1 U.S. Olympic Team Member

Rose Magers represented the Tigers on the international stage as the United States won silver in the Games of the XXIII Olympiad played in Los Angeles.

2 NCAA Final Four Appearances

LSU is one of only two schools in SEC history with multiple Final Four appearances. The Tigers went to back-to-back Final Fours in 1990 and 1991.

5 SEC Player of the Year Awards

The Tigers have notched five postseason SEC honors highlighted by Brittnee Cooper's 2009 SEC Player of the Year award. Elena Martinez reeled in 2007 and 2008 SEC Defensive Player of the Year, while Marina Skender and Desiree Elliott tallied SEC Freshman of the Year honors in 2005 and 2010, respectively.

5 SEC Regular Season Championships

LSU claimed the SEC regular season titles in 1986, 1989, 1990, 1991 and 2009. The '09 Tigers ended Florida's 18-run year at the top of the league. LSU posted undefeated marks in both 1990 and 1991 only dropping six sets during the two-year span.

5 Fifth-Set Superiority

Over the last eight seasons, LSU has won 36 of its 48 five-set matches, as the 2013 team became the third in program history to win nine five-setters in a single season, tying the 2007 and 1985 squads. The Tigers overcame a 2-1 deficit to upend No. 14 New Mexico State during the opening round of the 2007 NCAA Tournament.

7 USA Volleyball

In seven of the last eight years, LSU has been involved with various USA Volleyball programs, most notably being Regan Hood as a member of the U.S. Women's National Team at the 2014 Pan American Cup and 2013 FIVB World Grand Prix. The Tigers have also won seven medals with the prestigious USA Collegiate National Teams (Formerly known as the A2 program). Former All-Americans Brittnee Cooper and Elena Martinez won gold in 2008, while Cooper Picked up a Silver Medal in 2009. Former assistant coach Steven Loeswick added a bronze medal in 2010, followed by head coach Fran Flory's Gold medal in 2011 and Meghan Mannari's silver medal in 2012. Most recently, Helen Boyle earned gold at the Girls Junior National Championships in Minnesota.

7 SEC Western Division Titles

The Tigers have won seven of the last eight SEC Western Division crowns and are an impressive 60-9 over the last seven seasons against their division. LSU pieced together a run of 35 straight home wins over the SEC West from 2004-11.

13 All-Americans

The Tigers have 13 AVCA All-Americans in program history, fourth-most of any SEC school. Brittnee Cooper was one of 14 players to earn AVCA First-Team honors in 2009. LSU garnered a pair of AVCA All-Americans from 2007-09, the first time in program history the Tigers have had two All-Americans in three straight seasons.

14 NCAA Tournament Appearances

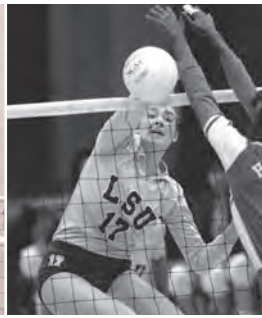
LSU has made 14 NCAA Tournament appearances, which is tied for fourth among SEC schools. The Tigers strung together six consecutive bids from 2005-10 for a program record passing up the five straight postseason bids recorded between the 1989-93 seasons.

MARAVICH CENTER

LSU volleyball heads into its 34rd season at the Pete Maravich Assembly Center in 2015. The structure, which was renamed in honor of the all-time LSU and NCAA men's basketball scoring leader on July 22, 1988, seats 13,215 and ranks as one of the finest college athletic arenas in the nation.

Over the last 10 seasons, the Tigers have racked up a dominant 90-28 (.763) mark at home sparked by a 37-3 (.925) run versus SEC Western Division opponents during the divisional format era.

LSU volleyball moved into a new state-of-the-art locker room facility off the southwest corridor starting in 2011. Decorated by numerous graphics showcasing the program's prominent history, the fully carpeted facility features locker, film, equipment and training rooms.

The auxiliary gym located underground in the north section of the arena was converted to a volleyball only practice facility leading into the 2010 season. Volleyball fans also can see a redesigned concourse with video and graphic displays, renovated concession stands and video kiosks showcasing the best of the sports that play in the building.

On July 1, 2004, the management of the Maravich Center came under the direction of the LSU Athletics Department and underwent a multi-year refurbishment. The renovations have included new television lighting, an interior makeover and new roof surface.

Prior to the 2007 season, the main arena got a new subfloor and a new playing floor. In the summer of 2008, the auxiliary practice gym also received a new floor.

The outside windows of the building now feature the

Tiger mascot running around the arena. In addition, all seats in the 100 lower level were replaced leading into the 2010-11 basketball season.

Between 1985 and 1992, the Maravich Center was one of the top home courts in the nation, as LSU ran up a 110-10 (.917) record. During that time, LSU recorded a 37-match home-court win streak which is the second-longest streak in SEC history.

In 1991, the Tigers enjoyed possibly their finest season in the arena as LSU recorded a perfect 16-0 record and advanced to the Final Four through the NCAA South Regional in Baton Rouge.

The Tigers have posted 17 consecutive seasons without a losing record in the Maravich Center under head coach Fran Flory, making it once again a tough place for visiting teams to play. Over that span, LSU has a record of 142-61 (.700), including double digit wins during four of the last nine seasons.

The Maravich Center has played host to SEC and NCAA Tournaments for volleyball, basketball and gymnastics. The 1982, 1987 and 1995 SEC Volleyball Championships were all held in the arena. The Tigers have produced a winning record in 30 of 33 seasons at the PMAC.

LSU won its final eight league home matches in 2009 highlighted by a 3-0 sweep of No. 6 Florida to clinch the program's fifth SEC championship. The Tigers also welcomed back postseason volleyball to the Maravich Center in 2009 for the first time since 1991. In total, the Maravich Center has been the site of four NCAA Championships as well as the 1991 NCAA South Regional.

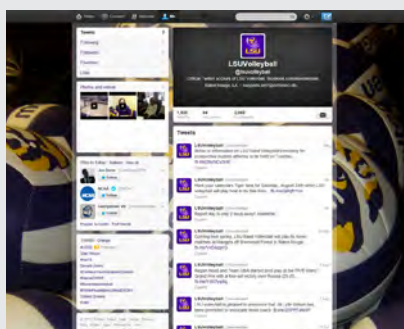
YOUTH CLINICS

MEDIA TRAINING

Karam and White record the mock interviews on camera and then provide feedback, allowing student-athletes to become more comfortable and confident when doing actual interviews.

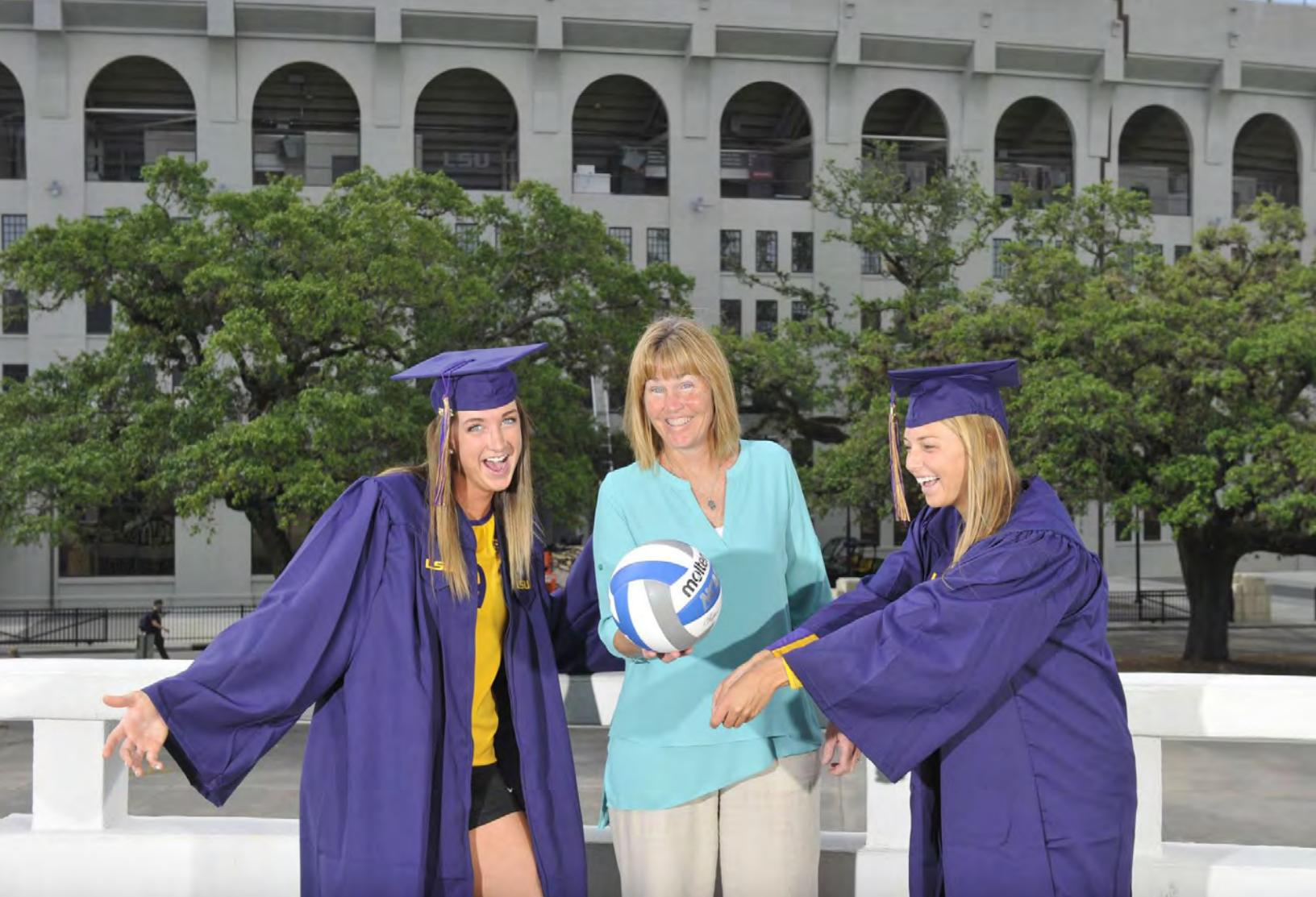


SEC ON ESPN & SEC NETWORK

In 2009-10, ESPN and the Southeastern Conference reached a milestone 15-year agreement. ESPN acquired the rights as the exclusive cable home and the syndication rightsholder for the conference. In August of 2014, the launch of the SEC network opened programming into over 90 million homes to mark a new era in collegiate athletics. Between ESPNU and the SEC Network, 50 matches will be televised live, of which the Tigers will be featured nine times.

LSU's full-time athletic training staff and graduate assistants prepare the players for gameday in the comfort of the Pete Maravich Assembly center both before and after games.



LSU boasts the largest and most complete athletic training facilities in all of collegiate athletics with both the Operations Center and the Broussard Center for Athletic Training in Tiger Stadium. Both are furnished with the latest in technology and equipment. The Operations Center training room features a full view of the practice fields, two hot/cold jacuzzis and an underwater treadmill. The Broussard Center includes an on-site x-ray room, an in-house pharmacy and a hydrotherapy pool. It is also one

of the few collegiate training centers with a full-service pharmacy, vision center and dental center.



NUTRITION FIRST

LSU is one of the few schools nationally who maintain a state-of-the-art nutritional program for today's student-athlete. Athletic trainers coordinate with LSU dining services to provide a balanced training table diet. LSU athletic trainers also meet one-on-one with student-athletes to give them expert nutritional information.

The two story, 22,000 square foot facility contains 20 treatment tables with the newest forms of modalities available, 14 taping stations, a 1,600 square foot rehabilitation area which contains the latest rehabilitation equipment including the Cybex Norm, Woodway treadmills and Body Master select rise equipment. LSU's multi-million dollar athletic training facility is named in honor of Dr. Martin J. Broussard (left), the legendary athletic trainer whose career spanned over 40 years at LSU.

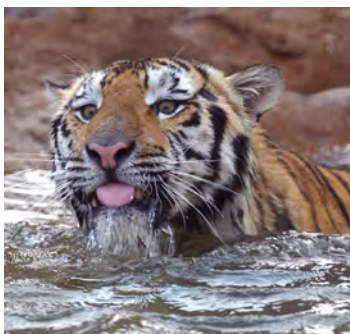

STRENGTH & CONDITIONING

The Operations Center houses one of the most complete strength training facilities in the nation. Ranked No. 2 in the nation in a July 2010 poll by ESPN.com, the weight room area includes 16 multi-purpose platform, bench, incline, squat and Olympic lifting stations. It features more than 10,000 square feet of training space and more than 30,000 pounds of weights and equipment.





