# THE Hunted

Expectations are high for the LSU Lady Tigers. Ranked anywhere from third to eighth in the preseason polls, LSU returns everybody from last year's NCAA Tournament team that posted an 18-12 record. The Lady Tigers also return four players from injury and add one of the best freshman classes in the nation.

At the center of it all is Sue Gunter who enters the 2002-03 season, her 21st as head coach of the Lady Tigers, needing 15 victories to reach 400 in her LSU career. She hopes those 15 victories and more will lead the Lady Tigers to a Southeastern Conference title and even the elusive Final Four. With those goals and expectations comes pressure.

“Certainly there is pressure,” said Gunter. “The expectations are unreasonably high, but that is okay. That is something we are going to have to deal with.”

Gunter and her teams have always enjoyed the underdog roll, including last season when the team surprised many people by making a run in the SEC Tournament title

that included an upset 81-80 win over Tennessee in the semifinals.

“We have always had a lot of success as the underdog,” Gunter added. “This year it is a different roll. Every time we walk out there this year we are going to be the hunted and not the hunter. We are going to have to be ready for that and we can't ignore that. In a way it is a compliment to where this program has gone.”

The talent will be there for the Lady Tigers. A total of 14 players, twice as many as they had dressed out to finish the 2001-02 season, are on the roster and appear to be healthy. Despite returning the five starters from last season, there are six players on the roster that did not play a game for LSU in 2001-02, including four who have never played a collegiate basketball game.

“We obviously have a solid group returning,” Gunter said. “But, we also have a lot of things we are going to have to figure out. A

lot of these kids have not been tested.”

Among the untested are freshmen Seimone Augustus and Treynell Clavelle. The pair makes up one of the top-ranked classes in the nation and one of the best in LSU history. Augustus, a Baton Rouge native, was one of the best high school players in the nation during her career. The 6-1 guard/forward earned numerous All-America honors as a senior and was the 2002 Student Sports and Girls Basketball National Player of the Year.

The two freshmen will have some experienced players to learn from. Leading the group of experienced players are fourth-year veteran seniors DeTrina White and Ke-Ke Tardy. White returns to the team following a medical redshirt season last year, while Tardy enters her fourth season and played in all 30 games last season, starting 24 at forward.

The Lady Tigers have a good mix of experience and youth to go along with depth at every position on the court.

LSU has more depth inside this year than they have in many years. Aiysha Smith returns for her second and final season with the Lady Tigers. The 6-2 Detroit, Mich., native, garnered first-team All-SEC honors and was the 2002 Louisiana Newcomer of the Year after leading the Lady Tigers with 15.9 points and 7.7 rebounds per game.

"Aiysha can give us a little bit of both power and she can step out and shoot from the perimeter and take a defender away from the goal," Gunter said. "These are the kind of things that allow us to do a lot of different things."

Also returning, but from a year away from the game, is senior DeTrina White. The 5-11 Lafayette, La., native was forced to sit out last season with a foot injury, but is healthy and ready to play entering 2002-03. White adds a lot of experience to the team, having played in 82 games and averaged 11.8 points and 8.4 rebounds during her career.

"DeTrina is a physically powerful player," Gunter adds. "She is very athletic and, despite her 5-11 frame, can play either the four or the five as well as anyone in the country."

In addition to the pair of seniors, LSU adds two newcomers to the center position. Crystal White, a sophomore transfer from Duke, and Treynell Clavelle, a freshman who was part of one of the top recruiting classes in the country, will make a big impact for LSU in their first seasons.

"Crystal is a 6-5 kid with a year of experience at Duke in the ACC and will come in and make an impact with us particularly at the defensive end of the floor," Gunter said about White who will not be eligible to play until after the fall semester due to transfer rules. "She is a shot blocker and runs the floor extremely well."

Clavelle, a 6-4 Jeanerette, La., native, was a two-time Class 3A MVP at Jeanerette High School and adds solid depth to the Lady Tigers.

At the four position, LSU returns Ke-Ke Tardy and Tillie Willis. Tardy, a 6-1 senior from Jackson, Miss., who averaged just under 10 points and five rebounds per game at the four spot on the floor. Willis, a 6-3 sophomore from Atlanta, Ga., played in 20 games before suffering a season-ending knee injury during practice. "Ke-Ke has played three years for us and has the ability to step outside and give us a shot when we need her to," Gunter said. "Tillie is coming off the knee injury and is a little behind at the position, but we expect her to work hard and be ready."

Gunter and her staff also have the option of putting Florence Williams inside at the four position. Williams,

players and power players, and, along with the depth, make the inside game of the Lady Tigers a strength of the team.

"I am excited about the fact that when we want to go power inside we can go power inside," said Gunter. "When we need to jam the ball inside we have the people that can take it in there. We have not had that in the past."

## WINGS

Gunter also has a good corps of talent at the wing position entering 2002-03. Roneeka Hodges, Seimone Augustus, Wendlyn Jones and Florence Williams all look to contribute at the three spot for the Lady Tigers.

Hodges, a 5-11 junior from New Orleans, La., played in all 30 games as a sophomore last year and has 37 career starts under her belt.

"We still have injury problems with Roneeka," said Gunter. "But, when she is healthy, she brings a certain amount of intelligents to the position. She has great range, is a

good defender and she can go in and post up if needed."

Hodges is the lone three-player with collegiate game experience, but that is not to say the talent level is any less with Augustus, Jones and Williams.

"We are still looking to see where Seimone is going to fit," Gunter said about one of the nation's best high school players last season. "She is probably a true three and yet it is really hard because we know what her skills are. She is one of the most talented youngsters we have ever had come in here in a long time. She could easily play the one, two, three or four positions and has the ability, size and mobility to do that."

Jones, like Williams, sat out last season. The 6-1 redshirt freshman from Grosnell, Ark., suffered a knee injury prior to last season and missed the year.

"I can't tell you how excited we are about Wendlyn," Gunter said. "She looks great after her injury and has good size and is strong. I also love her attitude on the floor."

Williams and Jones, along with Hodges and

Augustus make a formidable group at the wing for the Lady Tigers. The group not only has size, averaging over 6-0, but they have quickness and outstanding athletic ability.

## BACK COURT

The Lady Tigers also have a lot of depth at the guard positions. Along with that depth is a lot of talent and experience too. Of the four guards on the squad, three have started at least 18 games in their career, including senior leader Kisha James. James, a 5-6 native of Pineville, La., started 10 games as a sophomore and eight last year before suffering a her second season-ending knee injury. She is back this season ready to contribute at either the point or two-guard position.

At the two guard spot is returning starter Doneeka Hodges. Hodges, a 5-9 junior from New Orleans, La., started all 30 games for the Lady Tigers last season, finished second on the team with 15.3 points per game and led the way with 53 three-pointers. She was named Second-Team All-SEC for her efforts

and complimented point guard Temeka Johnson well.

Johnson, a Honorable Mention all-American in 2001-02, joined the team after the fall semester and started 22 of the 24 games she played. The 5-3 junior from New Orleans, scored 11.1 points and dished out a team-high 179 assists.

"We have one of the premier point guards in the country," Gunter said of Johnson.

Senior Patty Hanten adds depth to the guard spots and is one of the best pure outside shooters on the team.

"Patty has worked extremely hard," Gunter said. "We don't have anyone that has worked harder at her game than her. She is our zone buster and is a threat on the outside."

With Hanten and others, Gunter feels good about the perimeter shooting entering the season. LSU has James (39-134), Doneeka Hodges (77-218) and Roneeka Hodges (36-110) with success from behind the arc.

"We feel good about our outside shooting

"First, everyone is back from a team that rode a six-woman roster to the SEC Tournament championship game, along with a hopefully healthy DeTrina White, a 5-11 post player who plays about 6-3. Louisiana State University and Agricultural & Mechanical College has, throughout its 142-year history, served the people of Louisiana, the region, the nation, and the world through extensive multipurpose programs encompassing instruction, research and public service. The University continuously develops programs of breadth and quality that make it one of the nation's outstanding educational institutions.

The University influences the educational, economic, social and cultural lives of its citizens throughout the state – indeed, in some way, it touches the life of every person in Louisiana.

Because of its designation as a Research I University – the top category of the Carnegie Foundation's ranking of research institutions – LSU ranks in the top 2 percent of the nation's colleges and universities. The Research I designation is shared by only 59 public and 29 private universities across the nation. One of only 25 universities nationwide designated as both a land-grant and sea-grant college, LSU is also actively pursuing space-grant status.

History and tradition began with LSU's founding in 1853 by the General Assembly of Louisiana as the Louisiana State Seminary of Learning and Military Academy near Pineville, Louisiana. The institution opened January 2, 1860. When the Civil War began, the school's first superintendent, William Tecumseh Sherman, resigned to assume a command in the Union Army. Fire demolished the Seminary in 1869 and the school moved to Baton Rouge.

In 1870, the Seminary was renamed Louisiana State University. In 1874, under the United States Morrill Act, the Louisiana State Agricultural & Mechanical College was established in New Orleans. The two institutions were merged by the Legislature in 1877 to become Louisiana State University and Agricultural & Mechanical College.

Construction on the present campus began in 1922 and the first classes were held in 1926. LSU experienced major growth in the 1930s and 1940s, expanding its student body, curricula and services. During the 1960s, the University began to place increasing emphasis on research.

Recognizing the importance and extent of statewide agricultural

activities of units in the LSU System, the LSU Board of Supervisors in 1972 established the Center for Agricultural Sciences & Rural Development. This unit was renamed the LSU Agricultural Center in 1982. Components of the LSU Agricultural Center include the Louisiana Agricultural Experiment Station, the Louisiana Cooperative Extension Service, International Programs and Administrative Services.

The primary mission of the LSU Agricultural Center is to conduct research in agricultural and natural resource development and to provide off-campus extension education that disseminates technological, economic, and management information to Louisiana residents.

In 1977, the Paul M. Hebert Law Center, established as the LSU Law School in 1906, was made an autonomous division of the LSU System. The Law Center provides legal education characterized by an unyielding demand for academic excellence. Its unique curriculum, based on civil law as well as substantial elements of common law, provides law graduates with qualifications and training for not one, but two legal systems.

LSU, located on more than 2,000 acres in the southern part of Baton Rouge, Louisiana, is bordered on the west by the Mississippi River. The University's more than 250 principal buildings are grouped on a 650-acre plateau that constitutes the main part of the campus.

LSU and A&M College is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. The Hebert Law Center holds membership in the Association of Law Schools and is on the approved list of the American Bar Association.

LSU's dressing room area ranks among the finest in college basketball. The project started prior to the 1997-98 season and was completed in time for the 1998-99 season.

The spacious locker room features wide dressing areas with mirrors for each player, including a locker and storage bin. Fully carpeted and well-lit, the locker room is immediately adjacent to the shower room, training facility and the new squad room.

The locker room, located downstairs in the Maravich Assembly Center, includes a big screen television to review video tapes of practice and upcoming

opponents as well as a wall-mounted marking board for messages and strategy sessions.



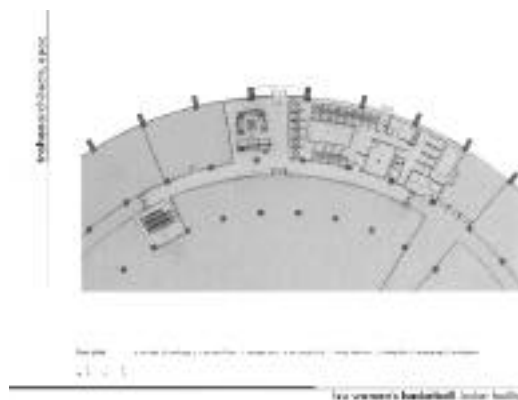
## Women's Basketball Complex

A completely refurbished hallway that will display pictures and artifacts of the LSU LadyTigers tradition of excellence will connect the entire project.



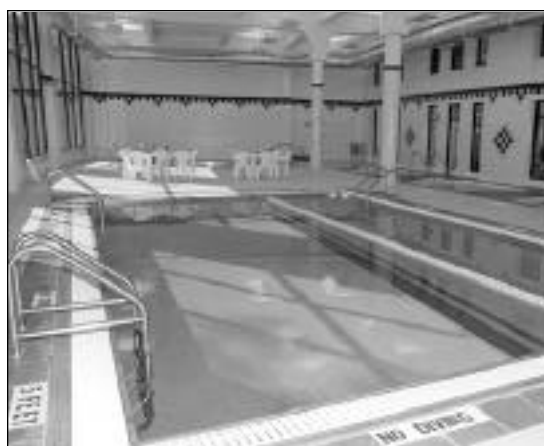
## Athletic Training

LSU is also the only school in college athletics with a training room equipped with a full-service vision center. The facility is named in honor of legendary trainer Dr. Martin J. Broussard, who served as LSU's athletic trainer for over four decades.

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### Dr. Martin J. Broussard

LSU's multi-million dollar athletic training facility is named in honor of Dr. Martin J. Broussard, who served as head trainer for the Tigers for over four decades. Broussard lettered in baseball and track and field at LSU in the mid-1940's winning the SEC broad jump title in 1944 and finishing second in the 220-yard dash. He served as head trainer at Florida and Texas A&M before being appointed to the same position at LSU in 1948 and the legendary Broussard has been an LSU fixture since. Broussard graduated from LSU in 1945 and he received his Master's of Science degree from LSU in 1960 followed by a doctorate in 1967.

"Doc" was also a trainer for the Pan American Games in 1955 and the U.S. Olympic team in 1960, and in 1963 he was named Trainer of the Year by the Rockne Foundation.

## Strength & Conditioning

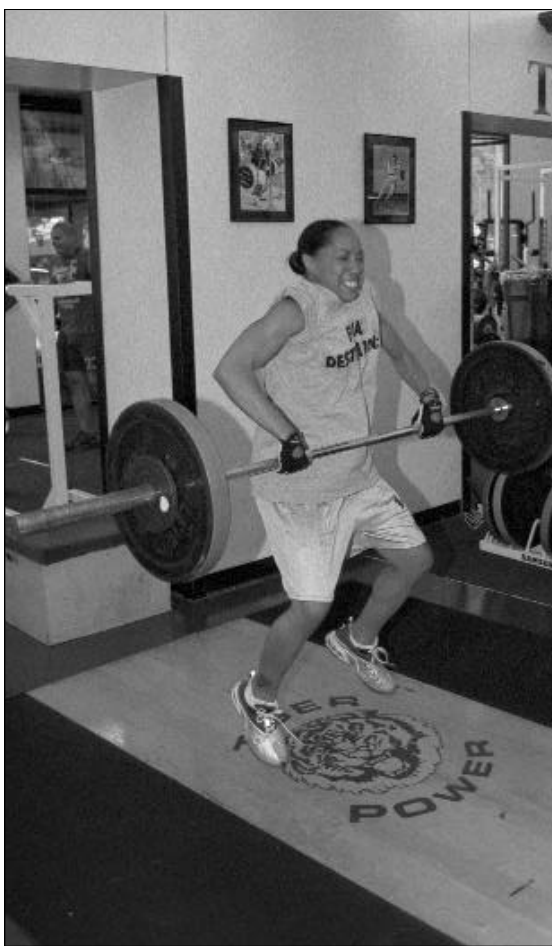
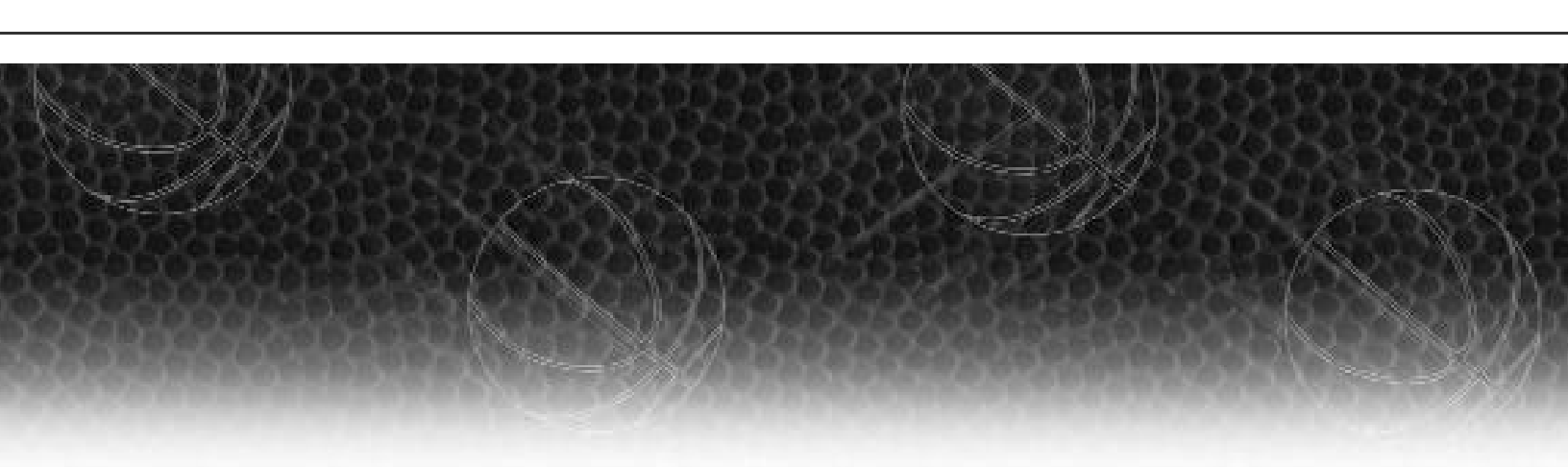

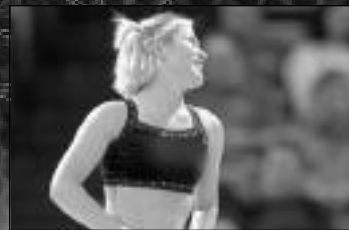

## Retired Numbers

The five athletes on this page are the only athletes to have their jerseys retired by LSU. Basketball has retired the No. 23 for Pete Maravich, No. 50 for Bob Pettit, Jr., and No. 33 for Shaquille O'Neal. Football's only retired jersey is the No. 20 worn by Billy Cannon, while baseball retired the No. 15 in honor of longtime coach and current athletic director Skip Bertman.

