.5 GPA in the spring to lead all LSU varsity teams. They were selected an ITA All-Academic team and Fisher and Paul White were named ITA Scholar Athletes.

## Donni Leaycraft

1989 NCAA SINGLES CHAMPION

Donni Leaycraft capped off his record-setting junior season by becoming the first LSU player to win the NCAA singles title. Leaycraft entered the NCAA singles tournament as the 13th seed and proceeded to breeze through the first four rounds, winning all four matches in straight sets. In the semifinal, Leaycraft upset hometown favorite Pablo Montana of Georgia in three sets and then beat Steven Jung of Nebraska 6-1, 4-6, 6-3 to claim the title. Leaycraft finished the year with a 42-10 record and ranked No. 3 in the nation.

1988 CLAY COURT SINGLES CHAMPION

Johan Kjellsten did not waste any time making an impact after transferring from McNeese State prior to his senior season. At the Clay Courts, Kjellsten, who was the tournament's eighth seed, knocked off top-ranked Malivai Washington of Michigan, 6-3, 6-3 in the quarterfinal and then cruised past fourth-ranked Greg Failla of Southern Cal in the semifinal. In the final, Kjellsten knocked off 12th-ranked Stephen Enochs of Georgia 2-6, 6-2, 6-1 to give LSU the school's first grand slam event winner. Kjellsten went on to post a 38-11 overall singles record and finished the year ranked No. 7 in the country.

The El Sawy-Woodruff semifinal match was said to be the best match of the tournament and it was only fitting that it would be the last match El Sawy would play at LSU.

The LSU men's tennis team has called the W.T. Robinson Tennis Stadium home since 1970, but the "Dub," as it is affectionately known, has kept up with newer college facilities through a series of renovations and improvements over the years.

Both the nationally-ranked Tigers and Lady Tigers enjoy state-of-the-art locker rooms, a squad room, brand-new showers and bathrooms. The "Dub" was totally refurbished after the 2002 season to include a media room, an equipment room and a ground-floor viewing area for handicapped tennis fans.

Robinson Stadium, named in honor of LSU's former winningest tennis coach, was completed in 1970 and is the site of the Tigers' and Lady Tigers' home outdoor matches. LSU plays its indoor matches at the next-door Carl Maddox Field House.

The "Dub" features six varsity courts and six practice courts. The six varsity courts were resurfaced prior to the 2002-03 academic school year, while the six practice courts received new surfaces in the spring of 2001 as a part of the facilities makeover. The varsity courts feature an electronic scoreboard and can accommodate up to 550 spectators.

Former men's coach Jerry Simmons surpassed Robinson in 1992 to become the Tigers' all-time winningest coach. The Coach Simmons Era came to a close in 1997, as the Tigers posted an 11-1 home mark en-route to an automatic berth in the NCAA Championships. With Simmons at the helm, Robinson Stadium became one of the toughest venues in the country for opponents to play. LSU tallied an incredible 162-25 (.866) record at home during the last 15 seasons under Simmons.

Since current head coach Jeff Brown took over the reins in 1998, the Tigers have accumulated a 57-14 (.803) overall record at home. In his opening season as head coach, Brown notched a perfect 12-0 record at Robinson Stadium.

Maddox Field House, which can seat up to 3,000 spectators, has four surfaced courts. It is climate controlled and also plays host to LSU track and field meets.

## W.T. "DUB" ROBINSON

LSU's legendary men's tennis coach, W.T. Robinson, or "Dub" as he was lovingly known, single-handedly acted as a catalyst in the LSU tennis program's rise to national prominence. In his nearly three decades as the head tennis coach at LSU, Robinson accumulated a 189-180-9 overall record and propelled the Tigers to a status among the nation's elite.

Working with limited resources and a financially-deprived tennis program, LSU's rise to the top of collegiate tennis can be traced back to Robinson's warm personality and quick wit. Always a favorite among his players, Robinson transformed a team that had not won a match in three years into a team that finished with a 12-1 record and a second-place finish in the Southeastern Conference in only his sixth season at the helm.

When the LSU tennis complex was completed in the fall of 1976, it was only natural that it was named after the person that built the program.

