Consistency, it's the mark of true excellence in any endeavor.

In today's intercollegiate athletics, competition has become so balanced and so competitive that it's virtually impossible to maintain consistency at a high level from year-to-year.

Fran Flory and the LSU volleyball program have defied those odds. The Tigers have exploded for 115 wins and garnered nine American Volleyball Coaches Association (AVCA) All-America selections since the 2005 season.

Flory has guided LSU to five consecutive SEC Western Division titles and added the overall league championship in 2009, the program's first since 1991. For her efforts, Flory earned 2009 AVCA South Region, SEC and Louisiana Coach of the Year accolades.

The Tigers also notched their fifth straight NCAA Tournament appearance during the 2009 campaign and are one of only 20 programs in the nation to accomplish that impressive feat during each of the last five seasons.

Flory has built LSU from the bottom up after taking over a team that posted a 9-21 record which included a 0-15 mark in SEC play during the 1997 season with her ability to identify and develop talent, relate to her players and surround herself with top-notch assistant coaches.

LSU has returned to national prominence it experienced when Flory served as an assistant coach from 1989-91 as the Tigers claimed a trio of SEC championships and collected back-to-back Final Four appearances.

But winning championships is only the beginning of defining the legacy of LSU volleyball.

Flory's goal for every student-athlete who puts on the Tiger uniform is to develop into a successful person in all aspects of life.

Since 2000, 36 players have earned their degree from the University, including five who went on to earn graduate degrees. From 1997 to 2008, 22 of 23 four-year letterwinners have received degrees.

"LSU has everything a student-athlete could ask for, from the facilities to the administration. We expect to win championships and every LSU student-athlete has those expectations. Our teams are committed to winning both on the court and in the classroom.

"Team togetherness and team ownership are two very important factors in our program. Our teams are committed not only to LSU, but also to each other. Team ownership is vital to the success of any team, company or organization. Everyone must have a clear understanding of the goals and direction of the program. We are very careful to define roles and responsibilities so everyone is headed in the same direction."

Now, entering her 13th season, Flory will continue to build on the solid foundation that she has laid out for LSU and continue to design her program around the fundamentals that have made the Tigers a success.

EDUCATION FIRST

A staple of the LSU program since Flory arrived in 1998 has been the tremendous academic success of her players. The Tigers have amassed 90 SEC Academic Honor Roll selection, second-most in the conference, over the last 12 seasons. LSU has led the conference on four occasions during that span.

"Balancing a successful career in the classroom and on the court is a difficult task," Flory said. "It requires a great deal of discipline and commitment. Our staff truly understands what it takes and shares in the commitment to insure the academic and athletic success of our student-athletes."

BUILDING FOR SUCCESS IN LIFE

When athletes sign to play for Coach Flory, they sign not only to maximize their potential as a volleyball player, but also to maximize their potential as a person.

"My goal for every student-athlete who competes on my team is to allow and to help them develop into a successful person in all aspects of life," Flory said. "When they graduate, I want them to truly feel prepared for the next step in their lives, whatever that may be. We are not just about developing successful volleyball players, our program is about developing successful people."

NCAA Final Four Appearances

LSU is one of only two schools in SEC history with multiple Final Four appearances. The Tigers went to back-to-back Final Fours in 1990 and 1991.

USA Volleyball A2 Team

LSU has picked up medals as part of USA Volleyball Women's A2 National Team during the last three years. Brittnee Cooper and Elena Martinez won gold at the USA Adult Open Volleyball Championships in May 2008, Cooper added a silver medal in May 2009 and assistant coach Steve Loeswick collected a bronze medal in May 2010.

SEC Player of the Year Awards

The Tigers have notched four postseason SEC honors highlighted by Brittnee Cooper's 2009 SEC Player of the Year award. Elena Martinez reeled in 2007 and 2008 SEC Defensive Player of the Year, while Marina Skender tallied 2005 SEC Freshman of the Year.

5

SEC Regular Season Championships

LSU claimed the SEC regular season titles in 1986, 1989, 1990, 1991 and 2009. The '09 Tigers ended Florida's 18-run year at the top of the league. LSU posted undefeated marks in both 1990 and 1991 only dropping six sets during the two-year span.

5

SEC Western Division Titles

The Tigers have won five consecutive SEC Western Division crowns and are an impressive 38-2 over the last four seasons against their division rivals, including 30 straight wins dating back to the 2006 season.

5

Fifth Set Dominance

Over the last four seasons, LSU has won 18 of its 29 five-set matches sparked by nine triumphs in 2007. The Tigers overcame a 2-1 deficit to upend No. 14 New Mexico State at the 2007 NCAA Tournament.

NCAA Tournament Appearances

LSU has made 11 NCAA Tournament appearances, which is tied for second-most among SEC schools. The Tigers have strung together five consecutive bids from 2005-09 to match five straight postseason bids recorded between the 1989-93 seasons.

All-Americans

The Tigers have 12 AVCA All-Americans in program history, second-most of any SEC school. Brittnee Cooper was one of 14 players to earn First-Team honors in 2009. LSU has garnered a pair of All-Americans in each of the last three seasons for the first time in program history.



MEDIA TRAINING

LSU is one of the few schools where student-athletes go through media training to enhance their communication skills. Dr. Tommy Karam and Dr. Shirley White are two experts in the field who give training sessions to student-athletes here on campus. The Academic Center features a mock press conference setting to get student-athletes acclimated to giving interviews in front of both print and electronic media. Karam and White record the mock interviews on camera and then provide feedback, allowing student-athletes to become more comfortable and confident when doing actual interviews.

SOCIAL MEDIA

LSU has been on the cutting edge in collegiate athletics when it comes to integrating social media into its traditional website and publications. Through its sports-specific Facebook pages and feeds on the micro-blogging site Twitter, LSU offers its fans in-game updates, behind-the-scenes access to coaches and student-athletes. ESPN, SEC and LSU

In 2009-10, ESPN and the Southeastern Conference reached a milestone 15-year agreement. ESPN acquired rights to every SEC home football game -- excluding those on the CBS network broadcast package -- and serves as the exclusive national cable home and the syndication rightsholder for the conference. LSU made three appearances on ESPNU in 2009 as part of that package.



Bo Campbell Auditorium

The 1,000-seat auditorium is used through the year as a classroom and lecture hall. Each seat in the auditorium has space for a laptop and a modem hookup, providing each student unlimited learning opportunities. The auditorium also contains a movie theatre size screen to aid professors with lectures and classroom activities.



DIG PINK

Coinciding with "Breast Cancer Awareness Month", the LSU volleyball program will continue its "Dig Pink" campaign during the 2010 season. Fans will have the opportunity to donate money in aid of awareness for the world's most common cause of cancer deaths in women. The Tigers have collected and donated over \$6,500 during the event's first three years.

LSU Athletics teamed up with LSU University Recreation [UREC] in 2009 as Dr. K.C. White, Associate Vice Chancellor and Dean of Students, led a one-mile "Victory Walk" to the Maravich Center prior to the Arkansas match. A breast cancer survivor, Dr. White accompanied the Tigers on the floor during introductions and served as a guest coach in LSU's 3-0 sweep over the Razorbacks.

LSU wore commemorative pink jerseys for the second consecutive season. Proceeds from the event benefited the Side-Out Foundation, whose mission is to make a significant and identifiable impact on the lives of breast cancer patients through fund-raising efforts that will support clinical trials, improve patient services and educate communities.



Nutrition First

LSU is one of the few schools nationally who maintain a state-of-the-art nutritional program for today's student-athlete. Senior Associate Athletic Trainer Shelly Mullenix coordinates with LSU dining services to provide a balanced training table diet. LSU trainers also meet one-on-one with student-athletes to give them expert nutritional information.

Athletic TRAINING

Athletic trainers Jack Marucci, Andy Barker and Shelly Mullenix have over a combined 50 years of experience.

LSU boasts the largest and most complete athletic training facilities in all of collegiate athletics with both the Operations Center and the Broussard Center for Athletic Training in Tiger Stadium. Both are furnished with the latest in technology and equipment. The Operations Center training room features a full view of the practice fields, two hot/cold jacuzzis and an underwater treadmill. The Broussard Center includes an on-site x-ray room, an in-house pharmacy, as well as the largest hydrotherapy pool in both collegiate and professional sports and is one of the few collegiate training centers with a full-service pharmacy and a full-service vision center.



Hydrotherapy Treatment

An integral part of rehabbing and developing LSU student-athletes is the operations center's hot/cold jacuzzis and an underwater treadmill in a fully equipped Hydrotherapy room. The Broussard training center boasts the largest hydrotherapy pool in both collegiate and professional sports.

Broussard Athletic TRAINING CENTER



The two story, 22,000 square foot facility contains 20 treatment tables with the newest forms of modalities available, 14 taping stations, a 1,600 square foot rehabilitation area which contains the latest rehabilitation equipment including the Cybex Norm, Woodway treadmills and Body Master select rise equipment. LSU's multi-million dollar athletic training facility is named in honor of Dr. Martin J. Broussard (left), the legendary trainer whose career spanned over 40 years at LSU.





Strength & CONDITIONING



The LSU strength and conditioning facility, located in Tiger Stadium, was built in 1997 and features the latest in both strength training and cardiovascular training equipment.



Did You Know?

- In the 2009 and 2010 editions of *U.S. News & World Report's America's Best Colleges*, LSU is ranked in the first tier for "Best National Universities."
- LSU is the only public university in Louisiana designated as having very high research activity (RU/VH) by the prestigious Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching, the highest ranking awarded to doctorate-granting institutions.
- LSU was named to the 2009 President's Higher Education Community Service Honor Roll, the highest federal recognition a college or university can receive for its commitment to volunteering, service-learning and civic engagement, by the Corporation for National and Community Service.
- LSU earned the prestigious Carnegie Community Engagement and Outreach classification in 2008, one of 68 public institutions nationally with this elective




classification based on community engagement.

- LSU is one of only a handful of universities in the nation having land-grant, sea-grant and space-grant status.
- LSU currently ranks among the top 30 public universities in total research awards. The University's total federal funding; from

agencies such as the National Science Foundation, National Institutes of Health, and the Department of Homeland Security; has increased 86 percent or more than \$90 million over the last five years.

