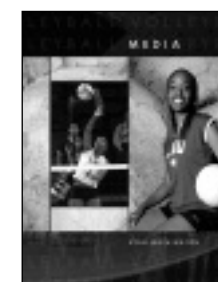

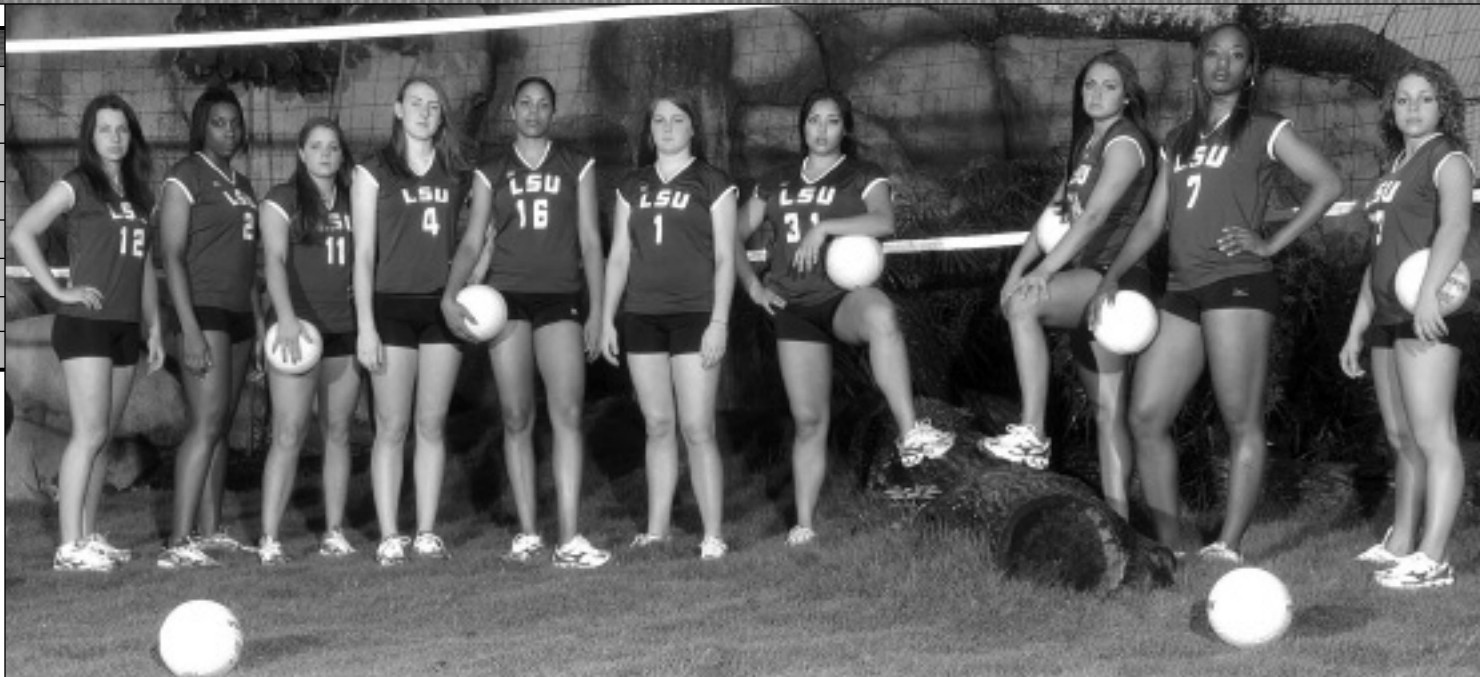

## HUNGRY FOR MORE

After winning their first Southeastern Conference Western Division Championship in school history and advancing to the NCAA Tournament for the first time in 13 years, the LSU volleyball team looks to build on that momentum as they enter the 2006 season with even higher hopes.

"The 2006 season will be an exciting season for us," said head coach Fran Flory. "We have a veteran team returning. We got a taste of what it was like to be in the NCAA Tournament and walked away wanting more. We're very excited."

With nine returning letterwinners and four seniors - Melody Clark (Colorado Springs, Colo.), Lauren Leaumont (New Orleans, La.), Kassi Mikulik (Flatonia, Texas) and Daniela Romero (Arlington, Texas) - who have started throughout their careers, the Tigers boast veteran leadership that complements their youth, which includes 2005 SEC Freshman of the Year Marina Skender.

"The team prepared very well in the spring and continues to prepare very well going into the fall," said Flory. "We feel the leadership that the senior class provides will allow us to take the step to not just to be in the NCAA Tournament, but compete and truly have an opportunity to play further into the tournament."

After coming in and carrying much of the load early in their careers, the four seniors have matured to lead the volleyball program to improving records in each of the last three seasons.

"The seniors have kind of run the gamut in terms of their experiences at LSU and they've gone through a great deal of adversity," said Flory. "I think that they have grown into a very strong group - a group that has outstanding leadership."

"Great teams have great leaders and I think that we have a number of people who will be able to step into that role at different times and in different areas and make sure that we succeed."

In much the same way as last year, the Tigers will not be dominated by any one element, but will spread their attack throughout the lineup. If LSU continues to improve on its serve receive and ball control, the Tigers will have the ability to run an offensive attack that sees LSU go at an opponent from many angles.

"I think that this team will be very balanced," said Flory. "I don't think there is going to be one area that is going to be an Achilles heel for us in terms of our offense. I think if we are able to ball control and pass and serve receive to a high enough level, then we will be a team that is very difficult to defend because we will be able to attack you in so many zones."

### MIDDLE BLOCKERS

Despite losing honorable mention All-American Ivana Kuzmic to graduation, the middle blocker position should remain a solid strength for the Tigers in 2006. With the return of Clark, who ranked sixth in the SEC in blocks in conference games, and the addition of redshirt freshman Lauren DeGirolamo (Belleville, Ill.) and true freshman Brittnee Cooper (Houston, Texas), the middle will become more offensive minded this season.

"Obviously we have a void in the middle after losing an All-American in Ivana," said Flory. "Those are certainly big shoes to fill and her attributes were certainly numerous. However, Lauren

DeGirolamo had a tremendous spring and created an opportunity through her athleticism, as a different type of athlete than Ivana, and allows us to change our offense a little bit and become more offensive minded in the middle.

"Lauren's athleticism and attributes also allow us to match Melody, so it's going to be an easier system to set and an easier system to run. It allows us to be a little more versatile in the number of zones we can attack with our middles."

Having solidified her role in the middle last season after seeing time in both the middle and on the right side over the last two seasons, Clark has been a quiet contributor for the Tigers throughout her career.

"Mel has been a stabilizing force and probably one of the most important players in our program in her tenure here," said Flory. "The unsung hero just about every year but she hasn't ever really gotten a lot of credit other than from our staff, and we certainly know her value and we look for her to have a tremendous senior year."

A talented two-sport standout, Cooper joins the LSU squad after leading the Houston Juniors 16 Nationals club team to a fifth-place finish in the Junior Olympics in 2004.

"Brittnee is going to come in and be given the opportunity to work into a position," said Flory. "She will be a physical presence and shore up the front row defensively with her blocking, range and ability to reach over the net. She will eventually be the type of imposing blocker that Ivana was but she will need a little time to work into the speed and tempo of our offense, but she is certainly capable with her abilities."

### OUTSIDE HITTERS

After an outstanding season in 2005, LSU returns experienced outside hitters this season. Sophomore Kyna Washington (Houston, Texas) made an immediate impact as a freshman in 2005, earning SEC All-Freshman team and honorable mention All-Louisiana honors. Washington moved into the starting lineup during the third week of the season and completed the year ranked second on the team in kills and kills per game.

"Kyna Washington had a great freshman year," said Flory. "We were able to bring her along slowly and mature her without putting a lot of pressure on her early in the season. We reaped the benefits of that throughout the latter part of the year. She has matured as a player, becoming more creative and becoming more of the terminating offensive threat that we need her to be for this team."

After earning SEC Freshman of the Year honors on the right side, sophomore Marina Skender (Zagreb, Croatia) played much of the spring on the outside and may see time on the court there this season. In her inaugural campaign, she ranked third on the team in kills, blocks and assists while ranking second in service aces.

"Marina developed into an outstanding left side this spring and that may be a possibility this fall," said Flory. "She has the most shots of any outside hitter I have ever coached. Her ability to place the ball, while being accurate and efficient are probably her biggest attributes. She can also be a ter-

minating player on the left side."

One of the stars of the 2006 Tiger signing class, Alaina Klarquist (Allen, Texas) is a two-time participant in the USA Volleyball High Performance camp. She also led Allen High School to a Class 5A runner-up finish in 2003 and will likely make an immediate impact on the court for LSU.

"Alaina Klarquist is a physical kid who hits a heavy ball," said Flory. "She will probably have an opportunity to play fairly early. Our offense fits right into her ability and she fits into our system very well. I don't think it will take her long to find a rhythm within the offensive game that we are playing."

One of LSU's emotional leaders on and off the court, Lauren Leamont (New Orleans, La.) returns for her final season with the Tigers. The senior saw action in all 29 matches a year ago and has always stepped up to the challenge to keep an LSU rally going when called upon.

"Lauren Leamont has a huge arsenal of shots," said Flory. "She does a great job of keeping us in play. She isn't a high error type of player and certainly provides a great balance to the rest of the outside hitters."

A local recruit who is familiar with the Tigers, Shannon Balikowsky comes to LSU from Woodlawn High School across town in Baton Rouge. She was a 2005 first-team all-state selection and led the Panthers to the 2003 and 2004 district championships.

