

# TIGER SOFTBALL BY THE NUMBERS

## 1 WOMEN'S COLLEGE WORLD SERIES MOST OUTSTANDING PLAYER

Kristin Schmidt earned Women's College World Series Most Outstanding Player honors at the 2004 WCWS, making her the only player to not win the national championship and earn the honor.

## 2 WOMEN'S COLLEGE WORLD SERIES APPEARANCES

LSU is one of only three schools in SEC history with multiple Women's College World Series appearances and a winning record in WCWS play.

## 2 ACADEMIC ALL-AMERICANS

The Tigers have had two CoSIDA Academic All-Americans in the nine-year history of the program, while no program in the SEC has had more than three.

## 4 SEC TOURNAMENT TITLES

LSU has won an unprecedented four SEC Tournament titles and advanced to the championship game in six of the past seven seasons.

## 5 SEC CHAMPIONSHIPS

LSU claimed an unprecedented four consecutive league titles from 1999-2002. No other school in SEC history has claimed more than two overall titles.

## 5 SEC TOURNAMENT MVP'S

Five of the 10 SEC Tournament Most Valuable Player honors have been won by the Tigers, including an unprecedented five straight from 1999-2004.

## 7 SEC WESTERN DIVISION TITLES

LSU has won more Division titles than any school in the SEC, failing to win just three times in the program's history.

## 8 NCAA REGIONAL APPEARANCES

LSU made seven-straight NCAA Tournament appearances from 1998-2004, tying the Tigers for the most consecutive NCAA Tournament appearances in SEC history.

## 8 50-WIN SEASONS

LSU is one of only two programs in the nation to have posted eight 50-win seasons over the past nine years.

## 9 NFCA ALL-TIME RANKING

LSU ranks No. 9 in the NFCA All-Time poll, the highest ranking of any team in the SEC. In addition, the Tigers are the youngest team ranked in the top 10.

## 10 ALL-AMERICANS

The Tigers have 10 NFCA All-Americans in the 10-year history of the program, the most of any school in SEC history.

## 53 WINS PER SEASON

LSU is averaging more than 53 wins a season over the past nine years, the second best average in the nation.

## 54 WEEKS RANKED IN THE ESPN/USA SOFTBALL POLL

The Tigers have been in the ESPN/USA Softball poll for 54 of the 63 weeks since its inception in 2003, while spending 24 weeks ranked in the Top 10.

## 119 WEEKS RANKED IN THE NFCA/USA TODAY POLL

LSU has been ranked in the NFCA/USA Today Coaches poll for 119 of the 140 weeks since the Tigers began play in 1997, including a span of 103 consecutive weeks between Feb. 20, 1998, and March 30, 2005. The Tigers have also been ranked in the Top 10 for 73 weeks.

## .789 WINNING PERCENTAGE

LSU has the fifth-best winning percentage in the nation over the last 10 seasons.

## .765 WINNING PERCENTAGE IN SEC GAMES

LSU has posted the best winning percentage of any school in the conference in league play.

## .732 WINNING PERCENTAGE IN THE SEC TOURNAMENT

LSU has the best winning percentage in SEC Tournament history by more than 20 percentage points.

## .636 WINNING PERCENTAGE IN THE NCAA TOURNAMENT

The Tigers have the fifth-best winning percentage in NCAA Tournament play.

## THE ALL NEW TIGER PARK



The New Tiger Park will feature 1,289 seats, including 587 chair-back seats, and the capability of accommodating 1,200 more fans on an outfield berm.

The softball stadium will also feature first-class team facilities, including a locker room, team lounge, meeting facility, training facility, equipment room, indoor batting cages and umpire locker rooms.

All seats in the New Tiger Park will be angled toward the playing field, and the facility will include an open concourse with concessions areas and video monitors.

Press facilities and private suites will be included in the new stadium, plus enhanced lighting for night and televised games. The stadium will also be designed to allow for future expansion.

The berm/earthwork package was completed last year and has been settling in preparation for construction.

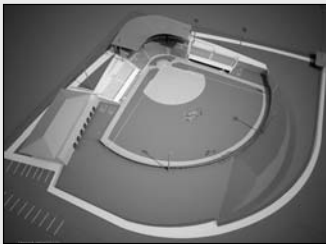
## LSU TIGER SOFTBALL IS ABOUT TO ENTER A NEW ERA!

## UNFINISHED BUSINESS

Falling one game shy of the Women's College World Series at Arizona last year has made the 2007 LSU softball team return with a renewed dedication to completing their goals and earning the Tigers' third WCWS berth in seven seasons.

"Unfinished business' is the mantra this club has adopted and embraced heading into the 2007 campaign," said head coach Yvette Girouard. "Coming within one game of returning to the College World Series on the home field of eventual National Champion Arizona in Super Regionals showed the returnees on this team the reality that they are indeed close to the dream."

Having lost four senior starters from the 2006 team, this year's squad went into the fall knowing that many positions were up for grabs and that every player would have to compete for a starting role, which showed the true spirit of the team.

"We had an extremely competitive team in fall drills, in the challenges we presented to them both as a whole and as individuals," said Girouard. "That has shown that this team has great passion and heart."

That heart and passion has led to an eagerness to get better everyday because they know they control their own destiny. The Tigers practice with an aggressiveness that shows they want to be champions and are willing to put in the work.

"Dirty uniforms everyday in practice embodies a unit that will have no excuses or regrets when they leave the field," said Girouard. "They celebrate the effort and know the desired outcome will eventually follow."

"Changes defensively to personnel will allow this team to be as sound as any LSU softball team has been. Defense is about an attacking attitude and this team portrays that in their everyday demeanor on the field."

### PITCHERS

After a phenomenal 2006 campaign in the circle that saw Emily Turner (Chula Vista, Calif.) garner both All-SEC and All-America honors, LSU returns three outstanding hurlers while adding a heralded freshman to round out the staff.

Turner posted a 28-9 record as the Tigers' ace a year ago with a 0.93 earned run average and 260 strikeouts. The senior recorded 13 wins over nationally ranked opponents, including LSU's first win over a top-ranked

team when she knocked off No. 1 Arizona in the NCAA Super Regionals.

"Emily Turner returns after an All-American year," said Girouard. "I fully expected Emily's breakout to be in her junior year and she did not disappoint. After turning in her best fall campaign, she is ready to become one of the premier pitchers in the country."

"Her confidence, awareness of competition, reality of what is going on around her and her maturation level are exactly where a senior needs to be. She is ready to be a true leader on the field."

The 2005 Gatorade National High School Player of the Year, Dani Hofer (Safety Harbor, Fla.) did not disappoint in her first season as a Tiger. The sophomore posted 16-5 mark with 160 strikeouts and a no-hitter in her first collegiate outing.

"Dani is a true competitor who is not afraid of challenges and realizes the extra work she needed during the summer," said Girouard. "She spent her summer playing and capturing the magic she possessed at the beginning of last year. 'Been there, done that' will truly be beneficial to Dani in relation to encountering any setbacks. She looked sharper and crisper in the fall and is maturing rapidly inside and outside of the circle."

A breakout star as a relief pitcher before getting injured last season, Tiffany Garcia (LaPorte, Texas) went undefeated a year ago with a perfect 5-0 record and a 0.44 earned run average. The junior also recorded just the third perfect game in school history as part of back-to-back no-hitters.

"Tiffany should see more action this spring as she has a dramatically different look than Emily and Dani," said Girouard. "Realizing the skills she needs to master, she is ready to step into her own role on this team."

A high school All-American out of Little Cypress-Mauriceville High School, Cody Trahan (Orange, Texas) joins the Tigers with an outstanding resume both as a pitcher and a hitter, both of which will be utilized by the team this season. In the circle, the freshman posted a 27-2 record as a senior while being named the Texas 4A Player of the Year and state championship MVP.

"Cody worked really hard during the fall to grasp the Tiger expectations of pitchers," said Girouard. "Good spin and movement are characteristics of Cody's talent. She will also be utilized in the hitting lineup."

### CATCHERS

The Tigers return two veteran catchers in Killian Roessner (Manasquan, N.J.) and Kristen Hobbs (Royal Palm Beach, Fla.). Hobbs saw the most work behind the plate in 2005, but surgery limited her playing time in 2006, allowing Roessner to step into the starting role.

"LSU will have much experience returning at the catcher's position with Kristen and Killian anchoring the defense for the second year in a row," said LSU associate head coach James DeFeo. "Both Hobbs and Roessner have been voted to captain roles and look to provide solid leadership and direction from behind the plate as well as in the batter's box."

Taking over behind the plate last season, Roessner made an immediate impact on the team. The junior began calling her own games, while recording the third most putouts in the Southeastern Conference. In addition, she recorded the third highest number of runners caught stealing compared to stolen base attempts in the league, gunning down 16 runners in 43 attempts.

"Roessner returns for her junior year as one of the more vocal leaders for this Tiger squad," said DeFeo. "We are looking for Killian to build upon last year's game experience and be one of the cornerstones for this veteran-laden roster. Roessner plays the game all out, and provides the passion and fire that it takes to lead a team to their highest level."

Hobbs was sidelined most of last season while she recovered from offseason ulnar collateral ligament reconstruction, commonly known as Tommy John surgery, which limited her to only seven game appearances and five at-bats.

"Being sidelined for most of the 2006 season, we look for Kristen to come back with a vengeance for her senior year," said DeFeo. "Kristen worked incredibly hard all fall on her game and looks to be back to playing form this spring. She is a veteran player that brings knowledge and heart to the team."

### INFIELD

Despite having to replace a pair of departed senior starters in the infield, the Tigers have a wealth of experience and talent to choose from that should make the transition much easier.

