Kristin Schmidt earned Women's College World Series Most Outstanding Player honors at the 2004 WCWS, making her the only player to not win the national championship and earn the honor.

LSU claimed an unprecedented four consecutive league titles from 1999-2002. No other school in SEC history has claimed more than two overall titles.

State-of-the-Art Amenities

The New Tiger Park features 1,289 seats, including 587 chair-back seats, and the capability of accommodating 1,200 more fans on the outfield berm. The stadium also features a first-class clubhouse, including a locker room, team lounge, stadium-style theater for video breakdown, outdoor deck overlooking the playing field, meeting facility, training facility, equipment room, indoor batting cages and umpire locker rooms. All seats in the new Tiger Park are angled toward the playing field, and the facility includes an open concourse with concessions areas and video monitors.

Tiger Park Groundbreaking

The berm/earthwork package was completed in 2006 and the LSU softball program officially broke ground to begin construction on Oct. 9, 2007.

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BUILD IT

The 2009 LSU softball team is up for the challenge as the Tigers are ready to continue to build on the program's strong tradition that has already been established in the form of two Women's College World Series trips, five SEC titles and 10 NCAA Regional appearances.

After having to deal with some injuries during the fall season, head coach Yvette Girouard is confident in her team's depth and that the program's 10 newest faces will blend with the solid nucleus that returns.

"The positive that came in dealing with the injuries over the fall was that we had the opportunity to see some players grow which allowed us to utilize different lineup combinations," Girouard said. "We have some questions heading into the season, but we have a lot of depth. There's a ton of potential for this group of Tigers."

LSU also moves into the state-of-the-art new Tiger Park that features 1,289 seats angled toward the playing field with an outfield berm that can accommodate an additional 1,200 fans. The stadium also features a first-class clubhouse, including a locker room, team lounge, batting cages, theatre for video breakdown and an outdoor deck overlooking the playing field.

"It's exciting to see the new Tiger Park come to fruition," Girouard said. "It may not be the biggest ballpark, but it has a lot of character to it. It's going to be a jewel in the realm of college softball. Everything from a fan and player viewpoint will be located at the new Tiger Park."

THE BATTERY

As is the case for any collegiate softball program, LSU's pitching staff will have the biggest impact on the Tigers this season.

Dani Hofer and Cody Trahan return to anchor the pitching staff. Both fired over 150 innings for the Tigers as Hofer started last season with an impressive 16-2 mark that included four wins over ranked opponents before a wrist injury. She enters 2009 ranked in the top eight of program history in 12 different pitching categories.

"It all starts in the circle," Girouard said. "The bottom line is to succeed there and then there is no question that the team will reach many of its goals. Dani is coming off surgery but has started back strong. We need her to return to her form from the end of the 2007 season where she was All-SEC First Team and SEC Tournament MVP."

Trahan picked up All-SEC Second-Team honors after going 18-6 last season which included winning nine of her 12 league decisions. The nine wins were fourth, while the 2.18 ERA was fifth in the SEC.

"Cody is expected to carry a significant role and we are looking for her to have a banner season," Girouard said. "She will utilize her SEC experience and be a better pitcher this season."

When not in the outfield, Kirsten Shortridge will see action in the circle. The transfer from Baylor earned Big 12 Freshman of the Year honors and was a key member of the Bears 2007 Women's College World Series squad. She posted a 17-6 record and tallied wins over Florida and Texas A&M.

"Kirsten possesses the best drop ball on the staff and has Women's College World Series experience," Girouard said. "She is a phenomenal athlete who will keep the ball in the ballpark."

Casey Faile and Brittany Mack also are in the mix to throw innings for LSU. Faile went 4-1 with a 1.92 ERA as a freshman registering 55 strikeouts in 51 innings, while Mack notched 60 career victories in addition to tossing six no-hitters and three perfect games for Westwood High School in Round Rock, Texas.

"Casey has worked extremely hard on developing new looks and polishing up her game, while Brittany will groom herself into something special down the line for the Tigers," Girouard said. "Consistency is something that we are working with both daily."

Calling the shots for the pitchers will be freshman catcher Morgan Russell, who racked up All-Edmond Co-Player of the Year at Sante Fe High School in Oklahoma. She batted .402 with 22 doubles and 27 RBIs as a senior.

"There's no doubt that Morgan will step into some big shoes [replacing Killian Roessner], but I believe she'll have no problem filling them," associate head coach James DeFeo said. "She has come around quite nicely on offense and worked hard during the fall season developing the all-important pitcher-catcher relationships."

Jessica Mouse will move to catcher to spell Russell when needed.

INFIELD

The Tigers must replace three-fourths of its infield from last season. Jessica Mouse is the lone returning starter at third base. She anchored the hot corner committing only six errors on 160 chances for a .963 fielding percentage.

"Jessica is a special player who loves our system and the rest of the infielders look to as a leader," assistant coach Megan Smith said. "She is one of the top defensive third basemen in the country and leads by example making everybody around her better."

LSU spent a majority of the fall season introducing six new infielders into the system.

"Our freshmen are an eager, hard-working and enthusiastic group that started to come together as a cohesive unit at the end of the fall," Smith said. "The good thing is that they'll have to go out and play. They are confident and ready to contribute right away."

Juliana Santos is the frontrunner at shortstop. She was the Modesto Bee Player of the Year pacing her section with 55 RBIs on a .667 average with 11 home runs at Orestimba High School in California despite battling Crohn's Disease.

"Juliana is a sparkplug who proves everyday why she should be starting," Smith said. "She keeps everyone together on the infield and is a fun player to watch."

Ashley Langoni is slated to start at second base after picking up of pair of All-State selections at Pueblo West High School in Colorado. She powered home the second-most RBIs in 2006 and also could see action at third base and first base.

"Ashley is extremely versatile on defense and has proved to be one of our better hitters during the fall," Smith said. "She is an aggressive infielder who attacks the ball with good fundamentals."

Anissa Young is set at first base after earning a trio of Sunbelt League MVP's at Bloomington High School in California. She may hold the state's career home run record as her total from her freshman season in unavailable and was the San Bernardino Player of the Year.

"Anissa is an excellent receiver who does a good job with errant throws," Smith said. "We're also looking to her to help Jessica out as a vocal leader."

Katie Hamilton, Courtney Hollier and Lauren Capello can step into different positions in the infield when needed.

"Katie is not flashy but a solid player all the way around," Smith said. "Courtney is really smooth and makes plays look effortless, while Lauren is good edition that is eager to work at any position."

OUTFIELD

The Tiger outfield will once again be characterized by speed, power and depth.

Rachel Mitchell headlined LSU as an All-SEC First-Team pick that ranked inside the SEC's Top 10 in batting average (.374), home runs (11), RBIs (51), runs scored (48), total bases (126) and slugging percentage (.665). She will see most of her action in left and center field.

"We're expecting big things from Rachel this season," associate head coach James DeFeo said. "The faces around her in the lineup are new and she is going to have to be the veteran we can count on in clutch situations."

When she isn't in the circle, Kirsten Shortridge will patrol center field. She was first among Big 12 freshmen hitting .340 with 14 stolen bases at Baylor in 2007.

Jazz Jackson looks to return to her NFCA All-South Region and All-SEC Second-Team form where she hit a scorching .377 with a .425 on-base percentage as a freshman in 2007, while Ashley Applegate will see more time after registering 14 starts as a freshman.

"Jazz and Ashley are comfortable at every outfield position," DeFeo said. "It's key for us to have interchangeable parts in the Tiger Patrol outfield because that allows us to give teams different looks with our lineup."

Katie Guillory and Tiffany Shaw will provide depth at the corner outfield positions.

"Katie and Tiffany have done a great job during the fall season of learning the system and getting their footwork down," DeFeo said.

LINEUP

The LSU offense is loaded and geared up for another successful season after ranking in the Top 50 nationally last season in five offensive categories, including runs (5.1), stolen bases (1.6) and home runs (0.9) per game.

"We have some firepower to replace," DeFeo said. "The good news is that we've

brought in players that can not only pick up the slack but add to our balanced line-up. We have a lot of weapons that complement each other well."

Kirsten Shortridge and Jazz Jackson are left-handed slappers that could work as a 1-2 punch at the top of the lineup. Jackson also could see time as a second lead-off hitter at the No. 9 spot along with Ashley Applegate, Katie Guillory and Tiffany Shaw.

"It's so important to have speed at the top and bottom of the order," DeFeo said. "It can really set the tone for the offense. Kirsten is the quintessential lead-off hitter because she possesses both speed and power. Jazz can wreak havoc on the bases already with 37 stolen bases in two seasons. Ashley, Katie and Tiffany have all improved at their slapping during the fall season."

The heart of the order is comprised of Rachel Mitchell and Casey Faile along with quartet of freshmen Ashley Langoni, Morgan Russell, Juliana Santos and Anissa Young.

"Each player in this group has the power in their bat to hit the ball over the berm in left field at the new Tiger Park," DeFeo said. "We're expecting big home run and RBI totals from this group to continue the strong tradition of the Tiger Attack Hitting Corps."

Jessica Mouse has improved on her consistency and gap-to-gap hitting during the fall, while Katie Hamilton, Courtney Hollier and Lauren Capello also possess strong bats that could see time in the batting order.

"It is fun for us as coaches to see how these young players develop and complement each other," DeFeo said. "The challenge is to find out where they best fit in the line-up."

SCHEDULE

LSU has played a challenging schedule in the past and 2009 will be no different as the Tigers have 24 games slated against NCAA Regional teams, including six tilts with a trio of Women's College World Series teams.

The Tigers square off with UAB, Oklahoma and host Hawai'i at the Oceanic Time Warner Cable Paradise Classic (Feb. 5-7) to start the season.

"Our Hawai'i trip is nice but tough where we will have our work cut out for us," Girouard said. "We're throwing these young pups immediately into the fire on the road. Fire is competition and you can only grow and develop team chemistry through actual competition."

LSU christens the new Tiger Park with a mid-week game against McNeese State (Feb. 11) before welcoming national runner-up Texas A&M, Ohio State and Sam Houston State for the Easton Tiger Classic (Feb. 13-15).

Northern Iowa, Texas State and UAB visit Tiger Park the following weekend in the Easton Purple and Gold Challenge (Feb. 20-22).

LSU's toughest weekend of the non-conference schedule comes at NFCA Leadoff Classic (Feb. 27-March 1). The Tigers take on four NCAA Regional squads, including Northwestern, a Super Regional participant.

"Our home tournaments are always challenging and this season is no different," Girouard said. "We also have the challenge of facing off against some stiff competition at the prestigious NFCA Leadoff Classic."

In addition, LSU plays mid-week home-and-home series against McNeese State (Feb. 11 & April 22), Nicholls State (March 4 & April 7), Southeastern Louisiana (Feb. 18 & April 15) and Southern Miss (Feb. 25 & April 1). The Tigers also face off with Baylor (March 11).

LSU embarks into SEC action against Kentucky (March 7 & 8). The Tigers also plays host to Women's College World Series foes Alabama (March 18) and Florida (April 18 & 19) along with Tennessee (April 4 & 5), and South Carolina (April 25 & 26).

LSU hits the road against NCAA Regional squads Georgia (March 14 & 15), Mississippi State (March 21 & 22) and Arkansas (April 10 & 11) in addition to Ole Miss (March 24) and Auburn (May 2 & 3).

"The SEC home schedule for our fans is as good as it gets," Girouard said. "Every series provides a challenge that we look forward to facing."

