Collegiate athletics has few tennis leagues that compare to the competition in the Southeastern Conference. Both men's and women's tennis are the most consistently dominant sports in the nation's most competitive athletic conference.

Florida led the way for the conference last season, taking advantage of its home court and upsetting Stanford in the national championship match to claim the league's sixth NCAA title in eleven years. But even the eventual national champions couldn't escape the conference unscathed. They finished 10-1 but came out on top of the SEC tournament, which featured ten teams ranked in the final ITA poll.

Vanderbilt and Georgia joined Florida with semifinal appearances in 2004, adding to the SEC's streak of 17 years with a team in that round.

Tennessee's Vilmarie Castellvi lost in the national singles championship match, 7-6 (5), 6-2 to Amber Liu of Stanford. Castellvi, the SEC Player of the Year, maintained a No. 1 ranking in the final poll of the season and was followed by Georgia's Agata Cioroch. Cioroch and Lori Grey were ranked No. 1 in the final doubles poll. Four other SEC doubles teams were ranked in the top-10.

"The SEC is tough. And it's the best. You want to play against the best and coach against the best and we get to do that every time out every year," said LSU head coach Tony Minnis. "It's very intense and there are a lot of good coaches. The conference speaks for itself in how we compete."

BACK FOR MORE

Lady Tigers head coach Tony Minnis finds himself and his squad a pleasant but unfamiliar situation as the 2004 season begins. For the first time in Minnis' 13 years at LSU, his team's roster is identical to last season's.

"This season brings a lot of excitement for me, strictly due to the fact that this is the first time I've had an entire team returning from the previous year," Minnis said. "What's got me excited is that at the end of last year I saw how much they progressed from the beginning of the year."

Senior Rocio Fantilli and junior Amanda Mang

lead the Lady Tigers again this year and senior Jessica Ferguson returns to the lineup after missing the fall season. Four talented sophomores will also get to use their experience from last year to try to send LSU to its tenth consecutive NCAA tournament. With no freshmen, the Lady Tigers have depth and experience throughout their lineup.

"When you have a bunch of veteran players they're more mature and they're more confident because they know what to expect," Minnis said. "I think that with the type of players we have we have a lot of potential to do something special and something new. Rocio [Fantilli] and Amanda [Mang] have done solid jobs as older players and leaders. I'm also really impressed with the leadership abilities of some of the younger players."

When I've been a part of outstanding teams, we were not relying on one or two people. When everybody emerges you have something great. Even though we are more experienced, we're still relatively young."

Consistency will be the highest hurdle for the Lady Tigers to clear this season. LSU struggled early last season after an injury sidelined Mang for the month of April and most of the Southeastern Conference schedule. The Lady Tigers played four freshmen and one first-year junior college transfer as they tried to succeed in the nation's toughest conference.

LSU rebounded from a tough losing streak late in the season, racking up four victories in its last six matches to earn a berth in the NCAA tournament. Minnis said he believes the late season rebound by his squad last year should help this year's squad play well.

"The biggest thing we're going to have to do is play with consistency," he said. "Every time we get on the court I want to know what we're getting. We cannot have these patches like we've had in the past where we have a couple of players not compete to their potential in individual matches. If we do compete with consistency we can have a heck of a year."

"I think when you go through a rough patch you grow from it," he said. "These girls, after a really hard stretch last year, reeled off some good victories against some really good schools. That experience should bode really well for this year."

LSU will have to draw on all of its experience to survive a difficult 2004 schedule. In addition to playing in the SEC with defending national champion Florida and a host of other perennial powers, the Lady Tigers will have tough non-conference matches against Purdue, Rice, Texas A&M, SMU, Florida State and Tulsa.

"That only helps you," Minnis said of his team's schedule strength. "The goal every year is to make it to the tournament by playing the best teams. Having a tough schedule puts you in a position not only to make the tournament but to be seeded high. Our schedule this year is as tough as ever."

Minnis, who has more wins than any coach in LSU women's tennis history, says he likes the character of this year's team as much as many he's had in the past.

"This team has a lot more depth than a lot of the other teams we've had," he said. "The goal is to hopefully play a little bit more solid up top."

Fantilli, a Puerto Madryn, Argentina native, faced 17 top-100 opponents last year in her first year at that spot. Mang will also play near the top after coming on strong in the off-season. Ferguson, who played at No. 2 last season, will also be relied on for strength at the top of the lineup.

Tony Minnis has a chance to lead his team to its 10th consecutive NCAA tournament, a feat only a handful of coaches will have the chance to accomplish. He also gets a treat he has never received as a head coach. He returns all his players from last year, including two seniors, two juniors and four sophomores.

"Only a few teams have made the tournament that many times, and it's harder than it sounds because you have those years where you have injuries or where things don't go your way," Minnis said. "Last year was supposed to be a rebuilding year, with four freshmen. We pushed ourselves and that says a lot about the focus and determination and intensity of the kids we have coming back this year."

Minnis returned to his hometown of Baton Rouge in 1992 to take over the women's tennis team and has long since earned more wins than any other coach in the program's history.

In 12 seasons as head coach, Minnis has earned a 166-129 overall record. By earning his 80th career victory at LSU in 1997, he passed Phillip Campbell (1984-88) as the winningest women's tennis coach in LSU history. During the 2002 dual-match season, Minnis earned his 150th career victory with a 5-2 win over Tulsa. The achievement was just another milestone obtained by the talented young coach.

"I don't really think about that much," he said. "One thing I've learned as a player and a coach is to instill in yourself and your team an attitude that when one thing is over you move on to the next. It's nice to know I've had those accomplishments in my career here, but I try to focus on each year."

Minnis came to LSU knowing what it takes to excel in the sport. He was a tennis star at Southwestern Louisiana from 1984-88. He was team captain his freshman and senior seasons and is USL's all-time winningest singles player with an impressive 94-40 career mark.

He followed his playing career with a job as an assistant tennis coach at USL as well as working as the club professional at several tennis clubs in the Lafayette, La., area. But, Minnis said, his LSU experience has taught him the most about the game.

"I've learned a lot over the last 13 years, especially

about how very, very important it is to communicate with your players. I know the roller coasters that come with coaching and I've learned to take them in stride. I have been so fortunate to be in this tremendous environment at LSU, because you get to learn from every single coach here. There are some great coaches and that's the beauty of having an athletic department as good as this one."