On the Prowl

Mike the Tiger was recently ranked in the top three in a Bleacher Report poll of college football's top live mascots. Mike's habitat is one of the most visited attractions in the state of Louisiana located in the shadows of the north endzone of Tiger Stadium.



MIKE THE TIGER

History of Mike

Few mascots in the country are as admired as Mike the Tiger. LSU's live Bengal mascot serves as the graphic image of all LSU athletic teams. The school has had six mascots, with the most recent, Mike VI, taking over the reign prior to the 2007 national championship football season. LSU veterinarian Dr. David Baker began the search for the young tiger after his predecessor, Mike V, died in May 2007 of renal failure at the age of 17. The nine-year-old Bengal/Siberian mix, formerly known as "Roscoe," was donated to LSU by Great Cats of Indiana in Idaville, Ind., a nonprofit sanctuary and rescue facility for big cats and other large carnivores.

Mike's ride through Tiger Stadium before home games in a travel trailer topped by the LSU cheerleaders is a school tradition. Before entering the stadium, his trailer on wheels is parked next to the opponent's locker room in the southeast end of the stadium. Opposing players must make their way past Mike's trailer to reach their locker room.

Tradition dictates that the Tigers will score a touchdown for every growl issued by Mike before a football game. For many years, Mike was prompted to roar by pounding on the cage. Objections of cruel punishment brought about the use of recorded growls

to play to the crowd before the games. That practice was discontinued shortly afterward and today Mike participates in the pregame tradition without provocation.

In the mid-1980's, pranksters cut the locks on Mike IV's cage and freed him in the early-morning hours just days before the annual LSU-Tulane clash. Mike roamed free, playfully knocking down several small pine trees in the area, before being trapped in the Bernie Moore Track Stadium where police used tranquilizer guns to capture and return the Bengal Tiger to his home.

The incident was reminiscent of a kidnapping of Mike I many years ago by Tulane students before a Tiger-Green Wave battle.



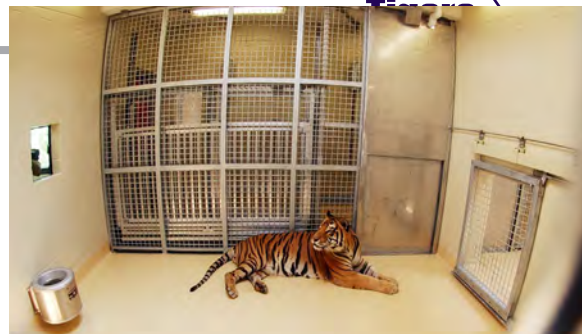

1936-1956

Mike I

The original Mike was purchased from the Little Rock Zoo in 1936 for \$750, with money contributed by the student body. Originally known as "Sheik" at the time of his purchase, his name was changed to Mike to honor Mike Chambers who served as LSU's athletic trainer when the first mascot was purchased. The first Mike was housed in the Baton Rouge Zoo for one year before a permanent home was constructed near Tiger Stadium. Mike I reigned for 20 years before dying of pneumonia.



Mike's Habitat

In 2005, a new environment (above) was created for Mike that is 15,000 square feet in size with lush planting, a large live oak tree, a beautiful waterfall and a stream evolving from a rocky backdrop overflowing with plants and trees. The habitat has, as a backdrop, an Italianate tower - a campanile - that creates a visual bridge to the Italianate architectural vernacular that is the underpinning of the image of the entire beautiful LSU campus. This spectacular habitat features state-of-the-art technologies, research, conservation and husbandry programs, as well as educational, interpretive and recreational activities. It is, in essence, one of the largest and finest Tiger habitats in the United States.



Sneaux Day

On Dec. 11, 2008, a winter storm blanketed Baton Rouge that hadn't been seen in decades. The early white Christmas gave Mike VI, LSU's live Bengal/Siberian tiger, a chance to relax and play in nearly two inches of accumulation.



1956-1958

Mike II

The second Mike served a brief reign, lasting only through the 1957 season before dying of pneumonia in the spring of 1958. He was born at the Audubon Zoo in New Orleans and came to LSU on Sept. 28, 1956. The young tiger was held overnight in Tiger Stadium and unveiled Sept. 29, the opening day of the football season.



1958-1976

Mike III

Just in time for the 1958 national championship season, Mike III was purchased from the Woodland Park Zoo in Seattle, Wash., following a "national search" by then-athletic director Jim Corbett. The student body contributed \$1,500 for the purchase of the tiger. Mike III served as mascot for 18 seasons, dying after the only losing season of his reign, as LSU posted a 5-6 record in 1975.



1976-1990

Mike IV

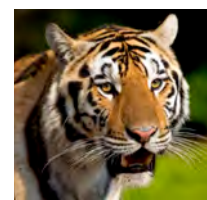
Mike IV reigned over Tiger athletics for 14 years after being donated to the school by August A. Busch III from the Dark Continent Amusement Park in Tampa, Fla. on Aug. 29, 1976. Born on May 15, 1974, Mike's age and health were determining factors in his retirement to the Baton Rouge Zoo in 1990. Mike IV died of old age in March of 1995 at the age of 21.



1990-2007

Mike V

Mike V was donated by Dr. Thomas and Caroline Atchison of the Animal House Zoological Park in Moulton, Ala. Dr. Sheldon Bivin of the LSU School of Veterinary Medicine traveled to Alabama and brought the baby tiger back to Baton Rouge. Born Oct. 18, 1989, the new tiger was introduced to LSU fans at a basketball game against Alabama in February of 1990. He officially began his reign on April 30, 1990, when he was moved into the tiger habitat across from Tiger Stadium. Mike V died on May 18, 2007, at the age of 17.



2007-present

Mike VI

Mike VI arrived in Baton Rouge on Aug. 25, 2007, thanks to the donation by Great Cats of Indiana. He was officially designated as the successor to Mike V on Sept. 8, when LSU played host to Virginia Tech. Six days later, on Sept. 14, 2007, a ceremony was held to honor Mike V and dedicate the habitat to Mike VI. The nine-year-old Bengal/Siberian mix, formerly known as "Roscoe," reigned over a football national title in his first year and most recently, a 2011 Southeastern Conference championship and perfect regular season.

GREATS

The following nine individuals are the only athletes to have their jerseys retired by LSU. Men's basketball has retired the No. 23 for Pete Maravich, No. 50 for Bob Pettit, Jr., No. 33 for Shaquille O'Neal and No. 40 for Rudy Macklin. Women's basketball retired the No. 33 for Seimone Augustus. Football's only two retired jerseys are the No. 20 worn by Billy Cannon and the No. 37 worn by Tommy Casanova. Baseball retired the No. 15 in honor of longtime coach and former athletics director Skip Bertman and the No. 19 for Ben McDonald. Casanova, Macklin and McDonald joined the prestigious list in May 2009. Augustus became the first woman in LSU Athletics history to have her jersey retired in January 2010.



50 Bob Pettit

Pettit led LSU to its first NCAA Final Four in 1953 and he later became the first player in NBA history to exceed the 20,000-plus point barrier. Pettit is a member of the NBA Hall of Fame, and in 1997, he was named as one of the top 50 players in NBA history.



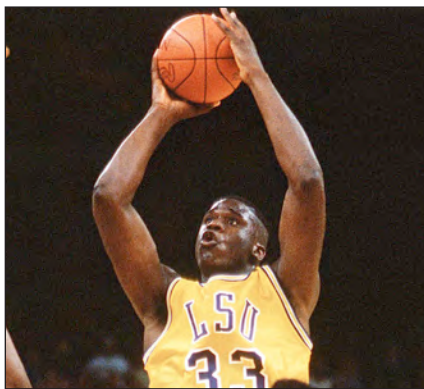
23 Pete Maravich

"Pistol Pete," Maravich still holds the NCAA record for career points with 3,667 and for career scoring average with 44.2 points a game. He was selected the National Player of the Year in 1970 after leading the Tigers to the NIT Final Four. He scored 50-plus points an amazing 28 times. He went on to a 10-year professional career and was selected as one of the NBA's 50 greatest players in 1997.



20 Billy Cannon

One of the true legends of college football in the South, Billy Cannon was the 1959 Heisman Trophy winner and helped the Tigers to the 1958 national title. Cannon's most memorable performance came in 1959 against Ole Miss when No. 1 LSU trailed No. 3 Ole Miss 3-0 in the fourth quarter. He fielded a punt, broke seven tackles and returned it 89 yards for the 7-3 victory. He went on to a successful 11-year professional career.



33 Shaquille O'Neal

Shaquille O'Neal was the first pick in the 1992 NBA Draft. He was named MVP of the league in 2000 and was a three-time NBA Finals MVP after leading the Los Angeles Lakers to three World Championships. At LSU, O'Neal averaged 21.6 points and 13.6 rebounds for his career, and in 1991, he was named the World's Amateur Athlete of the Year as well as SEC Athlete of the Year and National Player of the Year. In 1997, he was named as one of the top 50 players in NBA history.



15 Skip Bertman

A legend in the college baseball ranks, Skip Bertman created a dynasty at LSU, guiding the Tigers to five national titles in a 10-year stretch from 1991-2000. He also coached the United States to a bronze medal at the 1996 Olympics in Atlanta and was an assistant on the gold medal-winning U.S. squad in Seoul, Korea, in 1988. Bertman retired from coaching following the 2001 season and served as LSU's athletics director for seven years. Bertman was inducted into the College Baseball Hall of Fame in 2006.



40 Rudy Macklin

Rudy Macklin was a two-time basketball All-American selection during his Tiger career from 1976-81 during which time he became LSU's all-time leading rebounder with 1,276 boards and the second-leading scorer in school history behind only the legendary Pete Maravich with 2,080 points. He led the Tigers to two Elite Eight appearances and the 1981 Final Four in Philadelphia. He still holds the school single game rebound record with 32, a mark like some of the great records in any sport that may never be broken.

About LSU Retired Jerseys

The retirement of the jerseys of Casanova, McDonald, Macklin and Augustus comes under a new provision of the LSU jersey retirement bylaws that says the retirement of an athlete's jersey in a particular sport does not preclude a current student-athlete in that sport from wearing the jersey number in that or any other sport, subject to the discretion of the head coach. This provision applies only to jerseys retired after January 1, 2007, so the numbers worn by Maravich, Pettit, O'Neal, Cannon and Bertman may never again be worn by future student-athletes in their respective sports. To have a jersey retired at LSU, an athlete must have completed intercollegiate competition for LSU a minimum of five years prior to nomination. Athletes must have demonstrated truly unusual and outstanding accomplishments, exceeding and in addition to all criteria used for Hall of Fame selection. Nominees must have a unanimous vote of support from the Hall of Fame committee.



37 Tommy Casanova

Tommy Casanova is the only three-time All-American in the history of LSU football and is a member of the College Football Hall of Fame. During his Tiger career from 1969-71, Casanova personified versatility for his myriad of talents as he played offense, defense, returned punts and kickoffs. One of just two three-time All-SEC performers at LSU, he played six seasons with the Cincinnati Bengals of the NFL while earning his medical degree.



19 Ben McDonald

Ben McDonald won the prestigious Golden Spikes Award, given annually to the nation's most outstanding player, in 1989 and is a member of the College Baseball Hall of Fame. He led LSU to two College World Series appearances. In 1989, McDonald was named National Player of the Year by Baseball America, The Sporting News and Collegiate Baseball. He was selected by the Baltimore Orioles as the No. 1 pick in the major league draft in 1989 and went on to enjoy a 10-year major league career with the Orioles and the Milwaukee Brewers.



33 Seimone Augustus

Seimone Augustus is the only women's basketball player in school history to earn State Farm Coaches Association All-America honors three times: 2004, 2005 and 2006. Augustus became LSU's first NCAA National Player of the Year, and she claimed the honor twice in 2005 and 2006. A 2006 graduate of LSU, Augustus was the 2012 WNBA Finals MVP after winning a world title. She also led the United States to Olympic gold medals at the 2008 Beijing and 2012 London Games.