"Shannon is a physical player who comes in from high school," said Flory. "She will need some time to adjust to the collegiate game but certainly has some great athletic ability and late in the season could have some opportunity to play."

A transfer from St. Edwards University in Austin, Texas, Kristie Dugas was a 2004 all-state selection at Pius X High School in Lincoln, Neb. She led the Thunderbolts to a state runner-up finish in 2004 and a third place finish in the state in 2003.

"Kristie Dugas is a bit smaller but does a nice job of being a ball-control outside," said Flory.

## RIGHT SIDE

Junior Vanessa Freeman (Granger, Texas) returns to action after a great spring. The powerful right side is one of the most athletic players on the court for the Tigers and has continued to develop each year she has been at LSU.

"Vanessa developed into a terminator on the right side over the spring and can terminate at any point in a rally," said Flory. "She developed a great number of shots and creates great angles with her arm and athleticism, and certainly is a blocking force on the right side."

In addition to action on the outside, Skender may also return to play on the right side, where she starred as a freshman last season. She became the first freshman at LSU to earn All-SEC honors since Daniela Reis in 1989.

"There is not much you need to say about Marina," said Flory. "She was the Freshman of the Year playing the right side. She has pinpoint accuracy and can hit shots that everyone in the gym looks around and asks how she did that. She is one of the most deceptive offensive players I have ever coached."

## SETTERS

After running both a 6-1 and a 5-2 last season, Romero returns for her senior season with a renewed leadership. Ranked fourth in career assists in school history, she will finally be able to run her type of offense for the first time.

"As a senior, Dee certainly will lead this team," said Flory. "She has matured into a very positive leader on the court. She is finally being allowed to run the type of offense that best fits her abilities and that she most enjoys running."

"She does a great job of set selection and set location. I think the biggest improvement we will see with her this year is set location. She worked really hard this past spring to become more consistent at that and I think she was very successful."

The Tigers bring in freshman Maggie Lonergan (Antioch, Ill.), who may figure into playing time. An experienced setter, she led the Sky High Volleyball Club to back-to-back third place finishes nationally in the 15 Club National Division and 16 Club National Division in 2003 and 2004 while being named to the all-tournament teams both years.

"Maggie is a very well-trained setter," said Flory. "She set for a high-level club her entire career and has enjoyed a high level of success. She has nice speed and delivery. She has run a faster offense so she should fit right into the type of offense that we run."

Renee Zeringue (Prairieville, La.) also joins the program after success at Germantown (Tenn.) High School, where she led her team to 2003 and 2005 Tennessee state championships.

"Renee will need some training and some time to adjust, but certainly has some outstanding abilities," said Flory. "She is a fierce competitor and has shown some very positive leadership skills."

## LIBERO/DEFENSIVE SPECIALIST

After making the transition from outside hitter to libero last season, Mikulik returns to the defensive role again in 2006. The senior ranked ninth in the SEC in digs per game, recording the 10th most single-season digs in school history.

"Kassi was probably last year's most valuable player in the opinion of the staff," said Flory. "She was the true stabilizing force on the court consistently. She is the backbone of the defense and our

ball control. She became a very solid serve receive person and her defensive range increased significantly. She will once again be a vital part of this team and our success."

After seeing limited action as a freshman due to an injury suffered during the summer before coming to LSU, Elena Martinez (New Orleans, La.) returns for her sophomore season healthy and in a position to compete for the starting libero role.

"Elena developed very well throughout the spring," said Flory. "She has finally healed from her injuries and has had an opportunity to play on an international tour and train with the national team this summer. She will come in and certainly challenge for the libero spot this year with Kassi. I think competition will be very heated in this position."

After seeing action as a defensive specialist and for her serving last season, Michelle Hensgens (Morgan City, La.) returns for her junior season with the Tigers after showing progress and development during the spring.

"Michelle had an outstanding spring," said Flory. "She probably showed the most improvement of any player on the team. Her hand speed and foot speed were tremendously improved and her ball control defense took huge step up."

## SCHEDULE

In 2006, the SEC has made the first dramatic alteration of the volleyball format in 15 years, since the addition of Arkansas and South Carolina to the league. Gone is the SEC Tournament, which had been a staple of the postseason since 1979, and in its place is a double round-robin regular season league format which will see each of the conference's 11 teams play one another twice to determine the league champion and who earns the SEC's automatic bid to the NCAA Tournament.

"The SEC is going to a double round for the first time in its history," said Flory. "We're excited about that. We like the idea that we will play everyone home and away."

Last season, the SEC emerged on the national scene as a volleyball force with the league recording a record six teams earning bids to the NCAA Tournament, with Tennessee advancing to the Final Four for the first time and Florida advancing to the Elite Eight. With this type of success, SEC teams are now able to validate their national standing with conference victories rather than relying upon non-conference wins.

"I think that throughout the conference every program has raised the level of success to the point that we will be able to be successful by playing each other and kind of protecting each other within the conference," said Flory. "I think that was illustrated last year with teams getting into the NCAA Tournament based on conference wins. That was one of the first years that happened in the SEC."

"Certainly we know as a conference, and as a program, that we have got to beat some non-conference opponents to create that opportunity," Flory continued. "We've scheduled our pre-conference schedule with that in mind, so that we will have a strong enough winning percentage and hopefully some significant wins pre-conference to lend some additional credibility to the SEC schedule."

LSU has an outstanding non-conference schedule in 2006, with four teams that advanced to the 2005 NCAA Tournament. The slate includes three pre-conference tournaments and one post-conference tournament.

After playing only six matches in the Maravich Center a year ago due to circumstances beyond their control, the Tigers begin the season at home with the Tiger Invitational and are scheduled to play in the Maravich Center 13 times in 2006. As part of the season-opening tournament, LSU will host 2005 Sweet Sixteen participant Penn State, along with 2004 NCAA Tournament participant Rice and in-state rival Nicholls State.

"We are excited about the opportunity to have Penn State on our home floor opening weekend," said Flory. "It's not often do you get a top 10 program to come in and play you on your home court and I think it's a tribute to what we have been able to accomplish in the last few years that people are willing to do that."

Following the Tiger Invitational, the Tigers travel to St. Louis for the Billiken Invitational. LSU will face perennial powers Minnesota and Texas A&M, along with host St. Louis.

"Certainly the St. Louis tournament is one of the top tournaments in the country in terms of competition," said Flory. "Texas A&M will be very solid. Minnesota will be among the top in the Big 10 and St. Louis will have a chance to be successful in their conference as well."

The Tigers close out the pre-conference schedule in the Marriott Flyer Invitational. LSU will take on 2006 NCAA Tournament participant Dayton, along with Indiana and Wake Forest.

"The Dayton Tournament is a very solid tournament with teams that will be challenging for their conference tournaments or will be the front runner for that championship," said Flory.

Following the SEC season, the Tigers will travel for the SEC/Big East Challenge at Disney's Wide World of Sports Complex. LSU will face St. John's and Marquette to close out the regular season.

"The schedule is catered towards having an opportunity to play in the NCAA Tournament and having an opportunity to play teams that are going to be in the tournament as well," said Flory. "It's a tough schedule both home and away."

Senior Technical Director for PDI/DreamWorks' movies "Antz", "Shrek", "Shrek 2", "Madagascar" and "Over the Hedge".

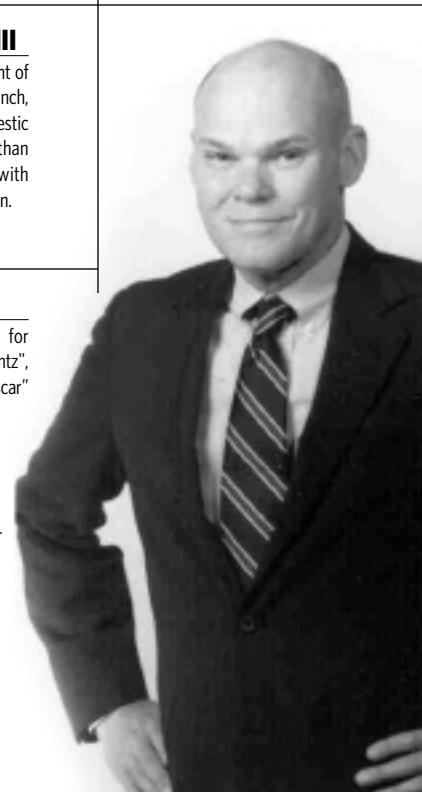


### Harry J. Longwell

Basketball has retired the No. 23 for Pete Maravich, No. 50 for Bob Pettit, Jr., and No. 33 for Shaquille O'Neal. Football's only retired jersey is the No. 20 worn by Billy Cannon, while baseball retired the No. 15 in honor of long-time coach and current athletics director Skip Bertman.

## Bob Pettit

Led LSU to its first NCAA Final Four in 1953 and he later became the first player in NBA history to break the 20,000-plus point barrier. Pettit is a member of the NBA Hall of Fame and in 1997 he was named as one of the top 50 players in NBA history.

## Pete Maravich

"Pistol Pete" Maravich still holds the NCAA record for career points with 3,667 and for career scoring average with 44.2 points a game. He was named the National Player of the Year in 1970 after leading the Tigers to the NIT Final Four. He scored 50+ points an amazing 28 times. He went on to a 10-year professional career and was selected as one of the NBA's 50 greatest players in 1997.

