**W**ith the program's first trip to the NCAA Final Four last season, the LSU Lady Tigers could rest on their laurels, but with head coach Pokey Chatman, and four returning starters leading the way, not only is a second trip to the Final Four in their sites, but so is a national title.

Chatman, in her first season as head coach, but 14th on the LSU coaching staff, has a lot of experience leading a Lady Tigers team. Not only was she a four-year starter as a point guard for the Lady Tigers, but she guided LSU to a 15-5 record, a second-place finish in the Southeastern Conference and the Final Four as acting head coach last season in the absence of Sue Gunter.

"This team has a unique blend of talent, depth, experience and hunger," Chatman said. "Last year's finish or preseason rankings will have no bearing on how we approach our season."

Leadership will have a lot to do with the success of the 2004-05 Lady Tigers, and LSU will have plenty with four starters returning and two others that have started at least 13 career games.

Depth is also a major factor for the team.

"The fact the we can go two or three deep at each position will compliment the way we play," Chatman stated. "Our depth will also allow us to extend our defense and play an overall more up-tempo style. I don't expect a drop in intensity or execution when we substitute."

### The Seniors

The depth and leadership begins with the senior class of Temeka Johnson, Tillie Willis, Crystal White and Florence Williams.

"When you talk about leadership you have to start with Temeka Johnson," Chatman said. "In my opinion, she is the best point guard in the country. Her mindset separates her from most and she is in the best shape of her career."

Johnson, a New Orleans native, broke LSU's single season and career assist marks in 2003-04 and returns for another season after graduating in August.

Willis started 21 games last season.

"Tillie was a consistent contributor all season long and played a major role in the run to the Final Four," Chatman said.

White, who underwent off-season surgery, is healthy and, along with Williams, will look to enhance our paint presence.

White also received her degree in August.

### The Juniors

LSU's junior class of Seimone Augustus, Scholanda Hoston and Wendlyn Jones is one of the Lady Tigers most talented groups.

Augustus, a 2004 Kodak All-American and a preseason All-America selection ended last season with a run in the NCAA Tournament that is hard to match, averaging 24.2 points in LSU's five games, including posting a career-high 29 points in each of the West Regional games in Seattle.

Hoston, who has started 13 games in her career, was very productive for the Lady Tigers last season.

"Scholanda has to have been the most productive player per minutes played in the nation last season," Chatman added. "She defends, she boards, she has a nice stroke from behind the arc, but more importantly she brings energy."

Jones, who missed the first half of last season with an injury, is ready to build on her success from last season.

"The highlight of the off-season has been the metamorphosis of Wendlyn Jones," Chatman said. "She is focused, fit and ready to take her game to another level."

### The Sophomores

LSU's lone sophomore on the roster is Hanna Biernacka. The native of Sweden started 27 games for the Lady

Tigers in 2003-04 and brings valuable experience to the team.

"Hanna's versatility and understanding of the game will continue to be an asset to this team," Chatman stated. "She was asked to shoulder a huge load at times last year and she came through."

### The Freshman

LSU's freshman class, consisting of redshirt freshmen Khalilah Mitchell and Marian Whitfield, and true freshmen Quinna Chaney, Sylvia Fowles, RaShonta LeBlanc, Ashley Thomas and Erica White, could be one of the best groups in LSU history.

"There is no doubt in my mind that this is the most talented freshmen class in the history of our program," Chatman said. "This group has the ability to make this team better."

The incoming freshman bring a combined nine state championship titles to the Lady Tigers and three (Chaney, Fowles and White) earned McDonald's and Parade All-America honors last year as high school seniors.



# 2004 FINAL FOUR SEASON



When LSU began its run in the 2004 NCAA Tournament, it was the culmination of a season of destiny.

Legendary coach Sue Gunter, who earned her 700th career victory in February, had to miss the final 20 games due to illness.

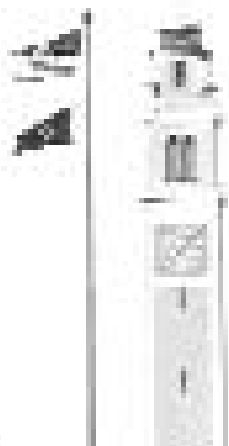

**A**long with the success of the Lady Tigers' basketball team, comes a great deal of media attention and Dr. Tommy Karam, the Director of the Communications Lab, uses his lab, located on the fourth floor of the Cox Communications Academic Center for Student-Athletes, to work with LSU student-athletes on their interaction with the media and interview skills. Karam's lab is a mock press conference setting to get the student-athletes used to handling themselves in front of both print and electronic media. He video tapes the mock interview session and reviews it with the student-athlete to help them become more comfortable in an interview setting.



## LIGHTS, CAMERA, ANSWER

Dr. Karam uses his studio to prepare LSU's student-athletes to interact with all phases of local and national media by working one-on-one in a press conference setting. The Communications Lab includes a working camera for Karam to review the session with the student-athletes.

Over the last eight years the Lady Tigers have given the women’s hoop fans something to cheer about. In that span, LSU has a 113-12 record in home games, giving the Lady Tigers the second best home record among SEC teams. The Lady Tigers have also hosted some top 10 battles over the past few seasons, including the 2002 match-up between No. 3 Tennessee and No. 4 LSU, which a record crowd of 15,217 witnessed.



### **LADY TIGERS AT HOME**

- ▶ Recorded a then Louisiana women’s basketball record attendance of 15,217 when No. 4 LSU hosted No. 3 Tennessee on Feb. 23, 2003 in the PMAC (The record was broken at the 2004 Final Four in New Orleans Arena). The previous record was set just a little over a month before when 11,252 paid to see No. 2 LSU host No. 15 Penn State in Pack the PMAC VII.

LSU's Women's Basketball Complex area ranks among the finest in college basketball. The project was started in the spring of 2003 and was completed prior to the start of the 2003-04 season, although it is constantly being modified.

The spacious Jinks Coleman Team Room is the focal point of the complex, a fully carpeted and well-lit, locker room. A new squad room with a large projection screen for viewing scouting video, and practice and game film, and a lounge are also features of the complex.

The locker room complex, located just up the ramp in the Maravich Center, includes a big screen television, a computer station, and a lounge for student-athletes to study and visit before and after practice and games.

The new LSU Women's Basketball Complex, which cost over \$500,000 to create, was paid for by the Tiger Athletic Foundation, the LSU Athletic Department and the Women's Basketball Fast Break Club. The various state-of-the-art displays cost over \$225,000 and were funded by a committee to raise funds headed by the Fast Break Club. The art work was a seven-month process that included the Lady Tigers coaching staff, along with the LSU sports information department, going over several designs before choosing the final art.

# DR. MARTIN BROUSSARD

LSU's multi-million dollar athletic training facility is named in honor of Dr. Martin J. Broussard, the legendary trainer whose career spanned over 40 years at LSU, having been appointed to the position of head athletic trainer in 1948. Following his semi-retirement from the day-to-day work as trainer in 1993, he continued to serve the LSU as an Assistant to the Athletic Director through 2001 giving him well over 50 years of service to the Athletic Department.

Among his many accomplishments was the formulation of "Quick Kick", an isotonic drink used to replace liquids, vitamins and the electrolytes lost through sweating. He was a trainer for the Pan American Games in 1955 and the U.S. Olympic team in 1960. In 1963, the Rockne Foundation named him Trainer of the Year. In 1978, Broussard was named to the NATA Hall of Fame followed by the Louisiana Athletic Trainer's Hall of Fame in 1982.

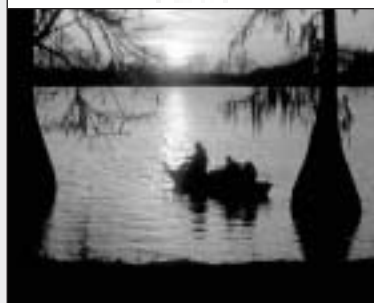

## SUE GUNTER

1980 USA Head Coach, 1976 Assistant Coach

Sue Gunter's coaching career extends beyond the boundaries of the Southeast with an international resume that laid the groundwork for today's Olympic success story. Gunter was the head coach of the USA National Team in 1976, which set the table for her assistant coaching position under Billie Moore and the 1976 Olympic team. In their first Olympic appearance, the USA brought home the silver medal in Montreal. Gunter was then named head coach of the USA national team in both 1978 and 1980, leading to her being named the head coach of the USA Olympic team in 1980. The 1980 Olympic team included such great players like Denise Curry, Carol Blazekowski, Anne Donovan, Rosie Walker, and Lynette Woodard. The USA stormed to a 6-1 record during the qualifying tournament. However, the dream for Team USA's first Olympic gold medal was cut short when President Jimmy Carter ordered a boycott of the 1980 Olympic games in protest of the Soviet Union's invasion of Afghanistan.

At LSU, O'Neal averaged 21.6 points and 13.6 rebounds for his career, and in 1991, he was named the World's Amateur Athlete of the Year as well as SEC Athlete of the Year and National Player of the Year. In 1997, he was named as one of the top 50 players in NBA history.

One of the true legends of college football in the South, Cannon was the 1959 Heisman Trophy winner and helped the Tigers to the 1958 national title. Cannon's most memorable performance came in 1959 against Ole Miss when No. 1 LSU trailed No. 3 Ole Miss 3-0 in the fourth quarter. He fielded a punt, broke seven tackles and returned it 89 yards for the 7-3 victory. He went on to a successful 11-year professional career.

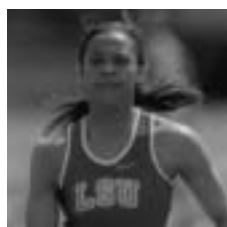
A legend in the college baseball ranks, Bertman created a dynasty at LSU, guiding the Tigers to five national titles in a 10-year stretch from 1991-2000. Bertman retired from coaching following the 2001 season and is currently the LSU athletic director.

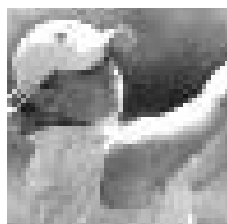
## WALTER DAVIS

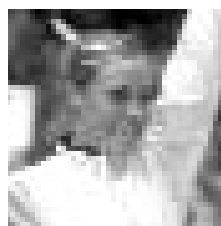
## MEREDITH DUNCAN

One of three four-time first-team All-SEC selections in conference history, Sneed was a two-time SEC Player of the Year and was a three-time NFCA All-American, leading the Tigers to the Women's College World Series in 2001.



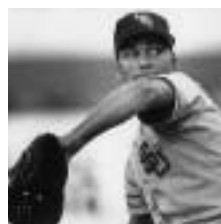
## DAVID TOMS

### DR. JAMES ANDREWS

A world-renowned orthopedic surgeon. Andrews is a 1963 graduate of LSU and a 1967 graduate of LSU Medical School. While at LSU, Andrews won the SEC indoor and outdoor titles in the pole vault.



### CARLOS ROBERTO FLORES

## LADY TIGERS **TIMELINE**

***LSU is entering its 29th season of women's basketball. The Lady Tigers first played basketball as a varsity sport in 1975-76 and since that inaugural season, LSU has posted 23 winning seasons, played in 14 NCAA Tournaments, and advanced to the AIAW National Championship game in 1977.***

### The Coaches

LSU has had four coaches in its history with Jinks Coleman serving as the school's first head coach and Pokey Chatman as its newest. Coleman coached the Lady Tigers for three and a half years before stepping down midway through the 1978-79 season. In 3-plus years with the Lady Tigers, Coleman guided LSU to a 91-32 overall mark. Her crowning moment with LSU came during the 1976-77 season as she led the Lady Tigers to the AIAW National Championship game. LSU fell to top-ranked Delta State, but that 1977 team remains the only squad in school history to play for a national title.

Coleman was replaced by Barbara Swanner midway through the 1979 season and Swanner coached the Lady Tigers for the next three years. She led LSU to an overall mark of 57-50 before ending her coaching career at the conclusion of the 1981-82 season.

Sue Gunter joined the Lady Tigers for the 1982-83 season and has been in Baton Rouge ever since. In 20 seasons with the Lady Tigers, Gunter led the Lady Tigers to 442 victories and guided her teams to 14 NCAA Tournament appearances, the 1991 and 2003 SEC Tournament titles and the 2004 NCAA Final Four. Gunter, who retired following the 2003-04 season, is member of the Women's Basketball Hall of Fame.

Chatman replaced Gunter after serving as the acting head coach for 20 games in 2003-04, guiding the team to a 15-5 mark, including the program's first trip to the NCAA Final Four.

### The 1970s

The decade of the 1970's saw the start of women's basketball as a varsity sport at LSU. The Lady Tigers played their first game in November of 1975, losing to Whitworth, 64-58. LSU's first win came a week later with a 75-62 win over Southwestern Louisiana. The win was the first of 17 for the Lady Tigers in their inaugural season as LSU posted a first-year mark of 17-14.

A year later, LSU, behind the play of a couple of Australians in Maree Jackson and Julie Gross, was playing for the AIAW National title. After going unrecognized for much of the year, LSU finally began to gain some respect with wins over three ranked teams in February. The Lady Tigers entered the AIAW State Tournament on a roll, however, LSU lost to Louisiana Tech and Northwestern State, but they were still able to advance to the AIAW Regional Tournament. At Regionals, the Lady Tigers beat Texas, Stephen F. Austin and Baylor to advance to the AIAW National Tournament. By this time the Lady Tigers were ranked No. 11 in the nation and after wins over Western Washington and Baylor, LSU was in the Final Four. LSU knocked off second-ranked Immaculata, 74-68, in the semifinals and then fell to top-ranked Delta State, 68-55, in the national title game. LSU finished with a 29-8 overall mark, the second-most victories recorded in school history in a single year.

In 1977-78, the Lady Tigers achieved their first and only No. 1 ranking as LSU spent most of January and February atop the Associated Press poll, after having

started the year ranked No. 2 in the nation. The Lady Tigers stayed there until Feb. 15 when Tennessee moved ahead of LSU. Despite being ranked No. 2 in the nation, LSU couldn't advance out of the Regionals as the Sue Gunter-coached Stephen F. Austin LadyJacks eliminated the Lady Tigers in the semifinals. LSU still won 37 games, which remains the school record for victories in a season.

LSU closed out the decade of the 1970's with a coaching change as Jinks Coleman stepped down after 15 games in the 1978-79 season. With an 8-7 mark, Coleman was replaced by Barbara Swanner, who guided LSU to a 5-5 mark over the final 10 games of the year. LSU finished with a 13-12 record.

## The 1980s

The decade of the 80's saw LSU establish itself as one of the top programs in the country.

LSU opened the decade under Barbara Swanner and posted a 17-17 mark and reached the semifinals of the AIAW Regional Tournament.

A year later, Joyce Walker came to Baton Rouge and put women's basketball at LSU back on the map. Walker, who was way ahead of her time, could do it all. In her first year with the Lady Tigers she averaged 20.7 points a contest and led the Lady Tigers to a 17-15 mark.

A year later, the NCAA became the governing body of women's athletics and the NCAA Tournament was started. The Lady Tigers didn't make the NCAA Tournament in 1982, but still posted an 18-13 overall mark as Walker averaged 24.9 points a contest. That season was Swanner's last year as head coach of the Lady Tigers.

The 1982-83 season was the first for the Lady Tigers under Sue Gunter, who came to LSU from

Stephen F. Austin in Nacogdoches, Texas. In her first year with LSU, Gunter guided the Lady Tigers to a 20-7 mark and a tie for first place in the Western Division of the SEC.

Walker's last year with LSU in 1983-84 marked the Lady Tigers' first-ever appearance in the NCAA Tournament. LSU went 23-7 and reached the Sweet 16 at the NCAA Tournament before falling to Louisiana Tech.

In 1984-85, the Lady Tigers claimed the National Women's Invitational Tournament (NWIT) title with a 74-54 win over Florida in the championship game.

LSU's best season since 1977 occurred in 1985-86 as the Lady Tigers climbed all the way to No. 8 in the nation and reached the Elite Eight at the NCAA Tournament before falling to Tennessee in the final seconds, 67-65.

Another 20-win season followed in 1986-87 as the Lady Tigers spent most of the year ranked in the top 10. However, the Lady Tigers lost their last three games, including a 70-56 setback to Southern Illinois in the second round of the NCAA Tournament.

The 1987-88 season saw the arrival of Dana "Pokey" Chatman, the best point guard in school history.

Chatman helped guide the Lady Tigers to an 18-11 mark and another NCAA Tournament appearance. LSU closed out the 1980's with its fifth NCAA Tournament appearance as LSU reached the Sweet 16 before falling to Louisiana Tech.

