Team Link: Up-to-date LSU women's tennis information can be obtained through a free media service called Team Link. The media can access updated statistics, notes, bios and other information related to LSU women's tennis via e-mail. All information will be delivered to a registered media representative's e-mail free of charge as soon as it's updated by the LSU Sports Information Department.

Media may register for the service at www.tmlk.com/media or by calling (770) 399-0096. After registering for the service, the media can then log on and pre-select the documents you want to receive. To view the documents, all you will need is the Adobe Acrobat Reader, which can be downloaded to your computer free of charge.

Match Credentials: Media Credentials for all women's tennis matches should be requested two days before the match by contacting Zac Schrieber at (225) 578-8226. Once credentials have been requested, all passes will be left at the double-door main entrance to the W.T. "Dub" Robinson Tennis Stadium.

During matches, media members will be provided with a media guide as well as a match program that includes notes and updated statistics. Final match results can be obtained immediately following the match.

Photographers: All photographers MUST check in with an LSU Sports Information staff member on site for designated photo locations prior to EVERY match. Photographers are welcome to photograph from the stands, but MUST receive permission to photograph on the courts. Only accredited photographers or those persons on special assignment will be allowed access to the court.

Interviews: All interviews with players and coaches must be coordinated through the SID office and requested 24 hours in advance to ensure availability - excluding post-match interviews.

W.T. "Dub" Robinson Tennis Stadium

The LSU women's tennis team calls the newly-renovated W.T. "Dub" Robinson Tennis Stadium home for the 2002-03 season after the 27-year old structure received an impressive facelift that was completed before the 2002 season.

Both the nationally-ranked Lady Tigers and Tigers now enjoy state-of-the-art locker rooms, a squad room, brand-new showers and bathrooms. The totally refurbished "Dub" Robinson Tennis Stadium also includes a media room, an area specified for stringing rackets and a ground floor viewing area for handicapped tennis fans.

With both modern outdoor and indoor tennis courts, the LSU tennis facilities are among the best in the nation. The W.T. "Dub" Robinson Tennis Stadium, named in honor of LSU's former winningest tennis coach, was completed in 1970 and is the site of the Lady Tigers' home outdoor matches.

The "Dub" Robinson Tennis Complex consists of six varsity courts and six practice courts. The six varsity courts were resurfaced in the fall of 2003. The six practice courts received new surfaces in the spring of 2001 as a part of the facilities' makeover. The varsity courts feature a fully mechanical scoreboard and can accommodate up to 550 spectators.

Both the 1999 and 1988 SEC Women's Tournaments were played at Robinson Stadium. Since its inception in 1976, the LSU women's tennis program has made impressive strides towards success in the national and conference standings. The Lady Tigers netted five Louisiana AIAW Championships in their first six seasons of existence. The Lady Tigers are a combined 247-108 (.696) at Robinson Stadium since 1976 and 97-45 (.683) since 1992 in 11 seasons under head coach Tony Minnis.

the second round of the NCAA's en-route to a No. 18 final ranking. Minnis has led LSU to eight straight NCAA postseason appearances, including impressive outings in three seasons at the NCAA Southwest Regional Championships.

The LSU Field House, which can seat up to 3,000 spectators, has four surfaced courts. The courts were resurfaced in December of 1990 and it gives LSU one of the finest on-campus indoor tennis facilities in the country. The LSU Field House is climate controlled and also plays host to LSU track and field meets.

prominence. In his nearly three decades the head tennis coach at LSU, Robinson accumulated an unforeseen 199-180-9 overall record and propelled the Tigers to a status among the nation's elite.

Working with limited resources and a financially-deprived tennis program, LSU's rise to the top of collegiate tennis can be traced back to Robinson's firm personality and quick wit. Always a favorite among his players, Robinson transformed a team that had not won a match in three years, into a team that finished with a 12-1 record and a second-place finish in the Southeastern Conference in only his fourth season at the helm.

When the LSU tennis complex was completed in the fall of 1976, it was only natural that it was named after the person that built the program.

The complex was named the W.T. "Dub" Robinson Tennis Stadium.

Reloading for the Future

The LSU women's tennis team heads into the 2002-03 season with a stable of talented freshmen and a quality mix of returning starters that has the Baton Rouge area buzzing with lofty expectations of a run extending deep into the postseason.

Head coach Tony Minnis has built one of the nation's premier women's tennis programs in his 11 seasons at LSU and looks to take his 2003 squad to a ninth-consecutive NCAA Tournament. The consistent winning of the Lady Tiger tennis team can be greatly attributed to Minnis' signing of top-notch recruiting classes and this season should be no different as LSU has reloaded its talent for the future.

The 2002-03 roster boasts five newcomers that are each expected to make huge contributions in the Lady Tigers' starting lineup. Jessica Ferguson, the top-ranked junior college player in the nation last year, will be joined by a foursome of gifted freshmen in Camila Caliarì, Marina Chiarelli, Daysi Espinal and Lauren Seaman.

Espinal, the No. 1 ranked singles player in her native Dominican Republic, should prove to be a dominant force in the bottom of LSU's lineup, while Brazilians, Chiarelli and Caliarì, will be fixtures in the middle of the Lady Tigers' lineup for years to come. With Ferguson coming in to play either the No. 1 or No. 2 singles position, Seaman, who was a four-time

Louisiana state champion in high school, will be utilized at the bottom of the order to possibly give LSU the most depth in the Southeastern Conference.

"This is probably the most depth we've had in years," said Minnis. "With that, I think it will make our practices and our matches much more competitive and it will just make everyone on the team better. This is the most depth that we've had since the 1999-2000 team that made it all the way to the Sweet 16."

If the Lady Tigers are fortunate enough to earn a return trip to the Sweet 16, it will be due to the play of returning starters Rocio Fantilli and Amanda Mang.

