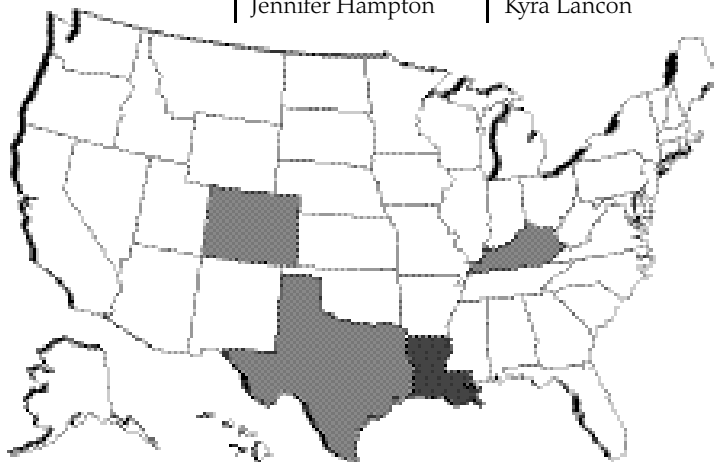

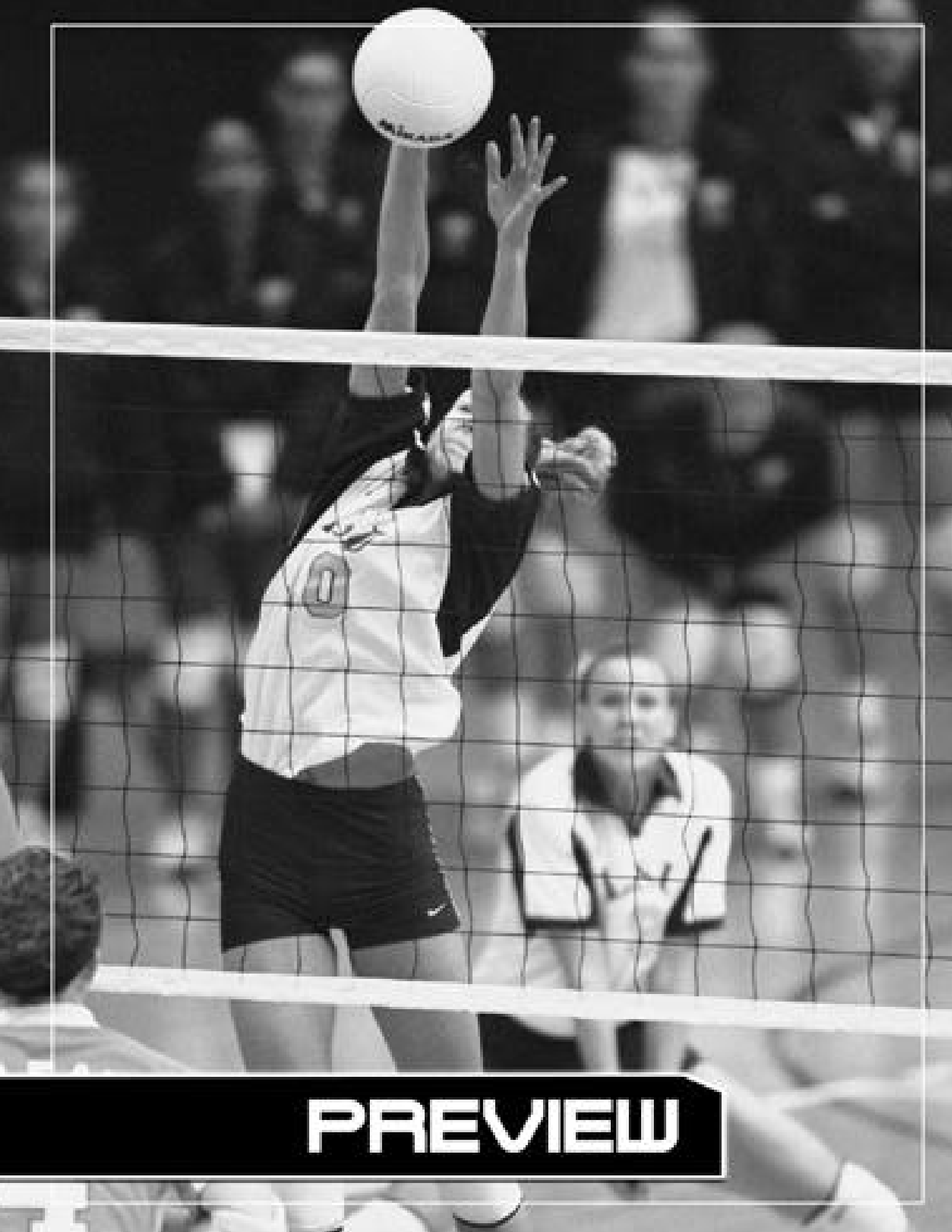

# Breaking Through

As the 2001 volleyball season approached, it was easy to see the confidence and excitement building in LSU coach Fran Flory.

After taking over a program that had hit rock bottom in 1997, Flory has the Tigers poised to make their first NCAA Tournament appearance in nearly a decade.

"This team, since last November, has decided that they want to take the step to the next level. They did that in the SEC Tournament, they did that this Spring. We have been playing and training with a high level of intensity and an attitude that just says we want it more."

For the past three seasons, LSU has hovered around the .500 mark. However, five returning starters and a collection of new talent have placed the Tigers on the brink of breaking through.

Combine that with a change in scoring that favors team's that side out well and LSU should compete for the SEC Western Division crown.

"With the change of score, play is going to be much faster. Every touch of the ball is going to be more important because you can score every time you have it. We have to understand that our side out offense is now point-scoring offense, which for us is a good thing. Last year we were a good side out team, just not as good in transition and scoring points."

However, the Tigers will have to prove their worth early on in the season as the schedule offers no breaks and features seven games against teams that reached the big dance a season ago.

"I think this year's schedule is a little tougher than last season's. Each year I've been here, we've taken a step up in the RPI because of a tougher schedule. If we continue to make that progress and put up a few more wins, then we'll be on the bubble as a team to get in the NCAA Tournament."

Gone from last season's 15-17 squad are three seniors, including starting outside hitter Jill Lytle and setter Lauren O'Connor, who

ranks second in LSU history in career assists. Despite that, the Tigers return 89.6 percent of its kill total from last season.

"We have a great foundation and going in the right direction. There is a lot of experience on this team for the first time in a few years and that should translate into more consistent play and more better play."

## OUTSIDE HITTER/RIGHT SIDE

To find the most depth on the squad, one needs to look no further than the outside hitter position. With two returning starters and a bevy of fresh talent coming in, the competition just to get on the court could be more fierce than the competition on the court.

"The competition for playing time on the outside is going to be really tough this year. We have all our outside's returning and they have proven to be pretty effective. The key for outside hitters is they are ball control people that allow us to stay in our offense. With side-out offense able to score points, offensive efficiency is going to become more important."

With the luxury of having such depth at the position, Flory will be able to use versatile line ups and pose match up problems for opposing teams.