## The 1990s

The decade of the 1990's was one of ups and downs for the Lady Tigers. LSU opened the decade with a 21-9 overall mark and its fifth NCAA Tournament appearance.

A year later, the Pokey Chatman era came to an end as the Lady Tigers posted a 24-7 overall mark, won the school's only SEC Tournament title and were seeded No. 2 in the Midwest Region of the NCAA Tournament.

The 1991-92 season started the Cornelia Gayden era, but it was also the beginning of a stretch that saw the Lady Tigers go five years without an appearance in the NCAA Tournament. LSU posted a 16-13 overall mark, but five straight losses in mid-February kept the Lady Tigers home in March.

A year later in 1992-93, the Lady Tigers had their first-ever losing record as LSU went 9-18 and was winless in the SEC for the first time. Things weren't much better in 1993-94 as LSU went 11-16 overall and tied for 10th in the SEC.

One of the bright spots in 1994-95 was Sue Gunter's 500th career victory on the same night Gayden set an NCAA record with 12 3-point goals in a 92-62 win over Jackson State on Feb. 9 in Baton Rouge. LSU suffered through its worst record ever that year as the Lady Tigers posted a 7-20 mark.

Despite the losing record the year prior, LSU signed one of the nation's best recruiting classes for the 1995-96 season and the results were immediate. LSU had the biggest turnaround in SEC history as the Lady Tigers went from 7-20 in 1994-95 to 21-11 in 1995-96. Junior college transfers Elaine Powell and Pietra Gay help lead LSU to a win over second-ranked Georgia in the SEC Tournament as the Lady Tigers appeared to be headed for its first NCAA Tournament appearance in five years, but was denied. The Lady Tigers settled for the NWIT, where they placed third out of eight teams.

The following year, LSU posted its best record in the 90's as they went 25-5 overall, won nine SEC games and reached the Sweet 16 for the first time since 1989. In 1997-98, the Lady Tigers, in what was supposed to be a rebuilding year, posted a 19-13 overall mark and reached the semifinals of the Women's NIT.

In 1998-99 the Lady Tigers, behind the play of senior point guard Latasha Dorsey, the only senior on the

team, reached the Sweet 16 for the second time in three years and finished second in the SEC with a school-record 10 league wins. LSU's 22-8 overall mark in 1998-99 was LSU's fourth 20-win season of the 1990s.

## The 2000s

The Lady Tigers rolled into the new millennium much like they way they ended the old one. In 1999-2000, LSU was 25-7 overall and 11-3 in the SEC, the best record for the program since 1996-97. The 11-3 conference mark was the best in the school's history. LSU rode that success all the way to the program's second Elite Eight appearance in the NCAA Tournament, falling to Connecticut in the regional final.

Another 20-win season greeted the Lady Tigers in 2000-01, compiling a 20-11 mark, including the fifth straight winning conference record at 8-6.

The 2001-02 season could have been one of the finest in recent history. Gunter's group of just six healthy players collected 18 victories, including a trip to the SEC Tournament Championship game and a fourth straight trip to the NCAA Tournament.

Building on the success of the previous two seasons, the 2002-03 team went even further, ending the season with a 30-4 record, winning the SEC Tournament title, advancing to the NCAA Elite Eight and finishing the season ranked No. 3 in the national rankings.

It was in 2003-04 that the much eluded goal of the Lady Tigers was reached, advancing to the Final Four. The 2003-04 team posted at 27-8 record and steamed through the NCAA Tournament on its way to New Orleans and the Final Four.

Now, the program, under first-year head coach Pokey Chatman, is poised to take it one step further.

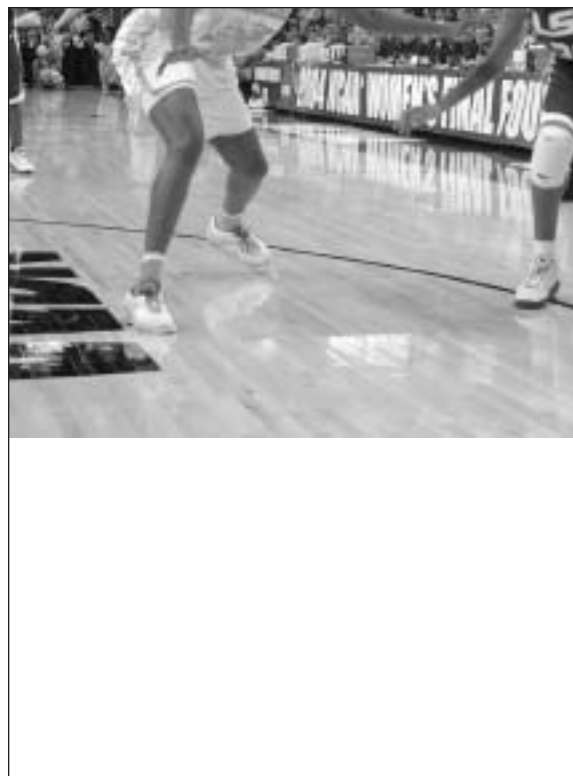

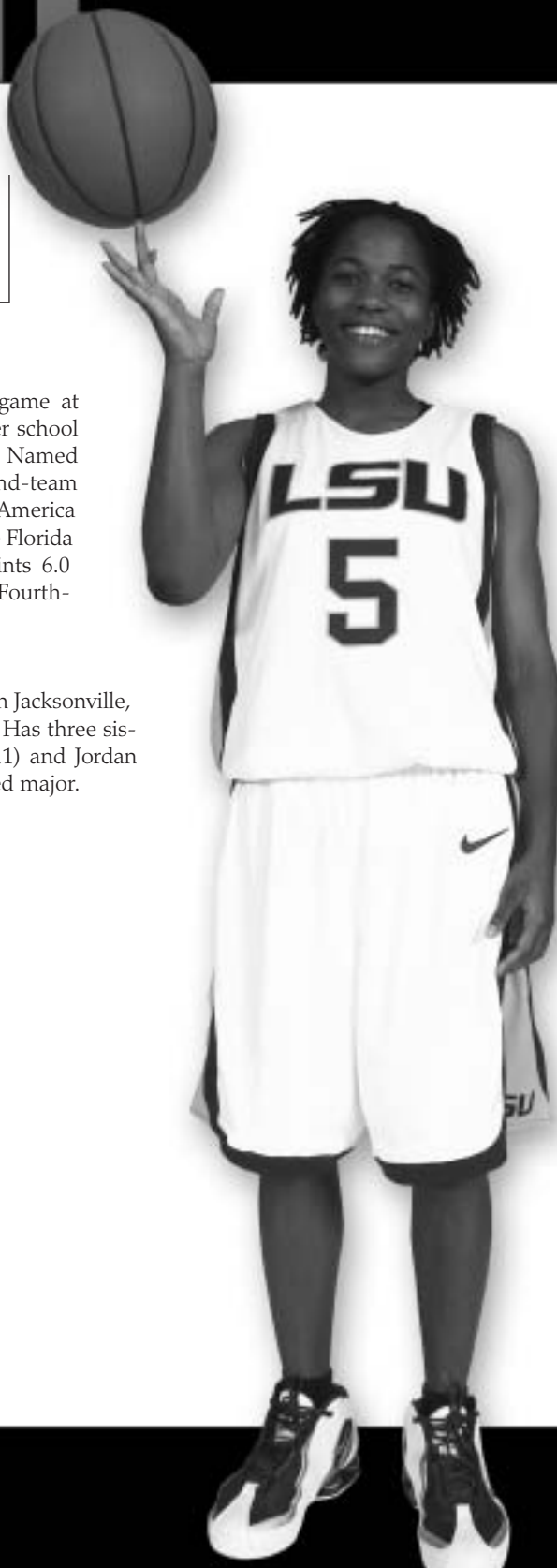

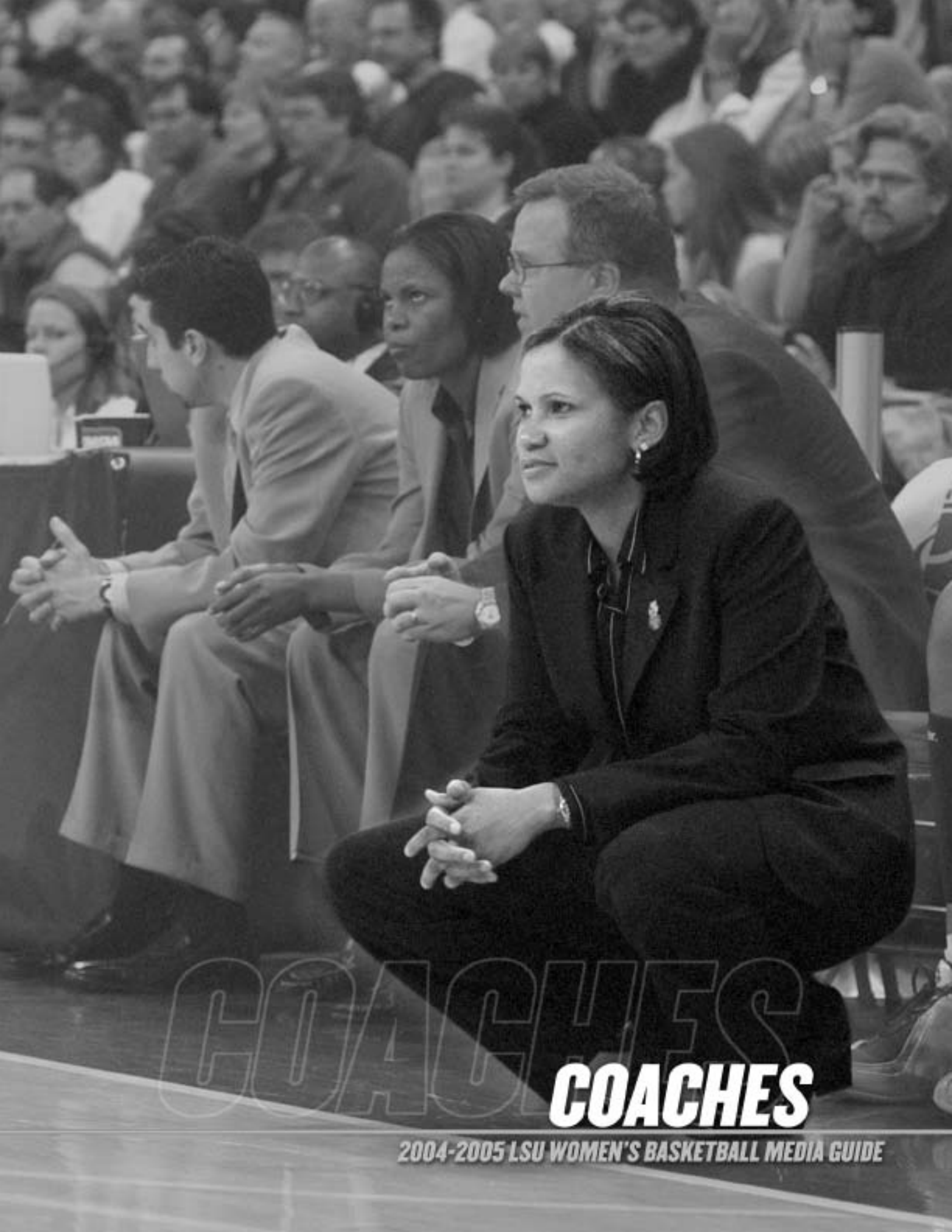

# POKEY CHATMAN

Head Coach - First Season > 14th Season Overall > 2004 Black Coaches Association Coach of the Year

It happens every so often in college sports: a legend becomes synonymous with a school's program. It happens when a coach enjoys sustained success, and her career defines the very history of the sport. That was Sue Gunter and LSU Lady Tiger Basketball.

What ultimately comes next is the sometimes impossible task of replacing the legend, finding just the right person to carry on traditions, yet establish a new but equally successful identity.

At LSU, the search was short and the speculation negligible. Pokey Chatman has helped build the very program the legend was leaving behind, and she has prepared herself well for the opportunity to step in as head coach.

In fact, that opportunity came sooner and in a manner no one had anticipated. When Gunter fell ill during the 2003-04 season, Chatman stepped to the front and seamlessly led LSU to the first Final Four in school history and a second-place finish in the SEC. Chatman led the Lady Tigers to a 15-5 record in the absence of Gunter from the sidelines. Included in those victories were five wins over top 25 teams, including the school's first victory over a No. 1 seed in the NCAA Tournament, a 71-55 drubbing of Texas in the West Regional Semifinal prior to upsetting SEC foe Georgia in the regional final to advance to the Final Four.

When Gunter announced she would retire after a Hall of Fame coaching career marked by 40 years and 708 victories, LSU athletics director Skip Bertman smartly turned to Chatman, an LSU Hall of Famer herself, and an All-American guard who had been with Gunter as both a player and an assistant coach for 17 years.

The call came on April 27, 2004, when Bertman named Chatman as only the fourth head coach in the history of LSU Women's Basketball.

Chatman had just completed her 13th season on the Lady Tiger staff, and her fifth as an associate coach after being elevated to that position in September 1999. But in 2003-04, Chatman became the most famous associate coach in the country when she took on the role of acting head coach in Gunter's absence, earning the Black Coaches Association's National Coach of the Year honors for her efforts in relief.

The way Chatman guided the Lady Tigers through the second half of the season, into March Madness and a trip to the Final Four only added an exclamation point on what everyone already knew about Chatman's coaching potential.

Chatman, who dazzled LSU fans for four years as LSU's starting point guard in the late 1980s and early 1990s, developed a reputation as one of the nation's best recruiters, and one of the top up-and-coming coaches in the collegiate ranks. Chatman

led LSU's recruiting efforts over the last nine years and as a result, the Lady Tigers have had eight straight classes rank among the top 20 in the nation, including this year's incoming class which features three Parade All-Americans in Sylvia Fowles, Quinna Chaney and Erica White.

Chatman helped LSU land another top incoming freshmen class in 2003, in All-American Marian Whitfield out of Georgia, Swedish National team member Hanna Biernacka and New Orleans native Khalilah Mitchell.

The previous four years were also highly productive for Chatman. She helped the Lady Tigers land 2002 National High School Player of the Year Seimone Augustus, Aiysha Smith, a Kodak Junior College All-American who was the first-round pick of the Washington Mystics of the WNBA in 2003, two years ago, prep All-American Doneeka Hodges and AAU teammate Temeka Johnson out of New Orleans three years ago and Ke-Ke Tardy, the top player in Mississippi and ranked the 11th best player in the nation prior to the 1998-99 season.

Chatman was also responsible for bringing DeTrina White, one of the top 15 rated players in the country in 1998, who went on to become the 1998-99 National Freshman of the Year.

Since joining the Lady Tigers staff, Chatman has tutored some of the finest guards in the country. Marie Ferdinand was a 2001 Kodak All-American selection and a finalist for the prestigious Naismith Award, given to the nation's best collegiate player. In addition to averaging over 21 points a game her senior season, she was a finalist for the Shooting Guard of the Year Award given out by ESPN. Ferdinand, a first round draft pick in the WNBA, is currently playing for the San Antonio Silver Stars and is a two-time WBA All-Star.

Chatman also worked with Cornelia Gayden, a three-time All-SEC pick who holds the NCAA record for 3-point goals in a single-game with 12 against Jackson State. Other standouts under Chatman include

Elaine Powell, a two-time first-team All-SEC selection, Pietra Gay, an All-SEC pick in 1997, and Latasha Dorsey, a first team Defensive All-American in 1999. Powell was the starting point guard in the 2003 World Champion Detroit Shock, while Gay was a member of the 1997 WNBA World Champion Houston Comets.

Before being named to assistant coach prior to the 1992-93 season, Chatman served one season, 1991-92, as a student assistant with the Lady Tigers. Chatman, a Kodak All-American point guard for the Lady Tigers in 1991, graduated from Hahnville High School in 1987. She received her Bachelor's degree from LSU in December of 1991.

During her four years with the Lady Tigers, Chatman started all but one game and was the school's all-time assists and steals leader with 570 and 346, respectively when she finished her career. Chatman held the assist record until the 2003-04 season when current Lady Tigers point guard Temeka Johnson passed her coach for the top spot. She also finished fifth on the all-time scoring list with 1,826 points where she still ranks entering the 2004-05 season. Chatman played in the NCAA Tournament four times and posted a four-year record of 82-38.

Chatman was a three-time All-SEC selection and in 1991 led the Lady Tigers to their first-ever SEC Tournament title. Chatman was named MVP of the 1991 SEC Tournament, also a first for LSU.

Chatman capped her career at LSU by being selected to the prestigious Kodak All-American team following her senior season in 1991. Chatman is one of only five Lady Tigers named to the Kodak team. Chatman set a total of 20 school records while at LSU with five of those records still standing.