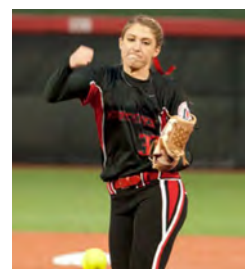

Shaquille O'Neal

A four-time NBA champion and 15-time All-Star, Shaquille O'Neal was one of the most dominant centers in NBA history. He announced his retirement from the NBA in June 2010 after a brilliant Hall of Fame career and has since become a television analyst on TNT. One of the most quotable figures on the planet, O'Neal earned his bachelor's degree from LSU in December 2000. In 2011, he penned his own biography, "Shaq Uncut, My Story," and then received his doctorate degree from Florida's Barry University in May 2012.

Lolo Jones

A three-time national champion hurdler at LSU, Lolo Jones continues to take the sporting world by storm. Jones became an inspirational figure as a two-time World Indoor Champion and the world record holder in the 60-meter hurdles with a time of 7.72. She competed in both the 2008 Beijing and 2012 London Olympic Games and became the first LSU athlete to ever grace the cover of Time Magazine in July 2012. A 2005 graduate of LSU, Jones is now a two-sport star. She was named to the U.S. National Bobsled Team that went on to claim gold at the 2013 FIBT World Championships and compete at the 2014 Winter Olympics.

Eduardo Aguirre, Jr.

Named the first Director of U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) for the Department of Homeland Security in 2003, Aguirre, Jr., was the U.S. Ambassador to Spain from 2005 until 2009.



Seimone Augustus

A two-time NCAA Women's Basketball National Player of the Year, Augustus graduated from LSU in 2006. She is a two-time U.S. Olympic gold medalist and continues an All-Star pro career with the WNBA's Minnesota Lynx. She was named WNBA Finals MVP in 2012 after winning a WNBA title.



James Carville

Carville received both a bachelor's degree and law degree from LSU and gained fame in the 1990s as the chief campaign strategist for Bill Clinton and Al Gore. Carville also penned a best-selling memoir titled "All's Fair: Love, War and Running for President."



Lod Cook

Cook graduated from LSU with a bachelor's degree in mathematics in 1955 and then earned his Master's degree in petro engineering in 1955. Cook served as CEO of ARCO for nine years.



Carlos Roberto Flores

The president of Honduras from 1998-2002, Flores helped the nation recover after Hurricane Mitch devastated the country in 1998. Flores is married to the former Mary Carol Flake, also an alumnus of LSU.



Jim Flores

Flores graduated with two bachelor's of science degrees; one in corporate finance in 1981 and the second in petroleum land management in 1982. Flores serves as both chairman and CEO of Flores and Rucks, Inc., a publicly held independent oil and gas company.

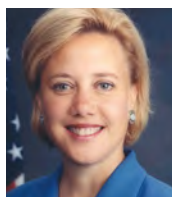
Sylvia Fowles

Dr. F. King Alexander

President/Chancellor

LSU

Dr. F. King Alexander is the president and chancellor of Louisiana State University, which has an annual budget of \$3.4 billion and more than 54,000 students. He was appointed to the position by the LSU Board of Supervisors in March 2013 and assumed the position on July 1.

Prior to being named the LSU president, Dr. Alexander was president of California State University, Long Beach (2006-2013) one of the nation's largest public universities located in southern California.

During his more than seven-year tenure at California State University, Long Beach, Dr. Alexander was twice named the California State University Student Association (CSSA) "President of the Year," which represents all 23 California State Universities and its over 440,000 students.

Prior to becoming president of California State University, Long Beach, Dr. Alexander was president of Murray State University in Kentucky (2001-2005) and was a faculty member at the University of Illinois, Champaign-Urbana, where he was the director of the graduate higher education program.

A Kentucky native who grew up in north Florida, Dr. Alexander received his Ph.D. from the University of Wisconsin-Madison in higher education administration with a focus on finance and educational policy analysis, and a Master of Science degree from the University of Oxford, Oxford, England in comparative educational studies.

As a teacher and administrator, Dr. Alexander has received many honors, including the University of Wisconsin-Madison School of Education Alumni

Achievement Award (2002) and has research university faculty affiliations at the University of Wisconsin-Madison Center for the Study of Postsecondary Education (WISCAPE) and Cornell University Higher Education Research Institute (CHERI).

Alexander is an internationally-respected expert in higher education finance and public policy and frequently publishes in national journals and for organizations in this field. He has served as a reviewer, an editorial board member, and a university instructor and faculty member, teaching courses in higher education finance, law, history and current events.

Dr. Alexander also has been asked to represent public higher education colleges and universities on numerous occasions to the United States Congress on issues of college affordability, student indebtedness, and institutional efficiency and effectiveness in efforts to address many of the growing challenges facing American higher education. Due to his national recognition and involvement on higher education issues, Dr. Alexander has served on numerous U.S. higher education and statewide organizational leadership boards where he remains very active.

Dr. Bill Demastes

Faculty Athletics Representative



Dr. Bill DeMastes, a professor of English at LSU, is in his second year as Faculty Athletics Representative. Dr. Demastes earned his Ph.D. in English in 1986 from the University of Wisconsin-Madison with a Field of Study of Drama as Genre and a specialization in 20th-Century American and British Drama. He earned his masters in English in June 1979 from the University of Georgia in Athens where he specialized in 19th-Century American Literature.

At LSU, he served as Associate Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences from 2001-2004 and Director of Undergraduate Studies for the Department of English from 1999-2001 and 2010-11. He has also served as Associate

Chair of the Department of English (1998-99); Director of the Master of Arts in Liberal Arts Program (1996-2004); and Director of Graduate Studies in the Department of English (1992-94; 2006-06).

He was honored with the LSU Alumni Association Faculty Excellence Award in 2000 and in 2002 won the LSU Distinguished Faculty Award. He was named in 2009 an LSU Rainmaker, which is given to the top 100 LSU Faculty. In 2010 he received the Tiger Athletic Foundation Undergraduate Teaching Award and in the summer of 2011 was named the Harry Ransom Summer Fellowship recipient by the University of Texas.



Joe Alleva

LSU Vice Chancellor/Director of Athletics



Joe Alleva continues to bring unprecedented national recognition to LSU as Vice Chancellor and Director of Athletics. Under Alleva's leadership, LSU enjoys one of the country's premier athletics programs with success on and off the field of competition. Now in his sixth year at LSU, Alleva is dedicated to athletic and academic excellence, and is committed to providing the opportunities and the resources necessary for student-athletes to excel in competition, in the classroom and in the community. Alleva joined the LSU family on April 4, 2008 after a highly successful tenure as director of athletics at Duke University for 10 years. Alleva's role at LSU was further expanded in August of 2009 when vice chancellor was added to his title by the LSU Board of Supervisors. It is the first time in school history that the director of athletics has also held a vice chancellor position.

Alleva is currently serving a five-year term on the prestigious NCAA Men's Basketball Committee, reinforcing his position as one of the most respected athletic administrators in the country.

Upon his arrival at LSU, Alleva unveiled a strategic master plan for the LSU athletics program – "LSU: Thru and True" – to ensure the advancement and future of LSU Athletics as an exemplary program. The central mission of the plan is to create an environment for student-athletes to reach their ultimate potential, prepare them to be champions in life and to set out goals and values for the entire athletics program.

Alleva's vision will keep LSU among the nation's leaders in athletic facilities. He launched an aggressive fund-raising campaign to replace several hundred windows in Tiger Stadium that were in disrepair, and a new coating to the facade of the structure has given the old stadium new life. A renovated gating system on the west side of the stadium debuted in the fall of 2012 to include a plaza that celebrates LSU's football national championships and recognition walls that honor Tiger All-Americans. A new plaza will open on the north end of the stadium in the fall of 2013, further enriching the experience of visitors to the LSU campus.

A new lighting system was installed prior to last season that turns the upper archways of the north end of the stadium purple and gold and lights the iconic "LSU" on the stadium's north scoreboard. In addition, "Tiger Stadium" in 10-foot tall illuminated letters sits just below the west upper deck facing Nicholson Drive.

Also in the fall of 2012, LSU began construction on an expansion of the South End Zone of the stadium – a project that will add premium seating, general public seating and two state-of-the-art video boards – continuing an effort to augment one of the most iconic venues in all of college sports. The project will be completed in time for the start of the 2014 football season.

Under Alleva's direction, LSU's world-renowned track and field program received a state-of-the-art running surface in 2010 when a new track was installed in Bernie Moore Stadium and extensive renovations to the Tiger soccer facility were completed in the fall of 2011.

Alleva directed a major renovation to the University Club golf course that was completed in September 2010 and allows the LSU men's and women's golf teams to compete on one of the most challenging courses in the country. The renovated course helped prepare Tiger

golfers John Peterson and Austin Ernst, respectively, to win 2011 NCAA men's and women's individual championships, marking the first time both titles were claimed by players from the same school. The LSU men's team in 2013 played host to an NCAA Regional for the first time in the school's illustrious golf history.

Future plans include a new gymnastics practice facility, a new tennis complex featuring indoor and outdoor courts, and a state-of-the-art Nutrition Center for Student-Athletes, a facility that will house full-time chefs and nutritionists and provide the best dietary selections for all Fighting Tiger competitors.

LSU's prominence was evident in the final 2012-13 Learfield Sports Director's Cup standings that recognize the nation's best athletic programs, as the Tigers finished in the Top 20 for the eighth consecutive year.

The year was highlighted by another 10-win season and bowl appearance for the Fighting Tiger football team, which recorded a double-digit victory total for the sixth time in eight years. The men's basketball program was rejuvenated by first-year coach Johnny Jones, who directed the Tigers to a 19-12 mark while placing LSU back into consideration for a postseason berth. Women's basketball continued its rise under second-year coach Nikki Caldwell, who guided the Lady Tigers to LSU's first Sweet 16 berth in five years.

The 2013 Fighting Tiger baseball team established a school record for victories with 57 and earned the school's 16th College World Series appearance while capturing SEC Western Division and SEC Tournament titles. The softball squad won the SEC West and played host to an NCAA Regional in Tiger Park before record crowds. The LSU gymnastics team reached the prestigious Super Six for the third time in six seasons, and the women's track team, led by Bowerman Award winner and national sprint champion Kimberlyn Duncan, placed fourth in the final NCAA outdoor standings.

But the 2012-13 year was about more than just athletic success. Living up to Alleva's mantra of "competition, classroom, community," LSU student-athletes logged more than 4,475 hours in community service work across 20 sports through LSU's Geaux Givers program. And a total of 89 proud Tigers received their degrees from the university during LSU commencement ceremonies in December and May.

The Tigers in 2011-12 finished fourth in both the men's and women's Capital

One Cup competition that identifies athletic excellence. LSU was one of only two schools in the country – and the only one in the SEC – to rank in the top four in both categories.

Eighteen of the Tigers' 20 varsity sports participated in NCAA postseason competition in 2011-12. The year was highlighted by the football team's undefeated regular season, an SEC championship and an appearance in the BCS National Championship Game. The Lady Tiger track and field team captured the SEC championship while the LSU softball squad advanced to the Women's College World Series. The Fighting Tiger baseball team won the 2012 SEC championship, and LSU led the nation in attendance for the 17th straight season. The 2011-12 season marked the first time in school history that LSU won both the SEC title in both football and baseball in the same athletic year.

Outstanding performances of the 2010-11 athletic season included the exploits of the Fighting Tiger football squad that posted an 11-2 mark – including a Cotton Bowl victory – and finished the season ranked No. 8 in the nation. The year also featured Top 5 national finishes both indoors and outdoors by the men's and women's track and field teams.

In 2008-09, all 20 LSU sports competed in NCAA postseason play for the first time in school history and the Tiger baseball team won the national championship. LSU ranked second among Southeastern Conference teams in the Learfield Director's Cup All-Sports standings and finished in the Top 20 for the sixth year in a row.

With a strong commitment to academics, Alleva ensures that the Cox Communications Academic Center for Student-Athletes is a first-class facility that provides student-athletes the resources necessary for success in the classroom and personal development. The facility was recently enhanced by the addition of a media training center that gives student-athletes valuable assistance in improving their communications skills.

And with a strong emphasis on community service and outreach programs, the implementation under Alleva's direction of the "Geaux Givers" program fosters a relationship between the local community and LSU student-athletes, who regularly participate in philanthropic events. In addition, Alleva has bolstered the department's L-Club program to reach out and connect with former student-athletes.

