# AWAKEN THE TIGER INSIDE

After an underwhelming season by Tiger standards a year ago, the 2006 LSU softball team takes the field with an awakened Tiger spirit that drives them to return to their familiar place atop the Southeastern Conference and the NCAA. LSU did not lose a starter from its 2005 team, and lost only one letterwinner, while also adding a trio of newcomers who can help them revisit the level of success that has become a staple for the Tigers throughout the program's history.

"Everyone associated with the program is eager to return to competition and prove that the Tigers were merely napping," said head coach Yvette Girouard. "The coaching staff and the entire team expect great things for this regular season."

Playing without a senior and starting several freshmen a year ago, LSU went through a few growing pains, but the team learned from those trials and tribulations and returns with battle tested players who are ready to welcome the challenges of a difficult schedule.

"The demanding schedule early on the road in major competition will prepare us for the rigors of the SEC," said Girouard. "Since the first meeting in the fall we have dedicated ourselves to living in the present by embracing each 'today' with a chance to become better softball players, coaches and teammates."

By overcoming the obstacles last year and putting them in the past, the team has united in the present to become a unit in which each individual understands her contribution and role in making LSU successful.

"This is a team any coach would love to direct," said Girouard. "The team is filled with highly talented, driven, extremely loyal athletes who love LSU. One of the most glaring qualities of the team is their respect for the game and their true appreciation for each other and the talents and attributes each player brings to the group."

The team was tested in the fall and rose to the occasion, never once wavering during the most demanding offseason workouts in the program's history. The players stepped up to the challenge and that has given the team a renewed confidence and terrific approach that will carry them through the year.

"Collectively, the group has embraced each and every new challenge presented to them, including the most strenuous fall conditioning program the Tigers have ever accomplished," said Girouard. "The team's attitude is one of tremendous confidence that this LSU softball team will be one to be remembered."

## PITCHERS

After a less than phenomenal season by LSU standards, the focus on pitching has returned. With the return of three pitchers, including All-SEC selection Emily Turner (Chula Vista, Calif.), the Tigers add the National Player of the Year Dani Hofer (Safety Harbor, Fla.).

"The pitch is back," said Girouard. "LSU softball has been synonymous with excellent pitchers and staffs. This 2006 staff will be exciting to watch with the promise of a return to dominance within the circle."

As a sophomore, Turner posted a 17-16 record with 203 strikeouts. In addition, the junior earned three wins over nationally ranked teams and posted six complete-game shutouts.

"We believe Emily turned the corner in the latter part of last season," said Girouard. "Her confidence, awareness of competition and her own recognition of her physical talents is part of her maturation process. We believe that Emily will have a breakout year."

Despite an injury that limited her action throughout most of 2005, Megan Jolly (Owensboro, Ky.) recorded a 7-5 record with 71 strikeouts. The sophomore threw three complete-game shutouts and recorded a win over nationally ranked Florida.

"Megan is finally healthy and has worked harder physically than at any time in her career," said Girouard. "If she can stay healthy she can give the Tigers very good innings."

A sophomore from LaPorte, Texas, Tiffany Garcia posted a 7-2 mark in her freshman season. She threw three complete-game shutouts, including a one-hitter against Grambling State, while recording 45 strikeouts.

"Tiffany returns with more confidence in her abilities," said Girouard. "Possessing the best change up on the team, Tiffany is fine change of pace from others."

The 2005 Gatorade National Player of the Year, Hofer joins the Tigers after leading Palm Harbor High School to back-to-back Florida Class 5A state titles. As a senior, she recorded a 25-0 record for the 31-0 Hurricanes with 21 shutouts and 15 no-hitters. She struck out 404 with a 0.08 ERA. In four years, she recorded 13 perfect games, which ranks fourth in the all-time national high school record book.

"Dani will be a great addition to this team," said Girouard. "Her greatest attribute is an inherent mound presence. A true competitor, Dani exudes confidence and her teammates feed off her attitude. Dani has great movement on all pitches and more than likely will always stay ahead of the hitters."

## CATCHERS

The Tigers return both junior Kristen Hobbs (Royal Palm Beach, Fla.) and sophomore Killian Roessner (Manasquan, N.J.) from a year ago. While Hobbs saw the most work behind the plate, Roessner got considerable playing time as a freshman.

Hobbs will be sidelined early on as she recovers from offseason ulnar collateral ligament reconstruction, commonly known as Tommy John surgery but affectionately called Tammy Jane surgery by the team.

"Kristen is coming back and is now able to throw gradually," said assistant coach Lori Osterberg. "We will have to see what happens with her rehab, but she will possibly get some time behind the plate. She is rehabbing hard and we'll have to see her progress."

The loss of Hobbs opens the door for Roessner to step in. With a strong, accurate arm, she allowed only seven stolen bases on 14 attempts.

"Killian saw action last year, but has come back a new woman," said Osterberg. "She returns with confidence. She's accurate, has a gun and is smart with it. Killian is also a great communicator on the field with a solid, strong voice that the girls hear. She keeps them centered and on the same page."

## INFIELD

Returning all four starters in an infield that saw a pair of freshmen up the middle, the unit has had time to build a connection and strengthen its confidence.

"With basically the same infield, we have an extra year of experience" said Osterberg. "We have been able to grow together and build off each other. We are playing as a unit. Our confidence is extremely high and we are eager to take the field."

"The infield is like a team within our team and that enables them to play as a unit," said Osterberg. "We have a solid group of girls on the same page. They are communicating well and are talented defensively."

The Tigers return Stephanie Hill (Harahan, La.) at first base, Vanessa Soto (San Diego, Calif.) at second base, Andrea Smith (Moreno Valley, Calif.) at shortstop and Lauren Delahoussaye (Lafayette, La.) at third base. In addition, LSU brought in Texas A&M-Corpus Christi transfer Shannon Stein (Upland, Calif.), who will challenge for a starting role, and freshman Fallon Fisher (Sulphur, La.), who is learning her way at first base.

Hill, a senior who has held down the starting role at first base for two seasons, was selected as one of the team captains for 2006. The former walk-on has been solid in the field, while contributing as one of the team's most consistent and powerful hitters.

"Stephanie is completely solid at her position," said Osterberg. "She's a great leader and communicator on the field. The girls look to her for leadership."

Delahoussaye holds down the hot corner in her second year at third base after playing shortstop in her first two seasons. The senior has used her outstanding arm to make remarkable plays look easy.

"Lauren covers a lot of ground," said Osterberg. "She is fast and has an amazing arm. She is a big plus for us in stopping opponents' short game."

During her freshman year at shortstop, sophomore Smith proved to be one of the most dependable players at that position in school history. Leading the SEC in fielding by a shortstop, she routinely made the highlight reel.

"Andrea plays like a major league baseball player," said Osterberg. "She is fun to watch. She's very consistent and covers a lot of ground."

Soto joins Smith to form the heart of the infield. The sophomore recorded only 10 errors in almost 200 attempts last season while leading the Tigers at the plate in several offensive categories.

"Vanessa is a real steady, stable player who understands the game well," said Osterberg.

Leading TAMUCC to one of its best seasons in school history, Stein ranked second with a .315 average. The sophomore started all 48 games at second base for the Islanders with a .968 fielding percentage, but may play multiple positions at LSU.

"Shannon can play anywhere," said Osterberg. "Put her anywhere and she will come through. She's an impact player and just gets it done. She is strong and fast, so she'll be dependable wherever we put her. With her bat coming through as a prime time hitter, she may find herself in a starting role."

Inducted into the Southwest Louisiana High School Sports Hall of Fame while still in high school, Fisher is a former pitcher and infielder who brings an outstanding bat to the roster as she develops at first base.

"Stephanie has taken Fallon under her wing and shown her the ropes at first base," said Osterberg. "Fallon has come in and really adjusted nicely."

## OUTFIELD

While LSU returns all starters in the outfield this season, the lineup will shift as All-American Leslie Klein (Sunrise, Fla.) moves from left field to center field and All-SEC selection Camille Harris (Hendersonville, Tenn.) shifts from center to left. With both starting positions solidified, the battle will be for a position in right field. Returning starter Quinlan Duhon (Youngsville, La.) is battling senior Lauren Castle (Lafayette, La.) and sophomore Erika Sluss (Vista, Calif.) for the role.

"We are going to have a fast outfield," said associate head coach James DeFeo. "We are going to cover a lot of ground - balls that dropped last year, will definitely not drop this year."

Klein earned All-America honors as a freshman in 2004, but was hampered last season after recovering from a second ACL tear in her knee. The junior has returned to the lineup at full speed.

"Leslie is fully healed and back to her All-America-potential self," said DeFeo. "She's covering ground out there and looking really good."

After starting in center field in 2005 and right field two years ago, Harris will complete the trio with the move to left field. The senior's speed has helped her develop into one of LSU's most reliable outfielders.

"Camille makes the outstanding plays look routine," said DeFeo, "as she patrols the grass at Tiger Park."

