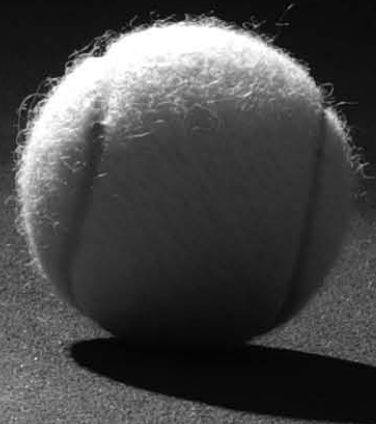

Match Credentials

Media credentials for all men's tennis matches should be requested two days before the match by contacting Alex Restrepo at (225) 578-8226. Once credentials have been requested, all passes will be left at the double-door main entrance to the W.T. "Dub" Robinson Tennis Stadium.

During matches, media members will be provided with a media guide as well as a match program that includes notes and updated statistics. Final match results can be obtained immediately following the match.

Photographers

All photographers must check in with an LSU Sports Information staff member on site for designated photo locations prior to every match. Photographers are welcome to photograph from the stands, but must receive permission to photograph on the courts. Only accredited photographers or those persons on special assignment will be allowed access to the court.

Interviews

All interviews with players and coaches must be coordinated through the SID office and requested 24 hours in advance to ensure availability - excluding post-match interviews.

Media can now access images for all LSU athletic teams, including action shots, heads shots, logos, etc. To gain access to the high-resolution pictures, e-mail Alex Restrepo (arestri@lsu.edu). You will be assigned a login and password that will enable you to retrieve pictures. This service is for the media use only. Resale of these pictures is strictly prohibited.

W.T. "Dub" Robinson Tennis Stadium



The LSU men's tennis team has called the W.T. Robinson Tennis Stadium home since 1970, but the "Dub," as it is affectionately called, has kept up with newer college facilities through a series of renovations and improvements over the years.

Robinson Stadium, named in honor of LSU's former tennis coach, was completed in 1970 and is the site of the Tigers' and Lady Tigers' home matches.

The "Dub" features six varsity courts and six practice courts. The six varsity courts were resurfaced and had new tower lights installed prior to the 2007 academic year, while the six practice courts received new surfaces in the spring of 2001 as a part of the facilities makeover. The varsity courts feature an electronic scoreboard and can accommodate up to 550 spectators.

Both the nationally-ranked Tigers and Lady Tigers enjoy state-of-the-art locker rooms, a squad room, and brand-new showers and bathrooms. The "Dub" was totally refurbished after the 2002 season to include a media room, an equipment room and a ground-floor viewing area for handicapped tennis fans. Prior to the 2007 season, the media room was refurbished with leather couches and a 42-inch flat screen television.

Former men's coach Jerry Simmons surpassed Robinson in 1992 to become the Tigers' all-time winningest coach. The Simmons Era came to a close in 1997, as the Tigers posted an 11-1 home mark en-route to an automatic berth in the NCAA Championships. With Simmons at the helm, Robinson Stadium became one of the toughest venues in the country for opponents to play. LSU tallied an incredible 162-25 (.866) record at home during the last 15 seasons under Simmons.

Since current head coach Jeff Brown took over the reins in 1998, the Tigers have accumulated a 115-27 (.810) overall record at home. In his opening season as head coach, Brown notched a perfect 12-0 record at Robinson Stadium.



W.T. "Dub" Robinson facts

LSU's legendary men's tennis coach W.T. Robinson, or "Dub" as he was lovingly known, single-handedly orchestrated the LSU tennis program's rise to national prominence. In his nearly three decades as the head tennis coach at LSU, Robinson accumulated a 189-180-9 overall record and propelled the Tigers to a status among the nation's elite.

Working with limited resources and a financially-deprived tennis program, LSU's rise to the top of collegiate tennis can be traced back to Robinson's warm personality and quick wit. Always a favorite among his players, Robinson transformed a team that had not won a match in three years into a team that finished with a 12-1 record and a second-place finish in the Southeastern Conference in only his sixth season at the helm. His great-granddaughter, Hannah Robinson, currently plays for the LSU women's tennis team.

When the LSU tennis complex was completed in the fall of 1976, it was only natural that it was named after the person that built the program.

LSU tennis fans received a new nickname during the 2007 season. The LSU marketing and promotions department dubbed LSU tennis fans as the “Court Crazies.”

The “Court Crazies” proved to be a valid asset for the Tigers, particularly in the postseason. During the SEC Tournament and NCAA first and second rounds, the LSU faithful was in full force wearing their purple and gold tie-die “Court Crazies” t-shirts with lively enthusiasm throughout LSU’s matches. The “Court Crazies” made a name for themselves with coaches around the country.

Bo Campbell Auditorium

Athletic TRAINING

LSU boasts the largest and most complete athletic training facilities in all of collegiate athletics with both the Football Operations Center and the Broussard Center for Athletic Training in Tiger Stadium. Both are furnished with the latest in technology and equipment. The Football Operations Center training room features a full view of the practice fields, two hot/cold jacuzzis and an underwater treadmill. The Broussard Center includes an on-site x-ray room, an in-house pharmacy, as well as the largest hydrotherapy pool in both collegiate and professional sports and is one of the few collegiate training centers with a full-service pharmacy and a full-service vision center.