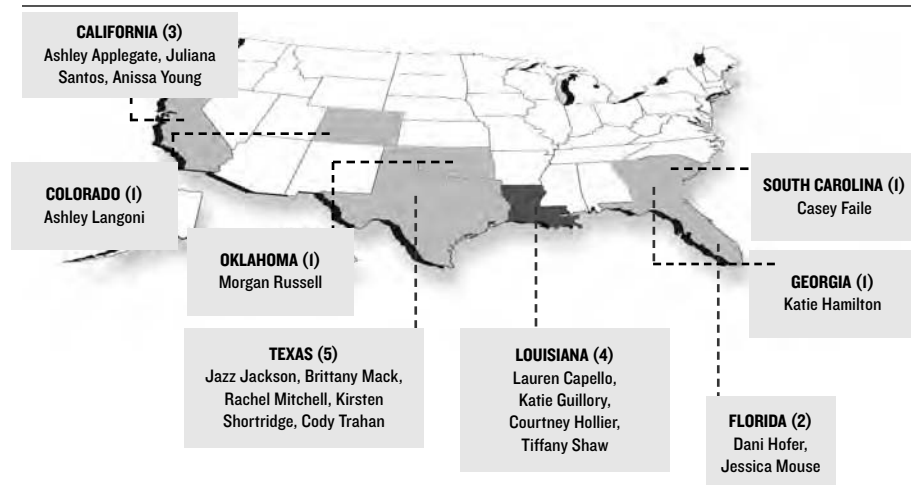

The goal was to improve our standing as a nationally competitive flagship university. Following intense discussions among the LSU Board of Supervisors, campus administrators, faculty, and student leaders, the objectives required to reach this status crystallized, providing the impetus for LSU's National Flagship Agenda.

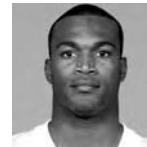

Athletic TRAINING

LSU boasts the largest and most complete athletic training facilities in all of collegiate athletics with both the Football Operations Center and the Broussard Center for Athletic Training in Tiger Stadium. Both are furnished with the latest in technology and equipment. The Football Operations Center training room features a full view of the practice fields, two hot/cold jacuzzis and an underwater treadmill. The Broussard Center includes an on-site x-ray room, an in-house pharmacy, as well as the largest hydrotherapy pool in both collegiate and professional sports and is one of the few collegiate training centers with a full-service pharmacy and a full-service vision center.



Hydrotherapy Treatment

An integral part of rehabbing and developing LSU student-athletes is the operations center's hot/cold jacuzzis and an underwater treadmill in a fully equipped Hydrotherapy room. The Broussard training center (above) boasts the largest hydrotherapy pool in both collegiate and professional sports.

LSU's multi-million dollar athletic training facility is named in honor of Dr. Martin J. Broussard (left), the legendary trainer whose career spanned over 40 years at LSU.

Football's only retired jersey is the No. 20 worn by Billy Cannon, while baseball retired the No. 15 in honor of longtime coach and current athletics director Skip Bertman.

Bob Pettit

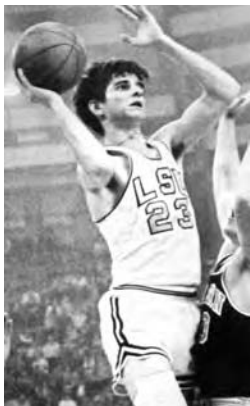
Led LSU to its first NCAA Final Four in 1953 and he later became the first player in NBA history to exceed the 20,000-plus point barrier. Pettit is a member of the NBA Hall of Fame and in 1997 he was named as one of the top 50 players in NBA history.

Billy Cannon

One of the true legends of college football in the South, Cannon was the 1959 Heisman Trophy winner and helped the Tigers to the 1958 national title. Cannon's most memorable performance came in 1959 against Ole Miss when No. 1 LSU trailed No. 3 Ole Miss 3-0 in the fourth quarter. He fielded a punt, broke seven tackles and returned it 89 yards for the 7-3 victory. He went on to a successful 11-year professional career.

Pete Maravich

"Pistol Pete" Maravich still holds the NCAA record for career points with 3,667 and for career scoring average with 44.2 points per game. He was selected the National Player of the Year in 1970 after leading the Tigers to the NIT Final Four. He scored 50+ points an amazing 28 times. He went on to a 10-year professional career and was selected as one of the NBA's 50 greatest players in 1997.

Shaquille O'Neal

Was the first pick in the 1992 NBA Draft. He was named MVP of the league in 2000 and was a three-time NBA Finals MVP after leading the Los Angeles Lakers to three World Championships. At LSU, O'Neal averaged 21.6 points and 13.6 rebounds for his career, and in 1991, he was named the World's Amateur Athlete of the Year as well as SEC Athlete of the Year and National Player of the Year. In 1997, he was named as one of the top 50 players in NBA history.

Skip Bertman

A legend in the college baseball ranks, Bertman created a dynasty at LSU, guiding the Tigers to five national titles in a 10-year stretch from 1991-2000. He also skippered the United States to a bronze medal at the 1996 Olympics in Atlanta and was an assistant on the gold medal-winning U.S. squad in Seoul, Korea in 1988. Bertman retired from coaching following the 2001 season and is currently the LSU athletics director. Bertman was inducted into the College Baseball Hall of Fame in 2006.

Seimone Augustus

Augustus was the two-time NCAA National Player of the Year, receiving the Wade Trophy, the Naismith and the Wooden Awards as a junior and a senior. Augustus helped lead the Lady Tigers to three straight Final Fours and was the NCAA Regional MOP three times. She was the No. 1 draft pick in the 2006 WNBA draft.



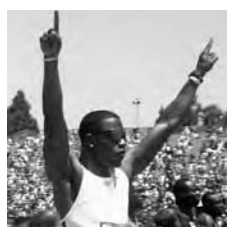
Nicki Arnstad

The 2002 NCAA floor exercise co-champion, Arnstad became the first LSU gymnast to win a national title. She was a two-time All-American and won the NCAA Central Regional Floor and All-Around Championships.



April Burkholder

The 2006 NCAA beam co-national champion. Finished career with 14 All-America honors and four All-SEC selections. In addition, was named the NCAA Central Region Gymnast of the year twice (2004, 2005), the SEC Gymnast of the Year on two occasions (2004 and 2005) and was also the conference's Freshman of the Year in 2003.



Xavier Carter

Carter won a school record-tying seven NCAA titles on the track and earned a total of 10 All-America honors. He became just the second athlete to win four titles at one national meet, joining Jesse Owens. Holds four individual school records and anchored LSU's 4x400-meter relay teams to two school records.



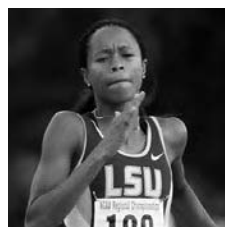
Walter Davis

A two-time Olympian and World Champion, Davis helped LSU to national titles in 2001 and 2002. The SEC Male Athlete of the Year in 2002, he won six NCAA titles and earned a school-record nine All-America honors.



Meredith Duncan

The nation's top collegiate golfer in 2002, Duncan left LSU as the school's best female golfer. She earned first-team All-America honors as a senior in 2002 and won the United States Women's Amateur Championship in 2001.



Muna Lee

The most decorated track and field athlete in school history, Lee won 20 All-America awards and a school record seven national titles while helping the Lady Tigers to five NCAA team championships during her time at LSU. A 2004 Olympian, she finished seventh in the 200 meters at the Summer Games in Athens, Greece.



Ben McDonald

Named the Golden Spikes National Player of the Year in 1989 and he was later the first player chosen in the Major League Baseball Draft by the Baltimore Orioles.



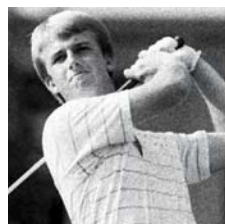
Kristin Schmidt

The 2004 Women's College World Series Most Outstanding Player, Schmidt was a three-time NFCA All-American and one of only two players in conference history to earn back-to-back SEC Tournament Most Outstanding Player honors.



Britni Sneed

One of three four-time first-team All-SEC selections in conference history, Sneed was a two-time SEC Player of the Year and a three-time NFCA All-American, leading the Tigers to their first Women's College World Series appearance in 2001.



David Toms

The two-time SEC Player of the Year, Toms has gone on to a successful career on the PGA Tour. Among his PGA Tour victories was a thrilling win at the PGA Championship in August of 2001.



Todd Walker

Capped his LSU career as the SEC's all-time leader in hits, runs, RBIs, and total bases. Walker, who is a member of the All-Time College World Series Team, led LSU to the national title in 1993.

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Shaquille O'Neal

Four-time NBA champion, including the 2006 title with Miami, Shaquille O'Neal, the 2000 NBA MVP, joined the long list of prominent LSU alumni when he earned his degree in general studies in December 2000.



Seimone Augustus

Received her degree in 2005 after just three years at LSU and while earning NCAA Women's Basketball National Player of the Year honors twice. The first pick of the 2006 WNBA draft by the Minnesota Lynx.

Lod Cook

Graduated from LSU with a bachelor's degree in Mathematics in 1955 and then earned his Master's degree in Petro Engineering in 1955. Cook served as CEO of ARCO for nine years.



Kevin Faulk

Excelled in both the classroom and on the playing field as he graduated in just three years. Faulk is currently a member of the three-time Super Bowl Champion New England Patriots.



Carlos Roberto Flores

The president of Honduras from 1997-2001, Flores helped the nation recover after Hurricane Mitch devastated the country in 1998. Flores is married to the former Mary Carol Flake, also an alumnus of LSU.



Jim Flores

Graduated with two LSU bachelors of science degrees; one in Corporate Finance in 1981 and the second in Petroleum Land Management in 1982. Flores is currently Chairman, President and CEO of Plains Exploration & Production Company

A 2005 inductee into the National Fastpitch Coaches Association Hall of Fame, LSU head coach Yvette Girouard's effect on the Tiger softball program for the last eight seasons has been powerful. A pioneer in the game of collegiate women's softball and one of the greatest coaches in history, she continues to add to her legacy by helping LSU maintain its place among the nation's elite.

Girouard, who was also inducted into the Louisiana Softball Coaches Association Hall of Fame in June 2002, enters the 2009 season among the career leaders in NCAA Division I wins (No. 5) and winning percentage (No. 4) and among the active NCAA Division I coaching leaders in wins (No. 4) and winning percentage (No. 4).

Against Arkansas on April 6, 2005, she became the sixth coach in NCAA history in any division to earn her 1,000th career victory and just the fifth in NCAA Division I history. Averaging more than 40 wins a season in her 28 years as a head coach, she is one of only a handful of coaches who can boast that feat over such an extended and noteworthy career.

With 27-straight winning seasons to her credit, she has guided her athletes to 39 All-America honors, including 11 while at LSU, 16 Academic All-America honors, including 2007 Academic All-American Dee Dee Henderson, and taken teams to 17 NCAA Regionals and five Women's College World Series.

No stranger to Oklahoma City, Girouard became just the third coach in NCAA history to take two programs to the Women's College World Series after leading UL-Lafayette to three World Series appearances in the 1990s and LSU to the WCWS in 2001 and 2004.

In 2004, she led LSU to its second Women's College World Series appearance, where the Tigers advanced to within one game of the championship game. After defeating Michigan in extra innings in its first game, LSU fell to eventual national champion UCLA in game two.

Weather postponed play for a day and forced the Tigers into the unenviable situation of having to win three games in a single day to advance to the national championship game. LSU began the day with a win over Florida State before defeating California to force just the seventh "if necessary" game in WCWS history.

Unfortunately, the Tigers could not get past California a second time and came up seven outs shy of the national championship game. LSU's remarkable run marked the first time since 1984 a school from east of the Mississippi River had advanced to within a game of the national championship. Pitcher Kristin Schmidt was named the WCWS Most Outstanding Player, becoming the first player to earn the honor who was not a member of the national championship team.

In addition, the Tigers were ranked as high as second nationally, matching the highest national ranking for any team coached by Girouard.