- *Newsweek* magazine named LSU the "Most Diverse" school in the nation in the Sept. 3, 2003, issue. The enrollment consists of 24 percent minority students.



Shaquille O'Neal

A four-time NBA champion and 15-time All-Star, Shaquille O'Neal is one of the most dominant centers in league history. O'Neal, one of the most quotable athletes on the planet, joined the long list of prominent LSU alumni when he earned his degree in general studies in December 2000. O'Neal was traded to the Cleveland Cavs in June 2009.

Seimone Augustus

Seimone Augustus received her degree in 2005 after just three years at LSU and while earning NCAA Women's Basketball National Player of the Year honors twice. She was the first pick of the 2006 WNBA Draft by the Minnesota Lynx and teamed with fellow LSU alum Sylvia Fowles to claim an Olympic gold medal for the United States in 2008.

Eduardo Aguirre, Jr.

Named the first Director of U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) for the Department of Homeland Security in 2003, Aguirre, Jr., was the U.S. Ambassador to Spain from 2005 until 2009.



James Carville

Carville received both a bachelor's degree and law degree from LSU and gained fame in the 1990s as the chief campaign strategist for Bill Clinton and Al Gore. Carville also penned a best-selling memoir titled "All's Fair: Love, War and Running for President".



Lod Cook

Cook graduated from LSU with a bachelor's degree in mathematics in 1955 and then earned his Master's degree in petro engineering in 1955. Cook served as CEO of ARCO for nine years.



Carlos Roberto Flores

The president of Honduras from 1997-2001, Flores helped the nation recover after Hurricane Mitch devastated the country in 1998. Flores is married to the former Mary Carol Flake, also an alumnus of LSU.



Jim Flores

Flores graduated with two bachelor's degrees; one in corporate finance in 1981 and the second in petroleum land management in 1982. Flores is currently Chairman, President and CEO of Plains Exploration & Production Company.



Sylvia Fowles

Sylvia Fowles was a two-time State Farm All-American at LSU before going onto a career in the WNBA with the Chicago Sky. Fowles and Seimone Augustus became the first LSU basketball players to claim Olympic gold when they did so in 2008 for the United States.

John Ed Bradley - Sports Illustrated writer and novelist, former LSU football player

John Breaux - U.S. Senator (1987-2005) and U.S. Congressman (1972-86) from Louisiana.

Rebecca Wells - Author of the novel and film "Devine Secrets of the Ya-Ya Sisterhood."

Joanne Woodward - Academy Award-winning actress and wife of Paul Newman.


Dr. James Andrews

Suzanne Perron

A 1991 LSU graduate, Suzanne Perron is a rising star in the design world having worked with top designers Vera Wang and Carolina Herrera. Perron has designed dresses for Hollywood stars Jennifer Lopez, Mariska Hargitay and Holly Hunter, among others.



Marty Sixkiller

Senior Technical Director for PDI/DreamWorks' movies "Antz," "Shrek," "Shrek 2," "Shrek the Third," "Madagascar" and "Over the Hedge".

LSU GREATS

The following nine individuals are the only athletes to have their jerseys retired by LSU. Men's basketball has retired the No. 23 for Pete Maravich, No. 50 for Bob Pettit, Jr., No. 33 for Shaquille O'Neal and No. 40 for Rudy Macklin. Women's basketball retired the No. 33 for Seimone Augustus. Football's only two retired jerseys are the No. 20 worn by Billy Cannon and the No. 37 worn by Tommy Casanova. Baseball retired the No. 15 in honor of longtime coach and former athletics director Skip Bertman and the No. 20 for Ben McDonald. Casanova, Macklin and McDonald joined the prestigious list in May 2009. Augustus became the first woman in LSU Athletics history to have her jersey retired in January 2010.

50 Bob Pettit

Pettit led LSU to its first NCAA Final Four in 1953 and he later became the first player in NBA history to exceed the 20,000-plus point barrier. Pettit is a member of the NBA Hall of Fame, and in 1997, he was named as one of the top 50 players in NBA history.



23 Pete Maravich

"Pistol Pete," Maravich still holds the NCAA record for career points with 3,667 and for career scoring average with 44.2 points a game. He was selected the National Player of the Year in 1970 after leading the Tigers to the NIT Final Four. He scored 50-plus points an amazing 28 times. He went on to a 10-year professional career and was selected as one of the NBA's 50 greatest players in 1997.



20 Billy Cannon

One of the true legends of college football in the South, Cannon was the 1959 Heisman Trophy winner and helped the Tigers to the 1958 national title. Cannon's most memorable performance came in 1959 against Ole Miss when No. 1 LSU trailed No. 3 Ole Miss 3-0 in the fourth quarter. He fielded a punt, broke seven tackles and returned it 89 yards for the 7-3 victory. He went on to a successful 11-year professional career.



33 Shaquille O'Neal

O'Neal was the first pick in the 1992 NBA Draft. He was named MVP of the league in 2000 and was a three-time NBA Finals MVP after leading the Los Angeles Lakers to three World Championships. At LSU, O'Neal averaged 21.6 points and 13.6 rebounds for his career, and in 1991, he was named the World's Amateur Athlete of the Year as well as SEC Athlete of the Year and National Player of the Year. In 1997, he was named as one of the top 50 players in NBA history.



15 Skip Bertman

A legend in the college baseball ranks, Bertman created a dynasty at LSU, guiding the Tigers to five national titles in a 10-year stretch from 1991-2000. He also coached the United States to a bronze medal at the 1996 Olympics in Atlanta and was an assistant on the gold medal-winning U.S. squad in Seoul, Korea, in 1988. Bertman retired from coaching following the 2001 season and served as LSU's athletics director for seven years. Bertman was inducted into the College Baseball Hall of Fame in 2006.

About LSU Retired Jerseys

The retirement of the jerseys of Casanova, McDonald, Macklin and Augustus comes under a new provision of the LSU jersey retirement bylaws that says the retirement of an athlete's jersey in a particular sport does not preclude a current student-athlete in that sport from wearing the jersey number in that or any other sport, subject to the discretion of the head coach. This provision applies only to jerseys retired after January 1, 2007, so the numbers worn by Maravich, Pettit, O'Neal, Cannon and Bertman may never again be worn by future student-athletes in their respective sports. To have a jersey retired at LSU, an athlete must have completed intercollegiate competition for LSU a minimum of five years prior to nomination. Athletes must have demonstrated truly unusual and outstanding accomplishments, exceeding and in addition to all criteria used for Hall of Fame selection. Nominees must have a unanimous vote of support from the Hall of Fame committee.

Rudy Macklin 40

Rudy Macklin was a two-time basketball All-American selection during his Tiger career from 1976-81 during which time he became LSU's all-time leading rebounder with 1,276 boards and the second-leading scorer in school history behind only the legendary Pete Maravich with 2,080 points. He led the Tigers to two Elite Eight appearances and the 1981 Final Four in Philadelphia. He still holds the school single game rebound record with 32, a mark like some of the great records in any sport that may never be broken.



Tommy Casanova 37

Tommy Casanova is the only three-time All-American in the history of LSU football and is a member of the College Football Hall of Fame. During his Tiger career from 1969-71, Casanova personified versatility for his myriad of talents as he played offense, defense, returned punts and kickoffs. One of just two three-time All-SEC performers at LSU, he played six seasons with the Cincinnati Bengals of the NFL while earning his medical degree.




Ben McDonald 19

Ben McDonald won the prestigious Golden Spikes Award, given annually to the nation's most outstanding player, in 1989 and is a member of the College Baseball Hall of Fame. He led LSU to two College World Series appearances. In 1989, McDonald was named National Player of the Year by Baseball America, The Sporting News and Collegiate Baseball. He was selected by the Baltimore Orioles as the No. 1 pick in the major league draft in 1989 and went on to enjoy a 10-year major league career with the Orioles and the Milwaukee Brewers.



Seimone Augustus 33

Seimone Augustus is the only women's basketball player in school history to earn State Farm Coaches Association All-America honors three times: 2004, 2005 and 2006. Augustus became LSU's first NCAA National Player of the Year and she claimed the honor twice in 2005 and 2006. A 2006 graduate of LSU, Augustus was the WNBA's No. 1 draft pick in 2006. She went on to lead the United States to a gold medal at the 2008 Beijing Olympic Games.







One of the things that make a program great is its ability to continually replace departing players without missing a beat. For the LSU volleyball team, that challenge is more magnified for the 2010 season as the Tigers must fill the void left by a quartet of highly-acclaimed seniors.

Brittnee Cooper, Sam Dabbs, Lauren DeGirolamo and Marina Skender racked up 86 career accolades sparked by five AVCA All-America selections. The Tigers took their championship tradition to the next level in 2009 by going 25-7 en route to the program's first overall SEC title since 1991.

Despite losing so many key players from a season ago, head coach Fran Flory said this year's version of the Tigers will still compete in the strong SEC.

"There's no doubt we've got to replace some key positions but our internal expectations don't change from year-to-year," Flory said. "We know to be successful we must execute in the serve-receive game to run our up-tempo offense. At the same time, we have to be an extremely disciplined blocking team. The bottom line is rising expectations and added pressure is something we knew we would have to deal with as our program continues to improve."

Flory, the 2009 SEC and AVCA South Region Coach of the Year, has guided the Tigers to a 115-38 record as the defending five-time SEC Western Division champions are one of only 20 programs in the nation to collect five consecutive NCAA Tournament appearances.


For LSU to build on those impressive streaks in 2010, the Tigers will rely on Angela Bensed, Brittney Johnson, Lauren Wacławczyk and Michele Williams. All four have logged significant court time with Bensed and Williams picking up 2007 and 2008 All-SEC Freshman Team honors, respectively.

"We're positioned well with the talent that we have, but it's going to take some time for us to get used to each other," Flory said. "Our team has worked extremely hard and improved each day in the areas we felt they needed to get better in during the spring season. It will be exciting to see our young team develop, come together and the wins will take care of themselves if each player gives their maximum effort each day."

Couple that with the buzz provided by LSU's incoming freshmen class highlighted by Desiree Elliott, Avery Striebel and Nicole Willis, all of which garnered AVCA Under Armour High School All-America Second-Team status. This group is ready to show they can step in and compete at the Division I level sooner rather than later.