Hydrotherapy Treatment

An integral part of rehabbing and developing LSU student-athletes is the operations center's hot/cold jacuzzis and an underwater treadmill in a fully equipped Hydrotherapy room. The Broussard training center (above) boasts the largest hydrotherapy pool in both collegiate and professional sports.

SEC Men 2007 Recap

The Southeastern Conference men's tennis programs continue to be among the nation's leaders on the collegiate hardcourt and the trend continued this past season.

The conference made another strong national showing in 2007 as the Georgia men won their fifth national title and both the Florida and Georgia women advanced to the quarterfinals at the 2007 NCAA Division I Tennis Championships in Athens, Ga.

Georgia advanced to the finals with wins over Farleigh Dickinson, Auburn, Florida, UCLA, Virginia and Illinois. The Bulldogs defeated Illinois, 4-0, in the finals to finish the season a perfect 32-0.

In the singles tournament, Georgia senior John Isner fell to Somdev Devvarman of Virginia, 6-7(4), 6-4, 6-7(2), in the finals. In doubles, the SEC had four teams (Luis Flores-John Isner, Georgia; Danny Bryan-Colt Gaston, LSU; Jesse Levine-Greg Quелlette, Florida; Eric Claesson-Erling Tveit, Ole Miss) make it to the quarterfinals.

Overall the SEC has 16 NCAA singles champions in men's tennis dating back to 1930, with eight of those titles coming since 1984. Six of the ten doubles titles have come since 1993, with five different SEC schools being represented. Florida won in 1993 with the doubles tandem of David Blair and partner, singles champion Dan Merklein. Mississippi State followed in 1994 with Laurent Miquelard and Joc Simmons and Ole Miss duo Mahesh Bhupathi and Ali Hamadeh captured the doubles title in 1995. In 2001, Matias Boeker and Travis Parrott of Georgia took home the title. The next year, Auburn's Andrew Colombo and Mark Kovacs took the title. In 2005, the Georgia duo of John Isner and Antonio Ruiz were crowned champions.

All five national team titles for the league have been captured by Georgia, having won in 1985, 1987, 1999, 2001 and 2007.

BUILDING A FOUNDATION

The 2008 season will have a different feel for the LSU men's tennis team as it brings in seven newcomers, including five freshmen. Joining the freshmen are sophomore walk on Cody Loup and junior transfer Michael Venus.

LSU will have a much younger look from last year's team that finished the season ranked No. 15 after posting an 18-7 record and reaching the NCAA round of 16. Eight of the nine members of that team were upperclassmen, including senior All-Americans Ken Skupski and Danny Bryan.

Leading the way for the Tigers this season are seniors Kevin Dessauer, Colt Gaston and Jan Zelezny.

Dessauer was named team captain this year. The former walk on showed great leadership last season by receiving second-team All-SEC honors and being named the SEC Scholar-Athlete of the Year.

Gaston received doubles ITA All-American honors after he and partner Bryan finished the season with a 24-4 record and reached the NCAA doubles quarterfinals.

Zelezny made his mark in his first year as a Tiger in 2007 by posting a team-best 8-3 record in conference play. The Czech Republic native was named the 2007 Louisiana Newcomer of the Year.

This trio of seniors has proven to have the tools needed to help this young team build a foundation to continue its tradition of success on and off the court.

