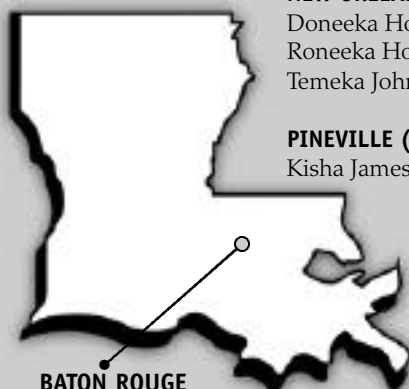

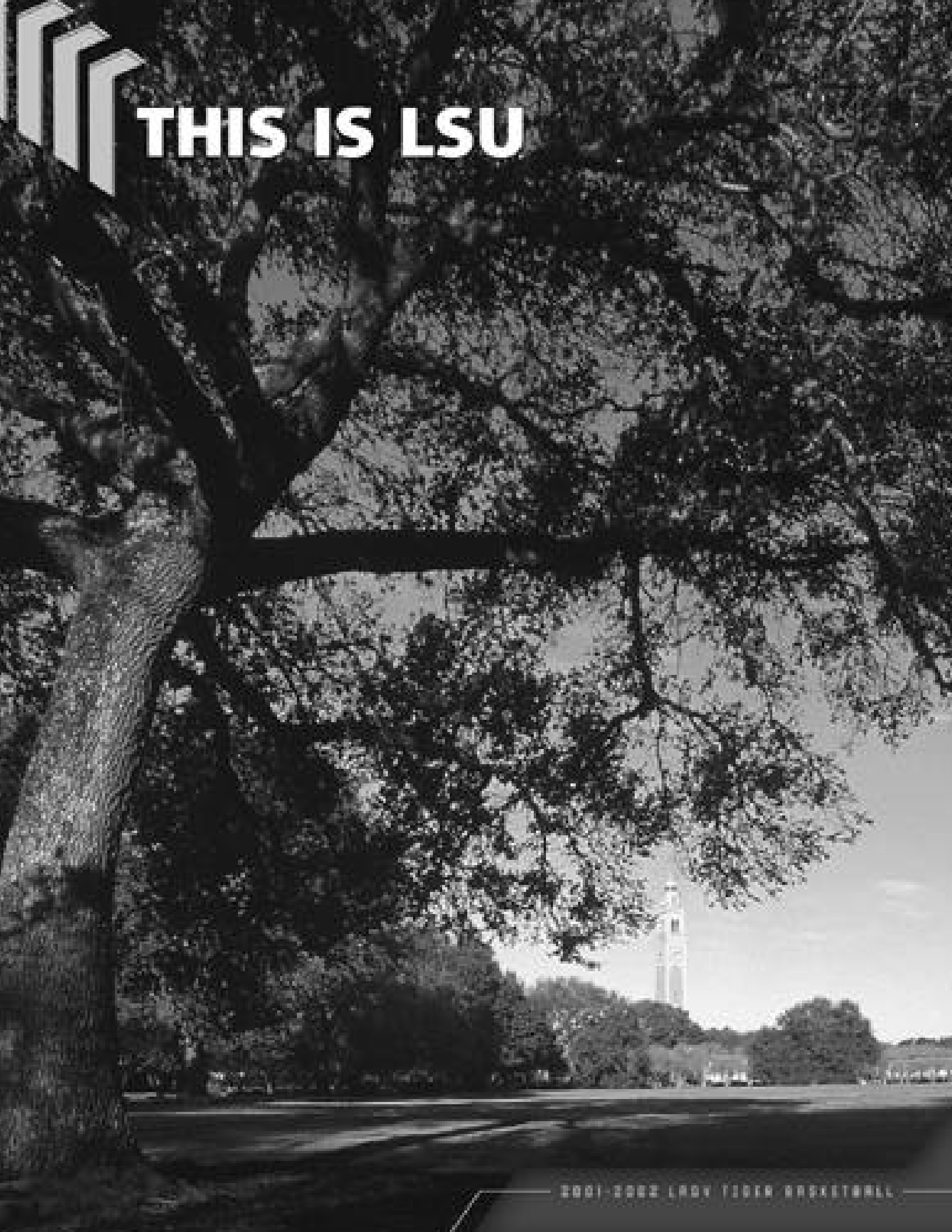

## Campus Life

Louisiana State University and Agricultural & Mechanical College has, throughout its 141-year history, served the people of Louisiana, the region, the nation, and the world through extensive multipurpose programs encompassing instruction, research, and public service. The University continuously develops programs of quality that make it one of the nation's outstanding educational institutions.

The University influences the educational, economic, social, and cultural lives of citizens throughout the state - in some way, it touches the life of every person in Louisiana.

Because of its designation as a Research University I - the top category of the Carnegie Foundation's ranking of research institutions - **LSU ranks in the top two percent of the nation's colleges and universities.** The Research I designation is shared by only 59 public and 29 private universities in the country. One of only 25 universities nationwide designated as

both a land-grant and sea-grant college, LSU is also actively pursuing space-grant status.

History and tradition began with LSU's founding in 1853 by the General Assembly of Louisiana as the Louisiana State Seminary of Learning



and Military Academy near Pineville, Louisiana. The institution opened Jan. 2, 1860. When the Civil War began, the first superintendent, William Tecumseh Sherman, resigned to assume a command in the Union Army. Fire demolished the Seminary in 1869, and the school moved to Baton Rouge.

In 1870, the Seminary was renamed Louisiana State University. In 1874, under the United States Morrill Act, the Louisiana State Agricultural & Mechanical College was established in New Orleans. The two institutions were merged by the Legislature in 1877 to become Louisiana State University and Agricultural & Mechanical College.

Construction of the present campus began in 1922, and the first classes were held in 1926. LSU experienced major growth in the 1930s and 1940s, expanding its student body,

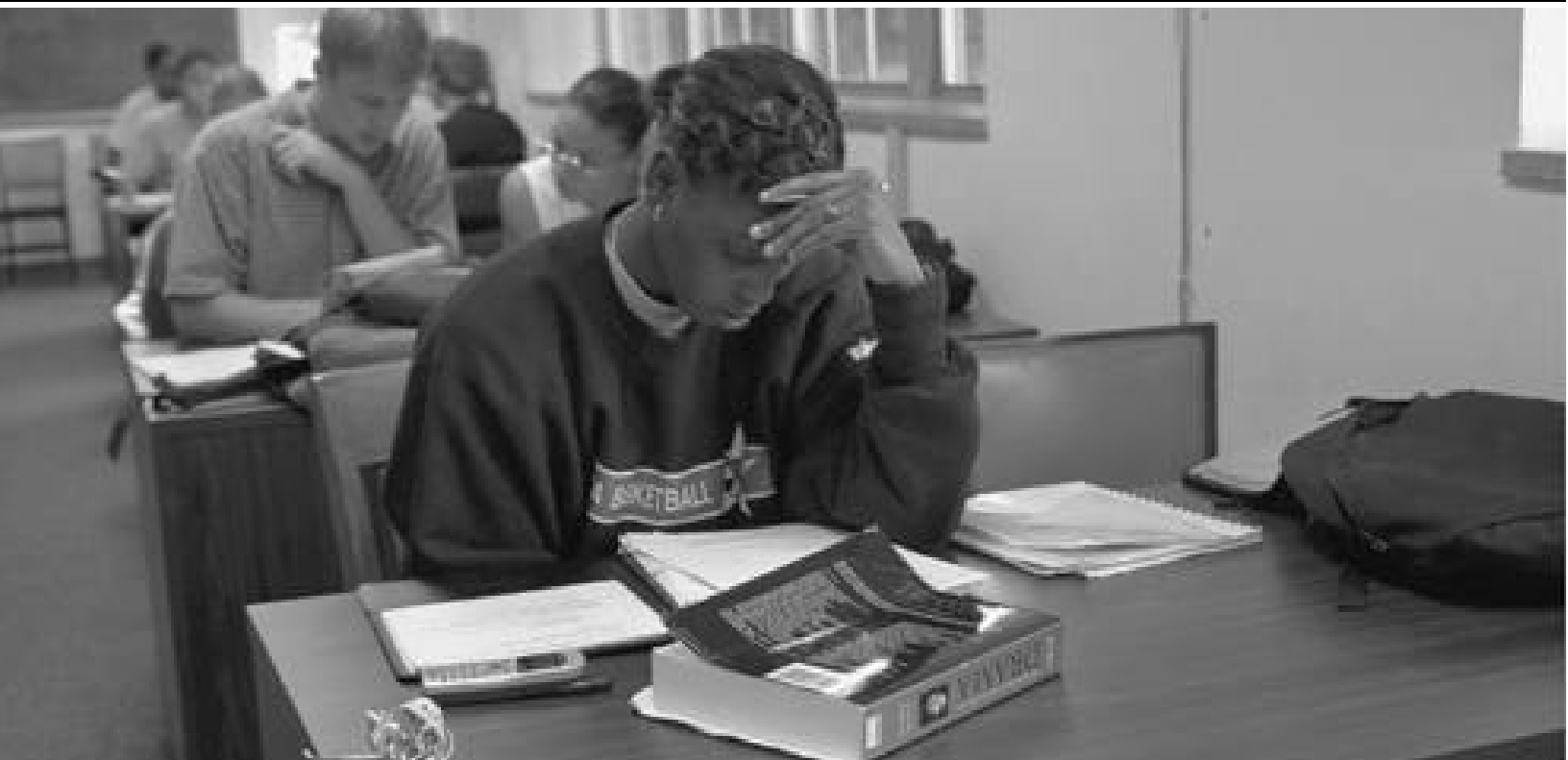
curricula, and services. During the 1960s, the University began to place increasing emphasis on research.

Recognizing the importance and extent of statewide agricultural activities of units in the LSU System, the LSU Board of Supervisors in 1972 established the Center for Agricultural Sciences & Rural Development. This unit was renamed the LSU Agricultural Center in 1982. Components of the LSU Agricultural Center include the Louisiana Agricultural Experiment Station, the Louisiana Cooperative Extension Service, International Programs, and Administrative Services.

In 1977, the Paul M. Hebert Law Center, established as the LSU Law School in 1906, was made an autonomous division of the LSU System. It provides a legal education characterized by an unyielding demand for academic excellence. Its unique curriculum, based on civil law and substantial elements of common law, provides law graduates with qualifications and training for not one, but two legal systems.

LSU, located on more than 2,000 acres in the southern part of Baton Rouge, Louisiana, is bordered on the west by the Mississippi River. The University's more than 250 principal buildings are grouped on a 650-acre plateau that constitutes the main part of the campus.

LSU is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. The Hebert Law Center is a member of the Association of American Law Schools and is on the approved list of the American Bar Association.



## Academic Success

**C**ritical to the development of an athlete as a student is an adequate academic facility and capable staff to further the athlete's progress. The **Academic Center for Athletes** is responsible for overseeing the educational development and progress toward graduation for all student-athletes. The staff acts as a liaison between the athlete and the academic communities and insures that student-athletes comply with academic rules established by the University, NCAA and SEC. The staff also coordinates academic programs designed to assist student-athletes in acquiring a quality education.

### Services Available at the Academic Center For Athletes

- A showpiece of the Academic Center is the Deumite Memorial Library, a 2,400-square foot resource and study facility offering reading materials and a relaxing quiet area conducive to learning.
- The Center has private study rooms, made possible by generous donations from alumni, and the Tammany Tigers Computer Room, which has the latest in technology to meet all of the student-athletes' needs. The Bengal Belle room is an additional study area.

## Athletic Training

LSU boasts the largest and most complete athletic training facility in all of collegiate athletics. Focused on aggressive rehabilitation, the Broussard Center for Athletic Training is furnished with the latest in technology and equipment. Some of the features of the 23,000-square foot facility



include an on-site x-ray room, an in-house pharmacy, as well as state of the art hydrotherapy pools. The Broussard Center for Athletic Training is equipped with the largest hydrotherapy pools in both collegiate and professional sports and is one of the few collegiate training centers with a full-service pharmacy, as well as on-site x-ray room. LSU is also the only school in college athletics with a training room equipped with a full-service vision center. The facility is named in honor of legendary trainer Dr. Martin J. Broussard, who served as LSU's athletic trainer for several decades.

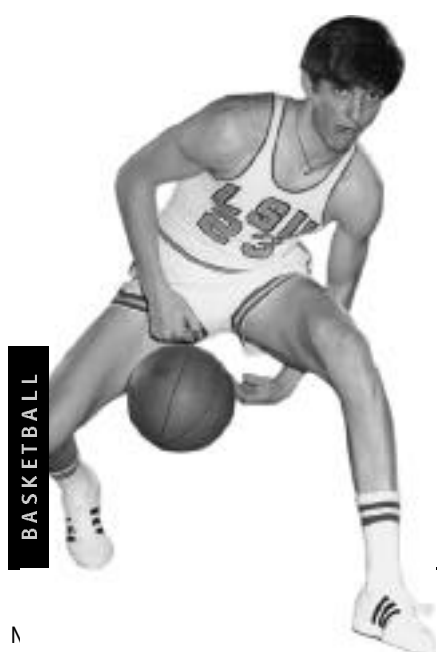

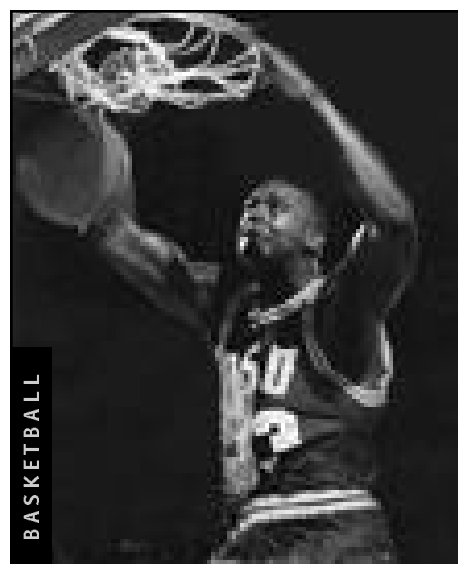

### Billy Cannon

One of the true legends of college football in the South, Cannon was the 1959 Heisman Trophy winner that helped the Tigers to the 1958 national title. Cannon's most memorable performance came in 1959 against Ole Miss. The top-ranked Tigers trailed No. 3 Ole Miss 3-0 in the fourth quarter when Cannon fielded a punt, broke seven tackles and returned it 89 yards as the Tigers went on to win 7-3. He went on to a successful 11-year professional career.

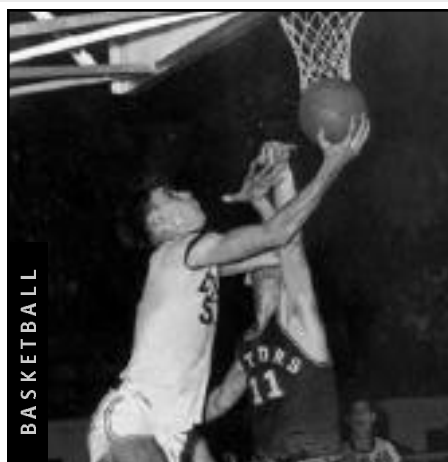
### Shaquille O'Neal

Was the first pick in the 1992 NBA Draft. He was named MVP of the league in 2000 and the Finals MVP in 2000 and 2001 after leading the Los Angeles Lakers to two World Championships. At LSU, O'Neal averaged 21.6 points and 13.6 rebounds for his career, and in 1991, he was named the World's Amateur Athlete of the Year as well as SEC Athlete of the Year and National Player of the Year. In 1997, he was named as one of the top 50 players in NBA history.

## Lady Tigers Timeline

LSU is entering its 27th season of women's basketball. The Lady Tigers first played basketball as a varsity sport in 1975-76 and since that inaugural season, LSU has posted 22 winning seasons, played in 11 NCAA Tournaments, and advanced to the AIAW National Championship game in 1977.

### The Coaches

LSU has had three coaches in its history with Jinks Coleman serving as the school's first head coach. Coleman coached the Lady Tigers for three and a half years before stepping down midway through the 1978-79 season. In 3-plus years with the Lady Tigers, Coleman guided LSU to a 91-32 overall mark. Her crowning moment with LSU came during the 1976-77 season as she led the Lady Tigers to the AIAW National Championship game. LSU fell to top-ranked Delta State, but that 1977 team remains the only squad in school history to play for a national title.

Coleman was replaced by Barbara Swanner midway through the 1979 season and Swanner coached the Lady Tigers for the next three years. She led LSU to an overall mark of 57-50 before ending her coaching career at the conclusion of the 1981-82 season.

Sue Gunter joined the Lady Tigers for the 1982-83 season and has been in Baton Rouge ever since. In 19 seasons with the Lady Tigers, Gunter has led the Lady Tigers to 367 victories and guided her teams to 11 NCAA Tournament appearances and the 1991 SEC Tournament title. Gunter is the winningest coach in LSU history and is a member of the Women's Basketball Hall of Fame.

## The 1970s

The decade of the 1970's saw the start of women's basketball as a varsity sport at LSU. The Lady Tigers played their first game in November of 1975, losing to Whitworth, 64-58. LSU's first win came a week later with a 75-62 win over Southwestern Louisiana. The win was the first of 17 for the Lady Tigers in their inaugural season as LSU posted a first-year mark of 17-14.

A year later, LSU, behind the play of a couple of Australians in Maree Jackson and Julie Gross, was playing for the AIAW National title. After going unrecognized for much of the year, LSU finally began to gain some respect with wins over three ranked teams in February. The Lady Tigers entered the AIAW State Tournament on a roll, however, LSU lost to Louisiana Tech and Northwestern State, but they were still able to advance to the AIAW Regional Tournament. At Regionals, the Lady Tigers beat Texas, Stephen F. Austin and Baylor to advance to the AIAW National Tournament. By this time the Lady Tigers were ranked No. 11 in the nation and after wins over Western Washington and Baylor, LSU was in the Final Four. LSU knocked off second-ranked Immaculata, 74-68, in the semifinals and then fell to top-ranked Delta State, 68-55, in the national title game. LSU finished with a 29-8 overall mark, the second-most victories recorded in school history in a single year.

In 1977-78, the Lady Tigers achieved their first and only No. 1 ranking as LSU spent most of January and February atop the Associated Press poll, after having started the year ranked No. 2 in the nation. The Lady Tigers stayed there until a Feb. 15 when Tennessee moved ahead of LSU. Despite being ranked No. 2 in the nation, LSU couldn't advance out of the Regionals as the Sue Gunter-coached Stephen F. Austin LadyJacks eliminated the Lady Tigers in the semifinals. LSU still won 37 games, which remains the school record for victories in a season.

LSU closed out the decade of the 1970's with a coaching change as Jinks Coleman stepped down after 15 games in the 1978-79 season. With an 8-7 mark, Coleman was replaced by Barbara Swanner, who guided LSU to a 5-5 mark over the final 10 games of the year. LSU finished with a 13-12 record.

## The 1980s

The decade of the 80's saw LSU establish itself as one of the top programs in the country.

LSU opened the decade under Barbara Swanner and posted a 17-17 mark and reached the semifinals of the AIAW Regional Tournament.