"Our infield has a different look this year, but still has a tremendous amount of experience," said first-year assistant coach Megan Smith. "They are playing as a cohesive unit and although there have been some changes this year, they look like they have been playing together for a long time."

The group typifies what it means to be a Tiger with their play on the field. They are passionate and are always ready to get the job done, no matter what it takes.

"Every infielder brings an intense and aggressive attitude to the field and it shows in their play," said Smith. "There is never a day of practice that ends without them being covered in dirt. They committed themselves to working harder than they ever have during the fall and it has paid off already."

LSU returns only one starter to the same position from a year ago as shortstop Andrea Smith (Moreno Valley, Calif.) patrols up the middle for the Tigers. The junior standout has routinely made the highlight reel in her first two seasons with a rifle for an arm and an incredible range.

"Andrea has really stepped up her game this fall," said Smith. "After much practice and dedication she has a renewed sense of dominance as our shortstop. She has a knack for making the unbelievable plays look routine."

After earning first-team NFCA All-South Region honors a year ago, two-year starter at second base Vanessa Soto (San Diego, Calif.) makes the transition to first base to replace the departed Stephanie Hill. The steady Soto led the SEC in fielding by a second baseman last season and has recorded only 12 errors in her two years as a Tiger.

"Vanessa will move from second base to first base this season," said Smith. "She is a naturally smooth and effortless defensive player, so the transition has been easy for her. She worked hard in the fall adjusting her game at first base so she is prepared for the season."

In Soto's stead at second will be junior Shannon Stein (Upland, Calif.), who saw time at several positions a year ago after transferring to LSU from Texas A&M-Corpus Christi. As a freshman, she helped guide the Islanders to one of their best seasons in school history.

"Shannon is the sparkplug of our infield," said Smith. "She has stepped into a larger role at second base and has owned it. Her quickness and solid fundamentals will be a huge asset to our infield. Shannon also has become the vocal leader of our infield and she has really helped to improve our communication."

Replacing departed senior Lauren Delahoussaye at third will be junior transfer Tayl'r Hollis. The St. Amant, La., native, joined the Tiger program last spring from Oklahoma, where she started at shortstop and second base for the nationally ranked Sooners as a freshman.

"Tayl'r brings a lot of swagger to our infield," said Smith. "Her fearless attitude makes her a force at third base. She is a fierce competitor who would sacrifice anything to get the out. I look for big things from her."

An all-around athlete, Erika Sluss (Vista, Calif.) has been an outstanding utility payer in her first two seasons. The junior will be called upon once again to help LSU at several key positions.

"Erika will serve many roles for our team this season," said Smith. "She is such a versatile athlete and has worked at both first and second during the fall. Erika is a solid player who simply gets the job done."

An NFCA High School All-American at St. Amant High School, Lindsey Hope (St. Amant, La.) helped the Lady Gators to back-to-back Louisiana state championships. She used the fall to advance her position at third base.

"Lindsey worked in the fall to improve her defensive skills at third base," said Smith. "She has developed better fundamentals and has really improved her game."

## OUTFIELD

The 2007 Tiger outfield returns two of its three starters, including two-time All-American Leslie Klein (Sunrise, Fla.) and two-year starter Quinlan Duhon (Youngsville, La.). LSU will add freshman speedster Jazz Jackson (Houston, Texas) to left field, replacing the departed Camille Harris. When needed, the Tigers can call upon Dee Dee Henderson (Atlanta, Texas) and Rachel Mitchell (LaPorte, Texas) without losing a step.

"The 2007 outfield will once again be anchored in center by All-American Leslie Klein," said DeFeo. "Right field will be patrolled by Quinlan and Jazz Jackson will solidify the defense in left field. Junior speedster Dee Dee Henderson and the hard-hitting freshman Rachael Mitchell make this year's Tiger outfield one of the most talented units in the SEC, if not the country."

Klein earned All-America honors as a freshman in 2004 and again as a junior last season after being slowed as a sophomore during recovery from a second ACL tear in her knee. The senior ranked in the top 10 in the SEC in nine offensive categories a year ago, including batting average, runs scored, RBIs and home runs. In addition, she did not commit an error in the field.

"Throughout her career, Leslie has established herself as one of the most powerful forces on the softball field that the SEC has ever seen," said DeFeo. "With her potent bat and flawless defense, she can beat you in several different ways."

After starting 51 of LSU's 67 games in right last season, Duhon returns for her third season patrolling the Tiger outfield. The junior scored the walk-off game-winning run in the NCAA Regional Championship game last year against UL-Lafayette and posted 10 multiple-hit games on the season.

"Quinlan brings intensity and desire to the playing field that is rivaled by few," said DeFeo. "She has developed her defensive skills to become one of our most dependable defenders. At the plate she can beat you with power, but she is also one of our best situational hitters in the lineup."

The Most Valuable Player of the Texas All-Star Game and a two-time district MVP, Jackson will take in left field. Her quickness will be an effective tool for LSU both at the plate and in the field, continuing the long line of Tiger speedsters in the outfield.

"Jazz will add even more speed to the 2007 Tiger outfield," said DeFeo. "This crafty lefty from Houston can cover a lot of ground in a short amount of time and can make all of the plays defensively. Her arm strength and accuracy has improved greatly since the fall and will be a welcomed asset to the Tiger defense."

One of the most feared base stealers in the SEC for the past two years, Henderson has stepped up her play in the field. Mitchell comes in as a two-time Texas all-state selection that has a tremendous bat. The pair will add great depth to the Tiger outfield.

"Dee Dee's defensive skills have improved greatly and she will be feared for more than her offensive speed in the near future," said DeFeo. "Rachel has been developing all aspects of her game, both on offense and defense, and will prove to be one of LSU's most versatile outfielders in this talent-rich group."

## AT THE PLATE

Despite losing four bats from last season's offense that ranked third in the SEC, LSU returns its top two hitters from a year ago and 60 percent of its RBIs. The majority of the Tiger lineup now has two or more years under its belt and with the added familiarity, LSU is poised to be a dangerous team at the plate.

"LSU returns a wealth of experience to the plate this year as the 2007 Tigers look to build upon their past success and once again be a dominant force in the conference as well as at a national level," said DeFeo.

The Tigers leading hitter in two of her three seasons, Klein will once again be called upon to lead LSU at the plate. The senior already ranks in the top 10 in 10 separate offensive categories in Tiger softball history.

"Leading the Tiger attack offense will be Leslie Klein," said DeFeo. "She has proven to be one of the most dominant offensive forces in LSU history."

The six juniors in the starting lineup will be called upon to step up offensively again this season. Soto ranked second on the team in hitting a year ago, while Duhon, Roessner and Smith provided solid bats in the rotation. New to the lineup this season will be Hollis and Stein, who should both be welcome additions. Sluss

should provide LSU with a solid bat off the bench when called upon.

"The supporting cast of standout juniors will bring this year's squad to another level," said DeFeo. "The spark of having Shannon in the lineup as an everyday player will energize the top of our order while the smooth swinging lefty Vanessa Soto will provide power and consistency."

"Andrea and newcomer Tayl'r Hollis will be counted on to produce clutch hits in prime time situations. Erika is coming off her best semester of fall practice and has emerged as one of the Tigers' biggest bats."

LSU has also added a powerful punch with the addition of a trio of freshmen. Conversely, the addition of Jackson, to go along with Henderson, gives the Tigers the added benefit of having speed on the base paths.

"With the addition of freshmen Cody Trahan, Rachel Mitchell, and Lindsay Hope, the Tigers will get a big boost of power from both sides of the plate," said DeFeo. "Balancing out the Tiger attack offense are speed merchants Dee Dee Henderson and Jazz Jackson."

"This year's offensive unit will have the best of all worlds! Speed, power and consistency, and looks to be one of the most balanced offenses LSU has fielded in years."

## SCHEDULE

Never shying away from tough competition, the Tigers will once again face a challenging schedule in 2007. With 21 games against teams that participated in NCAA Regional play last season, LSU will be put to the test as the Tigers pursue a third Women's College World Series berth.

LSU opens the season at home in the three-day Easton Tiger Classic. At the Crowne Plaza Classic, the Tigers will take on Houston, Indiana, Missouri State, Southern Illinois and Texas State. LSU will once again host the Easton Tiger Classic at Tiger Park. The final pre-conference tournament of the year is at the Washington.

"The pre-conference schedule is an attractive, RPI-boosting, representation of the countries conferences," said Girouard. "We have some new names gracing Tiger Park and we travel to a very good Houston tournament with an exciting trip to Seattle. This schedule should prepare us for the rigors of the highly competitive SEC."

In addition, the Tigers will host non-conference games against Alcorn State, Texas-San Antonio and in-state rivals Centenary, McNeese State, Southeastern Louisiana and UL-Monroe.

The biggest change to the schedule this year takes place during the SEC regular season. The league has shortened the schedule from 30 games to 28. The two mid-week series have now been shortened to double-headers. In 2007, the Tigers will have these doubleheader series against Mississippi State and Kentucky.

"The change in the SEC this year is that the mid-week partner is a doubleheader, cutting SEC games down to 28," said Girouard. "The coaches all believe that this will help our RPI, free up some out of conference scheduling and prevent the sister schools from constantly beating up on each other."

In SEC action, the Tigers open league play on the road at Ole Miss. LSU will also take on Auburn, Mississippi State, Arkansas and Georgia on the road. At home, LSU will host Florida, Kentucky, South Carolina and 2006 Women's College World Series participants Alabama and Tennessee.

"Our home SEC schedule spotlights some great programs in Florida, Alabama, Kentucky, South Carolina and preseason favorite Tennessee," said Girouard.