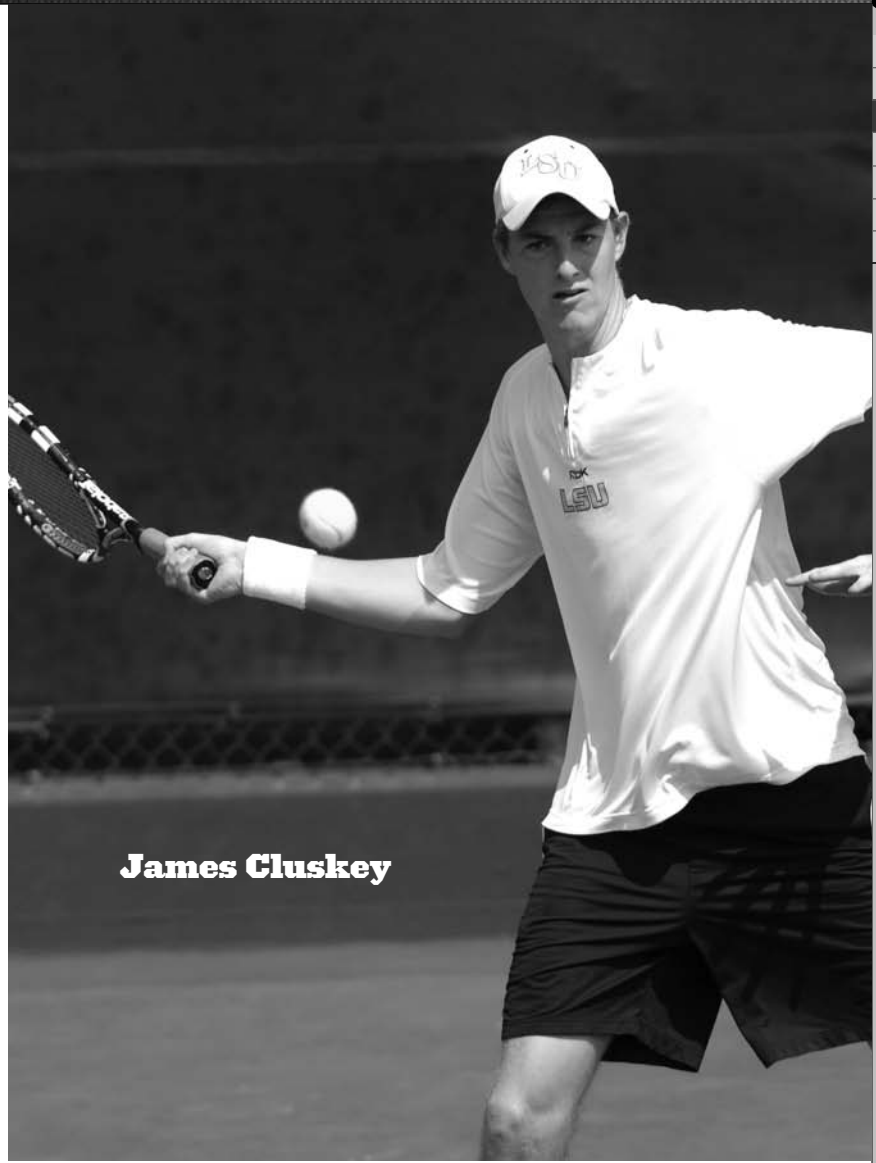
Bryan is Back

Bryan enters his first season as a student assistant for the LSU men's tennis team. He will join head coach Jeff Brown and associate head coach Mark Booras in coaching the Tigers this season. Bryan played for the Tigers the past four seasons.

Bryan should be a great asset to the LSU coaching staff as he put on an impressive campaign as a Tiger from 2003-07.

Bryan was co-captain for the Tigers his junior and senior year. The four-year letterman sits tied for 14th place on the LSU career singles wins list with 84. He was selected as a doubles ITA All-American last season. Bryan compiled 110 career doubles wins.

The New Orleans native's leadership skills were exemplified

off the court as well as he was named the 2007 ITA/Arthur Ashe Jr. for Leadership and Sportsmanship award winner. He was selected as the 2007 LSU Male Volunteer of the Year and received SEC Community Service team honors three times.

New Crop

Coach Brown brings in five freshmen, which is the most he has had in his 11 years in leading the Tigers. The three freshmen expected to make the biggest impact this season are Sebastian Carlsson, Julien Gauthier and Ryan Lissner.

Carlsson should be a regular in the singles and doubles lineup after putting up an impressive campaign in Sweden. He won the Under 21 Swedish Junior Indoor Championship. He is a two-time Swedish Junior Doubles Champion. Carlsson was ranked among Sweden's top-five from 13 to 18 years old.

"He is going to be a great Tiger for a long time," Brown commented. "He has a great head on his shoulders. He will contribute and is a great teammate."

Gauthier was a standout at Georges Vanier High School. He was the 2005 Junior Tennis Player of the Year in Quebec. He was named the No. 1-ranked junior player in Canada and won a

remarkable 13 national and provincial titles.

Brown says "the sky is the limit" for Gauthier.

"Julien is an exciting player," Brown commented. "He has every shot, and they are all big. He is going to be a guy who could make a run at an NCAA Singles Championship; he is just that kind of athlete."

Lissner is expected to contribute for the Tigers, particularly in doubles. He ranked in the top 15 of the USTA Boy's 16 in both singles and doubles. He was named the 2004 Maryland's Gatorade High School Rookie of the Year. The Baltimore, Md. native went undefeated in regular season play at Centennial High School. Lissner was named to the 2006 Baltimore Sun and Washington Post All-Metro Team.

"Ryan's tennis game is continuing to grow," Brown explained. "He rebounded from some injuries last year. He will be a great asset to this team. Every year you will see him grow."

Venus is the most anxious of the LSU newcomers. The Orlando, Fla., native sat out the fall season after transferring from the University of Texas.

"We are excited to have Michael out on the court representing us," Brown stated. "He has done everything we have asked him

to do, and we are looking forward to having him compete for LSU."

Stiff Competition

LSU's 2008 schedule features twelve teams that show the potential of finishing the season in the national rankings. Six of those teams come from the Southeastern Conference. Topping the list of LSU's opponents is defending national champion Georgia who visits Baton Rouge March 21.

LSU and Georgia squared off twice last season, in Athens, Ga. during the regular season and then in Baton Rouge for the SEC Tournament. Georgia came out on top in both meetings, but LSU was the only team to capture a singles or doubles win in the conference tournament against Georgia.

LSU will face two of the premiere non-conference teams this year with a road trip to Illinois on Feb. 9 and a home match against Ohio State on March 16.