## LSU Greats



### Bob Pettit, Jr. > # 50

Led LSU to its first NCAA Final Four in 1953 and he later became the first player in NBA history to exceed the 20,000-plus point barrier. Pettit is a member of the NBA Hall of Fame and in 1997 he was named as one of the top 50 players in NBA history.



### Billy Cannon > # 20

One of the true legends of college football in the South, Cannon was the 1959 Heisman Trophy winner that helped the Tigers to the 1958 national title. Cannon's most memorable performance came in 1959 against Ole Miss. The top-ranked Tigers trailed No. 3 Ole Miss 3-0 in the fourth quarter when Cannon fielded a punt, broke seven tackles and returned it 89 yards as the Tigers went on to win 7-3. He went on to a successful 11-year professional career.



### Pete Maravich > # 23

Nicknamed "Pistol Pete," Maravich still holds the NCAA record for career points with 3,667 and for career scoring average with 44.2 points a game. Maravich was selected the National Player of the Year in 1970 after leading the Tigers to the NIT Final Four. He scored 50+ points an amazing 28 times. After LSU he went on to a 10-year professional career and was selected as one of the NBA's 50 greatest players in 1997.



### Shaquille O'Neal > # 33

Was the first pick in the 1992 NBA Draft. He was named MVP of the league in 2000 and the Finals MVP in 2000, 2001 and 2002 after leading the Los Angeles Lakers to three World Championships. At LSU, O'Neal averaged 21.6 points and 13.6 rebounds for his career, and in 1991, he was named the World's Amateur Athlete of the Year as well as SEC Athlete of the Year and National Player of the Year. In 1997, he was named as one of the top 50 players in NBA history.



### Skip Bertman > # 15

A legend in the college baseball ranks, Bertman created a dynasty at LSU, guiding the Tigers to five national titles in a 10-year stretch from 1991-2000. He also skippered the United States to a bronze medal at the 1996 Olympics in Atlanta and was an assistant on the gold medal-winning U.S. squad in Seoul, Korea in 1988. Bertman retired from coaching following the 2001 season and is currently the LSU athletics director.





### Steve Van Buren

A halfback for the Tigers from 1941-43, Van Buren was an All-SEC selection in 1943, helping LSU to an Orange Bowl victory. An NFL Hall of Famer who enjoyed an eight-year career with the Eagles.



### Marie Ferdinand

The eighth pick overall in the 2001 WNBA draft by the Utah Starzz and was a 2002 WNBA all-star. A First-Team All-American in 2000-01 and helped the Lady Tigers to the Elite Eight in 2000 and to the NCAA Tournament three times.



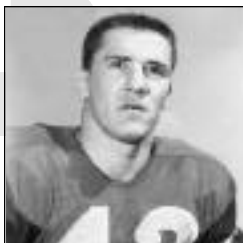
### Y.A. Tittle

A standout quarterback for the Tigers from 1944-47. Tittle went on to a Hall of Fame NFL career spanning 15 seasons where he was selected NFL MVP on two occasions ('57 and '62).



### Ben McDonald

Named National Player of the Year in 1989 and he was later the first player chosen in the Major League Baseball Draft by the Baltimore Orioles.



### Jimmy Taylor

Tiger All-American fullback in 1957. Taylor became a Hall of Famer with the Green Bay Packers and was on both Super Bowl winners under Vince Lombardi.



### Todd Walker

Capped his LSU career as the SEC's all-time leader in hits, runs, RBIs, and total bases. Walker, who is a member of the All-Time College World Series Team, led LSU to the national title in 1993.



### Josh Reed

An All-American, Reed re-wrote both the LSU and SEC record books. The winner of the Biletnikoff Award in 2001, Reed finished his career with an SEC record 3,001 yards receiving.



### David Toms

The two-time SEC Player of the Year, Toms has gone on to a successful career on the PGA Tour. Among his PGA Tour victories was a thrilling win at the PGA Championship in August of 2001.



### Esther Jones

A 21-time All-American while at LSU. Won a gold medal in the 4x100 meter relay team in Barcelona in 1992.



### Walter Davis

A track Olympian in 2000, Davis helped LSU to national titles in 2001 and 2002. The SEC Male Athlete of the Year in 2002, he won six NCAA titles and earned a school-record nine All-America honors.



### Peta-Gaye Dowdie

A 19-time track All-American. Dowdie was a member of three NCAA Championship teams during her time at LSU and went on to compete for her native Jamaica at the 2000 Sydney Olympics.



### Pat Henry

Has led the LSU track and field program to 23 national championships and 19 SEC titles. The only coach to win both men's and women's titles in the same year.

### Reinosuke Hara

Researched at LSU in the 1950s and then later received the honorary Doctorate of Science degree from LSU in 1992. Currently Vice-Chairman of Seiko Instruments.



### Harry Longwell

graduated from LSU in 1963 with a Bachelor's degree in Petroleum Engineering and currently is Executive Vice President of ExxonMobil.



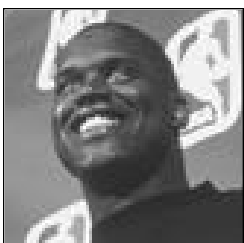
### Carlos Roberto Flores

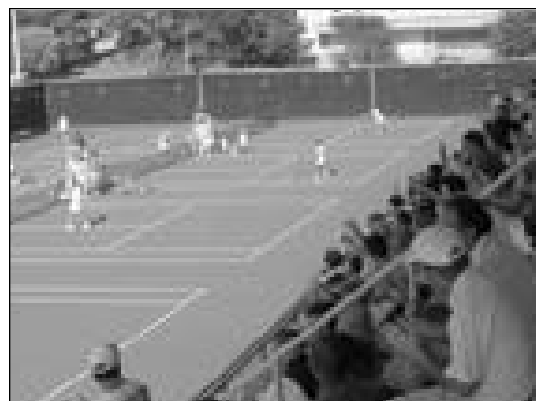

## Lady Tigers Timeline



1991 SEC Tournament Champions

LSU is entering its 28th season of women's basketball. The Lady Tigers first played basketball as a varsity sport in 1975-76 and since that inaugural season, LSU has posted 22 winning seasons, played in 12 NCAA Tournaments, and advanced to the AIAW National Championship game in 1977.

## The Coaches

LSU has had three coaches in its history with Jinks Coleman serving as the school's first head coach. Coleman coached the Lady Tigers for three and a half years before stepping down midway through the 1978-79 season. In 3-plus years with the Lady Tigers, Coleman guided LSU to a 91-32 overall mark. Her crowning moment with LSU came during the 1976-77 season as she led the Lady Tigers to the AIAW National Championship game. LSU fell to top-ranked Delta State, but that 1977 team remains the only squad in school history to play for a national title.

Coleman was replaced by Barbara Swanner midway through the 1979 season and Swanner coached the Lady Tigers for the next three years. She led LSU to an overall mark of 57-50 before ending her coaching career at the conclusion of the 1981-82 season.

Sue Gunter joined the Lady Tigers for the 1982-83 season and has been in Baton Rouge ever since. In 20 seasons with the Lady Tigers, Gunter has led the Lady Tigers to 385 victories and guided her teams to 12 NCAA Tournament appearances and the 1991 SEC Tournament title. Gunter is the winningest coach in LSU history and is a member of the Women's Basketball Hall of Fame.

## The 1970s

The decade of the 1970's saw the start of women's bas-

ketball as a varsity sport at LSU. The Lady Tigers played their first game in November of 1975, losing to Whitworth, 64-58. LSU's first win came a week later with a 75-62 win over Southwestern Louisiana. The win was the first of 17 for the Lady Tigers in their inaugural season as LSU posted a first-year mark of 17-14.

A year later, LSU, behind the play of a couple of Australians in Maree Jackson and Julie Gross, was playing for the AIAW National title. After going unrecognized for much of the year, LSU finally began to gain some respect with wins over three ranked teams in February. The Lady Tigers entered the AIAW State Tournament on a roll, however, LSU lost to Louisiana Tech and Northwestern State, but they were still able to advance to the AIAW Regional Tournament. At Regionals, the Lady Tigers beat Texas, Stephen F. Austin and Baylor to advance to the AIAW National Tournament. By this time the Lady Tigers were ranked No. 11 in the nation and after wins over Western Washington and Baylor, LSU was in the Final Four. LSU knocked off second-ranked Immaculata, 74-68, in the semifinals and then fell to top-ranked Delta State, 68-55, in the national title game. LSU finished with a 29-8 overall mark, the

second-most victories recorded in school history in a single year.

In 1977-78, the Lady Tigers achieved their first and only No. 1 ranking as LSU spent most of January and February atop the Associated Press poll, after having started

the year ranked No. 2 in the nation. The Lady Tigers stayed there until a Feb. 15 when Tennessee moved ahead of LSU. Despite being ranked No. 2 in the nation, LSU couldn't advance out of the Regionals as the Sue Gunter-coached Stephen F. Austin LadyJacks eliminated the Lady Tigers in the semifinals. LSU still won 37 games, which remains the school record for victories in a season.

LSU closed out the decade of the 1970's with a coaching change as Jinks Coleman stepped down after 15 games in the 1978-79 season. With an 8-7 mark, Coleman was replaced by Barbara Swanner, who guided LSU to a 5-5 mark over the final 10 games of the year. LSU finished with a 13-12 record.

## The 1980s

The decade of the 80's saw LSU establish itself as one of the top programs in the country.

LSU opened the decade under Barbara Swanner and posted a 17-17 mark and reached the semifinals of the AIAW Regional Tournament.

A year later, Joyce Walker came to Baton Rouge and put women's basketball at LSU back on the map. Walker, who was way ahead of her time, could do it all. In her first year with the Lady Tigers she averaged 20.7 points a contest and led the Lady Tigers to a 17-15 mark.

A year later, the NCAA became the governing body of women's athletics and the NCAA Tournament was started. The Lady Tigers didn't make the NCAA Tournament in 1982, but still posted an 18-13 overall mark as Walker averaged 24.9 points a contest. That season was Swanner's last year as head coach of the Lady Tigers.

The 1982-83 season was the first for the Lady Tigers under Sue Gunter, who came to LSU from Stephen F. Austin in Nacogdoches, Texas. In her first year with LSU, Gunter guided the Lady Tigers to a 20-7 mark and a tie for first place in the Western Division of the SEC.

Walker's last year with LSU in 1983-84 marked the Lady Tigers' first-ever appearance in the NCAA Tournament. LSU went 23-7 and reached the Sweet 16 at the NCAA Tournament before falling to Louisiana Tech.

In 1984-85, the Lady Tigers claimed the National Women's Invitation Tournament (NWIT) title with a 74-54 win over Florida in the championship game.

LSU's best season since 1977 occurred in 1985-86 as the Lady Tigers climbed all the way to No. 8 in the nation

and reached the Elite Eight at the NCAA Tournament before falling to Tennessee in the final seconds, 67-65.

Another 20-win season followed in 1986-87 as the Lady Tigers spent most of the year ranked in the top 10. However, the Lady Tigers lost their last three games, including a 70-56 setback to Southern Illinois in the second round of the NCAA Tournament.

The 1987-88 season saw the arrival of Dana "Pokey" Chatman, the best point guard in school history. Chatman helped guide the Lady Tigers to an 18-11 mark and another NCAA Tournament appearance. LSU closed out the 1980's with its fifth NCAA Tournament appearance as LSU reached the Sweet 16 before falling to Louisiana Tech.

## The 1990s

The decade of the 1990's was one of ups and downs for the Lady Tigers. LSU opened the decade with a 21-9 overall mark and its fifth NCAA Tournament appearance.

A year later, the Pokey Chatman era came to an end as the Lady Tigers posted a 24-7 overall mark, won the school's only SEC Tournament title and were seeded No. 2 in the Midwest Region of the NCAA Tournament.

The 1991-92 season started the Cornelia Gayden era, but it was also the beginning of a stretch that saw the Lady Tigers go five years without an appearance in the NCAA Tournament. LSU posted a 16-13 overall mark, but five straight losses in mid-February kept the Lady Tigers home in March.

A year later in 1992-93, the Lady Tigers had their first-ever losing record as LSU went 9-18 and was winless in the SEC for the first time. Things weren't much better in 1993-94 as LSU went

11-16 overall and tied for 10th in the SEC.

One of the bright spots in 1994-95 was Sue Gunter's 500th career victory on the same night Gayden set an NCAA record with 12 3-point goals in a 92-62 win over Jackson State on Feb. 9 in Baton Rouge. LSU suffered through its worst record ever that year as the Lady Tigers posted a 7-20 mark.

Despite the losing record the year prior, LSU signed one of the nation's best recruiting classes for the 1995-96 season and the results were immediate. LSU had the biggest turnaround in SEC history as the Lady Tigers went from 7-20 in 1994-95 to 21-11 in 1995-96. Junior college transfers Elaine Powell and Pietra Gay help lead LSU to a win over



second-ranked Georgia in the SEC Tournament as the Lady Tigers appeared to be headed for its first NCAA Tournament appearance in five years, but was denied. The Lady Tigers settled for the NWIT, where they placed third out of eight teams.

The following year, LSU posted its best record in the 90's as they went 25-5 overall, won nine SEC games and reached the Sweet 16 for the first time since 1989. In 1997-98, the Lady Tigers, in what was supposed to be a rebuilding year, posted a 19-13 overall mark and reached the semifinals of the Women's NIT.

In 1998-99 the Lady Tigers, behind the play of senior point guard Latasha Dorsey, the only senior on the team, reached the Sweet 16 for the second time in three years and finished second in the SEC with a school-record 10 league wins. LSU's 22-8 overall mark in 1998-99 was LSU's fourth 20-win season of the 1990's.

## The 2000's

The Lady Tigers rolled into the new millennium much like they way they ended the old one. In 1999-2000, LSU was 25-7 overall and 11-3 in the SEC, the best record for the program since 1996-97. The 11-3 conference mark was the best in the school's history. LSU rode that success all the way to the program's second Elite Eight appearance in the NCAA Tournament, falling to Connecticut in the regional final. Another 20-win season greeted the Lady Tigers in 2000-01, compiling a 20-11 mark, including the fifth straight winning conference record at 8-6. The 2001-02 season could have been on of the finest in recent history. Gunter's group of just six healthy players collected 18 victories, including a trip to the SEC Tournament Championship game and a fourth straight trip to the NCAA Tournament.

