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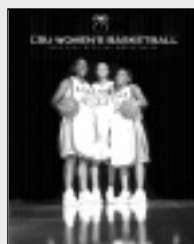

DEFENDING the Crown

Youthful. That is the one word that can best describe the 2003-04 LSU Lady Tigers. With only two seniors on the squad, head coach **Sue Gunter** and the Lady Tigers will rely on young talented players in their attempt to defend the Southeastern Conference Tournament title and look for another trip to the NCAA Tournament.

LSU does return three starters from a year ago, including seniors **Temeka Johnson** and **Doneeka Hodges** and sophomore **Seimone Augustus**, but after that trio, the Lady Tigers do not have much more experience. LSU has three juniors, two of which will only be in their second seasons in the purple and gold, four sophomores

and four freshmen.

Gunter, who begins her 22nd season at LSU, and her staff face a tough challenge this season. LSU won 30 games in 2002-03, finished second in the SEC and were the number one seed in the NCAA Tournament so they will not be able to sneak up on anybody this season.

"Overall, coming off a year that we had expectations are still going to be high," Gunter said. "It does not bother me that much. It is just part of coaching. It will take a little time for this team to find their peak and to understand the players roles and figure out what we expect from them."

2003-04 Outlook

Seimone Augustus was named preseason First-Team All-American by numerous national publications for the 2003-2004 season.

The Seniors

The Lady Tigers start with the two seniors, **Hodges** and **Johnson**, both returning starters, who look to lead the Lady Tigers in 2003-04. Both would love to end their careers in their home town of New Orleans.

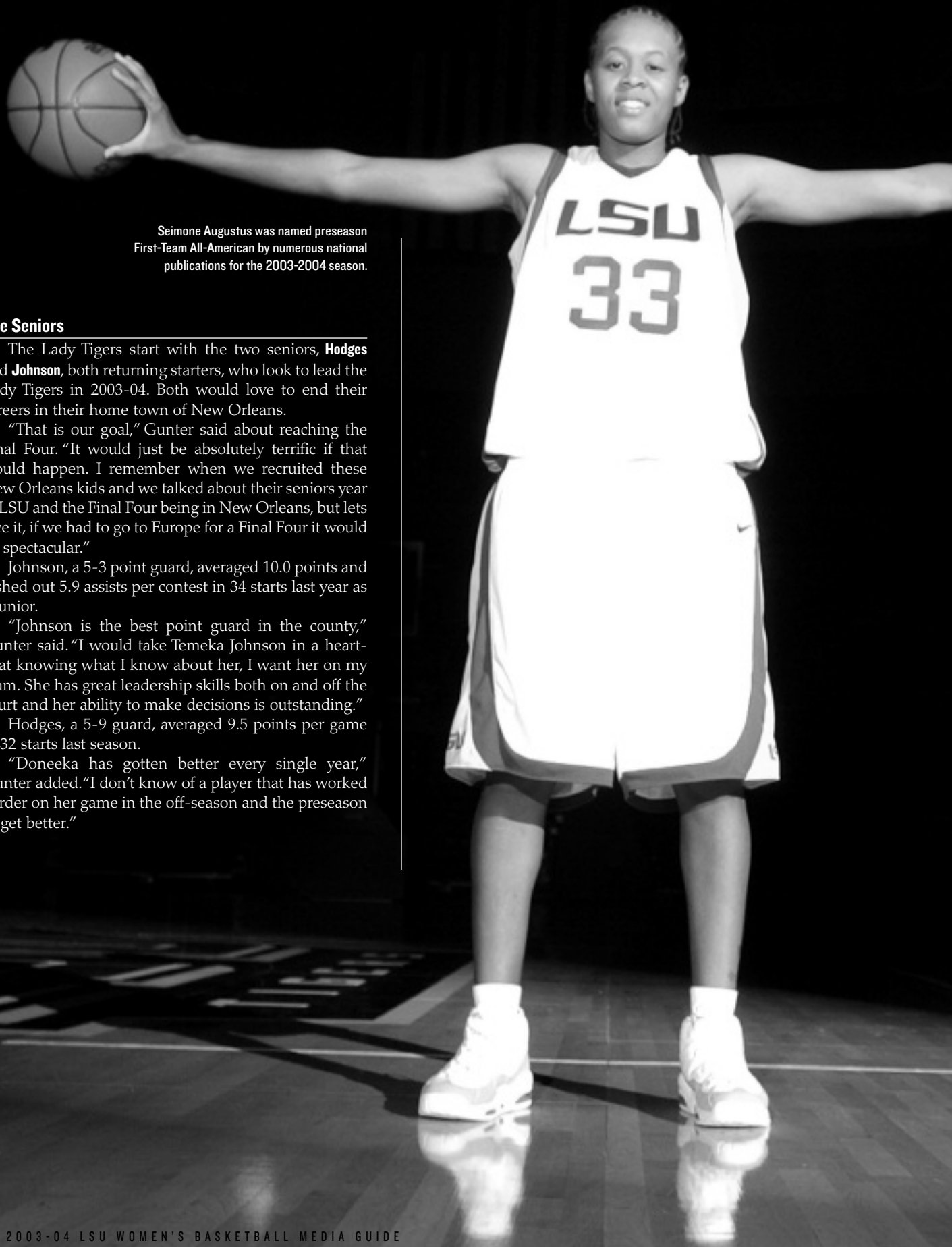
"That is our goal," Gunter said about reaching the Final Four. "It would just be absolutely terrific if that would happen. I remember when we recruited these New Orleans kids and we talked about their seniors year at LSU and the Final Four being in New Orleans, but lets face it, if we had to go to Europe for a Final Four it would be spectacular."

Johnson, a 5-3 point guard, averaged 10.0 points and dished out 5.9 assists per contest in 34 starts last year as a junior.

"Johnson is the best point guard in the county," Gunter said. "I would take Temeka Johnson in a heart-beat knowing what I know about her, I want her on my team. She has great leadership skills both on and off the court and her ability to make decisions is outstanding."

Hodges, a 5-9 guard, averaged 9.5 points per game in 32 starts last season.

"Doneeka has gotten better every single year," Gunter added. "I don't know of a player that has worked harder on her game in the off-season and the preseason to get better."





2003-04 LADY TIGERS

The Juniors

LSU's trio of juniors **Crystal White**, **Florence Williams** and **Tillie Willis** all return from last year's squad.

White, a 6-5 center from Mt. Clemens, Mich., played in 24 games after becoming eligible in December after transferring from Duke. She averaged 2.2 points and 3.2 rebounds per game and really made an impact on the defensive side of the court with 44 blocked shots.

"Crystal will be an outstanding five player," Gunter said. "She has waited for her turn and she has worked really hard on her game this summer. She is going to be an intimidating force for us this year in the middle."

Williams, a 6-1 forward from Miami, Fla., saw limited action in 2002-03 and averaged 1.3 points and 1.3 rebounds per outing, will add depth as a swing player.

Willis, a 6-3 forward from Atlanta, Ga., also saw limited action and averaged 1.0 point and 1.0 rebounds per contest in 12 games, will look to contribute at the three of four position.

The Sophomores

Augustus leads what could be called the most talented class of the four that includes **Treynell Clavelle**, **Scholanda Hoston** and **Wendlyn Jones**.

Augustus, a 6-1 guard from Baton Rouge, was the consensus National Freshman of the Year last season and led LSU with 14.8 points per game and also grabbed 5.5 rebounds per outing.

"It is amazing to see her development," Gunter said. "We are only beginning to see how truly good she is

going to be."

Clavelle, a 6-4, center from Jeanerette, La., played in only eight games last year and averaged 1.1 points and 1.5 rebounds per outing, will be solid depth inside for the Lady Tigers.

Hoston, a 5-10 guard from Miami, Fla., missed last season for personal reasons, but averaged 10.6 points and 4.2 rebounds per game as a freshman in 2001-02 in 29 games and nine starts.

"Scholanda has worked hard this year," Gunter said. "She had a great freshman year both offensively and defensively. She has great speed and is a good shooter and more importantly she is a competitor."

Jones, a 6-1 forward from Grosnell, Ark., averaged 3.8 points and 2.1 rebounds per game as a redshirt freshman last season, but will have to miss the early part of the 2003-04 season after suffering a torn ACL in her right knee in June. She is expected to return to action in late December.

Jones was penciled in to be the starting four player for Gunter and the Lady Tigers before her knee injury.

The Freshmen

LSU signed four players last year to join the Lady Tigers as freshman for this season. **Hanna Biernacka**, **Amber Long**, **Khalilah Mitchell** and **Marian Whitfield** each bring something to the table and will try to leave their mark on LSU

Biernacka, a 6-1 forward from Sweden, averaged 18.0 points and 7.0 rebounds per game last season for her club team in Sweden. She also played for Team Sweden in 2002 in the FIBA European Championships for Junior Women.

Biernacka will add some depth to the three and four position with her ability to shoot and post up.

Long, a 5-6 guard from Irmo, S.C., was a five year starter at Dutch Fork High School and scored over 1,900 points in her career and was a WBCA All-American.

Mitchell, a 5-11 guard from New Orleans, La., averaged 18.2 points and 7.8 rebounds per game at St. Mary's High School and was named the New Orleans Times-Picayune Metro Player of the Year.

Whitfield, 5-9 guard from Augusta, Ga., averaged 16.0 points and 6.0 rebounds at Glenn Hills High School and was the Georgia 4A Player of the Year. She was also a two-time Nike and Street & Smith's All-American.

All three guards will add depth to the Lady Tigers back court that is already among the best in the nation.

The University continuously develops programs of breadth and quality that make it one of the nation's outstanding educational institutions.

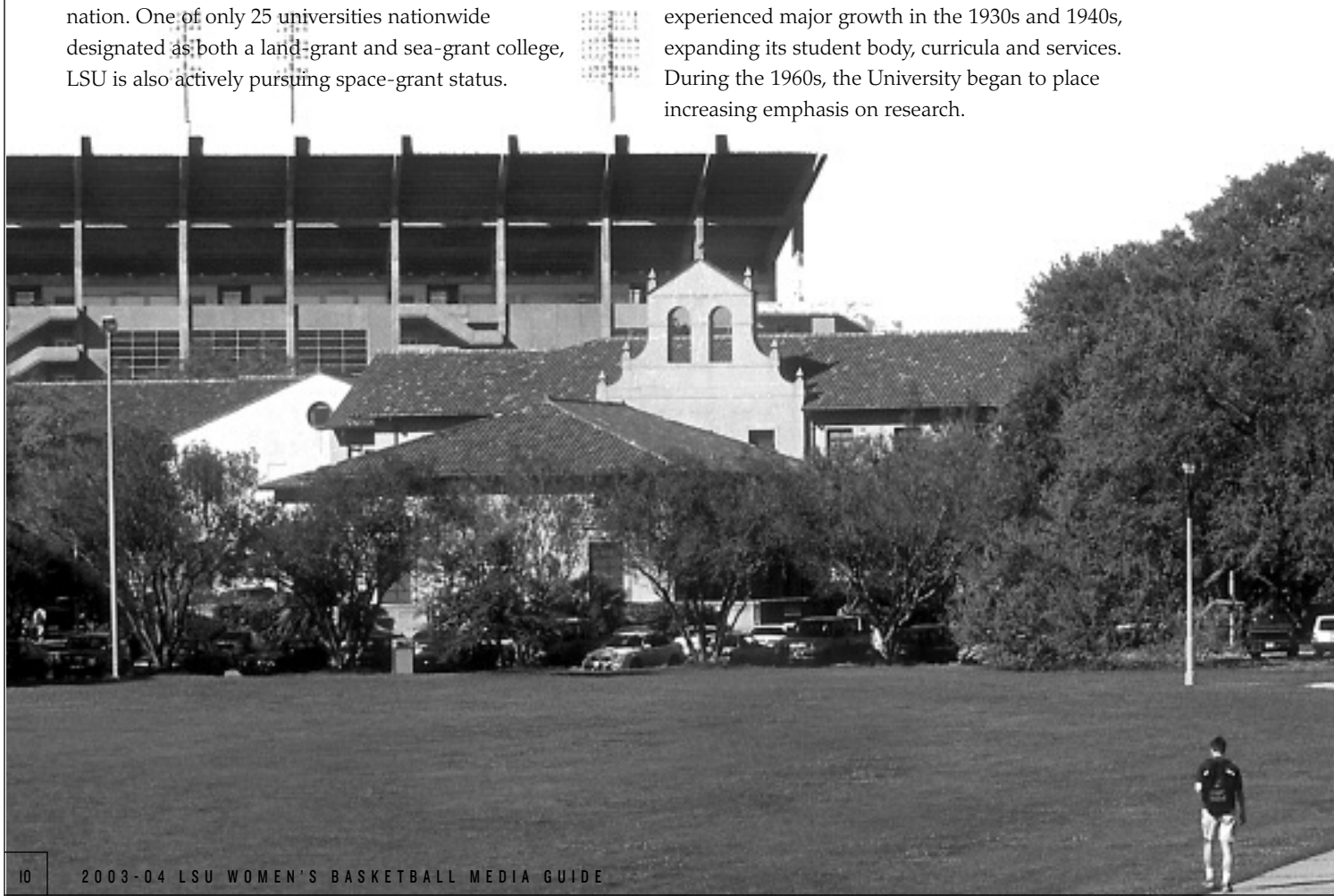
The University influences the educational, economic, social and cultural lives of its citizens throughout the state – indeed, in some way, it touches the life of every person in Louisiana.

Because of its designation as a Research I University – the top category of the Carnegie Foundation's ranking of research institutions – LSU ranks in the top 2 percent of the nation's colleges and universities. The Research I designation is shared by only 59 public and 29 private universities across the nation. One of only 25 universities nationwide designated as both a land-grant and sea-grant college, LSU is also actively pursuing space-grant status.

History and tradition began with LSU's founding in 1853 by the General Assembly of Louisiana as the Louisiana State Seminary of Learning and Military Academy near Pineville, Louisiana. The institution opened January 2, 1860. When the Civil War began, the school's first superintendent, William Tecumseh Sherman, resigned to assume a command in the Union Army. Fire demolished the Seminary in 1869 and the school moved to Baton Rouge.

In 1870, the Seminary was renamed Louisiana State University. In 1874, under the United States Morrill Act, the Louisiana State Agricultural & Mechanical College was established in New Orleans. The two institutions were merged by the Legislature in 1877 to become Louisiana State University and Agricultural & Mechanical College.

Construction on the present campus began in 1922 and the first classes were held in 1926. LSU experienced major growth in the 1930s and 1940s, expanding its student body, curricula and services. During the 1960s, the University began to place increasing emphasis on research.



Recognizing the importance and extent of statewide agricultural activities of units in the LSU System, the LSU Board of Supervisors in 1972 established the Center for Agricultural Sciences & Rural Development. This unit was renamed the LSU Agricultural Center in 1982. Components of the LSU Agricultural Center include the Louisiana Agricultural Experiment Station, the Louisiana Cooperative Extension Service, International Programs and Administrative Services.

The primary mission of the LSU Agricultural Center is to conduct research in agricultural and natural resource development and to provide off-campus extension education that disseminates technological, economic, and management information to Louisiana residents.

In 1977, the Paul M. Hebert Law Center, established as the LSU Law School in 1906, was made an autonomous division of the LSU System. The Law Center provides legal education characterized by an unyielding demand for academic excellence. Its unique curriculum, based on civil law as well as substantial elements of common law, provides law graduates with qualifications and training for not one, but two legal systems.

LSU, located on more than 2,000 acres in the southern part of Baton Rouge, Louisiana, is bordered on the west by the Mississippi River. The University's more than 250 principal buildings are grouped on a 650-acre plateau that constitutes the main part of the campus.

LSU and A&M College is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. The Hebert Law Center holds membership in the Association of Law Schools and is on the approved list of the American Bar Association.

The LSU Women's Basketball Complex



LSU's Women's Basketball Complex area ranks among the finest in college basketball. The project was started last spring and completed prior to the start of the 2003-04 season.

The spacious Jinks Coleman Team Room is the focal point of the complex, a fully carpeted and well-lit, the locker room. A new squad room with a large projection screen for viewing scouting video, and practice and game film and a lounge are also features of the complex.

The locker room complex, located just up the ramp in the Maravich Center, includes a big screen television, a computer station, and a

lounge for student athletes to study and visit before and after practice and games.

The new LSU Women's Basketball Complex, which cost over \$500,000 to create, was paid for by the Tiger Athletic Foundation, the LSU Athletic Department and the Women's Basketball Fast Break Club. The various state-of-the-art displays cost over \$225,000 and were funded by a committee to raise funds head by the Fast Break Club. The art work was a seven-month process that included the Lady Tigers coaching staff, along with the LSU sports information department, going over several designs before choosing the final art.

The heart of the LSU Women's Basketball Complex is the Jinks Coleman Team Room. This locker room facility features new African mahogany wood lockers that were designed by the Lady Tiger basketball staff and crafted by cabinet makers. Each individual locker area includes a vanity with make-up lights and a mirror as well as locker cabinet with individual spaces for all each player's equipment. The well-lit locker room was also outfitted with carpet that was specifically dyed to match the LSU purple. The locker room is also equipped with showers and is just down the hall from a fully equipped training room.

The entire complex is framed within the Northwest part of the Pete Maravich Assembly Center which includes the Jinks Coleman Team Room, the Lady Tiger Players

Lounge, Alumni Hall, and the Team Video Room. Part of the complex process was to bring in outside firm to create the wall-art for the hall ways that speak to the tradition of Lady Tiger basketball on the court and in the classroom.

Dr. Martin J. Broussard Athletic Training Center

LSU boasts the largest and most complete athletic training facility in all of collegiate athletics. Focused on aggressive rehabilitation, the Broussard Center for Athletic Training is furnished with the latest in technology and equipment. Some of the features of the 23,000-square foot facility include an on-site x-ray room, an in-house pharmacy, as well as state of the art hydrotherapy pools. The Broussard Center for Athletic Training is equipped with the largest hydrotherapy pools in both collegiate and professional sports and is one of the few collegiate training centers with a full-service pharmacy, as well as on-site x-ray room. LSU is also the only school in college athletics with a training room equipped with a full-service vision center. The facility is named in honor of legendary trainer Dr. Martin J. Broussard, who served as LSU's athletic trainer for over four decades.

Dr. Martin J. Broussard

LSU's multi-million dollar athletic training facility is named in honor of Dr. Martin J. Broussard, the legendary trainer whose career spanned over 40 years at LSU, having been appointed to the position of head athletic trainer in 1948. Following his semi-retirement from the day-to-day work as trainer in 1993, he continued to serve the Athletic Department as an Assistant to the Athletic Director through 2001 giving him well over 50 years of service to the Athletics Department.

As a student-athlete at LSU, Broussard lettered in baseball and track and field in the mid-1940s, winning the Southeastern Conference broad jump title in 1944 and finishing second in the 200-yard dash. He was the high point scorer of any athlete in the 1944 SEC meet in Birmingham.

Broussard went on to play professional baseball, but served as student trainer for the football team during his undergraduate days. After receiving his B. S. in 1945 from LSU, he served single seasons as the head athletic trainer at the University of Florida and Texas A&M University before coming to LSU to begin a career that continued almost until his death.