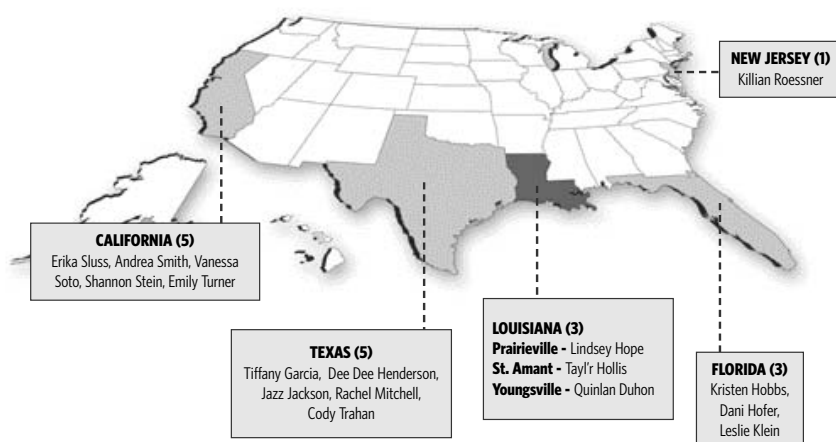

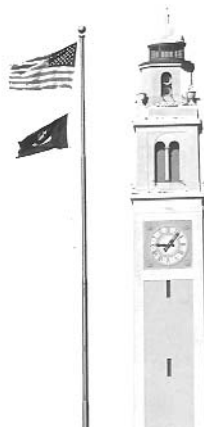

**A**long with the success of the LSU Football team, comes a great deal of media attention and Dr. Tommy Karam, the Director of the Communications Lab, uses his lab, located on the fourth floor of the Cox Communications Academic Center for Student-Athletes, to work with LSU student-athletes on their interactions with the media and interview skills. Karam's lab is a mock press conference setting to get the student-athletes used to handling themselves in front of both print and electronic media. He video tapes the mock interview session and reviews it with the student-athlete to help them become more comfortable in an interview setting. Karam also helps the LSU Football players get prepared for the NFL Combine by working closely with those players on the interview process.

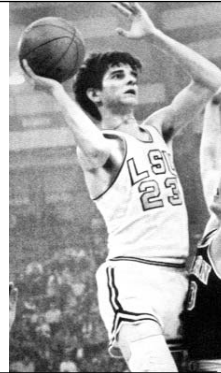

Basketball has retired the No. 23 for Pete Maravich, No. 50 for Bob Pettit, Jr., and No. 33 for Shaquille O'Neal. Football's only retired jersey is the No. 20 worn by Billy Cannon, while baseball retired the No. 15 in honor of longtime coach and current athletics director Skip Bertman.

## Bob Pettit

Led LSU to its first NCAA Final Four in 1953 and he later became the first player in NBA history to break the 20,000-plus point barrier. Pettit is a member of the NBA Hall of Fame and in 1997 he was named as one of the top 50 players in NBA history.

## Pete Maravich

"Pistol Pete" Maravich still holds the NCAA record for career points with 3,667 and for career scoring average with 44.2 points a game. He was named the National Player of the Year in 1970 after leading the Tigers to the NIT Final Four. He scored 50+ points an amazing 28 times. He went on to a 10-year professional career and was selected as one of the NBA's 50 greatest players in 1997.

## Shaquille O'Neal

The first pick in the 1992 NBA Draft, O'Neal was named MVP of the league in 2000 and was a three-time NBA Finals MVP after leading the Los Angeles Lakers to three World Championships. At LSU, O'Neal averaged 21.6 points and 13.6 rebounds for his career, and in 1991, he was named the World's Amateur Athlete of the Year as well as SEC Athlete of the Year and National Player of the Year. In 1997, he was named as one of the top 50 players in NBA history.

## Billy Cannon

One of the true legends of college football in the South, Cannon was the 1959 Heisman Trophy winner and helped the Tigers to the 1958 national title. Cannon's most memorable performance came in 1959 against Ole Miss when No. 1 LSU trailed No. 3 Ole Miss 3-0 in the fourth quarter. He fielded a punt, broke seven tackles and returned it 89 yards for the game-winning touchdown in a 7-3 victory. He went on to a successful 11-year professional career.

## Skip Bertman

A legend in the college baseball ranks, Bertman created a dynasty at LSU, guiding the Tigers to five national titles in a 10-year stretch from 1991-2000. He also skipped the United States to a bronze medal at the 1996 Olympics in Atlanta and was an assistant on the gold medal-winning U.S. squad in Seoul, Korea in 1988. Bertman retired from coaching following the 2001 season and is currently the LSU athletics director. In 2006, he was one of 10 inaugural inductees into the College Baseball Hall of Fame in Lubbock, Texas.

## LSU's Success in each of its 20 sports is evident with this outstanding list of former Tigers.



### Seimone Augustus

Augustus was the two-time NCAA National Player of the Year, receiving the Wade Trophy, the Naismith and the Wooden Awards as a junior and a senior. Augustus helped lead the Lady Tigers to three straight Final Fours and was the NCAA Regional MOP three times. She was the No. 1 draft pick in the 2006 WNBA draft.



### Muna Lee

The most decorated track and field athlete in school history, Lee won 20 All-America awards and a school record seven national titles while helping the Lady Tigers to five NCAA team championships during her time at LSU. A 2004 Olympian, she finished seventh in the 200 meters at the Summer Games in Athens, Greece.



### Nicki Arnstad

The 2002 NCAA Floor Exercise Co-Champion, Arnstad became the first LSU gymnast to win a national title. She was a two-time All-American and won the NCAA Central Regional Floor and All-Around Championships.



### Ben McDonald

Named the Golden Spikes National Player of the Year in 1989 and he was later the first player chosen in the Major League Baseball Draft by the Baltimore Orioles.



### April Burkholder

The 2006 NCAA Balance Beam co-national champion. Completed her LSU career with 14 All-America honors and four All-SEC selections. In addition, she was named the NCAA Central Region Gymnast of the Year and SEC Gymnast of the Year twice (2004 and 2005) and was also the conference's Freshman of the Year in 2003.



### Kristin Schmidt

The 2004 Women's College World Series Most Outstanding Player, Schmidt was a three-time NFCA All-American and one of only two players in conference history to earn back-to-back SEC Tournament Most Outstanding Player honors.



### Xavier Carter

Carter won a school record-tying seven NCAA titles on the track and earned a total of 10 All-America honors. He became just the second athlete to win four titles at one national meet, joining Jesse Owens. Holds four individual school records and anchored LSU's 4x400-meter relay teams to two school records.



### Britni Sneed

One of three four-time first-team All-SEC selections in conference history, Sneed was a two-time SEC Player of the Year and a three-time NFCA All-American, leading the Tigers to their first Women's College World Series appearance in 2001.



### Walter Davis

An Olympian in 2000 and 2004, Davis helped LSU to national titles in 2001 and 2002. The SEC Male Athlete of the Year in 2002, he won six NCAA titles and earned nine All-America honors. A five-time USA triple jump champion, he is also the reigning World Indoor and Outdoor triple jump champion.



### David Toms

The two-time SEC Player of the Year, Toms has gone on to a successful career on the PGA Tour. Among his PGA Tour victories was a thrilling win at the PGA Championship in August of 2001.



### Meredith Duncan

The nation's top collegiate golfer in 2002, Duncan left LSU as the best female golfer in school history. She earned first-team All-America honors as a senior in 2002 and won the United States Women's Amateur Championship in 2001.



### Todd Walker

Capped his LSU career as the SEC's all-time leader in hits, runs, RBIs, and total bases. Walker, who is a member of the All-Time College World Series Team, led LSU to the national title in 1993. Walker is currently a member of the San Diego Padres.

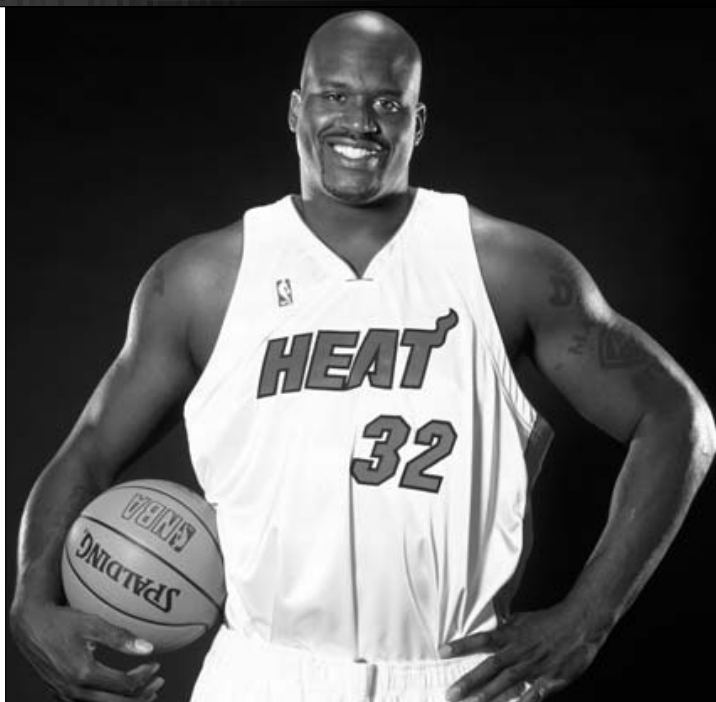

### Dr. James Andrews

A world-renowned orthopedic surgeon. Andrews is a 1963 graduate of LSU and a 1967 graduate of LSU Medical School. While at LSU, Andrews won the SEC indoor and outdoor titles in the pole vault.