With those years of experience and lessons has come a pile of awards and achievements for Minnis and his Lady Tigers

Minnis and the Lady Tigers put together a solid campaign in 2001 and finished the season with a 14-10 overall record. The squad advanced to the NCAA Tournament and finished with a No. 27 national ranking.

Bruna Colosio, who graduated after a record-breaking senior season in 2002, was one of the top five players in the nation and the 2001 SEC Player of the Year. She excelled under Minnis' tutelage and received All-America status in both 2000 and 2001.

Minnis led LSU to its second Sweet 16 appearance in school history in 2000. The Lady Tigers upset sixth-

ranked Pepperdine, 5-4, in the second round of the tournament. The upset is considered the most impressive victory in team history. LSU fell in the Sweet 16 to USC.

In 1999, he was named the Southwest Regional Coach of the Year after reaching the NCAA Tournament for the fifth-straight season. The season was supposed to be a rebuilding one, but Minnis led his squad to upset victories over both 10th-ranked Tennessee and 15th-ranked Arkansas on its way to a final ranking of No. 28 in the nation.

In 1997, Minnis was named the SEC Coach of the Year when he led LSU to the regional finals. The Lady Tigers advanced to the championship match of the Southwest regional by beating Texas A&M, 5-0. Minnis was recognized as the Louisiana Coach of the Year for the third time in four years. Senior Suzana Rodrigues finished her career ranked fifth in all-time singles wins at 108-42 overall. She and teammate Laura Olave won the 1996 National Clay Court Doubles title. The tandem earned All-America honors after placing 10th in the final doubles rankings.

LSU posted its highest national ranking ever under Minnis in April of 1995 when the Lady Tigers leapt from No. 30 to No. 15 after upsetting 11th-ranked Tennessee, 5-3, in the opening round of the NCAA Championships. The Lady Tigers fell to eventual NCAA runner-up Florida, 5-0, in round two. Minnis was named the Southwest Region and Louisiana Coach of the Year after guiding the Lady Tigers to their first-ever win at the NCAAs and their first postseason appearance since 1991.

As a player, Minnis competed in the 1988 NCAA Team Championships and was a semifinalist at the NIT Tournament in 1986. He had a 37-6 three-set record in his first three seasons at USL. During his four years there, the Ragin' Cajuns posted a 78-39 overall record and finished each year ranked in the Top-25. In his senior season, USL was ranked 15th in the final polls and



advanced to the second round of the NCAA Championships.

Minnis comes from a family loaded with tennis experience. His father, Howard, was the head tennis coach at Southern University for several years and is now a professor there. His sister, Patricia, was a four-year letter winner at LSU from 1988-91. His brother, Patrick, was USL's No. 1 singles player after his departure. Minnis played high school tennis at Redemptorist in Baton Rouge. He graduated from USL in 1988 with a degree in finance and earned an MBA in 1996.

Sandy Sureephong joined the LSU women's tennis coaching staff in the fall of 2001, bringing another dimension of expertise and energy to the program. Her experience as a player on the professional and collegiate level allow her to add to the team's success, but her off-court leadership is just as valuable.

"Sandy brings a lot of focus and confidence to the team," said LSU head coach Tony Minnis. "She's been through what they're hoping to go through and she's been a great role model for our players. They all have a huge amount of respect for her and I think it's because she's not that far removed from competing at this level. She's been a part of some great collegiate teams and she knows what it's like to be consistently ranked among the top 10 teams in the nation."

Sureephong, a native of Haines City, Fla., was a four-time All-American at the University of Texas from 1995-99 and was ranked as high as No. 3 in the nation in singles play. She is currently the third-winningest player in Texas history and finished her career with an overall record of 86-24. Sureephong also played a major role in Texas' run to the Final Four at the 1997 NCAA Team Championships.

After making history at Texas, Sureephong spent two years playing on the professional circuit, where she recorded victories over both Chanda Rubin and Lindsay Davenport. Sureephong was the 168th-ranked player in the world in doubles play and reached as high as No. 330 in singles.

"Her experiences both as a collegiate athlete and as a pro athlete benefit our team both on and off the field," Minnis said. "She's been through the exact things that our girls are going through and she knows what it takes to win and to be the best."

Sureephong earned her bachelor's degree in sports management from the University of Texas' College of Education in December of 1999. She was included on the 1998 fall and 1999 spring Big 12 Conference Commissioner's Honor Roll, she

received the Texas Women's Athletics 1999 Donna Lopiano/Jean Kaspar Scholarship and earned the 1998 Anne Haskins Grousbeck Scholarship for Academic Accomplishment and Leadership.