A year later, Joyce Walker came to Baton Rouge and put women's basketball at LSU back on the map. Walker, who was way ahead of her time, could do it all. In her first year with the Lady Tigers she averaged 20.7 points a contest and led the Lady Tigers to a 17-15 mark.

A year later, the NCAA became the governing body of women's athletics and the NCAA Tournament was started. The Lady Tigers didn't make the NCAA Tournament in 1982, but still posted an 18-13 overall mark as Walker averaged 24.9 points a contest. That season was Swanner's last year as head coach of the Lady Tigers.

The 1982-83 season was the first for the Lady Tigers under Sue Gunter, who came to LSU from Stephen F. Austin in Nacogdoches, Texas. In her first year with LSU, Gunter guided the Lady Tigers to a 20-7 mark and a tie for first place in the Western Division of the SEC.

Walker's last year with LSU in 1983-84 marked the Lady Tigers' first-ever appearance in the NCAA Tournament. LSU went 23-7 and reached the Sweet 16 at the NCAA Tournament before falling to Louisiana Tech.

In 1984-85, the Lady Tigers claimed the National Women's Invitation Tournament (NWIT) title with a 74-54 win over Florida in the championship game.

LSU's best season since 1977 occurred in 1985-86 as the Lady Tigers climbed all the way to No. 8 in the nation and reached the Elite Eight at the NCAA Tournament before falling to Tennessee in the final seconds, 67-65.

Another 20-win season followed in 1986-87 as the Lady Tigers spent most of the year ranked in the top 10. However, the Lady Tigers

lost their last three games, including a 70-56 setback to Southern Illinois in the second round of the NCAA Tournament.

The 1987-88 season saw the arrival of Dana "Pokey" Chatman, the best point guard in school history. Chatman helped guide the Lady Tigers to an 18-11 mark and another NCAA Tournament appearance. LSU closed out the 1980's with its fifth NCAA Tournament appearance as LSU reached the Sweet 16 before falling to Louisiana Tech.

## The 1990s

The decade of the 1990's was one of ups and downs for the Lady Tigers. LSU opened the

decade with a 21-9 overall mark and its fifth NCAA Tournament appearance.

A year later, the Pokey Chatman era came to an end as the Lady Tigers posted a 24-7 overall mark, won the school's only SEC Tournament title and were seeded No. 2 in the Midwest Region of the NCAA Tournament.

The 1991-92 season started the Cornelia Gayden era, but it was also the beginning of a stretch that saw the Lady Tigers go five years without an appearance in the NCAA Tournament. LSU posted a 16-13 overall mark, but five straight losses in mid-February kept the Lady Tigers home in March.

A year later in 1992-93, the Lady Tigers had their first-ever losing record as LSU went 9-18 and was winless in the SEC for the first time. Things weren't much better in 1993-94 as LSU went 11-16 overall and tied for 10th in the SEC.

One of the bright spots in 1994-95 was Sue Gunter's 500th career victory on the same night Gayden set an NCAA record with 12 3-point goals in a 92-62 win over Jackson State on Feb. 9 in Baton Rouge. LSU suffered through its worst record ever that year as the Lady Tigers posted a 7-20 mark.

Despite the losing record the year prior, LSU signed one of the nation's best recruiting classes for the 1995-96 season and the results were immediate. LSU had the biggest turnaround in SEC history as the Lady Tigers went from 7-20 in 1994-95 to 21-11 in 1995-96. Junior college transfers Elaine Powell and Pietra Gay help lead LSU to a win over second-ranked Georgia in the SEC Tournament as the Lady Tigers appeared to be headed for its first NCAA Tournament appearance in five years, but was denied. The Lady Tigers settled for

the NWIT, where they placed third out of eight teams.

The following year, LSU posted its best record in the 90's as they went 25-5 overall, won nine SEC games and reached the Sweet 16 for the first time since 1989. In 1997-98, the Lady Tigers, in what was supposed to be a rebuilding year, posted a 19-13 overall mark and reached the semifinals of the Women's NIT.

In 1998-99 the Lady Tigers, behind the play of senior point guard Latasha Dorsey, the only senior on the team, reached the Sweet 16 for the second time in three years and finished second in the SEC with a school-record 10 league wins. LSU's 22-8 overall mark in 1998-99 was LSU's fourth 20-win season of the 1990's.

## 1977 AIAW FINAL FOUR

While it may not have been the NCAA Final Four, LSU's appearance at the AIAW Final Four in 1977 is just as significant. At the time, the Lady Tigers were just in their second year of existence and were a

relative unknown in the world of women's college basketball. Behind the play of Maree Jackson and Julie Gross, LSU peaked at tournament time as the unranked Lady Tigers beat Texas Tech, 95-67, in the first round at the AIAW Regionals and then followed that with a 76-73 victory over a Sue Gunter-coached Stephen F. Austin team in the semifinals. LSU routed Baylor, 92-76, in the regional finals to advance to the 16-team AIAW National Tournament in Minneapolis, Minn. LSU, now ranked No. 11 in the nation, drew Western Washington in the first round and coasted to a 91-53 victory. That was followed by another win over Baylor, 71-64, as the Lady Tigers advanced to the AIAW Final Four. LSU stunned second-ranked Immaculata, 74-68, to advance to the national championship game. In the AIAW National Championship game, Jackson got in early foul trouble and the Lady Tigers never got on track as the Delta Devils claimed the national title with a 68-55 win over LSU. The 1977 remains the only squad in school history to reach the national championship game.

## NCAA TOURNAMENT TEAMS

Since its inception in 1982, the Lady Tigers have had 11 teams compete in the NCAA Tournament, all of which have come under the direction of Sue Gunter. LSU first played in the NCAA Tournament in 1984 as the Lady Tigers reached the Sweet 16 before falling to Louisiana Tech. Since then, LSU has been to the NCAA Tournament in 1986, 1987, 1988, 1989, 1990, 1991, 1997, 1999, 2000 and 2001. LSU's

longest NCAA Tournament runs came in 1986 and 2000 when the Lady Tigers reached the Elite Eight. LSU has reached the Sweet 16 six times (1984, 1986, 1989, 1997 and 1999). LSU's all-time NCAA Tournament record stands at 12-11.

LSU claimed its first, and only, SEC Tournament title in 1991 as the Lady Tigers had one of the most impressive runs in conference tournament history. Entering the tournament as the No. 4 seed, the Lady Tigers had a first round bye and then beat Kentucky, 96-76, in the second round. The Lady Tigers, who were ranked No. 12 in the nation, then upset fourth-ranked Georgia, 83-74, in the semifinals. In the title game, point guard Pokey Chatman scored 30 points, including 16 straight at one point, as the Lady Tigers knocked off third-ranked Tennessee, 80-75. Chatman was named most valuable player of the tournament, while Sheila Johnson and Annette Jackson-Lowery were named to the all-tournament team.

## 1985 NWIT CHAMPIONS

LSU made the most of its first appearance in the National Women's Invitation Tournament as the Lady Tigers won the eight-team event in Amarillo, Texas. LSU beat West Virginia, 69-57, in the first round and then followed that with a 71-67 victory over Texas Tech in the semifinals to set up a matchup with SEC foe Florida in the finals. In the championship game, Alisha Jones scored 19 points and Natalie Randall added 14 points and 12 rebounds as the Lady Tigers won 74-54.

## ALL-AMERICANS

In its 25-year history, the Lady Tigers have had 11 players earn All-America honors. The list of All-Americans is highlighted by LSU's four Kodak All-Americans -- Julie Gross in 1978, Joyce Walker in 1983 and 1984, Pokey Chatman in 1991 and Marie Ferdinand in 2001. DeTrina White became the first player in school history to earn National Freshman of the Year recognition in 1999. Defensive All-America honors went to Latasha Dorsey in 1999 and Angelia Crockett in 2001. LSU's other All-Americans are Maree Jackson (Basketball News), Cornelia Gayden (Associated Press), Rene Moran (Basketball News) and Freshman All-American Roneeka Hodges (womenscollegehoops.com).

## LSU KNOCKS OFF NO. 1 TENNESSEE

In perhaps its finest regular-season performance ever, the Lady Tigers were nearly flawless in their 72-69 win over No. 1 ranked Tennessee on Feb. 21, 1999 in the Pete Maravich Assembly Center. LSU jumped on the Lady Vols early as they raced out to a 29-15 lead just 10

minutes into the contest. LSU stretched its lead to as many as 16 points, 44-28, in the first half before settling for a 44-33 lead at half-time. Tennessee made its run at LSU in the second half and eventually took a 67-66 lead at the 1:09 mark. Marie Ferdinand tied the game at 67 with a free throw with 50 seconds left. Tennessee's Chamique Holdsclaw hit a 15-foot jumper with 26.5 seconds left to give the Lady Vols a 69-67 advantage. On LSU's next possession, Katrina Hibbert scored the game-winning points on a conventional 3-point play, a layup and free throw, with 11.8 seconds left giving the Lady Tigers their first-ever win over a team ranked No. 1 in the nation. The victory also kept Tennessee's Holdsclaw from winning in Baton Rouge during her career, which makes the PMAC the only SEC arena in which she didn't win in during her four years with the Lady Vols.

### THE BUZZER BEATERS

When you think of buzzer beaters and LSU women's basketball, four shots come to mind and two involved Pokey Chatman.

Chatman's first buzzer beater came on the road against Fresno State in 1989. In that game, the Lady Tigers trailed by 17 at halftime but

had rallied to take the lead with less than a minute left. Fresno State tied the game with just under 10 seconds remaining, which left enough time for Chatman to take the ball to midcourt where she let a shot fly. The ball hit the front of the rim, bounced straight up in the air and dropped through the net for a 76-73 LSU victory. Chatman did the same thing on the road against Stephen F. Austin as she canned a shot from midcourt with one second left to lift the Lady Tigers to a 79-77 victory. Perhaps the biggest buzzer beater in school history came in 1986 in the Sweet 16 of the NCAA Tournament. Trailing 80-79 with just seconds left on the clock, LSU's Jeanetta Burns took to her defender back-door and hit a wide-open layup as time expired giving the Lady Tigers an 81-80 victory as they advanced to the Elite Eight. The latest buzzer beater came in the 1998-99 season when Latasha Dorsey hit an 8-foot jumper against Auburn with 1.3 seconds left to give the Lady Tigers a 63-61 win in overtime. Dorsey's basket capped a comeback that saw the Lady Tigers battle back from 13 points down with five minutes remaining. Dorsey's shot earned national recognition as it was selected the Compaq Women's Basketball Play of the Week.

### GAYDEN AND GUNTER'S NIGHT

It could have been a script for a movie, but it wasn't. It was real life and two of the most memorable moments in LSU women's basketball history happened on the same night. On Feb. 9, 1995, LSU faced Jackson State in what seemed like a meaningless contest. What ensued during the game went down in both NCAA and LSU history. Senior guard Cornelia Gayden found "the zone" as everything she threw up went in - as in an NCAA record 12 3-point goals on 15 attempts. LSU scored 48 points in the first half and Gayden had 30 of them, with 24 of those points coming from 3-point range. Gayden cooled off a bit in the second half, however, she still managed to score 19 more points and hit four more 3-point goals. Gayden finished with an NCAA record 12 3-point goals to go along with a school-record 49 points in the 92-62 LSU win. The victory was the 500th in the career of LSU coach Sue Gunter.

## The Players

### MAREE JACKSON

At 6-foot-2, Maree Jackson was one of the most dominating players in the game in the late 1970's. Jackson played only two years (1976-78) with the Lady Tigers, but during that time she scored 1,852 points in 70 games for an average of 26.4 points a contest. Her sophomore season could rank as the best in women's basketball history as her 1,021 points and 539 rebounds two of the most in NCAA history (although the NCAA does not recognize statistics prior to 1982). LSU posted a 66-11 mark in her two years. Jackson earned first team all-America honors by Basketball News in 1978. She scored 40 or more points five times including a career-best of 47 against Northwestern State in 1978. Jackson had a school-record 27 rebounds twice and had 12 games with at least 20 points and 20 rebounds in the same contest.

### JULIE GROSS

Another of LSU's dominating 6-2 players of the 70's, Julie Gross, like Maree Jackson, came to LSU from Australia. In four years with the Lady Tigers, Gross scored 2,488 points, second most in school history, and hauled in a school-record 1,466 rebounds. Gross was LSU's first Kodak All-American as she won the award after averaging 20.7 points and 11.5 rebounds as a sophomore in 1978. Gross' career rebound total ranks second in SEC history.

### JOYCE WALKER

No other player in school history could take over a game on the offensive end like Joyce Walker did. Walker, a native of Seattle, Wash., capped her career as the leading scorer in SEC history with 2,906 points, an average of 24.8 points a contest, until her scoring record was broken in 2000. Walker is LSU's only two-time

Kodak All-American as she won the award in 1983 and 1984. In 1984, Walker averaged 26.5 points and 4.0 rebounds in leading LSU to the Sweet 16 in its first NCAA Tournament appearance. In her four years, Walker averaged at least 20 points each season with her career-best being 27.6 points as a junior.

### POKEY CHATMAN

She was like having another coach on the floor. She was so good at it that when her playing career was over she immediately joined Sue Gunter's coaching staff. Pokey Chatman is without a doubt the best point guard to ever play at LSU. In four years with the Lady Tigers she started all but one game. She led the Lady Tigers to the NCAA Tournament four times and she guided the Lady Tigers to their only SEC Tournament title in 1991 earning tourney MVP honors along the way. Chatman holds the school record for career assists and steals. She capped her career with 1,826 points, which ranks fifth in school history.

### CORNELIA GAYDEN

There may not have been a better shooter come through LSU than Cornelia Gayden. In four years with the Lady Tigers, Gayden scored 2,451 points, third most in school history, and she re-wrote the NCAA 3-point record book. By the end of her career, Gayden held

the NCAA records for 3-pointers in a game (12 vs. Jackson State in 1995), 3-pointers in a career (337) and 3-pointers attempted in a career (875). The 12 3-point goals vs. Jackson State is currently the only one that stands, however all three are SEC records. By her senior season, Gayden had also become the complete player as she ranks fifth in school history in rebounds (894), 11th in assists (261) and fourth in steals (196). Gayden also had a pair of triple-doubles and her 49 points against Jackson State in 1995 is a school-record.

## ELAINE POWELL

Although she was only at LSU two years, Elaine Powell was the biggest reason the Lady Tigers went from 7-20 the year prior to her arrival to 21-11 in her first season in Baton Rouge. Powell was a two-time first team All-SEC selection and in her first season with the Lady Tigers, she led LSU to its first post-season appearance (NWIT) in four years. A year later in 1997, Powell took the Lady Tigers a step further as LSU got its first NCAA Tournament bid since 1991. That year, Powell helped lead LSU to a 25-5 overall mark and to the Sweet 16 at the NCAA Tournament. In her career, Powell scored 1,163 which ranks 12th in school history. Powell is currently a member of the Orlando Miracle of the WNBA.

## LATASHA DORSEY

In four years time, Latasha Dorsey developed into one of the most feared defenders in LSU women's basketball history. Dorsey, who finished her career ranked 16th in school history in scoring with 1,054 points, joined Joyce Walker and Pokey Chatman as the only three players in school history with 1,000 points, 300 assists

and 200 steals. Dorsey finished third in school history with 258 steals and fifth in assists with 383. Dorsey also played in more post-season games (men or women) in school history with 12 as she appeared in six NCAA Tournament contests and six NIT games. As a senior, Dorsey was named first team Defensive All-American by the Women's Basketball Journal.

## MARIE FERDINAND

One of the most explosive guards to ever play at LSU, Miami native Marie Ferdinand earned 2001 Kodak All-America honors and was a unanimous coaches poll first-team All-SEC selection. For her career, Ferdinand averaged 137. points and 4.1 rebounds a game. In 2000, she led the Lady Tigers to the Elite Eight, averaging team-highs in points, assists and steals. She was named to the 2000 NCAA East Regional all-tournament team. Ferdinand also made an impact in international play in the summer of 2000, helping lead the U.S. Women's Select Team to a gold medal at the Jones Cup Tournament in Taipei, Taiwan. She is currently a member of the Utah Starzz of the WNBA and finished third in Rookie of the Year voting in 2001.

## DETRINA WHITE

No other freshman in school history made an impact the way DeTrina White did in her rookie season. In 1999, White became the first freshman in school history to be named National Freshman of the Year. She was also named a first team Freshman All-American by two publications and the Associated Press named her SEC Freshman/Newcomer of the Year. White led the SEC with 62.1 percent shooting from the field as a freshman and her 12 double-doubles were tops in the league.

November 1975 — LSU wins its first basketball game with a 75-62 victory over Southwestern Louisiana.

Feb. 12, 1977 — LSU beats 11th-ranked UNLV, 92-89, for its first win over a ranked opponent in school history.

March 16, 1977 — LSU enters the Associated Press Top 20 poll for the first time as the Lady Tigers are ranked No. 11 in the nation.

March 26, 1977 — LSU's hopes for a national title come to an end as the Lady Tigers fall to No. 1 Delta State, 68-55, in the national championship game.

Jan. 18, 1978 — LSU climbs to the No. 1 spot in the AP poll, its only No. 1 ranking in school history.

Nov. 27, 1982 — Sue Gunter makes her debut as head coach of the Lady Tigers as LSU rolls over Tulane, 88-60 in Baton Rouge.

Jan. 1, 1984 — After winning its first nine games, the Lady Tigers move to No. 5 in the AP poll, which still marks the highest-ranking for an LSU team under Sue Gunter.

Jan. 10, 1984 — LSU beats Princeton, 97-49, to improve its record to 12-0, setting the school record for most consecutive wins to start a season.

March 18, 1984 — LSU earns its first bid to the NCAA Tournament and knocks off Missouri, 92-82, in the second round.

March 23, 1985 — LSU wins its first national title in women's basketball as the Lady Tigers beat Florida, 74-54, to claim the Women's NIT crown in Amarillo, Texas.

Nov. 30, 1986 — Gunter wins her 111th game at LSU to become the winningest coach in school history in an 84-68 victory over USL.

Dec. 30, 1989 — Gunter wins her 400th career game as the Lady Tigers blast Pacific, 88-58.

March 4, 1991 — Pokey Chatman scores 30 points as LSU knocks off No. 4 Tennessee, 80-75, to win its first SEC Tournament title. Chatman is named MVP of the SEC Tournament.

Feb. 9, 1995 — LSU coach Sue Gunter wins her 500th career game and Cornelia Gayden sets an NCAA record with 12 3-point goals at the Lady Tigers beat Jackson State, 92-62. Gayden also scored a school-record 49 points in the contest.

Jan. 21, 1997 — 6,552 fans show up for inaugural "Pack The PMAC", breaking the then school attendance record, as 18th-ranked LSU knocks off 13th-ranked Arkansas, 79-72.

Feb. 27, 1997 — For the first time in her 15 years at LSU, Sue Gunter is named the SEC Coach of the Year by both the Associated Press and the Nashville Banner.

March 15, 1998 — Latasha Dorsey scored a career-high 26 points as LSU knocks off Butler, 74-58, in the quarterfinals of the Women's NIT in Baton Rouge. The win marked the 300th for Sue Gunter at LSU.

Feb. 17, 1999 — DeTrina White is named National Freshman of the Year by the Women's Basketball News Service.