In 2001, Girouard led LSU to its first appearance in the WCWS, where the Tigers finished third. Under her guidance, UL-Lafayette (formerly Southwestern Louisiana) advanced to the WCWS three times, with a pair of fifth-place finishes and a third-place finish in 1993.

With an .815 winning percentage in the 1990s, her teams posted the third-best winning percentage in the nation behind only Arizona and UCLA. In eight seasons at LSU, she has posted the second most wins in the nation over that period with the fifth-best winning percentage.

While her influence has been a catalyst for the growth of the game in the state and nationally for many years, her impact in just seven years in Baton Rouge has been no less significant. Becoming the first coach in Southeastern Conference history to lead a team to back-to-back tournament championships, Girouard made a clean sweep of the three major league titles (SEC Western Division, SEC Championship, SEC Tournament Championship) in three of her first four seasons. 2008 was another successful campaign as the Tigers went 44-18 and hosted a NCAA Regional in its final season at the old Tiger Park.

In 2007, she kept LSU among the Top 10 nationally as the Tigers swept their NCAA Regional in Palo Alto and advanced to the NCAA Super Regionals for the second-straight year. The Tigers earned their fourth SEC Tournament championship under Girouard, and took two out of three from both No. 1 Tennessee and No. 2 Alabama during the SEC regular season, earning LSU its fourth Western Division title in the last seven years.

For her achievements, Girouard was honored with her unprecedented 13th Louisiana Coach of the Year honor. Killian Roessner was named the Diamond Sports National Catcher of the Year, and she and Leslie Klein earned NFCA All-America honors, the third All-America honor of Klein's career. Dee Dee Henderson also earned Academic All-America honors, giving LSU an Academic All-American in each of the past three seasons.

Girouard guided LSU back into the Top 10 nationally in 2006 as the Tigers won their NCAA Regional in Baton Rouge and advanced to the NCAA Super Regionals for the first time. In the Super Regional in Tucson, Ariz., LSU earned its first win over a No. 1-ranked team as the Tigers took the second game from eventual national champion Arizona, 3-2. LSU was one of only two teams to hand the Wildcats a loss at home as the Tigers became the first program in history to knock off Arizona in a game at home that could send it to the Women's College World Series.

Girouard was honored with her third SEC Coach of the Year award and named the Louisiana Coach of the Year for a 12th time. Emily Turner and Klein earned NFCA All-America honors, while Stephanie Hill earned her second-straight first-team Academic All-America honor.

In 2005, she became the fifth coach in NCAA Division I history and the sixth coach in NCAA history to earn 1,000 career victories. She guided Hill to first-team Academic All-America honors, the second Academic All-American in school history and the first to earn first-team honors.

After failing to earn the league titles in 2003, LSU came back to sweep all three major titles again in 2004. The Tigers earned the top seed in NCAA Region 3, marking the 14th consecutive trip to the postseason for Girouard and the seventh for LSU. The Tigers swept through NCAA Regional play, defeating Illinois in the championship game to earn their berth in the Women's College World Series.

For their efforts, Girouard, associate head coach James DeFeo and assistant coach Lori Osterberg were named the National Fastpitch Coaches Association South Region Coaching Staff of the Year, marking the seventh regional coach of the year honor in Girouard's career.

In 2003, Girouard earned her 900th career victory and the Tigers advanced through the conference tournament to the championship game for the fifth-consecutive year. LSU earned its sixth-consecutive trip to the NCAA Regionals and finished the year ranked No. 15, the fourth consecutive top 15 ranking for LSU and fifth consecutive top 20-finish for Girouard.

In 2002, Girouard picked up her 100th win at LSU in just 119 games, the fastest Tiger coach to 100 victories in school history. In addition, Girouard led LSU to its then highest regular-season ranking, No. 3 nationally.

After sweeping all three of the SEC Championship titles and advancing to the NCAA Regional finals, she earned her second-straight SEC Coach of the Year honor. She has been named coach of the year by three separate conferences: the Southeastern Conference in 2001 and 2002, the Sun Belt in 2000 and the Southland in 1984, 1985 and 1987. A fourth-consecutive Louisiana Sport Writer's Association Louisiana Coach of the Year honor followed for Girouard.

In her first season at LSU, Girouard was able to accomplish something no other coach had been able to do. She led the Tigers to their first appearance in the WCWS with a victory over her former school, UL-Lafayette, in the NCAA Regional Championship game.

In the WCWS, the Tigers fell to Stanford in the first round, but bounced back to knock off Iowa and defending national champion Oklahoma before losing out to UCLA and finishing in a tie for third place nationally, the then highest final ranking for any LSU squad.

For their accomplishments, she, DeFeo and Osterberg were named the NFCA National Coaching Staff of the Year. She was also named the Coach of the Year by the SEC and the LSWA. To her credit, she was named the National Coach of the Year in 1990 and 1993.

In her two decades as the Lady Cajuns' head coach, she built the team from the ground floor with no scholarships and a \$3,000 budget to one of the nation's perennial powers. She advanced her UL-Lafayette teams to the NCAA Regionals a total of 10 times, hosting on seven of those occasions.

The daughter of the late Rose Mary and Alton Girouard, Yvette was born in Broussard, La., and attended Comeaux High School. She earned a Bachelor of Science degree from USL in 1976 in health and physical education. During her college days, she played on the Lady Cajun volleyball team and was named the school's Female Athlete of the Year in 1976.

Following college, Girouard served as head coach at Lafayette High School where she began the softball program in 1977. In 1980, she coached at her alma mater, Comeaux High School, before beginning the USL softball program in 1981.

Girouard served a three-year term as the South Region Representative on the NCAA All-America Committee and served two, two-year stints on the NCAA South Regional ranking committee. She also served as a member of the nine-person NCAA Softball Rules Committee.

With a list of accomplishments and awards that speak for themselves, Girouard has proven that she can take her teams to the next level and be successful. Her guidance and leadership have carried her through 27 outstanding seasons and hopefully she will continue to build upon her past successes and reach the ultimate goal of bringing LSU its first national championship in softball.

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James DeFeo

Associate Head Coach
Ninth Year

James DeFeo enters his fifth season as the associate head coach at LSU after four years as an assistant coach. It also is his 10th season under head coach Yvette Girouard after one year with her at UL-Lafayette.

Prior to joining Girouard's staff, DeFeo was a graduate assistant at Southern Miss in 1999 when the Golden Eagles became the first, first-year program to advance to the Women's College World Series.

In 2004, he, Girouard and former assistant coach Lori Osterberg were named the National Fastpitch Coaches Association South Region Coaching Staff of the Year after leading the Tigers to their second WCWS appearance. The trio was also named the NFCA National Coaching Staff of the Year in 2001 after they led LSU to its first WCWS berth.

DeFeo's main duties include working with the hitters and the outfielders as well as recruiting, scouting and practice management. In 2008, the Tiger hitters ranked in the top 50 nationally in stolen bases (22nd) home runs (24th), slugging percentage (27th), runs scored (30th) and batting average (40th).

The Tigers matched the program's highest on-base percentage (.380) in addition to drawing the second most walks (203). LSU also belted 57 home runs, the third-most in school history.

Rachel Mitchell, an All-SEC First-Team and Second-Team NFCA All-South Region selection in 2008, ranked inside the SEC's Top 10 in batting average (.374), home runs (11), RBIs (51), runs scored (48), total bases (126) and slugging percentage (.665).

In 2007, LSU recorded the second best slugging percentage (.469). The Tigers also tied for the second most doubles in school history and fourth most in SEC history with 102. The 58 home runs hit, including home runs by 10 difference players, tied for the second most in a single season in school history.

Individually, three-time All-American Leslie Klein ranked in the top 10 in the SEC in virtually every hitting category and ranked in the top 50 in the NCAA in batting average and doubles per game. She finished her career as one of the most prolific hitters in both LSU and SEC history with three Tiger single-season records – doubles, home runs and total bases; and five LSU career records – slugging percentage, doubles, home runs, RBIs and total bases.

Over the previous four seasons, the Tiger hitters ranked in the top 30 in the NCAA in batting average, while posting two top 20 rankings in slugging percentage. LSU ranked in the top 10 nationally in doubles per game in 2006 and 2004, with top 30 rankings in scoring in both 2005 and 2006.

In 2004, LSU broke the school record and led the SEC in home runs, while LSU ranked second in the league in batting average, runs scored, hits, triples and RBIs. Individually, then-freshman Klein ranked in the top 10 in the SEC in every hitting category and ranked in the top 50 in the

NCAA in slugging percentage, runs per game and RBIs per game. The Tigers had at least two players ranked in the top 10 individually in the SEC in every hitting category, including five of the top 10 individuals ranked in total bases.

In 2002, former Tiger All-American Trena Peel led the nation in triples, while breaking the LSU and SEC single-season records. With 14 triples, she was just two shy of the NCAA record. In his first season at LSU the Tigers were second in the SEC and 12th nationally with a .293 team batting average. LSU also led the league in scoring and finished ranked 16th nationally with more than five runs per game.

At UL-Lafayette, DeFeo's team hit .310 and finished the season with a No. 22 national ranking and in the top 10 in hitting and scoring. The 1999 Southern Miss team finished the season ranked second nationally in batting and 10th in scoring. DeFeo was instrumental in helping to revive the Golden Eagle team after a six-year hiatus.

For 11 years, he has served as sole proprietor and instructor of the All-American Softball Clinics in New Jersey, New York, Florida, Pennsylvania and Mississippi. DeFeo has coaching experience at nearly every level of fastpitch softball, including Under-12, Under-16, 18 and Under and Women's Major. DeFeo also is a member of the National Fastpitch Coaches Association.

A native of New Jersey, DeFeo graduated from Rutgers University in 1996 with a bachelor's degree in sport management. He received his master's in sports administration from Southern Miss in 1999. His sister, Stephanie DeFeo, was a three-time All-American under Girouard at UL-Lafayette and is a current assistant coach at Ball State.

In 2000, DeFeo was married to the former Samantha Rock of Orlando, Fla. They have two daughters, Victoria, 6, and Zoe, 4, and son, Zachary, 2.

Assistant Coach
Third Year

Megan Smith enters her third season coaching the infielders in the LSU softball program after spending one year as the head coach at Western Carolina, where she served for the inaugural 2006 season.

In her first two years as an assistant with the Tigers, Smith guided the LSU infield to its first and third best finishes in program history, including a .974 mark in 2008. The .974 also ranked 13th in the NCAA.

Overcoming injuries that decimated the infield, she was forced to shift players to unfamiliar positions and have several players learn new positions during the 2007 season.

A broken finger by third baseman Tayl'r Hollis forced her to miss 15 games and put Erika Sluss at the hot corner for the first time in her career. Shannon Stein also broke her finger at second base, which forced Vanessa Soto to shift from first to second and Kristen Hobbs to move from behind the plate to first for the first time in her career. Despite these difficulties, Tiger infielders committed only 35 errors the entire season, one of the best seasons in the field in school history.

As the head coach for the Catamounts in 2006, she guided the first-year program to their first Southern Conference title, compiling a 41-20 record, including a 16-4 mark in league play. For her success, she was named the SoCon Coach of the Year.

Her team posted 81 home runs, which ranked third nationally, while WCU ranked 12th in the NCAA in slugging percentage, 19th in scoring, 38th in win-loss percentage and 50th in batting average. Additionally, three players ranked nationally statistically and two were named to the NFCA All-Southeastern Region team.

Hired in July 2004, Smith built the Western Carolina program from the ground up, spending a year and a half to build the program, including the hiring of staff and the recruitment of players, while supervising the construction of a state-of-the-art softball facility.

She was hired to head the Catamount program from the University of North Carolina, where she had also been a player. As an assistant coach for Donna Papa, she helped the Tar Heels with recruiting, fundraising, and oversaw the academic progress of student-athletes, while participating in practice planning and game management.

