During matches, media members will be provided with a media guide as well as a match program that includes notes and updated statistics. Final match results can be obtained immediately following the match.

PHOTOGRAPHERS

All photographers must check in with an LSU Sports Information staff member on site for designated photo locations prior to every match. Photographers are welcome to photograph from the stands, but must receive permission to photograph on the courts. Only accredited photographers or those persons on special assignment will be allowed access to the court.

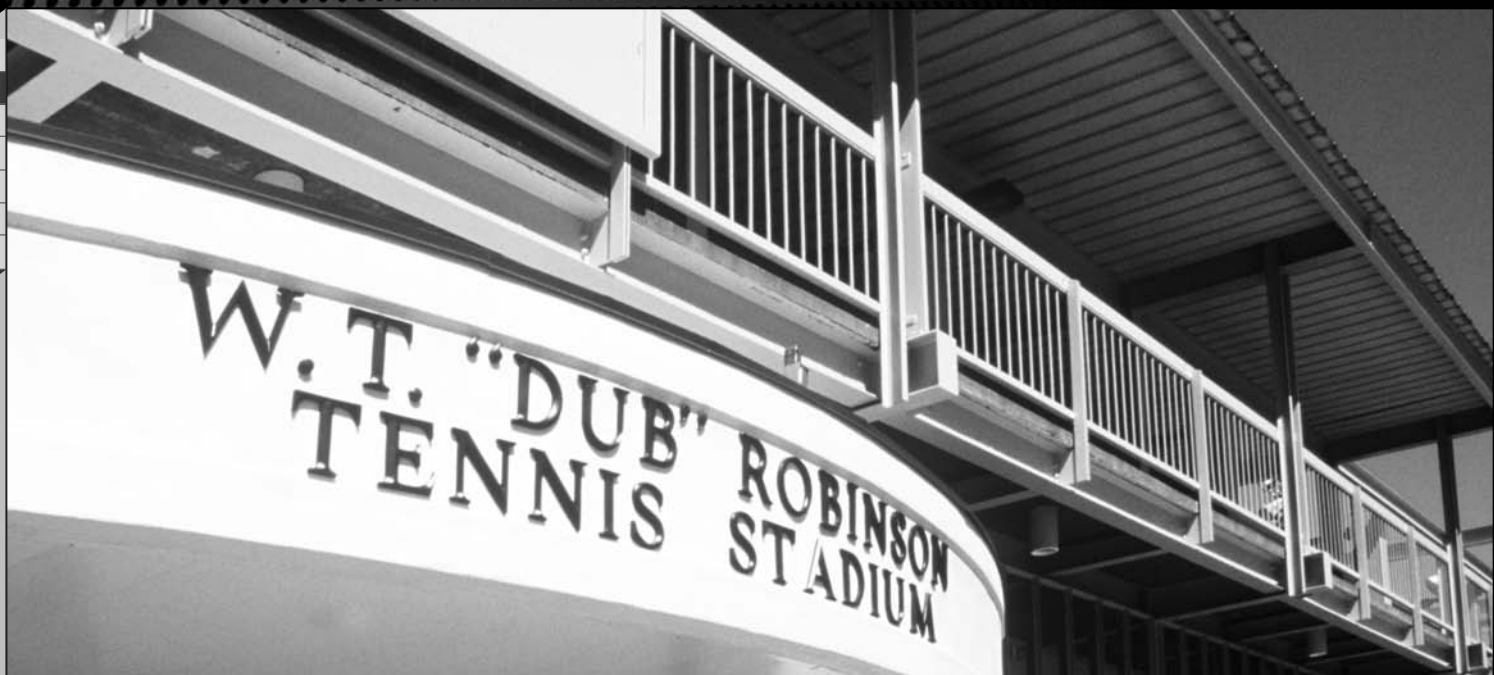

HISTORY



The LSU men's tennis team has called the W.T. Robinson Tennis Stadium home since 1970, but the "Dub," as it is affectionately called, has kept up with newer college facilities through a series of renovations and improvements over the years.

Robinson Stadium, named in honor of LSU's former winningest tennis coach, was completed in 1970 and is the site of the Tigers' and Lady Tigers' home outdoor matches.

The "Dub" features six varsity courts and six practice courts. The six varsity courts were resurfaced and had new tower lights put in prior to the 2007 academic school year, while the six practice courts received new surfaces in the spring of 2001 as a part of the facilities makeover. The varsity courts feature an electronic scoreboard and can accommodate up to 550 spectators.

Both the nationally-ranked Tigers and Lady Tigers enjoy state-of-the-art locker rooms, a squad room, and brand-new showers and bathrooms. The "Dub" was totally refurbished after the 2002 season to include a media room, an equipment room and a ground-floor viewing area for handicapped tennis fans. Prior to the 2007 season the media room was refurbished with leather couches and a 42-inch flat screen television.

Former men's coach Jerry Simmons surpassed Robinson in 1992 to become the Tigers' all-time winningest coach. The Simmons Era came to a close in 1997, as the Tigers posted an 11-1 home mark en-route to an automatic berth in the NCAA Championships. With Simmons at the helm, Robinson Stadium became one of the toughest venues in the country for opponents to play. LSU tallied an incredible 162-25 (.866) record at home during the last 15 seasons under Simmons.

Since current head coach Jeff Brown took over the reins in 1998, the Tigers have accumulated a 104-25 (.806) overall record at home. In his opening season as head coach, Brown notched a perfect 12-0 record at Robinson Stadium. In 2005, Brown notched his best home record at 16-1.

W.T. "DUB" ROBINSON FACTS

LSU's legendary men's tennis coach, W.T. Robinson, or "Dub" as he was lovingly known, single-handedly acted as a catalyst in the LSU tennis program's rise to national prominence. In his nearly three decades as the head tennis coach at LSU, Robinson accumulated a 189-180-9 overall record and propelled the Tigers to a status among the nation's elite.

Working with limited resources and a financially-deprived tennis program, LSU's rise to the top of collegiate tennis can be traced back to Robinson's warm personality and quick wit. Always a favorite among his players, Robinson transformed a team that had not won a match in three years into a team that finished with a 12-1 record and a second-place finish in the Southeastern Conference in only his sixth season at the helm.

When the LSU tennis complex was completed in the fall of 1976, it was only natural that it was named after the person that built the program.

Computer Stations

Throughout the Academic Center are 75 computer stations, providing student-athletes with a quiet working environment for research, writing and studying.



Bo Campbell Auditorium

The 1,000-seat auditorium is used through the year as a classroom and lecture hall. Each seat in the auditorium has space for a laptop and a modem hookup, providing each student unlimited learning opportunities. The auditorium also contains a movie theatre size screen to aid professors with lectures and classroom activities.



The Library

The library provides a perfect setting for individual study, or with a tutor as a group.

Study Area

Included in the 54,000 square feet of the Academic Center are individual study areas as well as 14 private computer rooms for student-athletes to work one-on-one with tutors or by themselves.