Fantilli, the emotional leader of the team who hails from Puerto Madryn, Argentina, is coming off of the best season of her collegiate career and is expected to be amongst the elite of the SEC in 2003. During her sophomore campaign, Fantilli accumulated a 5-2 record at the No. 2 singles position and was a member of the nation's 19th-ranked doubles team along with partner Bruna Colosio.

After leading the Lady Tigers in singles victories a year ago, Mang enters her sophomore campaign as the most consistent player on the team and is anticipated to make waves in the nation's toughest conference at the No. 3 singles position. The New Orleans native compiled a sterling 23-16 overall record last season and earned an impressive 7-4 mark against a rigorous slate of SEC competition.

Despite owning one of the most talent-laden teams in LSU history, the road to Gainesville, Fla., and the 2003 NCAA Championships proves to be an arduous one for the Lady Tigers as the upcoming dual-match schedule features 17 opponents ranked among the nation's top-75 teams. Coach Minnis' squad will not only face 10 SEC rivals ranked in the top 75, but will challenge top ranked opponents in Florida State, Texas A&M, Tulsa, Southern Methodist, Ohio State, Tulane and Purdue.

Playing nine of its 17 toughest opponents at home at the W.T. "Dub" Robinson Tennis Stadium could provide the added boost of energy for the Lady Tigers this season due to the fact that LSU is accustomed to defeating some of the nation's top teams in Baton Rouge.

Last season, the LSU women's tennis team used a clutch 6-4, 5-7, 6-2 victory from Mang to knock off the No. 13 ranked Kentucky Lady Wildcats in dramatic fashion as the Lady Tigers overcame a three-point deficit to upset the Cats, 4-3, in the friendly confines of the W.T. "Dub" Robinson Tennis Stadium. The huge conference win came at a key point in the 2002 season and propelled the LSU Lady Tigers to earn their eighth-consecutive NCAA Tournament appearance.

"I just feel that when you play a very tough schedule it makes you tough because it prepares you to come to play all the time," Minnis said. "With that tough schedule, you're going to have some matches where maybe you don't play up to your capabilities, but at the same time it creates an atmosphere where the team will play its absolute best and put itself in a position where it can knock off a really good team or do something special."

After opening the 2003 dual-match season with home con-

tests versus Louisiana Tech, Centenary, Southern and Louisiana-Monroe, the Lady Tigers will remain in Baton Rouge for their first true test of the year against the 50th-ranked Florida State Lady Seminoles. The LSU-Florida State matchup has escalated into a bitter rivalry over the past few years and has seen a trio of one point decisions in its previous three meetings. In the 2002 contest, Florida State edged the Lady Tigers in Tallahassee, Fla., by a slim 4-3 margin.

On Feb. 8, LSU will hit the road for the first time of the 2003 campaign as the Lady Tigers begin a two-match tour against Southwest Regional foes in Houston and the 23rd-ranked Texas A&M Lady Aggies. Last season, LSU fared well against Houston with a slight 4-3 victory, but fell to the ever-improving Lady Aggies by an identical 4-3 score. Texas A&M leads the all-time series against LSU, 13-11.

Prior to beginning SEC play on the road against No. 38 Alabama, the Lady Tigers host a couple of up-and-coming teams in 56th-ranked Tulsa and No. 65 Southern Methodist. In recent history, LSU has consistently faced one of the nation's toughest schedules, and it has always been Coach Minnis' philosophy that in order to be the best, you have to beat the best.

"By playing an extremely competitive schedule, I feel that it really makes you mentally tough and puts you in a position where you feel that you can play with anybody," explained Minnis. "In six of the past eight seasons, we've had this type of schedule and our teams have been playing their best tennis at the end of the season heading into the NCAA Tournament. I believe that playing the more difficult schedule had something to do with it."

LSU's schedule doesn't get any easier during the month of March as the Lady Tigers face eight-straight, top-50 teams. On March 2, LSU begins its version of Murderer's Row on the road against No. 32 Auburn before returning home to face some of the nation's elite teams in No. 19 South Carolina, No. 2 Florida, No. 11 Tennessee, No. 3 Georgia and the 40th-ranked Ohio State Buckeyes of the BIG-10 Conference. After their brutal five-match homestand, the Lady Tigers take to the road again and challenge eighth-ranked Vanderbilt and No. 14 Kentucky in a pair of difficult conference matchups.

With 11 of its 12 teams ranked among the nation's top-75 in the ITA preseason poll, the SEC looks poised to remain the country's most-dominant conference for yet another year. The SEC continued to rule women's collegiate tennis in 2002, as the league placed three teams in the semifinals of the NCAA Championships for a second-straight season. With Florida's runner-up finish, an SEC school has advanced all the way to the championship match in seven-consecutive seasons.

All five of the SEC's national team titles have come in the last 10 years with Florida's three (1992, 1996 and 1998) and Georgia's two (1994 and 2000) coming since the 1992 campaign. Last season also marked the 16th-straight year that an SEC team has advanced to the national semifinals.

Colosio, who graduated after a record-breaking senior season in 2002, was groomed by Minnis into one of the top-five players in the country and was named the 2001 SEC Player of the Year. She excelled under Minnis' constant tutelage and received All-America status in both 2000 and 2001.

Minnis has molded LSU into one of the nation's top up-and-coming teams during his 11 years at the helm of the women's tennis program. He has been instrumental in guiding the Lady Tigers to eight-consecutive NCAA postseason appearances from 1995-2002, and has helped attain an impressive list of honors for the program.

During an unexpected run at the NCAA Championships in 2000, Minnis led LSU to its second Sweet 16 appearance in school history, as the Lady Tigers upset the sixth-ranked Pepperdine Waves, 5-4, in the second round of the tournament. The upset win marked LSU's top victory of all time before the Lady Tigers fell to a talented USC team in the Sweet 16.