Chatman was inducted into the LSU Athletics Hall of Fame in the spring of 1999.

## BOB

Assistant Coach - 16th Season

Bob Starkey enters his seventh season on the LSU women's basketball staff after joining the team on a full-time basis in 1998. Starkey had served as the administrative assistant for both the LSU men's and women's basketball team for two years prior to joining the Lady Tigers as assistant coach.

Starkey works with all phases of the program, which includes working with both perimeter and post players on the practice floor. He also breaks down game tape and develops game plans while compiling scouting reports on LSU's opponents. Starting four years ago, Starkey added recruiting to his list of responsibilities. He brought a wealth of experience to the Lady Tigers' recruiting efforts, having worked as a recruiter for LSU men's basketball, at Marshall University, and at West Virginia State.

In his first year working as a recruiter for the Lady Tigers, Starkey helped sign a class of newcomers that ranked as high as fifth nationally, including Kodak Junior College All-American Aiysha Smith. In his second year on the recruiting trail, Starkey helped LSU ink one of the best classes in the nation, which included Baton Rouge native and National High School Player of the Year Seimone Augustus. This past season, Starkey helped LSU sign another of the nation's top classes, including all-Americans Sylvia Fowles, Quianna Chaney and Erica White.

In addition, Starkey handles all scheduling for the Lady Tigers, serves as the Director of the LSU women's basketball teams' Fast Break Club, and is also involved in all areas of promotions for the women's program. With his help, the Lady Tigers had a banner year in 2002-03, drawing 4,457 fans per game in the PMAC, almost tripling the previous year's average. The Lady Tigers had at least 3,000 fans attend nine of the team's 15 home games, including the two largest crowds in school history with 15,217 against Tennessee and 11,252 against Penn State.

As the administrative assistant, Starkey provided valuable assistance to both the men's and women's programs, handling many of the responsibilities for both groups that would ease the work load for the coaching staff, allowing them to concentrate fully on their teams, recruiting and future opponents.

Starkey served as tournament director for the 1997 NCAA Women's Basketball Subregional held at the Maravich Assembly Center. The NCAA Subregional was the first for LSU to host and it was also called by many that attended the event as one of the best-run subregionals since the NCAA changed tournament formats.

Perhaps Starkey's finest achievement in the role of administrative assistant came in the Pack the PMAC games. In the 1997 Pack the PMAC contest against Arkansas, LSU drew a school-record 6,552 fans for the contest. The 6,552 fans for the contest nearly tripled the previous record crowd of 2,454 set against Ole Miss

in 1984. A year later against Ole Miss, LSU reset the school-mark with a crowd of 7,255 for Pack the PMAC II. Three years ago, the school record crowd of 9,636 for the Pack the PMAC V game against Auburn was at the time the largest attendance ever for a women's basketball game in the state of Louisiana. Two years ago 11,252 fans packed the PMAC for nationally televised

game against Penn State, setting both the LSU and state record, only to be broken later in the season when 15,217 paid to see No. 3 LSU battle No. 2 Tennessee. The Pack the PMAC promotion has developed into an LSU tradition, as Pack the PMAC IX will take place this season.

Prior to his stint as an administrative assistant, Starkey served as an assistant coach for Dale Brown on the LSU men's basketball staff from 1990-1996, during which time the Tigers participated in four NCAA Tournaments. While on the men's staff, Starkey coached three first-round NBA draft picks in Shaquille O'Neal, Chris Jackson and Stanley Roberts. As a recruiter, he helped sign three nationally-ranked recruiting classes, including one which was rated No. 1 in the country.

Groomed on the high school level in West Virginia, Starkey started his coaching career as an assistant at Winfield High School where he helped guide the boys' program to a five-year record of 72-45 and the girls' program to an 87-23 record.

Starkey then made his first appearance in the collegiate ranks as an assistant at West Virginia College on the NAIA level. In his three-year stint at West Virginia State, the program blossomed with improving records of 17-10, 26-4 and 31-4. That final season saw the Yellow Jackets capture conference and district titles on their way to the NAIA National Championship game, where they were a one-point loser to Washburn University.

Following that, Starkey also served for one year at Poca High School in West Virginia with his former high school coach, Allen Osborne, and teamed up for the 1988-89 season with Judy Southard to lead the women's program at Marshall to an 18-10 record and a regular season Southern Conference Championship. Southard is now in her third year as the Senior Woman Administrator at LSU after serving as the Athletic Director at Texas Women's University.

Starkey, who considers himself a full-time student of the game, has written numerous articles and has authored such basketball books as The 2-3 Match-Up Defense and Motion Offense.

His latest project is a Basketball Coaching Series of books that include The Art of Being An Assistant Coach, The Art of Scouting and The Art of Motivation.

The native of Charleston, W.V., is married to Sherie Hayslett, also a native of West Virginia.

# CARLA BERRY

**Assistant Coach - Fourth Season**

Carla Berry enters her fourth season as an assistant coach for the Lady Tigers and will coordinate all facets of recruiting and oversee academics. Berry was a guard for the LSU women's basketball team from 1988-92 and was a member of the 1991 SEC Tournament championship team.

Bringing four years of recruiting experience to the program, Berry joined the accomplished LSU staff that has had eight signing classes rank among the top 20 in the nation over the last nine years, four of which have been ranked in the top 10.

Berry was an integral part of signing this year's freshman class that includes all-Americans Sylvia Fowles, Quianna Chaney and Erica White.

In just her first year on the staff, Berry helped the Lady Tigers sign one of the nation's top classes that included National High School Player of the Year Seimone Augustus prior to the 2001-02 season.

The opportunity to return to LSU was one that Berry could not pass up after having played for Coach Gunter and the Lady Tigers. As one of the team's chief recruiters, her commitment to the program and its success is personal and transcends just her professional obligations as a coach.

As a former LSU player, Berry has the ability to discuss the strengths of the program with recruits and lay out the opportunities LSU has to offer its student-athletes.

Berry, an Academic All-SEC selection in 1992, helped LSU advance to three NCAA Tournament appearances and was a part of the Lady Tigers' 1991 SEC Tournament Championship team. In 1993, she earned her bachelor's degree in advertising.

After graduating, she returned home to Alabama where she spent one season as a graduate assistant coach for the University of South Alabama in 1993-94. Berry then took a position as an assistant coach and recruiting coordinator for Cal Poly-San Luis

Obispo in 1994 as the Lady Mustangs made the difficult transition from NCAA Division II to Division I competition.

Taking a position at St. John's University in 1995, she spent three years with the women's basketball program as the top assistant and recruiting coordinator, working with current Lady Tiger administrative assistant Joe Carvalhido. Coaching a team that was in the process of rebuilding, the program showed improvement each year she was there, including a 13-win season in her final year. Additionally, in her three seasons at St. John's, the Red Storm penned a pair of recruiting classes ranked in the top 50 nationally, including one top 25 class that included former Lady Tiger and current Washington Mystic Aiysha Smith.

In addition to her recruiting responsibilities at LSU, Berry will also oversee academics for the Lady Tigers. Working closely with the Cox Communication Academic Center for Student-Athletes, she will help coordinate study hall and tutoring, while monitoring the academic progress for the student-athletes. Her primary on-court assignment will be coaching LSU's guards.

Berry spent two years working in sales for Cingular Wireless (formerly BellSouth Mobility) in her hometown of Mobile, Ala., prior to joining the Lady Tigers staff. She took the two years off from coaching to assist with an illness in the family.

Christie Sides, a Baton Rouge native, enters her first season as a member of the LSU Lady Tigers basketball coaching staff as an assistant coach.

Sides comes to LSU after spending the past two seasons on the Louisiana Tech coaching staff, the first as administrative assistant and this past season as assistant coach. During her time there, Tech posted a 60-6 overall record and a 35-1 mark in the Western Athletic Conference.

A graduate of Central Private High School in Baker, La., Sides' responsibilities include recruiting, assisting in all areas of Lady Tiger Basketball Camp, on-court coaching, working primarily with the perimeter players, and fundraising.

She joins current assistant coaches Bob Starkey and Carla Berry on

Chatman's staff. Chatman was named head coach of the program in April following the retirement of 22-year head coach Sue Gunter. Chatman and her staff led LSU to the program's first

NCAA Final Four appearance this past season in the absence of Gunter who was sidelined due to illness.

Prior to her years at Louisiana Tech, Sides spent two seasons as the head junior varsity coach and assistant varsity coach at Ruston (La.) High School where she served under Ricky Durrett. While at Ruston High, Sides helped guide the Lady Bearcats to consecutive state playoff appearances, including a 31-10 record in 2000-01 and a berth in the Louisiana High School Athletic Association Sweet 16 Tournament. During the 2001-02 season, Ruston High posted a 23-11 mark and advanced to the regionals of the LHSAA girls state playoffs.

Sides played her first two collegiate seasons at Ole Miss for Hall of Fame coach Van Chancellor and helped the Rebels to a 34-22 overall record. She then transferred to Louisiana Tech where she finished her playing career for fellow Hall of Fame coach Leon Barmore. Sides helped the Lady Techsters to a 61-6 record in two seasons, including a trip to the 1999 Final Four. She holds the career record at Tech for three-point field goal percentage and ranks seventh in three-pointers made and eighth in three-pointer attempted.

Prior to her collegiate playing career Sides led Central Private High School to the state championship her senior season while earning the Louisiana Gatorade Player of the Year award and all-state honors. She ended her high school playing career ranked No. 1 in school history with 3,375 points.

Sides earned her bachelor's degree in health and physical education from Tech in 2000.

# SUE GUNTER

40 seasons > 708 wins > Women's Basketball Hall of Famer

Sue Gunter added another and undoubtedly the best chapter to her coaching legacy this past year as the Walnut Grove, Miss., native continued to stake her claim as one of the greatest coaches in the history of the women's game.

In Gunter's unprecedented 40th and final season as a collegiate head coach, she led the LSU Lady Tigers to the program's first NCAA Final Four, despite missing numerous games due to illness. In her 22nd season at the helm of LSU, Gunter's Lady Tigers posted a 27-8 record, finished second in the Southeastern Conference, advanced to the Final Four and finished No. 3 in the final poll.

Gunter, who became the third women's coach in history to reach 700 career victories with a win over Arkansas on Feb. 12, 2004, has been with women's basketball on the collegiate level every step of the way and has seen the sport evolve from a novelty back in the early 1960s to present day, where the Final Four is sold out years in advance and games are shown nightly on national television.

Gunter, who was inducted into the Women's Basketball Hall of Fame in June 2000, completes her career among the leaders in several NCAA coaching categories: seasons coached (No. 1 - 40); games coached (No. 3 - 1,016); wins (No. 3 - 708); and 20-win seasons (No. 4 - 22).

Gunter's influence has been a catalyst behind the growth of the game and things have been no different in Baton Rouge as the Lady Tigers continue to play before school-record crowds and media attention is at an all-time high. In Gunter's 22-year tenure at LSU, her list of accomplishments are long and impressive -- 14 NCAA Tournament appearances, one trip to the Final Four, four NCAA Elite Eight appearances, eight NCAA Sweet 16 appearances, two SEC Tournament titles, a Women's NIT title, and a handful of Coach of the Year awards.

## Sue Gunter - The Coach

Sue Gunter led the LSU women's basketball program back to national prominence. After a three-year hiatus in the mid-1990's that saw the Lady Tigers suffer through the school's first-ever losing seasons, LSU has now been to post-season action eight straight years, including six trips to the NCAA Tournament.

To realize just how far the Lady Tigers have come, one has to go back to the 1994-95 season, the worst year in school history as LSU posted a 7-20 overall mark. Strangely enough, it was the 1994-95 season that proved to be the turning point for the Lady Tigers as Gunter turned up her recruiting magic and promptly signed the best class in school history. That class, which included future All-SEC selections in Elaine Powell, Pietra Gay and Toni Gross, won 46 games over two years and resurrected the LSU women's basketball program. The Lady Tigers have now won an average of 22.5 games per season since the 1994-95 campaign and once again, LSU women's basketball is back in the national scope.

This past season was undoubtedly one of Gunter's and LSU's finest on the court. The Lady Tigers won 27 games, finished second in the SEC with a 10-4 mark, received a No. 4 seed in the NCAA Tournament's West Region and advanced past Austin Peay, Maryland, No. 1 seed Texas and Georgia to reach the program's first Final Four right down the road in New Orleans. Gunter coached in her 1,000 game on Jan. 25, 2004 and recorded her 700th career victory later in the season against Arkansas. Sophomore Seimone Augustus earned Kodak All-American honors and was the Louisiana Player of the Year.

Gunter completed her career as the third winningest women's basketball coach in history with an overall record of 708-308, which included coaching stints at Middle Tennessee, Stephen F. Austin and LSU. Gunter's LSU record is 442-221, which makes her the winningest coach in school history.

Under the direction of Gunter, the Lady Tigers played in 14 NCAA Tournaments, one

National Women's Invitational Tournament and two WNIT events. Gunter led LSU to one Final Four and to the Elite Eight in 1986, 2000 and 2003, while leading the Lady Tigers to a championship at the National Women's Invitational Tournament in 1985. LSU also captured the 1991 and 2003 SEC Tournament titles. In addition, Gunter has directed LSU to 14 20-plus-win seasons, including one 30-win season.

Prior to her arrival in Baton Rouge, Gunter had a very successful coaching stint at Stephen F. Austin in Nacogdoches, Texas. While at SFA, Gunter built that program into a national powerhouse as she led the LadyJacks to a 266-87 mark in 12 years as head coach. In addition, she led Stephen F. Austin to four top 10 national rankings, which included No. 5 final rankings in 1979 and 1980. While at Stephen F. Austin, Gunter coached four sports - women's basketball, softball, tennis and track. Her basketball teams went to five Association of Intercollegiate Athletics for Women (IAIW) playoffs, won four state titles and earned a regional crown.

After 16 seasons at SFA, she relinquished the reigns and moved into the position of Director of Women's Athletics where she served two years before returning to the coaching ranks at LSU.

Gunter began her coaching career at Middle Tennessee State where she led the Blue Raiders to undefeated seasons in both of her years there.

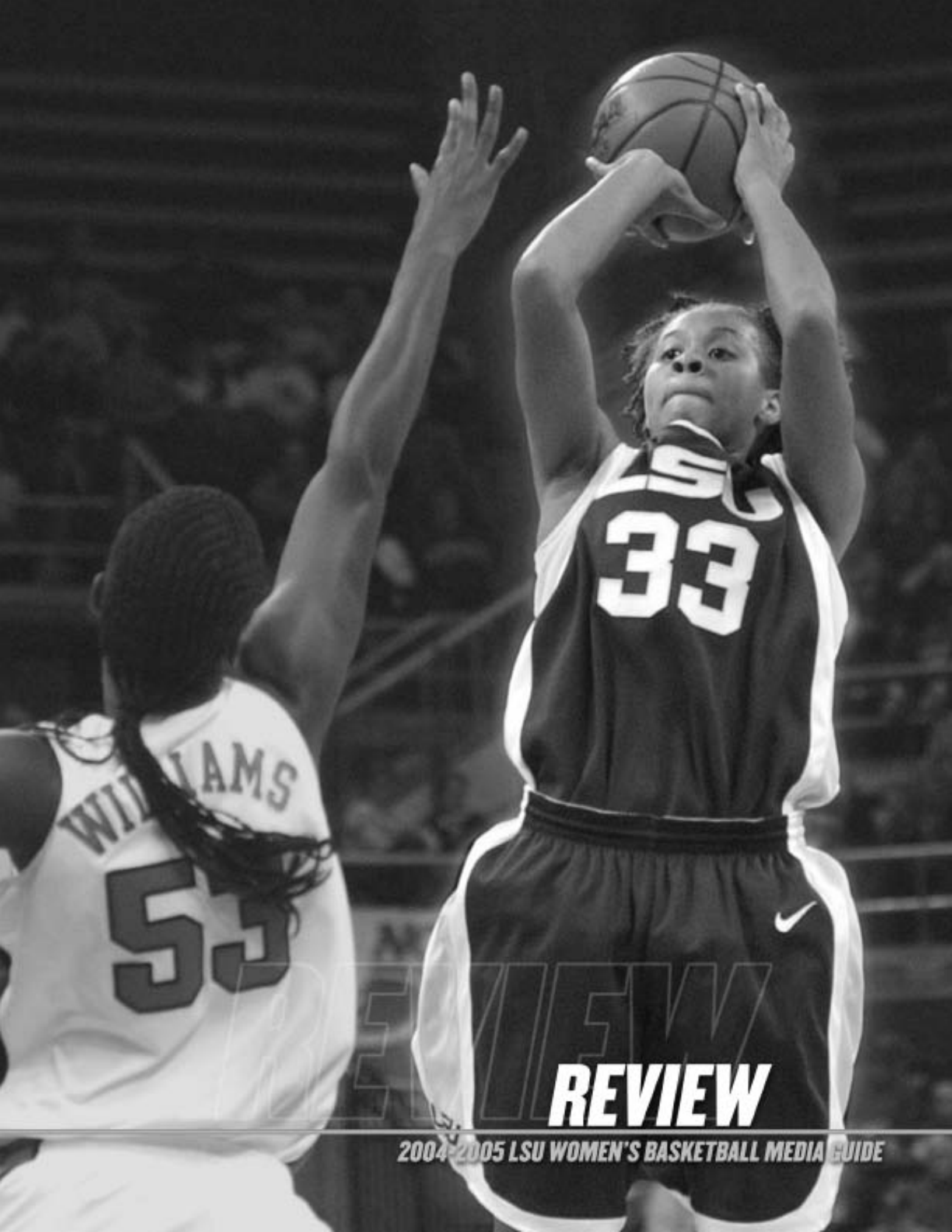

### FINALLY FOUR!

The Lady Tigers advanced to the first Final Four in the program's history with a victory over Georgia in the West Regional Final on March 29 in Seattle, Wash. LSU upended No. 3 seed Georgia 62-60 to advance to New Orleans after getting past top seeded Texas 71-55 in the regional semifinal. **Seimone Augustus**, named the West Regional MVP, scored 29 points in both games, while **Temeka Johnson**, a New Orleans native, joined Augustus on the All-Tournament team, scoring 16 points in the final and collecting a double double in the semifinal. The Lady Tigers' run ended in the national semifinal with a heartbreaking 52-50 loss to Tennessee in New Orleans.