After starting 32 of LSU's 54 games in right last season, Duhon returns with the most experience in the outfield. Castle started 13 games in right before taking over as the designated player. Sluss is moving to the outfield after seeing action in the infield last year.

"We have a pretty big battle between Erika, Quinlan and Lauren Castle," said DeFeo. "We really would like to

see Castle in there to free up the designated player spot, but Erika and Quinlan are really hitting the ball well. It will all depend on who is swinging the bat hot."

Dee Dee Henderson (Marietta, Texas) and Heidi Robin (Breaux Bridge, La.) add depth to the outfield to help make it one of the Tigers' strengths.

## AT THE PLATE

The Tigers return all of their hitters from last season as LSU ranked near the top of the SEC in batting a year ago. With an veteran upper class that has played in a majority of games during their careers and a sophomore class than now has a year of experience, LSU looks to remain among the league's best at the plate.

"Castle, Stephanie and Camille are coming back really strong," said DeFeo. "Lauren Delahoussaye is back and swinging the bat really well, while Klein is as strong as ever with her hitting, slapping and running."

"The sophomores bring a lot of experience to the Tigers. Andrea has really worked hard at the plate and is going to be solid, while Soto is just a natural hitter. Sluss is going to be hard to keep out of the lineup."

A duel threat for the Tigers, Castle has the ability to slap for a high average or swing for power. She has improved her bat control and now has the ability to find the holes in the defense.

"Opponents don't know how to play Castle because she can beat out a bunt and she can hit it out at any point," said Osterberg. "She also has a presence because of height, but she is deceptively fast."

Someone that may surprise opponents this season is Roessner, who has returned with added power while making solid contact.

"Killian has really stepped up her game," said DeFeo. "I think this will be her breakout year. Her power game has come. She'll be really solid at the plate this year with a year under her belt."

Adding to the lineup this year will be Fisher and Stein. Both give LSU prime time hitting off the bench and may see extensive time in pinch hitting roles.

"Fallon looks to be a very big impact player," said DeFeo. "Stein is a utility player and her bat is really something that can provide us with a spark."

Henderson add speed to the roster after tying for the team lead in stolen bases last year and crossing the plate in almost half of her games played.

"Henderson can come off the bench and run for anyone," said Osterberg. "We need to get her on early in an inning, move her from bag to bag, and score her."

In a change from last season, Turner will bat for herself while she is pitching. Her ability to remain in the lineup will allow the Tigers more choices with the designated player role.

"Emily will be in the lineup for herself when she is pitching this year," said DeFeo. "She's one of the most natural hitters on the team but we haven't been able to get her in the lineup. This will open up the DP spot, with just one more person in there to get it going."

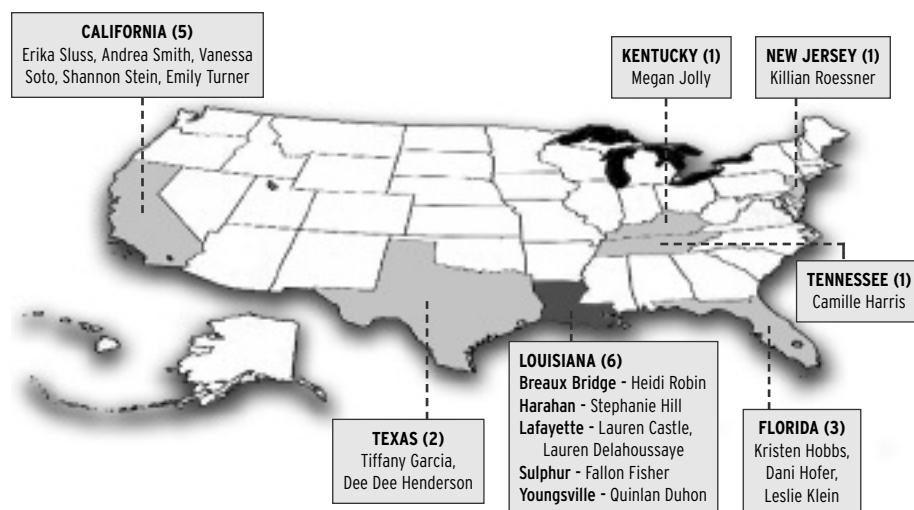

Strong supporters of education throughout the state have provided resources for a variety of innovative projects that are attracting world-class researchers and their expertise to LSU. The National Flagship Agenda is working to improve the standing of the University, as well as strengthen its position as an economic engine for the state of Louisiana. As a result, the University community is even more determined to achieve excellence at every level.

LSU remains firmly focused on attaining national flagship status by 2010, the University's 150th anniversary. The resolve of the LSU community and the support of the state make these goals attainable. And, if the last five years are any indication of success, the next phase of this agenda will guarantee LSU's place in the arena of national prominence.

Because of its designation as a doctoral/research university by the Carnegie Foundation, LSU ranks in the top 2 percent of the nation's colleges and universities. This designation is shared by only 59 public and 29 private universities across the nation. LSU is also one of only 25 universities nationwide designated as both a land-grant and sea-grant college.

History and tradition began with LSU's founding in 1853 by the General Assembly of Louisiana as the Louisiana State Seminary of Learning and Military Academy near Pineville, Louisiana. The

institution opened January 2, 1860. When the Civil War began, the school's first superintendent, William Tecumseh Sherman, resigned to assume a command in the Union Army. The seminary reopened in 1869, but was soon destroyed by fire. The institution moved to Baton Rouge, opening on Nov. 1, 1869.

In 1870, the Seminary was renamed Louisiana State University. In 1874, under the United States Morrill Act, the Louisiana State Agricultural & Mechanical College was established in New Orleans. The two institutions were merged by the Legislature in 1877 to become Louisiana State University and Agricultural & Mechanical College.

Construction on the present campus began in 1922 and the first classes were held in 1926. LSU experienced major growth in the 1930s and 1940s, expanding its student body, curricula, and services. During the 1960s, the University began to place increasing emphasis on research.

Recognizing the importance and extent of statewide agricultural activities of units in the LSU System, the LSU Board of Supervisors established the Center for Agricultural Sciences & Rural Development in 1972. This unit was renamed the LSU Agricultural Center in 1982. Components of the LSU Agricultural Center include the Louisiana Agricultural Experiment Station, the Louisiana Cooperative Extension Service

and International Programs.

The primary mission of the LSU Agricultural Center is to conduct research in agricultural and natural resource development and to provide off-campus extension education that disseminates technological, economic, and management information to Louisiana residents.

In 1977, the Paul M. Hebert Law Center, established as the LSU Law School in 1906, was made an autonomous division of the LSU System. The Law Center provides legal education characterized by an unyielding demand for academic excellence. Its unique curriculum, based on civil law as well as substantial elements of common law, provides law graduates with qualifications and training for not one, but two legal systems. The Hebert Law Center holds membership in the Association of Law Schools and is on the approved list of the American Bar Association.

LSU, located on more than 2,000 acres in the southern part of Baton Rouge, Louisiana, is bordered on the west by the Mississippi River. The University's more than 250 principal buildings are grouped on a 650-acre plateau that constitutes the main part of the campus.

LSU and A&M College is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools.

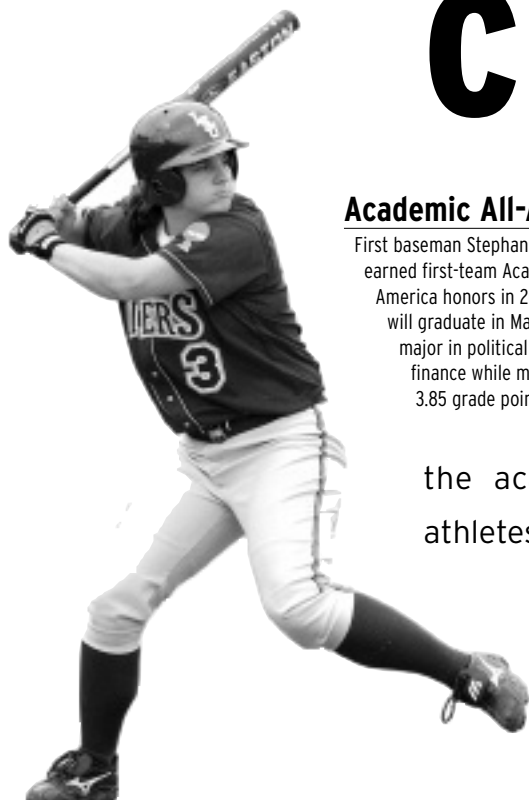

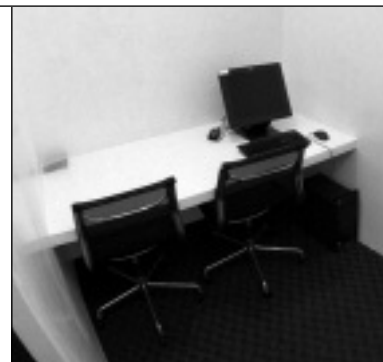


## The Library

### Bob Pettit

Led LSU to its first NCAA Final Four in 1953 and he later became the first player in NBA history to exceed the 20,000-plus point barrier. Pettit is a member of the NBA Hall of Fame and in 1997 he was named as one of the top 50 players in NBA history.

