THE DOMINANCE OF LSU TRACK & FIELD

As the LSU Track and Field team closed its record book on yet another year in 2001, the Tigers and Lady Tigers added yet another brilliant chapter to the illustrious history of this program. And what a history it is.

LSU once again added a national championship – although this time it was Pat Henry's men's squad, claiming the NCAA indoor title for the first time. At the NCAA Outdoor Championships, his men finished fifth, the 14th time in 15 years they finished in the top 10, while his Lady Tigers finished sixth.

In short, LSU has created the most balanced combined men's and women's program in the nation, as the Tigers NCAA Indoor crown was the 24th national title in the program's history. The Lady Tigers set a standard in women's sports that may never be matched, winning 11 consecutive titles from 1987-97 and have won 12 of the last 15 NCAA titles overall.

The 11 consecutive NCAA Outdoor Championships won by the Lady Tigers serve as the standard of excellence in women's collegiate athletics. The only Division I women's program with a streak that can rival the Lady Tigers' is the North Carolina Lady Tar Heel's nine consecutive NCAA Soccer Championships from 1986-94.

Even on the men's side, the Lady Tiger track and field streak is impressive. The only streak that betters the LSU women is the 12 Indoor Track and Field Championships by Arkansas between 1984-95.

However, when one considers the dominance of the Lady Tiger track program in just the parameters of women's track and field,

there is no other team that comes close.

Since the inception of the women's NCAA Track and Field Championships in 1982, the Lady Tigers have won 12 (1987-97, 2000) of the 20 Outdoor Championships contested and were runner-up in one other (1985). They scored an average of 74.7 points a year during

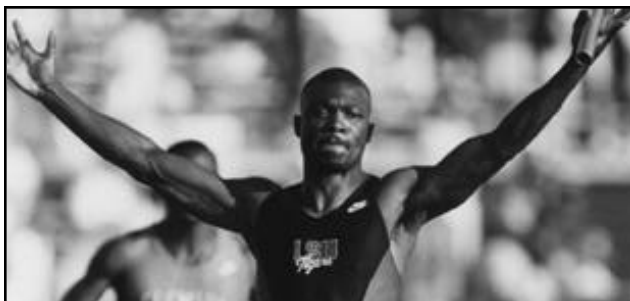
their outdoor championship run from 1987-97 and in 1993 and 1994 doubled the points scored by the NCAA runner-up.

Not to be overshadowed by the accomplishments of the Lady Tigers, LSU's total track and field program has made NCAA history several times. In 1989, both the men's and women's program won the NCAA Outdoor Championships. This was the first time

in history that the same school won both the men's and women's NCAA Outdoor titles in the same year. LSU repeated in 1990 as dual NCAA Champions, again rewriting NCAA track and field history.

In 2001 it was the Tigers stepping to the forefront, claiming victory over TCU in dramatic fashion at the NCAA Indoor Championships with a thrilling victory in the 4x400-meter relay. For the Tigers, it was their first NCAA Indoor title and fourth NCAA title overall after winning outdoor crowns in 1933, 1989 and 1990.

As the 2002 season approaches and the NCAA Outdoor Championships return to Baton Rouge for the first time in 15 years, the Lady Tigers have reloaded with a new generation of future All-Americans that will carry the torch for this program through the upcoming years. Furthermore, the Tigers appear ready to defend their NCAA Indoor crown, while making an assault on the NCAA team race in front of their home fans in June.





Bernie Moore Track Stadium

The heart of any track and field program is its facility. Fortunately, LSU owns the finest in America and the world in Bernie Moore Track Stadium. As a result of the impressive renovations to Bernie Moore Track Stadium, LSU will host the 2002 NCAA Outdoor Championships, the fourth time the event will be held in Baton Rouge.

The stadium was named in 1971 after the legendary Bernie Moore, who coached the LSU track team for 18 years (1930-47) and led the Tigers to the 1933 NCAA Championship as well as 12 SEC crowns. Most recently, Bernie Moore Track Stadium served as host site of the 2000 SEC Outdoor Championships, the first time in nearly a decade the event came to Baton Rouge.

Bernie Moore Stadium has long been considered one of the nation's premier facilities with its unique specialization for each event. In 1999, it underwent a massive renovation and a new nine-lane 400-meter oval was laid by Martin Surfacing, the makers of the 1984 Los Angeles Olympic track. In addition, the nine-lane infield sprint straightaway, one of the signature features of Bernie Moore Stadium was resurfaced as well. The 400-meter oval sports fine 42-inch lanes, while the infield sprint straightaway sports 48-inch lanes.

The field event areas are equally impressive. There are three dual-

directional long/triple jump runways (six pits), a huge high jump apron that can accommodate three simultaneous competitions, a choice of four pole vault directions, two separate shot put areas, a choice of three wind-directional discus areas, two hammer cages, and a synthetic javelin runway.

In 1969, a tartan surface was laid at the stadium (before it was named after Moore), making it one of a select few all-weather tracks in the U.S.

It underwent a \$1.3 million renovation in 1987 and finished just in time for LSU to host the 1987 NCAA Championships. The athletes responded by setting 12 NCAA meet records, including three collegiate records. The stadium was host to the 1984 and 1991 Southeastern Conference Championships. It was also the site of the 1973 and 1981 NCAA Championships, as well as the 1982 TAC National Decathlon Championships, 1982 Decathlon Dual meet with West Germany, the 1984 TAC National Junior Olympics, the 1993 National Senior Olympics and the 1993 USA T&F National Junior Olympics.

The 1987 renovation was almost identical to that of the 1999 renovation when a nine-lane 400-meter oval was laid by Rekortan. In addition, that was when the signature nine-lane infield sprint straightaway -- the first of its kind in the world -- was installed.





Campus Life

Louisiana State University and Agricultural & Mechanical College has, throughout its 141-year history, served the people of Louisiana, the region, the nation, and the world through extensive multipurpose programs encompassing instruction, research, and public service. The University continuously develops programs of quality that make it one of the nation's outstanding educational institutions.

The University influences the educational, economic, social, and cultural lives of citizens throughout the state - in some way, it touches the life of every person in Louisiana.

Because of its designation as a Research University I - the top category of the Carnegie Foundation's ranking of research institutions - LSU ranks in the top two percent of the nation's colleges and universities. The Research I designation is shared by only 59 public and 29 private universities in the country. One of only 25 universities



nationwide designated as both a land-grant and sea-grant college, LSU is also actively pursuing space-grant status.

History and tradition began with LSU's founding in 1853 by the General Assembly of Louisiana as the Louisiana State Seminary of Learning and

Military Academy near Pineville, Louisiana. The institution opened Jan. 2, 1860. When the Civil War began, the first superintendent, William Tecumseh Sherman, resigned to assume a command in the Union Army. Fire demolished the Seminary in 1869, and the school moved to Baton Rouge.

In 1870, the Seminary was renamed Louisiana State University.

In 1874, under the United States Morrill Act, the Louisiana State Agricultural & Mechanical College was established in New Orleans. The two institutions were merged by the Legislature in 1877 to become Louisiana State University and Agricultural & Mechanical College.

Construction of the present campus began in 1922, and the first classes were held in 1926. LSU experienced major growth in the 1930s and 1940s, expanding its student body, curricula, and services. During the 1960s, the University began to place increasing emphasis

on research.

Recognizing the importance and extent of statewide agricultural activities of units in the LSU System, the LSU Board of Supervisors in 1972 established the Center for Agricultural Sciences & Rural Development. This unit was renamed the LSU Agricultural Center in 1982. Components of the LSU Agricultural Center include the Louisiana Agricultural Experiment Station, the Louisiana Cooperative Extension Service, International Programs, and Administrative Services.

In 1977, the Paul M. Hebert Law Center, established as the LSU Law School in 1906, was made an autonomous division of the LSU System. It provides a legal education characterized by an unyielding demand for academic excellence. Its unique curriculum, based on civil law and substantial elements of common law, provides law graduates with qualifications and training for not one, but two legal systems.

LSU, located on more than 2,000 acres in the southern part of Baton Rouge, Louisiana, is bordered on the west by the Mississippi River. The University's more than 250 principal buildings are grouped on a 650-acre plateau that constitutes the main part of the campus.

LSU is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. The Hebert Law Center is a member of the Association of American Law Schools and is on the approved list of the American Bar Association.

One of the true legends of college football in the South, Cannon was the 1959 Heisman Trophy winner that helped the Tigers to the 1958 national title. Cannon's most memorable performance came in 1959 against Ole Miss. The top-ranked Tigers trailed No. 3 Ole Miss 3-0 in the fourth quarter when Cannon fielded a punt, broke seven tackles and returned it 89 yards as the Tigers went on to win 7-3. The Carl Maddox Field House

(Capacity - 3,000)

The Carl Maddox Field House is widely recognized as one of the country's best facilities for top-level indoor competition. Completed in 1975, the LSU Field House originally sported a 220-yard unbanked tartan oval. In December of 1987, the oval was slightly widened to its current 200-meter configuration.

