## TIGER SOFTBALL CHAMPIONSHIP LEGACY

### 1 WCWS MOST OUTSTANDING PLAYER

Kristin Schmidt earned Women's College World Series Most Outstanding Player honors in 2004. She is the only player to earn the honor outright and not win the national championship.

### 4 WOMEN'S COLLEGE WORLD SERIES APPEARANCES

LSU is one of five schools in SEC history with multiple Women's College World Series appearances. The Tigers along with Florida, Georgia and Tennessee have tallied a winning record in WCWS play.

### 5 ACADEMIC ALL-AMERICANS

The Tigers have had five CoSIDA Academic All-Americans in the 29-year history of the program, while only one program in the SEC has had more than four.

### 5 SEC CHAMPIONSHIPS

LSU has claimed a five regular season championships highlighted by four consecutive crowns from 1999-2002. Only three other schools in SEC history - Alabama, Florida and Georgia have claimed multiple regular season titles.

### 5 SEC TOURNAMENT TITLES

LSU is tied for the conference lead with five SEC Tournament titles and has advanced to the championship game in nine of the past 16 seasons.

### 21 ALL-AMERICANS

The Tigers have 21 NFCA All-Americans in the 20-year history of the program, second-most of any school in the SEC.

### 17 NCAA REGIONAL APPEARANCES

LSU has racked up 17 NCAA Tournament appearances, currently on the longest streak in program history which stands at nine. The Tigers are tied for the most NCAA trips among SEC schools since 1997.

### 915 VICTORIES

LSU has racked up 915 wins, the sixth-most in the nation since reinstating softball in 1997.

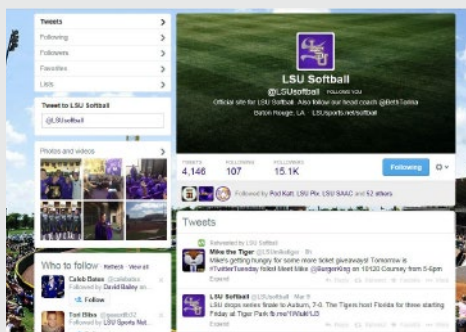
The 2016 LSU Softball Media Guide is produced by the LSU Sports Information Office and has been rated among the top seven collegiate softball publications in the nation for eight of the last 13 seasons. The 2012 media guide was awarded "Best in the Nation" and 2013 media guide garnered "Best Cover in the Nation" status for the first time in program history by the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA). The publication also collected second-place finishes in 2005 and 2011 followed by third-place rankings in 2004, 2007 and 2010, a fifth-place finish in 2006 and a seventh-place showing in 2002.



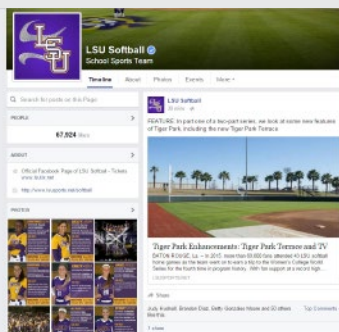

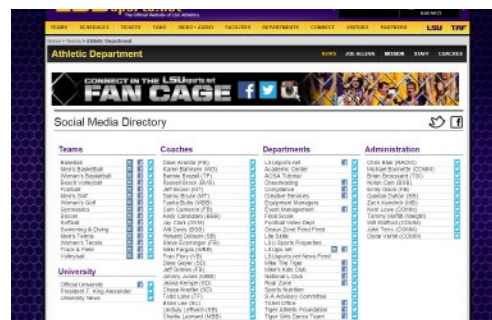

## MEDIA TRAINING

LSU is one of the few schools where student-athletes go through media training to enhance their communication skills. Dr. Tommy Karam and Dr. Shirley White are two experts in the field who give training sessions to student-athletes on campus. The team's film room turns into a mock press conference setting to get student-athletes acclimated to giving interview in front of both print and electronic media. Karam and White record the mock interviews on camera and then provide feedback, allowing the student-athletes to become more comfortable and confident when doing actual interviews.



## SEC ON ESPN

In 2009-10, ESPN and the Southeastern Conference reached a milestone 15-year agreement. ESPN acquired rights to every SEC home football game, excluding those on the CBS network broadcast package. The ESPN family of networks serves as the exclusive national cable home and syndication rights holder for the conference. In August of 2014, the launch of the SEC network opened programming into over 90 million homes to mark a new era in collegiate athletics. More than 70 games will be aired on the network, with over a hundreded through it's difigatl offering of SEC Network+

# Career Development

## STUDENT AFFAIRS AND THE SHAQUILLE O'NEAL LIFE SKILLS PROGRAM



### CAREER/PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

In order for student-athletes to be truly prepared for their careers, it is the goal of the Student Affairs and the Shaquille O'Neal Life Skills Program to ensure that each student-athlete will leave LSU with a professional resume, cover letter, and interview experience. The program has three phases: career preparation, the "job project" and a career symposium. Many LSU student-athletes gain experience with career-developing jobs in the community during the summer months.

### HOW CAN CHAMPS HELP?

The CHAMPS (Challenging Athletes Minds for Personal Success)/Life Skills program was developed by the NCAA to help prepare student-athletes for the challenges of life beyond the playing field. By focusing on "real life" skills and personal development, the CHAMPS program not only assists student-athletes with meeting daily challenges but also enhances their growth in college years and beyond.

### HEALTH/WELLNESS

The goal of the Health & Wellness component of the Student Affairs division is to inform and educate student-athletes about the various health and wellness related issues that they will encounter throughout their tenure at LSU and beyond.

### DIVERSITY, INCLUSION & CIVIC ENGAGEMENT

The Cox Communications Academic Center for Student-Athletes strives to celebrate, highlight, affirm, and embrace the diversity of LSU student-athletes. They provide an environment that is respectful of cultural, racial, and ethnic differences by acknowledging their individuality and uniqueness. In addition, the programs emphasize the importance of giving back and citizenship by engaging in the University and surrounding community.





The LSU softball team routinely holds clinics and camps for Baton Rouge area youth throughout much of the summer and into the fall. Along with the partnership with the Geaux Teal initiative, the team takes part in various local and national charities, as the picture above is from when coach Torina took on the Chillin' for Charity challenge before she was drenched with ice cold water in the name of charity.

# Community Outreach



## GEAUX PLAY

LSU has had a longstanding relationship with the Miracle League Association at Cypress Mounds in Baton Rouge. Former All-American Brittany Mack created and championed the "Geaux Play" program leading into the 2012 season where she challenged the LSU softball community to share the gift of sports with special needs children. Over the last two seasons, LSU has hosted "Geaux Play Day" at Tiger Park where the Miracle League participants get to be the team's VIP guests. The children are honored on the field before the game, and the Tigers played a special game afterwards.



## STRIKEOUT OVARIAN CANCER TEAL GAME

Over the last four years, LSU softball has played hosted to the program's "Strikeout Ovarian Cancer" event. The Tigers hold a pregame recognition where survivors of ovarian cancer and other gyn cancers are recognized at the ballpark. Head coach Beth Torina's mother, Betty Dieter, is an ovarian cancer survivor. In 2013, LSU held the inaugural "Geaux Teal Ovarian Cancer Walk" where close to \$15,000 was raised for research. Torina serves on a committee of women from Baton Rouge to New Orleans with connections to ovarian cancer either as a survivor or lost a family member to the deadly disease. LSU will welcome Georgia on Saturday, April 12, 2014 for this season's "Strikeout Ovarian Cancer" event.



## MOVE IN DAY

LSU softball played a major role in President and Chancellor Dr. F. King Alexander's initiative to help the Class of 2018 move into their dorm rooms before the fall semester began in August. The Tigers helped unload cars and greet the incoming students and their families as they arrived on campus.





# Athletic Training



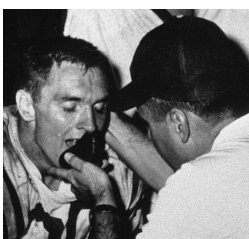
LSU boasts the largest and most complete athletic training facilities in all of collegiate athletics with both the Operations Center and the Broussard Center for Athletic Training in Tiger Stadium. Both are furnished with the latest in technology and equipment. The Operations Center training room features a full view of the practice

fields, two hot/cold jacuzzis and an underwater treadmill. The Broussard Center includes an on-site x-ray room, an in-house pharmacy, as well as the largest hydrotherapy pool in both collegiate and professional sports and is one of the few collegiate training centers with a full-service pharmacy and a full-service vision center.

## HYDROTHERAPY TREATMENT

An integral part of rehabbing and developing LSU student-athletes is the operations center's hot/cold jacuzzis and an underwater treadmill in a fully equipped Hydrotherapy room. The Broussard training center boasts the largest hydrotherapy pool in both collegiate and professional sports.

## BROUSSARD ATHLETIC TRAINING CENTER



The two story, 22,000 square foot facility contains 20 treatment tables with the newest forms of modalities available, 14 taping stations, a 1,600 square foot rehabilitation area which contains the latest rehabilitation equipment including the Cybex Norm, Woodway treadmills and Body Master select rise equipment. LSU's multi-million dollar athletic training facility is named in honor of Dr. Martin J. Broussard (left), the legendary trainer whose career spanned over 40 years at LSU.







# Strength AND CONDITIONING

The LSU strength and conditioning facility, located in Tiger Stadium, was built in 1997 and features the latest in both strength training and cardiovascular training equipment.

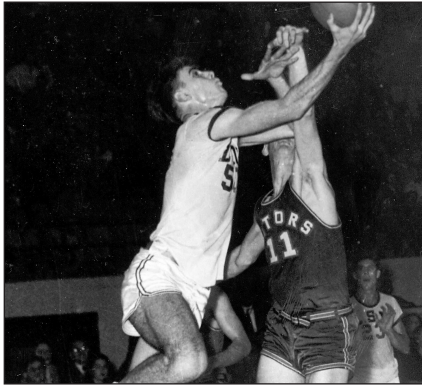


Melissa Moore and the weight room staff conduct workout sessions that include both strength and endurance training.



# LSU GREATS

The following nine individuals are the only athletes to have their jerseys retired by LSU. Men's basketball has retired the No. 23 for Pete Maravich, No. 50 for Bob Pettit, Jr., No. 33 for Shaquille O'Neal and No. 40 for Rudy Macklin. Women's basketball retired the No. 33 for Seimone Augustus. Football's only two retired jerseys are the No. 20 worn by Billy Cannon and the No. 37 worn by Tommy Casanova. Baseball retired the No. 15 in honor of longtime coach and former athletics director Skip Bertman and the No. 20 for Ben McDonald. Casanova, Macklin and McDonald joined the prestigious list in May 2009. Augustus became the first woman in LSU Athletics history to have her jersey retired in January 2010.



## 50 Bob Pettit

Pettit led LSU to its first NCAA Final Four in 1953 and he later became the first player in NBA history to exceed the 20,000-plus point barrier. Pettit is a member of the NBA Hall of Fame, and in 1997, he was named as one of the top 50 players in NBA history.



## 23 Pete Maravich

"Pistol Pete," Maravich still holds the NCAA record for career points with 3,667 and for career scoring average with 44.2 points a game. He was selected the National Player of the Year in 1970 after leading the Tigers to the NIT Final Four. He scored 50-plus points in an amazing 28 times. He went on to a 10-year professional career and was selected as one of the NBA's 50 greatest players in 1997.