## Shaquille O'Neal

The first pick in the 1992 NBA Draft, O'Neal was named MVP of the league in 2000 and was a three-time NBA Finals MVP after leading the Los Angeles Lakers to three World Championships. At LSU, O'Neal averaged 21.6 points and 13.6 rebounds for his career, and in 1991, he was named the World's Amateur Athlete of the Year as well as SEC Athlete of the Year and National Player of the Year. In 1997, he was named as one of the top 50 players in NBA history.

## Billy Cannon

One of the true legends of college football in the South, Cannon was the 1959 Heisman Trophy winner and helped the Tigers to the 1958 national title. Cannon's most memorable performance came in 1959 against Ole Miss when No. 1 LSU trailed No. 3 Ole Miss 3-0 in the fourth quarter. He fielded a punt, broke seven tackles and returned it 89 yards for the game-winning touchdown in a 7-3 victory. He went on to a successful 11-year professional career.

## Skip Bertman

A legend in the college baseball ranks, Bertman created a dynasty at LSU, guiding the Tigers to five national titles in a 10-year stretch from 1991-2000. He also skippered the United States to a bronze medal at the 1996 Olympics in Atlanta and was an assistant on the gold medal-winning U.S. squad in Seoul, Korea in 1988. Bertman retired from coaching following the 2001 season and is currently the LSU athletics director. In 2006, he was one of 10 inaugural inductees into the College Baseball Hall of Fame in Lubbock, Texas.

### Seimone Augustus

Augustus was the two-time NCAA National Player of the Year, receiving the Wade Trophy, the Naismith and the Wooden Awards as a junior and a senior. Augustus helped lead the Lady Tigers to three straight Final Fours and was the NCAA Regional MOP three times. She was the No. 1 draft pick in the 2006 WNBA draft.



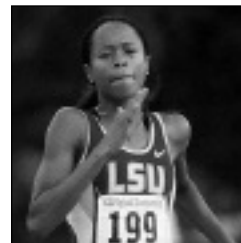
### Temeka Johnson

The 2004-05 Lieberman Award winner as the nation's top point guard, Johnson led the Lady Tigers to back-to-back NCAA Final Fours, the 2004-05 SEC regular season title and the 2003 tournament title, and was the SEC's all-time assist leader, finishing her career fifth in NCAA history with 945.



### Nicki Arnstad

The 2002 NCAA Floor Exercise Co-Champion, Arnstad became the first LSU gymnast to win a national title. She was a two-time All-American and won the NCAA Central Regional Floor and All-Around Championships.



### Muna Lee

The most decorated track and field athlete in school history, Lee won 20 All-America awards and a school record seven national titles while helping the Lady Tigers to five NCAA team championships during her time at LSU. A 2004 Olympian, she finished seventh in the 200 meters at the Summer Games in Athens, Greece.



### April Burkholder

The 2006 NCAA Balance Beam co-national champion. Completed her LSU career with 14 All-America honors and four All-SEC selections. In addition, she was named the NCAA Central Region Gymnast of the Year and SEC Gymnast of the Year twice (2004 and 2005) and was also the conference's Freshman of the Year in 2003.



### Ben McDonald

Named the Golden Spikes National Player of the Year in 1989 and he was later the first player chosen in the Major League Baseball Draft by the Baltimore Orioles.



### Xavier Carter

Carter won a school record-tying seven NCAA titles on the track and earned a total of 10 All-America honors. He became just the second athlete to win four titles at one national meet, joining Jesse Owens. Holds four individual school records and anchored LSU's 4x400-meter relay teams to two school records.



### Britni Sneed

One of three four-time first-team All-SEC selections in conference history, Sneed was a two-time SEC Player of the Year and a three-time NFCA All-American, leading the Tigers to their first Women's College World Series appearance in 2001.



### Walter Davis

An Olympian in 2000 and 2004, Davis helped LSU to national titles in 2001 and 2002. The SEC Male Athlete of the Year in 2002, he won six NCAA titles and earned nine All-America honors. A five-time USA triple jump champion, he is also the reigning World Indoor and Outdoor triple jump champion.



### David Toms

The two-time SEC Player of the Year, Toms has gone on to a successful career on the PGA Tour. Among his PGA Tour victories was a thrilling win at the PGA Championship in August of 2001.



### Meredith Duncan

The nation's top collegiate golfer in 2002, Duncan left LSU as the best female golfer in school history. She earned first-team All-America honors as a senior in 2002 and won the United States Women's Amateur Championship in 2001.



### Todd Walker

Capped his LSU career as the SEC's all-time leader in hits, runs, RBIs, and total bases. Walker, who is a member of the All-Time College World Series Team, led LSU to the national title in 1993. Walker is currently a member of the San Diego Padres.

# Mike's New Habitat



The new environment created for Mike is 15,000 square feet in size with lush planting, a large live oak tree, a beautiful waterfall and a stream evolving from a rocky backdrop overflowing with plants and trees. The habitat has, as a backdrop, an Italianate tower - a campanile - that creates a visual bridge to the Italianate architectural vernacular that is the underpinning of the image of the entire beautiful LSU campus. As part of the second phase of development, this spectacular new habitat will feature state-of-the-art technologies, research, conservation and husbandry programs, as well as educational, interpretive and recreational activities. It will, in essence, be one of the largest and finest Tiger habitats in the United States.

**M**ike V, the famed live Bengal tiger that serves as the graphic image of all LSU athletics teams, begins the 16th year of his reign on the LSU campus.

He proudly rules over a state-of-the-art 15,000 square foot domicile, just north of Tiger Stadium, which contains a beautiful waterfall, stream and swimming pool with plants and trees. In addition, there is an indoor area into which he can retreat to avoid inclement weather.

Mike's ride through Tiger Stadium before home games in a cage topped by the LSU cheerleaders is a school tradition. Before entering the stadium, his cage on wheels is parked next to the opponent's locker room in the southeast end of the stadium. Opposing players must make their way past Mike's cage to reach their locker room.

Tradition dictates that the Tigers will score a touchdown for every growl issued by Mike before a football game. For many years, Mike was prompted to roar by pounding on the cage. Objections of cruel punishment brought about the use of recorded growls to play to the crowd before the games. That practice was discontinued shortly afterward and, today, Mike participates in the pregame tradition without provocation.

The Tiger mascot stopped traveling regularly with the LSU team in 1970 when his cage overturned on Airline Highway in an accident en route to a game. Mike IV traveled four more times, though, as he appeared at a Mardi Gras parade in 1984, the 1985 Sugar Bowl, and LSU's basketball games in the Superdome.

Mike V made his first road trip in December 1991 to the Louisiana Superdome to witness Shaquille O'Neal and LSU defeat Texas, 84-83.

In the mid-1980's, pranksters cut the locks on Mike IV's cage and freed him in the early-morning hours just days before the annual LSU-Tulane clash. Mike roamed free, playfully knocking down several small pine trees in the area, before being trapped in the Bernie Moore Track Stadium where police used tranquilizer guns to capture and return the Bengal Tiger to his home.

The incident was reminiscent of a kidnapping of Mike I many years ago by Tulane students before a Tiger-Green Wave battle.

## Mike I

The original Mike was purchased from the Little Rock Zoo in 1936 for \$750, with money contributed by the student body. Originally known as "Sheik" at the time of his purchase, his name was changed to Mike to honor Mike Chambers who served as LSU's athletic trainer when the first mascot was purchased. Chambers played football at Illinois where he blocked for the legendary Red Grange. The first Mike was housed in the Baton Rouge Zoo for one year before a permanent home was constructed near Tiger Stadium. Mike I reigned for 20 years before dying of pneumonia in the midst of a six-game LSU football losing streak in 1957. Fearing the LSU faithful would give up hope upon the death of the mascot, Mike's death was not made public until the Tigers ended the losing streak.

## Mike II

The second Mike served a brief reign, lasting only through the 1957 season before dying of pneumonia in the spring of 1958. He was born at the Audubon Zoo in New Orleans and came to LSU on Sept. 28, 1956. The young tiger was held overnight in Tiger Stadium and unveiled Sept. 29, the opening day of the football season.

## Mike III

Just in time for the 1958 national championship season, Mike III was purchased from the Woodland Park Zoo in Seattle, Wash., following a national search by then-athletic director Jim Corbett. The student body contributed \$1,500 for the purchase of the tiger. Mike III served as mascot for 18 seasons, dying after the only losing season of his reign, as LSU posted a 5-6 record in 1975.

## Mike IV

Mike IV reigned over Tiger athletics for 14 years after being donated to the school by August A. Busch III from the Dark Continent Amusement Park in Tampa, Fla., on Aug. 29, 1976. Born on May 15, 1974, Mike's age and health were determining factors in his retirement to the Baton Rouge Zoo in 1990. The centerpiece of the Zoo's cat exhibit, Mike weighed in at 500 pounds. His only hiatus from the LSU campus before 1990 was the summer of 1981 which he spent at the Little Rock Zoo while his cage was being expanded. Ironically, the Little Rock Zoo was the birthplace of the first Mike the Tiger. Mike IV died of old age in March of 1995 at the age of 21.

## Mike V

The newest tiger mascot was donated by Dr. Thomas and Caroline Atchison of the Animal House Zoological Park in Moulton, Ala. Avid LSU supporter Charles Becker, a member of the LSU booster group the Tammany Tigers, put Dr. Sheldon Bivin of the LSU School of Veterinary Medicine in touch with the Atchisons. Bivin traveled to Alabama and brought the baby tiger back to Baton Rouge. Born Oct. 18, 1989, the new tiger was introduced to LSU fans at a basketball game against Alabama in February 1990. He officially began his reign on April 30, 1990, when he was moved into the tiger cage across from Tiger Stadium.