Feb. 21, 1999 — Katrina Hibbert converts on a 3-point play with 11.8 seconds left as LSU beats No. 1 Tennessee, 72-69, LSU's first-ever win over a team ranked No. 1 in the nation.

March 13, 1999 — DeTrina White becomes the first freshman in school history with a double-double in an NCAA Tournament game with 24 points and 11 rebounds in LSU's 78-69 first round win over Evansville.

Dec. 11, 1999 — LSU defeats Michigan, 67-56, at the Pete Maravich Assembly Center. The game is televised by ESPN2, marking the first nationally-televised home game in LSU history.

Jan. 13, 2000 — LSU defeats Arkansas, 82-69, in Fayetteville to give head coach Sue Gunter her 600th career college coaching victory. Gunter becomes just the fourth NCAA women's basketball coach to earn 600 wins.

June 10, 2000 — LSU head coach Sue Gunter is inducted into the Women's Basketball Hall of Fame in Knoxville, Tenn.

Feb. 4, 2001 — LSU breaks the school and state's single-game attendance record with a crowd of 9,636 for "Pack the PMACV" against Auburn. LSU lost the game, 65-62.

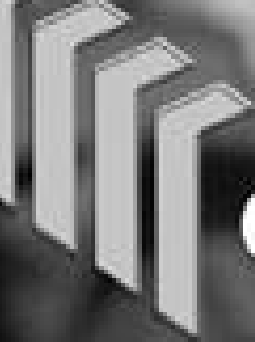

Sue Gunter added another chapter to her coaching legacy last year as the Walnut Grove, Miss., native continues to stake her claim as one of the greatest coaches in the history of the women's game.

As Gunter enters her 38th season as a collegiate head coach, she continues to be an ambassador for a game in which she served as a pioneer many years ago. Gunter has been with women's basketball on the collegiate level every step of the way, having seen the sport evolve from a novelty back in the early 1960s to present day, where the Final Four is sold out years in advance and games are shown nightly on national television.

Gunter, who was inducted into the Women's Basketball Hall of Fame in June 2000, enters the 2001-02 season among the career leaders in several NCAA coaching categories: seasons coached (No. 2 - 31 as recognized by the NCAA); games coached (No. 2 - 917); wins (No. 4 - 633); and 20-win seasons (No. 4 - 20).

Gunter's influence has been a catalyst behind the growth of the game and things have been no different in Baton Rouge as the Lady Tigers continue to play before school-record crowds and media attention is at an all-time high. In Gunter's 19-year tenure at LSU, her list of accomplishments are long and

impressive -- 11 NCAA Tournament appearances, two NCAA Elite Eight appearances, six NCAA Sweet 16 appearances, an SEC Tournament title, a Women's NIT title, and a handful of Coach of the Year awards.

However, as Gunter enters her 20th season as the Lady Tigers head coach, the prized Final Four appearance still eludes her. LSU has come close several times, most recently in 2000, when the Lady Tigers advanced to the Elite Eight before falling to eventual national champion Connecticut. However, Gunter perseveres with the fact that her best seasons may still be ahead of her. The Lady Tigers return five players from last season's squad and bring in their second straight top five recruiting class. With the table set for what should be another outstanding season, Gunter heads into the twilight of her coaching career with that elusive Final Four right around the corner.

### SUE GUNTER -- THE COACH

Sue Gunter has taken the LSU women's basketball program back to national prominence. After a three-year hiatus in the mid-1990's that saw the Lady Tigers suffer through the school's first-ever losing seasons, LSU has now been to post-season action six straight years, including four trips to the NCAA Tournament.

To realize just how far the Lady Tigers have come in four years, one has to go back to the 1994-95 season, the worst year in school history as LSU posted a 7-20 overall mark. Strangely enough, it was the 1994-95 season that proved to be the turning point for the Lady Tigers as Gunter turned up her recruiting magic and promptly signed the best class in school history. That class, which included future All-SEC selections in Elaine Powell, Pietra Gay and Toni Gross, won 46 games over two years and resurrected the LSU women's basketball program. The Lady Tigers have now won an average of 22 games over the last six years and once again, LSU women's basketball is back in the national scope.

This past year, Gunter led LSU to its third consecutive 20-win season and the fifth in the past six years. The season also



included a third straight trip to the NCAA Tournament, where the Lady Tigers fell to eventual national runner-up Purdue in West Lafayette, Ind. Gunter also produced her third Kodak All-American as senior Marie Ferdinand garnered the honor. Ferdinand joined Joyce Walker (1983, 1984) and Pokey Chatman (1991) as Gunter's Kodak All-Americans.

In 2001 the Lady Tigers also shattered the school's single-game attendance record for Pack the PMACV when 9,636 fans showed up to see LSU take on Auburn. The crowd, the largest to ever see a women's basketball game in the state of Louisiana, could unfortunately do little as the Lady Tigers lost, 65-62.

Two seasons ago, Gunter directed the Lady Tigers to a 25-7 mark, including a berth in the NCAA Tournament Elite Eight, where LSU fell to eventual national champion Connecticut. The Lady

Tigers won a school-record 11 SEC games, and their 7-1 SEC start was the best ever by an LSU team. The Lady Tigers also established school marks for most home victories (17) and most SEC road wins (5). Gunter reached another milestone during the season as she posted her 600th career victory on Jan. 13, 2000, at Arkansas. The year was culminated in June with her induction into the Women's Basketball Hall of Fame, located in Knoxville, Tenn.

The 1998-99 season may have been one of Gunter's best on the bench as she took a team with only one senior to a 22-8 overall mark and a second place finish in the SEC. After being picked to finish eighth in the SEC, the Lady Tigers won a school-record 10 league games, including a win over top-ranked Tennessee, and reached the Sweet 16 at

the NCAA Tournament for the second time in three years. As a result, Gunter was named SEC Coach of the Year by both her peers and the Associated Press. She was also named the Women's Basketball Coaches Association District 3 Coach of the Year.

In 1997-98, the Lady Tigers, after losing one of the best senior classes in school history, advanced to the Women's NIT semifinals before falling to Baylor. LSU beat a couple of top 10 teams at home and one of the season highlights came on Jan. 18 when the Lady Tigers shattered the school's then single-game attendance record for Pack the PMAC II when 7,255 fans showed up to see LSU beat Ole Miss, 69-56.

The 1996-97 season was perhaps the most rewarding for Gunter in all her years of coaching as she was named the SEC Coach of the Year for the first time after leading the Lady Tigers to a 25-5 overall mark and a berth in the NCAA Tournament's Sweet 16. LSU finished the year ranked No. 9 in the nation in the AP poll and the Lady Tigers had a then school-record nine SEC wins, which included victories over Tennessee, Alabama, Auburn and two over Arkansas. In addition, Gunter proved that women's basketball could become a hit in Baton Rouge as fans flocked to see the Lady Tigers in record fashion as LSU broke every school attendance record that year.

The success of the 1996-97 team was a direct result of what happened to LSU in 1995-96. The 1995-96 team posted the biggest turnaround in SEC history, posting a 21-11 record after going 7-20 the year prior. However, the season proved to be bitter sweet for LSU as the Lady Tigers were denied a spot in the 64-team NCAA Tournament despite beating second-ranked Georgia in the SEC Tournament the week prior to the tournament selection. LSU did advance to the Women's National Invitational Tournament (WNIT) where they finished third after pounding Arkansas in the third place game.

Prior to the turnaround in 1995-96, the three years prior were tough on both Gunter and the Lady Tigers. But there were some bright spots. Despite posting

a 7-20 mark in 1995, Gunter won the 500th game of her career on Feb. 9 when the Lady Tigers routed Jackson State, 92-62. In that same game, LSU's Cornelia Gayden set an NCAA record by hitting 12 3-point goals.

Gunter is so admired by her peers that despite LSU's losing record in 1994, she was still honored that year as the recipient of the Carol Eckman Award. The award goes to the coach that shows spirit, integrity and courage in coaching women's basketball.

In 1993, Gunter and the Lady Tigers suffered through their first losing season ever as LSU fell to 9-18 overall and 0-11 in the SEC. Gunter called that season the most trying in her career.

In 1992 the Lady Tigers slipped to 16-13 overall and 4-7 in the SEC. During the 1991-92 campaign, the Lady Tigers made a late season push to make the NCAA Tournament, however, their hopes were dashed after Tennessee beat LSU in the final seconds during the second round of the SEC Tournament.

The 1991 season was one of firsts for the Lady Tigers and Gunter as they captured their first SEC Tournament title by defeating eventual national champion Tennessee, 80-75, in the finals. Also during that season, LSU defeated Louisiana Tech for the first time since 1978, defeat-

ed Auburn for the first time since 1984 and, for the first time in her career, Gunter defeated both Stephen F. Austin and Tennessee.

The Lady Tigers finished the 1991 season with a 24-7 record and ranked No. 8 in the final AP poll, while point guard Pokey Chatman earned Kodak All-America honors.

During her silver anniversary year of coaching in 1989, Gunter collected her 400th career victory with a win over the University of Pacific. Also during that season, the Lady Tigers posted a 19-11 record and advanced to the Midwest Regional of the NCAA Tournament. In the second round of the NCAAs, Gunter led LSU to a come-from-behind win over Purdue, before losing to Louisiana Tech. With one of the nation's toughest schedules in 1989, Gunter's team once again surprised critics by defeating four Top 10 teams with only one senior on the squad.

Gunter became the winningest coach in LSU women's basketball history during the 1987 season surpassing Jinks Coleman. During that season, Gunter led the Lady Tigers to their fifth 20-plus win season with a 20-8 mark and a No. 14 ranking in the final AP poll.

The 1986 season was probably one

of the most satisfying for Gunter as the Lady Tigers posted a 27-6 record and appeared in the SEC title game.

However, a trip to the Final Four that season was denied with a 67-65 loss to Tennessee in the Mideast Regional Finals. During the 1985 season, Gunter led the Lady Tigers to a 20-9 record and to the school's first women's national title, the WNIT, as LSU defeated Florida in the title game.

Gunter's 1984 team started the season with then a school-record 12 straight wins and appeared in the NCAA Tournament for the first time. The Lady Tigers finished the season ranked No. 8 in the nation and it also ended the brilliant career of the SEC's second leading scorer Joyce Walker. The 1983 season marked Gunter's first year at LSU and she led the Lady Tigers to a 20-7 record and a No. 20 national ranking in the AP

Poll. The inaugural season marked the beginning of a bright future for both Gunter and the Lady Tigers, who finished in a first-place tie in the SEC Western Division that year. As a result, Gunter was named National Coach of the Year by Basketball News, received the Converse Region IV coaching honor, and was chosen the top coach in the state by the Louisiana Sportswriters Association.

Gunter enters the 2001-02 season as the fourth winningest active women's basketball coach in the nation with an overall record of 633-284, which includes coaching stints at Middle Tennessee, Stephen F. Austin and LSU. Gunter's LSU record stands at 367-197, which makes her the winningest coach in school history.

Under the direction of Gunter, the Lady Tigers have played in 11 NCAA Tournaments, one National Women's Invitation Tournament and two WNIT events. Gunter led LSU to within one

game of the Final Four in 1986 and 2000, while leading the Lady Tigers to championship at the National Women's Invitation Tournament in 1985. In addition, Gunter has directed LSU to 12 20-plus win seasons.

Prior to her arrival in Baton Rouge, Gunter had a very successful coaching stint at Stephen F. Austin in Nacogdoches, Texas. While at SFA, Gunter built that program into a national powerhouse as she led the LadyJacks to a 266-87 mark in 12 years as head coach. In addition, she led Stephen F. Austin to

four top 10 national rankings, which included No. 5 final rankings in 1979 and 1980. While at Stephen F. Austin, Gunter coached four sports - women's basketball, softball, tennis and track. Her basketball teams went to five Association of Intercollegiate Athletics for Women (AIAW) playoffs, won four state titles, and earned a regional crown.

After 16 seasons at SFA, she relinquished the reigns and moved into the position of Director of Women's Athletics where she served two years before returning to the coaching ranks at LSU.

Gunter began her coaching career at Middle Tennessee State where she led the Blue Raiders to undefeated seasons in both of her years there.

Sue Gunter's impressive coaching credentials don't end with her contributions to the college game as she has also played a big part in the success of the United States in women's basketball on the International level.

Gunter has tasted success at the Olympics, however, as she was an assistant coach on the 1976 U. S. Team which captured the silver medal in Montreal.

Gunter has also served as head coach for the U.S. National Team three

times, as she led those squads in 1976, 1978 and 1980.

Gunter received her Bachelor and Master's degrees in 1962 from Peabody College in Nashville, Tenn. She followed that with post-graduate work at Texas Women's University.

A fine player in her own right, Gunter played AAU basketball for Nashville Business College from 1958-62 earning AAU All-America honors. She was also a member of the 1960-62

United States teams that competed against the Soviet Union.

Gunter has also become very active in many community service areas throughout Baton Rouge. This year alone, Gunter has played an active role in the Baton Rouge Area Lupas Foundation and she served as the honorary chairperson for the Walk for Alzheimer's in Baton Rouge. Gunter was also a finalist for the 1997 YWCA Women of Achievement Award, which recognizes the top women in the Baton Rouge community for contributions to their field.

The Lady Tigers earned a No. 6 seed in the NCAA Tournament and traveled to West Lafayette, Ind. for the first and second rounds. LSU shot over 58 percent from the field to defeat nationally-ranked and 11th seeded Arizona State, 83-66, to move on to face third-seeded Purdue. The Lady Tigers had come from being behind by more than 15 points in the second half to defeat the then sixth-ranked Boilermakers in Indianapolis, Ind., 62-55, earlier in the season. Despite cutting a 24-point deficit to just one with under a minute remaining, the Lady Tiger rally came up short, falling to Purdue, 73-70, and ending their NCAA Tournament run. Concluding her illustrious LSU career against Purdue, Kodak All-American Marie Ferdinand scored a school postseason record, matching her career-high with 34 points. The 2000-01 season also closed out the careers of two vital members of the LSU squad that helped the Lady Tigers advance to the NCAA Tournament three out of their four seasons — April Brown and Angelia Crockett.

**No. 14 LSU 64, No. 4 Ole Miss 59**

Pokey Chatman scored 29 points as 14th-ranked LSU upset fourth-ranked Ole Miss, 64-59, in Oxford. The win by LSU marked its second victory over a top five opponent that season.

**LSU 82, No. 5 Georgia 72**

Feb. 25, 1989 • Baton Rouge, La.

LSU beat its third top five ranked opponent of the season as the unranked Lady Tigers used a second-half explosion to beat fifth-ranked Georgia, 82-72, in Baton Rouge. Patricia Woods led LSU with 26 points and 11 rebounds.

**LSU 54, No. 15 Purdue 53**

March 19, 1989 • NCAA First Round • West Lafayette, Ind.

Pokey Chatman hit a jump shot with 38 seconds remaining to lift unranked LSU to a 54-53 over 15th-ranked Purdue in the first round of the NCAA Tournament. Chatman, who directed a second half comeback that saw the Lady Tigers rally from a 12-point deficit, led all scorers with 20 points.

March 4, 1991 • SEC Tournament Finals • Albany, Ga.

LSU beat its second top five opponent in as many days and captured its first SEC Tournament title in the process with an 80-75 win over fourth-ranked Tennessee. Pokey Chatman led LSU with 30 points, including 16 straight at one point.

### No. 23 LSU 76, No. 7 Vanderbilt 69

Barbara Henderson scored 29 points as LSU stunned seventh-ranked Vanderbilt 76-69, in Baton Rouge. The win over Vanderbilt marked the last time an LSU team beat a ranked opponent until the 1996 season.

### LSU 73, No. 2 Georgia 71

LSU shocked the women's basketball world as the Lady Tigers upset second-ranked and SEC regular-season champion Georgia in the second round of the SEC Tournament, 73-71, in Chattanooga, Tenn. The win marked only the third time in school history that LSU had beaten a team ranked as high as No. 2 in the nation. Pietra Gay led LSU with 24 points.

### No. 18 LSU 79, No. 13 Arkansas 72

Keia Howell had career-highs of 22 points and 18 rebounds as LSU beat 13th-ranked Arkansas, 79-72, before a school-record crowd of 6,552 at the PMAC. The win was the first for LSU over Arkansas in Baton Rouge.

### No. 18 LSU 75, No. 21 Auburn 64

Jan. 25, 1997 • Auburn, Ala.

Pietra Gay scored 32 points and hit a season-best seven 3-pointers as LSU beat Auburn for the first time ever at Auburn by a 75-64 count.

### No. 14 LSU 84, No. 5 Alabama 74

Feb. 1, 1997 • Baton Rouge, La.

Pietra Gay scored 22 points and had seven rebounds as LSU knocked off fifth-ranked

Alabama, 84-74, in Baton Rouge. The win over Alabama is the first for LSU since the 1991 season.

### No. 13 LSU 76, No. 20 Arkansas 70

Feb. 19, 1997 • Fayetteville, Ark.

LSU overcame a sluggish first half to outscore Arkansas 44-29 in the second half en route to a 76-66 win over the 20th-ranked Lady Backs in Fayetteville. Elaine Powell led LSU with 22 points.

### No. 13 LSU 83, No. 8 Tennessee 78

Feb. 22, 1997 • Baton Rouge, La.

Elaine Powell scored 32 points as Sue Gunter beat Tennessee for only the second time in her career in the Lady Tigers' 83-78 win over the eventual national champion Lady Vols. The victory also gave LSU a school-record nine SEC wins and clinched a third place finish in the SEC for the Lady Tigers.

### LSU 67, No. 10 Florida 57

Jan. 24, 1998 • Baton Rouge, La.

Katrina Hibbert scored 17 points and Latasha Dorsey added 15 points and eight rebounds as the unranked Lady Tigers knocked off 10th-ranked Florida in Baton Rouge by a 67-57 count. The win was the 14th straight at home for the Lady Tigers and the first against Florida since 1991.

### LSU 57, No. 10 Vanderbilt 46

Ashley Bankston scored a career-high 19 points as unranked LSU beat 10th-ranked Vanderbilt, 57-46. LSU limited Vanderbilt to just 34.0 percent from the field as only one Commodore scored in double-figures.

### LSU 63, No. 17 Auburn 61

Latasha Dorsey hit an 8-foot jumper with 1.3 seconds left to lift LSU to an unlikely 63-61 overtime win over Auburn in Baton Rouge. Dorsey's shot capped a comeback that saw LSU battle back from a 13-point deficit with just over five minutes left in regulation. DeTrina White led LSU with 18 points and 12 rebounds.

### No. 23 LSU 72, No. 1 Tennessee 69

Katrina Hibbert conventional 3-point play with 11.7 seconds lifted LSU to a 72-69 win over top-ranked Tennessee. The win was the first by LSU over a team ranked No. 1 in the nation and it gave the Lady Tigers their school-record 10th SEC victory. Hibbert, who was named SEC Player of the Week for her efforts, led the Lady Tigers with 18 points.

### No. 21 LSU 74, No. 8 Notre Dame 64

March 15, 1999 • NCAA Second Rounds • Baton Rouge, La.