At the SEC Indoor Championships in 1998 the track at the Field House was dedicated and renamed in honor of late LSU Athletic Director Carl Maddox, an avid fan of track and field and a major force in building the Field House.

The Field House has been host to a bevy of track and field action since its first meet on January 25, 1975. The Field House has hosted the SEC Indoor Championships on 15 occasions, most recently in 1998. Other major events held in the Field House include the 1981 NCAA "Outdoor" men's long jump (contested indoors due to rain), the 1986 and 1988 TAC National Masters Indoor Championships Team Trials for the men's 200 and 400 meters.

In addition, it is host to Louisiana's two largest high school indoor meets, the LSU High School Indoor Classic (since 1978) and the Louisiana State High School Indoor Championships (since 1982).

2002 NCAA Championships Return to LSU

Bernie Moore Track Stadium will be the site of the NCAA Outdoor Championships for the fourth time in its venerable history this spring, and the first time since 1987.

LSU first hosted the event in 1973 when legendary American distance runner Steve Prefontaine of Oregon won the last of his four straight NCAA titles in the three-mile, while guiding the Ducks to a second place finish. Jim Bush's UCLA Bruins won their third straight NCAA title in the process, besting runner-up Oregon.

In 1981, the NCAA Outdoor Championships returned to Baton Rouge and future Olympic great Carl Lewis stole the show. Competing for the University of Houston, the track icon won the 100-meter title in a time of 9.99w and added the title in the long jump with a jump of 27-0 3/4. UTEP won its fourth of five consecutive NCAA team titles in the final NCAA Outdoor Championship contested by men only, as women would begin competing the



following year.

The last time the NCAA Outdoor Championships graced Bernie Moore Track Stadium, a dynasty unmatched in women's sport was born. The LSU women's track and field team claimed a thrilling victory over Alabama in a competition that came down to the final event of the meet. Little did

anyone know that it would be the first of a Division I women's record 11 consecutive titles, starting a streak that would not end until 1998.

The NCAA Outdoor Championships returns to one of the great venues in track and field this spring. While the names may not be household to the common sports fan yet, the NCAA Outdoor Championships are a glimpse at what the world will be watching in Athens in 2004. The gap between amateur

and professional is no closer than in the sport of track and field. Bernie Moore Track Stadium will not only host the best the NCAA has to offer – it will entertain the best in the world this spring.

On June 19, 1987 LSU Athletic Director Joe Dean introduced a young coach named Pat Henry as the ninth LSU Track and Field coach of the SEC era.

Inheriting a women's team that had just won its first national championship, Henry's challenge was to keep LSU's men's and women's teams among the college track and field elite. Nearly 15 years later, it is needless to say, he has accomplished this and so much more, bringing LSU track and field to levels previously unimaginable.

Now entering his 15th season as the head coach of the LSU men's and women's track & field teams, the soft-spoken, hard-working Henry's efforts can not only be characterized as a success - rather, as history in the making.

In 14 years under Henry's direction, the Tiger program has attained unparalleled success: 21 NCAA titles and 19 SEC crowns. As a university, LSU has accounted for 35 NCAA titles. Henry has served as head coach for 60 percent of those.

In 2001, he added another remarkable chapter to his brilliant career. He guided his Tigers to their first NCAA Indoor title in dramatic fashion. Needing a win in the 4x400-meter relay to steal victory, the Tigers demonstrated the character and poise matched only by their mentor, rallying in thrilling fashion to win the event, and ultimately, the team title.

In June 2000, Henry became only the second coach in NCAA history to reach the 20 NCAA title plateau, as he guided his Lady Tigers to an improbable run for the national title, their 12th in stretch of 14 years. In addition, his men's team finished fifth, giving him his 12th top 10 finish in 13 seasons at the men's helm.

The Lady Tigers entered the 2000 NCAA Outdoor Championships picked to finish



fifth, but under Henry's calm guidance, completed a thrilling final day assault on the title by picking up 46 of their 58 points on the last day, edging powerhouse USC in the final event of the competition.

The scene in 2000 was reminiscent of his 1997 NCAA Championship team. The 1997 team was a true testament to Henry's abilities, as he led a young and inexperienced

women's squad to a pair of national crowns against heavily favored teams. The Lady Tigers capped an incredible four-day stretch in Bloomington, Indiana with a 43-point final day outburst to edge Texas by a single point, 63-62, for the closest finish in NCAA history. It marked the 11th consecutive year that the Lady Tigers won the NCAA Outdoor Championship, further extending the longest winning streak in the history of women's athletics. Just three months earlier, the Lady Tigers also managed to capture their eighth NCAA Indoor title in eleven years, their fifth consecutive

secutive victorious venture to Indianapolis' RCA Dome.

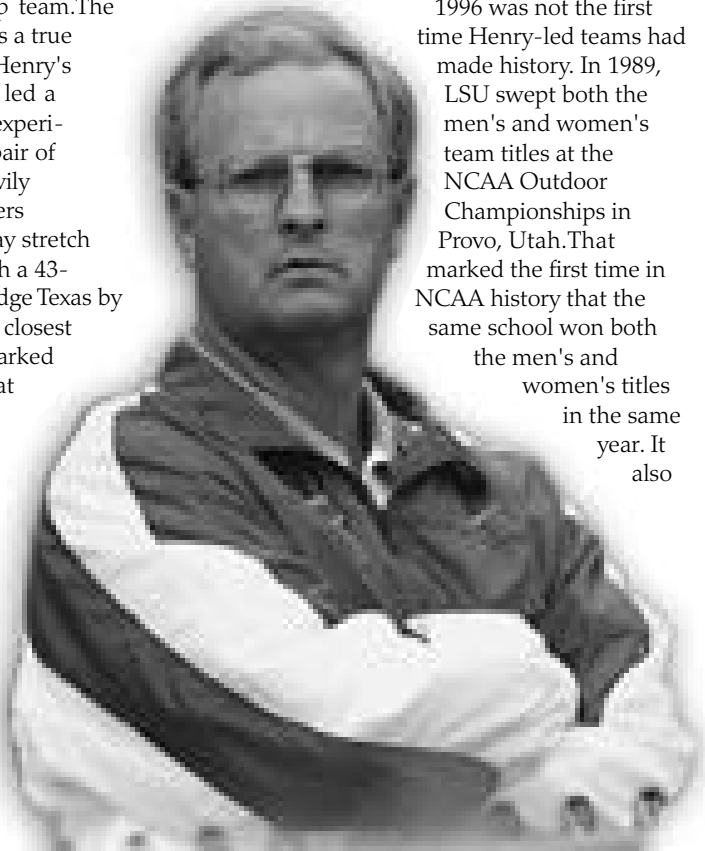
In 1996, Henry added yet another chapter to his illustrious coaching resume' as he guided his women's team to an historical accomplishment. The Lady Tigers marched into Eugene, Ore., and captured their 10th consecutive NCAA Outdoor Championship, a feat unmatched by any women's team in any women's sport. In addition to continuing their dominance outdoors, the Lady Tigers were crowned NCAA Indoor Champions for the seventh time in ten years.

Consistency is the model by which Henry's teams are defined. In addition to the widely recognized success of his women's teams, from 1988-96, his men's squads placed

in the top seven in the nation at the NCAA Outdoor Championships. In Henry's tenure, the Tigers have claimed two national crowns, while averaging a fifth place finish at the NCAA Outdoor Championships. His Tigers finished fifth in Durham, N.C., a year ago, the 12th time in 13 years under Henry that they finished in the top 10.

1996 was not the first time Henry-led teams had made history. In 1989, LSU swept both the men's and women's team titles at the NCAA Outdoor Championships in Provo, Utah. That marked the first time in NCAA history that the same school won both the men's and

women's titles in the same year. It also

made Henry only the third coach in NCAA history to enjoy National Championships in both a men's and women's sport. Henry's teams made history again in 1990 when they both won the NCAA Outdoor Championships in Durham, N.C.

In 1995 Henry guided his Lady Tigers to their ninth straight NCAA Outdoor title, while the men's team finished an impressive third. The Lady Tigers also claimed their sixth NCAA Indoor title, narrowly edging out UCLA in the closest finish in the history of the meet.

During the 1994 season, the Lady Tigers traveled to Boise, Idaho, and won their eighth consecutive NCAA Outdoor National Championship, finishing with 86 points, the fourth highest point total by an LSU women's team, while doubling the point total of the runner-up for the second straight year. Also Henry guided the Lady Tigers to their fifth NCAA Indoor National Championship. Under Henry's leadership the men's team finished sixth in the nation at the NCAA Outdoor Championships.