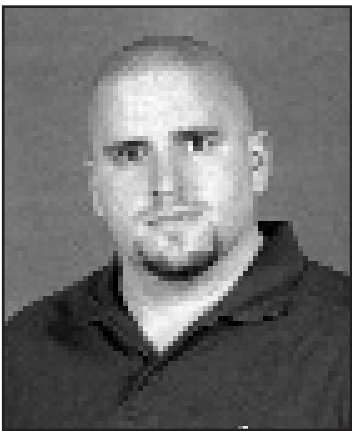

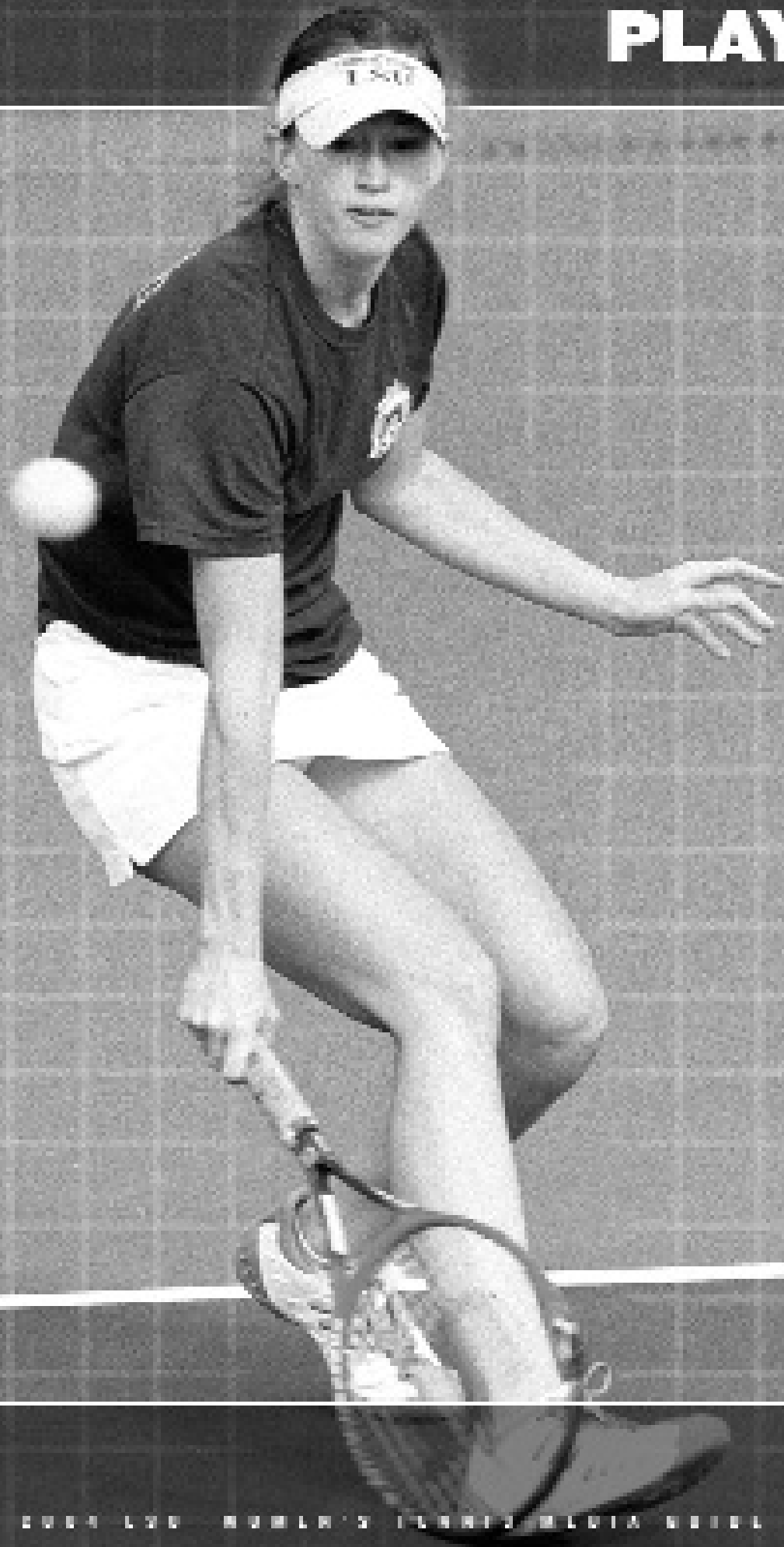

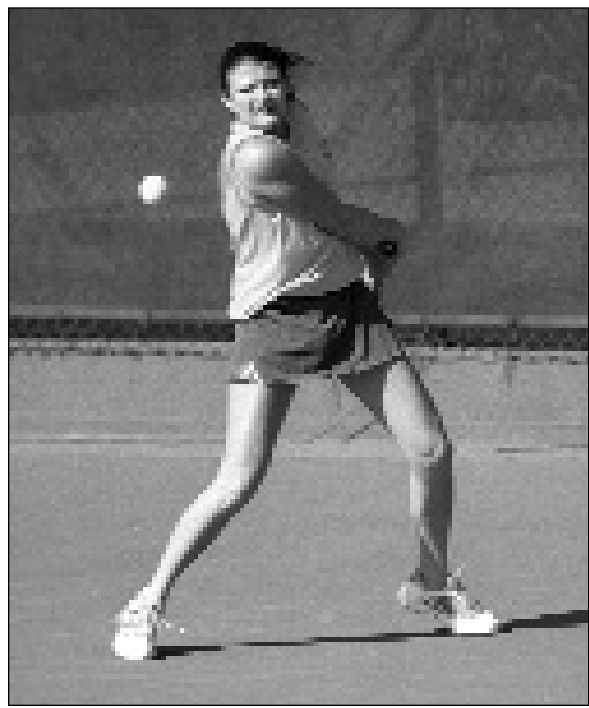

REVIEW



YOUNG AND RESILIENT

The Lady Tigers suffered several setbacks during the 2002-03 season that might have left them out of the NCAA Tournament for the first time in nine years. But they met the adversity with a good attitude and strong regular season finish to advance to tournament once again.

The Lady Tigers were already low on experience after losing three seniors in 2002, including three-time All-American and SEC Player of the Year Bruna Colosio. With four freshmen and a junior college transfer on the roster, plus one of the most difficult schedules in the NCAA, the Lady Tigers couldn't afford to lose any veterans.

Then, in the middle of the conference schedule, junior standout Amanda Mang suffered an injury that kept her off the courts until nearly the end match of the season.

"We hit a stretch where we played Florida, Georgia and Tennessee back-to-back-to-back," head coach Tony Minnis said. "Florida was the defending national champion, Georgia was in the top five and Tennessee was not far

behind. It was right when Amanda got hurt and that was really hard for us.

"We hit a really rough patch, but we kind of turned things around. I was actually really impressed, especially when Amanda got hurt and we wound up playing five new players out of six. We still made a push and upset some pretty good teams and wound up in the tournament."

STRONG FINISH TAKES LADY TIGERS BACK TO THE NCAAS

The struggling Lady Tigers stumbled in March after losing Mang, but rebounded impressively in April. LSU won three in a row beginning April 2 when it knocked off No. 26 Tulane in New Orleans.

The upset victory was highlighted by the duo of Rocio Fantilli and Lauren Seaman, who defeated the ninth-ranked team of Julie Smekodub and Jenny Kuhn, 9-7, in the No. 1 doubles match. Freshman Marina Chiarelli then beat 71st-ranked Erika Valdes at No. 3 singles to seal the 4-3

win. It was only Tulane's fourth loss of the season.

LSU went on to beat Mississippi State and No. 49 Ole Miss at home before losing to No. 56 Purdue on the road. They closed out the season with a 6-1 win over Arkansas in Fayetteville.

FANTILLI AND SEAMAN EARN NATIONAL RECOGNITION

Fantilli and Seaman defeated two top-10 opponents in a week to catapult them to a No. 43 ranking in the ITA's April 9 poll.

Five days before spurring the win over Tulane, Fantilli and Seaman beat the first-ranked team in the nation. The pair stunned SEC foes Sarah Riske and Aleke Tsoubanos of Vanderbilt, 8-4.