Broussard received his master's of science degree from LSU in 1960, followed by his doctorate in 1967. He was promoted to full professor in 1970 and taught in the Health and Physical Education Department for over 40 years.

As a distinguished colleague in the field of athletic training, Broussard was one of five people to establish the governing body, the National Athletic Trainers Association as well as one of three people to establish the Southeastern Conference Trainer's Association. Over the years, he has served on the NATA's Board of Directors and the Ethics Committee and was acting President of the SEC Trainer's Association on three occasions.

Among his many accomplishments was the formulation of "Quick Kick," an isotonic drink used to replace liquids, vitamins and the electrolytes lost through sweating. His articles on training have been published on numerous occasions. He was a trainer for the Pan American Games in 1955 and the U.S. Olympic team in 1960. In 1963, the Rockne Foundation named him Trainer of the Year. In 1978, Broussard was named to the NATA Hall of Fame followed by the Louisiana Athletic Trainer's Hall of Fame in 1982.

Strength & Conditioning

The LSU strength and conditioning facility was built in 1997 and features the latest in both strength training and cardiovascular training equipment. Measuring 10,000-square feet, LSU has one of the finest strength and conditioning facilities in the nation.

LSU strength and conditioning team took a new direction in 2000 under strength coach Tommy Moffitt. Moffitt, who was named the 1999 Collegiate Football Strength and Conditioning

Coach of the Year by the Professional Football Strength and conditioning Coaches Society, is in charge of the LSU strength and conditioning facility, located in Tiger Stadium. LSU also hired Scott Gaden to work solely with the Lady Tigers basketball program.

Strength and conditioning can be the heart and soul of an athletic program's success, and LSU has taken great strides to improve its strength program and facilities.

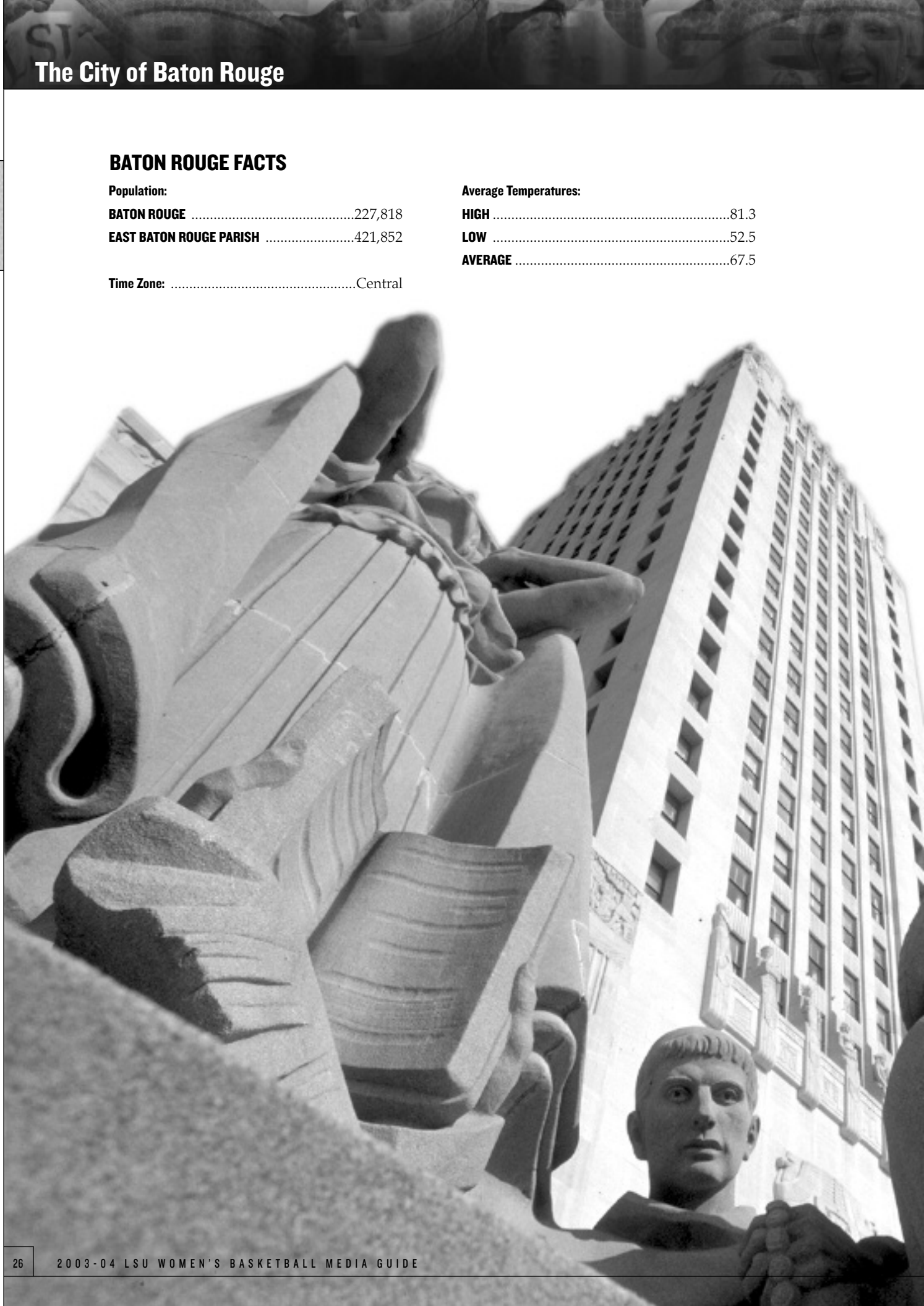

DISTANCE CHART FROM BATON ROUGE (BASED ON 70 MPH SPEED):

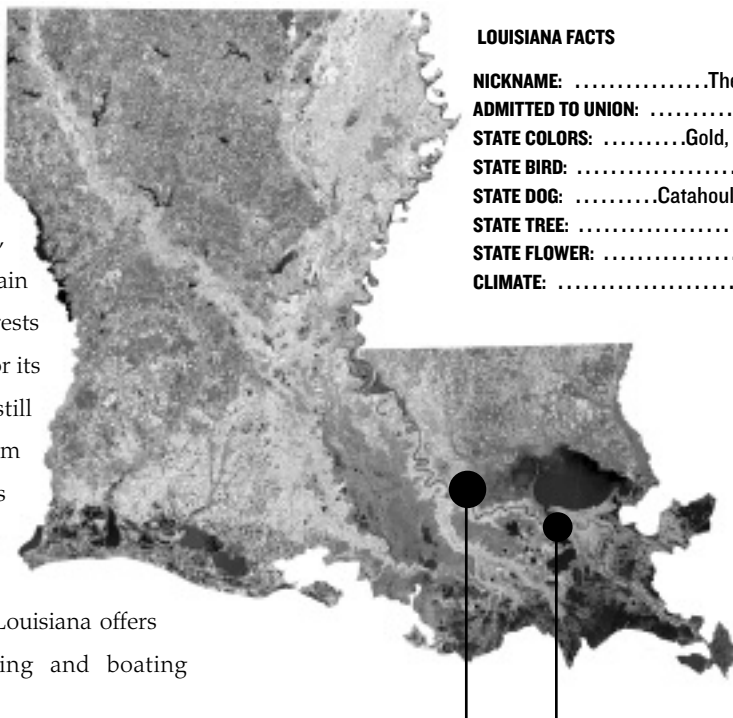

Retired Numbers

The five athletes on this page are the only athletes to have their jerseys retired by LSU. Basketball has retired the No. 23 for Pete Maravich, No. 50 for Bob Pettit, Jr., and No. 33 for Shaquille O'Neal. Football's only retired jersey is the No. 20 worn by Billy Cannon, while baseball retired the No. 15 in honor of long-time coach and current athletic director Skip Bertman.



Bob Pettit, Jr. • #50

Led LSU to its first NCAA Final Four in 1953 and later became the first player in NBA history to exceed the 20,000-plus point barrier. Pettit is a member of the NBA Hall of Fame and in 1997 was named as one of the top 50 players in NBA history.



Billy Cannon • #20

One of the true legends of college football in the South, Cannon was the 1959 Heisman Trophy winner that helped the Tigers to the 1958 national title. Cannon's most memorable performance came in 1959 against Ole Miss. The top-ranked Tigers trailed No. 3 Ole Miss 3-0 in the fourth quarter when Cannon fielded a punt, broke seven tackles and returned it 89 yards as the Tigers went on to win 7-3. He went on to a successful 11-year professional career.



Pete Maravich • #23

Nicknamed "Pistol Pete," Maravich still holds the NCAA records for career points with 3,667 and career scoring average with 44.2 points a game. Maravich was selected as the National Player of the Year in 1970 after leading the Tigers to the NIT Final Four. He scored 50+ points an amazing 28 times. After LSU he went on to a 10-year professional career and was selected as one of the NBA's 50 greatest players in 1997.



Shaquille O'Neal • #33

Was the first pick in the 1992 NBA Draft. He was named MVP of the league in 2000 and the Finals MVP in 2000, 2001 and 2002 after leading the Los Angeles Lakers to three World Championships. At LSU, O'Neal averaged 21.6 points and 13.6 rebounds for his career, and in 1991, he was named the World's Amateur Athlete of the Year as well as SEC Athlete of the Year and National Player of the Year. In 1997, he was named as one of the top 50 players in NBA history.



Skip Bertman • #15

A legend in the college baseball ranks, Bertman created a dynasty at LSU, guiding the Tigers to five national titles in a 10-year stretch from 1991-2000. He also skippered the United States to a bronze medal at the 1996 Olympics in Atlanta and was an assistant on the gold medal-winning U.S. squad in Seoul, Korea in 1988. Bertman retired from coaching following the 2001 season and is currently the LSU athletics director.



Nicki Arnstad

The 2002 NCAA Floor Exercise Co-Champion, Arnstad became the first LSU gymnast to win a national title. She was a two-time All-American and won the NCAA Central Regional floor and all-around championships.



Britni Sneed

One of three four-time first-team All-SEC selections in conference history, Sneed was a two-time SEC Player of the Year and was a three-time NFCA All-American, leading the Tigers to the College World Series in 2001.



Meredith Duncan

The nation's top collegiate golfer in 2002, Duncan left LSU as the schools best female golfer. She earned first-team All-America honors as a senior in 2002 and won the United States Women's Amateur Championship in 2001.



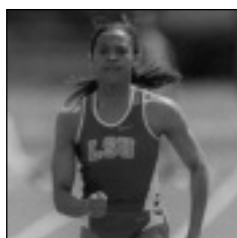
Josh Reed

An All-American, Reed re-wrote both the LSU and SEC record books. The winner of the Biletnikoff Award in 2001, Reed finished his career with an SEC record 3,001 yards receiving.



Esther Jones

A 21-time All-American while at LSU. Won a gold medal as a member of the 4x100 meter relay team in Barcelona in 1992.



Peta-Gaye Dowdie

A 19-time track All-American. Dowdie was a member of three NCAA Championship teams during her time at LSU and went on to compete for her native Jamaica at the 2000 Sydney Olympics.



Marie Ferdinand

The eighth pick overall in the 2001 WNBA draft by the Utah Starzz and was a 2002 WNBA all-star. A First-Team All-American in 2000-01 and helped the Lady Tigers to the Elite Eight in 2000 and to the NCAA Tournament three times.



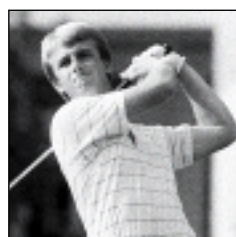
Ben McDonald

Named the National Player of the Year in 1989 and he was later the first player chosen in the Major League Baseball Draft by the Baltimore Orioles.



Todd Walker

Capped his LSU career as the SEC's all-time leader in hits, runs, RBIs, and total bases. Walker, who is a member of the All-Time College World Series Team, led LSU to the national title in 1993.



David Toms

The two-time SEC Player of the Year, Toms has gone on to a successful career on the PGA Tour. Among his PGA Tour victories was a thrilling win at the PGA Championship in August of 2001.



Walter Davis

A track Olympian in 2000, Davis helped LSU to national titles in 2001 and 2002. The SEC Male Athlete of the Year in 2002, he won six NCAA titles and earned a school-record nine All-America honors.



Pat Henry

Has led the LSU track and field program to 25 national championships and 19 SEC titles. The only coach to win both men's and women's titles in the same year.

While LSU continues to make its mark on the playing field, winning 38 national titles, the state's flagship University continues to be a breeding ground for some of the greatest minds in the world past and present.



Mary L. Landrieu

Became the first woman from Louisiana elected to a full term in the United States Senate in 1997.



Dr. James Andrews

A world-renowned orthopedic surgeon. Andrews is a 1963 graduate of LSU and a 1967 graduate of the LSU Medical School. While at LSU, Andrews won the SEC indoor and outdoor titles in the pole vault.



Reinosuke Hara

Researched at LSU in the 1950s and then later received the honorary Doctorate of Science degree from LSU in 1992. Currently Vice-Chairman of Seiko Instruments.



Harry Longwell

LSU is entering its 29th season of women's basketball. The Lady Tigers first played basketball as a varsity sport in 1975-76 and since that inaugural season, LSU has posted 23 winning seasons, played in 13 NCAA Tournaments, and advanced to the AIAW National Championship game in 1977.

The Coaches

LSU has had three coaches in its history with Jinks Coleman serving as the school's first head coach. Coleman coached the Lady Tigers for three and a half years before stepping down midway through the 1978-79 season. In 3-plus years with the Lady Tigers, Coleman guided LSU to a 91-32 overall mark. Her crowning moment with LSU came during the 1976-77 season as she led the Lady Tigers to the AIAW National Championship game. LSU fell to top-ranked Delta State, but that 1977 team remains the only squad in school history to play for a national title.

Coleman was replaced by Barbara Swanner midway through the 1979 season and Swanner coached the Lady Tigers for the next three years. She led LSU to an overall mark of 57-50 before ending her coaching career at the conclusion of the 1981-82 season.

Sue Gunter joined the Lady Tigers for the 1982-83 season and has been in Baton Rouge ever since. In 20 seasons with the Lady Tigers, Gunter has led the Lady Tigers to 385 victories and guided her teams to 12 NCAA Tournament appearances and the 1991 SEC Tournament title. Gunter is the winningest coach in LSU history and is a member of the Women's Basketball Hall of Fame.

The 1970s

The decade of the 1970's saw the start of women's basketball as a varsity sport at LSU. The Lady Tigers played their first game in November of 1975, losing to Whitworth, 64-58. LSU's first win came a week later with a 75-62 win over Southwestern Louisiana. The win was the first of 17 for the Lady Tigers in their inaugural season as LSU posted a first-year mark of 17-14.

A year later, LSU, behind the play of a couple of Australians in Maree Jackson and Julie Gross, was playing for the AIAW National title. After going unrecognized for much of the year, LSU finally began to gain some respect with wins over three ranked teams in February. The Lady Tigers entered the AIAW State Tournament on a roll, however, LSU lost to Louisiana Tech and Northwestern State, but they were still able to advance to the AIAW Regional Tournament. At Regionals, the Lady Tigers beat Texas, Stephen F. Austin and Baylor to advance to the AIAW National Tournament. By this time the Lady Tigers were ranked No. 11 in the nation and after wins over Western Washington and Baylor, LSU was in the Final Four. LSU knocked off second-ranked Immaculata, 74-68, in the semifinals and then fell to top-ranked Delta

State, 68-55, in the national title game. LSU finished with a 29-8 overall mark, the second-most victories recorded in school history in a single year.

In 1977-78, the Lady Tigers achieved their first and only No. 1 ranking as LSU spent most of January and February atop the Associated Press poll, after having started the year ranked No. 2 in the nation. The Lady Tigers stayed there until Feb. 15 when Tennessee moved ahead of LSU. Despite being ranked No. 2 in the nation, LSU couldn't advance out of the Regionals as the Sue Gunter-coached Stephen F. Austin LadyJacks eliminated the Lady Tigers in the semifinals. LSU still won 37 games, which remains the school record for victories in a season.

LSU closed out the decade of the 1970's with a coaching change as Jinks Coleman stepped down after 15 games in the 1978-79 season. With an 8-7 mark, Coleman was replaced by Barbara Swanner, who guided LSU to a 5-5 mark over the final 10 games of the year. LSU finished with a 13-12 record.

The 1980s

The decade of the 80's saw LSU establish itself as one of the top programs in the country.

LSU opened the decade under Barbara Swanner and posted a 17-17 mark and reached the semifinals of the AIAW Regional Tournament.

A year later, Joyce Walker came to Baton Rouge and put women's basketball at LSU back on the map. Walker, who was way ahead of her time, could do it all. In her first year with the Lady Tigers she averaged 20.7 points a contest and led the Lady Tigers to a 17-15 mark.

A year later, the NCAA became the governing body of women's athletics and the NCAA Tournament

was started. The Lady Tigers didn't make the NCAA Tournament in 1982, but still posted an 18-13 overall mark as Walker averaged 24.9 points a contest. That season was Swanner's last year as head coach of the Lady Tigers.

The 1982-83 season was the first for the Lady Tigers under Sue Gunter, who came to LSU from Stephen F. Austin in Nacogdoches, Texas. In her first year with LSU, Gunter guided the Lady Tigers to a 20-7 mark and a tie for first place in the Western Division of the SEC.

Walker's last year with LSU in 1983-84 marked the Lady Tigers' first-ever appearance in the NCAA Tournament. LSU went 23-7 and reached the Sweet 16 at the NCAA Tournament before falling to Louisiana Tech.

In 1984-85, the Lady Tigers claimed the National Women's Invitational Tournament (NWIT) title with a 74-54 win over Florida in the championship game.

LSU's best season since 1977 occurred in 1985-86 as the Lady Tigers climbed all the way to No. 8 in the nation and reached the Elite Eight at the NCAA Tournament before falling to Tennessee in the final seconds, 67-65.

Another 20-win season followed in 1986-87 as the Lady Tigers spent most of the year ranked in the top 10. However, the Lady Tigers lost their last three games, including a 70-56 setback to Southern Illinois in the second round of the NCAA Tournament.

The 1987-88 season saw the arrival of Dana "Pokey" Chatman, the best point guard in school history. Chatman helped guide the Lady Tigers to an 18-11 mark and another NCAA Tournament appearance. LSU closed out the 1980's with its fifth NCAA Tournament appearance as LSU reached the Sweet 16 before falling to Louisiana Tech.

The 1990s

The decade of the 1990's was one of ups and downs for the Lady Tigers. LSU opened the decade with a 21-9 overall mark and its fifth NCAA Tournament appearance.

A year later, the Pokey Chatman era came to an end as the Lady Tigers posted a 24-7 overall mark, won the school's only SEC Tournament title and were seeded No. 2 in the Midwest Region of the NCAA Tournament.

The 1991-92 season started the Cornelia Gayden era, but it was also the beginning of a stretch that saw the Lady Tigers go five years without an appearance in the NCAA Tournament. LSU posted a 16-13 overall mark, but five straight losses in mid-February kept the Lady Tigers home in March.

A year later in 1992-93, the Lady Tigers had their first-ever losing record as LSU went 9-18 and was winless in the SEC for the first time. Things weren't much better in 1993-94 as LSU went 11-16 overall and tied for 10th in the SEC.