## PETE MARAVICH ASSEMBLY CENTER



**T**he Pete Maravich Assembly Center, which seats 13,425 people, is the largest volleyball venue in the Southeastern Conference. LSU has been able to use the PMAC as a great home court advantage since beginning play there in 1982. Three times in the last 20 years, LSU has put together undefeated seasons in the Assembly Center -- 1986, 1991 and 2005. In addition, the Tigers have produced home winning streaks of 37 and 30 matches and have not posted a losing home record since 1997. The PMAC has hosted six NCAA Volleyball Tournament matches, including the 1991 South Regional, which LSU won to advance to the Final Four.

**T**he LSU volleyball team has the luxury of its very own practice facility in the Pete Maravich Assembly Center. ## LOCKER ROOM

**T**he LSU locker room is located in the northwest corner of the Pete Maravich Assembly Center, directly between the playing floor of the PMAC and the auxiliary gym, which serves as the Tigers' practice facility. The locker room, a two-tiered facility which is equipped with a players lounge, was remodeled prior to the 2000 season and has locker space for each athlete.





**L**SU boasts the largest and most complete athletic training facility in all of collegiate athletics. Focused on aggressive rehabilitation, the Broussard Center for Athletic Training is furnished with the latest in technology and equipment. Some of the features of the 23,000-square foot facility include an on-site x-ray room, an in-house pharmacy, as well as state of the art hydrotherapy pools. The Broussard Center for Athletic Training is equipped with the largest hydrotherapy pools in both collegiate and professional sports and is one of the few collegiate training centers with a full-service pharmacy, as well as on-site x-ray room. LSU is also the only school in college athletics with a training room equipped with a full-service vision center. The facility is named in honor of legendary trainer Dr. Martin J. Broussard, who served as LSU's athletic trainer for several decades.

**A**lready a Louisiana Legend and one of the greatest college baseball coaches of all time, J. Stanley "Skip" Bertman has made the seamless transition into the athletics director's chair with the same enthusiasm, vision and demand for excellence that were trademarks of his stellar coaching career.

In just five years as LSU's director of athletics, Bertman has already added to his impressive list of on-the-field achievements. Under his direction, LSU enjoyed arguably the greatest athletics years in the history of the institution. In 2003-04, three teams won national championships, nine teams finished in the nation's top ten, and 14 teams ranked in the top 25, and in 2004-05, 14 teams advanced to the postseason. LSU teams also enjoyed improved grade point averages across the board, making the LSU student-athlete experience a success on and off the fields of competition.

While supervising the Tigers' progress on the playing fields, he has begun to implement measures necessary to realize his vision of building the LSU athletics department into the best in the country. Bertman's bold and innovative plans promise to keep the Tigers among the nation's elite in all phases of collegiate athletics.

Bertman is now in the midst of upgrading LSU's athletics complex. Working hand in hand with the Tiger Athletic Foundation, Bertman has already overseen the completion of the Cox Communications Academic Center for Student-Athletes while renovating Tiger Stadium and the Pete Maravich Assembly Center, and constructing the Football Operations Center.

It was also Bertman who took the bold but essential move to implement a seat contribution program in Tiger Stadium to fund facility improvements and ensure the financial stability of the LSU Athletics Department for the next decade.

Bertman was named LSU's athletics director on Jan. 19, 2001. With Bertman, LSU gained an athletics director who provides the leadership and experience necessary to manage the Tigers' \$52 million budget.

Bertman guided LSU to five NCAA baseball titles, and his teams drew huge crowds to venerable Alex Box Stadium, as the Tigers led the nation in attendance in each of his final six seasons (1996-2001).

He also served as head coach of the 1996 U.S. Olympic team that captured the bronze medal in Atlanta.

Bertman continues to be honored for his remarkable coaching tenure, as he was inducted in June, 2002, into the Louisiana Sports Hall of Fame. He was inducted into the American Baseball Coaches Association Hall of Fame in January, 2003. In 2006, he was one of 10 inaugural inductees into the College Baseball Hall of Fame in Lubbock, Texas.

In a Baseball America poll published in 1999, Bertman was voted the second greatest college baseball coach of the 20th century, trailing only the late Rod Dedeaux of Southern California. Bertman and Dedeaux are the only coaches to win five CWS titles.

He had previously earned recognition as one of the nation's brightest assistant coaches while at the University of Miami (Fla.) for eight seasons (1976-83). Before working at Miami, Bertman was renowned for his coaching excellence. In 11 seasons at Miami Beach High School, he directed the Hi-Tides to a state championship and two runners-up finishes and he was named Florida's Coach of the Year on three occasions.

In 1975, Bertman coached at Miami-Dade Downtown, leaving after one season to join legendary head coach Ron Fraser at Miami. The move was a homecoming of sorts, as Bertman spent his collegiate playing days with the Hurricanes as an outfielder and catcher from 1958-60. He earned his B.A. in health and physical education from Miami in 1961 and received his master's degree from UM in 1964.

## Dr. William L. Jenkins

President, LSU

Dr. William L. Jenkins is President of the Louisiana State University System, which includes ten institutions on 10 campuses in five cities as well as 10 public hospitals in 10 cities.

A native of South Africa, Dr. Jenkins received his professional veterinary medicine degree in 1958 and specialist credentials in 1968 from the University of Pretoria. In 1970 he received a Ph.D. degree from the University of Missouri in Columbia. After practicing veterinary medicine for four years, Dr. Jenkins joined the faculty at the University of Pretoria, advancing through the ranks to become professor and head of the Department of Veterinary Physiology, Pharmacology and Toxicology in 1971.

In 1978 Dr. Jenkins moved to the United States and joined the faculty in the Department of Veterinary Physiology and Pharmacology at Texas A&M University. In 1988 he was appointed dean of the LSU School of Veterinary Medicine, was named LSU's provost and vice chancellor for academic affairs in 1993, Chancellor of LSU in 1996, and President of the LSU System in 1999.

Dr. Jenkins has taught extensively at both the professional and graduate levels. He also has been active in continuing education and has delivered more than 200 lectures and addresses to diverse groups in both the United States and abroad. He has published more than 60 scientific articles and has contributed 15 chapters to various textbooks. He is co-author of a textbook on veterinary pharmacology.

Over the years President Jenkins has received numerous teaching and service awards and recognitions. He also has served on many boards and commissions at the local, regional, state, and national levels.

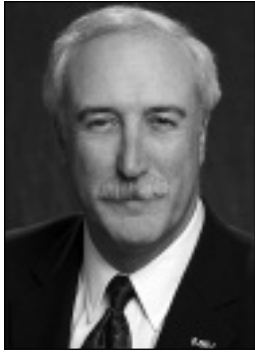

# Sean O'Keefe

Chancellor, LSU

The Honorable Sean O'Keefe assumed the office of Chancellor of Louisiana State University and A&M College on February 21, 2005. Prior to his appointment as LSU's seventh chancellor, O'Keefe established a distinguished career in higher education and United States government service.

Chancellor O'Keefe earned his Bachelor of Arts from Loyola University in New Orleans in 1977 and his Master of Public Administration from the Maxwell School of Syracuse University in 1978. He held an endowed chair at the Syracuse University Maxwell School of Citizenship and Public Affairs and served as the Director of National Security Studies, a partnership of Syracuse University and Johns Hopkins University for delivery of executive education programs. He was also Professor of Business Administration and Assistant to the Senior Vice President for Research and Dean of the Graduate School at the Pennsylvania State University.

He served on four separate occasions as a presidential appointee. Most recently, until February 2005, he served as the 10th Administrator of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration. O'Keefe joined President George W. Bush's Administration as Deputy Assistant to the President and as the Deputy Director of the Office of Management and Budget until December 2001.

Appointed Secretary of the Navy in July 1992 by President George Bush, O'Keefe served as Comptroller and Chief Financial Officer of the Department of Defense since 1989. Before joining then-Defense Secretary Dick Cheney's Pentagon management team in these capacities, he served on the United States Senate Committee on Appropriations staff for eight years and was Staff Director of the Defense Appropriations Subcommittee. His public service began in 1978 upon his selection as a Presidential Management Intern.

Chancellor Sean O'Keefe is a Fellow of the National

Academy of Public Administration, a Fellow of the International Academy of Astronautics, and member of the Naval Postgraduate School Board of Advisors. During his academic postings, he was a Visiting Scholar at the Wolfson College of the University of Cambridge in the United Kingdom, a member of the Naval Postgraduate School's civil-military relations seminar team, and conducted seminars for the Strategic Studies Group at Oxford University. He served on the national security panel to devise the 1988 Republican platform and was a member of the 1985 Kennedy School of Government program for national security executives at Harvard University.

In 1993, President Bush and Secretary Cheney presented him the Distinguished Public Service Award. He was the 1999 faculty recipient of the Syracuse University Chancellor's Award for Public Service; recipient of the Department of the Navy's Public Service Award in December 2000; and has been awarded five honorary doctorate degrees from several prestigious educational institutions. In 2003 and 2004, he was recognized and honored by the Irish American Magazine as one of the Top 100 Irish Americans.

He is the author of several journal articles and contributing author of *Keeping the Edge: Managing Defense for the Future* released in October 2000. In 1998, he co-authored *The Defense Industry in the Post-Cold War Era: Corporate Strategies and Public Policy Perspectives*.

He is married to Laura McCarthy O'Keefe, and they have three children - Lindsey, Jonathan, and Kevin.



## Kenneth E. Carpenter, Faculty Athletics Representative

Kenneth E. Carpenter is in his third year as LSU's faculty representative in NCAA and Southeastern Conference matters.