### Kevin Faulk

Excelled in both the classroom and on the playing field as he graduated in just three years. Faulk is currently a member of the three-time Super Bowl Champion New England Patriots.



### James Bernhard, Jr.

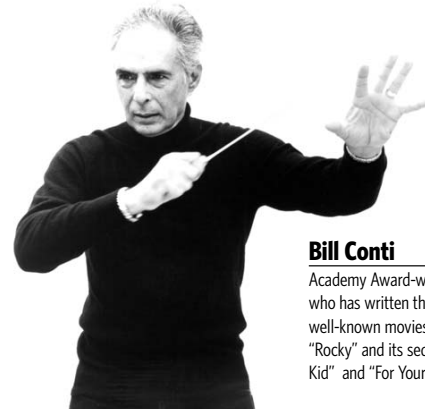

A new, elevated, air-conditioned press box was installed behind the home plate bleachers prior to the 2003 season. Tiger Park also features an inning-by-inning scoreboard, message board and a state-of-the-art sound system. In the Fall of 2006, LSU broke ground on the new Tiger Park, which will be located along Skip Bertman Drive adjacent to the women's soccer stadium. The stadium will boast 1,289 seats with 1,200 addition seats along the outfield berm.**

## PHILOSOPHY

**I believe fully in trying to instill in our athletes a knowledge and a love for the qualities and virtues that comprise good character.**

Character is what we are inside. It is often revealed by how we act when no one is looking. Winning in our program should occur both on the field as well as in the classroom, in society and in personal lives after Tiger softball. When our players leave our program, hopefully we have developed successful people that will feel that their Tiger family will always have a unique and lasting place in their hearts.

**LSU is a very special place with everything provided for success; from athletic facilities to the very best academic center in the country and a first-class administration all at the disposal of our student athletes.**

In addition to having the friendliness of Louisiana people, LSU has one of the most beautiful campuses in the country. Our players will know from their first visit to the LSU campus that their number one goal is to leave this institution with their degree in hand.

**In setting our high standards for the athletes that represent this program, the number one characteristic I look for in student-athletes is discipline.**

We want disciplined people in our program. It all starts with someone who can control her choices in a respectable way, both on and off the field. The ability to choose right from a wrong should not be a battle. We expect to play for championships here at LSU and every student-athlete who competes for the Tiger softball team will have to have that same discipline and expectations. Our staff is dedicated to LSU, our program and our players.

**Concerning the softball side, we will incorporate the 'Tiger Attack' mind set for our games.**

I'd like to think that my teams are aggressive and hard-nosed, and that they will play the game hard until the final out. We must attack every inning as if the score were 0-0, always thinking 'it is never enough'. We will always be a fundamental team with high emphasis placed on this aspect of the game throughout the entire year. Playing the game with pride, emotion and respect for tradition and class should be a goal for every LSU team. This team will embody those qualities.

In six seasons at LSU, head coach Yvette Girouard's effect on the Tiger softball program has been powerful. With each year, she continues to add to her legacy as one of the greatest coaches in the history of women's softball by helping LSU maintain its place among the nation's elite in the collegiate ranks.

Girouard, who was inducted into the National Fastpitch Coaches Association Hall of Fame in December 2005 and the Louisiana Softball Coaches Association Hall of Fame in June 2002, enters the 2007 season among the career leaders in NCAA Division I wins (No. 5) and winning percentage (No. 4) and among the active NCAA Division I coaching leaders in wins (No. 5) and winning percentage (No. 3).

Against Arkansas on April 6, 2005, she became the sixth coach in NCAA history in any division to earn her 1,000th career victory and just the fifth in NCAA Division I history. Averaging more than 40 wins a season in her 26 years as a head coach, she is one of only a handful of coaches who can boast that feat over such an extended and noteworthy career.

With 25-straight winning seasons to her credit, she has guided her athletes to 37 All-America honors, including nine while at LSU, 15 Academic All-America honors, including 2005 and 2006 first-team Academic All-American Stephanie Hill, and taken teams to 15 NCAA Regionals.

No stranger to Oklahoma City, Girouard became just the third coach in NCAA history to take two programs to the Women's College World Series after leading UL-Lafayette to three World Series appearances in the 1990s and LSU to the WCWS in 2001 and 2004.

In 2004, she led LSU to its second Women's College World Series appearance, where the Tigers advanced to within one game of the championship game. After defeating Michigan in extra innings in its first game, LSU fell to eventual national champion UCLA in game two.

Weather postponed play for a day and forced the Tigers into the unenviable situation of having to win three games in a single day to advance to the national championship game. LSU began the day with a win over Florida State before defeating California to force just the seventh "if necessary" game in WCWS history.

Unfortunately, the Tigers could not get past California a second time and came up one game shy of the national championship game. LSU's remarkable run marked the first time since 1984 a school from east of the Mississippi River had advanced to within a game of the national championship. Tiger pitcher Kristin Schmidt was named the WCWS Most Outstanding Player, becoming the first player to earn the honor who was not a member of the national championship team. Sophomore Camille Harris was also named to the WCWS All-Tournament team.

In addition, the Tigers were ranked as high as second nationally, matching the highest national ranking for any team coached by Girouard.

In 2001, Girouard led LSU to its first appearance in the WCWS, where the Tigers finished third. Under her guidance, UL-Lafayette (formerly Southwestern Louisiana) advanced to the WCWS three times, with a pair of fifth-place finishes and a third-place finish in 1993.

With .815 winning percentage in the 1990s, her teams posted the third-best winning percentage in the nation behind only Arizona and UCLA. In six seasons at LSU, she has posted the fourth most wins in the nation over that period with the fifth-best winning percentage.

While her influence has been a catalyst for the growth of the game in the state and nationally for many years, her impact in just six years in Baton Rouge has been no less significant. Becoming the first coach in Southeastern Conference history to lead a team to back-to-back tournament championships, Girouard made a clean sweep of the three major league titles

(SEC Western Division, SEC Championship, SEC Tournament Championship) in three of her first six seasons as a Tiger.

Last season, she guided LSU back into the Top 10 nationally as the Tigers won their NCAA Regional in Baton Rouge and advanced to the NCAA Super Regionals for the first time. In the Super Regional in Tucson, Ariz., LSU earned its first win over a No. 1-ranked team as the Tigers took the second game from eventual national champion Arizona, 3-2. LSU was one of only two teams to hand the Wildcats a loss at home as the Tigers became the first program in history to knock off Arizona in a game at home that could send it to the Women's College World Series.

For her achievements, Girouard was honored with her third SEC Coach of the Year award and named the Louisiana Coach of the Year an unprecedented 12th time. Juniors Emily Turner and Leslie Klein earned NFCA All-America honors, the second honor of Klein's career, while Stephanie Hill earned her second-straight first-team Academic All-America honor.

In 2005, she became the fifth coach in NCAA Division I history and the sixth coach in NCAA history to earn 1,000 career victories. She guided Hill to first-team Academic All-America honors, the second Academic All-American in school history and the first to earn first-team honors.

After failing to earn the league titles in 2003, LSU came back to sweep all three major titles again in 2004. The Tigers earned the top seed in NCAA Region 3, marking the 14th consecutive trip to the postseason for Girouard and the seventh for LSU. The Tigers swept through NCAA Regional play, defeating Illinois in the championship game to earn their berth in the Women's College World Series.

For their efforts, Girouard, associate head coach James DeFeo and assistant coach Lori Osterberg were named the National Fastpitch Coaches Association South Region Coaching Staff of the Year, marking the seventh regional coach of the year honor in Girouard's career.

In 2003, Girouard earned her 900th career victory, becoming just the sixth coach in NCAA Division I history and the eighth coach in

NCAA history to reach the historic milestone.

After finishing second in the SEC Western Division, the Tigers advanced through the conference tournament to the championship game for the fifth-consecutive year.

The Tigers earned their sixth-consecutive trip to the NCAA Regionals and finishing the year ranked No. 15, the fourth consecutive top 15 ranking for LSU and fifth consecutive top 20 finish for Girouard.

In 2002, Girouard picked up her 100th win at LSU in just 119 games, the fastest Tiger coach to 100 victories in school history. In addition, Girouard led LSU to its then highest regular-season ranking, No. 3 nationally.

After sweeping all three of the SEC Championship titles and advancing to the NCAA Regional finals, she earned her second-straight SEC Coach of the Year honor. She has been named coach of the year by three separate conferences: the Southeastern Conference in 2001 and 2002, the Sun Belt in 2000 and the Southland in 1984, 1985 and 1987.

A fourth-consecutive Louisiana Sport Writer's Association Louisiana Coach of the Year honor followed for Girouard, the 11th state honor of her career.

In her first season at LSU, Girouard was able to accomplish something no other coach had been able to do. She led the Tigers to their first appearance in the WCWS with a victory over her former school, UL-Lafayette, in the NCAA Regional Championship game.

In the WCWS, the Tigers fell to Stanford in the first round, but bounced back to knock off Iowa and defending national champion Oklahoma before losing out to UCLA and finishing in a tie for third place nationally, the highest final ranking for any LSU squad.

For their accomplishments, she, DeFeo and Osterberg were named the NFCA National Coaching Staff of the Year. She was also named the Coach of the Year by the SEC and the LSWA. To her credit, she was named the National Coach of the Year in 1990 and 1993.

In her two decades as the Lady Cajuns' head coach, she built the team from the ground floor with no scholarships and a \$3,000 budget to one of the nation's perennial powers. She advanced her UL-Lafayette teams to the NCAA Regionals a total of 10 times, hosting on seven of those occasions.