Minnis has accumulated a number of coaching accolades throughout his illustrious career at LSU. In 1999, he was named the Southwestern Region Coach of the Year, after leading the LSU women's team to the NCAA Tournament for its fifth-straight season. The season was thought to be a rebuilding year for the Lady Tigers, but Minnis led his squad to upset victories over both 10th ranked Tennessee and 15th-ranked Arkansas on

its way to earning a final ranking of No. 28 in the nation.

LSU overcame injuries in 1998 to qualify for its fourth-straight NCAA Tournament and hosted the NCAA Southwest Regional Championships. After making the final for the second consecutive season, the Lady Tigers were defeated by top-seeded Arkansas, 5-2, to end an impressive run against all odds. Before being upended by the Lady Razorbacks, LSU knocked off Baylor and second-seeded Miami.

In 1997, Minnis was named the SEC Coach of the Year when he led LSU to the regional finals and a fifth-place finish in the league standings. The Lady Tigers advanced to the championship match of the Southwest regional by beating Texas A&M, 5-0. Minnis was also recognized as the Louisiana Coach of the Year for the third time in four years. During the 1997 season, senior Suzana Rodrigues led the way for LSU in her final season. Rodrigues finished her career ranked fifth in all-time singles wins at 108-42 overall. She joined teammate Laura Olave in doubles to claim the 1996 National Clay Court Doubles title. The tandem would earn All-America honors after placing 10th in the final-doubles rankings.

LSU posted its highest national ranking ever under Minnis during April of 1995, as the Lady Tigers leapt from No. 30 to No. 15 in the country. The Lady Tigers charted a 19-8 record en route to national prominence. Minnis saw his team stun the 11th-ranked Tennessee Volunteers, 5-3, in the opening round of the NCAA Championships, before falling to eventual NCAA runner-up Florida, 5-0, in round two.

On the heels of LSU's postseason success, Minnis received dual-coaching honors, by being named both the Southwest Region and Louisiana Coach of the Year after guiding the Lady Tigers to their first-ever win at the NCAA's and their first-post-season appearance since 1991.

In his first year at LSU, Minnis guided the Lady Tigers to key victories over No. 10 Miami and No. 17 Kentucky. The 10th-ranked Hurricanes were the highest rated team that LSU had beaten until the 1995 squad forged a 5-4 win over then No. 10 Alabama to tie the mark set in 1992 for the school's biggest win in the 22-year history of the program. LSU finished with a 14-9 record and a No. 21 ranking. LSU's senior doubles duo of Vikki Chambers and Sarah Stewart represented the Lady Tigers in post-season play at the 10th-annual NCAA Championships.

Not only have the Lady Tigers enjoyed team success in Minnis' stay, but they have also attained a great deal of individual achievements. Minnis has produced four all-Americans, six All SEC players, one Clay Court doubles title (Rodrigues and Olave, 1996), and 36 Academic All-SEC and five ITA Scholar Athletes.

Minnis came to LSU after serving as an assistant coach for Southwestern Louisiana's men's tennis team for four years. In addition to being an assistant at USL, Minnis has worked as the club professional at several tennis clubs in the Lafayette, La., area.

Minnis, 37, was a tennis star at USL during the mid '80's. He was a four-year letterman from 1984-88 for the Ragin' Cajuns and served as the team captain his freshman and senior seasons. Minnis is USL's all-time winningest singles player with an impressive 94-40 career mark.

He competed in the 1988 NCAA Team Championships and was a semifinalist at the NIT Tournament in 1986. Minnis also had a remarkable 37-6 three-set record in his first three seasons at USL. During his four years at USL, the Ragin' Cajuns posted a 78-39 overall record and finished each year ranked among the nation's top-25 teams. In his senior season (1988), USL was ranked 15th in the final rankings and advanced to the second round of the NCAA Championships. Minnis claimed first-team All-Louisiana honors as a freshman.

Minnis, a native of Baton Rouge, comes from a family loaded with tennis experience. His father, Howard, was the head tennis coach at Southern University for several years and now serves as a professor at the university. His sister, Patricia, was a four-year letter winner at LSU from 1988-91, while his brother Patrick played as USL's No. 1 singles player after Tony's departure. Minnis played high school tennis at Redemptorist in Baton Rouge. Minnis graduated from USL in 1988 with a degree in finance and earned his Master's of Business Administration in 1996.

Sandy Sureephong became a part of the LSU women's tennis coaching staff in the fall of 2001, and already her skill and expertise has helped revitalize the Lady Tiger squad. Her energy and competitive spirit has brought about a sense of both determination and learning to the Lady Tiger practice sessions and the team has greatly benefitted from her collegiate experience.

During her first full season as an assistant coach in 2002, Sureephong helped guide the LSU women's tennis team to its eighth-consecutive NCAA Tournament appearance and her constant encouragement played a major role in the progression of LSU's younger players.

"Sandy brings a lot of focus and confidence to the team," said LSU head coach Tony Minnis. "She's been through what they're hoping to go through and she's been a great role model for our players. They all have a huge amount of respect for her and I think it's because she's not that far removed from competing at this level. She's been a part of some great collegiate teams and she knows what it's like to be consistently ranked among the top 10 teams in the nation."

The LSU Athletic Department officially named Sureephong its assistant women's tennis coach on Sept. 27, 2001, and her experience as one of the top singles players in the nation deems to be extremely beneficial for the future of the Lady Tiger tennis program.

Sureephong, a native of Haines City, Fla., was a four-time All-American at the University of Texas from 1995-99 and was ranked as high as No. 3 in the nation in singles play. She is

currently the Longhorns' third-ranked player in all-time winning percentage (.781) and finished her illustrious career with an overall record of 86-24. Sureephong also played a major role in Texas' run to the Final Four at the 1997 NCAA Team Championships.