"We've had some great recruiting classes recently at LSU, but this collection of talent might be the best of any of them," Flory said. "Getting more versatile players has been the biggest area of growth of our program over the last five seasons. The thing we absolutely love is the level of competitiveness that this group will bring into our gym. There's a learning curve with all freshmen, but these players all possess the desire to help this program continue to win championships."

The Tigers have averaged 23 wins per season during its five-year run and Flory has once again put together a grueling slate for her team in 2010. LSU's high-caliber series of opponents feature nine



matches against 2009 NCAA Tournament teams as the Tigers start the season with a pair of tournaments in the Lone Star state hosted by Texas A&M and TCU.

LSU faces Pacific (Aug. 27) and Siena (Aug. 27) along with a NCAA Second Round rematch versus Texas A&M (Aug. 28) on opening weekend before taking on NCAA participant TCU (Sept. 3), Central Arkansas (Sept. 3) and Alcorn State (Sept. 4) in Fort Worth.

Before entering SEC action, LSU welcomes North Carolina (Sept. 10), New Mexico State (Sept. 11) and NCAA participant Rice (Sept. 11) to the Maravich Center for the Tiger Classic.

For the fifth consecutive season, the Tigers will play a home-and-home series with each SEC squad in lieu of a conference tournament. LSU squares off with Auburn (Sept. 17) and Georgia (Sept. 19) on the league's first weekend.

NCAA Sweet 16 participant Kentucky (Oct. 8) visits the PMAC as part of three-match home stand that features NCAA participant Tennessee (Oct. 10) and Arkansas (Oct. 13). The Tigers also play host to Mississippi State (Oct. 29), Alabama (Oct. 31) and Ole Miss (Nov. 7) before wrapping up the home slate with South Carolina (Nov. 19) and NCAA Sweet 16 participant Florida (Nov. 21).

"The SEC continues to be a league on the rise in volleyball after placing four teams in the NCAA's last season," Flory said. "Each team has talented players, and our team will be in for a challenge every time we step on the court."

The NCAA Tournament begins with opening rounds, Dec. 2-5, on campus sites before moving onto four regional sites hosted by Dayton, Penn State, Texas and Washington. The Final Four is set for Dec. 16-18 at the Spirit Center in Kansas City, Mo.

OUTSIDE HITTERS/RIGHT SIDE

One of the most intriguing situations heading into the 2010 campaign is LSU's front row hitting corps. The Tigers will have a youthful group ready to take charge following the graduation of All-SEC First-Team and AVCA All-America Honorable Mention pick Marina Skender.

LSU doesn't lack a shortage of candidates as senior Angela Bensend joined by sophomore Madie Jones can succeed at either the outside or right side hitting positions. Brittney Johnson and Tania Schatow are additional candidates that can see time when not in their traditional positions, while freshmen Avery Striebel and Nicole Willis, a pair of Tar Heel state standouts, also will be in the mix.

Bensend has compiled 79 starts and the Tigers have won 14 of 15 matches when she reaches double-digit kills over the previous three seasons. She was one of four players to average over 1.75 kills per set and popped 90 of her 176 spikes during LSU's last 12 matches.

Jones saw action in 20 matches and performed at a high level primarily off the bench. She slapped six or more kills on five occasions; all against 2009 NCAA Tournament teams Nebraska, Notre Dame, Stanford, Tennessee and Tulane.

"Our hitters have a tremendous amount of talent, and we feel great about the progress that they continue to make," Flory said. "We're very pleased with Angela and Madie's development. I'm confident they're ready to step forward and rise to the challenges that are ahead."

Striebel collected 2009 Carolina 3A Conference Player of the Year for Cardinal Gibbons High School in North Carolina. Her team finished with an impressive 114-8 mark during her four-year career and claimed three state championships in 2006, 2007 and 2009.

Willis, a southpaw, expects to make an impact on the right side. She secured three CAP All-Conference First-Team selections after finishing among the Top 5 in kills, digs, blocks and aces at Needham Broughton High School in North Carolina. She also was a five-year player in the Junior Olympics.

"Both Avery and Nicole are athletes who have all the attributes, we, as coaches, look for in recruits," Flory said. "Avery knows how to win and succeed after having played for one of the top high school teams in the country. At the same time, Nicole's versatility and ability to play above the net on both sides of the ball will definitely impact our team."

MIDDLE BLOCKERS

The most glaring difference for LSU fans will be in the middle, where voids will be left by two-time AVCA All-American and reigning SEC Player of the Year Brittnee Cooper along with Lauren DeGirolamo, another AVCA All-America honoree.

The cupboard isn't completely bare, however, as the Tigers enter the season with a strong group of middle blockers who have varying degrees of experience.

Junior Michele Williams leads the way with the tools to be successful in all facets of the game. She powered home 244 kills and tacked on nine double-digit kill performances to rank third on the team. The unanimous pick to the 2008 SEC All-Freshman Team also posted 124 blocks and cranked 30 aces, second-most in both categories. Her 1.15 blocks per set were fifth-highest in the SEC.

Senior Tania Schatow appears ready to contribute either in the middle or on the outside after seeing spot duty during her first three seasons. She is a physical blocker that continues to build her game and has recorded 73 stuffs over her 104 sets of action.

Freshman Desiree Elliott has racked up multiple All-District and All-State accolades during her prep career at Cypress Woods High School in Texas. She also won a gold medal in addition to a pair of bronze medals at the Junior Olympics.

"Michele continued to play at a consistent level for us last year at middle blocker," Flory said. "Heading into her junior season, I think she's ready to step her game up another notch and take ownership of this team as an upperclassman. We also expect Tania and Desiree to contribute. Tania had a strong spring and might be one of most improved players on the roster, while Desi is a physical athlete that brings power, speed and explosiveness to our team. Her attributes fit directly into our system."





SETTERS

With the departure All-SEC First-Team and AVCA All-America Honorable Mention performer Sam Dabbs, LSU will undeniably have a hole to fill in one of the most crucial position on the court.

The good news is that senior Brittney Johnson has experience waiting in the wings and has distributed 835 assists during her first three seasons with the Tigers. Her athleticism and versatility offer LSU's attack multiple looks on the front row. The Baton Rouge native proved able to run the offense efficiently in a 3-2 setback to No. 5 Stanford during the 2009 season opener filling in for Dabbs.

Freshman Shelby Pursley joins the Tigers out of Winter Springs High School in Florida where she was received two All-Central Florida First-Team picks and was named Seminole County Player of the Year in 2009. She also was chosen to PrepVolleyball.com's Academic All-America First Team and was a finalist for the National Merit Scholarship.

"Both Brittney and Shelby bring something unique to the table," Flory said. "There's no doubt that Brittney continues to improve for us and clearly understands the expectations that are required to be successful at the setter position on this level. Shelby is not only gifted as an athlete but is a tremendous student who owns a tremendous work ethic that will be a great addition for our program."

DEFENSIVE SPECIALIST/LIBEROS

A key to LSU's success during its five-year run has been the Tigers ability to play excellent defense and pass well. That trend is expected to continue in 2010 as junior Lauren Wacławczyk quickly established herself as a player worthy of filling the libero position left by two-time All-American Elena Martinez.

Wacławczyk notched 425 digs at a 3.76 per set ratio to rank 10th in the SEC. She provided double-digit digs in 24 of her 31 starts at libero, and her deadly jump serve registered a team-high 33 aces aided by 10 multi-ace efforts.

Returning are sophomores Sam Delahoussaye and Meghan Mannari, who also will compete for time on the back row. Delahoussaye emerged as a strong defensive option and finished fourth on the team with 257 digs with nine of her 11 double-digit dig outings coming in SEC play. Mannari played sparingly during her freshman season but saw most of her action down the stretch after battling back from injury.

Victoria Jacobsen and Brittany Steele, a pair of freshmen, expect to add depth and are looking to make an instant impact on the Tigers' backcourt defense. Jacobsen made the transition from setter on her high school team where she earned two District MVP honors and two All-State First-Team selections at St. Thomas More in Lafayette. Steele took home back-to-back District Defensive MVP awards and amassed a school record 860 digs to cap her career at Georgetown High School in Texas.

"The back row is one of the spots where we feel we have a lot of depth and potential," Flory said. "Our philosophy has always been that the first touch is the most important. Lauren did a great job of taking the reins following Elena last season and there will be opportunities for all five players to be in the mix. This group has outstanding energy, competitiveness and the ability to make match-changing plays."

Maravich Center

The 2010 season marks LSU volleyball's 29th season in the Pete Maravich Assembly Center, the largest volleyball venue in the SEC. The structure, which was renamed in honor of the all-time LSU and NCAA men's basketball scoring leader on July 22, 1988, seats 13,215 and ranks as one of the finest college athletic arenas in the nation.

On July 1, 2004, the management of the Maravich Center came under the direction of the LSU Athletics Department and underwent a multi-year refurbishment. The renovations have included new television lighting, an interior makeover and new roof surface.

Prior to the 2007 season, the main arena got a new subfloor and a new playing floor. In the summer of 2008, the auxiliary practice gym also received a new floor.

The outside windows of the building now feature the Tiger mascot running around the arena. In addition, all seats in the 100 lower level are scheduled to be replaced for the 2010 season.

Volleyball fans can see a redesigned concourse with video and graphic displays, renovated concession stands and video kiosks showcasing the best of the sports that play in the building.

Prior to the start of the 2010 season, the auxiliary gym located underground in the north section of the arena has been converted to a volleyball only practice facility.

The defending SEC champions enjoy the comforts of a spacious locker room. The two-tiered, fully carpeted facility features individual cubicles for each athlete, a meeting room and storage area. The first phase of a graphics project spotlighting the Tiger volleyball program is scheduled to begin in 2010.

Between 1985 and 1992, the Maravich Center was one of the top home courts in the nation, as LSU ran up a 110-10 (.917) record. During that time, LSU recorded a 37-match home-court win streak, which is the second-longest streak in SEC history.

In 1991, the Tigers enjoyed possibly their finest season in the arena as LSU recorded a perfect 16-0 record and advanced to the Final Four through the NCAA South Regional in Baton Rouge.

The Tigers have posted 12 consecutive seasons without a losing record in the Maravich Center, making it once again a tough place for visiting teams to play. Over that span, LSU has a record of 102-42 (.708), including an undefeated 6-0 mark in 2005. The Tigers have strung together a winning record in 25 of 28 seasons at the PMAC.