Latasha Dorsey scored 24 points to lead LSU to a second round NCAA win over Notre Dame. Trailing 59-51 with 8:11 to play, the Lady Tigers used a 23-5 run over the games' final eight minutes to advance to Sweet 16. Dorsey scored 15 of LSU's final 23 points. The win extended LSU's home court winning streak against non-conference teams to 36 straight.

### No. 23 LSU 80, No. 2 Georgia 74

Dec. 2, 1999 • Athens, Ga.

Four Lady Tigers scored in double-figures to lead LSU to the huge road victory. April Brown poured in 25 points on 9-of-14 shooting from the field, and Marie Ferdinand added 21 points, six assists and four steals. Katrina Hibbert hit three 3-pointers and recorded 16 points, eight rebounds and six assists, while DeTrina White added 10 points and five rebounds. Brown and Hibbert

shared SEC Player of the Week honors after the triumph.

### No. 16 LSU 61, No. 20 Mississippi St. 54

LSU shot 50 percent from the field while limiting the Bulldogs to 37 percent shooting in the hard-fought victory. DeTrina White turned in a double-double performance, scoring 21 points and pulling down 10 rebounds. Katrina Hibbert and April Brown added 14 and 12 points, respectively.

### No. 12 LSU 64, No. 20 Mississippi St. 58

Jan. 30, 2000 • Starkville, Miss.

LSU outlasted the Bulldogs for the second time in one month, earning its sixth conference win in seven games and improving to 4-0 in SEC road contests. Katrina Hibbert connected on four 3-pointers and scored 22 points while Marie Ferdinand contributed 16 points and four assists.

### No. 7 LSU 54, No. 13 Auburn 52

Feb. 6, 2000 • Auburn, Ala.

LSU improved to 7-1 in the SEC and 5-0 in league road games with the triumph on the Plains. Katrina Hibbert hit 6-of-12 three-pointers, scoring 21 points with five assists and three rebounds, while April Brown added 15 points, two assists, two steals and three rebounds. LSU limited Auburn to just 35.8 percent shooting from the floor in the critical victory.

### No. 12 LSU 79, No. 7 Duke 66

March 25, 2000 • NCAA Sweet 16 • Richmond, Va.

LSU advanced to the NCAA Elite Eight for the second time in school history by overwhelming the Blue Devils. The Lady Tigers trailed, 31-30, at halftime, but shot 56.7 percent (17-30) in the second half, outscoring Duke, 49-35, to win by a comfortable margin. Marie Ferdinand scored 22 points, dished out eight assists and recorded three steals while DeTrina White contributed 19 points and 11 rebounds.

Marie Ferdinand scored 20 of her 25 points in the second half as LSU rallied from a 15 point second-half deficit to upset No. 6 Purdue, 62-55. With 38 seconds remaining, Ferdinand hit a backdoor lay up and was fouled to break a 55-55 tie. She hit the ensuing free throw to give LSU a three-point lead. After a defensive stop, Angelia Crockett hit two free throws to put away the Boilermakers. Ke-Ke Tardy and Roneeka Hodges each had 10 points for LSU to give the Lady Tigers three players in double-figures.

### No. 11 LSU 70, No. 17 Mississippi St. 63

Ke-Ke Tardy scored five of her 17 points to spark a 12-5 run in the final three minutes that gave No. 11 LSU a 70-63 victory over No. 17 Mississippi State. Tardy's biggest basket came with 1:51 to play as she hit a 17-footer from straight away to extend LSU's lead to 62-58. LSU led by as many as nine a few times in the second half, last at 52-43, before Mississippi State began to come back. Cynthia Hall capped a 15-6 Lady Bulldog run with a three-pointer at the 3:22 mark in the second half, which knotted the game at 58-58. The Lady Bulldogs were never able to take the lead as Marie Ferdinand converted on two free throws following the Hall foul to give LSU the lead back. An intentional foul allowed DeTrina White sealed the game for the LSU as she knocked down both free throws.

# Pokey Chatman

Dana "Pokey" Chatman enters her 11th season on the LSU women's basketball staff, and her third year as an associate head coach after being elevated to her current position in September 1999. Chatman, who dazzled LSU fans for four years as LSU's starting point guard in the late 1980s and early 1990s, is considered one of the best recruiters in the nation.

In addition for having a reputation of being one of the nation's best recruiters, Chatman is also thought to be one of the top up-and-coming coaches in the collegiate ranks. Chatman has led LSU's recruiting efforts over the last six years and as a result, the Lady Tigers have had five straight classes rank among the top 20 in the nation, including this year's class of newcomers which was rated as high as No. 5 in the nation.

Chatman's latest recruiting effort could go down as one of the best classes in school history as the Lady Tigers landed Aiysha Smith, a Kodak Junior College All-American last season who was listed by womenscollegehoops.com as one of the top 21 impact players for 2001-02.

Last season, Chatman landed prep All-Americans Doneeka and Roneeka Hodges out of New Orleans. The year before she helped sign Ke-Ke Tardy, the top player in Mississippi and ranked the 11th best player in the nation.

In 1997-98, Chatman landed one of the top 15 rated players in the country in forward DeTrina White, who went on to become the 1998-99 National Freshman of the Year. Both White and Tardy are returning starters for the Lady Tigers in 2001-02.

Besides coordinating all of LSU's recruiting efforts, Chatman also serves as the director for the Sue Gunter Basketball Camp. Chatman's primary on-court responsibility is the coaching and teaching of LSU's backcourt. Chatman is also involved in developing game plans during the season.

Since joining the Lady Tigers staff, Chatman has tutored some of the finest guards in the country. Marie Ferdinand was a 2001 Kodak All-American selection and a finalist for the prestigious Naismith Award, given to the



nation's best collegiate player. In addition to averaging over 21 points a game her senior season, she was a finalist for the Shooting Guard of the Year Award given out by ESPN. Ferdinand, a first round draft pick in the WNBA, is currently playing for the Utah Starzz and recently finished third in voting for the league's Rookie of the Year Award.

Cornelia Gayden was a three-time All-SEC pick and holds the NCAA record for 3-point goals in a single game with 12 against Jackson State. Other standouts under Chatman were Elaine Powell, a two-time first team All-SEC selection, Pietra Gay, an All-SEC pick in 1997, and Latasha Dorsey, a first team Defensive All-American in 1999. Powell is currently playing in the WNBA with the Orlando Miracle, while Gay was a member of the 1997 WNBA championship team, the Houston Comets.

Before being named to assistant coach prior to the 1992-93 season, Chatman served one season, 1991-92, as a student assistant with the Lady Tigers.

Chatman, a Kodak All-American point guard for the Lady Tigers in 1991, graduated from Hahnville High School in 1987. She received her Bachelor's degree from LSU in December of 1991.

During her four years with the Lady Tigers, Chatman started all but one game and is the school's all-time assists and steals leader with 570 and 346, respectively. She is also fifth on the all-time scoring list with 1,826 points. Chatman played in the NCAA Tournament four times and she posted a four-year record of 82-38.

Chatman was a three-time All-SEC selection and in 1991 as she led the Lady Tigers to their first-ever SEC Tournament title. Chatman was named MVP of the 1991 SEC Tournament, also a first for LSU.

Chatman capped her career at LSU by being selected to the prestigious Kodak All-American team following her senior season in 1991. Chatman is one of only four Lady Tigers ever named to the Kodak team. Chatman set a total of 20 school records while at LSU with five of those records still standing.

Chatman was inducted into the LSU Athletic Hall of Fame in the spring of 1999.

# Carla Berry

Carla Berry enters her first season as an assistant coach for the Lady Tigers to oversee academics and assist with recruiting. Berry was an outstanding guard for the LSU women's basketball team from 1988-92 and a member of the 1991 SEC Tournament championship team.

Bringing four years of recruiting experience to the program, Berry joins the accomplished LSU staff that has had five signing classes rank among the top 20 in the nation over the last six years. Berry returned just after Kodak Junior College All-American Aiysha Smith signed with the Lady Tigers. The pair reunites after Berry had helped sign Smith at St. John's right out of high school.

The opportunity to return to LSU was one that Berry could not pass up after having played for Coach Gunter and the Lady Tigers.

As one of the team's chief recruiters, her commitment to the program and its success is personal and transcends just her professional obligations as a coach.

Speaking from firsthand experience as a former LSU player, she has the ability to discuss the strengths of the program with recruits and lay out the opportunities LSU has to offer its student-athletes. She can speak truthfully about the resources the university, department and program have at its disposal for the student-athletes that will allow them to leave LSU with a positive and complete collegiate experience.

Berry, an Academic All-SEC selection in 1992, helped LSU advance to three NCAA Tournament appearances and was a part of the Lady Tigers' 1991 SEC Tournament Championship team. In 1993, she earned with her bachelor's degree in Advertising.



After graduating, she returned home to Alabama where she spent one season as a graduate assistant coach for the University of South Alabama in 1993-94. Berry then took a position as an assistant coach and recruiting coordinator for Cal-Poly San Luis Obispo in 1994 as the Mustangs made the difficult transition from NCAA Division II to Division I competition.

Taking a position at St. John's University in 1995, she spent three years with the women's basketball program as the top assistant and recruiting coordinator, working with current Lady Tiger administrative assistant Joe Carvalhido. Coaching a team that was in the process of rebuilding, the program showed improvement each year she was there, including a 13-win season in her final year. Additionally, in her three seasons at St. John's, the Red Storm penned a pair of recruiting classes ranked in the top 50 nationally, including one top 25 signing class that ranked third in the Big East behind Connecticut and Rutgers.

In addition to her recruiting responsibilities at LSU, Berry will also oversee academics for the Lady Tigers. Working closely with the Academic Center for Athletes, she will help coordinate study hall and tutors for the student-athletes and oversee their academic progress. Her primary on-court assignment will be coaching LSU's guards.

Immediately prior to joining the Lady Tiger staff, Berry spent two years working in sales for BellSouth and Cingular Wireless (formerly BellSouth Mobility) in her hometown of Mobile, Ala. She took the two years off from coaching to assist with an illness in the family.

# Bob Starkey

Bob Starkey enters his fourth season on the LSU women's basketball staff after joining the team on a full-time basis in 1998. Starkey had served as the administrative assistant for both the LSU men's and women's basketball team for two years prior to joining the Lady Tigers as assistant coach.

Starkey works with all phases of the program, which includes working with both perimeter and post players on the practice floor. He also breaks down game tape and develops game plans while compiling scouting reports on LSU's opponents. Starting last year, Starkey added recruiting to his list of responsibilities. He brought a wealth of experience to the Lady Tigers' recruiting efforts, having worked as a recruiter for LSU men's basketball, at Marshall University, and at West Virginia State.

In just his first year working as a recruiter for the Lady Tigers, Starkey helped sign a class of newcomers that ranked as high as fifth nationally, including Kodak Junior College All-American Aiysha Smith.

In addition, Starkey serves as the Director of the LSU women's basketball teams' Fast Break Club, and he is also involved in all areas of promotions for the women's program. Starkey also handles all scheduling for the Lady Tigers.

As the administrative assistant, Starkey provided valuable assistance to both the men's and women's programs, handling many of the responsibilities for both groups that would ease the work load for the coaching staff, allowing them to concentrate fully on their teams, recruiting and future opponents.

Starkey served as tournament director for the 1997 NCAA Women's Basketball Subregional held at the Maravich Assembly Center. The NCAA Subregional was the first for LSU to host and it was also called by many that attended the event as one of the best-run subregionals since the NCAA changed tournament formats five years ago.

Perhaps Starkey's finest achievement in the role of administrative assistant came in the Pack the PMAC games. In the 1997 Pack the PMAC contest against Arkansas, LSU drew a school-record 6,552 fans for the contest. The 6,552 fans for the contest nearly tripled the previous record crowd of 2,454 set against Ole Miss in 1984. A year later against Ole Miss, LSU reset the



school-mark with a crowd of 7,255 for Pack the PMAC II. Just this last year, the school record crowd of 9,636 for the Pack the PMAC V game against Auburn was the largest attendance ever for a women's basketball game in the state of Louisiana. The Pack the PMAC promotion has developed into an LSU tradition, as Pack the PMAC VI is set for Jan. 27-4, 2002, when the Lady Tigers face Vanderbilt.

Prior to his stint as an administrative assistant, Starkey served as an assistant coach for Dale Brown on the LSU men's basketball staff from 1990-1996, during which time the Tigers participated in four NCAA Tournaments. While on the men's staff, Starkey coached three first-round NBA draft picks in Shaquille O'Neal, Chris Jackson and Stanley Roberts. As a recruiter, he helped sign three nationally-ranked recruiting classes, including one which was rated No. 1 in the country.

Groomed on the high school level in West Virginia, Starkey started his coaching career as an assistant at Winfield High School where he helped guide the boys' program to a five-year record of 72-45 and the girls' program to an 87-23 record.

Starkey then made his first appearance on the collegiate level as an assistant at West Virginia College on the NAIA level. In his three-year stint at West Virginia State, the program blossomed with improving records of 17-10, 26-4 and 31-4. That final season saw the Yellow Jackets capture conference and district titles on their way to the NAIA National Championship game, where they were a one-point loser to Washburn University.

Following that, Starkey also served for one year at Poca High School in West Virginia with his former high school coach, Allen Osborne, and teamed up for the 1988-89 season with Judy Southard to lead the women's program at Marshall to an 18-10 record and a regular season Southern Conference Championship. Southard is now in her first year as the Senior Woman Administrator at LSU after serving as the Athletic Director at Texas Women's University.

Starkey, who considers himself a full-time student of the game, has written numerous articles and has authored such basketball books as The 2-3 Match-Up Defense and Motion Offense.

His latest project is a Basketball Coaching Series of books that include The Art of Being An Assistant Coach, The Art of Scouting and The Art of Motivation.

The native of Charleston, W.Va., is married to Sherie Hayslett, also a native of West Virginia.

# ON TRACK

## THE "D-TRAIN", SENIOR DETRINA WHITE, DIRECTS THE LADY TIGERS IN 2001-2002

LSU's success over the past five years has earned the Lady Tigers respect around the country, but with that respect comes raised expectations. LSU has proven itself with recent achievements: NCAA Tournament appearances in four of the past five years ... Three NCAA Sweet 16 appearances ... One NCAA Elite Eight appearance ... Three straight NCAA Tournament bids ... National rankings as high as seventh. However, the Lady Tigers are still searching for that elusive Final Four run.

This season, the Final Four is certainly within the Lady Tigers' reach. Despite losing three starters from a year ago, including Kodak All-American Marie Ferdinand, head coach **Sue Gunter** has confidence in the talent that will take the court for LSU in 2001-

02. A young team, led by All-America candidate **DeTrina "D-Train" White**, the lone LSU senior, will look to continue its streak of NCAA appearances and remain on track toward the Final Four and beyond.

With one of the best recruiting classes in school history, the Lady Tigers combine court-tested talent with a mix of raw skill that should give LSU one of the most balanced attacks it has had in years.

Averaging over 6-1, the front line for the Lady Tigers will be the tallest in more than four years, more than two inches taller than last year's team. While adding that height, LSU has not sacrificed athleticism, with players that can play tough underneath and still step out and shoot from the perimeter.

"Over the last few years, our frontcourt

has been relatively small," said Lady Tiger head coach Sue Gunter. "We have proven that a team can compete with very athletic players that are under six-feet tall, but this season we add power and size to our front-line that we haven't really seen in recent years and that gives us some options in the type of looks we send on the court."

In the backcourt, the Lady Tigers have lacked a true three-point threat in recent years, hitting fewer than 100 from beyond the arch the past two seasons, but that is something that will change this year.

"Despite losing one of the best guards in school history in Kodak All-American Marie Ferdinand, our overall perimeter shooting improves this season," said Gunter. "We have brought in a true three-point shooter that will give us the outside threat that we have been lacking."

"Our depth is also something that we have this season that has been missing over the last few years. We really have outstanding talent throughout our lineup and that production does not drop off when you look at our bench."

Here is the way the 2001-02 LSU Lady Tigers stack up position-by-position.

### GUARDS

The Lady Tigers' backcourt will be very young this season, featuring just two returning players.

Veteran **Kisha James** will lead the Lady Tigers from the point, but the 5-7 junior has the ability to step out and play the two-guard when needed. Last season, she returned to the line-up after a knee injury sidelined her for the entire 1999-00 season and averaged 5.8 points and 2.5 assists a game with a team-high 82.1 percent free-throw percentage.

"We expect great things from Kisha this season," said Gunter. "Last season she was coming off a knee injury, but now she is in great shape and is experiencing no residual problems with her knee."

"She worked very hard in the offseason to get better, which was something we needed her to do," Gunter continued. "She will play the one or two guard positions for us and provide us with some depth in our perimeter game."

Also returning for the Lady Tigers is sophomore **Doneeka Hodges**. The 5-9 shooting guard played in all 31 games for LSU as a true freshman and averaged 6.9 points a game and was second on the team in 3-pointers.

"Doneeka will see time for us at the two spot this season," said Gunter. "Although we will use her primarily as a shooting guard,

she also has the ability to play at the point, which gives us some versatility in our matchups. I am pleased with Doneeka's progress after she spent a lot of time working to improve her game in the offseason."

In addition to James and Hodges, the Lady Tigers add a junior, sophomore and freshman to the backcourt.

Junior **Patty Hanton** will add a three-point threat and instant scoring ability that LSU has been lacking over recent years. The 5-10 transfer from Miami-Dade Community College ranked ninth nationally in scoring at the junior college level last season with an average of 18.3 points per game and failed to score in double-figures just once.

"Patty is a true shooting guard," said Gunter. "She can come in and provide us with instant offense off the bench. Last season, we were missing the three-pointer from our game, and Patty will bring that element to this team. She has a great attitude and knows her role on this team."

Although ineligible last season and for the fall semester this season, sophomore **Temeka Johnson** was one of the top guards in the nation in high school and will be a leader on the court at point guard when she begins play in December.

"Temeka is a true point guard," said Gunter. "She will become eligible in December and we can't wait. She is a leader on the floor at the point and will provide us with some more depth along with Kisha James."

The final addition to the Lady Tiger backcourt is freshman **Scholanda Dorrell**. Following in the footsteps of Ferdinand, the

Edison High School product was rated as one of the top high school players in the nation as a guard and forward last season. Primarily a shooting guard, she is versatile enough to also play small forward at LSU. A relentless defender, she will add speed to the Lady Tiger team with her quickness and step in with playing time as a freshman.

"Everyone knows that Scholanda comes from the same high school as Marie Ferdinand and even though I would never compare anyone to Marie, I think they are very similar players," said Gunter. "Scholanda will give us some quality minutes this season. She has phenomenal speed and is tenacious on defense. I think her greatest asset is in the transition game. She is quick and athletic and can help us put some speed on the court."

### FORWARD

The Lady Tigers have depth at forward they haven't enjoyed in recent years. Senior All-America candidate **DeTrina White** will be counted on to provide leadership on the court. Although she was forced to miss 11 games last season with a misaligned vertebrae, she still averaged 9.5 points and a team-high 7.5 rebounds a game in her 20 appearances.

"In her three years at LSU she has had to deal with as much as any player I have ever had when it comes to injuries," said Gunter. "She knows how to play with pain. In all my years, there is no tougher player that I have coached."