After making history at Texas, Sureephong spent two years playing on the professional circuit against some of the top women's tennis players in the world and recorded victories over both Chanda Rubin and Lindsay Davenport in her career. Sureephong was the 168th-ranked player in the world in doubles play and reached as high as No. 330 in singles.

"Her experiences both as a collegiate athlete and as a pro athlete should benefit our team both on and off the field," Minnis said. "She's been through the exact things that our girls are going through and she knows what it takes to win and to be the best."

Sureephong earned her Bachelor's degree in sports management from the University of Texas' College of Education in December of 1999. She was included on the 1998 fall and 1999 spring Big 12 Conference Commissioner's Honor Roll, she received the Texas Women's Athletics 1999 Donna Lopiano/Jean Kaspar Scholarship and earned the 1998 Anne Haskins Grousbeck Scholarship for Academic Accomplishment and Leadership.

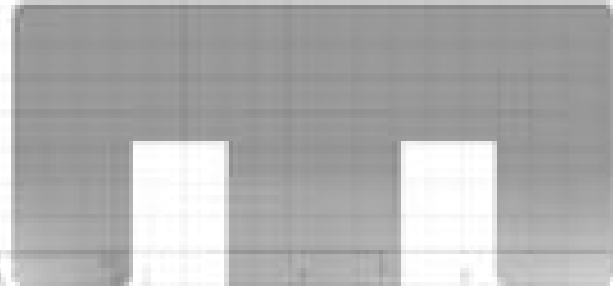

Despite a rash of nagging injuries and a roster consisting of only six scholarship players, the 2002 LSU women's tennis team displayed the program's commitment to excellence by earning a school-record, eighth-consecutive trip to the NCAA Tournament and a No. 51 final ranking. Under the tutelage of 11th-year head coach Tony Minnis, the Lady Tigers finished the 2002 dual-match season with a 12-13 overall record and constructed a foundation that has LSU poised to reach loftier heights in the near future.

Against one of the nation's toughest schedules, the haggard LSU team proved to be competitive in every contest and finished the regular season with a 12-11 record despite losing an unprecedented six matches by a slim 4-3 margin. In Southeastern Conference play, the Lady Tigers fell short against Western Division rivals, Auburn, Alabama and Ole Miss in one-point decisions and also suffered a heartbreaking 4-3 defeat against fifth-ranked Vanderbilt at home in Baton Rouge.

"I think that we lost a total of six matches by the score of 4-3 last season," Minnis said. "At the same time, we were able to pull off an upset over a team like Kentucky who reached the Sweet 16 and at the time was No. 13 in the nation. We were also able to knock off some other pretty good schools such as Tulsa, Houston, SMU, Arkansas and Mississippi State. We also made the tournament for an eighth-consecutive season which says a lot about our consistency over the years."

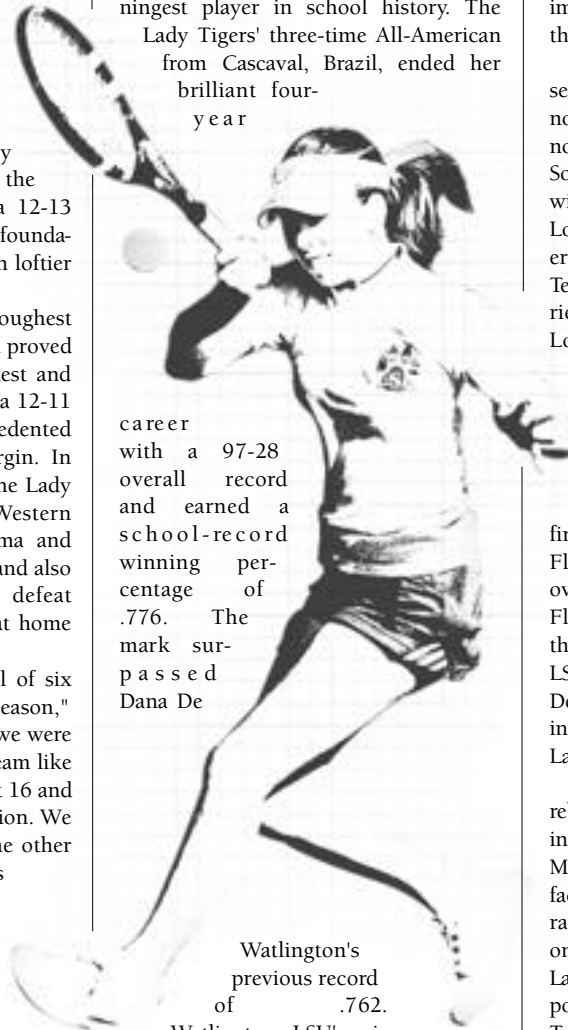
On April 2, LSU used a clutch 6-4, 5-7, 6-2 victory from freshman Amanda Mang to knock off the No. 13-ranked Kentucky Lady Wildcats in dramatic fashion as the Lady Tigers overcame a three-point deficit to upset the Cats, 4-3, at the W.T. "Dub" Robinson Tennis Stadium. The huge SEC win came at a key point in the 2002 season and propelled the Lady Tigers to yet another NCAA Tournament berth.

The 2002 version of the LSU women's tennis team consisted of three

extremely talented seniors in Bruna Colosio, Amy McIlhaney and Tami Botts.

Colosio, the 2001 SEC Player of the Year, finished her senior campaign with an 18-9 record and as the eighth-winningest player in school history. The Lady Tigers' three-time All-American from Cascaval, Brazil, ended her brilliant four-year

career with a 97-28 overall record and earned a school-record winning percentage of .776. The mark surpassed Dana De



Watlington's previous record of .762.