Carpenter, a professor in the School of Architecture, has taught at LSU since 1986. He received his bachelor's degree in architecture from the University of Oklahoma in 1962 and his master's from the University of Minnesota in 1967. Before joining the LSU faculty, he served at Clemson University as associate professor of architecture from 1967-77; Ball State University, where he was professor and chairman of the Department of Architecture, 1977-81; and, Iowa State University, serving as

professor and chairman, Department of Architecture from 1981-86.

At LSU, he served as the dean of the College of Design from 1986-97; Interim Executive Director of International Programs from 1997-98; and Interim Dean of the College of Art and Design from 2001-02.

Carpenter is a member of Phi Kappa Phi, the American Institute of Architects, and the American Association of University Professors.

## SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE

*The 2005 Tigers won a share of their first SEC Western Division Championship.*

**Y**ear after year, the Southeastern Conference shows why it is considered to be one of the premier volleyball conferences in the nation. In the 1990's and continuing into the 2000's, the SEC made stellar contributions to the sport of volleyball.

The conference has sent at least two teams to the NCAA Tournament in every season for the last 15 years. The SEC has had a team reach the Final Four 10 of the last 16 seasons, with Tennessee advancing to the Final Four last season and Florida facing Southern California in the 2003 National Championship game.

In 2005, Florida competed in its 15th straight NCAA Tournament. A league-record six teams advanced to postseason play, including Alabama, Arkansas, Kentucky, LSU and Tennessee.

Since the inaugural SEC volleyball championship in 1979-80, many changes have occurred in the conference. The addition of Arkansas and South Carolina to the league in 1991 brought the divisional format to the sport with five teams competing in the Eastern Division and six teams in the Western Division. This season, the league will forego the three-day tournament and instead play a double round-robin regular season SEC schedule to determine the conference champion and who receives the automatic bid to the NCAA Tournament.

Along with the popularity growth throughout the country, women's volleyball has also grown in the SEC. A benchmark in that growth came in 1995 when SEC volleyball was first broadcast on SEC-TV on a tape-delay basis. For the past 11 seasons the coverage has grown, especially in the last six years, to live telecasts of several regular season matches. SEC volleyball will continue to enjoy live coverage on SEC-TV in 2006, reaching almost 22 million subscribers in the conference's nine-state region.

## SEC Volleyball

### A STANDARD OF EXCELLENCE

- ▶ The 2005 season marked the 16th consecutive year the SEC has placed at least two teams in the NCAA Tournament.
- ▶ A record-breaking six SEC teams earned berths in the NCAA Tournament, shattering the previous record of four teams.
- ▶ Nine of the 11 teams in the SEC posted wins in double-digits in 2005, with five posting 20+ wins. Florida led the way with an SEC-high 33 victories. Tennessee had 25 wins, while Alabama had 23 and LSU and Arkansas posted 21 victories on the season.
- ▶ Arkansas and LSU claimed a share of the Western Division crown in 2005, with Florida earning the Eastern Division championship.
- ▶ Florida captured its 12th SEC Tournament Championship and advanced to the NCAA quarterfinals.
- ▶ Tennessee made its eighth NCAA appearance and advanced to the NCAA Final Four before falling to eventual national champion Washington.
- ▶ Three players were named AVCA All-American and nine players were named to the AVCA Division I All-District Team.
- ▶ In the past 15 years, 837 student-athletes have earned selection to the SEC Academic Honor Roll.

## HEAD COACH Fran Flory

NINTH YEAR AT LSU • 15TH YEAR OVERALL



**E**ntering her ninth year at the helm of the Tigers, head coach Fran Flory continues to raise the level of success, returning LSU to the national rankings as the Tigers compete for a place near the top of the SEC each season.

During her eighth season at LSU, Flory passed former head coach Ruth Nelson to become the second winningest head coach in Tiger history. In addition, LSU vaulted into the top 25 poll for the first time since 1993, ranking as high as No. 24 in the AVCA/CSTV Coaches poll last season.

Despite traveling over 14,000 miles in 2005, Flory guided the Tigers to one of their most successful seasons in two decades. LSU won its first SEC Western Division championship and advanced to the NCAA Tournament for the first time since 1992.

After Hurricane Katrina turned the Maravich Center into the largest field hospital in the United States, the volleyball team played their first 17 matches on the road, posting a 13-4 record including a win over No. 8 Notre Dame. LSU went on to finish the season at 21-8 overall and 11-5 in the SEC, the most wins by a Tiger team since 1993 and the most SEC wins since 1992, while going 6-0 at home, the third undefeated mark in the Maravich Center in the program's history.

For her efforts, Flory earned the second Louisiana Sports Writer's Association Louisiana Coach of the Year honor of her career. In addition, senior Ivana Kuzmic became LSU's first All-American since 1992, earning honorable mention AVCA honors after being named the Louisiana Player of the Year and a first-team All-SEC selection.

Marina Skender was named the SEC Freshman of the Year, the fourth conference rookie of the year honor in LSU history, but the first since 1990. Skender was also a second-team All-SEC selection along with senior Jelena Mijatovic, marking the first time since 2001 the Tigers had three players earn all-conference honors.

Flory has now guided players to 12 All-SEC honors, including four first-team selections. In addition, she has led her players to 19 All-Louisiana awards, including 12 first-team selections, and every individual state award, including player, freshman and newcomer of the year.

Flory's success, however, has not been solely on the court. LSU has had the second-most players named to the SEC Academic Honor Roll of any school in the league during her tenure, leading the league four times in the last eight seasons. The LSU volleyball program has also been recog-

nized nationally for its academic success, picking up an American Volleyball Coaches Association Academic Award three times, while recording a team average over 3.0 last year.

Two years ago, Flory led the Tigers to a third place finish in the SEC West, marking the seventh consecutive season LSU finished at least third in the West, including every year in her tenure. With a 17-12 mark, she also matched the most wins in a season since she became head coach, including three wins over teams in the NCAA Tournament field. In addition, Kuzmic was named the Louisiana Newcomer of the Year, while she and Regan Hood earned first-team All-Louisiana honors.

In 2003, Flory guided a youthful Tiger team, one with eight freshmen and no seniors, to a third place finish in the SEC West. For the first time since she became head coach, the Tigers defeated South Carolina in Columbia, S.C., knocking off the Gamecocks, 3-1, to mark the first win in Columbia since 1995. Hood earned her first All-SEC honor under Flory's tutelage, being named to the second team, while Lauren Leaumont was an All-Freshman selection in the team's inaugural year.

In 2002, Flory's Tiger team recorded the most wins by any LSU team since 1999. The Tigers also picked up back-to-back winning SEC records for the first time since 1992-93. With that came back-to-back runner-up finishes in the SEC Western Division. In addition, LSU became the first team in 19 regular-season SEC matches to take a game from nationally ranked Florida. Prior to the game one loss, the Gators last lost a game on Sept. 21, 2001, when they fell behind 2-0 in an eventual 3-2 win over South Carolina. Florida had not lost a regular-season SEC game at home since dropping the third game to the Gamecocks in a 3-1 win on Oct. 8, 2000, a string of 12 consecutive matches.

In 2001, the Tigers recorded the fourth most conference wins in school history and picked up their first winning conference record since 1995, finishing second in the SEC West. LSU owned the best intra-division record among Western Division teams at 9-1, while finishing fourth overall.

Flory guided her 2000 squad to the SEC Tournament Championship match against perennial-powerhouse Florida. Despite the loss in the final, LSU made a breakthrough, as it had not been to the championship match since 1992 and had not won a tournament match since 1993.

Flory's 2000 team also became the first LSU team to beat Arkansas when it did so in three games on the Lady Backs' home floor. She led the Tigers to their first win at Auburn in 10 years en route to a third place finish in the SEC Western Division.

In 1999, Flory led her injury-riddled squad to a 17-15 overall record, the best for an LSU team since the Tigers won 20 matches in 1995. Of the 17 wins, seven came in conference play, also a Tiger best since the 1995 season.

She made an immediate impact at LSU in 1998 as she led the Tigers to a 15-16 record, six matches better than the 9-21 mark the team had the year before. More impressive was the five-match improvement in SEC play. After a winless 1997 in conference action under the former head coach, LSU notched five conference victories in 1998 to finish third in the West.

This is Flory's second stint at LSU as the Baton Rouge native was an assistant for four years under LSU's winningest coach, Scott Luster. She served as a graduate assistant in 1988, before being named a full-time assistant in 1989. During her four seasons with the Tigers, Flory helped LSU to unprecedented success with three SEC championships, three SEC Tournament championships and two Final Four appearances, the first school in SEC history to advance to the NCAA Final Four.

In 1992, Flory left LSU to assume the head coaching duties at Southeastern Louisiana. In her first season as a Division I head coach, she led the Lions to a 21-13 record. In March 1993, Flory returned to the SEC as she became an assistant coach at Kentucky. Five months later, she was named the Wildcats head coach as then-Kentucky coach Kathy DeBoer, who is currently the Executive Director of the American Volleyball Coaches Association, was named an Associate Athletic Director.