One of LSU's biggest victories last season came against then No. 6-ranked Illinois on March 20 in Baton Rouge, 4-3. Illinois reached the national championship match last season.

LSU will have a sense of revenge when it faces Ohio State at home on March 16 this season as they are the team that ended the Tigers season last year. The two faced each other twice last season, once in the regular season and in the NCAA round of 16.

Jeff Brown has been a part of LSU tennis for almost half his life, playing a major role in nearly all of the most successful teams in the program's history. Now in his 11th season as the Tigers' head coach, Brown has done more than just maintain the standards of excellence that have characterized LSU tennis since his days as a player here. He has raised the bar substantially.

Brown took the reins of the program in 1998 after serving as an assistant to Jerry Simmons for three seasons. He was an All-American doubles player for LSU in 1988 and spent five years on the professional circuit.

Brown led the Tigers to back-to-back SEC Championships in 1998 and 1999, becoming the first person in league history to do so in his first two seasons as head coach. The Tigers also won the SEC Tournament both years.

He has since proven those feats were more than just beginner's luck. Brown quickly earned respect among his peers due to his lengthy list of achievements. Brown has never failed to take his teams to the NCAA Tournament, and earned Louisiana Coach of the Year honors in 1998, 1999, 2001, 2002, 2005 and 2007. He has coached 13 All-Americans in his tenure, and after young teams fell out of the top 20 in 2002 and 2003, he brought the team back to the national spotlight in 2004. In 2005, Brown helped the Tigers return to the top 10 for the first time since 1998.

Last season's final ranking of No. 15 marked the sixth time in Brown's 10 seasons that his team was among the top 15 in the country and his team has finished in the top 10 three times during his tenure. But he's not ready to stop there. More than anyone, Brown himself would like to get back to the top of the conference because he remembers the thrill of being a part of championship teams.

"The years when we won the SEC and got to the Final Four set the standard that we want to get back to," he said. "When you have a couple of years where you don't make it, you really appreciate it and you're hungry for more."

Brown has put his Tigers in position to succeed on and off the court. Brown helped setup "Duel Under the Oaks" on Oct. 29, 2006, a charity event held on LSU's campus that helped raise more than \$400,000 for LSU Health Sciences Center students impacted by the hurricanes that ripped through Louisiana in 2005. The event included a youth tennis clinic, tennis exhibitions with LSU tennis players and local celebrities and the main event of an exhibition match with former tennis pros Pete Sampras against Todd Martin at the Pete Maravich Assembly Center.

During Brown's LSU tenure, the Tigers have had three SEC Scholar Athlete's of the Year, eight Academic All-Americans and 50 SEC Honor Roll members.

The Tigers were honored by the NCAA in 2007 for its Academic Progress Rate score. The Tigers scored a perfect APR of 1000 in the report by the NCAA. The LSU men's tennis team scored the highest among LSU sports for the third year in a row. The NCAA recognized college sports teams from around the country that achieved an APR score in the top 10 percent of all squads in their respective sports. The LSU men's tennis team is one of only 10 sports teams out of 236 squads in the entire Southeastern Conference that were recognized for academic achievement by the NCAA, and it is the only men's tennis team in the SEC to achieve the honor.

When Brown took over the program in 1998, he was already well acquainted with the demands of being successful in college tennis. He enjoyed tremendous success as a player at LSU from 1985-88, as evidenced by his two All-SEC awards. He joined the Tiger tennis elite in his senior season when he eclipsed the 100-career victory mark. That same year he captained LSU's only NCAA finals team. He still has the fourth-most wins of any player in LSU history. Brown helped lead the Tigers to an 85-35 record as an assistant coach from 1994-97. LSU finished in the top-10 three of those years.

"To be a part of LSU from so many angles, first as a player, then as an assistant and now as a head coach has been wonderful," Brown said. "The tradition that has been here is that we're competing for championships and we're going to fight you to the end. That's the thing that's always been known about LSU in most sports and particularly tennis."

"LSU's overall sports excellence helps because our guys are around other people who are used to winning. Athletes here run into each other often and it's almost like there's a silent competition amongst the sports. You are pulling for each other of course, but at the same time you're driven not to fall behind the other sports on campus."

"Jeff represents what the LSU tennis program is all about," said Hall of Fame coach Jerry Simmons, who coached Brown on the 1988 LSU team that reached the NCAA Tournament championship match. Brown was team captain that year, leading the Tigers to a 27-2 record. Three years earlier as a freshman, Brown won a crucial SEC match at No. 4 singles that enabled LSU to win the conference crown.

"I knew as a player that I probably wanted to be a coach," Brown said. "I could see that it was something that kept you young and kept you around young people. Everyone I came in contact with as a player has had some influence on me as a coach."

Brown came across quite a few tennis legends as a player. He earned his degree at LSU in 1989 while serving as an assistant coach, then left Baton Rouge for the ATP tour. He won the doubles title at the Volvo International in 1990 and advanced to the round of 16 at the U.S. Open by beating the team of Pete Sampras and Jim Courier in the first round. Brown also advanced to the round of 16 at both the Australian Open and Wimbledon. His No. 45 international ranking in doubles is the highest ranking ever for a former LSU player.

