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LOOKING UP

Sylvia Fowles and the Lady Tigers Shoot for another Final Four Berth

With a host of young talent and the return of the consensus National Player of the Year, head coach Pokey Chatman enters her second season poised to take the LSU women's basketball program to an even higher level.

LSU posted a 33-3 overall record a year ago under Chatman, the National Coach of the Year. The Lady Tigers, who were ranked No. 1 for 11 weeks, also won the program's first Southeastern Conference regular season

title with a 14-0 mark and returned to their second straight NCAA Final Four.

With all that accomplished last season, the Lady Tigers are hungry to repeat and take it a step further.

"Our most important goal is to work as hard as we can to maximize the ability and potential of this year's team," Chatman said. "If we can stay focused on that goal, I think we have enough of what we need for all other goals to be a realistic possibility."



Scholanda Houston

Seniors

The 2005-06 group of seniors is as experienced as you can get with Seimone Augustus, Scholanda Houston and Florence Williams.

"This year's senior class will blend a unique but very much needed type of experience," Chatman said. "You start with Seimone and the fact that she's logged extensive minutes from her arrival on campus against and along side some of the best the game has to offer. And she's delivered!"

Augustus received every honor in women's college basketball a season ago and looks to repeat. The 6-1 guard from Baton Rouge, averaged 20.1 points and 4.6 rebounds last season and enters the 2005-06 season just 93 points shy of becoming the fourth player in LSU history to reach 2,000 career points.

"She's everybody's All-American, but more importantly she's a coach's dream, not just with her stats, but her mentality in the classroom, at practice, in the weight-room and throughout the community," added Chatman. "This year Seimone will rise to an even higher level and take on more of a leadership role. She understands what is needed to help fill the void left by the departure of Temeka Johnson."

LSU has advanced to two Final Fours, won a Southeastern Conference Tournament title and won a SEC regular season championship during Augustus' previous three seasons.

Houston, along with Augustus, are LSU's lone returning starters from 2004-05. Houston, a 5-10 guard from Miami, Fla., has started 49 games in her career and brings a lot of experience to the court, having played in 100 games as a Lady Tiger.

"Scholanda brings versatility and consistency to the table," Chatman said. "Not only has she been our defensive stopper, drawing the opposition's top perimeter player, but she has also played in the post as well as on the perimeter."

Williams, a 6-1 forward from Miami, Fla., returns for her second senior season after the NCAA granted her a year of eli-

gibility back after graduating this past August.

Williams has played in 63 games during her career and really came on strong late last season, averaging 9.3 points in LSU's three games in the SEC Tournament, including posting a career-high 16 points against Georgia.

"Florence's ability to be effective on the perimeter or in the post is an element that separates her from most players," added Chatman. "As a perimeter player she is one of our best post feeders and as a post player she understands how to play to her strength of quickness in the paint."

"Florence has proven she's ready whenever her number is called and we will look to utilize her versatility and experience to help us improve."

Juniors

Hanna Biernacka, LSU's lone junior, also adds a great deal of experience to the squad. Despite her role changing last season, the 6-1 forward from Sweden, started 27 games in 2003-04 and averaged 4.5 points and 3.4 rebounds. She has played in 52 games over her first two seasons at LSU.

"Hanna has probably had one of the best off seasons of any player," Chatman said. "She's in the best shape of her life and she's shown consistency with her game. Her ability to think and understand the game will go a long way in terms of our success this year."

Katie Antony, a transfer from Vanderbilt, will sit out this season and join the team next year as a junior.

Sophomores

This seven member class is the future of LSU women's basketball. The group that includes freshmen All-SEC performers Sylvia Fowles and Quianna Chaney, will play an important role this season as well the ones to come.

"They each know what it takes to compete at the highest level and they know what it feels like to fall short," Chatman said. "The experience of last

season will be great motivation for this season for all our players."

Fowles, a 6-6 center from Miami, Fla., not only gained great experience last season as the SEC's 6th Woman of the Year, but she also led Team USA to a gold medal at the 2005 World University Games this past summer with 15.0 points and 7.3 rebounds per game and Augustus and Chatman by her side.

"We're going to look to our sophomore class early and often," Chatman said. "In my mind Sylvia has been a sophomore since December of last year and with her ability she will be expected to play like a senior. She and Seimone com-

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peted against some of the best in the world and came home with a gold medal. That same level of play is necessary if we are going to be successful."

Coming off the bench last season, Fowles led the Lady Tigers with 9.0 rebounds per game and was second with 11.8 points per contest.

Chaney also played in every game. The 5-11 guard from Baton Rouge connected on 40 of her 115 3-point field goal attempts, second to Houston on the team from long range.

"Quianna's shooting ability is a given, but she's also one of our better passers, and has shown promise on the defensive end of the floor," Chatman said. "This fall she's added another dimension and that is her mental focus. The sky is the limit if Quianna continues at her current pace."

Erica White, a 5-4 guard from Jacksonville, Fla., RaShonta LeBlanc, a 5-7 guard from Port Arthur, Texas, and Khalilah Mitchell, a 5-11 guard from New Orleans, La., are all expected to compete and play significant minutes at the point guard position in place of All-American Temeka Johnson.

"Erica, Rashonta, and Khalilah will look to fill the void at the point," Chatman said. "The competitiveness to make our team better at this position has been pleasing to say the least. These kids understand you don't simply replace a Temeka Johnson. As a team we're going to close the gap by committee, which means every individual on the roster, coaching staff included, will bring their "A" game until the game experience of running the point is attained."

Ashley Thomas, a 6-0 forward from Stone Mountain, Ga., is expected to return to her early season form of a year ago after suffering a knee injury that sidelined her for the final 22 games.

"Ashley Thomas' versatility and knowledge of how the game is played is what we're happy to have back," added Chatman. "I have no doubt that she will pick up where she left off."

Marian Whitfield, a 5-9 guard from Augusta, Ga., gained experience in the 20 games played in her career.

"Marian whitfield will look to add depth to our perimeter game," Chatman said.

Freshmen

LSU's incoming class is one of the smallest in the program's history, but quality beats quantity in this case.

Kristen Morris, a 6-2 forward from Lathrup Village, Mich., enters LSU as the lone freshman. She averaged 12.5 points, 8.0 rebounds, 2.0 assists and 2.0 blocks per game last season as a senior at Detroit Country Day and earned Nike All-American honors as well as being named the Class B Michigan Player of the Year.

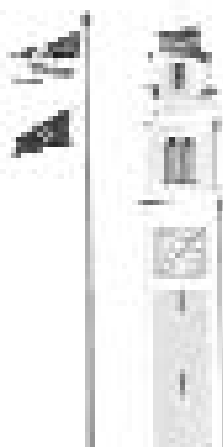

Strong supporters of education throughout the state have provided resources for a variety of innovative projects that are attracting world-class researchers and their expertise to LSU. The National Flagship Agenda is working to improve the standing of the University, as well as strengthen its position as an economic engine for the state of Louisiana. As a result, the University community is even more determined to achieve excellence at every level.

LSU remains firmly focused on attaining national flagship status by 2010, the University's 150th anniversary. The resolve of the LSU community and the support of the state make these goals attainable. And, if the last five years are any indication of success, the next phase of this agenda will guarantee LSU's place in the arena of national prominence.

Because of its designation as a doctoral/research university by the Carnegie Foundation, LSU ranks in the top 2 percent of the nation's colleges and universities. This designation is shared by only 59 public and 29 private universities across the nation. LSU is also one of only 25 universities nationwide designated as both a land-grant and sea-grant college.

History and tradition began with LSU's founding in 1853 by the General Assembly of Louisiana as the Louisiana State Seminary of Learning and Military Academy near Pineville, Louisiana. The

institution opened January 2, 1860. When the Civil War began, the school's first superintendent, William Tecumseh Sherman, resigned to assume a command in the Union Army. The seminary reopened in 1869, but was soon destroyed by fire. The institution moved to Baton Rouge, opening on Nov. 1, 1869.

In 1870, the Seminary was renamed Louisiana State University. In 1874, under the United States Morrill Act, the Louisiana State Agricultural & Mechanical College was established in New Orleans. The two institutions were merged by the Legislature in 1877 to become Louisiana State University and Agricultural & Mechanical College.

Construction on the present campus began in 1922 and the first classes were held in 1926. LSU experienced major growth in the 1930s and 1940s, expanding its student body, curricula, and services. During the 1960s, the University began to place increasing emphasis on research.

Recognizing the importance and extent of statewide agricultural activities of units in the LSU System, the LSU Board of Supervisors established the Center for Agricultural Sciences & Rural Development in 1972. This unit was renamed the LSU Agricultural Center in 1982. Components of the LSU Agricultural Center include the Louisiana Agricultural Experiment Station, the Louisiana Cooperative Extension Service

and International Programs.

The primary mission of the LSU Agricultural Center is to conduct research in agricultural and natural resource development and to provide off-campus extension education that disseminates technological, economic, and management information to Louisiana residents.

In 1977, the Paul M. Hebert Law Center, established as the LSU Law School in 1906, was made an autonomous division of the LSU System. The Law Center provides legal education characterized by an unyielding demand for academic excellence. Its unique curriculum, based on civil law as well as substantial elements of common law, provides law graduates with qualifications and training for not one, but two legal systems. The Hebert Law Center holds membership in the Association of Law Schools and is on the approved list of the American Bar Association.

LSU, located on more than 2,000 acres in the southern part of Baton Rouge, Louisiana, is bordered on the west by the Mississippi River. The University's more than 250 principal buildings are grouped on a 650-acre plateau that constitutes the main part of the campus.

LSU and A&M College is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools.

LSU has 18 residence halls with architectural styles ranging from a Renaissance style typical of the older core of the campus to modern high-rise buildings. 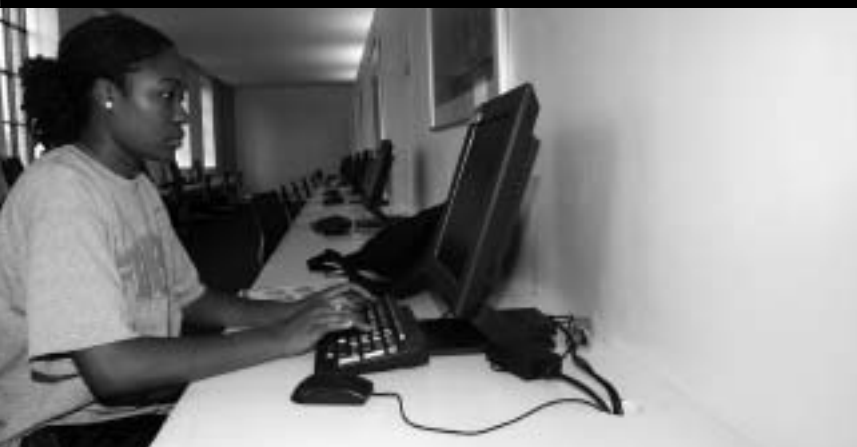

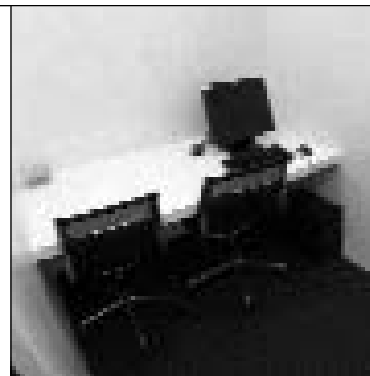


Bo Campbell Auditorium

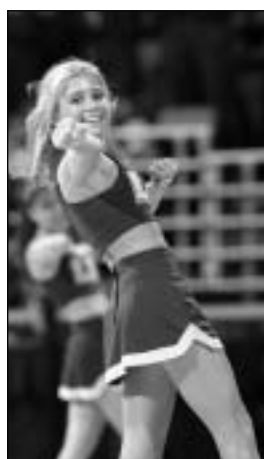

Over the last nine years the Lady Tigers have given the women’s hoop fans something to cheer about. In that span, LSU has a 125-12 record in home games, giving the Lady Tigers the second best home record among SEC teams. The Lady Tigers have also hosted some top 10 battles over the past few seasons, including the 2005 match-up between No. 1 LSU and No. 5 Tennessee, which saw a record crowd of 15,233 witness a Lady Tigers victory.



Lady Tigers at Home

- ▶ Recorded a LSU women’s basketball record attendance of 15,233 when No. 1 LSU defeated No. 5 Tennessee on Feb. 10, 2005 in the PMAC. The Lady Tigers had four home crowds of over 10,000 fans in 2004-05, including two over 14,000.
- ▶ Have eight postseason home wins since 1997.
- ▶ Posted a 52-10 SEC record over the last nine years at home.
- ▶ Posted a 125-12 overall record over the last nine years at home, second best in the SEC.

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The Maravich Center on Gameday

- ▶ Has a new capacity of 13,472 spectators
- ▶ A total of 87,806 spectators witness the Lady Tigers win all 12 games in the Maravich Center in 2004-05. LSU was 10th in the national in average attendance with 7,317.

Maravich Center Concourse

The newly renovated Maravich Center concourse features four interactive quadrants, Pete Maravich Pass, Walk of Champions, Heroes Hall and Midway of Memories, for fans and visitors to enjoy. Each quadrant includes kiosks with photos of great moments, great athletes and memories of the four sports, women's basketball, men's basketball, volleyball and gymnastics, all which compete in the Maravich Center.





LSU's Women's Basketball Complex area ranks among the finest in college basketball. The project was started in the spring of 2003 and was completed prior to the start of the 2003-04 season, although it is constantly being modified.

The spacious Jinks Coleman Team Room is the focal point of the complex, a fully carpeted and well-lit, locker room. A new squad room with a large projection screen for viewing scouting video, and practice and game film, and a lounge are also features of the complex.

The locker room complex, located just up the ramp in the Maravich Center, includes a big screen television, a computer station, and a lounge for student-athletes to study and visit before and after practice and games.

The new LSU Women's Basketball Complex, which cost over \$500,000 to create, was paid for by the Tiger Athletic Foundation, the LSU Athletic Department and the Women's Basketball Fast Break Club. The various state-of-the-art displays cost over \$225,000 and were funded by a committee to raise funds headed by the Fast Break Club. The art work was a seven-month process that included the Lady Tigers coaching staff, along with the LSU sports information department, going over several designs before choosing the final art.

The heart of the LSU Women's Basketball Complex is the Jinks Coleman Team Room. This locker room facility features new African mahogany wood lockers that were designed by the Lady Tiger basketball staff and crafted by cabinet makers. Each individual locker area includes a vanity with make-up lights and a mirror as well as locker cabinet with individual spaces for all each player's equipment. The well-lit locker room was also outfitted with carpet that was specifically dyed to match the LSU purple. The locker room is also equipped with showers and is just down the hall from a fully equipped training room.

The entire complex is framed within the Northwest part of the Pete Maravich Assembly Center which includes the Jinks Coleman Team Room, the Lady Tiger Players Lounge, Alumni Hall, and the Team Video Room. Part of the complex process was to bring in an outside firm to create the wall-art for the hallways that speak to the tradition of Lady Tiger basketball on the court and in the classroom.

Each locker is made of African mahogany wood and features a vanity and make-up lights as well as plenty of room for equipment.