Fantilli, a native of Puerto Madryn, Argentina became accustomed to doubles success in her first two years at LSU. She competed with Bruna Colosio in 2001 and 2002, earning a national ranking as high as 19th in 2002.

Seaman walked on to the Lady Tiger squad in 2003, fresh off a stellar high school career at Country Day School in Metairie, La.

LADY TIGERS' ROSTER ADDS FIVE NEW FACES

Four freshmen and a junior college transfer moved to Baton Rouge last fall with big shoes to fill.

Along with the departure of Colosio, the Lady Tigers lost seniors Amy McIlhane and Tami Botts in 2002.

"Bruna Colosio was one of the best players we've ever had here," Minnis said. "Tami Botts stayed in and out of the rankings throughout her career and Amy McIlhane was probably one of the best doubles players we've ever had here."

But the new additions were not disappointing. Marina Chiarelli and Camila Caliar were two of the top players leaving their native Brazil that year. Daysi Espinal joined the squad from the Dominican Republic and Seaman walked on to round out the talented freshman class.

Jessica Ferguson, a Houston native, spent her sophomore year at Tyler Community College as the second-ranked junior college player in the nation. She was named All-Big 12 as a freshman at Missouri.

All five newcomers had stepped into the starting lineup by the end of the SEC schedule.

"Last year was no doubt supposed to be a rebuilding year," Minnis said. "We still pushed ourselves and knocked off some pretty good teams while playing five new players out of six."

NINTH STRAIGHT NCAA TOURNAMENT APPEARANCE FOR LADY TIGERS

The Lady Tigers made a strong statement with hard-fought victories to put them in the NCAA Tournament for the ninth consecutive year, an accomplishment only 10 other teams in the nation can claim. Arizona State, California, Duke, Georgia, South Carolina, USC, Tennessee, Texas, UCLA and Vanderbilt are the only other programs in college tennis this year with an opportunity to make the tournament for at least a tenth straight year.

Minnis expects his team to not only make the tournament, but to enter it in a more favorable position.

"For seven of the years we made it we were in the top 32," Minnis said. "The last two years we have not been and we want to get back to a one or two seed. It says a lot about our team though, because not many teams are there every year."

Minnis said the fact that his team rebounded after a 1-7 start in conference play to make it to the tournament was impressive—it made him excited about the future.

Last year's appearance in the tournament was a brief one. The Lady Tigers finished the 2003 season with a 4-0 loss to 26th-ranked Texas A&M in the first round.

LSU's Record When

1976 LADY TIGERS

Overall Record: 11-5 *Inaugural Season* • Louisiana AIAW Champions • 14th USTA Nationals

LSU won nine of its last 11 matches, including five straight to end its inaugural campaign en route to the Louisiana AIAW Championship. The Lady Tigers opened the season with a 9-0 win over Northwestern State and went on to outscore its opponents 107-37. LSU finished 14th at the USTA Nationals.

1978 LADY TIGERS

Overall Record: 19-5 • Louisiana AIAW Champions

Former head coach Pat Newman guided LSU to its third consecutive state AIAW title in as many seasons. Lady Tiger standouts Kay McDaniel and Ebie Taylor became LSU's first ever All-Americans, earning the prestigious honor after leading the team to a 10th place finish at the AIAW National Championships. The '78 squad holds the record for most consecutive wins in a season with 12 in a row.

1979 LADY TIGERS

Overall Record: 22-10 • Louisiana AIAW Runner-up

After claiming three-straight Louisiana AIAW titles, LSU earned it's best at 22-10 but fell shy of its fourth- straight title. The Lady Tigers lost, 7-2, to Northeast La. in the finals. LSU won eight straight matches to start the season and 16 of 18 down the stretch. In four seasons, LSU dominated its in-state rivals 26-2, with its only blemish being dual losses to NLU during the '79 season.

1985 LADY TIGERS

Overall Record: 19-7 • SEC Runner-up

LSU's most prolific women's tennis duo, twin sisters Dana De and De Ann Watlington, showcased their outstanding talent by leading an experienced Lady Tiger squad to a second place finish in the SEC behind Florida. LSU won nine of its final 10 matches of the season under coach Philip Campbell.

1991 LADY TIGERS

Overall Record: 19-6 • NCAA Final 20 • Final Rank: (0)No. 18

The Lady Tigers advanced to the NCAA Championships for the first time in school history, compiling a 19-6 record and finishing third in the SEC. LSU dropped a hard-fought 5-3 decision to Indiana in the opening round at the NCAA's, finishing at No. 18 in the nation.

1992 LADY TIGERS

Overall record: 14-9 NCAA Final Rank: No. 21

1995 LADY TIGERS

Overall Record: 19-8 • NCAA Final 16 • Final Rank: No. 18

LSU capped off its most successful season in school history with a stunning 5-3 upset of No. 11th-ranked Tennessee in the opening round of the 1995 NCAA Championships, before falling to national runner-up Florida 5-0 in round two. The Lady Tigers tallied a 19-8 overall record, amassing numerous accolades, including a No. 18 final ranking.

1997 LADY TIGERS

Overall Record: 18-9 • NCAA SW Regional Finalists • Final Rank: No. 20

The Lady Tigers enjoyed another stellar campaign, charting numerous athletic and academic honors en route to an 18-9 mark and a national top 20 finish. LSU fell short of the NCAA Championships in a 5-2 loss to Tennessee in the NCAA Southwest Regional final. Tony Minnis became LSU's winningest coach and was named both SEC and Louisiana Coach of the Year. Three-time All-American Suzana Rodrigues said farewell in 1997 as the highly successful four-year star ended her collegiate career in record fashion.

1998 LADY TIGERS

Overall Record: 15-10 • NCAA SW Regional Finalists • Final Rank: No. 26

LSU overcame injuries to two of its top players, Laura Olave and Ana Paula Mores, to qualify for the fourth consecutive year and play host to the NCAA Southwest Regional Championships. After making the final for the second consecutive season, the Lady Tigers were defeated by top-seeded Arkansas, 5-2, to end an impressive run against all odds. Before being upended by the Lady Razorbacks, the Lady Tigers knocked off Baylor and 2nd-seeded Miami, Fla. Three Lady Tigers seniors, Laura Olave, Jennifer Barr and Jamie Vallotton, bowed out by finishing their careers in Baton Rouge.