COMMUNICATIONS LAB



Along with the success LSU's athletic teams, comes a great deal of media attention and Dr. Tommy Karam, the Director of the Communications Lab, uses his lab, located on the fourth floor of the Cox Communications Academic Center for Student-Athletes, to work with LSU student-athletes on their interactions with the media and interview skills. Karam's lab is a mock press conference setting to get the student-athletes used to handling themselves in front of both print and electronic media. He video tapes the mock interview session and reviews it with the student-athlete to help them become more comfortable in an interview setting.



Lights, Camera, Answer

Dr. Karam uses his studio to prepare LSU's student-athletes to interact with all phases of local and national media by working one-on-one in a press conference setting. The Communications Lab includes a working camera for Karam to review the session with the student-athletes.

A Champions



The 2005-06 athletics year was another wonderful one for LSU. The Tigers and Lady Tigers enjoyed success from the fields and courts to the classroom. All in all, it was an exciting year for LSU's student-athletes, coaches and fans.

Postseason Presence

Of LSU's 20 sports, 12 teams advanced to postseason play. Among the highlights: Both of LSU's basketball teams advanced to the NCAA Final Four, the football team defeated Miami in the Chick-Fil-A Peach Bowl, the men's track and field team finished second at both the indoor and outdoor NCAA Championship meets, while the women placed seventh at both meets. The gymnastics team finished the season ranked eighth in the nation and softball was 15th.



In the Classroom

Nine of LSU's sports posted a cumulative grade point average of 3.0 or better during 2005-06.

50%

50 percent of student-athletes (207 of 314) recorded a grade point average of 3.0 or higher. 79 of those student-athletes recorded at least a 3.5 GPA and 28 finished with a perfect 4.0 GPA.

X Factor

Track sprinter Xavier Carter sprinted his way into the record books in 2006. Carter won six NCAA titles and became the first athlete in NCAA history to ever win both the 100 and 400 meters at the championship meet and was the first male to win four titles in one meet since Jesse Owens in 1936. Carter was named the NCAA Indoor and Outdoor Track Athlete of the Year.

Augustus Again

Seimone Augustus earned women's basketball's National Player of the Year honors for the second straight season. She received the Wade, the Naismith and the John R. Wooden Awards and was named the Associated Press' Player of the Year. Augustus, a Kodak All-American, also led the nation in scoring averaging 22.7 points per game.

National Champions

Gymnast April Burkholder earned the individual NCAA title on the balance beam. Track star Xavier Carter was a six-time NCAA champion in 2006, winning the 100m and 400m races at the NCAA Outdoor Championships and the 400m race at the NCAA Indoor Championships. He also led the 4x100m relay to an outdoor title and both the indoor and outdoor 4x400m relays to titles. The LSU women's 4x400m relay also claimed both the NCAA indoor and Outdoor titles as well.

Hoops Sweep

LSU's duo of Glen Davis and Seimone Augustus were named the Southeastern Conference Men's and Women's Players of the Year, respectively. Davis helped lead the men's program to its first SEC title since 2000, while Augustus guided the Lady Tigers to a second straight league title. Tyrus Thomas was crowned the SEC's Freshman of the Year as well.

Tops in the League

Xavier Carter and Seimone Augustus swept the SEC Male and Female Athlete of the Year honors. Carter, the NCAA Indoor and Outdoor Track Athlete of the Year, was a three-time individual NCAA champion, winning the outdoor 100 and 400 meter races and the 400m indoors. Augustus led the SEC in scoring and help guide the Lady Tigers to a second straight conference title.

Rare Feat

LSU joined North Carolina as the only schools in NCAA history to have its football team and men's and women's basketball teams finish their seasons ranked in the top 5 in the nation during the same athletic year. LSU's football team finished fifth in the nation after a solid victory over Miami in the Peach Bowl. The men's basketball team finished third in the polls after advancing to the NCAA Final Four, while the women's basketball team competed the season ranked fourth after a third straight trip to the NCAA Final Four.

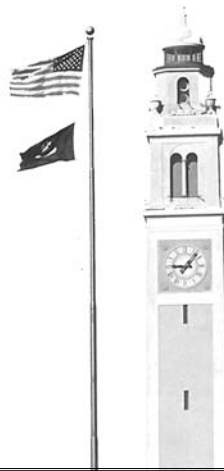

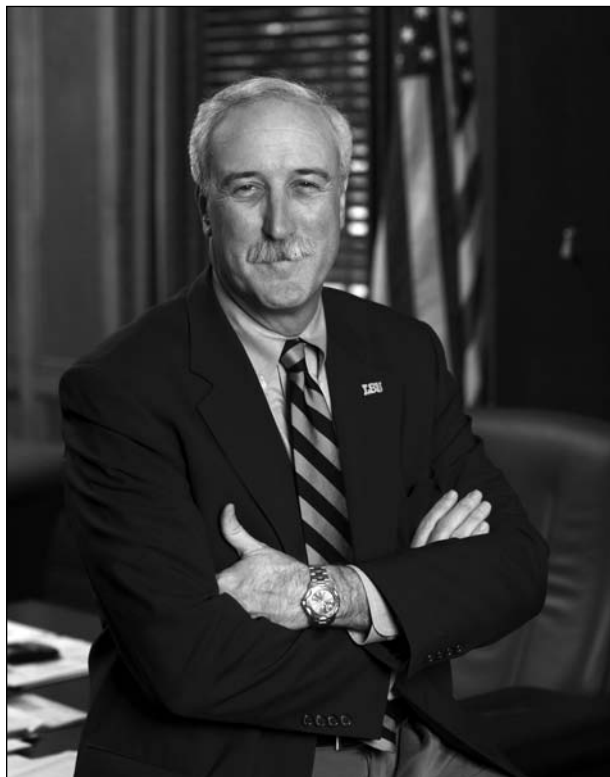

Sean O'Keefe

Chancellor, LSU

The Honorable Sean O'Keefe assumed the office of Chancellor of Louisiana State University and A&M College on February 21, 2005. Prior to his appointment as LSU's seventh chancellor, O'Keefe established a distinguished career in higher education and United States government service.

Chancellor O'Keefe earned his Bachelor of Arts from Loyola University in New Orleans in 1977 and his Master of Public Administration from the Maxwell School of Syracuse University in 1978. He held an endowed chair at the Syracuse University Maxwell School of Citizenship and Public Affairs and served as the Director of National Security Studies, a partnership of Syracuse University and Johns Hopkins University for delivery of executive education programs. He was also Professor of Business Administration and Assistant to the Senior Vice President for Research and Dean of the Graduate School at the Pennsylvania State University.

He served on four separate occasions as a presidential appointee. Most recently, until February 2005, he served as the 10th Administrator of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration. O'Keefe joined President George W. Bush's Administration as Deputy Assistant to the President and as the Deputy Director of the Office of Management and Budget until December 2001.

Appointed Secretary of the Navy in July 1992 by President George Bush, O'Keefe served as Comptroller and Chief Financial Officer of the Department of Defense since 1989. Before joining then-Defense Secretary Dick Cheney's Pentagon management team in these capacities, he served on the United States Senate Committee on Appropriations staff for eight years and was Staff Director of the Defense Appropriations Subcommittee. His public service began in 1978 upon his selection as a Presidential Management Intern.