### Pete Maravich

"Pistol Pete," Maravich still holds the NCAA record for career points with 3,667 and for career scoring average with 44.2 points a game. He was selected the National Player of the Year in 1970 after leading the Tigers to the NIT Final Four. He scored 50+ points an amazing 28 times. He went on to a 10-year professional career and was selected as one of the NBA's 50 greatest players in 1997.

### Shaquille O'Neal

Was the first pick in the 1992 NBA Draft. He was named MVP of the league in 2000 and was a three-time NBA Finals MVP after leading the Los Angeles Lakers to three World Championships. At LSU, O'Neal averaged 21.6 points and 13.6 rebounds for his career, and in 1991, he was named the World's Amateur Athlete of the Year as well as SEC Athlete of the Year and National Player of the Year. In 1997, he was named as one of the top 50 players in NBA history.

### Billy Cannon

One of the true legends of college football in the South, Cannon was the 1959 Heisman Trophy winner and helped the Tigers to the 1958 national title. Cannon's most memorable performance came in 1959 against Ole Miss when No. 1 LSU trailed No. 3 Ole Miss 3-0 in the fourth quarter. He fielded a punt, broke seven tackles and returned it 89 yards for the 7-3 victory. He went on to a successful 11-year professional career.

### Skip Bertman

A legend in the college baseball ranks, Bertman created a dynasty at LSU, guiding the Tigers to five national titles in a 10-year stretch from 1991-2000. He also skipped the United States to a bronze medal at the 1996 Olympics in Atlanta and was an assistant on the gold medal-winning U.S. squad in Seoul, Korea in 1988. Bertman retired from coaching following the 2001 season and is currently the LSU athletic director.

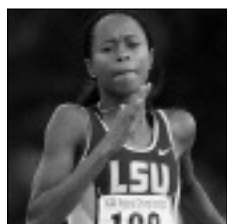
### Kristin Schmidt

The 2002 NCAA Floor Exercise Co-Champion, Arnstad became the first LSU gymnast to win a national title. She was a two-time All-American and won the NCAA Central Regional Floor and All-Around Championships.



### Muna Lee

The most decorated track and field athlete in school history, Lee won 20 All-America awards and a school record seven national titles while helping the Lady Tigers to five NCAA team championships during her time at LSU. A 2004 Olympian, she finished seventh in the 200 meters at the Summer Games in Athens, Greece.



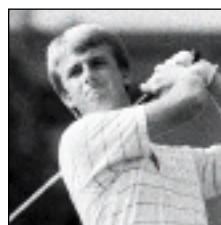
### Britni Sneed

One of three four-time first-team All-SEC selections in conference history, Sneed was a two-time SEC Player of the Year and a three-time NFCA All-American, leading the Tigers to their first Women's College World Series appearance in 2001.



### Walter Davis

An Olympian in 2000 and 2004, Davis helped LSU to national titles in 2001 and 2002. The SEC Male Athlete of the Year in 2002, he won six NCAA titles and earned a school-record nine All-America honors.



### David Toms

The two-time SEC Player of the Year, Toms has gone on to a successful career on the PGA Tour. Among his PGA Tour victories was a thrilling win at the PGA Championship in August of 2001.



### Marie Ferdinand

The eighth pick overall in the 2001 WNBA draft by the Utah Starzz. A Kodak All-American in 2000-01 who helped the Lady Tigers to the Elite Eight in 2000 and to the NCAA Tournament three times. She is a two-time WNBA all-star selection.



### Todd Walker

Capped his LSU career as the SEC's all-time leader in hits, runs, RBIs, and total bases. Walker, who is a member of the All-Time College World Series Team, led LSU to the national title in 1993.



### Meredith Duncan

The nation's top collegiate golfer in 2002, Duncan left LSU as the school's best female golfer. She earned first-team All-America honors as a senior in 2002 and won the United States Women's Amateur Championship in 2001.



### Ben McDonald

Named National Player of the Year in 1989 and he was later the first player chosen in the Major League Baseball Draft by the Baltimore Orioles.

**T**iger Park, located directly behind LSU's "Dub" Robinson Tennis Stadium, has a seating capacity of 1,000. The dimensions of the field are 200 feet to both foul poles and 220 to center field. A new, elevated, air-conditioned press box was installed behind the home plate bleachers prior to the 2003 season. Tiger Park also features an inning-by-inning scoreboard, message board and a state-of-the-art sound system. With these features, LSU's softball field is one of the most modern softball facilities in the country.



## LSU SOFTBALL LOCKER ROOM

Measuring 81 feet by 29 feet, the LSU softball locker room is a suite of rooms including a lounge area, meeting room, locker room, showers, sauna and a coach's office.

## LSU INDOOR PRACTICE FACILITY

When the weather prevents the softball team from practicing at Tiger Park, the team moves to the indoor, climate-controlled football practice facility. LSU student-athletes benefit from one of the most modern indoor facilities in the nation. Located at the site of the Charles McClendon Practice Facility, the indoor facility was built as part of a \$15 million upgrade of the LSU physical plant in the late 1980's and early 1990's and houses a full football field.

# HEAD COACH Yvette Girouard

SIXTH YEAR AT LSU • 26TH YEAR OVERALL



In five seasons at LSU, head coach Yvette Girouard's effect on the Tiger softball program has been powerful. With each year, she continues to add to her legacy as one of the greatest coaches in the history of women's softball by helping LSU maintain its place among the nation's elite in the collegiate ranks.

Girouard, who was inducted into the National Fastpitch Coaches Association Hall of Fame in December 2005 and the Louisiana Softball Coaches Association Hall of Fame in June 2002, enters the 2006 season among the career leaders in NCAA Division I wins (No. 5) and winning percentage (No. 5) and among the active NCAA Division I coaching leaders in wins (No. 5) and winning percentage (No. 5).

Against Arkansas on April 6, 2005, she became the sixth coach in NCAA history to earn her 1,000th career victory and just the fifth in NCAA Division I history. Averaging more than 40 wins a season in her 25 years as a head coach, she is one of only a handful of coaches who can boast that feat over such an extended and noteworthy career.

With 24-straight winning seasons to her credit, she has guided her athletes to 35 All-America honors, including seven while at LSU, 14 Academic All-America honors, including 2005 first-team Academic All-American Stephanie Hill, and taken teams to 14 NCAA Regionals.

No stranger to Oklahoma City, Girouard became just the third coach in NCAA history to take two programs to the Women's College World Series after leading UL-Lafayette to three World Series appearances in the 1990s and LSU to the WCWS in 2001 and 2004.

In 2004, she led LSU to its second Women's College World Series appearance, where the Tigers advanced to within one game of the championship game. After defeating Michigan in extra innings in its first game, LSU fell to eventual national champion UCLA in game two.

Weather postponed play for a day and forced the Tigers into the unenviable situation of having to win three games in a single day to advance to the national championship game. LSU began the day with a win over Florida State before defeating California to force just the seventh "if necessary" game in WCWS history.

Unfortunately, the Tigers could not get past California a second time and came up one game shy of the national championship game. LSU's remarkable run marked the first time since 1984 a school from east of the Mississippi River had advanced to within a game of the national championship. Tiger pitcher Kristin Schmidt was named the WCWS Most Outstanding Player, becoming the first player to earn the honor who was not a member of the national championship team. Sophomore Camille Harris was also named to the WCWS All-Tournament team.

In addition, the Tigers were ranked as high as second nationally, matching the highest national ranking for any team coached by Girouard.

In 2001, Girouard led LSU to its first appearance in the WCWS, where the Tigers finished third. Under her guidance, UL-Lafayette (formerly Southwestern Louisiana) advanced to the WCWS with a pair of fifth-place finishes and a third-place finish in 1993.

With .815 winning percentage in the 1990s, her teams posted the third-best winning percentage in the nation behind only Arizona and UCLA. In five seasons at LSU, she has posted the second most wins in the nation over that period, behind only Arizona, and the fourth-best winning percentage.

While her influence has been a catalyst for the growth of the game in the state and nationally for many years, her impact in just five years in Baton Rouge has been no less significant. Becoming the first coach in Southeastern Conference history to lead a team to back-to-back tournament championships, Girouard made a clean sweep of the three major league titles (SEC Western Division, SEC Championship, SEC Tournament Championship) in three of her first five seasons as a Tiger.

In 2005, she became the fifth coach in NCAA Division I history and the sixth coach in NCAA history to earn 1,000 career victories. She guided junior Stephanie Hill to first-team Academic All-America honors, the second Academic All-American in school history and the first to earn first-team honors.