## 20 Billy Cannon

One of the true legends of college football in the South, Cannon was the 1959 Heisman Trophy winner and helped the Tigers to the 1958 national title. Cannon's most memorable performance came in 1959 against Ole Miss when No. 1 LSU trailed No. 3 Ole Miss 3-0 in the fourth quarter. He fielded a punt, broke seven tackles and returned it 89 yards for the 7-3 victory. He went on to a successful 11-year professional career.



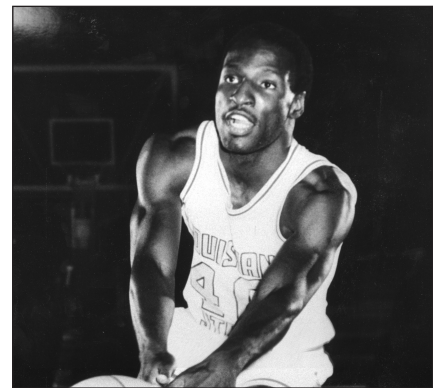
## 33 Shaquille O'Neal

O'Neal was the first pick in the 1992 NBA Draft. He was named MVP of the league in 2000 and was a three-time NBA Finals MVP after leading the Los Angeles Lakers to three World Championships. At LSU, O'Neal averaged 21.6 points and 13.6 rebounds for his career, and in 1991, he was named the World's Amateur Athlete of the Year as well as SEC Athlete of the Year and National Player of the Year. In 1997, he was named as one of the top 50 players in NBA history.



## 15 Skip Bertman

A legend in the college baseball ranks, Bertman created a dynasty at LSU, guiding the Tigers to five national titles in a 10-year stretch from 1991-2000. He also coached the United States to a bronze medal at the 1996 Olympics in Atlanta and was an assistant on the gold medal-winning U.S. squad in Seoul, Korea, in 1988. Bertman retired from coaching following the 2001 season and served as LSU's athletics director for seven years. Bertman was inducted into the College Baseball Hall of Fame in 2006.



## 40 Rudy Macklin

Rudy Macklin was a two-time basketball All-American selection during his Tiger career from 1976-81 during which time he became LSU's all-time leading rebounder with 1,276 boards and the second-leading scorer in school history behind only the legendary Pete Maravich with 2,080 points. He led the Tigers to two Elite Eight appearances and the 1981 Final Four in Philadelphia. He still holds the school single game rebound record with 32, a mark like some of the great records in any sport that may never be broken.

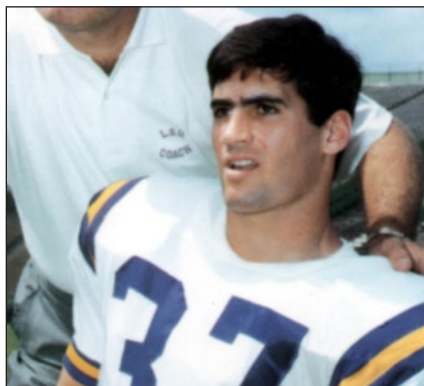


**Ben McDonald (left) and Skip Bertman (right) were honored with jersey retirement ceremonies in Alex Box Stadium.**



## About LSU Retired Jerseys

The retirement of the jerseys of Casanova, McDonald, Macklin and Augustus comes under a new provision of the LSU jersey retirement bylaws that says the retirement of an athlete's jersey in a particular sport does not preclude a current student-athlete in that sport from wearing the jersey number in that or any other sport, subject to the discretion of the head coach. This provision applies only to jerseys retired after January 1, 2007, so the numbers worn by Maravich, Pettit, O'Neal, Cannon and Bertman may never again be worn by future student-athletes in their respective sports. To have a jersey retired at LSU, an athlete must have completed intercollegiate competition for LSU a minimum of five years prior to nomination. Athletes must have demonstrated truly unusual and outstanding accomplishments, exceeding and in addition to all criteria used for Hall of Fame selection. Nominees must have a unanimous vote of support from the Hall of Fame committee.



### 37 Tommy Casanova

Tommy Casanova is the only three-time All-American in the history of LSU football and is a member of the College Football Hall of Fame. During his Tiger career from 1969-71, Casanova personified versatility for his myriad of talents as he played offense, defense, returned punts and kickoffs. One of just two three-time All-SEC performers at LSU, he played six seasons with the Cincinnati Bengals of the NFL while earning his medical degree.



### 19 Ben McDonald

Ben McDonald won the prestigious Golden Spikes Award, given annually to the nation's most outstanding player, in 1989 and is a member of the College Baseball Hall of Fame. He led LSU to two College World Series appearances. In 1989, McDonald was named National Player of the Year by Baseball America, The Sporting News and Collegiate Baseball. He was selected by the Baltimore Orioles as the No. 1 pick in the major league draft in 1989 and went on to enjoy a 10-year major league career with the Orioles and the Milwaukee Brewers.



### 33 Seimone Augustus

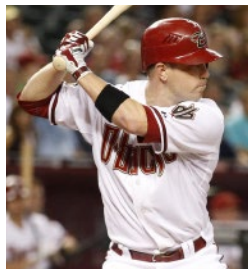
Seimone Augustus is the only women's basketball player in school history to earn State Farm Coaches Association All-America honors three times: 2004, 2005 and 2006. Augustus became LSU's first NCAA National Player of the Year and she claimed the honor twice in 2005 and 2006. A 2006 graduate of LSU, Augustus was the 2012 WNBA Finals MVP after winning a world title. She also led the United States to a gold medal at the 2008 Beijing Olympic Games.

### Shaquille O'Neal

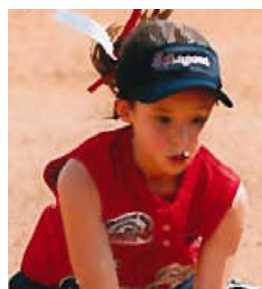

# What do you do for an encore?

In 2015 the LSU softball program went on a run for the ages, setting a new LSU athletic department record for wins to start a campaign at 25 and ending up with 50 wins for the first time since 2007. The Tigers reached its goal of qualifying for the Women's College World Series for the fourth time in program history, finishing third overall.

But in an age of ever-increasing goals and aspirations, the 2016 version of the Tigers are asking one simple question.

"What's 'Next?'"

The embodiment of this year's motto will come from the overwhelming desire to go beyond what the group did last year and take on all-comers this season with a goal greater than just making it back to Oklahoma City.

"It's about taking our game to the next level and not dwelling on the past," said head coach Beth Torina, who is entering her fifth season at the helm of the program. "We're really trying to reinvent ourselves, and making sure we're focusing on the next at bat, next game, while making sure we're focused on being in the moment."

To do that, LSU will see virtually all of its production at key spots return to the fold this season, with 16 letterwinners, seven everyday starters and three pitchers combining to produce over 80 percent of the team's offense, defense and pitching statistics from a year ago.

"I think it's really important that we approached this season with adding as many versatile pieces to the team to make the whole better," Torina said. "Whether it was a pitcher that had a better location, or a hitter that can cover both sides of the plate, we've really just tried to up our game both individually and as a team as a whole."

Going into the new year, the Tigers will look to begin the year the way they ended it, finishing fourth in both major polls after finishing in third place at the WCWS in OKC last June. The Tigers entered its first No. 1 ranking, a spot it held for multiple weeks during the year, while facing the second-toughest schedule in the nation.

"We understand that this game is not played on paper, and we realize how good this team was last year, but if anything last year showed that it is a game of inches," Torina said. "We were nearly removed from our own regional on that Saturday, but instead ended up third in the Women's College World Series. But, it's exciting to know that you have a team that is capable of competing for the highest accomplishments in the sport."

The friendly confines of Tiger Park will serve as the backdrop for more than two-thirds of the team's regular season games this season, as the squad will play 21 of the first 26 games in Baton Rouge, hosting three tournaments and the first SEC series of the year against Alabama. In all, 37 games will be hosted by LSU, including series' against Florida, Kentucky, South Carolina and ending the year with a non-conference tilt against Washington.

"Not only are we going to have an opportunity for our fans to see great softball, but to see what this group is capable of," Torina said. "We have the best fans in the country and they make Tiger Park a tough place to play if you're opposing team, and their support last year really helped propel us to the Women's College World Series."

## THE BATTERY

Going into last year, the Tigers went into the year with one of its most heralded pitching groups not seen since the early days of the program since it was restarted back in the late 90's. While untested with only two pitchers returning and four on the roster, the move to add power and depth proved to be one of the biggest factors in the team's run last season, holding the ninth-lowest earned run average in the nation in 2015 at 1.84.

The returning pieces of the battery consist of three All-Americans, a first team All-SEC performer and the addition of a two-time prep award winning pitcher to the fold for the upcoming season.

In her first season after transferring from Stanford, Carley Hoover returned to the circle and showed why she was the top recruit coming out of D.W. Daniel High School, as the 6-foot-2 right-handed pitcher was a second team All-American after leading the LSU pitching staff in wins (18), earned run average (1.78), appearances (35), innings pitched (169.0), strikeouts (174), complete games (15) and saves (5), while finishing tied for first in shutouts (6) and starts (22).

Hoover had 18 games with five or more strikeouts, with four double-digit strikeout contests during the campaign, including being a Top 10 finalist for the NFCA National Freshman of the Year Award, during a year in which she was the most valuable player of the Baton Rouge Regional and a first team All-SEC selection.

Moving straight out of high school to the collegiate level, Allie Walljasper assimilated into the faster pace by appearing in 26 games in the circle for LSU, leading the team in fewest walks allowed (30), fewest earned runs allowed (34) and saves (1), while finishing second on the team in wins with 16, innings pitched with 130.1, earned run average at 1.83, complete games with 13 and strikeouts with 97.

The Manteca, California, native earned the best start by a true freshman pitcher in program history, winning her first nine games as she was named the pitcher of the month by the LSWA, was one of 25 initial finalists for the nation's top freshman award and earning third team All-America honors.

Easily the most experienced pitcher returning to the fold in the spring is junior Baylee Corbello. Now in her third year on the team, the Louisiana native has 28 career wins through two seasons after going 9-2 last year with a 2.36 ERA. Corbello holds the distinction as the only pitcher on the staff that has thrown a career no-hitter, doing so last March at home against Northwestern State, while gritting out a three-hit shutout on the road in the cold at Kentucky last season to avoid a sweep in Lexington.

The newest Tiger to enter the circle this season was a two-time Minnesota Gatorade Softball Player of the Year in Sydney Smith, a native of Maple Grove. As a senior, Smith was 20-1 overall with a save in the circle, holding an earned run average below 0.20, with three no-hitters and a perfect game to her credit, batting .520 at the plate on the season as she also set the school's home run record.

Finishing the season carrying much of the bulk of the catching duties, senior Kellsie Kloss returns for her final season in Purple and Gold looking to improve upon her first team All-SEC honors from a year ago. Kloss played in all 66 games in 2015, catching each of the final 13 games of the year. She hit .317 on the year with a personal-best 13 home runs, none more thrilling than drilling the go-ahead grand slam against Florida to give LSU the win in game two of the series.

Returning to the position along with Kloss is sophomore Sydney Loupe and veteran junior Savannah Jaquish, who started all 66 games for the Tigers last season, seeing action 17 times at the catcher position.

A newcomer to the group who will serve in a utility role behind the plate is freshman Taylor Satchell. A multi-year letterwinner out of Notre Dame of Crowley, Satchell helped lead her team to a pair of district titles and a state runner-up finish in 2013. She was a four-time all-district and all-parish first team selection, as in her final two seasons she was named to the All-Acadiana team and all-state first team.