Brown married the former Deborah Schaeffer of Colorado Springs, Colo., on Nov. 19, 1999. They have two young boys, Connor (3) and Cameron (1).

An assistant coach with Mark Booras' capabilities is almost unheard of in collegiate tennis. Booras has played a large role in the Tigers success during his nine years on the LSU staff. Booras holds his players to high standards on the court, in the classroom and in the community. Booras leadership was showcased in 2007 when the Intercollegiate Tennis Association named him Assistant Coach of the Year.

"We have been fortunate to have Mark for as long as we have," head coach Jeff Brown said. "He's a super coach and tactician. He's a great role model for the guys and he plays as well as anybody on the team."

Booras received more national recognition during the 2007 season when he was selected as the USTA Summer Collegiate Coach by the United States Tennis Association. He coached a collegiate all-star team consisting of six of the top American male players in the country. The team traveled, primarily during July 2007, throughout the country while competing at six USTA Futures and Challenger professional tournaments.

Booras has pushed the Tigers in the classroom. His encouragement paid off as the Tigers were honored by the NCAA in 2007 for its latest Academic Progress Rate score. The Tigers scored a perfect APR of 1000 in the report by the NCAA. The LSU men's tennis team scored the highest among LSU sports for the third year in a row. Booras was recognized in 2004 and 2007 as the best assistant coach in the ITA

Southeast Region, which holds some of the top coaching and playing talent in the country. In 2004, Booras was given the title of associate head coach.

In his first season with the Tigers, Booras helped guide LSU to its second consecutive SEC Championship as well as a berth in the Final Four. The 1999 squad also won its second-straight SEC Tournament, becoming the first team to ever repeat as tournament champions.

Booras, a Chicago native, graduated from West Virginia in 1993 and played college tennis for the legendary Terry Deremer. He was a top-20 singles and doubles player throughout his college career.

In each of his final three seasons at West Virginia, Booras competed in both the NCAA singles and doubles championship tournaments. Following his collegiate career, Booras joined the ATP tour and continued his success, ranking as high as No. 240 in the world in doubles. After a three-year career from 1994-96, he retired and decided to further his education. While earning his master's degree in sport psychology at West Virginia he was also the assistant men's tennis coach and a private tennis instructor.

In 1999, he came to LSU to help Brown build on the LSU tradition. His duties as assistant coach include conducting practices, player instruction during matches and recruiting future players.

"Mark continues to lend his knowledge of the game to this team and it is paying dividends," Brown said. "He is a great recruiter and he has incredible knowledge of the game. He is as important as any one person in this program."

Booras married the former Laura Anne Ingram on June 17, 2006.

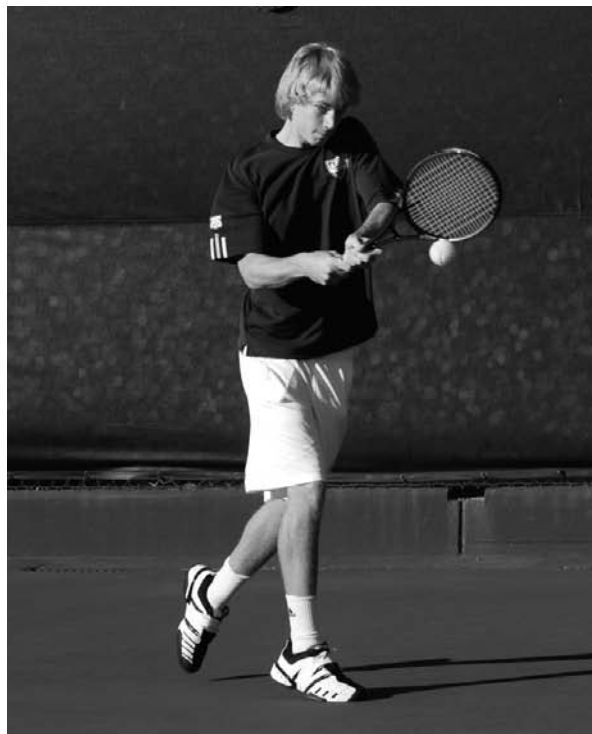

Review

Men's Tennis Review 06-07

SWEET SUCCESS

The LSU men's tennis team finished another strong season in 2006-07 as it notched an 18-7 record and reached the NCAA round of 16. It marked the sixth time in Jeff Brown's 10 years as head coach that the Tigers reached the sweet 16.

Fall Showcase

The Tigers opened the season with a solid performance at the Courtyard by Marriott/Rice Invitational where they took four bracket titles. Senior Ken Skupski began to gel with new doubles partner James Cluskey as they reached two ITA semifinals, at the Polo Ralph Lauren All-American Tennis Championships and the National Intercollegiate Indoor Championships.

The Tigers finished its final weekend of competition for the fall season in grand fashion as they won the singles and doubles portion of the Ragin' Cajun Classic. Senior Danny Bryan won the singles bracket, while senior Eric DeRoche and junior Kevin Dessauer won the doubles bracket.