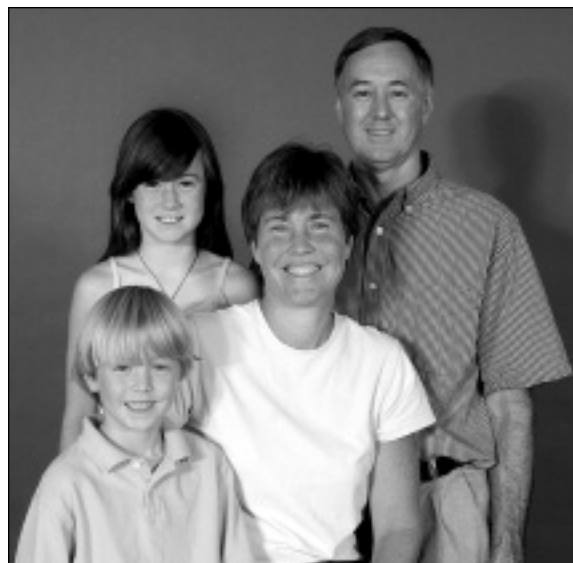
In her first season at Kentucky, Flory led the Wildcats to a 29-4 record, while advancing to the second round of the NCAA Tournament. For her efforts in the 1993 season, she was named the Tachikara/AVCA Region IV Coach of the Year.

A 1984 graduate of Texas, Flory has also experienced much success as a player. In 1981, she was a member of Texas' AIAW National Championship squad. She received All-Southwest Conference and All-South Region honors during three seasons with the Longhorns.

Following her playing career, Flory was named the head coach at Wittenberg University, where she coached for one season before being named an assistant at Texas A&M for the 1987 season.

A member of the American Volleyball Coaches Association, Flory has also assisted in coordinating both the Louisiana Senior Olympic Games and the Special Olympics, and hosting the Senior Olympic Games in 2001. She is also a member of the United States Volleyball Association coaching accreditation program.

She is married to Ken Flory. The two have a daughter, Lindsay (9), and a son, Nicholas (7).

In 2005, he helped guide LSU to the first SEC Western Division championship in school history and its first NCAA Tournament berth since 1992. The Tigers posted the fourth best hitting percentage in the SEC, while the LSU setting duo of Daniela Romero and Heather Fierce both ranked in the top 10 in the league in assists per game.

The head coach at the University of Southern Indiana from 2002-03, Bere led the Screaming Eagles to one Great Lakes Valley Conference Tournament title and to with- in three points of a second consecutive championship and bid to the NCAA Division II Tournament.



He guided setter Kim Boehmer to honorable mention All-America honors, the first player in USI history to earn the honor, after she was named to the 2002 and 2003 All-GLVC first team. Kristi Kavanaugh was also named a CoSIDA first-team Academic All-American under his helm.

In 2002, Bere led the Screaming Eagles to their first bid in the NCAA Division II Tournament and first tournament win after winning the GLVC Tournament crown. Despite just two seasons at Southern Indiana, he was the third winningest head coach in the program's 24-year history, posting a 47-17 (.734) record.

Prior to taking the job at USI, Bere was an assistant coach at Mississippi State from 1997-2002, where he coached along side current Tiger assistant John Blackwell. He served as the coordinator of the Bulldog defense and worked closely with MSU's outside hitters on the court. Bere coordinated MSU's recruiting efforts and handled additional administrative duties off the court.

A native of Louisville, Kentucky, Bere was a standout four-sport letterman at Doss High School, competing in football, basketball, baseball, and soccer.

He attended Morehead State University, where he was a three-year letterwinner on the Eagle football team and became a member of the men's volleyball club team, leading to his career as a volleyball coach.

He joined Morehead's varsity women's volleyball coaching staff in 1993 as a student assistant. He was appointed to a full-time assistant coach's position in 1994, first as an undergraduate and then as a graduate student.

While Bere was on the Morehead State staff, the Eagles claimed regular season Ohio Valley Conference runner-up honors, captured the OVC Tournament title, and advanced to the 1993 National Invitational Volleyball Classic. In 1995 Morehead State marched to the finals of the OVC Tournament, taking runner-up honors.

A member of the American Volleyball Coaches Association, Bere has served as a camp instructor in summer volleyball camps in Alabama, Indiana, Kentucky, Louisiana, and Michigan.

He earned a bachelor's degree in health in 1995 from Morehead State before receiving his master's degree in health, physical education, and recreation in 1997. He and his wife, Shannon, who also works at LSU, are expecting their first child this fall.

**J**ohn Blackwell begins his second season with the Tiger volleyball program after spending one season at Rice University. He is involved in practice planning, recruiting and game strategy. On the court, he handles the middle blockers and defense.

In 2005, he helped guide LSU to the first SEC Western Division championship in school history and its first NCAA Tournament berth since 1992. The Tigers ranked third in the SEC in blocks per game, while senior Ivana Kuzmic ranked second in the league and went on to become LSU's first All-American since 1992.

In 2004 as an assistant at Rice, he helped the Owls advance to the NCAA Tournament for the first time in school history and post a 25-5 record overall, including a 12-1 record in Western Athletic Conference play, the best overall and conference records in school history.

A school-record six players were named to the All-WAC teams, the most of any school in the league, including four on the first team. Additionally, one player earned All-WAC Tournament team honors and one was named to the AVCA All-West Region squad.

In the classroom, the Owls placed one player on the Academic All-America first team and four on the Academic All-District teams.

Prior to his stay at Rice, Blackwell was an assistant coach at Mississippi State, along with current Tiger assistant Craig Bere. In his four years with the Bulldogs, he oversaw MSU's middle blockers and served as the team's recruiting coordinator. In 2004, his recruiting class was ranked in the top 50 nationally by PrepVolleyball.com. In each of his four seasons, the middle blockers led the team in hitting percentage.

Additionally, Blackwell oversaw the Bulldogs in the classroom as the volleyball contact for the athletic academic office. In his tenure, Mississippi State earned the AVCA/Molten academic team award in 2000 and 2001.

From 1996-1999, he was the head coach at NAIA Division I Belhaven College in Jackson, Miss. Under his leadership, the team improved from a 1-29 record in 1996 to a 21-15 mark in 1999 while finishing as the Gulf Coast Athletic Conference runner-up. Ranked fifth in their region his final season, he had five players named to the All-GCAC teams while the program set school records in wins, kills, assists, aces and digs.

Equally as successful in the classroom as on the court, Blackwell's Belhaven teams earned the AVCA team academic award each year and two players were named to the NAIA Academic All-America team.

While working at Belhaven, he was active in the development of club volleyball in Mississippi as the club director and head coach for the Jackson Volleyball Club, founding the first girls volleyball club in the Jackson area in 1996. Helping the club double in size in three years, he also worked at numerous collegiate camps across the south-east.

A 1992 graduate of Millsaps College with a bachelor of business administration degree in accounting, Blackwell began his coaching career as an assistant coach at his alma mater in 1992, where he coached the Majors for three seasons.

A three-year basketball standout at John Curtis High School, the New Orleans native is married to the former Jackie Batte. The couple has two sons, Taylor (13) and Carter (9).

