FIVE-TIME SEC CHAMPIONS

## DREAMING OF MORE

One year after one of the finest seasons in LSU softball history, which saw the Tigers win their seventh SEC Western Division title, fifth SEC regular season championship and fourth SEC Tournament title while advancing to the Women's College World Series for the second time in four years, LSU returns eight highly acclaimed and experienced players while adding nine outstanding newcomers to provide the Tigers with tremendous potential in 2005.

"Coaches dream - those are the simple words to describe our affection and respect for this team," said head coach Yvette Girouard. "We have a great blend of nine newcomers with our talented returners that has presented our staff with talent, depth, options, tremendous student-athletes and most importantly players who desire to do the right thing for their team every day."

Despite the addition of many new players to the system, LSU went through the fall season with few growing pains as the players steadily advanced toward the spring schedule.

"Our fall season could not have gone better, with teaching our system and our players progressing the way we thought they should," said Girouard.

Despite losing a pair of All-Americans and two All-SEC performers, the four returning position starters, including an All-American and two All-South Region performers, bring a work ethic and knowledge of what it takes to be successful to the team.

The newcomers will fill the gaps left behind and each will be called upon to perform for the team throughout the season. So, while the lineup may have changed, the team will have the

same Tiger pride and same Tiger intensity as always.

"Our fans will see many new faces that will all contribute at some point this season," Girouard said. "This is basically a very different team than the one that left the WCWS field last year, but one our fans will enjoy watching for the simple fact that these players have tremendous pride in their performances. Our staff is excited for our players to wear the purple and gold because they truly seem to love playing softball."

LSU came within seven outs of the national championship game a year ago and the players know the type of hard work and dedication it takes to get back as they dream of advancing one step further and winning the Tigers' first national championship.

### PITCHERS

Pitching will once again be a key to LSU's success. Despite a young and inexperienced staff, the Tigers will have added depth this season with the addition of two freshmen. Sophomore Emily Turner (Chula Vista, Calif.) is the only returning member of the pitching staff, while LSU brings in Megan Jolly (Owensboro, Ky.) and Tiffany Garcia (LaPorte, Texas).

An All-SEC Freshman team selection in 2004, Turner posted an 18-5 record with 108 strikeouts in 28 appearances with five wins over top 25 teams, including three over teams ranked in the top 10.

"Emily has the only game experience and has grown by leaps and bounds in one year," said Girouard. "She has a real concept now of technique and an incredible work ethic."

The 2004 Miss Kentucky Softball, Jolly was a high school All-American at Owensboro Catholic. She led the Lady Aces to the 2003 Kentucky state championship and a return trip to the state title game in 2004.

"Megan is a very promising newcomer who possesses incredible spin on her movement pitches," said Girouard. "She is a tremendous competitor who has the correct mental capacity as a pitcher in order to be successful."

Garcia was a two-time all-state selection at LaPorte High School and led the Bulldogs to a No. 5 national ranking as a senior. She posted a 30-2 record with 248 strikeouts.

"Tiffany is a very deceptive and effective talent on the mound," said Girouard. "She provides added depth to the staff and has a very different look from both Emily and Megan."

### CATCHERS

The Tigers have two outstanding catchers to choose from this season in Kristen Hobbs (Royal Palm Beach, Fla.) and Killian Roessner (Manasquan, N.J.). The pair excel defensively, while also adding to the LSU offensive lineup.

"The 2005 campaign will see Hobbs and Roessner anchoring the catching duties for the Tigers," said associate head coach James DeFeo.

Hobbs returns for her sophomore season after a solid freshman campaign playing behind Leigh Ann Danos last year.

Successful at both the high school and summer ball levels, Roessner brings experience far beyond her freshman level.

"Last year, Hobbs played a solid role behind the plate while battling some nagging injuries and looks for her second season to be her breakout year at LSU. Roessner comes in as one of

the program's most decorated and experienced catchers, coming off a 2004 Women's Major National Championship with the storied Stratford Brakettes. She will be counted on to make an immediate impact."

#### INFIELD

With the departure of Julie Wiese and Sara Fitzgerald from the Tiger infield, LSU will have a completely different look this season. The Tigers return juniors Stephanie Hill (Harahan, La.) and Lauren Delahoussaye (Lafayette, La.), while adding freshmen Andrea Smith (Moreno Valley, Calif.) and Vanessa Soto (San Diego, Calif.).

"With two freshmen up the middle and two juniors at the corners, our infield will be considered quite young," said assistant coach Lori Osterberg. "However, these girls have instincts and skills that are comparable to those of true veterans. Our infielders are devoted to becoming reliable, consistent defenders and their steadiness in the field is attributed to their solid fundamentals."

The only returning player to remain in her role from a year ago is Hill, who took over the starting job at first base early in 2004. Delahoussaye, who started every game at shortstop last year, will move over to third base this season.

"Del and Hill will be the cornerstones of our infield," said Osterberg. "Their unwavering leadership and stability will carry our infielders through tight situations. Lauren has shown that she is a great fit for third base. Her strong arm and quick release will be an asset in defending the bunt and short game. Stephanie has a presence about her at first base. Her infielders trust her ability to catch everything they throw her way."

Up the middle, Smith takes over the reigns at shortstop once filled by her older sister, Blair, for two seasons (2002-03). A member of the All-California Interscholastic Federation team with Smith, Soto joins a long list of solid second basemen for the Tigers. The duo forms a formidable defensive pair at the heart of the LSU infield.

"It didn't take long for Andrea and Vanessa to gel up the middle," said Osterberg. "They fit like hand in glove and have some similarities in their flashy style of play. They both have smooth gloves and great arm strength. Their game awareness and ball sense has enabled them to adapt rather quickly to our Tiger defense."

#### OUTFIELD

One of the most highly decorated outfielders in the country last season will once again be one of the best in the nation. Despite losing All-American LaDonia Hughes, LSU returns All-American Leslie Klein (Sunrise, Fla.) and WCWS All-Tournament team selection Camille Harris (Hendersonville, Tenn.). In addition, the Tigers return Lauren Castle (Lafayette, La.) and Lauren Uhle (Harahan, La.), who will also battle for playing time in the outfield.

"Making the outstanding play seem routine, the Tigers will once again assemble one of the best outfielding units in the nation," said associate head coach James DeFeo. "Klein and Harris will again be patrolling the green grass at Tiger Park. The two returning Laurens, Castle and Uhle, will be battling to secure the third and final position in the outfield."

The new additions to the LSU outfield include Louisiana all-state selections Quinlan Duhon (Youngsville, La.) and Heidi Robin (Breaux Bridge, La.), California all-CIF selection Erika Sluss (Vista, Calif.) and Texas speedster Dee Dee Henderson (Marietta, Texas).

"With the addition of four stellar freshmen, Duhon, Sluss, Henderson, and Robin, the LSU outfield will have the much needed depth to make this position one of the true strengths of the Tiger program," said DeFeo.

#### AT THE PLATE

After one of the best seasons at the plate in Tiger history, LSU returns four of its top five hitters from a year ago, including over 70 percent of the run production.

"The Tiger attack hitting corps is looking to reload in 2005 by returning four All-SEC and All-South Region selections, one All-American and one All-WCWS Tournament Team member," said DeFeo. "Klein, who set the LSU single season record for home runs last year with 14, will have all-conference teammates Castle, Hill, Delahoussaye, and not to mention All-WCWS hitter Harris back in the box to produce one of the nation's most feared lineups."

LSU also brings in power and speed to the lineup with the addition of several new faces.

"Hobbs and Roessner will be providing the power from the catching position, while freshmen Soto, Duhon, Smith, and Sluss will be looking to step up in 2005 and show the rest of the country how dangerous they can be offensively," said DeFeo. "Rounding out the potent portion of the Tigers' lineup, Uhle and freshmen Henderson and Robin will inject the much needed threat of speed to make this Tiger attack once again one of the most balanced and explosive offensive machines in the Division I ranks."

#### SCHEDULE

Never shying away from tough competition, the Tigers will once again face a challenging schedule in 2005. With 27 games against teams that participated in NCAA Regional play last season, LSU will be put to the test as the Tigers pursue a second-straight Women's College World Series berth.

The Tigers open the season on the road for the first time since 2001 as LSU travels to Las Vegas for the UNLV Desert Classic. The Tigers will then host the Tiger Classic before defending their tournament championship at the NFCA Leadoff Classic, which boasts 24 of the nation's top teams. LSU will close out pre-conference play with the Purple & Gold Challenge.

"The schedule is a good early test for a very young team," said Girouard. "Opening on the road at UNLV will show us immediately the maturation process needed for the challenging SEC schedule. Defending the NFCA Leadoff Classic title will be tough, but it is always an entertaining and challenging weekend."

In SEC action, the Tigers open league play on the road at South Carolina and Georgia. LSU will also take on Mississippi State, Auburn and Florida on the road. All five of the Tigers' road series are against teams that advanced to NCAA Regional play last season.

At home, LSU will host Alabama, Arkansas, Kentucky, Ole Miss and 2004 SEC Eastern Division champion Tennessee. In addition, the Tigers will host non-conference games against Baylor and in-state rivals McNeese State, Nicholls State and Southeastern Louisiana.

"Visiting Tiger Park will be an array of good out of conference opponents including a very talented Baylor team," said Girouard. "Two very big conference weekends are at home against Alabama and Tennessee, which should draw tremendous crowds."