Chancellor Sean O'Keefe is a Fellow of the National Academy of Public Administration, a Fellow of the International Academy of Astronautics, and member of the Naval Postgraduate School Board of Advisors. During his academic postings, he was a Visiting Scholar at the Wolfson College of the University of Cambridge in the United Kingdom, a member of the Naval Postgraduate School's civil-military relations seminar team, and conducted seminars for the Strategic Studies Group at Oxford University. He served on the national security panel to devise the 1988 Republican platform and was a member of the 1985 Kennedy School of Government program for national security executives at Harvard University.

In 1993, President Bush and Secretary Cheney presented him the Distinguished Public Service Award. He was the 1999 faculty recipient of the Syracuse University Chancellor's Award for Public Service; recipient of the Department of the Navy's Public Service Award in December 2000; and has been awarded five honorary doctorate degrees from several prestigious educational institutions. In 2003 and 2004, he was recognized and honored by the Irish American Magazine as one of the Top 100 Irish Americans.

He is the author of several journal articles and contributing author of *Keeping the Edge: Managing Defense for the Future* released in October 2000. In 1998, he co-authored *The Defense Industry in the Post-Cold War Era: Corporate Strategies and Public Policy Perspectives*.

He is married to Laura McCarthy O'Keefe, and they have three children - Lindsey, Jonathan, and Kevin.

ALREADY A LOUISIANA LEGEND AND ONE OF THE GREATEST COLLEGE BASEBALL COACHES OF ALL TIME,

J. Stanley "Skip" Bertman has made the seamless transition into the athletics director's chair with the same enthusiasm, vision and demand for excellence that were trademarks of his stellar coaching career.

In just four years as LSU's director of athletics, Bertman has already added to his impressive list of on-the-field achievements. Under his direction, LSU enjoyed arguably the greatest athletics years in the history of the institution. In 2003-04 three teams won national championships, nine teams finished in the nation's top ten, and fourteen teams ranked in the top 25 and in 2004-05 14 teams advanced to the post-season. LSU teams also enjoyed improved grade point averages across the board, making the LSU student-athlete experience a success on and off the fields of competition.

While supervising the Tigers' progress on the playing fields, he has begun to implement measures necessary to realize his vision of building the LSU athletics department into the best in the country. Bertman's bold and innovative plans promise to keep the Tigers among the nation's elite in all phases of collegiate athletics.

Bertman is now in the midst of upgrading LSU's athletics complex. Working hand in hand with the Tiger Athletic Foundation, Bertman has already overseen the completion of the Cox Communications Academic Center for Student-Athletes while renovating Tiger Stadium and the Pete Maravich Assembly Center, and constructing the Football Operations Center.

It was also Bertman who took the bold but essential move to implement a seat contribution program in Tiger Stadium to fund facility improvements and ensure the financial stability of the LSU Athletics Department for the next decade.

Bertman was named LSU's athletics director on January 19, 2001. With Bertman, LSU gained an athletics director who provides the leadership and experience necessary to manage the Tigers' \$52 million budget.

Bertman guided LSU to five NCAA baseball titles, and his teams drew huge crowds to venerable Alex Box Stadium, as the Tigers led the nation in attendance in each of his final six seasons (1996-2001).

He also served as head coach of the 1996 U.S. Olympic team which captured the bronze medal in Atlanta.

Bertman continues to be honored for his remarkable coaching tenure, as he was inducted in June, 2002, into the Louisiana Sports Hall of Fame. He was inducted into the American Baseball Coaches Association Hall of Fame in January, 2003.

In a Baseball America poll published in 1999, Bertman was voted the second greatest college baseball coach of the 20th century, trailing only Rod Dedeaux of Southern California. Bertman and Dedeaux are the only coaches to win five CWS titles.

He had previously earned recognition as one of the nation's brightest assistant coaches while at the University of Miami (Fla.) for eight seasons (1976-83). Before working at Miami, Bertman was renowned for his coaching excellence. In 11 seasons at Miami Beach High School, he directed the Hi-Tides to a state championship and two runners-up finishes and he was named Florida's Coach of the Year on three occasions.

In 1975, Bertman coached at Miami-Dade Downtown, leaving after one season to join legendary head coach Ron Fraser at Miami. The move was a homecoming of sorts, as Bertman spent his collegiate playing days with the Hurricanes as an outfielder and catcher from 1958-60. He earned his B.A. in health and physical education from Miami in 1961 and received his master's degree from UM in 1964.

Bertman and his wife Sandy are the parents of four daughters - Jan, Jodi, Lisa and Lori. The Bertmans have three grandchildren - Sophie Faith and Isaac Stanley, the children of Emile and Lori Bertman Guirard, and Samuel Aaron, the son of Drew and Lisa Pate.

SEC MEN

The Southeastern Conference men's tennis program continues to be the nation's leader on the collegiate hardcourt and in 2006 the trend continued.

The conference made another strong national showing in 2006 as the Georgia men advanced to the finals at the 2006 NCAA Division I Tennis Championships in Palo Alto, Calif. The Bulldogs advanced to the finals with wins over Furman, Georgia Tech, Notre Dame, Virginia and Baylor. Georgia lost to Pepperdine, 2-4 to end the season 30-1.

In the singles tournament, Ole Miss' Erling Tveit had the best showing. Tveit lost to eventual champion, UCLA's Kohlhoefel, in the semifinals. In doubles, the final two SEC teams were defeated in the Round of 16. Overall the SEC has 16 NCAA singles champions in men's tennis dating back to 1930. Eight of those singles titles have come since 1984.

Six of the ten doubles titles have come since 1993, with five different SEC schools being represented. Florida won in 1993 with the doubles tandem of David Blair and partner, singles champion Mark Merklein. Mississippi State followed in 1994 with Laurent Miquelard and Joc Simmons and the Ole Miss duo of Mahesh Bhupathi and Ali Hamadeh captured the doubles title in 1995. In 2001, Matias Boeker and Travis Parrott of Georgia won the championship. The next year, Auburn's Andrew Colombo and Mark Kovacs took the title. In 2005, the Georgia duo of John Isner and Antonio Ruiz were crowned champions.

National team titles for the league have been captured by Georgia as it boasts the SEC's only four men's NCAA championship teams in 1985, 1987, 1999 and 2001.

"When players are looking at schools, there aren't many conferences, if any, to look for if they want to get the best competition match-in and match-out," said LSU head coach Jeff Brown, who became well acquainted with the league's tradition of excellence as a player at LSU from 1985-88.

"Any match you win in the SEC is a highlight because in most years that team is going to be ranked in the top-25 or at least the top-35," said Brown. "It's not like we have matches where half the schedule in conference is going to be weak. Every match is going to be a fight. It's a great atmosphere."

Ten Years Under Brown

LSU head coach Jeff Brown enters his 10th season leading the Tigers with high expectations as eight of his 10 players are upperclassmen

With three seniors and five juniors, Brown believes this group of seasoned veterans is a force to be reckoned with.

"There is no substitute for experience," Brown said. "When freshmen come in it takes some time for them to understand the level of intensity that your opponent is coming at you with and how important it is to close out matches. Having so much experience our guys know that everything is important. They know what it takes to succeed."