1999 LADY TIGERS

Overall Record: 13-11 • NCAA Championship Qualifiers • Final Rank: No. 28

LSU finished the 1998-99 season strong despite having only one senior and two freshmen in the starting lineup. Under the leadership of lone senior Nikki Rasheed, the team concluded the season ranked No. 28. Rasheed finished her career at LSU with a 64-63 record. Head coach Tony Minnis led the Lady Tigers to their fifth-consecutive NCAA post-season appearance, in which they advanced to the second round. Freshmen Bruna Colosio and Tami Botts stepped up for the team, combining for a 31-27 dual-match record. Colosio finished the season ranked 45th in the nation.

2000 LADY TIGERS

Overall Record: 16-11 • NCAA Sweet 16 • Final Rank: No. 21

The Lady Tigers accomplished two amazing feats during the 2000 dual match season. In the second round of the NCAA tournament, No. 32 LSU upset the sixth-ranked Pepperdine Waves, 5-4, on their home court in Malibu, Calif., to advance to the Sweet 16. The biggest upset in school history allowed the 2000 Lady Tigers to become the second LSU women's tennis team to reach the quarterfinal round. The Lady Tigers were led by their lone senior, Ana Paula Mores, and sophomore Bruna Colosio. Colosio ended the season as the sixth ranked singles player in the nation, while Mores ended her illustrious four-year career with 97 singles wins and a No. 75 national ranking. As a doubles team, the pair finished the 2000 campaign ranked No. 4.

Louisiana State University and Agricultural & Mechanical College has, throughout its 143-year history, served the people of Louisiana, the region, the nation, and the world through extensive multipurpose programs encompassing instruction, research and public service. The University continuously develops programs of breadth and quality that make it one of the nation's outstanding educational institutions.

The University influences the educational, economic, social and cultural lives of its citizens throughout the state – indeed, in some way, it touches the life of every person in Louisiana.

Because of its designation as a Research I University – the top category of the Carnegie Foundation's ranking of research institutions – LSU ranks in the top 2 percent of the nation's colleges and universities. The Research I designation is shared by only 59 public and 29 private universities across the nation. One of only 25 universities nationwide designated as both a land-grant and sea-grant college, LSU is also actively pursuing space-grant status.

History and tradition began with LSU's founding in 1853 by the General Assembly of Louisiana as the Louisiana State Seminary of Learning and Military Academy near Pineville, Louisiana. The institution opened January 2, 1860. When the Civil War began, the school's first superintendent, William Tecumseh Sherman, resigned to assume a command in the Union Army. Fire demolished the Seminary in 1869 and the school moved to Baton Rouge.

In 1870, the Seminary was renamed Louisiana State University. In 1874, under the United States Morrill Act, the Louisiana State Agricultural & Mechanical College was established in New Orleans. The two institutions were merged by the Legislature in 1877 to become Louisiana State University and Agricultural & Mechanical College.

Construction on the present campus began in 1922 and the first classes were held in 1926. LSU experienced major growth in the 1930s and 1940s, expanding its student body, curricula and services. During the 1960s, the University began to place increasing emphasis on research.



Recognizing the importance and extent of statewide agricultural activities of units in the LSU System, the LSU Board of Supervisors in 1972 established the Center for Agricultural Sciences & Rural Development. This unit was renamed the LSU Agricultural Center in 1982. Components of the LSU Agricultural Center include the Louisiana Agricultural Experiment Station, the Louisiana Cooperative Extension Service, International Programs and Administrative Services.

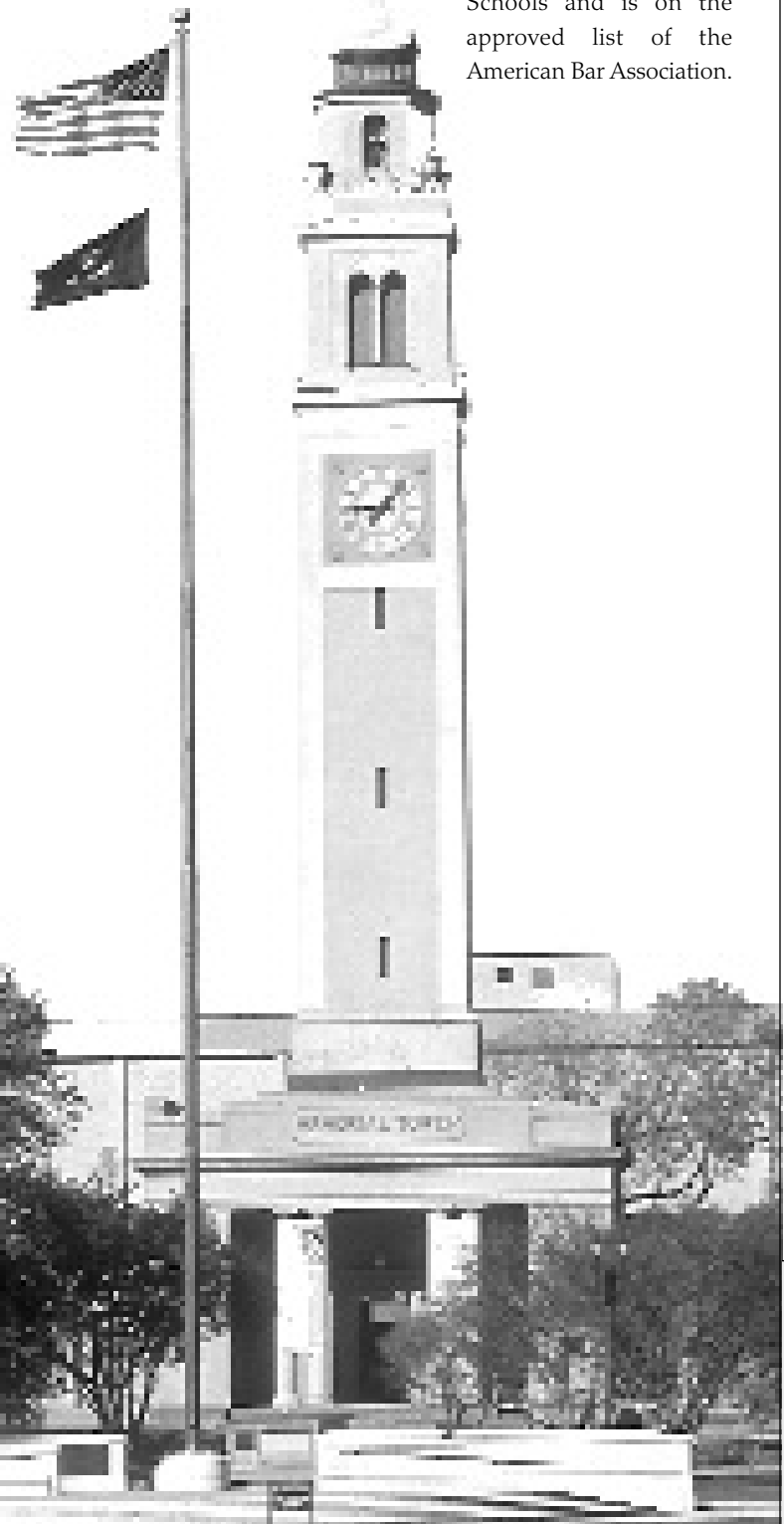
The primary mission of the LSU Agricultural Center is to conduct research in agricultural and natural resource development and to provide off-campus extension education that disseminates technological, economic, and management information to Louisiana residents.