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LSU boasts the largest and most complete athletic training facility in all of collegiate athletics. Focused on aggressive rehabilitation, the Broussard Center for Athletic Training is furnished with the latest in technology and equipment. Some of the features of the 23,000-square foot facility include an on-site x-ray room, an in-house pharmacy, as well as state of the art hydrotherapy pools. The Broussard Center for Athletic Training is equipped with the largest hydrotherapy pools in both collegiate and professional sports and is one of the few collegiate training centers with a full-service pharmacy, as well as an on-site x-ray room. LSU is also the only school in college athletics with a training room equipped with a full-service vision center. The facility is named in honor of legendary trainer Dr. Martin J. Broussard, who served as LSU's athletic trainer for several decades.

Dr. Martin J. Broussard

LSU's multi-million dollar athletic training facility is named in honor of Dr. Martin J. Broussard, the legendary trainer whose career spanned over 40 years at LSU, having been appointed to the position of head athletic trainer in 1948. Following his semi-retirement from the day-to-day work as trainer in 1993, he continued to serve LSU as an Assistant to the Athletic Director through 2001 giving him well over 50 years of service to the Athletic Department.

Among his many accomplishments was the formulation of "Quick Kick", an isotonic drink used to replace liquids, vitamins and the electrolytes lost through sweating. He was a trainer for the Pan American Games in 1955 and the U.S. Olympic team in 1960. In 1963, the Rockne Foundation named him Trainer of the Year. In 1978, Broussard was named to the NATA Hall of Fame followed by the Louisiana Athletic Trainer's Hall of Fame in 1982.

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The LSU strength and conditioning facility was built in 1997 and features the latest in both strength training and cardiovascular training equipment. Measuring 10,000-square feet, LSU has one of the finest strength and conditioning facilities in the nation.

LSU's strength and conditioning team took a new direction in 2000 under strength coach Tommy Moffitt. Moffitt is in charge of the LSU strength and conditioning facilities, located in Tiger Stadium and in the Football Operations Center. LSU also hired Jeff Dillman to work solely with the Lady Tigers basketball program.

Strength and conditioning can be the heart and soul of an athletic program's success, and LSU has taken great strides to improve its strength program and facilities.

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The Jack and Priscilla Andonie Museum is home to LSU's athletics history. The museum, located at the Lod Cook Alumni Center on LSU's campus, is full of artifacts and memorabilia from the Andonie's personal collection gathered by the couple over the past three decades that total about 13,000 pieces. The museum features 51 separate displays that include at least one area in the room for each of LSU's sports. There are also displays featuring LSU's five retired jerseys, the "Early Years" of LSU athletics, the Tiger Band and Golden Girls, cheerleaders and Mike the Tiger. The center piece of the museum "The Road to the National Championship" is a game-by-game recap of the 2003 LSU football team's national championship season. Included in the display is a replica of the ADT National Championship trophy, coach Nick Saban's sideline headset, and an official game ball signed by the team.

Local Girl Makes Good

After spurning Tennessee to play in her hometown, SEIMONE AUGUSTUS has LSU eyeing its first national title, a fitting coronation for the queen of Baton Rouge

ON APRIL 30, 2002, her 18th birthday, Seimone Augustus came of age with a decision that had been breathlessly awaited throughout her home state of Louisiana and beyond. A 6'1" shooting guard who's as slender as a dandelion, she had captivated fans with her seamless grace and dominating skill since she was in middle school. The Baton Rouge native was such a sensation that when she was 14, Sports Illustrated for Women put her on the cover of its inaugural issue with the billing THIS NEXT MICHAEL JORDAN? Even her birthday parties were SRO. When she turned 16 and 17, some 500 people showed up at celebratory crawfish boils thrown by her daddy, Seimone. On her 18th birthday about twice that many people, as well as a dozen TV camera crews, gathered around the starker courtyard at Baton Rouge's Capital High, the school she had led to two straight Class 4A state titles. This was the day she had chosen to announce her college choice. A lot of schools wanted her. The one in her hometown really needed her. On the day of the announcement LSU athletics director Skip Bertman had called Augustus "the most important recruit in the history of LSU," the same school, mind you, that had wrangled Pete Maravich and Shaquille O'Neal. Bertman, a former LSU baseball coach then in his second year as AD, was poised to pour a lot of money into women's basketball, but not if such a beloved local kid

chose to go elsewhere. Failing to get her, he said, "would have had signs for the program." But Coach LSU's coach at the time, who surely knew of this as he sat in her family's office listening to a radio broadcast of Augustus's announcement, she wouldn't wide open "it was I had to jump," she says. After everyone else in town, Coach Bertman Augustus chose to come down to LSU and become national champion Transcend, an SEC rival. Obviously, Coach couldn't see what the Capital High crowd saw as Augustus approached the microphone. She was wearing orange, in her senior and in her last. A ripple of despair pulsed through the crowd. She had joined Tennessee!

It was a classic Augustus head fake, a vixen's move. When Augustus announced that she would begin the championship tradition of Pat Summitt and Tennessee and instead try to take LSU to the Lady Vols level, a cheer went up around the city and a giant celebration broke through Capital's windows. It was such a big story that local TV stations broke in on their programming to announce the good news.

TWO AND A HALF YEARS have passed, and so far the Augustus myth has been nearly all that the entirety of Baton

SUE GUNTER

1980 USA Head Coach, 1976 Assistant Coach

Sue Gunter's coaching career extends beyond the boundaries of the Southeast with an international resume that laid the groundwork for today's Olympic success story. Gunter was the head coach of the USA National Team in 1976, which set the table for her assistant coaching position under Billie Moore and the 1976 Olympic team. In their first Olympic appearance, the USA brought home the silver medal in Montreal. Gunter was then named head coach of the USA national team in both 1978 and 1980, leading to her being named the head coach of the USA Olympic team in 1980. The 1980 Olympic team included such great players like Denise Curry, Carol Blazekowski, Anne Donovan, Rosie Walker, and Lynette Woodard. The USA stormed to a 6-1 record during the qualifying tournament. However, the dream for Team USA's first Olympic gold medal was cut short when President Jimmy Carter ordered a boycott of the 1980 Olympic games in protest of the Soviet Union's invasion of Afghanistan.

Bob Pettit

Led LSU to its first NCAA Final Four in 1953 and he later became the first player in NBA history to exceed the 20,000-plus point barrier. Pettit is a member of the NBA Hall of Fame and in 1997 he was named as one of the top 50 players in NBA history.

Pete Maravich

"Pistol Pete," Maravich still holds the NCAA record for career points with 3,667 and for career scoring average with 44.2 points a game. He was selected the National Player of the Year in 1970 after leading the Tigers to the NIT Final Four. He scored 50+ points an amazing 28 times. He went on to a 10-year professional career and was selected as one of the NBA's 50 greatest players in 1997.

Shaquille O'Neal

Was the first pick in the 1992 NBA Draft. He was named MVP of the league in 2000 and was a three-time NBA Finals MVP after leading the Los Angeles Lakers to three World Championships. At LSU, O'Neal averaged 21.6 points and 13.6 rebounds for his career, and in 1991, he was named the World's Amateur Athlete of the Year as well as SEC Athlete of the Year and National Player of the Year. In 1997, he was named as one of the top 50 players in NBA history.

Billy Cannon

One of the true legends of college football in the South, Cannon was the 1959 Heisman Trophy winner and helped the Tigers to the 1958 national title. Cannon's most memorable performance came in 1959 against Ole Miss when No. 1 LSU trailed No. 3 Ole Miss 3-0 in the fourth quarter. He fielded a punt, broke seven tackles and returned it 89 yards for the 7-3 victory. He went on to a successful 11-year professional career.

Skip Bertman

A legend in the college baseball ranks, Bertman created a dynasty at LSU, guiding the Tigers to five national titles in a 10-year stretch from 1991-2000. He also skippered the United States to a bronze medal at the 1996 Olympics in Atlanta and was an assistant on the gold medal-winning U.S. squad in Seoul, Korea in 1988. Bertman retired from coaching following the 2001 season and is currently the LSU athletic director.

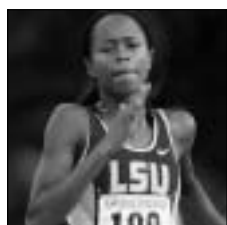
Temeka Johnson

The 2004-05 Lieberman Award winner as the nation's top point guard, Johnson led the Lady Tigers to back-to-back NCAA Final Fours, the 2004-05 SEC regular season title and the 2003 tournament title, and was the SEC's all-time assist leader, finishing her career fifth in NCAA history with 945.



Nicki Arnstad

The 2002 NCAA Floor Exercise Co-Champion, Arnstad became the first LSU gymnast to win a national title. She was a two-time All-American and won the NCAA Central Regional Floor and All-Around Championships.



Muna Lee

The most decorated track and field athlete in school history, Lee won 20 All-America awards and a school record seven national titles while helping the Lady Tigers to five NCAA team championships during her time at LSU. A 2004 Olympian, she finished seventh in the 200 meters at the Summer Games in Athens, Greece.



Britni Sneed

One of three four-time first-team All-SEC selections in conference history, Sneed was a two-time SEC Player of the Year and a three-time NFCA All-American, leading the Tigers to their first Women's College World Series appearance in 2001.



Walter Davis

An Olympian in 2000 and 2004, Davis helped LSU to national titles in 2001 and 2002. The SEC Male Athlete of the Year in 2002, he won six NCAA titles and earned a school-record nine All-America honors.



David Toms

The two-time SEC Player of the Year, Toms has gone on to a successful career on the PGA Tour. Among his PGA Tour victories was a thrilling win at the PGA Championship in August of 2001.



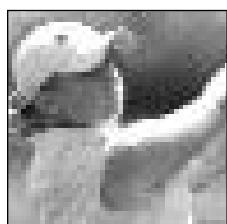
Marie Ferdinand

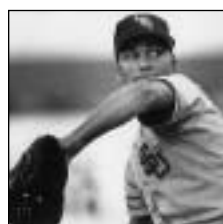
Todd Walker

Named National Player of the Year in 1989 and he was later the first player chosen in the Major League Baseball Draft by the Baltimore Orioles.

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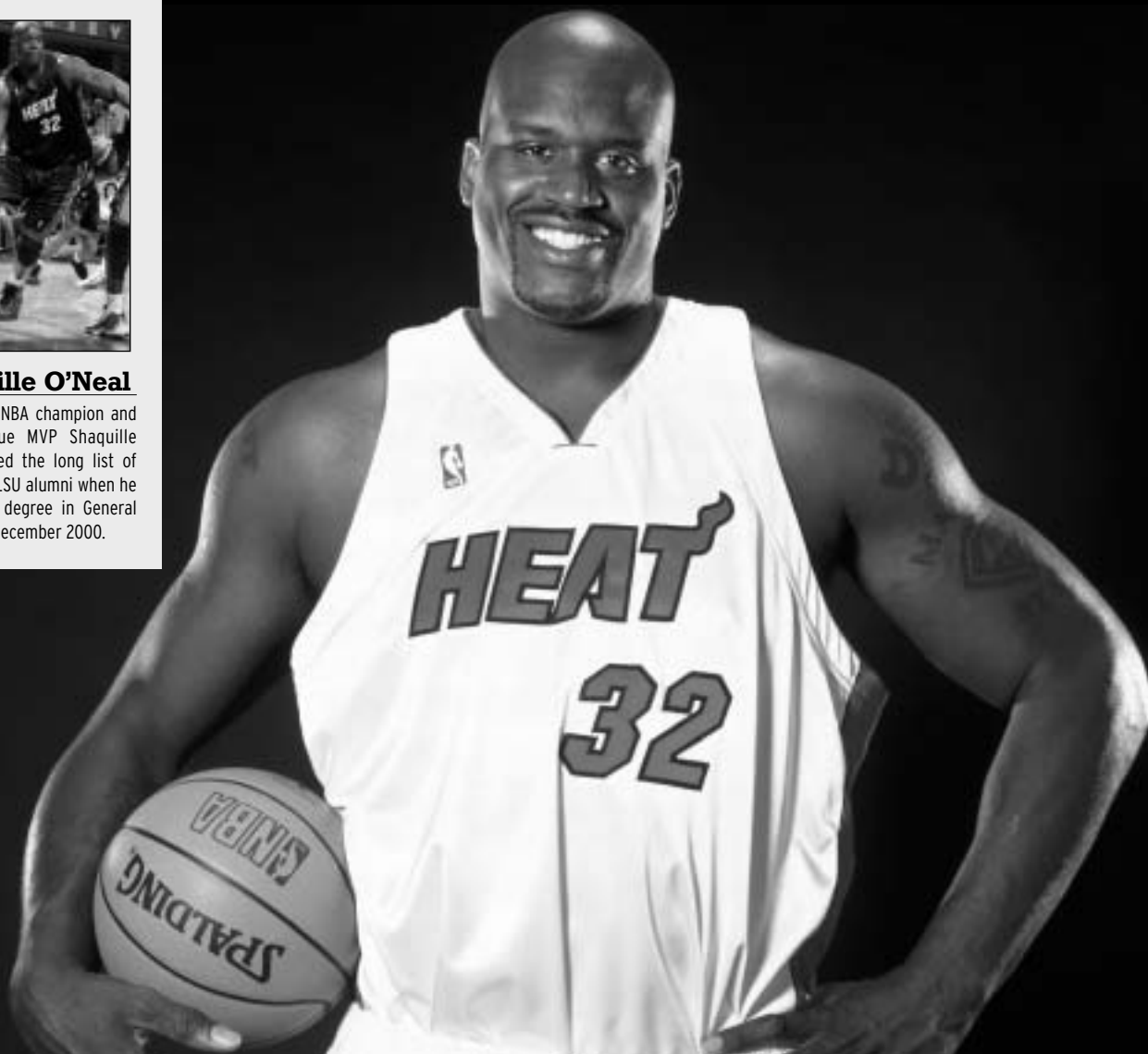
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Shaquille O'Neal

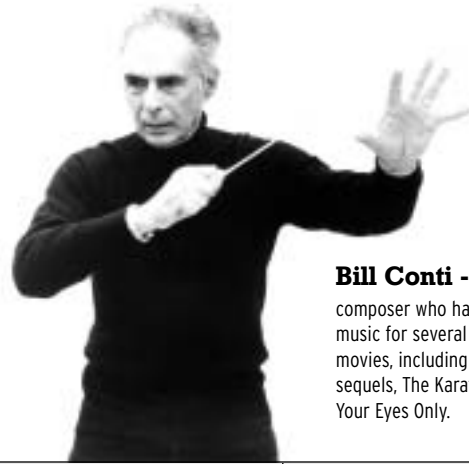

Received both a Bachelor's degree and Law degree from LSU. Carville gained fame in the 1990's as the chief campaign strategist for Bill Clinton and Al Gore. Carville also penned a best-selling memoir titled All's Fair: Love, War and Running for President.

LADY TIGERS TIMELINE

LSU is entering its 31st season of women's basketball. The Lady Tigers first played basketball as a varsity sport in 1975-76 and since that inaugural season, LSU has posted 27 winning seasons, played in 15 NCAA Tournaments, advanced to the AIAW National Championship game in 1977 and the NCAA Final Four in 2004 and 2005.

The Coaches

LSU has had four coaches in its history with Jinks Coleman serving as the school's first head coach and Pokey Chatman as its newest. Coleman coached the Lady Tigers for three and a half years before stepping down midway through the 1978-79 season. In 3-plus years with the Lady Tigers, Coleman guided LSU to a 91-32 overall mark. Her crowning moment with LSU came during the 1976-77 season as she led the Lady Tigers to the AIAW National Championship game. LSU fell to top-ranked Delta State, but that 1977 team remains the only squad in school history to play for a national title.