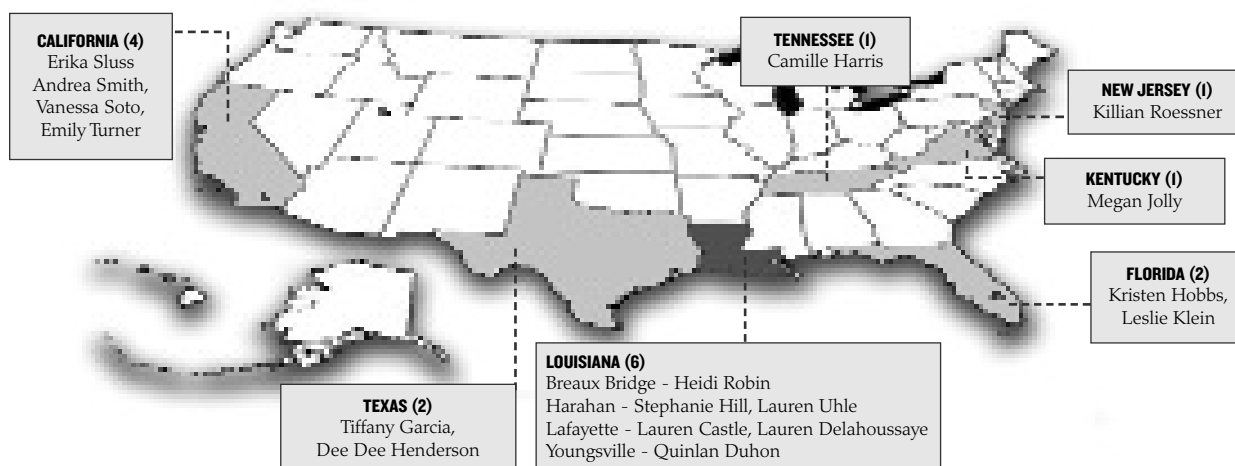

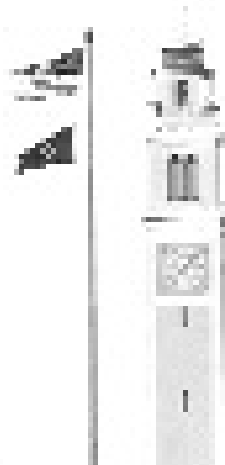

Strong supporters of education throughout the state have provided resources for a variety of innovative projects that are attracting world-class researchers and their expertise to LSU. The National Flagship Agenda is working to improve the standing of the University, as well as strengthen its position as an economic engine for the state of Louisiana. As a result, the University community is even more determined to achieve excellence at every level.

LSU remains firmly focused on attaining national flagship status by 2010, the University's 150th anniversary. The resolve of the LSU community and the support of the state make these goals attainable. And, if the last five years are any indication of success, the next phase of this agenda will guarantee LSU's place in the arena of national prominence.

Because of its designation as a doctoral/research university by the Carnegie Foundation, LSU ranks in the top 2 percent of the nation's colleges and universities. This designation is shared by only 59 public and 29 private universities across the nation. LSU is also one of only 25 universities nationwide designated as both a land-grant and sea-grant college.

History and tradition began with LSU's founding in 1853 by the General Assembly of Louisiana as the Louisiana

State Seminary of Learning and Military Academy near Pineville, Louisiana. The institution opened January 2, 1860. When the Civil War began, the school's first superintendent, William Tecumseh Sherman, resigned to assume a command in the Union Army. The seminary reopened in 1869, but was soon destroyed by fire. The institution moved to Baton Rouge, opening on Nov. 1, 1869.

In 1870, the Seminary was renamed Louisiana State University. In 1874, under the United States Morrill Act, the Louisiana State Agricultural & Mechanical College was established in New Orleans. The two institutions were merged by the Legislature in 1877 to become Louisiana State University and Agricultural & Mechanical College.

Construction on the present campus began in 1922 and the first classes were held in 1926. LSU experienced major growth in the 1930s and 1940s, expanding its student body, curricula, and services. During the 1960s, the University began to place increasing emphasis on research.

Recognizing the importance and extent of statewide agricultural activities of units in the LSU System, the LSU Board of Supervisors established the Center for Agricultural Sciences & Rural Development in 1972. This unit was renamed the LSU Agricultural Center in

1982. Components of the LSU Agricultural Center include the Louisiana Agricultural Experiment Station, the Louisiana Cooperative Extension Service and International Programs.

The primary mission of the LSU Agricultural Center is to conduct research in agricultural and natural resource development and to provide off-campus extension education that disseminates technological, economic, and management information to Louisiana residents.

In 1977, the Paul M. Hebert Law Center, established as the LSU Law School in 1906, was made an autonomous division of the LSU System. The Law Center provides legal education characterized by an unyielding demand for academic excellence. Its unique curriculum, based on civil law as well as substantial elements of common law, provides law graduates with qualifications and training for not one, but two legal systems. The Hebert Law Center holds membership in the Association of Law Schools and is on the approved list of the American Bar Association.

LSU, located on more than 2,000 acres in the southern part of Baton Rouge, Louisiana, is bordered on the west by the Mississippi River. The University's more than 250 principal buildings are grouped on a 650-acre plateau that constitutes the main part of the campus.

Football's only retired jersey is the No. 20 worn by Billy Cannon, while baseball retired the No. 15 in honor of longtime coach and current athletics director Skip Bertman.

Led LSU to its first NCAA Final Four in 1953 and he later became the first player in NBA history to exceed the 20,000-plus point barrier. Pettit is a member of the NBA Hall of Fame and in 1997 he was named as one of the top 50 players in NBA history.

"Pistol Pete," Maravich still holds the NCAA record for career points with 3,667 and for career scoring average with 44.2 points a game. He was selected the National Player of the Year in 1970 after leading the Tigers to the NIT Final Four. He scored 50+ points an amazing 28 times. He went on to a 10-year professional career and was selected as one of the NBA's 50 greatest players in 1997.



**SHAQUILLE  
O'NEAL**

**33**

Was the first pick in the 1992 NBA Draft. He was named MVP of the league in 2000 and was a three-time NBA Finals MVP after leading the Los Angeles Lakers to three World Championships. At LSU, O'Neal averaged 21.6 points and 13.6 rebounds for his career, and in 1991, he was named the World's Amateur Athlete of the Year as well as SEC Athlete of the Year and National Player of the Year. In 1997, he was named as one of the top 50 players in NBA history.

CANNON**

**20**

One of the true legends of college football in the South, Cannon was the 1959 Heisman Trophy winner and helped the Tigers to the 1958 national title. Cannon's most memorable performance came in 1959 against Ole Miss when No. 1 LSU trailed No. 3 Ole Miss 3-0 in the fourth quarter. He fielded a punt, broke seven tackles and returned it 89 yards for the 7-3 victory. He went on to a successful 11-year professional career.



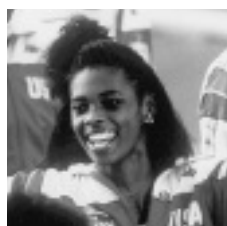

A legend in the college baseball ranks, Bertman created a dynasty at LSU, guiding the Tigers to five national titles in a 10-year stretch from 1991-2000. He also skipped the United States to a bronze medal at the 1996 Olympics in Atlanta and was an assistant on the gold medal-winning U.S. squad in Seoul, Korea in 1988. Bertman retired from coaching following the 2001 season and is currently the LSU athletics director.

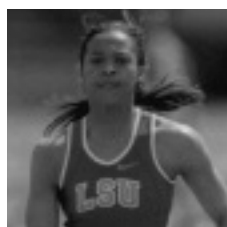

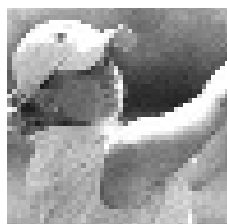
## WALTER DAVIS

The nation's top collegiate golfer in 2002, Duncan left LSU as the school's best female golfer. She earned first-team All-America honors as a senior in 2002 and won the United States Women's Amateur Championship in 2001.



## KRISTIN SCHMIDT

The 2004 Women's College World Series Most Outstanding Player, Schmidt was a three-time NFCA All-American and one of only two players in conference history to earn back-to-back SEC Tournament Most Outstanding Player honors.



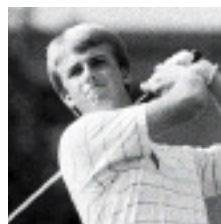
## NICKI ARNSTAD

The 2002 NCAA Floor Exercise Co-Champion, Arnstad became the first LSU gymnast to win a national title. She was a two-time All-American and won the NCAA Central Regional Floor and All-Around Championships.



## BRITNI SNEED

One of three four-time first-team All-SEC selections in conference history, Sneed was a two-time SEC Player of the Year and was a three-time NFCA All-American, leading the Tigers to the Women's College World Series in 2001.



## DAVID TOMS

The two-time SEC Player of the Year, Toms has gone on to a successful career on the PGA Tour. Among his PGA Tour victories was a thrilling win at the PGA Championship in August of 2001.



## TODD WALKER

Capped his LSU career as the SEC's all-time leader in hits, runs, RBIs, and total bases. Walker, who is a member of the All-Time College World Series Team, led LSU to the national title in 1993.



## BEN McDONALD

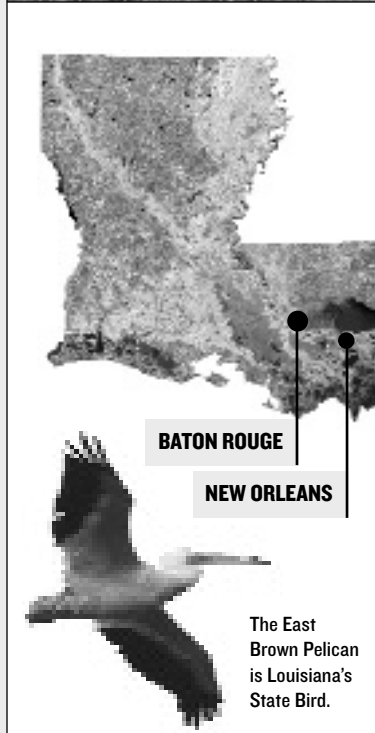

The LSU strength and conditioning facility was built in 1997 and features the latest in both strength training and cardiovascular training equipment. Measuring 10,000 square feet, LSU has one of the finest strength and conditioning facilities in the nation.