In 1977, the Paul M. Hebert Law Center, established as the LSU Law School in 1906, was made an autonomous division of the LSU System. The Law Center provides legal education characterized by an unyielding demand for academic excellence. Its unique curriculum, based on civil law as well as substantial elements of common law, provides law graduates with qualifications and training for not one, but two legal systems.

LSU, located on more than 2,000 acres in the southern part of Baton Rouge, Louisiana, is

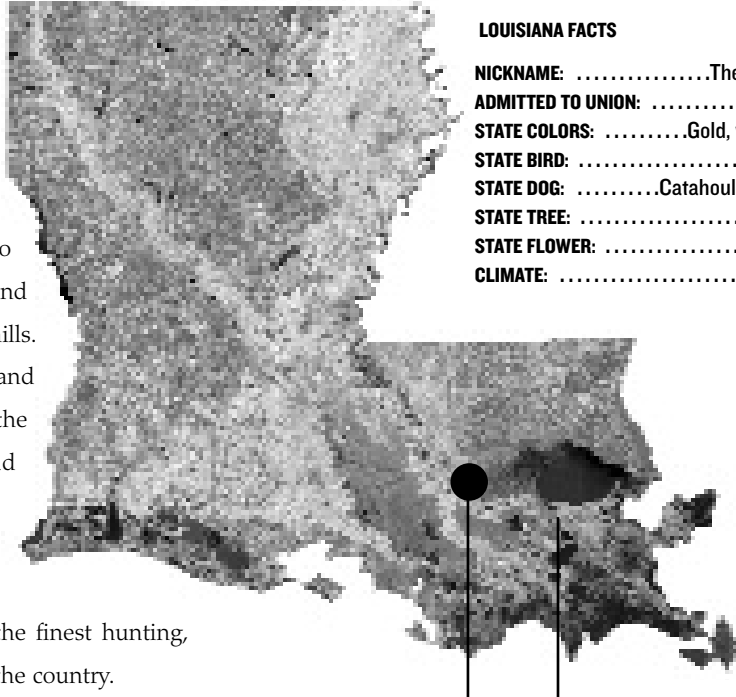
bordered on the west by the Mississippi River. The University's more than 250 principal buildings are grouped on a 650-acre plateau that constitutes the main part of the campus.

LSU and A&M College is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. The Hebert Law Center holds membership in the Association of Law Schools and is on the approved list of the American Bar Association.

Finances

The LSU Athletic Department is a totally **self-sufficient** auxiliary of the University. No state tax dollars are used to finance LSU athletics. All money spent by the Athletic Department is generated by the department through ticket sales, corporate sponsorships, radio and television revenue, the Tiger Gift Center and concessions, and is supplemented through revenue-sharing resulting from LSU's membership in the Southeastern Conference.

Individual Athletes

Year in and year out, LSU boasts some of the most renowned athletes in all of college athletics.

NBA Most Valuable Player and world-wide entertainment superstar **Shaquille O'Neal** delighted Tiger basketball fans for three seasons. PGA Champion **David Toms** played for the Tigers in the late 1980s, while Major League Baseball standouts **Todd Walker** and **Paul Byrd** learned their trade at Alex Box Stadium. Sometimes overlooked are some of the finest female athletes in the country in their respective sports: golfer **Meredith Duncan**, softball All-American **Britni Sneed**, women's basketball All-American **Marie Ferdinand**, and track superstar **Muna Lee** have dazzled LSU fans in recent years.

Job Placement

Is there life after college athletics? LSU is helping to answer that question with a job placement program as part of the **Ninth Semester Program**. LSU works closely with the Career Placement Center on campus as well as professional recruiting services to offer advice to athletes on entering the job market upon graduation.

National Awards

LSU has had one winner each of the Heisman Trophy, Adolph Rupp Award and Golden Spikes Award, the premier individual awards in football, basketball and baseball. The **Heisman Trophy**, given annually to college football's best player, was won by **Billy Cannon in 1959**. The **Adolph Rupp Award**, which goes to college basketball's top player, was won by **Shaquille O'Neal in 1991**. The **Golden Spikes Award**, given to college baseball's most outstanding player each year, was won by **Ben McDonald** in 1989. In 2001, **Josh Reed** added his name to the list as he claimed the **Biletnikoff Award**, which goes annually to the nation's top receiver.

Stadiavision

At all LSU football games in Tiger Stadium, basketball games at the Pete Maravich Assembly Center and baseball games at Alex Box Stadium, **live action is shown on monitors** near concession stands and restrooms so fans won't miss the action in progress.

Tiger Gift Center

LSU operates a fully stocked merchandise store within Tiger Stadium that gives fans a wide array of LSU clothing and memorabilia. The Gift Center is open on football, basketball and baseball game days for fans' convenience. A new satellite Gift Center near Mike the Tiger's cage is open for added customer convenience. The Tiger Gift Center also went worldwide during the 2000-01 season as LSU merchandise can now be purchased from anywhere in the world on LSU's website, www.LSUsports.net.

University Involvement

LSU continues to produce profits in its athletic department, despite generally difficult economic times for college athletic programs.

Athletics has contributed over \$8 million to the academic side of the University in the past 12 years.

In 1994-95, athletics contributed \$100,000 to the LSU Libraries to assist in buying books and other materials necessary to keep LSU's library system among the finest in the nation, and in 1996 generated over \$30,000 by dedicating all ticket sales from the Spring Football Game to the libraries.