## 1977 AIAW Final Four

While it may not have been the NCAA Final Four, LSU's appearance at the AIAW Final Four in 1977 is just as

significant. At the time, the Lady Tigers were just in their second year of existence and were a relative unknown in the world of women's college basketball. Behind the play of Maree Jackson and Julie Gross, LSU peaked at tournament time as the unranked Lady Tigers beat Texas Tech, 95-67, in the first round at the AIAW Regionals and then followed that with a 76-73 victory over a Sue Gunter-coached Stephen F. Austin team in the semifinals. LSU routed Baylor, 92-76, in the regional finals to advance to the 16-team AIAW National Tournament in Minneapolis, Minn. LSU, now ranked No. 11 in the nation, drew Western Washington in the first round and coasted to a 91-53 victory. That was followed by another win over Baylor, 71-64, as the Lady Tigers advanced to the AIAW Final Four. LSU stunned second-ranked Immaculata, 74-68, to advance to the national championship game. In the AIAW National Championship game, Jackson got in early foul trouble and the Lady Tigers never got on track as the Delta Devils claimed the national title with a 68-55 win over LSU. The 1977 remains the only squad in school history to reach the

national championship game.

## 1991 SEC Tournament Champions

LSU claimed its first, and only, SEC Tournament title in 1991 as the Lady Tigers had one of the most impressive runs in conference tournament history. Entering the tournament as the No. 4 seed, the Lady Tigers had a first round bye and then beat Kentucky, 96-76, in the second round. The Lady Tigers, who were ranked No. 12 in the nation, then upset fourth-ranked Georgia, 83-74, in the semifinals. In the title game, point guard Pokey Chatman scored 30 points, including 16 straight at one point, as the Lady Tigers knocked off third-ranked Tennessee, 80-75. Chatman was named most valuable player of the tournament, while Sheila Johnson and Annette Jackson-Lowery were named to the all-tournament team.

Sue Gunter makes her debut as head coach of the Lady Tigers as LSU rolls over Tulane, 88-60 in Baton Rouge.

## Jan. 1, 1984

After winning its first nine games, the Lady Tigers move to No. 5 in the AP poll, which still marks the highest-ranking for an LSU team under Sue Gunter.

## Jan. 10, 1984

LSU beats Princeton, 97-49, to improve its record to 12-0, setting the school record for most consecutive wins to start a season.

## March 18, 1984

LSU earns its first bid to the NCAA Tournament and knocks off Missouri, 92-82, in the second round.

## March 23, 1985

LSU wins its first national title in women's basketball as the Lady Tigers beat Florida, 74-54, to claim the Women's NIT crown in Amarillo, Texas.

## Nov. 30, 1986

Gunter wins her 111th game at LSU to become the winningest coach in school history in an 84-68 victory over USL.

## Dec. 30, 1989

Gunter wins her 400th career game as the Lady Tigers blast Pacific, 88-58.

## March 4, 1991

Pokey Chatman scores 30 points as LSU knocks off No. 4 Tennessee, 80-75, to win its first SEC Tournament title. Chatman is named MVP of the SEC Tournament.

## Feb. 9, 1995

LSU coach Sue Gunter wins her 500th career game and Cornelia Gayden sets an NCAA record with 12 3-point goals at the Lady Tigers beat Jackson State, 92-62. Gayden also scored a school-record 49 points in the contest.

## Jan. 21, 1997

6,552 fans show up for inaugural "Pack The PMAC", breaking the then school attendance record, as 18th-ranked LSU knocks off 13th-ranked Arkansas, 79-72.



## Feb. 27, 1997

For the first time in her 15 years at LSU, Sue Gunter is named the SEC Coach of the Year by both the Associated Press and the Nashville Banner.

## March 15, 1998

Latasha Dorsey scored a career-high 26 points as LSU knocks off Butler, 74-58, in the quarterfinals of the Women's NIT in Baton Rouge. The win marked the 300th for Sue Gunter at LSU.

## Feb. 17, 1999

DeTrina White is named National Freshman of the Year by the Women's Basketball News Service.

## Feb. 21, 1999

Katrina Hibbert converts on a 3-point play with 11.8 seconds left as LSU beats No. 1 Tennessee, 72-69, LSU's first-ever win over a team ranked No. 1 in the nation.

## March 13, 1999

DeTrina White becomes the first freshman in school history with a double-double in an NCAA Tournament game with 24 points and 11 rebounds in LSU's 78-69 first round win over Evansville.

## Dec. 11, 1999

LSU defeats Michigan, 67-56, at the Pete Maravich Assembly Center. The game is televised by ESPN2, marking the first nationally-televised home game in LSU history.

## Jan. 13, 2000

LSU defeats Arkansas, 82-69, in Fayetteville to give head coach Sue Gunter her 600th career college coaching victory. Gunter becomes just the fourth NCAA women's basketball coach to earn 600 wins.

## June 10, 2000

LSU head coach Sue Gunter is inducted into the Women's Basketball Hall of Fame in Knoxville, Tenn.

## Feb. 4, 2001

LSU breaks the school and state's single-game attendance record with a crowd of 9,636 for "Pack the PMAC V" against Auburn. LSU lost the game, 65-62.

# The Players

## Maree Jackson

At 6-foot-2, Maree Jackson was one of the most dominating players in the game in the late 1970's. Jackson played only two years (1976-78) with the Lady Tigers, but during that time she scored 1,852 points in 70 games for an average of 26.4 points a contest. Her sophomore season could rank as the best in women's basketball history as her 1,021 points and 539 rebounds two of the most in NCAA history (although the NCAA does not recognize statistics prior to 1982). LSU posted a 66-11 mark in her two years. Jackson earned first team all-America honors by Basketball News in 1978. She scored 40 or more points five times including a career-best of 47 against Northwestern State in 1978. Jackson had a school-record 27 rebounds twice and had 12 games with at least 20 points and 20 rebounds in the same contest.

## Julie Gross

Another of LSU's dominating 6-2 players of the 70's, Julie Gross, like Maree Jackson, came to LSU from Australia. In four years with the Lady Tigers, Gross scored 2,488 points, second most in school history, and hauled in a school-record 1,466 rebounds. Gross was LSU's first Kodak All-American as she won the award after averaging 20.7 points and 11.5 rebounds as a sophomore in 1978. Gross' career rebound total ranks second in SEC history.

## Joyce Walker

No other player in school history could take over a game on the offensive end like Joyce Walker did. Walker, a native of Seattle, Wash., capped her career as the leading scorer in SEC history with 2,906 points, an average of 24.8 points a contest, until her scoring record was broken in 2000. Walker is LSU's only two-time Kodak All-American as she won the award in 1983 and 1984. In 1984, Walker averaged 26.5 points and 4.0 rebounds in leading LSU to the Sweet 16 in its first NCAA Tournament appearance. In her four years, Walker averaged at least 20 points each season with her career-best being 27.6 points as a junior.

## Pokey Chatman

She was like having another coach on the floor. She was so good at it that when her playing career was over she immediately joined Sue Gunter's coaching staff. Pokey Chatman is without a doubt the best point guard to ever play at LSU. In four years with the Lady Tigers she started all but one game. She led the Lady Tigers to the NCAA Tournament four times and she guided the Lady Tigers to their only SEC Tournament title in 1991 earning tourney MVP honors along the way. Chatman holds the school record for career assists and steals. She capped her career with 1,826 points, which ranks fifth in school history.

## Cornelia Gayden

There may not have been a better shooter come through LSU than Cornelia Gayden. In four years with the Lady Tigers, Gayden scored 2,451 points, third most in school history, and she re-wrote the NCAA 3-point record book. By the end of her career, Gayden held the NCAA records for 3-pointers in a game (12 vs. Jackson State in 1995), 3-pointers in a career (337) and 3-pointers attempted in a career (875). The 12 3-point goals vs. Jackson State is currently the only one that stands, however all three are SEC records. By her senior season, Gayden had also become the complete player as she ranks fifth in school history in rebounds (894), 11th in assists (261) and fourth in steals (196). Gayden also had a pair of triple-doubles and her 49 points against Jackson State in 1995 is a school-record.

## Elaine Powell

Although she was only at LSU two years, Elaine Powell was the biggest reason the Lady Tigers went from 7-20 the year prior to her arrival to 21-11 in her first season in Baton Rouge. Powell was a two-time first team All-SEC selection and in her first season with the Lady Tigers, she led LSU to its first post-season appearance (NWIT) in four years. A year later in 1997, Powell took the Lady Tigers a step further as LSU got its first NCAA Tournament bid since 1991. That year, Powell helped lead LSU to a 25-5 overall mark and to the Sweet 16 at the NCAA Tournament. In her career, Powell scored 1,163 which ranks 12th in school history. Powell is currently a member of the Orlando Miracle of the WNBA.

## Latasha Dorsey

In four years time, Latasha Dorsey developed into one of the most feared defenders in LSU women's basketball history. Dorsey, who finished her career ranked 16th in school history in scoring with 1,054 points, joined Joyce Walker and Pokey Chatman as the only three players in school history with 1,000 points, 300 assists and 200 steals. Dorsey finished third in school history with 258 steals and fifth in assists with 383. Dorsey also played in more post-season games (men or women) in school history with 12 as she appeared in six NCAA Tournament contests and six NIT games. As a senior, Dorsey was named first team Defensive All-American by the Women's Basketball Journal.

## Marie Ferdinand

One of the most explosive guards to ever play at LSU, Miami native Marie Ferdinand earned 2001 Kodak All-America honors and was a unanimous coaches poll first-team All-SEC selection. For her career, Ferdinand averaged 137. points and 4.1 rebounds a game. In 2000, she led the Lady Tigers to the Elite Eight, averaging team-highs in points, assists and steals. She was named to the 2000 NCAA East Regional all-tournament team. Ferdinand also made an impact in international play in the summer of 2000, helping lead the U.S. Women's Select Team to a gold medal at the Jones Cup Tournament in Taipei, Taiwan. She is currently a member of the Utah Starzz of the WNBA and finished third in Rookie of the Year voting in 2001 and was named to the 2002 All-Star team.

## DeTrina White

No other freshman in school history made an impact the way DeTrina White did in her rookie season. In 1999, White became the first freshman in school history to be named National Freshman of the Year. She was also named a first team Freshman All-American by two publications and the Associated Press named her SEC Freshman/Newcomer of the Year. White led the SEC with 62.1 percent shooting from the field as a freshman and her 12 double-doubles were tops in the league.

Sparked a six-game win streak upon her initial return, which came against in-state rival Tulane on Dec. 10 ... Led team with 7.4 rebounds per game while averaging 9.5 points ... Was even better in conference play as she averaged 10.6 points and 7.7 boards ... Ranked second on the squad in blocks per game (0.8) and steals per game (2.0) ... Her 14 points against North Texas marked her first double-figure scoring game ... Sue Gunter added another chapter to her coaching legacy last year as the Walnut Grove, Miss., native continues to stake her claim as one of the greatest coaches in the history of the women's game.

As Gunter enters her 39th season as a collegiate head coach, she continues to be an ambassador for a game in which she served as a pioneer many years ago. Gunter has been with women's basketball on the collegiate level every step of the way, having seen the sport evolve from a novelty back in the early 1960s to present day, where the Final Four is sold out years in advance and games are shown nightly on national television.

Gunter, who was inducted into the Women's Basketball Hall of Fame in June 2000, enters the 2002-03 season among the career leaders in several NCAA coaching categories: seasons coached (No. 1 - 38); games coached (No. 2 - 947); wins (No. 4 - 651); and 20-win seasons (No. 4 - 21).

Gunter's influence has been a catalyst behind the growth of the game and things have been no different in Baton Rouge as the Lady Tigers continue to play before school-record crowds and media attention is at an all-time high. In Gunter's 20-year tenure at LSU, her list of accomplishments are long and impressive -- 12 NCAA Tournament appearances, two NCAA Elite Eight appearances, six NCAA Sweet 16 appearances, an SEC Tournament title, a Women's NIT title, and a handful of Coach of the Year awards.

However, as Gunter enters her 21st season as the Lady Tigers head coach, the prized Final Four appearance still eludes her. LSU has come close several times, most recently in 2000, when the Lady Tigers advanced to the Elite Eight before falling to eventual national champion Connecticut. However, Gunter perseveres with the fact that her best seasons may still be ahead of her. The Lady Tigers

return every starter from last season's squad and bring in several highly touted recruits. With the table set for what should be another outstanding season, Gunter heads into the twilight of her coaching career with that elusive Final Four right around the corner.

## Sue Gunter -- The Coach

Sue Gunter has taken the LSU women's basketball program back to national prominence. After a three-year hiatus in the mid-1990's that saw the Lady Tigers suffer through the school's first-ever losing seasons, LSU has now been to post-season action six straight years, including four trips to the NCAA Tournament.

To realize just how far the Lady Tigers have come in four years, one has to go back to the 1994-95 season, the worst year in school history as LSU posted a 7-20 overall mark. Strangely enough, it was the 1994-95 season





that proved to be the turning point for the Lady Tigers as Gunter turned up her recruiting magic and promptly signed the best class in school history. That class, which included future All-SEC selections in Elaine Powell, Pietra Gay and Toni Gross, won 46 games over two years and resurrected the LSU women's basketball program. The Lady Tigers have now won an average of 22 games over the last six years and once again, LSU women's basketball is back in the national scope.

This past year, Gunter had probably one of her greatest coaching achievements in her illustrious career. Losing All-American candidate DeTrina White for the season due

joined Joyce Walker (1983, 1984) and Pokey Chatman (1991) as Gunter's Kodak All-Americans.

In 2001 the Lady Tigers also shattered the school's single-game attendance record for Pack the PMAC V when 9,636 fans showed up to see LSU take on Auburn. The crowd, the largest to ever see a women's basketball game in the state of Louisiana, could unfortunately do little as the Lady Tigers lost, 65-62.

In 2000, Gunter directed the Lady Tigers to a 25-7 mark, including a berth in the NCAA Tournament Elite Eight, where LSU fell to eventual national champion Connecticut. The Lady Tigers won a school-

Association District 3 Coach of the Year.

In 1997-98, the Lady Tigers, after losing one of the best senior classes in school history, advanced to the Women's NIT semifinals before falling to Baylor. LSU beat a couple of top 10 teams at home and one of the season highlights came on Jan. 18 when the Lady Tigers shattered the school's then single-game attendance record for Pack the PMAC II when 7,255 fans showed up to see LSU beat Ole Miss, 69-56.

The 1996-97 season was perhaps the most rewarding for Gunter in all her years of coaching as she was named the SEC Coach of the Year for the first time after leading the Lady Tigers to a 25-5 overall mark and a

to injury and losing three players for the year to torn ACLs, including starting point guard Kisha James, the outlook seemed bleak as the Tigers entered SEC play in January.

Forced to limit the length of practices and maximize every break, Gunter helped guiding a team that had only seven healthy players to their first SEC Tournament Championship game since 1991 and their fourth straight NCAA Tournament, where the Lady Tigers fell to Colorado in the second round. Gunter also produced sophomore honorable mention All-American Temeka Johnson.

Two seasons ago, Gunter led LSU to its third consecutive 20-win season and the fifth in the past six years. The season also included a third straight trip to the NCAA Tournament, where the Lady Tigers fell to eventual national runner-up Purdue in West Lafayette, Ind. Gunter also produced her third Kodak All-American as senior Marie Ferdinand garnered the honor. Ferdinand

record 11 SEC games, and their 7-1 SEC start was the best ever by an LSU team. The Lady Tigers also established school marks for most home victories (17) and most SEC road wins (5). Gunter reached another milestone during the season as she posted her 600th career victory on Jan. 13, 2000, at Arkansas. The year was culminated in June with her induction into the Women's Basketball Hall of Fame, located in Knoxville, Tenn.

The 1998-99 season may have been one of Gunter's best on the bench as she took a team with only one senior to a 22-8 overall mark and a second place finish in the SEC. After being picked to finish eighth in the SEC, the Lady Tigers won a school-record 10 league games, including a win over top-ranked Tennessee, and reached the Sweet 16 at the NCAA Tournament for the second time in three years. As a result, Gunter was named SEC Coach of the Year by both her peers and the Associated Press. She was also named the Women's Basketball Coaches

berth in the NCAA Tournament's Sweet 16. LSU finished the year ranked No. 9 in the nation in the AP poll and the Lady Tigers had a then school-record nine SEC wins, which included victories over Tennessee, Alabama, Auburn and two over Arkansas. In addition, Gunter proved that women's basketball could become a hit in Baton Rouge as fans flocked to see the Lady Tigers in record fashion as LSU broke every school attendance record that year.