While serving as added depth to the stable of catchers at LSU, Satchell also has experience both playing in the infield and the outfield during her prep career to add to the depth at those positions as well.

## THE INFIELD

An experienced and talented core of veterans throughout the infield gives LSU stability at multiple positions for the upcoming season, returning every player that saw time at each of the main defensive positions in 2015.

The Tigers committed fewer errors than their opponents last year, and with no less than five upperclassmen roaming the infield dirt, LSU will have plenty of options

to keep the opposition from capitalizing on mistakes.

While this group will look to continue its stout approach defensively, these Tigers are poised to keep up the offensive pace that has seen this group set a host of records over the course of the last four years, both in power and production.

Two seniors that will help lead the group into the new season are Blanka Bell at shortstop and Sandra Simmons at first base. The duo have combined to play over 360 games during their three years at LSU, and go into their final season as one of the more experienced combo's in the SEC.

One of the players leading that offensive charge is Bell, a first team All-American last year who now owns the season and career marks in home runs with 18 and 44, respectively. Her heroics helped the Tigers in a myriad of ways last season, including having the game-winning hit in the regional round against Arizona State.

Simmons capped one of her best seasons at LSU by being named to the nine-member SEC All-Defensive Team with a .975 defensive percentage, while hitting .331 at the plate with 38 RBIs. The Fountain Valley, California, product saved some of her best hitting for the end of the year, being named the NCAA Baton Rouge Super Regional most valuable player after registering a .800 batting average in two games, leading the team with six RBIs with a 1.800 slugging percentage and .714 on-base percentage.

Arguably one of the most versatile players in LSU lore can also lay claim to being the first player since Rachele Fico to be a back-to-back All-American in Savannah Jaquish, who also repeated as a first team All-SEC pick as well. Jaquish started 49 of the 66 total games at third base last season, and produced a fielding percentage of .978, but really made her mark with her bat by setting the new single-season record for RBIs in a season with 78.

Playing in 63 games last year and getting 60 total starts last year is Constance Quinn, the versatile junior who volunteered to play on the women's basketball team when they were low on players due to injury. Quinn batted .273 at the plate and was third on the team in doubles with 11, including being named to the All-Baton Rouge Regional Team and seeing time at second base as well as designated player.

Starting 21 of the final 23 games of the season, Sydney Bourg made the most of her first year as a Tiger, hitting .262 with 11 hits. Bourg appeared in 31 total games, pinning her time defensively at second base, while also coming in to pinch run, scoring the game-winning run against Arizona State to move LSU into the next round.

In her first full year after transferring from Washington, Jenna Kreamer enters her senior season after playing in 17 games last year, making 13 starts all at third base. The Evangel High School record-holder was a lock-down defender at third, finishing the season without committing an error at the position.

The Tigers will have some fresh faces that could also see time in the lineup in the infield, with three freshmen and a sophomore making up the reserve unit.

A sophomore on this year's team is local product Randi Provost, who sat out all of last season after transferring to LSU. Provost won a state championship and played for another in consecutive seasons at Teurlings Catholic, being named an all-district player multiple times.

The first of a trio of freshmen is Shemiah Sanchez out of Newnan, Georgia, and East Coweta High School. She won the regional championship every season of her career in softball, being an all-state selection twice during her career as a

sophomore and senior and finished her ECHS career as the holder of 15 individual season and career school records combined.

Amber Serrett was a four-year standout at Oak Ridge High School in Texas, where she was a four-time District 14-5A first team selection, earning first team all-county honors those same seasons. Serrett graduated Summa Cum Laude and was the Montgomery County Scholar Athlete of the Year.

Hailing from St. Joseph's Academy right here in Baton Rouge is Elyse Thornhill, who capped her career as a Red Sticker by leading the team to 66 total wins. As a senior she hit .531, slugging .827 with 38 stolen bases as she was named the team's most valuable player for the second time at the school, while also earning MVP honors at the LHSCA All-Star Game for the East squad.

#### THE OUTFIELD

The Tigers are sure to be in good hands after the graduation of All-SEC and All-American performer A.J. Andrews, as LSU returns two starters in Emily Griggs and Bailey Landry, along with the returns of Alayna Falcon, Taylor Lockwood and Layna Savoie and addition of freshman Akiya Thymes.

After a strong freshman season, Landry showed no signs of a slump as a sophomore by leading the team with a .426 batting average and 89 hits en route to a second team All-America selection. The East Ascension product netted the longest hitting streak in program history at 21 games – six longer than the previous streak – while at one point reached base in 43 consecutive games as she earned second team All-SEC honors as well as making the regional and super regional teams.

On the other side of the outfield in left, Griggs made her name playing in 62 games with 61 starts in her inaugural season. The speedster was selected to the SEC All-Freshman team after hitting .343 on the year with 14 stolen bases which was second on the team, holding a .976 fielding percentage defensively.

As the only senior in the group, Falcon enters the season after playing in 16 games last year, earning 10 starts as a designated player and outfielder. Falcon hit her first career home run last season, clearing McNeese State's scoreboard for the team's fifth grand slam of the season on a night in which she drove in a career-high five.

Lockwood saw the most action of a reserve that did not have at least one start on the season, appearing in 24 games in 2015. The Walker native was driven in the most of the non-everyday starters, crossing the plate 10 times over the course of the year, holding a .200 batting average.

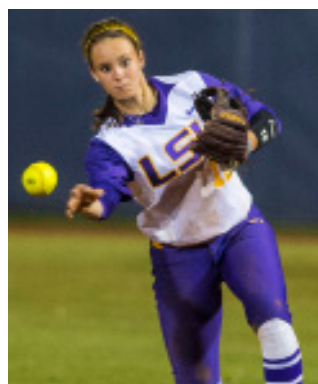
Now a junior, Savoie also returns as a seasoned outfielder and baserunner for the Tigers, scoring four times as a pinch runner.

The newest member of the group is Thymes, who heads across the river from Brusly and brings a .443 lifetime prep batting average to LSU. The niece of current track and field assistant coach Debbie Paris-Thymes, the three-sport prep athlete at Brusly is the all-time steals leader in the program's history, being a first team all-district, all-metro and all-state selection for a program that won 105 games while she was there.

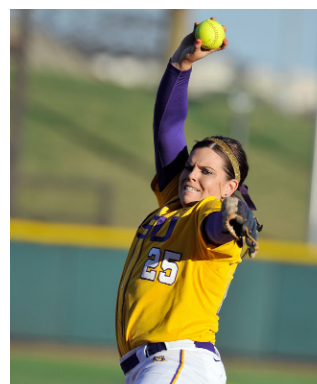

# BETH TORINA

## HEAD COACH

9<sup>TH</sup> SEASON OVERALL • 5<sup>TH</sup> SEASON AT LSU

Beth Torina heads into her fifth season at the helm of the LSU softball program after she returned the Tigers to national prominence with a 50-win, two 40-win seasons and two trips to the Women's College World Series in 2012 and 2015 already to her credit in her short time in Baton Rouge.

The 2012 WCWS berth was the program's third overall appearance on college softball's biggest stage and program's first since 2004. The Tigers are only one of three teams since the current regional/super regional format that was adopted in 2005 to knock off a pair of seeded teams in No. 8 Texas A&M and No. 9 Missouri on the road to Oklahoma City. In 2015, LSU hosted its second regional under Torina and the program's first-ever super regional, staving off elimination three times in the first round before racing to OKC for the second time in her career.

LSU capped one of its greatest seasons in the crown jewel of the collegiate softball world at the end of the season, beginning it going on a 25-game winning streak which not only set program records for the longest winning tear and best start to a season in the program's history, but as the best start to a year at LSU among any sport. The Tigers ascended to its first ever No. 1 ranking during the year, holding the top spot for three weeks en route to the first 50-win season for the group since 2007.

After originally being picked fourth in the preseason in the Southeastern Conference, LSU finished that way by the end as it hosted the 2015 SEC Tournament for the first time since the new Tiger Park opened by finishing with a 15-9 record against league competition, the third time under Torina that an LSU team has won at least 15 league games in a season.

The season awards came in like a tidal wave for the Tigers as a record five LSU players were named NFCA All-Americans with Bianca Bell earning first team honors, Bailey Landry and Savannah Jaquish earning second team honors and freshmen Carley Hoover and Allie Walljasper being third team selections. The five selections tied for the most in the nation, as the nine total selections under Torina are the most over any four-year stretch in program history.

Bell was one of four first team All-SEC selections along with Hoover, Jaquish and Kells Kloss, as Landry and A.J. Andrews were second team picks, with Hoover and Emily Griggs named to the SEC All-Freshman Team and Sandra Simmons landing on the SEC All-Defensive Team.

For the first time since becoming the head coach at LSU, Torina was named the LSWA Louisiana Coach of the Year, while Bell was named the Louisiana Hitter of the Year and Hoover earned the Louisiana Pitcher of the Year.

Torina's third year at the helm proved to be defining in many ways, as the 2014 squad incorporated an influx of youthful talent into an already experienced squad which led to 38 wins and a trip to the NCAA Tucson Regional final, LSU's eighth consecutive trip to the postseason which is now a new program record. The Tigers played the second toughest schedule in the country, with 19 wins against teams ranked in the top 25 of the RPI.

The Tigers finished the SEC slate in the tie for sixth place after going 13-11 in the now division-less conference, earning a win in the SEC tournament for the first time since the 2010 season before being sent to Arizona to grab wins against the Wildcats, Louisville and Boston.

Savannah Jaquish earned NFCA All-American honors for her outstanding freshman campaign, becoming the fifth player in program history named to the second team list. It was the fifth consecutive year an LSU player has been named

to one of the three lists after belting a single-season program record 17 home runs and 55 RBI.

Along with being named to the NFCA All-South Region first team along with Bianca Bell, Jaquish was one of four players to earn All-SEC honors as she was first team, while A.J. Andrews was placed on the second team. Baylee Corbello and Bailey Landry were also selected to the SEC All-Freshman team.

LSU raced out to a 14-1 start in 2013 which was the program's best start to a season since 2007. Playing one of the nation's toughest schedules, the Tigers

claimed 12 victories over Top 25 opponents and spent a majority of the season ranked inside the nation's Top 15. It was the LSU's highest win total over ranked opponents dating back to the 2006 season.

LSU returned to the top of the SEC's Western Division and clinched the program's ninth division crown with a three-game sweep over Alabama that featured three one-run victories. The final two games of the series were played in front of the two-highest crowds in Tiger Park history.

A.J. Andrews and Rachele Fico earned NFCA All-American accolades. The last time LSU had two players garner Louisville Slugger/National Fastpitch Coaches Association (NFCA) All-American status during the same season was 2007.

For Fico, she took home NFCA All-American First-Team honors for the second straight season which enabled her to join Ashlee Ducote and Britni Sneed as the only two NFCA All-American First-Team selections in program history. She was a USA Softball Top 25 Player of the Year finalist, Senior Class Award Top 10 finalists and picked up the NFCA's National Player of the Week award on April 30 after two wins during LSU's sweep of Alabama.

Fico's 24 wins in the circle was the highest total for a LSU pitcher since Dani Hofer tallied 24 wins in 2007. She twirled 10 shutouts to rank tied for 10th nationally. The right-hander racked up 232 strikeouts and matched the SEC's single-game record held by Tennessee's Monica Abbott with 22 Ks against Mississippi State.