Alleva oversees a staff of outstanding coaches and he has made

critical additions to LSU's coaching staff in recent years. He hired former LSU guard Johnny Jones in April 2012 to breathe new life and enthusiasm into the men's basketball program and last year added Julia Sell as the new women's tennis coach. In 2011, he lured the dynamic Nikki Caldwell to LSU to coach the Lady Tiger basketball team and then hired Beth Torina to direct the Tiger softball program, both of whom immediately returned their respective programs to NCAA postseason success.

Alleva is an innovator with bold ideas that benefit not only LSU but all of Greater Baton Rouge. He has been instrumental in the planning of the Bayou Country Superfest, a two-day country music concert and festival held in Tiger Stadium each spring. The event attracts nearly 100,000 visitors to the LSU campus and makes a tremendous economic impact upon the local community.

Alleva has served on numerous national committees throughout his career including the Football Bowl Certification Committee, the NCAA Division I Championships/Competition Cabinet and several Southeastern Conference and Atlantic Coast Conference committees.

He became director of athletics at Duke in 1998 and his impressive tenure there propelled the university into the ranks of America's top all-around collegiate programs. Among his outstanding list of accomplishments includes the greatest 10-year period in Duke Athletics, winning more ACC and NCAA championships than in any other decade in school history.

Alleva, whose hometown is Suffern, N.Y., majored in Finance at Lehigh University and received his bachelor's degree in 1975. While at Lehigh, Alleva was the quarterback of the football team and team captain in 1974. Alleva also played on the Lehigh baseball team. He served as a graduate assistant football coach and earned an MBA in 1976.

While at Duke, Alleva played a key role in Durham's community sports scene. He started Little League Baseball in Durham over 20 years ago, and also began the American Legion baseball program.

He is a member of the North Carolina American Legion Hall of Fame, Suffern High School Hall of Fame and the Rockland County Hall of Fame.

Alleva and his wife, Annie, have three children, J.D., Jeff, and Jenny. Joe and Annie recently welcomed their first grandchild, Harper, the daughter of Jenny and husband Kyle Young.



Verge Ausberry

Senior Associate AD/Operations and Administration

A former LSU football standout, Verge Ausberry joined the athletics administrative staff in August 2001 as the Associate Athletics Director for Operations. He was appointed to the position of Senior Associate Athletics Director in May 2006.

Ausberry supervises and is responsible for football, operations and football scheduling. He oversees the LSU men's and women's track and field programs, the equipment staff,

the strength and conditioning staff, the Dr. Martin Broussard training room, the video department and football game management. He also works as the athletic department's liaison with LSU's trademark licensing program.

Ausberry, from New Iberia, La., played inside linebacker for the Tigers, lettering in 1986-89. He was part of two SEC championship teams, playing on teams that went to four bowl games.

Before joining the LSU athletic administration, he was very closely involved in the athletic program, first serving for almost seven years as a member of LSU's highly regarded Academic Center for Athletes.

After leaving the Academic Center, he moved in July 1999 to the Tiger Athletic Foundation staff as part of LSU's fundraising arm.

Ausberry received his Bachelor of Science degree in education in May of 1990, his Master of Education degree in administration, supervision and certification in child welfare in May of 1992 and his specialist in higher education administration in 2004. He is presently a doctoral candidate in higher education administration at LSU. He is married to the former Cheri Morial of New Orleans and they have two boys, Austin(9) and Jaiden(8).



Bo Bahnsen

Senior Associate AD/Compliance and Planning

Returning in 2009 to serve the department in the Compliance Office, Bahnsen is once again proving to be a very versatile member of the athletic department.

Before moving back to Compliance, Bahnsen served the previous five years, in a valuable role as Associate Athletics Director for Internal Relations, overseeing the ticket office and all customer service operations.

Prior to December of 2003, Bahnsen's primary responsibility for the previous 14 years was to serve as LSU's NCAA compliance officer.

Bahnsen served as manager of the LSU basketball team as an undergraduate at LSU. In 1982, he became the administrative assistant for the men's basketball team, where he worked for five years.

In July 1987, he became administrative assistant to Athletics Director Joe Dean, overseeing the purchasing office and departmental travel operations until his promotion in 1989. In 1989, he was assigned his primary responsibility as NCAA compliance officer as assistant athletics director, and then was promoted to associate AD in 1996.

Bahnsen has been responsible for overseeing the successful implementation of LSU's Tradition Fund Program, a football-seating plan that requires contributions for the right to purchase approximately 45,000 seats in Tiger Stadium. In 2009, he helped organize the highly successful LSU celebration of the 100th anniversary of the Men's Basketball Program.

A native of Wharton, Texas, Bahnsen attended Wharton County Junior College for two years before transferring to LSU in 1979. He earned his Bachelor of Science degree in physical education.

Bahnsen, 54, is married to the former Karen Mayson, a former LSU golfer and current head coach of the Lady Tigers golf program. The couple has two children, Darren and Devin.



Michael Bonnette

Senior Associate AD/Sports Information

Michael Bonnette enters his 14th year as LSU's Sports Information Director and his first as a Senior Associate Athletic Director after being promoted to his current position in August 2013. He was appointed Associate Athletic Director in April of 2007 and served in that capacity for over six years. Bonnette was originally elevated to Sports Information Director in August of 2000 and then promoted to Assistant Athletic Director in July of 2004.

As Sports Information Director, Bonnette serves as the chief contact for LSU's nationally-ranked football team as well as overseeing all publicity activities for the 20 sports sponsored by the Athletic Department. He also works as the athletic department's liaison with LSU Sports Properties on all radio, TV and Internet issues.

The 43-year-old Bonnette, who served as an Associate Sports Information Director

for seven years, is in his 20th year with the LSU Athletic Department.

His 2012 LSU Football media guide was named Best in the Nation by CoSIDA, one of several awards he has received from the organization and in the Louisiana Sports Writers Association annual writing contests.

The Lake Charles, La., native has been around the sports media relations profession his entire life as he is the son of longtime and recently retired McNeese State Sports Information Director Louis Bonnette, a member of the CoSIDA Hall of Fame. The field at Cowboy Stadium in Lake Charles bears the name Louis Bonnette Field. His brother, Matthew, continued the family tradition at McNeese by being named Sports Information Director in July 2012, following his Dad in the position.

Bonnette, who is a 1993 graduate of LSU, is past president of SIDs for the Southeastern Conference and is currently the vice-president for SIDs for the LSWA. He is married to the former Robin Arnaud of Opelousas, La., and the couple has three sons, Peyton (15), Grant (14) and Max (8).



Mark Ewing

Senior Associate AD/Business

Mark Ewing, a 29-year employee of Louisiana State University, is in his 13th year with the Athletics Department, and serves as the department's Senior Associate Athletics Director for Business and the department's Chief Financial Officer.

His duties as the department's Chief Financial Officer includes oversight of the departments over \$95 million budget, management of the athletic business office, oversight of

all travel, human resources, and purchasing. He also supervises the Athletic Ticket Office, the LSU SportShop and the Fighting Tiger Band, and he serves as the liaison for concession operations. Ronnie Haliburton

Senior Associate AD/Athletic Facility Management

Ronnie Haliburton, who served as director of facility services in the LSU Athletics Department for three years, was promoted to Associate Athletics Director for Athletic Facility Management in March 2007.

Eddie Nuñez joined the Athletics Department in October 2003 as the Director of Game and Event Management and was promoted to Associate Athletics Director for Operations and Project Development in June of 2007 and Senior Associate Athletic Director in 2009. Nuñez has 13 years of experience working in intercollegiate athletics.

As a member of the Senior Management Team, Nuñez's responsibilities include assisting in the oversight of day to day operations of the athletic

department and serves as the program administrator for men's basketball program and men's and women's tennis programs. He also supervises the Marketing department and the Event Management department, and he directs all capital projects for the Athletic Department and Tiger Athletic Foundation. Under his guidance, the athletic department has experienced over \$300 million dollars in renovations and construction of athletic facility projects. Nuñez also serves as the Athletic Department's liaison with the Tiger Athletic Foundation as well as assist in fundraising/development. Senior Associate AD/Senior Woman Administrator

Former LSU women's basketball player Miriam Segar has been a part of the athletics administration since June of 1995 and was most recently named Senior Associate AD and the department's Senior Woman Administrator after having served as Associate Athletics Director for Student Services since April 2007. She had served as Assistant Athletics Director since 2004.

Brian Broussard

Associate AD/Ticket Sale and Operations

A 17-year veteran of the Athletics Department, including 13 years as ticket manager, Brian Broussard was promoted to Assistant Athletics Director for Ticket Operations in July 2007 and Associate AD in 2012.

Broussard is responsible for revenue in excess of \$50 million, which includes the management of ticket and parking sales and renewals for all sports, as well as Tradition Fund donations for

football, men's basketball and baseball.

Associate AD/Facility and Project Development

Emmett David joined the LSU Athletics Department in 2012 after serving as Director of the Office of Planning Design and Construction at LSU since June of 1996.

He will assist in facility and project development for the athletics department including the new South Stadium addition

and future projects for such sports as tennis and gymnastics.

Among his responsibilities for the University was to serve as facility officer for Doctoral I Research Institution consisting of 11.2 million gross square feet with 250 primary buildings. He also was responsible for the 5-year Capital Outlay project planning of some \$484 million, deferred maintenance reporting and funding; and, ADA and Life Safety Code deficiency projects, budgets and tracking of expenditures of some \$200 million. Assistant AD/Fiscal Operations

Previously, Shanklin served 20 years as the Associate Athletic Director of Marketing and Licensing at the University of Arkansas.

Shanklin supervises all operations and client services for LSU Sports Properties, while also managing the LSU Marketing efforts. Since joining LSU, he has implemented several new

initiatives including the Bengal Brigade Street team and the new Band pre-game presentation for men's basketball.

While at Arkansas, Shanklin was in charge of all department marketing/promotions, corporate sponsorships, advertising sales and coordinated all sales and programming for the football, basketball and baseball video boards. He was instrumental in developing the HogPen, a tailgating area for fans inside Baum Stadium, the Hog Spa hot tub area at Baum Stadium and the RBI Girls. Shanklin was instrumental in establishing the school's first baseball radio network in 1992, one of the nation's largest with more than 25 affiliates statewide as well as creating the first Hispanic radio network for the University of Arkansas. In 1998, Shanklin became the university's licensing coordinator and under his direction, licensing revenues increased every quarter.

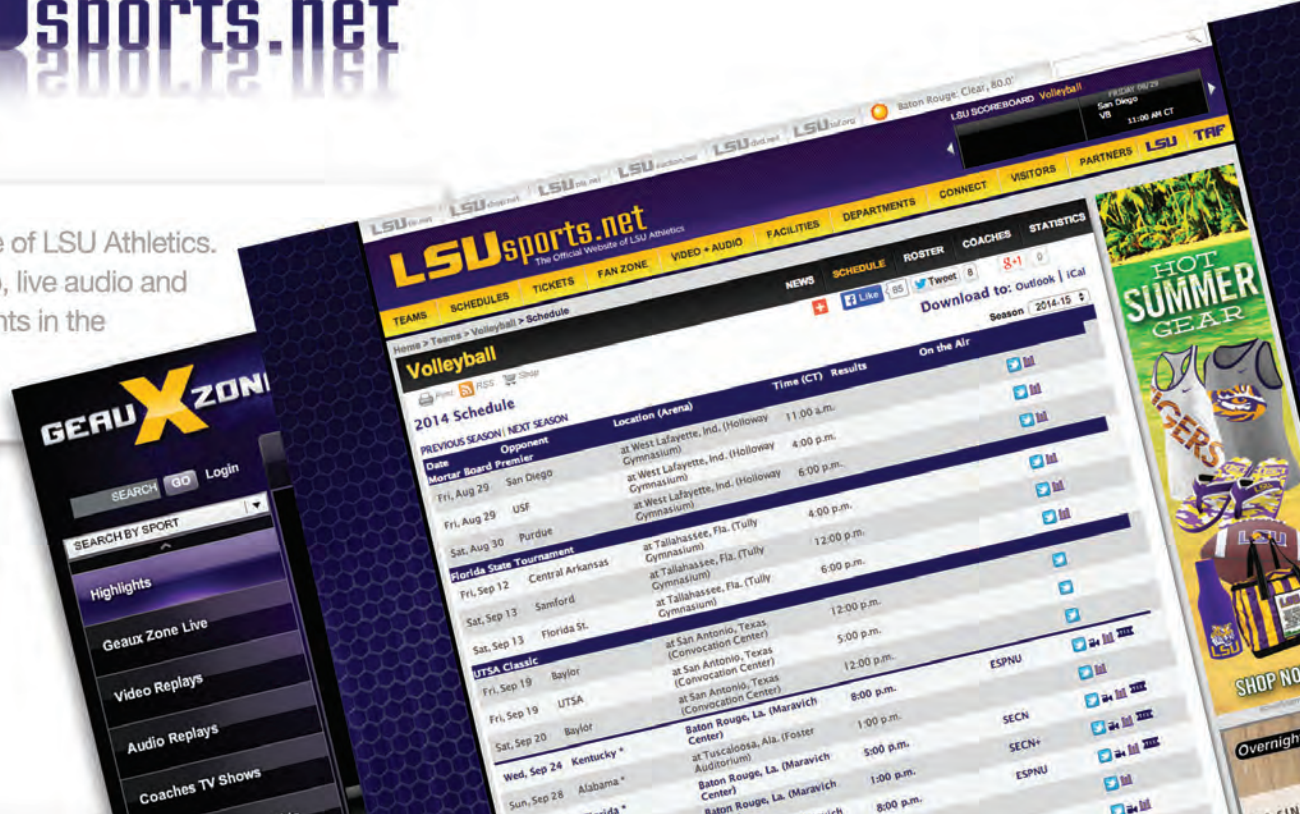
Shanklin was assistant marketing director at East Carolina University for a year before going to Arkansas. He had served as an intern at Arkansas for five months before joining the ECU staff.