The Maravich Center also has played host to SEC and NCAA Tournaments for volleyball, basketball and gymnastics. The 1982, 1987 and 1995 SEC Volleyball Championships were all held in the arena.

LSU won its final eight league home matches in 2009 highlighted by a 3-0 sweep of No. 6 Florida to clinch the program's fifth SEC championship. The Tigers also welcomed back postseason volleyball to the Maravich Center in 2009 for the first time since 1991.

In total, the Maravich Center has been the site of four NCAA Championships as well as the 1991 NCAA South Regional.







HEAD COACH

Fran Flory moves into her 13th season as head coach of the LSU volleyball program, having firmly established the Tigers in the national spotlight.

LSU has been nothing short of spectacular and continues to raise the level of success. The Tigers have won five consecutive SEC Western Division crowns and are one of only 20 programs to reach the NCAA Tournament in each of the last five seasons. The last time LSU strung together five straight postseason appearances was 1988-93.

LSU has posted 23 wins per season and spent 35 weeks ranked inside the Bison/AVCA Top 25 poll climbing as high as No. 10 on two occasions during the five-year run. The Tigers also have tallied eight American Volleyball Coaches Association [AVCA] All-South Region First-Team picks, including a pair of AVCA All-Americans in each of the last three seasons for the first time in program history.

LSU climbed to new heights in 2009 and claimed the SEC overall championship to close Florida's 18-year reign at the top of the conference. The Tigers finished with a 25-7 record highlighted by a pair of historic wins over the Gators, including their first win in UF's O'Connell Center since 1991.

LSU returned to the NCAA Tournament and rolled past Tulane during their opener before falling in a five-set affair to Texas A&M in the second round.

Following the successful season, the

individual accolades began to pour in for the Purple and Gold. Flory was recognized as the AVCA South Region, SEC and Louisiana Coach of the Year.

Brittnee Cooper added to LSU's rich heritage with the program's first SEC Player of the Year award along with AVCA All-America First-Team honors to join the elite company of Monique Adams (1991) and Angie Miller (1992). She headlined the SEC and ranked among the NCAA's Top 20 in blocks and hitting percentage. Her .409 hitting clip also set a program single-season mark.

Under Flory's guidance, LSU has secured 31 All-SEC selections, including 12 First-Team picks. Cooper was joined by Sam Dabbs and Marina Skender to become the first Tiger trio to notch All-SEC First-Team honors in the same season.

Elena Martinez notched 2007 & 2008 SEC Defensive Player of the Year in addition to AVCA All-America Honorable Mention accolades. She finished her career second in program history reeling in 1,414 digs and her professional team, Llaneras de Toa Baja in Puerto Rico, earned a runner-up finish in 2010.

LSU has dominated with 37 All-Louisiana selections highlighted by 20 First-Team honors. The four-time Louisiana Coach of the Year also has led her players to every individual state award, including



four players, three freshmen, two defensive players and two newcomers of the Year.

LSU has been represented on the national stage as a part of USA Volleyball Women's A2 National Team in each of the last three seasons. Cooper and Martinez won gold at the USA Adult Open Volleyball Championships in May 2008, Cooper added a silver medal in May 2009 and assistant coach Steve Loeswick garnered a bronze medal in May 2010.

Flory's success at LSU, however, hasn't been solely on the court. The Tigers have registered the second-most players named to the SEC Academic Honor Roll of any school in the league during her tenure, leading the league on four occasions. LSU also has been recognized nationally for its academic success, picking up an AVCA Academic Award three times.

The 2008 Tigers overcame injuries and finished the regular season with six straight wins to collect their fourth straight divisional title. Cooper emerged as one of the top middle blockers in the nation en route to All-SEC, All-Louisiana, AVCA All-South Region First-Team and AVCA All-America Honorable Mention accolades.

LSU compiled a stellar 25-8 campaign in 2007. The Tigers broke through with an NCAA Tournament victory, a gritty five-set triumph over New Mexico State, in its third-straight year in the postseason. Lauren DeGirolamo and Kyna Washington took home All-SEC First-Team honors, while DeGirolamo teamed with Martinez for AVCA All-America Honorable Mention.

The Tigers made the 2006 season a year to remember after racking up a 26-6 mark. The 26 victories and No. 19 final national ranking were accomplished for the first time in program history since the 1992 season. LSU also won the SEC Western Division crown outright setting a program mark along the way with 16 league victories.

Flory garnered her second consecutive Louisiana Coach of the Year award. Daniela Romero tacked on AVCA All-America Honorable Mention after securing All-SEC First Team and Louisiana Player of the Year. She was joined by Skender to give the Tigers two All-SEC First-Team picks for the first time since 1999.

LSU's return to volleyball prominence began in 2005 as the Tigers finished 21-8 sharing its first SEC Western Division championship and garnered its first NCAA Tournament berth

since 1992. After Hurricane Katrina turned the Maravich Center into the largest field hospital in the United States, LSU played its first 17 matches on the road traveling over 14,000 miles.

Ivana Kuzmic became LSU's first All-American since 1992 after being named All-SEC First Team and Louisiana Player of the Year. Skender added SEC Freshman of the Year and Second-Team accolades.

LSU totaled a pair of second-place finishes and five third-place showings in the SEC West over Flory's first seven seasons. She made an immediate impact on the program moving LSU within a game of the .500 mark in 1998 after the Tigers went winless in SEC action the year before.

The 1999 Tigers improved to 17-15 overall as Meagan Davis and





Kelly Thompson notched All-SEC First-Team accolades. In 2000, LSU took another step forward making the SEC Tournament finals. Despite the setback, LSU broke a six-year winless draught at the SEC Tournament.

The Tigers picked up its first winning conference record under Flory during the 2001 season. LSU won nine of its 10 matches against Western Divisions squads en route to a second-place finish. Flory kept the momentum going into 2002 and strung together back-to-back SEC winning season for the first time since 1992-93.

LSU bounced back from an 11-19 mark in 2003 and fired back with a 17-12 record during the 2004 season. Kuzmic earned Louisiana Player of the Year as the Tigers won three matches against NCAA Tournament squads.

This is Flory's second stint at LSU as the Baton Rouge native was an assistant for four seasons under LSU's winningest coach, Scott Luster. She served as a graduate assistant in 1988, before being named a full-time assistant prior to the 1989 season.

During her four seasons with the Tigers, Flory helped LSU to unprecedented success with three SEC championships, three SEC Tournament championships and two Final Four appearances, the first school in SEC history to advance to the NCAA Final Four.

Flory left LSU to assume the head coaching duties at Southeastern Louisiana in 1992. In her first season as a head coach, SLU turned in a 21-13 record. She returned to the SEC as an assistant coach at Kentucky in 1993. Five months later,

Flory assumed the head coaching duties when Kathy DeBoer, who is currently the Executive Director of the AVCA, was named Associate Athletic Director.

The 1993 Wildcats stormed to a 29-4 record and advanced to the NCAA Tournament Second Round. For her efforts, Flory was named the Tachikara/AVCA Region IV Coach of the Year. She remained at Kentucky through the 1997 season.

Before entering coaching, Flory experienced a successful playing career at the University of Texas. She was a member of the Longhorns 1981 AIAW National Championship squad. She received All-Southwest Conference and All-south Region honors during her three seasons.

Flory graduated from Texas in 1984 and was named head coach at Wittenberg University in 1986, where she coached for one season before moving on to Texas A&M as an assistant coach.

A member of the AVCA, and chair of the NCAA rules committee starting in fall 2010, Flory has assisted in coordinating both the Louisiana Senior Olympic Games and the Special Olympics; hosting the 2001 Senior Olympic Games. She also is a member of the United States Volleyball Association coaching accreditation program.

Flory and her husband, Ken, live in Baton Rouge. The couple has a daughter, Lindsay (13), and a son, Nicholas (11).



ASSISTANT COACH

Steve Loeswick heads into his fourth season as an assistant coach on the LSU volleyball staff. Loeswick's main duties with the Tigers include setter training, film and opponent breakdown along with lead beach coach responsibilities during the spring season.

Loeswick has been a major contributor as LSU has won three consecutive SEC Western Division titles sparked by the program's first overall SEC championship since 1991. The Tigers have accumulated 68 victories and are one of 27 programs nationally to put together three straight NCAA Tournament appearances fueled by a pair of 25-win campaigns in 2007 and 2009, respectively.



Loeswick guided LSU to its first beach championship as all four Tiger squads made the gold bracket playoff on the sands of Siesta Key, Fla. in April 2010. He also represented LSU on the national stage as an assistant coach of the USA National A2 Red Team and received a bronze medal for his efforts at the 2010 USA Adult Open Volleyball Championships.

A former setter, Loeswick developed transfer Sam Dabbs into a 2009 American Volleyball Coaches Association (AVCA) All-America Honorable Mention recipient. She passed out 2,089 assists during her two-year career to join LSU's setting legacy of former All-Americans Daniela Reis (1991 & 1992) and Daniela Romero (2006).

After the Tigers defeated No. 6 Florida for the first time since 1991, Dabbs was the first player in program history to be selected AVCA National Player of the Week on October 13, 2009 en route to a Top 20 national finish in assists per set.

LSU's offense was retooled under Loeswick in 2007 after the graduation of Romero. The Tigers used the setting tandem Maggie Lonergan and Brittney Johnson to distribute 1,587 assists to jump out to a 15-2 start and emerge with a five-set triumph of No. 14 New Mexico State in NCAA Opening Round.

During his tenure at LSU, the quartet of Brittnee Cooper, Lauren DeGirolamo, Marina Skender and Kyna Washington have eclipsed the 1,000-kill plateau. Skender is one of only five players to record 1,000 kills and 1,000 digs.

The Tigers have racked up a bounty of awards and featured at least two players on the AVCA All-South Region First Team in addition to eight All-SEC selections since 2007. Cooper captured 2009 SEC Player of the Year, while Martinez took home the 2007 & 2008 SEC Defensive Player of the Year award.