One of the bright spots in 1994-95 was Sue Gunter's 500th career victory on the same night Gayden set an NCAA record with 12 3-point goals in a 92-62 win over Jackson State on Feb. 9 in Baton Rouge. LSU suffered through its worst record ever that year as the Lady Tigers posted a 7-20 mark.

Despite the losing record the year prior, LSU signed one of the nation's best recruiting classes for the 1995-96 season and the results were immediate. LSU had the biggest turnaround in SEC history as the Lady Tigers went from 7-20 in 1994-95 to 21-11 in 1995-96. Junior college transfers Elaine Powell and Pietra Gay help lead LSU to a win over second-ranked Georgia in the SEC Tournament as the Lady Tigers appeared to be headed for its first NCAA Tournament appearance in five years, but was denied. The Lady Tigers settled for the NWIT, where

they placed third out of eight teams.

The following year, LSU posted its best record in the 90's as they went 25-5 overall, won nine SEC games and reached the Sweet 16 for the first time since 1989. In 1997-98, the Lady Tigers, in what was supposed to be a rebuilding year, posted a 19-13 overall mark and reached the semifinals of the Women's NIT.

In 1998-99 the Lady Tigers, behind the play of senior point guard Latasha Dorsey, the only senior on the team, reached the Sweet 16 for the second time in three years and finished second in the SEC with a school-record 10 league wins. LSU's 22-8 overall mark in 1998-99 was LSU's fourth 20-win season of the 1990s.

The 2000s

The Lady Tigers rolled into the new millennium much like they way they ended the old one. In 1999-2000, LSU was 25-7 overall and 11-3 in the SEC, the best record for the program since 1996-97. The 11-3 conference mark was the best in the school's history. LSU rode that success all the way to the program's second Elite Eight appearance in the NCAA Tournament, falling to Connecticut in the regional final.

Another 20-win season greeted the Lady Tigers in 2000-01, compiling a 20-11 mark, including the fifth straight winning conference record at 8-6.

The 2001-02 season could have been one of the finest in recent history. Gunter's group of just six healthy players collected 18 victories, including a trip to the SEC Tournament Championship game and a fourth straight trip to the NCAA Tournament.

Building on the success of the previous two seasons, the 2002-03 team went even further, ending the season with a 30-4 record, winning the SEC Tournament title, advancing to the NCAA Elite Eight and finishing the season ranked No. 3 in the national rankings.

Lady Tigers Timeline

Maree Jackson

At 6-foot-2, Maree Jackson was one of the most dominating players in the game in the late 1970's. Jackson played only two years (1976-78) with the Lady Tigers, but during that time she scored 1,852 points in 70 games for an average of 26.4 points a contest. Her sophomore season could rank as the best in women's basketball history as her 1,021 points and 539 rebounds two of the most in NCAA history (although the NCAA does not recognize statistics prior to 1982). LSU posted a 66-11 mark in her two years. Jackson earned first team All-America honors by Basketball News in 1978. She scored 40 or more points five times including a career-best 47 against Northwestern State in 1978. Jackson had a school-record 27 rebounds twice and had 12 games with at least 20 points and 20 rebounds in the same contest.

Julie Gross

Another of LSU's dominating 6-2 players of the 70's, Julie Gross, like Maree Jackson, came to LSU from Australia. In four years with the Lady Tigers, Gross scored 2,488 points, second most in school history, and hauled in a school-record 1,466 rebounds. Gross was LSU's first Kodak All-American as she won the award after averaging 20.7 points and 11.5 rebounds as a sophomore in 1978. Gross' career rebound total ranks second in SEC history.

Joyce Walker

No other player in school history could take over a game on the offensive end like Joyce Walker did. Walker, a native of Seattle, Wash., capped her career as the leading scorer in SEC history with 2,906 points, an average of 24.8 points a contest, until her scoring record was broken in 2000. Walker is LSU's only two-time Kodak All-American as she won the award in 1983 and 1984. In 1984, Walker averaged 26.5 points and 4.0 rebounds in leading LSU to the Sweet 16 in its first NCAA Tournament appearance. In her four years, Walker averaged at least 20 points each season with her career-best 27.6 points as a junior.

Pokey Chatman

She was like having another coach on the floor. She was so good at it that when her playing career was over she immediately joined Sue Gunter's coaching staff. Pokey Chatman is without a doubt the best point guard to ever play at LSU. In four years with the Lady Tigers she started all but one game. She led the Lady Tigers to the NCAA Tournament four times and guided the Lady Tigers to their only SEC Tournament title in 1991 earning tourney MVP honors along the way. Chatman holds the school record for career assists and steals. She capped her career with 1,826 points, which ranks fifth in school history.

Cornelia Gayden

There may not have been a better shooter come through LSU than Cornelia Gayden. In four years with the Lady Tigers, Gayden scored 2,451 points, third most in school history, and she re-wrote the NCAA 3-point record book. By the end of her career, Gayden held the NCAA records for 3-pointers in a game (12 vs. Jackson State in 1995), 3-pointers in a career (337) and 3-pointers attempted in a career (875). The 12 3-point goals vs. Jackson State is currently the only one that stands, however all three are SEC records. By her senior season, Gayden had also become the complete player as she ranks fifth in school history in rebounds (894), 11th in assists (261) and fourth in steals (196). Gayden also had a pair of triple-doubles and her 49 points against Jackson State in 1995 is a school-record.

Elaine Powell

Although she was only at LSU two years, Elaine Powell was the biggest reason the Lady Tigers went from 7-20 the year prior to her arrival to 21-11 in her first season in Baton Rouge. Powell was a two-time first team All-SEC selection and in her first season with the Lady Tigers, she led LSU to its first post-season appearance (NWIT) in four years. A year later in 1997, Powell took the Lady Tigers a step further as LSU got its first NCAA Tournament bid since 1991. That year, Powell helped lead LSU to a 25-5 overall mark and to the Sweet 16 at the NCAA Tournament. In her career, Powell scored 1,163 which ranks 12th in school history. Powell is currently a member of the Orlando Miracle of the WNBA.

Latasha Dorsey

In four years time, Latasha Dorsey developed into one of the most feared defenders in LSU women's basketball history. Dorsey, who finished her

career ranked 16th in school history in scoring with 1,054 points, joined Joyce Walker and Pokey Chatman as the only three players in school history with 1,000 points, 300 assists and 200 steals. Dorsey finished third in school history with 258 steals and fifth in assists with 383. Dorsey also played in more post-season games (men or women) in school history with 12 as she appeared in six NCAA Tournament contests and six NIT games. As a senior, Dorsey was named first team Defensive All-American by the Women's Basketball Journal.

Marie Ferdinand

One of the most explosive guards to ever play at LSU, Miami native Marie Ferdinand earned 2001 Kodak All-America honors and was a unanimous coaches poll first-team All-SEC selection. For her career, Ferdinand averaged 13.7 points and 4.1 rebounds a game. In 2000, she led the Lady Tigers to the Elite Eight, averaging team-highs in points, assists and steals. She was named to the 2000 NCAA East Regional all-tournament team. Ferdinand also made an impact in international play in the summer of 2000, helping lead the U.S. Women's Select Team to a gold medal at the Jones Cup Tournament in Taipei, Taiwan. She is currently a member of the Utah Starzz of the WNBA and finished third in Rookie of the Year voting in 2001 and was named to the 2002 All-Star team.

DeTrina White

No other freshman in school history made an impact the way DeTrina White did in her rookie season. In 1999, White became the first freshman in school history to be named National Freshman of the Year. She was also named a first team Freshman All-American by two publications and the Associated Press named her SEC Freshman/Newcomer of the Year. White led the SEC with 62.1 percent shooting from the field as a freshman and her 12 double-doubles were tops in the league.

Seimone Augustus

Like DeTrina White, not many other freshman made an impact like Seimone Augustus in their rookie season. The 6-1 Baton Rouge native led the team in scoring as a first year player on her way to earning the consensus National Freshman of the Year honors. She was also named to numerous All-America teams as well as named Freshman of the Year in the Southeastern Conference. Augustus set the school record for single season free throw percentage by hitting 88.8 percent of her shots and connected on 54.9 percent of her field goals during the season, the second best FG percentage by a freshman. She opened her collegiate career by scoring 27 points against Arizona, the most points by a LSU player in their first game. To top off her freshman campaign, Augustus led Team USA to a gold medal in the FIBA World Championships for Young Women, earning MVP honors

Sue Gunter makes her debut as head coach of the Lady Tigers as LSU rolls over Tulane, 88-60 in Baton Rouge.

Jan. 1, 1984

After winning its first nine games, the Lady Tigers move to No. 5 in the AP poll, which marked the highest-ranking for an LSU team under Sue Gunter. until 2002-03.

March 18, 1984

LSU earns its first bid to the NCAA Tournament and knocks off Missouri, 92-82, in the second round.

March 23, 1985

LSU wins its first national title in women's basketball as the Lady Tigers beat Florida, 74-54, to claim the Women's NIT crown in Amarillo, Texas.

Nov. 30, 1986

Gunter wins her 111th game at LSU to become the winningest coach in school history in an 84-68 victory over USL.

Dec. 30, 1989

Gunter wins her 400th career game as the Lady Tigers blast Pacific, 88-58.

March 4, 1991

Pokey Chatman scores 30 points as LSU knocks off No. 4 Tennessee, 80-75, to win its first SEC Tournament title. Chatman is named MVP of the SEC Tournament.

Feb. 9, 1995

LSU coach Sue Gunter wins her 500th career game and Cornelia Gayden sets an NCAA record with 12 3-point goals at the Lady Tigers beat Jackson State, 92-62. Gayden also scored a school-record 49 points in the contest.

Jan. 21, 1997

6,552 fans show up for inaugural Pack The PMAC, breaking the then school attendance record, as 18th-ranked LSU knocks off 13th-ranked Arkansas, 79-72.

Feb. 27, 1997

For the first time in her 15 years at LSU, Sue Gunter is named the SEC Coach of the Year by both the Associated Press and the Nashville Banner.

March 15, 1998

Latasha Dorsey scored a career-high 26 points as LSU knocks off Butler, 74-58, in the quarterfinals of the Women's NIT in Baton Rouge. The win marked the 300th for Sue Gunter at LSU.

Feb. 17, 1999

DeTrina White is named National Freshman of the Year by the Women's Basketball News Service.

Feb. 21, 1999

Katrina Hibbert converts on a 3-point play with 11.8 seconds left as LSU beats No. 1 Tennessee, 72-69, LSU's first-ever win over a team ranked No. 1 in the nation.

Dec. 11, 1999

LSU defeats Michigan, 67-56, at the Pete Maravich Assembly Center. The game is televised by ESPN2, marking the first nationally-televised home game in LSU history.

Jan. 13, 2000

LSU defeats Arkansas, 82-69, in Fayetteville to give head coach Sue Gunter her 600th career college coaching victory. Gunter becomes just the fourth NCAA women's basketball coach to earn 600 wins.

June 10, 2000

LSU head coach Sue Gunter is inducted into the Women's Basketball Hall of Fame in Knoxville, Tenn.

Feb. 4, 2001

LSU breaks the school and state's single-game attendance record with a crowd of 9,636 for Pack the PMAC V against Auburn. LSU lost the game, 65-62.

Jan. 4, 2003

LSU hosts Penn State for Pack the PMAC 7 and defeats the Lady Lions 80-63 in front of 11,252, the first crowd of over 10,000 people to see a women's game in the state of Louisiana. The game, aired on CBS, was the first time LSU was on CBS in school history.

Jan. 16, 2003

Sue Gunter picked up her 400th victory as LSU head coach with a win over Kentucky. The Lady Tigers defeated UK 82-39 for the 15th win in a row to open the season, breaking a school record for consecutive wins to begin a season.

Feb. 23, 2003

No. 4 LSU hosted No. 3 Tennessee in front of 15,217 people, the fourth largest crowd to see a basketball game (men or women) in PMAC history. Tennessee went on to win the game 68-65, but the crowd was not dissatisfied after watching one of the greatest games played in PMAC history.

March 9, 2003

LSU defeated Tennessee 78-62 to completed a three-game-three-day run that would give the Lady Tigers their second SEC Tournament title. LSU defeated Arkansas and Vanderbilt on the previous two nights before Temeka Johnson and company upset UT to take the title. Johnson led the team with 26 points and earned the tournament MVP honors.

March 16, 2003

The Lady Tigers gathers to watch the NCAA selection show to find out they had earned a No. 1 seed in the upcoming NCAA Tournament, a first for LSU.

Sue Gunter added another chapter to her coaching legacy last year as the Walnut Grove, Miss., native continues to stake her claim as one of the greatest coaches in the history of the women's game.

As Gunter enters her unprecedented 40th season as a collegiate head coach, she continues to be an ambassador for a game in which she served as a pioneer many years ago. Gunter has been with women's basketball on the collegiate level every step of the way, having seen the sport evolve from a novelty back in the early 1960s to present day, where the Final Four is sold out years in advance and games are shown nightly on national television.

Gunter, who was inducted into the Women's Basketball Hall of Fame in June 2000, enters the 2003-04 season among the career leaders in several NCAA coaching categories: seasons coached (No. 1 - 40); games coached (No. 3 - 981); wins (No. 3 - 681); and 20-win seasons (No. 4 - 21).

Gunter's influence has been a catalyst behind the growth of the game and things have been no different in Baton Rouge as the Lady Tigers continue to play before school-record crowds and media attention is at an all-time high. In Gunter's 21-year tenure at LSU, her list of accomplishments are long and impressive -- 13 NCAA Tournament appearances, three NCAA Elite Eight appearances, seven NCAA Sweet 16 appearances, two SEC Tournament titles, a Women's NIT title, and a handful of Coach of the Year awards.

However, as Gunter enters her 22nd season as the



Lady Tigers head coach, the prized Final Four appearance still eludes her. LSU has come close several times, most recently this past season, when the Lady Tigers advanced to the Elite Eight before falling to Texas in the West Regional Final. However, Gunter perseveres with the fact that her best seasons may still be ahead of her. The Lady Tigers bring back a solid nucleus from last season with over 50 percent of the team's offense returning. Pair that with a solid group of recruits and the Lady Tigers are poised to make another run at the national title.

Sue Gunter -- The Coach

Sue Gunter has taken the LSU women's basketball program back to national prominence. After a three-year hiatus in the mid-1990's that saw the Lady Tigers suffer through the school's first-ever losing seasons, LSU has now been to post-season action seven straight years, including five trips to the NCAA Tournament.

To realize just how far the Lady Tigers have come, one has to go back to the 1994-95 season, the worst year in school history as LSU posted a 7-20 overall mark. Strangely enough, it was the 1994-95 season that proved to be the turning point for the Lady Tigers as Gunter turned up her recruiting magic and promptly signed the best class in school history. That class, which included future All-SEC selections in Elaine Powell, Pietra Gay and Toni Gross, won 46 games over two years and resurrected the LSU women's basketball program. The Lady Tigers have now won an average of 22.5 games per season since the 1994-95 campaign and once again, LSU women's basketball is back in the national scope.

This past season was undoubtedly one of Gunter's and LSU's finest on the court. The Lady Tigers posted 30 wins, the most for a Gunter led team, tied the school record with 11 SEC victories, won the SEC Tournament title, earned the school's first NCAA Tournament No. 1 seed, advanced to the Elite Eight for the third time in school history and finished the season as the No. 3 ranked team in the nation. Individual honors also racked up for the Lady Tigers. Gunter was named the Louisiana Coach of the Year and the Regional Coach of the Year by the Women's Basketball Coaches Association and on Jan. 16 she won her 400th game as LSU head coach at home against Kentucky. Seimone Augustus was the consensus National Freshman of the Year, while she joined Temeka Johnson as an All-American.

The success of the 2002-03 team also put a record

number of people in the Pete Maravich Assembly Center. LSU averaged 4,457 paid attendance in the PMAC, the 19th best average in the nation and almost triple the amount from years past for the Lady Tigers. Another attendance record was shattered during the year as 15,217 fans paid to see No. 3 LSU battle No. 2 Tennessee in the PMAC on Feb. 23, marking the fourth largest crowd to see a basketball game (men's or women's) in the PMAC and the largest women's crowd to see a game in the state of Louisiana. The year ended with Gunter being inducted into her home state of Mississippi's Sports Hall of Fame.

Two seasons ago was one of Gunter's toughest in terms of having to overcome adversity. LSU lost three players to knee injuries during the season and all-American DeTrina White was out for the year with foot problems, but the Lady Tigers managed to win 18 games

despite playing most of the season with seven healthy players. LSU and Gunter won the heart of the nation by making it to the championship game of the SEC Tournament and the second round of the NCAA Tournament with the "Magnificent Seven."

The 1999-2000 season was special for Gunter as well. Not only did she direct the Lady Tigers to a 25-7 mark, including a berth in the NCAA Tournament Elite Eight, where LSU fell to eventual national champion Connecticut, but she posted her 600th career victory on Jan. 13, 2000, at Arkansas. The year was culminated in June with her induction into the Women's Basketball Hall of Fame, located in Knoxville, Tenn.

The 1998-99 season may have been one of Gunter's best on the bench as she took a team with only one senior to a 22-8 overall mark and a second-place finish in the

SEC. After being picked to finish eighth in the SEC, the Lady Tigers won a then school-record 10 league games, including a win over top-ranked Tennessee, and reached the Sweet 16 at the NCAA Tournament for the second time in three years. As a result, Gunter was named SEC Coach of the Year by both her peers and the Associated Press. She was also named the Women's Basketball Coaches Association District 3 Coach of the Year.

In 1997-98, the Lady Tigers, after losing one of the best senior classes in school history, advanced to the Women's NIT semifinals before falling to Baylor. LSU beat a couple of top 10 teams at home and one of the season highlights came on Jan. 18 when the Lady Tigers shattered the school's then single-game attendance record for Pack the PMAC II when 7,255 fans showed up to see LSU beat Ole Miss, 69-56.

The 1996-97 season was perhaps the most rewarding for Gunter in all her years of coaching as she was named the SEC Coach of the Year for the first time after leading the Lady Tigers to a 25-5 overall mark and a berth in the NCAA Tournament's Sweet 16. LSU finished the year ranked No. 9 in the nation in the AP poll and the Lady Tigers had a then school-record nine SEC wins, which included victories over Tennessee, Alabama, Auburn and two over Arkansas. In addition, Gunter proved that women's basketball could become a hit in Baton Rouge as fans flocked to see the Lady Tigers in record fashion as LSU broke every school attendance record that year.

The success of the 1996-97 team was a direct result of what happened to LSU in 1995-96. The 1995-96 team posted the biggest turnaround in SEC history, posting a 21-11 record after going 7-20 the year prior. However, the season proved to be bitter sweet for LSU as the Lady Tigers were denied a spot in the 64-team NCAA Tournament despite beating second-ranked Georgia in the SEC Tournament the week prior to the tournament selection. LSU did advance to the Women's National

Invitational Tournament (WNIT) where they finished third after pounding Arkansas in the third place game.

Prior to the turnaround in 1995-96, the three years prior were tough on both Gunter and the Lady Tigers. But there were some bright spots. Despite posting a 7-20 mark in 1995, Gunter won the 500th game of her career on Feb. 9 when the Lady Tigers routed Jackson State, 92-62. In that same game, LSU's Cornelia Gayden set an NCAA record by hitting 12 3-point goals.