A 1984 graduate of South Mecklenburg (N.C.) High School in Charlotte, N.C., where he lettered in baseball and soccer, Shanklin earned his degree in communications from North Carolina-Wilmington in 1988.

A graduate of Ohio University's highly respected sports administration program, Shanklin earned a master's degree in that program in the fall of 1989.

An avid golfer, Shanklin married the former Missy Emmerson of Jacksonville, Texas, in 2003. She has a daughter, Jordan (18) who attends LSU, and they are also the parents of Barbara Blake (8) and Isabella Grace (6).

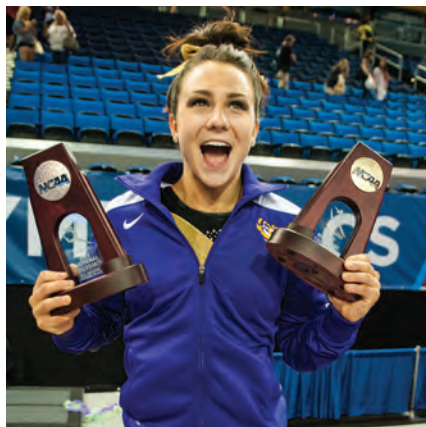

LSU Athletics Championship Legacy



In its storied athletics history, LSU has produced 47 national team championships and 124 Southeastern Conference team championships. The 2013-14 athletic year was another successful one. LSU was the first school in the history of the Southeastern Conference to play in a bowl game, have both its men's and women's basketball teams reach the NCAA Tournament and advance to the College World Series in baseball and softball in the same athletic year. Of LSU's 21 sports, 16 competed and placed in an NCAA event with the men's golf team leading the way with the program's first national title in 60 years. LSU also won Southeastern Conference titles in men's golf and baseball. In all, LSU had seven teams finish the season with a Top 10 placing nationally.

Did You Know?

In a May 2013 study by USA Today, LSU ranked in the top seven nationally of athletic department revenue generated. At a time when subsidies for college athletics increased across the country, LSU was one of seven schools to not receive subsidy money. LSU Athletics is a self-sufficient entity.

Did You Know?

LSU is only one of three schools ever in the country along with Florida and Texas (twice) to ever have its football team reach a bowl game, men's and women's basketball teams earning an NCAA Tournament berth and have its baseball and softball teams reach the College World Series in the same season.

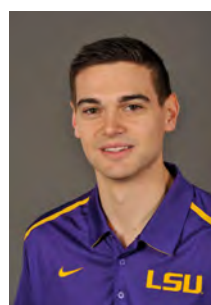

On October 3 of last year, the LSU volleyball team was two games under .500 and came off of a stretch of games against three of the top four teams the Southeastern Conference would produce for the NCAA Tournament later that season. Charged with finding a solution to the team's woes, Fran Flory - then in her 17th year at the helm - took a different approach with this group than previous ones, spending time in practice and on the road reading the bestselling book "The Energy Bus" to the squad.

The book, and the bonding time, proved to be the thing the team needed to break the slump and finish the season stronger than where it started, rattling off a blistering 11-straight wins during the most crucial point of the season in league play to qualify for the tournament for the second consecutive year, winning a postseason game to boot.

"Anytime you get to the NCAA Tournament you have to be satisfied with where you went, but this team was not satisfied and felt like they could have continued to play and get further," Flory said. "That was some of the things we talked about this fall, in the expectation of not only making it but going further than we've been. Last year was fun and they had a great mission, but I think this year's group is going to be much closer, more tight-knit and when you have that loyalty to each other the results can be great and that's what we're expecting out of this group."

Although the team closed the book on the 2014 season in Oregon last December, many of those same elements can be found in the 2015 version of the Tigers heading into the new year, as the themes of unity, togetherness and teamwork have been etched into the core of returning players and newcomers that hope to build upon last year's success, while creating a lasting legacy of their own which continues the storied history that is LSU volleyball.

Flory begins her 18th season as the head coach of the Tigers, molding a squad that returns 11 total letterwinners and five starters from that team from a season ago, featuring a four-member senior class of starters and a key mix of underclassmen that all saw time during stretches last year.

While the returning pieces of the team already have a leg-up with regards to continuity, the returning Tigers will be pushed harder than ever with the addition of six talented newcomers that bring varying ranges of prep success and high-level skill sets that will help round the team into form with added depth at key positions.

"When you add youth to your team I think you're always hoping that they can come in and contribute in ways that helps the team grow overall as a group," Flory said. "This group came in right away and bought into what we were doing and what we wanted to accomplish and I have no doubts that they will do whatever they can to accomplish the goals the upperclassmen set forth at the start of the year."

After two-week period of pre-season training, the Tigers will embark on its first week of in-season preparation at the end of the month as LSU will open its challenging slate with a bang participating in the American Campus Classic hosted by Texas in Austin. The 2015 schedule is 29-games filled with conference and tournament contenders from last season on the docket, with 11 non-conference clashes leading into an 18-game SEC slate in late September.

"Our schedule is certainly challenging, and we don't shy away from playing a tough schedule because at the end of the day you either play your way in, or out, of the NCAA Tournament with your first three or four weeks of the season," Flory said. "We feel like we have the right schedule, win the right matches and put ourselves in a position to help the league first and ourselves second."

UC Irvine, Rice and Texas await LSU in the opening week of the season, traveling the next week to take on Ohio, Michigan and Xavier. The Tigers will host its first tournament after a hiatus last year by bringing in Purdue and Miami, before closing out the non-conference schedule in New Mexico against LIU-Brooklyn, CSUN and the host Lobos.

Some of the most featured games by the time SEC play rolls around will feature a pair of matches against Alabama, Arkansas and Kentucky - matches that either went four sets or greater last season - while having another home contest against Florida set for the last home weekend of the year.

MIDDLE BLOCKERS

Last year the Tigers were one of the best blocking teams in the conference, and that was without one of its key returners in Khoutrni Fears who was injured in the preseason and lost for the season. The loss of Fears meant the Tigers had to shuffle some players into the position to hold steady such as senior Emily Ehrle, which proved to work as the team averaged 2.36 blocks per set.

With the return of Fears to the lineup as well as some key additions in transfer Tiara Gibson and newcomers Olivia Beyer and Brittany Welsh, the team doesn't expect too much of a drop-off in production in 2015.

Before Fears went down to injury, she was beginning to round into the form that made her one of the most coveted middles in the country out of high school, where as a sophomore she appeared in 21 matches and started 17, notching 1.86 kills and 0.85 blocks per set over her three rotations. She had at least five kills during 13 of her 21 outings, while her 0.85 blocks per set were third on the team, while her .273 hitting percentage was second on the team that season.

"Having Khoutrni back into the lineup is going to be key, and she's done a great job of rehabbing her injury and coming back from it," Flory said. "Losing her was a significant blow, and she has come back with a higher level of competitiveness and cannot wait to get back to the court."

Although making her name as a hitter, Ehrle transition to the blocking role and flourished by starting the final 19 matches of the season last year. She hit .201 on the season at the net with 35 total blocks for a .055 blocks per set average with seven on the solo end and 28 assisted. Ehrle had six matches with at least four kills and four matches with at least three, earning eight matches with at least two blocks and five matches with three.

"Emily had a great year, and what a selfless team player she was stepping into that role, a position she hadn't played since she was 14-years-old," Flory said. "She had a great Spring, training in that position in the offseason and made some huge strides in understanding that spot and how she can be effective there."

Moving into a role as both an attacker and a blocker in sophomore Kelly Esch, who made her debut last season against Central Arkansas where she played in three sets finishing with a kill and three blocks.

The first of the newcomers isn't really a newcomer at all to collegiate volleyball in Gibson, who transferred to LSU in the winter and joined the team in the spring after spending two years at South Dakota State. As a Jackrabbit, she played in every match and every set over two seasons, earning 60 starts during that stretch and over 200 sets played. As a sophomore, Gibson led SDSU in kills (236) and kills per set (2.02), while finishing second in hitting percentage (.205), points (291.5), points per set (2.49), blocks (96) and blocks per set (0.82).

One of two freshmen middles is Olivia Beyer out of Canton, Michigan. Beyer was a four-year letterwinner at Plymouth High School where she accumulated over 1,000 kills during her career with an above .350 hitting percentage and 240 blocks. Beyer was named to the all-association and all-region team three times, while being a four-time academic all-state selection.

The final piece to the group is a 6-4 Californian in Brittany Welsh, a product of Mater Dei High School. In helping lead her high school team to the regional finals of the state tournament, Welsh finished the year with 192 kills and 122 total blocks and was considered one of the top 25 teams in the nation. Welsh is no stranger to high-powered teams, as she played club for the famed Mizuno Long Beach team.

The depth at the position will make for spirited competition

throughout the season among the group, helping contain teams on the other side of the net.

OUTSIDE HITTERS/RIGHT SIDE

With four players returning that was at or above averaging 2.00 kills per set, the LSU offensive punch will see a return of consistent play in 2015, led by two senior hitters in Cati Leak and Katie Lindelow, with sophomores Gina Tillis and Mimi Eugene.

An All-SEC selection on the right side, Leak is the top kill producing player from last year's team, as the Guntersville, Alabama, native had 291 kills and averaged 2.65 kills per set as a junior. Where Leak really shined was as an all-rounder, as she finished third on the team in digs with 263 and third in service aces, earning 347.0 points which was also second on the team.

"Cati is a gamer, really thrives off of ball control and a player that has just really acquired a nice sense of presence and poise out on the court," Flory said. "With the way she's worked, you can tell she is ready to have a great senior year."

Not too far behind Leak statistically, doing so much of last season at various positions on the court, is the Louisiana native Lindelow who finished with 226 kills which was third and 282 digs which was second on the squad last year in 106 total sets played. To illustrate her prowess on both sides of the coin, she finished the season with 18 matches with seven or more kills, with nine double-digit kill matches and 23 matches with seven or more digs, with 12 double-digit dig contests.

"It seems like ever since Katie joined the team, every season it seems like she going to be the starting libero, before finding her way on the court as an outside hitter," Flory said. "She's a proven winner, a tough-nosed Louisiana kid that I expect to lead our team in a lot of ways this year."

Tillis proved to be a revelation toward the back end of the season, with no more poignant game announcing her arrival than the 26-kill performance she had in a five-set thriller against Arkansas that jump-started the LSU winning streak and proved to be the highest output for any Tiger for the rest of the season. Tillis parlayed that game into Freshman All-SEC honors, finishing eighth in the SEC and second among freshman in kills per set with a 3.08 average in SEC matches, while finishing 14th by averaging 3.36 points per set.

"What a lot of people don't know about Gina is that she played through a lot of pain last season due to her knees, but fortunately we worked with her in the offseason and is now playing pain-free for the first time in her career," Flory said. "She's one of the strongest players on the team, and we held her back for much of the spring, but she's going to be a force and I think the league recognizes that."