The success of the 1996-97 team was a direct result of what happened to LSU in 1995-96. The 1995-96 team posted the biggest turnaround in SEC history, posting a 21-11 record after going 7-20 the year prior. However, the season proved to be bitter sweet for LSU as the Lady Tigers were denied a spot in the 64-team NCAA Tournament despite beating second-ranked Georgia in the SEC Tournament the week prior to the tournament selection. LSU did advance to the Women's National Invitational

Tournament (WNIT) where they finished third after pounding Arkansas in the third place game.

Prior to the turnaround in 1995-96, the three years prior were tough on both Gunter and the Lady Tigers. But there were some bright spots. Despite posting a 7-20 mark in 1995, Gunter won the 500th game of her career on Feb. 9 when the Lady Tigers routed Jackson State, 92-62. In that same game, LSU's Cornelia Gayden set an NCAA record by hitting 12 3-point goals.

Gunter is so admired by her peers that despite LSU's losing record in 1994, she was still honored that year as the recipient of the Carol Eckman Award. The award goes to the coach that shows spirit, integrity and courage in coaching women's basketball.

In 1993, Gunter and the Lady Tigers suffered through their first losing season ever as LSU fell to 9-18 overall and 0-11 in the SEC. Gunter called that season the most trying in her career.

In 1992 the Lady Tigers slipped to 16-13 overall and 4-7 in the SEC. During the 1991-92 campaign, the Lady Tigers made a late season push to make the NCAA Tournament, however, their hopes were dashed after Tennessee beat LSU in the final seconds during the second round of the SEC Tournament.

The 1991 season was one of firsts for the Lady Tigers and Gunter as they captured their first SEC Tournament title by defeating eventual national champion Tennessee, 80-75, in the finals. Also during that season, LSU defeated Louisiana Tech for the first time since 1978, defeated Auburn for the first time since 1984 and, for the first time in her career, Gunter defeated both Stephen F. Austin and Tennessee.

The Lady Tigers finished the 1991 season with a 24-7 record and ranked No. 8 in the final AP poll, while point guard Pokey Chatman earned Kodak All-America honors. During her silver anniversary year of coaching in 1989, Gunter collected her 400th career victory with a win over the University of Pacific. Also during that season, the Lady Tigers posted a 19-11 record and advanced to the Midwest Regional of the NCAA Tournament. In the second round of the NCAAAs, Gunter led LSU to a come-from-behind win over Purdue, before losing to Louisiana Tech. With one of the nation's toughest schedules in 1989, Gunter's team once again surprised critics by defeating four Top 10 teams with only one senior on the squad.

Gunter became the winningest coach in LSU women's basketball history during the 1987 season surpassing Jinks Coleman. During that season, Gunter led the Lady

Tigers to their fifth 20-plus win season with a 20-8 mark and a No. 14 ranking in the final AP poll.

The 1986 season was probably one of the most satisfying for Gunter as the Lady Tigers posted a 27-6 record and appeared in the SEC title game. However, a trip to the Final Four that season was denied with a 67-65 loss to Tennessee in the Mideast Regional Finals. During the 1985 season, Gunter led the Lady Tigers to a 20-9 record and to the school's first women's national title, the WNIT, as LSU defeated Florida in the title game.

Gunter's 1984 team started the season with then a school-record 12 straight wins and appeared in the NCAA Tournament for the first time. The Lady Tigers finished the season ranked No. 8 in the nation and it also ended the brilliant career of the SEC's second leading scorer Joyce Walker.

The 1983 season marked Gunter's first year at LSU and she led the Lady Tigers to a 20-7 record and a No. 20 national ranking in the AP Poll. The inaugural season marked the beginning of a bright future for both Gunter and the Lady Tigers, who finished in a first-place tie in the SEC Western Division that year. As a result, Gunter was named National Coach of the Year by Basketball News, received the Converse Region IV coaching honor, and was chosen the top coach in the state by the Louisiana Sportswriters Association.

Gunter enters the 2001-02 season as the fourth winningest active women's basketball coach in the nation with an overall record of 633-284, which includes coaching stints at Middle Tennessee, Stephen F. Austin and LSU. Gunter's LSU record stands at 367-197, which makes her the winningest coach in school history.

Under the direction of Gunter, the Lady Tigers have played in 11 NCAA Tournaments, one National Women's Invitation Tournament and two WNIT events. Gunter led LSU to within one game of the Final Four in 1986 and 2000, while leading the Lady Tigers to championship at the National Women's Invitation Tournament in 1985. In addition, Gunter has directed LSU to 12 20-plus win seasons.

Prior to her arrival in Baton Rouge, Gunter had a very successful coaching stint at Stephen F. Austin in Nacogdoches, Texas. While at SFA, Gunter built that program into a national powerhouse as she led the LadyJacks to a 266-87 mark in 12 years as head coach. In addition, she led Stephen F. Austin to four top 10 national rankings, which included No. 5 final rankings in 1979 and 1980. While at Stephen F. Austin, Gunter coached four sports - women's basketball, softball, tennis and track. Her

basketball teams went to five Association of Intercollegiate Athletics for Women (AIAW) playoffs, won four state titles, and earned a regional crown.

After 16 seasons at SFA, she relinquished the reigns and moved into the position of Director of Women's Athletics where she served two years before returning to the coaching ranks at LSU.

Gunter began her coaching career at Middle Tennessee State where she led the Blue Raiders to undefeated seasons in both of her years there.

### Sue Gunter -- International Coach

Sue Gunter's impressive coaching credentials don't end with her contributions to the college game as she has also played a big part in the success of the United States in women's basketball on the International level.

In 1980, Gunter was selected as the head women's basketball coach for the United States Olympic Team. Gunter guided her team to the title at the Olympic Qualifying



Tournament prior to the Olympics. However, Gunter and her team were denied a chance at a gold medal due to the United States' boycott of the Olympic Games, which were held in Moscow, that year.

Gunter has tasted success at the Olympics, however, as she was an assistant coach on the 1976 U. S. Team which captured the silver medal in Montreal.

Gunter has also served as head coach for the U.S. National Team three times, as she led those squads in 1976, 1978 and 1980.

### Sue Gunter -- Off The Court

Gunter received her Bachelor and Master's degrees in 1962 from Peabody College in Nashville, Tenn. She followed that with post-graduate work at Texas Women's University.

A fine player in her own right, Gunter played AAU basketball for Nashville Business College from 1958-62 earning AAU All-America honors. She was also a member of the 1960-62 United States teams that competed against the Soviet Union.

Gunter has also become very active in many community service areas throughout Baton Rouge. This year alone, Gunter has played an active role in the Baton Rouge Area Lupas Foundation and she served as the honorary chairperson for the Walk for Alzheimer's in Baton Rouge. Gunter was also a finalist for the 1997 YWCA Women of Achievement Award, which recognizes the top women in the Baton Rouge community for contributions to their field.

The Sue Gunter era at LSU got off to a flying start as the Lady Tigers posted a 20-7 overall mark and finished in a first place tie in the SEC Western Division with a 6-2 mark. Gunter was named Basketball News' National Coach of the Year and Region IV Coach of the Year by Converse after the Lady Tigers finished the year ranked No. 20 in the nation in the AP poll. LSU had wins over 17th-ranked Auburn and 16th-ranked Ole Miss during the season.

Alisha Jones scored 16 points as LSU overcame a three point halftime deficit to beat 13th-ranked Maryland, 67-57, in Miami. LSU outscored Maryland, 41-28, in the second half to secure the victory.

**#9 LSU 84, #10 Georgia 53**

Jan. 11, 1987 • Baton Rouge, La.

Joanne Ineman scored a career-high 21 points as No. 9 LSU beat 10th-ranked Georgia, 84-53, in Baton Rouge. The win was the first-ever by LSU over Georgia.

Feb. 1, 1987 • Nashville, Tenn.

Karen Linder scored 20 points and had 19 rebounds as ninth-ranked LSU beat 14th-ranked Vanderbilt, 81-79, in overtime.

LSU, behind 21 points from April Delley, raced out to a 39-23 halftime lead and then cruised to a 70-56 victory over 13th-ranked Georgia in Athens.

The win marked only the third time in school history that LSU had beaten a team ranked as high as No. 2 in the nation. Pietra Gay led LSU with 24 points.

Pietra Gay scored 22 points and had seven rebounds as LSU knocked off fifth-ranked Alabama, 84-74, in Baton Rouge. The win over Alabama is the first for LSU since the 1991 season.

Elaine Powell scored 32 points as Sue Gunter beat Tennessee for only the second time in her career in the Lady Tigers' 83-78 win over the eventual national champion Lady Vols. The victory also gave LSU a school-record nine SEC wins and clinched a third place finish in the SEC for the Lady Tigers.

#### LSU 67, #10 Florida 57

Katrina Hibbert scored 17 points and Latasha Dorsey added 15 points and eight rebounds as the unranked Lady Tigers knocked off 10th-ranked Florida in Baton Rouge by a 67-57 count. The win was the 14th straight at home for the Lady Tigers and the first against Florida since 1991.

Ashley Bankston scored a career-high 19 points as unranked LSU beat 10th-ranked Vanderbilt, 57-46. LSU limited Vanderbilt to just 34.0 percent from the field as only one Commodore scored in double-figures.

Latasha Dorsey scored 24 points to lead LSU to a second round NCAA win over Notre Dame. The win extended LSU's home court winning streak against non-conference teams to 36 straight.

Four Lady Tigers scored in double-figures to lead LSU to the huge road victory. April Brown poured in 25 points on 9-of-14 shooting from the field, and Marie Ferdinand added 21 points, six assists and four steals. Katrina Hibbert hit three 3-pointers and recorded 16 points, eight rebounds and six assists, while DeTrina White added 10 points and five rebounds. Brown and Hibbert shared SEC Player of the Week honors after the triumph.

Marie Ferdinand scored 20 of her 25 points in the second half as LSU rallied from a 15 point second-half deficit to upset No. 6 Purdue, 62-55. With 38 seconds remaining, Ferdinand hit a lay up and was fouled to break a 55-55 tie. She hit the free throw to give LSU a three-point lead. After a defensive stop, Angelia Crockett hit two free throws to put away the Boilermakers.

#### LSU 84, #15 Florida 59

LSU recorded the largest win over a ranked opponent in three years with the victory over the Lady Gators. The Lady Tigers poured in on on the first half, taking a 42-17 lead into the locker room. Temeka Johnson scored a career-high 29 points, while Scholanda Dorrell added 13 points and 10 rebounds.

#### LSU 72, #9 South Carolina 62

Feb. 17, 2002 Baton Rouge, La.

LSU shot 55 percent from the field in the second half and outscored USC 29-3 at the free throw line in the upset win. Aiysha Smith led the way with 18 points and 12 rebounds, while Doneeka Hodges hit for 17 points. Temeka Johnson added a solid effort with nine points, nine assists and eight rebounds.

#### LSU 81, #3 Tennessee 80

March 2, 2002 Nashville, Tenn.

Temeka Johnson made 12 of 15 free throws, including one with 4.5 seconds remaining to upset No. 1 seed Tennessee in the semifinals of the SEC Tournament. Johnson finished the game with 18 points and 10 assists and Doneeka Hodges added 23 points, while Aisha Smith had 14 points.



# Pokey Chatman

Dana "Pokey" Chatman enters her 12th season on the LSU women's basketball staff, and her fourth year as an associate coach after being elevated to her current position in September 1999. Chatman, who dazzled LSU fans for four years as LSU's starting point guard in the late 1980s and early 1990s, is considered one of the best recruiters in the nation.

In addition for having a reputation of being one of the nation's best recruiters, Chatman is also thought to be one of the top up-and-coming coaches in the collegiate ranks. Chatman has led LSU's recruiting efforts over the last seven years and as a result, the Lady Tigers have had six straight classes rank among the top 20 in the nation, including this year's class of newcomers which was rated by some publications as the best in the nation. Chatman's efforts in landing this year's class could be her best work ever. LSU signed Seimone Augustus, named the National Player of the Year by Girls Basketball and Student Sports, and Louisiana All-Star Treynell Clavelle.

The previous three years were also highly productive for Chatman. She helped the Lady Tigers land Aiysha Smith, a Kodak Junior College All-American and Florence Williams last season, prep All-Americans twins Doneeka and Roneeka Hodges and AAU teammate Temeka Johnson out of New Orleans two years ago and Ke-Ke Tardy, the top player in Mississippi and ranked the 11th best player in the nation prior to the 1998-99 season.

Chatman was also responsible for bringing DeTrina White, one of the top 15 rated players in the country in 1998, who went on to become the 1998-99 National Freshman of the Year.

Besides coordinating all of LSU's recruiting efforts, Chatman also serves as the director for the Sue Gunter Basketball Camp. Chatman's primary on-court responsibility is the coaching and teaching of LSU's backcourt. Chatman is also involved in



developing game plans during the season.

Since joining the Lady Tigers staff, Chatman has tutored some of the finest guards in the country. Marie Ferdinand was a 2001 Kodak All-American selection and a finalist for the prestigious Naismith Award, given to the nation's best collegiate player. In addition to averaging over 21 points a game her senior season, she was a finalist for the Shooting Guard of the Year Award given out by ESPN. Ferdinand, a first round draft pick in the WNBA, is currently playing for the Utah Starzz and was named to the 2002 WNBA All-Star team.

Chatman also worked with Cornelia Gayden, a three-time All-SEC pick who holds the NCAA record for 3-point goals in a single-game with 12 against Jackson State. Other standouts under Chatman were Elaine Powell, a two-time first team All-SEC selection, Pietra Gay, an All-SEC pick in 1997, and Latasha Dorsey, a first team Defensive All-American in 1999. Powell is currently playing in the WNBA with the Detroit Shock, while Gay was a member of the 1997 WNBA championship team, the Houston Comets.

Before being named to assistant coach prior to the 1992-93 season, Chatman served one season, 1991-92, as a student assistant with the Lady Tigers. Chatman, a Kodak All-American point guard for the Lady Tigers in 1991, graduated from Hahnville High School in 1987. She received her Bachelor's degree from LSU in December of 1991.

During her four years with the Lady Tigers, Chatman started all but one game and is the school's all-time assists and steals leader with 570 and 346, respectively. She is also fifth on the all-time scoring list with 1,826 points. Chatman played in the NCAA Tournament four times and she posted a four-year record of 82-38.

Chatman was a three-time All-SEC selection and in 1991 as she led the Lady Tigers to their first-ever SEC Tournament title. Chatman was named MVP of the 1991 SEC Tournament, also a first for LSU.

Chatman capped her career at LSU by being selected to the prestigious Kodak All-American team following her senior season in 1991. Chatman is one of only four Lady Tigers ever named to the Kodak team. Chatman set a total of 20 school records while at LSU with five of those records still standing.

Chatman was inducted into the LSU Athletic Hall of Fame in the spring of 1999.

# Carla Berry

Carla Berry enters her second season as an assistant coach for the Lady Tigers and will primarily oversee academics and assist in all facets of recruiting. Berry was an outstanding guard for the LSU women's basketball team from 1988-92 and a member of the 1991 SEC Tournament championship team.

Bringing four years of recruiting experience to the program, Berry joins the accomplished LSU staff that has had six signing classes rank among the top 20 in the nation over the last seven years, three which have been ranked top 10. In just her first year on the LSU staff, Berry helped the Lady Tigers sign one of the top classes in the nation that included the National High School Player of the Year Seimone Augustus.

The opportunity to return to LSU was one that Berry could not pass up after having played for Coach Gunter and the Lady Tigers. As one of the team's chief recruiters, her commitment to the program and its success is personal and transcends just her professional obligations as a coach.

As a former LSU player, Berry has the ability to discuss the strengths of the program with recruits and lay out the opportunities LSU has to offer its student-athletes.

Berry, an Academic All-SEC selection in 1992, helped LSU advance to three NCAA Tournament appearances and was a part of the Lady Tigers' 1991 SEC Tournament Championship team. In 1993, she earned her bachelor's degree in Advertising.

After graduating, she returned home to Alabama where she spent one season as a graduate assistant coach for the University of South Alabama in 1993-94. Berry then took a position as an assistant coach and recruiting coordinator for Cal-Poly San Luis Obispo in 1994. During her time there, the Mustangs made the difficult transition from NCAA Division II to Division I competition.