After the 1988-89 fiscal year, LSU Athletics donated \$2 million to the general fund of the University to help offset projected losses. LSU Athletics has also donated sizeable amounts of money to fund professorships and provide for repairs in academic facilities.



Over a four-day span in the spring of 2002, the LSU campus served as the host of the NCAA Track and Field Championships as well as an NCAA Baseball Regional.

All-Sports Success

LSU's athletics program has traditionally been strong throughout all of its varsity sports and has fielded nationally competitive teams in most of its sports.

A total of 16 of LSU's 20 athletic teams participated in NCAA postseason play last year. LSU added a pair of national titles to its trophy case, running its overall total to 40, last year as the women's track and field teams swept the NCAA indoor and outdoor titles.

In all, LSU had nine of its 20 teams finish the year ranked in the Top 25 for their respective sports in 2002-03 and seven of those were ranked in the Top 10.

LSU also claimed its 103rd Southeastern Conference title as the Tiger baseball team won the league championship in 2003 before advancing to the College World Series.

Athletics as a Business

Athletics is mistakenly thought of as merely entertainment. In fact, the **total revenues of over \$37.5 million** generated annually by the Athletic Department is:

- twice that of the sales of an average manufacturing plant in Louisiana
- twice the volume of an average food processor
- about seven times more than the typical apparel plant in the state

Attendance

LSU teams draw some of the largest crowds in all of college athletics:

- More than **1 million fans** watched LSU athletics in all 20 sports during the 2002-03 athletic year.
- Since 1957, LSU has averaged over 73,000 fans a contest in football, including over 90,000 for the last two



seasons.

- In 2001, LSU set a school-record by averaging **90,491** fans a contest, a number that ranked fifth nationally. Last year, LSU averaged 90,307 fans a contest making Tiger Stadium, on a Saturday night, **more populated than 52 of Louisiana's 64 parishes.**
- **LSU baseball set the standard in college baseball for attendance again** in 2003 as more than 291,000 fans watched the Tigers play at Alex Box Stadium in regular and postseason play.

CHAMPS Program

LSU sponsors a fully funded life skills program for student-athletes. The program is called CHAMPS, an acronym for **Challenging Athletes Minds for Personal Success.** Under the CHAMPS program, LSU sets up a number of projects and workshops that aid student-athletes in addressing day-to-day living situations, handling stress and preparing for post-college life.

Under the CHAMPS program, LSU

also establishes community service projects in which student-athletes organize and participate. The LSU CHAMPS program sponsors an annual **Halloween "Boo-Zar"** on campus. The boozar is a trick-or-treat night in the LSU Field House in which athletes from all sports distribute candy to Baton Rouge area children. Each athletic team participates in CHAMPS workshops which educate them in life skills and personal development.

Community Involvement

Because of the athletic facilities on the LSU campus, Baton Rouge is able to attract many events and conventions that benefit the community in both public relations and monetary means. LSU has played host to such events as the National Sports Festival (now called the Olympic Festival) and the International Special Olympics. In 2001, LSU hosted the U.S. Senior Olympics and in the past has played host to the U.S. Junior National Track & Field Championships.

The LSU campus is annually the site of LHSAA Track & Field Championships, bringing to campus thousands of young people and their parents. Most recently, **LSU hosted the 2002 NCAA Outdoor Track & Field Championships at Bernie Moore Stadium.**

Economic Impact

LSU has a tremendous impact on the economy of the Baton Rouge area. LSU sporting events bring money into the Baton Rouge economy, not only from throughout the state, but throughout the southeast.

According to a study by LSU economics professor Loren Scott, the existence of **LSU Athletics generates \$131 million in sales for businesses in the Baton Rouge community**, another \$40 million in household earnings and supports over 2,100 jobs in the Baton Rouge area.

LSU boasts the largest and most complete athletic training facility in all of collegiate athletics. Focused on aggressive rehabilitation, the Broussard Center for Athletic Training is furnished with the latest in technology and equipment. Some of the features of the 23,000-square foot facility include an on-site x-ray room, an in-house pharmacy, as well as state of the art hydrotherapy pools. The Broussard Center for Athletic Training is equipped with the largest hydrotherapy pools in both collegiate and professional sports and is one of the few collegiate training centers with a full-service pharmacy, as well as on-site x-ray room. LSU is also the only school in college athletics with a training room equipped with a full-service vision center. The facility is named in honor of legendary trainer Dr. Martin J. Broussard, who served as LSU's athletic trainer for several decades.





LSU ATHLETICS NATIONAL PROMINENCE

The 2002-03 athletic year proved to be another outstanding one for LSU. The school claimed its 39th and 40th national titles (women's indoor and outdoor track & field) as well as the 103rd Southeastern Conference title (baseball) and a SEC Tournament title in women's basketball. The phenomenal success has continued into the current year, as the LSU football team claimed the 2003 BCS national title.

Last year 16 of LSU's 20 sports competed in postseason action, all being invited to the NCAA Tournament (or bowl game). LSU's women's basketball team reached the Elite Eight and finished ranked No. 3 in the nation and the baseball team advanced to the College World Series in Omaha.

LSU was the only school in the SEC to have both its men's and women's basketball teams make the NCAA Tournament field of 64, its football team play in a New Year's Day bowl game and its baseball team reach the College World Series.



The following is a look at some of the top individual performances by LSU athletes last year.



Bradie James

Football

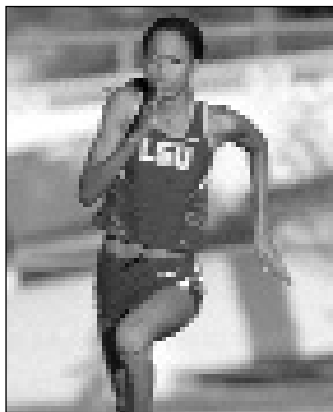
James was a first-team All-America by both the American Football Coaches Association and *The Sporting News* as a senior linebacker for the Tigers. He led LSU to an eight win season and the Cotton Bowl with 154 tackles as the defensive captain. He finished his career just shy of the LSU record for career tackles with 418. He also became just the second Tiger to record at least 100 tackles in three consecutive seasons. In addition to his on the field success, James was also a great success in the classroom. He was one of only eight players in the nation to receive the National Football Foundation Scholar-Athlete Award. In April James was drafted by the Dallas Cowboys in the fourth round of the NFL Draft.