"We became more physical with the addition of Kyra (Lancon) and Regan (Hood), who are both 6-2. We are going to be pretty difficult to match up with. We are going to have a lot of options. All of our outsides have

the capability of hitting different sets, different tempo's and different zones, which makes it harder for other teams to truly understand who is going where with the ball."

Meghan Bedford, who plays mostly on the right side, returns as the team's top outside hitter. The League City, Texas, native was second on the team in kills last year with 343 and has been the most efficient outside hitter for the Tigers in each of the past two seasons.

"Bedford is going to be a big factor for us. By the end of the Spring, she was hitting the ball harder than anyone on our team. She has increased her velocity and ability to put the ball away on the first swing."

Jennifer Hampton is coming off one of the best defensive seasons in LSU history as she posted a 3.83 digs/game average to lead the conference. She is also one of just two Tigers, along with Meagan Davis, who has hit for over 300 kills in each of the past two seasons.

"Hampton has a great natural ability to flow with the game. She knows where the hitter is hitting almost before they do. She can look at a hitter, understand her options and position herself where she needs to be and all great defenders do that. That is not a system, it is a knowledge of the game and natural ability. Couple that with her desire to get the ball and there are not many balls she can't reach."

Lyndsey Benson returns for her senior



season after having sat out much of the past year due a dislocated elbow. As the most creative offensive player on the team, her offensive spark will go a long way in increasing LSU's options this season.

"Lyndsey made a miraculous recovery from two knee surgeries and an elbow dislocation. She has a great shot selection and hits every shot in the book. She is smart and truly understands the game."

Standing 6-4, Addie Prewitt is the Tigers most intimidating presence at the net. Her size and skill have helped her become a terminating blocker on the right side who can match up with any opponent.

"She adds some great physical ability to the team, but adds a great attitude and spirit to the team as well. Every team needs a heart and soul and I think Addie is the heart and soul of this team."

Rachel Vogt, selected as a co-captain for the season, has moved to outside hitter after starting some of last year at middle blocker. She is the most physical player on the team and is constantly working to improve herself.

"Rachel is the most improved player we have on a consistent basis. Every year I say she is the most improved player because she has an undying attitude that she is going to get better and be successful and she will not let anyone stand in the way of that."

After redshirting the 2000 season, Kyra Lancon should make the most impact of the new players this season. She proved last season in practice that she can be a major factor in the SEC and will be counted on to be just that this season.

"Kyra can't wait to put on the purple and gold and play. Through the middle part of last season, she was our most outstanding player in practice. We had a hard time keeping the redshirt on and not playing her."

Regan Hood is a talented young player whose size and athletic ability will allow her to be able to contribute immediately. She is a player who should only get better as the season passes.

"Regan was, I think, one of the best kept secrets in this recruiting class. Everybody now is asking, 'Who is Regan Hood?'. Not only is she 6-2, but she has the heart and is going to fight until the match is over. She will do anything she can to make her team successful."

#### MIDDLE BLOCKERS

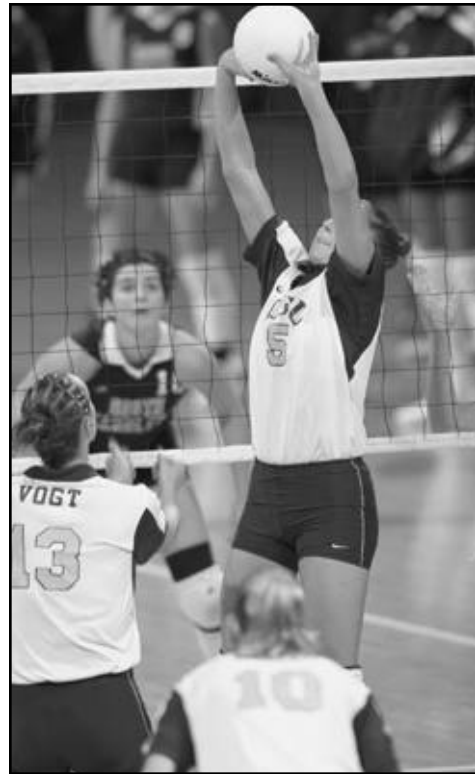
The outside hitter position may have more depth, but there is no question that middle blocker is where the strength of LSU's team is.

"I think we have two of the best middle blockers in the league. There is some depth in the middle in our conference, but in terms of physical ability, Megan and Lauren (Cuyler)

are up near the top."

The Tigers return both starters from a year ago in two-time All-SEC performer Davis and Cuyler, who is the reigning SEC leader in blocks.

Cuyler was one of the biggest surprises of the season last year. After shoulder surgery

limited her effectiveness at outside hitter, she moved into the middle and became a dominating player.

"Cuyler is just a great natural athlete who we just let free lance last season. She is so anxious to get back and be in the middle and be a force and be the cornerstone of our defense. She wants to be the put away person in the middle. It is fun to watch her progress into the new spot and excel."

Davis is simply one of the most effective hitters in the SEC. She has ranked in the top 10 in hitting percentage for each of the past two seasons and her .320 career hitting percentage is second best in school annals.

"She is one of the most heralded middle blockers in the conference. She doesn't get a lot of credit sometimes because her style is unimposing. She is a silent killer. But when you look at her stats at the end she has 12 or 15 kills and hit over .300 with four or five blocks in the game and that is pretty significant."

#### SETTER

At setter, the Tigers have a blend of expe-

rience and talent as returning starter Katie Kubena and incoming freshman Beth Cowley make up the corps at LSU.

"There is going to be a lot of competition at the starting spot. Katie understands our offense and is very in tune with our hitters. But Beth is very accustomed to playing rally scoring. She does a great job of making the right choices at the right time which is more important than making a good set when it comes to rally scoring."

Kubena, LSU's leader in assists in 2000, is back for her junior season after starting in 24 of 32 matches a year ago. She has become a much better all around player as she was third on the team in digs/game last year.

"Katie is great because nothing rattles her. She is going to play one point the next point and the point after. She is much more accurate with where she is delivering the ball and understands where to put the ball now, which is key for her."

Cowley brings to LSU a winning attitude that she developed as her high school and club teams won national titles. Her talent both as a setter and defensive specialist will enable her to be a big factor right away.

"Beth is going to bring a different attitude to our team. Her high school team and club team are proven winners and win national championships all the time so I am going to look to her to bring that type of confidence to the team."

"We are excited about both players and I wouldn't hesitate to use either or both of them in a system. Having two high quality setters gives us that many more options offensively."

#### DEFENSIVE SPECIALIST

A season ago, Jenny Greco solidified the position of defensive specialist for the Tigers and she is back to do the same this season. She will be joined by sophomore Angie Jordan on the back row this year.

Greco proved last season that size doesn't matter. As the smallest player in the league, at just 5-1, she recorded 292 digs, which ranked second on the squad.

"Greco is one that gets in there and sets our defensive attitude. She will fight and claw tooth and nail for everything she can get and that is nice because it is a Louisiana attitude. We are blue collar and get dirty and fight, and she brings that."

Jordan is the best natural athlete on the team. At only 5-8, she has the ability to hit on the outside, but will most likely be used on the back row.

"She is a very gifted athlete with great speed. She can explode on things and it is amazing the balls she can get and how she can run down things."