Taking a position at St. John's University in



1995, Berry spent three years with the women's basketball program as an assistant coach, working with current Lady Tiger administrative assistant Joe Carvalhido. Coaching a team that was in the process of rebuilding, the program showed improvement each year she was there, including a 13-win season in her final year. Additionally, in her three seasons at St. John's, the Red Storm penned a pair of recruiting classes ranked in the top 50 nationally, including one top 25 class that included current Tiger Aiysha Smith.

In addition to her recruiting responsibilities at LSU, Berry will also oversee academics for the Lady Tigers. Working closely with the Academic Center for Athletes, she will help coordinate study hall and tutoring, while monitoring the academic progress for the student-athletes. Her primary on-court assignment will be coaching LSU's guards.

Berry spent two years working in sales for Cingular Wireless (formerly BellSouth Mobility) in her hometown of Mobile, Ala. prior to joining the Lady Tiger staff. She took the two years off from coaching to assist with an illness in the family.

# Bob Starkey

Bob Starkey enters his fifth season on the LSU women's basketball staff after joining the team on a full-time basis in 1998. Starkey had served as the administrative assistant for both the LSU men's and women's basketball team for two years prior to joining the Lady Tigers as assistant coach.

Starkey works with all phases of the program, which includes working with both perimeter and post players on the practice floor. He also breaks down game tape and develops game plans while compiling scouting reports on LSU's opponents. Starting two years ago, Starkey added recruiting to his list of responsibilities. He brought a wealth of experience to the Lady Tigers' recruiting efforts, having worked as a recruiter for LSU men's basketball, at Marshall University, and at West Virginia State.

In addition, Starkey serves as the Director of the LSU women's basketball teams' Fast Break Club, and he is also involved in all areas of promotions for the women's program. Starkey also handles all scheduling for the Lady Tigers.

As the administrative assistant, Starkey provided valuable assistance to both the men's and women's programs, handling many of the responsibilities for both groups that would ease the work load for the coaching staff, allowing them to concentrate fully on their teams, recruiting and future opponents.

Starkey served as tournament director for the 1997 NCAA Women's Basketball Subregional held at the Maravich Assembly Center. The NCAA Subregional was the first for LSU to host and it was also called by many that attended the event as one of the best-run subregionals since the NCAA changed tournament formats five years ago.

Perhaps Starkey's finest achievement in the role of administrative assistant came in the Pack the PMAC games. In the 1997 Pack the PMAC contest against Arkansas, LSU drew a school-record 6,552 fans for the contest. The 6,552 fans for the contest nearly tripled the previous record crowd of 2,454 set against Ole Miss in 1984. A year later against Ole Miss, LSU reset the schoolmark with a crowd of 7,255 for Pack the PMAC II. Two years ago, the school record crowd of 9,636 for the Pack the PMAC V game against Auburn was the largest atten-



dance ever for a women's basketball game in the state of Louisiana. The Pack the PMAC promotion has developed into an LSU tradition, as Pack the PMAC VII is set for Jan. 4, 2003, when the Lady Tigers face Penn State on CBS.

Prior to his stint as an administrative assistant, Starkey served as an assistant coach for Dale Brown on the LSU men's basketball staff from 1990-1996, during which time the Tigers participated in four NCAA Tournaments. While on the men's staff, Starkey coached four first-round NBA draft picks in Shaquille O'Neal, Chris Jackson, Geert Hammick and Stanley Roberts. As a recruiter, he helped sign three nationally-ranked recruiting classes, including one which was rated No. 1 in the country.

Groomed on the high school level in West Virginia, Starkey started his coaching career as an assistant at Winfield High School where he helped guide the boys' program to a five-year record of 72-45 and the girls' program to an 87-23 record.

Starkey then made his first appearance in the collegiate ranks as an assistant at West Virginia College on the NAIA level. In his three-year stint at West Virginia State, the program blossomed with improving records of 17-10, 26-4 and 31-4. That final season saw the Yellow Jackets capture conference and district titles on their way to the NAIA National Championship game, where they were a one-point loser to Washburn University.

Following that, Starkey also served for one year at Poca High School in West Virginia with his former high school coach, Allen Osborne, and teamed up for the 1988-89 season with Judy Southard to lead the women's program at Marshall to an 18-10 record and a regular season Southern Conference Championship. Southard is now the Senior Woman Administrator at LSU after serving as the Athletic Director at Texas Women's University.

Starkey, who considers himself a full-time student of the game, has written numerous articles and has authored such basketball books as The 2-3 Match-Up Defense and Motion Offense.

His latest project is a Basketball Coaching Series of books that include The Art of Being An Assistant Coach, The Art of Scouting and The Art of Motivation.

The native of Charleston, W.V., is married to Sherie Hayslett, also a native of West Virginia.

# MAGNIFICENT SEVEN

**D**espite playing most of the season with just seven healthy players, LSU advanced the NCAA Tournament for the 12th time in school history and the fifth time in the last six years. The Lady Tigers got past Santa Clara 84-78 in the first round of the tournament, but then fell to host Colorado 69-58 in the second round.

LSU enjoyed a lot of success in 2001-02, including reaching the championship game of the Southeastern Conference tournament and finishing fourth in the league's regular season. The journey to the title game included a 81-80 upset victory over No. 3 Tennessee in the semifinals. Overall LSU defeated four ranked teams in 2001-02, including Tennessee and No. 9 South Carolina.

## WHITE, JAMES, JONES AND WILLIS OUT FOR THE YEAR WITH INJURIES

The Lady Tigers were bitten by the injury bug four times in 2001-02.

Freshman **Tillie Willis** (Atlanta, Ga./Cumberland Christian) went down with a torn ACL in practice on Feb. 20. She was out for the remainder of the season and had surgery on March 7. At the time of her injury, she was averaging 1.1 points and 1.9 rebounds per game and had seen action off the bench in 20 of the Lady Tigers' 23 games.

Senior **DeTrina White** (Lafayette, La./Acadiana HS) decided to use her redshirt due to injury. After missing most of the pre-

season with a recurring back injury, White was diagnosed with a stress fracture in her foot prior to the exhibition game with AIS. On Dec. 2, she underwent surgery to place a screw into her foot. In her first day back at practice after her foot injury, she collided with another player in practice and was diagnosed with a concussion and required stitches.

Junior **Kisha James** (Pineville, La./Pineville HS) injured her left knee in the opening minutes against Mercer. She underwent an MRI on Dec. 19 and it was determined that she tore her anterior cruciate ligament and underwent reconstructive surgery on Jan. 7. She tore the ACL in that knee in an exhibition game on Nov. 14, 1999 and took a medical redshirt year after having successful reconstructive surgery on Dec. 8, 1999.

Freshman **Wendlyn Jones** (Grosnell, Ark./Blytheville HS) went down with a torn ACL in practice on Saturday, Nov. 10. **LSU'S MAGIC NUMBER IS 75**



The 75-point mark has become somewhat of a magical number for LSU as the Lady Tigers have become almost unbeatable when scoring 75 or more points. Since the 1996-97 season, LSU has posted a 77-3 (.963) record when scoring at least 75 points in a game. LSU was 12-1 (.923) in 2001-02 when reaching the 75-point plateau, with its only loss coming against Michigan in double overtime. In that same six-year period, the Lady Tigers barely broke even in games when failing to score 75 points and were just 54-51 (.514) in that time, including a 7-10 (.411) record in 2001-02.

### STRAIGHT NCAA APPEARANCE

For the fourth straight season and the fifth time in the last six years, the Lady Tigers have advanced to the "Big Dance". LSU has now made postseason play for seven consecutive seasons, including WNIT appearances in 1996 and 1998.

The Lady Tigers are still looking for their first Final Four berth, having advanced to the Elite Eight in 1986 and 2000. Last season, LSU made it to the second round, where the Lady Tigers lost, 73-70, to eventual national runner-up Purdue.

### NON-RANKED OPPONENTS

Since the 1998-99 season the Lady Tigers have lost just seven games against non-ranked opponents, posting a 68-9 (.883) record against those teams. This season, LSU is 14-2 (.875) against non-ranked teams, with losses to Alabama and Arkansas on the road.

The Lady Tigers have improved each year since the 1998-99 season when it comes to non-ranked teams, posting records of 17-3 (.850) in 1998-99 and 20-2 (.909) in 1999-00. Last year, LSU fell only once to a non-ranked team, dropping a 65-62 heartbreaker to Auburn for Pack the PMAC V, making the Lady Tigers 16-1 (.941) in 2000-01.

### SMITH'S STREAK ENDS AT 27 GAMES



Junior **Aiysha Smith** (Detroit, Mich./Tyler JC) posted double-figure scoring outputs in the first 27 games this season, including a career-high 23 points against Ole Miss and at Vanderbilt. The fourth longest streak in LSU history came to an end against Vanderbilt in the SEC Tournament champi-

onship game when she scored just four points.

During the streak, she also recorded eight double-doubles - against Virginia Tech, Louisiana-Lafayette, Ole Miss, Arkansas, Auburn, South Carolina, Alabama and Kentucky. With back-to-back double-doubles against Ole Miss and Arkansas and again against Alabama and Kentucky, she was the first player to record back-to-back double-doubles since **DeTrina White** did so during the 1999-2000 season and the 17 rebounds she recorded against Arkansas is also the most since White's 17 rebounds against Southern on Nov. 24, 1998.

### SMITH, HODGES NAMED



### TO ALL-SEC TEAM

Lady Tigers **Aiysha Smith** and **Doneeka Hodges** were named to the All-SEC basketball team as announced by the league office. Smith was named to the first team, while Hodges earned a spot on the second team.

The leading scorer and rebounder for the Lady Tigers, Smith has scored in double-figures in all 25 games. She has also recorded seven double-doubles on her way to averaging 16.4 points and 7.9 rebounds.

The SEC and LSWA Player of the Week for Feb. 18, Smith scored a career-high 23 points against both Ole Miss and Vanderbilt and pulled down a career-high 17 rebounds against Arkansas.

Hodges ranks second on the team in scoring, averaging 15 points a game and leads the team in three-point shooting with 46 three's this season. She currently ranks eighth in three-pointers made in a single season in LSU history. In addition, she is second on the team with 92 assists, ranking her seventh among sophomores in school history.

Against Florida, Hodges scored a career-high 29 points and recorded her first collegiate double-double with 14 points and 10 rebounds against Ole Miss.

### HONORED IN THE STATE

**Aiysha Smith** and **Sue Gunter** were both recognized by the Louisiana Sports Writers Association in 2001-02. Smith, a 6-2 center, was named the Louisiana Newcomer of the Year after leading the Lady Tigers with 15.7 points and 7.7 rebounds per game.

Gunter, in her 20th season as head coach, earned Louisiana Coach of the Year for posting a 18-12 and making the NCAA Tournament despite not having more than eight healthy players on the squad at one time.

### JOHNSON GET SCHOOL RECORD FOR ASSISTS, EARNS HONORABLE MENTION ALL-AMERICAN

**Temeka Johnson** earned Honorable Mention All-America by both the Associated Press and womenscolleg hoops.com. The 5-3 guard averaged 11.1 points and 7.5 assists in 24 games. She also set the LSU school record for assists in a game when she dished out 15 in a 88-57 victory over Ole Miss on Jan. 17.

### PACK THE PMAC VI DRAWS SECOND LARGEST CROWD

On Jan. 27, the Lady Tigers took on nationally ranked Vanderbilt in the sixth annual Pack the PMAC game. The second-largest crowd in school history attended the event as 8,153 fans witnessed the game. The Lady Tigers battled back from a 22-point second half deficit to get as close as nine points, but eventually fell to the Commodores, 64-53.

As part of the halftime festivities, John Pinegar of Baton Rouge won a 2002 Mitsubishi Eclipse courtesy of Levis Mitsubishi as part of the Flying Frenzy contest. He was able to successfully fly a paper airplane from the stands into the car's sunroof. It marked the second time in six contests that someone has walked away with a new vehicle.

The Pack the PMAC event is one of the most successful promotions in women's college basketball. Pack the PMAC is a joint effort between the LSU Athletics and several Baton Rouge businesses to attract record-breaking crowds for Lady Tiger basketball. Five of the top six crowds in LSU women's basketball history were recorded at the Pack the PMAC games, including a Louisiana record attendance of 9,636 in February 2001, when the Lady Tigers hosted Auburn.

LSU shot 50 percent from the floor, including 52 percent in the second half. Santa Clara shot 43 percent.

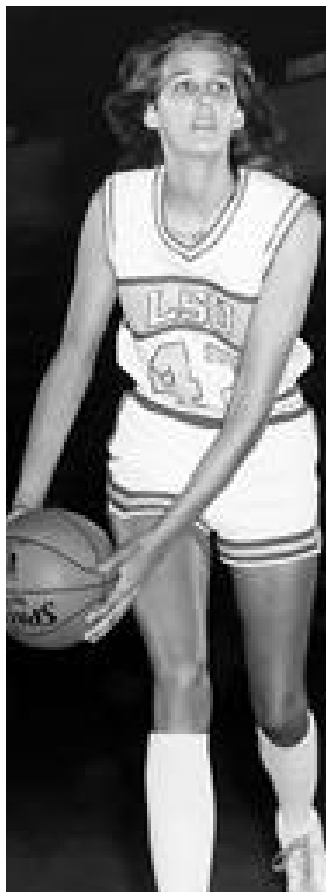

## Lady Tigers

The Only Lady Tiger Team To Reach the National Championship Game of a post-season Tournament

With one of the most dominating forward-center combinations in LSU women's basketball history in Australians Julie Gross and Maree Jackson, the Lady Tigers enjoyed one of their finest seasons ever in 1976-77.

The Lady Tigers, behind the play of Gross and Jackson, started the season off slow, splitting its first four games. With a 2-2 mark, the Lady Tigers then ran off four straight wins, three of which came on the road against Alabama, Northwestern State, and Mississippi State to improve to 6-2. After a road loss to Memphis State, LSU made a run that saw the Lady Tigers win 13 of their next 14 games with the only setback coming at Louisiana Tech.

Southeastern Louisiana snapped LSU's 11-game winning streak with a 106-69 victory over the Lady Tigers in Hammond on Feb. 14. With the loss, LSU's record stood at 19-5 with two regular-season game remaining. LSU won both of those contests, beating Northeastern Louisiana and Southeastern Louisiana in Baton Rouge to end its regular-season with a 21-5 mark.

The Lady Tigers then headed to the AIAW State Tournament in Ruston. LSU easily handled New Orleans in the first round, winning 85-58, followed by a 73-51 victory over Southern. Louisiana Tech stopped LSU in the semifinals as the Techsters posted a 101-88 win over LSU. The Lady Tigers then fell to Northwestern State, 87-82, but the Lady Tigers still managed to finish in second place at the state tournament.

By virtue of its second place finish at the state tournament, LSU advanced to the AIAW Regional Tournament in Monroe.

"We went to the regional tournament with guarded optimism," LSU coach Jinks Coleman said. "I felt we didn't do enough work, but I still felt we had a chance. Until then, we were inconsistent, winning a big game and then losing a little one."

At the regional tournament, the Lady Tigers got on a roll as they whipped Texas, 95-67, in the first round followed by a 76-73 win over a Sue Gunter-coached Stephen F. Austin team in the semifinals. LSU beat Baylor, 92-76, in the championship game to advance to the AIAW National Tournament in Minneapolis, Minn.

At the AIAW National Tournament, the Lady Tigers drew Western Washington in the first round.

"We got a good draw playing Western Washington first," Coleman said. "I did some calling around and found out that they were weak, but they had been to nationals before. We were just so excited to be there, but I let

the team know that we had a chance at winning."

LSU had little trouble with Western Washington as the Lady Tigers, behind 40 points from Maree Jackson, raced out to 49-26 halftime lead and never looked back in their 91-53 win. Next up for the Lady Tigers was Baylor, a team that LSU had already beat twice during the season, which included a victory over the Bears in the regional finals.

LSU was once again victorious over Baylor as the Lady Tigers behind 35 points and 26 rebounds from Maree Jackson advanced with a 71-64 win.

The Lady Tigers then moved into the semifinal round against Immaculata, a powerhouse in women's basketball at the time. Immaculata was ranked No. 2 in the nation and was considered a huge favorite in the contest with the Lady Tigers.

"Immaculata was outstanding," Coleman said before the contest. "We had nothing to lose, On paper, I felt like we could be them, but that was on paper."