In 2004, she helped guide the North Carolina program to a 46-24 record, including a second place finish in the Atlantic Coast Conference, while earning an NCAA Regional bid. In addition, she directed the Carolina Softball Camps, overseeing all aspects of the camps.

Prior to her stay at her alma mater, Smith was an assistant coach at Charlotte for the 2002 season. She worked with the infielders, pitchers and served as the hitting coach. The assistant also organized all recruiting efforts for head coach Aimee DeVoss.

For two seasons, Smith served as the head coach at Young Harris College in Georgia from 2000-2001. While there, she guided her program to a 79-41 record. Without an assistant coach, she oversaw all aspects of the team, from practice to strength training to academics to fundraising.

While at Young Harris, she finished second in the regional championships twice and was one game away from the national tournament in 2001. Her team broke nearly every school record, including wins in as season with 45. In addition, in 2002, her squad ranked nationally in batting average and eight players were named to the all-regional team.

During her collegiate career at North Carolina, Smith earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in exercise and sport science and recreation administration. Playing third base primarily, she served as captain during her senior season and broke the school record for RBIs in a game and was named the Defensive Player of the Year in 1999.

Also an exceptional student, the Walkertown, N.C., native was named to the All-Atlantic Coast Conference honor roll for three years and made the Dean's List twice. In 2000, she earned her Master's of Science degree in human performance and sports studies with a concentration in sports management from the University of Tennessee.

On June 19, 2004, she married Paul Buske, and the pair welcomed their first child, Cooper Smith Buske, on Aug. 6, 2007.

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Adam Roorbach

Director of Softball Operations

Adam Roorbach enters his second season with the LSU softball program as the Director of Softball Operations, after serving as an assistant coach at Houston for the 2007 season.

No stranger to the softball community, he has spent three years as an assistant softball coach at the Division I level after spending four seasons as a head coach at the NAIA and junior college levels. Although new to the LSU program, Roorbach already has ties to the Tiger coaching staff after working with current assistant coach Megan Smith for one season at Western Carolina in 2006.

As an assistant coach with the Cougars last season, he helped the program to its Conference USA Regular Season and Tournament championship in school history, advancing to the NCAA Tournament for the first time since 2004. After knocking off UL-Lafayette and Texas A&M, Houston advanced to the final day of competition at the College Station Regional before falling twice to Aggies to end its season with a school record 44 wins.

Prior to his one-year stint at Houston, Roorbach was an assistant coach at Western Carolina under Smith, who was the Catamounts' head coach. In its inaugural season in 2006, Western Carolina posted a 41-20 record and won the Southern Conference Championship. The Catamounts also ranked third nationally with 81 home runs and 12th in the NCAA with a .476 slugging percentage. Three WCU players were ranked nationally statistically and two were named to the NFCA All-Southeastern Region team.

In 2005, Roorbach served as an assistant coach at Nicholls State. Working primarily with the Lady Colonel hitters and outfielders, Nicholls set a school record with 31 home runs and improved its team batting average by 29 points over the previous season.

Roorbach moved to the Division I level at Nicholls after serving for three seasons as the head coach at NAIA affiliate Bethel College in Mishawaka, Ind. From 2002-2004, he compiled a 102-56 record and won three consecutive Mid-Central Conference Championships and qualified for the NAIA Regional and National Christian College Athletic Association (NCCAA) National Tournaments all three years.

Earning 2003 Mid-Central Conference Coach of the Year honors, Roorbach guided 14 Pilot players to All-Mid-Central Conference awards. Equally as impressive, all three of his teams were awarded the prestigious NFCA Top 10 Academic Team Award and 17 of his players were named NFCA Academic All-Americans.

Prior to arriving at Bethel, Roorbach spent one season as the head coach at Andrew College in Cuthbert, Ga. In his only season, he guided the Tigers to a 14-18 record, a 13-win improvement over the previous years' 1-32 mark. In addition, he faced Smith on the field for the first time as Andrew College took on Young Harris College, where Smith was the head coach.

Roorbach graduated from Indiana Wesleyan University in 1999 with a double major in business administration and sports management, he went on to earn his master's degree in physical education from Eastern Illinois in 2000. While attending Indiana Wesleyan, he served as an assistant softball coach and also the school's sports information director.



Kristen Hobbs

Student Assistant Coach

After an outstanding four-year career for the Tigers, Kristen Hobbs returns for her second season to the LSU softball program as a student assistant coach for the 2008 season.

A native of Royal Palm Beach, Fla., Hobbs was awarded the Brad Davis SEC Community Service Scholarship last year for her work with the CHAMPS/Life Skills program and volunteering in the area. She was also a three-time member of the SEC Academic Honor Roll and the SEC Good Works Team.

Hobbs had the best season of her career as a senior, being named to the NCAA Tempe Super Regional All-Tournament team and being selected the Most Valuable Player of the Easton Tiger Classic. Overcoming Tommy John surgery that limited her to just seven games and no starts during the 2006 season, she closed out her career on a high note playing behind the plate, and also filling in at first base and as designated player.

A career .232 hitter, she hit .283 as a senior with a career-high eight home runs, after having hit only two in her previous three seasons at LSU. One of three Tiger softball team captains, she has also surpassed her season-bests with 32 hits, 20 runs scored and 22 RBIs. Hobbs is also the LSU career fielding percentage record holder, having committed just five errors in over 600 chances for a .992 mark in four years.

In May 2007, she earned her bachelor's degree from LSU in mass communications. Hobbs is currently working towards her master's degree in sports management.



Ana Gross

Associate Athletics Trainer

Ana Gross begins her third season as the associate athletics trainer for the LSU softball program. She joined the Tigers' staff after spending two years at Southern Miss. In addition to her duties as the athletics trainer for softball, she works to coordinate the drug prevention program for LSU's student-athletes.

While at Southern Miss, Gross spent two years working for the baseball team. She also worked with the cross country, soccer and football teams. In January 2006, she was promoted to Assistant Athletic Trainer.

A New Orleans native, Gross graduated from LSU with a bachelor's degree in athletic training. As an undergraduate for the Tigers, she worked with LSU's 2003 National Champion football team, nationally ranked women's basketball team, and men's tennis team.

Gross earned her master's degree from Southern Miss in sports administration in May 2006. The oldest of Greg and Maria Gross' five children, she is certified by the National Athletic Trainers Association.

Moore, a native of Enon, La., also coordinates the strength and conditioning of LSU women's basketball team and assists with the LSU Football.

Moore came to LSU after stints at both Georgia Tech and Elon as an assistant strength & conditioning coach. She spent two years at Georgia Tech working with Yellowjackets' softball and women's tennis programs after a brief stint working with Elon's baseball, men's and women's soccer, women's basketball and track teams.

A graduate of Southern Miss, Moore spent two years working with the football, baseball, men's and women's basketball, soccer, tennis, softball and volleyball programs at USM while working toward her master's degree.

Moore's expertise in strength and conditioning has led her to be published in two publications, including The Journal of Strength and Conditioning Research and Medicine & Science in Sports & Exercise. She also authored an online presentation for the Atlantic Coast Conference's website about Georgia Tech's off-season softball training.

Dunaway comes to LSU from Rice where he promoted the Owl women's basketball and tennis teams in addition to sharing secondary football duties. He also was the analyst for the women's basketball broadcast team where Valeriya Berezhyńska was a third round pick of the WNBA's Detroit Shock. Bruno Rosa also tallied a NCAA Tennis All-America selection as the Owls finished No. 24 nationally in 2008.

Prior to Rice, Dunaway spent two years across town as a sports information assistant at the University of Houston. There he was the primary contact for the Cougar softball, volleyball and tennis teams. The 2007 Cougar softball team won the Conference USA championship en route to a NCAA Regional berth as Angel Shamblin and Jessica Valis swept C-USA Pitcher and Player of the Year awards. 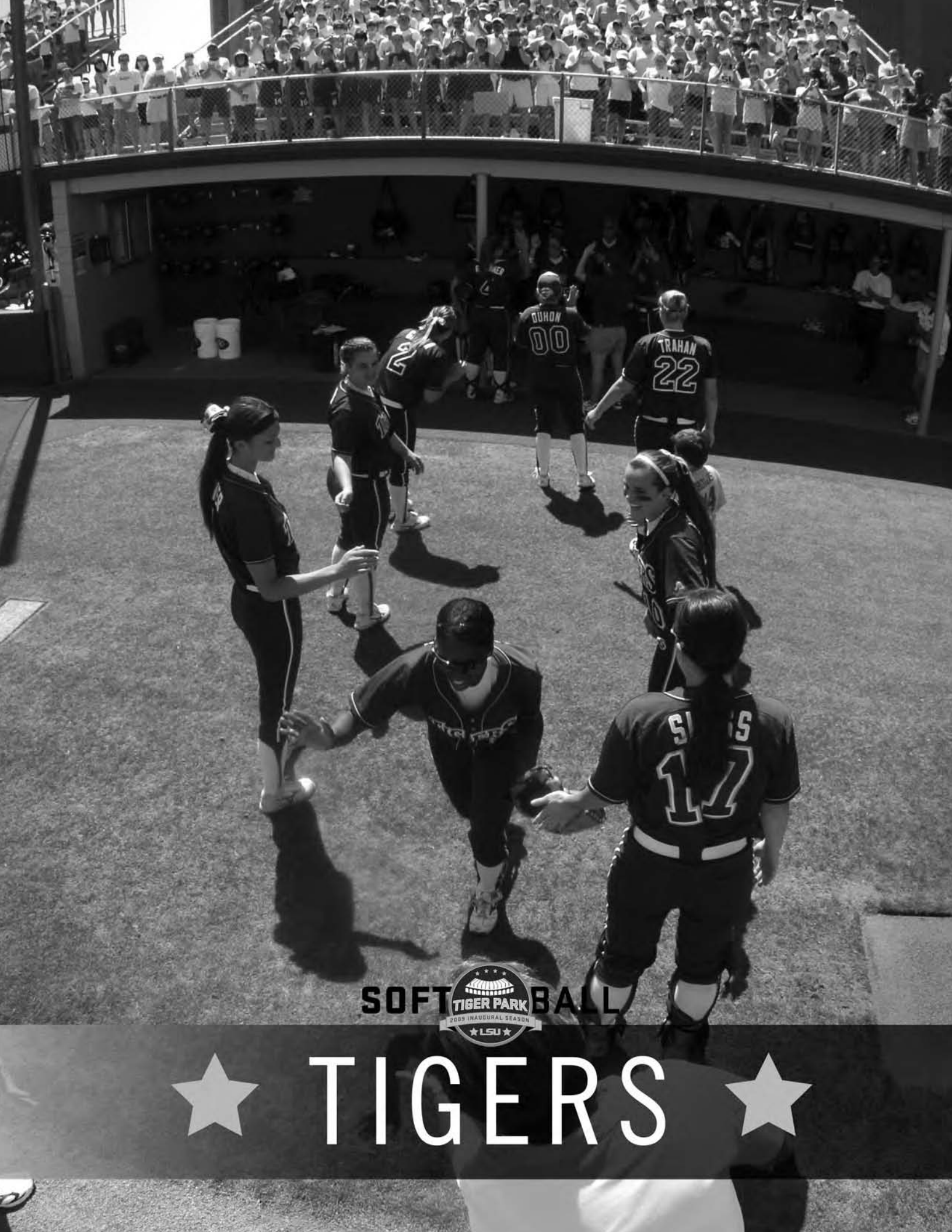

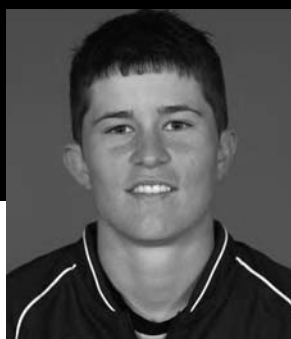

LSU RACKS UP 10TH NCAA REGIONAL BID

For the 10th time in 12 seasons, the Tigers earned a bid to the NCAA Tournament. LSU has tallied a 33-20 all-time mark, the seventh best all-time winning percentage in tournament play.