The Southeastern Conference will hold the 23rd annual SEC Tournament this year in Knoxville, Tenn.

The tournament is a single elimination team competition involving the top eight league schools based on regular season records. The first round of competition takes place on Friday, Nov. 16, with four matches. Semifinal matches are held on Saturday, Nov. 17, with the tournament final on Sunday, Nov. 18. The final match of the tournament will be broadcast on SEC-TV and the winner will be awarded the conference's automatic bid into the NCAA Tournament.

The NCAA Division I Volleyball Championship consists of a 64-team field that competes over the course of two weeks for the National Championship. First and second round matches take place at sites to be announced the first weekend of December. Winners of the second round matches move on to a four-team regional at a site to be announced. Each regional winner advances to the 2001 Final Four which takes place on Dec. 13 and 15 in San Diego.

**Fran Flory**

HEAD COACH - FOURTH SEASON

Entering her fourth year at the helm of the Tigers, coach Fran Flory continues to raise the level of success of the LSU volleyball program and break down barriers that have plagued the Tigers for the past decade.

This past season, Flory guided her squad to the Southeastern Conference Tournament championship match against perennial powerhouse Florida. Despite the loss in the final, LSU had made a breakthrough as it had not been to the championship match since 1992 and had not won a tournament match since 1993.

Flory's 2000 team also became the first LSU team to beat Arkansas when it did so in just three games on the LadyBacs home floor. She also led the Tigers to their first win at Auburn in 10 years en route to a third-place finish in the SEC Western Division.

Flory made an immediate impact at LSU in 1998 as she led the Tigers to a 15-16 record, six games better than the 9-21 mark the team had the year before. More impressive was the five-match improvement in SEC play. After a winless 1997 in conference action, LSU notched five conference victories in 1998 to finish third in the West.

In 1999, Flory led her injury-riddled squad to a 17-15 overall record, the best for an LSU team since the Tigers won 20 matches in 1995. Of the 17 wins, seven came in conference play, also a Tiger best since the 1995 season.

This is Flory's second stint at LSU as the Baton Rouge native was an assistant for four years under LSU's winningest coach, Scott Luster.

She served as a graduate assistant coach in 1988, before being named a full-time assistant in 1989. During her four



seasons as a member of the Tiger coaching staff, Flory helped LSU to unprecedented success with three SEC championships, three SEC Tournament championships and two

Final Four appearances.

After winning the first of the three consecutive conference championships in 1989, Flory and the Tigers became the first school in

SEC history to advance to the NCAA Final Four in 1990. The Tigers would duplicate the Final Four feat in 1991, while earning conference titles in both seasons. The 1991 team remains the only SEC team to win a game in the final four.

In 1992, Flory left LSU to assume the head coaching duties at Southeastern Louisiana. In her first season as a Division I head coach, she led the Lions to a 21-13 record.

In March 1993, Flory returned to the SEC as she became an assistant coach at Kentucky. Five months later, she was named the Wildcats head coach as then-Kentucky head coach Kathy DeBoer was named an Assistant Athletic Director at the school.

In her first season at Kentucky, Flory led the Wildcats to a 29-4 record, while advancing to the second round of the NCAA tournament. For her efforts in the 1993 season, she was named the Tachikara/AVCA

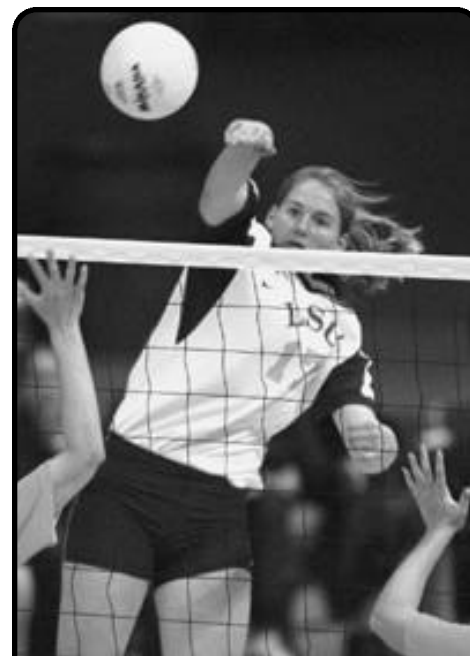

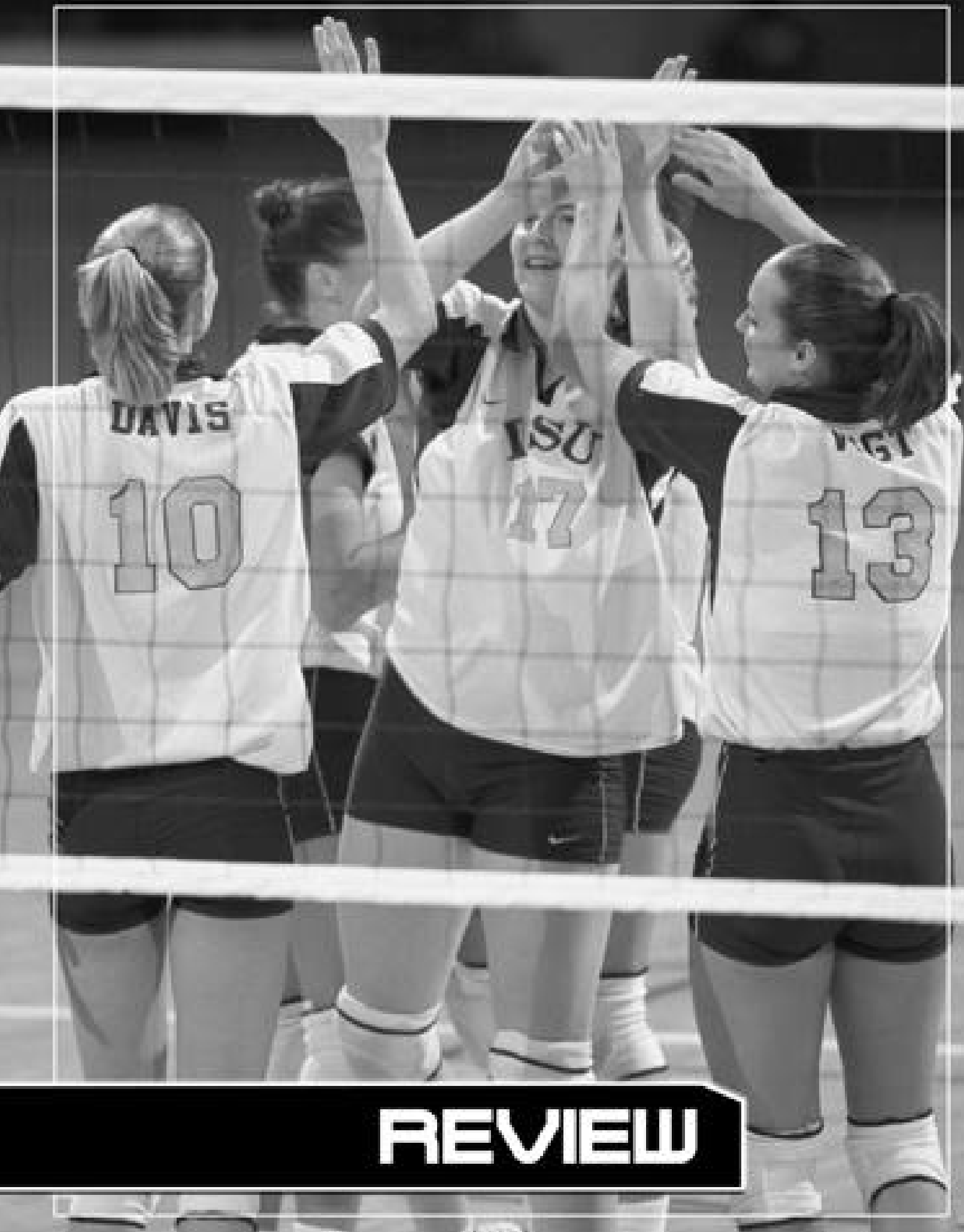

# Continuing the Journey

It wasn't the final record of last season's team that made head coach Fran Flory smile. It was the late-season breakthrough her squad made that did that.