Despite her 5-11 height, White was the Lady Tigers' starting center over the past three seasons and was able to dominate even the tallest opponents in the paint. With the addition of Aiysha Smith at center this season, White will get to play more of the power forward position, where her stature will match up better with opponents and her skill will be better showcased.

"She has worked as hard as anyone to transform her game and is now so sleek and quick," Gunter continued. "There is no kid in the country that is 5-10 or 5-11 that can play like they are 6-2 or 6-3 like DeTrina can. She maximizes her skills and is always improving on her power and range. For her size, she is the most dominating player in the country."

White is joined in the frontcourt by junior **Ke-Ke Tardy**. No longer the team's tallest player, Tardy can play both the small forward and power forward positions.

"Ke-Ke is a perfectionist and has really worked very hard to keep improving her game," said Gunter. "When we brought her in, we were looking at her to play the three, but she has evolved into a great four player."

Last season, Tardy averaged 9.3 points with a team-high 27 blocked shots, but it was her performance in the NCAA Tournament that really displayed her talent. Against Arizona State in the first round, she led the team with a career-high 21 points and six rebounds. She followed that up with a career-high 11 rebounds against Purdue in the second round.

"Ke-Ke has made tremendous strides in her game and that was most evident in the NCAA Tournament last season," said Gunter. The game against Arizona State was really a coming out for her. She was matching up with players much bigger than her underneath and she held her own."

Sophomore **Roneeka Hodges** returns after a stellar freshman campaign that saw her earn honorable mention Freshman All-America honors. The 5-11 lefty will play primarily at the small forward position after seeing time at both the three and four positions last season.

"With the injuries that our team suffered last season, Roneeka had to come in and play a lot of minutes as freshmen, but that experi-

ence is something that should help her out this year," said Gunter. "There is nothing that anyone can bring to the court that she has not seen. In addition to Roneeka's finesse and touch with the ball, she also has a great range on her shot. She is almost the perfect three player."

Talented freshman **Wendlyn Jones** could surprise a lot of people in the SEC this season. This 6-1 shooter is going to make an immediate impact in the frontcourt. She has

great range and is versatile enough to play both forward positions or center if needed.

"Wendlyn is going to come in and play for us as a freshman," said Gunter. "She is a strong, smart player with great range. She can play the five, but can still step out and take the three. I think that she will be one of the biggest surprises on our team this season."

The tallest player for the Lady Tigers this season is freshman **Tillie Willis**. Bringing a lot of raw talent to the team, Willis has the potential to be a force for LSU at power forward as she develops.

"Tillie comes in with great potential and is highly skilled, but she is still young and has a long way to go," said Gunter. "She is a very talented player, but she needs to keep learning as she spends more time on her game."

#### CENTER

For the first time in several years, the Lady Tigers will have some height in the paint. **Aiysha Smith**, one of the most highly touted junior college transfers to ever sign at LSU, will make an immediate impact on this team. The 6-2 junior has one year of NCAA experience under her belt, playing for St. John's out of the Big East Conference in 1999-2000. The junior college Kodak All-American from Tyler Junior College combines power with mobility to give the Lady Tigers a threat at both ends of the court.

"Aiysha was the best junior college player in the country last year at Tyler, leading her

team to the national tournament where they made a good run at the title," said Gunter. "She is probably the best junior-college transfer we have had since Elaine Powell. She is a power player with strength and mobility that will compliment DeTrina at the four spot. She will have to come in and be an impact player for us this season if we are going to be successful."

#### ROSTER MOVES

Sophomore Temeka Johnson was a non-qualifier and did not participate in any games with the Lady Tigers last season. She will be eligible to begin her collegiate career for LSU in December.

Freshman **Florence Williams**, a 6-1 forward from Miami, Fla. (Edison HS) was an NCAA partial qualifier and will not be eligible to play this season. She will practice and participate in workouts with the Lady Tigers, but will not compete until next season.

#### 2001-02 SCHEDULE

Once again, the Lady Tigers' schedule is stacked with difficult opposition as eight 2001 NCAA Tournament participants made the schedule with a potential matchup against one other in early tournament play.

"This is probably the strongest schedule we have had in some time, particularly because of our non-conference opponents," said Gunter. "I am sure that our schedule will be among the top five or six most difficult in the country. We will be challenged early, but it should be excellent preparation for when we enter conference play."

LSU begins the season on Nov. 7 with an exhibition game against the Jackson All-Stars. The regular season begins in the PMAC against Grambling on Nov. 20, one of eight non-conference opponents the Lady Tigers host this season. LSU enters the year with a 54-game non-conference home winning streak and has not lost a non-conference home game since January 1995.

Purdue, which finished as the runner-up to NCAA Champion Notre Dame last season, will visit Baton Rouge on Dec. 2. The Lady Tigers overcame a 15-point second-half deficit to defeat the Boilermakers early last season, but fell three points short in the second round of the NCAA Tournament, 73-70.

"We played Purdue twice last season and split with them, winning in Indianapolis and losing in the NCAA Tournament on their home court," said Gunter. "This should be an exciting game that the fans should definitely not miss. Purdue lost by just two points in the NCAA Championship game and this year we have a chance to play them at home."

The Lady Tigers will host Michigan and

take on Colorado in Lubbock, Texas. Both teams advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament last season. Other non-conference opponents include in-state rival Louisiana-Lafayette, Mercer, Rice and Prairie View. In the LSU-hosted women's college-hoops.com Crawfish Classic, the Lady Tigers will take on Tennessee-Martin on Nov. 24 and face either Virginia Tech or Northwestern State on Nov. 25. Virginia Tech also advanced to the NCAA Tournament last season, falling to Texas Tech in the second round.

LSU begins SEC play on the road against Georgia on Jan. 3. The Lady Tigers will open the home conference schedule against Florida on Jan. 10 and host conference rivals Arkansas, Auburn, Mississippi State, Ole Miss, South Carolina and Vanderbilt in 2001-02. LSU will also travel to Tennessee, Vanderbilt, Kentucky, Alabama, Ole Miss, Arkansas and Kentucky to round out SEC play.

"Our conference schedule is extremely tough as always," said Gunter. "I think the team to beat this year is going to be Vanderbilt. They did not lose a single player from a team that went to the Elite Eight last season and we see them twice this year."

"We have had a difficult conference schedule made even more difficult over the past few years because of the way our schedule lays out. We have really not gotten a break," Gunter continued. "We play two of our first three SEC games at Georgia and Tennessee and then close out with Arkansas, Vanderbilt and Alabama on the road in three of our last five games. The spacing of those games concerns me."

Along with LSU, five teams from the SEC - Arkansas, Florida, Georgia, Tennessee and Vanderbilt - advanced to the NCAA Tournament last season, with all moving on to at least the second round. Tennessee was knocked out in the Sweet 16 and Vanderbilt made it to the round of eight before losing to eventual national champion Notre Dame. The Lady Tigers will play seven games against those five teams in 2001-02.

#### NON-CONFERENCE HOME WIN STREAK REMAINS INTACT

LSU enters the 2001-02 season with a 54-game non-conference winning streak at home. The Lady Tigers have not lost a non-conference game in the Pete Maravich Assembly Center since Jan. 30, 1995, when LSU dropped a 68-62 decision to Lamar. LSU was 7-0 in non-conference home action last season. LSU's 54-game streak includes six NCAA Tournament wins and two WNIT triumphs.

### LADY TIGERS DOMINATE NON-RANKED OPPONENTS

Over the past three seasons, the Lady Tigers have lost just seven games against non-ranked opponents, posting a 53-7 (.883) record against those teams. LSU has improved each of the last three seasons when it comes to non-ranked teams, posting records of 17-3 (.850) in 1998-99 and 20-2 (.909) in 1999-2000. Last year, LSU fell only once to a non-ranked team, dropping a 65-62 heartbreaker to Auburn for Pack the PMAC V, making the Lady Tigers 16-1 (.941) in 2000-01.

### LADY TIGERS AMONG THE SEC ELITE

LSU has posted the third-best overall record among SEC teams over the past five seasons. Beginning with the 1996-97 campaign, LSU has recorded a 132-54 (.716) mark. Here's how the SEC teams rank in overall records over the past five years:

### PACK THE PMAC VI

One of the most successful promotions in women's college basketball is the annual "Pack the PMAC" game in the Pete Maravich Assembly Center. This season's event will take place when the Lady Tigers play host to Vanderbilt on Jan. 27. Pack the PMAC is a joint effort between the LSU Athletic Department and several Baton Rouge businesses to attract record-breaking crowds for

Lady Tiger basketball. Five of the top six crowds in LSU women's basketball history were recorded at the Pack the PMAC games, including the LSU and Louisiana record attendance of 9,636 set in February 2001, when the Lady Tigers lost a 65-62 heart-breaker to Auburn.

### GUNTER NEARS 650 WIN MARK, RANKS HIGH IN NCAA RECORD BOOK

Entering the 2001-02 season, Lady Tiger head coach Sue Gunter is just 17 wins from posting the 650th victory of her career, becoming only the third coach in NCAA history to reach that milestone. In 37 years of coaching, Gunter has compiled a 633-284 record, which ranks her as the fourth winningest head coach in NCAA history. One two other coaches who have reached the 650-victory mark, Jody Conradt from Texas with 766 wins and Pat Summitt from Tennessee with 759 wins.

Gunter has been a head basketball coach for a total of 37 seasons, but the NCAA office only recognizes 31 seasons due to incomplete record keeping during the first six seasons in her career. With 31 recognized seasons coached, Gunter ranks second in NCAA history for seasons coached at 31, behind Conradt with 32. Gunter also ranks second in most games coached with 917, behind the 1,014 games coached by Conradt.

In addition, Gunter now stands alone in fourth place in NCAA history for 20-win seasons in a career. With the 20-11 record last year, Gunter has now posted 20-wins or better in 20 seasons, breaking the tie with Penn State head coach Rene Portland, who has 17. Conradt Summitt hold the NCAA record with 25 20-win seasons, followed by C. Vivian Stringer of Rutgers with 23.

Enjoying continued success and increased popularity, the 2001 Southeastern Conference Women's Basketball Tournament moves to Nashville, Tenn. The Gaylord Entertainment Center (16,304) will serve as the tournament's home.

The 2001 tournament proved to be another success for the league. The session five attendance of 11,182 was the second-largest attended session in tournament history.

The total tournament attendance of 32,793 ranks fifth in all-time total attendance.

Previous to this year, the tournament was held in Chattanooga, Tenn. The 1999 tournament proved to be the most successful when several attendance records were shattered. The single session record was demolished when 11,788 fans watched the semifinal game in session five. The previous record was 9,872, set in 1996.

Chattanooga also hosted the event for five years from 1993-97. During that time, the SEC tournament experienced a growth in fan support, highlighted in 1997 as records were broken in overall (36,391), single-session (9,872 - Session 3) and championship game (7,121) attendance.

The tournament moved to Columbus, Ga. in 1998 where the championship game record was broken when 7,603 fans watched Tennessee squeak by Alabama 67-63.

Albany, Ga., served as the site of the tournament for six years from 1987-92. Prior to 1987 the tournament was held at campus sites, beginning with its inception in 1980.

The winner of the 11-game tournament will receive the league's automatic bid to the NCAA Tournament. The tournament seeds and conference champion will be determined by the 12-game regular-season SEC schedule.



The top four seeds earn a first-round bye.

The 2002 SEC Women's Basketball Tournament will once again enjoy live television coverage. FOX Sports Net South continues its dedication to SEC events by televising all four second round games as well as both semifinal games. The championship game will once again be televised on ESPN2.

Tickets for this year's event will be available in mid-December. Prices are: reserved tournament book, \$70; general admission Dr Pepper Six-Pack tournament book, \$40; reserved single-session (six sessions total), \$15; general admission single-session, \$10.

## Lady Tigers Advance to NCAA Tournament for Fourth Time in Five Years

**OVERALL RECORD: 20-11**

**SEC RECORD: 8-6 (T-FOURTH PLACE)**

**FINAL NATIONAL RANKINGS: NO. 18 BY AP**

For the fourth time in five years, the Lady Tiger basketball team advanced to the NCAA Tournament. LSU joins just Tennessee and Georgia in the SEC in sending teams to the last three NCAA tournaments. The Lady Tigers finished the year with a record of 20-11, 8-6 in the SEC, and travelled to West Lafayette, Ind. for the first and second rounds of the NCAA Tournament. LSU overwhelmed Arizona State, 83-66, in the first round. Advancing to the second round for the eighth time in school history, the Lady Tigers lost a heartbreaker, 73-70, to Purdue, which advanced on to the tournament championship game and lost by two points to national champion Notre Dame.

### NOTES OF INTEREST

- LSU used seven different starting lineups in 2000-01, compared to just four starting line-ups in the previous two seasons combined
- Eight of the 10 Lady Tigers started at least one game last season
- Senior **Marie Ferdinand** scored in double-digits in 35 straight games, including every game her senior season, to end her career. It is the fourth longest streak in school history.
- The Lady Tigers average height was just over 5'10, with only one player over six feet tall.
- With a 7-0 record against non-conference opponents in the Pete Maravich Assembly Center in 2000-01, the Lady Tigers extended their non-conference home winning streak to 54 games, the longest in the SEC.

### LSU GETS WIN NO. 500 IN 26TH SEASON

With its 75-47 win over Mercer on Dec. 10, LSU picked up the 500th win in the history of the program. The Lady Tigers are now 515-285 (.644) all-time. LSU has averaged 19.8 wins per season in its first 26 years of women's hoops. The Lady Tigers have recorded 14 20-win seasons in their history, including last year's 20-11 record. The 1977-78 Lady Tigers season still ranks as the best in terms of wins and winning percentage as LSU posted a 37-3 mark.

### GUNTER HITS MILESTONE NUMBERS; 350 AND 900

LSU head coach **Sue Gunter** earned her 350th win as the head coach of the Lady Tigers on Nov. 28 as her LSU team beat SMU, 83-62. Gunter increased her win total with the Lady Tigers to 367 over 19 years and is the second winningest coach (men's or women's) in LSU basketball history behind former men's basketball coach Dale Brown with 448 victories over 25 years.

Against Mississippi State she became the second coach in NCAA history to reach 900 games coached. Gunter ranks second in NCAA history in career games coached behind only Texas' Jody Conradt, who had been on the sideline for 1,014 games. Pat Summitt of Tennessee also hit the 900-game plateau in 2000-01.

### FERDINAND NAMED KODAK ALL-AMERICAN

Senior guard Marie Ferdinand lived up to her preseason hype as the senior was named LSU's fourth Kodak All-American. She was also a second-team All-America selection by the Women's Basketball Journal and the Associated Press.

Both the league's coaches (unanimous) and the Associated Press selected Ferdinand as a First-Team All-SEC selection. It was the second straight year for her to earn all-conference honors.

In addition, Ferdinand was one of 15 finalists for the Naismith Player of the Year Award. The Naismith Awards Program honors the most outstanding college basketball ball players in the country. She was also one of three finalists for the Shooting Guard of the Year Award presented by ESPN the Magazine.

Ranked third in the SEC in scoring and fourth in field goal percentage, Ferdinand averaged 21.1 points per game, with 51.2 percent aim. She also ranked fifth in steals with 76 and 10th in assists with 107 in the league. She concluded her phenomenal collegiate career with the Lady Tigers ranked in the top 10 in three-season and 11-career school-record categories.

Chosen to represent LSU at the Women's Basketball Coaches Association (WBCA) All-Star Challenge, Ferdinand scored 10 points and was named the Most Valuable Player on her Blues team as they fell 74-66 to the opposing Jazz.

**LADY TIGERS GET 20TH WIN**

With an 83-66 victory over Arizona State in the first round of the NCAA Tournament, LSU hit the 20-win plateau for the 14th time in school history and for the third consecutive season. For only the second time in school history, the Lady Tigers hit 20 wins in three straight years. The last time came between 1983-87 when LSU ran off five straight 20-win seasons. Tennessee and Georgia are the only other SEC teams that have posted three 20-win seasons in the past three years.

**LSU'S MAGIC NUMBER IS 75**

The 75-point mark has become somewhat of a magical number for LSU as the Lady Tigers have become almost unbeatable

when scoring 75 or more points. Since the 1996-97 season, LSU has posted a 65-2 (.970) record when scoring at least 75 points in a game. LSU was 11-1 (.917) in 2000-01 when reaching the 75-point plateau, with its only loss coming against No. 16 Southwest Missouri (85-75). In that same five-year period, the Lady Tigers barely break even in games when failing to score 75 points and were just 47-41 (.534) in that time, including a 9-10 (.474) record in 2000-01.

**TOURNAMENT STREAKS**

LSU is one of four Southeastern Conference schools to have earned a repeat bid to the NCAA Tournament last season. Of the four, the Lady Tigers have the third most consecutive tourney bids (3) behind Tennessee (19) and Georgia (6), which rank first and second. Last year's bid, along with no bid for Auburn or Mississippi State, makes LSU one of only three conference schools that went to its third straight NCAA tournament.

**AVERAGES ARE TOUGH TO HIT AGAINST LADY TIGERS**

After allowing 89 points to No. 2 Tennessee in its conference opener on Jan. 4, the LSU defense went on a mission. In the Lady Tigers' next 14 games, they held 11 opponents well below their season average while allowing just three to hit it. In that stretch, LSU posted a 9-5 record.

**BROWN IS 11TH PLAYER TO HAVE 1,000 POINTS AND 500 REBOUNDS**

Against Louisiana-Lafayette on Jan. 30, April Brown became the 20th player in LSU history to score 1,000 career points. Brown concluded her career with 1,125 points scored. Twelve days earlier when facing Kentucky, Brown recorded her 500th career rebound. She is one of only 19 LSU players to ever hit that milestone. She is part of an exclusive club that only 12 players in Lady Tiger history belong to as she recorded 1,000 points and 500 rebounds in her career. Marie Ferdinand became the 12th player in the exclusive club in the season against Tennessee.

**FERDINAND GETS 1,500TH POINT AND 500TH REBOUND AGAINST UT**

On Feb. 18, against Tennessee, Marie Ferdinand hit yet another pair of milestones. With her ninth point, she hit 1,500 career points, becoming the ninth LSU player to ever do so. She also hauled in seven rebounds, the sixth of which was the 500th of her career. She is just the 19th player in LSU history to accomplish that feat. Ferdinand notched her 1,000th career point in the Lady Tigers season opener against New Mexico in

the Women's Sports Foundation Classic.

**1,500 POINT-500 REBOUND-300 ASSIST-200 STEAL CLUB**

Marie Ferdinand was one of the most complete players in LSU history, and she had the numbers to back it up. Last season, Ferdinand joined an elite group in the 1,500 point-500 rebound-300 assist-200 steal club at LSU. She concluded her career with 1,648 points, 524 rebounds, 384 assists and 239 steals. There have been only four players in LSU history that have been able to produce those statistical numbers in their careers, and three - Ferdinand, Joyce Walker and Julie Gross - went on to earn Kodak All-America honors.