LSU's strength and conditioning team took a new direction in 2000 under strength coach Tommy Moffitt. Moffitt is in charge of the LSU strength and conditioning facility, located in Tiger Stadium. LSU also hired Will Jones to work solely with the baseball and softball programs.

Strength and conditioning can be the heart and soul of an athletic program's success, and LSU has taken great strides to improve its strength program and facilities.

**T**iger Park, located directly behind LSU's "Dub" Robinson Tennis Stadium, has a regular seating capacity of 1,000. The dimensions of the field are 200 feet to both foul poles and 220 to center field. A new, elevated, air-conditioned press box was installed behind the home plate bleachers prior to the 2003 season. Tiger Park also features an inning-by-inning scoreboard, message board and a state-of-the-art sound system. With these features, LSU's softball field is one of the most modern softball facilities in the country.



## LSU SOFTBALL LOCKER ROOM

Measuring 81 feet by 29 feet, the LSU softball locker room is a suite of rooms including a lounge area, meeting room, locker room, showers, sauna and a coach's office.

## LSU INDOOR PRACTICE FACILITY

When the weather prevents the softball team from practicing at Tiger Park, the team moves to the indoor, climate-controlled football practice facility. LSU student-athletes benefit from one of the most modern indoor facilities in the nation. Located at the site of the Charles McClendon Practice Facility, the indoor facility was built as part of a \$15 million upgrade of the LSU physical plant in the late 1980's and early 1990's and houses a full 100-yard football field.

In four seasons at LSU, head coach Yvette Girouard's effect on the Tiger softball program has been powerful. With each year, she continues to add to her legacy as one of the greatest coaches in the history of women's softball by making LSU a national force in the collegiate ranks.

Girouard, who was inducted into the Louisiana Softball Coaches Association Hall of Fame in June 2002, enters the 2005 season among the career leaders in NCAA Division I wins (No. 5) and winning percentage (No. 5) and among the active NCAA Division I coaching leaders in wins (No. 5) and winning percentage (No. 4). She is currently 19 wins away from becoming just the fourth head coach in NCAA Division I history to reach the 1,000 career win plateau, and just the fifth coach in NCAA history to record 1,000 career wins in any division.

With 23-straight winning seasons to her credit, she has guided her athletes to 35 All-America honors, including seven while at LSU, 13 Academic All-America honors and taken her teams to 14 NCAA Regionals.

No stranger to Oklahoma City, Girouard became just the third coach in NCAA history to take two programs to the Women's College World Series after leading UL-Lafayette to three World Series appearances in the 1990s and LSU to the WCWS in 2001 and 2004.

In 2004, she led LSU to its second Women's College World Series appearance, where the Tigers advanced to within one game of the championship game. After defeating Michigan in extra innings in its first game, LSU fell to eventual national champion UCLA in game two.

Weather postponed play for a day and forced the Tigers into the unenviable situation of having to win three games in a single day to advance to the national championship game. LSU began the day with a win over Florida State before defeating California to force just the seventh "if necessary" game in WCWS history.

Unfortunately, the Tigers could not get past California a second time and came up seven outs shy of the national championship game. LSU's remarkable run marked the first time since 1984 a school from east of the Mississippi River had advanced to within a game of the national championship. Tiger pitcher Kristin Schmidt was named the WCWS Most Outstanding Player, becoming the first player to earn the honor who was

## THE GIROUARD PHILOSOPHY

"I believe fully in trying to instill in our athletes a knowledge and a love for the qualities and virtues that comprise good character. Character is what we are inside. "LSU is a very special place with everything provided for success; from athletic facilities to the very best academic center in the country and a first-class administration all at the dis-

posal of our student athletes. In addition to having the friendliness of Louisiana people, LSU has one of the most beautiful campuses in the country. Our players will know from their first visit to the LSU campus that their number one goal is to leave this institution with their degree in hand.

"In setting our high standards for the athletes that represent this program, the number one characteristic I look for in student-athletes is discipline. We want disciplined people in our program. It all starts with someone who can control her choices in a respectable way, both on and off the field. The ability to choose right from wrong should not be a battle. We expect to play for championships here at LSU and every student-athlete who competes for the Tiger

softball team will have to have that same discipline and expectations. Our staff is dedicated to LSU, our program and our players.

"Concerning the softball side, we will incorporate the 'Tiger Attack' mind set for our games. I'd like to think that my teams are aggressive and hard-nosed, and that they will play the game hard until the final out. We must attack every inning as if the score were 0-0, always thinking 'it is never enough'. We will always be a fundamental team with high emphasis placed on this aspect of the game throughout the entire year. Playing the game with pride, emotion and respect for tradition and class should be a goal for every LSU team. This team will embody those qualities."

not a member of the national championship team. Sophomore Camille Harris was also named to the WCWS All-Tournament team.

In addition, the Tigers were ranked as high as second nationally, matching the highest national ranking for any team coached by Girouard. LSU finished the season ranked No. 3, the highest final ranking for the Tigers in the program's history.

In 2001, Girouard led LSU to its first appearance in the WCWS, where the Tigers finished third. Under her guidance, UL-Lafayette (formerly Southwestern Louisiana) advanced to the WCWS with a pair of fifth place finishes and a third-place finish in 1993.

With a .815 winning percentage in the 1990s, her teams posted the third-best winning percentage in the nation behind only Arizona and UCLA. In four seasons at LSU, she has posted the second most wins in the nation over that period, behind only Arizona, and the fourth-best winning percentage.

While her influence has been a catalyst for the growth of the game in the state and nationally for many years, her impact in just four years in Baton Rouge has been no less significant. Becoming the first coach in Southeastern Conference history to lead a team to back-to-back tournament championships, Girouard made a clean sweep of the three major league titles (SEC Western Division, SEC Championship, SEC Tournament Championship) in three of her first four seasons as a Tiger.

After failing to earn the league titles in 2003, LSU came back to sweep all three major titles again in 2004. The Tigers earned the top seed in NCAA Region 3, marking the 14th consecutive trip to the postseason for Girouard and the seventh for LSU. The Tigers swept through NCAA Regional play, defeating Illinois in the championship game to earn their berth in the Women's College World Series.

For their efforts, Girouard, associate head coach James DeFeo and assistant coach Lori Osterberg were named the National Fastpitch Coaches Association South Region Coaching Staff of the Year, marking the seventh regional coach of the year honor in Girouard's career.

In 2003, Girouard earned her 900th career victory, becoming just the sixth coach in NCAA Division I history



and the eighth coach in NCAA history to reach the historic milestone.

After finishing second in the SEC Western Division, the Tigers advanced through the conference tournament to the championship game for the fifth-consecutive year.

The Tigers earned their sixth-consecutive trip to the NCAA Regionals, and completed the season ranked No. 15, the fourth consecutive top 15 ranking for LSU and fifth consecutive top 20 finish for Girouard.

In 2002, Girouard picked up her 100th win at LSU in just 119 games, the fastest Tiger coach to 100 victories in school history.

After sweeping all three of the SEC Championship titles and advancing to the NCAA Regional finals, she earned her second-straight SEC Coach of the Year honor. She has been named coach of the year by three separate conferences: the Southeastern Conference in 2001 and 2002, the Sun Belt in 2000 and the Southland in 1984, 1985 and 1987.

A fourth-consecutive Louisiana Sport Writer's Association Louisiana Coach of the Year honor followed for Girouard, the 11th state honor of her career.

In her first season at LSU, Girouard was able to accomplish something no other coach had been able to do. She led the Tigers to their first appearance in the WCWS with a victory over her former school, UL-Lafayette, in the NCAA Regional Championship game.

In the WCWS, the Tigers fell to Stanford in the first round, but bounced back to knock off Iowa and defending national champion Oklahoma before losing out to UCLA and finishing in a tie for third place nationally.

For their accomplishments, Girouard, DeFeo and Osterberg were named the NFCA National Coaching Staff of the Year. She was also named the Coach of the Year by the SEC and the LSWA. To her credit, she was named the National Coach of the Year in 1990 and 1993.

In her two decades as the Lady Cajuns' head coach, she built the team from the ground floor with no scholarships and a \$3,000 budget to one of the nation's perennial powers. She advanced her UL-Lafayette teams to the NCAA Regionals a total of 10 times, hosting on seven of those occasions.

Girouard was born in Broussard, La., and attended Comeaux High School. She earned a bachelor of science degree from USL in 1976 in health and physical education. During her college days, she played on the Lady Cajun volleyball team and was named the school's Female Athlete of the Year in 1976.

Following college, Girouard served as head coach at Lafayette High School where she began the softball program in 1977. In 1980, she coached at her alma mater, Comeaux High School, before beginning the USL softball program in 1981.

Girouard served a three-year term as the South Region Representative on the NCAA All-America Committee and served two, two-year stints on the NCAA South Regional ranking committee. She is currently a member of a six-person panel assembled by the Amateur Softball Association and the United States Olympic Committee to develop a set criteria for teaching hitting.

With a list of accomplishments and awards that speak for themselves, Girouard has proven that she can take her teams to the next level and be successful. Her guidance and leadership have carried her through 24 outstanding seasons and hopefully she will continue to build upon her past successes and reach the ultimate goal of bringing LSU its first national championship in softball.

### James DeFeo

**Associate Head Coach  
Fifth Year**

James DeFeo enters his first season as the associate head coach at LSU after four years as an assistant coach. It is also his sixth season under head coach Yvette Girouard after one year with her at UL-Lafayette.

Prior to joining Girouard's staff, DeFeo was a graduate assistant at Southern Miss in 1999 when the Golden Eagles became the first, first-year program to advance to the Women's College World Series.