The LSU women's team kept its record-breaking streak alive at the 1993 NCAA Outdoor Championships in New Orleans, winning their seventh straight NCAA Outdoor title with a meet record 93 points. Henry nearly duplicated his accomplishments of 1989 and 1990 when both the men's and women's teams won National Championships, as the men's team capped a spectacular year with a second place finish.

Although the NCAA Championships stand out in the annals of LSU track and field, Henry still maintains that each year his

team's primary goals are to be successful at the SEC Championships. Such a philosophy has been shown in the fact that LSU has captured a total of 19 SEC crowns during his tenure. The highlight may have been in 1989 when LSU won all but the men's NCAA Indoor Championships.

The women won both the SEC and NCAA Indoor and Outdoor titles and the men won the NCAA Outdoor and both SEC titles. The SEC Indoor victory by the men, a dramatic compe-

tition not decided until the final event, was the first by LSU since 1963.

Although track and field is considered a team sport collegiately, internationally it is still an individual one. LSU track and field has been well represented in the Olympics, as nine athletes from the Henry regime participated in the 2000 Summer Games in Sydney, Australia. The list includes current Tigers Claston Bernard and Walter Davis, as well as recently departed NCAA champions off of last year's Lady Tiger squad, Peta-Gaye

Dowdie and Keisha Spencer. While no one with LSU ties picked up medals at this past Olympic Games, Henry had former pupils go on to win Gold Medals at both the Barcelona and Atlanta Olympic Games.

Understandably, Henry has been laden with honors by his peers. In 1998 and 1999 he has been honored as SEC Women's Indoor Coach of the Year and Louisiana Women's Coach of the Year. After the 1996 season he was named the SEC Women's Indoor Coach of the Year, as well as Louisiana Women's Coach of the Year. In 1995 he was selected as the 1995 NCAA Women's Outdoor Coach of the Year. In 1994 he was named SEC co-Women's Indoor Coach of the Year. In 1991, and again in 1993, he was recognized as the SEC Women's Outdoor Coach of the Year. In 1990 he garnered SEC Men's Coach of the Year honors. At the 1989 indoor competition, Henry was named both SEC Men's and Women's Coach of the Year, while going on to earn the SEC co Men's Coach of the Year honor during the outdoor campaign.

Yet Henry himself would rather empha-

size the fact that his teams have been productive even without an overabundance of what many would consider "blue chip" talent. A quick look at his teams and their successes reveals numerous unheralded athletes whose development made them an integral part of the program. Across the board, walk-on and scholarship athletes alike have shown great improvements. This has to do with Henry's ability to recognize undeveloped talent. His ability to develop the talent along with his assistant coaches is demonstrated by the success of his program. Or, as he would say, "OUR" program.

This may be best epitomized by Henry's 1992 men's 4x100 meter relay team that captured the NCAA title, without one true former prep "blue chip" sprinter. That win, coupled with a victory by the women's 4x100 meter relay squad, made NCAA history by being the first school to win both relays in the same year. Henry's relay teams duplicated the feat in both 1993 and 1994.

LSU, however, hasn't been the only

school associated with Henry's successful coaching, teaching and administrative abilities. From 1983-87, he molded a powerhouse men's program at Blinn College in Brenham, Texas, which swept both the 1987 NJCAA Indoor and Outdoor Championships. Henry earned National Junior College Coach of the Year honors both indoors and outdoors not only in 1987, but in 1986 as well. Prior to Blinn, he was head coach at Hobbs (NM) High School, where he led his team to four state championships.

Henry comes from a family of coaches. In 1911 when sprint sensation Gwinn Henry was declared the "fastest man in the world," One reporter wrote, "Unlike most champions, he is not a talker." It is a trait that has been passed down from generation to generation, along with the proficiency for coaching. Gwinn went on to coach foot-

ball at Kansas, Missouri, and New Mexico, his son Gwinn Bub at New Mexico, and now grandson Pat in track and field at LSU.

Pat also has four brothers, two of whom coach in Albuquerque, New Mexico. Matt

Henry coaches cross country and track and field at Pat's Alma Mater, the University of New Mexico, while brother Mark serves as Associate Head Coach for the Lobos.

A native of Albuquerque, Henry graduated from Del Norte High School in 1969. He earned a bachelor's degree in physical education from the University of New Mexico in 1973, while adding a master's degree in education administration from Western

New Mexico in 1979.

He is married to the former Gail Duggin of Albuquerque. They have a daughter Shelly, 26, and a son Brandon, 25.

Assistant Coaches



Mark Elliott

Assistant Coach
Ninth Year
LSU, 1991

A fixture at LSU for more than a decade as an athlete, now a coach, Mark Elliott begins his ninth season as assistant coach working with LSU's distance corps. In addition, Elliott coaches the Cross

Country team during the fall.

Elliott has coached several standout distance runners including on the collegiate and international scene including David Kiptoo, Joseph Tengalei, and Passmore Furusa. Kiptoo finished sixth in the men's 800 meter final at the Olympics in Atlanta in 1996, while Tengalei was ranked fifth in the world at 800 meters in 1995. Furusa was a five time All-America at LSU.

In 2000 he helped Likhaya Dayile become the first man since Furusa in 1994 to qualify for the NCAA Cross Country Championships. Elliott guided the Tigers to a fourth place team finish at the SEC Championships, their highest since a runner-up finish in 1989 when he donned the purple and gold. Dayile narrowly missed qualifying for the NCAA Championships, while Susanne Strunz developed into one of the nation's premier 3,000-meter steeplechase threats, finishing second at the SEC Championships while qualifying for the NCAA Outdoor Championships.

Dayile and Strunz are not the first athletes to achieve success under Elliott's tutelage. In the mid-1990s, he helped transform former Lady Tiger Charlotte Mayock into one of the nation's top distance runners. Under Elliott's guidance, Mayock became the first ever Lady Tiger to earn All-America honors in a distance better than 1,000 meters with her seventh place finish in the mile at 1997 NCAA Indoor Championships. Mayock also qualified and advanced to the final of the 3,000 at the NCAA Outdoor Championships in 1997 and was again in the mile field at the 1998 NCAA Indoor Championships.

In the fall of 1996, Elliott helped direct Mayock to the NCAA Cross Country Championships, the first-ever Lady Tiger to qualify. His women's team placed fifth at the SEC Cross Country Championships marking the highest finish ever for an LSU women's team.

Elliott, a 1991 graduate of LSU brings a wealth of experience to his runners. Elliott was a four-time NCAA All-America while competing for LSU. He was a member of four consecutive national outdoor championship teams (two at LSU in the NAAs and two at Blinn College in the NJCAAs). He is the only member of all four men's championship teams coached by Pat Henry.

He was runner-up at the 1989 NCAA Indoor 3000-meter run and a top five finisher on three other occasions in a variety of other distance events, including the 5000 meters and the 10,000 meters.

Elliott was the 1989 Southeastern Conference Champion in the 10,000 meters and the 1990 SEC Indoor Champion at 5000 meters. He still owns the SEC Outdoor 5000-meter record (13:33.10) and was a 14 time Junior College All-America.

A native of Spanish Town, Jamaica, Elliott earned his Bachelor of Science from LSU in 1991, in addition to receiving an Associate degree in Arts from Blinn College in 1988. He added a Master's Degree in Kinesiology in August, 2000. He was born October 21, 1966 in Kingston, Jamaica.

Elliott and Kareth Smith are the parents of two children, Breanna and Ashley.



Dennis Shaver

Assistant Coach
Seventh Year
Texas-Arlington, 1979

One of the premier sprint coaches in all of track and field, Dennis Shaver enters his seventh season with the LSU track and field program.

Using a wealth of knowledge, Shaver's primary responsibilities are coaching the female sprinters, and hurdlers.

Shaver has enjoyed six tremendously successful years with the program, as he has directed 14 individual NCAA champions, as well as four national champion relay teams in that time period. He has helped his athletes earn 105 All-American honors in only six years.

In his time at LSU, he has seen great sprinter after great sprinter come through the program, achieve success and move on, but he simply reloads each year.

After losing a pair of national champions, he mentored and developed a young and inexperienced sprinting corps in 2001 into one of the hottest up-and-coming groups in the nation. Under Shaver's tutelage, Muna Lee exploded onto the scene and became only the second freshman to ever sweep the sprint titles at the SEC Outdoor Championships and only the second freshman to ever win the 100-meter dash at the prestigious Penn Relays. Lee went on to post a trio of top five finishes in individual competition on the NCAA level and anchored the Lady Tigers to their third NCAA 4x100-meter relay title in six years under Shaver. Lee's second place finish in the 200-meter dash outdoors was the highest ever by a Lady Tigers freshman.