LSU had five players secure All-SEC accolades with Andrews (First Team), Jacee Blades (Second Team), Bianka Bell (Second Team, Freshmen Team), Fico (Second Team, Team) and Kellsie Kloss (Freshmen Team). Bell became the second player in LSU history to collect the SEC's Freshman of the Year award.

Andrews registered a .353 batting average on 71 hits, the program's highest totals since Kirsten Shortridge's All-American campaign in 2010. Bell connected for 12 home runs, tied for third-most in program history for a single season.

In 2012, Torina guided the LSU pitching staff to a stifling 1.58 staff ERA which tied for second-lowest in the SEC. The 1-2 punch of Rachele Fico and Brittany Mack amassed 36 of LSU's 40 victories during 2012 in the circle.

Fico garnered 20 victories, a stout 1.12 ERA, racked up 221 strikeouts, limited opponents to a .183 batting average and tossed 13 shutouts over 230.1 innings. Her 1.12 ERA and 13 shutouts were fourth and fifth, respectively, in the NCAA rankings.

Mack created and championed the "Geaux Play" program where new or gently used sports equipment was donated at home games to benefit the Miracle League Association at Cypress Mounds. She was named a Lowe's Senior Class Award Top 30 Finalist and the SEC's Co-Scholar Athlete of the Year, the first time a LSU softball

player has received that award.

Fico and Mack finished their careers as two of LSU's most decorated hurlers. The duo combined for 134 victories and 1,399 strikeouts during their careers. They are two of the six pitchers in program history to account for 600-plus Ks.

Both Mack (2012) and Fico (2013) went onto become the first overall draft picks in the National Pro Fastpitch (NPF) League during consecutive years. Mack played her first season with the USSSA Florida Pride under Torina before the pair was reunited with the Akron Racers in 2013.

Torina spent three seasons with the Pride as an assistant coach (2010) followed by a two-year run as head coach (2011-12). During her tenure, the organization captured the 2012 Ringer Cup trophy awarded to the league's regular season champion and won the 2010 NPF championship. The Pride roster featured multiple Olympians which includes ESPN softball analyst Jessica Mendoza along with Caitlin Lowe and Natasha Watley.

Before joining the LSU program in June 2011, Torina took Florida International of the Sun Belt Conference to new heights. The two-time SBC Coach of the Year led the Golden Panthers to a 129-111 record in four seasons and directed FIU to its first NCAA Tournament victory in 2010.

The 2010 campaign saw the Golden Panthers sweep the SBC postseason awards as Kasey Barrett was the league's Pitcher of the Year, Ashley McClain was tabbed Player of the Year and Brie Rojas garnered Freshman of the Year status.

Individually, Torina coached 10 players to 14 All-SBC selections sparked by Jessy Alfonso and McClain, who have picked up All-SBC First-Team honors during each of the last two seasons. McClain also has collected 2010 and 2011 NFCA All-South Region First-Team accolades.

Torina spent five seasons as the pitching coach and recruiting coordinator at the University of Houston from 2003-07. The Cougars claimed the 2007 Conference USA regular season and tournament titles. One of her most prized recruits, Angel Shamblin, went on to become a two-time C-USA Pitcher of the Year, an NFCA All-South Region selection and a 2008 NFCA All-American. In addition to Shamblin, Torina saw seven UH hurlers receive All-Conference USA accolades during her tenure.

Torina began her coaching career as an assistant coach at Stetson University from 2000-02, leaving her mark on the Hatters' softball program after helping lead the 2001 squad to a share of the regular season Atlantic Sun Conference championship. Torina's pitchers set a quartet of school records, including wins (45), shutouts (20), strikeouts (385) and strikeouts per seven innings (6.70).

Torina earned her B.S. in health sciences and occupational therapy from Florida in 2000. During her playing career with the Gators, she was a member of the 1998 Southeastern Conference regular season championship team as the squad's top pitcher. She posted 60 career wins, which currently ranks tied for fourth in the UF record book. In the classroom, Torina was a GTE Academic All-America and a finalist for the 2000 H. Boyd McWhorter SEC Scholar-Athlete of the Year.

Torina has established an active community service function within the softball program as the Tigers regularly visit hospitals and schools in the Baton Rouge area. She is personally involved in several philanthropic causes highlighted by the program's annual "Strikeout Ovarian Cancer" event where LSU wears teal jerseys to celebrate survivors and support the cause of spreading ovarian cancer awareness. Torina's mother, Betty Dieter, is a seven-year ovarian cancer survivor.

In 2012, the inaugural "Geaux Teal Ovarian Cancer Walk" was added to the event. The walk began at Tiger Park and rose close to \$15,000 for ovarian cancer research. Torina serves on a committee of women from Baton Rouge to New Orleans with connections to ovarian cancer either as a survivor or lost a family member to the deadly disease. The group promoted "Ovarian Cancer Awareness Month" and received a proclamation from Governor Bobby Jindal during September 2013.

Torina and her husband, Nick, were married in January 2010. The couple has three daughters in Taryn, Tatum and Tenley. They currently reside in Baton Rouge.





# HOWARD DOBSON

## ASSISTANT COACH

### 5<sup>TH</sup> SEASON AT LSU



Howard Dobson enters his fifth season as an assistant coach at LSU. He serves as the program's hitting coach and assists with recruiting.

Known in some circles as one of the best hitting instructors in the nation, the 2015 Tigers set five team statistical records on the way to Dobson's fourth trip to the Women's College World Series, while producing two of the most prolific home run hitting teams LSU has ever seen. LSU finished the season setting a new team record with a .395 batting average, .523 slugging percentage and .425 on-base percentage, driving in a record 392 RBIs and scoring 428 times. The squad finished two homers shy of tying the record set last season with 63, including having the first trio of players with multiple home runs since the mid-2000's and just the second time ever.

Seven of eight LSU starters finished the 2015 year with a batting average above .300, with two nearly breaking a 15-year-old record in the process hitting above .400 in Bianca Bell and Bailey Landry. LSU produced a record five NFCA All-Americans led by Bell on the first team, with Landry and Savannah Jaquish landing on the second team. Bell was named the Louisiana Hitter of the Year becoming the fourth player to win that award ever at LSU, while also earned a spot with her coach on the USA Softball Senior Women's National Team.

Since joining the staff, Dobson has helped lead a resurgence of the Tiger offense in a big way, as the 2014 team earned the second highest team batting average in program history at .314, while the squad's 65 home runs were the most in a single year as a group in program history. LSU turned in a 65-point improvement in batting average from the 2012 to 2013 season, improving it another 30 points to jump from .220 to .314 during that span.

Savannah Jaquish was the 16th player in program history to become an NFCA All-American, as she was one of seven players to finish the season with a batting average of .300 or better. Jaquish, along with Bianca Bell (NFCA All-South Region first team), A.J. Andrews (All-SEC Second Team, NFCA All-South Region second team), Allison Falcon (NFCA All-South Region second team), Bailey Landry, Tammy Wray and Sandra Simmons each achieved this feat in 2014.

Dobson returned to the Women's College World Series for the third time in his

coaching career with the Tigers during the 2012 season. Ashley Langoni joined former All-American Leslie Klein (2006) and Rachel Mitchell (2008) as the only players to capture the program's triple crown during a single season.

The Tigers had five players collect over a .300 batting average which included All-SEC honorees A.J. Andrews (first team), Bianca Bell (second team) and Jacee Blades (second team). Andrews was the 15th player in program history to notch NFCA All-America status, while Bell garnered the SEC's Freshman of the Year award after her 12 homers tied for third-most in program history for a single season.

Dobson has been heavily involved with USA Softball over the last four summers. He served as an assistant coach on the USA Softball Elite Team in 2012 and the USA Softball Women's National Team in 2013. He traveled with Team USA to the World Cup of Softball and the Canadian Open and returned as an assistant coach for the senior national team in the summer of 2014.

Dobson spent the previous four seasons as the head coach of Southern Miss. During his tenure with the Golden Eagles, he coached seven All-Conference USA performers highlighted by Megan Hill. The four-time All-Conference USA pick set eight offensive program records, including hits (205), RBIs (151), runs scored (148), home runs (48) and total bases (398). She also garnered NFCA All-Midwest First-Team accolades, the program's first recipient since the 2000 season.

Prior to Southern Miss, Dobson served as an assistant coach at Oklahoma for five seasons. He helped the Sooners continue to develop their reputation as not only a Big 12 offensive powerhouse but a national offensive juggernaut.

OU topped the Big 12 in scoring and also ranked among the league's top two in batting average during all five of his seasons in Norman. The Sooners had seven players secure NFCA All-American honors in addition to 15 NFCA All-Midwest Region selections and 20 All-Big 12 honorees. Norrele Dickson, Heather Scaglione and Kristin Vesely racked up multiple NFCA All-America selections under Dobson.

Dobson played an instrumental role as OU made a pair of trips to the Women's College World Series trips in 2003 and 2004. The Sooners also made four NCAA Super Regional runs (2003, 2004, 2005, 2007) during their five consecutive trips to the postseason sparked by a 55-win campaign in 2007, which is tied for third in the OU record books.

Before Oklahoma, Dobson contributed to the establishment of Houston's softball program in 2000. The Orange, Texas, native had players notch 10 All-Conference USA accolades in two seasons fueled by Kristen Glowacz's 2002 C-USA Freshman of the Year award. The 2002 Cougars paced C-USA in hits (480), runs scored (279), slugging percentage (.448), RBIs (244) and home runs (47).

Dobson began his coaching career in the Pelican State with stops at Southeastern Louisiana, McNeese State and Barbe High School in Lake Charles. He directed his team at Barbe to a 5A state championship and gained valuable experience working at collegiate skills camps along with coaching on the international level. In the summer of 1999, his international team won the German Open.

A former all-conference performer at Panola College in Carthage, Texas, Dobson went on to finish his collegiate baseball career at McNeese State where he graduated with a degree in health and human performance and English in 1997.

Dobson and his wife, Katharine, have a 10-year-old son Trip. They live in Baton Rouge.







# LINDSAY LEFTWICH

## ASSISTANT COACH

### 5<sup>TH</sup> SEASON AT LSU

Lindsay Leftwich embarks on her fifth season as an assistant coach at LSU. She is involved with all aspects of the program which include defense, hitting, recruiting, video scouting and camps.

The former Northwestern State standout has been with Beth Torina for every step of her eight-year head coaching career which includes LSU's run to the 2012 and 2015 Women's College World Series.

Under Leftwich, LSU produced her second SEC All-Defensive Team member in first baseman Sandra Simmons who produced a fielding percentage of .970, while catcher Kelsi Kloss led all players with a .988 mark behind the plate for the Tigers.

In 2014 the team produced its highest fielding percentage under Leftwich, finishing in the top five in the league with a .970 mark. Under her watch, six different players posted defensive averages above led by Sandra Simons who led

the team with a .994 average with 309 putouts.

LSU improved its fielding percentage to a .968 ratio to rank fourth on the SEC leaderboard during the 2013 season. Sandra Simmons tallied 306 putouts, the sixth-most by a position player in program history. She also amassed a .991 fielding clip which sits in fifth place on LSU's all-time list.

The Tigers came away with a .964 team fielding percentage in 2012, the fourth-best defensive clip in the SEC. Ashley Langoni totaled 74 putouts and four assists from her left field post as an All-SEC Defensive Team pick. LSU's catching tandem of Morgan Russell and Lauren Houston gunned down a combined 21 base runners attempting to steal. The total equaled the program's second-highest single season mark.