Gunter is so admired by her peers that despite LSU's losing record in 1994, she was still honored that year as the recipient of the Carol Eckman Award. The award goes to the coach that shows spirit, integrity and courage in coaching women's basketball.

In 1993, Gunter and the Lady Tigers suffered through their first losing season ever as LSU fell to 9-18 overall and 0-11 in the SEC. Gunter called that season the most trying in her career.

In 1992 the Lady Tigers slipped to 16-13 overall and 4-7 in the SEC. During the 1991-92 campaign, the Lady Tigers made a late season push to make the NCAA Tournament, however, their hopes were dashed after Tennessee beat LSU in the final seconds during the second round of the SEC Tournament.

The 1991 season was one of firsts for the Lady Tigers and Gunter as they captured their first SEC Tournament title by defeating eventual national champion Tennessee, 80-75, in the finals. Also during that season, LSU defeated Louisiana Tech for the first time since 1978, defeated Auburn for the first time since 1984 and, for the first time in her career, Gunter defeated both Stephen F. Austin and Tennessee.

The Lady Tigers finished the 1991 season with a 24-7 record and ranked No. 8 in the final AP poll, while point guard Pokey Chatman earned Kodak All-America honors.

During her silver anniversary year of coaching in 1989, Gunter collected her 400th career victory with a win over the University of Pacific. Also during that season, the Lady Tigers posted a 19-11 record and advanced to the Midwest Regional of the NCAA Tournament. In the second round of the NAAs, Gunter led LSU to a come-from-behind win over Purdue, before losing to Louisiana Tech. With one of the nation's toughest schedules in 1989, Gunter's team once again surprised critics by defeating four Top 10 teams with only one senior on the squad.

Gunter became the winningest coach in LSU women's basketball history during the 1987 season surpassing Jinks Coleman. During that season, Gunter led the Lady Tigers to their fifth 20-plus win season with a 20-8 mark and a No. 14 ranking in the final AP poll.

The 1986 season was probably one of the most satisfying for Gunter as the Lady Tigers posted a 27-6 record and appeared in the SEC title game. However, a trip to the Final Four that season was denied with a 67-65 loss to Tennessee in the Mideast Regional Finals.

During the 1985 season, Gunter led the Lady Tigers to a 20-9 record and to the school's first women's national title, the WNIT, as LSU defeated Florida in the title game.

Gunter's 1984 team started the season with then a school-record 12 straight wins and appeared in the NCAA Tournament for the first time. The Lady Tigers finished the



season ranked No. 8 in the nation and it also ended the brilliant career of the SEC's second leading scorer Joyce Walker.

The 1983 season marked Gunter's first year at LSU and she led the Lady Tigers to a 20-7 record and a No. 20 national ranking in the AP Poll. The inaugural season marked the beginning of a bright future for both Gunter and the Lady Tigers, who finished in a first-place tie in the SEC Western Division that year. As a result, Gunter was named National Coach of the Year by Basketball News, received the Converse Region IV coaching honor, and was chosen the top coach in the state by the Louisiana Sportswriters Association.

Gunter enters the 2003-04 season as the third winningest active women's basketball coach in the nation with an overall record of 681-300, which includes coaching stints at Middle Tennessee, Stephen F. Austin and LSU. Gunter's LSU record stands at 415-213, which makes her the winningest coach in school history.

Under the direction of Gunter, the Lady Tigers have played in 13 NCAA Tournaments, one National Women's Invitational Tournament and two WNIT events. Gunter led LSU to within one game of the Final Four in 1986, 2000 and 2003, while leading the Lady Tigers to a championship at the National Women's Invitational Tournament in 1985. In addition, Gunter has directed LSU to 13 20-plus-win seasons, including one 30-win season.

Prior to her arrival in Baton Rouge, Gunter had a very successful coaching stint at Stephen F. Austin in Nacogdoches, Texas. While at SFA, Gunter built that program into a national powerhouse as she led the LadyJacks to a 266-87 mark in 12 years as head coach. In addition, she led Stephen F. Austin to four top 10 national rankings, which included No. 5 final rankings in 1979 and 1980. While at Stephen F. Austin, Gunter coached four sports - women's basketball, softball, tennis and track. Her basketball teams went to five Association of Intercollegiate Athletics for Women (AIAW) playoffs, won four state titles and earned a regional crown.

After 16 seasons at SFA, she relinquished the reigns and moved into the position of Director of Women's Athletics where she served two years before returning to the coaching ranks at LSU.

Gunter began her coaching career at Middle Tennessee State where she led the Blue Raiders to undefeated seasons in both of her years there.

Sue Gunter -- International Coach

Sue Gunter's impressive coaching credentials don't end with her contributions to the college game as she has also played a big part in the success of the United States in women's basketball on the international level.

In 1980, Gunter was selected as the head women's basketball coach for the United States Olympic Team. Gunter guided her team to the title at the Olympic Qualifying Tournament prior to the Olympics. However, Gunter and her team were denied a chance at a gold medal due to the United States' boycott of the Olympic Games, which were held in Moscow, that year.

Gunter has tasted success at the Olympics, however, as she was an assistant coach on the 1976 U. S. Team which captured the silver medal in Montreal.

Gunter has also served as head coach for the U.S. National Team three times, as she led those squads in 1976, 1978 and 1980.

Sue Gunter -- Off The Court

Gunter received her Bachelor and Master's degrees in 1962 from Peabody College in Nashville, Tenn. She followed that with post-graduate work at Texas Women's University.

A fine player in her own right, Gunter played AAU basketball for Nashville Business College from 1958-62 earning AAU All-America honors. She was also a member of the 1960-62 United States teams that competed against the Soviet Union.

Gunter has also become very active in many community service areas throughout Baton Rouge. This year alone, Gunter has played an active role in the Baton Rouge Area Lupas Foundation and she served as the honorary chairperson for the Walk for Alzheimer's in Baton Rouge. Gunter was also a finalist for the 1997 YWCA Women of Achievement Award, which recognizes the top women in the Baton Rouge community for contributions to their field.

LSU had wins over 17th-ranked Auburn and 16th-ranked Ole Miss during the season.

March 4, 1991 • SEC Tournament Finals • Albany, Ga.

LSU beat its second top five opponent in as many days and captured its first SEC Tournament title in the process with an 80-75 win over fourth-ranked

Tennessee. Pokey Chatman led LSU with 30 points, including 16 straight at one point.

#23 LSU 76, #7 Vanderbilt 69

Jan. 11, 1992 • Baton Rouge, La.

Barbara Henderson scored 29 points as LSU stunned seventh-ranked Vanderbilt 76-69, in Baton Rouge. The win over Vanderbilt marked the last time an LSU team beat a ranked opponent until the 1996 season.

LSU 73, #2 Georgia 71

March 3, 1996 • SEC Tourn. 2nd Round • Chattanooga, Tenn.

LSU shocked the women's basketball world as the Lady Tigers upset second-ranked and SEC regular-season champion Georgia in the second round of the SEC Tournament, 73-71, in Chattanooga, Tenn. The win marked only the third time in school history that LSU had beaten a team ranked as high as No. 2 in the nation. Pietra Gay led LSU with 24 points.

#14 LSU 84, #5 Alabama 74

Feb. 1, 1997 • Baton Rouge, La.

Pietra Gay scored 22 points and had seven rebounds as LSU knocked off fifth-ranked Alabama, 84-74, in Baton Rouge. The win over Alabama is the first for LSU since the 1991 season.

#13 LSU 83, #8 Tennessee 78

Feb. 22, 1997 • Baton Rouge, La.

Elaine Powell scored 32 points as Sue Gunter beat Tennessee for only the second time in her career in the Lady Tigers' 83-78 win over the eventual national champion Lady Vols. The victory also gave LSU a school-record nine SEC wins and clinched a third place finish in the SEC for the Lady Tigers.

LSU 67, #10 Florida 57

Jan. 24, 1998 • Baton Rouge, La.

Katrina Hibbert scored 17 points and Latasha Dorsey added 15 points and eight rebounds as the unranked Lady Tigers knocked off 10th-ranked Florida in Baton Rouge by a 67-57 count. The win was the 14th straight at home for the Lady Tigers and the first against Florida since 1991.

LSU 57, #10 Vanderbilt 46

Feb. 7, 1998 • Baton Rouge, La.

Ashley Bankston scored a career-high 19 points as unranked LSU beat 10th-ranked Vanderbilt, 57-46. LSU limited Vanderbilt to just 34.0 percent from the field as only one Commodore scored in double-figures.

#23 LSU 72, #1 Tennessee 69

Feb. 22, 1999 • Baton Rouge, La.

Katrina Hibbert conventional 3-point play with 11.7 seconds lifted LSU to a 72-69 win over top-ranked Tennessee. The win was the first by LSU over a team ranked No. 1 in the nation and it gave the Lady Tigers a then school-record 10th SEC victory. Hibbert, who was named SEC Player of the Week for her efforts, led the Lady Tigers with 18 points.

#21 LSU 74, #8 Notre Dame 64

March 15, 1999 • NCAA Second Rounds • Baton Rouge, La.

Latasha Dorsey scored 24 points to lead LSU to a second round NCAA win over Notre Dame. Trailing 59-51 with 8:11 to play, the Lady Tigers used a 23-5 run over the games' final eight minutes to advance to Sweet 16. Dorsey scored 15 of LSU's final 23 points. The win extended LSU's home court winning streak against non-conference teams to 36 straight.

#23 LSU 80, #2 Georgia 74

Dec. 2, 1999 • Athens, Ga.

Four Lady Tigers scored in double-figures to lead LSU to the huge road victory. April Brown poured in 25 points on 9-of-14 shooting from the field, and Marie Ferdinand added 21 points, six assists and four steals. Katrina Hibbert hit three 3-pointers and recorded 16 points, eight rebounds and six assists, while DeTrina White added 10 points and five rebounds. Brown and

Hibbert shared SEC Player of the Week honors after the triumph.

#12 LSU 79, #7 Duke 66

March 25, 2000 • NCAA Sweet 16 • Richmond, Va.

LSU advanced to the NCAA Elite Eight for the second time in school history by overwhelming the Blue Devils. The Lady Tigers trailed, 31-30, at halftime, but shot 56.7 percent in the second half, outscoring Duke, 49-35, to win by a comfortable margin. Marie Ferdinand scored 22 points, dished out eight assists and recorded three steals while DeTrina White contributed 19 points and 11 rebounds.

#16 LSU 62, #6 Purdue 55

Dec. 16, 2000 • Indianapolis, Ind.

Marie Ferdinand scored 20 of her 25 points in the second half as LSU rallied from a 15 point second-half deficit to upset No. 6 Purdue, 62-55. With 38 seconds remaining, Ferdinand hit a lay up and was fouled to break a 55-55 tie. She hit the free throw to give LSU a three-point lead. After a defensive stop, Angelia Crockett hit two free throws to put away the Boilermakers.

LSU 84, #15 Florida 59

Jan. 10, 2002 • Baton Rouge, La.

LSU recorded the largest win over a ranked opponent in three years with the victory over the Lady Gators. The Lady Tigers poured in on on the first half, taking a 42-17 lead into the locker room. Temeka Johnson scored a career-high 29 points, while Scholanda Dorrell added 13 points and 10 rebounds.

LSU 72, #9 South Carolina 62

Feb. 17, 2002 • Baton Rouge, La.

LSU shot 55 percent from the field in the second half and outscored USC 29-3 at the free throw line in the upset win. Aiysha Smith led the way with 18 points and 12 rebounds, while Doneeka Hodges hit for 17 points. Temeka Johnson added a solid effort with nine points, nine assists and eight rebounds.

LSU 81, #3 Tennessee 80

March 2, 2002 • Nashville, Tenn.

Temeka Johnson made 12 of 15 free throws, including one with 4.5 seconds remaining to upset No. 1 seed Tennessee in the semifinals of the SEC Tournament. Johnson finished the game with 18 points and 10 assists and Doneeka Hodges added 23 points, while Aiysha Smith had 14 points.

#6 LSU 78, #3 Tennessee 62

March 9, 2003 • Little Rock, Ark.

Temeka Johnson earned MVP honors of the SEC Tournament by scoring a career-high 24 points to lead LSU past Tennessee in the SEC Tournament Championship game. Johnson added nine rebounds and seven assists, while Aiysha Smith had 18 points and Seimone Augustus added 12 points and eight rebounds. LSU never trailed in the game, and led 42-25 at the break.

#3 LSU 69, #5 Louisiana Tech 63

March 30, 2003 • Palo Alto, Calif.

In one of the greatest come-from-behind victories in NCAA Tournament history, LSU trailed 50-33 with 14 minutes to play in the game and mounted a 36-13 comeback to advance to the West Regional Final. The Lady Tigers, down 33-23 at the break, shot 56 percent from the floor in the second half and hit eight of nine free throws in the final 20 minutes. Aiysha Smith led the way with 19 points, while Seimone Augustus added 14 points and DeTrina White added 10 points and six rebounds off the bench.

Chatman

Associate Coach - 13th Season

Dana "Pokey" Chatman enters her 13th season on the LSU women's basketball staff, and her fifth as an associate coach after being elevated to her current position in September 1999. Chatman, who dazzled LSU fans for four years as LSU's starting point guard in the late 1980s and early 1990s, is considered one of the best recruiters in the nation.

In addition to having a reputation as one of the nation's best recruiters, Chatman is also thought to be one of the top up-and-coming coaches in the collegiate ranks. Chatman has led LSU's recruiting efforts over the last eight years and as a result, the Lady Tigers have had seven straight classes rank among the top 20 in the nation, including this year's class of newcomers which was rated among the best in the country by some publications.

Chatman helped LSU land another top incoming freshmen class this season, in WBCA All-Star and South Carolina Player of the Year Amber Long, All-American Marian Whitfield out of Georgia, Swedish National team member Hanna Biernacka and New Orleans native Khalilah Mitchell.

The previous four years were also highly productive for Chatman. She helped the Lady Tigers land 2002 National High School Player of the Year Seimone Augustus last year, Aiysha Smith, a Kodak Junior College All-American who was recently drafted by the Washington Mystics of the WNBA, two years ago, prep All-American Doneeka Hodges and AAU teammate Temeka Johnson out of New Orleans three years ago and Ke-Ke Tardy, the top player in Mississippi and ranked the 11th best player in the nation prior to the 1998-99 season.

Chatman was also responsible for bringing DeTrina White, one of the top 15 rated players in the country in 1998, who went on to become the 1998-99 National Freshman of the Year.

Besides coordinating all of LSU's recruiting efforts, Chatman also serves as the director for the Sue Gunter Basketball Camp. Chatman's primary on-court responsibility is the coaching and teaching of LSU's backcourt. Chatman is also involved in developing game plans during the season.

Since joining the Lady Tigers staff, Chatman has tutored some of the finest guards in the country. Marie Ferdinand was a 2001 Kodak All-American selection and a finalist for the prestigious Naismith Award, given to the nation's best collegiate player. In addition to averaging over 21 points a game her senior season, she was a finalist for the Shooting Guard of the

Year Award given out by ESPN. Ferdinand, a first round draft pick in the WNBA, is currently playing for the San Antonio Silver Stars and is a two-time WNBA All-Star.

Chatman also worked with Cornelia Gayden, a three-time All-SEC pick who holds the NCAA record for 3-point goals in a single-game with 12 against Jackson State. Other standouts under Chatman include Elaine Powell, a two-time first-team All-SEC selection, Pietra Gay, an All-SEC pick in 1997, and Latasha Dorsey, a first team Defensive All-American in 1999. Powell was the starting point guard in the 2003 World Champion Detroit Shock, while Gay was a member of the 1997 WNBA World Champion Houston Comets.

Before being named to assistant coach prior to the 1992-93 season, Chatman served one season, 1991-92, as a student assistant with the Lady Tigers.

Chatman, a Kodak All-American point guard for the Lady Tigers in 1991, graduated from Hahnville High School in 1987. She received her Bachelor's degree from LSU in December of 1991.

During her four years with the Lady Tigers, Chatman started all but one game and is the school's all-time assists and steals leader with 570 and 346, respectively. She is also fifth on the all-time scoring list with 1,826 points. Chatman played in the NCAA Tournament four times and she posted a four-year record of 82-38.

Chatman was a three-time All-SEC selection and in 1991 she led the Lady Tigers to their first-ever SEC Tournament title. Chatman was named MVP of the 1991 SEC Tournament, also a first for LSU.

Chatman capped her career at LSU by being selected to the prestigious Kodak All-American team following her senior season in 1991. Chatman is one of only four Lady Tigers ever named to the Kodak team. Chatman set a total of 20 school records while at LSU with five of those records still standing.

Chatman was inducted into the LSU Athletics Hall of Fame in the spring of 1999.

Assistant Coach - Third Season

Carla Berry enters her third season as an assistant coach for the Lady Tigers and will primarily oversee academics and assist in all facets of recruiting. Berry was an outstanding guard for the LSU women's basketball team from 1988-92 and was a member of the 1991 SEC Tournament championship team.

Bringing four years of recruiting experience to the program, Berry joined the accomplished LSU staff that has had seven signing classes rank among the top 20 in the nation over the last eight years, three of which have been ranked in the top 10. In just her first year on the staff, Berry helped the Lady Tigers sign one of the nation's top classes that included National High School Player of the Year Seimone Augustus prior to last season.

The opportunity to return to LSU was one that Berry could not pass up after having played for Coach Gunter and the Lady Tigers. As one of the team's chief recruiters, her commitment to the program and its success is personal and transcends just her professional obligations as a coach.

As a former LSU player, Berry has the ability to discuss the strengths of the program with recruits and lay out the opportunities LSU has to offer its student-athletes.

Berry, an Academic All-SEC selection in 1992, helped LSU advance to three NCAA Tournament appearances and was a part of the Lady Tigers' 1991 SEC Tournament Championship team. In 1993, she earned her bachelor's degree in advertising.

After graduating, she returned home to Alabama where she spent one season as a graduate assistant coach for the University of South Alabama in 1993-94. Berry then took a position as an assistant coach and recruiting coordinator for Cal Poly-San Luis Obispo in 1994 as the Mustangs made the difficult transition from NCAA Division II to Division I competition.

Taking a position at St. John's University in 1995, she spent three years with the women's basketball program as the top assistant and recruiting coordinator, working with current Lady Tiger administrative assistant Joe Carvalhido. Coaching a team that was

in the process of rebuilding, the program showed improvement each year she was there, including a 13-win season in her final year. Additionally, in her three seasons at St. John's, the Red Storm penned a pair of recruiting classes ranked in the top 50 nationally, including one top 25 class that included former Lady Tiger and current Washington Mystic Aiysha Smith.

In addition to her recruiting responsibilities at LSU, Berry will also oversee academics for the Lady Tigers. Working closely with the Cox Communication Academic Center for Student-Athletes, she will help coordinate study hall and tutoring, while monitoring the academic progress for the student-athletes. Her primary on-court assignment will be coaching LSU's guards.

Berry spent two years working in sales for Cingular Wireless (formerly BellSouth Mobility) in her hometown of Mobile, Ala., prior to joining the Lady Tigers staff. She took the two years off from coaching to assist with an illness in the family.