After failing to earn the league titles in 2003, LSU came back to sweep all three major titles again in 2004. The Tigers earned the top seed in NCAA Region 3, marking the 14th consecutive trip to the post-season for Girouard and the seventh for LSU. The Tigers swept through NCAA Regional play, defeating Illinois in the championship game to earn their berth in the Women's College World Series.

For their efforts, Girouard, associate head coach James DeFeo and assistant coach Lori Osterberg were named the National Fastpitch Coaches Association South Region Coaching Staff of the Year, marking the seventh regional coach of the year honor in Girouard's career.

In 2003, Girouard earned her 900th career victory, becoming just the sixth coach in NCAA Division I history and the eighth coach in NCAA history to reach the historic milestone.

After finishing second in the SEC Western Division, the Tigers advanced through the conference tournament to the championship game for the fifth-consecutive year.

The Tigers earned their sixth-consecutive trip to the NCAA Regionals and finishing the year ranked No. 15, the fourth consecutive top 15 ranking for LSU and fifth consecutive top 20 finish for Girouard.

## THE GIROUARD PHILOSOPHY

I believe fully in trying to instill in our athletes a knowledge and a love for the qualities and virtues that comprise good character. Character is what we are inside. It is often revealed by how we act when no one is looking. Winning in our program should occur both on the field as well as in the classroom, in society and in personal lives after Tiger softball. When our players leave our program, hopefully we have developed successful people that will feel that their Tiger family will always have a unique and lasting place in their hearts.

LSU is a very special place with everything provided for success; from athletic facilities to the very best academic center in the country and a first-class administration all at the disposal of our student ath-

letes. In addition to having the friendliness of Louisiana people, LSU has one of the most beautiful campuses in the country. Our players will know from their first visit to the LSU campus that their number one goal is to leave this institution with their degree in hand.

In setting our high standards for the athletes that represent this program, the number one characteristic I look for in student-athletes is discipline. We want disciplined people in our program. It all starts with someone who can control her choices in a respectable way, both on and off the field. The ability to choose right from wrong should not be a battle. We expect to play for championships here at LSU and every student-athlete who competes for the Tiger softball

team will have to have that same discipline and expectations. Our staff is dedicated to LSU, our program and our players.

Concerning the softball side, we will incorporate the 'Tiger Attack' mind set for our games. I'd like to think that my teams are aggressive and hard-nosed, and that they will play the game hard until the final out. We must attack every inning as if the score were 0-0, always thinking 'it is never enough'. We will always be a fundamental team with high emphasis placed on this aspect of the game throughout the entire year. Playing the game with pride, emotion and respect for tradition and class should be a goal for every LSU team. This team will embody those qualities.

In 2002, Girouard picked up her 100th win at LSU in just 119 games, the fastest Tiger coach to 100 victories in school history. In addition, Girouard led LSU to its then highest regular-season ranking, No. 3 nationally.

After sweeping all three of the SEC Championship titles and advancing to the NCAA Regional finals, she earned her second-straight SEC Coach of the Year honor. She has been named coach of the year by three separate conferences: the Southeastern Conference in 2001 and 2002, the Sun Belt in 2000 and the Southland in 1984, 1985 and 1987.

A fourth-consecutive Louisiana Sport Writer's Association Louisiana Coach of the Year honor followed for Girouard, the 11th state honor of her career.

In her first season at LSU, Girouard was able to accomplish something no other coach had been able to do. She led the Tigers to their first appearance in the WCWS with a victory over her former school, UL-Lafayette, in the NCAA Regional Championship game.



In the WCWS, the Tigers fell to Stanford in the first round, but bounced back to knock off Iowa and defending national champion Oklahoma before losing out to UCLA and finishing in a tie for third place nationally, the highest final ranking for any LSU squad.

For their accomplishments, she, DeFeo and Osterberg were named the NFCA National Coaching Staff of the Year. She was also named the Coach of the Year by the SEC and the LSWA. To her credit, she was named the National Coach of the Year in 1990 and 1993.

In her two decades as the Lady Cajuns' head coach, she built the team from the ground floor with no scholarships and a \$3,000 budget to one of the nation's perennial powers. She advanced her UL-Lafayette teams to the NCAA Regionals a total of 10 times, hosting on seven of those occasions.

Girouard was born in Broussard, La., and attended Comeaux High School. She earned a Bachelor of Science degree from USL in 1976 in health and physical education. During her college days, she played on the Lady Cajun volleyball team and was named the school's Female Athlete of the Year in 1976.

Following college, Girouard served as head coach at Lafayette High School where she began the softball program in 1977. In 1980, she coached at her alma mater, Comeaux High School, before beginning the USL softball program in 1981.

Girouard served a three-year term as the South Region Representative on the NCAA All-America Committee and served two, two-year stints on the NCAA South Regional ranking committee. She is currently a member of a nine-person NCAA Softball Rules Committee until her term expires on Sept. 1, 2007.

With a list of accomplishments and awards that speak for themselves, Girouard has proven that she can take her teams to the next level and be successful. Her guidance and leadership have carried her through 25 outstanding seasons and hopefully she will continue to build upon her past successes and reach the ultimate goal of bringing LSU its first national championship in softball.

## James DeFeo

**Associate Head Coach  
Sixth Year**

James DeFeo enters his second season as the associate head coach at LSU after four years as an assistant coach. It is also his seventh season under head coach Yvette Girouard after one year with her at UL-Lafayette.

Prior to joining Girouard's staff, DeFeo was a graduate assistant at Southern Miss in 1999 when the Golden Eagles became the first, first-year program to advance to the Women's College World Series.

In 2004 season, he, Girouard and Lori Osterberg were named the National Fastpitch Coaches Association South Region Coaching Staff of the Year after leading the Tigers to their second WCWS appears. The trio was also named the NFCA National Coaching Staff of the Year in 2001 after they led LSU to its first WCWS berth.

DeFeo's main duties include working with the hitters and the outfielders as well as recruiting, scouting and practice management. His work with Lori Osterberg and the Tiger hitters has paid off as LSU ranked in the top 30 in the NCAA in batting average and scoring, while ranking fifth in doubles per game last season. Two years ago, the Tigers ranked in the top 10 in the NCAA in batting average, in the top 15 in slugging percentage and home runs per game and in the top 35 in triples per game.

In 2004, LSU broke the school record and led the Southeastern Conference in home runs, while LSU ranked second in the league in batting average, runs scored, hits, triples and RBIs. Individually, then-freshman All-American Leslie Klein ranked in the top 10 in the SEC in every hitting category and ranked in the top 50 in the NCAA in slugging percentage, runs per game and RBIs per game. The Tigers had at least two players ranked in the top 10 individually in the SEC in every hitting category, including five of the top 10 individuals ranked in total bases.

In 2002, former Tiger All-American Trena Peel led the nation in triples, while breaking the LSU and SEC single-season records. With 14 triples, she was just two shy of the NCAA record.

In his first season at LSU the Tigers were second in the SEC and 12th nationally with a .293 team batting average. LSU also led the league in scoring and finished ranked 16th nationally with more than five runs per game.

"James brings an incredible passion for studying hitters and molding players into knowledgeable offensive athletes," said Girouard. "I would describe him as passionate, dedicated, loyal and intelligent and he has an unwavering commitment to our student-athletes, our program and to his hitters."

At UL-Lafayette, DeFeo's team hit .310 and finished the season with a No. 22 national ranking and in the top 10 in hitting and scoring. His 1999 Southern Miss team finished the season ranked second nationally in batting and 10th in scoring. DeFeo was instrumental in helping to revive the Golden Eagle team after a six-year hiatus.

For 10 years, he has served as sole proprietor and instructor of the All-American Softball Clinics in New Jersey, New York, Florida, Pennsylvania and Mississippi. DeFeo has coaching experience at nearly every level of fastpitch softball, including Under-12, Under-16, 18 and Under and Women's Major. DeFeo also is a member of the National Fastpitch Coaches Association.

A native of New Jersey, DeFeo graduated from Rutgers University in 1996 with a bachelor's degree in sport management. He received his master's in sports administration from Southern Miss in 1999. His sister, Stephanie DeFeo, was a three-time All-American under Girouard at UL-Lafayette.

In 2000, DeFeo was married to the former Samantha Rock of Orlando, Fla. They have two daughters, Victoria, 3, and Zoe, 1, and are expecting their third child this summer.



## Lori Osterberg

**Assistant Coach  
Fourth Year**

An assistant for LSU during the 2001 season, Lori Osterberg rejoined the Tigers coaching staff in 2004 after two years as a teacher and softball coach at North Scott High School in Eldridge, Iowa, and now enters her fourth season at LSU.

One of head coach Yvette Girouard's former players, Osterberg brings collegiate playing experience to the Tiger coaching staff. At LSU, Osterberg works with the Tiger infield and hitters and serves as the recruiting co-coordinator.

In 2004, she, Girouard and James DeFeo were named the National Fastpitch Coaches Association South Region Coaching Staff of the Year after leading the Tigers to their second WCWS appears. The trio was also named the NFCA National Coaching Staff of the Year in 2001 after they led LSU to its first WCWS berth.