The Tigers are one of three teams in the SEC with multiple Women's College World Series appearances (Alabama and Tennessee) and one of two with a winning WCWS record (Tennessee).

LSU advanced through the NCAA Regionals to the WCWS on two occasions (2001 & 2004), finishing seven outs from the national championship game in 2004. In 2007, the Tigers swept through the NCAA Regionals to earn a bid to the NCAA Super Regionals before falling to Arizona State.

DUO ON SEC ALL-TOURNAMENT TEAM

Seniors **Quinlan Duhon** and **Shannon Stein** were named to the SEC All-Tournament Team. **Duhon** led the team with a .571 average for the tournament, the highest average by any player in the tournament. In addition, she recorded a double, a home run and two RBIs while scoring once for a 1.143 slugging percentage. It marked the first SEC All-Tournament honor of her career. **Stein** was second on the team with a .500 average, including a double, a home run, two RBIs and two runs scored for a 1.167 slugging percentage. She recorded the first inside the park home run at LSU in over four years with the roundtripper against Auburn.

THREE NAMED TO ALL-SEC TEAMS

Outfielder **Rachel Mitchell** was named to the 2008 All-SEC first team, while outfielder **Quinlan Duhon** and pitcher **Cody Trahan** were named to the second team. It marked the second All-SEC honor for **Mitchell**, who was named to the All-Freshman team last season. It is the first All-SEC honor for both **Duhon** and **Trahan**. Ranked in the top 10 in the SEC in 10 categories including batting average, RBIs and home runs in league play, **Mitchell** was an easy selection to the first team. Stepping up her play in her final season, **Duhon** ranks in the top 10 in the SEC in slugging percentage and home runs and recorded three RBIs on a walk-off home run to post a run-rule win over Auburn. With the loss of **Dani Hofer** to injury, **Trahan** stepped in to the No. 1 role and has gone 6-0 since that time, picking up three wins against Arkansas, two against South Carolina and one over nationally ranked Tennessee.

HENDERSON REACHES 100 STEALS

Senior **Dee Dee Henderson** became only the second player in LSU history and sixth in SEC history to record 100 stolen bases with a swipe of second in the sixth inning of the first game against Auburn on March 21. Against UL-Monroe, **Henderson** became just the second player in LSU history to record 30 stolen bases in a single season, joining Dee Douglas, who accomplished the feat four times. Despite starting only 36 games entering the 2008 season, **Henderson** has recorded over 20 steals in each of her four seasons.

A ROSE BY ANY OTHER NAME

In honor of LSU head coach Yvette Girouard's mother Rose Mary Girouard, who passed away in September 2007, the team will wear a rose decal on their batting helmets throughout the season. An avid supporter of her daughter for almost 30 years, Mama G was a fixture at softball games and she will be missed by fans everywhere.



MORE THAN A DECADE OF DOMINANCE

In its 12th season of softball in the modern era, LSU has achieved an unrivaled tradition of success. The Tigers have won more SEC Championships than all other conference schools combined, while remaining one of only two schools in league history to record the triple crown (Division, Overall and Tournament Titles) in the same season, having accomplished the feat four times.

LSU POSTS SECOND-MOST WINS

In just its 12th year since reinstatement in 1997, LSU has proven to be among the elite in the nation. The Tigers have averaged 52.0 wins per year in its previous 12 years, which is by far the best in the SEC in that span.

In the nation, LSU is second to only Arizona, which has averaged 55.0 wins a season over the past 12 years. The Tigers also are third in winning percentage behind only Arizona and UCLA. The Tigers rank ahead of past national champions Michigan, Oklahoma, California and Fresno State.

LSU DOMINATES SEC SERIES

LSU has now competed in 118 series against conference foes and has only lost 18. The Tigers have swept 33 three-game series since the SEC adopted the three-game format in 2001 and taken 22 more series wins in that time period. In 2008, LSU is 2-0 in mid-week doubleheader series and 4-0 since the SEC changed to a 28-game schedule.

Prior to 2001, the league played four-game series against divisional opponents and doubleheaders against cross divisional rivals. LSU swept nine four-game series and 15 doubleheaders while taking six series, 3-1. LSU now has an SEC series record of 89-18-11 (.801).

MEMORABLE FIRSTS

Freshman **Jessica Mouse**'s first career at-bat was something she will likely not forget. In the top of the first inning against St. John's in the season opener, **Mouse** came up to the plate for the first time in her collegiate career. She drilled the first pitch she saw deep over the center field fence for her first collegiate home run.

Mouse nearly duplicated the feat in her first career at-bat of SEC play. On the sixth pitch of the at-bat against Georgia, she slammed the ball over the center field fence for her third career home run.

Freshman **Casey Faile**'s first career home run was the only run scored in a 1-0 win over South Alabama in the Easton Purple & Gold Challenge. With the win, LSU advanced to the championship game against Tulsa, where the Tigers defeated the Golden Hurricane for the tournament title.

TIGERS SCORE EARLY...

In 62 games, the Tigers have outscored their opponents, 49-22 (+27), in the first inning. By the end of the second inning, the Tigers hold a commanding 81-39 (+42) scoring margin. LSU is 35-3 when leading after the fourth inning. The only losses came against then No. 2 Northwestern, at No. 2 Alabama and at No. 9 Tennessee.

In games when the Tigers have scored first, LSU is 34-5 (.889). In games where the opponent scores first, the Tigers are only 10-13 (.435). The last time LSU scored first in a game and lost was on May 9, 2008, when LSU fell to No. 3 Alabama, 7-4, in the SEC Tournament at Tiger Park.

...AND TIGERS SCORE OFTEN

This season, the Tigers have scored 320 runs in 62 games for a 5.17 runs per game average, just under the school record of 5.58 set in 2004. On six occasions this season, LSU has broken into double figures in runs.

CAUGHT IN THE ACT

In 2008, LSU tied for second in the SEC with 16 runners caught stealing. The Tigers have allowed only 34 stolen bases in 50 attempts. Senior **Killian Roessner** is tied for second in the conference with 15 runners caught stealing.

Roessner has allowed just 33 stolen bases, including six with runners on the corners and second base conceded, for a .651 mark.

DROPPING BOMBS

In 2008, LSU averaged nearly a home run a game. The Tigers belted 57 home runs in 62 games, led by **Quinlan Duhon** and **Rachel Mitchell** with 11 home runs each. **Killian Roessner** added 10 homer, while **Erika Sluss** tallied eight.

LSU hit the third most home runs in a single season in school history and finished only three behind the school record of 60 in 2004.

Conversely, the Tigers allowed 43 home runs, the most home runs allowed by an LSU team in school history.

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Farewell to Tiger Park

A school record 2,326 fans watched as LSU knocked off No. 1 Tennessee as part of a series win over the top-ranked Lady Volunteers in 2007.

At the end of the 2008 season, the LSU softball program said goodbye to the old Tiger Park.

Built in 1996, the 1,000-seat facility was the softball team's home since its inception in 1997. The old Tiger Park quickly became known as one of the toughest places in the nation for visitors to play.

In 12 seasons, the old Tiger Park played hosted to the 2008 SEC Tournament in addition to five NCAA Regionals.

For the program's history, LSU was 14-6 (.700) all-time in postseason games and won nine of its last 11 NCAA Regional games in the old Tiger Park.

The old Tiger Park was home to some amazing feats.

On May 20, 2000, LSU and Southern Miss battled out 12 scoreless innings in a NCAA Regional game before the Tigers plated the game-winner on a Stephanie Hastings sacrifice fly in the 13th.

In 2001, the Tigers advanced through the NCAA Regional tournament dismissing Cornell, Penn State, Arizona State and UL-Lafayette securing its first berth in the Women's College World Series.

The 2006 squad posted a remarkable 34-3 (.919) mark in the old Tiger Park as LSU jumped out to a program-best 14-0 start.

In 2007, the Tigers played host to an ESPN national television audience and No. 1 Tennessee as a school record 2,326 fans packed the Old Tiger Park. LSU took the final two games of the series from the top-ranked Volunteers.

In its final season, LSU set a program attendance record for the second consecutive season as 919 fans watched the Tigers win 30 home games for the fifth time in program history.

Over the years, the old Tiger Park drew over 160,000 fans. LSU owned an astounding 338-51 (.873) record at home, including a 140-34 (.805) Southeastern Conference mark.

Dr. John V. Lombardi

President, Louisiana State University System



Dr. John V. Lombardi is the fifth individual to serve as the President of the Louisiana State University System. As its Chief Executive Officer, Dr. Lombardi oversees 11 institutions, including five academic campuses, as well as 10 public hospitals located throughout the state. He is also a Professor of History at Louisiana State University and Agricultural and Mechanical College.

Dr. Lombardi was born in Los Angeles, California and attended Pomona College where he earned his bachelor's degree. He received his M.A. and Ph.D. degrees in history from Columbia University. He joined the faculty in the Department of History at Indiana University, where he later served as Dean of International Programs and Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences. In 1987, he became Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs at the Johns Hopkins University. From 1990-1999, Dr. Lombardi was President of the University of Florida. Prior to his appointment as President of the LSU System, he served as Chancellor of the University of Massachusetts Amherst.

He is a Latin American historian, with a special interest in Venezuela. Dr. Lombardi is also one of the country's foremost authorities in higher education, serving as Co-Editor of The Top American Research Universities. He is the author of numerous professional publications, and along with his wife, Cathryn, co-authored a teaching atlas on Latin American History. He has taught courses in history, intercollegiate sports, and university management.

Dr. Michael V. Martin

Chancellor, LSU



Dr. Michael V. Martin was approved as the eighth chancellor of LSU by the Board of Supervisors on June 5, 2008. Dr. Martin, formerly the president of New Mexico State University, had served at NMSU since 2004.

In his time at NMSU he was praised for his reorganization of the university's athletic department and physical plant, as well as his fundraising prowess. A 1969 graduate of Mankato State College, Dr. Martin received a Ph.D. in applied economics from the University of Minnesota in 1977 and has since worked in both academic and administrative capacities at universities such as Minnesota, Oregon State University and the University of Florida.

An agricultural economist, Dr. Martin is considered an expert on land-grant universities.

Dr. Martin became president of New Mexico State University on July 1, 2004. An academic leader dedicated to the land-grant mission of teaching, research and extension service, he was awarded the 2008 Distinguished Leadership Award by Leadership New Mexico. Dr. Martin was recognized as a strong voice for education and the agriculture industry in New Mexico. The Leadership New Mexico Distinguished Leadership Award recognizes an individual who has used his/her leadership abilities to improve the quality of life for New Mexico citizens and future generations.

Dr. Martin also was named the recipient of the Justin Smith Morrill Memorial Award in 2007. This national award, named after the author of the bill creating land-grant universities, honors and recognizes outstanding service on behalf of the land-grant mission. Only six individuals have been designated to receive this award since it was first given in 1980.

Dr. Martin established at NMSU the One University concept and called for a five-year plan titled "Living the Vision" to take the university to "the next level." He laid the groundwork for university wide extension and created the J. Paul Taylor Social Justice Symposium.

During his tenure at NMSU, the first capital campaign was established with a goal of raising \$150 million by 2010. The campaign met its goal in the first half of the seven-year fundraising plan. Dr. Martin also oversaw the establishment of a system of research clusters that revolve around five areas in which NMSU scientists and researchers have expertise: 21st century aerospace, information sciences, bioscience, southwest border issues, and natural resources.