BOB Starkey

Assistant Coach -15th Season

Bob Starkey enters his sixth season on the LSU women's basketball staff after joining the team on a full-time basis in 1998. Starkey had served as the administrative assistant for both the LSU men's and women's basketball team for two years prior to joining the Lady Tigers as assistant coach.

Starkey works with all phases of the program, which includes working with both perimeter and post players on the practice floor. He also breaks down game tape and develops game plans while compiling scouting reports on LSU's opponents. Starting three years ago, Starkey added recruiting to his list of responsibilities. He brought a wealth of experience to the Lady Tigers' recruiting efforts, having worked as a recruiter for LSU men's basketball, at Marshall University, and at West Virginia State.

In his first year working as a recruiter for the Lady Tigers, Starkey helped sign a class of newcomers that ranked as high as fifth nationally, including Kodak Junior College All-American Aiysha Smith. In his second year on the recruiting trail, Starkey helped LSU ink one of the best classes in the nation, which includes Baton Rouge native Seimone Augustus.

In addition, Starkey handles all scheduling for the Lady Tigers, serves as the Director of the LSU women's basketball teams' Fast Break Club, and is also involved in all areas of promotions for the women's program. With his help, the Lady Tigers had a banner year in 2002-03, drawing 4,457 fans per game in the PMAC, almost tripling the previous year's average. The Lady Tigers had at least 3,000 fans attend nine of the team's 15 home games, including the two largest crowds in school history with 15,217 against Tennessee on Feb. 23 and 11,252 against Penn State on Jan. 4.

As the administrative assistant, Starkey provided valuable assistance to both the men's and women's programs, handling many of the responsibilities for both groups that would ease the work load for the coaching staff, allowing them to concentrate fully on their teams, recruiting and future opponents.

Starkey served as tournament director for the 1997 NCAA Women's Basketball Subregional held at the Maravich Assembly Center. The NCAA Subregional was the first for LSU to host and it was also called by many that attended the event as one of the best-run subregionals since the NCAA changed tournament formats.

Perhaps Starkey's finest achievement in the role of administrative assistant came in the Pack the PMAC games. In the 1997 Pack the PMAC contest against Arkansas, LSU drew a school-record 6,552 fans for the contest. The 6,552 fans for the contest nearly tripled the previous record crowd of 2,454 set against Ole Miss in 1984. A year later against Ole Miss, LSU reset the school-mark with a crowd of 7,255 for Pack the PMAC II. Three years ago, the school record crowd of 9,636 for the Pack the PMACV game against Auburn was at the time the largest attendance ever for a women's basketball game in the state of Louisiana. This past year 11,252

fans packed the PMAC for nationally televised game against Penn State, setting both the LSU and state record, only to be broken later in the season when 15,217 paid to see No. 3 LSU battle No. 2 Tennessee. The Pack the PMAC promotion has developed into an LSU tradition, as Pack the PMACVIII will take place this season.

Prior to his stint as an administrative assistant, Starkey served as an assistant coach for Dale Brown on the LSU men's basketball staff from 1990-1996, during which time the Tigers participated in four NCAA Tournaments. While on the men's staff, Starkey coached three first-round NBA draft picks in Shaquille O'Neal, Chris Jackson and Stanley Roberts. As a recruiter, he helped sign three nationally-ranked recruiting classes, including one which was rated No. 1 in the country.

Groomed on the high school level in West Virginia, Starkey started his coaching career as an assistant at Winfield High School where he helped guide the boys' program to a five-year record of 72-45 and the girls' program to an 87-23 record.

Starkey then made his first appearance in the collegiate ranks as an assistant at West Virginia College on the NAIA level. In his three-year stint at West Virginia State, the program blossomed with improving records of 17-10, 26-4 and 31-4. That final season saw the Yellow Jackets capture conference and district titles on their way to the NAIA National Championship game, where they were a one-point loser to Washburn University.

Following that, Starkey also served for one year at Poca High School in West Virginia with his former high school coach, Allen Osborne, and teamed up for the 1988-89 season with Judy Southard to lead the women's program at Marshall to an 18-10 record and a regular season Southern Conference Championship. Southard is now in her third year as the Senior Woman Administrator at LSU after serving as the Athletic Director at Texas Women's University.

Starkey, who considers himself a full-time student of the game, has written numerous articles and has authored such basketball books as The 2-3 Match-Up Defense and Motion Offense.

His latest project is a Basketball Coaching Series of books that include The Art of Being An Assistant Coach, The Art of Scouting and The Art of Motivation.

The native of Charleston, W.V., is married to Sherie Hayslett, also a native of West Virginia.

A SEASON TO Remember

Not many people will forget what the Lady Tigers did in 2002-03

The LSU Lady Tigers will always remember last season. The program earned its first No. 1 seed in the NCAA Tournament and advanced to its third "Elite Eight" before falling to Texas. LSU also won 30 games for the first time under head coach **Sue Gunter** and the second time in school history.

The season began with a record setting start that included 15 straight wins to open the season and a No. 2 national ranking, the highest since 1977-78. The first victory of the season was also memorable as the Lady Tigers defeated Arizona in Tucson 78-71 in overtime behind super freshman **Seimone Augustus'** record 27-point performance in her debut. Also among the 15 consecutive victories was a 76-58 win over then-No. 15 Texas and a 80-63 win over then-No. 15 Penn State. The Penn State game was in front of a national television audience and a school record 11,252 paid fans inside the Pete Maravich Assembly Center.

That attendance record would not hold up long, as just four weeks later the Lady Tigers hosted No. 3 Tennessee in front of a packed house of 15,217 paid, the fourth largest crowd to see a basketball game (men's or women's) in PMAC history.

The season saw LSU win a school-record tying 11 Southeastern Conference games and produced the best home record in four seasons with a 14-1 mark. An Arkansas victory over the Lady Tigers in January snapped the 15-game winning streak, but LSU rattled off eight straight to follow before another setback when

Tennessee upended LSU at home, 68-65.

The Lady Tigers entered the SEC Tournament as the No. 2 seed despite losing two of the last three regular season games, but that did not matter. LSU avenged all three regular season losses on its way to its first SEC Tournament Championship in 12 years by defeating then-No. 23 Arkansas in the first game, then-No. 15 Vanderbilt in the semifinals and then-No. 3 Tennessee in the title game.

Personal milestones, records and honors were also achieved during the spectacular season. **Gunter** earned her 400th victory at LSU on Jan. 16 in a win over Kentucky. Gunter was named the Louisiana Coach of the Year by the LSWA and was the WBCA's Regional Coach of the Year. Senior center **DeTrina White** became the 21st player to score 1,000 points in her career, doing so against Washington State on Nov. 29. She also became the seventh player in school history to have at least 1,000 points and 800 rebounds in her career. **Seimone Augustus** became the first LSU player since 1994 to record 19 rebounds in a game against Georgia, earning her the SEC Player of the Week honors, while senior post **Aiysha Smith** poured in 30 points, the most by a Lady Tiger since 2001, in a triple overtime win over Santa Barbara on her way to the SEC Player of the Week honors. Augustus was tabbed USBWA National Freshman of the Year and the SEC Freshman of the Year as well as second-team All-SEC by both the coaches and AP, while Smith and junior guard **Temeka Johnson** earned honorable mention All-SEC

by the coaches. Johnson was also the SEC Tournament MVP and Augustus was named to the all-tournament team.

GUNTER GETS 400!

LSU head coach **Sue Gunter**, in her 21st season with the Lady Tigers, reached 400 victories in her career at LSU with the 82-39 win over Kentucky on Jan. 16th. Gunter has 681 career wins that includes 266 wins in 12 seasons at Stephen F. Austin prior to her stay in Baton Rouge.

IN THE POLLS

LSU finished the season ranked No. 3 by the Associated Press and No. 5 by the coaches. The AP poll is final before the NCAA Tournament, while the coaches poll is completed at the conclusion of the tournament. LSU's final rankings are the highest in school history. It is also the sixth time the Lady Tigers have finished in the top 10 in the polls.

AGAINST THE RANKS

The Lady Tigers were 13-4 against top 25 teams in 2002-03, the most wins against top 25 teams in a single season for LSU. The previous best was eight wins during the 1977-78 season.

SEIMONE NATION'S TOP FRESHMAN

Seimone Augustus was named the National Freshman of the Year by the USBWA, Basketball Times, Gballmag.com and WOMENSCOLLEGEHOOPS.com. The 6-1 guard led the Lady Tigers in scoring, field goal percentage and free throw percentage, and was second in rebounding. She finished the season in fifth-place in points by a freshman at LSU and had the second highest field goal percentage by a freshman in school history. The Baton Rouge native joins **DeTrina White** as the only two Lady Tigers to earn National Freshman of the Year honors. Women's Basketball News Service gave White the honor in 1999.

GUNTER HONORED BY TWO STATES

Head coach Sue Gunter, not only was named the Louisiana Sports Writers Association Coach of the Year, but she was also inducted into the Mississippi Sports Hall of Fame. Gunter received the LSWA honor on April 3 and was inducted into the Hall of Fame on April 4.

AP ALL-AMERICANS

Seimone Augustus and **Temeka Johnson** were both honored by the Associated Press in the postseason. Augustus was tabbed third-team All-America by the AP, while Johnson was named honorable mention All-America by the media organization.

SEC TOURNAMENT CHAMPS!

LSU won the SEC Tournament title for the first time since 1991 and just the second time in school history. This year's run to the title was similar to that of the 1991 season. This year's Lady Tigers avenged all three of their regular season losses in the tournament, the 1991 team avenged two of their losses. This year's team defeated Tennessee in the title game and the Lady Tigers defeated the Lady Vols in the championship game in 1991. In addition, LSU's point guard **Temeka Johnson**, was named MVP of the tournament. In 1991, **Pokey Chatman**, the team's point guard, was named the tournament MVP.

D-TRAIN GOES OUT IN STYLE

DeTrina White ended her stellar career at LSU ranked 13th in career points scored with 1,167, seventh in career rebounds with 840, third in career blocks with 100 and second in career field goal percentage with a 61.1 clip. With her blocked shot against Louisiana Tech in the West regional semifinal, she became the second player in school history to record over 1,000 points, 800 rebounds and 100 blocks, joining Julie Gross (2,488 points, 1,466 rebounds and 178 blocks).

CLOSING IN ON A GRAND

Doneeka Hodges finished her junior season with 996 career points. She sits in 23rd on LSU's career scoring list and needs three points to pass Ke-Ke Tardy for 22nd and needs four points to become the 22nd player in school history to reach 1,000.

CROWDING THE PMAC

The 2003-04 season brought more fans to the PMAC for women's games than any other. The Lady Tigers played before three of the largest crowds in school history. The top crowd in history came on Feb. 23 when 15,217 people paid to see No. 4 LSU battle No. 3 Tennessee. The second largest crowd was the 11,252 that paid to see No. 2 LSU take on No. 15 Penn State for Pack the PMAC 7 on Jan. 4, and the 5,455 fans that paid to see No. 4 LSU face No. 18 Vanderbilt on Jan. 26 marked the 11th largest crowd in school history. In 15 home games this season, LSU drew a record 66,852 people to the PMAC, an average of 4,457 per game!

PACKIN' THE PMAC!

LSU ended the 2002-03 season ranked 19th in the nation in women's basketball attendance, averaging 4,457 per home game.

LSU used a 10-0 run midway through the first half to pull away from Southwest Texas State for the first round victory. The Lady Tigers never trailed in the game and led 47-25 at the break and by as many as 38 in the second half.

Roneeka Hodges sparked the team off the bench with 16 points, while Aiysha Smith had 15 points and seven rebounds. Seimone Augustus added 11 points, while Temeka Johnson had 10 points, six rebounds and five assists as all 13 players played at least two minutes for coach Sue Gunter's squad.

The Lady Tigers shot a LSU NCAA Tournament record 58.8 percent from the field in the game, including 65.4 in the first half, while holding SWTS to 38.3 percent. The Lady Tigers also connected on 88.9 percent of their free throws, hitting 24 of 27 from the charity stripe.

Aiysha Smith led the charge with 19 points, while Seimone Augustus added 14 points. Doneeka Hodges had 11 points and DeTrina White chipped in 10 off the bench. Temeka Johnson had eight points, a team high eight rebounds and nine assists in the victory.

2003 SEC TOURNAMENT CHAMPIONS!

The LSU Lady Tigers run through the Southeastern Conference Tournament was something special. It had been 12 years since LSU last won a tournament title and the Lady Tigers were hungry for the crown.

Standing in the way of the second-seeded Lady Tigers in the opening game were the No. 23 Arkansas Lady Razorbacks, a team that had handed LSU its first defeat of the season in Fayetteville in January.

It would prove to be the closest margin in LSU's run to the title. LSU defeated Arkansas 78-72 thanks to some clutch free throw shooting down the stretch, including Seimone Augustus' two free throws with 19 seconds to play, giving the freshman her 21st and 22nd points of the game and LSU a four point lead.

Four of the five starters for LSU scored in double figures in the opening round victory over Arkansas. In addition to Augustus, Temeka Johnson added 15 points, while Doneeka Hodges and Aiysha Smith both hit for 11 points.

15th-ranked Vanderbilt was the next item on the menu for the Lady Tigers. The Commodores were also a team that had defeated LSU during the regular season. In fact, the defending SEC tournament champions had knocked off LSU just the week before in Nashville and were playing with a lot of confidence heading into the semifinals of the SEC Tournament.

Vandy had so much confidence in themselves they led by as many as nine in the first half and took a 39-35 lead into the locker room at halftime after shooting 51.7 percent from the floor in the opening 20 minutes of play.

LSU did not take its first lead of the game until Seimone Augustus hit a pair of free throws with 17 minutes to play to give the Lady Tigers a 44-43 advantage. The lead went back and forth for most of the second half until LSU closed the game with a 12-2 run in the final four minutes to advance to their second straight SEC Tournament title game.

Augustus took over the game during the final run, scoring 14 of her 20 points in the final four minutes of play. Aiysha Smith led LSU with 21 points, while Temeka Johnson added 12 points and Augustus had nine rebounds to go along with her point total.

The stage was set for the SEC title game, sixth-ranked LSU vs. No. 3 Tennessee for the SEC Championship. A rematch of a 68-65 Lady Vol victory during the regular season in Baton Rouge.

The Lady Tigers took control of the game early, jumping to a 7-0 lead and led 42-25 at the break. Tennessee managed to trim the margin down to 13 with 15 minutes to play before the Lady Tigers took the largest lead of the game at 18 with 10 minutes left.

Temeka Johnson took home the MVP honors after scoring a career-high 24 points in the victory. She added nine rebounds and seven assists in the victory. Aiysha Smith added 18 points, while Seimone Augustus had 12 points and eight rebounds on her way to an all-tournament team selection.

LSU avenged all three of its regular season losses with three wins over three top 25 teams in three days to win the 2003 SEC Tournament Championship.

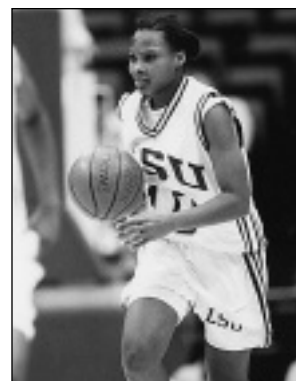

With one of the most dominating forward-center combinations in LSU women's basketball history in Australians Julie Gross and Maree Jackson, the Lady Tigers enjoyed one of their finest seasons ever in 1976-77.

The Lady Tigers, behind the play of Gross and Jackson, started the season off slow, splitting its first four games. With a 2-2 mark, the Lady Tigers then ran off four straight wins, three of which came on the road against Alabama, Northwestern State, and Mississippi State to improve to 6-2. After a road loss to Memphis State, LSU made a run that saw the Lady Tigers win 13 of their next 14 games with the only setback coming at Louisiana Tech.

Southeastern Louisiana snapped LSU's 11-game winning streak with a 106-69 victory over the Lady Tigers in Hammond on Feb. 14. With the loss, LSU's record stood at 19-5 with two regular-season game remaining. LSU won both of those contests, beating Northeastern Louisiana and Southeastern Louisiana in Baton Rouge to end its regular-season with a 21-5 mark.

The Lady Tigers then headed to the AIAW State Tournament in Ruston. LSU easily handled New Orleans in the first round, winning 85-58, followed by a 73-51 victory over Southern. Louisiana Tech stopped LSU in the semifinals as the Techsters posted a 101-88 win over LSU. The Lady Tigers then fell to Northwestern State, 87-82, but the Lady Tigers still managed to finish in second place at the state tournament.

By virtue of its second place finish at the state tournament, LSU advanced to the AIAW Regional Tournament in Monroe.

"We went to the regional tournament with guarded optimism," LSU coach Jinks Coleman said. "I felt we didn't do enough work, but I still felt we had a chance. Until then, we were inconsistent, winning a big game and then losing a little one."

At the regional tournament, the Lady Tigers got on a roll as they whipped Texas, 95-67, in the first round followed by a 76-73 win over a Sue Gunter-coached Stephen F. Austin team in the semifinals. LSU beat Baylor, 92-76, in the championship game to advance to the AIAW National Tournament in Minneapolis, Minn.

At the AIAW National Tournament, the Lady Tigers drew Western Washington in the first round.

"We got a good draw playing Western Washington first," Coleman said. "I did some calling around and found out that they were weak, but they had been to nationals before. We were just so excit-

ed to be there, but I let the team know that we had a chance at winning."

LSU had little trouble with Western Washington as the Lady Tigers, behind 40 points from Maree Jackson, raced out to 49-26 halftime lead and never looked back in their 91-53 win. Next up for the Lady Tigers was Baylor, a team that LSU had already beat twice during the season, which included a victory over the Bears in the regional finals.

LSU was once again victorious over Baylor as the Lady Tigers behind 35 points and 26 rebounds from Maree Jackson advanced with a 71-64 win.

The Lady Tigers then moved into the semifinal round against Immaculata, a powerhouse in women's basketball at the time. Immaculata was ranked No. 2 in the nation and was considered a huge favorite in the contest with the Lady Tigers.

"Immaculata was outstanding," Coleman said before the contest. "We had nothing to lose. On paper, I felt like we could be them, but that was on paper."

Coleman's hunch that LSU could win proved true as the Lady Tigers upset Immaculata, 74-68, despite the fact that Jackson played after having root canal surgery and Brenda McGuffie played with a severely sprained ankle. In addition, Jackson and McGuffie played the final 10 minutes of the contest with four fouls. Jackson finished with 29 points and 19 rebounds, while Gross had 23 points and 11 boards.

"Thelma McCoy and Julie (Gross) really picked up the slack for us," Coleman said.

It was on to the national championship game for LSU as the 11th-ranked Lady Tigers would face top-ranked Delta State for the title.

Delta State scored the first six points of the contest and the Delta Devils quickly built a nine point advantage, 13-4, on a jumper by Debbie Brock at the 15:14 mark. LSU could get no closer than seven points the rest of the way as Lady Tiger All-American Jackson picked up her third foul with 5:54 to play in the first half. Delta State led 34-25 at intermission.

In the second half, Delta State never let the Lady Tigers back in the contest as the Delta Devils held Jackson to a career-low six points in posting a 68-55 victory. Lucy Harris, the best women's player in the country at the time, led Delta State with 23 points and 16 rebounds.