In 2000 he guided Peta-Gaye Dowdie to the NCAA title at 200 meters and runner-up finishes in both the 100 and 60 meter dashes. Dowdie finished her career as a 19-time All-American in four years under Shaver, the second highest total of any woman in LSU history.

The same year, he also helped Joyce Bates to her second individual national title, as she won the NCAA 100-meter hurdles title, the third different Lady Tiger in Shaver's five years to win the NCAA crown.

Shaver joined the LSU staff in August 1995 after serving for four seasons as Assistant Coach at Auburn University. At Auburn, he designed training programs for the field events and multi-event athletes.

Prior to his tenure at Auburn, Shaver served as head coach for men's and women's track and field at Barton County Community College in Great Bend, Kansas.

In his six years at Barton, Shaver's men's and women's teams captured all 12 conference titles in indoor and outdoor track. He led the Barton women's team to eight national championships: two in cross country, three indoor, and three outdoor. In 1990-91, his women's team captured the first "National Triple Crown" in junior college history by winning the cross country, indoor, and outdoor track titles.

Shaver has earned national recognition for his many accomplishments in coaching. He has earned seven National Coach of the Year awards, six Kansas Collegiate Coach of the Year, and 12 Regional Coach of the Year awards.

A native of Salina, Kan., Shaver earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in Physical Education in 1979 from the University of Texas-Arlington. In 1981 he added a Master's degree in Education with an emphasis on administration at Stephen F. Austin. He is a Level I and II certified coach by USA Track and Field.

Dennis and his wife Connie have two children, Dale and Lindsay.

Irving "Boo" Schexnayder

Irving "Boo" Schexnayder begins his seventh season as multi-event coach at LSU. The South Louisiana native arrived in Baton Rouge in 1995 after spending three years as a valuable member of the University of Southwestern Louisiana (now Louisiana-Lafayette) coaching staff.

It didn't take long for Schexnayder to quickly establish himself among the nation's premier field event coaches, and has had at least one national champion in five of his first six years at LSU. In his first six seasons with the LSU track and field program, Schexnayder has coached 40 All-Americans, four different NCAA triple jump champions and a pole vault champion.

Last year he helped guide Olympian Walter Davis to one of the finest seasons ever by a Tiger. Davis won the NCAA Indoor and Outdoor titles in the triple jump, was second indoors and outdoors in the long jump, won the SEC Indoor and Outdoor long and triple jump titles and swept the horizontal jumps at the prestigious Penn Relays. Under Schexnayder's guidance, Davis broke the school record indoors and outdoors in the triple jump, owns the indoor long jump school mark and sits second in the long jump outdoors. Davis culminated his season with a fifth place finish in the triple jump at the World Championships in Edmonton.

In 2000, he boasted two NCAA champions and two NCAA runners-up. Under Schexnayder's guidance, Russ Buller put together a tremendous season, winning the SEC and NCAA Indoor and Outdoor titles, the Penn and Texas Relays and the USTCA National Championship. He helped Keisha Spencer to the SEC and NCAA Indoor and Outdoor titles and eventually, the Honda Award, recognizing the premier women's collegiate athlete in each sport.

In addition, Claston Bernard, in only his sophomore season, went on to win his second straight SEC title while finishing second and the NCAA Championships before qualifying for the Olympics in Sydney, Australia. Another disciple of Schexnayder, Monique Freeman, finished second in the long jump at the NCAA Indoor Championships last year.

He has also taken the raw talent of Marcus Thomas and transformed him into one of the nation's hottest young jumpers, as he scored at both the NCAA Indoor and Outdoor championships in the long and triple jumps while winning the SEC Indoor title in the long jump and the outdoor title in the triple jump in 2000. Thomas has one outdoor season of eligibility remaining and can leave LSU with the most All-American honors in Tiger history, owning seven going into his final season.

Under Schexnayder's guidance, Lady Tiger Suzette Lee shattered the NCAA record in the triple jump and captured National titles outdoors in both 1996 and 1997, while claiming the NCAA Indoor title in 1997. She was also the NCAA runner-up in the long jump in 1997. Schexnayder also molded LeVar Anderson into a school record holder in the triple jump and the 1999 NCAA Outdoor champion.

While at USL, his primary responsibilities were jumps, multi-events, and overseeing the women's weight events. In 1995, Schexnayder helped lead the Cajuns to Sun Belt Conference titles at the men's indoor and outdoor championships. During his three-year tenure at USL, the Cajuns won three men's outdoor titles, two indoor titles, and one women's outdoor title.

At the 1995 NCAA Outdoor Championships he coached his first NCAA Champion, as Ndabe Mdhlongwa won the triple jump, marking only the second ever NCAA champion in USL history.

Schexnayder came to USL in 1992 via St. James High School where he served as head coach of both cross country and track and field.

Following the 1990 season, Schexnayder left St. James to serve for one year as field events coach at Blinn College in Brenham, Texas, the same program that Pat Henry built up prior to coming to LSU. In 1991 they captured both the NJCAA indoor and outdoor national championships.

Schexnayder is Level I and II certified by USA Track and Field and is a Level I instructor for the USA Track and Field Coaches Education Program. He is also one of only four coaches in the United States qualified as a Level II jumps instructor for USA Track and Field. In addition, he is a Biomechanics instructor for USA Track and Field, thus being the only person in the nation serving in such a dual capacity. Schexnayder serves as chairman of the National Coaching Education Curriculum, has lectured nationally on track and field and the sports sciences program, and is the author of several publications on jumps. The Vacherie, Louisiana native earned both his bachelor's and master's degrees at Nicholls State University. In 1983 he earned his undergraduate degree with cum laude honors, and in 1988 added a master's degree in administration and supervision.



Kent Pagel

One of the truly respected minds in track and field on both the national and international level, Kent Pagel begins his first season with the LSU track and field program as its throws coach.

"Kent is a great addition to our staff," said Henry. "He brings a wealth of experience to our program. He comes to LSU with outstanding credentials and we're delighted to have him join us."

Pagel comes to the LSU track and field program after spending five successful seasons as associate head coach at Kent State University (Ohio) where he worked with throwers, designed and implemented its strength and conditioning program and served as meet director at all home competitions. Pagel coached extensively in the state of California from 1979-95, serving on staffs at Cal State-Long Beach, San Diego State and San Diego Mesa College.

Pagel has worked extensively with USA Track and Field as a national clinician in both the shot put and discus.

Well-respected on the international level, Pagel has served on coaching staffs at major international competitions in Japan, Switzerland, Sweden and England. Pagel is married to four-time United States Olympian Ramona Pagel.

At LSU, Pagel inherits an area with a wealth of potential for LSU, as he hopes to restore its legacy as one of the premier throws schools in the nation.

Men's Season Preview

YEAR of the Tiger

LSU head coach Pat Henry added the final piece to his resume' last year when his Tigers won their first NCAA Indoor title, taking a dramatic 34-33 decision over TCU.

With everyone back, a scary thought for the rest of the nation is that the 2002 version of the Tigers is more experienced, and perhaps, even better.

The Tigers return their entire national champion 4x400-meter relay team, as well as Olympians Walter Davis and Claston Bernard, as they hope to defend their NCAA Indoor crown, while giving the hometown fans something to cheer about in June when the NCAA Outdoor Championships return to Baton Rouge.

"We've got a very talented team returning this season, as talented a men's team as I've ever had," says Henry. "We return a great deal of experience on an NCAA level, while adding a nice corps of newcomers to the mix."

Sprints/Relays

The Tigers return a stable of quarter milers, bringing back their NCAA champion 4x400-meter relay team, as well as four individual qualifiers in the open quarter.

Leading the way is mile relay anchor and NCAA 400-meter runner-up Allyene Francique, the only returning sub-45 second quarter miler in the nation. Francique finished second at the NCAA Championships to eventual world champion Avarad Moncur of Auburn, but clearly cemented his position as one of the top threats for 2002. Francique finished seventh at the World Championships in the 400-meter dash this past summer.

Lueroy Colquhoun returns for his senior season after serving as a critical part of the Tigers' NCAA champion mile relay a year ago. Colquhoun, an All-American in the open quarter in 2000, will look to not only continue his role on the Tigers' mile relay, but get back into the mix in an individual capacity.

Colquhoun was the SEC runner-up in the quarter at the 2000 SEC Indoor Championships and finished fourth at the NCAA Championships.