LSU had one final tune up before the regular season as they played host to the SEC Coaches Indoor Championships at the Rivercenter Racquet and Health Club in New Orleans. The Tigers shined in the doubles portion of the tournament by having their top two teams of Cluskey and Skupski, and Bryan and Colt Gaston advance to the semifinals. It marked the first time Bryan and Gaston competed as a doubles duo as Gaston had to sit out the fall season due to injury. Gaston and Bryan dominated the doubles tournament to take home the doubles crown. It marked the third-straight year LSU had taken home one of the titles as Skupski won the singles title the previous two seasons.

Strong Start

Resurfacing of the W.T. "Dub" Robinson Tennis Stadium courts forced the Tigers to play their first two home matches on the practice courts adjacent to the "Dub," and their third match at the Lamar Tennis Center at Paula G. Manship YMCA. The change of venues did not distract the Tigers as they opened the season with a five-match win streak.

The Tigers first big challenge came on Feb. 24 when they faced the No. 2-ranked Ohio State Buckeyes in front of a packed "Dub" and facing wretched wind conditions, the Tigers gave a valiant effort against the Buckeyes but stumbled at the end of doubles and singles play as they fell by a 4-2 score. The Tigers rebounded quickly in their next match against TCU with a 6-1 win before opening SEC play.

The Tigers began conference play by winning three out of their first four matches with the only loss during that stretch coming against the No. 1-ranked Georgia Bulldogs.

LSU took a break from SEC competition against two stellar opponents in Texas A&M and No. 6 ranked Illinois. LSU's Irishman Cluskey celebrated St. Patrick's Day by clinching the Tigers' match against the Aggies. The luck of the Irish continued to strike for the Tigers in their next match as Cluskey clinched the Tigers' biggest win of the regular season against the Illini. Cluskey's efforts garnered him LSU Male Athlete of the Week honors.

The Home Stretch

After their short out-of-conference break the Tigers traveled to Columbia, S.C. to take on the Gamecocks. The Tigers put together their second five-match win streak of the season with a quick 4-0 route of the Gamecocks. The Tigers' next two matches would not go as peaceful as they received back-to-back 4-3 losses against two strong SEC opponents, Florida and Ole Miss.

LSU won three out of its last four matches to finish the regular season with a 15-5 overall record and a 7-4 conference mark. The Tigers finished the regular season fourth in the conference to give them a first-round bye in the SEC Tournament, which they would host at Robinson Stadium.

Postseason Presence

The Tigers would face the Tennessee Volunteers in the second round of the SEC Tournament. Bryan clinched the win by defeating Davey Sandgren in straight sets. The win set the Tigers to face the top-ranked Georgia Bulldogs in the semifinals. The soon eventual national champion Bulldogs were too much for the Tigers as they fell by a 4-1 score. However, LSU was the only team to capture a win in singles and doubles against the top-seed Georgia.

2007 Senior Class

Entering the NCAA Tournament with a No. 15 ranking allowed the Tigers to host the first two rounds of the tournament. It marked the third time that the Tigers hosted an event as they played host to the SEC Indoor Tournament and the SEC Championships.

The Tigers cruised through their first and second round matches by sweeping Alcorn State and Vanderbilt, respectively. LSU traveled to Athens, Ga. to face a familiar foe, Ohio State, in the round of 16. The Tigers struggled throughout the match as they were swept for the first time all season against the Buckeyes by a 4-0 score.

Ample Accolades

The Tigers compiled more awards in 2007 than they have in any previous season. Not only did they receive recognition for their athletic performance, but also for their strong work in the classroom and support in the community. Topping the accolades is Associate Head Coach Mark Booras who was named ITA/National Assistant Coach of the Year. For the fourth time in team history, LSU had three players named All-Americans. The top doubles duo of Bryan and Gaston took home the honor for the first time, while Skupski claimed his third All-American honor.