### IN CONCLUSION...

LSU completed its milestone season with a 27-8 record and ranked no. 3 in the coaches poll. The Lady Tigers also finished second in the SEC with a 10-4 mark. The Lady Tigers, ranked in the top 25 all season, won at least 20 games for the 16th time in the program's history and defeated six ranked teams along the way, including Texas and Georgia to advance to the Final Four. LSU, which began the season with a win over Villanova in the Women's Sports Foundation Classic in Oregon, fell in the next two outings and then rattled off a school-record tying 15 straight victories, including beginning the SEC with four consecutive wins. There were also many milestones reached and records set during the season. Head coach **Sue Gunter** won her 700th career game (Feb. 12 vs. Arkansas) and coached her 1,000 career game (Jan. 25 at Georgia). **Temeka Johnson** broke the career and single season assists records, while **Doneeka Hodges**, **Seimone Augustus** and Johnson all reach 1,000 points in their respective careers. Awards also piled up for the Lady Tigers. Augustus was named Kodak All-American, third-team All-American by the AP and first-team All-SEC by both the coaches and the AP. Johnson

earned first-team by the coaches and second-team by the AP and Hodges was second-team by the coaches. Augustus was also a finalist for the Women's Wooden Award and Naismith Player of the Year, while Johnson is a finalist for the Lieberman

Point Guard of the Year Award. The year was capped by Hodges, the lone senior, being selected with the 25th pick of the WNBA draft by the Los Angeles Sparks.

### GUNTER GETS 700!

LSU head coach **Sue Gunter**, in her 22nd season with the Lady Tigers, picked up her 700th career victory on Feb. 12 against Arkansas. Despite missing the game due to illness, Gunter became the third women's coach to reach the milestone, joining Tennessee's Pat Summitt and Texas' Jody Conradt. Gunter has 442 wins in her 22nd season at LSU and collected 266 wins in her 12 seasons at Stephen F. Austin prior to her arrival in Baton Rouge.

### THE BIG 300!

The Lady Tigers' victory on Feb. 12 over Arkansas was the 300th for the program in the Pete Maravich Assembly Center. LSU has been playing in the Maravich Center since the 1975-76 season and has collected 300 victories, an average of 10.2 wins per season. The most wins in a season came during the 1999-2000 season when the Lady Tigers won 17.

### IN THE POLLS

LSU finished the season ranked No. 19 in both the Associated Press and third in USA Today/ESPN/WBCA polls. The final AP poll was released prior to the NCAA Tournament, while the coaches poll was released at the conclusion of the NCAA Tournament. LSU was been ranked in the top 20 the entire season and the No. 3 finish is the best in school history.



**AUGUSTUS NAMED TO KODAK TEAM**

**Seimone Augustus** was named to the 10-member Kodak All-American team by the Women's Basketball Coaches Association. The sophomore guard was the youngest player on the 2004 team and was one of just two underclassmen. Augustus is the fifth LSU player to earn the honor and sixth Kodak member. She joins Julie Gross (1978), Joyce Walker (1983, 1984), Pokey Chatman (1991) and Marie Ferdinand (2001).

**GUNTER TAKES LEAVE FROM BENCH COACHING DUTIES**

Head coach **Sue Gunter** took a medical leave of absence (acute bronchitis) from her bench coaching duties for the remainder of the season and post-season. She continued to participate in film sessions, practices and game preparation. **Pokey Chatman**, LSU's associate coach served as acting head coach. Gunter missed 20 games due to the illness. LSU is 15-5 in those games.

**Johnson OPTS TO PLAY NEXT YEAR**

Point guard **Temeka Johnson** announced on March 14 that she will return to LSU for another senior season. The New Orleans native, who has played two and a half seasons, was a partial qualifier and had to sit out her first three semesters. The NCAA granted Johnson her lost year back based on her good academic standing at LSU.

**Johnson GETS THE RECORD**

Senior point guard **Temeka Johnson** became LSU's all-time assists leader in a career when she collected her fourth assist at Florida on Feb. 15. She entered the game needing four to pass associate coach **Pokey Chatman** for the career lead and got it with 6:50 remaining in the game. Johnson, is just 93 games, finished the season with 667 assists (7.2 average).

**Johnson GETS ANOTHER TOP SPOT**

**Temeka Johnson**, LSU's point guard that already owns the records for assists by a sophomore and junior at LSU, climbed to the top of the list for assists by a senior with 11 against Alabama on Feb. 5.

**OWNER OF EVERY RECORD NOW**

**Temeka Johnson** now owns all of LSU's assists record by breaking the single-season mark on Feb. 22 against Mississippi State. The senior needed three assists to break mark of 201 held by Brenda McGuffee (1976-77) and collected six in the game. Johnson finished the season with 289 assists this season.

**Johnson TIES OWN RECORD**

**Temeka Johnson** tied her own school record of 15 assists in a game on Feb. 12 against Arkansas when the senior dished out 15 in the victory over the Lady Razorbacks. She set the record at Ole Miss on Jan. 17, 2002. She has dished out at least 10 assists 11 times this season.

**NCAA ASSIST RECORD**

**Temeka Johnson** broke the NCAA Tournament assist record with 50 in the 2004 tournament. The previous record was 47 set by LaQuan Stallworth of Louisiana Tech during the 1998 tournament. Johnson collected her 50 dishes in five games, while Stallworth played in six tournament games.

**25 WINS FOR SEVENTH TIME**

LSU won its 25th game of the season on March 23 against Maryland, marking the seventh time to reach the milestone in the programs' history. This is the second straight season LSU has

recorded at least 25 wins. **Sue Gunter** has guided the Lady Tigers in five of those seven 25-win seasons.

**Hodges GETS A GRAND!**

Senior **Doneeka Hodges** became the 22nd player in LSU Lady Tigers history to reach 1,000 career points when the New Orleans native hit her second field goal in the victory over Villanova on Nov. 15. She finished her career with 1,484 points, 10th on LSU career scoring list.

**GOT A GRAND**

**Seimone Augustus** became the 23rd player in school history to reach 1,000 career points when she scored her 15th point of the game with 9:43 left to play against Ole Miss on Feb. 26. She also became the eighth player at LSU to accomplish the feat in two seasons or less. Augustus finished the season with 1,183 points and sits in 14th-place, 55 points away from passing Patricia Woods for 13th spot.

**ANOTHER GRAND**

Senior guard **Temeka Johnson** became the third LSU player to reach 1,000 points in her career this season. The New Orleans native needed 14 points in the first-round game against Austin Peay on March 21 and finished with 17. She is the 24th player in school history to accomplish the feat and joins **Doneeka Hodges** who scored her 1,000 point in the season opener on Nov. 15 against Villanova and **Seimone Augustus** who reached 1,000 on Feb. 26 against Ole Miss. Johnson sits in 22nd-place in career scoring, needing 12 points to pass Latasha Dorsey for 21st.

**GUNTER COACHES 1,000TH**

**Sue Gunter**, in her 40th season as a head coach, became the third coach in women's basketball history to reach 1,000 games coached in a career on Jan. 25th at Georgia. She sits only behind Texas' Jody Conradt and Tennessee's Pat Summitt in reaching the milestone.

**GUNTER GETS FIRST FINAL FOUR**

**Sue Gunter**, in her 40th season as a head coach, can finally claim what has eluded her and the LSU program, a Final Four appearance. Gunter has coached the most games, collected the most victories and the most NCAA Tournament wins without making it to the Final Four until this season.

**DUO NAMED AP ALL-AMERICANS**

Sophomore **Seimone Augustus** was named third-team All-American by the Associated Press. The Baton Rouge native received the honor for the second straight season and is the first player in LSU history to earn AP All-America honors twice. **Temeka Johnson** was named honorable mention by the AP for the second year.

**AUGUSTUS HONORED BY THE USA**

**Seimone Augustus** was honored in December by USA Basketball by being named the Female Athlete of the Year. She was the MVP of the 2003 FIBA World Championship for Young Women this past summer as a member of the Gold Medal winning United States team. Augustus joins a long list of past winners of the award which includes Lisa Leslie, Teresa Edwards, Chamique Holdscaw, Dawn Staley and Cheryl Miller to name a few. San Antonio Spurs center **Tim Duncan** was named the Male Athlete of the Year.

Sophomore guard Seimone Augustus scored 21 points and junior guard Temeka Johnson added 17 with 12 assists, as fourth-seeded LSU defeated 14th-seed Austin Peay 83-66.

Augustus made 10-of-15 shots while adding five rebounds and three steals to pace the upstart Lady Tigers. Johnson's double double was her eighth of the season.

Freshman forward Hanna Biernacka and junior forward Tillie Willis each notched double digits scoring with 13 and 11, respectively.

The Lady Tigers never trailed and led by as many as 13 in the first half before taking a 40-30 lead into the lockerroom. LSU shot nearly 55 percent in the half.

The Lady Governors cut the lead to five only 2:23 into the second half on a three pointer by guard Cassandra Peek, however, they were unable to sustain the run and never got within 10 points after the 13-minute mark. LSU led by as many as 19 in the final minutes.

No. 4-seeded LSU needed 26 points from sophomore All-American Seimone Augustus to come from behind in the second half and advance to the Sweet 16 over No. 12-seeded Maryland, 76-61.

Trailing by one at halftime, 28-27, LSU outscored the Terrapins (18-13) 49-33 in the second half. Augustus scored 16 points in the second half on 8-of-12 shooting. She was 12 of 20 for the game and added four rebounds.

After LSU pulled out to a 10-2 lead only three minutes into the game, both teams struggled from the field in the first half. An Augustus jumper gave LSU a 16-11 lead at the 10:51 mark before Maryland scored nine straight points to notch their biggest lead of the game, 20-16, with 5:55 to play in the first half.

LSU shot only 35.5 percent (11 of 31) from the field in the first 20 minutes, while the Terrapins hit 10-of-30 shots for 33.3 percent.

Five Lady Tigers scored in double figures, as LSU committed only eight turnovers.

Turnabout is fair play, so goes the cliché. Nearly a year to the day after Texas eliminated top-seeded LSU from the 2003 NCAA Tournament, the fourth-seeded Lady Tigers advanced to the Elite 8 for the second-consecutive season with a 71-55 win over Texas.

Texas had no answer for LSU sophomore guard Seimone Augustus, who hit 14-of-19 shots and scored 29 points in 39 minutes of action.

Point guard Temeka Johnson posted her third-straight double double of the NCAA Tournament, as the 5-3 guard had 12 points, 13 assists, five rebounds and only two turnovers in 38 minutes of action.

LSU reserve forward Treynell Clavell came off the bench to play seven minutes and score 11 critical points in the post, while Doneeka Hodges had 10 points.

LSU outrebounded the Longhorns, 39-35, and had nine steals.

Who knew that the road to New Orleans from Baton Rouge went through Seattle? After coming back from seven points down with less than six minutes to play, the LSU women's basketball team advanced to its first Final Four, 62-60, over No. 3-seeded Georgia.

The Final Four berth is the first for the women's team, after falling in three previous Elite Eight appearances, most recently to Texas in 2003.

The fourth-seeded Lady Tigers needed a career-best 29 points for the second time in as many games out West from sophomore All-American Seimone Augustus to reign over the Southeastern Conference Tournament Champion Lady Bulldogs.

Augustus, the NCAA West Region's Most Outstanding Player at 26.3 points per game, made 12-of-19 shots including two three pointers, to keep the Lady Bulldogs near the cage throughout the evening. The 6-1 guard also grabbed eight rebounds, had two assists, two blocks and a steal.

Lady Tigers point guard Temeka Johnson, who was also named to the All-Tournament Team, had 16 points, five assists and four rebounds in 38 minutes of play.

Tennessee's Shyra Ely picked up a loose ball and passed to LaToya Davis for an uncontested layup with 1.2 seconds to play, as the Lady Vols eliminated LSU from its first NCAA Women's Final Four, 52-50.

With the game tied at 50-50, the fourth-seeded Lady Tigers (27-8) had the ball with 6.0 seconds left, but point guard Temeka Johnson was unable to shake off a triple team in the back court and her pass was tipped into the waiting hands of Ely.

Johnson's one-handed, 65-foot shot at the buzzer hit the top of the backboard and fell away.

Neither team shot the ball well in the battle of Southeastern Conference juggernauts. LSU managed to make only 19-of-50 shots (38 percent), while holding Tennessee to 18-of-57 shooting for 31.6 percent.

Critical to LSU's success was its ability to keep Tennessee off the boards, as the Lady Vols had 18 second-chance points and outrebounded the Lady Tigers by nine.

However, LSU dominated the otherwise post-oriented Tennessee offense, outscoring the Lady Vols in the paint, 38-20.

LSU All-American Seimone Augustus wasn't immune to the cold shooting, as the tournament's second-best percentage shooter made only 7-of-21 attempts. She scored a game-high 16 points and grabbed a team-high nine rebounds.

Johnson, who with eight tonight broke the tournament's 6-year-old assist record (50), added nine points on 3-of-8 shooting. Her last of only two turnovers was most costly.