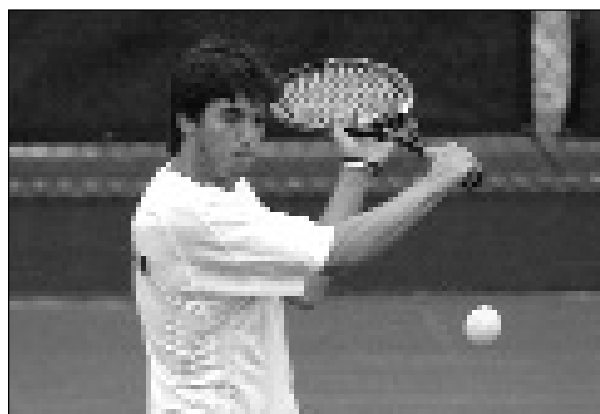

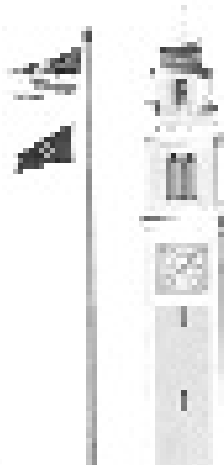

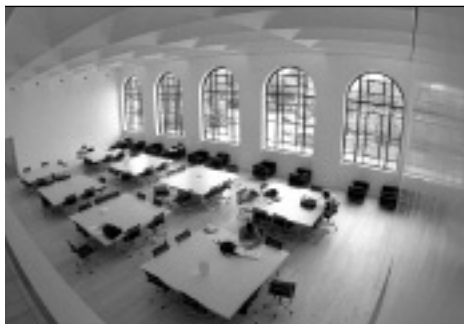
## COMPUTER STATIONS

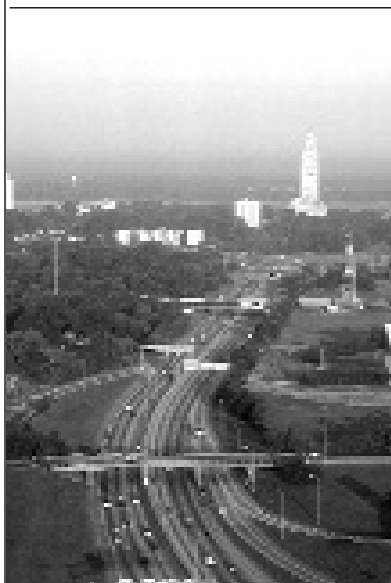

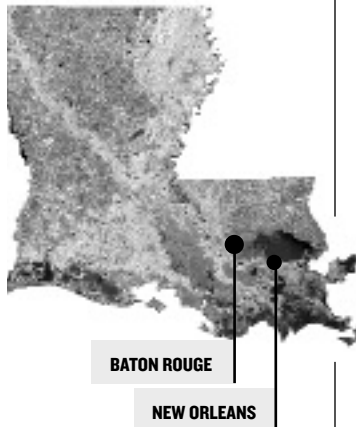

Already a Louisiana Legend and one of the greatest college baseball coaches of all time, J. Stanley "Skip" Bertman has augmented his impressive list of achievements in two seasons as LSU's director of athletics. While supervising the Tigers' magnificent progress on the playing fields, he has begun to implement measures necessary to realize his vision of building the LSU athletics department into the best in the country. Bertman's bold and innovative plans promise to keep the Tigers among the nation's elite in all phases of collegiate athletics.

LSU's programs enjoyed remarkable success under Bertman's direction in 2002-03, as 16 of the Tigers' 20 sports participated in NCAA post-season competition. That accomplishment, along with improved graduation rates, increased team grade point averages and the construction of new academic facilities, foreshadow even more significant deeds in Bertman's tenure.

Bertman was named LSU's athletics director on January 19, 2001. With Bertman, LSU gained an athletics director who provides the leadership and experience necessary to manage the Tigers' nearly \$40 million budget.

Bertman guided LSU to five NCAA baseball titles, and his teams drew huge crowds to venerable Alex Box Stadium, as the Tigers led the nation in attendance in each of his final six seasons (1996-2001).

He also served as head coach of the 1996 U.S. Olympic team which captured the bronze medal in Atlanta.

Bertman continues to be honored for his remarkable coaching tenure, as he was inducted in June, 2002, into the Louisiana Sports Hall of Fame. He was inducted into the American Baseball Coaches Association Hall of Fame in January, 2003.