The Tigers' biggest weapon is senior Ken Skupski. The two-time ITA All-American has been a dominant force in the SEC since he arrived in Baton Rouge.

Skupski was the first Tiger to win the SEC Coaches Indoor Championship, and the first player in the history of the tournament to win back-to-back titles. The Liverpool, England, native picked up his first NCAA Tournament singles victory last spring, but his season was cut short as a nagging back injury forced him to retire from the competition.

Last spring was the curtain call for one of the Tiger's most successful doubles teams in school history as Skupski's partner Mark Growcott finished his eligibility. But, Skupski looks to add to an already impressive résumé

as he sets himself up for the pro tour after he graduates in the spring.

"He is looking forward to using this year to become more physically fit and wants to stay focused so when he steps on the pro tour, he can continue to have success," Brown explained.

Joining Skupski with one year of eligibility remaining are fellow seniors Danny Bryan and Eric DeRoche.

Bryan was team captain last year and shined in his leadership role as he received second-team All-SEC honors. The New Orleans native excelled on the doubles court as he and partner Colt Gaston notched a team-best 26 victories.

"Danny was a vital part of our success last year," Brown commented. "He and Colt did a great job with doubles and I expect them to do even bigger and better things this year."

DeRoche is known for his intensity and work ethic. The former walk-on is ready to make a name for himself this season as the coaching staff tries to utilize him and maximize his potential in singles and doubles.

Leading the pack of juniors is Gaston. The left hander has an intimidating presence on the court as he stands a towering 6 feet 5 inches tall. The Georgia native was one

of the team's most consistent contributors last season, notching 16 singles victories on his way to second-team All-SEC honors. Gaston's success in singles, and in doubles with Bryan, will be one of the key ingredients to the Tigers' success this season.

"Colt really stepped up last year and had several big wins for us in singles," Brown said. "He and Danny (Bryan) have been great in doubles and haven't lost many matches. I know this duo is determined to be an All-American team this season."

Junior Kevin Dessauer has not only performed on the court but in the classroom as well. The two-time ITA Scholar-Athlete has maintained a 4.0 grade point average while still competing at a high level in tennis.

One of the team's two newcomers, Colorado transfer Jan Zelezny, comes to LSU with two years remaining of eligibility. Brown believes Zelezny will make an immediate impact for LSU after he saw him compete last season.

"We played against him while we were at Colorado last year and liked his skills," Brown commented. "He has great speed which allows him to get more balls and makes it difficult for his opponents to finish points against him."

Rounding out the junior class are Martel Campbell and Jonathan Tragardh. Brown believes these two California natives will be part of a heavy competition to move up in the lineup.

"Besides Ken, I believe every position is up for grabs," Brown said. "We have such a talented group of veterans that have raised their level of play that it will be a heated competition heading into the regular season."

Sophomore James Cluskey performed well enough last year that Brown decided to make him Skupski's new doubles partner. The duo picked up three wins last year as a doubles team.

TOUGH ROAD AHEAD

The Tigers participated in five tournaments in the fall to help prepare for the regular season. Brown said his team understands the importance of the fall tournaments is not only to gain experience for the regular season but for rankings as well.

"Our guys realize doing well in the tournaments will push us in the rankings," he said. "We have to make a statement early to help us enter the spring on a good note."

LSU took a break from its fall season to give back to the community. On Oct. 29 2006, the Tigers hosted "Duel Under the Oaks," an event that helped raise money for New Orleans Health Sciences.

The main attraction was an exhibition tennis match between tennis legend Pete Sampras and former professional tennis star Todd Martin. Before the exhibition there was a children's clinic run by LSU's coaching staff and players at W.T. Robinson Tennis Stadium.

After the clinic the festivities headed to the Pete Maravich Assembly Center for the tennis exhibitions. Bryan and Skupski faced each other in an exhibition followed by two members from the women's team going

"The clinic went really well and was a nice start to a great day of tennis," Brown said. "The kids got to play tennis with not only our teams but Todd Martin and Pete Sampras. They really went above and beyond what they had to do by hitting with each kid. Those kids have something they will always remember."

The regular season will be challenging for LSU as it faces 14 teams that participated in the NCAA Tournament last season.

"We look forward to having such a competitive schedule because we never have to worry about the guys getting pumped up for a match," Brown said. "We play against some out of conference teams that we have had great matches with in the past, including Texas A&M, Ohio State and TCU."

The Tigers kickoff the 2007 season at the SEC Coaches Indoor Championships, where Skupski was victorious the two previous seasons. The Tigers also have an extended home season, as they will host the SEC tournament.

"We are thrilled about the SEC Championships being held on our courts," Brown said. "We only hope to put ourselves in position to have the best draw possible."

"We are excited especially for our fans that have been great to us over the years. Having the SEC Championships here and the SEC Indoor Championships in New Orleans will allow our fans to see us play close to home."