"We are absolutely ecstatic that Lori has rejoined our program," said Girouard. "She is the complete package in an assistant coach. She is a fantastic teacher and a great motivator."

Osterberg's main duties include working with the hitters and the infielders as well as recruiting and practice management. Her work with James DeFeo and the Tiger hitters has paid off as LSU ranked in the top 30 in the NCAA in batting average and scoring, while ranking fifth in doubles per game last season. Two years ago, the Tigers ranked in the top 10 in the NCAA in batting average, in the top 15 in slugging percentage and home runs per game and in the top 35 in triples per game.

In 2004, LSU broke the school record and led the Southeastern Conference in home runs, while LSU ranked second in the league in batting average, runs scored, hits, triples and RBIs. Individually, then-freshman All-American Leslie Klein ranked in the top 10 in the SEC in every hitting category and ranked in the top 50 in the NCAA in slugging percentage, runs per game and RBIs per game. The Tigers had at least two players ranked in the top 10 individually in the SEC in every hitting category, including five of the top 10 individuals ranked in total bases.

Her work with the LSU infield also paid off last season as defensively the Tigers committed the second fewest errors of any team in the SEC, while ranking fifth in team fielding percentage.

In her first season at North Scott High School, Osterberg guided the softball program to the Iowa state championship in 2002. She then led her team to the state championship game in 2003. For her efforts she was named the East Iowa Regional Coach of the Year both seasons.

In 1999, Osterberg served as a student assistant under Girouard at ULL and graduated with a degree in secondary level special education. She then returned home to Iowa where she coached basketball, volleyball and softball and taught special education at North Scott High School for one year in 2000.

Osterberg was the starting shortstop for UL-Lafayette from 1994-97 and was a member of two Women's College World Series teams. While playing for the Lady Cajuns, she earned All-South honors and was a three-time All-Louisiana selection. She finished her collegiate career with a .336 batting average, 12 home runs and 44 doubles.

"Lori was the epitome of the term 'student-athlete'," said Girouard. "She was a joy to coach every day and is a bigger pleasure to associate with as a person on a daily basis in her role as an assistant coach. She is an individual who makes everyone around her better because of the quality person she is."





## Will Jones

**Assistant Strength & Conditioning Coordinator**

Will Jones enters his fourth year as full-time member of the LSU strength and conditioning staff after being promoted to assistant coordinator in the summer of 2002.

Jones, who graduated with a master's of science degree within the department of kinesiology in May of 2002, served as a graduate assistant in the LSU weight room in 2000 and 2001.

Jones works with the LSU football program and is also responsible for developing and implementing strength and conditioning programs for the baseball and softball teams.

Jones holds certifications as a Certified Strength and Conditioning Specialist (CSCS) with the National Strength and Conditioning Association and is USA Track & Field certified at Level 1.

Jones graduated from Louisiana-Lafayette in May of 1999 with a bachelor's degree in exercise science. He was a defensive back on the Ragin' Cajun football team for four years.

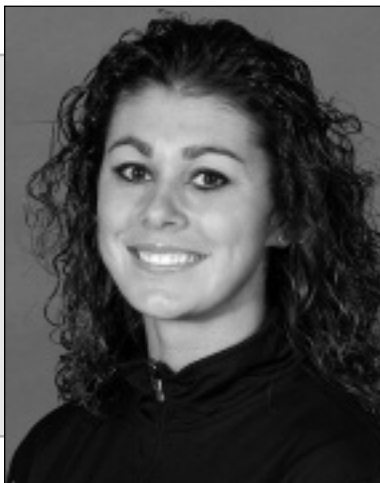

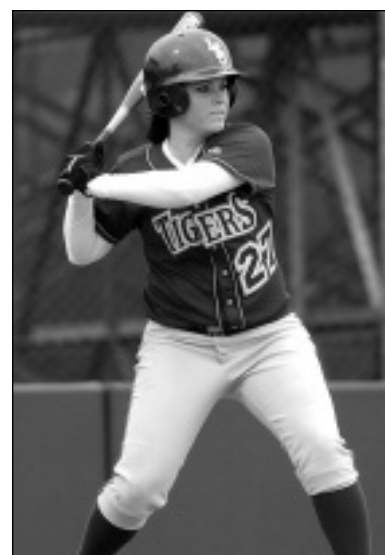

# Legendary

## GIROUARD EARNS 1,000TH CAREER WIN

With an 8-3 win over Arkansas on April 6, 2005, head coach Yvette Girouard became just the sixth coach in any division in NCAA history to record 1,000 career wins, and the fifth coach in NCAA Division I history to reach that milestone. The two-time National Coach of the Year and seven-time Regional Coach of the Year won 759 games in 20 years while at the helm at UL-Lafayette from 1981-2000, where she built the program from the ground up before departing for LSU in 2001. One of only three coaches in NCAA history to lead two programs to the Women's College World Series, she took the Tigers to the WCWS twice in her first four years at LSU.

## GIROUARD INDUCTED INTO NFCA HALL OF FAME

Head coach Yvette Girouard was inducted into the National Fastpitch Coaches Association Hall of Fame on Dec. 2, 2005, at the convention in Orlando, Fla. A three-time national coach of the year and seven-time regional coach of the year, she has posted 24-straight winning seasons and has been named Coach of the Year by three different conferences.

Girouard has coached 35 All-Americans, 14 Academic All-Americans and taken her teams to 14 NCAA Regionals. An 11-time Louisiana Coach of the Year, she was inducted into the Louisiana Softball Coaches Association Hall of Fame in the summer of 2002.

## FABULOUS FRESHMEN

With nine freshman on the roster and only eight returning players, the youngsters were called upon to step in and make an immediate impact for the Tigers, and they delivered. They accounted for 45 percent of LSU's RBIs and over 40 percent of the Tigers' runs scored in 2005.

Vanessa Soto ranked fifth on the team with a .306 batting average, while leading the team with 16 doubles, four away from the LSU single-season record, with a team-best 39 RBIs. Quinlan Duhon ranked sixth on the team with a .292 batting average, and led the team with eight home runs and

ranked second with 38 RBIs.

Andrea Smith was a solid addition to the infield, making some amazing plays, while committing only 12 errors in 191 chances, the second-best fielding percentage by a shortstop in the SEC. Killian Roessner has been a gun behind the plate, allowing only seven stolen bases on the year, while throwing out seven and picking off another. Dee Dee Henderson also added blazing speed, proved by her team-best 21 stolen bases, fourth-best in the SEC.

In the circle, Megan Jolly was 7-5 with a 2.32 ERA, while Tiffany Garcia was 7-2 with a 3.46 ERA. The pair combined for six shutouts and 116 strikeouts in 155.0 innings.

## DOUBLE TROUBLE

For just the second time in school history, four players recorded 10 or more doubles in a season. Vanessa Soto led the team with 16 doubles, followed by Lauren Castle with 14, and Stephanie Hill and Quinlan Duhon with 12 each. Soto was tied for ninth in single-season doubles in school history. As a team, the Tigers hit 88 doubles in 2005, which was the fifth most in school history and the fifth most in the NCAA per game.

## IT TAKES A THIEF

LSU stole 72 bases in 84 attempts in 2005 for an .857 percentage with 1.33 stolen bases per game. Seven Tigers stole at least four bases. Dee Dee Henderson and Camille Harris led the team with 21 stolen bases (in 25 and 23 attempts respectively), which ranked fourth in the SEC. Twelve LSU players stole at least one base, while Vanessa Soto and Heidi Robin were a perfect 4-for-4 on the year.

## PRIME TARGET

Camille Harris was hit by a pitch an LSU single-season record 14 times in 2005, which led the SEC. In total, she was hit in 11 games and, on three occasions, she was hit twice in a game. Her first hit by pitch did not occur until

the 18th game of the season, but she made up for lost time in the last 21 games, being hit 11 times. In addition, she moved into third place in career hit by pitches with 19. Ironically, Harris is the one player who least likes to get plunked after her left arm was broken by a pitch from Kristen Keyes at Auburn during her freshman year which forced her to miss the final 12 games of the season.

### MEMORABLE FIRST

Dee Dee Henderson's first career base hit, a pinch hit bunt single in the fourth inning, occurred on April 10 against Kentucky. April 10 also happens to be Henderson's birthday, so she gave herself a hit for her 18th birthday in Tiger Park.

### UNDER FOUR MEANS SUCCESS FOR THE TIGERS

Keeping opponents under four runs seemed to do the trick for the Tigers in 2005. LSU was 28-8 (.778) when holding opponents to fewer than four runs. Conversely, LSU was 3-15 (.167) when opponents scored four or more runs. Since the start of the 2004 season, the Tigers have lost only 12 times when allowing fewer than four runs. In the history of the softball program, LSU has posted a 440-58 (.884) record when allowing fewer than four runs.