Girouard was born in Broussard, La., and attended Comeaux High School. She earned a Bachelor of Science degree from USL in 1976 in health and physical education. During her college days, she played on the Lady Cajun volleyball team and was named the school's Female Athlete of the Year in 1976.

Following college, Girouard served as head coach at Lafayette High School where she began the softball program in 1977. In 1980, she coached at her alma mater, Comeaux High School, before beginning the USL softball program in 1981.

Girouard served a three-year term as the South Region Representative on the NCAA All-America Committee and served two, two-year stints on the NCAA South Regional ranking committee. She is currently a member of a nine-person NCAA Softball Rules Committee until her term expires on Sept. 1, 2007.

With a list of accomplishments and awards that speak for themselves, Girouard has proven that she can take her teams to the next level and be successful. Her guidance and leadership have carried her through 25 outstanding seasons and hopefully she will continue to build upon her past successes and reach the ultimate goal of bringing LSU its first national championship in softball.

James DeFeo enters his third season as the associate head coach at LSU after four years as an assistant coach. It is also his eighth season under head coach Yvette Girouard after one year with her at UL-Lafayette.

Prior to joining Girouard's staff, DeFeo was a graduate assistant at Southern Miss in 1999 when the Golden Eagles became the first, first-year program to advance to the Women's College World Series.

In 2004, he, Girouard and Lori Osterberg were named the National Fastpitch Coaches Association South Region Coaching Staff of the Year after leading the Tigers to their second WCWS appearance. The trio was also named the NFCA National Coaching Staff of the Year in 2001 after they led LSU to its first WCWS berth.

DeFeo's main duties include working with the hitters and the outfielders as well as recruiting, scouting and practice management. Last season, the Tiger hitters ranked in the top 25 nationally in batting average (16th), slugging percentage (19th), scoring (22nd) and doubles (10th).

The Tigers also set school records for on base percentage and sacrifice flies in 2006. In addition, LSU led the SEC and posted the second most doubles in a season. Individually, two-time All-American Leslie Klein ranked in the top 10 of virtually every hitting category and ranked in the top 50 in the NCAA in batting average.

In 2005, the Tiger hitters ranked in the top 30 in the NCAA in batting average and scoring, including a No. 5 ranking in doubles per game. Two years ago, the Tigers ranked in the top 10 in the NCAA in batting average, in the top 15 in slugging percentage and home runs per game and in the top 35 in triples per game.

In 2004, LSU broke the school record and led the Southeastern Conference in home runs, while LSU ranked second in the league in batting average, runs scored, hits, triples and RBIs. Individually, then-freshman All-American Leslie

Klein ranked in the top 10 in the SEC in every hitting category and ranked in the top 50 in the NCAA in slugging percentage, runs per game and RBIs per game. The Tigers had at least two players ranked in the top 10 individually in the SEC in every hitting category, including five of the top 10 individuals ranked in total bases.

In 2002, former Tiger All-American Trena Peel led the nation in triples, while breaking the LSU and SEC single-season records. With 14 triples, she was just two shy of the NCAA record.

In his first season at LSU the Tigers were second in the SEC and 12th nationally with a .293 team batting average. LSU also led the league in scoring and finished ranked 16th nationally with more than five runs per game.

At UL-Lafayette, DeFeo's team hit .310 and finished the season with a No. 22 national ranking and in the top 10 in hitting and scoring. The 1999 Southern Miss team finished the season ranked second nationally in batting and 10th in scoring. DeFeo was instrumental in helping to revive the Golden Eagle team after a six-year hiatus.

For 10 years, he has served as sole proprietor and instructor of the All-American Softball Clinics in New Jersey, New York, Florida, Pennsylvania and Mississippi. DeFeo has coaching experience at nearly every level of fastpitch softball, including Under-12, Under-16, 18 and Under and Women's Major. DeFeo also is a member of the National Fastpitch Coaches Association.

A native of New Jersey, DeFeo graduated from Rutgers University in 1996 with a bachelor's degree in sport management. He received his master's in sports administration from Southern Miss in 1999. His sister, Stephanie DeFeo, was a three-time All-American under Girouard at UL-Lafayette.

In 2000, DeFeo was married to the former Samantha Rock of Orlando, Fla. They have two daughters, Victoria, 4, and Zoe, 2, and an infant son, Zachary.

Megan Smith enters her first year with the LSU softball program after serving as the head coach at Western Carolina, where she served for the inaugural 2006 season.

As the head coach for the Catamounts last season, she guided the first-year program to their first Southern Conference title, compiling a 41-20 record, including a 16-4 mark in league play. For her success, she was named the 2006 SoCon Coach of the Year.

Her team posted 81 home runs, which ranked third nationally, while WCU ranked 12th in the NCAA in slugging percentage, 19th in scoring, 38th in win-loss percentage and 50th in batting average. Additionally, three players ranked nationally statistically and two were named to the NFCA All-Southeastern Region team.

Hired in July 2004, Smith built the Western Carolina program from the ground up, spending a year and a half to build the program, including the hiring of staff and the recruitment of players, while supervising the construction of a state-of-the-art softball facility.

She was hired to head the Catamount program from the University of North Carolina, where she had also been a player. As an assistant coach for Donna Papa, she helped the Tar Heels with recruiting, fundraising, and oversaw the academic progress of student-athletes, while participating in practice planning and game management.

In 2004, she helped guide the North Carolina program to a 46-24 record, including a second place finish in the Atlantic Coast Conference, while earning an NCAA Regional bid. In addition, she directed the Carolina Softball Camps, overseeing all aspects of the camps.

Prior to her stay at her alma mater, Smith was an assistant coach at Charlotte for the 2002 season. She worked with the infielders, pitchers and served as the hitting coach. The assistant also organized all recruiting efforts for head coach Aimee DeVoss.

For two seasons, Smith served as the head coach at Young Harris College in Georgia from 2000-2001. While there, she guided her program to a 79-41 record. Without an assistant coach, she oversaw all aspects of the team, from practice to strength training to academics to fundraising.

While at Young Harris, she finished second in the regional championships twice and was one game away from the national tournament in 2001. Her team broke nearly every school record, including wins in as season with 45. In addition, in 2002, her squad ranked nationally in batting average and eight players were named to the all-regional team.

During her collegiate career at North Carolina, Smith earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in exercise and sport science and recreation administration. Playing third base primarily, she served as captain during her senior season and broke the school record for RBIs in a game and was named the Defensive Player of the Year in 1999.

Also an exceptional student, the Walkertown, N.C., native was named to the All-Atlantic Coast Conference honor roll for three year and made the Dean's List twice. In 2000, she earned her Master's of Science degree in human performance and sports studies with a concentration in sports management from the University of Tennessee.

On June 19, 2004, she married Paul Buske, and the pair raise two cats, Sammy and Callie, and a dog, Buddy.

## COMING BACK STRONG

### **TIGERS EARN FIRST TRIP TO NCAA SUPER REGIONALS**

After sweeping through the NCAA Region 13 bracket in Baton Rouge, the Tigers earned their first trip to the NCAA Super Regionals since the tournament went to its current format in 2005. LSU, the top seed in its region and 15th overall national seed advanced undefeated through Regional play, including a pair of one-run wins over in-state rival UL-Lafayette.

The Tigers advanced to face No. 2 seed and top-ranked Arizona in Tucson. After losing the first game, LSU came back to even the best-of-three format with a 3-2 win in game two. It marked the Tigers' first win over a top-ranked team in school history and sent the series to a decisive game three. Unfortunately, LSU could not make it two in a row as the Wildcats won to advance to the Women's College World Series, where they claimed their seventh NCAA Championship.

### **TIGERS POST PROGRAM WIN NO. 500**

With a 13-2 win in five innings over Kentucky on March 25, 2006, the LSU softball program earned its 500th victory since the program's reinstatement in 1997. The Tigers entered the last season with 470 wins and posted the 500th win just 35 games into the season. LSU is the only school in the SEC to break the 500-win plateau since the conference began sponsoring softball in 1997. South Carolina has the most program wins of any school in the league (1,125), but has been competing in softball since 1974.

### **LSU HITS THE HALF CENTURY MARK AGAINST AUBURN**

With a win over Auburn at the SEC Tournament on May 11, 2006, LSU hit 50 wins in just 61 games. It also marked the eighth time in the last 10 years that the Tigers have hit the 50-win plateau and are one of only two teams to have eight 50-win seasons in the last 10 years.

### **TIGERS ON THE TUBE**

The Tigers appeared on television 14 times in 2006, including six games broadcast by the ESPN networks. LSU's first television appearances of the season was on ESPNU at the Palm Springs Classic against

Stanford. The Tigers then appeared on Cox Sports Television six times, including an NCAA Regional championship win over UL-Lafayette. LSU also faced South Carolina and Tennessee on Fox Sports as part of the SEC-TV package. In addition, two of the Tigers' three games at Tennessee were aired by ESPN, with the first game of the series televised by ESPN2 and the final game broadcast by ESPNU. LSU closed out the season with all three of its NCAA Super Regional games at Arizona broadcast on ESPNU.

### **LSU VS. RANKED TEAMS**

In 2006, the Tigers had one of the toughest schedules in the nation. LSU finished 19-14 against nationally ranked teams, including an 8-10 record against teams ranked in the top 10. The Tigers recorded their first win over a No. 1-ranked team when LSU topped Arizona, 3-2, in the second game of the NCAA Super Regional.

### **TIGERS SCORE EARLY...**

The LSU softball team made a habit of taking early leads on opponents. In 69 games, the Tigers outscored their opponents, 81-29 (+52), in the first inning. By the end of the fourth inning, the Tigers held a commanding 231-82 (+149) scoring margin. LSU was 43-1 when leading after the fourth inning.