Coleman was replaced by Barbara Swanner midway through the 1979 season and Swanner coached the Lady Tigers for the next three years. She led LSU to an overall mark of 57-50 before ending her coaching career at the conclusion of the 1981-82 season.

Hall of Famer Sue Gunter joined the Lady Tigers for the 1982-83 season. In 22 seasons with the Lady Tigers, Gunter led the Lady Tigers to 442 victories and guided her teams to 14 NCAA Tournament appearances, the 1991 and 2003 SEC Tournament titles and the 2004 NCAA Final Four. Gunter, who retired following the 2003-04 season, is a member of the both the Naismith Hall of Fame and the Women's Basketball Hall of Fame.

Chatman replaced Gunter after serving as the acting head coach for 20 games in 2003-04, guiding the team to a 15-5 mark, including the program's first trip to the NCAA Final Four.

The 1970s

The decade of the 1970's saw the start of women's basketball as a varsity sport at LSU. The Lady Tigers played their first game in November of 1975, losing to Whitworth, 64-58. LSU's first win came a week later with a 75-62 win over Southwestern Louisiana. The win was the first of 17 for the Lady Tigers in their inaugural season as LSU posted a first-year mark of 17-14.

A year later, LSU, behind the play of a couple of Australians in Maree Jackson and Julie Gross, was playing for the AIAW National title. After going unrecognized for much of the year, LSU finally began to gain some respect with wins over three ranked teams in February. The Lady Tigers entered the AIAW State Tournament on a roll, however, LSU lost to Louisiana Tech and Northwestern State, but they were still able to advance to the AIAW Regional Tournament. At Regionals, the Lady Tigers beat Texas, Stephen F. Austin and Baylor to advance to the AIAW National Tournament. By this time the Lady Tigers were ranked No. 11 in the nation and after wins over Western Washington and Baylor, LSU was in the Final Four. LSU knocked off second-ranked Immaculata, 74-68, in the semifinals and then fell to top-ranked Delta State, 68-55, in the national title game. LSU finished with a 29-8 overall mark, the second-most victories recorded in school history in a single year.

In 1977-78, the Lady Tigers achieved their first and only No. 1 ranking as LSU spent most of January and February atop

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the Associated Press poll, after having started the year ranked No. 2 in the nation. The Lady Tigers stayed there until Feb. 15 when Tennessee moved ahead of LSU. Despite being ranked No. 2 in the nation, LSU couldn't advance out of the Regionals as the Sue Gunter-coached Stephen F. Austin LadyJacks eliminated the Lady Tigers in the semifinals. LSU still won 37 games, which remains the school record for victories in a season.

LSU closed out the decade of the 1970's with a coaching change as Jinks Coleman stepped down after 15 games in the 1978-79 season. With an 8-7 mark, Coleman was replaced by Barbara Swanner, who guided LSU to a 5-5 mark over the final 10 games of the year. LSU finished with a 13-12 record.

The 1980s

The decade of the 80's saw LSU establish itself as one of the top programs in the country.

LSU opened the decade under Barbara Swanner and posted a 17-17 mark and reached the semifinals of the AIAW Regional Tournament.

A year later, Joyce Walker came to Baton Rouge and put women's basketball at LSU back on the map. Walker, who was way ahead of her time, could do it all. In her first year with the Lady Tigers she averaged 20.7 points a contest and led the Lady Tigers to a 17-15 mark.

A year later, the NCAA became the governing body of women's athletics and the NCAA Tournament was started. The Lady Tigers didn't make the NCAA Tournament in 1982, but still posted an 18-13 overall mark as Walker averaged 24.9 points a contest. That season was Swanner's last year as head coach of the Lady Tigers.

The 1982-83 season was the first for the Lady Tigers under Sue Gunter, who came to LSU from Stephen F. Austin in Nacogdoches, Texas. In her first year with LSU, Gunter guided the Lady Tigers to a 20-7 mark and a tie for first place in the Western Division of the SEC.

Walker's last year with LSU in 1983-84 marked the Lady Tigers' first-ever appearance in the NCAA Tournament. LSU went 23-7 and reached the Sweet 16 at the NCAA Tournament before falling to Louisiana Tech.

In 1984-85, the Lady Tigers claimed the National Women's Invitational Tournament (NWIT) title with a 74-54 win over Florida in the championship game.

LSU's best season since 1977 occurred in 1985-86 as the Lady Tigers climbed all the way to No. 8 in the nation and reached the Elite Eight at the NCAA Tournament before falling to Tennessee in the final seconds, 67-65.

Another 20-win season followed in 1986-87 as the Lady Tigers spent most of the year ranked in the top 10. However, the Lady Tigers lost their last three games, including a 70-56 setback to Southern Illinois in the second round of the NCAA Tournament.

The 1987-88 season saw the arrival of Dana "Pokey" Chatman, the best point guard in school history. Chatman helped guide the Lady Tigers to an 18-11 mark and another NCAA Tournament appearance. LSU closed out the 1980's with its fifth NCAA Tournament appearance as LSU reached the Sweet 16 before falling to Louisiana Tech.

The 1990s

The decade of the 1990's was one of ups and downs for the Lady Tigers. LSU opened the decade with a 21-9 overall mark and its fifth NCAA Tournament appearance.

A year later, the Pokey Chatman era came to an end as the Lady Tigers posted a 24-7 overall mark, won the school's only SEC Tournament title and were

seeded No. 2 in the Midwest Region of the NCAA Tournament.

The 1991-92 season started the Cornelia Gayden era, but it was also the beginning of a stretch that saw the Lady Tigers go five years without an appearance in the NCAA Tournament. LSU posted a 16-13 overall mark, but five straight losses in mid-February kept the Lady Tigers home in March.

A year later in 1992-93, the Lady Tigers had their first-ever losing record as LSU went 9-18 and was winless in the SEC for the first time. Things weren't much better in 1993-94 as LSU went 11-16 overall and tied for 10th in the SEC.

One of the bright spots in 1994-95 was Sue Gunter's 500th career victory on the same night Gayden set an NCAA

record with 12 3-point goals in a 92-62 win over Jackson State on Feb. 9 in Baton Rouge. LSU suffered through its worst record ever that year as the Lady Tigers posted a 7-20 mark.

Despite the losing record the year prior, LSU signed one of the nation's best recruiting classes for the 1995-96 season and the results were immediate. LSU had the biggest turnaround in SEC history as the Lady Tigers went from 7-20 in 1994-95 to 21-11 in 1995-96. Junior college transfers Elaine Powell and Pietra Gay help lead LSU to a win over second-ranked Georgia in the SEC Tournament as the Lady Tigers appeared to be headed for its first NCAA Tournament appearance in five years, but was denied. The Lady Tigers settled for the NWIT, where they placed third out of eight teams.

The following year, LSU posted its best record in the 90's as they went 25-5 overall, won nine SEC games and reached the Sweet 16 for the first time since 1989. In 1997-98, the Lady Tigers, in what was supposed to be a rebuilding year, posted a 19-13 overall mark and reached the semifinals of the Women's NIT.

In 1998-99 the Lady Tigers, behind the play of senior point guard Latasha Dorsey, the only senior on the team, reached the Sweet 16 for the second time in three years and finished second in the SEC with a school-record 10 league wins. LSU's 22-8 overall mark in 1998-99 was LSU's fourth 20-win season of the 1990s.

The 2000s

The Lady Tigers rolled into the new millennium much like they way they ended the old one. In 1999-2000, LSU was 25-7 overall and 11-3 in the SEC, the best record for the program since 1996-97. The 11-3 conference mark was the best in the school's history. LSU rode that success all the way to the program's second Elite Eight appearance in the NCAA Tournament, falling to Connecticut in the regional final.

Another 20-win season greeted the Lady Tigers in 2000-01, compiling a 20-11 mark, including the fifth straight winning conference record at 8-6.

The 2001-02 season could have been one of the finest in recent history. Gunter's group of just six healthy players collected 18 victories, including a trip to the SEC Tournament Championship game and a fourth straight trip

to the NCAA Tournament.

Building on the success of the previous two seasons, the 2002-03 team went even further, ending the season with a 30-4 record, winning the SEC Tournament title, advancing to the NCAA Elite Eight and finishing the season ranked No. 3 in the national rankings.

It was in 2003-04 that the much eluded goal of the Lady Tigers was reached, advancing to the Final Four. The 2003-04 team posted at 27-8 record and steamed through the NCAA Tournament on its way to New Orleans and the Final Four. Despite the success, the 2003-04 season was full of adversity. Hall of Fame head coach Sue Gunter missed most of the season due to illness and ultimately retired following the season. Gunter was replaced during the season and on a full-time basis with former All-American guard Pokey Chatman.

The next season, in her first full year, Chatman, again guided the Lady Tigers to success. In 2004-05, LSU posted a 33-3 overall record, was ranked No. 1 in the nation for 11 weeks, won the program's first SEC regular season title with a perfect 14-0 mark, and advanced to the NCAA Final Four in Indianapolis. Chatman and guard Seimone Augustus earned numerous national honors, including sweeping the National Coach and Player of the Year honors.

This is the newest area of the booster club as it was established in 1999-2000 to allow businesses in the Baton Rouge and surrounding areas to donate \$1000 to the organization. Besides all regular club privileges, the Corporate Club members receive five additional club privileges for members of their company. There is also a special dinner held in their honor as well as an opportunity to sit on the Lady Tigers bench for one game. Locker room passes are also made available to Corporate Club members. In addition, there is a special presentation made to the corporation at one of the Lady Tigers home games which includes an award and an autographed Lady Tiger basketball.

The Junior Fast Break Club

The chance for members of the LSU women's basketball team to serve as role models to young boys and girls in Louisiana was the inspiration behind the formation of the Junior Fast Break Club. Open to all elementary and junior high students, the Junior Fast Break Club offers each member a membership card, a club t-shirt, an autographed poster, a quarterly club newsletter, a free coaching clinic and free admittance to select home games, as well as a season-ending pizza party with the team. The Junior Fast Break Club membership is only \$20.

In her first full season as head coach of her alma mater, Chatman guided LSU to a 33-3 overall record, led the team to its first Southeastern Conference regular season title with a perfect 14-0 record and helped the program reach its second consecutive NCAA Final Four.

Chatman did not go unrecognized for her success as she was named the National Coach of the Year by the United States Basketball Writers Association (USBWA) and the Women's Basketball Coaches Association (WBCA) and received the Naismith Award and the Victor Award as the country's top coach. Chatman, the fourth head coach in the program's history, was also named the SEC Coach of the Year and repeated the honor of being named the Black Coaches Association (BCA) Coach of the Year.

The year also included the program's best regular season record of 27-1 and the Lady Tigers were ranked No. 1 in the polls for 11 weeks between November and March.

The off season was not any less hectic for Chatman. She was named to the 27-member WBCA

Board of Directors as the BCA representative and helped lead the United States World University Games team to a gold medal as an assistant coach. With Team USA, Chatman coached with Harvard head coach Kathy Delany-Smith to win her second medal in international competition, having also won a medal as a player with the 1990 USA Select Team.

Chatman, a part of LSU's program as a player and coach for 17 years, became head coach in April of 2004 after Sue Gunter, a Hall of Fame coach and Chatman's mentor retired, but the task of guiding the team had began before that for Chatman.

Gunter fell ill during the 2003-04 season and Chatman stepped to the front and seamlessly led LSU to the first NCAA Final Four in school history and a second-place finish in the SEC. Chatman led the Lady Tigers to a 15-5 record in the absence of Gunter from the sidelines. Included in those victories were five wins over top 25 teams, including the school's first victory over a No. 1 seed in the NCAA Tournament, a 71-55 drubbing of Texas in the West Regional Semifinal prior to upsetting SEC foe Georgia in the regional final to advance to the Final Four.

When Gunter announced she would retire after a career marked by 40 years and 708 victories, LSU athletics director Skip Bertman smartly turned to Chatman, an LSU Hall of Famer herself, and an All-American point guard.

The call came on April 27, 2004, when Bertman



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named Chatman as only the fourth head coach in the history of LSU Women's Basketball.

Chatman had just completed her 13th season on the Lady Tiger staff, and her fifth as an associate coach after being elevated to that position in September 1999. But in 2003-04, Chatman became the most famous associate coach in the country when she took on the role of acting head coach in Gunter's absence, earning the BCA Coach of the Year honors for her efforts in relief.

The way Chatman guided the Lady Tigers through the second half of the season, into March Madness and a trip to the Final Four only added an exclamation point on what everyone already knew about Chatman's coaching potential.

Chatman, who dazzled LSU fans for four years as LSU's starting point guard in the late 1980s and early 1990s, developed a reputation as one of the nation's best recruiters, and one of the top up-and-coming coaches in the collegiate ranks. Chatman led LSU's recruiting efforts over nine years and as a result, the Lady Tigers have had eight straight classes rank among the top 20 in the nation, including the 2004 freshman class which featured three Parade All-Americans in Sylvia Fowles, Quianna Chaney and Erica White.

Chatman helped LSU land another top incoming freshmen class in 2003, in All-American Marian Whitfield out of Georgia, Swedish National team member Hanna Biernacka and New Orleans native Khalilah Mitchell.

The previous years were also highly productive for

Chatman. She helped the Lady Tigers land 2002 National High School Player of the Year Seimone Augustus who last year was named the consensus National Collegiate Player of the Year. Chatman also helped sign Aiysha Smith, a Kodak Junior College All-American and the 2003 first-round pick of the Washington Mystics, New Orleans natives Doneeka Hodges and Temeka Johnson, both current players in the WNBA, and Ke-Ke Tardy, the top player in Mississippi and ranked the 11th best player in the nation.

Chatman was also responsible for bringing DeTrina White, one of the top 15 rated players in the country in 1998, who went on to become the 1998-99 National Freshman of the Year.

Since joining the Lady Tigers staff, Chatman has tutored some of the finest guards in the country. Marie Ferdinand was a 2001 Kodak All-American selection and a finalist for the prestigious Naismith Award, given to the nation's best collegiate player. In addition to averaging over 21 points a game her senior season, she was a finalist for the Shooting Guard of the Year Award given out by ESPN. Ferdinand, a first round draft pick in the WNBA, is currently playing for the San Antonio Silver Stars and is a two-time WNBA All-Star.

Chatman also worked with Cornelia Gayden, a three-time All-SEC pick who holds the NCAA record for 3-point goals in a single-game with 12 against Jackson State. Other standouts under Chatman include Elaine Powell, a two-time first-team All-SEC selection, Pietra

Chatman spent time visiting many Baton Rouge area shelters that housed victims of both Hurricanes Katrina and Rita from New Orleans and other parts of the state affected by the storms. Last winter Chatman served as the honorary chairperson of the the 2005 Susan G. Komen Breast Cancer Foundation Race for the Cure held in Baton Rouge last February. Chatman is also very involved with the Alzheimers Services of the Capital Area as well as the Sue Gunter Fund.

Chatman was a three-time All-SEC selection and in 1991 led the Lady Tigers to their first-ever SEC Tournament title. Chatman was named MVP of the 1991 SEC Tournament, also a first for LSU.

Chatman capped her career at LSU by being selected to the prestigious Kodak All-American team following her senior season in 1991. Chatman is one of only five Lady Tigers named to the Kodak team. Chatman set a

Before being named to assistant coach prior to the 1992-93 season, Chatman served one season, 1991-92, as a student assistant with the Lady Tigers. Chatman, a Kodak All-American point guard for the Lady Tigers in 1991, graduated from Hahnville High School in 1987. She received her Bachelor's degree from LSU in December of 1991.