The 2000 the LSU Tigers accomplished something no Tiger team had since 1992 by reaching the championship of the SEC Tournament. Flory's squad also became the first LSU team ever to beat perennial powerhouse Arkansas.

Although the ultimate goal of an NCAA Tournament bid was not attained, the end-of-the-year achievements were a sweet reward for a team that spent an entire year growing together.

The journey began in Boulder, Colo., at the Colorado PowerBar Invitational where Santa Clara awaited. After taking the first game from the Broncos, a top 20 team all season long, the Tigers were overmatched, 3-1. Rebounding against Central Florida in the consolation match, LSU was dominating in earning a 3-0 win.

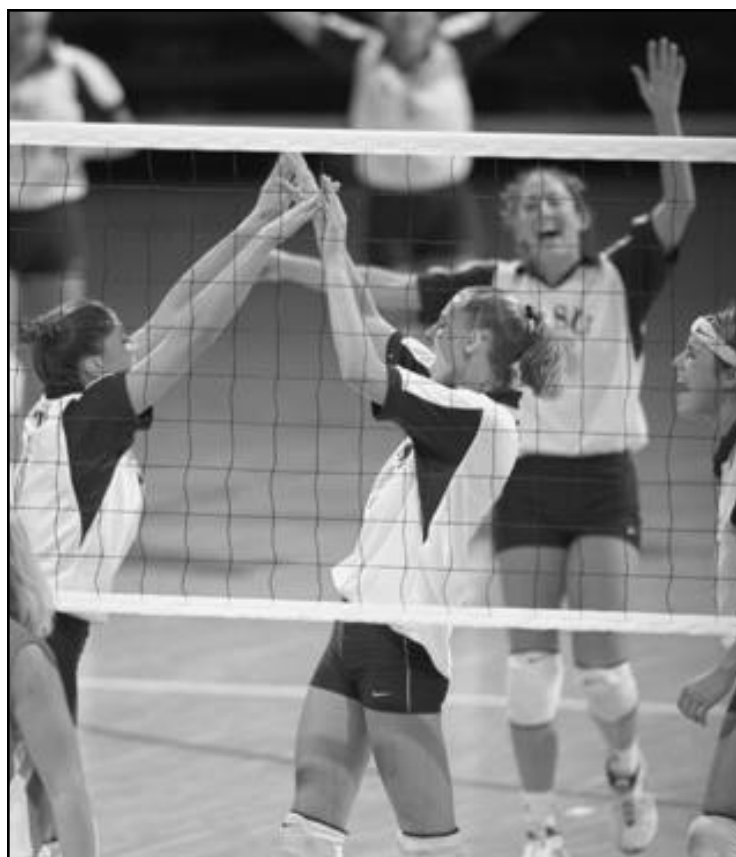
Following a 3-0 sweep of Southern Miss, the Tigers traveled the 90 miles to New Orleans for the Sugar Bowl Classic. An opening night loss to in-state rival Tulane did not deter LSU from making a strong performance in the tournament. The Tigers would down New Orleans, 3-1, before pushing eventual national runner-up Wisconsin to the limit in a loss.

Standing at 3-3 heading home for the Tiger Classic, the schedule wouldn't get any easier. Arkansas State, who annually makes a trip to the NCAA Tournament, was the first opponent. After dropping the first two games to the Lady Indians, LSU rallied to force a fifth game, but could not complete the comeback.

After quick sweep of Southeastern Louisiana, the Tigers faced NCAA

Tournament foe Texas Tech. Again, LSU lacked the firepower to match up and fell to the Red Raiders, 3-0.

Heading into conference play, the Tigers owned a 4-5 record, including losses in three of their previous four matches. The conference-opening match against South Carolina, which finished second in the league, was not



a relief for LSU as they dropped a 3-0 decision to the Lady Gamecocks.

Going back out of conference, a 3-0 win over Stephen F. Austin allowed the Tigers to get back into the win column.

A trip to Auburn, a place where LSU had not won in a decade, was next. However, the 2000 Tigers would not be denied on the plains as they rallied from a 2-1 deficit to score a 3-2 victory.

Traveling to Alabama after its first conference win, LSU looked to make it two in a row as they jumped out on top by winning the first game. But a game-two rally sparked the Crimson Tide to 3-1 victory.

Returning home to face Kentucky and Tennessee, the Tigers would earn another weekend split. After a dominating 3-0 win over the Wildcats, the Lady Vols held off a fighting LSU team for a 3-1 victory.

Following the Tennessee loss, sophomore Lauren Cuyler would be inserted into the starting line up at middle blocker, where she dominated the net in leading the SEC in blocks.

At 7-8 on the year, LSU put together a three-match win streak. Hosting Mississippi State, the Tigers set two school records and were in the top three in three other categories en route to a 3-0 sweep.

Ole Miss came in on fire and easily took game one from LSU. Then junior Meghan

Bedford, who was battling a stomach virus, entered the match and took over, leading the Tigers to the 3-1 win. For her efforts she was named the SEC Player of the Week.

Venturing back out of conference, LSU swept a feisty New Orleans team to improve to 10-8.

Heading back to the road for four games, the three-game winning streak would be replaced with a three-game losing streak. The Tigers began the skid by falling to No. 10 Florida, 3-0, and Georgia, 3-0.

The streak extended at Ole Miss, where LSU held a 2-0 lead and dropped the final three for a 3-2 loss. The Tigers managed to snap the losing streak on the final stop of the trip with a 3-1 in over Mississippi State.

Returning home to face SEC Western Division-leading Alabama and Auburn, LSU

would suffer two more losses. Against the Crimson Tide, the Tigers never really got on track in dropping a 3-1 decision.

After starting out on fire against Auburn and taking the first game, the visiting Tigers would regroup to take the final three games and the victory.

Having lost five of its past six, LSU looked to break out of its slump against Tulane. The Tigers successfully exacted their revenge for the loss earlier in the season with an easy 3-0 victory.

Coming together as the season was winding down, LSU headed to Fayetteville, Ark., for a date with five-time defending SEC West champion Arkansas. Jumping on the Lady Backs from the start, the Tigers could do no wrong in scoring their first victory over the border-state rival.