Last season, he, Girouard and Lori Osterberg were named the National Fastpitch Coaches Association South Region Coaching Staff of the Year after leading the Tigers to their second WCWS appearance. The trio was also named the NFCA National Coaching Staff of the Year in 2001 after they led LSU to its first WCWS berth.

DeFeo's main duties include working with the hitters and the outfielders as well as recruiting, scouting and practice management. His work with Lori Osterberg and the Tiger hitters paid off last season as LSU ranked in the top 10 in the NCAA in batting average, in the top 15 in slugging percentage and home runs per game and in the top 35 in triples per game. The Tigers broke the school record and led the Southeastern Conference in home runs, while LSU ranked second in the league in batting average, runs scored, hits, triples and RBIs.

Individually, then-freshman Leslie Klein ranked in the top 10 in the SEC in every hitting category and ranked in the top 50 in the NCAA in slugging percentage, runs per game and RBIs per game. The Tigers had at least two players ranked in the top 10 in the SEC in every hitting category, including five of the top 10 individuals ranked in total bases.

In 2002, former Tiger All-American Trena Peel led the nation in triples, while breaking the LSU and SEC single-season records. With 14 triples, she was just two shy of the NCAA record.

In his first season at LSU the Tigers were second in the SEC and 12th nationally in batting average. LSU also led the league in scoring and finished ranked 16th nationally.

"James brings an incredible passion for studying hitters and molding players into knowledgeable offensive athletes," said Girouard. "I would describe him as passionate, dedicated, loyal and intelligent and he has an unwavering commitment to our student-athletes, our program and to his hitters."

At UL-Lafayette, DeFeo's team hit .310 and finished the season with a No. 22 national ranking and in the top 10 in hitting and scoring. His 1999 Southern Miss team finished the season ranked second nationally in batting and 10th in scoring. DeFeo was instrumental in helping to revive the Golden Eagle team after a six-year hiatus.

For nine years, he has served as sole proprietor and instructor of the All-American Softball Clinics in New Jersey, New York, Florida, Pennsylvania and Mississippi. DeFeo has coaching experience at nearly every level of fastpitch softball, including Under-12, Under-16, 18 and Under, and Women's Major. DeFeo also is a member of the National Fastpitch Coaches Association.

A native of New Jersey, DeFeo graduated from Rutgers University in 1996 with a bachelor's degree in sport management. He received his master's in sports administration from Southern Miss in 1999. His sister, Stephanie DeFeo, was a three-time All-American under Girouard at UL-Lafayette and is now the head coach at UNC Greensboro.

In 2000, DeFeo was married to the former Samantha Rock of Orlando, Fla. They have two daughters, Victoria, 2, and Zoe, who was born in October 2004.



### Lori Osterberg

**Assistant Coach  
Third Year**

An assistant for LSU during the 2001 season, Lori Osterberg rejoined the Tigers coaching staff in 2004 after two years as a teacher and softball coach at North Scott High School in Eldridge, Iowa, and now enters her third season at LSU.

One of head coach Yvette Girouard's former players, Osterberg brings collegiate playing experience to the Tiger coaching staff. At LSU, Osterberg works with the Tiger infield and hitters and serves as the recruiting coordinator.

Last season, she, Girouard and James DeFeo were named the National Fastpitch Coaches Association South Region Coaching Staff of the Year after leading the Tigers to their second WCWS appearance. The trio was also named the NFCA National Coaching Staff of the Year in 2001 after they led LSU to its first WCWS berth.

"We are absolutely ecstatic that Lori has rejoined our program," said Girouard. "She is the complete package in an assistant coach. She is a fantastic teacher and a great motivator."

Osterberg's main duties include working with the hitters and the infielders as well as recruiting and practice management. Her work with James DeFeo and the Tiger hitters paid off last season as LSU ranked in the top 10 in the NCAA in batting average, in the top 15 in slugging percentage and home runs per game and in the top 35 in triples per game. The Tigers broke the school record and led the Southeastern Conference in home runs, while LSU ranked second in the league in batting average, runs scored, hits, triples and RBIs.

Individually, then-freshman Leslie Klein ranked in the top 10 in the SEC in every hitting category and ranked in the top 50 in the NCAA in slugging percentage, runs per game and RBIs per game. The Tigers had at least two players ranked in the top 10 in the SEC in every hitting category, including five of the top 10 individuals ranked in total bases.

Her work with the LSU infield also paid off last season as defensively the Tigers led the SEC and ranked 36th in the NCAA in double plays turned.

In her first season at North Scott High School, Osterberg guided the softball program to the Iowa state championship in 2002. She then led her team to the state championship game in 2003. For her efforts she was named the East Iowa Regional Coach of the Year both seasons.

In 1999, Osterberg served as a student assistant under Girouard at ULL and graduated with a degree in secondary level special education. She then returned home to Iowa where she coached basketball, volleyball and softball and taught special education at North Scott High School for one year in 2000.

Osterberg was the starting shortstop for UL-Lafayette from 1994-97 and was a member of two Women's College World Series teams. While playing for the Lady Cajuns, she earned All-South Region honors and was a three-time All-Louisiana selection. She finished her collegiate career with a .336 batting average, 12 home runs and 44 doubles.

"Lori was the epitome of the term 'student-athlete'," said Girouard. "She was a joy to coach every day and is a bigger pleasure to associate with as a person on a daily basis in her role as an assistant coach. She is an individual who makes everyone around her better because of the quality person she is."



## Will Jones

**Assistant Strength & Conditioning Coordinator**

Will Jones enters his third year as full-time member of the LSU strength and conditioning staff after being promoted to assistant coordinator in the summer of 2002.

Jones, who graduated with a Master's of Science degree within the department of Kinesiology in May of 2002, served as a graduate assistant in the LSU weight room in 2000 and 2001.

Jones works with the LSU football program and is also responsible for developing and implementing strength and conditioning programs for the baseball and softball teams.

Jones holds certifications as a Certified Strength and Conditioning Specialist (CSCS) with the National Strength and Conditioning Association and is USA Track & Field certified at Level 1.

Jones graduated from UL-Lafayette in May of 1999 with a degree in Exercise Science. He was a defensive back on the Ragin' Cajun football team for four years.

## Riana Burke

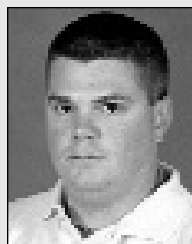
**Graduate Assistant Athletic Trainer**

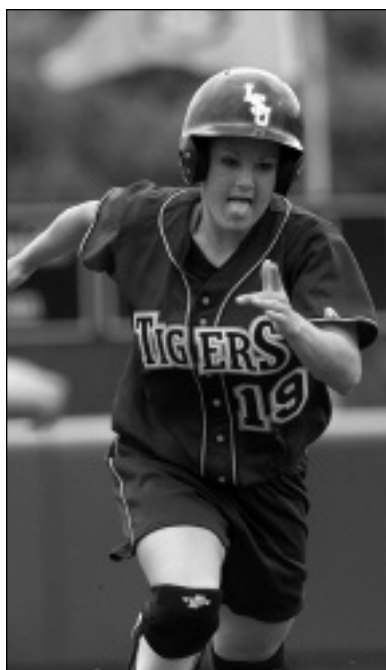

# SEVEN OUTS AWAY...

### **TIGERS EARN SECOND TRIP TO WOMEN'S COLLEGE WORLD SERIES**

After sweeping through the NCAA Region 3 bracket in Waco, Texas, the Tigers earned their second trip to the Women's College World Series in the program's history, becoming just the second SEC school to have two WCWS appearances. In 2001, LSU advanced to the WCWS for the first time after also sweeping through the NCAA Region 3 bracket, while hosting the tournament in Baton Rouge.

The Tigers went 3-2 in their second appearance in Oklahoma City. LSU won its first game, defeating Michigan, 3-2, in 13 innings. After falling to eventual national champion UCLA, 2-0, in the second round, the Tigers came back to defeat Florida State, 2-1, to advance to the semifinals.

Having to defeat California twice to advance to the national championship game, LSU won its first game, 4-1, and became the first team east of the Mississippi River since 1984 to come within one game of the national championship game. In the nightcap against the Bears, the Tigers took a 1-0 lead into the fifth inning, and were just seven outs away from the national championship game before falling, 4-1, to end the season ranked No. 3 in the nation.

In its first appearance in the WCWS, LSU went 2-2, losing to Stanford, 2-1 in eight innings before defeating Iowa 2-1 and Oklahoma 2-1 in 13 innings. UCLA knocked LSU out of the World Series with a 6-0 defeat in the semifinals.

### **TIGERS WIN FOURTH SEC TOURNAMENT CHAMPIONSHIP**

In 2004, LSU won its fourth SEC Tournament title in the last six seasons as the Tigers defeated Georgia 4-1 in the championship game. Stephanie Hill hit a three-run home run and drove in a run in the victory while Emily Turner picked up the win and Kristin Schmidt earned the save. The Tigers had to fight off elimination earlier in the morning with a 1-0 win over Auburn after falling to the Tigers late the night before 2-0. LSU won its first two games of the tournament, defeating South Carolina in the first round, 2-0, and Alabama, 2-1.

The Tigers are the only team in the SEC to sweep the trifecta of awards, winning the divisional title, regular season title and tournament title in the same season. LSU has now accomplished that feat four times, in 1999, 2001, 2002 and 2004.

### **LSU TAKES SEC CHAMPIONSHIP WITH SERIES WIN OVER FLORIDA**

With a 4-0 rain-shortened shutout of Florida on May 1, LSU clinched its fifth SEC title in the last six seasons. The Tigers finished the season two games ahead of Eastern Division champion Tennessee and three and a half games ahead of Western Division second place finisher Auburn. With the SEC title, LSU earned the top seed in the SEC Tournament. In 2003, LSU finished third overall, its worst finish since a third place finish in 1997. LSU won SEC titles in 1999, 2000, 2001 and 2002 and finished second in 1998.