The Tigers have a trio of young quarter milers who all stepped up when called up on last year. Sophomores Robert Parham, Pete Coley and Pedro Tunon all return for their sophomore seasons. Parham and Coley were both individual qualifiers in the 400 during the outdoor season, as well as half of the Tigers' mile relay, while Tunon ran the third leg of the NCAA champion mile relay during the indoor season.

In the short sprints, the Tigers return Devery Henderson, an NCAA provisional qualifier in the 60-meter dash during the 2001 indoor season. Henderson is the top 100/200-meter threat for the Tigers and is coming off a successful season on the football field in which he helped the Tigers to an SEC title and a victory in the Sugar Bowl.

Henderson will be joined by Parham and Coley on the 4x100-meter relay, while a replacement for the graduated Dwhyte Barrett will be determined closer to the outdoor season.

The possibility exists that with the tremendous depth in quarter milers for the Tigers that Lueroy Colquhoun could give the 400-meter hurdles a shot during the outdoor season. The Tigers do add freshman Bennie

Brazell to the mix in intermediate hurdles. Brazell was one of the top hurdlers to come out of Texas.

In the short hurdles, LSU returns two-time NCAA qualifier Greg Scott who will try to regain the form of his first two seasons in purple and gold when he finished third at the SEC Championships in the 100-meter hurdles both years.

Distance

For two years Likhaya Dayile has been one of the top up-and-coming distance runners, coming up just short of the NCAA Championships. Dayile had a breakout cross country season, however, finishing in the top five at the SEC Championships, while earning a spot in the NCAA Championship field. The Tigers hope that Dayile's success during the cross country season will carry over to the track, as he will lead their distance efforts once again, along with sophomore Jimmy Wiggins, also coming off a consistent cross country season.

Newcomer Marlon Greensword will give the Tigers a solid middle distance threat, while Kenny Henry will look to return to his form of two years ago when he was healthy, to give the Tigers points on the SEC level in the steeplechase.

Jumps

The only word to describe the Tigers jumping corps would be loaded. Walter Davis was the top scorer among jumpers at both the NCAA and SEC Championships. Davis won the NCAA Indoor and Outdoor titles in the triple jump while finishing second in the long jump at both national meets.

In addition, the 2000 Olympian swept the horizontal jumps at both the SEC Indoor and Outdoor Championships, as well as the Penn Relays. This past summer, Davis finished fifth in the triple jump at the IAAF World Championships in Edmonton, Alberta, Canada, further cementing his role as one of the top young jumpers in the world.

The Tigers will return seven-time All-American Marcus Thomas for the outdoor season, giving them two of the best horizontal jumpers in the nation. Thomas has won SEC titles in both the long and triple jump and has finished in the top five at the NCAA Championships in each.

Traun Smith returns to the mix to give the Tigers yet another triple and long jump threat. Smith has been an NCAA provisional qualifier in the triple jump each of the past two years and will look to take his jumping to another level in 2002.

Claston Bernard is a seven-foot high jumper who can help the Tigers on the SEC level in the event and placed fourth a year ago.

Daniel Trosclair leads a young pole vaulting corps that includes Ben Broussard, Gabriel Caraway and Danny Gagliano.

Throws

The Tigers return three-time NCAA qualifier Javier Nieto in the hammer, who will once again try and give the Tigers a boost at both the SEC and national level. In addition,

Nieto has taken great strides in the 35 lb.-weight throw under new LSU throws coach Kent Pagel and could become more of a factor in that event in 2002.

The Tigers get an added boost in the javelin from the return of 2000 SEC champion and All-American Blake Theriot who will look to re-establish himself among the nation's elite.

Matt Vincent gives the Tigers the shot put threat they lacked on the SEC level a year ago. The freshman is a versatile thrower, who in time can develop into one of the top young throwers in the SEC.

Decathlon

The Tigers return the top decathlete in the nation in senior Claston Bernard. The only 8,000-point scorer a year ago, Bernard is the three-time defending SEC champion in the event. He is the only man to ever win three consecutive SEC decathlon titles and this spring, will attempt to become only the second man in LSU history to win four consecutive SEC titles in an event.

Bernard is one of only three athletes in LSU history to surpass the 8,000-point barrier. The other two, Mario Sategna and Mikael Olander, both went on to win NCAA decathlon titles in their senior seasons.

JUNIOR SEASON (2001)

Became only the third man in LSU history to reach the 8,000-point plateau, becoming the first man in SEC history to win three consecutive SEC decathlon titles in the process ... His SEC-winning total of 8,024 points was the second highest in SEC history, trailing only former LSU great Mikael Olander's total of 8,126 in 1988 ... Bernard registered personal best in seven of 10 events en route to victory ... His first day total of 4,271 was an SEC Championship record, breaking the previous mark of 4,195 by Olander, also in 1988 ... Set an LSU school record for first day points at the Texas A&M Multi-Event competition with a total of 4,342, en route to a two-day total of 7,833 ... SOPHOMORE SEASON (2000)

Set PRs in nine of the 10 events at the SEC and won five events (100m, discus, javelin, shot put and high jump) ... His total was the seventh-highest in school history at the time ... The NEXT Step

Everyone reminded LSU track and field head coach Pat Henry of who he didn't have in 2001. He didn't have Peta-Gaye Dowdie. He didn't have Keisha Spencer or Joyce Bates.

But when those same people stopped and took a moment to look at what he did have, they saw one of the top young teams in the nation – and one that will only continue to get better as the Lady Tigers prepare for the 2002 season.

The Lady Tigers return five All-Americans from last year's squad that finished sixth in the nation after a near overhaul.

"We've got a great young group coming back and we've brought in some strong new talent that will make us one of the nation's top teams again," says Henry. "We've got a fantastic young pipeline of sprinters and should have very strong relays. I think we're very strong in the jumps and have filled holes in other areas that will make us competitive on an NCAA and SEC level."

With a wealth of returning talent, the Lady Tigers will look to take the next step towards regaining the title they've held 12 of the last 15 years in 2002.

Sprints/Relays

Muna Lee exploded onto the scene in 2001 and established herself as one of the nation's top young sprinters. Lee became only the second freshman in SEC history to sweep the 100 and 200-meter titles and only the second freshman in the 107-year history of the Penn Relays to win the 100-meter title.

At the NCAA Outdoor Championships all Lee did was anchor LSU to an NCAA title in the 4x100-meter relay, finish second in the 200-meter dash and fourth in the 100. Lee will unquestionably be one of the top sprinters in the nation in 2002 and will once again anchor LSU's 4x100-meter relay team as it looks for its eighth NCAA title in 11 years.

Stephanie Durst came up with an impres-

sive debut season in 2001 and will look to build upon that in her sophomore season. Durst was an NCAA qualifier in both the 100 and 200-meter dashes a year ago, while running on the NCAA champion 4x100-meter relay as a freshman.

With Durst's tremendous range, she can run on either the short or mile relays this season.

The Lady Tigers also return All-American quarter miler Ronetta Smith, a fourth place finisher at the NCAA Indoor Championships and key member of the mile relay. Smith is among the top returning quarter milers in the nation and will once again be a key member of the Lady Tigers' 4x400-meter relay.

Hurdles

The Lady Tigers return a stable of young hurdlers, led by All-American Lolo Jones, a seventh place finisher in the short hurdles at the NCAA Indoor Championships. The SEC runner-up in the 100-meter hurdles, Jones will be one of the top hurdlers in the nation this season and could also play a role on the Lady Tigers' short relay.

Zamyah Jackson and Tiffany Robinson return for their sophomore years after promising freshmen campaigns. Jackson scored for the Lady Tigers at the SEC Championships in the short hurdles, while both continue to develop under the tutelage of hurdles and sprints coach Dennis Shaver.

Doria Appleberry joins the mix as an

intermediate hurdler during the outdoor season, joining LSU as one of the top 300-meter high school hurdlers out of Texas. With quarter miler speed, Appleberry is a candidate to join the Lady Tigers' mile relay as well.

Distance

The Lady Tigers lose the heart of its distance corps with the departure of 2001 NCAA qualifier Susanne Strunz and graduating senior Bridget Cusack. Their strength this year will be in the middle distance area.

The Lady Tigers have a strong middle distance tandem in newcomer Marian Burnett, as well as returnee Xyllena Lynch. Burnett was the junior college national champion at

800-meters, while Lynch gave the Lady Tigers a solid 400/800-meter threat last year and ran on the mile relay.

Burnett could develop quickly into one of the top middle distance runners in the nation, as she comes to LSU from Essex County College where she was a teammate of current LSU All-Americans Ronetta Smith and Alleyne Francique. Look for Burnett to compete for a spot on the Lady Tigers' mile relay.

Jumps

The Lady Tigers return SEC triple jump champion Bianca Rockett, an NCAA qualifier in each of her first three seasons at LSU, as well as up-and-coming triple jump threat Ashely Gardner.