Eugene, a highly sought-after recruit out of high school in Texas caught fire toward the end of the season, playing in 27 matches and earned 22 starts in her first season in Purple and Gold, seeing 87 total sets of action. While being used primarily for her ball control, Eugene earned three double-doubles over the course of the final seven games of the year with kills and digs, including having five-straight games with double-digit digs.

Suffering a knee injury that cut short her final high school season, and effectively ruling her out of for her first year of college, redshirt freshman Toni Rodriguez will go into a season fully healthy for a campaign for the first time since 2012. The former metro player of the year has come back stronger and has the highest vertical on the team after workouts, poised to return to the form that made her a top prospect.

"I think Toni is going to be the surprise that nobody knew about," Flory said. "We're excited she chose LSU after everything she went through and we simply cannot wait to put her out on the floor in August."

Emily Ehrle and Kelly Esch are two returning players that could see time at those spots as well, with freshman newcomer Michelle Irvin also being added into the mix out of Austin, Texas.

Irvin was a Texas Girls Coaches Association 6A All-State selection, while also being named the district 14-6A Co-Hitter of the Year after finishing her final year with 387 kills, averaging 3.8 kills per set on a .270 hitting clip with 286 digs and 27 aces.

"In all we have some nice options at both fronts going into the new year, where we have players who can put the ball away and ones that can put up a big block as well when we need it," Flory said. "We're excited about the balance that we have all over."

SETTERS

The main engine that drives the offense will have a new face for the first time in four years after the graduation of Malorie Pardo last season, leaving the keys in part to sophomore Elly Ogle who saw some time last season in certain spots. She will be joined along with freshman Lindsay Flory and Cheyenne Wood as the primary servers this season.

Ogle played in 12 matches in her inaugural campaign at LSU, seeing action in 17 total sets as a freshman in 2014, serving up 27 assists on the year, averaging 1.59 per set. Her best game came on the road as she served up a season-high 11 assists and had six digs against Alabama.

"Elly had a tremendous spring and she's going to be a great leader for us," Flory said. "She's fearless, and I think that having that type of presence at the setter position is something that is going to be very valuable to our team and shows that she's capable of running our offense the way it needs to be run."

Wood played in 18 matches in her first season in Purple and Gold, making three starts with 56 total sets played, earning 3 digs on the season, averaging 1.12 digs per set, while serving up 10 assists and three service aces. One of her best games of the season came when she earned double figure digs for the first time with 10 against Arkansas and two assists, while playing all five sets in the win at Kentucky, with four digs and an assist.

"Cheyenne probably has the best location as a setter on the team," Flory said. "She's also a good defender, so she'll play behind Elly and we'll use her in a variety of ways as well as on the serve."

The final piece has spent most of her life in and around the program in Lindsay Flory, as she joins the team after a stellar four-year career at U-High. Led the U-High Cubs to a 133-34 overall mark during her prep tenure, an average of at least 33 wins per season, being named the Nola.com-Times Picayune All-Baton Rouge Area Small Schools Volleyball Player of the Year as well as the newspaper's preseason player of the year pick as a junior and senior.

"Lindsay adds depth and is another setter with size if something happens to Elly," Fran Flory said. "She's put in a lot of time this summer and has worked really hard to take her game to the next level."

DEFENSIVE SPECIALIST/LIBERO

The back row is fortified by the return of Haley Smith for her final season as a senior, bolstered by the return as well of Kelly Quinn, Wood and the addition and position switch of incoming freshman Katie Kampen.

A walk-on that joined the team without a scholarship and has played her way into an instrumental and vocal leadership role on the team has paid off for the Chalmette product, as Smith is just 404 digs shy of becoming the all-time leader in LSU volleyball history with over 1,100 to her credit in really two seasons of true action. She became the first player since Elena Martinez to earn back-to-back seasons with more than 500 digs, earning a team-leading 514 on the season and averaging 4.43 per set in 2014, while becoming the 11th player to earn at least 1,000 digs in a career.

Still, the competition for that different colored jersey is strong, with many stepping up to be the one to lead the last line of defense for the Tigers.

"Most would assume that Haley would start in that position but we've had a lot of spirited practices for that spot during much of the spring and the summer," Flory said.

Two of those players happen to be Cheyenne Wood and Kelly Quinn, with Quinn playing in 25 of the team's 29 matches in her first season as a Tiger, playing in 55 total sets in a reserve role. Hailing from The Woodlands, Quinn was a go-to server for the team in spots last year and over the course of the offseason joined the conversation for that libero role.

"Kelly really made some great strides defensively and is going to have a great run at that position," Flory said. "Serving is a huge key and she is our most consistent and accurate server and that adds value to her being on the court."

Coming in as one of the top players in the state in any category, Kampen joins the Tigers with a bit of a position switch. Although she could still see time as an attacker, the staff has taken note of her passing ability and has moved her into more of a defensive role potentially going forward. It's hard to overlook the numbers, however, that made her the two-time Louisiana Gatorade Volleyball Player of the Year and Miss Volleyball for the state after producing 1,983 kills, 1,501 digs, 186 service aces and 288 blocks, with a career hitting percentage of .469.

"Katie is a natural passer, and it might take a little time for her to get used to the pace of the game but that's not a problem because she will get there," Flory said. "She hasn't questioned anything we've asked her to do and those are the type of players who are successful because they understand how that helps the team reach their goals overall."

HEAD COACH

Fran Flory, the winningest coach in program history, enters her 18th season at the helm of the LSU volleyball program after leading the Tigers to eight NCAA Tournament berths in the last 10 seasons. The 2009 Southeastern Conference [SEC] and American Volleyball Coaches Association [AVCA] South Region Coach of the Year, Flory was hired as the program's fifth coach leading into the 1998 season and has returned the Tigers to national prominence during her tenure.

LSU has been nothing short of spectacular and continues to raise its level of success under Flory. The Tigers have averaged 21.4 wins per season since 2005, including the 2009 SEC championship which ended Florida's 18-year reign atop the conference and seven of eight SEC Western Division titles from 2005 to 2011. The seven straight division titles was the second-longest streak in SEC history, while the six consecutive NCAA Tournament bids from 2005-10 are a program record.

Flory has coached 10 AVCA All-South Region First-Team picks which include a pair of AVCA All-Americans from 2007-09. It marked the first time in program history that LSU recorded three straight seasons with multiple All-America selections, as Brianna Holman was the most recent All-America selection in 2014. The Tigers also have secured 41 All-SEC selections during Flory's nearly two-decade stay in Baton Rouge, as Catie Leak earned her first All-SEC nod in 2014.

Brittnee Cooper added to LSU's rich

heritage as the program's first player to collect SEC Player of the Year accolades in 2009. She also became the third player in program history to secure AVCA All-America First-Team honors joining the elite company of Monique Adams (1991) and Angie Miller (1992).

Elena Martinez picked up 2007 and 2008 SEC Defensive Player of the Year in addition to a pair of AVCA All-America Honorable Mention nods. She reeled in 1,414 career digs to rank second in program history.

LSU has been represented on the national stage as a part of USA Volleyball Women's A2 National Team during six of the last eight seasons. Flory captured a gold medal in May 2011 after leading the USA A2 Blue squad to a 7-1 record. Cooper and Martinez won gold in May 2008, Cooper added a silver medal in May 2009, former assistant coach Steve Loeswick garnered a bronze medal in May 2010 and Meghan Mannari tallied a silver medal in June 2012. Last summer, Helen Boyle won gold with the USA Blue squad at the Girls Junior National Championships in Minnesota, while Holman went on a tour of China with one of the collegiate national teams, where her side finished second overall after 10 days of competition abroad.

On the state level, LSU has dominated with 55 All-Louisiana selections highlighted by 33 First-Team honors. The five-time Louisiana Coach of the Year also has led her players to every individual state award which includes six overall players, four defensive players, four freshmen and two

newcomers of the year.

However, Flory's success at LSU hasn't been solely on the court. The Tigers have registered 118 SEC Academic Honor Roll selections, and Madie Jones was LSU's nominee for the prestigious SEC H. Boyd McWhorter Scholar-Athlete Award in April 2013.

In each of the last four seasons, LSU's senior classes have created and championed their own philanthropic projects to benefit the Baton Rouge community. The 2014 "Meals from Mike" initiative collected hundreds of pounds of food that was distributed to Baton Rouge area food banks. The "Geaux Kids" initiative collected a host of clothing and other related items for needy children, while "PAWS in the PMAC" collected close to 1,250 items ranging from food to toys that were donated to the Capital Area Animal Welfare Society in 2012. LSU donated nearly 3,000 books as part of the "Geaux Books" campaign to replenish the library at Dufrocq Elementary School following the 2011 season.

Earning their first 20-win season since 2010, the 2014 Tigers went on one of the longest winning streaks in program history in winning 11-straight contests over the course of the year, finishing third in the SEC and making it to the NCAA Tournament where they won their opening round game for the second consecutive year. LSU finished 20-9 on the year and 14-4 against league competition, finishing the season winning 14 of its last 15 matches to close

out the year.

After not making the postseason since the 2010 season, the 2013 Tigers won 10 of their first 11 contests en route to a 19-13 finish and 8-10 finish in the SEC, earning an NCAA Tournament berth that led to its first opening round win since 2009 with a thrilling, 3-2 comeback win over No. 24 Michigan. LSU has had eight players over the last two seasons join the program's illustrious 1,000-dig and 1,000-kill clubs, respectively. In total, LSU has had 16 players added to those lists going back to 2006.

LSU raced out to a program-best 13-0 start to open the 2010 season. Angela Bensend and Desiree Elliott collected All-SEC First-Team accolades to give the Tigers multiple picks on the league's premier squad for the fourth time in a five-season span. Elliott also notched SEC Freshman of the Year status as LSU racked up a 25-5 record.

LSU climbed to new heights in 2009 and claimed the SEC overall championship to close Florida's 18-year reign at the top of the conference. The Tigers finished with a 25-7 record highlighted by a program mark of 18 SEC victories and a pair of historic wins over the Gators which included the program's first triumph in UF's O'Connell Center since 1991. Cooper was joined by Sam Dabbs and Marina Skender to become the first Tiger trio to notch All-SEC First-Team honors during the same season. LSU rolled past Tulane in its NCAA opener before falling in a five-set affair to Texas A&M in the NCAA Second Round.

The 2008 Tigers overcame injuries and finished the regular season with six straight wins to collect their fourth straight divisional title. Cooper emerged as one of the top middle blockers in the nation en route to All-SEC and AVCA All-South Region First-Team along with AVCA All-America Honorable Mention accolades.

LSU compiled a stellar 25-8 campaign in 2007. The Tigers broke through with an NCAA Tournament victory, a gritty five-set triumph over New Mexico State, in its third-straight year in the postseason. Lauren DeGirolamo and Kyna

securing All-SEC First Team and Louisiana Player of the Year. She was joined by Skender to give the Tigers two All-SEC First-Team picks for the first time since 1999.

LSU's return to volleyball prominence began in 2005 as the Tigers finished 21-8 sharing its first SEC Western Division championship and garnered its first NCAA Tournament berth since 1992. After Hurricane Katrina turned the Maravich Center into the largest field hospital in the United States, LSU played its first 17 matches on the road traveling over 14,000 miles. Ivana Kuzmic became the first LSU's player to earn AVCA All-America accolades since 1992 after being named All-SEC First Team and Louisiana Player of the Year. Skender added the SEC's Freshman of the Year award.

LSU totaled a pair of second-place finishes and five third-place showings in the SEC West over Flory's first seven seasons. She made an immediate impact on the program moving LSU within a game of the .500 mark in 1998 after the Tigers went winless in SEC action the year before.

The 1999 Tigers improved to 17-15 overall as Meagan Davis

and Kelly Thompson notched All-SEC First-Team accolades. In 2000, LSU took another step forward and made a run to the SEC Tournament finals. The Tigers kept the momentum going and strung together back-to-back winning campaigns during 2001 and 2002 campaigns. It marked the program's first consecutive winning seasons since 1992-93. LSU bounced back from an 11-19 mark in 2003 and fired back with a 17-12 record during the 2004 season.

This is Flory's second stint at LSU as the Baton Rouge native served as an assistant for four seasons under the program's winningest coach, Scott Luster. She helped the Tigers accomplish unprecedented success with three SEC championships, three SEC Tournament championships and two Final Four appearances. The Tigers were the first school in SEC history to advance to the NCAA Final Four.