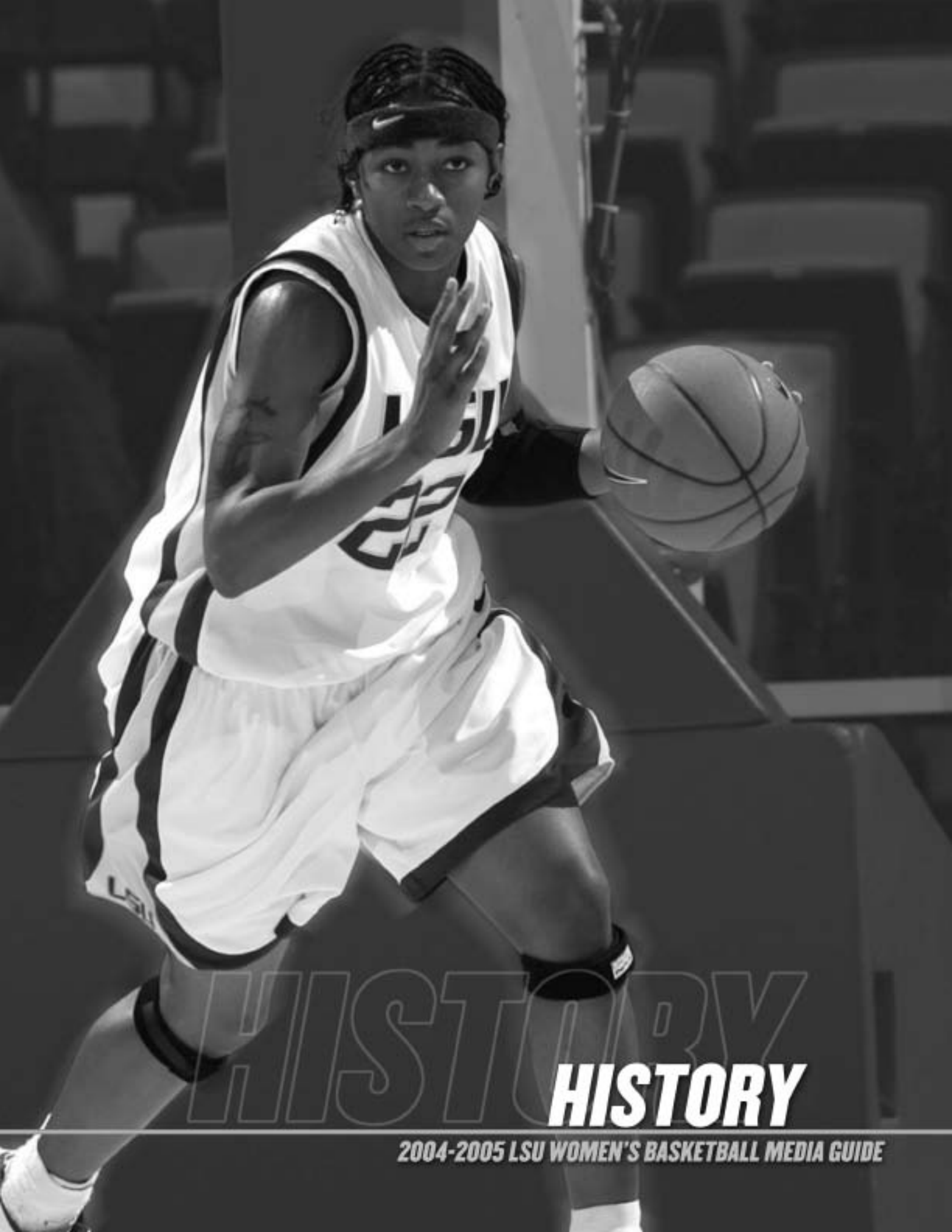

### Lady Tigers

The Only Lady Tiger

Team To Reach the National Championship Game of a post-season Tournament

With one of the most dominating forward-center combinations in LSU women's basketball history in Australians Julie Gross and Maree Jackson, the Lady Tigers enjoyed one of their finest seasons in 1976-77.

The Lady Tigers, behind the play of Gross and Jackson, started the season off slow, but ended its regular-season with a 21-5 mark.

The Lady Tigers then headed to the AIAW State Tournament in Ruston. LSU easily handled New Orleans in the first round, winning 85-58, followed by a 73-51 victory over Southern. Louisiana Tech stopped LSU in the semifinals as the Techsters posted a 101-88 win over LSU. The Lady Tigers then fell to Northwestern State, 87-82, but the Lady Tigers still managed to finish in second place at the state tournament.

By virtue of its second place finish at the state tournament, LSU advanced to the AIAW Regional Tournament in Monroe.

At the regional tournament, the Lady Tigers got on a roll as they whipped Texas, 95-67, in the first round followed by a 76-73 win over a Sue Gunter-coached Stephen F. Austin team in the semifinals. LSU beat Baylor, 92-76, in the championship game to advance to the AIAW National Tournament in Minneapolis, Minn.

At the AIAW National Tournament, the Lady Tigers drew Western Washington in the first round and had little trouble as the Lady Tigers, behind 40 points from Maree Jackson, raced out to 49-26 halftime lead and never looked back in their 91-53 win. Next up for the Lady Tigers was Baylor, a team that LSU had already beat twice during the season, which included a victory over the Bears in the regional finals.

LSU was once again victorious over Baylor as the Lady Tigers got 35 points and 26 rebounds from Maree Jackson advanced with a 71-64 win.

The Lady Tigers then moved into the semifinal round against Immaculata, a powerhouse in women's basketball at the time. Immaculata was ranked No. 2 in the nation and was considered a huge favorite in the contest with the Lady Tigers.

The Lady Tigers upset Immaculata, 74-68, despite the fact that Jackson played after having root canal surgery and Brenda McGuffie played with a severely sprained ankle. In addition, Jackson and McGuffie played the final 10 minutes of the contest with four fouls. Jackson finished with 29 points and 19 rebounds, while Gross had 23 points and 11 boards.

It was on to the national championship game for LSU as the 11th-ranked Lady Tigers would face top-ranked Delta State for the title.

Delta State scored the first six points of the contest and the Delta Devils quickly built a nine point advantage, 13-4, on a jumper by Debbie Brock at the 15:14 mark. LSU could get no closer than seven points the rest of the way as Lady Tiger All-American Jackson picked up her third foul with 5:54 to play in the first half. Delta State led 34-25 at intermission.

In the second half, Delta State never let the Lady Tigers back in the contest as the Delta Devils held Jackson to a career-low six points in posting a 68-55 victory. Lucy Harris, the best women's player in the country at the time, led Delta State with 23 points and 16 rebounds.

The Lady Tigers finished the year with an overall record of 29-8 and ranked No. 11 in the nation. That team still holds the distinction of being the only Lady Tiger team ever to reach the national championship game of a post-season tournament.

The First Lady Tiger

Team To Reach NCAA Final Four

With head coach Sue Gunter sitting out the last half of the season due to illness, acting head coach Pokey Chatman led the Lady Tigers to the program's first trip to the NCAA Final Four and ironically enough, it was just down to the road in New Orleans.

The Lady Tigers road to the Final Four begin at home in the Pete Maravich Assembly Center with victories over Austin Peay in the first round and Maryland in the second round. A 83-66 win over Austin Peay was sparked by a 21-point performance by all-American Seimone Augustus, while the Baton Rouge native poured in 26 in the 76-61 win over Maryland two nights later.

The fourth-seeded Lady Tigers now had a date with top seeded Texas in the West Regional semifinal in Seattle, Wash. LSU was looking for revenge from the year before when Texas had knocked off the top-seeded Lady Tigers in the regional final. Revenge is just what LSU got with a 71-55 victory over the Longhorns led by Augustus' career-high 29 points. SEC foe Georgia would be the opponent in the regional final.

It would prove to be one of best NCAA Tournament games in history with the lead going back and forth until Georgia took a seven point lead with six minutes to play. LSU did not falter, chipping away at the lead using a 8-1 run in the final four minutes to take the lead and hold it for a 62-60 victory and the program's first trip to the NCAA Final Four.

Augustus matched her career-high with 29 points, including a late free throw, while Temeka Johnson added 19 points, including a 15-foot jumper that gave the Lady Tigers the lead for good.

Augustus was named the West Regional Most Outstanding Player and Johnson joined her on the West Regional All-Tournament team.

LSU had a date with rival and SEC foe Tennessee in the national semifinal game in the New Orleans Arena, just 70 miles from the Baton Rouge campus.

The Lady Vols ended LSU's magical run, 52-50, with a dramatic late steal and lay-up for Tennessee.

LSU ended the season with a 27-8 overall record and a run to the Final Four, the school's first.





## 1983-84

**OVERALL RECORD: 23-7**

The Lady Tigers advanced to the 32-team NCAA Tournament for the first time in the school's history as LSU was the No. 5 seed in the Midwest Regional. LSU played host to and beat fourth-seeded Missouri, 92-82, in the first round before falling to Louisiana Tech, 92-67, in Ruston in the second round.

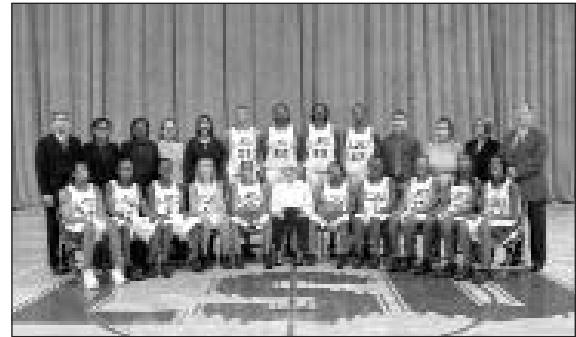

# Maravich Center Records



## The D E A F Dome

Over the last nine years, the LSU women's basketball team has established the Maravich Center as one of the toughest road playing sites in not only the Southeastern Conference, but in the nation. Since the 1995-96 season, the Lady Tigers have posted a remarkable home record of 123-16 (.885), including averaging 13.6 victories per year in the Deaf Dome.

In all, over the last nine years, LSU has won eight NCAA Tournament games and a pair of Women's NIT contests at the PMAC. Throw in the fact that LSU is 23-9 at home against top 25 teams over the last nine years, and the PMAC can back up its claim as one of the nation's most-feared road sites. In addition to their success on the court, the Lady Tigers are also playing before record crowds. In 2002-03, LSU shattered its attendance records for both a season and single-game. An average of 4,457 fans paid to see the Lady Tigers play in the PMAC that season, including nine games with over 3,000 paid attendance. LSU also set the single-game record twice during the 2002-03 season. On Jan. 4 LSU hosted Penn State in "Pack the PMAC VII" and drew 11,252 paid fans, marking the first women's basketball game in LSU history to draw over 10,000 fans. But, less than two months later the fourth-ranked Lady Tigers hosted No. 3 Tennessee in a showdown in the PMAC. 15,217 fans paid to enter the building for what was arguably the biggest home game crowd in school history. Tennessee won the game, but LSU has smashed the single-game attendance figure for both LSU and the state. In fact, the 15,217 was the fourth largest crowd to see a LSU basketball game in the PMAC, men's or women's.

Although LSU had a 41-game home winning streak against non-ranked opponents snapped four seasons ago by Auburn, the Lady Tigers are still 94-4 over the last nine years. LSU posted undefeated records at home over non-ranked opponents in 2002-03 (8-0), 2001-02 (11-0),

1999-00 (17-0), 1998-99 (11-0) and 1996-97 (11-0).

In 1999-00, the Lady Tigers set a school-record with 17 home victories with their only loss coming at the hands of second-ranked Tennessee.

The 1996-97 season proved to be big step for LSU's success at home. That year, the Lady Tigers posted a 14-1 home mark and knocked off such teams as eventual national champion Tennessee as well as fifth-ranked Alabama, and 13th-ranked Arkansas. In addition to the victories, LSU drew a then school-record crowd of 6,552 for the "Pack the PMAC" contest against Arkansas. After the Arkansas contest, LSU drew three more crowds that ranked in the top ten as 5,502 fans witnessed the LSU-Marquette NCAA second round contest, 5,260 for the LSU-Maine NCAA first round game, and 3,731 for the LSU-Tennessee game. Overall in 1996-97, LSU drew a then school-record 31,259 fans for its 15 home games for a school record average of 2,084 a contest.

In 29 years at the PMAC, LSU's home court advantage can be compared with the best programs from across the country as the Lady Tigers have won 78 percent of their homes games with a 304-86 overall mark. The Lady Tigers have recorded a 92-47 mark in SEC contests. LSU has also put together winning streaks of 26, 24 and 22 games at home. The Lady Tigers have also gone undefeated twice, going 14-0 in both 1977-78 and 1985-86.

Built in 1971 and seating 14,164 spectators, the massive \$11.5 million building competes with its neighbor across the street -- Tiger Stadium -- as the most visible structure on the LSU campus.

During the summer of 1988, Louisiana Governor Buddy Roemer signed legislation changing the official name of the building to the Pete Maravich Assembly Center in honor of the LSU star who had died tragically earlier that same year.

In addition to the normal basketball-seating configuration, a proscenium stage can be lowered into place at the north end allowing some 4,500 seats for theatrical productions. An additional 1,000 seats can be placed on the floor for graduations, convocations, lectures, concerts or other special events.

Also located in the building is an auxiliary practice gym used for basketball and volleyball practices and various P.E. classes; home and visitor dressing rooms; coaches dressing rooms, building administration offices; theater dressing rooms; Tiger Athletic Foundation offices; and the "L" Club meeting room with kitchen facilities.

The Assembly Center has been the site for both men's and women's NCAA Regional Tournaments, the 1981 SEC Women's Basketball Tournament, the 1988 SEC Men's Basketball Tournament and two SEC Volleyball Tournaments and was the site of the 2004 NCAA Tournament First & Second rounds.

# PACK THE PMAC

What started out as a dream eight years ago has developed into one of the biggest and the best promotional events in all of women's basketball, as Zapp's Pack the PMAC returns for year number nine this season when the Lady Tigers host Georgia on Jan. 8, 2005 on national television.

The concept of Pack the PMAC is simple—a blowout ticket sales push throughout Baton Rouge and surrounding communities in an attempt to fill the Maravich Center for a women's basketball game. After eight years, Pack the PMAC has blossomed into a much-anticipated event and it will once again be the highlight of the LSU women's basketball schedule. This year's Pack the PMAC game is set for Saturday, Jan. 8 for a nationally televised Southeastern Conference match-up with rival Georgia.

Starting in the fall, LSU uses various outlets to promote both the game and the "Flying Frenzy" halftime contest. At Pack the PMAC IV, Rich Bisson became the first person in the history of the event to win a car. In addition to the car giveaway, there are also televisions, shopping sprees, and other items that can be won in the halftime "Flying Frenzy" contest.

In eight years the event has become a tremendous success, but more important than the actual game is the

fact that Baton Rouge has finally become introduced, and welcomed, to LSU women's basketball at its finest hour.

Since the first Pack the PMAC contest in 1997, LSU has had the school's 10 largest crowds, which includes 15 crowds of 5,000 or better. Prior to 1997, the Lady Tigers had never played before a crowd larger than 2,500 at the Maravich Assembly Center. Seven of LSU's top eight home crowds have come at Pack the PMAC, including the first crowd over 10,000 fans at a women's basketball game in the state of Louisiana at Pack the PMAC VII when 11,252 fans paid to see the Lady Tigers defeat Penn State on CBS.

In the first year, the Lady Tigers drew a then school-record crowd of 6,552 as LSU beat Arkansas, 79-72. A year later, for Pack the PMAC II, LSU reset the school-record as 7,255 witnessed the Lady Tigers' 69-56 win over Mississippi.

In 1999-00, 6,352 fans witnessed the first nationally televised broadcast of an LSU women's basketball game as the Lady Tigers knocked off Arkansas, 68-51 on ESPN2. Pack the PMAC V drew a then school-record 9,636 fans, which was at the time the largest attendance ever at a women's basketball game in the state of Louisiana. The 2001-02 Pack the PMAC game collected 8,153 fans, the 10th largest crowd in state history.

**L**SU claimed its first Tournament title in 1991 as the Lady Tigers had one of the most impressive runs in conference tournament history. Entering the tournament as the No. 4 seed, the Lady Tigers had a first round bye and then beat Kentucky, 96-76, in the second round. The Lady Tigers, who were ranked No. 12 in the nation, then upset fourth-ranked Georgia, 83-74, in the

semifinals. In the title game, point guard Pokey Chatman scored 30 points, including 16 straight at one point, as the Lady Tigers knocked off third-ranked Tennessee, 80-75. Chatman was named most valuable player of the tournament, while Sheila

Johnson and Annette Jackson-Lowery were named to the all-tournament team.

**T**he LSU Lady Tigers run through the Southeastern Conference Tournament was something special in 2003. It has been 12 years since LSU had last won a tournament title and the Lady Tigers were hungry for the crown.

Standing in the way of the second seeded and sixth-ranked Lady Tigers in the opening game were the No. 23 Arkansas Lady Razorbacks, a team that had handed LSU its first defeat of the season in Fayetteville earlier during the season.

It would prove to be the closest margin of victory in LSU's run to the title. LSU defeated Arkansas 78-72 thanks to some clutch free throw shooting down the stretch, including Seimone Augustus' two free throws with 19 seconds to play to give the freshman her 21st and 22nd points of the game and LSU a four point lead.

Four of the five starters for LSU scored in double figures in the opening round victory over Arkansas. In addition to Augustus, Temeka Johnson added 15 points, while Doneeka Hodges and Aiysha Smith both hit for 11 points.

15th-ranked Vanderbilt was the next item on the menu for the Lady Tigers. The Commodores were also a team that had defeated LSU during the regular season. In fact, the defending SEC tournament champions had knocked off LSU just the week before in Nashville and were playing with a lot of confidence heading into the semifinals of the SEC Tournament.

Vandy had so much confidence in themselves they led by as many as nine in the first half and took a 39-35 lead into the locker room at halftime after shooting 51.7 percent from the floor in the opening 20 minutes of play.



**2003 SEC Champions**

LSU did not take its first lead of the game until Seimone Augustus hit a pair or free throws with 17 minutes to play to give the Lady Tigers a 44-43 advantage. The lead went back and forth for most of the second half until LSU closed the game with a 12-2 run in the final four minutes to advance to their second straight SEC Tournament title game.

Augustus took over the game during the final run,

scoring 14 of her 20 points in the final four minutes of play. Aiysha Smith led LSU with 21 points, while Temeka Johnson added 12 points and Augustus had nine rebounds to go along with her point total.