Prior to his arrival at LSU, Loeswick spent three seasons as an assistant coach at Oklahoma from 2004-06. As a member of 2006



AVCA Central Regional Coach of the Year Santiago Restrepo's staff, Loeswick aided the Sooners record turnaround in 2006 highlighted by a 28-6 record and a trip to the NCAA Sweet 16. The 28 victories and .824 winning percentage were school records, while the 15 more league wins marked the best one-year turnaround in Big 12 history.

OU finished the 2006 season ranked No. 12 in the AVCA poll, its highest ranking in program history as Elaine Santos and Joanna Schmitt notched All-America honors. Santos also tallied Big 12 Defensive Player of the Year, while Anna Monsen picked up Big 12 Libero of the Year.

Prior to Oklahoma, Loeswick served as an assistant coach for six seasons at Cornell. During his tenure, the Big Red racked up a 93-38 record and 16 All-Ivy League selections, including 2000 Player of the Year Robin Moore. Cornell posted a top three finish in the Ivy League standings during three of Loeswick's final four seasons, including a 21-4 mark and a second-place finish in 2003.

Loeswick began his coaching career in 1997 where he was an assistant coach for the Martinus Club, a professional women's club in Holland, for one season. He entered coaching after a year of playing in Germany's top professional volleyball league.

A four-year starting setter for the University of Southern California, Loeswick was just the third Trojan to start in a single position for all four seasons. As a freshman, he ranked 10th nationally with 15.86 assists per game before earning 1993 Volleyball Monthly All-Freshman Team honors and being named to the 1996 Mountain Pacific Sports Federation All-Academic Team.

During her first three seasons at her alma mater, LSU has racked up 68 victories en route to a trio of SEC Western Division crowns highlighted by the program's first overall SEC championship since 1991. The Tigers are one of 27 programs in the nation to secure three

consecutive NCAA Tournament berths and advanced to the NCAA Second Round after two 25-win campaigns in 2007 and 2009.

LSU has placed two players on the American Volleyball Coaches Association (AVCA) All-South Region First Team in each of the last three seasons, while Brittnee Cooper added to the program's storied tradition as the first SEC Player of the Year in 2009. In the process, Cooper also joined the elite company of Monique Adams (1991) and Angie Miller (1992) as an AVCA All-America First-Team selection. The Tigers also have had Sam Dabbs, Lauren DeGirolamo, Elena Martinez and Marina Skender take home AVCA All-America Honorable Mention status since 2007.

LSU has garnered eight All-SEC selections sparked by six First-Team picks. In 2009, Cooper, Dabbs and Skender became the first LSU trio to pick up All-SEC First-Team accolades during the same season. Both Cooper and DeGirolamo also eclipsed 1,000 career kills in 2009.

Elena Martinez capped her illustrious career with back-to-back SEC Defensive Player of the Year awards in 2007 and 2008. She reeled in 1,414 career digs, second-most in program history. Her and Cooper teamed for a gold medal as part of the USA National A2 Red Team at the 2008 USA Adult Open Volleyball Championships.

Skender and Kyna Washington surpassed the 1,000 career kills plateau during the 2007 season. The duo was the first pair of juniors since Nyla Shepherd and Julie Stempel to accomplish this historic feat since LSU's run to the Final Four in 1990.

The future is bright for LSU as the Tigers incoming freshman class for 2010 received a No. 27 national ranking from PrepVolleyball.com. Desiree Elliott, Avery Striebel and Nicole Willis notched AVCA Under Armour Girls High School All-America Second-team honors.

Prior to LSU, Lytle Wilson spent one season as an assistant coach at Wake Forest. The Demon Deacons matched a school record for most ACC wins in 2006. She trained the outside and right side hitters on





the court in addition to serving as team travel coordinator, recruiting assistant and camp director assistant off the court.

Lytle Wilson was an assistant coach at the University of North Carolina from 2002-2004. The Tar Heels put together a 32-4 record en route to the 2002 ACC regular season championship, its first NCAA Sweet 16 appearance and a No. 11 final national ranking during her first season. Laura Greene took home the 2002 ACC Player of the Year award and was an AVCA All-America Third-Team pick.

UNC posted another 20-win season in 2003 despite losing four starters, while Molly Pyles picked up an AVCA All-America Honorable Mention selection in 2004.

Before joining the North Carolina staff, Lytle Wilson served as a graduate assistant at Tennessee-Martin in 2001. The Skyhawks compiled a 24-7 record and won the Ohio Valley Conference regular season title.

Lytle Wilson started her coaching career at LSU as a student assistant in 2001 while earning her Bachelor of Science degree in Business Administration. She was a four-year starter at outside hitter from 1997-2000 and ranked sixth in the SEC with 23 service aces during her senior campaign. LSU also appeared in the 2000 SEC Tournament finals.

One of the hardest workers on her team and considered one of the most determined players Flory has ever coached, Lytle Wilson played in 98 career matches, being limited only by a torn anterior cruciate ligament in her right knee suffered 11 matches into her junior season.

A three-time member of the SEC Academic Honor Roll, Lytle Wilson also was the Tigers' representative on the women's at-large SEC Good Works Team in 1999-2000. Her good works didn't go unnoticed as Lytle Wilson was named the LSU Student-Athlete Volunteer of the Year in 2000. She served on the CHAMPS Student-Athlete Advisory Board for four years, the last year serving as president of the organization. She also was a member of the LSU tennis team in 2001.

Lytle Wilson, originally from Richmond, Texas, was a member of the Texas Elite Volleyball Club during her prep playing days. She earned All-District First-Team and All-

LSU ENDS FLORIDA'S 18-YEAR REIGN ON TOP OF SEC

After a loss to Kentucky on SEC opening weekend, the Tigers put together an eight-match winning streak sparked by seven dominating sweeps. The Wildcats escaped with a five-set win in Lexington, but LSU bounced back with a nine-match run to conclude the regular season to earn the program's fifth league championship.

In the process, the Tigers finished 18-2 and edged out Kentucky by one match to end Florida's 18-year stay at the top of the conference. LSU garnered its first SEC Championship since 1991 to secure the league's automatic bid to the NCAA Tournament

FIVE STRAIGHT SEC WESTERN DIVISION CROWNS

LSU also ran away with its fifth consecutive SEC Western Division title by a 10-match margin. The Tigers connected for a season-best .416 hitting percentage at Ole Miss to clinch the division on Nov. 6.

LSU's championship run started in 2005 when the Tigers shared the division crown with Arkansas. The Tigers have won the division title outright over the last four seasons and are an impressive 38-2 (.950) against fellow Western Division foes, including 30 consecutive victories dating back to the 2006 season.

LSU joins Arkansas and Florida as the only two programs in the conference to win four-straight divisional titles. The Gators won 14 Eastern Division titles from 1995-2008, sharing the title with Tennessee in 2004. Arkansas won five-straight Western Division titles from 1995-1999, sharing the title with Auburn in 1996 along with five-straight from 2001-2005, sharing the title with Alabama in 2004 and LSU in 2005.

FIVE STRAIGHT NCAA TOURNAMENT BERTHS

LSU racked up its fifth consecutive NCAA Tournament berth in 2009 and hosted postseason volleyball at the Maravich Center for the first time since 1991.

The Tigers earned a No. 15 national seed and disposed of Tulane 3-0 in the opening round as Sam Dabbs distributed 36 assists to fuel a balanced attack. Brittnee Cooper, Angela Bensend and Lauren DeGirolamo turned in 11, nine and eight kills, respectively.

Cooper and Dabbs upped the ante with career-highs against Texas A&M in round two. Cooper ripped 28 kills on 40 swings for a program postseason record .700 hitting percentage, while Dabbs circulated 64 assists, but LSU dropped a hard-fought 3-2 decision to the Aggies.

The match featured an astounding 60 ties and 29 lead changes as the Tigers outhit and outblocked Texas A&M.

Overall, LSU made its 11th NCAA appearance and eclipsed a four-year run from 1989-1992. The Tigers are one of only 20 programs in the nation with an active streak of five straight NCAA Tournament berths.

LSU was joined by three other SEC teams as Florida, Tennessee and Kentucky represented the SEC at the NCAA Tournament. All four SEC teams secured at least one NCAA win.

The Tigers are one of only three teams in the SEC to advance to the NCAA Final Four, making appearances in both 1990 and 1991.

FLORY CAPTURES A TRIO OF AWARDS

After LSU's historic season, head coach Fran Flory was rewarded with AVCA, SEC and Louisiana Coach of the Year accolades. She also was one of eight finalists for the AVCA's national award.



DEGIROLAMO & SKENDER HEADLINE ACADEMIC HONORS

Lauren DeGirolamo and Marina Skender came away with ESPN The Magazine Academic All-District honors as voted upon by the College Sports Information Directors of America [CoSIDA].

Both players already completed their undergraduate work entering the 2009 season, and were pursuing their master's degrees. DeGirolamo earned first-team accolades and carried a 3.92 GPA majoring in education technology. Skender, a sports management major, checked in with a third-team selection and a 3.53 GPA.

"Lauren and Marina are both exemplary examples of what it means to be a student-athlete," head coach Fran Flory said. "They work extremely hard not only on the court but in the classroom and have been a big part of building our program's success over the last five years."

DeGirolamo and Skender also represented LSU as members of the SEC Academic Honor Roll. They were joined by Sam Dabbs, Brittney Johnson, Tania Schatow, Lauren Wacławczyk and Michele Williams.

Since Fran Flory's arrival at LSU in 1998, the Tigers have amassed 93 honor roll selections. Members are required to maintain a cumulative 3.0 GPA or better over the previous academic year (Fall-Spring-Summer Semesters).



COOPER BEST OF THE BEST

Not only did Brittnee Cooper notch All-SEC First-Team accolades, she made program history as the Tigers' first SEC Player of the Year selection. She didn't stop there en route to being one of 14 players to pick up American Volleyball Coach Association [AVCA] All-America First-Team status. The Houston, Texas native joined Monique Adams [1990 & 1991] and Angie Miller [1992] as the only players to earn this prestigious honor in program history.

"This is such a wonderful honor for Brittnee," head coach Fran Flory said. "As I reflect on how far she has come during her career, it's such a fitting finish to have her recognized on the AVCA All-American First Team. She has gone from being a great athlete to being a great volleyball player this season. We're so proud that she has been recognized on the national level for her hard work and dedication."