### **LSU CLINCHES SEVENTH SEC WEST TITLE WITH SPLIT AGAINST AUBURN**

With an 11-0 shutout of Auburn on April 24, LSU clinched its seventh SEC Western Division title in the last eight seasons. The Tigers finished three and a half games ahead of Auburn, which finished in second place. In 2003, LSU finished second to Alabama in the West, marking the only time the Tigers have failed to win the Western Division.

### **LSU AMONG THE ELITE IN THE POLLS**

With a final ranking of No. 3, LSU has been ranked in the NFCA/USA Today coaches poll for 96 consecutive weeks dating back to Feb. 28, 1998. In all, LSU has been ranked in 98 of the 110 polls that have been released since the program was reinstated in 1997. The Tigers have been ranked in the top 10 for 12 consecutive weeks and 65 weeks in the program's history. The final ranking of No. 3 matches the highest ranking for LSU in the NFCA poll in school history.

Since ESPN and USA Softball began their softball poll on Feb. 25, 2003, LSU has been ranked in all 30 polls. The Tigers finished the season ranked No. 3, one spot from the highest national ranking in any poll in the program's history.

### **LSU BREAKS SINGLE-SEASON RBI RECORD**

The Tigers broke the school record for runs batted in for a season in 2004. LSU knocked in 336 runs, surpassing the 321 RBIs recorded in 1998. Leslie Klein led the team with 58 runs batted in, second most in LSU single-season history, followed by Stephanie Hill with 54 RBIs, third most in school history.

### **TIGERS BREAK SINGLE-SEASON HOME RUN RECORD**

The Tigers hit 60 home runs in 2004, breaking the school record of 52 set in 2003, and ranked 15th in the NCAA. In 69 games, LSU failed to record a home run in just 28 games. The Tigers recorded a season-best three home runs on six occasions (vs. Illinois, Texas-San Antonio, Southern Miss, Florida Atlantic, No. 15 South Carolina and Nicholls State). Leslie Klein led the team and the SEC with an LSU record 14 home runs, followed by Stephanie Hill with 13. It marks the second time in school history that two players have recorded double-figure home run totals. Lauren Delahoussaye was just behind with nine round trippers. Julie Wiese holds the LSU career home run record (31) and had eight home runs. LaDonia Hughes recorded her first career home run with an inside-the-park shot against Centenary in the season opener.

### **KLEIN SETS LSU SINGLE-SEASON HOME RUN RECORD**

Against California on May 30 in the Women's College World Series, Leslie Klein set the LSU single-season home run record with her 14th of 2004. Against South Carolina on May 13 in the SEC Tournament, Klein broke the then-record of 12 with her 13th of the season. Stephanie Hill then tied Klein against Georgia in the SEC Tournament Championship game with her 13th of the season, a mark she finished the year with. The pair broke the previous home run record of 12 set twice. Julie Wiese hit 12 home runs during the 2001 season, while Tara Asbill was the first LSU player to record 12 home runs in a season during 2000. 2004 also marks just the second time that two players have 10 or more home runs in a season after Asbill hit 12 and Ashlee Ducote hit 10 home run in 2000.

### **WIESE BREAKS LSU CAREER HOME RUN RECORD**

With her fifth home run of the season, Julie Wiese broke the LSU career home run record on a solo shot in the fourth inning against Florida State at the NFCA Leadoff Classic. The round tripper gave her 28 for her four-year career as a Tiger, surpassing the 27 hit by Tara Asbill from 1997-2000. She concluded her career with 31 home runs, seventh most in SEC history.





After throwing 349 pitches over three games in a single day in the Women's College World Series senior pitcher Kristin Schmidt was relieved after 20 and two-thirds innings to a standing ovation from the crowd. She was later named the WCWS's Most Outstanding Player.

## STREAKING...

Stephanie Hill set the school record by hitting safely in 15 consecutive games from Feb. 13 vs. Portland State to Feb. 29 vs. No. 6 Georgia. The streak was snapped with an 0-for-3 performance against No. 10 Florida State. During the streak, she hit .500 (24-for-48) with four doubles, five home runs, 13 runs scored and 20 RBIs for a .896 slugging percentage. She also recorded five walks and one hit by pitch.

Leslie Klein tied the school record with a 15-game hitting streak of her own. The streak began with a 1-for-4 performance on March 24 against Alabama A&M and ended with an 0-for-3 performance against Southern Miss on April 21. That first hit was a home run, one of four she hit in the 15 games. In addition, she hit .333 (18-for-54) with five doubles, 13 RBIs and 11 runs scored. Hill and Klein broke the previous record streak of 14 games held by Stacey Newton during the 1998 season.

## LSU HAD RECORD GAME AGAINST NICHOLLS STATE

After getting by Nicholls State, 3-0, in Thibodaux on March 31, the Tigers destroyed the Lady Colonels in Tiger Park the following night. LSU scored a school-record 15 runs in the fourth inning to take the 20-0 win over Nicholls in five innings, the largest margin of victory in school history. It marked only the second time in school history the Tigers scored more than 10 runs in an inning. On March 30, 1997, LSU scored 12 runs in the third inning against Ole Miss as the Tigers went on to win 13-2 in five innings.

Stephanie Hill tied the school records for home runs in a game with two and RBIs in a game with seven. With the pair of home runs, she tied the then-school single-season record with 12. In addition, Leslie Klein tied the school record with three walks in the game. The Tigers also broke the school record for RBIs in a game with 20 and tied the school record for runs in a game (20). It marked just the second time in school history that LSU scored 20 runs in a game, after the Tigers put up 20 on Alcorn State earlier in the season.

## LSU WINS PRESTIGIOUS NFCA LEADOFF CLASSIC

LSU went 6-0 to win the 24-team 2004 NFCA Leadoff Classic, topping a field that included 13 nationally ranked teams and five teams receiving votes in the top 25 polls. Along the way to the Tigers' championship, LSU defeated four top 10 teams and one team receiving votes. The Tigers also became the seventh of the previous nine tournament champions to advance to the Women's College World Series at the conclusion of the season.

The Tigers began the tournament with a 5-0 win over Ohio State before defeating Florida Atlantic, 4-2. In a rematch of a loss earlier in the year, LSU defeated No. 3 California, 6-1, to earn the second overall seed in the Gold Championship bracket.

In bracket play, the Tigers defeated No. 4 Washington, 4-2, before a come-from-behind win over No. 6 Georgia, 5-2 in eight innings, to advance to the championship game. LSU came from behind once again to defeat No. 10 Florida State, 4-3, and take the tournament title for the first time in school history.

## SCHMIDT ASSAULTED NCAA RECORD BOOKS

Kristin Schmidt became one of just 15 players in NCAA history, along with former Tiger All-American Britni Sneed, to record both 1,000 career strikeouts and 100 career victories. With her fifth strikeout of the first game at Ole Miss on April 17, she became the 24th player in NCAA history to record 1,000 career strikeouts. She completed her career ranked 12th with 1,154 career strikeouts.

In addition, with her victory against Kentucky on April 10, she became the 35th player in NCAA history to record 100 career victories. She concluded her career with 116 victories, which is ninth place all-time. Unlike LSU or SEC career records, for NCAA purposes, Schmidt's career stats include her freshman year at Notre Dame.

## UNDER FOUR MEANT SUCCESS FOR THE TIGERS

Keeping opponents under four runs seemed to do the trick for the Tigers in 2004. LSU was 54-4 (.931) when holding opponents to fewer than four runs. Conversely, LSU was only 3-8 (.273) when opponents scored four or more runs. The Tigers lost only four times when allowing fewer than four runs, twice to No. 12 Auburn, on April 24, 2-1, and May 15, 2-0; once to No. 20 Florida, 3-1, on May 2; and once to national champion UCLA in the WCWS, 2-0, on May 28.

## FIVE PROVED TO BE LSU'S MAGIC NUMBER

On the offensive side, the magic number for the Tigers seemed to be five. LSU was a perfect 33-0 when scoring five or more runs in a game. However, the Tigers were just 20-11 (.645) when scoring fewer than five runs. The Tigers' last loss when scoring five or more runs was a 6-5 defeat to Arkansas at home on April 22, 2003.

## TIGERS SCORE EARLY...

The LSU softball team made a habit of taking early leads on opponents. In 69 games, the Tigers outscored their opponents, 50-24 (+26), in the first inning. The third inning, however, was the one that was magical for LSU. The Tigers put up 88 runs in the third, or 1.3 runs in the third inning per game. By the third inning, the Tigers held a commanding 187-56 (+131) scoring margin.

In games when the Tigers took the lead first, LSU lost only one game and was 45-1. However, the Tigers were just 12-11 (.522) when opponents scored first. The Tigers' only loss in 2004 when scoring first was in their final game. LSU took a 1-0 lead into the fifth inning, but with two outs, the Tigers gave up four runs to California and fell 4-1 in the WCWS semifinal game.

## ...AND TIGERS SCORE OFTEN

For the season, the Tigers scored 385 runs in 69 games for a 5.58 runs per game average, second best in the SEC and eighth best in the nation. LSU broke the school record of 5.24 runs per game set during in 1998. On 12 occasions, LSU broke into double figures in runs and twice hit the 20-run mark. The 12 double-figure run performances broke the school record for games with 10 or more runs in a season set in 1998.

The Tigers also had five innings in which they scored eight or more runs. In the seven previous seasons of softball prior to 2004, LSU recorded only eight innings with eight or more runs. Against Nicholls State, the Tigers scored a school-record 15 runs in the fourth inning, besting the 12 runs scored by the 1997 team during the third inning of a 13-2 win over Ole Miss.