Seimone Augustus

Women's Basketball

Augustus helped lead the Lady Tigers to a record-breaking season that included 30 wins, a No. 3 national ranking, a SEC Tournament title, and a trip to the NCAA Elite Eight. She was the consensus National Freshman of the Year and was named second-team All-America by *The Basketball Times*. She led the team in scoring with 14.8 points per game and put together one of the most successful freshman campaigns in LSU Lady Tigers' history. In her collegiate debut, Augustus poured in 27 points in a victory at Arizona, the most points scored by a Lady Tiger in her debut. Later in the season she grabbed 19 rounds in a victory over Georgia, the most boards in a single game since 1994.



Muna Lee

Track & Field

Named the 2003 Indoor Track & Field National Athlete of the Year, Lee was instrumental in guiding the Lady Tigers to national titles at both the NCAA Indoor and Outdoor Championships. During the indoor season, Lee became just the fourth woman in NCAA history to sweep the short sprint events at the national championships, winning both the 60 and 200-meter. In doing so, Lee shattered the 21-year old collegiate record in the 200 meters, clocking an unprecedented time of 22.49. During the outdoor season, Lee anchored the 4x100-meter relay to a national title, as the Lady Tigers posted the second fastest time in NCAA history (42.55). In addition, Lee earned All-America honors with runner-up finishes in both the 100 and 200-meter dashes and anchored the LSU 4x200-meter relay to a collegiate record (1:29.78).



Aaron Hill

Baseball

Hill, a junior shortstop for the Tigers, became the 15th LSU player to earn first-team all-America recognition when he was named to the *Baseball America* All-America squad. Hill was drafted by the Toronto Blue Jays as the club's first-round selection (13th overall) in the June draft. He completed his collegiate career by earning SEC Player of the Year honors and leading LSU to the College World Series. He batted .358 with nine home runs, 68 runs scored, 67 RBI and 27 doubles, the second-highest single-season total for doubles by an LSU player. He also earned all-tournament recognition at the SEC Tournament and the NCAA Baton Rouge Regional.



Dr. Mark A. Emmert

Chancellor, LSU

Dr. Mark A. Emmert was appointed chancellor of Louisiana State University and Agricultural & Mechanical College on April 16, 1999, becoming the sixth chancellor to lead the state's flagship University.

Prior to joining LSU, Emmert served as chancellor of the University of Connecticut, as provost and vice president for academic affairs at Montana State University, and held various faculty and administrative positions at the University of Colorado. He has served as a member of numerous academic and civic boards and organizations.

Both the Fulbright Commission and the American Council on Education have awarded fellowships to Emmert. He has also been inducted into Phi Kappa Phi Honor Society, Alpha Lambda Delta Scholastic Society, Golden Key Honor Society, and the Connecticut Academy of Arts and Sciences. He is active in the American Council on Education, the New England Council of Presidents, and the National Association of State Universities and Land-Grant Colleges, where he served as chair of the Council on Academic Affairs.

A native of Tacoma, Washington, Emmert holds a bachelor's degree in political science from the University of Washington and master's and doctoral degrees from the Maxwell School of Syracuse University. His scholarly

work has focused on public policy topics, as well as issues in organizational theory. He has published his research in leading journals within his field and has served on several editorial boards. He has also served as a visiting scholar and lecturer internationally, working in Australia, Hong Kong, Japan, and Panama.

He is married to DeLaine S. Emmert, a former elementary school teacher, who is active in community, university, and philanthropic organizations. They have two children, Stephen and Jennifer.

Bertman's unyielding desire to succeed drove him to the pinnacle of his profession, and his astute knowledge of the game -- obtained from over 40 years of coaching -- combined with his steadfast determination and irrepressible enthusiasm transformed LSU Baseball into the nation's premier program.

Already a Louisiana Legend and one of the greatest college baseball coaches of all time, J. Stanley "Skip" Bertman has augmented his impressive list of achievements in two seasons as LSU's director of athletics. While supervising the Tigers' magnificent progress on the playing fields, he has begun to implement measures necessary to realize his vision of building the LSU athletics department into the best in the country. Bertman's bold and innovative plans promise to keep the Tigers among the nation's elite in all phases of collegiate athletics.

LSU's programs enjoyed remarkable success under Bertman's direction in 2002-03, as 16 of the Tigers' 20 sports participated in NCAA post-season competition. That accomplishment, along with improved graduation rates, increased team grade point averages and the construction of new academic facilities, foreshadow even more significant deeds in Bertman's tenure.

Bertman was named LSU's athletics director on January 19, 2001. With Bertman, LSU gained an athletics director who provides the leadership and experience necessary to manage the Tigers' nearly \$40 million budget.

Bertman guided LSU to five NCAA baseball titles, and his teams drew huge crowds to venerable Alex Box Stadium, as the Tigers led the nation in attendance in each of his final six seasons (1996-2001).

He also served as head coach of the 1996 U.S. Olympic team which captured the bronze medal in Atlanta.

Bertman continues to be honored for his remarkable coaching tenure, as he was inducted in June, 2002, into the Louisiana Sports Hall of Fame. He was inducted into the American Baseball Coaches Association Hall of Fame in January, 2003.

In a *Baseball America* poll released in January, 1999, Bertman was voted the second greatest college baseball coach of the 20th century, trailing only Rod Dedeaux of Southern California. Bertman and Dedeaux are the only coaches to win five CWS titles.

He had previously earned stellar recognition as one of the nation's brightest assistant coaches while at the University of Miami (Fla.) for eight seasons (1976-83). Before working at Miami, Bertman was renowned for his coaching excellence. In 11 seasons at Miami Beach High School, he directed the Hi-Tides to a state championship and two runners-up finishes. He was named Florida's Coach of the Year on three occasions.

In 1975, Bertman coached at Miami-Dade Downtown, leaving after one season to join legendary head coach Ron Fraser at Miami. The move was a homecoming of sorts, as Bertman spent his collegiate playing days with the Hurricanes as an outfielder and catcher from 1958-60. He earned his B.A. in health and physical education from Miami in 1961 and received his master's degree from UM in 1964.

Bertman and his wife Sandy are the parents of four daughters -- Jan, Jodi, Lisa and Lori. The Bertmans have two grandchildren -- Sophie Faith and Isaac Stanley, the children of Emile and Lori Bertman Guirard.