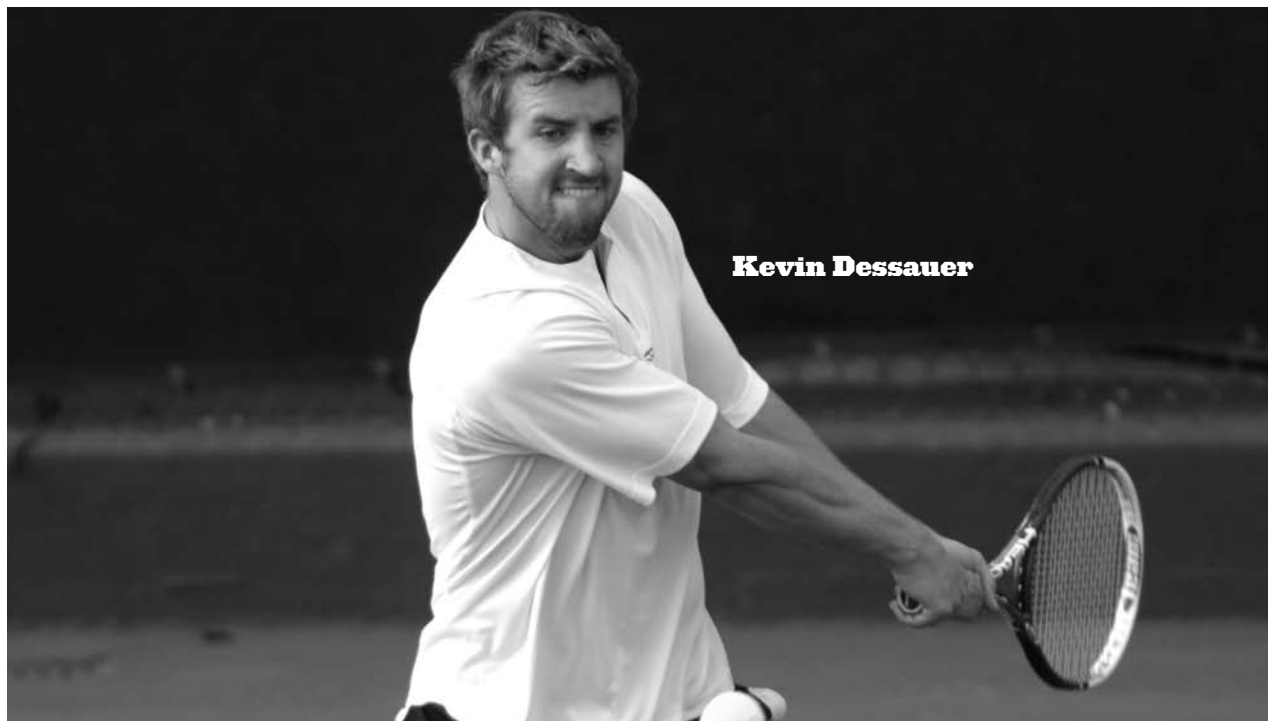
LSU was well represented in the SEC awards as three Tigers were received all-conference honors. Bryan and Skupski were named to the first team and Dessauer received second-team honors.

In the classroom, the Tigers scored a perfect Academic Progress Rate score of 1000. LSU was the only SEC men's tennis team to earn the prestigious achievement. Additionally, Dessauer was named the SEC Tennis Scholar Athlete of the Year.

Dessauer is the third Tiger to receive the award.

In the community, The Tigers hosted "Duel Under the Oaks," which was a charity event including a youth tennis clinic, tennis exhibitions with LSU tennis player and local celebrities and the main event of Pete Sampras against Todd Martin. The players and coaches gave a vast amount of their free time to volunteer in the community. Leading the way was Bryan who spearheaded a number of activities for his teammates to participate in. For his efforts, Bryan was named the ITA/Arthur Ashe Award for Leadership and Sportsmanship and to the SEC Community Service team for the third straight year.

LSU beat Kentucky in the first round and Alabama-Birmingham in the Regional semifinal. TCU, ranked 4th, bumped LSU from the NCAA Championships in the round of 16 for the second-straight year by a 4-3 count.

Jerry Simmons, LSU's all-time winningest coach, led the Tigers to the NCAA's for the 13th and final time during 1997 after announcing his retirement prior to the start of the spring season. Unfortunately, Simmons' Tigers were upended in round one by No. 10 Duke 4-1, finishing the year at 17-7 overall No. 9 nationally.

In the NCAA tournament, LSU tore through SMU and SEC rival Ole Miss before falling in the semifinals to a Georgia team the Tigers had twice defeated earlier in the year.

2000

Overall Record: 20-6

Final Rank: No. 12

After entering the season as one of the favorites to win the national championship, the 2000 LSU squad earned a No. 11 seed in the NCAA Tournament. For the second consecutive season, the Tigers roared through the first two rounds in Baton Rouge with 4-0 victories over both Alcorn State and Clemson. Then it was on to Athens, Ga., and a tough round of 16 match with sixth-seeded Illinois. In a grueling match, the Illini proved to be a little too strong as they claimed a 4-3 victory and ousted LSU from the tournament.

2001

Overall Record: 16-8

Final Rank: No. 13

The LSU men's tennis team qualified for the NCAA Championships for the seventh-straight season in 2001 after accumulating a 14-7 overall record during the regular season. The Tigers rebounded from a 4-3 upset loss against Alabama in the Southeastern Conference Tournament to host an NCAA Regional for the third-consecutive season. In front of a raucous home crowd at the W.T. "Dub" Robinson Tennis Stadium, LSU dropped Marist, 4-0, in first-round action before knocking off 19th-ranked Texas, 4-2, to earn a trip to the NCAA Championships in Athens, Ga. The Tigers advanced to the Sweet 16 for the third-straight year and faced No. 7 Texas A&M at the Dan Magill Tennis Center on the campus of the University of Georgia. In the third-round match, Texas A&M out-slugged the Tigers, 4-1.

2002

Overall Record: 11-14

Final Rank: No. 29

Despite finishing the regular season with a losing record for the first time in seven years, LSU proved its worthiness of an NCAA Tournament bid by advancing to the round of 32 with a convincing 4-0 victory over the higher-ranked Texas Christian Horned Frogs. The win was a triumphant contrast for the Tigers after the team had traversed a season full of 4-3 losses and had faced 16 top-25 teams in 25 dual-match contests. In the second round of the NCAA Tournament, LSU fell prey to 16th-ranked Texas A&M for the second-consecutive season, 4-0, in College Station, Texas.