The stage was set for the SEC title game, sixth-ranked LSU vs. No. 3 Tennessee for the SEC Championship. A rematch of the 68-65 Lady Vol victory during the regular season in Baton Rouge.

The Lady Tigers took control of the game early, jumping to a 7-0 lead and led 42-25 at the break. Tennessee managed to trim the margin down to 13 with 15 minutes to play before the Lady Tigers took the largest lead of the game at 18 with 10 minutes left.

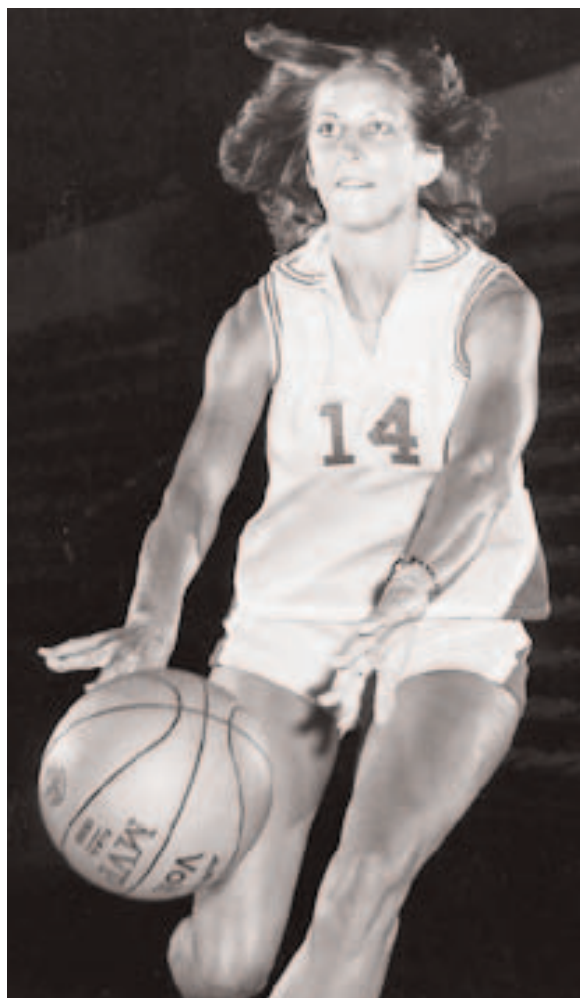
Temeka Johnson took home MVP honors after scoring a career-high 24 points in the victory. She added nine rebounds and seven assists in the victory. Aiysha Smith added 18 points, while Seimone Augustus had 12 points and eight rebounds on her way to an all-tournament team selection.

LSU avenged all three of its regular season losses with three wins over three top 25 teams in three days to win the 2003 SEC Tournament Championship.

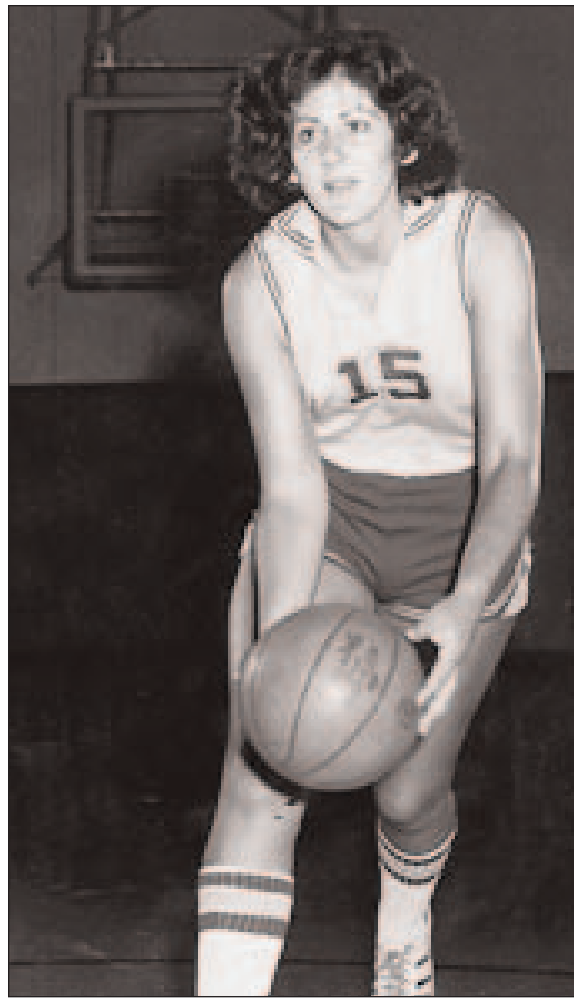
## Julie Gross

Forward, 6-2 • Tatura, Australia

### Kodak - 1978

Julie Gross became LSU's first Kodak All-American when she earned the honor following her sophomore season in 1978 after averaging 20.7 points and 11.5 rebounds for the Lady Tigers. She was also named honorable mention All-America by the Basketball News in 1980 when she averaged 17.6 points and 9.5 rebounds.

Gross finished her career as the all-time leading rebounder in LSU history with 1,466 rebounds and was second on the all-time scoring list with 2,488 points. Gross is also the second leading rebounder in SEC history.



## Maree Jackson

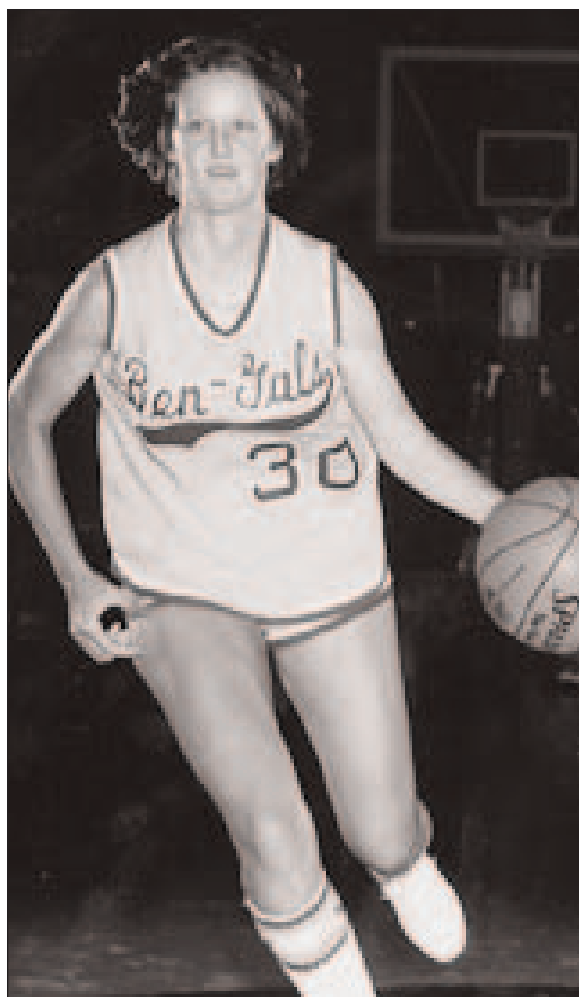
Center, 6-2 • Albury, Australia

### Basketball News - 1978

Maree Jackson became LSU's first Basketball News All-American in 1978 when she was named to the team following her sophomore season. As a sophomore, Jackson scored 1,021 points (25.5 ppg) and grabbed 539 rebounds (13.5 rpg). The 1,021 points and 539 rebounds are the most in both SEC and LSU history for one season.

In just two seasons with the Lady Tigers, Jackson scored 1,852 points which places her third on the all-time scoring list. She also finished her career as the second leading rebounder in LSU history with 1,032 rebounds.

For her career, Jackson averaged 26.4 points a game, which still stands as the SEC record.



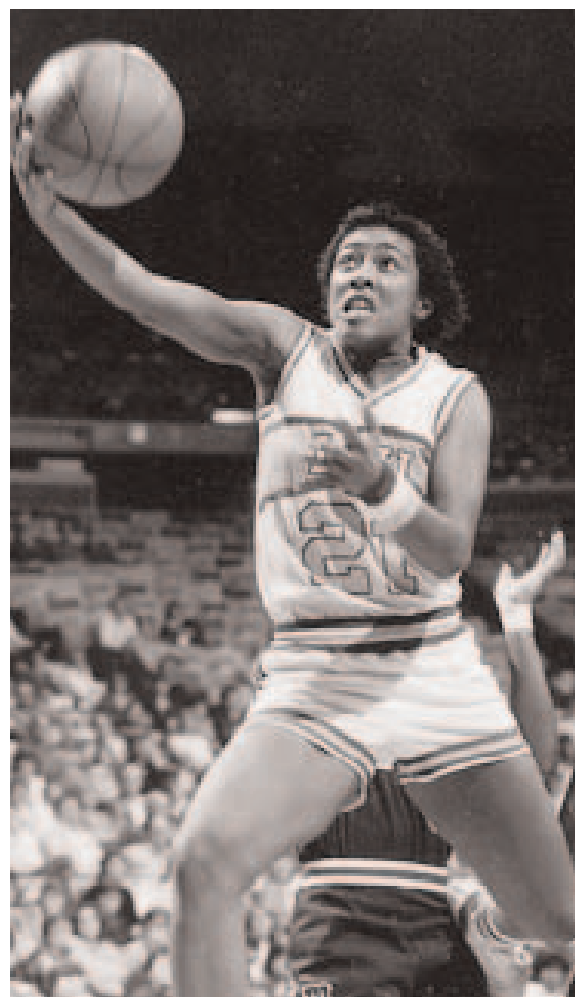
## Rene Moran

Guard, 5-9 • Pearl River, La.

### Basketball News - 1980

Rene Moran was a third team selection on the Basketball News All-America team in 1980. During that season, Moran led the Lady Tigers in scoring with a 21.6 average.

Moran, who transferred to LSU from Southeastern Louisiana, played only two seasons with LSU. A year after earning All-America honors, Moran injured her knee two weeks before the start of the 1980-81 season and never played again. She finished her career at LSU with 1,023 points and 304 rebounds.



## Joyce Walker

Guard, 5-8 • Seattle, Wash.

### Kodak - 1983, 1984

### Basketball News - 1982, 1983, 1984

Joyce Walker holds the distinction of being the only player in LSU history to be named to the prestigious Kodak All-America team two times.

Walker, considered by many to be one of the best players in SEC history, was a three-time selection to the Basketball News All-America team.

Walker, the second leading scorer in SEC history with 2,906 points (24.8 ppg) was selected to both the Kodak and Basketball News in 1983 after averaging 27.6 points a game.

In 1982, her first year as an All-American, Walker was named to the Basketball News All-America Team, while in 1984 she was named to the Kodak, Basketball News and JC Penney All-America teams.

Walker is the only player in LSU history to rank in the school's Top 10 in scoring, rebounding, assists, steals, and blocked shots.

At LSU, Walker is the all-time leading scorer, 10th in rebounding, third in assists, second in steals, and 10th in blocked shots.

In the summer of 1997, Walker was elected to the Louisiana Hall of Fame.

## Alisha Jones

Center, 6-3, Wiggins, Miss.

### Freshman All-American - 1984

Alisha Jones became LSU's first national Freshman All-American when she earned the honor after averaging 12.5 points and 7.9 rebounds per game to help lead the Lady Tigers during the 1983-84 season. The Basketball News recognized the 6-3 post player with the All-America honor after she hit 55.4 percent of her field goals and 73.3 percent of her free throws. She scored in double figures in 20 of the 29 games played, including a 19 point-11 rebound performance against Georgia in the SEC Tournament semifinals.



## Pokey Chatman

Guard, 5-5 • Ama, La.

### Kodak - 1991

Pokey Chatman capped her career at LSU by earning Kodak, Basketball Weekly and United States Basketball Writer's Association All-America honors following her senior season in 1991.

During the 1991 season, Chatman scored 576 points (18.6 ppg) and dished out 157 assists (5.1 apg). Chatman is the fifth all-time leading scorer in school history with 1,826 points. She is also LSU's all time leader in both assists (570) and steals (346).

During her four years at LSU, Chatman started all but one game and set 20 school records. She also led the Lady Tigers to their first-ever SEC Tournament title in 1991. Chatman was named MVP of the 1991 SEC Tournament.



## Cornelia Gayden

Guard, 5-9 • Bogue Chitto, Miss.

### Women's Basketball News - 1995 Associated Press - 1995

Cornelia Gayden had perhaps one of the best all-around seasons in school history as a senior as she was named second team All-America by the Women's Basketball News Service and third team All-America by the Associated Press in 1995. Gayden, who averaged 25.8 points and 8.4 rebounds as a senior, was also a finalist for AP Player of the Year.

During her senior season, Gayden set an NCAA record by hitting 12 3-pointers against Jackson State. In that same game, Gayden scored a school-record 49 points and became the NCAA's all-time leader in 3-point goals.

Gayden capped her career with NCAA records in 3-point goals (337) and 3-point goals attempted (875). Gayden is the third leading scorer in LSU history with 2,451 points and the eighth leading scorer in SEC history. Gayden was a three-time All-SEC selection.



## Latasha Dorsey

Guard, 5-7 • Abbeville, La.

### Defensive All-American - 1999

Latasha Dorsey had an outstanding senior season for the Lady Tigers as she led LSU to the Sweet 16 at the NCAA Tournament and was named a first team Defensive All-American by the Women's Basketball Journal.

As a senior, Dorsey ranked third in the SEC with 2.5 steals a contest. She also averaged 12.9 points and 4.2 assists a contest.

Dorsey completed her LSU career with more post-season appearances (12) than any player, male or female, in school history. In addition, Dorsey won 29 SEC games in her LSU career, also a school record. Dorsey finished her career with 1,054 points which ranks 14th in school history, while she ranks third all-time in steals and fifth in assists.

## DeTrina White

Forward, 5-11 • Lafayette, La.

### Freshman All-American - 1999

DeTrina White finished her first year at LSU with more honors than any other freshman in LSU history. Highlighting White's list of honors was being named National Freshman of the Year by the Women's Basketball News Service, a first for an LSU player.

White was also named first team Freshman All-America by both the Women's Basketball News Service and the Women's Basketball Journal. In addition, she was voted the Freshman of the Year in the SEC by the Associated Press.

White finished her first season averaging 13.1 points and 8.2 rebounds a contest. White led the SEC with 11 double-double games.



## Marie Ferdinand

Guard, 5-9 • Miami, Fla.

### Kodak - 2001

One of the most explosive guards to ever play at LSU, Miami native Marie Ferdinand earned 2001 Kodak and Women's Basketball Journal All-America honors and was a unanimous coaches poll first-team All-SEC selection. The Louisiana Player of the year, she was also a finalist for the Naismith Award and the ESPN the Magazine Shooting Guard of the Year Award.

For her career, Ferdinand averaged 13.7 points and 4.1 rebounds a game. In 2000, she led the LadyTigers to the Elite Eight, averaging team-highs in points, assists and steals. She was named to the 2000 NCAA East Regional all-tournament team.

Ferdinand also made an impact in international play in the summer of 2000, helping lead the U.S. Women's Select Team to a gold medal at the Jones Cup Tournament in Taipei, Taiwan.

She was a first round pick of the Utah Starzz of the WNBA and finished third in Rookie of the Year voting in 2001.



## Angelia Crockett

Guard, 5-II • Tallulah, La.

### Defensive All-American - 2001

One of the Lady Tigers most steady and unselfish players, Tallulah native Angelia Crockett became the second LSU player to ever earn first team Defensive All-America honors from the Women's Basketball Journal.

In her senior year, the point guard blocked 10 shots and was ranked seventh in the SEC in assist-to-turnover ratio. She also averaged 3.0 points and 2.4 rebounds a game.

In her four years at LSU, Crockett helped lead the Lady Tigers to four national tournaments, including three straight NCAA Tournament appearances, runs through to the Elite Eight and Sweet 16 and a WNIT appearance.



## Seimone Augustus

Guard, 6-I • Baton Rouge, La.

### Freshman All-American - 2003 Kodak - 2004

Seimone Augustus' first two seasons at LSU has rivaled few in Lady Tigers history.

As a freshman, the Baton Rouge native earned National Freshman of the Year honors and in her second season was named LSU's fifth Kodak All-American.

As a freshman Augustus averaged 14.8 points per game and shot 54.9 percent from the field and along the way setting the school's single-season record for free throw percent by hitting 88.8 percent of her shots (79 of 89). She led LSU to a SEC Tournament title and an Elite Eight appearance in the NCAA Tournament.

She followed that season by posting a team-high 19.5 points and 5.9 rebounds per game on her way to All-America honors, a West Regional MVP and helped the program to its first trip to the NCAA Final Four.