However, Arkansas would return the favor two days later when the teams met in Baton Rouge. LSU looked to still be in control of the Lady Backs after game one, but could keep it up and fell, 3-1.

At 13-14 and 6-9 in conference action, the Tigers had earned No. 7 seed for the SEC Tournament. That also meant a first-round match with SEC West champion Alabama.

Without a tournament win since 1993, LSU finally broke through that barrier as they upset the Crimson Tide, 3-1. A Georgia upset of South Carolina set up a match with the Bulldogs, who had beaten the Tigers earlier in the year.

Once again, LSU would exact a measure of revenge in scoring a 3-0 victory and reaching the tournament championship. It marked the first time ever that a No. 7 seed reached the final.

Awaiting the Tigers in the championship was host Florida, which was fresh off its 10th consecutive SEC Championship. Overmatched by the powerful Gators, LSU fell in the final, 3-0.

Following the success in the tournament, the Tigers headed to Houston to face SMU. With no hopes of an NCAA Tournament bid, LSU lost to the Lady Mustangs, 3-0, and then fell to Houston in the consolation match by the same score. With the loss, the Tigers season ended at 15-17.

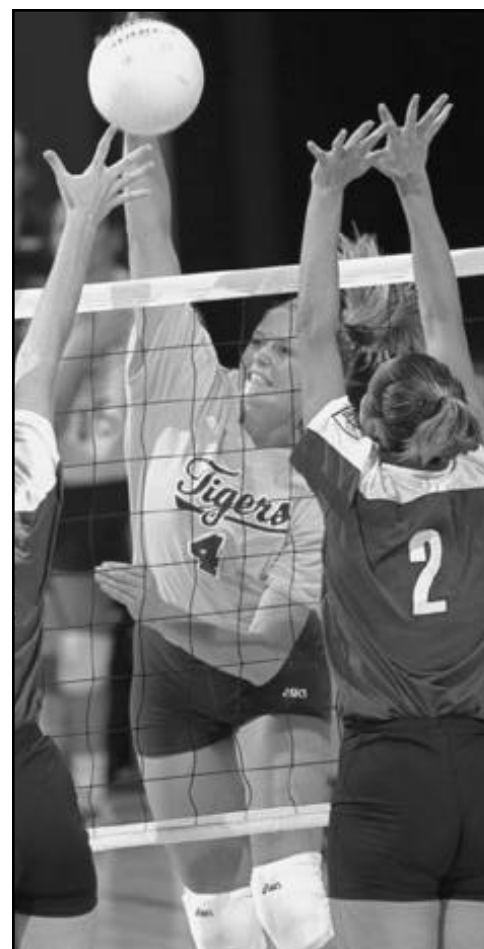
Individually, two Tigers led the conference in a statistical category as Cuyler led the league in blocks and sophomore Jennifer Hampton was the leader in digs. Her 425 digs on the season are the fourth most in school

history and most since 1993.

Meagan Davis had yet another solid season as she hit .348, the fourth best percentage ever at LSU. She also led the team with 349 kills, becoming the first player since 1996 to lead the team in attack percentage and kills in the same year.

LSU also had a record 12 players named to the SEC Academic Honor Roll: Lyndsey Benson, Bedford, Christy Carr, Cuyler, Davis, Hampton, Katie Kubena, Jill Lytle, Lauren O'Connor, Addie Prewitt, Claudia Rodriguez and Rachel Vogt.

It was a season in which LSU grew together as a unit and allowed new faces to assert themselves as major factors in the game. Despite not reaching the NCAA Tournament, the Tigers did make their mark in LSU volleyball history by taking yet another step in the journey back to the top.

The LSU volleyball program begins its 20th season in the Pete Maravich Assembly Center, the largest volleyball venue in the Southeastern Conference.

The \$11.5 million structure, which was renamed in honor of the all-time LSU and NCAA men's basketball scoring leader on July 22, 1988, seats 14,164 spectators and ranks as one of the finest college athletic arenas in the nation.

Containing over one-and-a-quarter million square feet of space and over three million cubic feet, the PMAC competes with Tiger Stadium, home to LSU football, as the most visible structure on the LSU campus.

"The assembly center is a great place to play," LSU head coach Fran Flory said. "It is a very volleyball friendly facility. In it we can create a great atmosphere for our student-athletes and for opposing teams."

Recently, the PMAC has undergone many renovations, the latest being a new portable wood floor which was added this past basketball season. In 2000, the arena was equipped with a brand new scoreboard and video screen that can be used for all sports.

Four years ago, the Tigers enjoyed the comforts of a newly renovated locker room. The two-tiered fully carpeted facility features individual cubicles for

each athlete, a squad meeting room, and a storage area.

"I know we can provide an atmosphere which is a true home court advantage in the assembly center," added Flory. "I have seen it done before."

Between 1985 and 1992, the PMAC became one of the top home-court advantages in the nation as LSU ran up a 110-10 (.917) record in that span. Included in that time was a 37-match home-court win streak, which is the second longest streak in Southeastern Conference history.

In 1991, LSU enjoyed possibly its finest season in the Assembly Center as the Tigers recorded a perfect 16-0 record. They also advanced to the Final Four through the NCAA South Regional which was held in Baton Rouge.

In 1999, the PMAC was once again a tough place for visiting teams to play as LSU notched a 10-4 mark at home en route to its first winning record in four years.

Overall since beginning play in the Assembly Center in 1982, the Tigers have run up an amazing 219-90 (.709) record. In that time, LSU has posted a losing record at home in just two seasons.

The PMAC has often played host to SEC and NCAA Tournaments for volleyball as well as men's and women's basketball and gymnastics.

The 1982, 1987 and 1995 SEC Volleyball Championships were all held in the arena. The PMAC has also been the site of the three NCAA Volleyball Championship First Round Matches as well as the NCAA South Regional in 1991.

The NCAA Women's Basketball First/Second Rounds in 1997, 1999 and 2000, as well as the SEC Men's Basketball Tournament in 1988 were also hosted in the arena. The SEC Gymnastics Championships came to the PMAC in 1999.

Along with the main court area, an auxiliary gym with a recently refinished court, is located underground in the north section of the arena. Nearly all Tiger volleyball practices take place in the auxiliary gym.

In addition to the new floor and locker room in the PMAC, the Tigers are also beginning their fifth season using a 9,700 square foot, state-of-the-weight room within Tiger Stadium. The facility, which was completed in the summer of 1997, fea-

## VOLLEYBALL at the PMAC

The Pete Maravich Assembly Center, which seats 14,161 people, is the largest volleyball venue in the Southeastern Conference. LSU has been able to use the PMAC as a great home court advantage since 1982 as it has compiled an amazing 219-91 (.706) record at home since then. In that span, the Tigers have put together two undefeated seasons and once had a 37-match home winning streak. The PMAC has hosted six NCAA Volleyball

## CAMPUS LIFE

**L**ouisiana State University and Agricultural & Mechanical College has, throughout its 141-year history, served the people of Louisiana, the region, the nation, and the world through extensive multipurpose programs encompassing instruction, research, and public service. The University continuously develops programs of quality that make it one of the nation's outstanding educational institutions.