### FIVE PROVED TO BE LSU'S MAGIC NUMBER

On the offensive side, the magic number for the Tigers seemed to be five. LSU was a 23-1 (.958) in 2005 when scoring five or more runs in a game. However, the Tigers were 8-22 (.267) when scoring fewer than five runs. The Tigers' only loss last season when scoring five or more runs was a 13-11 defeat at Mississippi State on March 30.

### TIGERS SCORE EARLY...

The LSU softball team made a habit of taking early leads on opponents in 2005. In 54 games, the Tigers outscored their opponents, 40-26 (+14), in the first inning. The second inning, however, was the one that was magical for LSU. The Tigers put up 56 runs in the second or 1.04 runs in the second inning per game. By the second inning, the Tigers held a commanding 96-51 (+45) scoring advantage.

In games when the Tigers took the lead first, LSU was almost unbeatable at 28-6 (.824). However, the Tigers were just 3-17 (.150) when opponents scored first. The last time LSU scored first in a game and lost was on April 9, 2005, when LSU fell to Kentucky, 5-1.

### ...AND TIGERS SCORE OFTEN

In 2005, the Tigers scored 273 runs in 54 games for a 5.06 runs per game average, fifth-best in the SEC, and were just behind the school record of 5.58 set in 2004 and ranked 29th in the NCAA. On 12 occasions LSU hit double figures in runs, including a season-best 18 runs in the third game of the Kentucky series.

### ...THERE'S NO PLACE LIKE TIGER PARK

The LSU bats seemed to love Tiger Park in 2005 as they performed much better in the friendly confines of home. With a 21-8 (.724) record, the team pounded away at a .312 clip and averaged 5.90 runs per game. LSU pitching, meanwhile, held opponents to a .179 average and 2.21 runs per game. With a 10-15 (.400) record on the road, LSU hit just .277 away from Tiger Park and averaged 4.08 runs per game. In turn, the pitching staff allowed opponents to score 3.96 runs per game with a 3.08 earned run average.

### HARRIS IN THE RECORD BOOKS

Camille Harris is making her mark in the LSU career record book. After three seasons she ranks in the top 10 in eight career offensive categories. She ranks third in hit by pitches with 19, fourth in stolen bases with 54, fourth in walks with 69, tied for fifth in home runs with 20, sixth in triples with eight, seventh in runs scored with 113 and is ninth in RBIs with 84 and total bases with 225.

### MOVIN' ON UP

A trio of Tigers also moved up the LSU career record books. Stephanie Hill is tied for fifth in home runs with 20 and is eighth in RBIs with 87. Lauren Delahoussaye is ninth in sacrifice flies with six and 12th in home runs with 12. Leslie Klein is tied for eighth in triples with six, ninth in doubles with 28 and 11th in home runs with 14.

### TURNER MAKING HER MARK

After two seasons, Emily Turner has already begun to make her mark on the LSU career record book. The pitcher currently ranks in the top six in wins, strikeouts and shutouts. With 35 career wins, she needs just one to move ahead of Brandi Landry into fifth place all-time. She also needs one shutout to move past Landry in career shutouts and is in sole possession of fourth in career strikeouts with 311.

In 2006, the LSU softball team will begin its 10th season of play at Tiger Park. Built in 1996, the facility opened just prior to the inaugural 1997 season.

The 1,000-seat facility, which has been the softball team's home since its inception, is one of the most recent facilities added to LSU's campus.

In just nine years, Tiger Park has hosted three NCAA Regional tournaments and become one of the toughest places in the nation for visitors to play.

LSU owns an astounding 244-38 (.865) record at home, including a 105-26 (.802) Southeastern Conference mark. In 2001, the Tigers advanced through the NCAA Regional tournament at Tiger Park to its first berth in the Women's College World Series.

Tiger Park has also been home to some amazing feats. On May 20, 2000, LSU and Southern Miss battled out 12 scoreless innings in NCAA Regional action before the Tigers plated the game-winner in the 13th.

This past season, an average of 672 fans watched as LSU won 21 regular-season home games, the second largest average home attendance in Tiger softball history. The SEC leader in attendance in 2003, LSU ranked ninth in the NCAA in 2004, marking its third national top 10 attendance ranking in the last four seasons.

# Dr. William L. Jenkins

## President, LSU

On April 1, 1999, Dr. William L. Jenkins, formerly Chancellor of Louisiana State University and Agricultural & Mechanical College, became president of the LSU System, which includes nine institutions on 10 campuses in five cities, as well as 10 public hospitals in 10 cities.

A native of South Africa, Dr. Jenkins studied at the University of Pretoria, where he received his professional veterinary medicine degree in 1958 and specialist credentials in 1968. He received his Ph.D. degree from the University of Missouri, Columbia, in 1970. After practicing veterinary medicine for four years, he joined the faculty at the University of Pretoria, advancing through the ranks to become professor and head of the Department of Veterinary Physiology, Pharmacology, & Toxicology in 1971.

He moved to the United States in 1978 and joined the faculty in the Department of Veterinary Physiology & Pharmacology at Texas A&M University. He was appointed dean of the LSU School of Veterinary Medicine in 1988, and was named LSU's provost and vice chancellor for academic affairs in September 1993.

When he was appointed LSU's fifth chancellor in November 1996, Dr. Jenkins reorganized the campus administration to be more effective and more responsive, and oversaw the development of a strategic plan to guide the University in its preparation for the challenges of the next century.

Over the years, Dr. Jenkins has received numerous teaching and service awards and recognitions, having been named the 1997 Communicator of the Year by the Public Relations Association of Louisiana and a Distinguished Alumnus by the University of Missouri in 1999. The regional chapter of Toastmasters International also presented him with its 1999 Communication and Leadership Award, and he was awarded the Vision of Excellence Award 2000 by the New Orleans Regional Chamber of Commerce and the New Orleans Chapter of MetroVision. In addition, the University of Pretoria awarded an honorary doctoral degree to Dr. Jenkins in September 2000.

Dr. Jenkins has been active in continuing education and has delivered more than 150 lectures and addresses to diverse groups in both the United States and abroad. He has taught extensively at both the professional and graduate levels. He has published more than 60 scientific articles and has contributed 15 chapters to various textbooks. He is co-author of a textbook on veterinary pharmacology.

Dr. Jenkins has been and continues to be a member of many professional organizations and select committees. Most recently he served on the National Institute of Health's Alcohol Abuse and Misuse on College Campuses Committee and on a special Steering Committee of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools to review accreditation criteria for colleges and universities. Dr. Jenkins also is a member of the National Association of State Universities and Land Grant Colleges' Committee on Food and Society and currently serves on the Governor's Advisory Commission on Coastal Restoration and Conservation.

His current community engagement includes serving on the boards of the Louisiana Endowment for the Humanities, Greater Baton Rouge Chamber of Commerce, Academic Distinction Fund, Council for a Better Louisiana, Arts Council of Greater Baton Rouge, The Nature Conservancy of Louisiana, and the Baton Rouge board of the National Conference for Community and Justice.

Dr. Jenkins and his wife, Peggy, have four children -Sharon, Gwynn, Anthea, and Warren- and nine grandchildren.

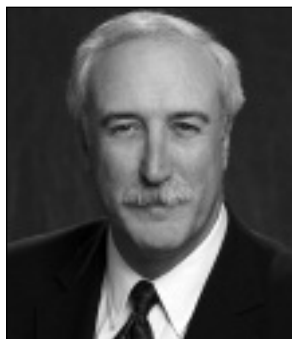

# Sean O'Keefe

Chancellor, LSU

The Honorable Sean O'Keefe assumed the office of Chancellor of Louisiana State University and A&M College on February 21, 2005. Prior to his appointment as LSU's seventh chancellor, O'Keefe established a distinguished career in higher education and United States government service.

Chancellor O'Keefe earned his Bachelor of Arts from Loyola University in New Orleans in 1977 and his Master of Public Administration from the Maxwell School of Syracuse University in 1978. He held an endowed chair at the Syracuse University Maxwell School of Citizenship and Public Affairs and served as the Director of National Security Studies, a partnership of Syracuse University and Johns Hopkins University for delivery of executive education programs. He was also Professor of Business Administration and Assistant to the Senior Vice President for Research and Dean of the Graduate School at the Pennsylvania State University.

He served on four separate occasions as a presidential appointee. Most recently, until February 2005, he served as the 10th Administrator of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration. O'Keefe joined President George W. Bush's Administration as Deputy Assistant to the President and as the Deputy Director of the Office of Management and Budget until December 2001.

Appointed Secretary of the Navy in July 1992 by President George Bush, O'Keefe served as Comptroller and Chief Financial Officer of the Department of Defense since 1989. Before joining then-Defense Secretary Dick Cheney's Pentagon management team in these capacities, he served on the United States Senate Committee on Appropriations staff for eight years and was Staff Director of the Defense Appropriations Subcommittee. His public service began in 1978 upon his selection as a Presidential Management Intern.