Coleman's hunch that LSU could win proved true as the Lady Tigers upset Immaculata, 74-68, despite the fact that Jackson played after having root canal surgery and Brenda McGuffie played with a severely sprained ankle. In addition, Jackson and McGuffie played the final 10 minutes of the contest with four fouls. Jackson finished with 29 points and 19 rebounds, while Gross had 23 points and 11 boards.

"Thelma McCoy and Julie (Gross) really picked up the slack for us," Coleman said.

It was on to the national championship game for LSU as the 11th-ranked Lady Tigers would face top-ranked Delta State for the title.

Delta State scored the first six points of the contest and the Delta Devils quickly built a nine point advantage, 13-4, on a jumper by Debbie Brock at the 15:14 mark. LSU could get no closer than seven points the rest of the way as Lady Tiger All-American Jackson picked up her third foul with 5:54 to play in the first half. Delta State led 34-25 at intermission.

In the second half, Delta State never let the Lady Tigers back in the contest as the Delta Devils held Jackson to a career-low six points in posting a 68-55 victory. Lucy Harris, the best women's player in the country at the time, led Delta State with 23 points and 16 rebounds.

The Lady Tigers finished the year with an overall record of 29-8 and ranked No. 11 in the nation. That team still holds the distinction of being the only Lady Tiger team ever to reach the national championship game of a post-season tournament.

The Lady Tigers advanced to the 32-team NCAA Tournament for the first time in the school's history as LSU was the No. 5 seed in the Midwest Regional. LSU played host to and beat fourth-seeded Missouri, 92-82, in the first round before falling to Louisiana Tech, 92-67, in Ruston in the second round.

# The D E A F Dome

Over the last six years, the LSU women's basketball team has established the Pete Marvich Assembly Center as one of the toughest road playing sites in not only the Southeastern Conference, but in the nation. Since the 1996-97 season, the Lady Tigers have posted a remarkable home record of 83-10 (.892), which is second only to Tennessee in the SEC.

In all, over the last six years, LSU has won six NCAA Tournament games and a pair of Women's NIT contests at the PMAC. Throw in the fact that LSU is 14-8 at home against top 25 teams over the last six years, and the PMAC can back up its claim as one of the nation's most-feared road sites. In addition to their success on the court, the Lady Tigers are also playing before record crowds. Last year, LSU averaged 1,361 fans at home games, with that total increasing to 2,033 for its SEC home games. Two years ago, LSU broke the school single-game attendance record with a crowd of 9,636 against Auburn, the largest attendance ever for a women's basketball game in the state of Louisiana. The top 10 crowds at the PMAC have all come since the 1996-97 season, and the Lady Tigers have played before 5,000 or more at home nine times over the last five years.

Although LSU had a 41-game home winning streak against non-ranked opponents snapped two seasons ago by Auburn, the Lady Tigers are still 73-3 over the last six years. LSU posted undefeated records at home over non-ranked opponents in 2001-02 (11-0), 1999-00 (17-0), 1998-99 (11-0) and 1996-97 (11-0).

In 1999-00, the Lady Tigers set a school-record with 17 home victories with their only loss coming at the hands of second-ranked Tennessee.

The 1996-97 season proved to be the starting point for LSU's success at home.

That year, the Lady Tigers posted a 14-1 home mark and knocked off such teams as eventual national champion Tennessee as well as fifth-ranked Alabama, and 13th-ranked Arkansas. In addition to the victories, LSU drew then a school-record crowd of 6,552 for the "Pack the PMAC" contest against Arkansas. After the Arkansas contest, LSU drew three more crowds that ranked in the top ten as 5,502 fans witnessed the LSU-Marquette NCAA second round contest, 5,260 for the LSU-Maine NCAA first round game, and 3,731 for the LSU-Tennessee game. Overall in 1996-97, LSU drew a school-record 31,259 fans for its 15 home games for a school record average of 2,084 a contest.

In 27 years at the PMAC, LSU's home court advantage can be compared with the best programs from across the country as the Lady Tigers have won 77 percent of their home games with a 274-84 overall mark. The Lady Tigers have recorded a 78-43 mark in SEC contests. LSU has also put together winning streaks of 26 and 24 games at home. The Lady Tigers have also gone undefeated twice, going 14-0 in both 1977-78 and 1985-86.

Built in 1971 and seating 14,164 spectators, the massive \$11.5 million building competes with its neighbor across the street -- Tiger Stadium -- as the most visible structure on the LSU campus.

During the summer of 1988, Louisiana Governor Buddy Roemer signed legislation changing the official name of the building to the Pete Marvich Assembly Center in honor of the LSU star who had died tragically earlier that same year.

In addition to the normal basketball-seating configuration, a proscenium stage can be lowered into place at the north end allowing some 4,500 seats for theatrical productions. An additional 1,000 seats can be placed on the floor for graduations, convocations, lectures, concerts or other special events.

Also located in the building is an auxiliary practice gym used for basketball and volleyball practices and various P.E. classes; home and visitor dressing rooms; coaches dressing rooms, building administration offices; theater dressing rooms; Tiger Athletic Foundation offices; and the "L" Club meeting room with kitchen facilities.

The Assembly Center has been the site for both men's and women's NCAA Regional Tournaments, the 1981 SEC Women's Basketball Tournament, the 1988 SEC Men's Basketball Tournament and two SEC Volleyball Tournaments.

What started out as a dream six years ago has developed into one of the biggest and the best promotional events in all of women's basketball, as Pack the PMAC returns for year number seven this season.

The concept of Pack the PMAC is simple - a blowout ticket giveaway throughout Baton Rouge and surrounding communities in an attempt to fill the Pete Maravich Assembly Center for a women's basketball game. After six years, Pack the PMAC has blossomed into a much-anticipated event and it will once again be the highlight of the LSU women's basketball schedule. This year's Pack the PMAC game is set for Saturday, Jan. 4 for a nationally televised match-up with Big 10 opponent Penn State.

Starting in the fall, LSU uses various outlets to promote both the game and the

"Flying Frenzy" halftime contest. To add more interest to the event, Jon Fos and Levis Mitsubishi annually donate a Montero Sport, valued at over \$25,000 to be given away at halftime if a fan can throw a paper airplane through the sunroof. At Pack the PMAC IV, Rich Bisson became the first person in the history of the event to win the vehicle. In addition to the car giveaway, there are also televisions, shopping sprees, and other items that can be won in the halftime "Flying Frenzy" contest.

In six years the event has become a tremendous success, but more important than the actual game is the fact that Baton Rouge has finally become introduced, and welcomed, to LSU women's basketball at its finest hour.

Since the first Pack the PMAC contest in 1997, LSU has had the school's 10 largest crowds, which includes eight crowds of

5,000 or better. Prior to 1997, the Lady Tigers had never played before a crowd larger than 2,500 at the Maravich Assembly Center. Six of LSU's top seven home crowds have come at Pack the PMAC.

In the first year, the Lady Tigers drew a school-record crowd of 6,552 as LSU beat Arkansas, 79-72. A year later, for Pack the PMAC II, LSU reset the school-record as 7,255 witnessed the Lady Tigers' 69-56 win over Mississippi.

In 1999-00, 6,352 fans witnessed the first nationally televised broadcast of an LSU women's basketball game as the Lady Tigers knocked off Arkansas, 68-51 on ESPN2. Pack the PMAC V drew a school-record 9,636 fans, the largest attendance ever at a women's basketball game in the state of Louisiana, and last year's PAC the PMAC VI collected 8,153 fans, the 10th largest crowd in state history.

# Honors





**Julie Gross** 1978

FORWARD, 6-2 • TATURA, AUSTRALIA

Julie Gross became LSU's first Kodak All-American when she earned the honor following her sophomore season in 1978 after averaging 20.7 points and 11.5 rebounds for the Lady Tigers. She was also named honorable mention All-America by the Basketball News in 1980 when she averaged 17.6 points and 9.5 rebounds.

Gross finished her career as the all-time leading rebounder in LSU history with 1,466 rebounds and second on the all-time scoring list with 2,488 points. Gross is also the second leading rebounder in SEC history.



**Joyce Walker** 1982, 1983

GUARD, 5-8 • SEATTLE, WASH.

Joyce Walker holds the distinction of being the only player in LSU history to be named to the prestigious Kodak All-America team two times.

Walker, considered by many to be one of the best players in SEC history, was a three-time selection to the Basketball News All-America team.

Walker, the second leading scorer in SEC history with 2,906 points (24.8 ppg) was selected to both the Kodak and Basketball News in 1983 after averaging 27.6 points a game.

In 1982, her first year as an All-American, Walker was named to the Basketball News All-America Team, while in 1984 she was named to the Kodak, Basketball News and JC Penney All-America teams.

Walker is the only player in LSU history to rank in the school's Top 10 in scoring, rebounding, assists, steals, and blocked shots.

At LSU, Walker is the all-time leading scorer, 10th in rebounding, third in assists, second in steals, and 10th in blocked shots.

In the summer of 1997, Walker was elected to the Louisiana Hall of Fame.





**Maree Jackson** 1978

CENTER, 6-2 • ALBURY, AUSTRALIA

Maree Jackson became LSU's first Basketball News All-American in 1978 when she was named to the team following her sophomore season. As a sophomore, Jackson scored 1,021 points (25.5 ppg) and grabbed 539 rebounds (13.5 rpg). The 1,021 points and 539 rebounds are the most in both SEC and LSU history for one season.

In just two seasons with the Lady Tigers, Jackson scored 1,852 points which places her third on the all-time scoring list. She also finished her career as the second leading rebounder in LSU history with 1,032 rebounds.

For her career, Jackson averaged 26.4 points a game, which still stands as the SEC record.



**Rene Moran** 1980

GUARD, 5-9 • PEARL RIVER, LA.

Rene Moran was a third team selection on the Basketball News All-America team in 1980. During that season, Moran led the Lady Tigers in scoring with a 21.6 average.

Moran, who transferred to LSU from Southeastern Louisiana, played only two seasons with LSU. A year after earning All-America honors, Moran injured her knee two weeks before the start of the 1980-81 season and never played again. She finished her career at LSU with 1,023 points and 304 rebounds.



## Dana "Pokey" Chatman 1991

GUARD, 5-5 • AMA, LA.

Pokey Chatman capped her career at LSU by earning Kodak, Basketball Weekly and United States Basketball Writer's Association All-America honors following her senior season in 1991.

During the 1991 season, Chatman scored 576 points (18.6 ppg) and dished out 157 assists (5.1 apg). Chatman is the fifth all-time leading scorer in school history with 1,826 points. She is also LSU's all time leader in both assists (570) and steals (346).

During her four years at LSU, Chatman started all but one game and set 20 school records. She also led the Lady Tigers to their first-ever SEC Tournament title in 1991. Chatman was named MVP of the 1991 SEC Tournament.



## Cornelia Gayden 1995

GUARD, 5-9 • BOGUE CHITTO, MISS.

Cornelia Gayden had perhaps one of the best all-around seasons in school history as a senior as she was named second team All-America by the Women's Basketball News Service and third team All-America by the Associated Press in 1995. Gayden, who averaged 25.8 points and 8.4 rebounds as a senior, was also a finalist for AP Player of the Year.

During her senior season, Gayden set an NCAA record by hitting 12 3-pointers against Jackson State. In that same game, Gayden scored a school-record 49 points and became the NCAA's all-time leader in 3-point goals.

Gayden capped her career with NCAA records in 3-point goals (337) and 3-point goals attempted (875). Gayden is the third leading scorer in LSU history with 2,451 points and the eighth leading scorer in SEC history. Gayden was a three-time All-SEC selection.



## Latasha Dorsey

1999

GUARD, 5-7 • ABBEVILLE, LA.

Latasha Dorsey had an outstanding senior season for the Lady Tigers as she led LSU to the Sweet 16 at the NCAA Tournament and was named a first team Defensive All-American by the Women's Basketball Journal.

As a senior, Dorsey ranked third in the SEC with 2.5 steals a contest. She also averaged 12.9 points and 4.2 assists a contest.

Dorsey completed her LSU career with more post-season appearances (12) than any player, male or female, in school history. In addition, Dorsey won 29 SEC games in her LSU career, also a school record. Dorsey finished her career with 1,054 points which ranks 14th in school history, while she ranks third all-time in steals and fifth in assists.



## Marie Ferdinand

2001

GUARD, 5-9 • MIAMI, FLA.

One of the most explosive guards to ever play at LSU, Miami native Marie Ferdinand earned 2001 Kodak and Women's Basketball Journal All-America honors and was a unanimous coaches poll first-team All-SEC selection. The Louisiana Player of the year, she was also a finalist for the Naismith Award and the ESPN the Magazine Shooting Guard of the Year Award.

For her career, Ferdinand averaged 13.7 points and 4.1 rebounds a game. In 2000, she led the Lady Tigers to the Elite Eight, averaging team-highs in points, assists and steals. She was named to the 2000 NCAA East Regional all-tournament team.

Ferdinand also made an impact in international play in the summer of 2000, helping lead the U.S. Women's Select Team to a gold medal at the Jones Cup Tournament in Taipei, Taiwan.

She was a first round pick of the Utah Starzz of the WNBA and finished third in Rookie of the Year voting in 2001.

In her senior year, the point guard blocked 10 shots and was ranked seventh in the SEC in assist-to-turnover ratio. She also averaged 3.0 points and 2.4 rebounds a game.

In her four years at LSU, Crockett helped lead the Lady Tigers to four national tournaments, including three straight NCAA Tournament appearances, runs through to the Elite Eight and Sweet 16 and a WNIT appearance.

## Dr. William L. Jenkins

President, Louisiana System

**O**n April 1, 1999, William L. Jenkins, formerly Chancellor of Louisiana State University and Agricultural and Mechanical College, became President of the LSU System, which includes nine institutions on 10 campuses in five cities, as well as 10 public hospitals in 10 cities.

A native of South Africa, Dr. Jenkins studied at the University of Pretoria where he received his professional veterinary medicine degree in 1958 and specialist credentials in 1968. He received the Ph.D. from the University of Missouri Columbia, in 1970. After practicing veterinary medicine for four years, he joined the faculty at the University of Pretoria, advancing through the ranks to become professor and head of the Department of Veterinary Physiology, Pharmacology and Toxicology in 1971.

He moved to the U.S. in 1978 and joined the faculty in the Department of Veterinary Physiology and Pharmacology at Texas A&M University. He was appointed dean of the LSU School of Veterinary Medicine in 1988 and was named LSU's provost and vice chancellor for academic affairs in September 1993.

When he was appointed LSU's fifth Chancellor in November 1996, Dr. Jenkins reorganized the campus administration to be more effective and more responsive, and oversaw the development of a strategic plan to guide the University in its preparation for the challenges of the next century.

Over the years President Jenkins has received numerous teaching and service awards and recognitions, having been named the 1997 Communicator of the Year by the Public Relations Association of Louisiana and a Distinguished Alumnus by the University of Missouri. The regional chapter of Toastmasters International also presented him with its 1999 Communication and Leadership Award, and he was awarded the Vision of Excellence Award 2000 by the New Orleans Regional Chamber of Commerce and the New Orleans

Chapter of MetroVision. In addition, the University of Pretoria bestowed an honorary doctorate on Dr. Jenkins in September of 2000.

Dr. Jenkins has been active in continuing education and has delivered more than 150 lectures and addresses to diverse groups in both the United States and abroad. He has taught extensively at both the professional and graduate levels. He has published more than 60 scientific articles and has contributed 15 chapters to various textbooks. He is coauthor of a textbook on veterinary pharmacology.

Over the years, Dr. Jenkins has been a member of many professional organizations and select committees. Most recently, he served on the National Institute of Health's Alcohol Abuse and Misuse on College Campuses Committee and on a special Steering Committee of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools to review accreditation criteria for colleges and universities.

Dr. Jenkins also is a member of the National Association of State Universities and Land Grant Colleges' Committee on Food and Society as well as the Committee on the Future of Coastal Louisiana.

His current community engagement includes serving on the boards of the Louisiana Endowment for the Humanities, Greater Baton Rouge Chamber of Commerce, Academic Distinction Fund, Council for a Better Louisiana, Arts Council of Greater Baton Rouge, and the Baton Rouge board of the National Conference for Community and Justice.

Dr. Jenkins and his wife, Peggy, have four children—Sharon Gwynn, Anthea, and Warren—and nine grandchildren.