LSU will add a great deal of depth to its jumps this season, however, as Nicole Toney, an NCAA qualifier while at UConn a year ago, comes to Baton Rouge for her sophomore season. Toney jumped nearly 43 feet while competing for the Huskies and joins Rockett and Gardner to give the Lady Tigers three strong threats in the event.

Newcomer Shontae Harris is a potential multi-event candidate but can bolster the

Lady Tigers' high jump corps that includes returnee Amanda Roessel who made tremendous progress a year ago.

The Lady Tigers return a young pole vault corps of athletes that will attempt to make an impact on the SEC level, as school record-holder Randi Opperman returns, as well as Margaret Reaves.

Throws

The Lady Tigers began to return to their form of old in the throws a year ago and will take a step to the next level under new throws coach Kent Pagel in 2002.

Pagel inherits a strong young javelin nucleus of Neely Falgout, Maria Romero and Amy Higginbotham, all potentially high scorers at the SEC Championships.

Candice Gonzalez returns after a strong sophomore season in which she made tremendous strides in both the hammer and 20-lb. weight throw. Mallory McDonald will join Gonzalez to give the Tigers two strong scoring threats on the SEC level in both events.

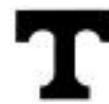

New Faces, SAME RESULTS

LSU head coach Pat Henry has been around track and field his entire life. He has experienced an array of emotions from success at the highest level to utter heartbreak. But every time he thinks he's seen it all, he is reminded that anything is possible in track and field and each year delivers new success stories and new emotional roller coasters.

The 2001 season was a perfect example of this. And it was a perfect example of why after all these years he still loves this sport so much.

Despite losing a majority of his 2000 NCAA champion women's squad, Henry and his staff were able to mold the Lady Tigers into a national contender faster than anyone thought. At the same time, his men introduced a host of new faces – faces that would lead the

Tigers to their first NCAA Indoor Championship, while shattering school record after school record in the process.

"We had so many new faces last year, yet it seemed to come together a little quicker than people figured it would," said Henry. "I think we started building up steam early in the indoor season and really hit a good rhythm by the time the NCAA Indoor meet rolled around.

"Overall, we had some of the most remarkable performances of my 14 years as head coach. Every year our athletes and this sport never cease to amaze me. The things that we were able to accomplish as a team and on an individual basis made last year a very special season."

TIGERS CLAIM FIRST NCAA INDOOR CROWN

It had been a long time since Pat Henry had experienced the nervous energy of entering an NCAA Championship. After 20 NCAA titles, he really had nothing to prove. But as he approached the Randall Tyson Track Center in Fayetteville, Ark., for the NCAA Indoor Championships, he was consumed by the notion that this could be the year for his men's team. He knew that if he was to leave Fayetteville with a national title, it would be on the strength of his Tiger squad this time.

The LSU Tigers claimed their first NCAA Indoor title in improbable fashion, edging TCU 34-33. Entering the final event of the competition, the Tigers were in sixth place and trailed TCU 33-24. They needed to win the event and have TCU not score a point. LSU and Baylor quickly assumed control of the race, while TCU, sitting in third, dropped the baton at the first exchange and was never a factor in the race again. Alleyne Francique ran a 44.98 second final leg to erase a 10-meter deficit, as the Tigers edged Baylor in a school record and world-leading time of 3:04.44. The group of Robert Parham, Lueroy Colquhoun, Pedro Tunon and Francique shattered the previous school record of 3:06.43 by almost exactly two seconds.

"I think it just goes to show that competition brings out the best in some people," said LSU head coach Pat Henry. "That group ran what they needed to win. It epitomized the effort of my team that weekend. We knew it would take every point we could get to win. I've never quite seen a finish like that, however."

The Tigers' relay put a punctuation mark on what had been an incredible weekend all around. Walter Davis won the triple jump, becoming the first Tiger to win a horizontal jump indoors, while he also placed second in the long jump, the highest finish by an LSU man in the event in five years. Davis' tremendous outing combined with a fourth place finish by Francique in the 400-meter dash and an eighth place finish by Marcus Thomas in the triple jump to give the Tigers every point they needed.

In the women's competition, the Lady Tigers finished 14th. Ronetta Smith finished fourth in the 400-meter dash, while Muna Lee placed fifth in the 200-meter dash and became LSU's first freshman All-American in the event since 1988.

TIGERS FIFTH, LADY TIGERS SIXTH AT NCAA OUTDOOR CHAMPIONSHIPS

The LSU Tigers came to venerable Hayward Field on the campus of the University of Oregon with high expectations. While they were able to come up with a top five finish for the second straight year, misfortune prevented them from adding to their NCAA Indoor title.

Walter Davis won the triple jump and finished second in the long jump, while Alleyne Francique finished second in the 400-meter dash and helped the Tigers to a third place finish in the mile relay. In an unfortunate turn of events, however, Claston Bernard was disqualified from the decathlon after failing to report for the start of the long jump after suffering an injury in the 100-meter dash. In addition, the Tigers' 4x100-meter relay failed to get the stick around after advancing to the

final, costing LSU critical points in its bid for its first NCAA Outdoor crown in 11 years.

On the women's side, the Lady Tigers came up with a very impressive sixth place finish behind an incredible performance from Muna Lee. The true freshman finished second in the 200-meter dash, fourth in the 100-meter dash and joined with Sa'Donna Thornton, Stephanie Durst and Myra Combs to win the 4x100-meter relay title. In addition, the Lady Tigers used a sixth place finish in the long jump by Chenelle Marshall and seventh place finishes from Combs and Ronetta Smith in the 200 and 400-meter dashes respectively to finish in the top 10 for the 14th time in 15 years.

TIGERS FINISH SECOND AT SEC INDOORS, LADY TIGERS FOURTH

The LSU Tigers finished second at the SEC Indoor Championships for the third time in four years, while the Lady Tigers finished fourth for the second straight year.

Walter Davis won the long and triple jump titles, while the men's 4x400-meter relay picked up a win in dramatic fashion to give the Tigers the edge for second place in the team competition over Tennessee.

Muna Lee won the 200-meter dash and finished fourth in the 60-meter dash, while senior Sa'Donna Thornton won her first SEC title, claiming the 60-meter dash. Bianca Rockett won her first SEC crown as well, taking the triple jump title.

Season Review

LADY TIGERS FOURTH, TIGERS SIXTH AT SEC OUTDOOR CHAMPIONSHIPS

On paper, a fourth and sixth place finish by the LSU track and field teams at the SEC Outdoor Championships looks like a typo or the result of a sub-par weekend. Neither could be farther from the truth. LSU combined to win seven events in a remarkable display of the nation's premier talent.

Walter Davis and Muna Lee both pulled rare doubles, with Davis winning the triple and long jumps titles, while Lee became only the second freshman in SEC history to ever take the 100 and 200-meter titles. Claston Bernard won his SEC-record third straight decathlon title, while Myra Combs won the first individual SEC title of her illustrious career, taking the women's long jump. The Tigers closed out the competition with a victory in the 4x400-meter relay, avenging a third place finish at the Penn Relays two weeks earlier to Auburn and Florida.

WALTER DAVIS DOMINATES HORIZONTAL JUMPS

It was the most anticipated debut in track and field last year and he certainly didn't disappoint. Walter Davis, the most sought after recruit in the land, burst on to the scene to put together one of the finest years any LSU athlete has ever had in any sport.

Fresh off a 12th place finish at the Sydney Olympics, Davis broke the LSU record in the triple jump in his first appearance and never

looked back. Davis won the NCAA Indoor and Outdoor titles in the triple jump and finished second in the long jump at both national meets. In addition, he swept the horizontal jumps at both the SEC Indoor and Outdoor Championships.

In sweeping the SEC Outdoor triple and long jump titles, he became only the fifth man in conference history to win both. At the Penn Relays, he became only the fourth man in the 107-year history of the Penn Relays to sweep the horizontal jumps.

His year ended with him owning the LSU records in the triple both indoors and outdoors, the long jump indoors, while ranking second in school history on the outdoor long jump list.

TIGER RELAY ON TOP OF THE WORLD

The LSU men's 4x400-meter relay was not only the best in the nation during the indoor season – try the world. The NCAA-winning time of 3:04.44 by Robert Parham, Lueroy Colquhoun, Pedro Tunon and Alleyne Francique was faster than the winning time of 3:04.47 by Poland at the IAAF World Championships the same weekend and finished as the fastest indoor time recorded during the 2001 season.

During the outdoor season Pete Coley moved in to the third spot in place of Tunon and the results were very similar. The Tigers' 4x400-meter relay squad broke the school record twice, running an eye-popping 3:01.73 at Houston, before "coasting" to a 3:01.66 at

the NCAA Outdoor Championships, the fastest time in the nation in 2001.