Watlington, LSU's winningest women's tennis player of all-time, competed for the Lady Tigers from 1984-87.

Botts, a four-year starter from Ashland, Ore., also played a vital role in LSU's continued success during the 2002 season. She started 17 contests at the No. 2 singles position and finished with a 21-14 overall record en route to becoming the 111th-ranked singles player in the nation.

In doubles play, Botts was joined by McIlhaney, as the senior pair combined to post a 10-4 record on the season and

finished with an 8-3 mark in dual-match competition. McIlhaney, who anchored

the bottom half of LSU's singles lineup, registered the best dual-match season of her career in 2002 by accumulating an impressive 20-17 record against some of the nation's top players.

LSU opened the 2002 dual-match season with five-consecutive wins over non-conference foes. The Lady Tigers notched victories against Centenary, 5-1, Southern, 5-1, Purdue, 5-2, as well as wins over both Louisiana Tech, 6-0, and Louisiana-Monroe, 7-0, in a doubleheader held at the W.T. "Dub" Robinson Tennis Stadium. With the pair of victories against Louisiana Tech and Louisiana-Monroe, the Lady Tigers increased their winning streak to 34-straight matches versus in state rivals.

After starting the season with a 5-0 record, LSU traveled to Tallahassee, Fla., to compete in its first road contest of the year against the Florida State Lady Seminoles. With the overall score of the match tied at 3-3, Florida State's Christina Denny sealed the Lady Seminole victory by outlasting LSU's Rocio Fantilli on court No. 2. Denny earned a vital 7-6(1), 4-6, 6-2 win in the non-conference battle to hand the Lady Tigers its first defeat of the season.

The LSU women's tennis team then rebounded from its previous heartbreaking loss by defeating both Southern Methodist, 4-3, and Houston, 4-3, before facing off with its arch-rival the 19th-ranked Texas A&M Lady Aggies at home on Feb. 17. In a hard-fought contest, the Lady Tigers suffered its second one-point defeat of the season as they fell to Texas A&M, 4-3.

The month of March didn't bode well for the Lady Tigers as their first four matchups were road contests against top-25 ranked opponents in No. 23 South Carolina, No. 5 Florida, No. 10 Tennessee and the top-ranked Georgia Lady Bulldogs. After falling to South Carolina, 6-1, LSU was swept by a tough Florida team, 7-0, lost to Tennessee in Knoxville, Tenn., 6-1, and then fell prey to the nation's No. 1 ranked team in Georgia, 7-0.

"The amount of talent in the SEC is unbelievable," said Minnis. "Last year,

everyone was ranked at one time or another and we went through stretches where we were up against seven or eight straight ranked opponents. It's definitely hard on a team to play quality opponents day in and day out, but it also makes them better because they're used to seeing tough competition all the time."

With a 7-6 overall record on the season, LSU returned home to face Auburn in what turned out to be the SEC's most thrilling match of the year. In a vital Western Division contest, the Lady Tigers led the match by a slim margin of 3-2 while two of the singles courts were simultaneously in the midst of a third-set tiebreaker. Auburn's Carolina Maurer and LSU's Fantilli were battling it out on court No. 3, while LSU's Botts and Auburn's Petra Bercik were competing on court No. 2.

Maurer rallied from a one-set deficit to defeat Fantilli, 2-6, 7-6(4), 7-6(4), in the No. 3 singles match and kept Auburn's hope alive by tying the score at 3-3. In the clinching match of the day, Auburn's Bercik staved off numerous match points against Botts and held on to notch a 4-6, 6-2, 7-6(5) victory on court No. 2 to secure the win.

Following the devastating 4-3 loss, LSU rebounded with a win on the road against Tulsa, 5 2, before falling to both Alabama and No. 5 Vanderbilt in narrow 4-3 defeats in Baton Rouge at the W.T. "Dub" Robinson Tennis Stadium. The Lady Tigers then rallied for conference victories over No. 13 Kentucky, 4-3, and Mississippi State, 7-0, prior to losing yet another tough match on the road against Ole Miss, 4-3.

"I've never had a season where we played in so many 4-3 matches," said Minnis. "The league was very even and no matter who you played, you knew that it would pretty much come down to one final court for the victory."

The LSU women's tennis team closed out its regular season with a 5-2 victory over the Tulane Green Wave, a 5-2 loss versus Oregon and a 7-0 sweeping of Arkansas to head into the SEC Tournament with a 12-11 overall record.

In the SEC Tournament held at the Maxcy Gregg Tennis Center in Columbia, S.C., the Lady Tigers fell in the first round of the four-day competition against a smitten Kentucky Lady Wildcat squad. After being upset by the Lady Tigers two weeks prior to the rematch, Kentucky used its second opportunity to overwhelm LSU, 4-1.

Despite losing in the first round of the SEC Tournament for the second-straight season, LSU earned an eighth-consecutive trip to the NCAA Tournament and faced the Furman Lady Paladins in the opening round of competition on the campus of the University of North Carolina in Chapel Hill, N.C.

Against the up-and-coming Paladins, LSU suffered a crucial injury to freshman Perri Budd and fell behind in the match by a score of 3-1 before Furman's Mary Neill Hagood secured the winning point with a 6-3, 7-5 victory over LSU's Mang at the No. 4 singles position. With the win, Furman improved to an impressive 23-3 record on the season and ended the Lady Tigers' volatile, yet successful 2002 campaign.

"We overcame a lot of adversity last

season," Minnis said. "We were plagued with a number of injuries throughout the year and I was very proud of how our players gave 110 percent in every match. Even as we went through the ups and downs of competing in the nation's best conference, we never gave up and we really did a great job of maintaining our winning tradition."