## THE TIGERS LOVE THE ROAD...

Perhaps Dorothy was wrong when she said, "There's no place like home," because for the 2004 Tigers, the road was very kind. In 19 true road games, LSU was 18-1 (.974), with the lone loss to No. 13 Tennessee on March 7. Factor in an 18-4 (.818) record in 22 neutral site games and the Tigers were 36-5 (.878) in games played away from home. LSU's four other losses were to national runner-up California in the UNLV Softball Classic and the Women's College World Series, to national champion UCLA in the WCWS and to No. 14 Auburn in the SEC Tournament.

## ...BUT THERE'S STILL NO PLACE LIKE TIGER PARK

The LSU bats seem to love Tiger Park as they performed much better in the friendly confines of home. The team pounded away at a .352 clip and averaged 6.93 runs per game. LSU pitching held opponents to a .217 average and just 2.14 runs per game. Despite a better road record, LSU hit just .283 away from home and averaged just 4.66 runs per game. It's the pitching staff that keyed the Tigers' success on the road, limiting opponents to just 62 runs in 41 games (1.5 runs per game).

## LSU POSTS SECOND-MOST WINS

In just eight years since reinstatement in 1997, the LSU softball program has proven to be among the elite in the nation. The Tigers have averaged 54.88 wins per year in eight seasons, which is by far the best in the SEC in that span (Alabama - 46.63). In the nation, it is second to only Arizona, which has averaged 57.63 wins a season over the past eight years. LSU and Arizona are also the only two programs to post seven consecutive 50-win seasons. The Tigers also rank third in winning percentage, behind only Arizona and UCLA. LSU ranks ahead of former national champions Oklahoma, California and Fresno State.

## GAME 1 - LSU 3, MICHIGAN 2 (13 INNINGS)

Down 0-2 in the 12th, LSU rallied to defeat Michigan, 3-2, in 13 innings in the first game of the Women's College World Series.

After the Wolverines broke the scoreless tie with a two-run home run in the top of the 12th, the Tigers would not go away. LSU scored three unearned runs in response to take the win an inning later.

With two outs and LaDonia Hughes on first, Leslie Klein reached on a fielding error by Michigan pitcher Nicole Motycka.

A single down the right field line by Leigh Ann Danos scored Hughes from second and sent Klein to third. Klein then scored as the ball got past Wolverine catcher Monica Schock, tying the game at two.

In the bottom of the 13th, Sara Fitzgerald singled through the left side with two outs. On an infield single by Camille Harris, Michigan shortstop Jessica Merchant threw the ball away at first, allowing Harris to move to second and Fitzgerald to go to third. An errant throw home by right fielder Courtney Betley scored Fitzgerald for the game-winning run.

All-American Kristin Schmidt went the distance for the Tigers, tying the school record for wins in a season. In a career-high 13 innings pitched, she allowed two runs on six hits with a walk and 13 strikeouts.

After allowing runners to reach scoring position in four of the first five innings, Schmidt faced the minimum over the next six innings. In the top of the 12th, she gave up a leadoff triple before allowing a two-run home run, the only runs she allowed in the game.

Motycka started and threw 11 and two-thirds innings to earn a no-decision for Michigan. She allowed two unearned runs on eight hits with four walks. Jennifer Ritter came on in relief and allowed one unearned run on two hits with one strikeout in an inning of work, taking the loss.

## GAME 2 - UCLA 2, LSU 0

Two runs in the top of the first inning by UCLA were all the Tigers would allow, but that was all the Bruins needed, as LSU fell 0-2 in its second game of the Women's College World Series.

In the top of the first, the Bruins scored two runs on four hits in what proved to be the only runs of the game. UCLA recorded only three hits and had just one runner reach third the remainder of the game.

After being shut down through the first three innings, LSU recorded four hits over the final four innings and had the tying runs in scoring position with no outs in the sixth. The Tigers, however, could not

push a run across and stranded five on base, including three in scoring position.

With one out in the top of the first, UCLA's Andrea Duran recorded an infield single. Lisa Dodd then singled through the left side to send Duran to second.

With two outs, Stephanie Ramos singled to right center, scoring Duran and sending Dodd to third. A single down the left field line scored Dodd and put the Bruins ahead, 2-0.

In the bottom of the sixth, the Tigers mounted their biggest threat of the game. Camille Harris led off with an infield single. After she stole second, she moved to third as LaDonia Hughes reached on a bunt that developed into a double as it trickled away from a diving Duran at third. With runners on second and third with no outs, Goerl recorded back-to-back strikeouts before coaxing an infield groundout to end the inning.

Never willing to concede the game, the Tigers again threatened in the bottom of the seventh. With the tying run at the plate and no outs, Goerl retired the final three batters to end the game.

A day removed from a 13-inning complete-game win on Thursday, Kristin Schmidt came back to throw the complete game. She allowed two runs on seven hits with a walk and six strikeouts in the loss.

Keira Goerl earned the win for UCLA. With the complete-game shutout, she allowed four hits with a walk and five strikeouts.

## GAME 3 - LSU 2, FLORIDA STATE 1

An RBI single by Sara Fitzgerald in the top of the fourth proved to be the game winner as LSU defeated Florida State, 2-1, to move on to the Women's College World Series semifinals.

The game had been scheduled for Saturday night, but was postponed a day due to tornados in the Oklahoma City area.

Kristin Schmidt threw the complete-game four hitter, setting a new LSU single-season record for wins. She allowed one run on a lead-off home run in the first and allowed just three runners to reach scoring position, while striking out 13.

Casey Hunter took the loss, her second loss of the season to the Tigers, and two of only four losses on the year. She allowed two runs on eight hits with a walk and two strikeouts. Jessica van der Linden came on in relief in the sixth and allowed a hit and a walk while striking out two in two innings of work.

The Tigers broke through with a run in the top of the first. After back-to-back singles by Lauren Castle and LaDonia Hughes, Camille Harris singled up the middle to score Castle from second as the throw from van der Linden in center field bounced away from the catcher.

With the bases loaded, LSU appeared to score its second run of the inning. Stephanie Hill tapped a check swing ball just in front of the plate. After the catcher fielded the ball, she attempted to throw down to first, but a collision with Hughes coming home broke up the play. Hughes was initially ruled safe, but after an umpire conference, she was called out for interference to end the inning.

## GAME 4 - LSU 4, CALIFORNIA 1

LSU rallied from an 0-1 deficit to defeat California, 4-1, and become just the seventh team to force an "if necessary" game since the Women's College World Series went to its current format.

The Bears took the lead in the bottom of the first inning. With no outs and runners on first and second, Haley Woods was thrown out attempting to sacrifice bunt. On the play, Vicky Galindo attempted to score from second, but was thrown out by Sara Fitzgerald at the plate. With Lindsay James on third and two outs, Kaleo Eldredge singled to left field to score the first run of the game.

The Tigers wasted no time in answering back. Leslie Klein led off the bottom of the second with a home run to right center field, giving her the LSU single-season home run record with 14.

In the top of the third, LSU added a pair of runs. With two outs, Lauren Castle singled to left center. An infield single by LaDonia Hughes sent Castle to second. Camille Harris knocked a two-RBI double to left center to give LSU the 3-1 advantage.

In the bottom half of the inning, it was Harris again coming up big for the Tigers, this time with her glove. With one out, she robbed a home run from Galindo as she careened into the wall and held onto the ball for the second out of the inning.

The Tigers tacked on a final run in the top of the sixth. With one out, Stephanie Hill reached on a fielding error by the shortstop. Lauren Delahoussaye then doubled to right center, scoring Hill from second to extend the lead to 4-1.

## GAME 5 - CALIFORNIA 4, LSU 1

After fighting off elimination twice and playing in their third game of the day, LSU came up seven outs short of advancing to the National Championship game for the first time in the program's history, falling to California, 4-1, in the Women's College World Series semifinals.

LSU became the first school east of the Mississippi River to be within one game of the National Championship game since 1984, when Northwestern lost to Texas A&M in the WCWS semifinals. The Tigers are the only school from east of the Mississippi River to force an "if necessary" game in the format's history.

LSU took the lead in the bottom of the second inning as Sara Fitzgerald doubled in Lauren Uhle. The Tigers had been 45-0 this season entering the game when scoring first, but a disastrous fifth inning proved the downfall of the Tigers.

With two outs, Kristin Schmidt gave up an infield single on a controversial call that would have ended the inning, as the ball appeared to hit the batter as she left the box.

California then went on to score four runs with two outs for the win. After the controversial hit, the Bears recorded another hit, got back-to-back walks and a pair of singles to push across four runs. LSU tried, but could not answer back as Bear pitcher Kelly Anderson held the Tiger bats in check the rest of the way.

In one of the most memorable performances in Women's College World Series history, Kristin Schmidt threw 20 and two-thirds innings on Sunday, picking up two wins before running out of gas late in the third game. Throwing 349 pitches in her three appearances, the senior hurler allowed just two runs on 11 hits with 21 strikeouts before her final outing. In game three, she allowed four runs, all in the fifth inning, on 12 hits, eight of which came in the final three innings, with five walks while striking out four.

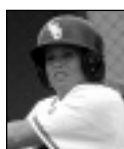

In 2005, the LSU softball team will begin its ninth season of play at Tiger Park. Built in 1996, the facility opened just prior to the inaugural 1997 season.

The 1,000-seat facility, which has been the softball team's home since its inception, is one of the most recent facilities added to LSU's campus.

In just eight years, Tiger Park has already hosted three NCAA Regional tournaments and become one of the toughest places in the nation for visitors to play.

LSU owns an astounding 223-30 (.881) record at home, including an 98-18 (.845) Southeastern Conference mark. In 2001, the Tigers advanced through the NCAA Regional tournament at Tiger Park to its first berth in the Women's College World Series.

Tiger Park has also been home to some amazing feats. On May 20, 2000, LSU and Southern Miss battled out 12 scoreless innings in NCAA Regional action before the Tigers plated the game-winner in the 13th.