Before coming to LSU, Leftwich spent four seasons as Torina's top assistant at Florida International. The Golden Panthers collected 14 All-Sun Belt selections sparked by a sweep of the league's 2010 postseason

awards where Kasey Barrett picked up the SBC's Pitcher of the Year, Ashley McClain notched SBC Player of the Year and Brie Rojas secured SBC Freshman of the Year. McClain also has come away with National Fastpitch Coaches Association [NFCA] All-South Region First-Team honors in 2010 and 2011.

FIU posted a 38-21 record and claimed the program's second-ever NCAA Tournament bid and first-ever NCAA Tournament victory in 2010. The Golden Panthers improved their win total during three of her four seasons, and she aided Torina to a pair of SBC Coach of the Year awards.

Prior to FIU, Leftwich served as a graduate assistant at New Mexico. She was in charge of softball operations and assisted with daily coaching duties during the 2007 season. In 2006, Leftwich worked as the pitching coach at Wichita State where she helped the Shockers compile a 35-23 record.

Leftwich, a native of Houston, Texas, opened her coaching career as a student assistant at Northwestern State. She aided in coaching the offense and catchers in addition to playing an instrumental role in recruiting, fundraising, alumni relations and camps.

Leftwich enjoyed a three-year playing career with the Demons highlighted by NFCA All-Southeast Region, All-Southland Conference and All-Louisiana Second-Team selections in 2002.

NSU racked up a program-record 45 victories en route to a NCAA Tournament berth during the 2002 campaign. Leftwich drove home 44 RBIs, which are currently tied for third-most in program history for a single season, while her 123 assists on the infield paced the Southland Conference.

During her career, Leftwich added five Southland Conference along with a pair of Louisiana Sports Writers Association [LSWA] Hitter of the Week awards. She finished her career ranked fifth in both home runs and RBIs at NSU after a back injury held her out of her senior season.

An excellent student-athlete, Leftwich garnered numerous academic accolades, including Verizon Academic All-District Team recognition in 2002 and 2004 and NFCA Scholar Athlete recognition from 2001-04. In 2005, she earned a bachelor's degree in psychology and a minor in art and substance abuse prevention.

Kara Dill enters her second season as a volunteer assistant coach at LSU after spending the previous five years at Kentucky as both a student-athlete and volunteer assistant coach for the Wildcats. Dill will assist in all aspects of the program, with a primary focus on the Tigers' slap hitters.

In her first season in 2015, Dill led the talented group to a prolific season at the plate, led by second team NFCA All-American selection Bailey Landry who led the Tigers with a .421 batting average and 89 hits. Under her watch last season, LSU slappers accounted for 216 of the team's 565 total hits.

The LaGrange, Ohio, native is coming off of stint in Lexington that went unrivaled in the program's existence which included two NCAA Super Regional berths and the school's first trip to the Women's College World Series this past summer after amassing 50 wins.

Dill was one of the most feared leadoff hitters in the Southeastern Conference while at UK, kicking off her career with a 15-game hitting streak as a freshman en route to an inaugural campaign that saw her earn 71 which was the fifth most for any Kentucky player in a single-season. By the time she ended her career, she finished eighth in hits with 201, sixth in stolen bases with 57, fifth in batting average at .330 and seventh in runs scored with 119 to go along with two All-SEC selections.

The consummate student-athlete, Dill was able to graduate from Kentucky with her bachelor's degree three semesters early, eventually completing her masters while concluding her stellar career on the diamond. After her senior year, where she led the team in batting average, Dill was named to the SEC Community Service Team for her work with various groups, as well as being a CoSIDA Capitol One Academic All-District selection.

While at Kentucky, Dill was named to the Frank G. Ham Society of Character, which annually honors Kentucky Wildcats who have shown an extraordinary commitment to academic excellence, athletic participation, personal development, career preparation and serving as a role model. She was also up for the Lowe's Senior CLASS Award, which recognizes student-athletes who utilize their complete athletic eligibility while honoring the four core attributes of the award in community, classroom, character and competition.

Dill resides in Baton Rouge.

Quinlan Duhon moves into her seventh season as the director of operations for the LSU softball program after her exceptional four-year career from 2005-08. She also served as a student marketing assistant during the 2008-09 academic year following her playing career.

Duhon is responsible for handling all the behind-the-scenes aspects of the softball program which earned its fourth trip to the Women's College World Series in 2015. Her responsibilities include team travel, supporting camp operations, supervising player academic progress, ordering and distributing of equipment, organizing recruiting functions and campus visits, as well as serving as the program's liaison to the Diamond Backers Booster Club. She also oversees a staff of three student managers.

Duhon has been instrumental in the direction and growth of the team's footprint in the Baton Rouge community by coordinating the season ticket delivery program, assisting in the development of the program's "Strikeout Ovarian Cancer" event to raise awareness for ovarian cancer and being involved in the scheduling of the team's philanthropy projects.

Duhon has played a major role in keeping Tiger Park as the nation's state-of-the-art softball facility. The team's clubhouse received a complete graphics makeover following its 2012 WCWS run. Updated graphics also were installed on the ballpark's concourse and party deck.

On gameday, Duhon manages the coaching staff's T2 motion video file system from the press box and handles pregame motivational video pieces for the Tigers.

During her playing career, Duhon was a part of three NCAA Regional teams highlighted by the 2006 and 2007 Super Regional squads. She scored the walk-off, game-winning run in a 5-4 triumph over Louisiana-Lafayette in the 2006 NCAA Regional championship game.

LSU spent the duration of the 2007 season in the nation's Top 10 and compiled an impressive 55-12 record. The Tigers tallied series victories over both No. 1 Tennessee and No. 2 Alabama during the regular season to win its fourth SEC Western Division crown and fourth SEC Tournament title during the Yvette Girouard era.

Duhon had an outstanding postseason being named to both the NCAA Palo Alto Regional and Tempe Super Regional All-Tournament teams. She cranked three home runs in NCAA play, including a two-run shot as part of a 3-2 win against Cal State Northridge in the NCAA Regional opening round.

As one of three captains for the 2008 team, Duhon posted career-bests in batting average (.333), hits (54), home runs (11), RBIs (38), on-base (.424) and slugging percentage (.605) en route to an All-SEC and All-Louisiana Second-Team honors.

Duhon finished her LSU career ranked third belting 30 career home runs and is listed among the school's Top 10 in walks (68), RBIs (128), total bases (300) and sacrifice flies (13). She is one of only 11 players in program history to score over 100 runs and post over 150 career hits. The Youngsville native also was a four-time SEC Academic Honor Roll selection.

Duhon earned her bachelor's degree in general business from LSU 2008 and her masters degree in sports management in December 2013. She lives in Baton Rouge.

Clyde Verdin enters his second season as an Associate Sports Information Director at LSU. He serves as the media relations contact for the Tiger softball and volleyball teams in addition to promoting LSU's community service efforts.

In his first year, Verdin helped publicized an All-American in both sports, including first team selection Briana Holman in volleyball and second team selection Savannah Jaquish in 2014. Among those have been seven All-SEC selections, along with a host of other state and national accolades.

Verdin comes to LSU from Nicholls State University where he was the Director of Media Relations, overseeing the communications efforts for the Division I institution's 14 intercollegiate sports. Verdin was the primary contact for men's basketball, baseball, women's soccer, women's volleyball, men's and women's cross country, women's track and field and men's golf. While there he publicized multiple first team All-Southland Conference honorees, including the first player of the year for the women's soccer program and student-athlete of the year in women's track and field history.

While there he also assisted with the Allstate Sugar Bowl, NCAA Men's Basketball Tournament and NFL Kickoff Weekend. That season, the PR staff was considered one of the top five in the league.

Verdin spent more than a year as an intern at the University of Missouri, serving as contact for the track and field teams and the swimming and diving teams.

Verdin graduated from Nicholls State University with a Bachelor of Arts in Mass Communications with a concentration in Broadcast Journalism. While there he worked in the athletic department serving in various roles.

## TIGERS EARN PROGRAM'S FOURTH WCWS TRIP

In the fourth season under head coach Beth Torina, the 2015 LSU softball team began a new season the way they had always done, putting in hard work in the fall before fine tuning the rest in the weeks before the season opener in February. Little did they know that the work they put in, along with the rallying cry of "Power of One," would lead the Tigers on a remarkable run that saw the team return to the Women's College World Series for the fourth time in program history and winning 52 games for the first time since 2007.

In an improbable start that took the nation by storm, LSU raced out to a perfect 25-0 start to the season, the best in program history and the best start for any team in department history at LSU. The Tigers vaulted up the rankings after the start, moving all the way from 19th at the start of the year to third in a meteoric rise that captured the attention of the softball world.

Not content to let the momentum slip through their fingers, the

Tigers went on the road after that start and went toe-to-toe with the defending national champion Florida Gators, taking two of three in the series to not only sit atop the league standings, but also earn the program's first No. 1 ranking in the polls, holding the top spot for three weeks throughout the season and never falling out of the top 10 for the rest of the campaign.

The Tigers took on all comers in 2015, squaring off with more than a dozen ranked teams throughout the year. LSU took that No. 1 ranking and welcomed Oklahoma to Tiger Park the very next weekend and swept the two-game series by outscoring the Sooners 11-2 with a run-rule game included to cement its top ranking status.

LSU ran into its first road block on the road in frigid conditions in Lexington, Kentucky, getting a pitching gem in a 2-0 win over the Wildcats to stave off a sweep in the finale. Unfazed, the Tigers came back to win its next four games in a row to reclaim the top spot after

### LSU PRODUCES NATION-TYING FIVE ALL-AMERICANS

After a record season that saw LSU return to the Women's College World Series for the fourth time in program history and first time since 2012, the Tigers picked up a host of postseason accolades, including having five NFCA All-Americans named to one of its three lists which tied Michigan for the most in the nation in 2015.

Bianka Bell, Carley Hoover, Sahvanna Jaquish, Bailey Landry and Allie Walljasper were LSU's representatives as the top players in the nation for the year, the most LSU has had selected in a single season in program history.

Bell, Hoover, Landry and Walljasper earned NFCA All-America honors for the first time in their careers, while Jaquish became just the seventh player to earn multiple honors, the first since Rachele Fico to be an All-American in back-to-back years.

"Having an All-American in your program is a dream for any coach, but to have five named as some of the best players in the entire country is an unbelievable honor," LSU head coach Beth Torina said. "Bianka, Bailey, Sahvanna, Carley and Allie have all had amazing seasons individually, while helping this team achieve new heights as a group together. From day one they've realized how important their teammates are to not only individual accolades, but group accomplishments as a whole, and they never lost sight of the team's true goal and 'Power of One' motto that has helped us get here to Oklahoma City and the Women's College World Series.





## BELL SETS HOME RUN MARKS AMID BANNER YEAR

A First Team NFCA All-American selection, Bianka Bell produced one of the most prolific offensive seasons for an LSU player in Tiger history in 2015, including setting the single-season and career home run marks in the same year.

Hitting over .400 for the season, the Tampa, Florida, native led LSU in doubles, runs, total bases, on-base percentage and slugging, while finishing the year second in hitting percentage, hits and RBIs. The slugging and total bases were also both LSU single-season records.

In her very first at bat in a series-clinching victory at home against Arkansas, Bell became the all-time leader in program history in smashing the 34th of her career, passing Rachel Mitchell who had held the record since 2010.