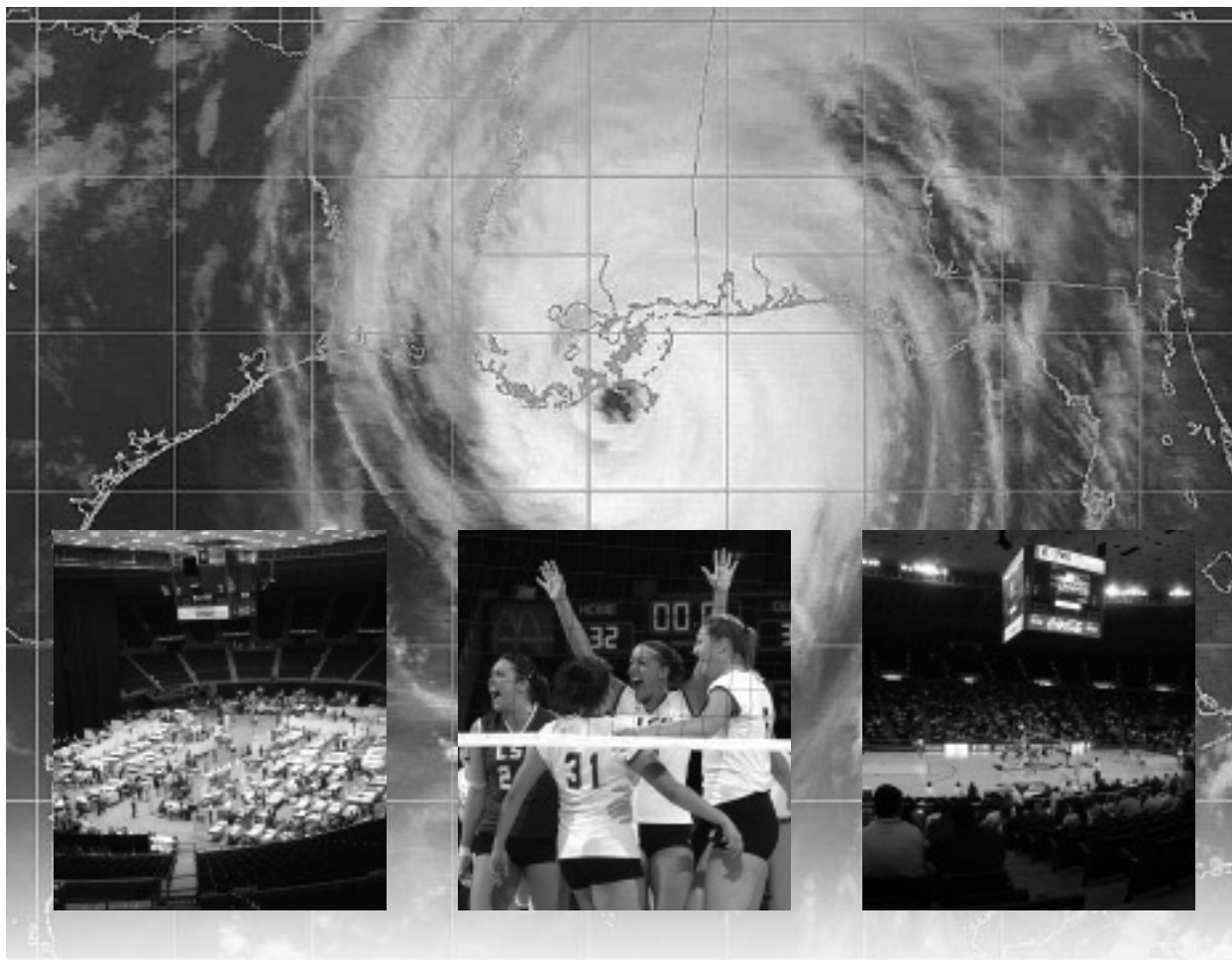

# THROUGH THE STORM

**LSU EARNS FIRST BID TO NCAA TOURNAMENT IN 13 YEARS DESPITE OBSTACLES**

## ROAD WARRIORS

The LSU volleyball team played its first 17 consecutive matches away from the friendly confines of the Maravich Center in 2005. The Tigers wrapped up a seven week road trip, in part due to scheduled renovations in the Maravich Center and in part due to the aftermath of Hurricane Katrina, with a 13-4 record. LSU was gone 26 of 46 days over that period and traveled 9,751 miles. During the monumental stretch, the Tigers never left the southeastern United States, before coming home to host their first match on Oct. 14 against Mississippi State. In less than two months, LSU bused the equivalent of New York to Los Angeles and flew the equivalent of Los Angeles to Sydney, Australia.

Later in the season, the Tigers returned to the road for trips to Athens, Ga., and Gainesville, Fla. (with an emergency landing in Montgomery on the return trip from Atlanta to Baton Rouge) and

closed out their regular season road schedule with trips to Oxford, Miss. and Starkville, Miss. LSU then traveled to Tuscaloosa, Ala., for the second time in 2005 for the SEC Tournament. The Tigers concluded its season with a road trip to Texas for the third time in the season as LSU went to Austin for their first NCAA Tournament appearance in 13 years. In total, LSU traveled 14,023 total miles during the 2005 season, while posting the most road wins since the 1991 team recorded 17 wins in matches away from the Maravich Center.

## LSU CLAIMS FIRST SEC WESTERN DIVISION TITLE

For the first time in school history, the Tigers claimed a share of the SEC Western Division championship. After posting an 11-5 conference record and closing out the regular season with a five-game win over Kentucky on Nov. 11, LSU earned a share of the SEC West

with Arkansas. The last time LSU previously won an SEC title was when the Tigers won three straight overall SEC Championships from 1989-1991.

## LSU IN THE NCAA TOURNAMENT

In 2005, the Tigers made their first trip to the NCAA Tournament since making four consecutive appearances from 1989-1992. Overall, LSU was making its seventh appearance in the NCAA Tournament and now has a 10-7 record. An SEC-record six teams earned bids to the 2005 NCAA Tournament. In addition to the Tigers, Florida, Alabama, Arkansas, Kentucky and Tennessee were also chosen to participate in the postseason tournament. The six teams selected from the SEC shattered the previous high of four teams.

## LSU POSTS MOST WINS SINCE 1993

With a 21-8 overall record and an 11-5 mark in SEC play, LSU recorded the most wins by a Tiger team since the 1993 season and won the most conference matches since the 1992 season. In 1993, LSU went 21-16 on its way to a NIVC championship. In 1992, the Tigers were 12-2 in SEC play and finished second in the league. With a .724 winning percentage, LSU also recorded its best mark since recording a .743 mark by going 26-9 in 1992.

## FOUR TIGERS ON ALL-SEC TEAMS

LSU had four players named to the 2005 All-SEC teams, which tied Florida for the second most of any school in the league (Tennessee led with five). In addition, Marina Skender was named the SEC Freshman of the Year, becoming the fourth Tiger to earn the award and the first since Luciana Reis in 1990. Ivana Kuzmic was named to the All-SEC first team, while Skender and Jelena Mijatovic were named to the second team. Skender is the first LSU freshman to make the All-SEC first or second team since Daniela Reis earned second-team honors in 1989. She and Kyna Washington were also named to the All-Freshman team for the Tigers.

## PERFECT IN THE PMAC

LSU completed the 2005 home schedule with an unblemished 6-0 record, marking the third unbeaten home mark in the program's history. The Tigers also completed the 1986 and 1991 seasons undefeated at home with 14-0 and 16-0 records respectively.

## LSU NEARLY DOUBLES ATTENDANCE IN 2005

Despite the turmoil surrounding the 2005 season, the Tigers nearly doubled their average home attendance. LSU averaged 758 for its six home matches, up from the 427 the Tigers averaged in 2004. Only once did LSU record less than 500 at a match, and that was for a midweek match against Arkansas. It marked the highest average attendance over the last eight seasons for the Tigers. In addition, the 1,563 attendance against Mississippi State on Oct. 14 ranked as the fifth highest attendance in school history.

## LSU IN THE CSTV/AVCA POLL

On Sept. 26, LSU entered the AVCA/CSTV Coaches poll at No. 24. It marked the first national ranking for the Tigers since Sept. 20, 1993. In addition, it was also the first national ranking for LSU under head coach Fran Florio.

## LSU POSTS BIG WIN OVER NO. 8 NOTRE DAME

On Sept. 18, the Tigers became the first team to knock off No. 8 Notre Dame in 2005, one of only four losses suffered by the Fighting Irish on the year. It was the first win over a nationally ranked team for LSU since Dec. 5, 1992 when the Tigers topped No. 18 Texas Tech, and the first victory over a top 10-ranked team since a 3-0 win over No. 9 New Mexico on Sept. 13, 1992.

## TIGER DUO POST 1,000 CAREER KILLS

With her 12th kill against Georgia State on Sept. 2, Jelena Mijatovic recorded the 1,000th kill of her career. She recorded 638 kills in her first two seasons at Northwood University and 723 in her two seasons at LSU for a total of 1,361. If she had played her entire career as a Tiger, she would have become the 14th player in LSU history to record 1,000 career kills and finished ranked eighth in the record books.

With her fifth kill against South Carolina on Sept. 23, Ivana Kuzmic recorded the 1,000th kill of her career. She recorded 614 kills in her first two seasons at Arkansas-Little Rock and 526 at LSU for a total of 1,140. If she had played her entire career at LSU, she would have become the 15th player in Tiger history to record 1,000 career kills and finished ranked 11th in the record books.

## MIKULIK HITS 700 DIGS; 300 FOR 2005

With her ninth dig against Georgia on Oct. 21, Kassi Mikulik recorded her 700th career dig, becoming just the 24th player in LSU history to record 700 career digs. She is also just the second player since 2002 to record 300 digs in a season. She finished with 384 digs, the 10th most in LSU single-season history.

## MIJATOVIC POSTS 700 CAREER DIGS

With her sixth dig of the match against Georgia on Oct. 21, Jelena Mijatovic recorded her 700th career dig. She recorded 301 in her first two seasons at Northwood University and 221 in her junior year at LSU before closing out her career with 264 in her senior season for 786 total. If she had played her entire career as a Tiger, she would have become the 25th player in LSU history to record 700 career digs.

## KUZMIC HITS 700, BREAKS LSU BLOCKS RECORD

With her third block of the match against Kentucky on Nov. 11, Ivana Kuzmic recorded the 700th block of her career and concluded her four-year career with 717, a feat never accomplished previously by a player in a Tiger uniform. She had a 1.65 blocks per game average with 352 total blocks in her two seasons at LSU, which is the school blocks per game record. If she had competed at LSU her entire career, she would hold the school record in career blocks.

## MIJATOVIC BREAKS LSU ACES RECORD

In 2005, Jelena Mijatovic recorded 64 aces, which is an 0.60 aces per game average. Having recorded 71 service aces in 92 games last season, she averaged 0.77 service aces per game in 2004, the fourth best mark in the NCAA. Having reached the 100-ace plateau at LSU, she shattered the school record for career service aces per game at .682. She broke the former record, held by Monica Freitas, who recorded .679 service aces per game from 1987-88. She also ranks 10th in NCAA history in career service aces per game.

## MIJATOVIC AMONG TOP IN SEC AND NCAA

Jelena Mijatovic led the SEC and ranked 13th in the NCAA in service aces per game. In addition, she ranked sixth in the SEC in kills per game. The outside hitter averaged 0.60 aces per game and 4.05 kills per game.

## KUZMIC SECOND IN SEC, SEVENTH IN NCAA

Ivana Kuzmic ranked second in the SEC and seventh in the NCAA in blocks per game, averaging 1.71 blocks per game. As a freshman at Arkansas-Little Rock, Kuzmic led the NCAA in blocks per game and led the Sunbelt Conference in blocks per game each of her first two seasons. In 2004, she led the SEC in blocks per game in her first year at LSU.

## KUZMIC BREAKS HITTING PERCENTAGE MARK

Against Campbell on Sept. 27, Ivana Kuzmic broke the LSU single-match hitting percentage record, going 12-for-13 with no errors for a .923 mark. In addition to breaking the LSU record, the mark is tied for 22nd in NCAA single-match history. The hitting percentage broke the previous record of .857 (12 kills on 14 attempts) by Lisa Smith against Mississippi State on Nov. 11, 1987.