Representative

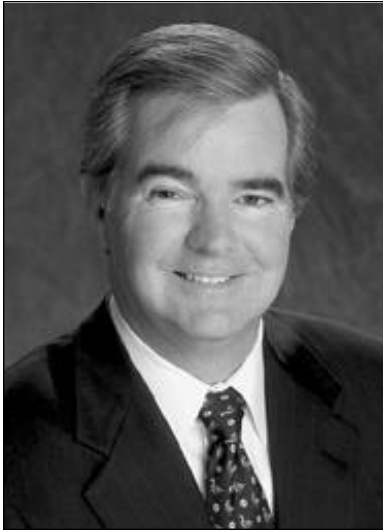
Dr. Kenneth E. Carpenter is in his first year as LSU's faculty representative in NCAA and Southeastern Conference matters.

**D**r. Mark A. Emmert was appointed chancellor of Louisiana State University and Agricultural & Mechanical College on April 16, 1999, becoming the sixth chancellor to lead the state's flagship University.

Prior to joining LSU, Emmert served as chancellor of the University of Connecticut, as provost and vice president for academic affairs at Montana State University, and held various faculty and administrative positions at the University of Colorado. He has served as a member of numerous academic and civic boards and organizations.

Both the Fulbright Commission and the American Council on Education have awarded fellowships to Emmert. He has also been inducted into Phi Kappa Phi Honor Society, Alpha Lambda Delta Scholastic Society, Golden Key Honor Society, and the Connecticut Academy of Arts and Sciences. He is active in the American Council on Education, the New England Council of Presidents, and the National Association of State Universities and Land-Grant Colleges, where he served as chair of the Council on Academic Affairs.

A native of Tacoma, Washington, Emmert holds a bachelor's degree in political science from the University of Washington and master's and doctoral degrees from the Maxwell School of Syracuse University. His scholarly work has focused on public policy topics,

as well as issues in organizational theory. He has published his research in leading journals within his field and has served on several editorial boards. He has also served as a visiting scholar and lecturer internationally, working in Australia, Hong Kong, Japan, and Panama.

He is married to DeLaine S. Emmert, a former elementary school teacher, who is active in community, university, and philanthropic organizations. They have two children, Stephen and Jennifer.

Already a Louisiana Legend and one of the greatest college baseball coaches of all time, J. Stanley "Skip" Bertman augmented his impressive list of achievements in his first season as LSU's director of athletics. While supervising the Tigers' magnificent progress on the playing fields, he began to implement measures necessary to realize his vision of building the LSU athletics department into the best in the country. Bertman's bold and innovative plans promise to keep the Tigers among the nation's elite in all phases of collegiate athletics.

LSU's programs enjoyed remarkable success under Bertman's direction in 2001-02, as 18 of the Tigers' 20 sports participated in post-season competition. Bertman was named LSU's athletics director on January 19, 2001. With Bertman, LSU gained an athletics director who provides the leadership and experience necessary to manage the Tigers' nearly \$35 million budget.

Bertman guided LSU to five NCAA baseball titles, and his teams drew huge crowds to venerable Alex Box Stadium, as the Tigers led the nation in attendance in each of his final six seasons (1996-2001).

He also served as head coach of the 1996 U.S. Olympic team which captured the bronze medal in Atlanta.

Bertman continues to be honored for his remarkable coaching tenure, as he was inducted in June, 2002, into the Louisiana Sports Hall of Fame. He is scheduled to be inducted into the American Baseball Coaches Association Hall of Fame in January, 2003.

In a Baseball America poll released in January, 1999, Bertman was voted the second greatest college baseball coach of the 20th century, trailing only Rod Dedeaux of Southern California. Bertman and Dedeaux are the only coaches to win five CWS titles.

He had previously earned stellar recognition as one of the nation's brightest assistant coaches while at the University of Miami (Fla.) for eight seasons (1976-83). Before working at Miami, Bertman was renowned for his coaching excellence. In 11 seasons at Miami Beach High School, he directed the Hi-Tides to a state championship and two runners-up finishes. He was named Florida's Coach of the Year on three occasions.

In 1975, Bertman coached at Miami-Dade Downtown, leaving after one season to join legendary head coach Ron Fraser at Miami. The move was a homecoming of sorts, as Bertman spent his collegiate playing days with the Hurricanes as an outfielder and catcher from 1958-60. He earned his B.A. in health and physical education from Miami in 1961 and received his master's degree from UM in 1964.

Bertman and his wife Sandy are the parents of four daughters -- Jan, Jodi, Lisa and Lori. The Bertmans have two grandchildren -- Sophie Faith and Isaac Stanley, the children of Emile and Lori Bertman Guirard.





## Dan Radakovich

Senior Associate Athletics Director

Dan Radakovich enters his second year as LSU's senior associate athletics director after joining the University in May of 2001. He came to LSU after serving as director of athletics at American University in Washington D.C.

As LSU's senior associate athletic director, Radakovich will oversee the daily operations of the LSU Athletic Department and he will serve as Bertman's chief assistant.

Prior to his one-year stint at American University, Radakovich spent six years as the associate athletics director at South Carolina where he directed the financial operations for the Gamecocks' \$30 million athletic department budget. Radakovich also worked closely with South Carolina Athletics Director Mike McGee in laying the ground work for a new \$70 million arena being built in Columbia. He also served as the department liaison for marketing and promotional activities with Host Communications. Radakovich was also responsible for home event management as well as that of overseeing concessions, football travel and the video department.

During his tenure with South Carolina, Radakovich supervised the finances and logistics for \$33 million in facility improvements.

Radakovich served as the senior associate athletics director at Long Beach State from 1989-94. In that capacity, he managed a \$5 million budget and supervised the nationally recognized men's basketball and baseball programs. In addition, Radakovich reorganized the fund-raising operations and coordinated the production and sales of radio broadcasting packages.

Radakovich began his collegiate athletics career as the athletics business manager at the University of Miami in Coral Gables, Fla., from 1983-85. He worked in the private sector for five years before joining Long Beach State.

Radakovich, a native of Aliquippa, Pa., graduated from Indiana University of Pennsylvania in 1980 with a bachelor of science degree in finance. Radakovich was also a football letterwinner as well as a student coach at Indiana University of Pennsylvania. He then went on to earn his master's degree in business administration from the University of Miami in 1982.

Radakovich is married to the former Marcie McDonald and the couple has two children, Christian (12) and Grant (8).



## Judy Southard

Associate Athletics Director/  
Senior Women's Administrator

Judy Southard, who had a very successful career as both a head women's basketball coach and director of athletics, enters her second year as LSU's senior women's administrator after joining the department last summer.

Southard came to LSU from Texas Woman's University, where she served as the school's director of athletics for nine years.

As LSU's senior women's administrator, Southard will serve as the administrative liaison to the Tigers' nationally-recognized Olympic sports teams.

While at Texas Woman's University, Southard initiated a corporate partnership program for the athletic department that tripled the involvement of area businesses and corporations in Pioneer athletics. Southard also established the TWU Intercollegiate Athletics Hall of Fame and she played a key role in the addition of softball and soccer to TWU's list of intercollegiate sports. In 2000, Southard served as chair of the NCAA Division II Women's Basketball Committee.

Prior to her nine-year stint at Texas Woman's University, Southard served as head women's basketball coach at Marshall University in Huntington, W. Va., for 11 years, where she led the Lady Herd to five Southern Conference regular-season titles. During her 11 years at Marshall, Southard was named Southern Conference Coach of the Year three times and her career record of 178-130 still stands as a school record for women's basketball victories. Southard also served as assistant athletics director at Marshall from 1983-1988, including a four-month period when she was interim director.

Prior to her tenure at Marshall, Southard spent three years as head coach at Tennessee-Martin and she also served for one season as an assistant coach at Tennessee. As a high school teacher from 1970-77, Southard coached both basketball and tennis, leading her West Florence High School basketball team to the South Carolina 4A state title in 1976.

A native of Columbia, S.C., Southard earned a bachelor's degree in physical education and health from Coker College in 1970 followed by a master's degree in physical education from Tennessee in 1978.



## Verge Ausberry

Associate Athletics Director/  
Internal Operations

Former LSU football standout Verge Ausberry joined the LSU Athletic Department administrative staff in August 2001 to head up Athletic Department Operations.

In his position he will be in charge of such areas as Game Management, the Athletic Department's courtesy car program, the weight room, the Dr. Martin Broussard training room and equipment rooms and video operations for the various sports on the campus.

Ausberry, from New Iberia, La., played inside linebacker for the Tigers, lettering in 1986-89. He was the leading tackler on the team in both 1988 and 1989. He was part of two Southeastern Conference championship teams (1986 under Bill Arnsparger and 1988 under Mike Archer) and played on teams that went to three bowl games: the 1987

Sugar Bowl, the 1987 Gator Bowl and the 1989 Hall of Fame Bowl. In those three years, the Tigers had a combined overall record of 27-8-1 and 16-3 in SEC games.

Although this is Ausberry's first tour of duty with the administration of the Athletic Department, he has remained very close to the LSU athletic scene in the 1990s, first serving for almost seven years as a member of LSU's highly regarded Academic Center for Athletes where he worked with many of the student-athletes, primarily dealing with LSU's football squad.

After leaving the Academic Center, he moved in July 1999 to the Tiger Athletic Foundation staff as part of LSU's fund-raising arm prior to accepting his present position.

The 35-year-old Ausberry received his Bachelor of Science degree in education in May of 1990 and his Master of Education in Administration, Supervision and certification in Child Welfare in May of 1992. He is presently a Doctoral Candidate in Higher Education Administration at LSU. He is married to the former Cheri Morial of New Orleans.



## Bo Bahnsen

Associate Athletics Director/  
Student Services

Bo Bahnsen serves as LSU's associate athletics director for student services and is the compliance officer for the Athletic Department.

David E. "Bo" Bahnsen was promoted to associate athletics director in 1996 after serving as an assistant A.D. since 1989. He served in various capacities within the department since his graduation from LSU in 1982.

On November 1, 1989, Bahnsen was assigned his primary responsibility as NCAA compliance officer. He also manages LSU's drug testing and drug education program.

After serving as manager of the LSU basketball team as an undergraduate, Bahnsen became administrative assistant for the basketball team upon graduation in May of 1982. Jerry Blanchard, in his position as assistant athletics director for facilities, supervises LSU's impressive athletic physical plant consisting of the playing and practice facilities for all sports.

Jerry Blanchard was appointed to the position of assistant athletics director in charge of facilities at LSU on August 15, 1997.

One of Blanchard's primary projects has been the expansion of Tiger Stadium with the addition of skyboxes and seating on the east side of the structure that increased the capacity of the stadium to over 91,600. The 2001-02 athletic year proved to be another outstanding one for LSU as the Tigers claimed their 37th and 38th national titles (women's indoor track and field and men's outdoor track and field) as well as their 101st and 102nd Southeastern Conference titles (football and softball).

In all, 18 of LSU's 20 sports competed in postseason action, with 17 of those teams being invited to the NCAA Tournament (or bowl game). The men's basketball team reached the second round

of the NIT for LSU's 18th postseason appearance in 2001-02.

LSU's two national titles led all SEC teams in that category for the 2001-02 season, while the Tigers' 17 NCAA (or Bowl) appearances was the third best total in the conference, trailing only Florida and Georgia.

The following is a look at some of the top individual performances by LSU athletes last year:

## Walter Davis

### MEN'S TRACK & FIELD

Walter Davis has perhaps one of the most dominating seasons for any athlete in school history. Davis was named the NCAA Division Track and Field Athlete of the Year after winning the NCAA outdoor title in the long jump, triple jump and anchoring a leg of



LSU's winning 4x100-meter relay team in leading the Tigers to the national title. He capped his illustrious career as a nine-time All-American and a six-time national champion. With his first national championship in the long jump, he recorded a mark of 26 feet 6 1/4 inches. He became the first LSU man to win the event since Llewellyn Starks in 1990. The 2000 Olympian closed out his collegiate career by shattering his own LSU record in the triple jump, winning with a mark of 56-10 3/4. He closed his collegiate career a perfect 17-0 in the event. In the process, he became only the sixth man in NCAA history to sweep the horizontal jumps and the first to do so since 1998. Davis bettered his school and SEC records by winning the triple jump at the 2002 USA Track & Field Championships (57-8 1/2).

## Nicki Arnstad

### GYMNASTICS

Nick Arnstad won a share of the NCAA title in the floor exercise with a score of 9.95. Arnstad, a First-Team All-America selection, became the first LSU gymnast in modern-day history to win an individual NCAA title. Arnstad captured the floor title as well as the all-around title a week earlier at the NCAA Central Regional. Arnstad posted a perfect 10.0 score on the floor exercise, leading the Tigers to their first NCAA Regional team title in 16 years.

## Britni Sneed

### SOFTBALL

The most dominating softball player in LSU history, Britni Sneed capped her Tiger career as the winningest pitcher in SEC history with 120 wins. Sneed, who was a First-Team All-America selection, also holds the SEC mark for career shutouts (55). Sneed earned SEC Pitcher of the Year honors for the second-straight year after posting a 34-7 overall mark and leading the Tigers to league title. She capped her four-year career with LSU ranked fourth in NCAA history in strikeouts with 1,370 and she ranks among the top 10 in NCAA history for career victories and strikeout ratio and in the top 15 in NCAA history for appearances, games started, winning percentage and saves. Sneed, who threw six no-hitters in 2002, was one of 10 semifinalists for USA Softball Collegiate Player of the Year Award and was named to the 2002 USA Softball Elite team.



## Muna Lee

### WOMEN'S TRACK AND FIELD

Named the SEC Female Track and Field Athlete of the Year in 2002 leading the Lady Tigers to the NCAA Indoor title. Lee won the NCAA title in the 200-meter dash in an LSU record time of 22.82 seconds, the second fastest time in NCAA history. In addition, Lee finished third in the 60-meter dash and helped the Lady Tigers to a third place finish in the 4x400-

meter relay. At the NCAA Outdoor meet, Lee finished third in the 100-meter dash, fourth in the 200-meter dash and anchored the final leg of LSU's 4x100 meter relay team that finished second.

## Josh Reed

### FOOTBALL

Josh Reed capped his LSU career as the SEC's all-time leader in receiving yards with 3,001. Reed, who won the Biletnikoff Award in 2001, shattered the league's single-season receiving mark with 1,740 yards on 94 catches last year for the Tigers. Reed also set SEC single-game records with 19 receptions for 293 yards and a pair of touchdowns in LSU's 35-21 win over Alabama. For his efforts, Reed was a consensus All-America selection in 2001 and was drafted in the second round of the 2002 NFL Draft by the Buffalo Bills.



## Meredith Duncan

### WOMEN'S GOLF

Meredith Duncan gained fame in the summer of 2001 as she became the first women's golfer in LSU history to win the prestigious U.S. Amateur title. Duncan, who participated in the U.S. Women's Open in 2001, earned First-Team All-America honors last year for the Lady Tigers. Duncan, a First-Team All-SEC selection in 2002, won three individual titles as a senior and she finished 19th at the NCAA Championships.

## All-Sports Success

LSU's athletics program has traditionally been strong throughout all of its varsity sports and has fielded nationally competitive teams in most of its sports.

A total of 18 of LSU's 20 athletic teams participated in post-season play last year, with 17 of those teams being invited to NCAA Tournament action (or a bowl game). The 18th team, the men's basketball squad, advanced to the second round of the National Invitation Tournament. Twelve of LSU's 20 teams finished ranked in the nation's Top 25 for their respective sports during the 2001-02 athletic year, and of those, seven finished in the Top 10.

LSU has won 102 Southeastern Conference championships and has claimed 38 national titles.

## Athletics as a Business

Athletics is mistakenly thought of as merely entertainment. In fact, the total revenues of over \$37.5 million generated annually by the Athletic Department is:

- twice that of the sales of an average manufacturing plant in Louisiana
- twice the volume of an average food processor
- and about seven times more than the typical apparel plant in the state

## Attendance

LSU teams draw some of the largest crowds in all of college athletics:

- More than 1.1 million fans watched LSU athletics in all 20 sports during the 2000-01 athletic year.
- Over the past 10 years, LSU football attendance has averaged more than 70,000 fans per game. Last season, LSU set a school-record by averaging 90,491 fans a contest, a number that ranked fifth nationally. LSU's average of 90,491 fans a contest makes Tiger Stadium, on a Saturday night, more populated than 52 of Louisiana's 64 parishes.
- LSU baseball set the standard in college baseball for attendance again in 2002 as more than 275,000 fans watched the Tigers play at Alex Box Stadium in regular and postseason play.