Chancellor Sean O'Keefe is a Fellow of the National Academy of Public Administration, a Fellow of the International Academy of Astronautics, and member of the Naval Postgraduate School Board of Advisors. During his academic postings, he was a Visiting Scholar at the Wolfson College of the University of Cambridge in the United Kingdom, a member of the Naval Postgraduate School's civil-military relations seminar team, and conducted seminars for the Strategic Studies Group at Oxford University. He served on the national security panel to devise the 1988 Republican platform and was a member of the 1985 Kennedy School of Government program for national security executives at Harvard University.

In 1993, President Bush and Secretary Cheney presented him the Distinguished Public Service Award. He was the 1999 faculty recipient of the Syracuse University Chancellor's Award for Public Service; recipient of the Department of the Navy's Public Service Award in December 2000; and has been awarded five honorary doctorate degrees from several prestigious educational institutions. In 2003 and 2004, he was recognized and honored by the Irish American Magazine as one of the Top 100 Irish Americans.

He is the author of several journal articles and contributing author of *Keeping the Edge: Managing Defense for the Future* released in October 2000. In 1998, he co-authored *The Defense Industry in the Post-Cold War Era: Corporate Strategies and Public Policy Perspectives*.

He is married to Laura McCarthy O'Keefe, and they have three children - Lindsey, Jonathan, and Kevin.



## Kenneth E. Carpenter, Faculty Athletics Representative

Kenneth E. Carpenter is in his second year as LSU's faculty representative in NCAA and Southeastern Conference matters.

Carpenter, a professor in the School of Architecture, has taught at LSU since 1986. He received his bachelor's degree in architecture from the University of Oklahoma in 1962 and his master's from the University of Minnesota in 1967. Before joining the LSU faculty, he served at Clemson University as associate professor of architecture from 1967-77; Ball State University, where he was professor and chairman of the

Department of Architecture, 1977-81; and, Iowa State University, serving as professor and chairman, Department of Architecture from 1981-86.

At LSU, he served as the dean of the College of Design from 1986-97; Interim Executive Director of International Programs from 1997-98; and Interim Dean of the College of Art and Design from 2001-02.

Carpenter is a member of Phi Kappa Phi, the American Institute of Architects, and the American Association of University Professors.

Bertman's unyielding desire to succeed drove him to the pinnacle of his profession, and his astute knowledge of the game -- obtained from over 40 years of coaching -- combined with his steadfast determination and irrepressible enthusiasm transformed LSU Baseball into the nation's premier program.

Already a Louisiana Legend and one of the greatest college baseball coaches of all time, J. Stanley "Skip" Bertman has made the seamless transition into the athletics director's chair with the same enthusiasm, vision and demand for excellence that were trademarks of his stellar coaching career.

In just five years as LSU's director of athletics, Bertman has already added to his impressive list of on-the-field achievements. Under his direction, LSU enjoyed arguably the greatest athletics years in the history of the institution. In 2003-04, three teams won national championships, nine teams finished in the nation's top ten, and 14 teams ranked in the top 25, and in 2004-05, 14 teams advanced to the postseason. LSU teams also enjoyed improved grade point averages across the board, making the LSU student-athlete experience a success on and off the fields of competition.

While supervising the Tigers' progress on the playing fields, he has begun to implement measures necessary to realize his vision of building the LSU athletics department into the best in the country. Bertman's bold and innovative plans promise to keep the Tigers among the nation's elite in all phases of collegiate athletics.

Bertman is now in the midst of upgrading LSU's athletics complex. Working hand in hand with the Tiger Athletic Foundation, Bertman has already overseen the completion of the Cox Communications Academic Center for Student-Athletes while renovating Tiger Stadium and the Pete Maravich Assembly Center, and constructing the Football Operations Center.

It was also Bertman who took the bold but essential move to implement a seat contribution program in Tiger Stadium to fund facility improvements and ensure the financial stability of the LSU Athletics Department for the next decade.

Bertman was named LSU's athletics director on Jan. 19, 2001. With Bertman, LSU gained an athletics director who provides the leadership and experience necessary to manage the Tigers' \$52 million budget.

Bertman guided LSU to five NCAA baseball titles, and his teams drew huge crowds to venerable Alex Box Stadium, as the Tigers led the nation in attendance in each of his final six seasons (1996-2001).

He also served as head coach of the 1996 U.S. Olympic team that captured the bronze medal in Atlanta.

Bertman continues to be honored for his remarkable coaching tenure, as he was inducted in June, 2002, into the Louisiana Sports Hall of Fame. He was inducted into the American Baseball Coaches Association Hall of Fame in January, 2003.

In a Baseball America poll published in 1999, Bertman was voted the second greatest college baseball coach of the 20th century, trailing only the late Rod Dedeaux of Southern California. Bertman and Dedeaux are the only coaches to win five CWS titles.

He had previously earned recognition as one of the nation's brightest assistant coaches while at the University of Miami (Fla.) for eight seasons (1976-83). Before working at Miami, Bertman was renowned for his coaching excellence. In 11 seasons at Miami Beach High School, he directed the Hi-Tides to a state championship and two runners-up finishes and he was named Florida's Coach of the Year on three occasions.

In 1975, Bertman coached at Miami-Dade Downtown, leaving after one season to join legendary head coach Ron Fraser at Miami. The move was a homecoming of sorts, as Bertman spent his collegiate playing days with the Hurricanes as an outfielder and catcher from 1958-60. He earned his B.A. in health and physical education from Miami in 1961 and received his master's degree from UM in 1964.

Bertman and his wife Sandy are the parents of four daughters - Jan, Jodi, Lisa and Lori. The Bertmans have three grandchildren - Sophie Faith and Isaac Stanley, the children of Emile and Lori Bertman Guirard, and Samuel Aaron, the son of Drew and Lisa Pate.



## Dan Radakovich

### Senior Associate Athletics Director

Dan Radakovich enters his fifth year as LSU's Senior Associate Athletics Director after joining the university in May of 2001. He came to LSU after serving as director of athletics at American University in Washington D.C.

As LSU's Senior Associate Athletics Director, Radakovich oversees the daily operations of the LSU Athletics Department and he serves as Skip Bertman's chief assistant.

Prior to his one-year stint at American University, Radakovich spent six years as the Associate Athletics Director at South Carolina. He worked closely with South Carolina Athletics Director Mike McGee in laying the groundwork for a new \$70 million arena built in Columbia. During his tenure with South Carolina, Radakovich supervised the finances and logistics for \$33 million in facility improvements.

Radakovich served as the Senior Associate Athletics Director at Long Beach State from 1989-94. Radakovich began his collegiate athletics career as the athletics business manager at the University of Miami in Coral Gables, Fla., from 1983-85. He worked in the private sector for four years before joining Long Beach State.

A native of Aliquippa, Pa., Radakovich graduated from Indiana University of Pennsylvania in 1980 with a bachelor of science degree in finance. Radakovich was also a football letterwinner as well as a student coach at IUP. He then went on to earn his master's degree in business administration from the University of Miami in 1982.

Radakovich is married to the former Marcie McDonald and the couple has two children, Christian (15) and Grant (11).



## Judy Southard

### Associate Athletics Director/Senior Women's Administrator

Judy Southard, who had a very successful career as both a head women's basketball coach and Director of Athletics, enters her fifth year as LSU's Senior Women's Administrator after joining the department in the summer of 2001.

Southard came to LSU from Texas Woman's University, where she served as the school's Director of Athletics for nine years.

As LSU's Senior Women's Administrator, Southard oversees the highly successful Tiger women's athletics program.

Southard has served on numerous national committees during her career in athletic administration. She is currently a member of the NCAA Division I Women's Basketball Committee and was named in the summer of 2004 to the SEC Executive Committee.

While at Texas Woman's University, Southard initiated a corporate partnership program for the athletic department that tripled the involvement of area businesses and corporations in Pioneer athletics.

Prior to her stint at TWU, Southard served as head women's basketball coach at Marshall University in Huntington, W. Va., for 11 years, where she led the Lady Herd to five Southern Conference titles. At Marshall, Southard was named Southern Conference Coach of the Year three times and her career record of 178-130 still stands as a school record for women's basketball victories. Southard also served as Assistant Athletics Director at Marshall from 1983-88, including a four-month period when she was interim director.

Before going to Marshall, Southard spent three years as head coach at Tennessee-Martin and she also served for one season as an assistant coach at Tennessee. As a high school teacher from 1970-77, Southard coached both basketball and tennis, leading her West Florence High School basketball team to the South Carolina 4A state title in 1976.

A native of Columbia, S.C., Southard earned a bachelor's degree in physical education and health from Coker College in 1970 followed by a master's degree in physical education from Tennessee in 1978.



## Vergé Ausberry

### Associate Athletics Director/Operations

A former LSU football standout Vergé Ausberry joined the LSU Athletics Department administrative staff in August 2001.

Ausberry supervises marketing and promotions, game management, strength and conditioning, the Dr. Martin Broussard training room, the Jeff Boss Equipment Room and video operations for various sports.