The Lady Tigers finished the year with an overall record of 29-8 and ranked No. 11 in the nation. That team still holds the distinction of being the only Lady Tiger team ever to reach the national championship game of a post-season tournament.

LSU advanced to the NCAA for the fifth straight year and for the first time in school history earned a No. 1 seed in the Field of 64. The Lady Tigers were the top team in the West Region and were sent to Eugene, Ore., to play the first two rounds. LSU got past Southwest Texas 86-50 in the opening round before defeating UW-Green Bay 80-69 to advance to the Sweet 16 for the first time since 2000. The West Regional Semifinal pitted rivals LSU against Louisiana Tech in Palo Alto, Calif. The Lady Tigers overcame a 17-point deficit to defeat the Lady Techsters 69-63 to reach the Elite Eight for the third time in school history before falling to No. 2 seed Texas in the Regional Final.

Over the last seven years, the LSU women's basketball team has established the Pete Maravich Assembly Center as one of the toughest road playing sites in not only the Southeastern Conference, but in the nation. Since the 1996-97 season, the Lady Tigers have posted a remarkable home record of 97-11 (.898), which is second only to Tennessee in the SEC.

In all, over the last six years, LSU has won six NCAA Tournament games and a pair of Women's NIT contests at the PMAC. Throw in the fact that LSU is 20-9 at home against top 25 teams over the last seven years, and the PMAC can back up its claim as one of the nation's most-feared road sites. In addition to their success on the court, the Lady Tigers are also playing before record crowds. Last season, LSU shattered its attendance records for both a season and single-game. An average of 4,457 fans paid to see the Lady Tigers play in the PMAC in 2002-03, including nine games with over 3,000 paid attendance. LSU also set the single-game record twice during the 2002-03 season. On Jan. 4 LSU hosted Penn State in "Pack the PMAC VII" and drew 11,252 paid fans, marking the first women's basketball game in LSU history to draw over 10,000 fans. But, less than two months later the fourth-ranked Lady Tigers hosted No. 3 Tennessee in a showdown in the PMAC. 15,217 fans paid to enter the PMAC for what was arguably the biggest home game crowd in school history. Tennessee won the game, but LSU has smashed the single-game attendance figure for both LSU and the state. In fact, the 15,217 was the fourth largest crowd to see a LSU basketball game in the PMAC, men's or women's.

Although LSU had a 41-game home winning streak against non-ranked opponents snapped three seasons ago by Auburn, the Lady Tigers are still 81-3 over the last seven years. LSU posted undefeated records at home over non-ranked opponents in 2002-03 (8-0), 2001-02 (11-0), 1999-

00 (17-0), 1998-99 (11-0) and 1996-97 (11-0).

In 1999-00, the Lady Tigers set a school-record with 17 home victories with their only loss coming at the hands of second-ranked Tennessee.

The 1996-97 season proved to be the starting point for LSU's success at home. That year, the Lady Tigers posted a 14-1 home mark and knocked off such teams as eventual national champion Tennessee as well as fifth-ranked Alabama, and 13th-ranked Arkansas. In addition to the victories, LSU drew a then school-record crowd of 6,552 for the "Pack the PMAC" contest against Arkansas. After the Arkansas contest, LSU drew three more crowds that ranked in the top ten as 5,502 fans witnessed the LSU-Marquette NCAA second round contest, 5,260 for the LSU-Maine NCAA first round game, and 3,731 for the LSU-Tennessee game. Overall in 1996-97, LSU drew a then school-record 31,259 fans for its 15 home games for a school record average of 2,084 a contest.

In 28 years at the PMAC, LSU's home court advantage can be compared with the best programs from across the country as the Lady Tigers have won 77 percent of their homes games with a 288-85 overall mark. The Lady Tigers have recorded a 86-46 mark in SEC contests. LSU has also put together winning streaks of 26, 24 and 22 games at home. The Lady Tigers have also gone undefeated twice, going 14-0 in both 1977-78 and 1985-86.

Built in 1971 and seating 14,164 spectators, the massive \$11.5 million building competes with its neighbor across the street -- Tiger Stadium -- as the most visible structure on the LSU campus.

During the summer of 1988, Louisiana Governor Buddy Roemer signed legislation changing the official name of the building to the Pete Maravich Assembly Center in honor of the LSU star who had died tragically earlier that same year.

In addition to the normal basketball-seating configuration, a proscenium stage can be lowered into place at the north end allowing some 4,500 seats for theatrical productions. An additional 1,000 seats can be placed on the floor for graduations, convocations, lectures, concerts or other special events.

Also located in the building is an auxiliary practice gym used for basketball and volleyball practices and various P.E. classes; home and visitor dressing rooms; coaches dressing rooms, building administration offices; theater dressing rooms; Tiger Athletic Foundation offices; and the "L" Club meeting room with kitchen facilities.

The Assembly Center has been the site for both men's and women's NCAA Regional Tournaments, the 1981 SEC Women's Basketball Tournament, the 1988 SEC Men's Basketball Tournament and two SEC Volleyball Tournaments and will be the site of the 2004 NCAA Tournament First & Second rounds.

What started out as a dream seven years ago has developed into one of the biggest and the best promotional events in all of women's basketball, as Pack the PMAC returns for year number eighth this season.

The concept of Pack the PMAC is simple - a blowout ticket giveaway throughout Baton Rouge and surrounding communities in an attempt to fill the Pete Maravich Assembly Center for a women's basketball game. After seven years, Pack the PMAC has blossomed into a much-anticipated event and it will once again be the highlight of the LSU women's basketball schedule. This year's Pack the PMAC game is set for Sunday, Jan. 11 for a televised Southeastern Conference match-up with rival Auburn.

Starting in the fall, LSU uses various outlets to promote both the game and the "Flying Frenzy" halftime contest. To add more interest to the event, Jon Fos and Levis Mitsubishi annually donate a Montero Sport, valued at over \$25,000 to be given away at halftime if a fan can throw a paper airplane through the sunroof. At Pack the PMAC IV, Rich Bisson became the first person in the history of the event to win the vehicle. In addition to the car giveaway, there are also televisions, shopping sprees, and other items that can be won in the halftime "Flying Frenzy" contest.

In seven years the event has become a tremendous

success, but more important than the actual game is the fact that Baton Rouge has finally become introduced, and welcomed, to LSU women's basketball at its finest hour.

Since the first Pack the PMAC contest in 1997, LSU has had the school's 10 largest crowds, which includes nine crowds of 5,000 or better. Prior to 1997, the Lady Tigers had never played before a crowd larger than 2,500 at the Maravich Assembly Center. Seven of LSU's top eight home crowds have come at Pack the PMAC, including the first crowd over 10,000 fans at a women's basketball game in the state of Louisiana at this past year's Pack the PMAC when 11,252 fans paid to see the Lady Tigers defeat Penn State on CBS.

In the first year, the Lady Tigers drew a school-record crowd of 6,552 as LSU beat Arkansas, 79-72. A year later, for Pack the PMAC II, LSU reset the school-record as 7,255 witnessed the Lady Tigers' 69-56 win over Mississippi.

In 1999-00, 6,352 fans witnessed the first nationally televised broadcast of an LSU women's basketball game as the Lady Tigers knocked off Arkansas, 68-51 on ESPN2. Pack the PMAC V drew a then school-record 9,636 fans, which was at the time the largest attendance ever at a women's basketball game in the state of Louisiana. The 2001-02 Pack the PMAC game collected 8,153 fans, the 10th largest crowd in state history.

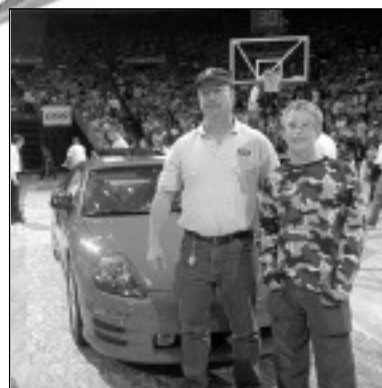

SEC Tournament Titles



1991 SEC Champions

LSU claimed its first Tournament title in 1991 as the Lady Tigers had one of the most impressive runs in conference tournament history. Entering the tournament as the No. 4 seed, the Lady Tigers had a first round bye and then beat Kentucky, 96-76, in the second round. The Lady Tigers, who were ranked No. 12 in the nation, then upset fourth-ranked

Georgia, 83-74, in the semifinals. In the title game, point guard Pokey Chatman scored 30 points, including 16 straight at one point, as the Lady Tigers knocked off third-ranked Tennessee, 80-75. Chatman was named most valuable player of the tournament, while Sheila Johnson and Annette Jackson-Lowery were named to the all-tournament team.

The LSU Lady Tigers run through the Southeastern Conference Tournament was something special in 2003. It has been 12 years since LSU had last won a tournament title and the Lady Tigers were hungry for the crown.

Standing in the way of the second seeded and sixth-ranked Lady Tigers in the opening game were the No. 23 Arkansas Lady Razorbacks, a team that had handed LSU its first defeat of the season in Fayetteville earlier during the season.

It would prove to be the closest margin of victory in LSU's run to the title. LSU defeated Arkansas 78-72 thanks to some clutch free throw shooting down the stretch, including Seimone Augustus' two free throws with 19 seconds to play to give the freshman her 21st and 22nd points of the game and LSU a four point lead.

Four of the five starters for LSU scored in double figures in the opening round victory over Arkansas. In addition to Augustus, Temeka Johnson added 15 points, while Doneeka Hodges and Aiysha Smith both hit for 11 points.

15th-ranked Vanderbilt was the next item on the menu for the Lady Tigers. The Commodores were also a team that had defeated LSU during the regular season. In fact, the defending SEC tournament champions had knocked off LSU just the week before in Nashville and were playing with a lot of confidence heading into the semifinals of the SEC Tournament.

Vandy had so much confidence in themselves they led by as many as nine in the first half and took a 39-35 lead into the locker room at halftime after shooting 51.7

percent from the floor in the opening 20 minutes of play. LSU did not take its first lead of the game until Seimone Augustus hit a pair of free throws with 17 minutes to play to give the Lady Tigers a 44-43 advantage. The lead went back and forth for most of the second half until LSU closed the game with a 12-2 run in the final four minutes to advance to their second straight SEC Tournament title game.

Augustus took over the game during the final run, scoring 14 of her 20 points in the final four minutes of play. Aiysha Smith led LSU with 21 points, while Temeka Johnson added 12 points and Augustus had nine rebounds to go along with her point total.

The stage was set for the SEC title game, sixth-ranked LSU vs. No. 3 Tennessee for the SEC Championship. A rematch of the 68-65 Lady Vol victory during the regular season in Baton Rouge.

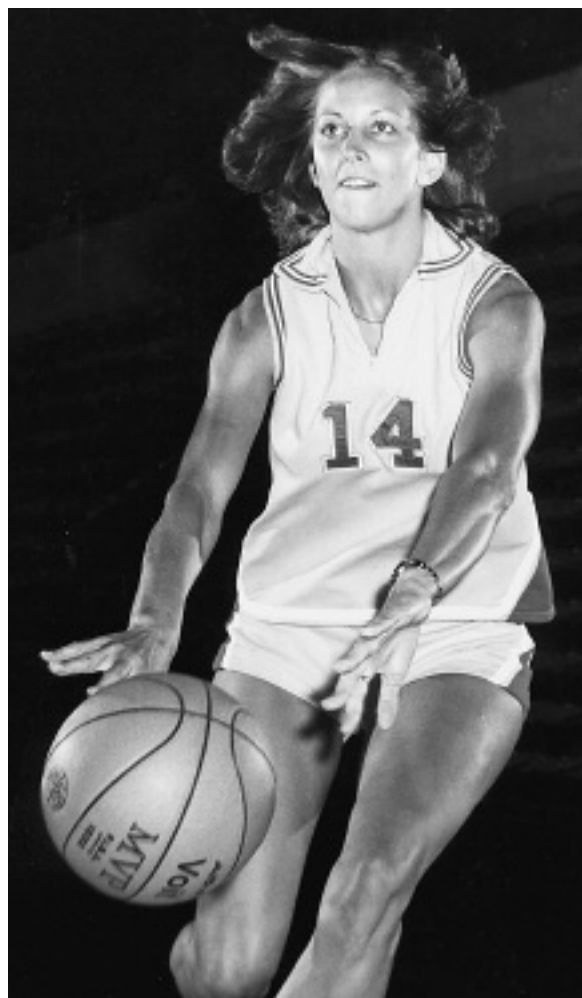
The Lady Tigers took control of the game early, jumping to a 7-0 lead and led 42-25 at the break. Tennessee managed to trim the margin down to 13 with 15 minutes to play before the Lady Tigers took the largest lead of the game at 18 with 10 minutes left.

Temeka Johnson took home MVP honors after scoring a career-high 24 points in the victory. She added nine rebounds and seven assists in the victory. Aiysha Smith added 18 points, while Seimone Augustus had 12 points and eight rebounds on her way to an all-tournament team selection.

LSU avenged all three of its regular season losses with three wins over three top 25 teams in three days to win the 2003 SEC Tournament Championship.

Julie Gross

Forward, 6-2 • Tatura, Australia

Kodak - 1978

Julie Gross became LSU's first Kodak All-American when she earned the honor following her sophomore season in 1978 after averaging 20.7 points and 11.5 rebounds for the Lady Tigers. She was also named honorable mention All-America by the Basketball News in 1980 when she averaged 17.6 points and 9.5 rebounds.

Gross finished her career as the all-time leading rebounder in LSU history with 1,466 rebounds and was second on the all-time scoring list with 2,488 points. Gross is also the second leading rebounder in SEC history.



Joyce Walker

Guard, 5-8 • Seattle, Wash.

Kodak - 1983, 1984

Basketball News - 1982, 1983, 1984

Joyce Walker holds the distinction of being the only player in LSU history to be named to the prestigious Kodak All-America team two times.

Walker, considered by many to be one of the best players in SEC history, was a three-time selection to the Basketball News All-America team.

Walker, the second leading scorer in SEC history with 2,906 points (24.8 ppg) was selected to both the Kodak and Basketball News in 1983 after averaging 27.6 points a game.

In 1982, her first year as an All-American, Walker was named to the Basketball News All-America Team, while in 1984 she was named to the Kodak, Basketball News and JC Penney All-America teams.

Walker is the only player in LSU history to rank in the school's Top 10 in scoring, rebounding, assists, steals, and blocked shots.

At LSU, Walker is the all-time leading scorer, 10th in rebounding, third in assists, second in steals, and 10th in blocked shots.

In the summer of 1997, Walker was elected to the Louisiana Hall of Fame.



Dana "Pokey" Chatman

Guard, 5-5 • Ama, La.

Kodak - 1991

Pokey Chatman capped her career at LSU by earning Kodak, Basketball Weekly and United States Basketball Writer's Association All-America honors following her senior season in 1991.

During the 1991 season, Chatman scored 576 points (18.6 ppg) and dished out 157 assists (5.1 apg). Chatman is the fifth all-time leading scorer in school history with 1,826 points. She is also LSU's all time leader in both assists (570) and steals (346).

During her four years at LSU, Chatman started all but one game and set 20 school records. She also led the Lady Tigers to their first-ever SEC Tournament title in 1991. Chatman was named MVP of the 1991 SEC Tournament.



Marie Ferdinand

Guard, 5-9 • Miami, Fla.

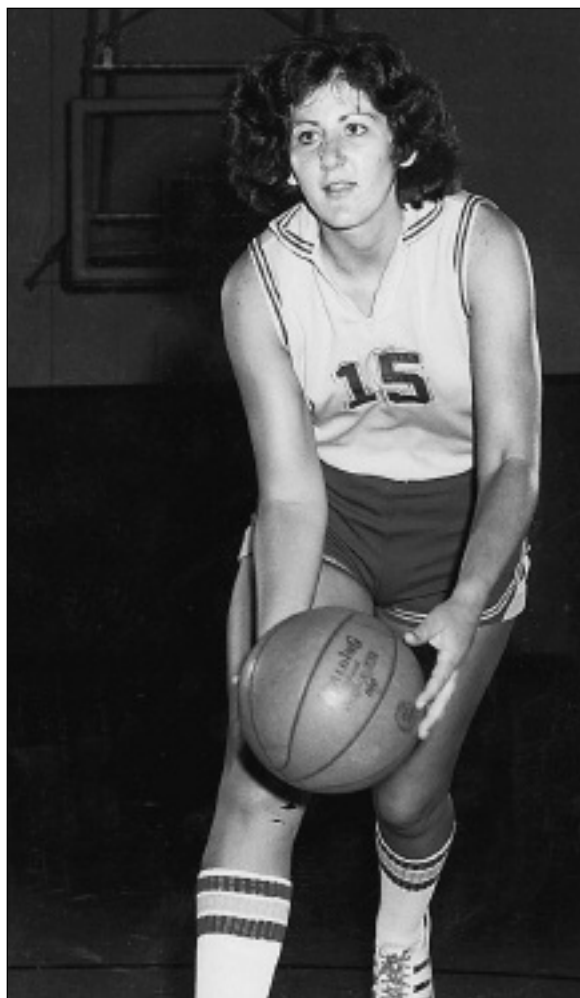
Kodak - 2001

One of the most explosive guards to ever play at LSU, Miami native Marie Ferdinand earned 2001 Kodak and Women's Basketball Journal All-America honors and was a unanimous coaches poll first-team All-SEC selection. The Louisiana Player of the year, she was also a finalist for the Naismith Award and the ESPN the Magazine Shooting Guard of the Year Award.

For her career, Ferdinand averaged 13.7 points and 4.1 rebounds a game. In 2000, she led the Lady Tigers to the Elite Eight, averaging team-highs in points, assists and steals. She was named to the 2000 NCAA East Regional all-tournament team.

Ferdinand also made an impact in international play in the summer of 2000, helping lead the U.S. Women's Select Team to a gold medal at the Jones Cup Tournament in Taipei, Taiwan.

She was a first round pick of the Utah Starzz of the WNBA and finished third in Rookie of the Year voting in 2001.



Maree Jackson

Center, 6-2 • Albury, Australia

Basketball News - 1978

Maree Jackson became LSU's first Basketball News All-American in 1978 when she was named to the team following her sophomore season. As a sophomore, Jackson scored 1,021 points (25.5 ppg) and grabbed 539 rebounds (13.5 rpg). The 1,021 points and 539 rebounds are the most in both SEC and LSU history for one season.

In just two seasons with the Lady Tigers, Jackson scored 1,852 points which places her third on the all-time scoring list. She also finished her career as the second leading rebounder in LSU history with 1,032 rebounds.

For her career, Jackson averaged 26.4 points a game, which still stands as the SEC record.



Rene Moran

Guard, 5-9 • Pearl River, La.

Basketball News - 1980

Rene Moran was a third team selection on the Basketball News All-America team in 1980. During that season, Moran led the Lady Tigers in scoring with a 21.6 average.

Moran, who transferred to LSU from Southeastern Louisiana, played only two seasons with LSU. A year after earning All-America honors, Moran injured her knee two weeks before the start of the 1980-81 season and never played again. She finished her career at LSU with 1,023 points and 304 rebounds.



Alisha Jones

Center, 6-3, Wiggins, Miss.