2003

Overall Record: 13-11

Final Rank: No. 24

The Tigers kept their NCAA tournament streak alive, making their ninth consecutive postseason appearance and finishing the season ranked in the top 25 for the 19th time in 20 years. The Tigers finished second in the SEC West with a 5-6 conference record and 13-11 overall record. They were upset in the first round by No. 56 South Alabama, 4-2, in New Orleans.



2004

Overall Record: 18-7

Final Rank: No. 13

LSU's three seniors, Cory Ross, Sebastian Rutka and Bryan Fisher, ended their time at LSU with their most successful years here. The Tigers finished in a tie for third in the SEC. They earned the right to host the first two rounds of the NCAA Tournament for the first time since. Despite losing in the second round to 14th-ranked Rice, they finished ranked 13th in the nation, the fifth top-15 finish in Jeff Brown's career. Ken Skupski entered the lineup at No. 1 singles and became one of two freshmen in the nation selected to play in the NCAA Singles Championship. Fisher and Jason Hazley finished their highly successful career as a doubles team ranked No. 15 in the nation. The 2004 Tigers compiled a 3.5 GPA in the spring to lead all LSU varsity teams. They were selected an ITA All-Academic team and Fisher and Paul White were named ITA Scholar Athletes.

2005

Overall Record: 21-9

Final Rank: No. 10

After another successful season the Tigers finished with a 19-8 regular season record and were rewarded with hosting an NCAA Regional. After defeating Binghamton and in-state rival Tulane in the first two rounds of the NCAA Tournament, the Tigers went back in the Sweet 16 for the first time since 2001 and for the 19th time in program history as the tournament's 11th seed. They took on SEC foe Georgia, the tournament's No. 6 seed. LSU entered the contest winners of 14 consecutive doubles points, but could not win the early point against the Bulldogs. Georgia outplayed the Tigers to win the match, 4-0, when play was stopped. The Tigers ended the season ranked in the top 10 for the first time since 1999. All of LSU's nine losses this season came to teams ranked 16th or higher in the final rankings, including five to top-10 teams.

2006

Overall Record: 15-10

Final Rank No. 25

For the eighth time in head coach Jeff Brown's nine years leading the way, the LSU Tigers finished the season in the top 25. The Tigers finished with a 15-10 record, but were ousted in the first round of the SEC and NCAA Tournament. LSU loss against Minnesota in the NCAA Tournament was the curtain call for acclaimed seniors Mark Growcott and Paul White. Growcott only spent two years as a Tiger but played a key role in the team's success. Growcott and doubles partner Ken Skupski were ranked No. 1 in the 2006 preseason poll. White, a four-year letterwinner, succeeded on and off the court. He was a two-time ITA Scholar-Athlete and was chosen as the 2005 SEC Scholar-Athlete of the Year.

2007

Overall Record: 18-17

Final Rank No. 15

The Tigers put together another successful campaign in 2007 by posting an 18-7 record, finishing the season ranked No. 15 and advancing the NCAA round of 16. It marked the sixth time in head coach Jeff Brown's ten years as coach that the Tigers reached the round of 16. No. 2 Ohio State, who had defeated LSU earlier in the regular season, ended the Tigers' season with a 4-0 victory in the round of 16. The round of the 16 match was the only postseason match the Tigers did not play at home as they hosted the SEC Championships and the NCAA first and second round.

1989 NCAA Singles Champion

Donni Leaycraft capped off his record-setting junior season by becoming the first LSU player to win the NCAA singles title. Leaycraft entered the NCAA singles tournament as the 13th seed and proceeded to breeze through the first four rounds, winning all four matches in straight sets. In the semifinal, Leaycraft upset hometown favorite Pablo Montana of Georgia in three sets and then beat Steven Jung of Nebraska 6-1, 4-6, 6-3 to claim the title. Leaycraft finished the year with a 42-10 record and ranked No. 3 in the nation.

At the Clay Courts, Kjellsten, who was the tournament's eighth seed, knocked off top-ranked Malivai Washington of Michigan, 6-3, 6-3 in the quarterfinal and then cruised past fourth-ranked Greg Failla of Southern Cal in the semifinal. In the final, Kjellsten knocked off 12th-ranked Stephen Enochs of Georgia 2-6, 6-2, 6-1 to give LSU the school's first grand slam event winner. Kjellsten went on to post a 38-11 overall singles record and finished the year ranked No. 7 in the country.

El Sawy posted a 39-5 overall record and reached the semifinals of the NCAA singles tournament in 1993. He breezed through the first three rounds of draw before beating Roland Thornqvist of North Carolina in three sets in the quarterfinal. El Sawy, the No. 3 seed, then dropped a three-set match No. 1-ranked Chris Woodruff of Tennessee. The El Sawy-Woodruff semifinal match was said to be the best match of the tournament and it was only fitting that it would be the last match El Sawy would play at LSU.