Dr. Martin was a recognized leader in New Mexico, being named a powerbroker by the New Mexico Business Weekly in 2006. He continues to be active as a scholar and has written numerous book chapters and articles for academic journals, trade publications and the popular press. He recently has published pieces for The Chronicle of Higher Education and University Business. Named the Outstanding Alumnus of Minnesota State University Mankato in 2006, Dr. Martin

also received the NMSU Social Justice Award in 2005.

Before arriving at NMSU, he served for six years as vice president for agriculture and natural resources at the University of Florida, leading the university's Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences with more than 3,000 employees statewide. He was elevated to senior vice president of the University of Florida shortly before being selected as NMSU's president.

Previously, he was vice president for agricultural policy and the dean of the College of Agricultural, Food and Environmental Sciences at the University of Minnesota. He began his academic career at Oregon State University as a faculty member in the Department of Agricultural and Resource Economics.

A native of Crosby, Minn., Dr. Martin completed a bachelor's degree in business and economics and a master's degree in economics at Mankato State College (Minnesota State University) in Minnesota. He received his Ph.D. in applied economics from the University of Minnesota in 1977. His areas of specialization are marketing, prices, international trade, public policy, transportation and business logistics.

Some of his philosophy is summed up in the following quote: "It is the tradition of land-grant universities to be non-traditional," written as part of a 2001 article titled "The Land-Grant University in the 21st Century," published in the Journal of Agricultural and Applied Economics. He traced the history of the land-grant movement from the mid-1800s and concluded that "the fundamental land-grant principles of accessibility, practical as well as classical education, research and discovery in the public interest, and connectedness to all the people remain powerful and profound."

He has been active in professional and community service organizations, including the Farm Foundation's Bennett Agricultural Round Table, the National Agricultural Biotechnology Council and the Florida Agricultural Resource Mobilization Foundation. He is a member of the American Economic Association, the American Agricultural Economics Association, the International Association of Agricultural Economics, the International Agricultural Trade Research Consortium, the Sigma Xi Scientific Research Society and the Economic History Association.

Dr. Martin and his wife Jan have two children, both adopted from South Korea. Amanda, a graduate of the University of Wisconsin-Eau Claire, is a graphic artist in Saint Paul, Minn. Sam, with a bachelor's degree from the University of Minnesota and a master's from Sarah Lawrence College, is a genetics counselor at Beth Israel Hospital in New York City.



Dydia DeLyser

Faculty Athletics Representative

Dydia DeLyser, an associate professor in the Department of Geography and Anthropology, serves in her second year as LSU's Faculty Athletics Representative.

DeLyser, a native of Santa Monica, Calif., earned her bachelor's degree in 1992 from UCLA, and her master's and doctoral degrees from Syracuse University (in 1996 and 1998).

DeLyser arrived at LSU in August 1998 as an Instructor before becoming an assistant professor one year later. She was promoted to associate professor with tenure in August 2005.

DeLyser is a cultural-historical geographer. Her research has been both ethnographic and historical, and most of it questions how different built landscapes can help make the past meaningful in the present.

Much of her published research has focused on two different studies. One was a many-year ethnographic study of a ghost town in California (Bodie State Historic Park) where she examined how images and ideas about the American mythic West became meaningful

to the tourists who visited the town. The second was an historical study that examined a 19th century novel (Ramona) and how it changed the way people understood (and still understand) southern California's past.

Her current research concerns early women aviators and how they used their practices of flying to advance feminism in the post-suffrage era.

DeLyser teaches graduate courses in cultural geography, qualitative research, and academic and professional writing. She has also taught undergraduate courses in cultural, and urban geography, and an introductory world-regional geography course.

DeLyser is a first-generation American -- her parents were Dutch immigrants and English is her second language. She also has language abilities in Russian and Spanish.

DeLyser's hobbies include driving/riding antique cars and motorcycles. She is also a licensed pilot and co-owns a Citabria, which is a two-place aerobatic airplane.



Joe Alleva

LSU Director of Athletics



Joe Alleva officially became the Director of Athletics at LSU on July 1, 2008, after spending the last ten years in the same position at the prestigious Duke University. Under Alleva's direction, the Duke athletic department experienced unprecedented growth and success.

"Joe Alleva brings a wealth of experience and accomplishment to LSU," said President John Lombardi. "I'm confident we've found a new leader for LSU athletics who exemplifies the vision and integrity needed to lead our sports programs to new heights, a champion of student athletes who believes in the highest standards of competition both on the field and in the classroom."

At LSU, Alleva is responsible for the administration and direction of the Tiger athletic program, which has a current annual budget of approximately \$70 million, includes 20 teams and more than 400 student-athletes.

At Duke, Alleva oversaw more than 190 staff members, a \$50 million budget, 26 sports and over 600 student-athletes. Duke athletics flourished under Alleva's direction.

Alleva, 55, has built his professional career on service to student-athletes and the commitment to individual development in athletics, academics and community service. Alleva is well-respected for sustaining high standards of excellence and integrity in the athletics program, the quality of coaches he has hired, and the high level of success that was achieved across athletic programs at Duke under his leadership.

Alleva's tenure as AD at Duke propelled the university into the ranks of America's top all-around collegiate programs. The Blue Devils consistently finished high in the annual Directors' Cup standings, ranking as high as fifth in 2005. Prior to 1998-99, Alleva's first full year as director of athletics, Duke had never placed higher than 21st in the Directors' Cup standings. Since then, Duke has enjoyed seven top 20 finishes, including five in succession (2004-08).

In the 2006 National Collegiate Scouting Association Power Rankings, that combine a school's Directors' Cup finish, its athletic graduation rates and its academic ranking in U.S. News and World Report, Duke was the top-ranked Division I school in the nation. Duke also finished first in this listing in 2005 and second in 2004.

Alleva's outstanding list of accomplishments includes Duke winning more ACC and NCAA championships than in any other 10-year period in school history. Six Duke teams won national championships under Alleva's leadership and 46 Blue Devil teams recorded ACC championships, the second-highest total among ACC schools since 1997-98.

Under Alleva's commitment to education, Duke's graduation rates continued to rank among the best in the nation. Duke regularly led the ACC in Academic Honor Roll honorees as Alleva increased the financial commitment to academic support by ten-fold during his tenure as AD.

While continuing to excel in competition and in the classroom, Alleva instituted a number of innovative community service programs for Duke student-athletes to benefit the community. Duke student-athletes regularly volunteered nearly 3,000 hours in community outreach.

Fundraising under Alleva's guidance reached extensive heights during his career at Duke. Alleva and his fundraising team generated more than \$173 million in gifts and funded more than \$85 million in new facilities or renovations. Annual giving to the Iron Dukes increased 50 percent since the year 2000.

New facilities built under Alleva's supervision include the Michael W. Krzyzewski Center Dedicated to Athletic and Academic Excellence, Yoh Football Center, Sheffield Tennis Center, Schwartz-Butters Athletic Center, Ambler Tennis Stadium, Karcher-Ingram Golf Center, Rod Myers Teaching Center, the

Skandalaris Fieldhouse at Koskinen Stadium and the fieldhouse at Williams Field. Facility upgrades were made to Cameron Indoor Stadium, Wallace Wade Stadium, Jack Coombs Stadium, Koskinen Stadium, Williams Field, Murray Athletic Building, and Brooks Field at the football practice facility.

Alleva is active on the national collegiate athletics scene, having served on the Football Bowl Certification Committee. He sat on several Atlantic Coast Conference committees and served on the NCAA Division I Championships/Competition Cabinet.

Alleva majored in Finance at Lehigh University and received his bachelor's degree in 1975. While at Lehigh, Alleva was the quarterback of the football team and team captain in 1974. Alleva also played on the Lehigh baseball team. He served as a graduate assistant football coach and earned an MBA in 1976.

Alleva began his career at Duke working for the vice president of business and finance in 1976 and joined the Duke athletic department in 1980, as director of finance. He became the assistant director of athletics in 1986 and was soon promoted in 1987 to associate director, before his tenure as

Director of Athletics in 1998.

He played a key role in Durham's community sports scene. He started Little League Baseball in Durham over 20 years ago, and also began the American Legion baseball program.

Alleva is a member of the North Carolina American Legion Hall of Fame, Suffern High School Hall of Fame and the Rockland County Hall of Fame.

Alleva and his wife, Annie, have two sons, J.D. and Jeff, along with a daughter, Jenny. J.D. played baseball at Duke and was picked in the 24th-round of the 2001 Major League Baseball Amateur Draft by the Kansas City Royals and is now a professional scout for the Houston Astros. Jeff finished his baseball career at Duke in 2003 and signed a free agent contract with the Royals following his senior season. He recently graduated with his MBA from the prestigious Fuqua School of Business at Duke. Jenny, a four-year letterwinner on Duke's women's soccer team, attends law school at the University of North Carolina.

Verge Ausberry

Senior Associate AD/Operations

A former LSU football standout, Verge Ausberry joined the athletics administrative staff in August 2001 as the Associate Athletics Director for Operations. He was appointed to the position of Senior Associate Athletics Director in May 2006.

Ausberry supervises and is responsible for football scheduling. He also oversees the LSU equipment staff, the strength and conditioning staff, the Dr. Martin Broussard training room, and the video department. Ausberry also oversees the highly-successful LSU Track & Field program.

Ausberry, from New Iberia, La., played inside linebacker for the Tigers, lettering in 1986-89. He was part of two SEC championship teams, playing on teams that went to four bowl games.

Before joining the LSU athletic administration, he was very closely involved in the athletic program, first serving for almost seven years as a member of LSU's highly regarded Academic Center for Athletics.

After leaving the Academic Center, he moved in July 1999 to the Tiger Athletic Foundation staff as part of LSU's fundraising arm.

Judy Southard

Senior Associate AD/Senior Woman Administrator

Judy Southard, who had very successful careers as both head women's basketball coach and Director of Athletics, enters her eighth year at LSU having been promoted to Senior Associate Athletics Director in May 2006.

Southard came to LSU from Texas Woman's University, where she served as the school's Director of Athletics for nine years.

As LSU's Senior Woman Administrator, Southard's responsibilities include oversight of the highly successful Tiger Olympic Sports program including 17 men's and women's sports. She has direct supervision of volleyball, women's basketball, softball, men's and women's golf and men's and women's swimming and diving as well as responsibilities in monitoring the athletic department's Gender Equity and Diversity Issues Plan.

Southard is currently a member of the NCAA Division I Women's Basketball Committee and served in the important role of committee chair for the 2006-07 and 2007-08 academic years. She additionally served as a member of the SEC Executive Committee from 2004-2007.

While at Texas Woman's, Southard initiated a corporate partnership program for the athletic department and was instrumental in the addition of two sports to the department's sport offerings.

Prior to her stint at TWU, Southard served as head women's basketball coach at Marshall University in Huntington, W. Va., for 11 years, where she led the Lady Herd to five Southern Conference titles and was named Southern Conference Coach of the Year three times. Southard also served as Assistant Athletics Director/SEA at Marshall from 1983-88, including a four-month period when she was interim director of athletics.

Before going to Marshall, Southard spent three years as head coach at Tennessee-Martin and she also served for one season as an assistant coach at Tennessee. As a high school teacher from 1970-77, Southard coached both basketball and tennis.

A native of Columbia, S.C., Southard earned a bachelor's degree in physical education and health from Coker College in 1970 followed by a master's degree in physical education from Tennessee in 1978. She was a 2000 inductee into the Coker College Athletics Hall of Fame and was recognized in the fall of 2006 as an inductee in the Marshall Athletic Hall of Fame.

Mark Ewing

Senior Associate AD/Business

Mark Ewing, a 24-year employee of Louisiana State University, joined the Athletics Department in January 2001, and serves as the department's Senior

Associate Athletics Director for Business.

As Associate Athletics Director for Business, Ewing has assumed responsibility for the athletic business operations including budget, travel, personnel and purchasing as well as responsibility for concession operations. He also handles financial forecasting and oversees the LSU Athletics Ticket Office.