In games when the Tigers took the lead first, LSU lost only once last season, going 48-1 (.980). In games where the opponent scored first the Tigers were just 7-13 (.330). The only time LSU scored first and lost was on April 26, 2006, when LSU fell to Arkansas, 3-2, in nine innings.

### **...AND TIGERS SCORE OFTEN**

Last season, the Tigers scored 350 runs in 69 games for a 5.07 runs per game average, 22nd best in the NCAA, and just behind the school record of 5.58 set in 2004. On nine occasions LSU broke into double figures in runs, including a school record-tying 20 runs in the first game of a doubleheader against Grambling State.

The Tigers also had two innings in which they have scored eight or more runs. Against Texas Southern, LSU recorded the second most runs in an inning in school history with 12 in the second inning. That mark was

behind the 15 scored in the fourth against Nicholls State on April 1, 2004, and tied the 12 runs scored in the third against Ole Miss in 1997.

### THREE PROVES TO BE LSU'S MAGIC NUMBER

On the offensive side, the magic number for the Tigers seems to be three. LSU was 47-1 (.980) when scoring three or more runs in a game, with the only loss of the season when scoring three runs coming in the final game of the year against No. 1 Arizona in the NCAA Super Regionals. However, the Tigers were 8-13 (.381) when scoring fewer than three runs.

### TWO OUTS ... NO PROBLEM

The third out was quite elusive for opponents of LSU last season. The Tigers recorded 193 of their 350 runs with two outs, accounting for 55-percent of their total runs. LSU hit .316 as a team with two outs, led by Quinlan Duhon with a .378 average, followed by Leslie Klein at .375 and Lauren Castle at .368.

All but one of the Tigers recorded a two-out RBI. Nine players posted double-figure RBI totals with two outs, led by Leslie Klein and Stephanie Hill with 19, while Lauren Delahoussaye had 17, Lauren Castle had 15 and Camille Harris, Killian Roessner and Andrea Smith all had 14.

### IT TAKES A THIEF

In 69 games last season, LSU ranked third in the SEC with 93 stolen bases, the fifth most in LSU single-season history, on 113 attempts for an .823 percentage with 1.35 stolen bases/game. Three Tigers stole at least 10 bases with 11 players stealing at least one base. Dee Dee Henderson led the team with a 28-for-32 mark, which ranked 23rd in the NCAA, while Leslie Klein stole 18 bases and Camille Harris had 17.

### PITCHER PERFECT

LSU laid claim to the one of the top pitching staffs in the nation. The Tigers allowed only 126 runs, 88 earned, in 69 games with a 1.37 team earned run average, which ranked 13th in the NCAA. In addition, LSU posted 31 shutouts and averaged 7.64 strikeouts per seven innings. Three of the four Tiger pitchers ranked in the top 10 in the league in ERA, including Emily Turner, who ranked ninth in the nation with a 0.93 ERA.

### DOUBLE TROUBLE

As a team, the Tigers hit 102 doubles in 69 games last season, or 1.48 doubles per game, 10th-best in the NCAA. This was the second-most doubles in a season in school history. The 1998 Tigers set the school record with 133 doubles in 72 games. Ten players recorded three or more doubles, led by the 17 by Vanessa Soto and the 16 by Stephanie Hill, 14 by Leslie Klein and 12 by Camille Harris.

### STREAKING...

Leslie Klein tied for the sixth longest hitting streak in school history with a 12-game mark. She posted hits in 12 straight games beginning with a 1-for-3 performance against Georgia on March 19. It ended with an 0-for-4 mark against Auburn in the second game of a doubleheader on April 8. During her streak, she went 21-for-37 (.568) with three doubles, a triple, three home runs and 14 RBIs.

### ROESSNER CALLING THE SHOTS

Last season, catcher Killian Roessner began calling the pitch selection from behind the plate for the Tiger pitchers. During the year, she called two no-hitters and a perfect game, just the third perfect game in LSU history. In addition, Roessner led the Tiger pitching staff to 31 complete-game shutouts and a 1.37 earned run average.

### PRIME TARGET

Camille Harris was hit by a pitch 16 times last season, breaking her LSU single-season record of 14 from 2005. She tied for second in the SEC and ranked 13th in the NCAA. For her career, she was hit 35 times, breaking the school career record with the second most in SEC career history.

### GIVING IT UP FOR THE CAUSE

With a game-winning sacrifice fly in the bottom of the seventh against UL-Lafayette in NCAA Regional play, Vanessa Soto broke the LSU single-season sacrifice fly record. The sac fly that scored Quinlan Duhon from third was the seventh of the season for Soto, topping the eight-year old mark of six set by Tara Asbill in 1998.

With a sacrifice fly by Killian Roessner at No. 6 Tennessee on May 7, LSU broke the SEC single-season team record for sacrifice flies. The previous record of 27 was held by the 1998 Tigers. For the season, LSU had 30 sacrifice flies. The Tigers had 10 players who recorded sacrifice flies, including five with three or more.

### GARCIA MAKES HISTORY WITH NO-NO NUMBER TWO

Against Mississippi Valley State on Feb. 17, in her second appearance of the season, Tiffany Garcia hurled her second-straight no-hitter, becoming the first player in LSU history to record back-to-back complete-game no-hitters. She was two outs from recording her second-straight perfect game after posting her first career perfect game against Grambling State two days earlier. It was also the 26th no-hitter in the program's history.

### GARCIA THROWS PERFECT GAME

In the second game of a doubleheader against Grambling State on Feb. 15, Tiffany Garcia hurled her first career perfect game. The first appearance of the season for Garcia also marked her first complete-game no-hitter as a Tiger. The third perfect game in LSU history, it was also the 25th no-hitter in the program's history and the second of the season.

### HOFFER HURLS NO-HITTER

In her first collegiate outing, Dani Hofer hurled a no-hitter against Arkansas-Pine Bluff on Feb. 11. It marked the first complete-game no-hitter for Hofer as a Tiger, who tossed 15 no-no's during her senior year in high school. It was also the 24th no-hitter in LSU softball history, and the first since Kristin Schmidt fired a no-no against Centenary on April 2, 2003.

### LUCKY 14 IN A ROW

LSU opened play in 2006 with 14 consecutive wins. It marked the longest season-opening winning streak for the Tigers in the program's history, besting the nine-game winning streak to open the 2000 season. In addition, it tied for the eighth longest winning streak overall in the program's history, five games shy of the school record of 19-consecutive wins during the 2000 season.

The Tigers also opened the home schedule at 15-0, the second best home start in school history, coming 10 games behind the best home start in school history of 25-0 that began the inaugural 1997 season. During the 2006 winning streak, LSU also recorded a school record seven consecutive shutouts from Feb. 12 - Feb. 18.

### LSU TIES SINGLE-SEASON HOME WINS MARK

With a 31-3 record at Tiger Park in 2006, LSU tied the 2000 team for the most home victories in school history. The Tigers also recorded the third best winning percentage in LSU history with a .912 mark, behind only the .967 (29-1) clip of the 2001 team and the .933 (28-2) percentage of the 1998 team. LSU began the 2006 season with 15 straight wins at Tiger Park, including two wins over then-No. 11 Washington. After a pair of losses to nationally ranked Georgia, LSU then rattled off nine more wins at home.

**In 2007, the LSU softball team will begin its 11th season of play at Tiger Park. Built in 1996, the facility opened just prior to the inaugural 1997 season. LSU is currently in the process of building a new home for the Tiger Softball Team on Skip Bertman Drive adjacent to the Soccer Complex.**

The current 1,000-seat facility, which has been the softball team's home since its inception, is one of the most recent athletic facilities added to LSU's campus.

In just 10 years, Tiger Park has hosted four NCAA Regional tournaments and become one of the toughest places in the nation for visitors to play.

LSU owns an astounding 278-41 (.871) record at home, including a 117-29 (.801) Southeastern Conference mark. In 2001, the Tigers advanced through the NCAA Regional tournament at Tiger Park to its first berth in the Women's College World Series.

Tiger Park has also been home to some amazing feats. On May 20, 2000, LSU and Southern Miss battled out 12 scoreless innings in NCAA Regional action before the Tigers plated the game-winner in the 13th. For the program's history, LSU is 12-4 (.750) all-time in postseason games and has won seven straight NCAA Regional games in Tiger Park.

This past season, an average of 613 fans watched as LSU won a school record 34 regular-season home games, the fourth largest average home attendance in Tiger softball history. The SEC leader in attendance in 2003, LSU ranked ninth in the NCAA in 2004 and 2005, marking its fourth national top 10 attendance ranking in the last five seasons.

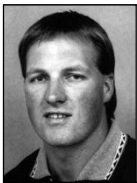

## Dr. William L. Jenkins

President, LSU

Dr. William L. Jenkins is President of the Louisiana State University System, which includes ten institutions on 10 campuses in five cities as well as 10 public hospitals in 10 cities.

A native of South Africa, Dr. Jenkins received his professional veterinary medicine degree in 1958 and specialist credentials in 1968 from the University of Pretoria. In 1970 he received a Ph.D. degree from the University of Missouri in Columbia. After practicing veterinary medicine for four years, Dr. Jenkins joined the faculty at the University of Pretoria, advancing through the ranks to become professor and head of the Department of Veterinary Physiology, Pharmacology and Toxicology in 1971.

In 1978 Dr. Jenkins moved to the United States and joined the faculty in the Department of Veterinary Physiology and Pharmacology at Texas A&M University. In 1988 he was appointed dean of the LSU School of Veterinary Medicine, was named LSU's Provost and Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs in 1993, Chancellor of LSU in 1996, and President of the LSU System in 1999.