In the opening game of the Women's College World Series against Auburn and sitting in a tie for first place for the single-season record, just like she had previously done against Arkansas she gave LSU life offensively by sending one over the fence in ASA Hall of Fame Stadium - OGE field, giving her 18 for the year and capping her junior season with the all-time single season record.

Bell ended the year as a first team All-SEC pick, first team NFCA All-South Region, first team NFCA All-American, first team All-Louisiana and the Louisiana Hitter of the Year. She went on later that summer to represent the United States with the USA Softball Women's National Team.

falling to No. 2, earning wins over ULM and Ole Miss.

Winning each of the next two series' against Tennessee and Texas A&M, LSU was in prime position to make a case for hosting at the very least a regional in Baton Rouge heading into the home stretch, and although the group dropped its final two weekends against Missouri and Auburn, the Tigers had done enough work when the postseason arrived to achieve its highest seed in program history at No. 5, securing hosting duties for a regional and super regional.

While LSU was able to open the postseason with a 15-0 win over Texas Southern, the Tigers fell to the elimination bracket with a 1-0 loss to Arizona State the next day. Later that night the team would need a 3-2 win in 10 innings over Nebraska to stay alive in a rematch of an early regular season game, going into Sunday needing to be ASU twice to advance.

After earning a 5-0 win over the Sun Devils in the first game, extra innings would be needed once again to determine a winner, as the Tigers got another walk-off hit in the ninth to advance to the Super Regional Round.

Another rematch awaited LSU as the team hosted Arizona, a team they had defeated out in Palm Springs during its hot start to open the year. The Tigers scored all eight of their runs in the first three innings to defeat the Wildcats in five innings in the opener, holding off the visitors the very next day by earning a 10-5 victory, sending LSU to Oklahoma City for the first time since 2012.

LSU was able to knock off rivals Auburn and Alabama during its time at ASA Hall of Fame Stadium - OGE Energy Field with 6-1 and 5-3 scores, respectively, falling only to eventual champion Florida and to Michigan in the semifinals of the tournament to end the year with a 52-14 record and finishing third overall in the event.

Various Tigers were honored throughout the season, as LSU players were bestowed with 27 individual weekly awards during the 2015 year. Each of LSU's pitchers earned a pitcher of the week award, while the squad had two players earn all three player of the week honors in the same week.

LSU finished the year racking up the postseason awards as well, tying Michigan for the most All-American selections with five, which was also the most for the program in team history. Bianka Bell, Carley Hoover, Savannah Jaquish, Bailey Landry and Allie Walljasper were all featured on the three-team list of the nation's best, as Bell and A.J. Andrews were both on the watch lists for the national player of the year award, Hoover and Walljasper were on the watch list for the national freshman of the year award.

The group was also recognized by the league, with Bell, Jaquish and Kelsi Kloss being selected to the All-SEC first team, while A.J. Andrews

and Bailey Landry were each selected to the second team. Sandra Simmons earned a spot on the nine-member SEC All-Defensive Team, while Emily Griggs and Hoover were named to the SEC All-Freshman Team.

Away from the field, Dylan Supak became the first LSU player to be a CoSIDA Academic All-American, landing on the organization's second team after being a first-teamer on the All-District squad, while also becoming the second player to earn the Elite 89 award, which is given to the student-athlete with the highest cumulative grade point average that is participating at the finals site for NCAA championships. Simmons was also selected to the SEC Community Service Team.

For their efforts, the LSU coaching staff of Torina, Howard Dobson, Lindsay Leftwich, Kara Dill and student coach Tammy Wray was named the NFCA South Region Coaching Staff of the Year by the NFCA, earning the award for the first time since the 2004 season.

## Tigers Celebrate 'Strikeout Ovarian Cancer' with Fourth Win

In the fourth-annual "Strikeout Ovarian Cancer" game, the No. 3 LSU softball team looked to keep its record unblemished not only in the game, but at home in Tiger Park, and did so plating six runs on 11 hits to pull away and defeat the No. 24 Texas A&M Aggies 6-1 Saturday night in Baton Rouge.

After scoring a run in the very first inning, things were close until the Tigers (40-5, 12-4 Southeastern) scored five-straight runs from the fourth on while the Aggies were only able to plate their lone run in the fifth and nothing more as LSU improved to 4-0 in the Teal game and 29-0 at home in 2015.

"I think second time through the lineup, we were able to make some adjustments off of their pitcher, and our offense did a good job at staying with the plan and trusting it," head coach Beth Torina said. "Ultimately we came away today with the victory."

LSU starting pitcher Carley Hoover (12-2) earned the win for the Tigers by scattering five hits and allowing one run with six strikeouts and four walks, tossing 146 pitches against Texas A&M. Although running into a few trouble spots on the night, one of LSU's two national freshman of the year candidates stood tall and helped the cause by having Texas A&M strand eight runners on base over the course of the game.

"Honestly it's such an honor that I'm even pitching in this game tonight. I mean there were four options to throw tonight, but the fact that I get to wear the jersey on the field and coach dressed me in a game that means so much to her, I'm just really honored to be out there tonight," Hoover said. "It was just a really, really cool day to see everyone and meet people and to hear their stories. I don't really cry but I was really trying not to cry all day."

Two years after embarking on her first season as head coach and leading LSU back to the Women's College World Series, head coach Beth Torina wasted little time in getting the team back as in 2015 the Tigers made their return and finished third overall for the third time in four total trips to Oklahoma City.

LSU opened postseason play in Tiger Park, hosting a regional that featured Arizona State, Nebraska and Texas Southern.

The Tigers opened the tournament by tying its season high for runs scored on the season with a 15-0 win over Texas Southern in five innings. LSU produced 11 hits and Kelsee Selman went the distance, improving to 9-0 on the year with her sixth shutout of the season.

In the winner's game, LSU squared off with the Sun Devils and in an ultra-competitive tilt a single run was scored between the two as LSU fell to ASU to fall into the elimination game later that night.

That game wound up being a rematch against a Nebraska team that LSU had already beaten earlier in the season 10-2 in five innings in California at the beginning of the year. Instead of a rehash of that previous contest, the Huskers were up for the fight as LSU and Nebraska each scored in the fourth inning and forced extras, where LSU got two runs in the 10th and held on in the bottom half of that same inning to move on to Sunday with a 3-2 win.

Needing two wins to continue playing, LSU opened the final day of the event with a 5-0 win over Arizona State to force a winner-take-all finale that lived up to the billing, with a game going to extras for the second straight day.

After taking the lead and watching it slip, and rallying back to tie it up late, LSU earned the final at-bat and got a walkoff game-winning hit from Bianka Bell to send LSU to the super regional round.

The super regional was another rematch for LSU, hosting Arizona,

another team LSU had beaten earlier in the season in California.

After needing to use all of its fight the previous week, LSU didn't let the visiting Wildcats have any momentum from the start, getting a one-hit shutout from Carley Hoover in the circle while scoring all eight of its runs in the first three innings to win 8-0 in five.

The next day, the Tigers once again brought the bats, scoring 10 runs to put enough distance between themselves and Arizona, booking a place in OKC the very next week.

The opening round game allowed LSU to enact a bit of revenge from the the final week of the regular season, matching up with Auburn who was making their first trip in program history. The Tigers scored five runs in the first three innings and Hoover pitched the complete game, allowing just one run in a 6-1 victory over the Tigers.

Unfortunately LSU ran into a hot Florida team the next day and was held to five hits, falling 4-0 to fall into the elimination bracket.

The final game of the day pitted LSU against Alabama in a classic SEC rivalry contest, one that LSU began by scoring all five of its runs in the first two innings, while getting six strong innings from Allie Walljasper and an inning from Hoover to hold on for a 5-3 win, eliminating the Crimson Tide.

Needing to beat Michigan twice, LSU started out well, going up 3-1 before the Wolverines tied the game in the bottom of the fourth. Unfortunately, LSU would not score again as Michigan plated three in the bottom of the sixth to take the lead, ending LSU's season in the very next inning to defeat the Tigers 6-3.

When Beth Torina was introduced as LSU softball's fifth head coach in June 2012, she vowed to win in everything the program did and return to the Tigers to national prominence.

Torina accomplished just that during her inaugural campaign as LSU returned to Oklahoma City and the Women's College World Series.

Led by eight seniors, the Tigers knocked off two seeded teams and future SEC rivals in No. 8 Texas A&M and No. 9 Missouri along the way.

To get back to softball's biggest stage, LSU embraced the mantra of "Whatever It Takes". Torina gave puzzle pieces to the players ranging from academic success to key performances in practices and games throughout the season. Each piece had different people that had the 'it' factor, and the puzzle was completed leading into LSU's trip to the NCAA postseason.

The Tigers started NCAA Regional play with a dramatic 1-0 victory over Texas State. Juliana Santos capped a three-hit barrage in the seventh inning with a walkoff RBI-single.

Rachele Fico fired her second straight two-hit shutout in as many days as LSU stayed in the winner's bracket with a 2-0 triumph over Texas A&M.

In the NCAA College Station Regional championship, Brittany Mack put together a masterful performance in a 2-1 win over the Aggies. LSU scored its two runs on a pinch-hit sacrifice fly from Kailey McCasland and a Dylan Supak infield single that was followed by a A&M throwing error.

The Tigers opened up the NCAA Columbia Super Regional and exploded for a 6-1 victory by roughing up Missouri All-American hurler Chelsea Thomas. Allison Falcon led the way with a 2-for-3 effort

and three RBIs.

After Missouri claimed a 5-1 game two win in 12 innings and overcame a career-best 17 strikeouts from Mack, LSU bounced back in the deciding contest aided by Simone Heyward's first extra base hit of the season. The timely three-run double came in the third inning and erased a 1-0 deficit.

Fico retired 12 of the final 14 Missouri hitters she faced, and Ashley Langoni squeezed the games last out with a runner on second base.

LSU carried the momentum into its opening game of the WCWS and fired out to a 2-0 lead on No. 1 California on a two-run, second inning single from Morgan Russell. The Golden Bears charged back with five unanswered runs highlighted by a three-run sixth inning.

Facing elimination in a 0-0 contest versus No. 19 South Florida, Andrews used alert base running to score the game's only run on a sacrifice popout in the sixth inning.

On a 1-0 offering, Falcon popped up to shortstop Kourtney Salvarola. Since Salvarola was playing drawn in with the bases loaded, Andrews tagged from the third base bag and scampered home. Salvarola's throw was offline which enabled Andrews to slide around the tag attempt head-first safely into home plate. Mack dealt a two-hit shutout to preserve the 1-0 win.

Defending national champion and No. 3 Arizona State ended LSU's run with a 6-0 win. The session attendance was 9,310, the largest number of fans to attend a softball game in program history.

For Yvette Girouard and the LSU softball program, the second run to the Women's College World Series was filled with as much joy, drama and excitement as the original.

Like in 2001, the Tigers accomplished the SEC triple crown and claimed the SEC Western Division, Regular Season and Tournament championships.

LSU also won a heart-stopping 13-inning affair and nearly pulled off an impossible feat at the WCWS.

After starting the 2004 campaign with a 5-3 record, the Tigers strung together a 17-game winning streak. LSU continued its climb up the polls sparked by a three-game sweep at No. 7 Alabama to end March and checked in with a No. 2 ranking heading into postseason play.

A trio of wins over Alabama, Auburn and Georgia, all ranked among the Top 15, allowed the Tigers to win their third SEC Tournament in five years.