Cooper connected for a team-high 410 kills on an impressive .409 hitting clip, which established a new program single-season record in addition to ranking No. 6 nationally. She knocked double-digit kills 23 times highlighted by a career-best 28 spikes against Texas A&M in the NCAA Tournament Second Round.

Cooper anchored LSU's front row defense as the Tigers recorded 2.75 blocks per set to rank No. 12 in the nation. Her 1.37 blocks per frame not only headlined the SEC but was No. 18 nationally. She tallied at least five blocks on 15 occasions and finished fifth on the program's all-time list with 504 total stuffs.



It marked the first time that Flory received the SEC and AVCA honors during her LSU career.

Flory secured her 200th win at LSU when the Tigers blew past Notre Dame to close out the Shamrock Invitational to cap opening weekend as Michele Williams knocked 11 kills and came away with Tournament MVP honors.

Over her 12 seasons with the Tigers, Flory is 223-141 and has racked up the second most wins of any active SEC head coach, behind only Florida's Mary Wise.

LATER GATORS

LSU used a total team effort to end a 26-match losing streak to Florida on October 6 in front of an ESPNU television audience. It marked the first time since November 1990 that the Gators were swept in an SEC regular season match.

The Tigers middle attack of Brittnee Cooper, Michele Williams and Lauren DeGirolamo combined to crush 38 kills on a scorching .567 hitting percentage.

LSU doubled its pleasure with a gritty 3-1 triumph on Nov. 13 to end a 72-match losing streak for the league's western division in Gainesville. The Tigers last accomplished that feat back in 1990.

Marina Skender powered home 20 kills and connected on 12 of her 27 swings without an attack error over the final two sets. She also tacked on 15 digs for her 12th double-double of the season.

Cooper racked up 16 kills on a .500 hitting percentage. Sam Dabbs also notched a double-double with 46 assists to go along with 14 digs. She set LSU to a match-best .483 attack clip during the fourth set.

With the win, LSU's senior class has won in every SEC road venue and joined the 1991 Final Four team as the last LSU squad to defeat Florida twice in the same season.

'DIG PINK' EVENT A SUCCESS

LSU made its third "Dig Pink" event a success as the Tigers swept Arkansas and raised over \$1,850 to benefit the Side-Out Foundation.

The Tigers also teamed with LSU University Recreation [UREC] with an initiative for the campus community to create awareness, impart knowledge and raise money as part of Breast Cancer Awareness Month held in October.

Dr. K.C. White, Dean of Students and Vice Chancellor of Student Life, led a 1-mile "Victory Walk" prior to the event and served as a guest coach on the bench.

JOHNSON EARNS JESSE OWENS ATHLETIC AWARD

For the second straight year, Brittney Johnson was presented with the Jesse Owens Athletic Award as part of the Black Faculty and Staff Caucus' 25th annual Black Scholars Awards Program at the Carl Maddox Field House in April.

The award is presented to the African American student with the highest grade point average. Johnson, a business major, currently carries a 3.7 GPA.

THE FUTURE IS BRIGHT

A trio of LSU signees Desiree Elliott, Avery Striebel and Nicole Willis represented the Tigers on the 4th annual AVCA Under Armour Girls High School All-American Second Team.

Shelby Pursley also was selected a PrepVolleyball.com High School Academic All America First-Team selection.

PrepVolleyball.com also placed the quartet as the nation's 27th best recruiting class in May, which is the second-highest mark in the SEC. All four players will be freshmen for the 2010 season.



DABBS GETS HISTORIC RECOGNITION

Sam Dabbs made program history as LSU's first Sports Imports/American Volleyball Coaches Association [AVCA] National Player of Week for the week of October 11.

"Sam is truly one of the premier setters of her class," head coach Fran Flory said. "The great thing for me is watching her continue to grow. When you get these awards, it really lends a lot of credibility and certainly she's very deserving of these honors."

Dabbs dished out a season-best 13.83 assists per set as LSU recorded a pair of sweeps over South Carolina and No. 6 Florida. She set the Tigers to a .308 team hitting percentage highlighted by a .333 clip against the Gators. A majority of her 49 assists fueled LSU's middle attack of Brittnee Cooper, Michele Williams and Lauren DeGirolamo to 38 kills on a crisp .567 hitting percentage as the Tigers defeated Florida for the first time since 1991.

Dabbs turned in a solid performance against South Carolina and dished out 34 assists to go along with 12 digs and nine kills to fall one spike shy of her second career triple-double. She also posted 3.33 digs per set and paced the SEC with 11.70 helpers per set in league matches.

The Tigers outlasted Arizona in five games during the opening round as Detra Brown (19 kills, 13 digs), Alice Card (10 kills, 18 digs), Simone DePaula (33 assists, 15 digs), Wendy Stammer (21 kills, 13 digs) and Lisa Smith (12 digs and 13 blocks) all posted double-doubles.

LSU made a run toward the Final Four sweeping Texas-Arlington before falling to host Texas in the South Regional final.

The Tigers headed to Austin, Texas where Texas-Arlington rallied from a two-game hole to stun LSU. Five players knocked double-figure kills for the Tigers, highlighted by 23 and 22 kills from Monique Adams and Shepherd.

Coming off its second undefeated conference championship in as many seasons, LSU cruised past Louisville behind a .337 team hitting percentage in the first round of the NCAA Tournament at the Maravich Center.

The Tigers dismissed Texas Tech 3-0 in round two as Daniela Reis set a balanced attack that featured 15 kills from Nyla Shepherd, 12 kills from Monique Adams and 10 kills from Julie Stempel.

LSU had its 1986 season end one step shy of the Final Four at Texas and were swept by the Longhorns during the 1990 regular season in Austin. Down 2-0 to the host Longhorns, LSU mounted a rally behind Adams, Shepherd and Stempel.

The trio combined for 74 of the Tigers' 91 kills and posted double-doubles as LSU fought back for a 8-15, 4-15, 15-10, 15-11, 17-15 triumph to advance to the program's first Final Four.

The Tigers fell to eventual national champion UCLA, 3-0, in the national semifinals, but the future was bright as Adams, Shepherd and Stempel would return for their senior seasons in 1991.

LSU fired out to a 12-0 record to start the 1991 season highlighted by wins over No. 11 New Mexico and No. 17 Texas before being upended at Florida to open SEC play.

The Tigers bounced back in a big way reeling off 20 consecutive victories en route to its third consecutive SEC regular season and tournament championships.

Only losing 12 games during the season, LSU entered the NCAA Tournament as a favorite to return to the Final Four and the Tigers did not disappoint shutting down Houston in the first round to advance to the South Regional, which the Tigers hosted.

After sweeping Texas Tech, LSU faced off with Florida for the fourth time in '91. Monique Adams and Daniela Reis set a program single-game marks. Adams cranked 43 kills on an amazing .507 hitting percentage, while Reis dished out 82 assists. Angie Miller (10 kills, 29 digs), Luciana Reis (12 kills, 22 digs) and Julie Stempel (11 kills, 12 digs) also tacked on double-doubles as LSU punched its second straight ticket to the Final Four.

LSU dropped a hard-fought, four-game duel with Long Beach State in the national semifinals. Until Florida in 2002, the 1991 Tigers were the only SEC squad to win a game in the Final Four.

Dr. John V. Lombardi

President, Louisiana State University System



Dr. John V. Lombardi is the fifth individual to serve as the President of the Louisiana State University System. As its Chief Executive Officer, Dr. Lombardi oversees 11 institutions, including five academic campuses, as well as 10 public hospitals located throughout the state. He is also a Professor of History at Louisiana State University and Agricultural and Mechanical College.

Dr. Lombardi was born in Los Angeles, California and attended Pomona College where he earned his bachelor's degree. He received his M.A. and Ph.D. degrees in history from Columbia University. He joined the faculty in the Department of History at Indiana University, where he later served as Dean of International Programs and Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences. In 1987, he became Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs at the Johns Hopkins University. From 1990-1999, Dr. Lombardi was President of the University of Florida. Prior to his appointment as President of the LSU System, he served as Chancellor of the University of Massachusetts Amherst.

He is a Latin American historian, with a special interest in Venezuela. Dr. Lombardi is also one of the country's foremost authorities in higher education, serving as Co-Editor of The Top American Research Universities. He is the author of numerous professional publications, and along with his wife, Cathryn, co-authored a teaching atlas on Latin American History. He has taught courses in history, intercollegiate sports, and university management.

Dr. Michael V. Martin

Chancellor, LSU



Dr. Michael V. Martin assumed the chancellorship of Louisiana State University and A&M College on August 1, 2008. Prior to his appointment as LSU's eighth chancellor, Dr. Martin established a distinguished career in higher education, serving most recently as president of New Mexico State University.

Before arriving at NMSU in 2004, Dr. Martin served for six years as vice president for agriculture and natural resources at the University of Florida, leading the university's Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences. He was elevated to senior vice president of the University of Florida shortly before being selected as NMSU's president. Previously, he was vice president for agricultural policy and the dean of the College of Agricultural, Food and Environmental Sciences at the University of Minnesota. He began his academic career at Oregon State University as a faculty member in the Department of Agricultural and Resource Economics.

An academic leader dedicated to the land-grant mission, Dr. Martin is recognized as a strong voice for higher education. In 2007, he received the Justin Smith Morrill Memorial Award, named after the author of the bill creating land-grant universities, which honors outstanding service on behalf of the land-grant mission. Only six individuals have been designated to receive this award since it was first given in 1980. For his leadership in improving the quality of life for New Mexico citizens and future generations, he was awarded the 2008 Distinguished Leadership Award by Leadership New Mexico.

Other recent awards include his recognition as a powerbroker by The New Mexico Business Weekly in 2006, being named Outstanding Alumnus of Minnesota State University Mankato in 2006, and receiving the NMSU Social Justice Award in 2005.

Dr. Martin is involved in a wide array of professional and community organizations and activities.

An active scholar, Dr. Martin has authored numerous book chapters and articles for academic journals, trade publications, and the popular press and recently published pieces for The Chronicle of Higher Education and University Business.

Some of his philosophy is summed up in the following quote: "It is the tradition of land-grant universities to be non-traditional," written as part of a 2001 article titled "The Land-Grant University in the 21st Century," published in the Journal of Agricultural and Applied Economics. He traced the history of the land-grant movement from the mid-1800s and concluded that "the fundamental land-grant principles of accessibility, practical as well as classical education, research and discovery in the public interest, and connectedness to all the people remain powerful and profound."