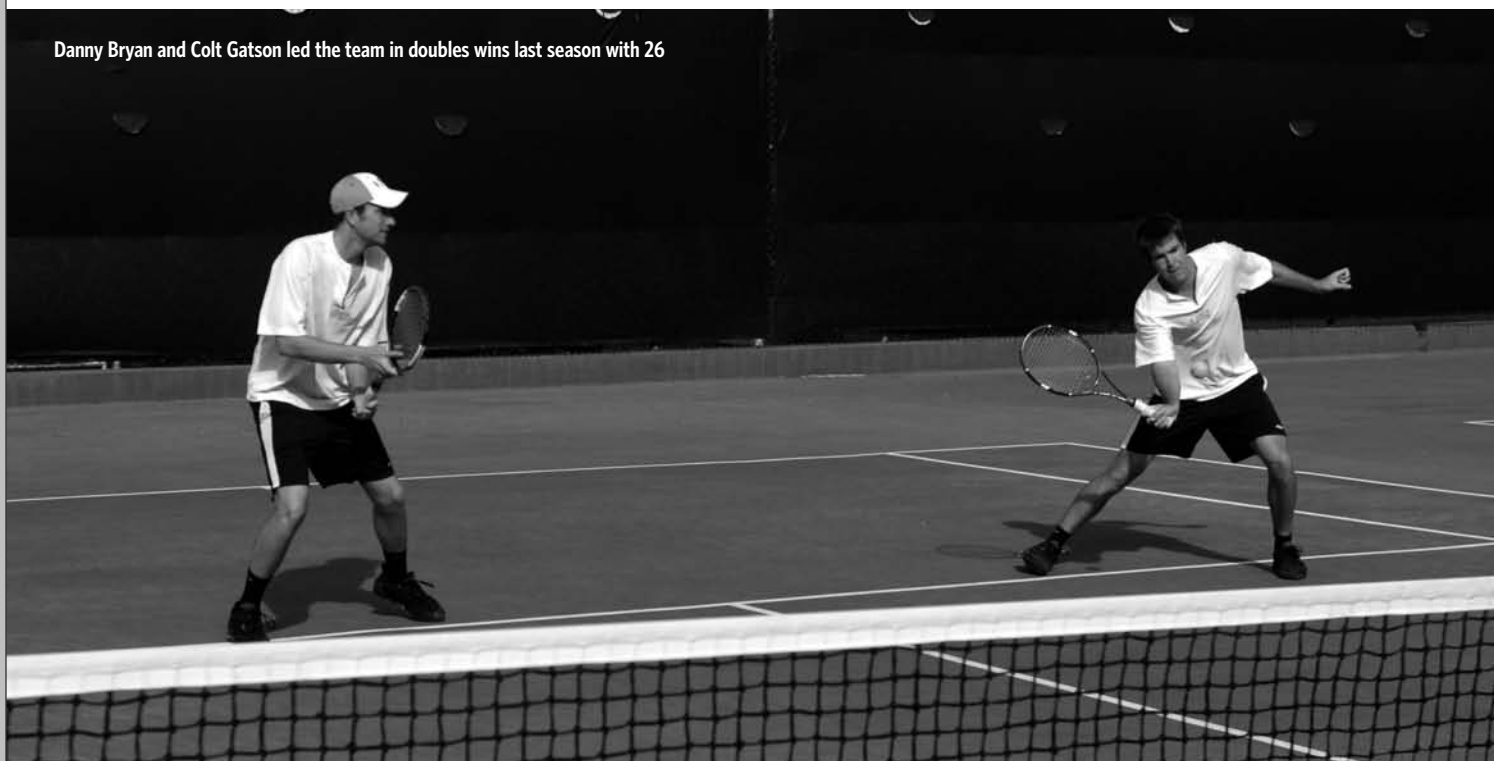

Jeff Brown has been a part of LSU tennis for almost half his life, playing a major role in nearly all of the most successful teams in the program's history. Now in his 10th season as the Tigers' head coach, Brown has done more than just maintain the standards of excellence that have characterized LSU tennis since his days as a player here. He has raised the bar substantially.

Brown took the reins of the program in 1998 after serving as an assistant to Jerry Simmons for three seasons. He was an All-American doubles player for LSU in 1988 and spent five years on the professional circuit.

Brown led the Tigers to back-to-back SEC Championships in 1998 and 1999, becoming the first person in league history to do so in his first two seasons as head coach. The Tigers also won the SEC Tournament both years.

He has since proven those feats were more than just beginner's luck. Brown quickly earned respect among his peers due to his lengthy list of achievements. Brown has never failed to take his teams to the NCAA Tournament, and earned Louisiana Coach of the Year honors in 1998, 1999, 2001, 2002 and 2005. He has coached 10 All-Americans in his tenure, and after young teams fell out of the top 20 in 2002 and 2003, he brought the team back to the national spotlight in 2004. In 2005, Brown helped the Tigers return to the top-10 for the first time since 1998.

Last season's final ranking of No. 25 marked the eighth time in Brown's nine seasons that his team was among the top-25 in the country and his team has finished in the top 10 three times during his tenure. But he's not ready to stop there. More than anyone, Brown himself would like to get back to the top of the conference because he remembers the thrill of being a part of championship teams.

"The years when we won the SEC and got to the Final Fours set the standard that we want to get back to," he said. "When you have a couple of years where you don't make it you really appreciate it and you're hungry for more."

When Brown took over the program in 1998, he was already well acquainted with the demands of being successful in college tennis. He enjoyed tremendous success as a player at LSU from 1985-88, as evidenced by his two All-SEC awards. He joined the Tiger tennis elite in his senior season when he eclipsed the 100-career victory mark. That same year he captained LSU's only NCAA finals team. He still has the fourth-most wins of any player in LSU history. Brown helped lead the Tigers to an 85-35 record as an assistant coach from 1994-97. LSU finished in the top-10 three of those years.

"To be a part of LSU from so many angles, first as a player, then as an assistant and now as a head coach has been wonderful," Brown said. "The tradition that has been here is that we're competing for championships and we're going to fight you to the end. That's the thing that's always been known about LSU in most sports and particularly tennis."

"LSU's overall sports excellence helps because our guys are around other people who are used to winning. Athletes here run into each other often and it's almost like there's a silent competition amongst the sports. You are pulling for each other of course, but at the same time you're driven not to fall behind the other sports on campus."

"Jeff represents what the LSU tennis program is all about," said Hall of Fame coach Jerry Simmons, who coached Brown on the 1988 LSU team that reached the NCAA Tournament championship match. Brown was team captain that year, leading the Tigers to a 27-2 record. Three years earlier as a freshman, Brown won a crucial SEC match at No. 4 singles that enabled LSU to win the conference crown.

"I knew as a player that I probably wanted to be a coach," Brown said. "I could see that it was something that kept you young and kept you around young people. Everyone I came in contact with as a player has had some influence on me as a coach."

Brown came across quite a few tennis legends as a player. He earned his degree at LSU in 1989 while serving as an assistant coach, then left Baton Rouge for the ATP tour. He won the doubles title at the Volvo International in 1990 and advanced to the round of 16 at the U.S. Open by beating the team of Pete Sampras and Jim Courier in the first round. Brown also advanced to the round of 16 at both the Australian Open and Wimbledon. His No. 45 international ranking in doubles is the highest ranking ever for a former LSU player.

Brown married the former Deborah Schaeffer of Colorado Springs, Colo., on Nov. 19, 1999. They have two young boys, Connor (2) and Cameron who was born on Jan. 28, 2007.

An assistant coach with Mark Booras' capabilities is almost unheard of in collegiate tennis, and Booras did solid job backing up Jeff Brown again in 2006.

"We have been fortunate to have Mark for as long as we have," head coach Jeff Brown said. "He's a super coach and tactician. He's a great role model for the guys and he plays as well as anybody on the team."

Booras was recognized in 2004 as the best assistant coach in the ITA Southeast Region, which holds some of the top coaching and playing talent in the country. That same year Booras was given the title of associate head coach.

In his first season with the Tigers, Booras helped guide LSU to its second consecutive SEC Championship as well as a berth in the Final Four. The 1999 squad also won its second-straight SEC Tournament, becoming the first team to ever repeat as tournament champions.

Booras, a Chicago native, graduated from West Virginia in 1993 and played college tennis for the legendary Terry Deremer. He was a top-20 singles and doubles player throughout his college career.

In each of his final three seasons at West Virginia, Booras competed in both the NCAA singles and doubles championship tournaments. Following his collegiate career, Booras joined the ATP tour and continued his success, ranking as high as No. 240 in the world in doubles. After a three-year career from 1994-96, he retired and decided to further his education. While earning his master's degree in sport psychology at West Virginia he was also the assistant men's tennis coach and a private tennis instructor.

In 1999, he came to LSU to help Brown build on the LSU tradition. His duties as assistant coach include conducting practices, player instruction during matches and recruiting future players.

"Mark continues to lend his knowledge of the game to this team and it is paying dividends," Brown said. "He is a great recruiter and he has incredible knowledge of the game. He is as important as any one person in this program."

Booras married the former Laura Anne Ingram on June 17, 2006.

He is looking forward to using this year to become more physically fit and wants to stay focused so when he steps on the pro tour he can continue to have success."