Freshman All-American - 1984

Alisha Jones became LSU's first national Freshman All-American when she earned the honor after averaging 12.5 points and 7.9 rebounds per game to help lead the Lady Tigers during the 1983-84 season. The Basketball News recognized the 6-3 post player with the All-America honor after she hit 55.4 percent of her field goals and 73.3 percent of her free throws. She scored in double figures in 20 of the 29 games played, including a 19 point-11 rebound performance against Georgia in the SEC Tournament semifinals.



Cornelia Gayden

Guard, 5-9 • Bogue Chitto, Miss.

**Women's Basketball News - 1995
Associated Press - 1995**

Cornelia Gayden had perhaps one of the best all-around seasons in school history as a senior as she was named second team All-America by the Women's Basketball News Service and third team All-America by the Associated Press in 1995. Gayden, who averaged 25.8 points and 8.4 rebounds as a senior, was also a finalist for AP Player of the Year.

During her senior season, Gayden set an NCAA record by hitting 12 3-pointers against Jackson State. In that same game, Gayden scored a school-record 49 points and became the NCAA's all-time leader in 3-point goals.

Gayden capped her career with NCAA records in 3-point goals (337) and 3-point goals attempted (875). Gayden is the third leading scorer in LSU history with 2,451 points and the eighth leading scorer in SEC history. Gayden was a three-time All-SEC selection.



Latasha Dorsey

Guard, 5-7 • Abbeville, La.

Defensive All-American - 1999

Latasha Dorsey had an outstanding senior season for the Lady Tigers as she led LSU to the Sweet 16 at the NCAA Tournament and was named a first team Defensive All-American by the Women's Basketball Journal.

As a senior, Dorsey ranked third in the SEC with 2.5 steals a contest. She also averaged 12.9 points and 4.2 assists a contest.

Dorsey completed her LSU career with more post-season appearances (12) than any player, male or female, in school history. In addition, Dorsey won 29 SEC games in her LSU career, also a school record. Dorsey finished her career with 1,054 points which ranks 14th in school history, while she ranks third all-time in steals and fifth in assists.



DeTrina White

Forward, 5-11 • Lafayette, La.

Freshman All-American - 1999

DeTrina White finished her first year at LSU with more honors than any other freshman in LSU history. Highlighting White's list of honors was being named National Freshman of the Year by the Women's Basketball News Service, a first for an LSU player.

White was also named first team Freshman All-America by both the Women's Basketball News Service and the Women's Basketball Journal. In addition, she was voted the Freshman of the Year in the SEC by the Associated Press.

White finished her first season averaging 13.1 points and 8.2 rebounds a contest. White led the SEC with 11 double-double games.



Angelia Crockett

Guard, 5-11 • Tallulah, La.

Defensive All-American - 2001

One of the Lady Tigers most steady and unselfish players, Tallulah native Angelia Crockett became the second LSU player to ever earn first team Defensive All-America honors from the Women's Basketball Journal.

In her senior year, the point guard blocked 10 shots and was ranked seventh in the SEC in assist-to-turnover ratio. She also averaged 3.0 points and 2.4 rebounds a game.

In her four years at LSU, Crockett helped lead the Lady Tigers to four national tournaments, including three straight NCAA Tournament appearances, runs through to the Elite Eight and Sweet 16 and a WNIT appearance.



Seimone Augustus

Guard, 6-1 • Baton Rouge, La.

Freshman All-American - 2003

Seimone Augustus put together one of the finest first seasons at LSU in school history during the 2002-03 campaign. The Baton Rouge native was the consensus National Freshman of the Year named by the United State Basketball Writers Association, The Basketball Times, www.WOMENSCOLLEGEHOOPS.com and Gballmag.com.

She also earned second-team All-America honors by The Basketball Times and was honorable mention All-America by the Associated Press and was District III Kodak All-American. Augustus led the Lady Tigers in scoring (14.8 points per game) and shooting percentage (54.9 percent) and set the school's single-season record for free throw percent by hitting 88.8 percent of her shots (79 of 89).

The Southeastern Conference Freshman of the Year also helped LSU win its first SEC Tournament title since 1991 and advance to the Elite Eight in the NCAA Tournament.

Dr. William L. Jenkins

President, LSU

On April 1, 1999, William L. Jenkins, formerly Chancellor of Louisiana State University and Agricultural and Mechanical College, became President of the LSU System, which includes nine institutions on 10 campuses in five cities, as well as 10 public hospitals in 10 cities.

A native of South Africa, Dr. Jenkins studied at the University of Pretoria, where he received his professional veterinary medicine degree in 1958 and specialist credentials in 1968. He received the Ph.D. degree from the University of Missouri, Columbia, in 1970. After practicing veterinary medicine for four years, he joined the faculty at the University of Pretoria, advancing through the ranks to become professor and head of the Department of Veterinary Physiology, Pharmacology, and Toxicology in 1971.

He moved to the U.S. in 1978 and joined the faculty in the Department of Veterinary Physiology and Pharmacology at Texas A&M University. He was appointed dean of the LSU School of Veterinary Medicine in 1988 and was named LSU's provost and vice chancellor for academic affairs in September 1993.

When he was appointed LSU's fifth Chancellor in November 1996, Dr. Jenkins reorganized the campus administration to be more effective and more responsive, and oversaw the development of a strategic plan to guide the University in its preparation for the challenges of the next century.

Over the years President Jenkins has received numerous teaching and service awards and recognitions, having been named the 1997 Communicator of the Year by the Public Relations Association of Louisiana and a Distinguished Alumnus by the University of Missouri. The regional chapter of Toastmasters International also presented him with its 1999 Communication and Leadership Award, and he was awarded the Vision of Excellence Award 2000 by the New Orleans Regional Chamber of Commerce and the New Orleans Chapter of

MetroVision. In addition, the University of Pretoria bestowed an honorary doctorate on Dr. Jenkins in September of 2000.

Dr. Jenkins has been active in continuing education and has delivered more than 150 lectures and addresses to diverse groups in both the United States and abroad. He has taught extensively at both the professional and graduate levels. He has published more than 60 scientific articles and has contributed 15 chapters to various textbooks. He is coauthor of a textbook on veterinary pharmacology.

Over the years, Dr. Jenkins has been a member of many professional organizations and select committees. Most recently, he served on the National Institute of Health's Alcohol Abuse and Misuse on College Campuses Committee and on a special Steering Committee of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools to review accreditation criteria for colleges and universities.

Dr. Jenkins also is a member of the National Association of State Universities and Land Grant Colleges' Committee on Food and Society as well as the Committee on the Future of Coastal Louisiana.

His current community engagement includes serving on the boards of the Louisiana Endowment for the Humanities, Greater Baton Rouge Chamber of Commerce, Academic Distinction Fund, Council for a Better Louisiana, Arts Council of Greater Baton Rouge, and the Baton Rouge board of the National Conference for Community and Justice.

Dr. Jenkins and his wife, Peggy, have four children—Sharon Gwynn, Anthea, and Warren—and nine grandchildren.



Dr. Kenneth E. Carpenter, Faculty Athletics Representative

Dr. Kenneth E. Carpenter is in his second year as LSU's faculty representative in NCAA and Southeastern Conference matters.

Carpenter, a professor in the School of Architecture, has taught at LSU since 1986. He received his bachelor's degree in architecture from the University of Oklahoma in 1962 and his master's from Minnesota in 1967. Before joining the LSU faculty, he served at Clemson University as Associate Professor of Architecture from 1967-77; Ball State University, where he was Professor and

Chairman of the Department of Architecture, 1977-81; and, Iowa State University, serving as Professor and Chairman, Department of Architecture from 1981-86.

At LSU he served as the Dean of the College of Design from 1986-1997, Interim Executive Director of International Programs from 1997-98; and, Interim Dean, College of Art and Design, 2001-02.

Carpenter is a member of Phi Kappa Phi, the American Institute of Architects and the American Association of University Professors.



Dr. Mark A. Emmert

Chancellor, LSU

Dr. Mark A. Emmert was appointed chancellor of Louisiana State University and Agricultural & Mechanical College on April 16, 1999, becoming the sixth chancellor to lead the state's flagship University.

Prior to joining LSU, Emmert served as chancellor of the University of Connecticut, as provost and vice president for academic affairs at Montana State University, and held various faculty and administrative positions at the University of Colorado. He has served as a member of numerous academic and civic boards and organizations.

Both the Fulbright Commission and the American Council on Education have awarded fellowships to Emmert. He has also been inducted into Phi Kappa Phi Honor Society, Alpha Lambda Delta Scholastic Society, Golden Key Honor Society, and the Connecticut Academy of Arts and Sciences. He is active in the American Council on Education, the New England Council of Presidents, and the National Association of State Universities and Land-Grant Colleges, where he served as chair of the Council on Academic Affairs.

A native of Tacoma, Washington, Emmert holds a bachelor's degree in political science from the University of Washington and master's and doctoral degrees from the Maxwell School of Syracuse University. His scholarly

work has focused on public policy topics, as well as issues in organizational theory. He has published his research in leading journals within his field and has served on several editorial boards. He has also served as a visiting scholar and lecturer internationally, working in Australia, Hong Kong, Japan, and Panama.

He is married to DeLaine S. Emmert, a former elementary school teacher, who is active in community, university, and philanthropic organizations. They have two children, Stephen and Jennifer.

Bertman's unyielding desire to succeed drove him to the pinnacle of his profession, and his astute knowledge of the game -- obtained from over 40 years of coaching -- combined with his steadfast determination and irrepressible enthusiasm transformed LSU Baseball into the nation's premier program.

Already a Louisiana Legend and one of the greatest college baseball coaches of all time, J. Stanley "Skip" Bertman has augmented his impressive list of achievements in two seasons as LSU's director of athletics. While supervising the Tigers' magnificent progress on the playing fields, he has begun to implement measures necessary to realize his vision of building the LSU athletics department into the best in the country. Bertman's bold and innovative plans promise to keep the Tigers among the nation's elite in all phases of collegiate athletics.

LSU's programs enjoyed remarkable success under Bertman's direction in 2002-03, as 16 of the Tigers' 20 sports participated in NCAA post-season competition. That accomplishment, along with improved graduation rates, increased team grade point averages and the construction of new academic facilities, foreshadow even more significant deeds in Bertman's tenure.

Bertman was named LSU's athletics director on January 19, 2001. With Bertman, LSU gained an athletics director who provides the leadership and experience necessary to manage the Tigers' nearly \$40 million budget.

Bertman guided LSU to five NCAA baseball titles, and his teams drew huge crowds to venerable Alex Box Stadium, as the Tigers led the nation in attendance in each of his final six seasons (1996-2001).

He also served as head coach of the 1996 U.S. Olympic team which captured the bronze medal in Atlanta.

Bertman continues to be honored for his remarkable coaching tenure, as he was inducted in June, 2002, into the Louisiana Sports Hall of Fame. He was inducted into the American Baseball Coaches Association Hall of Fame in January, 2003.

In a *Baseball America* poll released in January, 1999, Bertman was voted the second greatest college baseball coach of the 20th century, trailing only Rod Dedeaux of Southern California. Bertman and Dedeaux are the only coaches to win five CWS titles.

He had previously earned stellar recognition as one of the nation's brightest assistant coaches while at the University of Miami (Fla.) for eight seasons (1976-83). Before working at Miami, Bertman was renowned for his coaching excellence. In 11 seasons at Miami Beach High School, he directed the Hi-Tides to a state championship and two runners-up finishes. He was named Florida's Coach of the Year on three occasions.

In 1975, Bertman coached at Miami-Dade Downtown, leaving after one season to join legendary head coach Ron Fraser at Miami. The move was a homecoming of sorts, as Bertman spent his collegiate playing days with the Hurricanes as an outfielder and catcher from 1958-60. He earned his B.A. in health and physical education from Miami in 1961 and received his master's degree from UM in 1964.

Bertman and his wife Sandy are the parents of four daughters -- Jan, Jodi, Lisa and Lori. The Bertmans have two grandchildren -- Sophie Faith and Isaac Stanley, the children of Emile and Lori Bertman Guirard.



Dan Radakovich

Sr. Associate Athletics Director

Dan Radakovich enters his third year as LSU's senior associate athletics director after joining the University in May of 2001. He came to LSU after serving as director of athletics at American University in Washington D.C.

As LSU's senior associate athletic director, Radakovich oversees the daily operations of the LSU Athletics Department and he serves as Skip Bertman's chief assistant.

Prior to his one-year stint at American University, Radakovich spent six years as the associate athletics director at South Carolina where he directed the financial operations for the Gamecocks' \$30 million athletic department budget. Radakovich also worked closely with South Carolina Athletics Director Mike McGee in laying the ground work for a new \$70 million arena being built in Columbia. He also served as the department liaison for marketing and promotional activities with Host Communications. Radakovich was also responsible for home event management as well as that of overseeing concessions, football travel and the video department.

During his tenure with South Carolina, Radakovich supervised the finances and logistics for \$33 million in facility improvements.

Radakovich served as the senior associate athletics director at Long Beach State from 1989-94. In that capacity, he managed a \$5 million budget and supervised the nationally recognized men's basketball and baseball programs. In addition, Radakovich reorganized the fund-raising operations and coordinated the production and sales of radio broadcasting packages.

Radakovich began his collegiate athletics career as the athletics business manager at the University of Miami in Coral Gables, Fla., from 1983-85. He worked in the private sector for five years before joining Long Beach State.

Radakovich, a native of Aliquippa, Pa., graduated from Indiana University of Pennsylvania in 1980 with a bachelor of science degree in finance. Radakovich was also a football letterwinner as well as a student coach at Indiana University of Pennsylvania. He then went on to earn his master's degree in business administration from the University of Miami in 1982.

Radakovich is married to the former Marcie McDonald and the couple has two children, Christian (13) and Grant (9).



Judy Southard

Associate Athletics Director/
Senior Women's Administrator

Judy Southard, who had a very successful career as both a head women's basketball coach and director of athletics, enters her third year as LSU's senior women's administrator after joining the department in the summer of 2001.

Southard came to LSU from Texas Woman's University, where she served as the school's director of athletics for nine years.

As LSU's senior women's administrator, Southard serves as the administrative liaison to the Tigers' nationally-recognized Olympic sports teams.

While at Texas Woman's University, Southard initiated a corporate partnership program for the athletic department that tripled the involvement of area businesses and corporations in Pioneer athletics. Southard also established the TWU Intercollegiate Athletics Hall of Fame and she played a key role in the addition of softball and soccer to TWU's list of intercollegiate sports. In 2000, Southard served as chair of the NCAA Division II Women's Basketball Committee.

Prior to her nine-year stint at Texas Woman's University, Southard served as head women's basketball coach at Marshall University in Huntington, W. Va., for 11 years, where she led the Lady Herd to five Southern Conference regular-season titles. During her 11 years at Marshall, Southard was named Southern Conference Coach of the Year three times and her career record of 178-130 still stands as a school record for women's basketball victories. Southard also served as assistant athletics director at Marshall from 1983-1988, including a four-month period when she was interim director.

Prior to her tenure at Marshall, Southard spent three years as head coach at Tennessee-Martin and she also served for one season as an assistant coach at Tennessee. As a high school teacher from 1970-77, Southard coached both basketball and tennis, leading her West Florence High School basketball team to the South Carolina 4A state title in 1976.

A native of Columbia, S.C., Southard earned a bachelor's degree in physical education and health from Coker College in 1970 followed by a master's degree in physical education from Tennessee in 1978.

Verge Ausberry

Associate Athletics Director/Operations

Former LSU football standout Verge Ausberry joined the LSU Athletic Department administrative staff in August 2001 to head up Athletic Department Operations.

In his position he is in charge of such areas as Game Management, the Athletic Department's courtesy car program, the weight room, the Dr. Martin Broussard training room

and equipment rooms and video operations for the various sports on the campus.

Ausberry, from New Iberia, La., played inside linebacker for the Tigers, lettering in 1986-89. He was the leading tackler on the team in both 1988 and 1989. He was part of two Southeastern Conference championship teams (1986 under Bill Arnsparger and 1988 under Mike Archer) and played on teams that went to three bowl games: the 1987 Sugar Bowl, the 1987 Gator Bowl and the 1989 Hall of Fame Bowl. In those three years, the Tigers had a combined overall record of 27-8-1 and 16-3 in SEC games.

Although this is Ausberry's first tour of duty with the administration of the Athletic Department, he has remained very close to the LSU athletic scene in the 1990s, first serving for almost seven years as a member of LSU's highly regarded Academic Center for Athletes where he worked with many of the student-athletes, primarily dealing with LSU's football squad.

After leaving the Academic Center, he moved in July 1999 to the Tiger Athletic Foundation staff as part of LSU's fund-raising arm prior to accepting his present position.

Ausberry received his Bachelor of Science degree in education in May of 1990 and his Master of Education in Administration, Supervision and certification in Child Welfare in May of 1992. He is presently a Doctoral Candidate in Higher Education Administration at LSU. He is married to the former Cheri Morial of New Orleans.



Bo Bahnsen

Associate Athletics Director/Internal Relations

Bo Bahnsen serves as LSU's associate athletics director for internal relations.

In his capacity, Bahnsen oversees the ticket office and customer service operations and will coordinate the transition of the management of the Pete Maravich Assembly Center to the athletics department beginning next year.

Bahnsen's primary responsibility for the last 14 years was to serve as LSU's NCAA compliance officer.

A 1982 graduate of LSU, Bahnsen served as administrative assistant for the men's basketball team for five years before moving into athletics administration as director of purchasing for two years. In 1989, he was assigned his primary responsibility as NCAA compliance officer as assistant athletics director, then was promoted to associate AD in 1996.

Bahnsen will be responsible for overseeing the successful implementation of LSU's Preferred Seating Program that was approved by the LSU Board of Supervisors in August. The program will require contributions for the right to purchase approximately 45,000 seats in Tiger Stadium beginning with the 2004 football season.

Beginning in July of 2004, the management of the Pete Maravich Assembly Center will shift from the University to the athletics department. Bahnsen will be involved in coordinating the transition and integration of management of the arena.

Bahnsen, 44, served as manager of the LSU basketball team as an undergraduate and became administrative assistant for the team upon graduation in May of 1982. In July on 1987 he became administrative assistant to athletics director Joe Dean, overseeing the purchasing office until his promotion in 1989.

A native of El Campo, Texas, Bahnsen graduated from Wharton High School in 1977 and attended Wharton Country Junior College for two years before transferring to LSU in 1979. He earned his bachelor of science in physical education and is currently working on his masters in education administration.

Bahnsen is married to the former Karen Mayson, former LSU golfer and current head coach of the Lady Tigers golf program. The couple have two children, Darren (13) and Devin (11).

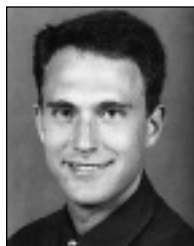
Jason Feirman is in his fourth year as the director of all of LSU's athletics publications.

Over a four-day span in the spring of 2002, the LSU campus served as the host of the NCAA Track and Field Championships as well as an NCAA Baseball Regional.

All-Sports Success

LSU's athletics program has traditionally been strong throughout all of its varsity sports and has fielded nationally competitive teams in most of its sports.

A total of 16 of LSU's 20 athletic teams participated in NCAA postseason play last year. LSU added a pair of national titles to its trophy case, running its overall total to 40, last year as the women's track and field teams swept the NCAA indoor and outdoor titles.