Unlike 2001, LSU's quest to Oklahoma City didn't start inside the friendly confines of Tiger Park. Instead, the Tigers were shipped to Waco, Texas and Baylor University for the NCAA Regionals.

After wins over Texas A&M-Corpus Christi and Seton Hall, LSU found itself down 3-0 to Baylor after two innings. Camille Harris kickstarted a three-run third inning with a solo home run to left field. Three batters later, future All-American Leslie Klein belted a two-run triple down the right field line to even the score at 3-3.

The Tigers exploded for a quartet of runs in the 10th inning. Stephanie Hill and Lauren Delahoussaye provided RBIs coupled with a Baylor error and wild pitch.

The next day against Illinois, Julie Wiese jumpstarted LSU with a solo shot in the second inning followed by RBI hits from Delahoussaye in the third and fifth innings.

That would be more than enough run support for two-time All-American Kristin Schmidt. She was touched up for only an unearned run on three hits to go along with nine strikeouts as the Tigers raced past the Fighting Illini 4-1 to return to the WCWS.

Another Big 10 team, No. 6 Michigan, would bite the dust in LSU's opening game in Oklahoma City. After 11 scoreless frames, the Wolverines took a 2-0 advantage to

open the 12th inning. In the home half, the Tigers used an RBI-single by Leigh Ann Danos and a passed ball to knot the score at 2-2.

LSU won the game in the 13th on a Harris infield single. After two throwing errors, Sara Fitzgerald crossed home for the game-winning run. In the circle, Schmidt fired all 13 innings and tallied 13 strikeouts.

Following a 2-0 setback to No. 2 UCLA, rain altered the WCWS schedule. The Tigers were faced with the task of winning three games in one day to advance to the championship game.

A Fitzgerald RBI-single in the fourth inning proved to be the game winner as LSU edged No. 4 Florida State 2-1 to start the day. Schmidt provided another 13 strikeouts and surrendered only one run on four hits.

The Tigers fought off elimination for a second time and erased an early 1-0 deficit against No. 5 California. Klein opened the second inning with a solo home run, Harris followed with a two-out, two-run double in the third and Delahoussaye tacked on an insurance run with an RBI-double during the sixth.

Schmidt added eight strikeouts and pitched around trouble to close out the 4-1 victory for her third win of the WCWS.

LSU was poised to finish out the hat trick and carried a 1-0 lead into the fifth inning. Seven outs away, the Golden Bears struck for a quartet of runs to take the win.

"What more could you ask for from your team," Girouard said after the game. "I told the team before we got off the bus this morning that we weren't leaving the park until they turned out the lights on us tonight and we are doing just that. Unfortunately, we came up just a little short."

"This team did everything my staff asked of them. They played with total heart. Kristin Schmidt pitched her heart out and this team never died. If I have ever coached a team that deserved to go to the national championship game, then it is certainly this group of girls."

Yvette Girouard's first season at LSU ended in storybook fashion as the Tigers racked up a school record 59 wins and qualified for the program's first Women's College World Series.

LSU also completed the SEC triple crown for the first time en route to the SEC Western Division, Regular Season and Tournament championships.

After splitting a doubleheader at No. 21 Louisiana-Lafayette on April 18, the Tigers reeled off 12 consecutive victories to climb up to No. 3 in the national rankings.

Girouard refocused her team after a 7-3 setback at Auburn in the regular season finale and fired back with a 6-0 win over Auburn to open the SEC Tournament.

Three days later, All-American Stephanie Hastings belted a solo home run that stayed just inside the left field foul pole to open the SEC Championship against No. 22 South Carolina.

The first-inning blast coupled with a stellar effort from SEC Player of the Year Britni Sneed in the circle were more than enough to avenge a 1-0 setback to the Gamecocks from the season before.

Sneed hurled a three-hitter to complete her undefeated SEC season and recorded a tournament-record 11 strikeouts against zero walks to secure the MVP honor and 1-0 triumph.

LSU opened NCAA Regional action with

victories over Cornell, Penn State and No. 9 Arizona State before facing No. 19 Louisiana-Lafayette in the finals.

The Tigers broke through for a pair of runs in the third inning as Hastings and future All-American Trena Peel provided RBIs.

An Alana Addison homer brought ULL within 2-1, but Sneed shut the door on the Cajuns retiring 12 of the final 15 batters highlighted by a strikeout of Heather Bertrand to vault LSU to the Women's College World Series.

Following a 2-1 hard-fought, extra inning loss to No. 4 Stanford, the Tigers bounced back behind a Julie Wiese two-run homer to dismiss No. 15 Iowa and set up an elimination tussle with No. 5 Oklahoma, the defending national champion.

The teams battled deep into the night before LSU emerged with a gritty 2-1 triumph in the 13th inning. An errant throw off an Ashley Lewis ground ball allowed Jennifer Schuelke to cross the plate for the game winning run.

Sneed willed her way to an impressive 18 strikeouts, a program single-game record. She escaped multiple jams during extra innings, none more impressive than back-to-back Ks to get out of a bases loaded situation in the 10th.

The game was viewed by 1.57 million fans, a softball record at the time according to NCAA Productions.

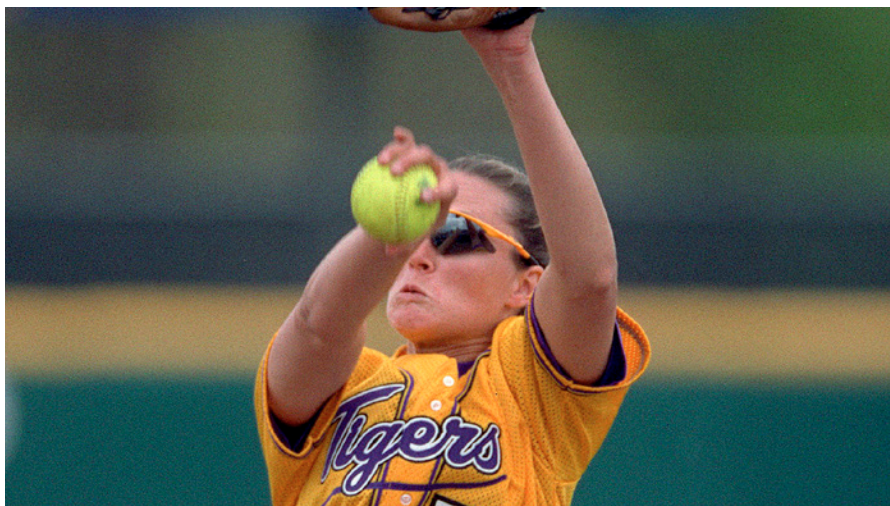

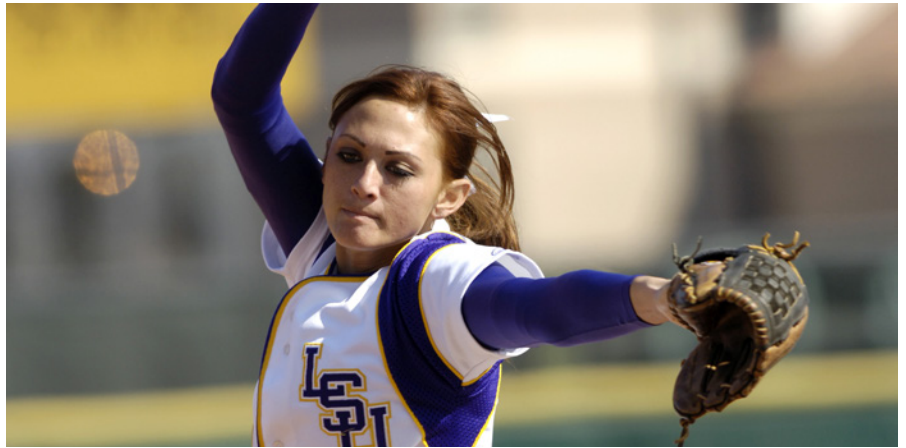

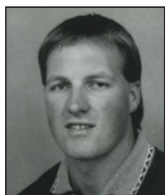

## Dr. F. King Alexander

President/Chancellor, LSU



Dr. F. King Alexander was named the president and chancellor of Louisiana State University, which has an annual budget of \$3.4 billion and more than 54,000 students. He was appointed to the position by the LSU Board of Supervisors in March 2013 and assumed the position on July 1.

Prior to being named the president, Dr. Alexander was president of California State University, Long Beach (2006-2013) one of the nation's largest public universities located in southern California.

During his more than seven-year tenure at California State University, Long Beach, Dr. Alexander was twice named the California State University Student Association (CSSA) "President of the Year," which represents all 23 California State Universities and its over 440,000 students.

Prior to becoming president of California State University, Long Beach, Dr. Alexander was president of Murray State University in Kentucky (2001-2005) and was a faculty member at the University of Illinois, Champaign-Urbana, where he was the director of the graduate higher education program.

A Kentucky native who grew up in north Florida, Dr. Alexander received his Ph.D. from the University of Wisconsin-Madison in higher education administration with a focus on finance and educational policy analysis, and a Master of Science degree from the University of Oxford, Oxford, England in comparative educational studies.

As a teacher and administrator, Dr. Alexander has received many honors, including the University of Wisconsin-Madison School

of Education Alumni Achievement Award (2002) and has research university faculty affiliations at the University of Wisconsin-Madison Center for the Study of Postsecondary Education (WISCAPE) and Cornell University Higher Education Research Institute (CHERI).

Alexander is an internationally-respected expert in higher education finance and public policy and frequently publishes in national journals and for organizations in this field. He has served as a reviewer, an editorial board member, and a university instructor and faculty member, teaching courses in higher education finance, law, history and current events.

Dr. Alexander also has been asked to represent public higher education colleges and universities on numerous occasions to the United States Congress on issues of college affordability, student indebtedness, and institutional efficiency and effectiveness in efforts to address many of the growing challenges facing American higher education. Due to his national recognition and involvement on higher education issues, Dr. Alexander has served on numerous U.S. higher education and statewide organizational leadership boards where he remains very active.



## Dr. Bill DeMastes

Faculty Athletics Representative

Dr. Bill DeMastes, a professor of English at LSU, is in his second year as Faculty Athletics Representative. Dr. DeMastes earned his Ph.D. in English in 1986 from the University of Wisconsin-Madison with a Field of Study of Drama as Genre and a specialization in 20th-Century American and British Drama. He

earned his masters in English in June 1979 from the University of Georgia in Athens where he specialized in 19th-Century American Literature.

At LSU, he served as Associate Dean of the College of Arts and

Sciences from 2001-2004 and Director of Undergraduate Studies for the Department of English from 1999-2001 and 2010-11. He has also served as Associate Chair of the Department of English (1998-99); Director of the Master of Arts in Liberal Arts Program (1996-2004); and, Director of Graduate Studies in the Department of English (1992-94; 2005-06).

He was honored with the LSU Alumni Association Faculty Excellence Award in 2000 and in 2002 won the LSU Distinguished Faculty Award. He was named in 2009 an LSU Rainmaker which is given to the top 100 LSU Faculty. In 2010, he received the Tiger Athletic Foundation Undergraduate Teaching Award, and in the summer of 2011, he was named the Harry Ransom Summer Fellowship recipient by the University of Texas.