During her four years with the Lady Tigers, Chatman started all but one game and was the school's all-time assists and steals leader with 570 and 346, respectively when she finished her career. Chatman held the assist record until the 2003-04 season when current Lady Tigers point guard Temeka Johnson passed her coach for the top spot. She also finished fifth on the all-time scoring list with 1,826 points where she still ranks entering

total of 20 school records while at LSU with five of those records still standing.

Chatman was inducted into the LSU Athletics Hall of Fame in the spring of 1999.



BOB ★ STARKEY

ASSISTANT COACH - EIGHTH SEASON WITH LADY TIGERS

Bob Starkey enters his eighth season on the LSU women's basketball staff after joining the team on a full-time basis in 1998. Starkey had served as the administrative assistant for both the LSU men's and women's basketball team for two years prior to joining the Lady Tigers as assistant coach.

Starkey works with all phases of the program, which includes working with both perimeter and post players on the practice floor. He also breaks down game tape and develops game plans while compiling scouting reports on LSU's opponents.

In addition, Starkey handles all scheduling for the Lady Tigers, serves as the Director of the LSU women's basketball teams' Fast Break Club, and is also involved in all areas of promotions for the women's program. With his help, the Lady Tigers have enjoyed great success over the past few years, including finishing 10th in the country in average home attendance in 2004-05, drawing 7,317 fans per game in the Maravich Center, shattering the school record.

As the administrative assistant, Starkey provided valuable assistance to both the men's and women's programs, handling many of the responsibilities for both groups that would ease the work load for the coaching staff, allowing them to concentrate fully on their teams, recruiting and future opponents.

Starkey served as tournament director for the 1997 NCAA Women's Basketball Subregional held at the Maravich Assembly Center. The NCAA Subregional was the first for LSU to host and it was also called by many that attended the event as one of the best-run subregionals since the NCAA changed tournament formats.

Perhaps Starkey's finest achievement in the role of administrative assistant came in the Pack the PMAC games. In the 1997 Pack the PMAC contest against Arkansas, LSU drew a school-record 6,552 fans for the contest. The 6,552 fans for the contest nearly tripled the previous record crowd of 2,454 set against Ole Miss in 1984. A year later against Ole Miss, LSU reset the school-mark with a crowd of 7,255 for Pack the PMAC II. Four years ago, the school record crowd of 9,636 for the Pack the PMAC V game against Auburn was at the time the largest attendance for a women's basketball game in the state of Louisiana. Three years ago 11,252 fans packed the PMAC for nationally televised game against Penn State, setting both the LSU and state record, only to be broken later in the season when 15,217 paid to see No. 3 LSU battle No. 2 Tennessee. The Pack the PMAC promotion has developed into an LSU tradition, as Pack the PMAC X will take place this season.

Prior to his stint as an administrative assistant, Starkey served as an assistant coach for Dale Brown on the LSU men's basketball staff from 1990-1996, during which time the Tigers participated in four NCAA Tournaments. While on the men's staff, Starkey coached three first-round NBA draft picks in Shaquille O'Neal, Chris Jackson and Stanley Roberts. As a recruiter, he helped sign three nationally-ranked recruiting classes, including one which was rated No. 1 in the country.

Groomed on the high school level in West Virginia, Starkey started his coaching career as an assistant at Winfield High School where he helped guide the boys' program to a five-year record of 72-45 and the girls' program to an 87-23 record.

Starkey then made his first appearance in the collegiate ranks as an assistant at West Virginia College on the NAIA level. In his three-year stint at West Virginia State, the program blossomed with improving records of 17-10, 26-4 and 31-4. That final season saw the Yellow Jackets capture conference and district titles on their way to the NAIA National Championship game, where they were a one-point loser to Washburn University.

Following that, Starkey also served for one year at Poca High School in West Virginia with his former high school coach, Allen



Osborne, and teamed up for the 1988-89 season with Judy Southard to lead the women's program at Marshall to an 18-10 record and a regular season Southern Conference Championship. Southard is now in her third year as the Senior Woman Administrator at LSU after serving as the Athletic Director at Texas Women's University.

Starkey, who considers himself a full-time student of the game, has written numerous articles and has authored such basketball books as The 2-3 Match-Up Defense and Motion Offense.

His latest project is a Basketball Coaching Series of books that include The Art of Being An Assistant Coach, The Art of Scouting and The Art of Motivation.

The native of Charleston, W.V., is married to Sherie Hayslett, also a native of West Virginia.

Carla Berry enters her fifth season as an assistant coach for the Lady Tigers and will coordinate all facets of recruiting and oversee academics. Berry was a guard for the LSU women's basketball team from 1988-92 and was a member of the 1991 SEC Tournament championship team.

Bringing four years of recruiting experience to the program, Berry joined the accomplished LSU staff that has had eight signing classes rank among the top 20 in the nation over the last 10 years, four of which have been ranked in the top 10.

Berry was an integral part of signing the 2004 freshman class that included all-Americans Sylvia Fowles, Quianna Chaney and Erica White.

In just her first year on the staff, Berry helped the Lady Tigers sign one of the nation's top classes that included National High School Player of the Year Seimone Augustus prior to the 2001-02 season.

The opportunity to return to LSU was one that Berry could not pass up after having played for Coach Gunter and the Lady Tigers. As one of the team's chief recruiters, her commitment to the program and its success is personal and transcends just her professional obligations as a coach.

As a former LSU player, Berry has the ability to discuss the strengths of the program with recruits and lay out the opportunities LSU has to offer its student-athletes.

Berry, an Academic All-SEC selection in 1992, helped LSU advance to three NCAA Tournament appearances and was a part of the Lady Tigers' 1991 SEC Tournament Championship team. In 1993, she earned her bachelor's degree in advertising.

After graduating, she returned home to Alabama where she spent one season as a graduate assistant coach for the University of South Alabama in 1993-94. Berry then took a position as an assistant coach and recruiting coordinator for Cal Poly-San Luis Obispo in 1994 as the Lady Mustangs made the difficult transition from NCAA Division II to Division I competition.

Taking a position at St. John's University in 1995, she spent three years with the women's basketball program as the top assistant and recruiting coordinator, working with current Lady Tiger administrative assistant Joe Carvalhido. Coaching a team that was in the process of rebuilding, the program showed improvement each year she was there, including a 13-win season in her final year. Additionally, in her three seasons at St. John's, the Red Storm penned a pair of recruiting classes ranked in the top 50 nationally, including one top 25 class that included former Lady Tiger and retired Washington Mystic Aiysha Smith.

In addition to her recruiting responsibilities at LSU, Berry will also oversee academics for the Lady Tigers. Working closely with the Cox Communication Academic Center for Student-Athletes, she will help coordinate study hall and tutoring, while monitoring the academic progress for the student-athletes. Her primary on-court assignment will be coaching LSU's guards.

Berry spent two years working in sales for Cingular Wireless (formerly BellSouth Mobility) in her hometown of Mobile, Ala., prior to joining the Lady Tigers staff. She took the two years off from coaching to assist with an illness in the family.

Christie Sides, a Baton Rouge native, enters her second season as a member of the LSU Lady Tigers basketball coaching staff as an assistant coach.

Sides comes to LSU after spending two seasons on the Louisiana Tech coaching staff, the first as administrative assistant and this past season as assistant coach. During her time there, Tech posted a 60-6 overall record and a 35-1 mark in the Western Athletic Conference.

A graduate of Central Private High School in Baker, La., Sides' responsibilities include recruiting, assisting in all areas of Lady Tiger Basketball Camp, on-court coaching, working primarily with the perimeter players, and fundraising.

Prior to her years at Louisiana Tech, Sides spent two seasons as the head junior varsity coach and assistant varsity coach at Ruston (La.) High School where she served under Ricky Durrett. While at Ruston High, Sides helped guide the Lady Bearcats to consecutive state playoff appearances, including a 31-10 record in 2000-01 and a berth in the Louisiana High School Athletic Association Sweet 16 Tournament. During the 2001-02 season, Ruston High posted a 23-11 mark and advanced to the regionals of the LHSAA girls state playoffs.

Sides played her first two collegiate seasons at Ole Miss for Hall of Fame coach Van Chancellor and helped the Rebels to a 34-22 overall record. She then transferred to Louisiana Tech where she finished her playing career for fellow Hall of Fame coach Leon Barmore. Sides helped the Lady Techsters to a 61-6 record in two seasons, including a trip to the 1999 Final Four. She holds the career record at Tech for three-point field goal percentage and ranks seventh in three-pointers made and eighth in three-pointer attempted.

Prior to her collegiate playing career Sides led Central Private High School to the state championship her senior season while earning the Louisiana Gatorade Player of the Year award and all-state honors. She ended her high school playing career ranked No. 1 in school history with 3,375 points.

Sides earned her bachelor's degree in health and physical education from Tech in 2000.

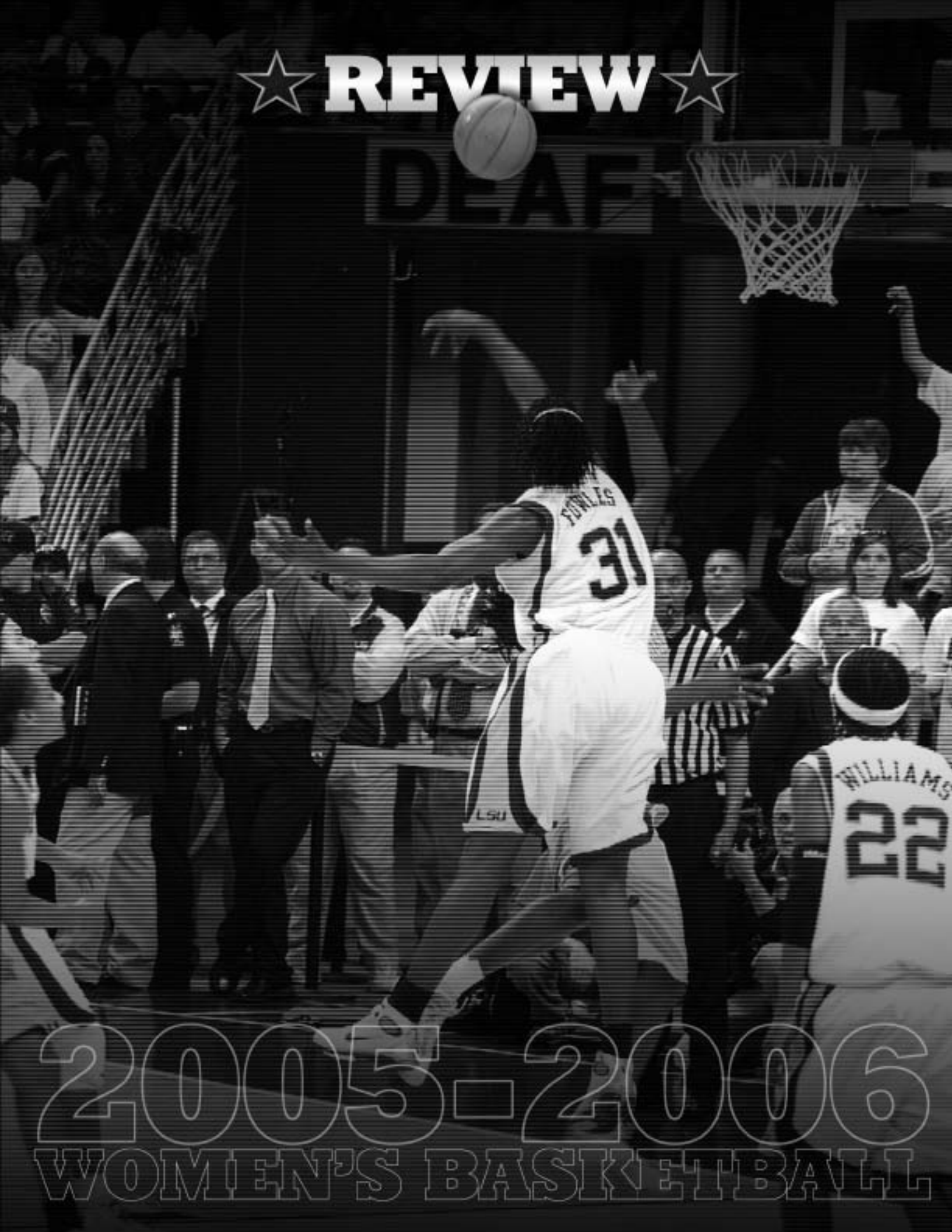

NATIONAL COACH OF THE YEAR

Head coach Pokey Chatman helped guide the Lady Tigers to a 33-3 overall record, the program's first Southeastern Conference regular season title and a return trip to the NCAA Final Four in 2004-05. Senior Temeka Johnson earned the Nanny Lieberman Award given annually to the nation's top point guard. Johnson, who finished her career as LSU's and the SEC's career assist leader, was also



named first-team All-America by the United States Basketball Writers Association and the Senior C.L.A.S.S. Award. The Associated Press named Johnson second-team All-American.

NATIONAL PLAYER OF THE YEAR

Junior Seimone Augustus was the consensus National Player of the Year following a season where she helped LSU climb to the top of the Southeastern Conference and nation. Augustus averaged 20.1 points and 4.6 rebounds per game, including posting double figures in all 36 games. The Baton Rouge native received the State Farm Wade Trophy, the Naismith Award, the John R. Wooden Award, the Honda Award, the Victor Award and the Associated Press and United States Basketball Writers Association National Player of the Year honors.

New Heights

LSU WOMEN'S BASKETBALL REACHES UNCHARTERED TERRITORY IN 2005

LSU completed one of its best seasons in school history. The Lady Tigers went 33-3 overall and advanced to the program's second straight NCAA Final Four. During the regular season, LSU posted a program best 27-1 mark that included a perfect 14-0 Southeastern Conference record for the school's first SEC regular season title. The Lady Tigers started the season with 13 straight wins and then won a school record 16 straight before falling in the SEC Tournament title game. The team was ranked No. 1 in the polls for 11 weeks and did not dropped below No. 3 all season in the AP poll, finishing second in the AP and third in the coaches poll. LSU posted eight wins against top 25 teams, including a 68-58 victory over No. 5 Tennessee on Feb. 10 in the Maravich Center. The Lady Tigers ended the season ranked 10th in the nation in average attendance, averaging 7,317 that included four of the top six record crowds in the program's history. **Seimone Augustus** became the school's first National and SEC Player of the Year. The junior was the consensus National Player of the Year, winning the Wade Trophy, the Wooden Award, the Naismith Trophy and being named the POY by the United States Basketball Writers Association and the Associated Press. **Temeka Johnson** highlighted the individual performances by becoming the SEC's all-time assist leader and ended her career ranked fifth in NCAA history. Johnson joined Augustus as a first-team All-America selection and both were also named first-team All-SEC. **Sylvia Fowles** was named the SEC's Sixth Woman of the Year as well as a second-team All-SEC and SEC All-Freshman. First-year head coach **Pokey Chatman** was named the National and SEC Coach of the Year.

PERFECT IN THE PMAC

LSU completed the 2004-05 home schedule with an unblemished 12-0 record, marking the third unbeaten home mark in the program's history. The Lady Tigers also completed the 1977-78 and 1985-86 seasons undefeated at home with 14-0 records.

STREAKING AT HOME

LSU ended the home schedule with a 16-game home court win streak in the Maravich Center. The Lady Tigers won the final four home games of the 2003-04 season and won all 12 in 2004-05. The streak is the eighth longest active streak in the nation.