In all, LSU had nine of its 20 teams finish the year ranked in the Top 25 for their respective sports in 2002-03 and seven of those were ranked in the Top 10.

LSU also claimed its 103rd Southeastern Conference title as the Tiger baseball team won the league championship in 2003 before advancing to the College World Series.

Athletics as a Business

Athletics is mistakenly thought of as merely entertainment. In fact, the **total revenues of over \$37.5 million** generated annually by the Athletic Department is:

- twice that of the sales of an average manufacturing plant in Louisiana
- twice the volume of an average food processor
- about seven times more than the typical apparel plant in the state

Attendance

LSU teams draw some of the largest crowds in all of college athletics:

- More than **1 million fans** watched LSU athletics in all 20 sports during the 2002-03 athletic year.
- Since 1957, LSU has averaged over 73,000 fans a contest in football, including over 90,000 for the last two



seasons.

- In 2001, LSU set a school-record by averaging **90,491** fans a contest, a number that ranked fifth nationally. Last year, LSU averaged 90,307 fans a contest making Tiger Stadium, on a Saturday night, **more populated than 52 of Louisiana's 64 parishes.**
- **LSU baseball set the standard in college baseball for attendance again** in 2003 as more than 291,000 fans watched the Tigers play at Alex Box Stadium in regular and postseason play.

CHAMPS Program

LSU sponsors a fully funded life skills program for student-athletes. The program is called CHAMPS, an acronym for **Challenging Athletes Minds for Personal Success**. Under the CHAMPS program, LSU sets up a number of projects and workshops that aid student-athletes in addressing day-to-day living situations, handling stress and preparing for post-college life.

Under the CHAMPS program, LSU

also establishes community service projects in which student-athletes organize and participate. The LSU CHAMPS program sponsors an annual **Halloween "Boo-Zar"** on campus. The boozar is a trick-or-treat night in the LSU Field House in which athletes from all sports distribute candy to Baton Rouge area children. Each athletic team participates in CHAMPS workshops which educate them in life skills and personal development.

Community Involvement

Because of the athletic facilities on the LSU campus, Baton Rouge is able to attract many events and conventions that benefit the community in both public relations and monetary means. LSU has played host to such events as the National Sports Festival (now called the Olympic Festival) and the International Special Olympics. In 2001, LSU hosted the U.S. Senior Olympics and in the past has played host to the U.S. Junior National Track & Field Championships.

The LSU campus is annually the site of LHSAA Track & Field Championships, bringing to campus thousands of young people and their parents. Most recently, **LSU hosted the 2002 NCAA Outdoor Track & Field Championships at Bernie Moore Stadium.**

Economic Impact

LSU has a tremendous impact on the economy of the Baton Rouge area. LSU sporting events bring money into the Baton Rouge economy, not only from throughout the state, but throughout the southeast.

According to a study by LSU economics professor Loren Scott, the existence of **LSU Athletics generates \$131 million in sales for businesses in the Baton Rouge community**, another \$40 million in household earnings and supports over 2,100 jobs in the Baton Rouge area.

Finances

The LSU Athletic Department is a totally **self-sufficient** auxiliary of the University. No state tax dollars are used to finance LSU athletics. All money spent by the Athletic Department is generated by the department through ticket sales, corporate sponsorships, radio and television revenue, the Tiger Gift Center and concessions, and is supplemented through revenue-sharing resulting from LSU's membership in the Southeastern Conference.

Individual Athletes

Year in and year out, LSU boasts some of the most renowned athletes in all of college athletics.

NBA Most Valuable Player and worldwide entertainment superstar **Shaquille O'Neal** delighted Tiger basketball fans for three seasons. PGA Champion **David Toms** played for the Tigers in the late 1980s, while Major League Baseball standouts **Todd Walker** and **Paul Byrd** learned their trade at Alex Box Stadium. Sometimes overlooked are some of the finest female athletes in the country in their respective sports: golfer **Meredith Duncan**, softball All-American **Britni Sneed**, women's basketball All-American **Marie Ferdinand**, and track superstar **Muna Lee** have dazzled LSU fans in recent years.

Job Placement

Is there life after college athletics? LSU is helping to answer that question with a job placement program as part of the **Ninth Semester Program**. LSU works closely with the Career Placement Center on campus as well as professional recruiting services to offer advice to athletes on entering the job market upon graduation.

National Awards

LSU has had one winner each of the Heisman Trophy, Adolph Rupp Award and Golden Spikes Award, the premier individual awards in football, basketball and baseball. The **Heisman Trophy**, given annually to college football's best player, was won by **Billy Cannon** in 1959. The **Adolph Rupp Award**, which goes to college basketball's top player, was won by **Shaquille O'Neal** in 1991. The **Golden Spikes Award**, given to college baseball's most outstanding player each year, was won by **Ben McDonald** in 1989. In 2001, **Josh Reed** added his name to the list as he claimed the **Biletnikoff Award**, which goes annually to the nation's top receiver.

At all LSU football games in Tiger Stadium, basketball games at the Pete Maravich Assembly Center and baseball games at Alex Box Stadium, **live action is shown on monitors** near concession stands and restrooms so fans won't miss the action in progress.

Tiger Gift Center

LSU operates a fully stocked merchandise store within Tiger Stadium that gives fans a wide array of LSU clothing and memorabilia. The Gift Center is open on football, basketball and baseball game days for fans' convenience. A new satellite Gift Center near Mike the Tiger's cage is open for added customer convenience. The Tiger Gift Center also went worldwide during the 2000-01 season as LSU merchandise can now be purchased from anywhere in the world on LSU's website, www.LSUports.net.

University Involvement

LSU continues to produce profits in its athletic department, despite generally difficult economic times for college athletic programs.

Athletics has contributed over \$8 million to the academic side of the University in the past 12 years. In 1994-95, athletics contributed \$100,000 to the LSU Libraries to assist in buying books and other materials necessary to keep LSU's library system among the finest in the nation, and in 1996 generated over \$30,000 by dedicating all ticket sales from the Spring Football Game to the libraries.

After the 1988-89 fiscal year, LSU Athletics donated \$2 million to the general fund of the University to help offset projected losses. LSU Athletics has also donated sizeable amounts of money to fund professorships and provide for repairs in academic facilities.

The Southeastern Conference



With six national championships, nine runner-up finishes, a nation-leading 25 Final Four appearances and 45 first-team All-America honors, the Southeastern Conference stands firmly as the nation's premier intercollegiate women's basketball conference.

SEC By The Numbers

- The SEC has posted impressive non-conference records in the last decade. The SEC compiled a 148-38 (.796) non-conference record during the 2002-03 season. Since the 1990 season, the SEC has compiled a 1908-500 (.792) record against other conferences. The league has recorded 150+ wins during seven seasons and had never recorded a non-conference winning percentage below .746.
- SEC teams have earned appearances in 20 of 22 NCAA Final Fours, an accomplishment unmatched by any other league. Overall, SEC squads have filled 25 of the 88 Final Four berths, including having two Final Four teams in 1988 (Auburn, Tennessee), 1989 (Auburn, Tennessee), 1995 (Georgia, Tennessee), 1996 (Georgia, Tennessee), and 1998 (Arkansas, Tennessee).
- SEC teams have made 15 appearances in a nation-high 13 NCAA Championship games, winning six national championships (Tennessee: 1987, 1989, 1991, 1996, 1997 and 1998). The league had the distinction of providing both national finalists twice in its history: in 1996 (Tennessee 83, Georgia 65) and in 1989 (Tennessee 76, Auburn 60).
- SEC teams have won 244 NCAA Tournament games against 129 losses (.654) for an average of 11.1 NCAA wins per year. In addition, all 12 current members have appeared in the NCAA Tournament.
- The SEC has paced the pack in NCAA tournament bids 21 times in its 22-year history. The SEC is the only league to ever have eight teams invited to the NCAA Tournament. The 2002 season was the second time the league has accomplished this feat, the first being 1999.
- The SEC is the only league to ever have seven teams invited to the NCAA Tournament and earned this honor five times (1986, 1991, 1995, 1996, 1997).
- Since the WNIT came into existence four years ago, the SEC has had at least one team accept a bid each year. This past year, Auburn won the title with wins over South Alabama, Florida State, Richmond, Creighton and Baylor. It's the second WNIT Championship for the SEC. In 1999, the Arkansas Lady Razorbacks defeated Wisconsin 76-64 to claim the SEC's first Women's NIT championship.

Individual Honors

- The SEC has had 45 student-athletes named as a First-Team All-America selection. Those 45 have been named a total of 79 times since 1977.
- The league has had three Honda-Broderick Cup Award winners (1988-Katrina McClain, Georgia; 1990-Bridgette Gordon, Tennessee; 1998-Chamique Holdscaw, Tennessee).
- Four Naismith Player of the Year winners have come from the SEC. In 1996 Georgia's Saudia Roundtree was given the honor while Chamique Holdscaw of Tennessee won the honor in 1998 and 1999 and Tennessee's Tamika Catchings was named in 2000.
- SEC teams have provided 102 All-Region performers, including 21 Most Outstanding Players.
- Over the past 22-years, 30 Final Four All-Tournament Team members have come from SEC schools. In 1996, the entire all-tournament team was made up of SEC players.
- Six NCAA Post-Graduate Scholarship winners and 18 Academic All-Americas hail from the SEC.

Dominance In the Polls

- Since the AP poll began in 1983 and the USA Today/ESPN poll in 1986, the SEC has never failed to place at least four members in each of the final polls.
- In terms of rankings, the SEC has the richest history of any conference in the nation, boasting more poll appearances than any other. SEC teams have been ranked 348 consecutive weeks in the AP Poll.
- League teams have been ranked 2,252 times, including 1,220 Top 10 appearances and 687 Top 5 appearances.
- Six SEC teams are ranked in the Top 25 of the AP all-time composite final poll. Tennessee is ranked first in the poll and is tied for the lead in number of final first place finishes with five. Other SEC schools are: 5. Georgia, 12. Auburn, 20. Ole Miss, 23. LSU, T24. Vanderbilt.

Mike Slive SEC Commissioner



From his early days as an athletic administrator to his current post as commissioner, Mike Slive has maintained an integral role in the ever-changing world of intercollegiate athletics. He was named the seventh commissioner of the Southeastern Conference on July 2, 2002.

"I am keenly aware that to be the Commissioner of the SEC is both a privilege and a challenge," said Slive at the announcement of his appointment as the SEC Commissioner. "It's a privilege because the SEC is the premier conference in the country - with outstanding academic institutions, unsurpassed winning athletic traditions as well loyal, dedicated and passionate fans, outstanding athletic directors and coaches, and, of course, national championship-caliber student-athletes."

It has been a busy first year for the new Commissioner. He has created committees within the SEC that are designed to assist member institutions in the operations of its athletics department as well as how its athletics operations fit within the academic mission of its universities. Slive was also instrumental in the development of the Sportsmanship and Fan Behavior Summit, a national forum which was held in Dallas. The summit brought together athletic, community and civic leaders as well as specialists to talk about sportsmanship and how to prevent inappropriate fan behavior.

During his first year, Slive also has developed an initiative to ensure gender and ethnic diversity in the SEC. Last year, the SEC office distributed a database to its institutions containing the names and biographies of every Division I-A and National Football League head and assistant coach. Slive is planning other initiatives in the future. Since his arrival in Birmingham, Slive has not passed up many opportunities to speak to community, civic and business groups about the positive attributes of intercollegiate athletics and the SEC.

Prior to joining the SEC, Slive was the Commissioner of Conference USA. He was named the first-ever Commissioner of the newly-formed league on April 24, 1995. Under his direction, Conference USA has quickly emerged as one of the nation's top conferences.

Slive served as chair of the first NCAA Infractions Appeals Committee and is presently on the National Letter of Intent Steering Committee. He is also chair of the Board of Directors of NCAA Football USA and is the just completed term as president of the Collegiate Commissioners Association (CCA). Last year, he was named to the Executive Committee of the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA) and also serves on the Board of Advisors of the Marquette Sports Law Institute and the NCAA Management Council.

The 63-year old Slive has also served on the Board of Directors of the Sports Lawyers Association from 1997-2001 and was chair of the Division I-A Commissioners from 1999-2001. He also was a member of the NCAA Division I Working Group to Study Basketball Issues in 1998-99. Slive served on the Commission of Athletic Opportunity, set up by the U.S. Secretary of Education to review the workings of Title IX. He was one of 15 panelists that consisted of former and current athletes, athletic and academic administrators and college professors from around the nation. Slive has an extensive administrative and legal background in intercollegiate athletics. He served as commissioner of the Great Midwest Conference since its formation in 1991, and played a pivotal role in the Great Midwest becoming one of the most successful and exciting conferences in the nation in the 1990's.

His previous athletic administrative experiences include: assistant director of athletics at Dartmouth College (1968-69), assistant Executive Director of the Pacific-10 Conference (1979-81), and Director of Athletics at Cornell University (1981-83), prior to developing his sports practice specializing in representing colleges and universities in athletic-related matters.

A native of Utica, N.Y., Slive was senior partner and founder of the Mike Slive-Mike Glazier Sports Group. Prior to the formation of the Slive-Glazier Sports Group in 1990, Slive was a partner in the Chicago law firm of Coffield Ungaretti Harris & Slavin. He operated his own practice in Hanover, N.H., and served as judge of the Hanover District Court from 1972-77. Slive graduated from Dartmouth College with a Bachelor of Arts degree in 1962. He earned a Juris Doctor from the University of Virginia Law School in 1965 and an LL.M. from the Georgetown University Law Center in 1966. Slive and his wife, Elizabeth, are the parents of a daughter, Anna.

Enjoying continued success and increased popularity, the 2004 Southeastern Conference Women's Basketball Tournament returns to Nashville, Tenn. The Gaylord Entertainment Center (16,008) will serve as the tournament's home.

Since 2001 the tournament has enjoyed many new sites, including Memphis, Tenn. (2001), Nashville (2002) and North Little Rock, Ark. (2003). Prior to that, the tournament was held in Chattanooga, Tenn. from 1993-99 with the exception of 1998 when the tournament moved to Columbus, Ga. Albany, Ga., served as the site of the tournament for six years from 1987-92. Prior to 1987 the tournament was held at campus sites, beginning with its inception in 1980.

The 2003 tournament proved to be a huge success for the league. The four-day event drew a record 43,642 fans. 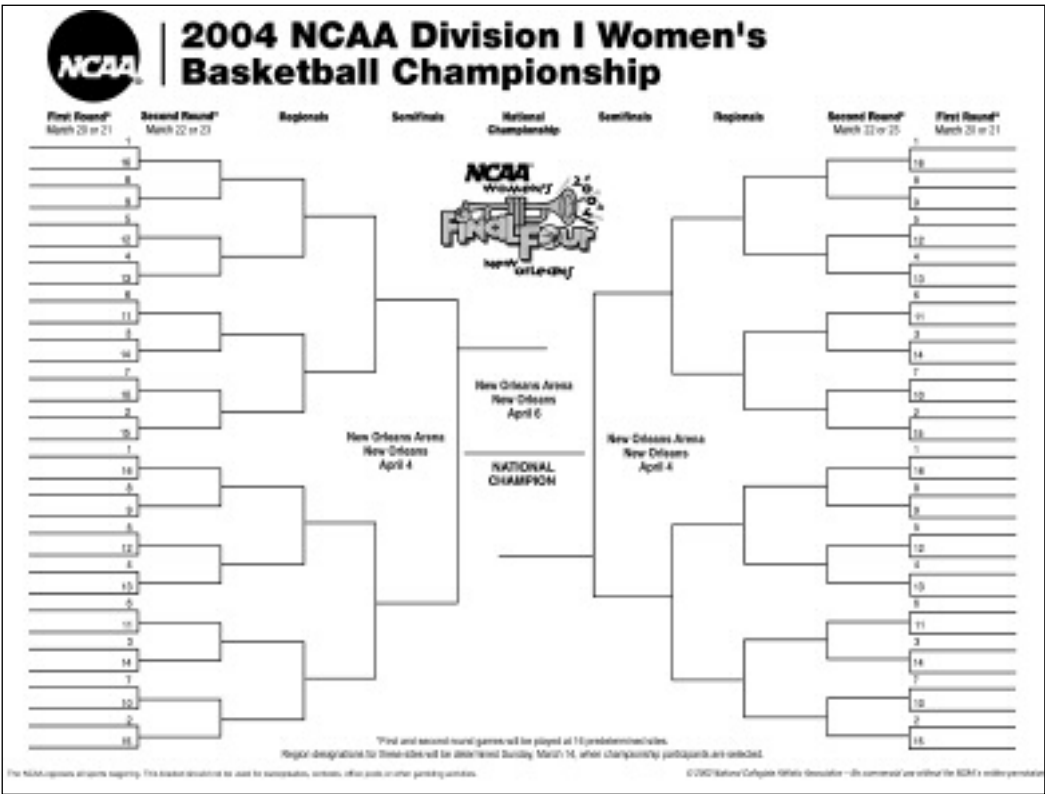

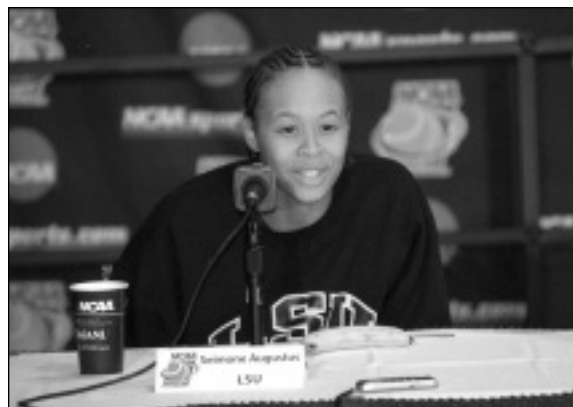

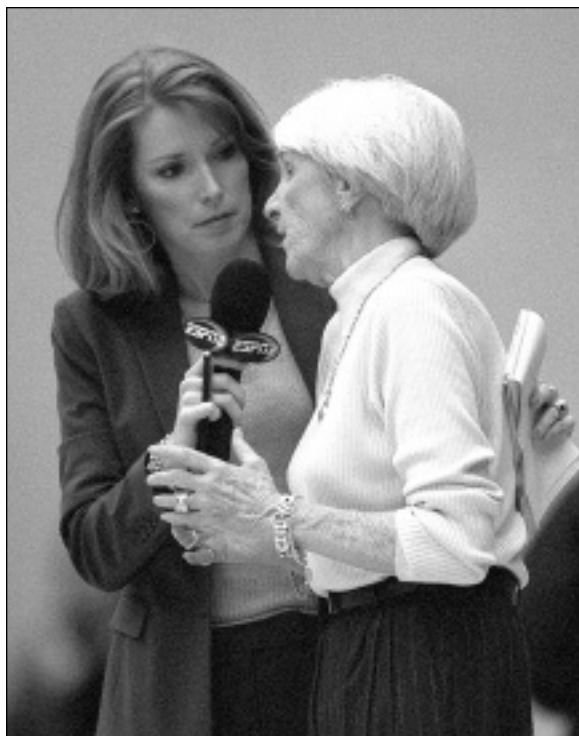
Press Work Area

Photographers

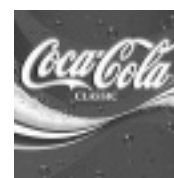