The LSU women's tennis team continued its commitment to excellence during the 2002 season and built a solid foundation for the future of the program as the Lady Tigers qualified for its eighth-consecutive NCAA Tournament. Coach Minnis' young squad also gained an abundance of experience during the season and has his team poised to make a run for the SEC Western Division title in 2003.

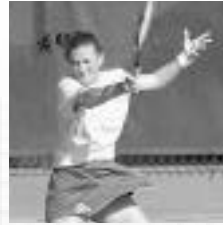

THE SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE**The Nation's Top Tennis Conference**

The Southeastern Conference men's and women's tennis programs continue to be the nation's leader on the collegiate hardcourt and in 2002 the trend continued.

SEC women's tennis continues to dominate as SEC schools placed three teams in the semifinals for the second consecutive year. With Florida's runner-up finish, an SEC school has advanced to the championship match for seven consecutive seasons. All five of the SEC's national team titles have come in the last 10 years with Florida's three (1992, 1996 and 1998) and Georgia's two (1994 and 2000). Last season also marked the sixteenth straight year that an SEC team advanced to the national semifinals.

The University of Florida's Jessica Lehnhoff lost to top-seeded Bea Bielik from Wake Forest 6-2, 6-0 in the final of the NCAA Women's Tennis Singles Championships.

Lehnhoff paired with Gator sophomore Lindsay Dawaf in the NCAA Doubles Semifinals and the Florida duo lost to top-seeded Lastra and Lauren Kalvaria from Stanford 6-2, 6-4. Kentucky's Carolina Mayorga and Sarah Witten fell to fifth-ranked Megan Bradley and Lauren Fisher of UCLA in the other semifinal match.

The league has garnered five NCAA women's doubles titles since 1989. Florida's Dawn Buth and Stephanie Nickitas won back-to-back titles in 1996 and 1997 and advanced to the doubles finals in 1998. Georgia's Marissa Catlin and Lori Grey advanced to the NCAA Finals in 2000. In addition, the SEC has produced 83 ITA All-Americans in the women's doubles division in the last 13 years.

Four of the last 10 women's singles champions belong to SEC players, bringing the SEC's NCAA singles titles to six. Since 1990, the SEC has had 74 women's singles players earn ITA All-America honors.

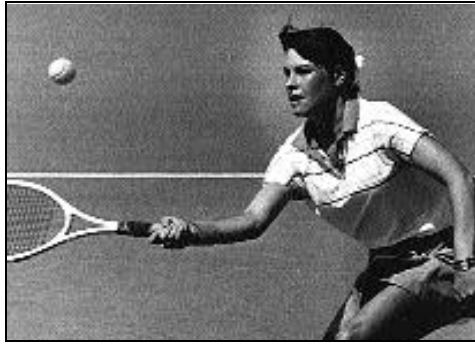

The dynamic duo of Suzana Rodrigues and Laura Olave added their names to a prestigious list of champions of past and present, as they defeated defending champion Kylie Hunt and new partner Christine Sim of Kansas 7 5, 3-6, 6-4 to capture the 1996 National Clay Court doubles title. With the win, they became the first-ever women's singles player or doubles team to win a major collegiate tennis championship in school history. The tandem ranked as high as second and finished the year doubles All America at No. 10 nationally. Rodrigues and Olave went 19-13 overall and posted a career 45-23 mark in three seasons.

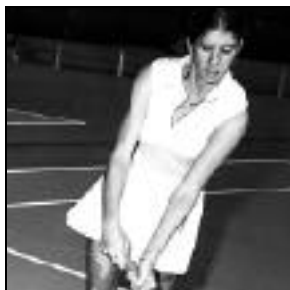

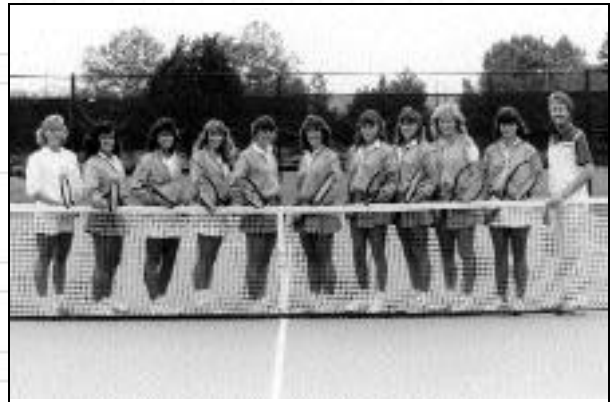

1976 LADY TIGERS

Overall Record: 11-5 *Inaugural Season* • Louisiana AIAW Champions • 14th USTA Nationals

LSU captured wins in nine of its last 11 matches, including five straight to end its inaugural campaign en route to the Louisiana AIAW Championship. The Lady Tigers opened the season with a 9-0 win over Northwestern State and went on to outscore its opponents 107-37. LSU finished 14th at the USTA Nationals.

1978 LADY TIGERS

Overall Record: 19-5 • Louisiana AIAW Champions

Former head coach Pat Newman guided LSU to its third consecutive state AIAW title in as many seasons. Lady Tiger standouts Kay McDaniel and Ebie Taylor became LSU's first ever All-Americans, earning the prestigious honor after leading the team to a 10th place finish at the AIAW National Championships. The '78 squad holds the record for most consecutive wins in a season with 12 in a row.

1979 LADY TIGERS

Overall Record: 22-10 • Louisiana AIAW Runner-up

After claiming three-straight Louisiana AIAW titles, LSU went on to garner its best overall record at 22-10 but fell shy of its fourth- straight title in a 7-2 loss to Northeast La. in the finals. LSU won eight-straight matches to start the season and 16 of 18 down the stretch. In four seasons, LSU dominated its in-state rivals 26-2, with its only blemish being dual losses to NLU during the '79 season.