## CHAMPS Program

LSU sponsors a fully funded life skills program for student-athletes. The program is called CHAMPS, an acronym for Challenging Athletes Minds for Personal Success. Under the CHAMPS program, LSU sets up a number of projects and workshops that aid student-athletes in addressing day-to-day living situations, handling stress

and preparing for post-college life.

Under the CHAMPS program, LSU also establishes community service projects in which student-athletes organize and participate. The LSU CHAMPS program sponsors an annual Halloween "Boo-Zar" on campus. The boozar is a trick-or-treat night in the LSU Field House in which athletes from all sports distribute candy to Baton Rouge area children. Each athletic team participates in CHAMPS workshops which educate them in life skills and personal development.

## Community Involvement

Because of the athletic facilities on the LSU campus, Baton Rouge is able to attract many events and conventions that benefit the community in both public relations and monetary means. LSU has played host to such events as the National Sports Festival (now called the Olympic Festival) and the International Special Olympics. In 2001, LSU hosted the U.S. Senior Olympics and in the past has played host to the U.S. Junior National Track & Field Championships.

The LSU campus is annually the site of LHSAA Track & Field Championships, bringing to campus thousands of young people and their parents. Most recently, LSU hosted the 2002 NCAA Outdoor Track & Field Championships at Bernie Moore Stadium.

## Economic Impact

LSU has a tremendous impact on the economy of the Baton Rouge area. LSU sporting events bring money into the Baton Rouge economy, not only from throughout the state, but throughout the southeast.

According to a study by LSU economics professor Loren Scott, the existence of LSU Athletics generates \$131 million in sales for businesses in the Baton Rouge community,

another \$40 million in household earnings and supports over 2,100 jobs in the Baton Rouge area.

## Finances

The LSU Athletic Department is a totally self-sufficient auxiliary of the University. No state tax dollars are used to finance LSU athletics. All money spent by the Athletic Department is generated by the department through ticket sales, corporate sponsorships, radio and television revenue, the Tiger Gift Center and concessions, and is supplemented through revenue-sharing resulting from LSU's membership in the Southeastern Conference.

## Individual Athletes

Year in and year out, LSU boasts some of the most renowned athletes in all of college athletics.

Two-time NBA Most Valuable Player and worldwide entertainment superstar Shaquille O'Neal delighted Tiger basketball fans for three seasons. PGA Champion David Toms played for the Tigers in the late 1980's, while Major League Baseball standouts Todd Walker and Paul Byrd learned their trade at Alex Box Stadium. Sometimes overlooked are some of the finest female athletes in the country in their respective sports: golfer Meredith Duncan, softball All-American Britni Sneed and women's basketball All-American Marie Ferdinand dazzled LSU fans in recent years.

## Job Placement

Is there life after college athletics? LSU is helping to answer that question with a job placement program as part of the Ninth Semester Program. LSU works closely with the Career Placement Center on campus as well as professional recruiting services to offer advice to athletes on entering the job market upon graduation.

## National Awards

LSU has had one winner each of the Heisman Trophy, Adolph Rupp Award and Golden Spikes Award, the premier individual awards in football, basketball and baseball. The Heisman Trophy, given annually to college football's best player, was won by Billy Cannon in 1959. The Adolph Rupp Award, which goes to college basketball's top player, was won by Shaquille O'Neal in 1991. The Golden Spikes Award, given to college baseball's most outstanding player each year, was won by Ben McDonald in 1989. Last year, Josh Reed added his name to the list as he claimed the Biletnikoff Award, which goes annually to the nation's top receiver.

## Stadiavision

At all LSU football games in Tiger Stadium, basketball games at the Pete Maravich Assembly Center and baseball games at Alex Box Stadium, live action is shown on monitors near concession stands and restrooms so fans won't miss the action in progress.

## Tiger Gift Center

LSU operates a fully stocked merchandise store within Tiger Stadium that gives fans a wide array of LSU clothing and memorabilia. The Gift Center is open on football, basketball and baseball game days for fans' convenience. A new satellite Gift Center near Mike the Tiger's cage is open for added customer convenience. The Tiger Gift Center also went worldwide during the 2000-01 season as LSU merchandise can now be purchased from anywhere in the world on LSU's website, [www.LSUsports.net](http://www.LSUsports.net).

## University Involvement

LSU continues to produce profits in its athletic department, despite generally difficult economic times for college athletic programs.

Athletics has contributed over \$7.5 million to the academic side of the University in the past 11 years. In 1994-95, athletics contributed \$100,000 to the LSU Libraries to assist in buying books and other materials necessary to keep LSU's library system among the finest in the nation, and in 1996 generated over \$30,000 by dedicating all ticket sales from the Spring Football Game to the libraries.

After the 1988-89 fiscal year, LSU Athletics donated \$2 million to the general fund of the University to help offset projected losses. LSU Athletics has also donated sizeable amounts of money to fund professorships and provide for repairs in academic facilities.



With six national championships, eight runner-up finishes, a nation-leading 24 Final Four appearances and 52 first-team All-America honors, the Southeastern Conference stands firmly as the nation's premier intercollegiate women's basketball conference.

#### SEC BY THE NUMBERS

- > The SEC has posted impressive non-conference records in the last decade. The SEC compiled a 137-43 (.761) non-conference record during the 2001-02 season. Since the 1990 season, the SEC has compiled a 1,759-461 (.792) record against other conferences. The league has recorded 150+ wins during seven seasons and had never recorded a non-conference winning percentage below .746.
- > SEC teams have earned appearances in 19 of 21 NCAA Final Fours, an accomplishment unmatched by any other league. Overall, SEC squads have filled 24 of the 84 Final Four berths, including having two Final Four teams in 1988 (Auburn, Tennessee), 1989 (Auburn, Tennessee), 1995 (Georgia, Tennessee), 1996 (Georgia, Tennessee), and 1998 (Arkansas, Tennessee).
- > SEC teams have made 14 appearances in a nation-high 12 NCAA Championship games, winning six national championships (Tennessee: 1987, 1989, 1991, 1996, 1997 and 1998). The league had the distinction of providing both national finalists twice in its history: in 1996 (Tennessee 83, Georgia 65) and in 1989 (Tennessee 76, Auburn 60).
- > SEC teams have won 230 NCAA Tournament games against 122 losses (.653) for an average of 10.9 NCAA wins per year. In addition, all 12 current members have appeared in the NCAA Tournament.
- > The SEC has paced the pack in NCAA tournament bids 20 times in its 21-year history. The SEC is the only league to ever have eight teams invited to the NCAA Tournament. The 2002 season was the second time the league has accomplished this feat, the first being 1999.
- > The SEC is the only league to ever have seven teams invited to the NCAA Tournament and earned this honor five times (1986, 1991, 1995, 1996, 1997).
- > Since the WNIT came into existence four years ago, the SEC has had at least one team represent them. This past year, Alabama made it to the third round. Last season, Alabama, Ole Miss and Mississippi State participated in the postseason tournament. State made it to the semifinals for the best finish of a SEC school. In 2000, Florida made it to the finals of the WNIT. It marked the second consecutive year that a SEC school played in the finals. In 1999, the Arkansas Lady Razorbacks defeated Wisconsin 76-64 to claim the SEC's first Women's NIT championship. The attendance of 14,161 set an Arkansas state record for a women's sporting event.

#### INDIVIDUAL HONORS

- > The SEC has had 52 student-athletes named as a First-Team All-America selection.
- > The league has had three Honda-Broderick Cup Award winners (1988-Katrina McClain, Georgia; 1990-Bridgette Gordon, Tennessee; 1998-Chamique Holdscaw, Tennessee).
- > Four Naismith Player of the Year winners have come from the SEC. In 1996 Georgia's Saudia Roundtree was given the honor while Chamique Holdscaw of Tennessee won the honor in 1998 and 1999 and Tennessee's Tamika Catchings was named in 2000.
- > SEC teams have provided 97 All-Region performers, including 20 Most Outstanding Players.
- > Over the past 21-years, 28 Final Four All-Tournament Team members have come from SEC schools. In 1996, the entire all-tournament team was made up of SEC players.
- > Six NCAA Post-Graduate Scholarship winners and 12 Academic All-Americas hail from the SEC.

#### DOMINANCE IN THE POLLS

- > Since the AP poll began in 1983 and the USA Today/ESPN poll in 1986, the SEC has never failed to place at least four members in each of the final polls.
- > In terms of rankings, the SEC has the richest history of any conference in the nation, boasting more poll appearances than any other. SEC teams have been ranked 328 consecutive weeks in the AP Poll.
- > League teams have been ranked 2,118 times, including 1,166 Top 10 appearances and 589 Top 5 appearances.
- > A nation-leading eight SEC teams were ranked at one point in the AP and CNN/USA Today Top 25 polls during the 1995-96 season. The league mirrored that feat during the 1996-97 season.
- > Six SEC teams are ranked in the Top 25 of the AP all-time composite final poll. Tennessee is ranked first in the poll and is tied for the lead in number of final first place finishes with five. Other SEC schools are: 5. Georgia, 12. Auburn, 20. Ole Miss, 23. LSU, T24. Vanderbilt.

#### MIKE SLIVE, SEC COMMISSIONER

From his early days as an athletic administrator to his current post as commissioner, Mike Slive has maintained an integral role in the ever-changing world of intercollegiate athletics. He was named the seventh commissioner of the Southeastern Conference on July 2, 2002.



Prior to joining the SEC, Slive was the Commissioner of Conference USA. He was named the first-ever Commissioner of the newly-formed league on April 24, 1995. Under his direction, Conference USA has quickly emerged as one of the nation's top conferences.

Presently, Slive is the chair of the first NCAA Infractions Appeals Committee and the National Letter of Intent Appeals Committee. He is also chair of the Board of Directors of NCAA Football USA and is the President of the Collegiate Commissioners Association (CCA). Last month, he was named to the Executive Committee of the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA) and also serves on the Board of Advisors of the Marquette Sports Law Institute. Slive was also on the NCAA Management Council from 1997-2002, serving on the Membership Subcommittee and the Subcommittee to Review Automatic Qualification.

The 61-year old Slive has also served on the Board of Directors of the Sports Lawyers Association from 1997-2001 and was chair of the Division I-A Commissioners from 1999-2001. He also was a member of the NCAA Division I Working Group to Study Basketball Issues in 1998-99.

This summer, Slive was named by President Bush to the Commission of Athletic Opportunity, that will review the workings of Title IX. He is one of 15 panelists that consists of former and current athletes, athletic and academic administrators and college professors from around the nation.

Slive has an extensive administrative and legal background in intercollegiate athletics. He served as commissioner of the Great Midwest Conference since its formation in 1991, and played a pivotal role in the Great Midwest becoming one of the most successful and exciting conferences in the nation in the 1990's. His previous athletic administrative experiences include: assistant director of athletics at Dartmouth College (1968-69), assistant Executive Director of the Pacific-10 Conference (1979-81), and Director of Athletics at Cornell University (1981-83), prior to developing his sports practice specializing in representing colleges and universities in athletic related matters.

A native of Utica, N.Y., Slive was senior partner and founder of the Mike Slive-Mike Glazier Sports Group. Prior to the formation of the Slive-Glazier Sports Group in 1990, Slive was a partner in the Chicago law firm of Coffield Ungaretti Harris & Slavin. He operated his own practice in Hanover, N.H., and served as judge of the Hanover District Court from 1972-77.

Slive graduated from Dartmouth College with a Bachelor of Arts degree in 1962. He earned a Juris Doctor from the University of Virginia Law School in 1965 and an LLM from the Georgetown University Law Center in 1966. Slive and his wife, Elizabeth, are the parents of a daughter, Anna.

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## 2003 Southeastern Conference Women's Basketball Tournament

The 2002 tournament proved to be the another success for the league. The 11,264 that attended the semifinal games was the second all-time largest crowd for any session while the Session 1 record was broken with 3,470 attending.

The total tournament attendance of 41,888 was the second largest in history.

The tournament was held in Memphis, Tenn. in 2001. Previous to that, the tournament was held in Chattanooga, Tenn. The 1999 tournament proved to be the most successful when several attendance records were shattered. The single session record was demolished when 11,788 fans watched the semifinal game in session five. The previous record was 9,872, set in 1996.

Chattanooga also hosted the event for five years from 1993-97. During that time, the SEC tournament experienced a growth in fan support, highlighted in 1997 as records were broken in overall (36,391), single-session (9,872 - Session 3) and championship game (7,121) attendance.

The tournament moved to Columbus, Ga. in 1998 where the championship game record was broken when 7,603 fans watched Tennessee squeak by Alabama 67-63.

Albany, Ga., served as the site of the tournament for six years from 1987-92. Prior to 1987 the tournament was held at campus sites, beginning with its inception in 1980.

The winner of the 11-game tournament will receive the league's automatic bid to the NCAA Tournament. The tournament seeds and conference champion will be determined by the 12-game regular-season SEC schedule. The top four seeds earn a first-round bye.

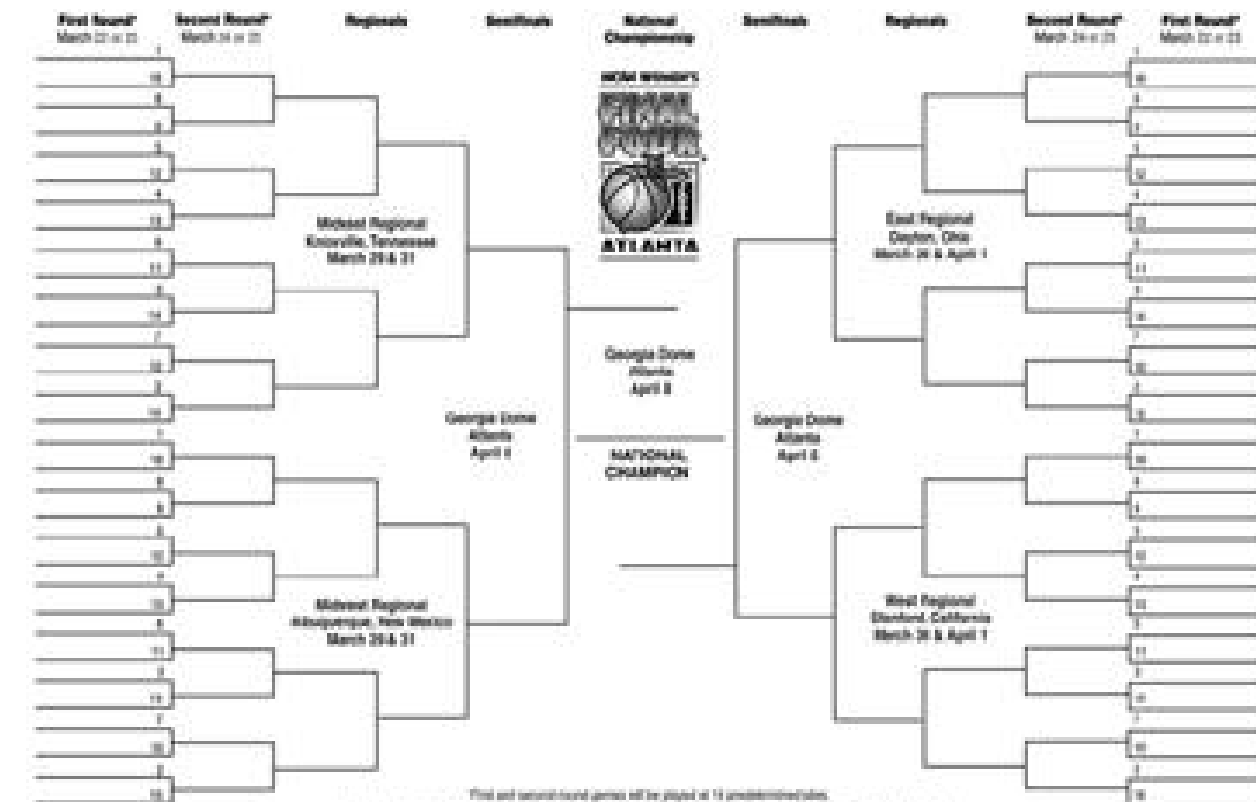