Ewing came to athletics from LSU's Office of Budget and Planning. He served as LSU's Budget Director overseeing the development and management of the university's \$360 million operating budget.

Herb Vincent

Senior Associate AD/External Affairs

Herb Vincent was appointed to the position of Senior Associate Athletic Director for External Affairs in May of 2006 after serving as associate AD since August of 2002. In addition, he was LSU's sports information director for 12 years from 1988-2000.

In his present position, Vincent manages communications and serves as the primary public relations officer for the LSU Athletics Department and all its entities, including the Tiger Athletic Foundation. He also supervises the sports information office and marketing and promotions office, serves as the primary liaison with LSU Sports Properties and TAF, and serves as the department administrator for the sport of baseball.

Vincent served as the LSU sports information director from July 1988 to July 2000. He was appointed Assistant Athletics Director in November of 1989, and then was elevated to Associate AD/Communications in 1992.

After graduating from LSU, Vincent spent the 1984 season as assistant public relations director for the United States Football League's New Orleans Breakers. Vincent was assistant SID and publications director at Louisiana-Lafayette for one year and served as assistant director of public relations for the Southeastern Conference office for two years prior to joining LSU in 1988.

Bo Bahnsen

Senior Associate AD/Compliance and Planning

Bo Bahnsen was promoted to Senior Associate AD in September 2008 overseeing compliance and future planning.

Bahnsen previously served as LSU's Associate Athletics Director for Internal Relations, overseeing the ticket office and all customer service operations.

Prior to moving into that position in December of 2003, Bahnsen's primary responsibility for the previous 14 years was to serve as LSU's NCAA compliance officer.

Bahnsen served as manager of the LSU basketball team as an undergraduate at LSU. In 1982, he became the administrative assistant for the men's basketball team, where he worked for five years before moving into athletics administration as director of purchasing for two years.

In July 1987, he became administrative assistant to Athletics Director Joe Dean, overseeing the purchasing office until his promotion in 1989. In 1989, he was assigned his primary responsibility as NCAA

compliance officer as assistant athletics director, and then was promoted to associate AD in 1996.

Bahnsen has been responsible for overseeing the successful implementation of LSU's Tradition Fund Program, a football-seating plan that requires contributions for the right to purchase approximately 45,000 seats in Tiger Stadium.

A native of Wharton, Texas, Bahnsen attended Wharton County Junior College for two years before transferring to LSU in 1979. He earned his Bachelor of Science degree in physical education.

Bahnsen, 49, is married to the former Karen Mayson, a former LSU golfer and current head coach of the Lady Tigers golf program. The couple has two children, Darren (19) and Devin (17).

Ronnie Haliburton

Associate AD/Athletic Facility Management

Ronnie Haliburton, who served as director of facility services in the LSU Athletics Department for three years, was promoted to Assistant Athletics Director for Athletic Facility Management in March 2007 and to Associate AD in September 2008.

Haliburton came to the athletics department in December of 2003 from LSU's facility maintenance department, where he served as manager for five years. He was responsible for the overall management of custodial operations, special events crews, stock room inventory and equipment repair.

Haliburton played as a tight end for the LSU football team from 1986-89, and was a member of two Southeastern Conference championship teams. He later played for the Denver Broncos for three years.

He first joined LSU in an administrative capacity in 1994 as resident assistant of Broussard Hall, then the school's athletic dormitory, before moving to the weight room as a student assistant strength coach.

Haliburton became a resident manager in 1996 before being named coordinator of residence life later that year. In 1998, he became Manager of Facility Maintenance at LSU.

Bo Kerin

Associate AD/Compliance

Bo Kerin joined the LSU Athletic Department as an Associate Athletic Director in charge of compliance in May 2007.

As LSU's compliance director, Kerin serves as the liaison between LSU and the NCAA and SEC offices for NCAA rules interpretations and other matters. He is also responsible for developing and coordinating educational components for staff, student-athletes, booster organizations, and entities outside the athletics department on NCAA and SEC rules and regulations.

Kerin came to LSU after a five-year stint with the NCAA from 2001-2007, where he most recently served as associate director of membership services. Kerin's primary responsibilities included oversight of the training of new staff members on the rules education program, the continuing education program for the membership services staff as well as the interpretation of NCAA legislation for Division I institutions.

Prior to his work with the NCAA, Kerin served in compliance at Mississippi State, holding the assistant director position for one year before being promoted to compliance coordinator from 1999 to 2001. He also served as an instructor in the sport administration graduate program for one semester.

Eddie Nunez

Associate AD/Operations, New Projects

Eddie Nunez joined the Athletics Department in October 2003 as the Director of Game and Event Management and was promoted to Associate Athletics Director for Operations and Project Development in June of 2007.

Nunez's responsibilities include overseeing game management for all sports. He also directs the coordination, development and renovation of over \$150 million dollars in athletic facility projects including renovations of the Maravich Center and current construction of the new baseball and softball stadiums, the Tiger Gift Center and the New Basketball

Practice Facility.

Nunez was the Department's coordinator in the TAF construction of the West Side addition to Tiger Stadium and the new football operations center. He also oversees the sport of men's basketball and represents the athletics department on various University and community committees.

Nunez came to LSU after two years as the Director of Game and Event Management at Vanderbilt. Prior to that, Nunez served as men's basketball administrative assistant at Marquette University for one year and two years as men's basketball graduate assistant and head equipment manager for coach Billy Donovan at the University of Florida. Associate AD/Student Services

Former LSU women's basketball player Miriam Segar has been a part of the athletics administration since June of 1995 and was most recently named Associate Athletics Director for Student Services in April 2007. She had served as Assistant Athletics Director since 2004.

Segar began her administrative career at LSU as the compliance coordinator where she served for three years. Following that, in 1998, Segar was named the director of the CHAMPS/ Life Skills Program where she worked until 2001 when she became the Director of Student Services.

While working with CHAMPS/ Life Skills, Segar guided the program to the Division I Athletic Directors Program of Excellence Award in 2001.

Segar also has sport oversight of LSU's soccer and gymnastics programs.

Prior to returning to her alma mater, Segar spent one year at the SEC office as the championships assistant and the officiating assistant, assisting in the management of all SEC championships and tournaments and the coordination of women's basketball officials.

Segar, the 2006 Athletic Department Female Alumnus of the Year, was a three-year captain for the Lady Tigers basketball team and received four letters from 1990 to 1994. She earned the 1994 NCAA Post-graduate Scholarship award and was a member of the 1994 NCAA All-Academic team.

Segar and her husband Jamie have four children - Grant, Reid, Maggie and Hayes.

Brian Broussard

Assistant AD/Director of Ticket Operations

A 12-year veteran of the Athletics Department, including eight years as ticket manager, Brian Broussard was promoted to Assistant Athletics Director for Ticket Operations in July 2007.

Broussard is responsible for revenue in excess of \$40 million, which includes the management of ticket and parking sales and renewals for all sports, as well as Tradition Fund donations for football and baseball. Additionally, he assists Mark Ewing with the Tiger Gift Center and Tiger Concessions.

Broussard began at LSU in August 1996 as an assistant ticket manager responsible for men's basketball sales and the day-to-day operations of ticket office. In March 2000, he was promoted to ticket manager, becoming responsible for the ticketing in all sports.

2007-2008 ATHLETICS YEAR IN REVIEW

The Nation's Elite Teams



Football

The Tigers celebrated the 10th SEC Championship in school history and capped an amazing season with the program's third national title and second since 2003. LSU posted a 12-2 overall record and a 6-2 mark in SEC play. The Tigers tallied their fourth BCS bowl victory as LSU defeated Ohio State, 38-24, in the 2008 BCS National Championship Game.



Women's Basketball

The Lady Tigers reached their fifth-straight NCAA Final Four with a 31-5 overall record after wins over Jackson State, Marist, Oklahoma State and North Carolina in the NCAA Tournament. LSU claimed the SEC regular-season title with an unblemished 14-0 mark, representing the second time in the last four seasons the Lady Tigers ran through the conference schedule unbeaten.



Track and Field

The LSU women's track and field team claimed the 14th NCAA Outdoor championship in school history, and the Lady Tigers were NCAA runners-up during the indoor season. The LSU men's track and field team placed second at the NCAA Outdoor Championships. The Lady Tigers swept both the SEC Indoor and Outdoor titles, while the men's team captured league runner-up honors during both seasons.



Baseball

The baseball team completed one of the most remarkable turnarounds in SEC history as the Tigers reached the College World Series for the 14th time. The Tigers, who once held a 6-11-1 record in SEC play, won the SEC Western Division, the SEC Tournament, the NCAA Baton Rouge Regional and the NCAA Baton Rouge Super Regional. The turnaround was sparked by an SEC-record 23 consecutive wins down the stretch.



Gymnastics

The gymnastics team advanced to the NCAA Super Six for the first time in program history after the Tigers won the NCAA Central Regional. LSU finished fifth at the NCAA Championships. The fifth-place ranking marked the highest finish for a Tiger gymnastics team since 1988, which was prior to the establishment of the NCAA Super Six. LSU now has 24 consecutive postseason appearances.

How The West Was Won

LSU became the first school to claim the SEC Western Division title in all three fall sports -- football, volleyball and soccer -- and the Tigers added another divisional championship in the spring with baseball. The volleyball team won its third-straight Western Division title with a 25-8 overall record, and the soccer team finished with a 12-5-7 overall mark to win the program's first division crown.



Elite Athletes

Kelly Baptiste

WOMEN'S TRACK & FIELD

Kelly Baptiste led the Lady Tigers to their 25th NCAA championship by scoring a team-high 19 points at the outdoor nationals. She became the fifth Lady Tiger to be crowned NCAA champion in the 100-meter dash, while she also added All-America honors in the 200 meters, 4x100 relay and 4x400 relay.

Blake Dean

BASEBALL

Blake Dean will go down in LSU lore as one of the greatest hitters in postseason history, batting .404 in the Tigers' postseason run to the College World Series. The sophomore was a first-team All-American by Baseball America, and he provided game-winning hits in four postseason contests, including a memorable walk-off, three-run double to lead LSU past Rice in the CWS.

Kevin Dessauer

MEN'S TENNIS

Kevin Dessauer led the Tigers to their 14th-straight NCAA Tournament appearance as the 2008 team captain. On the courts, Dessauer finished second on the team with 21 singles victories. Off the courts, he ended his undergraduate career with a perfect 4.0 grade-point average and was the recipient of the Southeast Regional ITA/Arthur Ashe Award for Leadership and Sportsmanship.

Glenn Dorsey

FOOTBALL

Glenn Dorsey became the most decorated defensive player in school history and led the Tigers to their third national championship. Dorsey, the fifth pick of the 2008 NFL Draft by the Kansas City Chiefs, was a consensus first-team All-American. The senior was the recipient of the Outland, Nagurski, Lombardi and Lott Awards as college football's top defensive player.



Megan Falcon

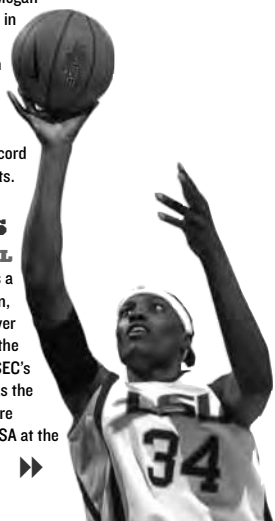
WOMEN'S TENNIS

A two-time singles All-American, Megan Falcon continued her brilliant play in 2008, earning All-America honors and first-team All-SEC recognition in her junior campaign. Falcon received a Top 20 singles ranking for the second-straight season as she finished with a 27-7 overall record with 12 wins over ranked opponents.