Dr. Jenkins has taught extensively at both the professional and graduate levels. He also has been active in continuing education and has delivered more than 200 lectures and addresses to diverse groups in both the United States and abroad. He has published more than 60 scientific articles and has contributed 15 chapters to various textbooks. He is co-author of a textbook on veterinary pharmacology.

Over the years President Jenkins has received numerous teaching and service awards and recognitions. He also has served on many boards and commissions at the local, regional, state, and national levels.

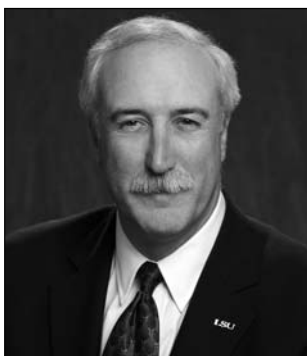

## Sean O'Keefe

Chancellor, LSU

The Honorable Sean O'Keefe assumed the office of Chancellor of Louisiana State University and A&M College on February 21, 2005. Prior to his appointment as LSU's seventh chancellor, O'Keefe established a distinguished career in higher education and United States government service.

Chancellor O'Keefe earned his Bachelor of Arts from Loyola University in New Orleans in 1977 and his Master of Public Administration from the Maxwell School of Syracuse University in 1978. He held an endowed chair at the Syracuse University Maxwell School of Citizenship and Public Affairs and served as the Director of National Security Studies, a partnership of Syracuse University and Johns Hopkins University for delivery of executive education programs. He was also Professor of Business Administration and Assistant to the Senior Vice President for Research and Dean of the Graduate School at the Pennsylvania State University.

He served on four separate occasions as a presidential appointee. Most recently, until February 2005, he served as the 10th Administrator of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration. O'Keefe joined President George W. Bush's Administration as Deputy Assistant to the President and as the Deputy Director of the Office of Management and Budget until December 2001.

Appointed Secretary of the Navy in July 1992 by President George Bush, O'Keefe served as Comptroller and Chief Financial Officer of the Department of Defense since 1989. Before joining then-Defense Secretary Dick Cheney's Pentagon management team in these capacities, he served on the United States Senate Committee on Appropriations staff for eight years and was Staff Director of the Defense Appropriations Subcommittee. His public service began in 1978 upon his selection as a Presidential Management Intern.

Chancellor Sean O'Keefe is a Fellow of the National Academy of Public Administration, a Fellow of the

International Academy of Astronautics, and member of the Naval Postgraduate School Board of Advisors. During his academic postings, he was a Visiting Scholar at the Wolfson College of the University of Cambridge in the United Kingdom, a member of the Naval Postgraduate School's civil-military relations seminar team, and conducted seminars for the Strategic Studies Group at Oxford University. He served on the national security panel to devise the 1988 Republican platform and was a member of the 1985 Kennedy School of Government program for national security executives at Harvard University.

In 1993, President Bush and Secretary Cheney presented him the Distinguished Public Service Award. He was the 1999 faculty recipient of the Syracuse University Chancellor's Award for Public Service; recipient of the Department of the Navy's Public Service Award in December 2000; and has been awarded five honorary doctorate degrees from several prestigious educational institutions. In 2003 and 2004, he was recognized and honored by the Irish American Magazine as one of the Top 100 Irish Americans.

He is the author of several journal articles and contributing author of *Keeping the Edge: Managing Defense for the Future* released in October 2000. In 1998, he co-authored *The Defense Industry in the Post-Cold War Era: Corporate Strategies and Public Policy Perspectives*.

He is married to Laura McCarthy O'Keefe, and they have three children - Lindsey, Jonathan, and Kevin.

Bertman's unyielding desire to succeed drove him to the pinnacle of his profession, and his astute knowledge of the game -- obtained from over 40 years of coaching -- combined with his steadfast determination and irrepressible enthusiasm transformed LSU Baseball into the nation's premier program.

Already a Louisiana Legend and one of the greatest college baseball coaches of all time, J. Stanley "Skip" Bertman has made the seamless transition into the athletics director's chair with the same enthusiasm, vision and demand for excellence that were trademarks of his stellar coaching career.

In just five years as LSU's director of athletics, Bertman has already added to his impressive list of on-the-field achievements. Under his direction, LSU enjoyed arguably the greatest athletics years in the history of the institution. In 2003-04, three teams won national championships, nine teams finished in the nation's top ten, and 14 teams ranked in the top 25, and in 2004-05, 14 teams advanced to the postseason. LSU teams also enjoyed improved grade point averages across the board, making the LSU student-athlete experience a success on and off the fields of competition.

While supervising the Tigers' progress on the playing fields, he has begun to implement measures necessary to realize his vision of building the LSU athletics department into the best in the country. Bertman's bold and innovative plans promise to keep the Tigers among the nation's elite in all phases of collegiate athletics.

Bertman is now in the midst of upgrading LSU's athletics complex. Working hand in hand with the Tiger Athletic Foundation, Bertman has already overseen the completion of the Cox Communications Academic Center for Student-Athletes while renovating Tiger Stadium and the Pete Maravich Assembly Center, and constructing the Football Operations Center.

It was also Bertman who took the bold but essential move to implement a seat contribution program in Tiger Stadium to fund facility improvements and ensure the financial stability of the LSU Athletics Department for the next decade.

Bertman was named LSU's athletics director on Jan. 19, 2001. With Bertman, LSU gained an athletics director who provides the leadership and experience necessary to manage the Tigers' \$52 million budget.

Bertman guided LSU to five NCAA baseball titles, and his teams drew huge crowds to venerable Alex Box Stadium, as the Tigers led the nation in attendance in each of his final six seasons (1996-2001).

He also served as head coach of the 1996 U.S. Olympic team that captured the bronze medal in Atlanta.

Bertman continues to be honored for his remarkable coaching tenure, as he was inducted in June, 2002, into the Louisiana Sports Hall of Fame. He was inducted into the American Baseball Coaches Association Hall of Fame in January, 2003. In 2006, he was one of 10 inaugural inductees into the College Baseball Hall of Fame in Lubbock, Texas.

In a Baseball America poll published in 1999, Bertman was voted the second greatest college baseball coach of the 20th century, trailing only the late Rod Dedeaux of Southern California. Bertman and Dedeaux are the only coaches to win five CWS titles.

He had previously earned recognition as one of the nation's brightest assistant coaches while at the University of Miami (Fla.) for eight seasons (1976-83). Before working at Miami, Bertman was renowned for his coaching excellence. In 11 seasons at Miami Beach High School, he directed the Hi-Tides to a state championship and two runners-up finishes and he was named Florida's Coach of the Year on three occasions.

In 1975, Bertman coached at Miami-Dade Downtown, leaving after one season to join legendary head coach Ron Fraser at Miami. The move was a homecoming of sorts, as Bertman spent his collegiate playing days with the Hurricanes as an outfielder and catcher from 1958-60. He earned his B.A. in health and physical education from Miami in 1961 and received his master's degree from UM in 1964.

Bertman and his wife Sandy are the parents of four daughters - Jan, Jodi, Lisa and Lori. The Bertmans have three grandchildren - Sophie Faith and Isaac Stanley, the children of Emile and Lori Bertman Guirard, and Samuel Aaron, the son of Drew and Lisa Pate.



**Verge Ausberry**

A former LSU football standout, Verge Ausberry joined the LSU Athletics Department administrative staff in August 2001.

Ausberry supervises and is responsible for football scheduling and new projects as well as overseeing the LSU men's basketball team, the equipment staff, the strength and conditioning staff, the Dr. Martin Broussard training room, video department and football game management.

Ausberry, from New Iberia, La., played inside linebacker for the Tigers, lettering in 1986-89. He was the leading tackler on the team in both 1988 and 1989 and was part of two Southeastern Conference championship teams (1986 under Bill Arnsparger and 1988 under Mike Archer), playing on teams that went to four bowl games.

Before joining the LSU athletic administration, he was very closely involved in the athletic program, first serving for almost seven years as a member of LSU's highly regarded Academic Center for Athletes where he worked with many of the student-athletes, primarily dealing with LSU's football squad.

After leaving the Academic Center, he moved in July 1999 to the Tiger Athletic Foundation staff as part of LSU's fund-raising arm prior to joining the department. He was appointed Senior Associate AD in May 2006.

Ausberry received his Bachelor of Science degree in education in May of 1990, his master of education in administration, supervision and certification in child welfare in May of 1992 and his specialist in higher education administration in 2004. He is presently a doctoral candidate in higher education administration at LSU. He is married to the former Cheri Morial of New Orleans and they have two boys, Austin and Jaiden.

Judy Southard, who had a very successful career as both head women's basketball coach and

Director of Athletics, enters her sixth year at LSU having recently been promoted to Senior Associate Athletics Director in May 2006.

Southard came to LSU from Texas Woman's University, where she served as the school's Director of Athletics for nine years.

As LSU's Senior Woman Administrator, Southard's responsibilities include oversight of the highly successful Tiger Olympic Sports program including 17 men's and women's sports. She has direct supervision of Volleyball, Women's Basketball, Softball and Women's Golf as well as responsibilities in monitoring the athletic department's Gender Equity and Diversity Issues Plan.

Southard has served on numerous national committees during her career in athletic administration. She is currently a member of the NCAA Division I Women's Basketball Committee and will serve in the important role of committee chair for the 2006-07 academic year. In 2004 she was named to the SEC Executive Committee and continues to serve in that capacity.

While at Texas Woman's University, Southard initiated a corporate partnership program for the athletic department and was instrumental in the addition of two sports (softball and soccer) to the department's sport offerings. She addition initiated efforts to create the TWU Athletics Hall of Fame during her tenure there.