1985 LADY TIGERS

Overall Record: 19-7 • SEC Runner-up

LSU's most prolific women's tennis duo in twin sisters Dana De and De Ann Watlington showcased their outstanding talent in leading an experienced Lady Tiger squad to a second place finish in the Southeastern Conference behind Florida. LSU won nine of its final 10 matches of the season under coach Philip Campbell en route a 19-7 overall record.

1991 LADY TIGERS

Overall Record: 19-6 • NCAA Final 20 • Final Rank: (t)No. 18

The Lady Tigers advanced to the NCAA Championships for the first time in school history, en route to a 19-6 record and a third place finish in league action. LSU would drop a hard-fought 5-3 decision to Indiana in the opening round at the NCAA's, finishing at No. 18 in the nation.

1995 LADY TIGERS

Overall Record: 19-8 • NCAA Final 16 • Final Rank: No. 18

LSU capped off its most successful season in school history with a stunning 5-3 upset of No. 11th-ranked Tennessee in the opening round of the 1995 NCAA Championships, before falling to national runner-up Florida 5-0 in round two. The Lady Tigers tallied a 19-8 overall record, amassing numerous accolades, including a No. 18 final ranking.

1997 LADY TIGERS

Overall Record: 18-9 • NCAA SW Regional Finalists • Final Rank: No. 20

The Lady Tigers enjoyed another stellar campaign, charting numerous athletic and academic honors en route to an 18-9 mark and a national top 20 finish. LSU fell short of the NCAA Championships in a 5-2 loss to Tennessee in the NCAA Southwest Regional final. Coach Tony Minnis became LSU's winningest coach and was named both SEC and Louisiana Coach of the Year. Three-time All-American Suzana Rodrigues said farewell in 1997, as the highly successful four-year star ended her collegiate career in record fashion.

1998 LADY TIGERS

Overall Record: 15-10 • NCAA SW Regional Finalists • Final Rank: No. 26

LSU overcome injuries to two of its top players, Laura Olave and Ana Paula Mores, to qualify for the fourth consecutive year and play host to the NCAA Southwest Regional Championships. After making the final for the second consecutive season, the Lady Tigers were defeated by top-seeded Arkansas, 5-2, to end an impressive run against all odds. Before being upended by the Lady Razorbacks, the Lady Tigers knocked off Baylor and 2nd-seeded Miami, Fla. Three Lady Tigers seniors, Laura Olave, Jennifer Barr and Jamie Vallotton, bowed out by finishing their careers in Baton Rouge.

1999 LADY TIGERS

Overall Record: 13-11 • NCAA Championship Qualifiers • Final Rank: No. 28

The LSU women's tennis team finished the 1998-99 season strong despite having only one senior and two freshmen in the starting lineup. Under the leadership of lone senior Nikki Rasheed, the young team concluded the season ranked 28th in the nation. Rasheed finished her brilliant career at LSU with a 64-63 record. Head coach Tony Minnis led the Lady Tigers to their fifth-consecutive NCAA post-season appearance in which they advanced to the second round. Freshmen Bruna Colosio and Tami Botts stepped up for the team as they combined for a needed 31-27 dual-match record. Colosio was a major influence as she finished the season ranked 45th in the nation.

2000 LADY TIGERS

Overall Record: 16-11 • NCAA Sweet 16 • Final Rank: No. 21

The 1999-00 version of the Lady Tigers accomplished two amazing feats during the 2000 dual match season. In the second round of the NCAA tournament, No. 32 LSU upset the sixth-ranked Pepperdine Waves, 5-4, on their home court in Malibu, Calif., to advance to the Sweet 16. With the win, the Lady Tigers earned the biggest upset in school history and became the second LSU women's tennis team to reach the quarterfinal round. The Lady Tigers were led by their lone senior, Ana Paula Mores, and sophomore Bruna Colosio. Colosio ended the season as the sixth ranked singles player in the nation, while Mores ended her illustrious four-year career with 97 singles wins and the nation's No. 75 ranking. As a doubles team, the pair finished the 2000 campaign as the fourth-ranked tandem in the country.

Minnis' Top-12 Victories

- 1. May 13, 2000 vs. #6 Pepperdine** - In the second round of the NCAA Championship Tournament, LSU's third-ranked doubles combination of Bruna Colosio and Ana Paula Mores defeated Pepperdine's No. 7 pair of Paola Palencia and Ipek Senoglu by a score of 8-3 to upset Pepperdine, 5-4, for a trip to the Sweet 16. The 32nd-ranked LSU women's tennis team defeated Pepperdine in Malibu, Calif., on their home court.
- 2. Feb. 21, 1992 vs. #10 Miami (Fla.)** - After falling behind, 4-2, after the singles competition, LSU swept the three doubles matches in Gainesville, Fla., to stun the Hurricanes for the first time in school history, 5-4.
- 3. April 11, 1992 vs. #23 Notre Dame** - In Baton Rouge, LSU led the match against the 23rd ranked Fighting Irish, 4-2, in singles play before going on to defeat Notre Dame, 7-2, without losing a set in a doubles sweep.
- 4. Feb. 13, 1993 vs. Texas A&M** - LSU's nationally ranked doubles pair of Vicki Chambers and Sarah Stewart closed out the Lady Tigers' first-ever victory over the Aggies, 5-2, before a hostile crowd on the road in College Station, Texas.
- 5. March 27, 1995 vs. #10 Alabama** - An unranked Lady Tiger team lured the 10th-ranked Crimson Tide into "Dub" Robinson Stadium where LSU's pair of Cymantha Owen and Elina Rocha upset Digk-Smith to give the Lady Tigers the victory.
- 6. April 28, 1995 vs. #11 Tennessee** - In the quarterfinal round of the SEC Tournament held in Auburn, Ala., LSU upset Tennessee, 5-3, after Jennifer Barr and Margaret Sale defeated Lady Vols' Lowery-Bachochina and LSU's Cymantha Owen and Elina Rocha defeated Lepsi-Mahlotra in doubles to put the Lady Tigers in the NCAA Tournament.
- 7. May 12, 1995 vs. #11 Tennessee** - Exactly two weeks after claiming victory at the SEC Tournament, LSU and Tennessee met again in the NCAA Championships held in Malibu, Calif. And, once again, Minnis and the Lady Tigers had the Lady Vols' number. LSU lost the first set of each of the six singles matches yet Jennifer Barr, Jamie Vallotton and Cymantha Owen each recovered in three sets to win. The doubles teams of Olave-Rodrigues and Owen-Roche clinched the match, 5-3. LSU advanced to the first NCAA Sweet 16 in school history.
- 8. April 10, 1999 vs. #10 Tennessee** - The Lady Tigers won four of the six singles matches to take an early lead over the Volunteers. Then the team of Ana Paula Mores and Bruna Colosio clinched the upset for LSU in Baton Rouge, 5-4.
- 9. April 2, 2002, vs. #13 Kentucky** - The LSU women's tennis team used a clutch 6-4, 5-7, 6-2 victory from freshman Amanda Mang to knock off the No. 13-ranked Kentucky Lady Wildcats in dramatic fashion as the Lady Tigers overcame a