The team's biggest weapon looks to continue to lead the Tigers as he enters his senior campaign. Skupski has proven to be a dominant force on the indoor courts as he became the first Tiger player to win the SEC Coaches Indoor Championship and the first player in the history of the tournament to win back-to-back titles. Skupski has 89 career singles victories, which ranks 12th in school history. Skupski will be without his longtime friend and doubles partner Mark Growcott this year, as Growcott finished his eligibility last season. 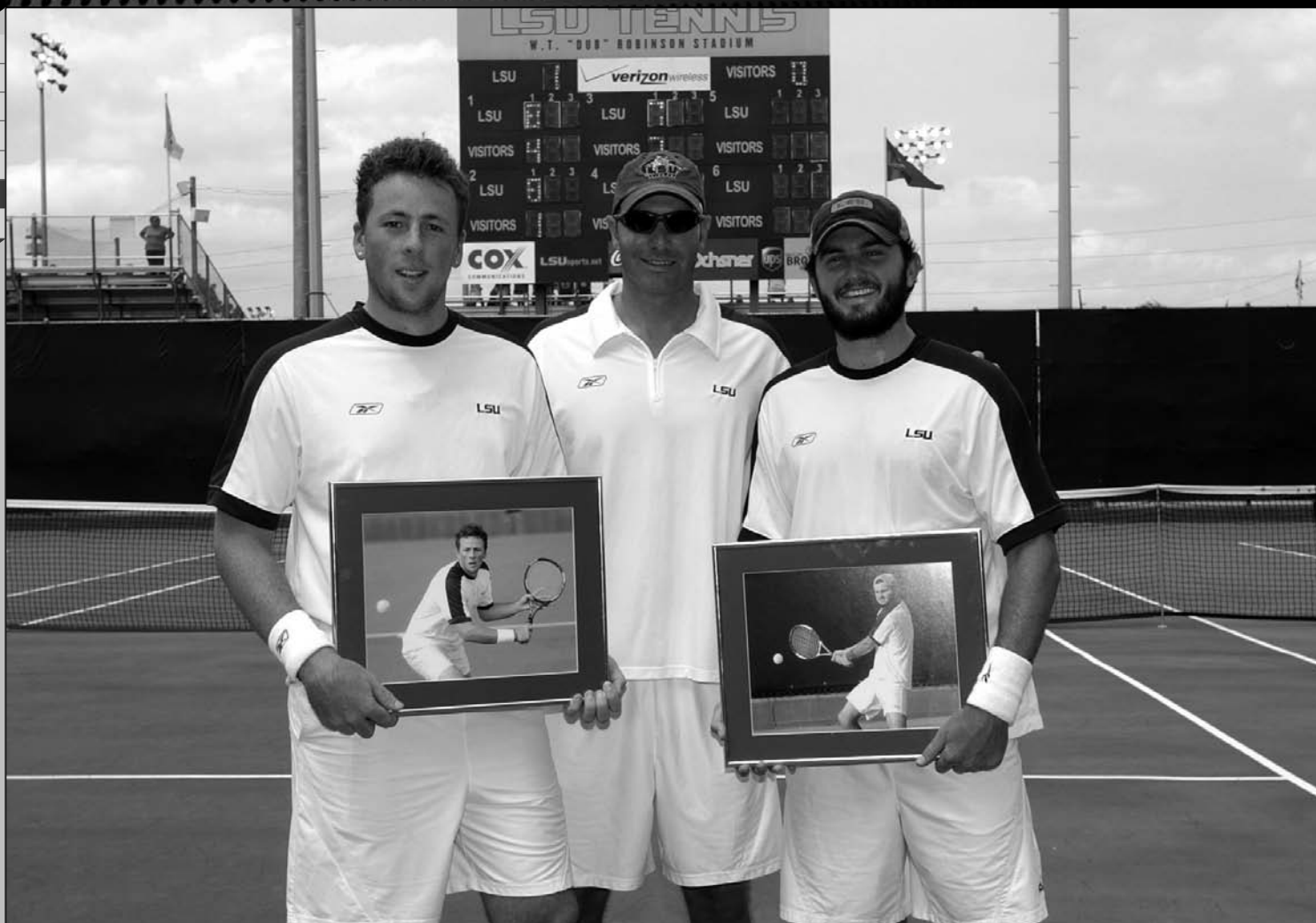

The LSU men's tennis team finished another successful season under head coach Jeff Brown in 2006. The Tigers finished the season ranked No. 25 in the nation, which marks the eighth time in nine years under Brown that the Tigers finished in the top-25.

The Tigers started the fall season with high expectations as the double duo of Ken Skupski and Mark Growcott was tabbed as the No. 1 team in the nation in the Intercollegiate Tennis Association's preseason rankings. Also making a splash in doubles was the tandem of Danny Bryan and Colt Gaston. Bryan and Gaston were ranked No. 27 in the preseason rankings. The pair opened the fall by winning the top doubles bracket at the Rice Crowne Plaza Invitational.

The Tigers competed for a good cause to cap off the fall season as the team traveled to Texas A&M to participate in the Wells Fargo Hurricane Katrina Fundraiser. The tournament, which also included host Texas A&M, Tulane and Tyler Junior College, was put together to serve as a fundraiser for the Tulane's men's and women's tennis programs. The two teams spent the fall season at Texas A&M due to damages the university suffered from Hurricane Katrina. Two Tigers met in the finals of the fundraiser as Skupski defeated Gaston in three sets. Coach Brown said he was proud of Skupski, not only

because he won the tournament but because he did it with a heavy heart.

Right before the team left for the tournament Skupski's grandfather passed away, something Brown said was difficult for Skupski to deal with.

"I know that was a lot to have on his mind when he was playing," Brown said. "I think he felt someone was watching over him during the tournament."

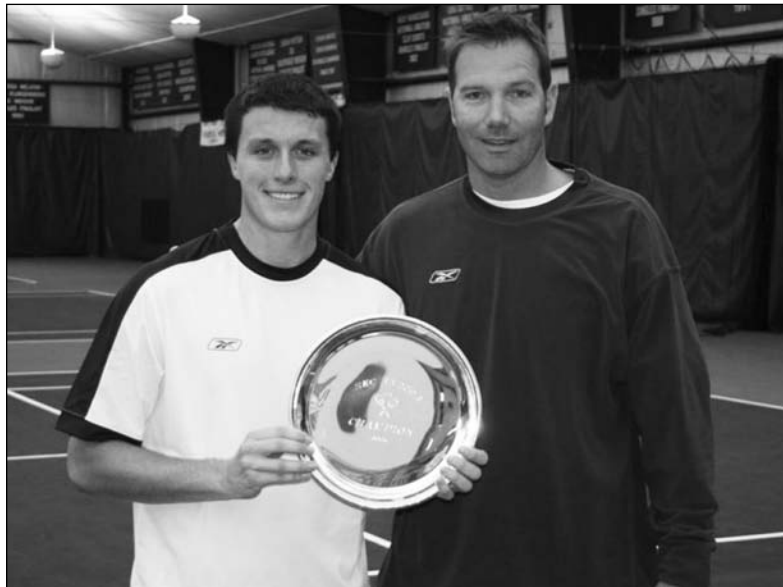
Skupski's accolades continued in the spring by taking his second straight SEC Coaches Indoor title.