The University influences the educational, economic, social, and cultural lives of citizens throughout the state - in some way, it touches the life of every person in Louisiana.

Because of its designation as a Research University I - the top category of the Carnegie Foundation's ranking of research institutions - **LSU ranks in the top two percent of the nation's colleges and universities.** The Research I designation is shared by only 59 public and 29 private universities in the country. One of only 25 universities nationwide designated as both a land-grant and sea-grant college, LSU is also actively pursuing space-grant status.

History and tradition began with LSU's founding in 1853 by the General Assembly of Louisiana as the Louisiana State Seminary of



Learning and Military Academy near Pineville, Louisiana. The institution opened Jan. 2, 1860. When the Civil War began, the first superintendent, William Tecumseh Sherman, resigned to assume a command in the Union Army. Fire demolished the Seminary in 1869, and the school moved to Baton Rouge.

In 1870, the Seminary was renamed Louisiana State University. In 1874, under the United States Morrill Act, the Louisiana State Agricultural & Mechanical College was established in New Orleans. The two institutions were merged by the Legislature in 1877 to become Louisiana State University and Agricultural & Mechanical College.

Construction of the present campus began in 1922, and the first classes were held in 1926. LSU experienced major growth in the 1930s and 1940s, expanding its student body, curricula, and services. During the 1960s, the University began to place increasing emphasis on research.

Recognizing the importance and extent of statewide agricultural activities of units in the LSU System, the LSU Board of Supervisors in 1972 established the Center for Agricultural Sciences & Rural Development. This unit was renamed the LSU Agricultural Center in 1982. Components of the LSU Agricultural Center include the Louisiana Agricultural Experiment Station, the Louisiana Cooperative Extension Service, International Programs, and Administrative Services.

In 1977, the Paul M. Hebert Law Center, established as the LSU Law School in 1906, was made an autonomous division of the LSU System. It provides a legal education characterized by an unyielding demand for academic excellence. Its unique curriculum, based on civil law and substantial elements of common law, provides law graduates with qualifications and training for not one, but two legal systems.

LSU, located on more than 2,000 acres in the southern part of Baton Rouge, Louisiana, is bordered on the west by the Mississippi River. The University's more than 250 principal buildings are grouped on a 650-acre plateau that constitutes the main part of the campus.

LSU is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. The Hebert Law Center is a member of the Association of American Law Schools and is on the approved list of the American Bar Association.

### Services Available at the ACA

- A showpiece of the Academic Center is the Deumite Memorial Library, a 2,400-square foot resource and study facility offering reading materials and a relaxing quiet area conducive to learning.
- The Center has private study rooms, made possible by generous donations from alumni, and the Tammany Tigers Computer Room, which has the latest in technology to meet all of the student-athletes' needs. The Bengal Belle room is an additional study area.
- The Eric Hill Athletic Communications Studio is a state-of-the-art facility that allows student-athletes to polish their public speaking ability and improve their communication skills with the media. Dr. Tommy Karam has expertise in assisting athletes in working with the news media.
- The support services offered include tutoring, career counseling and development, time management, study skills, and other programs that help each student-athlete reach and receive their highest-quality education and degree.
- The Academic Center for Athletes, located in the newly renovated Gym Armory, is responsible for overseeing the educational development and progress toward graduation for all student-athletes.



## WEIGHT/TRAINING ROOMS

**L**SU strength coach Tommy Moffitt was a perfect fit for the Tigers in his first season at LSU in 2000. He came to the Tigers from Miami where he was named the 1999 Collegiate Football Strength and Conditioning Coach of the Year by the Professional Football Strength and Conditioning Coaches Society.

The LSU strength and conditioning facility, located in Tiger Stadium, was built in 1997 and features the latest in both strength training and cardiovascular training equipment.

Measuring 10,000-square feet, LSU has one of the finest strength and conditioning facilities in the nation.

### TRAINING ROOM

LSU boasts the largest and most complete athletic training facility in all of collegiate athletics. Focused on aggressive rehabilitation, the Broussard Center for Athletic Training is furnished with the latest in technology and equipment. Some of the features of the

23,000-square foot facility include an on-site x-ray room, an in-house pharmacy, as well as state of the art hydrotherapy pools. The Broussard Center for Athletic Training is equipped with the largest hydrotherapy pools in both collegiate and professional sports and is one of the few collegiate training centers with a full-service pharmacy, as well as on-site x-ray room. LSU is also the only school in college athletics with a training room equipped with a full-service vision center. The facility is named in honor of legendary trainer Dr. Martin J. Broussard, who served as LSU's athletic trainer for several decades.

## THIS IS LSU ATHLETICS

Last season proved to be another outstanding year for LSU athletics as the Tigers claimed their 36th national championship (men's indoor track and field) as well as their 100th Southeastern Conference title (softball). In all, 12 of LSU's 20 sports finished the year ranked among the top 25 teams in the nation.

- The men's indoor track and field team claimed its first national title, winning the event on the last race in Fayetteville, Ark. The national title gave coach Pat Henry 21 for his career, second in NCAA history.
- The softball team advanced to the Women's College World Series for the first time in school history. LSU had wins over Iowa and defending national champion Oklahoma to finish third nationally. The softball team also won the SEC title for the third straight year

and pitcher Britni Sneed was named SEC Player of the Year.

- The men's tennis team reached the round of 16 at the NCAA Championships, while the men's golf team advanced to the NCAA Regionals for the first time in three years.
- The women's golf team, behind a third place finish from Katy Harris, finished 12th at the NCAA Championships.
- The women's basketball team tied for third in the SEC and reached the second round of the NCAA Tournament.
- The baseball team advanced to the Super Regional round of the NCAA Tournament.

### **ACADEMIC CENTER FOR ATHLETES**

The Academic Center for Athletes is responsible for overseeing the educational development and progress toward graduation of all LSU student-athletes. A liaison between the athlete and the academic communities, the Center insures that student-athletes comply with academic rules established by the university, the SEC and the NCAA.

The staff also coordinates academic programs designed to assist student-athletes in obtaining a quality education.

The Center is currently undergoing a multi-million dollar renovation that will give LSU student athletes the opportunity to learn in one of the nation's finest academic support centers.

### **ALL-SPORTS SUCCESS**

LSU's athletic program has traditionally been strong throughout all of its varsity sports and has fielded nationally-competitive teams in most of its sports.

A total of 14 of LSU's 20 athletic teams finished their seasons ranked in the nation's top 25 for their respective sports during the 2000-01 athletic year, and of those, six finished in the top 10. Only six of LSU's 20 sports were not ranked in 2000-01.

LSU has won 100 Southeastern Conference championships in all sports and has claimed 36 national titles.