A native of Crosby, Minn., Dr. Martin earned a bachelor's degree in business and economics and a master's degree in economics at Mankato State College (Minnesota State University) in Minnesota. He received his Ph.D. in applied economics from the University of Minnesota in 1977.

Dr. Martin and his wife, Jan, have two children, both adopted from South Korea. Amanda, a graduate of the University of Wisconsin-Eau Claire, is a graphic artist in Saint Paul, Minn. Sam, who holds a bachelor's degree from the University of Minnesota and a master's from Sarah Lawrence College, is a genetics counselor at Beth Israel Hospital in New York City.

Dydia DeLyser

Faculty Athletics Representative

Dydia DeLyser, an associate professor in the Department of Geography and Anthropology, serves in her fifth year as LSU's Faculty Athletics Representative.

DeLyser, a native of Santa Monica, Calif., earned her bachelor's degree in 1992 from UCLA, and her master's and doctoral degrees from Syracuse University (in 1996 and 1998).

DeLyser arrived at LSU in August 1998 as an Instructor before becoming an assistant professor one year later. She was promoted to associate professor with tenure in August 2005.

DeLyser is a cultural-historical geographer. Her research has been both ethnographic and historical, and most of it questions how different built landscapes can help make the past meaningful in the present.

Much of her published research has focused on two different studies. One was a many-year ethnographic study of a ghost town in California (Bodie State Historic Park) where she examined how images and ideas about the American mythic West became meaningful to the tourists who

visited the town. The second was an historical study that examined a 19th century novel (Ramona) and how it changed the way people understood (and still understand) southern California's past.

Her current research concerns early women aviators and how they used their practices of flying to advance feminism in the post-suffrage era.

DeLyser teaches graduate courses in cultural geography, qualitative research, and academic and professional writing. She has also taught undergraduate courses in cultural, and urban geography, and an introductory world-regional geography course.

DeLyser is a first-generation American -- her parents were Dutch immigrants and English is her second language. She also has language abilities in Russian and Spanish.

DeLyser's hobbies include driving/riding antique cars and motorcycles. She is also a licensed pilot and co-owns a Citabria, which is a two-place aerobatic airplane.



Joe Alleva

LSU Vice-Chancellor/Director of Athletics



Joe Alleva enters his third year as LSU's Vice Chancellor and Director of Athletics after being hired to lead one of the nation's most powerful athletic programs on April 4, 2008. Alleva joined LSU after 10 years of outstanding leadership as the director of athletics at Duke University. He officially took over at LSU on July 1, 2008.

The LSU Board of Supervisors approved a promotion in August 2009 for Alleva, adding vice chancellor to his title and expanding his role to the academic side of the university. It's the first time at LSU that the director of athletics has also held a vice chancellor position.

"I am honored to be named vice chancellor at this outstanding institution and thank Chancellor (Michael) Martin, President (John) Lombardi and the Board of Supervisors for the confidence they have shown in me," Alleva said. "Athletics is the window through which many people view LSU and it is important that we excel in competition and in the classroom while demonstrating the utmost of integrity. I believe my promotion ties athletics closer to the university and that is a good thing for everyone; we are all on the same team."

Under Alleva's guidance, LSU has reached new heights in terms of athletic success while continuing to be recognized as one of the top enterprises in college athletics.

A veteran leader in college athletics, Alleva is dedicated to athletic and academic excellence. He is committed to providing the opportunities and the resources necessary for student-athletes to excel in competition, in the classroom and in the community.

Alleva, 57, is well-respected for sustaining high standards of excellence and integrity in athletic programs, hiring the finest coaches in the country and the high level of success achieved by student-athletes.

One of Alleva's big initiatives on the LSU campus is the launching of a strategic plan for the continued success and future improvement of LSU Athletics.

LSU Athletics has produced a new booklet called "LSU: Thru and True" designed to introduce a strategic plan for operating a top tier athletics program. The strategic plan booklet is titled "LSU: Thru and True" because, in the words of Alleva, "Our core values run deep and our commitment to excellence is relentless. At LSU, college athletics is an avenue for providing opportunities, for achieving goals, for generating enthusiasm and for nurturing passion."

The subtitle of the booklet is "Excellence in Competition, Distinction in the Classroom, and Contribution to the Community." The strategic plan addresses various topics including quality of life for student-athletes; academic and athletic excellence; compliance and ethics; financial responsibility; diversity, inclusion and equity; tradition and history, and service and communication.

The plan also includes a vision for the future of LSU athletics facilities, highlighted by plans to improve North Stadium Drive between Tiger Stadium and the Pete Maravich Assembly Center.

Alleva is an innovator with bold ideas that benefit not only LSU but all of Greater Baton Rouge. Alleva was heavily involved in the planning of the inaugural Bayou Country Superfest, a two-day country music concert and festival held in Tiger Stadium last spring. The event attracted nearly 100,000 visitors to the LSU campus and made a tremendous economic impact upon the local community.

Seventeen of LSU's 20 sports programs participated in post-season competition in 2009-10, including the Tiger football squad that played in a bowl game for the 10th straight season. Six LSU teams posted Top 10 national finishes last season, and 12 were ranked among the Top

25. LSU finished in the Top 20 of the Learfield Director's Cup rankings, which measure overall athletic success for institutions across the country.

Under Alleva's direction in 2008-09, all 20 LSU sports competed in NCAA post-season play for the first time in school history, and it culminated with the baseball team winning the national championship. In addition, six teams finished in the top 10 nationally. LSU was the only school in the Southeastern Conference to participate in a bowl game and the men's and women's NCAA basketball tournaments during 2008-09. Furthermore, LSU student-athletes volunteered a total of 2,360 hours for community service projects.

LSU earned a ninth place ranking in the 2008-09 Learfield Director's Cup, as the Tigers were second only to Florida among SEC institutions. LSU accumulated points in 18 of a possible 20 categories in the standings, also a first for the school.

Upon being hired at LSU, Alleva immediately made an impact by hiring Trent Johnson to lead the men's basketball program. Johnson, the 2009 SEC Coach of the Year, wasted little time in turning the Tigers into a winner as LSU claimed the 2009 SEC regular season title and reached the second round of the NCAA Tournament.

LSU also had top 10 national finishes in 2008-09 in gymnastics, men's and women's indoor track and field and men's and women's outdoor track and field. Thirteen of LSU's 20 sports finished the year ranked among the top 25 in the nation.

The Tiger football team capped their 2008 season with a 38-3 win over 14th-ranked Georgia Tech in the Chick-fil-A Bowl. During the offseason, Alleva helped secure the funding necessary for the addition of a state-of-the-art artificial turf practice field, which complements the surface the Tigers have in their indoor practice facility. The addition of the outdoor artificial turf field gives the LSU football program one of the nation's finest all-around facilities.

Not only did LSU teams set records but so did the fans, as over 1.5 million fans filled venues on the LSU campus in 2008-09. LSU set the school record for overall attendance in the sports of football, baseball, and softball.

Alleva oversaw in the spring of 2009 the grand opening of two of the premier baseball and softball facilities in college athletics, Alex Box Stadium and Tiger Park.

In addition, LSU opened a new gift center for its fans – the LSU SportShop. The LSU SportShop, a spectacular, free-standing facility that features the latest in LSU apparel and merchandise, is located adjacent to Mike's Habitat.

Under Alleva's guidance, LSU has one of the most lucrative apparel and shoe contracts with Nike while also having one of the nation's most attractive multi-media rights contracts with CBS Collegiate Sports Properties. LSU athletic budget is now approaching \$85 million, which allows the university to compete at the highest level in the nation.

Alleva has a long-term vision for continued improvements to LSU's athletic facilities in order to insure that the Tigers are among the best in the country well into the 21st Century. One of his top priorities is the enhancement of Tiger Stadium and making Tiger Stadium and the North Stadium Drive corridor a showplace for the university.

Alleva's innovative plan is to make a plaza area between

the Maravich Assembly Center and Tiger Stadium that would recognize LSU's national championship teams and distinguished alumni. This special area, along with Mike's Habitat, and the LSU SportShop, would become the focal point for visitors to campus.

LSU opened in the spring of 2010 a basketball practice facility that houses both the men's and women's basketball teams. The new basketball practice facility features two full length courts as well as locker rooms and other amenities for both squads.

Alleva is also overseeing a major renovation to the golf course at the University Club that will be completed in September 2010, and he is developing plans for a new gymnastics practice facility, indoor tennis center and improved soccer facility. LSU's world-renowned track and field program will receive a state-of-the-art running surface this year when a new track is installed in Bernie Moore Stadium.

"Joe Alleva brings a wealth of experience and accomplishment to LSU," LSU President John Lombardi said of hiring Alleva. "I'm confident we've found a new leader for LSU athletics who exemplifies the vision and integrity needed to lead our sports programs to new heights, a champion of student athletes who believes in the highest standards of competition both on the field and in the classroom."

Alleva's impressive tenure as director of athletics at Duke propelled the university into the ranks of America's top all-around collegiate programs. Among his outstanding list of accomplishments includes the greatest 10-year period in Duke athletics, winning more ACC and NCAA championships than in any other decade in school history.

Also, his fundraising reached extensive heights providing new facilities or renovations for all 26 sports at Duke, which enhanced the experience for every student-athlete.

Alleva is active on the national collegiate athletics scene, having served on the Football Bowl Certification Committee. He sat on several Atlantic Coast Conference committees and served on the NCAA Division I Championships/Competition Cabinet.

Alleva majored in Finance at Lehigh University and received his bachelor's degree in 1975. While at Lehigh, Alleva was the quarterback of the football team and team captain in 1974. Alleva also played on the Lehigh baseball team. He served as a graduate assistant football coach and earned an MBA in 1976.

Alleva began his 32-year career at Duke University in 1976. He spent 28 years in the athletic administration prior to becoming director of athletics in 1998.

Alleva played a key role in Durham's community sports scene. He started Little League Baseball in Durham over 20 years ago, and also began the American Legion baseball program.

Alleva is a member of the North Carolina American Legion Hall of Fame, Suffern High School Hall of Fame and the Rockland County Hall of Fame.