# Dr. William L. Jenkins

President, LSU

On April 1, 1999, Dr. William L. Jenkins, formerly Chancellor of Louisiana State University and Agricultural & Mechanical College, became president of the LSU System, which includes nine institutions on 10 campuses in five cities, as well as 10 public hospitals in 10 cities. With the departure of Chancellor Mark Emmert in mid-June, the LSU Board of Supervisors asked President Jenkins to again assume the role of Interim Chancellor until a successor for Dr. Emmert can be selected.

A native of South Africa, Dr. Jenkins studied at the University of Pretoria, where he received his professional veterinary medicine degree in 1958 and specialist credentials in 1968. He received his Ph.D. degree from the University of Missouri, Columbia, in 1970. After practicing veterinary medicine for four years, he joined the faculty at the University of Pretoria, advancing through the ranks to become professor and head of the Department of Veterinary Physiology, Pharmacology, & Toxicology in 1971.

He moved to the United States in 1978 and joined the faculty in the Department of Veterinary Physiology & Pharmacology at Texas A&M University. He was appointed dean of the LSU School of Veterinary Medicine in 1988, and was named LSU's provost and vice chancellor for academic affairs in September 1993.

When he was appointed LSU's fifth chancellor in November 1996, Dr. Jenkins reorganized the campus administration to be more effective and more responsive, and oversaw the development of a strategic plan to guide the University in its preparation for the challenges of the next century.

Over the years, Dr. Jenkins has received numerous teaching and service awards and recognitions, having been named the 1997 Communicator of the Year by the Public Relations Association of Louisiana and a Distinguished Alumnus by the University of Missouri in 1999. The regional chapter of Toastmasters International also presented him with its 1999 Communication and Leadership Award, and he was awarded the Vision of Excellence Award 2000 by the New Orleans Regional Chamber of Commerce and the New Orleans Chapter of MetroVision. In addition, the University of Pretoria

awarded an honorary doctoral degree to Dr. Jenkins in September 2000.

Dr. Jenkins has been active in continuing education and has delivered more than 150 lectures and addresses to diverse groups in both the United States and abroad. He has taught extensively at both the professional and graduate levels. He has published more than 60 scientific articles and has contributed 15 chapters to various textbooks. He is co-author of a textbook on veterinary pharmacology.

Dr. Jenkins has been and continues to be a member of many professional organizations and select committees. Most recently he served on the National Institute of Health's Alcohol Abuse and Misuse on College Campuses Committee and on a special Steering Committee of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools to review accreditation criteria for colleges and universities. Dr. Jenkins also is a member of the National Association of State Universities and Land Grant Colleges' Committee on Food and Society and currently serves on the Governor's Advisory Commission on Coastal Restoration and Conservation.

His current community engagement includes serving on the boards of the Louisiana Endowment for the Humanities, Greater Baton Rouge Chamber of Commerce, Academic Distinction Fund, Council for a Better Louisiana, Arts Council of Greater Baton Rouge, The Nature Conservancy of Louisiana, and the Baton Rouge board of the National Conference for Community and Justice.

Dr. Jenkins and his wife, Peggy, have four children -Sharon, Gwynn, Anthea, and Warren- and nine grandchildren.



## Kenneth E. Carpenter, Faculty Athletics Representative

Kenneth E. Carpenter is in his second year as LSU's faculty representative in NCAA and Southeastern Conference matters.

Carpenter, a professor in the School of Architecture, has taught at LSU since 1986. He received his bachelor's degree in architecture from the University of Oklahoma in 1962 and his master's from the University of Minnesota in 1967. Before joining the LSU faculty, he served at Clemson University as associate professor of architecture from 1967-77; Ball State University, where he was professor and chairman of the Department

of Architecture, 1977-81; and, Iowa State University, serving as professor and chairman, Department of Architecture from 1981-86.

At LSU he served as the dean of the College of Design from 1986-1997; Interim Executive Director of International Programs from 1997-98; and Interim Dean of the College of Art and Design from 2001-02.

Carpenter is a member of Phi Kappa Phi, the American Institute of Architects, and the American Association of University Professors.

Already a Louisiana Legend and one of the greatest college baseball coaches of all time, J. Stanley "Skip" Bertman has made the seamless transition into the athletics director's chair with the same enthusiasm, vision and demand for excellence that were trademarks of his stellar coaching career.

In just three years as LSU's director of athletics, Bertman has already added to his impressive list of on-the-field achievements. Under his direction, LSU enjoyed arguably the greatest athletics year in the history of the institution in 2003-04. Three teams won national championships, nine teams finished in the nation's top ten, and fourteen teams ranked in the top 25. LSU teams also enjoyed improved grade point averages across the board, making the LSU student-athlete experience a success on and off the fields of competition.

While supervising the Tigers' progress on the playing fields, he has begun to implement measures necessary to realize his vision of building the LSU athletics department into the best in the country. Bertman's bold and innovative plans promise to keep the Tigers among the nation's elite in all phases of collegiate athletics.

Bertman is now in the midst of upgrading LSU's athletics complex. Working hand in hand with the Tiger Athletic Foundation, Bertman has already overseen the completion of the Cox Communications Academic Center for Student-Athletes while launching renovations to Tiger Stadium and the Pete Maravich Assembly Center, and beginning construction on a new Football Operations Center.

It was also Bertman who took the bold but essential move to implement a seat contribution program in Tiger Stadium to fund facility improvements and ensure the financial stability of the LSU Athletics Department for the next decade.

Bertman was named LSU's athletics director on January 19, 2001. With Bertman, LSU gained an athletics director who provides the leadership and experience necessary to manage the Tigers' \$52 million budget.

Bertman guided LSU to five NCAA baseball titles, and his teams drew huge crowds to venerable Alex Box Stadium, as the Tigers led the nation in attendance in each of his final six seasons (1996-2001).

He also served as head coach of the 1996 U.S. Olympic team which captured the bronze medal in Atlanta.

Bertman continues to be honored for his remarkable coaching tenure, as he was inducted in June, 2002, into the Louisiana Sports Hall of Fame. He was inducted into the American Baseball Coaches Association Hall of Fame in January, 2003.

In a Baseball America poll published in 1999, Bertman was voted the second greatest college baseball coach of the 20th century, trailing only Rod Dedeaux of Southern California. Bertman and Dedeaux are the only coaches to win five CWS titles.

He had previously earned recognition as one of the nation's brightest assistant coaches while at the University of Miami (Fla.) for eight seasons (1976-83). Before working at Miami, Bertman was renowned for his coaching excellence. In 11 seasons at Miami Beach High School, he directed the Hi-Tides to a state championship and two runners-up finishes and he was named Florida's Coach of the Year on three occasions.

In 1975, Bertman coached at Miami-Dade Downtown, leaving after one season to join legendary head coach Ron Fraser at Miami. The move was a homecoming of sorts, as Bertman spent his collegiate playing days with the Hurricanes as an outfielder and catcher from 1958-60. He earned his B.A. in health and physical education from Miami in 1961 and received his master's degree from UM in 1964.

Bertman and his wife Sandy are the parents of four daughters - Jan, Jodi, Lisa and Lori. The Bertman's have three grandchildren - Sophie Faith and Isaac Stanley, the children of Emile and Lori Bertman Guirard, and Samuel Aaron, the son of Drew and Lisa Pate.



## Dan Radakovich

Sr. Associate Athletics Director

Dan Radakovich enters his fourth year as LSU's senior associate athletics director after joining the university in May of 2001. He came to LSU after serving as director of athletics at American University in Washington D.C.

As LSU's senior associate athletics director, Radakovich oversees the daily operations of the LSU Athletics Department and he serves as Skip Bertman's chief assistant. He also directly supervises the sports of baseball and men's basketball.

Prior to his one-year stint at American University, Radakovich spent six years as the associate athletics director at South Carolina where he directed the financial operations for the Gamecocks' \$30 million athletic department budget. He also served as the department liaison for marketing and promotional activities with Host Communications and was responsible for home event management and supervision of concessions, football travel and the video department. Radakovich also worked closely with South Carolina Athletics Director Mike McGee in laying the ground work for a new \$70 million arena being built in Columbia. During his tenure with South Carolina, Radakovich supervised the finances and logistics for \$33 million in facility improvements.

Radakovich served as the senior associate athletics director at Long Beach State from 1989-94. In that capacity, he managed a \$5 million budget and supervised the nationally recognized men's basketball and baseball programs. In addition, Radakovich reorganized the fund-raising operations and coordinated the production and sales of radio broadcasting packages.

Radakovich began his collegiate athletics career as the athletics business manager at the University of Miami in Coral Gables, Fla., from 1983-85. He worked in the private sector for four years before joining Long Beach State.

A native of Aliquippa, Pa., Radakovich graduated from Indiana University of Pennsylvania in 1980 with a bachelor of science degree in finance. Radakovich was also a football letterwinner as well as a student coach at IUP. He then went on to earn his master's degree in business administration from the University of Miami in 1982.

Radakovich is married to the former Marcie McDonald and the couple has two children, Christian (14) and Grant (10).



## Judy Southard

Associate Athletics Director/  
Senior Women's Administrator

Judy Southard, who had a very successful career as both a head women's basketball coach and director of athletics, enters her fourth year as LSU's Senior Women's Administrator after joining the department in the summer of 2001.

Southard came to LSU from Texas Woman's University, where she served as the school's director of athletics for nine years.

As LSU's Senior Women's Administrator, Southard oversees the highly successful Tiger women's athletics program. She directly supervises volleyball, soccer, women's basketball, softball and men's and women's golf. She is also instrumental in monitoring the department's gender equity and minority issues plan.

Southard has served on numerous national committees during her career in athletic administration. She is currently a member of the NCAA Women's Gymnastics Committee and was named in the summer of 2004 to both the SEC Executive Committee and the NCAA Division I Women's Basketball Committee.

While at Texas Woman's University, Southard initiated a corporate partnership program for the athletic department that tripled the involvement of area businesses and corporations in Pioneer athletics. Southard also established the TWU Intercollegiate Athletics Hall of Fame and she played a key role in the addition of softball and soccer to TWU's list of intercollegiate sports. In 2000, Southard served as chair of the NCAA Division II Women's Basketball Committee.

Prior to her nine-year stint at Texas Woman's University, Southard served as head women's basketball coach at Marshall University in Huntington, W. Va., for 11 years, where she led the Lady Herd to five Southern Conference regular-season titles. During her 11 years at Marshall, Southard was named Southern Conference Coach of the Year three times and her career record of 178-130 still stands as a school record for women's basketball victories. Southard also served as assistant athletics director at Marshall from 1983-1988, including a four-month period when she was interim director.

Before going to Marshall, Southard spent three years as head coach at Tennessee-Martin and she also served for one season as an assistant coach at Tennessee. As a high school teacher from 1970-77, Southard coached both basketball and tennis, leading her West Florence High School basketball team to the South Carolina 4A state title in 1976.

A native of Columbia, S.C., Southard earned a bachelor's degree in physical education and health from Coker College in 1970 followed by a master's degree in physical education from Tennessee in 1978.



## Verge Ausberry

Associate Athletics Director/Operations

A former LSU football standout Verge Ausberry joined the LSU Athletics Department administrative staff in August 2001.

Ausberry is responsible for all corporate sales and marketing for the LSU Athletics program. He also supervises game management, strength and conditioning, the Dr. Martin Broussard training room, the Jeff Boss

Equipment Room and video operations for various sports. He also directly supervises the sports of men's and women's swimming and diving.

Ausberry, from New Iberia, La., played inside linebacker for the Tigers, lettering in 1986-89. He was the leading tackler on the team in both 1988 and 1989 and was part of two Southeastern Conference championship teams

(1986 under Bill Arnsparger and 1988 under Mike Archer), playing on teams that went to three bowl games: the 1987 Sugar Bowl, the 1987 Gator Bowl and the 1989 Hall of Fame Bowl. In those three years, the Tigers had a combined overall record of 27-8-1 and 16-3 in SEC games.

Although this is Ausberry's first tour of duty with the administration of the Athletic Department, he has remained very close to the LSU athletic scene in the 1990s, first serving for almost seven years as a member of LSU's highly regarded Academic Center for Athletes where he worked with many of the student-athletes, primarily dealing with LSU's football squad.

After leaving the Academic Center, he moved in July 1999 to the Tiger Athletic Foundation staff as part of LSU's fund-raising arm prior to accepting his present position.

Ausberry received his Bachelor of Science degree in education in May of 1990 and his Master of Education in Administration, Supervision and certification in Child Welfare in May of 1992. He is presently a Doctoral Candidate in Higher Education Administration at LSU. He is married to the former Cheri Morial of New Orleans and they have a son, Austin.

## Bo Bahnsen

Associate Athletics  
Director/Internal Relations

Bo Bahnsen serves as LSU's associate athletics director for internal relations, overseeing the ticket office and all customer service

operations, and the integration of the Pete Maravich Assembly Center into athletics department operations.

He also directly supervises the sports of men's and women's indoor and outdoor track and field and men's and women's cross country.

Prior to moving into his current position in December of 2003, Bahnsen's primary responsibility for the previous 14 years was to serve as LSU's NCAA compliance officer.

A 1982 graduate of LSU, Bahnsen served as administrative assistant for the men's basketball team for five years before moving into athletics administration as director of purchasing for two years. In 1989, he was assigned his primary responsibility as NCAA compliance officer as assistant athletics director, then was promoted to associate AD in 1996.

Bahnsen has been responsible for overseeing the successful implementation of LSU's Tradition Fund Program, a football seating plan that requires contributions for the right to purchase approximately 45,000 seats in Tiger Stadium beginning with the 2004 football season.

Beginning in July of 2004, the management of the Pete Maravich Assembly Center shifted from the university to the athletics department. Bahnsen will be involved in coordinating the transition and integration of management of the arena.

Bahnsen, 45, served as manager of the LSU basketball team as an undergraduate and became administrative assistant for the team upon graduation in May of 1982. In July 1987 he became administrative assistant to athletics director Joe Dean, overseeing the purchasing office until his promotion in 1989.

A native of El Campo, Texas, Bahnsen graduated from Wharton High School in 1977 and attended Wharton County Junior College for two years before transferring to LSU in 1979. He earned his bachelor of science in physical education and is currently working on his masters in education administration.

Bahnsen is married to the former Karen Mayson, former LSU golfer and current head coach of the Lady Tigers golf program. The couple has two children, Darren (14) and Devin (12).

Mark Ewing, a 20-year employee of Louisiana State University, joined the LSU Athletics Department in January 2001, and serves as

Chris Howard was named LSU's Associate Athletics Director for Compliance in December of 2003, coming to Baton

Rouge from the NCAA Office in Indianapolis.

Howard served as assistant director of enforcement services at the NCAA for two years after one year as a representative for agent, gambling and amateurism issues.

At LSU, Howard serves as the compliance coordinator and liaison between LSU and the NCAA and SEC offices for NCAA rules interpretations and other matters. He is also responsible for developing and coordinating educational components for staff, student-athletes, booster organizations and entities outside the athletics department on NCAA and SEC rules and regulations.

Howard was a combat medical specialist in the United States Army from 1986 to 1995 before earning his undergraduate degree from the University of Kansas in 1997. He earned a Master's degree in education from Kansas in 2001 and a juris doctor degree from the University of Kansas School of Law in 2001.

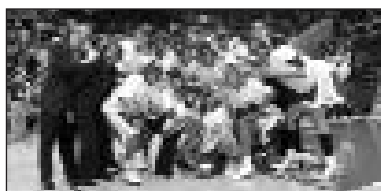

## 2003-2004 LSU ATHLETICS

# A CHAMPIONSHIP SEASON

LSU enjoyed perhaps its best all-around athletics season ever in 2003-04 as the Tigers claimed three national championships, including the 2003 BCS National Title in football, the first on the gridiron for the school since 1958.

Pat Henry's men's and women's indoor track and field teams became the first program in NCAA history to sweep the national titles at the NCAA Indoor Meet, claiming the school's 42nd and 43rd national championships.

The Lady Tiger basketball team advanced to the Women's Final Four for the first time in school history, while the softball team made its second trip to the Women's College World Series. Smoke Laval led the Tiger baseball team to the College World Series for the second straight year and the 13th time overall.

In all, LSU had nine of its team finish the season ranked among the top 10 in the nation, while 14 of LSU's 20 teams were ranked in the top 25.

In addition to its success on the field of play, the Tigers also had four student-athletes earn Academic All-America honors with another 107 being named to the SEC Academic Honor Roll for the year.

Tiger fans again turned out in record numbers as over 1.2 fans filled LSU stadiums and arenas in 2003-04. The Tiger baseball team led the nation in attendance for the ninth time, while LSU's football team averaged a school-record 90,974 fans per game, a figure that ranked sixth nationally.