### **ATHLETICS AS A BUSINESS**

Athletics is mistakenly thought of as merely entertainment. In fact, the total revenues of over \$21 million generated annually by the Athletic Department is:

- twice that of the sales of an average manufacturing plant in Louisiana
- twice the volume of an average food processor
- and about seven times more than the typical apparel plant in the state

### **ATTENDANCE**

LSU teams draw some of the largest crowds in college athletics:

- More than 1.1 million fans watched LSU athletics in all 20 sports during the 2000-01 athletic year.
- Over the last 10 years, LSU football attendance has averaged over 70,000 fans per game. Last season, LSU set a school-record by averaging over 87,000 fans a contest, a number that ranked fifth nationally. LSU's average of 87,000 fans a contest makes Tiger Stadium, on a Saturday night, more populated than 50 of Louisiana's 64 parishes.
- LSU baseball set the standard in college baseball for attendance again in 2001 as over 300,000 fans watched the Tigers play at Alex Box Stadium in regular and post-season play.

### **CHAMPS PROGRAM**

LSU sponsors a fully-funded life skills program for student-athletes. The program is called CHAMPS, an acronym for Challenging Athletes Minds for Personal Success. Under the CHAMPS program, LSU sets up a number of projects and workshops that aid student-athletes in addressing day-to-day living situations, handling stress, and preparing for post-college life.

Under the CHAMPS program, LSU also establishes community service projects in which student-athletes organize and participate. The LSU CHAMPS program sponsors an annual Halloween "Boo-Zar" on campus. The boozar is a trick-or-treat night in the LSU Field House in which athletes from all sports distribute candy to Baton Rouge area children. The event is designed to give parents and children a fun and safe place to participate in Halloween activities.

Each athletic team participates in CHAMPS workshops which educate them in life skills and personal development.

### **COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT**

Because of the athletic facilities on the LSU campus, Baton Rouge is able to attract many events and conventions that benefit the community in both public relations and monetary means. LSU has in the past hosted such events as the National Sports Festival (now called the Olympic Festival) and the International Special Olympics. Last Summer, LSU hosted the US Senior Olympics and in the past has hosted the US Junior National Track & Field Championships.



### **ECONOMIC IMPACT**

LSU has a tremendous impact on the economy of the Baton Rouge area. LSU sporting events bring money into the Baton Rouge economy, not only from throughout the state, but throughout the southeast.

According to a study by LSU economics professor Loren Scott, the existence of LSU Athletics generates \$109 million in sales for businesses in the Baton Rouge community, another \$42 million in household earnings and supports over 2,400 jobs in the Baton Rouge area.

### **FINANCES**

The LSU Athletic Department is a totally self-sufficient auxiliary of the University. No state tax dollars are used to finance LSU athletics. All money spent by the Athletic Department is generated by the department through ticket sales, corporate sponsorships, radio and television revenue, the Tiger Gift Center and concessions, and is supplemented through revenue-sharing resulting from LSU's membership in the Southeastern Conference.

### **INDIVIDUAL ATHLETES**

Year in and year out, LSU boasts some of the most renowned athletes in all of college athletics.

2000 NBA Most Valuable Player and worldwide entertainment superstar Shaquille O'Neal delighted Tiger basketball fans for three seasons. PGA star David Toms played for the Tigers in the late 1980's, while Major League Baseball standouts Todd Walker, Paul Byrd and Lyle Mouton learned their trade at Alex Box Stadium.

Sometimes overlooked are some of the finest female athletes in the country in their respective sports: golfer Katy Harris, softball All-American Britni Sneed and women's basketball All-American Marie Ferdinand dazzled LSU fans last season.

### **JOB PLACEMENT**

Is there life after college athletics? LSU is helping to answer that question with a job placement program as part of the Ninth Semester Program. LSU works closely with the Career Placement Center on campus as well as professional recruiting services to offer advice to athletes on entering the job market upon graduation.

## MIKE THE TIGER

One of the most visible and popular visiting spots on the LSU campus is Mike the Tiger's cage in front of the Pete Maravich Assembly Center. It serves as home to LSU's live Bengal tiger mascot, Mike V. His home includes a concrete area containing a pool and grassy expanse, equipped with a tiger-sized wooden scratching post and a climbing platform. In addition, there is an indoor home into which he can retreat to avoid inclement weather, and a large window allows his fans to view him even when he is indoors.

## NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS

LSU has won 36 national championships in its athletic history, more than any other school in the prestigious Southeastern Conference.

- LSU's national championships have come in men's basketball (1935), boxing (1949), football (1958), men's golf (1940, 1942, 1947, 1955), men's outdoor track & field (1933, 1989, 1990), men's indoor track & field (2001), women's indoor track & field (1987, 1989, 1991, 1993, 1994, 1995, 1996, 1997), women's outdoor track & field (1987, 1988, 1989, 1990, 1991, 1992, 1993, 1994, 1995, 1996, 1997, 2000) and baseball (1991, 1993, 1996, 1997, 2000).

## NATIONAL AWARDS

LSU has had one winner each of the Heisman Trophy, Adolph Rupp Award and Golden Spikes Award, the premier individual awards in football, basketball and baseball. The Heisman Trophy, given annually to college football's best player, was won by Billy Cannon in 1959. The Adolph Rupp Award, which goes to college basketball's top player, was won by Shaquille O'Neal in 1991. The Golden Spikes Award, given to college baseball's most outstanding player each year, was won by Ben McDonald in 1989.

## TIGER ATHLETIC FOUNDATION

The Tiger Athletic Foundation is an independent, private and non-profit fund raising organization that exists to support LSU athletics. Friends and supporters of the University are asked to contribute funds so that LSU athletic facilities may be improved and scholarship costs for athletes may be partially underwritten. TAF conducts an annual campaign, while also offering scholarship endowments from which earnings are applied to scholarship endeavors of LSU athletes on a perpetual basis. Presently, 15 TAF satellite chapters are operating over three states.

## TIGER GIFT CENTER

LSU operates a fully-stocked merchandise store within Tiger Stadium that gives fans a wide array of LSU clothing and memorabilia. The Gift Center is open on football, basketball and baseball game days for fans' convenience. A new satellite Gift Center near Mike the Tiger's cage is now open for added customer convenience. The Tiger Gift Center also went worldwide during the 2000-01 season as LSU merchandise can now be purchased from anywhere in the world on LSU's website, [LSUsports.net](http://LSUsports.net).

## UNIVERSITY INVOLVEMENT

LSU continues to produce profits in its athletic department, despite generally difficult economic times for college athletic programs.

Athletics has contributed over \$7 million to the academic side of the University in the last 10 years. In 1994-95, athletics contributed \$100,000 to the LSU Libraries to assist in buying books and other materials necessary to keep LSU's library system among the finest in the nation, and in 1996 generated over \$30,000 by dedicating all ticket sales from the Spring Football Game to the

libraries.

After the 1988-89 fiscal year, LSU Athletics donated \$2 million to the general fund of the University to help offset projected losses. LSU Athletics has also donated sizeable amounts of money to fund professorships and provide for repairs in academic facilities.

## WOMEN'S ATHLETICS

LSU boasts of one of the finest women's athletics programs in the nation with virtually every program competitive on a national level. LSU again had one of its finest years ever in women's athletics in 2000-01.

- The softball team won the Southeastern Conference title for the third straight year and advanced to the Women's College World Series for the first time, finishing third in the event.
- The basketball team finished third in the SEC and advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament.
- The golf team, behind a third place national finish by Katy Harris, placed 12th in the nation.
- The women's track and field team finished sixth nationally at the NCAA Outdoor Meet.

## SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE

**Y**ear after year, the Southeastern Conference shows why it is considered to be one of the premier volleyball conferences in the nation.

In the decade of the 1990s, the SEC made stellar contributions in volleyball. The conference has sent at least two SEC teams to the NCAA Tournament in every season the last 11 years. The SEC has had a team reach the Final Four seven of the 10 seasons in the '90s with the league having a team advance to the regional final nine of those 10 seasons.

In 2000, Florida competed in its 10th straight NCAA Tournament and made it to the Regional Semifinals. South Carolina earned yet another NCAA berth and came within three points of knocking off the eventual national champion. Tennessee also regained their spot in the NCAA tournament in 2000 after several years on the outside looking in. The surprise of 2000 was Alabama who barely missed earning a spot in the NCAA Tournament and won the SEC Western Division for the first time in school history.

Since the inaugural SEC volleyball championship in 1979-80, many changes have occurred in the conference with volleyball. The addition of Arkansas and South Carolina to the league in 1991 brought the divisional format to the sport with five teams competing in the Eastern Division and six teams in the Western Division. The most recent change came in 1999 as the tournament format will feature only eight teams participating in a three-day conference tournament.

Along with the popularity growth throughout the country, women's volleyball has also grown in the SEC. A benchmark in that growth came in 1995 when SEC volleyball was first broadcasted on SEC-TV (FOX Sports Net South, FOX Sports Net Southwest and Sunshine Network) on a tape-delay basis. For the past five seasons the coverage has grown, especially in the last two years, to live telecasts of several regular season matches and the SEC Tournament championship match. SEC volleyball will continue to enjoy the live coverage on SEC-TV to almost 19 million subscribers in the conference's nine-state region.

- The 2000 season marked the 11th consecutive season in which the SEC has placed at least two teams in the NCAA Tournament.
- Ten of the 11 teams posted wins in double-digits in 2000, with four posting 20+ wins. Florida led the way with an SEC-high 29 victories. Tennessee had 23 wins, while Alabama and South Carolina posted 22 each.
- Alabama earned the school's first ever SEC Western Division title.
- Florida made its 11th NCAA appearance and 10th in a row in 2000, making it to the Regional Semifinals.
- Eleven players were named to the AVCA All-District Team in 2000.
- In the past 11 years, 530 student-athletes have earned selection to the SEC Academic Honor Roll.



## SKIP BERTMAN, DIRECTOR of ATHLETICS

J. Stanley "Skip" Bertman was named LSU's athletics director on January 19, 2001, succeeding Joe Dean, who finished his 14-year term as A.D. on Dec. 31, 2000. Bertman, who completed a brilliant 18-year career this June as LSU's head baseball coach, served both as athletics director and head coach during the 2001 baseball season before assuming the full-time role as A.D. in August.

With Bertman, LSU gains an athletics director who can provide the leadership and experience necessary to manage the Tigers' nearly \$35 million athletic budget. He is one of the most respected people in the Baton Rouge community and throughout the state of Louisiana. His talent as a fund-raiser and businessman, as well as a public relations mastermind, developed the LSU baseball program into the best in the nation.

One only has to look at what Bertman has accomplished with the Tiger baseball program over the last 18 years to see he brings all the tools necessary to direct LSU's 20-sport athletic department.

Bertman guided LSU to five NCAA titles, including back-to-back championships in 1996 and 1997. His teams drew huge crowds to venerable Alex Box Stadium, as LSU led the nation in attendance in each of his final six seasons (1996-2001). Bertman's unyielding desire to succeed drove him to the pinnacle of his profession, and his astute knowledge of the game -- obtained from over 40 years of coaching -- combined with his steadfast determination and irrepressible enthusiasm transformed LSU Baseball into the nation's premier program.

Those same characteristics will carry over to the athletics director's chair, where Bertman has inherited a program considered to be one of the best in the country.

Bertman, 63, guided the baseball Tigers to a 870-330-3 (.724) record in his 18-year tenure, including the 1991, 1993, 1996, 1997 and 2000 NCAA titles, 11 College World Series appearances and Southeastern Conference championships in 1986, 1990, 1991, 1992, 1993, 1996 and 1997. He was named National Coach of the Year on six occasions -- 2000, 1997, 1996, 1993, 1991 and 1986, and he served as head coach of the 1996 U.S. Olympic team which captured the bronze medal in Atlanta.

In a Baseball America poll released in January, 1999, Bertman was voted the second greatest college baseball coach of the 20th century, trailing only Rod Dedeaux of Southern California. LSU was voted No. 3 in a poll of the greatest college baseball programs of the century.

LSU is one of only three schools to win five NCAA championships, and the Tigers are one of only 10 teams to have made 11 College World Series appearances. Bertman and Dedeaux are the only coaches to win five CWS titles, and LSU (1990s) and Southern California (1970s) are the only schools to win four

championships in one decade.

Bertman mastered the art of winning big games throughout his career, guiding the Tigers to a 21-4 record in championship games in NCAA post-season play. That mark includes all NCAA Regional, NCAA Super Regional and College World Series championship contests. Bertman also directed LSU to the highest all-time NCAA Tournament winning percentage with a 89-29 (.754) record.

Bertman led LSU to its fifth national title in 2000, as the Tigers recorded a 52-17 mark, including a perfect 13-0 post-season record. LSU won the SEC Tournament with four straight wins, and the Tigers raced to a 9-0 mark in the NCAA Tournament. The Tigers captured the national title with a thrilling 6-5 win over Stanford in the CWS championship game, as LSU scored four runs in the last two innings to overcome a 5-2 deficit. Catcher Brad Cresse's RBI single in the bottom of the ninth inning drove home shortstop Ryan Theriot with the winning run. LSU became only the third school in NCAA baseball history to win five national championships, joining Southern California and Arizona State.

The Tigers took their first crucial step toward college baseball prominence in 1983 when Bertman was hired to pump new blood into the program. He had previously earned stellar recognition as one of the nation's brightest assistant coaches while at the University of Miami (Fla.) for eight seasons (1976-83).

Bertman was known as the "best assistant coach in college baseball" while a member of Ron Fraser's staff at Miami, and he brought to LSU the same brand of exciting, winning baseball he helped install at UM.

Even before working at Miami, Bertman was renowned for his coaching excellence. In 11 seasons at Miami Beach High School, he directed the Hi-Tides to a state championship and two runners-up finishes. He was named Florida's Coach of the Year on three occasions.

Bertman left Miami Beach High School in 1974 to author the book, *Coaching Youth League Baseball*, funding the project out of his own resources. The book has become required reading for youth league coaches around the nation and in many foreign countries.

In 1975, Bertman went back to coaching at Miami-Dade Downtown, leaving after one season to join Fraser at Miami. The move was a homecoming of sorts, as Bertman spent his collegiate playing days with the Hurricanes as an outfielder and catcher from 1958-60. He earned his B.A. in health and physical education from Miami in 1961 and received his master's degree from UM in 1964.

Bertman and his wife Sandy are the parents of four daughters -- Jan, Jodi, Lisa and Lori. The Bertmans have two grandchildren -- Sophie Faith and Isaac Stanley, the children of Emile and Lori Bertman Guirard.