The Tigers began the regular season nationally ranked at No. 10. and opened the season strong by winning their first five matches. After the early success the Tigers began to struggle with injuries and only won three out of their next nine matches. The drought knocked LSU out of the top-25. The Tigers bounced back as they went on to win their next seven matches including two against top-10 teams. The winning streak put LSU as the front runner for the SEC West crown. However, two heart breaking road losses at Auburn and Arkansas prevented the Tigers from achieving their first SEC West title and a first-round bye in the SEC tournament.

LSU's struggles continued in postseason play as they fell to Mississippi State in the SEC Tournament and to Minnesota in the first round of the NCAA Tournament.

Dynamic Run Ends

Skupski and Growcott hoped to repeat the postseason success they achieved the previous season when they reached the doubles finals of the NCAA Championships. Skupski picked up his first win in the NCAA Singles Championships as he knocked off Ohio State's Bryan Koniecko in straight sets. Skupski's momentum ended quickly in the second round as he could not overcome a nagging back injury, which forced him to retire. The two-time ITA All-American fought through the pain to team up with Growcott to take out Utah's Nick Coutts and Zach Ganger in the opening round of doubles. The Tigers tandem could never get the upper hand in the second round where they were ousted by the No. 3 ranked team of Pepperdine's Andre Begermann and Scott Doerner.

"It was a real high quality match with neither team breaking serve," Brown commented. "Pepperdine hit a couple of clutch shots in the second tiebreaker to take the match."

The doubles duo finished the season with a 23-8 record and a 57-18 record over their career together as a doubles team.

Final Farewell

As the season finished, the Tigers said good bye to two prominent Tigers, Growcott and Paul White. Growcott only played two years for LSU but racked up an impressive resume as a Tiger. In 2005, The Birmingham, England, native earned ITA All-American and first-team All-SEC honors and finished the season ranked No. 4 in doubles competition. In 2006, Growcott got off to a slow start due to a hip injury but entered the season as the No. 37 ranked singles player and the No. 1 doubles team with Skupski as they reached the round of 16 in the NCAA Championships for the second-straight year.

White was a four-year letterwinner for the Tigers and excelled on and off the court. The Lake Charles, La. native was a three-time ITA Academic All-American and most notably was the 2005 SEC Academic Athlete of the year.

"These two young men were key ingredients to our success over the past couple of years," Brown said. "They are both decorated student athletes who represented this team and university well."

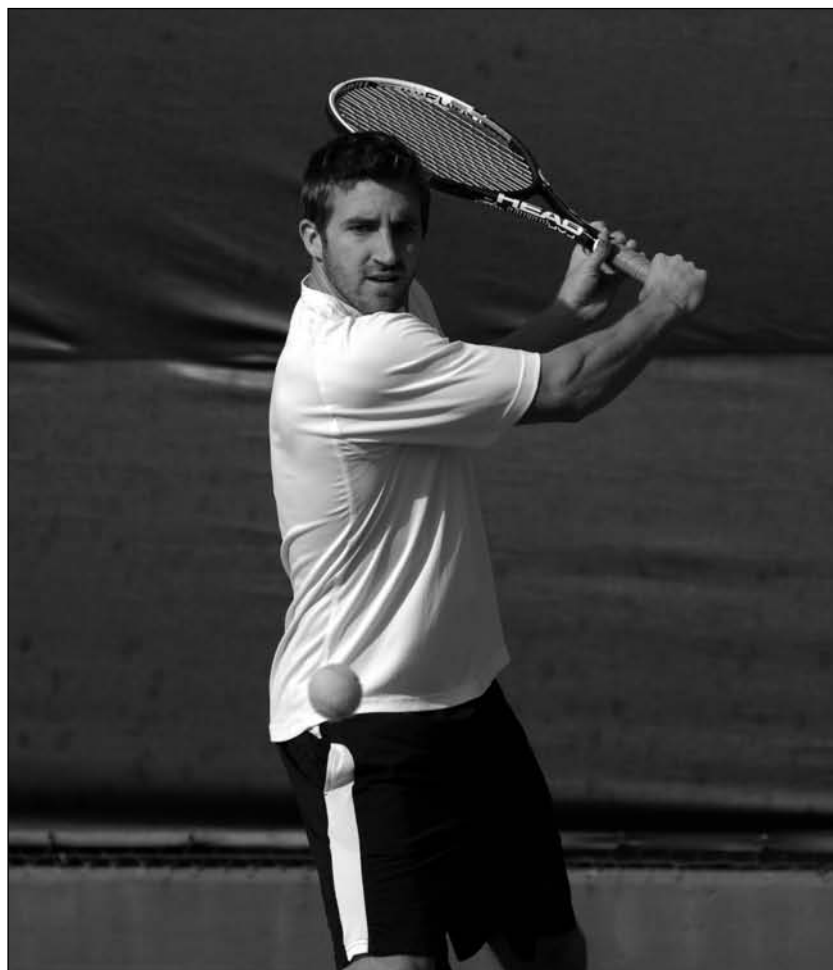
Postseason Accolades

For a second consecutive year Skupski picked up ITA All-America honors. Skupski and Bryan were named to the All-Louisiana team. It was the third-straight year for Skupski to receive the honor and second straight for Bryan. The Tigers also received honors in the classroom as three Tigers were named ITA Scholar-Athletes. Senior Skupski and junior Kevin Dessauer received the honor for the second-straight year, while senior Eric DeRoche received the honor for the first time. Individuals were required to maintain at least 3.5-grade point-average for the 2005-06 academic year to receive the Award.

Dazzling Doubles

Skupski and Growcott may have gotten most of the attention in doubles, but it was the team of Danny Bryan and Gatson who led the way for the Tigers in doubles. The duo capture a team-high 27 wins. They were ranked in the top-35 six out of the nine weeks of rankings, and reached as high as No. 14. Even after finishing the season winning 11-straight matches, they fell short of getting a birth into the NCAA Doubles Championship. Brown believes the Tiger tandem will carry their late season success of 2005 over to the 2006 season.

"It was unfortunate that Danny and Colt couldn't get in the tournament" Brown said. "I know something like that can be used as motivation for some guys and believe they will come out strong to open the season and make a case to get in the tournament next season."

LSU shocked the collegiate tennis world by returning to the Final Four for the second consecutive year in 1999. The Tigers, who had a No. 19 preseason ranking, hosted a regional and beat Alcorn State and Tulane to advance to the round of 16 at Athens, Ga. There, LSU beat a gutsy Fresno State team before upsetting second-ranked Duke in the quarterfinal. However, the magic ended in the Final Four as No. 1 UCLA managed to survive the Tiger attack. The Tigers defeated eventual national champion Georgia twice on the season.