He currently serves on the Louisiana State Board of the Special Olympics.

Alleva and his wife, Annie, have three children, J.D., Jeff, and Jenny.

**Verge Ausberry**
Senior Associate AD/Operations

A former LSU football standout, Verge Ausberry joined the athletics administrative staff in August 2001 as the Associate Athletics Director for Operations. He was appointed to the position of Senior Associate Athletics Director in May 2006.

Ausberry supervises and is responsible for football operations, football scheduling and new projects. He also oversees the LSU men's and women's track and field programs, the equipment staff, the strength and conditioning staff, the Dr. Martin Broussard training room, the video department and football game management.

Ausberry, from New Iberia, La., played inside linebacker for the Tigers, lettering in 1986-89. He was part of two SEC championship teams, playing on teams that went to four bowl games.

Before joining the LSU athletic administration, he was very closely involved in the athletic program, first serving for almost seven years as a member of LSU's highly regarded Academic Center for Athletes.

After leaving the Academic Center, he moved in July 1999 to the Tiger Athletic Foundation staff as part of LSU's fundraising arm.

Ausberry received his Bachelor of Science degree in education in May of 1990, his Master of Education degree in administration, supervision and certification in child welfare in May of 1992 and his specialist in higher education administration in 2004. He is presently a doctoral candidate in higher education administration at LSU. He is married to the former Cheri Morial of New Orleans and they have two boys, Austin and Jaiden.

**Miriam Segar**
Senior Associate AD/Senior Woman Administrator

Former LSU women's basketball player Miriam Segar has been a part of the athletics administration since June of 1995 and was most recently named Senior Associate AD and the department's Senior Woman Administrator after having served as Associate Athletics Director for Student Services since April 2007. She had served as Assistant Athletics Director since 2004.

As LSU's Senior Woman Administrator, Segar's responsibilities include oversight of the highly successful Tiger Olympic Sports program including 17 men's and women's sports. Segar began her administrative career at LSU as the compliance coordinator where she served for three years. Following that, in 1998, Segar was named the director of the CHAMPS/Life Skills Program where she worked until 2001 when she became the Director of Student Services.

While working with CHAMPS/Life Skills, Segar guided the program to the Division I Athletic Directors Program of Excellence Award in 2001.

Prior to returning to her alma mater, Segar spent one year at the SEC office as the championships assistant and the officiating assistant, assisting in the management of all SEC championships and tournaments and the coordination of women's basketball officials.

Segar, the 2006 Athletic Department Female Alumnus of the Year, was a three-year captain for the Lady Tigers basketball team and received four letters from 1990 to 1994. She earned the 1994 NCAA Post-graduate Scholarship and was a member of the 1994 NCAA All-Academic team.

Segar and her husband Jamie have four children -- Grant, Reid, Maggie and Hayes.

**Mark Ewing**
Senior Associate AD/Business

Mark Ewing, a 26-year employee of Louisiana State University, joined the Athletics Department in January 2001, and serves as the department's Senior Associate Athletics Director for Business.

Ewing is responsible for the athletic business operations including budget, travel, personnel and purchasing as well as responsibility for concession operations. He also handles financial forecasting and management of facility maintenance operations.

Ewing came to athletics from LSU's Office of Budget and Planning. He served as LSU's Budget Director overseeing the development and management of the university's \$360 million operating budget.

**Herb Vincent**
Associate Vice-Chancellor for University Relations
Senior Associate AD/External Affairs

Herb Vincent serves in the dual position of Senior Associate Athletic Director for External Affairs in the athletic department and Associate Vice Chancellor for University Relations. He was appointed Senior Associate AD in May of 2006 and assumed the additional duties of oversight of University Relations in August of 2009.

Vincent manages communications and serves as the primary public relations officer for the University and all its entities. In his role in athletics, he supervises the sports information office and marketing and promotions office, serves as the primary liaison with LSU Sports Properties, and is the department administrator for the sport of baseball.

Vincent was the LSU sports information director from July 1988 to July 2000. During that time he was named Assistant AD in November of 1989, and then was elevated to Associate AD for Communications in 1992.

In August of 2000 Vincent became Vice President for Communications for the College Sports Southeast regional cable network, headquartered in Birmingham, Ala., before returning to LSU in 2002.

He earned a bachelor's degree in journalism from LSU in 1983 and worked as a student assistant in the sports information office directed by CoSIDA Hall of Famer Paul Manasseh during his undergraduate years.

Bo Bahnsen

Sr. Associate AD/Compliance and Planning

Returning in 2009 to serve the department in the Compliance Office, Bahnsen is once again proving to be a very versatile member of the athletic department.

Before moving back to Compliance, Bahnsen served the previous five years, in a valuable role as Associate Athletics Director for Internal Relations, overseeing the ticket office and

all customer service operations.

Bahnsen oversees the Pete Maravich Assembly Center and game management for all sports except football.

Prior to December of 2003, Bahnsen's primary responsibility for the previous 14 years was to serve as LSU's NCAA compliance officer.

Bahnsen has been responsible for overseeing the successful implementation of LSU's Tradition Fund Program, a football-seating plan that requires contributions for the right to purchase approximately 45,000 seats in Tiger Stadium. In 2009, he helped organize the highly successful LSU celebration of the 100th anniversary of the Men's Basketball Program.

A native of Wharton, Texas, Bahnsen attended Wharton County Junior College for two years before transferring to LSU in 1979. He earned his Bachelor of Science degree in physical education.

Bahnsen, 50, is married to the former Karen Mayson, a former LSU golfer and current head coach of the Lady Tigers golf program. The couple has two children, Darren and Devin.



Eddie Nunez

Sr. Associate AD/Operations, Internal Affairs & Development

Eddie Nunez joined the Athletics Department in October 2003 as the Director of Game and Event Management and was promoted to Associate Athletics Director for Operations and Project Development in June of 2007.

Nunez's responsibilities include oversight of the men's basketball program, men's tennis program and the women's

tennis program. He supervises the Game/Event Management department as well as directs all capital project for the athletic department. Under his guidance, the athletic department has experienced over \$180 million dollars in renovations and construction of athletic facility projects. Assistant AD/Marketing

Craig Pintens is in his second year at LSU and serves as the Assistant Athletic Director of Marketing. While at Marquette, Pintens established attendance and revenue records in both men's and women's basketball ranking in the top ten nationally in men's basketball attendance.

SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE



The Southeastern Conference continues to flourish as a solid and competitive league in women's collegiate volleyball.

In the last two decades, the SEC has made stellar contributions in volleyball. The conference has sent at least two SEC teams to the NCAA Tournament in every season the last 20 years. The SEC had a team reach the Final Four seven of the 10 seasons in the '90s with the league having a team advance to the regional final nine of those 10 seasons. Since 2000, the SEC has had a team reach the Final Four three times and regional final four times.

In 2009, the LSU Tigers won the SEC title, their fifth in program history, first since 1991. The win by LSU snapped an 18-year reign of the Florida Gators.

The SEC sent four teams to the NCAA Tournament: Florida, Kentucky, LSU and Tennessee. Kentucky and Tennessee both advanced to the Regional rounds.

Since the inaugural SEC volleyball championship in 1979-80, many changes have occurred in the conference with volleyball. The addition of Arkansas and South Carolina to the league in 1991 brought the divisional format to the sport with five teams competing in the Eastern Division and six teams in the Western Division.

In 2009, the SEC entered into an unprecedented TV agreement with ESPN that provided exclusive coverage of SEC athletics. With the arrangement, SEC volleyball is now broadcast on three different platforms: ESPNU, FS South/Southwest/Sun Sports and CSS and has more exposure than any other league. Live SEC volleyball coverage can now reach into 73 million homes nation-wide on ESPNU, and in the SEC nine-state region, 25 million homes on FS South/Southwest/Sun Sports, and 11 million homes on CSS.

SEC VOLLEYBALL: SETTING THE STANDARD FOR INTERCOLLEGIATE ATHLETICS IN VOLLEYBALL.

- LSU won its fifth SEC regular season championship in 2009 to end Florida's 18-year run at the top of the league. The Tigers also took home the Western Division crown for the fifth consecutive season, with Kentucky earning its first Eastern Division championship.

- The 2009 season marked the sixth consecutive time in which the SEC at least four teams in the NCAA Tournament.

- Brittnee Cooper became the first SEC player since 2006 to garner AVCA All-America First-Team accolades. She, along with Sam Dabbs and Marina Skender, were three of 11 SEC athletes to garner AVCA All-America status.



The 2009-10 athletic year saw LSU claim a pair of SEC regular championships. Volleyball won its first SEC title since 1991 and the women's outdoor track and field team was crowned SEC champions for the 11th time in program history. Baseball followed up a national championship with a third straight SEC Tournament title, becoming the first school in league history to achieve that feat. Gymnast Susan Jackson received the highest individual honor as she was named SEC Female Athlete of the Year after winning two individual national championships.

In a time when subsidies for college athletics across the country are reaching an all-time high, a report published by USA Today in January 2010 indicated that LSU and Nebraska are the only two athletic departments in the nation that receive no subsidies.

Did You Know?

LSU is the only school in SEC history to pull a "triple-double" -- winning double-figure conference titles in the sports of football, men's basketball and baseball. The Tigers have claimed 10 football titles, 10 men's basketball championships and a league-leading 14 baseball titles.

Associate Athletic Director/Sports Information

Michael Bonnette enters his 11th year as LSU's Sports Information Director and fourth as an Associate Athletic Director after being promoted to his current position in April of 2007. Bonnette was originally elevated to Sports Information Director in August of 2000 and then promoted to Assistant Athletic Director in July of 2004. As Sports Information Director, Bonnette serves as the chief contact for LSU's nationally-ranked football team as well as overseeing all publicity activities for the 20 sports sponsored by the Athletic Department.

Bonnette, who is a 1993 graduate of LSU, is past president of SIDS for the Southeastern Conference and is currently the vice-president for SIDs for the Louisiana Sports Writers Association. Bill Franques

Senior Associate SID

Bill Franques works as the baseball program's media relations director, and he serves as managing editor of LSU's football, men's basketball and baseball GAMEDAY publications.

The LSU baseball media guide, written and edited by Franques, has twice been named best in the nation by the College Sports Information Directors of America. Associate SID