In a *Baseball America* poll released in January, 1999, Bertman was voted the second greatest college baseball coach of the 20th century, trailing only Rod Dedeaux of Southern California. Bertman and Dedeaux are the only coaches to win five CWS titles.

He had previously earned stellar recognition as one of the nation's brightest assistant coaches while at the University of Miami (Fla.) for eight seasons (1976-83). Before working at Miami, Bertman was renowned for his coaching excellence. In 11 seasons at Miami Beach High School, he directed the Hi-Tides to a state championship and two runners-up finishes. He was named Florida's Coach of the Year on three occasions.

In 1975, Bertman coached at Miami-Dade Downtown, leaving after one season to join legendary head coach Ron Fraser at Miami. The move was a homecoming of sorts, as Bertman spent his collegiate playing days with the Hurricanes as an outfielder and catcher from 1958-60. He earned his B.A. in health and physical education from Miami in 1961 and received his master's degree from UM in 1964.

Bertman and his wife Sandy are the parents of four daughters -- Jan, Jodi, Lisa and Lori. The Bertmans have two grandchildren -- Sophie Faith and Isaac Stanley, the children of Emile and Lori Bertman Guirard.

# Sean O'Keefe

Chancellor, LSU

Sean O'Keefe has been appointed chancellor of Louisiana State University and Agricultural & Mechanical College, becoming the seventh chancellor to lead the state's flagship University.

Nominated by President George W. Bush and confirmed by the United States Senate, Sean O'Keefe was appointed by the President as the 10th Administrator of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration on December 21, 2001, his fourth Presidential appointment. As Administrator, O'Keefe leads the NASA team and manages its resources as NASA seeks to advance exploration and discovery in aeronautics and space technologies.

O'Keefe joined the Bush Administration on inauguration day and first served as the Deputy Director of the Office of Management and Budget until December 2001, overseeing the preparation, management and administration of the Federal budget and government wide-management initiatives across the Executive Branch.

Prior to joining the Bush Administration, O'Keefe was the Louis A. Bantle Professor of Business and Government Policy, an endowed chair at the Syracuse University Maxwell School of Citizenship and Public Affairs. He also served as the Director of National Security Studies, a partnership of Syracuse University and Johns Hopkins University, for delivery of executive education programs for senior military and civilian officials. Appointed to these positions in 1996, he was previously Professor of Business Administration and Assistant to the Senior Vice President for Research and Dean of the Graduate School at the Pennsylvania State University.

Appointed as the Secretary of the Navy in July 1992 by President George Bush, O'Keefe had previously served as Comptroller and Chief Financial Officer of the Department of Defense since 1989. Before joining then Defense Secretary Dick Cheney's Pentagon management team in these capacities, he served on the United States Senate Committee on Appropriations staff for eight years, and was Staff Director of the Defense Appropriations Subcommittee. His public service began in 1978 upon selection as a Presidential Management Intern.

O'Keefe is a Fellow of the National Academy of Public Administration, a member of the Committee on Climate Change Science and Technology, and a Fellow of the International Academy of Astronautics. During his academic postings, he was a Visiting Scholar at the Wolfson College of the University of Cambridge in the United Kingdom, a member of the Naval Postgraduate School's civil-military relations seminar team, and conducted seminars for the Strategic Studies Group at Oxford University. He served on the national security panel to devise the 1988 Republican platform and was a member of the 1985 Kennedy School of Government program for national security executives at Harvard University.

In 1993, President Bush and Secretary Cheney presented him the Distinguished Public Service Award. He was the 1999 faculty recipient of the Syracuse University Chancellor's Award for Public Service; recipient of the Department of the Navy's Public Service Award in December 2000; and has been awarded honorary doctorate degrees from several prestigious educational institutions. In March 2003 and 2004, he was recognized and honored by the Irish American Magazine as one of the Top 100 Irish Americans.

He is the author of several journal articles, contributing author of "Keeping the Edge: Managing Defense for the Future" released in October 2000, and in 1998, co-authored "The Defense Industry in the Post-Cold War Era: Corporate Strategies and Public Policy Perspectives."

Sean O'Keefe earned his Bachelor of Arts in 1977 from Loyola University in New Orleans, Louisiana, and his Master of Public Administration degree in 1978 from The Maxwell School. O'Keefe and his wife Laura have three children—Lindsey, Jonathan and Kevin.