PACKIN' EM IN THE PMAC

LSU recorded four of the top six home crowds in the program's history in 2004-05. A record 15,233 fans witnessed the Lady Tigers defeat No. 5 Tennessee on Feb. 10. The then-second largest crowd of 14,256 saw the Lady Tigers defeat Auburn on Jan. 30, LSU's ninth annual promotional event, Pack the PMAC, against Georgia on Jan. 8 generated the then third largest crowd at 10,624, while the sixth-largest crowd of 10,125 paid to see the Lady Tigers defeat Florida to win the SEC title on Feb. 27.

ATTENDANCE FIGURES

LSU finished its 2004-05 home schedule ranked 10th in average attendance in the nation. The Lady Tigers averaged 7,317 during their 12 home games and finished second to Tennessee among Southeastern Conference schools.

THE RAREST OF RARE

Temeka Johnson became the first player in LSU history to collected at least 1,000 points, 500 assists and 500 rebounds in a career. She ended her career with 1,426 points, 945 assists and 527 rebounds.

"MEKE" GETS SEC RECORD

Temeka Johnson, who owns all of the assists records in LSU history, finished the year as the Southeastern Conference's career assist leader after collecting her first assist at Mississippi State on Feb. 6. She entered the game tied with former Florida guard Camille Ratledge for the top spot and broke the record with pass to **Seimone Augustus** for a lay-up with 11:04 left in the first half.

JOHNSON FINISHED 5TH ON NCAA LIST

Temeka Johnson ended her career ranked fifth in NCAA history with 945 assists.

JOHNSON WINS LIEBERMAN AWARD

Temeka Johnson was named the Nancy Lieberman Point Guard of the Year on April 3. The New Orleans native had been a finalist for the award as both in 2002-03 and 2003-04 and earned the award in 2004-05 after leading LSU back to the Final Four and averaging 10.4 points and 7.7 assists per game. The award is given annually to the nation's top point guard.

"MONE" GETS MILESTONE

Seimone Augustus became the ninth player in LSU history to have collected at least 500 rebounds and score at least 1,500 points. The junior ended the season with 563 rebounds and 1,907 points.

CONCENSUS PLAYER OF THE YEAR

Seimone Augustus was the consensus National Player of the Year, winning the honor from the United States Basketball Writers Association and the Associated Press. In addition she received the Wade Trophy, the Naismith Award, the Women's Wooden Award, the Honda Award and the Victor Award.

TRAVELIN' TIGERS

If you did not notice LSU's schedule last season then you missed the national tour. The Lady Tigers visited 14 states during the season and travel 26,644 miles. LSU traveled to Texas, Pennsylvania, Colorado, Minnesota, Missouri, California, New Jersey, Florida, Tennessee, Mississippi, South Carolina, Alabama, Arkansas and Indiana during the season.

PERFECT IN THE SEC

LSU's posted a perfect 14-0 record in the SEC for the first time in the program's history. The 14 league wins also surpassed the school record of 11 SEC wins set in 1999-00 and 2002-03.

BEST REGULAR SEASON MARK

LSU's 27-1 record in the regular season ranks as the best in school history. The mark surpassed the 31-2 record in 1977-78.

THE BIG 30 FOR THE THIRD TIME

LSU's 30 wins in 2004-05 marked the third time the Lady Tigers reached the milestone in the program's history. The Lady Tigers also won at least 30 games in 1977-1978 (37) and 2002-03 (30).

14 STRAIGHT IN THE SEC

LSU's 14 straight wins in the SEC set the school record for consecutive league wins. The previous record was seven straight wins set in 2003.

13-0 BEST START BY SEC COACH

Pokey Chatman's 13-0 overall start as a head coach was the best by a Southeastern Conference first-year head coach in the history of the league. Only Jim Foster, who was 11-0 to open his career as Vanderbilt, was close to Chatman's and LSU's 13-0 mark.

14-0 BEST BY FIRST-YEAR COACH

Pokey Chatman's 14-0 record in the SEC is the best conference record by a first-year head coach in league history, according to the SEC office and dating back to the 1982-83 season.

LSU NABS EIGHT SEC HONORS

LSU received eight postseason honors handed out by the Southeastern Conference. **Pokey Chatman** was named Coach of the Year, **Seimone Augustus** was named Player of the Year, Augustus joined **Temeka Johnson** as first-team All-SEC selections, **Sylvia Fowles** was named the Sixth Woman of the Year, second-team All-SEC and joined **Quianna Chaney** on the SEC All-Freshman team. These honors were selected by the league's 12 head coaches.

LSU NABS FIVE MORE FROM AP

LSU received five more SEC honors from the Associated Press. **Seimone Augustus** was the Player of the Year, **Pokey Chatman** was Coach of the Year, Augustus and **Temeka Johnson** were first-team All-SEC and **Sylvia Fowles** was a second-team selection.

FOWLES PICKS UP THREE HONORS

Freshman **Sylvia Fowles** received three post-season honors doled out by the SEC coaches. The Miami, Fla., native was named the Sixth Woman of the Year, a honor given to the best player in the league that comes off the bench. She also was a unanimous selection on the SEC All-Freshman team and was named second-team all-conference.

CHANNEY NAMED ALL-FRESHMAN

Quianna Chaney joined **Sylvia Fowles** on the SEC's All-Freshman team. The duo are the seventh and eighth Lady Tigers to earn All-Freshman honors from the conference in the program's history.

CHATMAN MAKES HISTORY

Pokey Chatman became the first first-year head coach in Southeastern Conference history to be named Coach of the Year. In her first season, Chatman guided LSU to the program's first regular season league title and a perfect 14-0 mark in conference play.

LSU's defense held Stetson to 24.1 percent shooting from the floor which is an NCAA Tournament record for lowest shooting percentage in a game. The Lady Tigers also totaled five blocks, 11 steals and forced 17 turnovers, converting them into 18 points.

Stetson was held to just 19 points in the first half and managed only 17 in the second half, going scoreless for over an eight minute stretch in the final 20 minutes. LSU led 41-19 at the break.

Temeka Johnson led LSU, who advanced to the second round of the tournament for the eighth straight time, with 15 points and six assists, shooting 5-9 from the field and a perfect 5-5 from the free-throw line. Seimone Augustus finished with 14 points with eight coming from the free throw line.

Sylvia Fowles added nine points and nine rebounds and helped to contain Stetson's center Kristy Brown who was the MVP of the Sun Conference Tournament. Brown finished the game with 17 points and eight rebounds.

LSU's Scholanda Hoston and Florence Williams each had eight points in the victory.

The Lady Tiger reserves began entering the game during the middle of the second half and finished out the game, getting some quality playing time and experience. LSU scored 30 bench points and held Stetson's bench scoreless.

Although LSU only shot 38.1 percent from the field, they got to the free throw line and connected on 20 of 26 attempts.

Arizona was held with out a point for almost eight minutes in a span from the 2:55 mark in the first half until 15:33 mark of the second half, while LSU scored 18 straight points during the stretch.

The Lady Tigers' domination continued in the second half which they began with a 16-4 run. LSU's bench contributed valuable minutes in the second half and 26 points for the game while holding Arizona's bench to only four points. All 14 Lady Tigers played and all but three scored at least two points.

Seimone Augustus led the way for LSU with 18 points and contributed to the Lady Tigers' 48 rebounds by collecting eight.

Temeka Johnson recorded a double-double scoring 14 points and 10 assists. Johnson also made 4 of 4 from the free throw line, gathered four rebounds and had three steals.

LSU also found its three-point game, hitting 41.2 percent on 7 of 17 from behind the arch. Scholanda Hoston scored 12 points, including two three pointers. Quianna Chaney collected all of her nine points on threes and Johnson added two more.

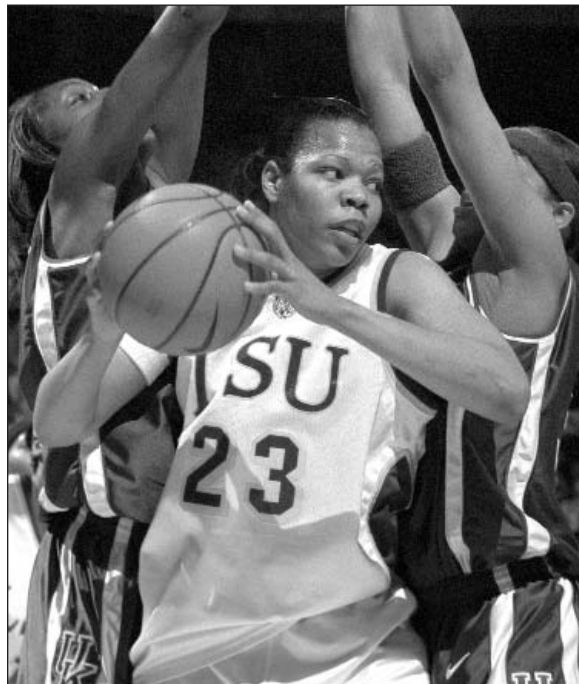

The First Lady Tiger Team To Reach NCAA Final Four

With head coach Sue Gunter sitting out the last half of the season due to illness, acting head coach Pokey Chatman led the Lady Tigers to the program's first trip to the NCAA Final Four and ironically enough, it was just down to the road in New Orleans.

The Lady Tigers road to the Final Four began at home in the Pete Maravich Assembly Center with victories over Austin Peay in the first round and Maryland in the second round. A 83-66 win over Austin Peay was sparked by a 21-point performance by all-American Seimone Augustus, while the Baton Rouge native poured in 26 in the 76-61 win over Maryland two nights later.

The fourth-seeded Lady Tigers now had a date with top-seeded Texas in the West Regional semifinal in Seattle, Wash. LSU was looking for revenge from the year before when Texas had knocked off the top-seeded Lady Tigers in the regional final. Revenge is just what LSU got with a 71-55 victory over the Longhorns led by Augustus' career-high 29 points. SEC foe Georgia would be the opponent in the regional final.

It would prove to be one of the best NCAA Tournament games in history with the lead going back and forth until Georgia took a seven-point lead with six minutes to play. LSU did not falter, chipping away at the lead using an 8-1 run in the final four minutes to take the lead and hold it for a 62-60 victory and the program's first trip to the NCAA Final Four.

Augustus matched her career-high with 29 points, including a late free throw, while Temeka Johnson added 19 points, including a 15-foot jumper that gave the Lady Tigers the lead for good.

Augustus was named the West Regional Most Outstanding Player and Johnson joined her on the West Regional All-Tournament team.

LSU had a date with rival and SEC foe Tennessee in the national semifinal game in the New Orleans Arena, just 70 miles from the Baton Rouge campus.

The Lady Vols ended LSU's magical run, 52-50, with a dramatic late steal and lay-up for Tennessee.

LSU ended the season with a 27-8 overall record and a run to the Final Four, the school's first.



2004-05

Lady Tigers Make it Back-to-Back Trips

After not advancing to the NCAA Final Four in the history of the program, the LSU Lady Tigers made it two straight trips with a visit in 2005.

First year head coach Pokey Chatman, who had guided LSU to the Final Four in her hometown of New Orleans as acting head coach in 2004, led the Lady Tigers back to the promise land.

Chatman and the Lady Tigers enjoyed one of the best seasons in school history, posting 33-3 overall record and claiming the program's first Southeastern Conference regular season title with a perfect 14-0 mark.

But, the success did not end in the regular season. LSU received a No. 1 seed in the NCAA Tournament and were placed in the Chattanooga Region.

The first stop for the Lady Tigers was Knoxville, Tenn., where No. 16 Stetson awaited. LSU took care of business in convincing fashion, posting a 70-36 victory. National Player of the Year Seimone Augustus scored 14 points, while National Point Guard of the Year Temeka Johnson had 15 points and seven assists.

No. 9 seed Arizona was the next victim as LSU advanced to the Sweet 16. The Lady Tigers continued its domination on defense in a 76-43 victory. For the second straight game the opposition shot below 30.0 percent from the floor.

Augustus led the way with 18 points and eight rebounds, while Johnson added 14 points and 10 rebounds.

Upset minded Liberty, the No. 13 seed, awaited LSU in Chattanooga for the Regional Semifinal. Defense again dominated the story line as the Lady Tigers defeated the Flames 90-48. LSU led 46-16 at the break and were led against by Augustus with 22 points. Scholanda Houston also had 22 points, while Johnson added 12 points and 15 assists.

The Duke Blue Devils, the No. 2 seed, now stood between LSU and a return trip to the Final Four.

Duke jumped out to an early lead and led for all but a few seconds of the first half until LSU battled back to tie the score at 30-30 just before halftime.

The Lady Tigers took control in the second half and held on for a 59-49 victory, earning them a trip to Indianapolis and a date with Baylor.

Augustus, who was named the Regional Most Outstanding Player, led the way with 24 points and seven rebounds, while freshman Sylvia Fowles added 13 points and 11 rebounds.

The RCA Dome was the site of the battle between the Lady Bears and the Lady Tigers in the National Semifinal. LSU jumped out to an early 15-point lead only to have Baylor chip back and eventually tie the score 28-28 at the break.

Unlike the Regional Final victory over Duke, this time Baylor, the eventual National Champions, took control in the second half and pulled away with a 68-57 victory.

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1976-77

The Only Lady Tigers to Reach the National Championship Game of a Post-Season Tournament



Maree Jackson

With one of the most dominating forward-center combinations in LSU women's basketball history in Australians Julie Gross and Maree Jackson, the Lady Tigers enjoyed one of their finest seasons in 1976-77.

The Lady Tigers, behind the play of Gross and Jackson, started the season off slow, but ended its regular-season with a 21-5 mark.

The Lady Tigers then headed to the AIAW State Tournament in Ruston. LSU easily handled New Orleans in the first round, winning 85-58, followed by a 73-51 victory over Southern. Louisiana Tech stopped LSU in the semifinals as the Techsters posted a 101-88 win over LSU. The Lady Tigers then fell to Northwestern State, 87-82, but the Lady Tigers still managed to finish in second place at the state tournament.

By virtue of its second place finish at the state tournament, LSU advanced to the AIAW Regional Tournament in Monroe.

At the regional tournament, the Lady Tigers got on a roll as they whipped Texas, 95-67, in the first round followed by a 76-73 win over a Sue Gunter-coached Stephen F. Austin team in the semifinals. LSU beat Baylor, 92-76, in the championship game to advance to the AIAW National Tournament in Minneapolis, Minn.

At the AIAW National Tournament, the Lady Tigers drew Western Washington in the first round and had little trouble as the Lady Tigers, behind 40 points from Maree Jackson, raced out to 49-26 halftime lead and never looked back in their 91-53 win. Next up for the Lady Tigers was Baylor, a team that LSU had already beat twice during the season, which included a victory over the Bears in the regional finals.

LSU was once again victorious over Baylor as the Lady Tigers got 35 points and 26 rebounds from Maree Jackson advanced with a 71-64 win.

The Lady Tigers then moved into the semifinal round against Immaculata, a powerhouse in women's basketball at the time. Immaculata was ranked No. 2 in the nation and was considered a huge favorite in the contest with the Lady Tigers.

The Lady Tigers upset Immaculata, 74-68, despite the fact that Jackson played after having root canal surgery and Brenda McGuffie played with a severely sprained ankle. In addition, Jackson and McGuffie played the final 10 minutes of the contest with four fouls. Jackson finished with 29 points and 19 rebounds, while Gross had 23 points and 11 boards.

It was on to the national championship game for LSU as the 11th-ranked Lady Tigers would face top-ranked Delta State for the title.