Flory left LSU to assume the head coaching duties at Southeastern Louisiana in 1992. In her only season with the Lions, SLU compiled a 21-13 record. She returned to the SEC as an assistant coach at Kentucky in 1993. Five months later, Flory assumed the head coaching duties when Kathy DeBoer,

who is currently the Executive Director of the AVCA, was named Associate Athletic Director.

The 1993 Wildcats stormed to a 29-4 record and advanced to the NCAA Tournament Second Round. For her efforts, Flory was named the Tachikara/AVCA Region IV Coach of the Year. She remained at Kentucky through the 1997 season.

Before entering coaching, Flory experienced a successful playing career at the University of Texas. She was a member of the Longhorns 1981 AIAW National Championship squad and was a two-time team captain. She received All-Southwest Conference Second-Team and NCAA Tournament All-South Region team in 1982.

Flory graduated from Texas in 1984 where she served as a student assistant before being named head coach at Wittenberg University in 1986. After Wittenburg, Flory was an assistant coach at Texas A&M in 1987 before joining the LSU staff as a graduate assistant in 1988.

A member of the AVCA and former chair of the NCAA Rules Committee, Flory has assisted in coordinating both the Louisiana Senior Olympic Games and the Special Olympics; hosting the 2001 Senior Olympic Games. She also is a member of the United States Volleyball Association coaching accreditation program.

Flory and her husband, Ken, live in Baton Rouge. The couple has a daughter, Lindsay (18), and a son, Nicholas (16). Lindsay is a freshman on the Tiger roster this season.

ASSOCIATE HEAD COACH

Jill Lytle Wilson moves into her third season as associate head coach and ninth overall season on the LSU volleyball staff. She will continue to serve as the program's recruiting coordinator in addition to training the team's defense.

LSU has racked up 163 victories, an average of 20.4 wins per season, during Lytle Wilson's time with the program. The Tigers have picked up six NCAA Tournament berths sparked by a three 25-win seasons in 2007, 2009 and 2010. LSU also has built on its championship legacy and secured five SEC Western Division titles highlighted by the 2009 SEC overall championship, the program's first since 1991.

The Tigers have placed four players on the American Volleyball Coaches Association (AVCA) All-South Region First Team in five of her nine seasons. Briana Holman became the first freshman in LSU history to be named the AVCA All-South Region Freshman of the Year, All-South Region Team and honorable mention All-American, as in 2014 she repeated on the all-region team and was named a first team All-American. Brittnee Cooper came away with the program's first SEC Player of the Year award in 2009. She also added to the program's storied tradition as the third AVCA All-America First-Team selection and joined the elite company of Monique Adams (1991) and Angie Miller (1992).

On the back row, Elena Martinez capped her illustrious career with back-to-back SEC Defensive Player of the Year awards accompanied by AVCA All-America Honorable Mention status in 2007 and 2008. She reeled in 1,414 career digs, second-most in program history. In total, seven players have eclipsed 1,000 career digs under Lytle Wilson's watch, including Malorie Pardo and Haley Smith in 2014.

LSU has garnered 15 All-SEC selections sparked by eight first team picks, before the debut of the 18-member All-SEC team at the dawn of the new league configuration that eliminated divisional play in 2013. Desiree Elliott, LSU's first freshman to claim All-SEC First Team since 1981, also tallied 2010 SEC Freshman of the Year. In 2009, Cooper teamed with AVCA Honorable Mention picks Sam Dabbs and Marina Skender to become the first LSU trio to notch All-SEC First-Team accolades during the same season.

The future continues to be bright for the Purple and Gold as Lytle Wilson has been instrumental in bringing in four Top 30 recruiting classes ranked by PrepVolleyball.com. In 2014, one of the members of that class in Gina Tillis was named to the Freshman All-SEC team.

LSU fired out to a program-best 13-0 to start the 2010 campaign. Angela Bensed collected All-SEC First-Team honors after leading the league for most of the season in kills per set. The Tiger offense ripped 14.35 kills per set on a .260 team hitting percentage to not only rank among the SEC leaders, but the NCAA's Top 25 in both categories.

Prior to LSU, Lytle Wilson spent one season as an assistant coach at Wake Forest. The Demon Deacons matched a school record for most ACC wins in 2006. She trained the outside and right side hitters on the court in addition to serving as team travel coordinator, recruiting assistant and camp director assistant off the court.

Lytle Wilson was an assistant coach at the University of North Carolina from 2002-2004. The Tar Heels put together a 32-4

record en route to the 2002 ACC regular season championship, its first NCAA Sweet 16 appearance and a No. 11 final national ranking during her first season. Laura Greene took home the 2002 ACC Player of the Year award and was an AVCA All-America Third-Team pick. UNC posted another 20-win season in 2003 despite losing four starters, while Molly Pyles picked up an AVCA All-America Honorable Mention selection in 2004.

Before joining the North Carolina staff, Lytle Wilson served as a graduate assistant at Tennessee-Martin in 2001. The Skyhawks compiled a 24-7 record and won the Ohio Valley Conference regular season title.

Lytle Wilson started her coaching career at LSU as a student assistant in 2001 while earning her Bachelor of Science degree in Business Administration. She was a four-year starter at outside hitter from 1997-2000 and ranked sixth in the SEC with 23 service aces during her senior campaign. LSU also appeared in the 2000 SEC Tournament finals.

One of the hardest workers on her team and considered one of the most determined players Flory has ever coached, Lytle Wilson played in 98 career matches being limited only by a torn anterior cruciate ligament in her right knee suffered 11 matches into her junior season.

A three-time member of the SEC Academic Honor Roll, Lytle Wilson also was the Tigers' representative on the women's at-large SEC Good Works Team in 1999-2000. Her good works didn't go unnoticed as Lytle Wilson was named the LSU Student-Athlete Volunteer of the Year in 2000. She served on the CHAMPS Student-Athlete Advisory Board for four years, the last year serving as president of the organization. She also was a member of the LSU tennis team in 2001.

Lytle Wilson, originally from Richmond, Texas, is the daughter of Mike Lytle and Kim Ward. She is married to Jared Wilson, and the couple lives in Baton Rouge.

ASSISTANT COACH

On Feb. 2, 2015, LSU volleyball head coach Fran Flory announced the hiring of Ethan Pheister to the role of assistant coach, bringing the former Ball State team captain to Baton Rouge after a stint as a coach at Duquesne University.

A standout athlete in the men's volleyball ranks while in college, Pheister has spent the last few years as a coaching piece in helping various teams make postseason berths, honing his skills in the Big East, Southeastern Conference and the Atlantic-10 over the course of the last five years.

"LSU is special place, this is evident with the tenure of many very successful coaches, with Fran being one of them," Pheister said. "The volleyball program here has such a fantastic reputation, not only with success on the court, but also creating an amazing family atmosphere."

Pheister, who began his duties officially on Monday, has worked with setters primarily at his other stops, drawing from the experience that made him three-time all-conference selection and two time academic all-conference pick while with the Cardinals, even being named the national player of the week by the AVCA. By the time his career was over, his 4,103 assists ranked fourth all-time at Ball State, as his 11.21 assist per set average was fifth all-time.

"Ethan will be a great addition to our staff and to our department, and he will have a huge impact in the gym," Flory said. "He is a diligent worker who will handle a wide variety of responsibilities. Our players will benefit from his passion and enthusiasm for our sport."

For the past two seasons, Pheister has helped lead the Dukes to consecutive winning seasons, as in 2013 Duquesne won the conference regular season and tournament title and the first ever NCAA tournament berth for the school. That season, he helped produce the A-10 Setter of the Year in Mary Henry, who had 1,016

for the season and 40 assists in a match 14 times.

In 2014, Duquesne hit .256 for the year, which was good enough for 35th in the nation, while leading the conference with a .281 clip against league competition.

As a volunteer assistant coach in 2012 at SEC member Arkansas, Pheister was a part of the most successful Razorback team in program history in winning 22 games that year, booking a trip to the postseason and having the highest hitting percentage in nine years at .248. He was integral in all aspects of the Razorback program, helping run practice, while organizing team footage and stats for the coaching staff.

The first stop on the coaching ladder for Pheister was at the University of Cincinnati, where in the first of two seasons with the Bearcats, his team finished the year 27-10 overall to claim the Big East Tournament Championship and making it to the second round before falling to eventual Final Four participant Florida State in Tallahassee.

That year, he helped freshman setter Caylin Mahoney earn second team All-BIG EAST honors as one of five first-year players on just two teams, while being named the BIG EAST Freshman of the Week three times and second in the league averaging 10.90 per set.

Along with his coaching stints, he also served as the camp coach at all three stops while also assisting with camps at Michigan, Kentucky, Ball State, while serving as the club coach for the Munciana Volleyball Club and High Performance Volleyball Club in Missouri.

Pheister is engaged to Jen Vilkoski.

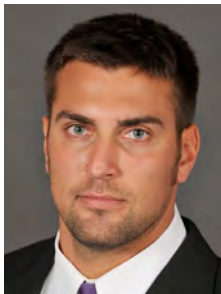

Shalini Gogawale enters her third year on the LSU volleyball staff as the Director of Operations for the indoor and beach programs. She is involved in all facets of the programs and her responsibilities include team travel, budget, travel, equipment and camps. She also serves as the program's liaison to several departments.

Gogawale joined the Tigers with five years of operations experience most recently a one-year stint with the women's lacrosse program at the University of Michigan. She was instrumental in creating and implementing many aspects of the program's operational day-to-day structure in preparation for the Wolverines inaugural 2013-14 season.

Gogawale's previous experience in volleyball came at the University of Florida during the 2010 and 2011 seasons where she was responsible for all behind-the-scenes tasks for the program which included day-to-day office operations, team travel, ordering and distribution of equipment, game day responsibilities, assisting with recruiting correspondence and NCAA compliance in regards to recruiting, and was also the liaison to the programs booster club, the Gator Attack Club. She also oversaw the volleyball budget and supervised the student manager staff and operations assistants. Beyond her duties as the director of operations, she also served as the Gators' Director of Volleyball Camp Operations, which saw over 1,500 youth participants. She was responsible for up to six camps per summer and handled logistics for all camps.

Prior to her time at Florida, Gogawale spent one year as the Assistant Director of Women's Basketball Operations at Oregon State University from 2009-10. She assisted with all operations for the Beavers, including day-to-day office operations, film exchange, video operations, team manager supervision and also served as the liaison between the marketing and women's

basketball offices.

In 2009, Gogawale got her start in operations while working with the women's basketball program at the University of California. There, she handled the day-to-day office operations and assisted with the program's recruiting database, budget, camps and special events.

Before getting her start in operations, she was an Assistant Tutorial Coordinator at Cal from 2008-2009, where she developed and monitored quiet study programs with 20 undergraduate monitors under her supervision. She also worked as a Student-Athlete Development Intern at Cal from 2007-08. In that position, she assisted student-athletes with career development and supervised over 60 student-athletes in the department's Student Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC).

From 2006-07, Gogawale served as a Diversity and Inclusion Intern for the NCAA in Indianapolis, Ind. In this role, she researched various issues about diversity in the work environment and she assisted with the planning and execution of several leadership institutes and conferences.

The Shorewood, Ill. native earned a bachelor's degree in sociology in May 2006 from Southern Illinois University, where she was a member of the Salukis' cross country and track teams. As an undergraduate, she also served as an Athletics Financial Aid Coordinator and Compliance Assistant. Upon graduation from SIU, she was awarded the NCAA Ethnic Minority Postgraduate Scholarship. Gogawale went on to earn a master's of arts degree in education from the University of California in May 2009.

Over 17 years ago the volleyball team was celebrating its 25th year of existence as a program at LSU, a program that helped the Southeastern Conference define success on a national level in a sport that soon grew to be a marquee destination for some of the best volleyball players in the world.

At the very same time, LSU entrusted the reinvention, rejuvenation and rebirth of that program to a coach who was intimately familiar with that past success, and now entering my 18th season, one that still strives to match the success of the many teams that have preceded the one that will begin another campaign in 2015.

When I was an assistant, then head coach, I was quick to relate to my student-athletes that I would be there to help them along their journey for as long as they wanted me to, but also pointing out that there was only one job in the country that I would ever leave for. And just after the completion of the 1997 season, I soon found myself in my dream job and have not stopped pinching myself since.