Sophomore forward Ke-Ke Tardy made 8-of-9 shots from the field and scored a career best 21 points to lead LSU to an 83-66 victory over the No. 11-seeded Arizona State Sun Devils in the first round of the NCAA Tournament. Using over 64-percent shooting from the field, the Lady Tigers held a 43-32 lead at halftime.

Senior Kodak All-American Marie Ferdinand dumped in 19 points and pulled down six rebounds. Kisha James came off the bench to score 13 clutch points for LSU, while April Brown and DeTrina White added a solid 10 points each.

LSU survived a 51-percent shooting performance by Arizona State to advance to the NCAA second round for the third straight year and pick up its 20th victory for the fourth time in five seasons.

The Lady Tigers cut a 24-point deficit to the third-seeded Purdue Boilermakers to one point in the final minute, but fell 73-70 to the eventual NCAA Tournament runners-up.

Despite a heroic effort by senior Kodak All-American Marie Ferdinand, who spearheaded the Lady Tiger effort with a career-high tying 34 points in her final game at LSU, the comeback fell just short.

Purdue used a 23-0 run in the first half to go up by 24 points with just over five minutes remaining until intermission. Cutting that lead to just 17 at halftime, LSU outscored Purdue 39-25 in the second half and got within one point with 32 seconds remaining.

The Lady Tigers waited until the shot clock ran out to foul Purdue's Katie Douglas with only 2.9 seconds remaining. Douglas hit both free throws and LSU failed to get a shot off as time expired.

## AIAW Runner-Up

With one of the most dominating forward-center combinations in LSU women's basketball history in Australians Julie Gross and Maree Jackson, the Lady Tigers enjoyed one of their finest seasons ever in 1976-77.

The Lady Tigers, behind the play of Gross and Jackson, started the season off slow, splitting its first four games. With a 2-2 mark, the Lady Tigers then ran off four straight wins, three of which came on the road against Alabama, Northwestern State, and Mississippi State to improve to 6-2. After a road loss to Memphis State, LSU made a run that saw the Lady Tigers win 13 of their next 14 games with the only setback coming at Louisiana Tech.

Southeastern Louisiana snapped LSU's 11-game winning streak with a 106-69 victory over the Lady Tigers in Hammond on Feb. 14. With the loss, LSU's record stood at 19-5 with two regular-season game remaining. LSU won both of those contests, beating Northeastern Louisiana and Southeastern Louisiana in Baton Rouge to end its regular-season with a 21-5 mark.

The Lady Tigers then headed to the AIAW State Tournament in Ruston. LSU easily handled New Orleans in the first round, winning 85-58, followed by a 73-51 victory over Southern. Louisiana Tech stopped LSU in the semifinals as the Techsters posted a 101-88 win

over LSU. The Lady Tigers then fell to Northwestern State, 87-82, but the Lady Tigers still managed to finish in second place at the state tournament.

By virtue of its second place finish at the state tournament, LSU advanced to the AIAW Regional Tournament in Monroe.

"We went to the regional tournament with guarded optimism," LSU coach Jinks Coleman said. "I felt we didn't do enough work, but I still felt we had a chance. Until then, we were inconsistent, winning a big game and then losing a little one."

At the regional tournament, the Lady Tigers got on a roll as they whipped Texas, 95-67, in the first round followed by a 76-73 win over a Sue Gunter-coached Stephen F. Austin team in the semifinals. LSU beat Baylor, 92-76, in the championship game to advance to the AIAW National Tournament in Minneapolis, Minn.

At the AIAW National Tournament, the Lady Tigers drew Western Washington in the first round.

"We got a good draw playing Western Washington first," Coleman said. "I did some calling around and found out that they were weak, but they had been to nationals before. We were just so excited to be there, but I let the team know that we had a chance at winning."

LSU had little trouble with Western Washington as the Lady Tigers, behind 40 points from Maree Jackson, raced out to 49-26 halftime lead and never looked back in their 91-53 win. Next up for the Lady Tigers was Baylor, a team that LSU had already beat twice during the season, which included a victory over the Bears in the regional finals.

LSU was once again victorious over Baylor as the Lady Tigers behind 35 points and 26 rebounds from Maree Jackson advanced with a 71-64 win.

The Lady Tigers then moved into the semifinal round against Immaculata, a powerhouse in women's basketball at the time. Immaculata was ranked No. 2 in the nation and was considered a huge favorite in the contest with the Lady Tigers.

"Immaculata was outstanding," Coleman said before the contest. "We had nothing to lose. On paper, I felt like we could be them, but that was on paper."

Coleman's hunch that LSU could win proved true as the Lady Tigers upset Immaculata, 74-68, despite the fact that Jackson played after having root canal surgery and Brenda McGuffie played with a severely sprained ankle. In addition, Jackson and McGuffie played the final 10 minutes of the contest with four fouls. Jackson finished with 29 points and 19 rebounds, while Gross had 23

points and 11 boards.

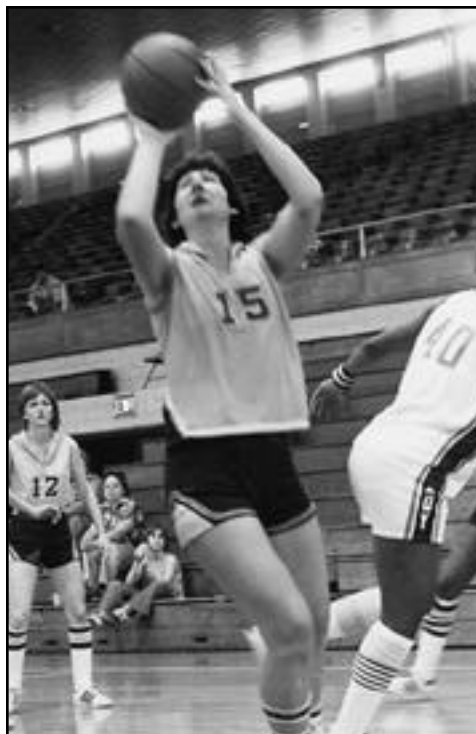
"Thelma McCoy and Julie (Gross) really picked up the slack for us," Coleman said.

It was on to the national championship game for LSU as the 11th-ranked Lady Tigers would face top-ranked Delta State for the title.

Delta State scored the first six points of the contest and the Delta Devils quickly built a nine point advantage, 13-4, on a jumper by Debbie Brock at the 15:14 mark. LSU could get no closer than seven points the rest of the way as Lady Tiger All-American Jackson picked up her third foul with 5:54 to play in the first half. Delta State led 34-25 at intermission.

In the second half, Delta State never let the Lady Tigers back in the contest as the Delta Devils held Jackson to a career-low six points in posting a 68-55 victory. Lucy Harris, the best women's player in the country at the time, led Delta State with 23 points and 16 rebounds.

The Lady Tigers finished the year with an overall record of 29-8 and ranked No. 11 in the nation. That team still holds the distinction of being the only Lady Tiger team ever to reach the national championship game of a post-season tournament.

## Pete Maravich Assembly Center



When you think of dreaded road playing sites in America, Tennessee's Thompson-Boling Arena and Connecticut's Gampel Pavilion come to mind. You can add the Pete Maravich Assembly Center on the LSU campus to that list.

Over the last five years, the LSU women's basketball team has established the Pete Maravich Assembly Center as one of the toughest road playing sites in not only the Southeastern Conference, but in the nation. Since the 1996-97 season, the Lady Tigers have posted a remarkable home record of 70-7 (.909), which is second only to Tennessee in the SEC.

In all, over the last five years, LSU has won six NCAA Tournament games and a pair of Women's NIT contests at the PMAC. Throw in the fact that LSU is 12-5 at home against top 25 teams over the last five years, and the PMAC can back up its claim as one of the nation's most-feared road sites. In addition to their success on the court, the Lady Tigers are also playing before record crowds. Last year, LSU averaged 1,494 fans at home games, with that total increasing to 2,374 for its SEC home games. Last season, LSU broke the school single-game attendance record with a crowd of 9,636 against Auburn, the largest attendance ever for a women's basketball game in the state of Louisiana. The top 10 crowds at the PMAC have all come since the 1996-97 season, and the Lady Tigers have played before 5,000 or more at home eight times over the last five years.

LSU enters the 2001-02 season riding a school-record 54-game non-conference home winning streak, a streak that was extended by seven games last season, as the Lady Tigers dominated the non-conference competition with an average victory of over 35 points.

Although LSU had a 41-game home winning

streak against non-ranked opponents snapped last season by Auburn, the Lady Tigers are still 62-3 over the last five years. LSU posted undefeated records at home over non-ranked opponents in 1999-00 (17-0), 1998-99 (11-0) and 1996-97 (11-0).

In 1999-00, the Lady Tigers set a school-record with 17 home victories with their only loss coming at the hands of second-ranked Tennessee. In addition, LSU tied the school-record with six home SEC wins, equaling the mark set in 1997-98 and 1998-99. LSU's 27 SEC wins over the last five years are more home league wins for the Lady Tigers than in the 11 previous years combined.

The 1996-97 season proved to be the starting point for LSU's success at home. That year, the Lady Tigers posted a 14-1 home mark and knocked off such teams as eventual national champion Tennessee as well as fifth-ranked Alabama, and 13th-ranked Arkansas. In addition to the victories, LSU drew then a school-

record crowd of 6,552 for the "Pack the PMAC" contest against Arkansas. After the Arkansas contest, LSU drew three more crowds that ranked in the top ten as 5,502 fans witnessed the LSU-Marquette NCAA second round contest, 5,260 for the LSU-Maine NCAA first round game, and 3,731 for the LSU-Tennessee game. Overall in

1996-97, LSU drew a school-record 31,259 fans for its 15 home games for a school record average of 2,084 a contest. LSU's home average of 1,632 in 1998-99 is the second-highest total in school history.

In 26 years at the PMAC, LSU's home court advantage can be compared with the best programs from across the country as the Lady Tigers have won 77 percent of their home games with a 262-80 overall mark. The Lady Tigers have recorded a 72-42 mark in SEC contests. LSU has also put together winning streaks of 26 and 24 games at home.

The Lady Tigers have won 10 or more games 17 years in the PMAC, and LSU has only suffered two losing records at home over the last 26 years. Over that span, LSU has averaged 10 wins and three losses a year. The Lady Tigers have gone undefeated twice, going 14-0 in both 1977-78 and 1985-86.

Built in 1971 and seating 14,164 spectators, the massive \$11.5 million building competes with its neighbor across the street -- Tiger Stadium -- as the most visible structure on the LSU campus.

During the summer of 1988, Louisiana Governor Buddy Roemer signed legislation changing the official name of the building to the Pete Maravich Assembly Center in honor of the LSU star who had died tragically earlier that same year.

In addition to the normal basketball-seating configuration, a proscenium stage can be lowered into place at the north end allowing some 4,500 seats for theatrical productions. An additional 1,000 seats can be placed on the floor for graduations, convocations, lectures, concerts or other special events.

Also located in the building is an auxiliary practice gym used for basketball and volleyball practices and various P.E. classes; home and visitor dressing rooms; coaches dressing rooms, building administration offices; theater dressing rooms; Tiger Athletic Foundation offices; and the "L" Club meeting room with kitchen facilities.

The Assembly Center has been the site for both men's and women's NCAA Regional Tournaments, the 1981 SEC Women's Basketball Tournament, the 1988 SEC Men's Basketball Tournament and two SEC Volleyball Tournaments.

The Pete Maravich Assembly Center is also home for the LSU volleyball and gymnastics teams.

## Pack the PMAC

What started out as a dream five years ago has developed into one of the biggest and the best promotional events in all of women's basketball, as Pack the PMAC returns for year number six this season.

The concept of Pack the PMAC is simple - a blowout ticket giveaway throughout Baton Rouge and surrounding communities in an attempt to fill the Pete Maravich Assembly Center for a women's basketball game. After five years, Pack the PMAC has blossomed into a much-anticipated event and it will once again be the highlight of the LSU women's basketball schedule. This year's Pack the PMAC game is set for Sunday, Jan. 27 against Vanderbilt.

For two weeks prior to the contest, LSU uses a media blitz to promote both the game and the "Flying Frenzy" halftime contest. In addition, over 35,000 tickets are distributed throughout Baton Rouge in hopes of packing the Maravich Assembly Center. To add more interest to the event, Jon Fos and Levis Mitsubishi annually donate a Montero Sport, valued at over \$25,000 to be given away at halftime if a fan can throw a paper airplane through the sunroof. In 1999-00, Rich Bisson became the first person in the history of the event to win the vehicle. In addition to the car giveaway, there are also televisions, shopping sprees, and other items that can be won in the halftime "Flying Frenzy" contest.

In five years the event has become a tremendous success, but more important than the actual game is the fact that Baton Rouge has finally become introduced, and welcomed, to LSU women's basketball at its finest hour.



Since the first Pack the PMAC contest in 1997, LSU has had the school's 10 largest crowds, which includes eight crowds of 5,000

or better. Prior to 1997, the Lady Tigers had never played before a crowd larger than 2,500 at the Maravich Assembly Center. Five of LSU's top six home crowds have come at Pack the PMAC.

In the first year, the Lady Tigers drew a school-record crowd of 6,552 as LSU beat Arkansas, 79-72. A year later, for Pack the PMAC II, LSU reset the school-record as 7,255 witnessed the Lady Tigers' 69-56 win over Ole Miss.

In 1999-00, 6,352 fans witnessed the first nationally televised broadcast of an LSU women's basketball game as the Lady Tigers knocked off Arkansas, 68-51 on ESPN2. Pack the PMAC V drew a school-record 9,636 fans, the largest attendance ever at a women's basketball game in the state of Louisiana.

## All-Americans

## Julie Gross

FORWARD, 6-2  
TATURA, AUSTRALIA



Julie Gross became LSU's first Kodak All-American when she earned the honor following her sophomore season in 1978 after averaging 20.7 points and 11.5 rebounds for the Lady Tigers. She was also named honorable mention All-America by the Basketball News in 1980 when she averaged 17.6 points and 9.5 rebounds.

Gross finished her career as the all-time leading rebounder in LSU history with 1,466 rebounds and second on the all-time scoring list with 2,488 points. Gross is also the second leading rebounder in SEC history.



## Joyce Walker

GUARD, 5-8  
SEATTLE, WASH.



Joyce Walker holds the distinction of being the only player in LSU history to be named to the prestigious Kodak All-America team two times.

Walker, considered by many to be one of the best players in SEC history, was a three-time selection to the Basketball News All-America team.

Walker, the second leading scorer in SEC history with 2,906 points (24.8 ppg) was selected to both the Kodak and Basketball News in 1983 after averaging 27.6 points a game.

In 1982, her first year as an All-American, Walker was named to the Basketball News All-America Team, while in 1984 she was named to the Kodak, Basketball News and JC Penney All-America teams.

Walker is the only player in LSU history to rank in the school's Top 10 in scoring, rebounding, assists, steals, and blocked shots.

At LSU, Walker is the all-time leading scorer, 10th in rebounding, third in assists, second in steals, and 10th in blocked shots.

In the summer of 1997, Walker was elected to the Louisiana Hall of Fame.



## All-Americans

### Maree Jackson

CENTER, 6-2  
ALBURY, AUSTRALIA



Maree Jackson became LSU's first Basketball News All-American in 1978 when she was named to the team following her sophomore season. As a sophomore, Jackson scored 1,021 points (25.5 ppg) and grabbed 539 rebounds (13.5 rpg). The 1,021 points and 539 rebounds are the most in both SEC and LSU history for one season.

In just two seasons with the Lady Tigers, Jackson scored 1,852 points which places her third on the all-time scoring list. She also finished her career as the second leading rebounder in LSU history with 1,032 rebounds.

For her career, Jackson averaged 26.4 points a game, which still stands as the SEC record.



### Rene Moran

GUARD, 5-9  
PEARL RIVER, LA.



Rene Moran was a third team selection on the Basketball News All-America team in 1980. During that season, Moran led the Lady Tigers in scoring with a 21.6 average.

Moran, who transferred to LSU from Southeastern Louisiana, played only two seasons with LSU. A year after earning All-America honors, Moran injured her knee two weeks before the start of the 1980-81 season and never played again. She finished her career at LSU with 1,023 points and 304 rebounds.

## Dana "Pokey" Chatman

GUARD, 5-5  
AMA, LA.



Pokey Chatman capped her career at LSU by earning Kodak, Basketball Weekly and United States Basketball Writer's Association All-America honors following her senior season in 1991.

During the 1991 season, Chatman scored 576 points (18.6 ppg) and dished out 157 assists (5.1 apg). Chatman is the fifth all-time leading scorer in school history with 1,826 points. She is also LSU's all time leader in both assists (570) and steals (346).

During her four years at LSU, Chatman started all but one game and set 20 school records. She also led the Lady Tigers to their first-ever SEC Tournament title in 1991. Chatman was named MVP of the 1991 SEC Tournament.



## Latasha Dorsey

GUARD, 5-7  
ABBEVILLE, LA.



Latasha Dorsey had an outstanding senior season for the Lady Tigers as she led LSU to the Sweet 16 at the NCAA Tournament and was named a first team Defensive All-American by the Women's Basketball Journal.

As a senior, Dorsey ranked third in the SEC with 2.5 steals a contest. She also averaged 12.9 points and 4.2 assists a contest.

Dorsey completed her LSU career with more post-season appearances (12) than any player, male or female, in school history. In addition, Dorsey won 29 SEC games in her LSU career, also a school record. Dorsey finished her career with 1,054 points which ranks 14th in school history, while she ranks third all-time in steals and fifth in assists.



## All-Americans

### Cornelia Gayden

GUARD, 5-9  
BOGUE CHITTO, MISS.



Cornelia Gayden had perhaps one of the best all-around seasons in school history as a senior as she was named second team All-America by the Women's Basketball News Service and third team All-America by the Associated Press in 1995. Gayden, who averaged 25.8 points and 8.4 rebounds as a senior, was also a finalist for AP Player of the Year.

During her senior season, Gayden set an NCAA record by hitting 12 3-pointers against Jackson State. In that same game, Gayden scored a school-record 49 points and became the NCAA's all-time leader in 3-point goals.

Gayden capped her career with NCAA records in 3-point goals (337) and 3-point goals attempted (875). Gayden is the third leading scorer in LSU history with 2,451 points and the eighth leading scorer in SEC history. Gayden was a three-time All-SEC selection.



### Marie Ferdinand

GUARD, 5-9  
MIAMI, FLA.



One of the most explosive guards to ever play at LSU, Miami native Marie Ferdinand earned 2001 Kodak and Women's Basketball Journal All-America honors and was a unanimous coaches poll first-team All-SEC selection. The Louisiana Player of the year, she was also a finalist for the Naismith Award and the ESPN the Magazine Shooting Guard of the Year Award.

For her career, Ferdinand averaged 13.7 points and 4.1 rebounds a game. In 2000, she led the Lady Tigers to the Elite Eight, averaging team-highs in points, assists and steals. She was named to the 2000 NCAA East Regional all-tournament team.

Ferdinand also made an impact in international play in the summer of 2000, helping lead the U.S. Women's Select Team to a gold medal at the Jones Cup Tournament in Taipei, Taiwan.

She is currently a member of the Utah Starzz of the WNBA and finished third in Rookie of the Year voting in 2001.

## Angelia Crockett

GUARD, 5-11  
TALLULAH, LA.