Delta State scored the first six points of the contest and the Delta Devils quickly built a nine point advantage, 13-4, on a jumper by Debbie Brock at the 15:14 mark. LSU could get no closer than seven points the rest of the way as Lady Tiger All-American Jackson picked up her third foul with 5:54 to play in the first half. Delta State led 34-25 at intermission.

In the second half, Delta State never let the Lady Tigers back in the contest as the Delta Devils held Jackson to a career-low six points in posting a 68-55 victory. Lucy Harris, the best women's player in the country at the time, led Delta State with 23 points and 16 rebounds.

The Lady Tigers finished the year with an overall record of 29-8 and ranked No. 11 in the nation. That team still holds the distinction of being the only Lady Tiger team ever to reach the national championship game of a post-season tournament.

1983-84

The Lady Tigers advanced to the 32-team NCAA Tournament for the first time in the school's history as LSU was the No. 5 seed in the Midwest Regional. Over the last 10 years, the LSU women's basketball team has established the newly renovated Pete Maravich Assembly Center as one of the toughest road playing sites in not only the Southeastern Conference, but in the nation. Since the 1995-96 season, the Lady Tigers have posted a remarkable home record of 135-16 (.894), including averaging 13.5 victories per year.

In all, over the last 10 years, LSU has won eight NCAA Tournament games and a pair of Women's NIT contests at the PMAC. Throw in the fact that LSU is 25-9 at home against top 25 teams over the last 10 years, and the PMAC can back up its claim as one of the nation's most-feared road sites.

In addition to their success on the court, the Lady Tigers are also playing before record crowds. In 2004-05, LSU finished 10th in the nation in average home attendance with 7,317 fans paid per game, by far a record for the Lady Tigers. During that 2004-05 season four crowds of over 10,000 were recorded for games, including a record crowd of 15,233 against Tennessee on Feb. 10, 2005. It was only fitting that records were broken in 2004-05. It was that season the Lady Tigers posted a perfect 12-0 record at home and won its first Southeastern Conference regular season title, clinching the league with a home victory over Florida on Feb. 27, 2005 in front of a crowd of 10,125, the sixth largest crowd in history.

Although LSU had a 41-game home winning streak against non-ranked opponents snapped five seasons ago by Auburn, the Lady Tigers are still 104-4 over the last 10 years against unranked teams. LSU posted undefeated records at home over non-ranked opponents in 2004-05 (10-0), 2002-03

(8-0), 2001-02 (11-0), 1999-00 (17-0), 1998-99 (11-0) and 1996-97 (11-0).

In 1999-00, the Lady Tigers set a school-record with 17 home victories with their only loss coming at the hands of second-ranked Tennessee.

In 30 years at the PMAC, LSU's home court advantage can be compared with the best programs from across the country as the Lady Tigers have won 78 percent of their homes games with a 316-86 overall mark. The Lady Tigers have recorded a 99-47 mark in SEC contests. LSU has also put together winning streaks of 26, 24 and 22 games, and a current 16-game streak at home. The Lady Tigers have also gone undefeated three, going 12-0 in 2004-05, and 14-0 in both 1977-78 and 1985-86.

Built in 1971, the PMAC will have a completed renovation prior to the 2005-06 season that includes an updated concourse, new seats and a new sound system. The capacity will be in the low 13,000 following the renovations.

During the summer of 1988, Louisiana Governor Buddy Roemer signed legislation changing the official name of the building to the Pete Maravich Assembly Center in honor of the LSU star who had died tragically earlier that same year.

In addition to the normal basketball-seating configuration, a proscenium stage can be lowered into place at the north end allowing some 4,000 seats for theatrical productions. An additional 1,000 seats can be placed on the floor for graduations, convocations, lectures, concerts or other special events.

Also located in the building is an auxiliary practice gym used for basketball and volleyball practices and various P.E. classes; home and visitor dressing rooms; coaches dressing rooms, building administration offices; theater dressing rooms; Tiger Athletic Foundation offices; and the "L" Club meeting room with kitchen facilities.

The Assembly Center has been the site for both men's and women's NCAA Regional Tournaments, the 1981 SEC Women's Basketball Tournament, the 1988 SEC Men's Basketball Tournament and two SEC Volleyball Tournaments and was the site of the 2004 NCAA Tournament First & Second rounds.

PACK THE PMAC

What started out as a dream nine years ago has developed into one of the biggest and the best promotional events in all of women's basketball, as Zapp's Pack the PMAC returns for year number 10 this season when the Lady Tigers host Minnesota on Jan. 7, 2005 on national television.

The concept of Pack the PMAC is simple—a blowout ticket sales push throughout Baton Rouge and surrounding communities in an attempt to fill the Maravich Center for a women's basketball game. After nine years, Pack the PMAC has blossomed into a much-anticipated event and it will once again be the highlight of the LSU women's basketball schedule. This year's Pack the PMAC game is set for Saturday, Jan. 7 for a nationally televised match-up with Big 10 foe Minnesota.

Starting in the fall, LSU uses various outlets to promote both the

game and the "Flying Frenzy" half-time contest. At Pack the PMAC IV, Rich Bisson became the first person in the history of the event to win a car. In addition to the car giveaway, there are also televisions, shopping sprees, and other items that can be won in the half-time "Flying Frenzy" contest.

In nine years the event has become a tremendous success, but more important than the actual game is the fact that Baton Rouge has finally become introduced, and welcomed, to LSU women's basketball at its finest hour.

Prior to the first Pack the PMAC in 1997, the Lady Tigers had never played before a crowd larger than 2,500 at the Maravich Assembly Center. Seven of LSU's top 15 home crowds have come at Pack the PMAC, including the first crowd over 10,000 fans at a women's basketball game in the state of Louisiana at Pack the PMAC VII when 11,252 fans paid to

see the Lady Tigers defeat Penn State on CBS. This past year at Pack the PMAC IX, 10,624 fans filled the arena and watched the Lady Tigers defeat Georgia on national television.

In the first year, the Lady Tigers drew a then school-record crowd of 6,552 as LSU beat Arkansas, 79-72. A year later, for Pack the PMAC II, LSU reset the school-record as 7,255 witnessed the Lady Tigers' 69-56 win over Mississippi.

In 1999-00, 6,352 fans witnessed the first nationally televised broadcast of an LSU women's basketball game as the Lady Tigers knocked off Arkansas, 68-51 on ESPN2. Pack the PMAC V drew a then school-record 9,636 fans, which was at the time the largest attendance ever at a women's basketball game in the state of Louisiana. The 2001-02 Pack the PMAC game collected 8,153 fans.

In 2004-05 the LSU Lady Tigers made history, not only by winning the program's first Southeastern Conference title, but by doing it in convincing fashion.

The Lady Tigers completed the SEC schedule unblemished, posting a 14-0 record.

LSU began the conference season with a home game against No. 17 Georgia on national television. The Lady Tigers, ranked No. 1 at the time, handed the Lady Bulldogs a 76-52 loss and took that momentum into Gainesville, Fla., for a date with the Lady Gators.

The Lady Tigers rolled past Florida, 64-47, and then returned home to host both Alabama and Arkansas. LSU handed Alabama a 76-51 loss and defeated Arkansas, 91-45, in impressive fashion.

A trip to Nashville to face Vanderbilt in Memorial Coliseum was next. The Lady Tigers had not had much success when facing the Commodores on their home floor, but this time LSU prevailed, 79-68, over 17th-ranked Vanderbilt.

The end of January had the Lady Tigers return to Baton Rouge to host pesky Auburn. A hard fought 57-52 victory boosted LSU to a 6-0 league mark with eight games left.

A road swing through Mississippi saw the Lady Tigers hand

Ole Miss a 82-58 loss and Mississippi State a 67-40 loss.

Those two wins meant a showdown in the Pete Maravich Center between top-ranked LSU at 8-0 in the league and fifth-ranked Tennessee, also with a perfect 8-0 league mark.



The Lady Tigers took care of business in front of the largest home crowd in LSU women's basketball history, defeating the Lady Vols 68-58 on national television.

A 66-36 victory at South Carolina and a 81-58 home victory

over Kentucky followed and LSU had 11 league wins, the most in the program's history.

The final three games awaited, including trips to Auburn and Arkansas.

Once again, the Auburn Tigers proved pesky, but LSU prevailed 62-57.

Things were much easier in Fayetteville as LSU rolled to a 90-64 win, clinching at least a share of the league crown for the Lady Tigers.

LSU returned home with a chance to claim the program's first outright league title and a perfect 14-0 record.

Florida stood in the way, but not for long. In front of a crowd of over 10,000 fans, LSU defeated the Lady Gators 76-52 and the first SEC Champions banner was dropped from the rafters of the PMAC.

LSU had completed the league schedule with a 14-0 record thanks in part of first-year head coach Pokey Chatman, senior Temeka Johnson, junior Seimone Augustus and freshman Sylvia Fowles.

In addition to claiming the league title, Chatman was named the SEC Coach of the Year, Augustus was the league's Player of the Year, Johnson earned first-team All-SEC honors and Fowles garnered the 6th Women of the Year award.



1991 SEC Champions

LSU claimed its first Tournament title in 1991 as the Lady Tigers had one of the most impressive runs in conference tournament history. Entering the tournament as the No. 4 seed, the Lady Tigers had a first round bye and then beat Kentucky, 96-76, in the second round. The Lady Tigers, who were ranked No. 12 in the nation, then upset fourth-ranked Georgia, 83-74, in the semifinals. In the title game, point guard Pokey Chatman scored 30 points, including 16 straight at one point, as the Lady Tigers knocked off third-ranked Tennessee, 80-75. Chatman was named most valuable player of the tournament, while Sheila Johnson and Annette Jackson-Lowery were named to the all-tournament team.



2003 SEC Champions

The LSU Lady Tigers run through the Southeastern Conference Tournament was something special in 2003. It has been 12 years since LSU had last won a tournament title and the Lady Tigers were hungry for the crown.

Standing in the way of the second seeded and sixth-ranked Lady Tigers in the opening game were the No. 23 Arkansas Lady Razorbacks, a team that had handed LSU its first defeat of the season in Fayetteville earlier during the season.

It would prove to be the closest margin of victory in LSU's run to the title. LSU defeated Arkansas 78-72 thanks to some clutch free throw shooting down the stretch, including Seimone Augustus' two free throws with 19 seconds to play to give the freshman her 21st and 22nd points of the game and LSU a four point lead.

Four of the five starters for LSU scored in double figures in the opening round victory over Arkansas. In addition to Augustus, Temeka Johnson added 15 points, while Doneeka Hodges and Aiysha Smith both hit for 11 points.

15th-ranked Vanderbilt was the next item on the menu for the Lady Tigers. The Commodores were also a team that had defeated LSU during the regular season. In fact, the defending SEC tournament champions had knocked off LSU just the week before in Nashville and were playing with a lot of confidence heading into the semifinals of the SEC Tournament.

Vandy had so much confidence in themselves they led by as many as nine in the first half and took a 39-35 lead into the locker room at halftime after shooting 51.7 percent from the floor in the opening 20 minutes of play. LSU did not take its first lead of the game until Seimone Augustus hit a pair of free throws with 17 minutes to play to give the Lady Tigers a 44-43 advantage. The lead went back and forth for most of the second half until LSU closed the game with a 12-2 run in the final four minutes to advance to their second straight SEC Tournament title game.

Augustus took over the game during the final run, scor-



ing 14 of her 20 points in the final four minutes of play. Aiysha Smith led LSU with 21 points, while Temeka Johnson added 12 points and Augustus had nine rebounds to go along with her point total.

The stage was set for the SEC title game, sixth-ranked LSU vs. No. 3 Tennessee for the SEC Championship. A rematch of the 68-65 Lady Vol victory during the regular season in Baton Rouge.

The Lady Tigers took control of the game early, jumping to a 7-0 lead and led 42-25 at the break. Tennessee managed to trim the margin down to 13 with 15 minutes to play before the Lady Tigers took the largest lead of the game at 18 with 10 minutes left.

Temeka Johnson took home MVP honors after scoring a career-high 24 points in the victory. She added nine rebounds and seven assists in the victory. Aiysha Smith added 18 points, while Seimone Augustus had 12 points and eight rebounds on her way to an all-tournament team selection.

LSU avenged all three of its regular season losses with three wins over three top 25 teams in three days to win the 2003 SEC Tournament Championship.



SUE ★ GUNTER

40 SEASONS • 708 WINS • BASKETBALL HALL OF FAMER

The late Sue Gunter, a 2005 inductee into the Naismith Basketball Hall of Fame, will always be remembered as not only one of the greatest coaches in women's basketball history, but also as a pioneer in the game. Gunter passed away on Aug. 4, 2005.

Gunter, who became the third women's coach in history to reach 700 career victories with a win over Arkansas on Feb. 12, 2004, was with women's basketball on the collegiate level every step of the way and saw the sport evolve from a novelty back in the early 1960s to present day, where the Final Four is sold out years in advance and games are shown nightly on national television.

Gunter, who was inducted into the Women's Basketball Hall of Fame in June 2000, completed her career among the leaders in several NCAA coaching categories: seasons coached (No. 1 - 40); games coached (No. 3 - 1,016); wins (No. 3 - 708); and 20-win seasons (No. 4 - 22).

Gunter's influence was a catalyst behind the growth of the game and things were no different in Baton Rouge as the Lady Tigers continue to play before school-record crowds and media attention is at an all-time high. In Gunter's 22-year tenure at LSU, her list of accomplishments are long and impressive -- 14 NCAA Tournament appearances, one trip to the Final Four, four NCAA Elite Eight appearances, eight NCAA Sweet 16 appearances, two SEC Tournament titles, a Women's NIT title, and a handful of Coach of the Year awards.

Sue Gunter -- The Coach

Sue Gunter brought the LSU women's basketball program back to national prominence. After a three-year hiatus in the mid-1990's that saw the Lady Tigers suffer through the school's first-ever losing seasons, LSU returned to the post-season, and in Gunter's final year as head coach in 2003-04, advanced to the program's first NCAA Final Four.

To realize just how far the Lady Tigers have come, one has to go back to the 1994-95 season, the worst year in school history as LSU posted a 7-20 overall mark. Strangely enough, it was the 1994-95 season that proved to be the turning point for the Lady Tigers as Gunter turned up her recruiting magic and promptly signed the best class in school history. That class, which included future All-SEC selections in Elaine Powell, Pietra Gay and Toni Gross, won 46 games over two years and resurrected the LSU women's basketball program. The Lady Tigers won an average of 22.5 games per season under Gunter since the 1994-95 campaign, including a then-school record 30 wins in 2002-03.

Her final season was undoubtedly one of Gunter's finest on the court, despite not being on the bench for over half the season due to illness. The Lady Tigers won 27 games, finished second in the SEC with a 10-4 mark, received a No. 4 seed in the NCAA Tournament's West Region and advanced past Austin Peay, Maryland, No. 1 seed Texas and Georgia to reach the program's first Final Four right down the road in New Orleans. Gunter coached in her 1,000 game on Jan. 25, 2004 and recorded her 700th career victory later in the season against Arkansas. Sophomore Seimone Augustus earned Kodak All-American honors and was the Louisiana Player of the Year.

Gunter completed her career as the third winningest women's basketball coach in history with an overall record of

708-308, which included coaching stints at Middle Tennessee, Stephen F. Austin and LSU. Gunter's LSU record was 442-221, which makes her the winningest coach in school history.