Sylvia Fowles

WOMEN'S BASKETBALL

Sylvia Fowles closed her career as a unanimous first-team All-American, the WBCA National Defensive Player of the Year and the SEC Player of the Year. The 6-6 senior became the SEC's all-time leading rebounder and was the No. 2 pick in the WNBA Draft before winning a gold medal with Team USA at the 2008 Olympics.



The Most Successful LSU Athletics Season In School History

LSU capped the most successful athletics season -- from top to bottom -- in school history by recording an eighth-place finish in the U.S. Sports Academy Director's Cup. The eighth-place finish is the highest for LSU since the inception of the director's cup in 1993-94. The Tigers accumulated an all-time high 1,085 points in 17 of a possible 20 sports, a first in school history. In all, the Tigers sent 19 of their 20 teams to NCAA post-season play in 2007-08. Eight teams finished in the top five nationally of their respective sports.



Susan Jackson ▲

GYMNASTICS

Susan Jackson became the fourth LSU gymnast to win an NCAA individual title in school history as she was the 2008 NCAA national champion on the vault with a score of 9.8563 at the individual event finals at the NCAA Championships. The sophomore also earned All-America honors on the beam, floor, vault and all-around.

Andrew Loupe

MEN'S GOLF

Andrew Loupe was one of three LSU golfers to earn SEC All-Freshman honors in 2007-08. Loupe led the squad with a scoring average of 74.06 in 11 appearances, and his two Top 10 finishes tied for a team-best mark.

Christoph Lubenau

MEN'S SWIMMING & DIVING

Christoph Lubenau shattered the school record in the 100-yard butterfly at the NCAA Championships (46.24) while earning NCAA All-America honors with a ninth-place finish. Lubenau added another All-America finish as part of the Tigers' school-record-setting 200 freestyle relay.

Michelle Makasini

SOCCER

Michelle Makasini was chosen as a Top Drawer Soccer Honorable Mention All-American and became the second LSU soccer player in school history to earn first-team All-SEC honors as she helped lead the Lady Tigers to their first NCAA Tournament berth and an SEC Western Division title.

Elena Martinez

VOLLEYBALL

The 2007 SEC Defensive Player of the Year, the senior libero also earned honorable mention AVCA All-America honors and was a second-team All-SEC selection. Martinez led the conference in digs and digs per game, breaking the 21-year-old SEC record for digs in a season as LSU won its third-straight SEC West title and earned a third-straight NCAA Tournament berth.

Rachel Mitchell

SOFTBALL

A second-team NFCA All-South Region selection, the junior outfielder also earned first-team All-SEC honors. Mitchell ranked in the top 10 in the SEC in 10 offensive categories and was in the top 100 in the NCAA in five.

Anthony Randolph

MEN'S BASKETBALL

Anthony Randolph, after a stellar freshman season, became the 13th LSU player drafted in the first round of the NBA Draft when he was chosen with the 14th pick by the Golden State Warriors, the final pick of the NBA lottery teams.

Alexis Rather

WOMEN'S GOLF

Alexis Rather chipped in from off the green on the first playoff hole to give the Lady Tigers the eighth and final spot in the NCAA Division I Women's Golf Championships. LSU would go on to finish 15th, and after the season the senior would be named an assistant coach of the Ole Miss Rebels.



Richard Thompson ▲

MEN'S TRACK & FIELD

Richard Thompson proved to be the nation's most dominant sprinter in 2008 as he was named the NCAA Men's Outdoor Track Athlete of the Year. He became the first LSU athlete in program history to sweep NCAA titles in the 60-meter dash and 100-meter dash in the same season, but he did not stop there as he went on to win silver medals in the 100 meters and 4x100-meter relay for his native Trinidad & Tobago at the 2008 Olympic Games in Beijing.

Rachel Ware

WOMEN'S SWIMMING & DIVING

Rachel Ware, the 2007-08 SEC Diver of the Year, recorded her third career NCAA All-America accolade when she finished 12th in the 1-meter springboard at the NCAA Championships.

Setting the Standard for Athletics in Softball

As it enters its 13th year of existence, SEC softball has established itself as one of the leading conferences in the sport.

The Southeastern Conference tied its conference record, qualifying eight teams for the 2008 NCAA Tournament - Alabama, Arkansas, Auburn, Florida, Georgia, LSU, Mississippi State, and Tennessee as the conference made its 11th overall, sixth consecutive, Women's College World Series appearance.

History was made as Florida received the league's first No. 1 national seed. Alabama earned the No. 3 national seed, giving the SEC two top five seeds. Overall, the SEC had five national seeds including No. 9 LSU, No. 13 Tennessee and No. 15 Georgia. Two teams, Florida and Alabama, advanced all the way to the semifinal round of the Women's College World Series, marking the first time ever the SEC had two of the final four teams left in the series.

The Southeastern Conference totaled seven bids for the 2007 NCAA Tournament - Alabama, Florida, Georgia, LSU, Mississippi State, South Carolina and Tennessee.

A record five teams advanced to the Super Regionals and Tennessee led the charge all the way to the Championship series of the WCWS. History was made as the Lady Vols became the first SEC team to advance to the Championship Series and was part of the most-viewed WCWS game on TV. As the runners-up, Tennessee finished the season ranked No. 2, the highest by an SEC team.

The SEC earned six bids for the 2006 NCAA Tournament - Alabama, Auburn, Florida, Georgia, LSU and Tennessee. Alabama and Tennessee returned for the second straight year to the Women's College World Series.

The SEC also qualified six teams for the 2005 NCAA Tournament - Alabama, Auburn, Florida, Georgia, Mississippi State and Tennessee.

Leading all conferences, the SEC qualified a then league-best eight teams for the 2004 NCAA Tournament - Alabama, Auburn, Florida, Georgia, LSU, Mississippi State, South Carolina and Tennessee. LSU was the lone SEC school to receive a No. 1 seed as the Tigers advanced to its second WCWS appearance in four years and Kristin Schmidt was named the WCWS Most-Outstanding Player.

The SEC notched six bids for the 2003 NCAA Tournament - Alabama, Florida, Georgia, LSU, Mississippi State and South Carolina. Alabama was the lone SEC team to receive a No. 1 seed, and the Crimson Tide, along with Florida, hosted regional tournaments.

The SEC tallied seven bids for the 2002 NCAA Tournament - Alabama, Auburn, Arkansas, Georgia, LSU, Mississippi State and South Carolina. LSU was the lone SEC team to receive a No. 1 seed, while South Carolina hosted a regional for the second time since 1997.

In 2001 the SEC qualified four teams for the NCAA Tournament. LSU, Alabama, South Carolina and Florida as the Tigers broke through to its first Women's College World Series appearance under NFCA Hall of Fame Coach Yvette Girouard.

The SEC picked up six bids for the 2000 NCAA Tournament, as LSU, Arkansas,

Mississippi State, Alabama, Florida and SEC Tournament Champion South Carolina all made the field of 48.

The 1999 season was the first in which the conference was eligible for an automatic berth to the NCAA Tournament. That year, four teams earned bids to postseason - Alabama, LSU, South Carolina and Tennessee.

Softball came under the auspices of the Southeastern Conference in the 1996-97 season. Since that time, nine different conference teams have made appearances in the NCAA Championship, including five teams earning Women's College World Series berths - one by South Carolina in the inaugural season, Alabama in 2000, 2003, 2005, 2006 and 2008, Florida in 2008, LSU in 2001 and 2004 and Tennessee in 2005, 2006 and 2007.

Eight teams (Alabama, Auburn, Florida, Georgia, LSU, Mississippi State, South Carolina and Tennessee) have made Top 25 appearances and five teams have climbed into the Top 10 (Alabama, Florida, Georgia, LSU and Tennessee) of the NFCA/USA Today Poll.

South Carolina is the flagship team of the league with a rich history in softball dating back 34 seasons. The Gamecocks have made 15 NCAA Regional and three Women's College World Series appearances.

Mississippi State played softball for five seasons during the 1980's before resuming the sport when it was added to the SEC. Tennessee added softball in 1995-96, one year before its inception in the SEC. Alabama, Arkansas, Auburn, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, LSU and Ole Miss began softball programs in 1996-97 to give the league 11 representatives (Vanderbilt does not sponsor softball).

Credentials

Credentials for LSU home games are issued for working media only. Because of space limitations and demand the deadline for all season credential requests is Feb. 9.

- All members of the media must request credentials online through Associate Sports Information Director Matt Dunaway.
- Please keep in mind that credentials authorize an accredited organization for news coverage of the game. ANY unauthorized use of credentials subjects the bearer to ejection from Tiger Park and the accredited organization to revocation of its credentials for future LSU athletic events.

Press box seating will be determined using the following criteria:

1. Sports editors of daily newspapers and sports director of television and radio stations.
2. Daily radio and television shows.
3. Weekly radio and television shows providing sound and/or video highlights.

4. Weekly magazines specifically dedicated to LSU Athletics.
5. Other weekly and monthly publications (monthly publications may be limited to one (1) photographer shooting non-conference games at the discretion of the LSU SID).
6. Websites (please see restrictions below).

The official website of LSU athletics and the official website of the visiting school will be credentialed. Also, the official online service of the national over-the-air or cable television network that owns broadcast rights to the game will receive credentials. Other websites will not be credentialed unless they meet specifications outlined below:

1. Must be a legal corporate entity that has been in business at least one full calendar year and has provided coverage of LSU or the visiting team for at least one year.
2. Must provide daily coverage of ALL athletic teams of LSU or the visiting team with its own staff of reporters, photographers and equipment.

3. Must travel to and cover all football away games and all major post-season events.
4. Must provide coverage of all press conferences of ALL athletic teams at LSU or the visiting team.
5. Must be accredited by home university as working media.

Note: Websites that sponsor message boards, message centers or chat rooms where people are allowed to post anonymous information will not be issued credentials. If a medium has an online site and they sponsor these anonymous forums, they may continue to request credentials under its traditional medium (newspaper, magazine, radio, television), but will not be granted additional passes for online staff.

Requests from individuals not employed by an accredited media outlet will not be considered.

LSU SOFTBALL ON THE RADIO

The LSU Sports Radio Network gives Tiger softball one of the most comprehensive audiences in all of collegiate softball. As Tiger softball begins its 13th season of extensive radio coverage, the LSU Sports Radio Network will broadcast 25 of 28 SEC games beginning with the March 14 doubleheader at Georgia. In addition, the network will broadcast five non-conference games, including the opener from the new Tiger Park against McNeese State on Feb. 11.

The LSU Sports Radio Network will bring Tiger softball to its many fans with broadcasts in the Baton Rouge area on 104.5/104.9 FM. This marks the ninth season LSU softball has been on the station. Patrick Wright, the voice of Tiger softball for the previous 12 seasons, will provide all of the play-by-play action. Wright also is the voice of LSU women's basketball and and serves as one of the locker room reporters for radio broadcasts of LSU football games. LSU softball will have six games televised during the 2009 season. Fox Sports Network will broadcast the April 5 game against Tennessee for SEC-TV. The SEC Tournament Championship game, which the Tigers have participated in seven of the last nine seasons, will be broadcast on Fox Sports on May 9 at Tennessee's Lee Stadium.

High School Camp – June 15-18

Entering Grades 9-12

The High School Camp is designed for players entering the 9-12th grade ONLY. Campers will be divided into competitive teams and will be coached by a collegiate level coach for all sessions. Sessions will be geared toward team concepts and individual skills, which will prepare players for high school level softball. PITCHERS: Pitchers will be trained by a collegiate level staff as well as former and current LSU players. Pitchers will be divided by skill level and will learn the mechanics of pitching, improve their speed and accuracy, and/or learn and develop movement pitches.

CATCHERS: An experienced catching staff will train catchers on the skills of blocking, receiving, throwing, calling pitches and much more. Catchers will also be divided by skill level.