One of the Lady Tigers' most steady and unselfish players, Tallulah native Angelia Crockett became the second LSU player to ever earn first team Defensive All-America honors from the Women's Basketball Journal.

In her senior year, the point guard blocked 10 shots and was ranked seventh in the SEC in assist-to-turnover ratio. She also averaged 3.0 points and 2.4 rebounds a game.

In her four years at LSU, Crockett helped lead the Lady Tigers to four national tournaments, including three straight NCAA Tournament appearances, runs through to the Elite Eight and Sweet 16 and a WNIT appearance.



## DeTrina White

FORWARD, 5-11  
LAFAYETTE, LA.



DeTrina White finished her first year at LSU with more honors than any other freshman in LSU history. Highlighting White's list of honors was being named National Freshman of the Year by the Women's Basketball News Service, a first for an LSU player.

White was also named first team Freshman All-America by both the Women's Basketball News Service and the Women's Basketball Journal. In addition, she was voted the Freshman of the Year in the SEC by the Associated Press.

White finished her first season averaging 13.1 points and 8.2 rebounds a contest. White led the SEC with 11 double-double games.



## Roneeka Hodges

FORWARD, 5-11  
NEW ORLEANS, LA.



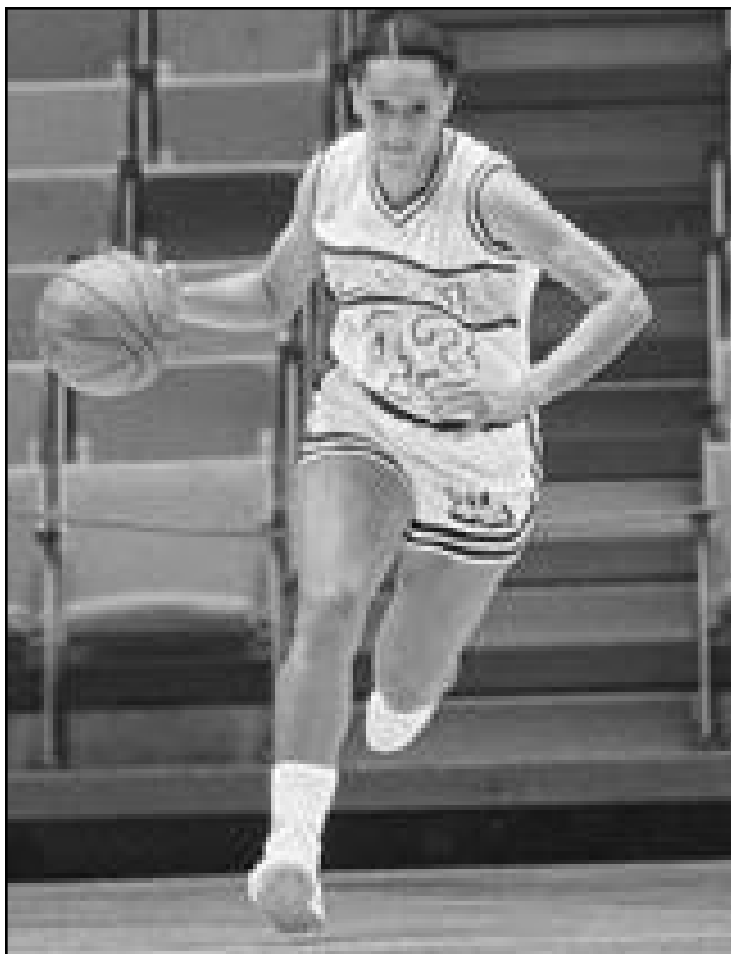
Called on to see considerable playing time in just her first year at LSU, New Orleans native Roneeka Hodges maximized the opportunity and garnered Freshman All-America honors for her effort. The forward moved into the starting job in just her fourth career collegiate game before an injury kept her from starting later in the season.

Playing through pain most of the season, Hodges averaged 8.4 points on over 46-percent shooting and pulled down 4.1 rebounds a contest. In addition, Hodges blocked 11 shots and knocked in better than 75-percent from the charity stripe.

## University Administration

On April 1, 1999, Dr. William L. Jenkins, formerly chancellor of Louisiana State University and Agricultural & Mechanical College, became president of the LSU System, which includes nine institutions on 10 campuses in five cities as well as 10 public hospitals in 10 cities.

A native of South Africa, Dr. Jenkins studied at the University of Pretoria, where he received his professional veterinary medicine degree in 1958. After practicing veterinary medicine for four years, he received his specialist credentials from the University of Pretoria in 1968. In 1970 he received his Ph.D. degree from the University of Missouri, Columbia. He joined the faculty at the University of Pretoria, advancing through the ranks to become professor and head of the Department of Veterinary Physiology, Pharmacology, and Toxicology in 1971.

He moved to the United States in 1978 and joined the faculty in the Department of Veterinary Physiology and Pharmacology at Texas A&M University. He was appointed dean of the LSU School of Veterinary Medicine in 1988 and was named LSU's provost and vice chancellor for academic affairs in September 1993.

When he was appointed LSU's fifth Chancellor in November 1996, Dr. Jenkins reorganized the campus administration to be more effective and more responsive, and oversaw the development of a strategic plan to guide the University in its preparation for the challenges of the next century.

President Jenkins has received numerous awards and recognitions, including being named the 1997 Communicator of the Year by the Public Relations

Humanities, Our Lady of the Lake College, Rotary Club of Baton Rouge, Greater Baton Rouge Chamber of Commerce, Baton Rouge Center for World Affairs, the Baton Rouge board of the National Conference for Community and Justice, and the Academic Distinction Fund.

Jenkins and his wife, Peggy, have four children -- Sharon, Gwynn, Anthea, and Warren -- and eight grandchildren.

Association of Louisiana. He has been active in continuing education and has delivered more than 150 lectures and addresses to diverse groups in both the United States and abroad. He has taught extensively at both the professional and graduate levels. He has published more than 60 scientific articles and has contributed 15 chapters to various textbooks. He is co-author of a textbook on veterinary pharmacology.

Jenkins is a member of the American Veterinary Medical Association and a Charter Diplomate of the American College of Veterinary Clinical Pharmacology. He has been a member of the World Association of Veterinary Physiologists, Pharmacologists, and Biochemists, the International Association of Forensic Toxicologists, and the American Academy of Veterinary Nutrition. In addition, he serves on The National Institute of Health's Alcohol Abuse and Misuse on College Campuses Committee and on a special steering committee of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools to review accreditation criteria for colleges and universities.

His community service includes serving on the boards of the Louisiana Endowment for the

Dr. Mark A. Emmert was appointed chancellor of Louisiana State University and Agricultural and Mechanical College on April 16, 1999, becoming the sixth chancellor to lead the state's flagship university. He assumed the position on July 1, 1999.

Dr. Emmert was hired after a national search was conducted to replace Dr. William L. Jenkins, who was named President of the LSU System.

Before arriving at LSU, Emmert served as chancellor of the University of Connecticut. While there, he was a critical player in the implementation of the university's strategic plan. The plan set forth eight academic goals for enhancing UConn's national standing with increased endowment funds to support research and educational objectives.

Emmert was a J.W. Fulbright Administrative Fellow in Germany in 1991. He has served as a visiting scholar in Melbourne, Australia, and he has lectured and conducted training programs in Hong Kong, Okinawa, Panama City, and Guam.

Emmert is an American Council on Education Fellow and chair-elect of the Council of Academic Affairs for the National Association of State Universities and Land Grant Colleges. He is the author of numerous journal articles, monographs, book chapters, and technical reports.

A native of Tacoma, Wash., Emmert holds doctoral and master's degrees in public administration from the Maxwell School of Syracuse University and a Bachelor of Arts degree in political science from the University of Washington.

Emmert taught political science at Northern Illinois University from 1983 to 1985. He joined the University of Colorado in Denver in 1985 and served as associate dean and associate professor in the Graduate School of Public Affairs and as associate vice chancellor for academic affairs. He served as special assistant to the president, University of Colorado System in Boulder in 1988-89. Subsequently, he served as provost and vice president for academic affairs and as professor of political science at Montana State University from 1992 to 1995.

He is married to DeLaine K. Emmert, an elementary school teacher who has been active in community, university, and philanthropic organizations. They have two children, Stephen and Jennifer.



**Dr. William P. Culbertson**

Dr. William P. "Pat" Culbertson is in his eighth year as LSU's faculty representative in NCAA and Southeastern Conference matters.

Culbertson, a professor of economics, has taught at LSU since 1974. The Gulfport, Miss., native received his bachelor's degree from LSU in 1963, earned his master's from LSU in 1965, and went on to earn a Ph.D. in Economics from the University of Texas in 1972. Culbertson was an assistant professor of economics at the University of Virginia from 1968-74 before joining the LSU faculty where he served as an associate professor from 1975-79.

Formerly the president of the LSU Faculty Senate for two terms, Culbertson is a member of the American Economic Association, the Southern Economic Association and the Western Economic Association. Culbertson is also an elected member of the Baton Rouge Metro Council.

Culbertson and his wife Margaret have two children.

## Director of Athletics

### Skip Bertman

Director of Athletics

J. Stanley "Skip" Bertman was named LSU's athletics director on January 19, 2001, succeeding Joe Dean, who finished his 14-year term as A.D. on Dec. 31, 2000. Bertman, who completed a brilliant 18-year career this June as LSU's head baseball coach, served both as athletics director and head coach during the 2001 baseball season before assuming the full-time role as A.D. in August.

With Bertman, LSU gains an athletics director who can provide the leadership and experience necessary to manage the Tigers' nearly \$35 million athletic budget. He is one of the most respected people in the Baton Rouge community and throughout the state of Louisiana. His talent as a fund-raiser and businessman, as well as a public relations mastermind, developed the LSU baseball program into the best in the nation.

One only has to look at what Bertman has accomplished with the Tiger baseball program over the last 18 years to see he brings all the tools necessary to direct LSU's 20-sport athletic department.

Bertman guided LSU to five NCAA titles, including back-to-back championships in 1996 and 1997. His teams drew huge crowds to venerable Alex Box Stadium, as LSU led the nation in attendance in each of his final six seasons (1996-2001). Bertman's unyielding desire to succeed drove him to the pinnacle of his profession, and his astute knowledge of the game -- obtained from over 40 years of coaching -- combined with his steadfast determination and irrepressible enthusiasm transformed LSU Baseball into the nation's premier program.

Those same characteristics will carry over to the athletics director's chair, where Bertman has inherited a program considered to be one of the best in the country.

Bertman, 63, guided the baseball Tigers to a 870-330-3 (.724) record in his 18-year tenure, including the 1991, 1993, 1996, 1997 and 2000 NCAA titles, 11 College World Series appearances and Southeastern Conference championships in 1986, 1990, 1991, 1992, 1993, 1996 and 1997. He was named National Coach of the Year on six occasions -- 2000, 1997, 1996, 1993, 1991 and 1986, and he served as head coach of the 1996 U.S. Olympic team which captured the bronze medal in Atlanta.

In a *Baseball America* poll released in January, 1999, Bertman was voted the second greatest college baseball coach of the 20th century, trailing only Rod Dedeaux of Southern California. LSU was voted No. 3 in a poll of the greatest college baseball pro-

grams of the century.

LSU is one of only three schools to win five NCAA championships, and the Tigers are one of only 10 teams to have made 11 College World Series appearances. Bertman and Dedeaux are the only coaches to win five CWS titles, and LSU (1990s) and Southern California (1970s) are the only schools to win four championships in one decade.

Bertman mastered the art of winning big games throughout his career, guiding the Tigers to a 21-4 record in championship games in NCAA post-season play. That mark includes all NCAA Regional, NCAA Super Regional and College World Series championship contests. Bertman also directed LSU to the highest all-time NCAA Tournament winning percentage with a 89-29 (.754) record.

Bertman led LSU to its fifth national title in 2000, as the Tigers recorded a 52-17 mark, including a perfect 13-0 post-season record. LSU won the SEC Tournament with four straight wins, and the Tigers raced to a 9-0 mark in the NCAA Tournament. The Tigers captured the national title with a thrilling 6-5 win over Stanford in the CWS championship game, as LSU scored four runs in the last two innings to overcome a 5-2 deficit. Catcher Brad Cresse's RBI single in the bottom of the ninth inning drove home shortstop Ryan Theriot with the winning run. LSU became only the third school in NCAA baseball history to win five national championships, joining Southern California and Arizona State.

The Tigers took their first crucial step toward college baseball prominence in 1983 when Bertman was hired to pump new blood into the program. He had previously earned

stellar recognition as one of the nation's brightest assistant coaches while at the University of Miami (Fla.) for eight seasons (1976-83).

Bertman was known as the "best assistant coach in college baseball" while a member of Ron Fraser's staff at Miami, and he brought to LSU the same brand of exciting, winning baseball he helped install at UM.

Even before working at Miami, Bertman was renowned for his coaching excellence. In 11 seasons at Miami Beach High School, he directed the Hi-Tides to a state championship and two runners-up finishes. He was named Florida's Coach of the Year on three occasions.

Bertman left Miami Beach High School in 1974 to author the book, *Coaching Youth League Baseball*, funding the project out of his own resources. The book has become required reading for youth league coaches around the nation and in many foreign countries.

In 1975, Bertman went back to coaching at Miami-Dade Downtown, leaving after one season to join Fraser at Miami. The move was a homecoming of sorts, as Bertman spent his collegiate playing days with the Hurricanes as an outfielder and catcher from 1958-60. He earned his B.A. in health and physical education from Miami in 1961 and received his master's degree from UM in 1964.

Bertman and his wife Sandy are the parents of four daughters -- Jan, Jodi, Lisa and Lori. The Bertmans have two grandchildren -- Sophie Faith and Isaac Stanley, the children of Emile and Lori Bertman Guirard.

## Athletic Administration

Dan Radakovich enters his first year as LSU's senior associate athletics director after joining the University in May. He came to LSU after serving as director of athletics at American University in Washington D.C.

"We feel very fortunate to have someone with Dan's experience join the LSU Athletic Department," said LSU Athletics Director Skip Bertman. "This is a new position within the athletic department and we're excited about what Dan brings to LSU. He's been an athletics director and he also spent six years as an associate athletics director at South Carolina so we are very lucky to hire Dan."

Radakovich will oversee the daily operations of the LSU Athletic Department and he will serve as Bertman's chief assistant.

Prior to his one-year stint at American University, Radakovich spent six years as the associate athletics director at South Carolina where he directed the financial operations for the Gamecocks' \$30 million athletic department budget. Radakovich also worked closely with South Carolina Athletics Director Mike McGee in laying the ground work for a new \$70 million arena being built in Columbia. He also served as the department liaison for marketing and promotional activities with Host Communications. Radakovich was also responsible for

home event management as well as that of overseeing concessions, football travel and the video department.

During his tenure with South Carolina, Radakovich supervised the finances and logistics for \$33 million in facility improvements.

Radakovich served as the senior associate athletics director at Long Beach State from 1989-94. In that capacity, he managed a \$5 million budget and supervised the nationally recognized men's basketball and baseball programs. In addition, Radakovich reorganized the fund-raising operations and coordinated the production and sales of radio broadcasting packages.

Radakovich began his collegiate athletics career as the athletics business manager at the University of Miami in Coral Gables, Fla., from 1983-85. He worked in the private sector for five years before joining Long Beach State.

Radakovich, a native of Aliquippa, Pa., graduated from Indiana University of Pennsylvania in 1980 with a bachelor of science degree in finance. Radakovich was also a football letterwinner as well as a student coach at Indiana University of Pennsylvania. He then went on to earn his master's degree in business administration from the University of Miami in 1982.

Radakovich is married to the former Marcie McDonald and the couple has two children, Christian (11) and Grant (7).



**Judy Southard**

Judy Southard, the director of athletics at Texas Woman's University for the past nine years, enters her first year as LSU's senior women's administrator after joining the athletic department staff in August of 2001.

As LSU's senior women's administrator, Southard will serve as the administrative liaison to the Tigers' nationally-recognized Olympic sports teams.

While at Texas Woman's University, Southard initiated a corporate partnership program for the athletic department that tripled the involvement of area businesses and corporations in Pioneer athletics. Southard also established the TWU Intercollegiate Athletics Hall of Fame and she played a key role in the addition of softball and soccer to TWU's list of intercollegiate sports. In 2000, Southard served as chair of the NCAA Division II Women's Basketball Committee.

Prior to her nine-year stint at Texas Woman's University, Southard served as head women's basketball coach at Marshall University in Huntington, W. Va., for 11 years, where she led the Lady Herd to five Southern Conference regular-season titles. During her 11 years at Marshall, Southard was named Southern Conference Coach of the Year three times and her career record of 178-130 still stands as a school record for victories. Southard also served as assistant athletics director at Marshall from 1983-1988, including a four-month period when she was interim director.

Prior to her tenure at Marshall, Southard spent three years as head coach at Tennessee-Martin and she also served for one season as an assistant coach at Tennessee. As a high school teacher from 1970-77, Southard coached both basketball and tennis, leading her West Florence High School basketball team to the South Carolina 4A state title in 1976.

A native of Columbia, S.C., Southard earned a bachelor's degree in physical education and health from Coker College in 1970 followed by a master's degree in physical education from Tennessee in 1978.

Former LSU football player Verge Ausberry joined the LSU Athletic Department administrative staff in August 2001 to head up Athletic Department Operations.

In his position he will be in charge of such things as Game Management, the Athletic Department's courtesy car program, the weight room, the Dr. Martin Broussard training room and equipment rooms and video operations for the various sports on the campus.

Ausberry, from New Iberia, La., played inside linebacker for the Tigers, lettering in 1986-89. He was the leading tackler on the team in both 1988 and 1989. He was part of two Southeastern Conference championship teams (1986 under Bill Arnsparger and 1988 under Mike Archer) and played on teams that went to three bowl games: the 1987 Sugar Bowl, the 1987 Gator Bowl and the 1989 Hall of Fame Bowl. In those three years, the Tigers had a combined overall record of 27-8-1 and 16-3 in SEC games.

Although this is Ausberry's first tour of duty with the administration of the Athletic Department, he has remained very close to the LSU athletic scene in the 1990s, first serving for almost seven years as a member of LSU's highly regarded Academic Center for Athletes where he worked with many of the student-athletes, primarily dealing with LSU's football squad.

After leaving the Academic Center, he moved in July 1999 to the Tiger Athletic Foundation staff as part of LSU's fund-raising arm prior to accepting his present position.

The 34-year-old Ausberry received his Bachelor of Science degree in education in May of 1990 and his Master of Education in Administration, Supervision and certification in Child Welfare in May of 1992. He is presently a Doctoral Candidate in Higher Education Administration at LSU. He is married to the former Cheri Morial of New Orleans.

### Bo Bahnsen

Bo Bahnsen serves as LSU's associate athletics director for student services and is the compliance officer for the Athletic Department.

David E. "Bo" Bahnsen was promoted to associate athletics director in 1996 after serving as an assistant A.D. since 1989. He served in various capacities within the department since his graduation from LSU in 1982.

On November 1, 1989, Bahnsen was assigned his primary responsibility as NCAA compliance officer. He also manages LSU's drug testing and drug education program.