Under the direction of Gunter, the Lady Tigers played in 14 NCAA Tournaments, one National Women's Invitational Tournament and two WNIT events. Gunter led LSU to one Final Four in 2004, and to the Elite Eight in 1986, 2000 and 2003, while leading the Lady Tigers to a championship at the National Women's Invitational Tournament in 1985. In addition, Gunter directed LSU to 14 20-plus-win seasons, including one 30-win season.

Prior to her arrival in Baton Rouge, Gunter had a very successful coaching stint at Stephen F. Austin in Nacogdoches, Texas. While at SFA, Gunter built that program into a national powerhouse as she led the Ladyjacks to a 266-87 mark in 12

years as head coach. In addition, she led Stephen F. Austin to four top 10 national rankings, which included No. 5 final rankings in 1979 and 1980. While at Stephen F. Austin, Gunter coached four sports - women's basketball, softball, tennis and track. Her basketball teams went to five Association of Intercollegiate Athletics for Women (AIAW) playoffs, won four state titles and earned a regional crown.

After 16 seasons at SFA, she relinquished the reigns and moved into the position of Director of Women's Athletics where she served two years before returning to the coaching ranks at LSU.

Gunter began her coaching career at Middle Tennessee State where she led the Blue Raiders to undefeated seasons in both of her years there.

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POKEYCHATMAN

NATIONAL COACH OF THE YEAR

First-year head coach Pokey Chatman, who guided the Lady Tigers to a 33-3 overall record, the first Southeastern Conference regular season title in the program's history, and a second straight trip to the NCAA Final Four, received the National Coach of the Year honor from the United States Basketball Writers Association, the Women's Basketball Coaches Association, the Black Coaches Association and Naismith. During Chatman's first season, LSU was ranked No. 1 in the nation for 11 weeks and earned a No. 1 seed in the NCAA Tournament. Chatman's Lady Tigers also posted a perfect 14-0 record in the SEC and went 12-0 inside the Peter Maravich Center. LSU put together win streaks of 12 straight and a school-record 16 games during the season. In Sue Gunter's first season as head coach of the Lady Tigers in 1982-83, she received the National Coach of the Year honor from the Basketball News. Gunter guided LSU to a 20-7 record and posted a 6-2 mark in the Southeastern Conference. LSU was ranked as high as No. 17 during the season.



SEIMONE AUGUSTUS

NATIONAL PLAYER OF THE YEAR

In 2004-05, Seimone Augustus, a junior for the Lady Tigers was the consensus National Player of the Year. The Baton Rouge native won the Wade Trophy, the Naismith Award, the John R. Wooden Award, the Honda Award and the Victor Award. She was also named the Player of the Year by the United States Basketball Writers Association and the Associated Press. Augustus led LSU to a 33-3 record, the first Southeastern Conference regular season title in the program's history and a second straight trip to the NCAA Final Four. She averaged 20.1 points and 4.6 rebounds per game and scored at least 13 points in all 36 games, including a career-high 33 points against Baylor in the State Farm Hall of Fame Tipoff Classic.

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JULIEGROSS

Forward • 6-2 • Tatura, Australia • Kodak - 1978

Julie Gross became LSU's first Kodak All-American when she earned the honor following her sophomore season in 1978 after averaging 20.7 points and 11.5 rebounds for the Lady Tigers. She was also named honorable mention All-America by the Basketball News in 1980 when she averaged 17.6 points and 9.5 rebounds. Gross finished her career as the all-time leading rebounder in LSU history with 1,466 rebounds and was second on the all-time scoring list with 2,488 points. Gross is also the second leading rebounder in SEC history.



JOYCE WALKER

Guard • 5-8 • Seattle, Washington

Kodak - 1983, 1984 • Basketball News - 1982, 1983, 1984

Joyce Walker holds the distinction of being the only player in LSU history to be named to the prestigious Kodak All-America team two times. Walker, considered by many to be one of the best players in SEC history, was a three-time selection to the Basketball News All-America team. Walker, the second leading scorer in SEC history with 2,906 points (24.8 ppg) was selected to both the Kodak and Basketball News in 1983 after averaging 27.6 points a game. In 1982, her first year as an All-American, Walker was named to the Basketball News All-America Team, while in 1984 she was named to the Kodak, Basketball News and JC Penney All-America teams.

Walker is the only player in LSU history to rank in the school's Top 10 in scoring, rebounding, assists, steals, and blocked shots. At LSU, Walker is the all-time leading scorer, 10th in rebounding, third in assists, second in steals, and 10th in blocked shots. In the summer of 1997, Walker was elected to the Louisiana Hall of Fame.

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POKEYCHATMAN

Guard • 5-5 • Ama, La. • Kodak - 1991

Pokey Chatman capped her career at LSU by earning Kodak, Basketball Weekly and United States Basketball Writer's Association All-America honors following her senior season in 1991. During the 1991 season, Chatman scored 576 points (18.6 ppg) and dished out 157 assists (5.1 apg). Chatman is the fifth all-time leading scorer in school history with 1,826 points. She is also LSU's all time leader in both assists (570) and steals (346). During her four years at LSU, Chatman started all but one game and set 20 school records. She also led the Lady Tigers to their first-ever SEC Tournament title in 1991. Chatman was named MVP of the 1991 SEC Tournament.



MARIE FERDINAND

Guard • 5-9 • Miami, Fla. • Kodak - 2001

One of the most explosive guards to ever play at LSU, Miami native Marie Ferdinand earned 2001 Kodak and Women's Basketball Journal All-America honors and was a unanimous coaches poll first-team All-SEC selection. The Louisiana Player of the year, she was also a finalist for the Naismith Award and the ESPN the Magazine Shooting Guard of the Year Award. For her career, Ferdinand averaged 13.7 points and 4.1 rebounds a game. In 2000, she led the Lady Tigers to the Elite Eight, averaging team-highs in points, assists and steals. She was named to the 2000 NCAA East Regional all-tournament team. Ferdinand also made an impact in international play in the summer of 2000, helping lead the U.S. Women's Select Team to a gold medal at the Jones Cup Tournament in Taipei, Taiwan. She was a first round pick of the Utah Starzz of the WNBA and finished third in Rookie of the Year voting in 2001.

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SEIMONE AUGUSTUS

Guard • 6-2 • Baton Rouge, La.

Kodak - 2004, 2005 • AP - 2005 • USBWA 2005 • Freshman All-American - 2003

Seimone Augustus' first three seasons at LSU has rivaled few in Lady Tigers history. In each of her first three years, the Baton Rouge native has received All-America honors, including Kodak honors in 2004 and 2005. In her first season in 2003, Augustus was named the National Freshman of the Year and a Freshman All-American. She averaged 14.8 points per game and shot 54.9 percent from the field as a freshman and set the school's single-season record for free throw percent by hitting 88.8 percent of her shots (79 of 89). She led LSU to a SEC Tournament title and an Elite Eight appearance in the NCAA Tournament. As a sophomore Augustus helped the Lady Tigers to the program's first NCAA Final Four by averaging 19.5 points and 5.9 rebounds per game. She was also the West Regional MVP, averaging 29.0 points in the two games to get LSU to the Final Four. As a junior she topped her first two seasons by not only earning her second straight Kodak All-America honor, but she was the consensus National Player of the Year after averaging 20.1 points and 4.6 rebounds. She helped lead the Lady Tigers to a return trip to the Final Four.



MAREE JACKSON

Center, 6-2 • Albury, Australia • Basketball News - 1978

Maree Jackson became LSU's first Basketball News All-American in 1978 when she was named to the team following her sophomore season. As a sophomore, Jackson scored 1,021 points (25.5 ppg) and grabbed 539 rebounds (13.5 rpg). The 1,021 points and 539 rebounds are the most in both SEC and LSU history for one season. In just two seasons with the Lady Tigers, Jackson scored 1,852 points which places her third on the all-time scoring list. She also finished her career as the second leading rebounder in LSU history with 1,032 rebounds. For her career, Jackson averaged 26.4 points a game, which still stands as the SEC record.



RENEE MORAN

Guard, 5-9 • Pearl River, La. • Basketball News - 1980

Rene Moran was a third team selection on the Basketball News All-America team in 1980. During that season, Moran led the Lady Tigers in scoring with a 21.6 average. Moran, who transferred to LSU from Southeastern Louisiana, played only two seasons with LSU. A year after earning All-America honors, Moran injured her knee two weeks before the start of the 1980-81 season and never played again. She finished her career at LSU with 1,023 points and 304 rebounds.



ALISHA JONES

Center, 6-3, Wiggins, Miss. • Freshman All-American - 1984

Alisha Jones became LSU's first national Freshman All-American when she earned the honor after averaging 12.5 points and 7.9 rebounds per game to help lead the Lady Tigers during the 1983-84 season. The Basketball News recognized the 6-3 post player with the All-America honor after she hit 55.4 percent of her field goals and 73.3 percent of her free throws. She scored in double figures in 20 of the 29 games played, including a 19 point-11 rebound performance against Georgia in the SEC Tournament semifinals.



CORNELIA GAYDEN

Cornelia Gayden had perhaps one of the best all-around seasons in school history as a senior as she was named second team All-America by the Women's Basketball News Service and third team All-America by the Associated Press in 1995. Gayden, who averaged 25.8 points and 8.4 rebounds as a senior, was also a finalist for AP Player of the Year. During her senior season, Gayden set an NCAA record by hitting 12 3-pointers against Jackson State. In that same game, Gayden scored a school-record 49 points and became the NCAA's all-time leader in 3-point goals. Gayden capped her career with NCAA records in 3-point goals (337) and 3-point goals attempted (875). Gayden is the third leading scorer in LSU history with 2,451 points and the eighth leading scorer in SEC history. Gayden was a three-time All-SEC selection.



LATASHA DORSEY

Guard, 5-7 • Abbeville, La. • Defensive All-American - 1999

Latasha Dorsey had an outstanding senior season for the Lady Tigers as she led LSU to the Sweet 16 at the NCAA Tournament and was named a first team Defensive All-American by the Women's Basketball Journal. As a senior, Dorsey ranked third in the SEC with 2.5 steals a contest. She also averaged 12.9 points and 4.2 assists a contest. Dorsey completed her LSU career with more post-season appearances (12) than any player, male or female, in school history. In addition, Dorsey won 29 SEC games in her LSU career, also a school record. Dorsey finished her career with 1,054 points which ranks 14th in school history, while she ranks third all-time in steals and fifth in assists.



DETRINA WHITE

Forward, 5-11 • Lafayette, La. • Freshman All-American - 1999

DeTrina White finished her first year at LSU with more honors than any other freshman in LSU history. Highlighting White's list of honors was being named National Freshman of the Year by the Women's Basketball News Service, a first for an LSU player. White was also named first team Freshman All-America by both the Women's Basketball News Service and the Women's Basketball Journal. In addition, she was voted the Freshman of the Year in the SEC by the Associated Press. White finished her first season averaging 13.1 points and 8.2 rebounds a contest. White led the SEC with 11 double-double games.



ANGELIA CROCKETT

Guard, 5-11 • Tallulah, La. • Defensive All-American - 2001

One of the Lady Tigers most steady and unselfish players, Tallulah native Angelia Crockett became the second LSU player to ever earn first team Defensive All-America honors from the Women's Basketball Journal. In her senior year, the point guard blocked 10 shots and was ranked seventh in the SEC in assist-to-turnover ratio. She also averaged 3.0 points and 2.4 rebounds a game. In her four years at LSU, Crockett helped lead the Lady Tigers to four national tournaments, including three straight NCAA Tournament appearances, runs through to the Elite Eight and Sweet 16 and a WNIT appearance.



TEMEKA JOHNSON

Guard, 5-3 • New Orleans, La.
USBWA - 2005 • Lieberman Award - 2005

Temeka Johnson, one of the best point guards in Southeastern Conference history, earn All-America honors from the United States Basketball Writers Association and was a second-team honoree by the Associated Press. Johnson, who won the Nancy Lieberman Award as the nation's top point guard, averaged 10.4 points and led the SEC with 7.7 assists per game. She finished her career tops in the SEC and fifth in NCAA history with 945 assists. She also ended her career as the only player in LSU history to collect at least 1,000 points, 500 assists and 500 rebounds. Johnson finished with 1,426 points, 945 assists and 527 rebounds and holds every assist record in school history.

The 2004-05 athletics year was another wonderful year for LSU. The Tigers and Lady Tigers enjoyed success from the fields and courts to the classroom. All in all it was an exciting year for LSU's student-athletes, coaches and fans.

Postseason Presence

Of LSU's 20 sports, 14 teams advanced to postseason play. Among the highlights: the football team advanced to a New Year's bowl game for the fourth straight year ... the women's basketball team won the SEC title and reached the Final Four for the second straight season ... the men's outdoor track & field team finished No. 3 in the country ... and the men's tennis team reached the NCAA Sweet Sixteen ... LSU was one of only four schools in the country to send its football team to a New Year's Bowl game and both of its basketball teams to the NCAA Tournament.



In the Classroom

Seven of 16 sports posted a team grade point average of 3.0 or higher, and 13 of the 16 were above 2.8, with women's tennis leading the way with a team GPA of 3.40.

Nearly 50 percent of the student-athletes - 48.5 percent to be exact - recorded a grade point average of 3.0 or higher. A total of 79 had a GPA of 3.5 or higher and 22 Tigers had a perfect 4.0 GPA in the spring semester.

Conference Crowns

The women's basketball team won the Southeastern Conference championship and two teams - men's basketball and baseball - finished first in the SEC Western Division.

Elite Teams

Six LSU teams finished their seasons ranked in the nation's top 10 and 11 finished in the top 30. Two teams - the women's basketball team and gymnastics team - were ranked No. 1 in the nation during their respective seasons.

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Dr. William L. Jenkins

President, LSU

On April 1, 1999, Dr. William L. Jenkins, formerly Chancellor of Louisiana State University and Agricultural & Mechanical College, became president of the LSU System, which includes nine institutions on 10 campuses in five cities, as well as 10 public hospitals in 10 cities. With the departure of Chancellor Mark Emmert in mid-June, the LSU Board of Supervisors asked President Jenkins to again assume the role of Interim Chancellor until a successor for Dr. Emmert can be selected.

A native of South Africa, Dr. Jenkins studied at the University of Pretoria, where he received his professional veterinary medicine degree in 1958 and specialist credentials in 1968. He received his Ph.D. degree from the University of Missouri, Columbia, in 1970. After practicing veterinary medicine for four years, he joined the faculty at the University of Pretoria, advancing through the ranks to become professor and head of the Department of Veterinary Physiology, Pharmacology, & Toxicology in 1971.

He moved to the United States in 1978 and joined the faculty in the Department of Veterinary Physiology & Pharmacology at Texas A&M University. He was appointed dean of the LSU School of Veterinary Medicine in 1988, and was named LSU's provost and vice chancellor for academic affairs in September 1993.

When he was appointed LSU's fifth chancellor in November 1996, Dr. Jenkins reorganized the campus administration to be more effective and more responsive, and oversaw the development of a strategic plan to guide the University in its preparation for the challenges of the next century.

Over the years, Dr. Jenkins has received numerous teaching and service awards and recognitions, having been named the 1997 Communicator of the Year by the Public Relations Association of Louisiana and a Distinguished Alumnus by the University of Missouri in 1999. The regional chapter of Toastmasters International also presented him with its 1999 Communication and Leadership Award, and he was awarded the Vision of Excellence Award 2000 by the New Orleans Regional Chamber of Commerce and the New Orleans Chapter of MetroVision. In addition, the University of Pretoria

awarded an honorary doctoral degree to Dr. Jenkins in September 2000.