## KUZMIC RECORDS FOURTH-BEST MARK

Against Tennessee on Sept. 25, Ivana Kuzmic recorded the fourth-best single-match hitting percentage in LSU history. She posted 10 kills with no errors on 12 attempts to hit at a .833 clip. She was just behind her school record of .923 set against Campbell on Aug. 27. It marked the first time in school history a Tiger player recorded two .800 hitting percentage matches in the same season.

## SKENDER RECORDS SECOND-BEST MARK

Against Auburn on Oct. 28, Marina Skender recorded the second-best single-match hitting percentage in LSU history for 20 or more attempts. She posted 16 kills with two errors on 20 attempts to hit at a .700 clip. She was just behind the school record of .727 set by Nyla Shepherd against Tulane on Oct. 23, 1990.

## MIJATOVIC TIED FOR SIXTH MOST KILLS

Against Jacksonville on Aug. 26, Jelena Mijatovic recorded 21 kills, tying her for the sixth most kills in a three-game match in LSU history. The mark was only five kills behind the school record of 26 kills by Monique Adams against Oklahoma on Aug. 31, 1991.

## MIJATOVIC RECORDS TOP ATTEMPT MARKS

Against Texas A&M on Sept. 10, Jelena Mijatovic recorded 70 attempts, tying her for the school record for total attempts in a five-game match in LSU history. The mark tied Kassi Mikulik's 70 attempts against Houston on Nov. 27, 2004. A week later, Mijatovic was one attempt away from matching the school record again. She posted 69 attempts against Notre Dame on Sept. 18.

## KUZMIC POSTS TOP 10 BLOCKING MATCHES

Against Notre Dame on Sept. 18, Ivana Kuzmic recorded 13 block assists, tying her for the seventh most blocks and fifth most block assists in a five-game match in school history. Her total block mark was 12 behind the school record of 25 recorded by Lisa Smith against Wyoming on Sept. 11, 1987. Her block assist mark was three behind the school record of 16 also recorded by Lisa Smith against Wyoming on Sept. 11, 1987.

Against Alabama on Oct. 30, Kuzmic posted four solo blocks, tying her for the fifth most in a three-game match in LSU history and the most solo blocks in a three-game match since Monique Adams recorded five solo blocks on Oct. 26, 1990.

On Oct. 14 against Mississippi State, she recorded eight block assists, tying her for the third-most block assists in a three-game match. It was the most block assists in a three-game match since Lauren Cuyler posted nine against Georgia on Nov. 18, 2000.

## MIKULIK TIED FOR SIXTH MOST DIGS

Against Kentucky on Nov. 11, Kassi Mikulik recorded 26 digs, tying her for the sixth most digs in a five-game match in LSU history. The mark was only two behind the school record of 28 digs, which has been done four times, most recently by Meg Norwood against Mississippi State on Nov. 11, 1998.

## MIJATOVIC TIED FOR FIFTH MOST ACES

Against Georgia Southern on Aug. 27, Jelena Mijatovic recorded seven service aces, tying her for the fifth most service aces in a four-game match in LSU history. The mark was only two behind the school record of nine aces, which was done twice, by Lisa Sulatycki against Auburn on Oct. 9, 1988 and Sibel Gurkan against Tulane on Sept. 22, 1987.

## LSU AMONG ELITE IN SEC TOURNAMENT

LSU was one of only two schools in the SEC, along with Tennessee, to have participated in all 28 SEC Tournaments, dating back to 1979. The Tigers and Lady Vols never missed an SEC Tournament, which was disbanded after the 2005 season. South Carolina and Arkansas also never missed SEC Tournament berths, but did not join the league until 1991 and 1994 respectively. In 1979 and 1980, the tournament took all eight SEC teams. From 1981-85, the tournament selected the top six teams. In 1986 and 1987, eight of the top nine teams. Four teams made the tournament in 1988 and 1989. In 1990, the tournament went to its final format of selecting the top eight teams.

This year in Los Angeles, Calif., the Tigers fell in four games to Long Beach State. Until Florida in 2002, the 1991 LSU team was the only team from the SEC to win a game in the NCAA Final Four.

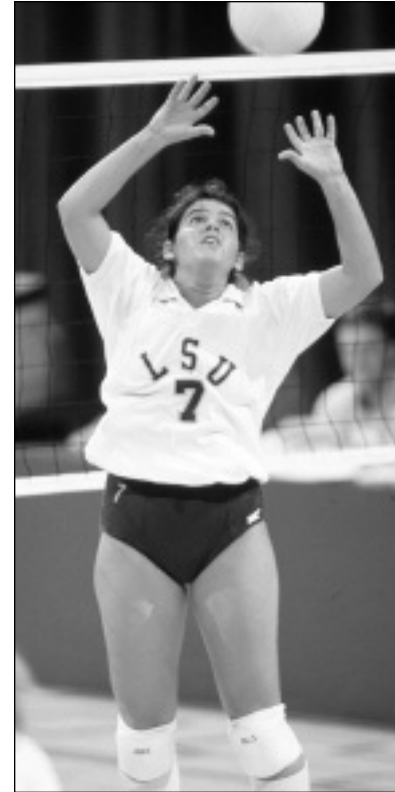

In 2006, the LSU volleyball program will begin its 25th season in the Pete Maravich Assembly Center, the largest volleyball venue in the Southeastern Conference. The structure, which was renamed in honor of the all-time LSU and NCAA men's basketball scoring leader on July 22, 1988, seats 13,425 and ranks as one of the finest college athletic arenas in the nation.

On July 1, 2004, the management of the Maravich Center came under the direction of the LSU Athletics Department. The building is now undergoing a multi-year refurbishment that will continue to keep it among the great volleyball venues in the South.

The renovation began three years ago with new television lighting and continued two years ago with a new roof surface. Last season, the inside of the Maravich Center saw an upgrade as the seats were replaced and the interior was given a complete makeover, reestablishing the bright look the building had in the 1970s and 1980s.

The outside windows of the building now feature the Tiger mascot running around the arena. Volleyball fans can also see a redesigned concourse with video and graphic displays, renovated concession stands and video kiosks showcasing the best of the sports that play in the building - men's and women's basketball, volleyball and gymnastics.

The Tiger volleyball team enjoys the comforts of a spacious locker room. The two-tiered fully carpeted facility features individual cubicles for each athlete, a meeting room and storage area.

Between 1985 and 1992, the Maravich Center was one of the top home courts in the nation, as LSU ran up a 110-10 (.917) record. During that time, LSU recorded a 37-match home-court win streak, which is the second-longest streak in SEC history. In 1991, the Tigers enjoyed possibly their finest season in the arena as LSU recorded a perfect 16-0 record. LSU also advanced to the Final Four through the NCAA South Regional, which was held in Baton Rouge.

The Tigers have now posted eight consecutive seasons without a losing record in the Maravich Center, making it once again a tough place for visiting teams to play. Over that span, LSU has a record of 58-33 (.637), including an undefeated 6-0 mark in 2005.

Since beginning play in the arena in 1982, the Tigers have notched an 252-108 (.700) record. In that time, LSU has posted only three losing seasons at home.

The Maravich Center has also played host to SEC and NCAA Tournaments for volleyball as well as basketball and gymnastics. The 1982, 1987 and 1995 SEC Volleyball Championships were all held in the arena. The Maravich Center has also been the site of three NCAA Championship first round matches as well as the NCAA South Regional in 1991.

The NCAA Women's Basketball First/Second Rounds in 1997, 1999, 2000 and 2004, as well as the SEC Men's Basketball Tournament in 1988, were held in the Maravich Center. The SEC Gymnastics Championships came to the arena in 1999 and the NCAA Central Regionals for gymnastics were held there in 2002 and 2004.

Along with the main court area, an auxiliary gym with a recently refinished court is located underground in the north section of the arena. Nearly all Tiger volleyball practices take place in the auxiliary gym.

## Kuzmic Named Honorable Mention All-America

BATON ROUGE -- LSU senior Ivana Kuzmic earned honorable mention All-America honors as announced by the America Volleyball Coaches Association on Wednesday.

The AVCA All-America team consisted of 12 players on each of the first, second and third teams and 64 players named honorable mention selections. She becomes the first Tiger to be honored as an All-American since Angie Miller was a first-team selection and Daniela Reis earned second team honors in 1992.

An All-South Region selection and first-team All-SEC honoree, Kuzmic led the team with 1.71 blocks per game, the second best in the SEC and seventh most in the NCAA. In addition, the middle blocker led the team and ranked sixth in the SEC with a .342 hitting percentage and also averaged 2.28 kills per game. Against Kentucky, she became the first player to wear an LSU uniform to record 700 career blocks, while also racking up over 1,000 career kills.

The LSU career and single-season record holder for blocks per game, she ranked third in single-season block assists and seventh in total blocks this year. In her two seasons with the Tigers after transferring from Arkansas-Little Rock, she posted a total of eight double-figure blocking matches, including four in each season, becoming the first player to achieve that feat at LSU since the 1985-86 seasons.

Earlier this season against Campbell, she recorded a school record .923 hitting percentage, posting 12 kills with no errors on 13 attempts. It tied her for the 22nd best single-match mark in NCAA history. She went on to earn Most Valuable Player honors in the three-day Georgia Southern Invitational.

She was named the SEC Defensive Player of the Week on three occasions and the SEC Player of the Week once this season. She garnered more SEC Defensive Player of the Week honors than any other player in the league this season. In addition, she was honored with more individual SEC weekly awards than any other non-freshman player in the league this season, behind only Tiger freshman Marina Skender, who earned five honors, including four Freshman of the Week marks.

This is the first All-American honor of Kuzmic's career after she earned the first AVCA All-Region honor of her career. In 2004, she earned honorable mention All-South Region honors.