LSU's success athletically coupled with its academic achievement made the 2003-04 season one of the best in the history of Tiger athletics.



A record 1.2 million fans watched LSU athletics in all 20 sports during the 2003-04 athletic season.

## All-Sports Success

LSU's athletics program has traditionally been strong throughout all of its varsity sports and has fielded nationally competitive teams in most of its sports.

A total of 18 of LSU's 20 athletic teams participated in NCAA postseason play last year with 14 of the sports finishing the year ranked among the top 25 in the nation. LSU had nine of its teams ranked in the top 10 for their respective sports last year.

LSU ranked No. 11 in the nation in the United States Sports Academy Directors' Cup for the 2003-04 season.

In all, LSU has won an SEC-leading 43 national titles, including three during the 2003-04 year. In addition, LSU ran its all-time SEC titles to 105 by winning conference championships in football and softball in 2003-04.

## Athletics as a Business

Athletics is mistakenly thought of as merely entertainment. In fact, the total revenues of over \$37.5 million generated annually by the Athletic Department is:

- twice that of the sales of an average manufacturing plant in Louisiana
- twice the volume of an average food processor
- about seven times more than the typical apparel plant in the state

## Attendance

LSU teams draw some of the largest crowds in all of college athletics:

- More than 1.2 million fans watched LSU athletics in all 20 sports during the 2003-04 athletic year.
- Since 1957, LSU has averaged over 74,000 fans a contest in football, including over 90,000 for the past three seasons.
- In 2003, LSU football set a school-

record by averaging 90,974 fans a contest, a number that ranked sixth nationally. The 90,974 average per game, made Tiger Stadium more populated than 51 of Louisiana's 64 parishes.

- LSU baseball set the standard in college baseball for attendance again in 2004 as more than 291,000 fans watched the Tigers play at Alex Box Stadium in regular and postseason play.

## CHAMPS Program

LSU sponsors a fully funded life skills program for student-athletes. The program is called CHAMPS, an acronym for Challenging Athletes Minds for Personal Success. Under the CHAMPS program, LSU sets up a number of projects and workshops that aid student-athletes in addressing day-to-day living situations, handling stress and preparing for post-college life.

Under the CHAMPS program, LSU also establishes community service projects in which student-athletes organize and participate. The LSU CHAMPS program sponsors an annual Halloween "Boo-Zar" on campus. The boozar is a trick-or-treat night in the LSU Field House in which athletes from all sports distribute candy to Baton Rouge area children. Each athletic team participates in CHAMPS workshops, which educate them in life skills and personal development.

## Community Involvement

Because of the athletic facilities on the LSU campus, Baton Rouge is able to attract many events and conventions that benefit the community in both public relations and monetary means. LSU has played host to such events as the National Sports Festival

(now called the Olympic Festival) and the International Special Olympics. In 2001, LSU hosted the U.S. Senior Olympics and in the past has played host to the U.S. Junior National Track & Field Championships.

The LSU campus is annually the site of the LHSAA Track & Field Championships as well as the Louisiana High School All-Star Games, bringing to campus thousands of young people and their parents. Most recently, LSU hosted the 2002 NCAA Outdoor Track & Field Championships at Bernie Moore Stadium.

## Economic Impact

LSU has a tremendous impact on the economy of the Baton Rouge area. LSU sporting events bring money into the Baton Rouge economy, not only from throughout the state, but throughout the southeast.

According to a study by LSU economics professor Loren Scott, the existence of LSU Athletics generates \$131 million in sales for businesses in the Baton Rouge community, another \$40 million in household earnings and supports over 2,100 jobs in the Baton Rouge area.

## Finances

The LSU Athletic Department is a totally self-sufficient auxiliary of the University. No state tax dollars are used to finance LSU athletics. All money spent by the Athletic Department is generated by the department through ticket sales, corporate sponsorships, radio and television revenue, the Tiger Gift Center and concessions, and is supplemented through revenue-sharing resulting from LSU's membership in the Southeastern Conference.

## Individual Athletes

Year in and year out, LSU boasts some of the most renowned athletes in all of college athletics.

Former NBA Most Valuable Player and worldwide entertainment superstar Shaquille O'Neal delighted Tiger basketball fans for three seasons. Former PGA Champion David Toms played for the Tigers in the late 1980s, while Major League Baseball standouts Todd Walker and Paul Byrd learned their trade at Alex Box Stadium. Four former LSU football players were members of the 2004 NFL Super Bowl Champions New England Patriots.

Sometimes overlooked are some of the finest female athletes in the country in their respective sports: golfer Meredith Duncan, softball All-American Britni Sneed, women's basketball All-American Marie Ferdinand, and track superstar Muna Lee have dazzled LSU fans in recent years.

## Job Placement

Is there life after college athletics? LSU is helping to answer that question with a job placement program as part of the Ninth Semester Program. LSU works closely with the Career Placement Center on campus as well as professional recruiting services to offer advice to athletes on entering the job market upon graduation.

## National Awards

LSU has had one winner each of the Heisman Trophy, Adolph Rupp Award and Golden Spikes Award, the premier individual awards in football, basketball and baseball. The Heisman Trophy, given annually to college football's best player, was won by Billy Cannon in 1959. The Adolph Rupp Award, which goes to college basketball's top player, was won by Shaquille O'Neal in 1991. The Golden Spikes Award, given to college baseball's most outstanding player each year, was won by Ben McDonald in 1989. In 2001, Josh Reed added his name to the list as he claimed the Biletnikoff Award, which goes annually to the nation's top receiver.

## National Championships

LSU has won 43 national titles in its athletic history, the most of any school in the SEC. Most recently, the Tigers claimed three national titles during the 2003-04 season with championships being brought back to Baton Rouge in football and men's and women's indoor track and field.

## University Involvement

LSU continues to produce profits in its athletic department, despite generally difficult economic times for college athletic programs.

Athletics has contributed over \$10 million to the academic side of the university in the past 13 years. In 1994-95, athletics contributed \$100,000 to the LSU Libraries to assist in buying books and other materials necessary to keep LSU's library system among the finest in the nation, and in 1996 generated over \$30,000 by dedicating all ticket sales from the Spring Football Game to the libraries. Most recently, the LSU athletic department purchased new uniforms for the Tiger Marching Band, which will be on display for the first time during the 2004 football season.

After the 1988-89 fiscal year, LSU Athletics donated \$2 million to the general fund of the university to help offset projected losses. LSU Athletics has also donated sizeable amounts of money to fund professorships and provide for repairs in academic facilities.

With six national championships, ten runner-up finishes, a nation-leading 27 Final Four appearances and 81 first-team All-America honorees, the **SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE** stands firmly as the nation's premier intercollegiate women's basketball conference.

### SEC By The Numbers

- The SEC has posted impressive non-conference records in the last decade. The SEC compiled a 133-45 (.747) non-conference record during the 2003-04 season. Since the 1990 season, the SEC has compiled a 2,041-545 (.789) record against other conferences. The league has recorded 150+ wins during seven seasons and had never recorded a non-conference winning percentage below .746
- SEC teams have earned appearances in **21 of 23 NCAA Final Fours**, an accomplishment unmatched by any other league. Overall, SEC squads have filled **27 of 92** Final Four berths, including having two Final Four teams in 1988 (Auburn, Tennessee), 1989 (Auburn, Tennessee), 1995 (Georgia, Tennessee), 1996 (Georgia, Tennessee), 1998 (Arkansas, Tennessee) and 2004 (LSU, Tennessee).
- SEC teams have made 16 appearances in a **nation-high 14 NCAA Championship games**, winning six national championships (Tennessee: 1987, 1989, 1991, 1996, 1997 and 1998). The league had the distinction of providing **both national finalists twice in its history** in 1996 (Tennessee 83, Georgia 65) and in 1989 (Tennessee 76, Auburn 60).
- SEC teams have won **260 NCAA Tournament games against 136 losses (.657)** for an average of **11.3 NCAA wins per year**. In addition, **all 12** current members have appeared in the NCAA Tournament.
- The SEC has paced the pack in NCAA tournament bids **21 times in its 23-year history**. The SEC was the first league to ever have **eight** teams invited to the NCAA Tournament, doing it in 1999 and 2002.
- The SEC was also the first league to ever have seven teams invited to the NCAA Tournament and earned this honor a leading six times (1986, 1991, 1995, 1996, 1997, 2004).
- In 2003, Auburn won the WNIT title with wins over South Alabama, Florida State, Richmond, Creighton and Baylor. It was the second WINIT Championship for the SEC. In 1999, the Arkansas Lady Razorbacks defeated Wisconsin 76-64 to claim the SEC's **first** Women's NIT championship.

### NCAA Numbers Do The Talking

- In the 23-year history of the NCAA Women's Basketball Tournament (since 1982), no league has posted more appearances, wins or titles than the SEC.

The following lists were derived and updated from the NCAA Final Four Record Book through the 2003 season, using actual conference membership and active conferences only.

### Individual Honors

- The SEC has had **47** student-athletes named as a **First-Team All-America selection**. Those 47 have been named a total of 81 times since 1977.
- The league has had **three Honda-Broderick Cup Award** winners (1988-Katrina McClain, Georgia; 1990-Bridgette Gordon, Tennessee; 1998-Chamique Holdsclaw, Tennessee).
- **Four Naismith Player of the Year** winners have come from the SEC. In 1996 Georgia's Saudia Roundtree was given the honor while Chamique Holdsclaw of Tennessee won the honor in 1998 and 1999 and Tennessee's Tamika Catchings was named in 2000.
- SEC teams have provided **109 All-Region performers**, including **22 Most Outstanding Players**.
- Over the past 23-years, **31 Final Four All-Tournament Team members** have come from SEC schools. In 1996, the entire all-tournament team was made up of SEC players.
- **Six** NCAA Post-Graduate Scholarship winners and **18** Academic All-Americas hail from the SEC.

### Players in WNBA

- SEC schools had **37** former players on opening day rosters in the WNBA.
- In this year's WNBA draft, a total of **seven** SEC women's basketball players were taken.
- Since women's basketball was added as an Olympic sport in 1976, the SEC has produced **30** Olympians.

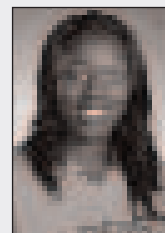

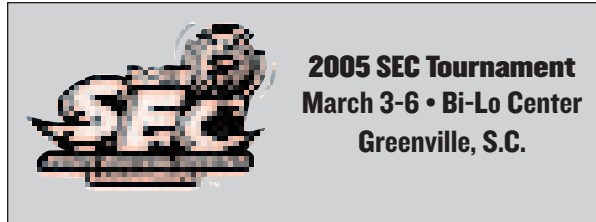

When people think of women's collegiate basketball, they think of the Southeastern Conference and the league's domination of the sport the last 15 years. 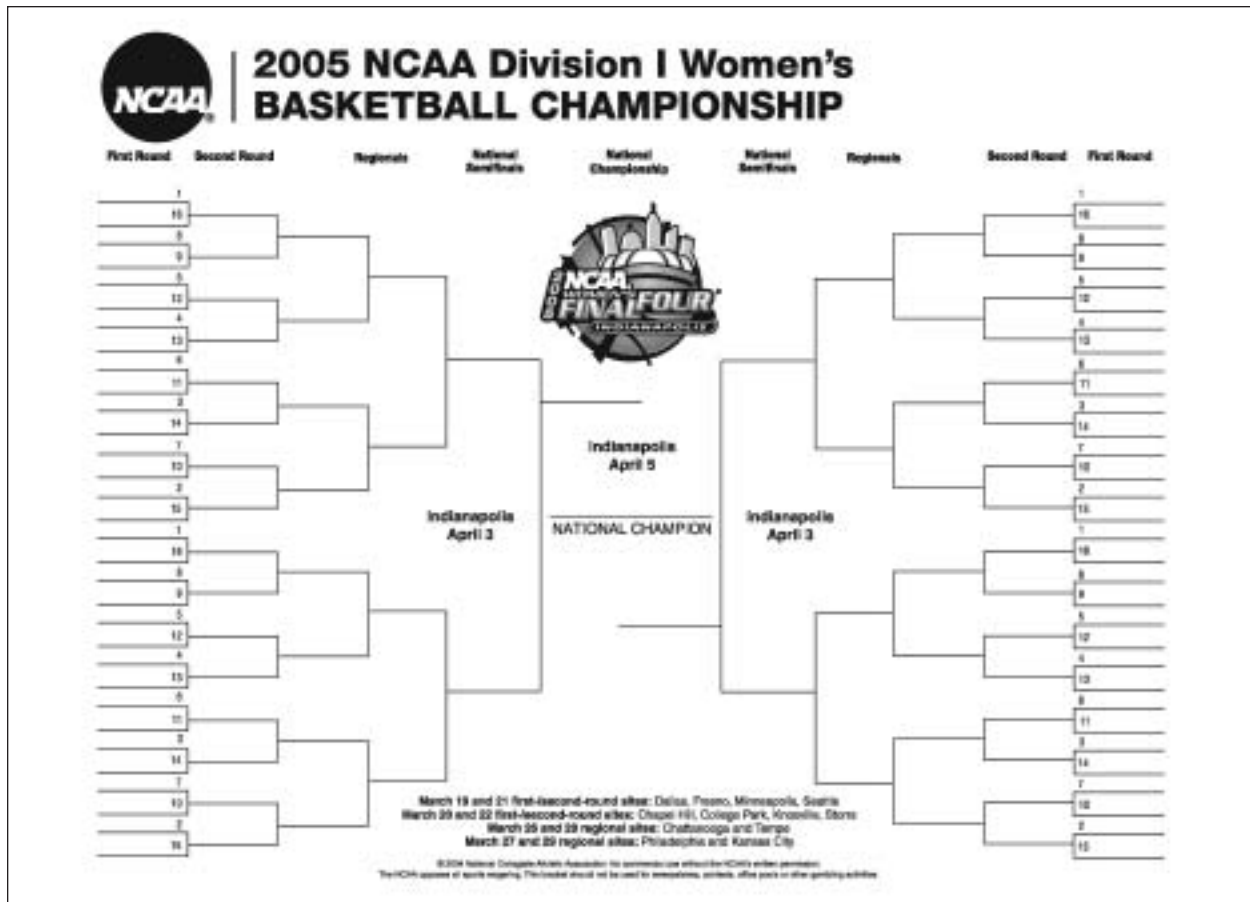
Beginning with its inception and through 1986, the tournament was held at campus sites. The tournament was then sent to Albany, Ga., which served as the site for six years from 1987-92. The tournament then moved to Chattanooga, Tenn., where it was held from 1993-2000, with the exception of 1998 when the tournament moved to Columbus, Ga.

Since 2001 the tournament has enjoyed many new sites, including Memphis (2001), Nashville (2002, 2004) and Little Rock, Ark. (2003).

This year the SEC Women's Basketball Tournament makes its way to the eastern part of the conference as the Bi-Lo Center in Greenville, S.C. will host. The winner of the 11-game tournament will receive the league's automatic bid to the NCAA Tournament. The tournament seeds and conference champion will be determined by the 14-game regular-season SEC schedule. The top four seeds earn a first-round bye.

The 2005 SEC Women's Basketball Tournament will once again enjoy live television coverage. FOX Sports Net South continues its dedication to SEC events by televising all first round, all second round as well as both semifinal games. The championship game will again be televised on ESPN2.

## Press Work Area

The Press Room is located in the Northeast Corridor of the PMAC. Three telephones will be available on a first-come, first-serve basis. Please notify a member of the sports information staff for use of a phone. A fax machine will also be available after the game.

## Post Game Interviews

Post Game Interviews, including coaches and players from both teams, will be held in the Interview Room approximately 10 minutes following the game. The Interview Room is located in the hallway off the Southwest Corridor. A member of the LSU Sports Information Department will take player interview requests during the second half of the game.





## Game Information

Sound microphone technicians will sit at press row, when seats are available or at a designated spots in front of press row that does not block any sold advertising panels. There is no mid-court break for television.

Any outlet using a satellite truck must request satellite truck parking and must have the truck in place at least two hours prior to tipoff. All production and uplink trucks should contact Eric Edwards, Director of the Maravich Assembly Center, (225) 578-8205, regarding arrival time and setup logistics.

## Photographers

LSU will follow NCAA and SEC rules regarding the media representatives photographing the game. Photographers are limited to working the designated space along the end line of the playing court. No credentials will be issued to freelance photographers, cutline writers, equipment carriers. Photographers will not be permitted to shoot from the sidelines. All photographers

must remain seated on the floor in areas directly in front of fans on the baseline. Video taping from a kneeling position will not be permitted. Photo positions may be assigned by the LSU Sports Information Office prior to selected games.