Dr. Jenkins has been active in continuing education and has delivered more than 150 lectures and addresses to diverse groups in both the United States and abroad. He has taught extensively at both the professional and graduate levels. He has published more than 60 scientific articles and has contributed 15 chapters to various textbooks. He is co-author of a textbook on veterinary pharmacology.

Dr. Jenkins has been and continues to be a member of many professional organizations and select committees. Most recently he served on the National Institute of Health's Alcohol Abuse and Misuse on College Campuses Committee and on a special Steering Committee of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools to review accreditation criteria for colleges and universities. Dr. Jenkins also is a member of the National Association of State Universities and Land Grant Colleges' Committee on Food and Society and currently serves on the Governor's Advisory Commission on Coastal Restoration and Conservation.

His current community engagement includes serving on the boards of the Louisiana Endowment for the Humanities, Greater Baton Rouge Chamber of Commerce, Academic Distinction Fund, Council for a Better Louisiana, Arts Council of Greater Baton Rouge, The Nature Conservancy of Louisiana, and the Baton Rouge board of the National Conference for Community and Justice.

Dr. Jenkins and his wife, Peggy, have four children -Sharon, Gwynn, Anthea, and Warren- and nine grandchildren.

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Sean O'Keefe

Chancellor, LSU

Sean O'Keefe has been appointed chancellor of Louisiana State University and Agricultural & Mechanical College, becoming the seventh chancellor to lead the state's flagship University.

Nominated by President George W. Bush and confirmed by the United States Senate, Sean O'Keefe was appointed by the President as the 10th Administrator of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration on December 21, 2001, his fourth Presidential appointment. As Administrator, O'Keefe led the NASA team and managed its resources as NASA sought to advance exploration and discovery in aeronautics and space technologies.

O'Keefe joined the Bush Administration on inauguration day and first served as the Deputy Director of the Office of Management and Budget until December 2001, overseeing the preparation, management and administration of the Federal budget and government wide-management initiatives across the Executive Branch.

Prior to joining the Bush Administration, O'Keefe was the Louis A. Bantle Professor of Business and Government Policy, an endowed chair at the Syracuse University Maxwell School of Citizenship and Public Affairs. He also served as the Director of National Security Studies, a partnership of Syracuse University and Johns Hopkins University, for delivery of executive education programs for senior military and civilian officials. Appointed to these positions in 1996, he was previously Professor of Business Administration and Assistant to the Senior Vice President for Research and Dean of the Graduate School at the Pennsylvania State University.

Appointed as the Secretary of the Navy in July 1992 by President George Bush, O'Keefe had previously served as Comptroller and Chief Financial Officer of the Department of Defense since 1989. Before joining then Defense Secretary Dick Cheney's Pentagon management team in these capacities, he served on the United States Senate Committee on Appropriations staff for eight years, and was Staff Director of the Defense Appropriations Subcommittee. His public service

began in 1978 upon selection as a Presidential Management Intern.

O'Keefe is a Fellow of the National Academy of Public Administration, a member of the Committee on Climate Change Science and Technology, and a Fellow of the International Academy of Astronautics. During his academic postings, he was a Visiting Scholar at the Wolfson College of the University of Cambridge in the United Kingdom, a member of the Naval Postgraduate School's civil-military relations seminar team, and conducted seminars for the Strategic Studies Group at Oxford University. He served on the national security panel to devise the 1988 Republican platform and was a member of the 1985 Kennedy School of Government program for national security executives at Harvard University.

In 1993, President Bush and Secretary Cheney presented him the Distinguished Public Service Award. He was the 1999 faculty recipient of the Syracuse University Chancellor's Award for Public Service; recipient of the Department of the Navy's Public Service Award in December 2000; and has been awarded honorary doctorate degrees from several prestigious educational institutions. In March 2003 and 2004, he was recognized and honored by the Irish American Magazine as one of the Top 100 Irish Americans.

He is the author of several journal articles, contributing author of "Keeping the Edge: Managing Defense for the Future" released in October 2000, and in 1998 co-authored "The Defense Industry in the Post-Cold War Era: Corporate Strategies and Public Policy Perspectives."

Sean O'Keefe earned his Bachelor of Arts in 1977 from Loyola University in New Orleans, Louisiana, and his Master of Public Administration degree in 1978 from The Maxwell School. O'Keefe and his wife Laura have three children—Lindsey, Jonathan and Kevin.



Kenneth E. Carpenter, Faculty Athletics Representative

Kenneth E. Carpenter is in his second year as LSU's faculty representative in NCAA and Southeastern Conference matters.

Carpenter, a professor in the School of Architecture, has taught at LSU since 1986. He received his bachelor's degree in architecture from the University of Oklahoma in 1962 and his master's from the University of Minnesota in 1967. Before joining the LSU faculty, he served at Clemson University as associate professor of architecture from 1967-77; Ball State University, where he was professor and chairman of the

Department of Architecture, 1977-81; and, Iowa State University, serving as professor and chairman, Department of Architecture from 1981-86.

At LSU, he served as the dean of the College of Design from 1986-97; Interim Executive Director of International Programs from 1997-98; and Interim Dean of the College of Art and Design from 2001-02.

Carpenter is a member of Phi Kappa Phi, the American Institute of Architects, and the American Association of University Professors.

Bertman's unyielding desire to succeed drove him to the pinnacle of his profession, and his astute knowledge of the game -- obtained from over 40 years of coaching -- combined with his steadfast determination and irrepressible enthusiasm transformed LSU Baseball into the nation's premier program.

Already a Louisiana Legend and one of the greatest college baseball coaches of all time, J. Stanley "Skip" Bertman has made the seamless transition into the athletics director's chair with the same enthusiasm, vision and demand for excellence that were trademarks of his stellar coaching career.

In just four years as LSU's director of athletics, Bertman has already added to his impressive list of on-the-field achievements. Under his direction, LSU enjoyed arguably the greatest athletics years in the history of the institution. In 2003-04 three teams won national championships, nine teams finished in the nation's top ten, and fourteen teams ranked in the top 25 and in 2004-05 14 teams advanced to the post-season. LSU teams also enjoyed improved grade point averages across the board, making the LSU student-athlete experience a success on and off the fields of competition.

While supervising the Tigers' progress on the playing fields, he has begun to implement measures necessary to realize his vision of building the LSU athletics department into the best in the country. Bertman's bold and innovative plans promise to keep the Tigers among the nation's elite in all phases of collegiate athletics.

Bertman is now in the midst of upgrading LSU's athletics complex. Working hand in hand with the Tiger Athletic Foundation, Bertman has already overseen the completion of the Cox Communications Academic Center for Student-Athletes while renovating Tiger Stadium and the Pete Maravich Assembly Center, and constructing the Football Operations Center.

It was also Bertman who took the bold but essential move to implement a seat contribution program in Tiger Stadium to fund facility improvements and ensure the financial stability of the LSU Athletics Department for the next decade.

Bertman was named LSU's athletics director on January 19, 2001. With Bertman, LSU gained an athletics director who provides the leadership and experience necessary to manage the Tigers' \$52 million budget.

Bertman guided LSU to five NCAA baseball titles, and his teams drew huge crowds to venerable Alex Box Stadium, as the Tigers led the nation in attendance in each of his final six seasons (1996-2001).

He also served as head coach of the 1996 U.S. Olympic team which captured the bronze medal in Atlanta.

Bertman continues to be honored for his remarkable coaching tenure, as he was inducted in June, 2002, into the Louisiana Sports Hall of Fame. He was inducted into the American Baseball Coaches Association Hall of Fame in January, 2003.

In a Baseball America poll published in 1999, Bertman was voted the second greatest college baseball coach of the 20th century, trailing only Rod Dedeaux of Southern California. Bertman and Dedeaux are the only coaches to win five CWS titles.

He had previously earned recognition as one of the nation's brightest assistant coaches while at the University of Miami (Fla.) for eight seasons (1976-83). Before working at Miami, Bertman was renowned for his coaching excellence. In 11 seasons at Miami Beach High School, he directed the Hi-Tides to a state championship and two runners-up finishes and he was named Florida's Coach of the Year on three occasions.

In 1975, Bertman coached at Miami-Dade Downtown, leaving after one season to join legendary head coach Ron Fraser at Miami. The move was a homecoming of sorts, as Bertman spent his collegiate playing days with the Hurricanes as an outfielder and catcher from 1958-60. He earned his B.A. in health and physical education from Miami in 1961 and received his master's degree from UM in 1964.

Bertman and his wife Sandy are the parents of four daughters - Jan, Jodi, Lisa and Lori. The Bertmans have three grandchildren - Sophie Faith and Isaac Stanley, the children of Emile and Lori Bertman Guirard, and Samuel Aaron, the son of Drew and Lisa Pate.



Dan Radakovich

Senior Associate Athletics Director

Dan Radakovich enters his fifth year as LSU's Senior Associate Athletics Director after joining the university in May of 2001. He came to LSU after serving as director of athletics at American University in Washington D.C.

As LSU's Senior Associate Athletics Director, Radakovich oversees the daily operations of the LSU Athletics Department and he serves as Skip Bertman's chief assistant.

Prior to his one-year stint at American University, Radakovich spent six years as the Associate Athletics Director at South Carolina. He worked closely with South Carolina Athletics Director Mike McGee in laying the ground work for a new \$70 million arena built in Columbia. During his tenure with South Carolina, Radakovich supervised the finances and logistics for \$33 million in facility improvements.

Radakovich served as the Senior Associate Athletics Director at Long Beach State from 1989-94.

Radakovich began his collegiate athletics career as the athletics business manager at the University of Miami in Coral Gables, Fla., from 1983-85. He worked in the private sector for four years before joining Long Beach State.

A native of Aliquippa, Pa., Radakovich graduated from Indiana University of Pennsylvania in 1980 with a bachelor of science degree in finance. Radakovich was also a football letterwinner as well as a student coach at IUP. He then went on to earn his master's degree in business administration from the University of Miami in 1982.

Radakovich is married to the former Marcie McDonald and the couple has two children, Christian (15) and Grant (11).



Judy Southard

Associate Athletics Director/Senior Women's Administrator

Judy Southard, who had a very successful career as both a head women's basketball coach and Director of Athletics, enters her fifth year as LSU's Senior Women's Administrator after joining the department in the summer of 2001.

Southard came to LSU from Texas Woman's University, where she served as the school's Director of Athletics for nine years.

As LSU's Senior Women's Administrator, Southard oversees the highly successful Tiger women's athletics program.

Southard has served on numerous national committees during her career in athletic administration. She is currently a member of the NCAA Division I Women's Basketball Committee and was named in the summer of 2004 to the SEC Executive Committee.

While at Texas Woman's University, Southard initiated a corporate partnership program for the athletic department that tripled the involvement of area businesses and corporations in Pioneer athletics.

Prior to her stint at TWU, Southard served as head women's basketball coach at Marshall University in Huntington, W. Va., for 11 years, where she led the Lady Herd to five Southern Conference titles. At Marshall, Southard was named Southern Conference Coach of the Year three times and her career record of 178-130 still stands as a school record for women's basketball victories. Southard also served as Assistant Athletics Director at Marshall from 1983-88, including a four-month period when she was interim director.

Before going to Marshall, Southard spent three years as head coach at Tennessee-Martin and she also served for one season as an assistant coach at Tennessee. As a high school teacher from 1970-77, Southard coached both basketball and tennis, leading her West Florence High School basketball team to the South Carolina 4A state title in 1976.

A native of Columbia, S.C., Southard earned a bachelor's degree in physical education and health from Coker College in 1970 followed by a master's degree in physical education from Tennessee in 1978.



Verge Ausberry

Associate Athletics Director/Operations

A former LSU football standout Verge Ausberry joined the LSU Athletics Department administrative staff in August 2001.

Ausberry supervises marketing and promotions, game management, strength and conditioning, the Dr. Martin Broussard training room, the Jeff Boss Equipment Room and video operations for various sports.

Ausberry, from New Iberia, La., played inside linebacker for the Tigers, lettering in 1986-89. He was the leading tackler on the team in both 1988 and 1989 and was part of two Southeastern Conference championship teams (1986 under Bill Arnsparger and 1988 under Mike Archer), playing on teams that went to three bowl games.

Although this is Ausberry's first tour of duty with the administration of the Athletic Department, he has remained very close to the LSU athletic scene in the 1990s, first serving for almost seven years as a member of LSU's highly regarded Academic Center for Athletes where he worked with many of the student-athletes, primarily dealing with LSU's football squad.

After leaving the Academic Center, he moved in July 1999 to the Tiger Athletic Foundation staff as part of LSU's fund-raising arm prior to accepting his present position.

Ausberry received his bachelor of science degree in education in May of 1990 and his master of education in administration, supervision and certification in child welfare in May of 1992. He is presently a doctoral candidate in higher education administration at LSU. He is married to the former Cheri Morial of New Orleans and they have two boys, Austin and Jaiden.



Bo Bahnsen

Associate Athletics Director/Internal Relations

Bo Bahnsen serves as LSU's Associate Athletics Director for Internal Relations, overseeing the ticket office and all customer service operations.

Prior to moving into his current position in December of 2003, Bahnsen's primary responsibility for the previous 14 years was to serve as LSU's NCAA compliance officer.

A 1982 graduate of LSU, Bahnsen served as administrative assistant for the men's basketball team for five years before moving into athletics administration as director of purchasing for two years. In 1989, he was assigned his primary responsibility as NCAA compliance officer as assistant athletics director, then was promoted to associate AD in 1996.

Bahnsen has been responsible for overseeing the successful implementation of LSU's Tradition Fund Program, a football seating plan that requires contributions for the right to purchase approximately 45,000 seats in Tiger Stadium.

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When people think of women's collegiate basketball, they think of the Southeastern Conference and the league's domination of the sport the last 15 years. With six national championships, nine runner-up finishes, a nation-leading 29 Final Four appearances and 113 first-team All-America honors, the SEC stands firmly as the nation's premier intercollegiate women's basketball conference.

On Feb. 7, 1980, the first SEC women's basketball tournament began play. It ended four days later with Tennessee defeating Ole Miss for the title. Fast forward 26 years later and the SEC Tournament is still enjoying success and increased popularity.

Beginning with its inception and through 1986, the tournament was held at campus sites. The tournament was then sent to Albany, Ga., which served as the site for six years from 1987-92. The tournament then moved to Chattanooga, Tenn., where it was held from 1993-2000, with the exception of 1998 when the tournament moved to Columbus, Ga.

Since 2001 the tournament has enjoyed many new sites, including Memphis (2001), Nashville (2002, 2004), North Little Rock, Ark. (2003, 2006) and Greenville, S.C. (2005).

This year the SEC Women's Basketball Tournament returns to Alltel Arena in North Little Rock, Ark.

The winner of the 11-game tournament will receive the league's automatic bid to the NCAA Tournament. The tournament seeds and conference champion will be determined by the 14-game regular-season SEC schedule. The top four seeds earn a first-round bye.

The 2006 SEC Women's Basketball Tournament will once again enjoy live television coverage. FOX Sports Net South continues its dedication to SEC events by televising all first round, all second round as well as both semifinal games. The championship game will again be televised on ESPN2.

Tickets for this year's event will go on sale later in the season. Prices are: reserved tournament book, \$75; general admission Dr Pepper Six-Pack tournament book, \$45; reserved single-session (six sessions total), \$15; general admission single-session, \$10.