three-point deficit to upset the Cats, 4-3, at the W.T. "Dub" Robinson Tennis Stadium. The huge Southeastern Conference win came at a key point in the 2002 season and propelled the LSU Lady Tigers to their eighth-consecutive NCAA Tournament appearance.

10. March 2, 1997 vs. #15 Vanderbilt - The Lady Tigers' duo of Jennifer Barr and Ana Paula Mores clinched the upset over the Commodores with an 8-6 upset victory over Morelos-Blumberg.

11. March 9, 1997 vs. #17 Alabama - The second-ranked doubles pair of Laura Olave and Suzana Rodrigues clinched the match over the Crimson Tide's Camino-Glinzer to win 6-3.

12. April 10, 1997 vs. #23 Texas A&M - In what Minnis called the "best played match in LSU history," LSU avenged a Feb. 15 loss in College Station (6-3) by defeating the Aggies 5-0 without losing a set in the match.

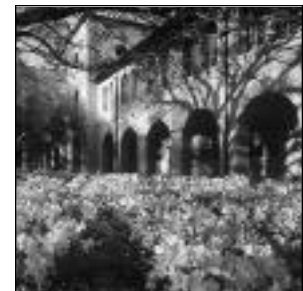

graduated from LSU in 1963 with a Bachelor's degree in Petroleum Engineering and currently is Executive Vice President of ExxonMobil.



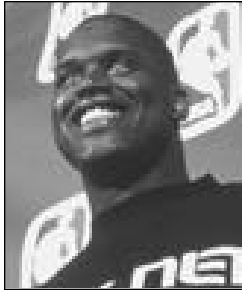
Carlos Roberto Flores

Bertman's unyielding desire to succeed drove him to the pinnacle of his profession, and his astute knowledge of the game -- obtained from over 40 years of coaching -- combined with his steadfast determination and irrepressible enthusiasm transformed LSU Baseball into the nation's premier program.

Already a Louisiana Legend and one of the greatest college baseball coaches of all time, J. Stanley "Skip" Bertman augmented his impressive list of achievements in his first season as LSU's director of athletics. While supervising the Tigers' magnificent progress on the playing fields, he began to implement measures necessary to realize his vision of building the LSU athletics department into the best in the country. Bertman's bold and innovative plans promise to keep the Tigers among the nation's elite in all phases of collegiate athletics.

LSU's programs enjoyed remarkable success under Bertman's direction in 2001-02, as 18 of the Tigers' 20 sports participated in post-season competition. That accomplishment, along with improved graduation rates, increased team grade point averages and the construction of new academic facilities, foreshadow even more significant deeds in the second season of Bertman's tenure.

Bertman was named LSU's athletics director on January 19, 2001. With Bertman, LSU gained an athletics director who provides the leadership and experience necessary to manage the Tigers' nearly \$35 million budget.

Bertman guided LSU to five NCAA baseball titles, and his teams drew huge crowds to venerable Alex Box Stadium, as the Tigers led the nation in attendance in each of his final six seasons (1996-2001).

He also served as head coach of the 1996 U.S. Olympic team which captured the bronze medal in Atlanta.

Bertman continues to be honored for his remarkable coaching tenure, as he was inducted in June, 2002, into the Louisiana Sports Hall of Fame. He was inducted into the American Baseball Coaches Association Hall of Fame in January, 2003.

In a Baseball America poll released in January, 1999, Bertman was voted the second greatest college baseball coach of the 20th century, trailing only Rod Dedeaux of Southern California. Bertman and Dedeaux are the only coaches to win five CWS titles.

He had previously earned stellar recognition as one of the nation's brightest assistant coaches while at the University of Miami (Fla.) for eight seasons (1976-83). Before working at Miami, Bertman was renowned for his coaching excellence. In 11 seasons at Miami Beach High School, he directed the Hi-Tides to a state championship and two runners-up finishes. He was named Florida's Coach of the Year on three occasions.

In 1975, Bertman coached at Miami-Dade Downtown, leaving after one season to join legendary head coach Ron Fraser at Miami. The move was a homecoming of sorts, as Bertman spent his collegiate playing days with the Hurricanes as an outfielder and catcher from 1958-60. He earned his B.A. in health and physical education from Miami in 1961 and received his master's degree from UM in 1964.

Bertman and his wife Sandy are the parents of four daughters -- Jan, Jodi, Lisa and Lori. The Bertmans have two grandchildren -- Sophie Faith and Isaac Stanley, the children of Emile and Lori Bertman Guirard.