Going into that first year I said, "We are going to point to the future and try to build on our past tradition that we have had here," and after at 2014 season where we made it to the NCAA Tournament for the second consecutive year and won at least 20 games for the sixth time, that we have created a culture of success that we strive to maintain and cultivate on a daily basis.

In 2015, we return five starters and 10 letterwinners that helped us continue that legacy of success, led by four seniors in Emily Ehrle, Cati Leak, Katie Lindelow and Haley Smith. The depth of our team will be on full display as we look to return to full strength with Khoutrni Fears returning from injury to add to the veteran leadership, while Toni Rodriguez has worked hard

all last year and in the offseason to return to the form that made her one of the top prospects in the country coming out of high school.

When you add in those two pieces with six sophomores that all saw playing time extensively last season, a high-level transfer and an incoming class of six talented freshmen, the coaching staff and I are more excited than ever to get this season underway.

TIGERS CONTINUE POSTSEASON RUN IN 2014

After a small postseason drought over the course of a few seasons, the LSU volleyball team is beginning to get accustomed to the inevitability of continuing play in December, as the Tigers earned a second-straight berth into the NCAA Tournament in 2014, earning a trip to the second round of competition for the second consecutive year as well.

Although the year did not start according to plan, LSU made up for the lost time during conference play and finished the year 20-9 and 14-4 in the Southeastern Conference after being originally picked to finish in the second half of the preseason poll.

With three wins against teams in top 25 and 16 total wins over teams in the top 150 of the RPI, the Tigers earned a berth into the NCAA Tournament, being selected for the Eugene Regional where they opened play against Oklahoma. On a three match winning streak heading into the postseason, LSU swept the Sooners to move on to the next day of action, falling to the host Oregon Ducks in four sets to end the year.

GOING STREAKING

With a 5-4 record in non-conference action, the Tigers began conference play in an 0-3 hole to eventual NCAA tournament teams in Kentucky, Alabama and Florida. However, that tough test early gave way to a rousing comeback that saw the team win its next 11 contests, cracking the top 10 for longest tears in program history.

The streak began with a stirring comeback victory at home against Arkansas that saw the squad fight back from a 2-1 deficit to earn the victory. It wouldn't be the first, nor the last against Arkansas alone that season, as the group would go on to do the same on the road at No. 12 Kentucky and Texas A&M in five set thrillers.

LSU would assert its dominance in a few matches as well, sweeping Tennessee, Missouri and Ole Miss all on the road, halting Ole Miss' best start in program history.

In all, from October 5 until the end of the season, The Tigers won 14 of their last 15 regular season games and 15 of their last 17 overall.

FLORY NOTCHES RECORD WIN IN 2014

In nearly 20 seasons as the head coach of her hometown team, Fran Flory officially became the winningest head coach in Tiger volleyball history on Wednesday, October 22 at Ole Miss where LSU defeated the Rebels in three sets to give the coach her 309th career mark at the helm.

In earning that milestone victory, Flory passed her former boss and mentor Scott Luster who held the record after winning 308 games from 1985-1997. Flory was a staff member for two of the biggest seasons in program history, as LSU made its only two trips to the NCAA Final Four in the 1990 and 91 seasons.

"It's my dream to be here, It's my dream job and you get to do it for as long as I have, I'm thankful, privileged and humbled to be that," Flory said after the win. "That's a lot of wins by a lot of players and a lot of hard work by staff members."

Since becoming the head coach before the 1998 season, the Baton Rouge native has led LSU to six 20-wins seasons, was the SEC Western Division champion seven times, claimed the conference's regular season championship in 2009, while earning a berth in the NCAA Tournament eight times.

One of the lasting legacies for Flory has been her commitment to not only winning on the court, but also winning off of it as during her tenure she has seen more than 50 student-athletes receive their degrees from LSU, with over 100 being named to the SEC's Academic Honor Roll.



LEAK, TILLIS EARN ALL-SEC NODS

LSU's attacking duo of Cati Leak and Gina Tillis earned a pair of league accolades at the conclusion of the 2014 season, as Leak was named to the 18-member All-SEC Team for the first time in her career, while newcomer Gina Tillis was named to the SEC All-Freshman Team.

Leak averaged 2.65 kills per set, hitting .241 on the season in 110 of a possible 116 sets played during the regular season. The Guntersville, Alabama, product averaged 2.39 digs per set with 263 on the year, while producing 56 blocks and 24 service aces. Sitting eighth in the conference in career kills, the highest placing for any current LSU player, Leak was 20th in the conference in points per set averaging 3.15, as five of her nine double-doubles on the year came in SEC play.

Tillis' selection marks the second-straight year the Tigers have had at least one representative on the all-freshman team, as the Rockwall Heath High School product out of the Dallas area has 199 kills in her inaugural season for LSU, averaging 2.08 per set with a .190 hitting percentage. In conference only matches, Tillis was eighth averaging 3.08 kills per set, while sitting 14th in points with a 3.36 average.



DEFENSE IS KEY

While the offensive side of volleyball can generally dominate the headlines, the LSU defense proved to be the strongest aspect of the team throughout much of the regular season, helping aid in that 11-game streak the team went on during the year.

By the end of the season, opposing teams were hitting just .196 against LSU in matches, the third lowest mark in the Southeastern Conference during the year. The 2.36 blocks also put the team third in the league, while the 14.99 average digs per match was second.

The team was even better against league competition, holding opponents to a .177 average and averaging 2.31 blocks per set, as both of those were second only to Florida in the conference. However in league play, LSU led the conference in digs, averaging 15.38 on the year, scooping up 1,107 which was also first.

MEALS FROM MIKE COLLECTS ITEMS THROUGHOUT THE SEASON

Continuing the tradition of the LSU volleyball senior class philanthropy project, seniors Helen Boyle, Madi Mahaffey, Malorie Pardo and Laura Whalen collected non-perishable food items all season long for the "Meals from Mike" initiative.

The season-long project championed by the quartet, collected food at every home match, collecting over 200 pounds, that at the end of the year was distributed to local food banks throughout the Greater Baton Rouge area.

It was the fourth straight year that the squad has picked a charity to call its own, as 2013 saw the Desiree Elliott's "Geaux Kids" program accumulated various children's items, 2012 having the "PAWS in the PMAC" campaign raising close to 1,250 items ranging from food to toys that were donated to the Capital Area Animal Welfare Society.

In the 2011 season, the "Geaux Books" drive collected and distributed nearly 3,000 books that went into replenishing the library at Dufrocq Elementary school.



PARDO CAPS CAREER WITH STRONG SENIOR SEASON

After four years of outstanding play on the court, senior setter Malorie Pardo completed her LSU career as one of the most prolific passers in Tiger volleyball history.

As a senior in 2014, the League City, Texas, product served up 1,227 assists, averaging 10.58 per set in her swan-song send-off. She became just the second player ever to dish out at least 1,000 assists in four consecutive seasons, with the 1,399 she had in 2013 being one of the top five all time in a single year.

Pardo finished her career with 4,911 career assists in Purple & Gold, placing her second all-time in the category behind Daniela Reis. Her career average of 10.68 assists per set is fourth all-time, as her average of 10.58 last year was the second highest average she's produced since her freshman campaign of 11.71.

Pardo routinely showed her versatility throughout much of her career, but none more so than last year as she connected for a career best 93 total kills and a .312 hitting percentage, while also having 76 total blocks, including 11 solo.

While she was climbing the assist chart, she was slowly making her way up

A year after falling to Georgia in the SEC Tournament finals, LSU exacted its revenge on the Bulldogs to qualify for its first of six NCAA Tournament's under Scott Luster.

The Tigers outlasted Arizona in five games during the opening round as Detra Brown (19 kills, 13 digs), Alice Card (10 kills, 18 digs), Simone DePaula (33 assists, 15 digs), Wendy Stammer (21 kills, 13 digs) and Lisa Smith (12 digs and 13 blocks) all posted double-doubles.

LSU made a run toward the Final Four sweeping Texas-Arlington before falling to host Texas in the South Regional final.

Along the way to its second straight NCAA Tournament appearance, LSU knocked off No. 10 Texas at the Maravich Center in five sets behind a 22-kill, 22-dig performance from Monica Freitas.

The Tigers fell to SEC rival Florida for the second time in 13 days. LSU put up a valiant effort before they ran out of gas in the fifth set. Lisa Smith slapped 18 kills on a .469 hitting percentage.

LSU returned to the NCAA Tournament after a one year absence and turned the tables on Houston coming back from a 2-1 hole. Nyla Shepherd led the comeback and racked up 21 kills on a .354 hitting clip.

The Tigers headed to Austin, Texas where Texas-Arlington rallied from a two-game hole to stun LSU. Five players knocked double-figure kills for the Tigers, highlighted by 23 and 22 kills from Monique Adams and Shepherd.

Coming off its second undefeated conference championship in as many seasons, LSU cruised past Louisville behind a .337 team hitting percentage in the first round of the NCAA Tournament at the Maravich Center.

The Tigers dismissed Texas Tech 3-0 in round two as Daniela Reis set a balanced attack that featured 15 kills from Nyla Shepherd, 12 kills from Monique Adams and 10 kills from Julie Stempel.

LSU had its 1986 season end one step shy of the Final Four at Texas and were swept by the Longhorns during the 1990 regular season in Austin. Down 2-0 to the host Longhorns, LSU mounted a rally behind Adams, Shepherd and Stempel.

The trio combined for 74 of the Tigers' 91 kills and posted double-doubles as LSU fought back for a 8-15, 4-15, 15-10, 15-11, 17-15 triumph to advance to the program's first Final Four.

The Tigers fell to eventual national champion UCLA, 3-0, in the national semifinals, but the future was bright as Adams, Shepherd and Stempel would return for their senior seasons in 1991.

LSU fired out to a 12-0 record to start the 1991 season highlighted by wins over No. 11 New Mexico and No. 17 Texas before being upended at Florida to open SEC play.

The Tigers bounced back in a big way reeling off 20 consecutive victories en route to its third consecutive SEC regular season and tournament championships.

Only losing 12 games during the season, LSU entered the NCAA Tournament as a favorite to return to the Final Four and the Tigers did not disappoint shutting down Houston in the first round to advance to the South Regional, which the Tigers hosted.

After sweeping Texas Tech, LSU faced off with Florida for the fourth time in '91. Monique Adams and Daniela Reis set a program single-game marks. Adams cranked 43 kills on an amazing .507 hitting percentage, while Reis dished out 82 assists. Angie Miller (10 kills, 29 digs), Luciana Reis (12 kills, 22 digs) and Julie Stempel (11 kills, 12 digs) also tacked on double-doubles as LSU punched its second straight ticket to the Final Four.

LSU dropped a hard-fought, four-game duel with Long Beach State in the national semifinals. Until Florida in 2002, the 1991 Tigers were the only SEC squad to win a game in the Final Four.

LSU had its string of four consecutive NCAA Tournaments come to a close as 11 of the squad's 16 setbacks came against Top 20 opponents in 1993. Despite being left out of the big dance, the Tigers showed why they deserved a bid by rolling to the NIVC Championship.

LSU dropped just three games over a six-match span. Luciana Santana earned Tournament MVP honors after racking up three double-doubles and passing out 14.0 assists per game. Tiffany Miller and Luciana Reis also picked up All-Tournament accolades as the Tigers defeated Baylor in the NIVC Finals.

LSU returned to the NCAA Tournament for the first time since 1992 overcoming having to play a majority of the season on the road in the aftermath of Hurricanes Katrina and Rita.

The LSU volleyball team made it back to the NCAA Tournament for the first time since the 2010 season, winning its first round game for the first time since 2009, capping a season that began with the squad winning 13 of its first 16 matches

LSU earned an at-large bid into the NCAA Tournament and was sent to Seattle in a regional with national seed Washington, Alabama State and Michigan. LSU defeated the Wolverines in a thrilling comeback win, rallying from a two-set deficit to take the final three. The Tigers eventually fell to No. 3-seeded Washington in four sets.

The Tigers qualified for the 2014 NCAA tournament, its second-straight berth, using an 11-game winning streak during the middle of the season to finish 20-9 and third in the SEC at 14-4.

LSU earned an at-large bid to the tournament and was sent to Eugene, Oregon, for the first and second rounds along with Oregon, Oklahoma and Santa Clara. The team earned a straight-sets sweep over the Sooners to open the tournament, before falling in four to Oregon to end the year.