## Joe Alleva

### LSU Vice Chancellor/Director of Athletics



Joe Alleva continues to bring unprecedented national recognition to LSU as Vice Chancellor and Director of Athletics. Under Alleva's leadership, LSU enjoys one of the country's premier athletics programs with success on and off the field of competition. Now in his sixth year at LSU, Alleva is dedicated to athletic and academic excellence, and is committed to providing the opportunities and the resources necessary for student-athletes to excel in competition, in the classroom and in the community. Alleva joined the LSU family on April 4, 2008 after a highly successful tenure as director of athletics at Duke University for 10 years. Alleva's role at LSU was further expanded in August of 2009 when vice chancellor was added to his title by the LSU Board of Supervisors. It is the first time in school history that the director of athletics has also held a vice chancellor position.

Alleva is currently serving a five-year term on the prestigious NCAA Men's Basketball Committee, reinforcing his position as one of the most respected athletic administrators in the country.

Upon his arrival at LSU, Alleva unveiled a strategic master plan for the LSU athletics program – "LSU: Thru and True" – to ensure the advancement and future of LSU Athletics as an exemplary program. The central mission of the plan is to create an environment for student-athletes to reach their ultimate potential, prepare them to be champions in life and to set out goals and values for the entire athletics program.

Alleva's vision will keep LSU among the nation's leaders in athletic facilities. He launched an aggressive fund-raising campaign to replace several hundred windows in Tiger Stadium that were in disrepair, and a new coating to the facade of the structure has given the old stadium new life. A renovated gating system on the west side of the stadium debuted in the fall of 2012 to include a plaza that celebrates LSU's football national championships and recognition walls that honor Tiger All-Americans. A new plaza opened on the north end of the stadium in the fall of 2013, further enriching the experience of visitors to the LSU campus.

A new lighting system was installed prior to last season that turns the upper archways of the north end of the stadium purple and gold and lights the iconic "LSU" on the stadium's north scoreboard. In addition, "Tiger Stadium" in 10-foot tall illuminated letters sits just below the west upper deck facing Nicholson Drive.

Also in the fall of 2012, LSU began construction on an expansion of the South End Zone of the stadium – a project that will add premium seating, general public seating and two state-of-the-art video boards – continuing an effort to augment one of the most iconic venues in all of college sports. The project will be completed in time for the start of the 2014 football season.

Under Alleva's direction, LSU's world-renowned track and field program received a state-of-the-art running surface in 2010 when a new track was installed in Bernie Moore Stadium and extensive renovations to the Tiger soccer facility were completed in the fall of 2011.

Alleva directed a major renovation to the University Club golf course that was completed in September 2010 and allows the LSU men's and women's golf teams to compete on one of the most challenging courses in the country. The renovated course helped prepare Tiger

golfers John Peterson and Austin Ernst, respectively, to win 2011 NCAA men's and women's individual championships, marking the first time both titles were claimed by players from the same school. The LSU men's team in 2013 played host to an NCAA Regional for the first time in the school's illustrious golf history.

Future plans include a new gymnastics practice facility, a new tennis complex featuring indoor and outdoor courts, and a state-of-the-art Nutrition Center for Student-Athletes, a facility that will house full-time chefs and nutritionists and provide the best dietary selections for all Fighting Tiger competitors.

LSU's prominence was evident in the final 2012-13 Learfield Sports Director's Cup standings that recognize the nation's best athletic programs, as the Tigers finished in the Top 20 for the eighth consecutive year.

The year was highlighted by another 10-win season and bowl appearance for the Fighting Tiger football team, which recorded a double-digit victory total for the sixth time in eight years. The men's basketball program was rejuvenated by first-year coach Johnny Jones, who directed the Tigers to a 19-12 mark while placing LSU back into consideration for a postseason berth. Women's basketball continued its rise under second-year coach Nikki Caldwell, who guided the Lady Tigers to LSU's first Sweet 16 berth in five years.

The 2013 Fighting Tiger baseball team established a school record for victories with 57 and earned the school's 16th College World Series appearance while capturing SEC Western Division and SEC Tournament titles. The softball squad won the SEC West and played host to an NCAA Regional in Tiger Park before record crowds. The LSU gymnastics team reached the prestigious Super Six for the third time in six seasons, and the women's track team, led by Bowerman Award winner and national sprint champion Kimberlyn Duncan, placed fourth in the final NCAA outdoor standings.

But the 2012-13 year was about more than just athletic success. Living up to Alleva's mantra of "competition, classroom, community," LSU student-athletes logged more than 4,475 hours in community service work across 20 sports through LSU's *Gaoux Givers* program. And a total of 89 proud Tigers received their degrees from the university during LSU commencement ceremonies in December and May.

The Tigers in 2011-12 finished fourth in both the men's and women's Capital

One Cup competition that identifies athletic excellence. LSU was one of only two schools in the country – and the only one in the SEC – to rank in the top four in both categories.

Eighteen of the Tigers' 20 varsity sports participated in NCAA postseason competition in 2011-12. The year was highlighted by the football team's undefeated regular season, an SEC championship and an appearance in the BCS National Championship Game. The Lady Tiger track and field team captured the SEC championship while the LSU softball squad advanced to the Women's College World Series. The Fighting Tiger baseball team won the 2012 SEC championship, and LSU led the nation in attendance for the 17th straight season. The 2011-12 season marked the first time in school history that LSU won both the SEC title in both football and baseball in the same athletic year.

Outstanding performances of the 2010-11 athletic season included the exploits of the Fighting Tiger football squad that posted an 11-2 mark – including a Cotton Bowl victory – and finished the season ranked No. 8 in the nation. The year also featured Top 5 national finishes both indoors and outdoors by the men's and women's track and field teams.

In 2008-09, all 20 LSU sports competed in NCAA postseason play for the first time in school history and the Tiger baseball team won the national championship. LSU ranked second among Southeastern Conference teams in the Learfield Director's Cup All-Sports standings and finished in the Top 20 for the sixth year in a row.

With a strong commitment to academics, Alleva ensures that the Cox Communications Academic Center for Student-Athletes is a first-class facility that provides student-athletes the resources necessary for success in the classroom and personal development. The facility was recently enhanced by the addition of a media training center that gives student-athletes valuable assistance in improving their communications skills.

And with a strong emphasis on community service and outreach programs, the implementation under Alleva's direction of the "Gaoux Givers" program fosters a relationship between the local community and LSU student-athletes, who regularly participate in philanthropic events. In addition, Alleva has bolstered the department's L-Club program to reach out and connect with former student-athletes.

Alleva oversees a staff of outstanding coaches and he has made

critical additions to LSU's coaching staff in recent years. He hired former LSU guard Johnny Jones in April 2012 to breathe new life and enthusiasm into the men's basketball program and last year added Julia Sell as the new women's tennis coach. In 2011, he lured the dynamic Nikki Caldwell to LSU to coach the Lady Tiger basketball team and then hired Beth Torina to direct the Tiger softball program, both of whom immediately returned their respective programs to NCAA postseason success.

Alleva is an innovator with bold ideas that benefit not only LSU but all of Greater Baton Rouge. He has been instrumental in the planning of the Bayou Country Superfest, a three-day country music concert and festival held in Tiger Stadium each spring. The event attracts nearly 100,000 visitors to the LSU campus and makes a tremendous economic impact upon the local community.

Alleva has served on numerous national committees throughout his career including the Football Bowl Certification Committee, the NCAA Division I Championships/Competition Cabinet and several Southeastern Conference and Atlantic Coast Conference committees.

He became director of athletics at Duke in 1998 and his impressive tenure there propelled the university into the ranks of America's top all-around collegiate programs. Among his outstanding list of accomplishments includes the greatest 10-year period in Duke Athletics, winning more ACC and NCAA championships than in any other decade in school history.

Alleva, whose hometown is Suffern, N.Y., majored in Finance at Lehigh University and received his bachelor's degree in 1975. While at Lehigh, Alleva was the quarterback of the football team and team captain in 1974. Alleva also played on the Lehigh baseball team. He served as a graduate assistant football coach and earned an MBA in 1976.

While at Duke, Alleva played a key role in Durham's community sports scene. He started Little League Baseball in Durham over 20 years ago, and also began the American Legion baseball program.

He is a member of the North Carolina American Legion Hall of Fame, Suffern High School Hall of Fame and the Rockland County Hall of Fame.

Alleva and his wife, Annie, have three children, J.D., Jeff, and Jenny. Joe and Annie recently welcomed their first grandchild, Harper, the daughter of Jenny and husband Kyle Young.



## Verge Ausberry

### Deputy Director of Athletics

A former LSU football standout, Verge Ausberry joined the athletics administrative staff in August 2001 as the Associate Athletics Director for Operations and was appointed to the position of Senior Associate Athletics Director in May 2006 and he was named Deputy Director of Athletics in January of 2016.

Ausberry supervises and is responsible for football operations, football scheduling and football management. He also oversees the LSU men's and women's track and field programs,

the equipment staff, the strength and conditioning staff, the Dr. Martin Broussard training room, the video department and football game management. Ausberry also assists the LSU President's office in external and governmental affairs.

Ausberry, from New Iberia, La., played inside linebacker for the Tigers, lettering in 1986-89. He was part of two SEC championship teams, playing on teams that went to four bowl games.

### Senior Associate AD/Communications Director

Michael Bonnette enters his 16th year as LSU's Communications Director and third as Senior Associate Athletic Director after being promoted to his current position in the fall of 2013. Bonnette held the title of Associate Athletic Director from April of 2007. 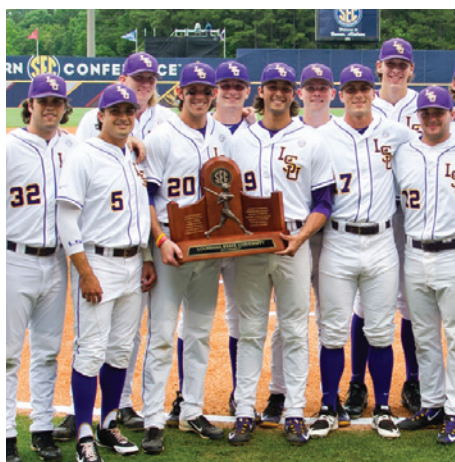

# LSU Athletics Championship Legacy



In its storied athletics history, LSU has produced 47 national team championships and 132 Southeastern Conference team championships. The 2014-15 athletic year was another successful one. The 2015 LSU men's golf team clinched the 47th NCAA national title in LSU athletics history when the Tigers defeated Southern Cal, 4-1, in Bradenton, Fla. (above); the LSU baseball team was ranked No. 1 for most of the season as the Tigers brought home the 16th SEC title in program history (top left); LSU softball has made two of its four total appearances in the Women's College World Series in the last four years, qualifying for the post-season in each of the last 10 years, which is a program record run (top right); LSU gymnastics earned a record 13 All-America honors at the NCAA Championships after securing the program's 14th NCAA Regional title; and for the 14th time in 16 seasons, Track and Field cracked the Top 5 of the final men's team standings at the NCAA Outdoor Championships in 2015.

## DID YOU KNOW?

LSU joined elite company with Florida State and Texas as the only schools to accomplish the following in the same athletic year: football play in a bowl game, men's and women's basketball qualify to the NCAA Tournament, and baseball and softball advance to the College World Series. LSU did it in 2014-15.

## DID YOU KNOW?

In the 2014-15 athletic year, LSU had 19 of its 21 sports teams earn a berth to the NCAA postseason. In addition, both LSU baseball and softball reached No. 1 in the national rankings during the season, and 11 of LSU's teams ended the season ranked in the Top 25.