This past season, an average of 718 fans watched as LSU won 21 regular-season home games, the largest average home attendance in Tiger softball history. LSU ranked 10th in the NCAA, marking its second consecutive national top 10 attendance ranking.

# Dr. William L. Jenkins

President, LSU

On April 1, 1999, Dr. William L. Jenkins, formerly Chancellor of Louisiana State University and Agricultural & Mechanical College, became president of the LSU System, which includes nine institutions on 10 campuses in five cities, as well as 10 public hospitals in 10 cities. With the departure of Chancellor Mark Emmert in mid-June, the LSU Board of Supervisors asked President Jenkins to again assume the role of Interim Chancellor until a successor for Dr. Emmert can be selected.

A native of South Africa, Dr. Jenkins studied at the University of Pretoria, where he received his professional veterinary medicine degree in 1958 and specialist credentials in 1968. He received his Ph.D. degree from the University of Missouri, Columbia, in 1970. After practicing veterinary medicine for four years, he joined the faculty at the University of Pretoria, advancing through the ranks to become professor and head of the Department of Veterinary Physiology, Pharmacology, & Toxicology in 1971.

He moved to the United States in 1978 and joined the faculty in the Department of Veterinary Physiology & Pharmacology at Texas A&M University. He was appointed dean of the LSU School of Veterinary Medicine in 1988, and was named LSU's provost and vice chancellor for academic affairs in September 1993.

When he was appointed LSU's fifth chancellor in November 1996, Dr. Jenkins reorganized the campus administration to be more effective and more responsive, and oversaw the development of a strategic plan to guide the University in its preparation for the challenges of the next century.

Over the years, Dr. Jenkins has received numerous teaching and service awards and recognitions, having been named the 1997 Communicator of the Year by the Public Relations Association of Louisiana and a Distinguished Alumnus by the University of Missouri in 1999. The regional chapter of Toastmasters International also presented him with its 1999 Communication and Leadership Award, and he was awarded the Vision of Excellence Award 2000 by the New Orleans Regional Chamber of Commerce and the New Orleans Chapter of MetroVision. In addition, the University of Pretoria

awarded an honorary doctoral degree to Dr. Jenkins in September 2000.

Dr. Jenkins has been active in continuing education and has delivered more than 150 lectures and addresses to diverse groups in both the United States and abroad. He has taught extensively at both the professional and graduate levels. He has published more than 60 scientific articles and has contributed 15 chapters to various textbooks. He is co-author of a textbook on veterinary pharmacology.

Dr. Jenkins has been and continues to be a member of many professional organizations and select committees. Most recently he served on the National Institute of Health's Alcohol Abuse and Misuse on College Campuses Committee and on a special Steering Committee of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools to review accreditation criteria for colleges and universities. Dr. Jenkins also is a member of the National Association of State Universities and Land Grant Colleges' Committee on Food and Society and currently serves on the Governor's Advisory Commission on Coastal Restoration and Conservation.

His current community engagement includes serving on the boards of the Louisiana Endowment for the Humanities, Greater Baton Rouge Chamber of Commerce, Academic Distinction Fund, Council for a Better Louisiana, Arts Council of Greater Baton Rouge, The Nature Conservancy of Louisiana, and the Baton Rouge board of the National Conference for Community and Justice.

Dr. Jenkins and his wife, Peggy, have four children - Sharon, Gwynn, Anthea, and Warren - and nine grandchildren.



## Kenneth E. Carpenter, Faculty Athletics Representative

Kenneth E. Carpenter is in his second year as LSU's faculty representative in NCAA and Southeastern Conference matters.

Carpenter, a professor in the School of Architecture, has taught at LSU since 1986. He received his bachelor's degree in architecture from the University of Oklahoma in 1962 and his master's from the University of Minnesota in 1967. Before joining the LSU faculty, he served at Clemson University as associate professor of architecture from 1967-77; Ball State University, where he was professor and chairman of the Department of

Architecture, 1977-81; and, Iowa State University, serving as professor and chairman, Department of Architecture from 1981-86.

At LSU he served as the dean of the College of Design from 1986-1997; Interim Executive Director of International Programs from 1997-98; and Interim Dean of the College of Art and Design from 2001-02.

Carpenter is a member of Phi Kappa Phi, the American Institute of Architects, and the American Association of University Professors.

Already a Louisiana Legend and one of the greatest college baseball coaches of all time, J. Stanley "Skip" Bertman has made the seamless transition into the athletics director's chair with the same enthusiasm, vision and demand for excellence that were trademarks of his stellar coaching career.

In just three years as LSU's director of athletics, Bertman has already added to his impressive list of on-the-field achievements. Under his direction, LSU enjoyed arguably the greatest athletics year in the history of the institution in 2003-04. Three teams won national championships, nine teams finished in the nation's top ten, and fourteen teams ranked in the top 25. LSU teams also enjoyed improved grade point averages across the board, making the LSU student-athlete experience a success on and off the fields of competition.

While supervising the Tigers' progress on the playing fields, he has begun to implement measures necessary to realize his vision of building the LSU athletics department into the best in the country. Bertman's bold and innovative plans promise to keep the Tigers among the nation's elite in all phases of collegiate athletics.

Bertman is now in the midst of upgrading LSU's athletics complex. Working hand in hand with the Tiger Athletic Foundation, Bertman has already overseen the completion of the Cox Communications Academic Center for Student-Athletes while launching renovations to Tiger Stadium and the Pete Maravich Assembly Center, and beginning construction on a new Football Operations Center.

It was also Bertman who took the bold but essential move to implement a seat contribution program in Tiger Stadium to fund facility improvements and ensure the financial stability of the LSU Athletics Department for the next decade.

Bertman was named LSU's athletics director on January 19, 2001. With Bertman, LSU gained an athletics director who provides the leadership and experience necessary to manage the Tigers' \$52 million budget.

Bertman guided LSU to five NCAA baseball titles, and his teams drew huge crowds to venerable Alex Box Stadium, as the Tigers led the nation in attendance in each of his final six seasons (1996-2001).

He also served as head coach of the 1996 U.S. Olympic team which captured the bronze medal in Atlanta.

Bertman continues to be honored for his remarkable coaching tenure, as he was inducted in June, 2002, into the Louisiana Sports Hall of Fame. He was inducted into the American Baseball Coaches Association Hall of Fame in January, 2003.

In a Baseball America poll published in 1999, Bertman was voted the second greatest college baseball coach of the 20th century, trailing only Rod Dedeaux of Southern California. Bertman and Dedeaux are the only coaches to win five CWS titles.

He had previously earned recognition as one of the nation's brightest assistant coaches while at the University of Miami (Fla.) for eight seasons (1976-83). Before working at Miami, Bertman was renowned for his coaching excellence. In 11 seasons at Miami Beach High School, he directed the Hi-Tides to a state championship and two runners-up finishes and he was named Florida's Coach of the Year on three occasions.

In 1975, Bertman coached at Miami-Dade Downtown, leaving after one season to join legendary head coach Ron Fraser at Miami. The move was a homecoming of sorts, as Bertman spent his collegiate playing days with the Hurricanes as an outfielder and catcher from 1958-60. He earned his B.A. in health and physical education from Miami in 1961 and received his master's degree from UM in 1964.

Bertman and his wife Sandy are the parents of four daughters - Jan, Jodi, Lisa and Lori. The Bertmans have three grandchildren - Sophie Faith and Isaac Stanley, the children of Emile and Lori Bertman Guirard, and Samuel Aaron, the son of Drew and Lisa Pate.

## Dan Radakovich

Sr. Associate Athletics Director

Dan Radakovich enters his fourth year as LSU's senior associate athletics director after joining the university in May of 2001. He came to LSU after serving as director of athletics at American University in Washington D.C.

As LSU's senior associate athletics director, Radakovich oversees the daily operations of the LSU Athletics Department and he serves as Skip Bertman's chief assistant. He also directly supervises the sports of baseball and men's basketball.

Prior to his one-year stint at American University, Radakovich spent six years as the associate athletics director at South Carolina where he directed the financial operations for the Gamecocks' \$30 million athletic department budget. He also served as the department liaison for marketing and promotional activities with Host Communications and was responsible for home event management and supervision of concessions, football travel and the video department. Radakovich also worked closely with South Carolina Athletics Director Mike McGee in laying the ground work for a new \$70 million arena being built in Columbia. During his tenure with South Carolina, Radakovich supervised the finances and logistics for \$33 million in facility improvements.

Radakovich served as the senior associate athletics director at Long Beach State from 1989-94. In that capacity, he managed a \$5 million budget and supervised the nationally recognized men's basketball and baseball programs. In addition, Radakovich reorganized the fund-raising operations and coordinated the production and sales of radio broadcasting packages.

Radakovich began his collegiate athletics career as the athletics business manager at the University of Miami in Coral Gables, Fla., from 1983-85. He worked in the private sector for four years before joining Long Beach State.

A native of Aliquippa, Pa., Radakovich graduated from Indiana University of Pennsylvania in 1980 with a bachelor of science degree in finance. Radakovich was also a football letterwinner as well as a student coach at IUP. He then went on to earn his master's degree in business administration from the University of Miami in 1982.

Radakovich is married to the former Marcie McDonald and the couple has two children, Christian (14) and Grant (10).



## Judy Southard

Associate Athletics Director/  
Senior Women's Administrator

Judy Southard, who had a very successful career as both a head women's basketball coach and director of athletics, enters her fourth year as LSU's Senior Women's Administrator after joining the department in the summer of 2001.

Southard came to LSU from Texas Woman's University, where she served as the school's director of athletics for nine years.

As LSU's Senior Women's Administrator, Southard oversees the highly successful Tiger women's athletics program. She directly supervises volleyball, soccer, women's basketball, softball and men's and women's golf. She is also instrumental in monitoring the department's gender equity and minority issues plan.