CLASTON BERNARD BREAKS 8,000-POINT BARRIER

Claston Bernard joined exclusive territory last May when he broke the 8,000-point barrier for the first time in his career. Bernard became the first man in SEC history to win three consecutive SEC decathlon titles, posting a personal best mark of 8,024 in the process. The mark gave Bernard the world lead, albeit very briefly. He became only the third man in LSU history to reach the barrier.

Unfortunately Bernard's season came to a terrible finish. A heavy favorite to win the NCAA decathlon title, he lined up for the first event of the competition at nationals, the 100-meter dash, and 60 meters through the race felt his hamstring give. While LSU trainers worked feverishly on the injury, he was unable to report in time to begin the next event and was disqualified in a sad turn of events.

MUNA LEE PERFORMS WELL BEYOND HER YEARS

When Peta-Gaye Dowdie graduated following the 2000 season, everyone wondered who the Lady Tiger sprinting corps would look to next. It didn't take for LSU women's sprint coach Dennis Shaver to find an answer, however, as freshman Muna Lee quickly became one of the rising stars in track and field. Lee became the first Lady Tiger

since Esther Jones in 1991 and the first freshman since (four-time Olympian) Pauline Davis of Alabama in 1987 to sweep the 100 and 200-meter titles at the SEC Outdoor Championships. Three weeks later she finished second in the 200-meter dash, fourth in the 100-meter dash and anchored the Lady Tigers to the national title in the 4x100-meter relay at the NCAA Outdoor Championships.

At the Penn Relays she became only the second freshman in Penn Relays history to win the 100-meter relay, joining former Lady Tiger All-American Kwajalein Butler (1995). During the indoor season she won the SEC 200-meter title and finished fifth at the NCAA Indoor Championships.

LADY TIGERS LOSE LAST LINK TO DYNASTY

From 1987-97, the LSU women's track and field team enjoyed an unprecedented run of 11 consecutive NCAA Outdoor titles – a mark that serves as the standard of excellence for all women's Division I athletics. While the streak ended in Buffalo in 1998, its legacy was carried on until last season. When Sa'Donna Thornton failed to make the 100-meter dash final, the last member of the 1997 squad's career came to an end. Thornton ran the third leg of the Lady Tigers' NCAA champion 4x100-meter relay team in 1997 and closed her career with another NCAA title in the short relay last season. Thornton closed her career as a five-time All-American.

LOLO JONES CONTINUES LADY TIGER HURDLES TRADITION

Lolo Jones seems like she was simply destined to be a Lady Tiger. Growing up following the career of former Lady Tiger great Kim Carson, Jones attended the same school, Roosevelt High School, in Des Moines, Iowa and broke all of Carson's school records. Carson went on to become a seven-time All-American and two-time NCAA champion for LSU from 1993-96. At the 2001 NCAA Indoor Championships, however, Jones was able to do something that Carson was not – she earned All-American honors indoors as a freshman. Despite having never run indoors until the 2001 season, Jones finished seventh in the 60-meter hurdles at the NCAA Indoor meet. During the outdoor season she went on to run 13.17w in the 100-meter hurdles and finished second at the SEC Outdoor Championships.

RELAYS ROCK

LSU relays were at an all-time high in 2001, as the Tigers and Lady Tigers both enjoyed incredible success. The Tigers won the NCAA Indoor title in the 4x400-meter relay for the first time indoors, while breaking both the indoor and outdoor school records with two

freshmen and two juniors running. The Lady Tigers won their 10th NCAA 4x100-meter title on a group that included two freshmen.

In addition, the Lady Tigers 4x200-meter relay squad broke the school record in the event for the third time in six years at the Penn Relays, while they qualified for both the NCAA Indoor and Outdoor Championships in the 4x400-meter relay, finishing sixth indoors.

STRUNZ STEPS UP IN STEEPLECHASE

Call it an experiment that definitely worked. Susanne Strunz had never competed in the 3,000-meter steeplechase – in practice or in a meet – before the Texas Relays. In her first attempt at the event, she went on to finish second in an NCAA provisional qualifying time of 10:40.17. She followed that with an 18-second improvement at

the Penn Relays, running a time of 10:22.63 before finishing as the SEC runner-up two weeks later. At the LSU Last Ditch she earned an automatic qualifier, running a time of 10:18.54ht to make the NCAA field. While Strunz did not score at the NCAA Championships in Eugene, Ore., she was the Lady Tigers' first distance qualifier since 1997.

MYRA COMBS CLOSES CAREER AS 13-TIME ALL-AMERICAN

Myra Combs stepped off the track at Hayward Field in Eugene, Ore., after the conclusion of the women's 4x400-meter relay and closed the books on her All-American career. Combs wrapped up her LSU career as a 13-time All-American, a member of the NCAA champion 4x100-meter relay team this past season and a member of the 2000 NCAA championship team. Combs was a member of four school record-breaking relay squads, won six SEC titles on relays and one individual title. Her 13 All-American honors are tied for sixth in LSU history.

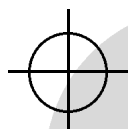

HISTORY

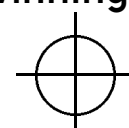
This is LSU Track & Field



Since 1897, LSU track & field has had an illustrious history filled with some of the most memorable performers and achievements in the school's colorful athletic heritage. Now in its 105th year, from its quiet birth at the Tulane Spring Games to its seat atop collegiate track prominence, one factor has remained consistent with the program -- success through hard work and an unmatched will to win.



H. Warren Taylor, Jr., LSU track & field historian wrote it best, "Tom Sherburne and Devall drew the signal distinction of being the first men of the Old War Skule to carry the Purple and Gold on the cinder path that they failed to win in their events does not distract from their envious place in Tiger track history; for they were the forerunners of a host of sterling athletes that have established a record of consistent winning unsurpassed in the southland."



The rest is history.

NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS

After winning five SIAA (Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Association) conference championships between 1913-1922 and capturing three consecutive SIC titles, Tiger track & field burst onto the national scene with an improbable upset of heavily favored Southern California to win the 1933 National Championship at Soldier Field in Chicago, Illinois. LSU trackmen were led by the speed of Glen "Slats" Hardin and the strength of Jack Torrance. Hardin set new world records in the 440-yard dash (47.1) and 220 low hurdles (22.9) while Torrance did the same in the shot put competition (52-10). The title did not rest in the Tigers' hands until the final event when Matt Gordy vaulted over the-14 foot mark for the first time in his career to secure LSU's first ever national title.

It took 54 years for LSU to again grab the national crown, but in 1987, it was worn twice by the Lady Tigers. In only the program's sixth season, it swept the indoor and outdoor national titles as the Lady Tigers were led by NCAA champions Schowonda Williams, Sylvia Brydson and Sheila Echols. The Lady Tigers repeated their outdoor success in 1988, but 1989 and 1990 saw the LSU track program reach its highest point thus far. Those two seasons brought a total of five national titles to Baton Rouge. For the first time in NCAA history, the same school won both the men's and women's crown at the NCAA Outdoor Championships, first in 1989, then again in 1990. In 1989, for the second time in its history, the Lady Tigers swept the indoor and outdoor crowns while the men captured the outdoor title. It was the Tigers first in 56 years.

The LSU men and women started the decade of the 90's the same way they ended the 1980's by combining for outdoor national championships in 1990. The Lady Tigers pulled off another sweep in 1991 by again claiming the winning spots in the indoor and outdoor meets.

One of the most memorable moments in LSU track lore came at the 1992 national championships in Austin, Texas. Trailing Florida entering the final day of competition, the Lady Tigers received a consulate team effort to rally and

defeat the Lady Gators (87-81) for an unprecedented sixth consecutive national crown.

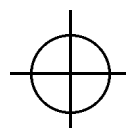
The Lady Tigers again demonstrated their dominance by winning two more national titles in 1993. They won their fourth indoor national championship in the past seven years in the last event by winning the 4x400-meter relay in a then-school record time of (3:33.63).

The Lady Tigers then went 80 miles south of where they started their outdoor streak in 1987 to win their seventh consecutive NCAA outdoor championship. They did it in record breaking fashion by scoring a school record 93 points and by outscoring their second place opponents by 49 points.

In 1996, the Lady Tigers made history by winning their 10th straight NCAA Outdoor title. Never before had a women's team reached double figures in consecutive titles in any NCAA sport. Led by seniors D'Andre Hill, Kim Carson, and Zundra Feagin, who all brought home individual titles, the Lady Tigers stormed into Eugene, Ore. and took their place in history.



The Lady Tigers celebrate a then-record setting 10th straight National Championship in 1986.