Prior to her stint at TWU, Southard served as head women's basketball coach at Marshall University in Huntington, W. Va., for 11 years, where she led the Lady Herd to five Southern Conference titles. At Marshall, Southard was named Southern Conference Coach of the Year three times and her career record of 178-130 still stands as a school record for women's basketball victories. Southard also served as Assistant Athletics Director/SWA at Marshall from 1983-88, including a four-month period when she was interim director. She will be recognized this fall as an inductee in the Marshall Athletic Hall of Fame.

Before going to Marshall, Southard spent three years as head coach at Tennessee-Martin and she also served for one season as an assistant coach at Tennessee. As a high school teacher from 1970-77, Southard coached both basketball and tennis, leading her West Florence High School basketball team to the South Carolina 4A state title in 1976.

A native of Columbia, S.C., Southard earned a bachelor's degree in physical education and health from Coker College in 1970 followed by a master's degree in physical education from Tennessee in 1978. She was a 2000 inductee into the Coker College Athletics Hall of Fame.

Herb Vincent was appointed to the position of senior associate athletic director for external affairs in

May of 2006 after serving as associate AD since August of 2002. In addition, he was LSU's sports information director for 12 years from 1988-2000.

In his present position, Vincent manages communications and serves as the primary public relations officer for the LSU Athletics Department and all its entities, including the Tiger Athletic Foundation. He also supervises the sports information office and marketing and promotions office, serves as the primary liaison with LSU Sports Properties and TAF, and serves as the department administrator for the sport of baseball.

Vincent served as the LSU sports information director from July 1988 to July 2000. He was appointed Assistant Athletics Director in November of 1989, and then was elevated to Associate AD/Communications in 1992.

He joined LSU as assistant sports information director in February of 1988 and was promoted to the position of SID in July of that year.

Prior to his return to LSU in 2002, Vincent served as Vice-President for Communications for the College Sports Southeast regional cable network, headquartered in Birmingham.

Vincent received a bachelor's degree in journalism from LSU in 1983. He worked as a student assistant in the sports information office directed by CoSIDA Hall of Famer Paul Manasseh during his undergraduate years.

After graduating from LSU, Vincent spent the 1984 season as assistant public relations director for the United States Football League's New Orleans Breakers. In 1985, he was assistant public relations director for the USFL's Los Angeles Express and was promoted during the season to the public relations staff's top position.

Before joining LSU in 1988, Vincent spent one year as assistant SID at Louisiana-Lafayette and also worked at the Southeastern Conference offices in Birmingham as assistant public relations director in charge of basketball publicity.

Vincent is married to the former Jamey Cavacini of Versailles, Ky, and they have recently become the parents of a baby girl, Kennedy.

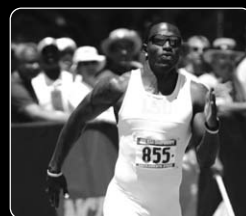

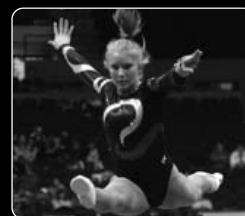

## X Factor

Track sprinter Xavier Carter sprinted his way into the record books in 2006. Carter won six NCAA titles and became the first athlete in NCAA history to ever win both the 100 and 400 meters at the championship meet and was the first male to win four titles in one meet since Jesse Owens in 1936. Carter was named the NCAA Indoor and Outdoor Track Athlete of the Year.

## Augustus Again

Seimone Augustus earned women's basketball's National Player of the Year honors for the second straight season. She received the Wade, the Naismith and the John R. Wooden Awards and was named the Associated Press' Player of the Year. Augustus, a Kodak All-American, also led the nation in scoring averaging 22.7 points per game.

## National Champions

Gymnast April Burkholder earned the individual NCAA title on the balance beam. Track star Xavier Carter was a six-time NCAA champion in 2006, winning the 100m and 400m races at the NCAA Outdoor Championships and the 400m race at the NCAA Indoor and Outdoor Championships. He led the 4x100m relay to an outdoor title and both the indoor and outdoor 4x400m relays to titles. The LSU women's 4x400m relay claimed the NCAA indoor and outdoor titles as well.

## Hoops Sweep

LSU's duo of Glen Davis and Seimone Augustus were named the Southeastern Conference Men's and Women's Players of the Year, respectively. Davis helped lead the men's program to its first SEC title since 2000, while Augustus guided the Lady Tigers to a second straight league title. Tyrus Thomas was crowned the SEC's Freshman of the Year as well.

## Tops in the League

Xavier Carter and Seimone Augustus swept the SEC Male and Female Athlete of the Year honors. Carter, the NCAA Indoor and Outdoor Track Athlete of the Year, was a three-time individual NCAA champion, winning the outdoor 100 and 400 meter races and the 400m indoors. Augustus led the SEC in scoring and help guide the Lady Tigers to a second straight conference title.

## Rare Feat

LSU joined North Carolina as the only schools in NCAA history to have its football team and men's and women's basketball teams finish their seasons ranked in the top 5 in the nation during the same athletic year. LSU's football team finished fifth in the nation after a solid victory over Miami in the Peach Bowl. The men's basketball team finished third in the polls after advancing to the NCAA Final Four, while the women's basketball team competed the season ranked fourth after a third straight trip to the NCAA Final Four.

## Setting the Standard for Intercollegiate Athletics in Softball

In only its 11th year of existence, Southeastern Conference softball has become one of the premier softball conferences in the nation.

The SEC qualified six teams for the 2006 NCAA Tournament - Alabama, Auburn, Florida, Georgia, LSU and Tennessee. Alabama and Tennessee advanced to represent the league in the Women's College World Series for the second straight year. It was Alabama's fourth WCWS appearance and Tennessee's second, making them two of three SEC teams with multiple WCWS appearances since softball became a conference sport in 1997. The Lady Vols went on to finish third in the WCWS for the second consecutive year.

The Crimson Tide claimed the regular season championship and the Western Division title, while Georgia claimed the Eastern Division crown. Tennessee won the SEC Tournament, outlasting LSU, 3-0, to capture its first SEC Tournament Championship.

The SEC also qualified six teams for the 2005 NCAA Tournament - Alabama, Auburn, Florida, Georgia, Mississippi State and Tennessee. Alabama and Tennessee advanced to represent the league in the Women's College World Series.

Leading all conferences in the nation, the SEC qualified a league-best eight teams for the 2004 NCAA Tournament - Alabama, Auburn, Florida, Georgia, LSU, Mississippi State, South Carolina and Tennessee. LSU was the lone SEC school to receive a No. 1 seed, while Georgia hosted its first regional tournament. With its second Women's College World Series appearance, LSU joined Alabama as the only SEC schools to represent the conference in the WCWS twice.

The SEC qualified six teams for the 2003 NCAA Tournament - Alabama, Florida, Georgia, LSU, Mississippi State and South Carolina. Alabama was the lone SEC team to receive a No. 1 seed, and the Crimson Tide, along with Florida, hosted regional tournaments. It was the second time that two SEC schools have hosted regionals. The six teams from the SEC to qualify was second only to the PAC-10 for the most teams from one conference to make the 2003 NCAA Tournament.

The SEC qualified seven teams for the 2002 NCAA Tournament - Alabama, Auburn, Arkansas, Georgia, LSU, Mississippi State and South Carolina. LSU was the lone SEC team to receive a No. 1 seed, while South Carolina hosted a regional for the second time since 1997. The seven teams from the SEC to qualify tied the Pac-10 for the most teams from one conference to make the 2002 NCAA Tournament.

In 2001 the SEC qualified four teams for the NCAA Tournament. LSU, Alabama, South Carolina and Florida all made yet another appearance in the tourney, while Mississippi State barely missed the field. LSU and Alabama both secured No. 1 seeds and hosted a regional championship, marking the first time the SEC had two schools achieve such an honor.

Trailing only the Pac-10, the SEC qualified six teams for the 2000 NCAA Tournament, as LSU, Arkansas, Mississippi State, Alabama, Florida and SEC

Tournament Champion South Carolina all made the field of 48.

The 1999 season was the first in which the conference was eligible for an automatic berth to the NCAA Tournament. That year, four teams earned bids to postseason, the second most by any conference.

The sport came under the auspices of the SEC in 1997. Since then, nine different teams have made appearances in the NCAA Tournament, including nine WCWS berths - four by Alabama in 2000, 2003, 2005 and 2006, two by LSU in 2001 and 2004, two by Tennessee in 2005 and 2006 and one by South Carolina in 1997.

Two different teams have won both the SEC regular season and tournament titles in the same season. South Carolina has won both once (1997) and LSU has won both four times (1999, 2001, 2002 and 2004).

Eight teams (Alabama, Auburn, Florida, Georgia, LSU, Mississippi State, South Carolina and Tennessee) have made Top 25 appearances and five teams (Alabama, Georgia, LSU, South Carolina and Tennessee) have climbed into the Top 10 of the NFCA/USA Today Poll. At least one SEC team has been ranked in the poll each week since the inception of SEC Softball. In 2006 alone, SEC teams made 84 appearances in the poll.

South Carolina is the dean of SEC Softball, with a rich history dating back 30 seasons. The Gamecocks have made 13 NCAA Regional and three WCWS appearances.

Mississippi State played softball for five seasons during the 1980's before resuming the sport when it was added to the SEC. Tennessee added softball in 1996, one year before Alabama, Arkansas, Auburn, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, LSU and Ole Miss began softball programs to give the league 11 representatives (Vanderbilt does not sponsor softball).