Southard has served on numerous national committees during her career in athletic administration. She is currently a member of the NCAA Women's Gymnastics Committee and was named in the summer of 2004 to both the SEC Executive Committee and the NCAA Division I Women's Basketball Committee.

While at Texas Woman's University, Southard initiated a corporate partnership program for the athletic department that tripled the involvement of area businesses and corporations in Pioneer athletics. Southard also established the TWU Intercollegiate Athletics Hall of Fame and she played a key role in the addition of softball and soccer to TWU's list of intercollegiate sports. In 2000, Southard served as chair of the NCAA Division II Women's Basketball Committee.

Prior to her nine-year stint at Texas Woman's University, Southard served as head women's basketball coach at Marshall University in Huntington, W. Va., for 11 years, where she led the Lady Herd to five Southern Conference regular-season titles. During her 11 years at Marshall, Southard was named Southern Conference Coach of the Year three times and her career record of 178-130 still stands as a school record for women's basketball victories. Southard also served as assistant athletics director at Marshall from 1983-1988, including a four-month period when she was interim director.

Before going to Marshall, Southard spent three years as head coach at Tennessee-Martin and she also served for one season as an assistant coach at Tennessee. As a high school teacher from 1970-77, Southard coached both basketball and tennis, leading her West Florence High School basketball team to the South Carolina 4A state title in 1976.

A native of Columbia, S.C., Southard earned a bachelor's degree in physical education and health from Coker College in 1970 followed by a master's degree in physical education from Tennessee in 1978.



## Verge Ausberry

Associate Athletics Director/Operations

A former LSU football standout Verge Ausberry joined the LSU Athletics Department administrative staff in August 2001.

Ausberry is responsible for all corporate sales and marketing for the LSU Athletics program. He also supervises game management, strength and conditioning, the Dr. Martin

Broussard training room, the Jeff Boss Equipment Room and video operations for various sports. He also directly supervises the sports of men's and women's swimming and diving.

Ausberry, from New Iberia, La., played inside linebacker for the Tigers, lettering in 1986-89. He was the leading tackler on the team in both 1988 and 1989 and was part of two Southeastern Conference championship teams (1986 under Bill Arnsparger and 1988 under Mike Archer), playing on teams that went to three bowl games: the

1987 Sugar Bowl, the 1987 Gator Bowl and the 1989 Hall of Fame Bowl. In those three years, the Tigers had a combined overall record of 27-8-1 and 16-3 in SEC games.

Although this is Ausberry's first tour of duty with the administration of the Athletic Department, he has remained very close to the LSU athletic scene in the 1990s, first serving for almost seven years as a member of LSU's highly regarded Academic Center for Athletes where he worked with many of the student-athletes, primarily dealing with LSU's football squad.

After leaving the Academic Center, he moved in July 1999 to the Tiger Athletic Foundation staff as part of LSU's fund-raising arm prior to accepting his present position.

Ausberry received his Bachelor of Science degree in education in May of 1990 and his Master of Education in Administration, Supervision and certification in Child Welfare in May of 1992. He is presently a Doctoral Candidate in Higher Education Administration at LSU. He is married to the former Cheri Morial of New Orleans and they have a son, Austin.



**Bo Bahnsen**  
Associate Athletics  
Director/Internal Relations

Bo Bahnsen serves as LSU's associate athletics director for internal relations, overseeing the ticket office and all customer service operations, and the integration of the Pete Maravich Assembly Center into athletics department operations. He also directly supervises the sports of men's and women's indoor and outdoor track and field and men's and women's cross country.

Prior to moving into his current position in December of 2003, Bahnsen's primary responsibility for the previous 14 years was to serve as LSU's NCAA compliance officer.

A 1982 graduate of LSU, Bahnsen served as administrative assistant for the men's basketball team for five years before moving into athletics administration as director of purchasing for two years. In 1989, he was assigned his primary responsibility as NCAA compliance officer as assistant athletics director, then was promoted to associate AD in 1996.

Bahnsen has been responsible for overseeing the successful implementation of LSU's Tradition Fund Program, a football seating plan that requires contributions for the right to purchase approximately 45,000 seats in Tiger Stadium beginning with the 2004 football season.

Beginning in July of 2004, the management of the Pete Maravich Assembly Center shifted from the university to the athletics department. Bahnsen will be involved in coordinating the transition and integration of management of the arena.

Bahnsen, 45, served as manager of the LSU basketball team as an undergraduate and became administrative assistant for the team upon graduation in May of 1982. In July 1987 he became administrative assistant to athletics director Joe Dean, overseeing the purchasing office until his promotion in 1989.

A native of El Campo, Texas, Bahnsen graduated from Wharton High School in 1977 and attended Wharton County Junior College for two years before transferring to LSU in 1979. He earned his bachelor of science in physical education and is currently working on his masters in education administration.

Bahnsen is married to the former Karen Mayson, former LSU golfer and current head coach of the Lady Tigers golf program. The couple has two children, Darren (14) and Devin (12).

Mark Ewing, a 20-year employee of Louisiana State University, joined the LSU Athletics Department in January 2001, and serves as the department's associate athletics director for business.

**Miriam Segar**  
Assistant Athletic Director/Student Services

Former LSU Lady Tiger basketball point guard Miriam Segar was promoted to Assistant Athletic Director in July 2004 in charge of student services, a position she

has held since 2001.

In her present role, Segar works closely with the school's compliance staff and interacts with the league office and the NCAA in regard to issues that affect the student-athletes, including the NCAA clearinghouse, orientation sessions and financial aid.

Segar, then Miriam Farr, played for Coach Sue Gunter and the Lady Tigers from 1990-1994, serving as team captain her last two seasons. The member of the SEC Academic Honor Roll played 91 games for the Lady Tigers.

After graduating from LSU with a BS in business administration in May 1994, Farr worked at the SEC Office in Birmingham, serving as an assistant in Championships, helping to manage many of the league's championship events as well as coordinating the awards program for the league. In 1999, Segar took over the direction of the CHAMPS Life Skills program, helping prepare student-athletes to the challenges of life beyond the playing field. She was also involved in several well-known CHAMPS projects in association with the student-athlete advisory board, including the Halloween BOOzar and the annual food drive for needy families at Thanksgiving and Christmas.

Segar returned to the Athletic Department offices in 2001 in her present position in Student Services.

Segar is married to Jamie Segar, who serves as assistant to the chancellor of the LSU School of Agriculture. They have three children: Grant (5), Reid (3) and Maggie (3).



## Setting the Standard for Intercollegiate Athletics in Softball

In only eight short years the Southeastern Conference has become one of the premier softball conferences in the nation.

Leading all conferences in the nation, the SEC qualified a league-best eight teams for the 2004 NCAA Tournament - Alabama, Auburn, Florida, Georgia, LSU, Mississippi State, South Carolina and Tennessee. LSU was the lone SEC school to receive a No. 1 seed, while Georgia hosted its first regional tournament. With its second Women's College World Series appearance, LSU joined Alabama as the only SEC schools to represent the conference in the WCWS twice since softball became a league sport.

The SEC qualified six teams for the 2003 NCAA Tournament - Alabama, Florida, Georgia, LSU, Mississippi State and South Carolina. Alabama was the lone SEC team to receive a No.1 seed, and the Crimson Tide, along with Florida, hosted regional tournaments. It was the second time that two SEC schools have hosted regionals. The six teams from the SEC to qualify was second only to the PAC-10 for the most teams from one conference to make the 2003 NCAA Tournament.

The SEC qualified a league-best seven teams for the 2002 NCAA Tournament - Alabama, Auburn, Arkansas, Georgia, LSU, Mississippi State and South Carolina. LSU was the lone SEC team to receive a No. 1 seed, while South Carolina hosted a regional for the second time since 1997. The seven teams from the SEC to qualify tied the Pac-10 for the most teams from one conference to make the 2002 NCAA Tournament.

In 2001 the SEC qualified four teams for the NCAA Tournament. LSU, Alabama, South Carolina and Florida all made yet another appearance in the tourney, while Mississippi State barely missed the field. LSU and Alabama both secured No. 1 seeds and hosted a regional championship, marking the first time the SEC had two schools achieve such an honor.

Trailing only the Pac-10, the SEC qualified a then-record six teams for the 2000 NCAA Tournament, as LSU, Arkansas, Mississippi State, Alabama, Florida and SEC Tournament Champion South Carolina all made the field of 48.

The 1999 season was the first in which the conference was eligible for an automatic berth to the NCAA Tournament. That year, four teams earned bids to postseason, the second most by any conference.

The sport came under the auspices of the SEC in the 1997 season. Since then, nine different teams have made appearances in the

NCAA Tournament, including five WCWS berths - two by LSU in 2001 and 2004, two by Alabama in 2000 and 2003 and one by South Carolina in 1997. The Tigers reached the semifinals each time and finished the season ranked third nationally.

Two different teams have won both the SEC regular season and tournament titles in the same season. South Carolina has won both once (1997) and LSU has won both four times (1999, 2001, 2002 and 2004).

Seven teams (Alabama, Auburn, Florida, Georgia, LSU, Mississippi State, South Carolina and Tennessee) have made Top 25 appearances and four teams (Alabama, Georgia, LSU and South Carolina) have climbed into the Top 10 of the NFCA/USA Today Poll. At least one SEC team has been ranked in the poll each week since the inception of SEC Softball. In 2004 alone, SEC teams made 89 appearances in the poll.

South Carolina is the dean of SEC Softball, with a rich history dating back 30 seasons. The Gamecocks have made 13 NCAA Regional and three WCWS appearances.

Mississippi State played softball for five seasons during the 1980's before resuming the sport when it was added to the SEC. Tennessee added softball in 1996, one year before Alabama, Arkansas, Auburn, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, LSU and Ole Miss began softball programs to give the league 11 representatives (Vanderbilt does not sponsor softball).