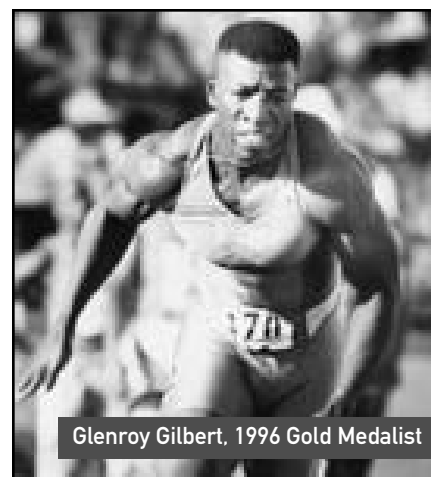


outscored Texas 12-11 in the most crucial race of the meet, getting that one point advantage it needed to clinch the overall title 63-62 in the closest finish in NCAA history.

In addition, the Lady Tigers claimed a fifth consecutive NCAA Indoor crown in 1997, their eighth in an eleven year span. Moreover, when combining indoor and outdoor totals, the Lady Tigers claimed 19 of a possible 22 NCAA Championships from 1987-97, creating a dynasty like no other in women's athletics.

In 2000, the Lady Tigers regained the title they last held in 1997, giving them their 12th national title in 14 years, once again in dramatic fashion. The Lady Tigers scored 46 points on the final day of competition and edged USC, 58-54, when Keisha Spencer closed out the meet by winning the triple jump when she needed to finish in the top three to clinch victory. Peta-Gaye Dowdie won the 200-meter title, finished second in the 100-meter dash and helped both relays score, while Joyce Bates was crowned LSU's third 100-meter hurdles champion in five years.

In 2001 it was LSU once again picking up a national title, this time, however, it was the Tigers stealing the spotlight. Needing a miracle in the final event of the NCAA Indoor Championships, the Tigers' prayers were answered when the foursome of Robert Parham, Lueroy Colquhoun, Pedro Tunon and Alleyne Francique won the 4x400-meter relay, while TCU failed to score, giving the Tigers a 34-33 edge over the Horned Frogs in one of the most exciting finishes in NCAA history. Walter Davis scored 18 of the Tigers' 34 points, winning the triple jump and finishing second in the long jump.

OLYMPICS AND WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS

Since 1928, LSU track and field has been well represented in major international competition. LSU's first Olympic competitor was Sid Bowman who placed sixth in the triple jump at the Amsterdam games.

Tiger trackmen Glen "Slat" Hardin and Bowman both placed at the 1932 Los Angeles games. Hardin became LSU's first medal winner as he took second place in the 400 hurdles for the United States and Bowman finished seventh in the triple jump.

At the 1936 Berlin games, Adolf Hitler and Nazi Germany watched as Tigers Hardin, Jack Torrance and Billy Brown competed for the United States. Hardin made history in the 400 hurdles as he became the first LSU trackster to ever win an Olympic Gold Medal.

Billy Hardin ran for the United States in the 400 hurdles at the 1964 Olympics but it was 24 years before LSU had any of its athletes perform in this arena again. The 1988 summer games in Seoul, South Korea, saw six Tigers and Lady Tigers compete for five different countries. Schowonda Williams and Sheila Echols represented the United States; Robin van Helden, Holland; Mikael Olander, Sweden; Lavern Eve, Bahamas and Angela Phipps, Canada. Echols became the first Lady Tiger to wear a Gold Medal as a part of the United States' 4x100-meter relay championship team.

The 1992 Barcelona Olympics featured seven LSU tracksters. Sheila Echols, Esther Jones, and Kym Carter competed for the United States; Lotfi Khaida, Algeria; Simon Williams, United Kingdom; Dahlia Duhaney, Jamaica; Edgar Diaz, Puerto Rico and Donalda Duprey, Canada. They were led by 21-time All-America Jones who was a member of the USA's Gold Medal-winning 4x100-meter relay team. Echols competed in her second consecutive Olympics placing eighth in the long jump and Carter finished 11th in the heptathlon in her Olympic debut.

At the 1996 Atlanta Olympics, LSU track and field was once again well represented. For the third consecutive Olympiad, a former LSU track athlete won a Gold Medal, as former Tiger Glenroy Gilbert ran the second leg of the Canadian 4x100-meter relay team that shocked the United States. D'Andre Hill advanced to the semi-finals of the women's 100 meter dash, and was the only American collegiate woman to compete in the track events at the 1996 Olympics. Debbie Parris of Jamaica just missed medal-ing by placing fourth in the women's 400-meter hurdles, while on the same night, David Kiptoo of Kenya finished sixth in the final of the men's 800 meters.

At the 1999 World Championships in Seville, Spain, LSU was as usual well represented. 12 current or former LSU athletes were on hand, led by current Lady Tiger All-American Peta-Gaye Dowdie, who made the quarterfinal of the 100 meter dash and won a Bronze Medal as the anchor of the Jamaican 4x100 meter relay team.

During the 1999 indoor season former Tiger All-American Rohsaan Griffin made a splash in the 200 meter dash once again, smashing the American indoor

record in the event with a time of 20.32, winning the American title and making the final at World Indoors.

LSU once again had its share of Olympians in 2000, as eight athletes with LSU ties - two current and six former - traveled to Sydney to compete in the 2000 Summer Olympics. Current Tigers Claston Bernard and Walter Davis made the trip down under to represent Jamaica and the United States respectively, while 2000 NCAA champions Peta-Gaye Dowdie and Keisha Spencer each represented Jamaica.

At the World Championships in Edmonton this past summer, former LSU athletes won a pair of gold medals, as Derrick Brew ran on the winning U.S. 4x400-meter relay team, while Debbie Parris ran on the world champion Jamaican mile relay. In addition, Davis continued to establish himself among the world's top up-and-coming horizontal jumpers, as the Louisiana native finished fifth in the triple jump in only his second major international competition.

THE COACHES

LSU track and field has been blessed with exceptional coaching talent, but during its first 18 years, LSU had numerous coaches, none whose tenure lasted more than three years. Its first full-time coach was Tad Gormley who arrived on the Baton Rouge campus in 1916. During his 12 years, LSU won three SIAA titles, competed on the new Tiger Stadium track and came into track prominence.

After Gormley's departure, the legendary Bernie Moore took over in 1930. Moore

molded the program into a national power and in 1933 guided the Tigers to their first national championship and a title in the first-ever SEC championship in only his fourth season. The Tigers reigned over the young Southeastern Conference by capturing 12 championships in 18 seasons under Moore. Former Tiger great Al Moreau, member of the 1933 National Championship team, took over in 1949 and LSU track and field did not break stride. During his career, LSU captured six SEC outdoor titles and two SEC indoor championships.

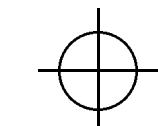
LSU track and field has reached its zenith under Pat Henry. What he has been able to accomplish since his reign began in 1988 is not only remarkable - it's history.

The most successful coach in school and conference history in any sport, Henry became only the second coach in NCAA history to reach 20 NCAA titles with the Lady Tigers' victory in Durham in 2000 and added to that total in 2001 with a men's indoor title. In his first 14 years in Baton Rouge he has led the Lady Tigers to 11 outdoor and seven indoor titles, while leading his Tigers to two outdoor crowns and the 2001 indoor title.

Henry is one of only three coaches to have won a national title with both a men's and women's team and is the only one to do so in the same year, and do so more than once. Of LSU's 35 NCAA titles as a University, Henry has served as head coach for 60 percent.

The Winning Streak

In 1998, the Lady Tiger track and field team failed to bring home the national title for the first time since 1986. It is very difficult sometimes to put into perspective how incredible an accomplishment is until it is complete. The Lady Tigers string of 11 consecutive NCAA titles a standard unmatched in Division I women's collegiate athletics in any sport. From its beginning in Baton Rouge in 1987, to its conclusion in 1998 at the University at Buffalo, it was a streak that was filled with some of the most incredible performances and some of the most incredible performers. The streak had blowouts and it had gut-wrenching drama. It was a streak that had everything, the stuff legends are made of. And in all likelihood, it will not be done again anytime soon.

While the names and faces responsible for these titles changed, the level of consistency and drive to ascend to the pinnacle of the sport remained the same. The following is a look back at the Lady Tigers' remarkable streak.

History of the 4x100-Meter Relay

For better than 15 years, strong relay teams on both the men's and women's sides have become as much a hallmark of LSU track and field as national championships.

LSU is the only school to ever win both short relays in the same year, doing so three consecutive times, as both the men and women won from 1992-94. From the Penn Relays to the Texas Relays to the NCAA Championships, LSU relay teams have become one of the biggest attractions in NCAA track and field.