Ausberry, from New Iberia, La., played inside linebacker for the Tigers, lettering in 1986-89. He was the leading tackler on the team in both 1988 and 1989 and was part of two Southeastern Conference championship teams (1986 under Bill Arnsparger and 1988 under Mike Archer), playing on teams that went to three bowl games.

Although this is Ausberry's first tour of duty with the administration of the Athletic Department, he has remained very close to the LSU athletic scene in the 1990s, first serving for almost seven years as a member of LSU's highly regarded Academic Center for Athletes where he worked with many of the student-athletes, primarily dealing with LSU's football squad.

After leaving the Academic Center, he moved in July 1999 to the Tiger Athletic Foundation staff as part of LSU's fund-raising arm prior to accepting his present position.

Ausberry received his bachelor of science degree in education in May of 1990 and his master of education in administration, supervision and certification in child welfare in May of 1992. He is presently a doctoral candidate in higher education administration at LSU. He is married to the former Cheri Morial of New Orleans and they have two boys, Austin and Jaiden.



## Bo Bahnsen

### Associate Athletics Director/Internal Relations

Bo Bahnsen serves as LSU's Associate Athletics Director for Internal Relations, overseeing the ticket office and all customer service operations.

Prior to moving into his current position in December of 2003, Bahnsen's primary responsibility for the previous 14 years was to serve as LSU's NCAA compliance officer.

A 1982 graduate of LSU, Bahnsen served as administrative assistant for the men's basketball team for five years before moving into athletics administration as director of purchasing for two years. In 1989, he was assigned his primary respon-

sibility as NCAA compliance officer as assistant athletics director, then was promoted to associate AD in 1996.

Bahnsen has been responsible for overseeing the successful implementation of LSU's Tradition Fund Program, a football-seating plan that requires contributions for the right to purchase approximately 45,000 seats in Tiger Stadium.

Bahnsen, 46, served as manager of the LSU basketball team as an undergraduate and became administrative assistant for the team upon graduation in May of 1982. In July 1987 he became administrative assistant to Athletics Director Joe Dean, overseeing the purchasing office until his promotion in 1989.

A native of El Campo, Texas, attended Wharton County Junior College for two years before transferring to LSU in 1979. He earned his bachelor of science in physical education and is currently working on his masters in education administration.

Bahnsen is married to the former Karen Mayson, former LSU golfer and current head coach of the Lady Tigers golf program. The couple has two children, Darren (15) and Devin (13).



## Mark Ewing

### Associate Athletics Director/Business

Mark Ewing, a 21-year employee of Louisiana State University, joined the LSU Athletics Department in January 2001, and serves as the department's Associate Athletics Director for Business.

Ewing came to the athletics department from LSU's Office of Budget and Planning. He served as LSU's Budget Director overseeing the development and management of the university's \$360 million operating budget.

Prior to his service at LSU, he was employed by Cajun Electric Power Cooperative where he managed accounting for the company's \$2 billion plus construction division.

Nearly 50 percent of the student-athletes - 48.5 percent to be exact - recorded a grade point average of 3.0 or higher. A total of 79 had a GPA of 3.5 or higher and 22 Tigers had a perfect 4.0 GPA in the spring semester.

The women's basketball team won the Southeastern Conference championship and two teams - men's basketball and baseball - finished first in the SEC Western Division.

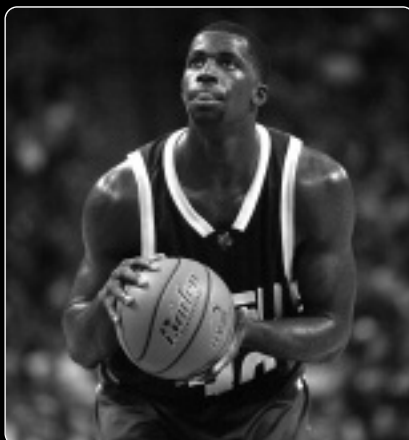
## Elite Teams

## Setting the Standard for Intercollegiate Athletics in Softball

In only its ninth year of existence, Southeastern Conference softball has become one of the premier softball conferences in the nation.

The SEC qualified six teams for the 2005 NCAA Tournament - Alabama, Auburn, Florida, Georgia, Mississippi State and Tennessee. Alabama and Tennessee advanced to represent the league in the Women's College World Series. It was Alabama's third WCWS appearances, making them one of two SEC teams with multiple WCWS appearances since softball became a conference sport in 1997. The Lady Vols made their first appearances, finishing third in the nation.

The Georgia Bulldogs claimed the regular season championship and the Eastern Division title, while Alabama claimed the Western Division crown. Alabama won the SEC Tournament, outlasting the Bulldogs to capture its second SEC Tournament Championship.

Leading all conferences in the nation, the SEC qualified a league-best eight teams for the 2004 NCAA Tournament - Alabama, Auburn, Florida, Georgia, LSU, Mississippi State, South Carolina and Tennessee. LSU was the lone SEC school to receive a No. 1 seed, while Georgia hosted its first regional tournament. With its second Women's College World Series appearance, LSU joined Alabama as the only SEC schools to represent the conference in the WCWS twice.

The SEC qualified six teams for the 2003 NCAA Tournament - Alabama, Florida, Georgia, LSU, Mississippi State and South Carolina. Alabama was the lone SEC team to receive a No. 1 seed, and the Crimson Tide, along with Florida, hosted regional tournaments. It was the second time that two SEC schools have hosted regionals. The six teams from the SEC to qualify was second only to the Pac-10 for the most teams from one conference to make the 2003 NCAA Tournament.

The SEC qualified seven teams for the 2002 NCAA Tournament - Alabama, Auburn, Arkansas, Georgia, LSU, Mississippi State and South Carolina. LSU was the lone SEC team to receive a No. 1 seed, while South Carolina hosted a regional for the second time since 1997. The seven teams from the SEC to qualify tied the Pac-10 for the most teams from one conference to make the 2002 NCAA Tournament.

In 2001 the SEC qualified four teams for the NCAA Tournament. LSU, Alabama, South Carolina and Florida all made yet another appearance in the tourney, while Mississippi State barely missed the field. LSU and Alabama both secured No. 1 seeds and hosted a regional championship, marking the first time the SEC had two schools achieve such an honor.

Trailing only the Pac-10, the SEC qualified six teams for the 2000 NCAA Tournament, as LSU, Arkansas, Mississippi State, Alabama, Florida and SEC Tournament Champion South Carolina all made the field of 48.

The 1999 season was the first in which the conference was eligible for an automatic berth to the NCAA Tournament. That year, four teams earned bids to postseason, the second most by any conference.

The sport came under the auspices of the SEC in the 1997 season. Since then, nine

different teams have made appearances in the NCAA Tournament, including seven WCWS berths - three by Alabama in 2000, 2003 and 2005, two by LSU in 2001 and 2004, one by Tennessee in 2005 and one by South Carolina in 1997.

Two different teams have won both the SEC regular season and tournament titles in the same season. South Carolina has won both once (1997) and LSU has won both four times (1999, 2001, 2002 and 2004).

Seven teams (Alabama, Auburn, Florida, Georgia, LSU, Mississippi State, South Carolina and Tennessee) have made Top 25 appearances and five teams (Alabama, Georgia, LSU, South Carolina and Tennessee) have climbed into the Top 10 of the NFCA/USA Today Poll. At least one SEC team has been ranked in the poll each week since the inception of SEC Softball. In 2005 alone, SEC teams made 65 appearances in the poll.

South Carolina is the dean of SEC Softball, with a rich history dating back 30 seasons. The Gamecocks have made 13 NCAA Regional and three WCWS appearances.

Mississippi State played softball for five seasons during the 1980's before resuming the sport when it was added to the SEC. Tennessee added softball in 1996, one year before Alabama, Arkansas, Auburn, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, LSU and Ole Miss began softball programs to give the league 11 representatives (Vanderbilt does not sponsor softball).

### LSU SOFTBALL ON THE RADIO

The LSU Sports Radio Network gives LSU softball one of the most comprehensive audiences in all of collegiate softball. As Tiger softball begins its 10th season of extensive radio coverage, the LSU Sports Radio Network will broadcast 27 of 30 SEC games beginning with the March 11 doubleheader against Ole Miss. In addition, the network will broadcast non-conference games against Northwestern State (DH), Centenary and McNeese State.

The LSU Sports Radio Network will bring Tiger softball to its many fans with broadcasts in the Baton Rouge area on 107.3 FM. This marks the seventh year LSU softball has been on the station. Its 6,000-watt signal allows fans throughout southeast Louisiana to hear the excitement of LSU softball.

Patrick Wright, the voice of the Tigers for the last nine years, will provide all of the play-by-play action. Wright is also the voice of the LSU women's basketball team and assists the "Voice of the Tigers", Jim Hawthorne, with LSU baseball broadcasts and serves as a statistician for broadcasts of LSU football games. For the 10th season, LSU Senior Associate Sports Information Director Kent Lowe will serve as the color analyst for Tiger softball home games.