After serving as manager of the LSU basketball team as an undergraduate, Bahnsen became administrative assistant for the basketball team upon graduation in May of 1982. ### Rannah Gray

Rannah Gray serves as associate athletics director over marketing and promotions. She is responsible for all activities involving sales, marketing, event promotions, special promotions, advertising and ticket office operations.

Gray joined the athletic department in 1990 and served one year as director of marketing and promotions before being promoted to assistant athletics director in April of 1991. In December of 1992, she was elevated to her current position.

In 1998, she was honored for her work in the marketing community when she was named the Marketer of the Year in Baton Rouge as selected by Sales and Marketing Executives International.

A native of Chatawa, Miss., and a graduate of St. Mary of the Pines Academy, Gray earned her bachelor's degree in journalism from LSU in 1976 and her master's degree in journalism in 1978.

Gray, who has managed several local and statewide political campaigns, served as the undersecretary of management and finance for the Louisiana Secretary of State from 1980-88. ### Jerry Blanchard

Jerry Blanchard, in his position as assistant athletics director for facilities, supervises LSU's impressive athletic physical plant consisting of the playing and practice facilities for all sports.

Jerry Blanchard was appointed to the position of assistant athletics director in charge of facilities at LSU on August 15, 1997.

One of Blanchard's primary projects has been the expansion of Tiger Stadium with the addition of skyboxes and seating on the east side of the structure that increased the capacity of the stadium to over 91,600. Also on his docket are the renovation of LSU's aging but historic baseball park, Alex Box Stadium, and the renovation of Tiger Stadium's press box.

Blanchard joined the athletic department after serving almost six years as the director of the Office of Facility Development on the LSU campus. He was responsible for administering a staff of architects, engineers, landscape architects, designers, construction managers, space utilization specialists, date specialists, CAD student workers and support personnel to plan, direct and coordinate all physical facilities, design and construction for the Baton Rouge campus.

## LSU Athletics



**2001 Men's Indoor Track & Field NCAA Champions**

Last season proved to be another outstanding year for LSU athletics as the Tigers claimed their 36th national championship (men's indoor track and field) as well as their 100th Southeastern Conference title (softball). In all, 12 of LSU's 20 sports finished the year ranked among the top 25 teams in the nation.

- The men's indoor track and field team claimed its first national title, winning the event on the last race in Fayetteville, Ark. The national title gave coach Pat Henry 21 for his career, second in NCAA history.
- The softball team advanced to the Women's College World Series for the first time in school history. LSU had wins over Iowa and defending national champion Oklahoma to finish third nationally. The softball team also won the SEC title for the third straight year and pitcher Britni Sneed was named SEC Player of the Year.
- The men's tennis team reached the round of 16 at the NCAA Championships, while the men's golf team advanced to the NCAA Regionals for the first time in three years.
- The women's golf team, behind a third place finish from Katy Harris, finished 12th at the NCAA Championships.
- The women's basketball team tied for third in the SEC and reached the second round of the NCAA Tournament.
- The baseball team advanced to the Super Regional round of the NCAA Tournament.

## Academic Center for Athletes

The Academic Center for Athletes is responsible for overseeing the educational development and progress toward graduation of all LSU student-athletes. A liaison between the athlete and the academic communities, the Center insures that student-athletes comply with academic rules established by the university, the SEC and the NCAA.

The staff also coordinates academic programs designed to assist student-athletes in obtaining a quality education.

The Center is currently undergoing a multi-million dollar renovation that will give LSU student athletes the opportunity to learn in one of the nation's finest academic support centers.

## All-Sports Success

LSU's athletic program has traditionally been strong throughout all of its varsity sports and has fielded nationally-competitive teams in most of its sports.

A total of 14 of LSU's 20 athletic teams finished their seasons ranked in the nation's top 25 for their respective sports during the 2000-01 athletic year, and of those, six finished in the top 10. Only six of LSU's 20 sports were not ranked in 2000-01.

LSU has won 100 Southeastern Conference championships in all sports and has claimed 36 national titles.

## Athletics as a Business

Athletics is mistakenly thought of as merely entertainment. In fact, the total revenues of over \$21 million generated annually by the Athletic Department is:

- twice that of the sales of an average manufacturing plant in Louisiana
- twice the volume of an average food processor
- and about seven times more than the typical apparel plant in the state

## Attendance

LSU teams draw some of the largest crowds in all of college athletics:

- More than 1.1 million fans watched LSU athletics in all 20 sports during the 2000-01 athletic year.
- Over the last 10 years, LSU football attendance has averaged over 70,000 fans per game. Last season, LSU set a school-record by averaging over 87,000 fans a contest, a number that ranked fifth nationally. LSU's average of 87,000 fans a contest makes Tiger Stadium, on a Saturday night, more populated than 50 of Louisiana's 64 parishes.
- LSU baseball set the standard in college baseball for attendance again in 2001 as over 300,000 fans watched the Tigers play at Alex Box Stadium in regular and post-season play.

## CHAMPS Program

LSU sponsors a fully-funded life skills program for student-athletes. The program is called CHAMPS, an acronym for Challenging Athletes Minds for Personal Success. Under the CHAMPS program, LSU sets up a number of projects and workshops that aid student-athletes in addressing day-to-day living situations, handling stress, and preparing for post-college life.

Under the CHAMPS program, LSU also establishes community service projects in which student-athletes organize and participate. The LSU CHAMPS program sponsors an annual Halloween "Boo-Zar" on campus. The boozar is a trick-or-treat night in the LSU Field House in which athletes from all sports distribute candy to Baton Rouge area children. The event is designed to give parents and chil-





dren a fun and safe place to participate in Halloween activities.

Each athletic team participates in CHAMPS workshops which educate them in life skills and personal development.

## Community Involvement

Because of the athletic facilities on the LSU campus, Baton Rouge is able to attract many events and conventions that benefit the community in both public relations and monetary means. LSU has in the past hosted such events as the National Sports Festival (now called the Olympic Festival) and the International Special Olympics. Last Summer, LSU hosted the US Senior Olympics and in the past has hosted the US Junior National Track & Field Championships.

The LSU campus is annually the site of high school track and field championships, bringing to campus thousands of young people and their parents. LSU will host the 2002 NCAA Outdoor Track and Field Championships at Bernie Moore Stadium.

## Concessions

Tiger Concessions is an in-house operation of the Athletic Department. By operating concessions, LSU has optimal fiscal control of a major profit center for the department as well as better control over product selection for the customer.

For a typical LSU football game the following is consumed: 2,000 bags of ice, 13,000 hot dogs, 59,100 orders of nachos.

## Construction

The construction involved in the Athletic Department contributes enormously to the Baton Rouge economy. During the 1996-97 fiscal year, LSU spent over \$2 million in construction expenditures. This money had a ripple effect on the economy, stimulating spending in the areas of business services, retail trade, wholesale trade, stone/clay/glass products, fabricated metal products, etc.

## Corporate Sponsorship

LSU operates an innovative and profitable corporate sponsorship program which provides sponsors with valuable promotional avenues and a high-profile identity affiliation with LSU Athletics in exchange for corporate dollars. The corporate sponsorship program generates almost \$3 million annually for the department.

## Economic Impact

LSU has a tremendous impact on the economy of the Baton Rouge area. LSU sporting events bring money into the Baton Rouge economy, not only from throughout the state, but throughout the southeast.

According to a study by LSU economics professor Loren Scott, the existence of LSU Athletics generates \$109 million in sales for businesses in the Baton Rouge community, another \$42 million in household earnings and supports over 2,400 jobs in the Baton Rouge area.

## Electronic Media

LSU operates a fully-staffed electronic media department which produces television coaches shows, radio broadcasts of football, men's and women's basketball, baseball, and softball games and radio coaches shows. It also provides a weekly satellite feed to statewide television stations and major television networks such as ABC, CBS, NBC and ESPN for optimum exposure of LSU athletics.

LSU has its own in-house radio studio from which all Tiger sports broadcasts originate, including coaches call-in radio shows.

It has been a pacesetter in the broadcast of sports programs, originating soccer and softball broadcasts.

before any other league school.

The Department is a totally self-sufficient auxiliary that uses state tax dollars to finance LSU athletics. The Athletic Department is generated by the revenue from ticket sales, corporate sponsorships, radio and television, the Tiger Gift Center and concessions, and is a major revenue-sharing resulting from LSU's membership in the Southeastern Conference.

## Athletes

Year after year, LSU boasts some of the most talented athletes in all of college athletics.

Most Valuable Player and worldwide entertainment star Shaquille O'Neal delighted Tiger basketball fans last season. PGA star David Toms played for the LSU team in the late 1980's, while Major League Baseball star Paul Byrd and Lyle Mouton learned their trade at LSU Stadium.

Overlooked are some of the finest female athletes in their respective sports: golfer Katy Harris, American Britni Sneed and women's basketball All-American Ferdinand dazzled LSU fans last season.

What is the future of college athletics? LSU is helping top answer that

question with a job placement program as part of the Ninth Semester Program. LSU works closely with the Career Placement Center on campus as well as professional recruiting services to offer advice to athletes on entering the job market upon graduation.

### LSUsports.net

Thanks to the internet, LSU fans across the world can follow the Tigers on a daily basis at LSU's website, LSUsports.net. All LSU sporting events broadcast on the radio are also carried on LSUsports.net. In addition, LSU coaches shows, both radio and television, are broadcast over LSU's website. Other features of LSUsports.net, include biographical information on every LSU athlete and coach, statistical information on all Tiger sports team as well as daily news releases pertaining to LSU athletics.

### Mike the Tiger

One of the most visible and popular visiting spots on the LSU campus is Mike the Tiger's cage in front of the Pete Maravich Assembly Center. It serves as home to LSU's live Bengal tiger mascot, Mike V. His home includes a concrete area containing a pool and grassy expanse, equipped with a tiger-sized wooden scratching post and a climbing platform. In addition, there is an indoor home into which he can retreat to avoid inclement weather, and a large window allows his fans to view him even when he is indoors.

### National Championships

LSU has won 36 national championships in its athletic history, more than any other school in the prestigious Southeastern Conference.

\* LSU's national championships have come in men's basketball (1935), boxing (1949), football (1958), men's golf (1940, 1942, 1947, 1955), men's outdoor track & field (1933, 1989, 1990), men's indoor track & field (2001), women's indoor track & field (1987, 1989, 1991, 1993, 1994, 1995, 1996, 1997), women's outdoor track & field (1987, 1988, 1989, 1990, 1991, 1992, 1993, 1994, 1995, 1996, 1997, 2000) and baseball (1991, 1993, 1996, 1997, 2000).

### National Awards

LSU has had one winner each of the Heisman Trophy, Adolph Rupp Award and Golden Spikes Award, the premier individual awards in football, basketball and baseball. The Heisman Trophy, given annually to college football's best player, was won by Billy Cannon in 1959. The Adolph Rupp Award, which goes to college basketball's top player, was won by Shaquille O'Neal in 1991. The Golden Spikes Award, given to college baseball's most outstanding player each year, was won by Ben McDonald in 1989.

### Radio Network

The LSU Radio Network is one of the best known nationwide because of the powerful signals of WWL-Radio in New Orleans, which covers the southeast, north and northeast United States, and WKH-Radio in Shreveport, which covers the south and southwest United States. There are currently over 40 stations on the LSU Sports Network. The LSU Radio Network produces game broadcasts in football, men's and women's basketball, baseball and softball, coaches shows in football, men's and women's basketball and baseball, and a weekly half-hour talk show, "Tiger Talk," which can be heard throughout Louisiana.

LSU was one of the pioneers in Internet broadcasting, and now LSU sporting events can be heard all over the world on the Internet at LSUsports.net.

### Stadiavision

At all LSU football games in Tiger Stadium, basketball games at the Pete Maravich Assembly Center and baseball games at Alex Box Stadium, live action is shown on monitors near concession stands and restrooms so fans won't miss the action in progress.

### Tiger Athletic Foundation

The Tiger Athletic Foundation is an independent, private and non-profit fund raising organization that exists to support LSU athletics. Friends and supporters of the University are asked to contribute funds so that LSU athletic facilities may be improved and scholarship costs for athletes may be partially underwritten. TAF conducts an annual campaign, while also offering scholarship endowments from which earnings are applied to scholarship endeavors of LSU athletes on a perpetual basis. Presently, 15 Tiger Athletic Foundation satellite chapters are operating over three states.



### Tiger Gift Center

LSU operates a fully-stocked merchandise store within Tiger Stadium that gives fans a wide array of LSU clothing and memorabilia. The Gift Center is open on football, basketball and baseball game days for fans' convenience. A new satellite Gift Center near Mike the Tiger's cage is now open for added customer convenience. The Tiger Gift Center also went worldwide during the 2000-01 season as LSU merchandise can now be purchased from anywhere in the world on LSU's website, LSUsports.net.

### University Involvement

LSU continues to produce profits in its athletic department, despite generally difficult economic times for college athletic programs. Athletics has contributed over \$7 million to the academic side of the University in the last 10 years. In 1994-95, athletics contributed \$100,000 to the LSU Libraries to assist in buying books and other materials necessary to keep LSU's library system among the finest in the nation, and in 1996 generated over \$30,000 by dedicating all ticket sales from the Spring Football Game to the libraries.

After the 1988-89 fiscal year, LSU Athletics donated \$2 million to the general fund of the University to help offset projected losses. LSU Athletics has also donated sizeable amounts of money to fund professorships and provide for repairs in academic facilities.

### Women's Athletics

LSU boasts of one of the finest women's athletics programs in the nation with virtually every program competitive on a national level. LSU again had one of its finest years ever in women's athletics in 2000-01.

\* The softball team won the Southeastern Conference title for the third straight year and advanced to the Women's College World Series for the first time, finishing third in the event.

\* The basketball team finished third in the SEC and advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament.

\* The women's track and field team finished sixth nationally at the NCAA Outdoor Meet.

## Southeastern Conference

Throughout its 67-year history, the Southeastern Conference has been a leader in the integration of athletic competition and higher education.

Since its formation in 1933, the SEC has achieved both stature and stability by designating governing/voting power to the presidents of the member institutions. They have determined the policies of the conference and through the years this involvement has been the principal source of strength in the evolution of the SEC.

Intercollegiate athletics has encountered many challenges in the 1990s and again the SEC provided guidance. In 1993, the member institutions adopted The Principles of Gender Equity. Committed to increasing the quantity and quality of women's athletic opportunities, each school provides at least two more women's intercollegiate programs than the number of men's.

Faced with the task of conference realignment after competing with 10 members since 1966, the SEC welcomed the University of Arkansas and the University of South Carolina in 1991.

SEC schools began athletic competition with one another almost 100 years ago as members of the Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Association.

Seven institutions (Alabama, Auburn, Georgia, Georgia Tech, North Carolina, Sewanee and Vanderbilt) attended the SIAA organizational meeting of faculty representatives in Atlanta in 1894.

Basketball moved quickly to the South as Vanderbilt was playing at the Nashville YMCA in 1893, just two years after Dr. James Naismith originated the game at Springfield (Mass.) College. Basketball became an intercollegiate sport in 1901 and in 1908 Vanderbilt was meeting Columbia and Yale intersectionally.

The seven-member SIAA expanded to 19 institutions in 1895 and by 1920 there were 30 members.

The larger schools reorganized as the Southern Conference in 1920. Despite an original limit of 16, the membership grew to 23 by 1928.

The 13 members west and south of the Appalachian Mountains reorganized as the Southeastern Conference at the annual SC meeting in 1932. The 10 coast members remained in the Southern Conference. Charter members of the new conference were:

Alabama, Auburn, Florida, Georgia, Georgia Tech, Kentucky, LSU, Mississippi, Mississippi State, Sewanee, Tennessee, Tulane and Vanderbilt. (Sewanee withdrew in 1940, Georgia Tech in 1964 and Tulane in 1966).

The first SEC champions were crowned in 1933 in four sports (baseball, basketball, football and outdoor track). The league's inaugural championship event was a basketball tournament in Atlanta in 1933. Records show the first men's team title for cross-country was awarded in 1935, while golf and swimming were added in 1937. The league later began hosting championships in tennis (1953) and indoor track (1957).

In the 1979-80 academic year SEC championships for women were recognized in basketball, tennis and volleyball. The following year golf, gymnastics, swimming and track and field were added. The administration of women's athletics officially came under the auspices of the conference office in 1984.

The SEC currently regulates nine men's sports and 11 women's sports: Men—baseball, basketball, football, golf, swimming, tennis and track (cross country, indoor and outdoor). Women—basketball, golf, gymnastics, soccer, softball, swimming, tennis, track (cross country, indoor and outdoor) and volleyball.



### SEC COMMISSIONERS

#### The Commissioners of the Southeastern Conference

The office of the commissioner was formed in 1940 in Jackson due to the great amount of detail work developing, especially in recruiting and eligibility.

Former Mississippi Governor Martin S. Conner took office as commissioner in

1940, as an extension of the authority of the presidents. Conner later became ill and the secretary of the conference, Dean N.W. Dougherty of Tennessee, served as acting commissioner during the fall of 1946.

The office moved to Birmingham with the appointment of Bernie H. Moore as

the second full-time commissioner in 1948. Moore, a former LSU coach, guided the SEC to national respect in his 18-year tenure.

A.M. (Tonto) Coleman succeeded Moore upon his retirement in 1966. The Alabama native, who was reared in Texas and was experienced in athletic coaching and administration, served six and a half years.

Dr. H. Boyd McWhorter, then Dean of Arts and Sciences at Georgia and secretary of the league since 1967, accepted the position upon the retirement of Coleman in 1972. Under his leadership the SEC experienced unparalleled growth. In McWhorter's first year the SEC distributed \$1.57 million and 14 years later (1986) the league distributed \$15 million in revenue to the member institutions.

Dr. Harvey W. Schiller, an Air Force colonel, followed McWhorter upon retirement, taking office in 1986.

Roy F. Kramer succeeded Schiller in 1990. Kramer has served on numerous NCAA committees and joined the league office after spending 12 years as athletic director at Vanderbilt. Under his leadership, the Southeastern Conference has expanded by two teams, introduced the concept of a Division I-A football playoff game and has signed the most lucrative television contract in the league's history.

## Media Credentials

Telecasting entities should contact Coordinator of Electronic Media Kevin Wagner (225) 578-1797 for information regarding setup. Sound microphone technicians will sit at press row, when seats are available or at a designated spots in front of press row that does not block any sold advertising panels. There is no mid-court break for television.

Any outlet using a satellite truck must request satellite truck parking and must have the truck in place at least two hours prior to tipoff. All production and uplink trucks should contact Eric Edwards, Director of the Maravich Assembly Center, (225) 578-8205, regarding arrival time and setup logistics.

## Photographers

LSU will follow NCAA and SEC rules regarding the media representatives photographing the game. Photographers are limited to working the designated space along the end line of the playing court. No credentials will be issued to freelance photographers, outline writers, equipment carriers. Photographers will not be permitted to shoot

from the sidelines. All photographers must remain seated on the floor in areas directly in front of fans on the baseline. Video taping from a kneeling position will not be permitted. Photo positions may be assigned by the LSU Sports Information Office prior to selected games.