2000

Overall Record: 20-6

Final Rank: No. 12

After entering the season as one of the favorites to win the national championship, the 2000 LSU squad earned a No. 11 seed in the NCAA Tournament. For the second consecutive season, the Tigers roared through the first two rounds in Baton Rouge with 4-0 victories over both Alcorn State and Clemson. Then it was on to Athens, Ga., and a tough round of 16 match with sixth-seeded Illinois. In a grueling match, the Illini proved to be a little too strong as they claimed a 4-3 victory and ousted LSU from the tournament.

The LSU men's tennis team qualified for the NCAA Championships for the seventh-straight season in 2001 after accumulating a 14-7 overall record during the regular season. The Tigers rebounded from a 4-3 upset loss against Alabama in the Southeastern Conference Tournament to host an NCAA Regional for the third-consecutive season. In front of a raucous home crowd at the W.T. "Dub" Robinson Tennis Stadium, LSU dropped Marist, 4-0, in first-round action before knocking off 19th-ranked Texas, 4-2, to earn a trip to the NCAA Championships in Athens, Ga. The Tigers advanced to the Sweet 16 for the third-straight year and faced No. 7 Texas A&M at the Dan Magill Tennis Center on the campus of the University of Georgia. In the third-round match, Texas A&M out-slugged the Tigers, 4-1.

2002

Despite finishing the regular season with a losing record for the first time in seven years, LSU proved its worthiness of an NCAA Tournament bid by advancing to the round of 32 with a convincing 4-0 victory over the higher-ranked Texas Christian Horned Frogs. The win was a triumphant contrast for the Tigers after the team had traversed a season full of 4-3 losses and had faced 16 top-25 teams in 25 dual-match contests. In the second round of the NCAA Tournament, LSU fell prey to 16th-ranked Texas A&M for the second-consecutive season, 4-0, in College Station, Texas.

The Tigers kept their NCAA tournament streak alive, making their ninth consecutive postseason appearance and finishing the season ranked in the top 25 for the 19th time in 20 years. The Tigers finished second in the SEC West with a 5-6 conference record and 13-11 overall record. They were upset in the first round by No. 56 South Alabama, 4-2, in New Orleans.

LSU's three seniors, Cory Ross, Sebastian Rutka and Bryan Fisher, ended their time at LSU with their most successful years here. The Tigers finished in a tie for third in the SEC. Despite losing in the second round to 14th-ranked Rice, they finished ranked 13th in the nation, the fifth top-15 finish in Jeff Brown's career. Ken Skupski entered the lineup at No. 1 singles and became one of two freshmen in the nation selected to play in the NCAA Singles Championship. Fisher and Jason Hazley finished their highly successful career as a doubles team ranked No. 15 in the nation. The 2004 Tigers compiled a 3.5 GPA in the spring to lead all LSU varsity teams. They were selected an ITA All-Academic team and Fisher and Paul White were named ITA Scholar Athletes.

2005

Overall Record: 21-9

After another successful season the Tigers finished with a 19-8 regular season record and were rewarded with hosting an NCAA Regional. After defeating Binghamton and in-state rival Tulane in the first two rounds of the NCAA Tournament, the Tigers went back in the Sweet 16 for the first time since 2001 and for the 19th time in program history as the tournament's 11th seed. They took on SEC foe Georgia, the tournament's No. 6 seed. LSU entered the contest winners of 14 consecutive doubles points, but could not win the early point against the Bulldogs. Georgia outplayed the Tigers to win the match, 4-0, when play was stopped. The Tigers ended the season ranked in the top 10 for the first time since 1999. All of LSU's nine losses this season came to teams ranked 16th or higher in the final rankings, including five to top-10 teams.

2006

Overall Record: 15-10

Final Rank: No. 25

For the eighth time in head coach Jeff Brown's nine years leading the way, the LSU Tigers finished the season in the top 25. The Tigers finished with a 15-10 record, but were ousted in the first round of the SEC and NCAA Tournament. LSU loss against Minnesota in the NCAA Tournament was the curtain call for acclaimed seniors Mark Growcott and Paul White. Growcott only spent two years as a Tiger but played a key role in the team's success. Growcott and doubles partner Ken Skupski were ranked No. 1 in the 2006 preseason poll. White, a four-year letterwinner, succeeded on and off the court. He was a two-time ITA Scholar-Athlete and was chosen as the 2005 SEC Scholar-Athlete of the Year.



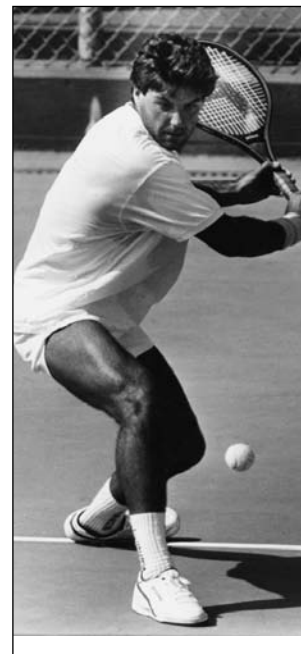

Donni Leaycraft 1989 NCAA SINGLES CHAMPION

Donni Leaycraft capped off his record-setting junior season by becoming the first LSU player to win the NCAA singles title. Leaycraft entered the NCAA singles tournament as the 13th seed and proceeded to breeze through the first four rounds, winning all four matches in straight sets. In the semifinal, Leaycraft upset hometown favorite Pablo Montana of Georgia in three sets and then beat Steven Jung of Nebraska 6-1, 4-6, 6-3 to claim the title. Leaycraft finished the year with a 42-10 record and ranked No. 3 in the nation.

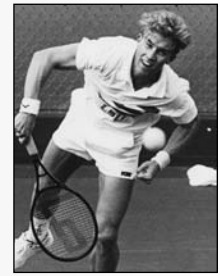

Johan Kjellsten did not waste any time making an impact after transferring from McNeese State prior to his senior season. At the Clay Courts, Kjellsten, who was the tournament's eighth seed, knocked off top-ranked Malivai Washington of Michigan, 6-3, 6-3 in the quarterfinal and then cruised past fourth-ranked Greg Failla of Southern Cal in the semifinal. In the final, Kjellsten knocked off 12th-ranked Stephen Enochs of Georgia 2-6, 6-2, 6-1 to give LSU the school's first grand slam event winner. Kjellsten went on to post a 38-11 overall singles record and finished the year ranked No. 7 in the country.

Tamer El Sawy 1993 NCAA SINGLES SEMIFINALIST

Arguably the best player to ever play for LSU, Tamer El Sawy capped off his career with the Tigers with one of the best individual seasons in school history. El Sawy posted a 39-5 overall record and reached the semifinals of the NCAA singles tournament in 1993. He breezed through the first three rounds of draw before beating Roland Thornqvist of North Carolina in three sets in the quarterfinal. El Sawy, the No. 3 seed, then dropped a three-set match No. 1-ranked Chris Woodruff of Tennessee. The El Sawy-Woodruff semifinal match was said to be the best match of the tournament and it was only fitting that it would be the last match El Sawy would play at LSU.

At the NCAA doubles tournament, the duo posted three wins, two over seeded opponents, before losing to eventual champion Mark Merklein and David Blair of Florida in the semifinal. Wesbrooks and Pesola finished the year ranked No. 11 in the nation.
