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When it comes to collegiate tennis, the Southeastern Conference is as good as it gets. SEC member schools remain the most consistently dominant in the NCAA in both men's and women's competition.

In 2004, the SEC sent eight teams to the NCAA Tournament for women's tennis, tying for the most of any conference in attendance. And for the 18th consecutive year, the SEC sent a team to the semifinal round. Vanderbilt earned that spot after defeating Georgia, another SEC school, in the quarterfinal round. The final team rankings featured two SEC schools in the top three with Vanderbilt second and Florida third. In addition, six SEC teams broke into the top 20 and eight teams into the top 35.

The SEC was equally as impressive last year in individual competition. Two women from SEC schools, Aibika Kalsarieva of Kentucky and Audra Falk of Vanderbilt, advanced all the way to the quarterfinals of singles play. The final singles rankings saw an SEC player ranked at No. 2, Alexis Gordon of Florida, the SEC Player of the Year. Falk finished at No. 9, leaving two singles players in the top 10. All together, the SEC placed six women in the top 25 and 12 total in the top 50. The SEC also placed five in the top 25 of the final doubles rankings including the Vanderbilt duo of Aleke Tsoubanos and Kelly Schmandt who made it to the NCAA semifinals at No. 2.

"The SEC is tough. And it's the best. You want to play against the best and coach against the best and we get to do that every time out every year," said LSU head coach Tony Minnis. "It's very intense and there are a lot of good coaches. The conference speaks for itself in how we compete."

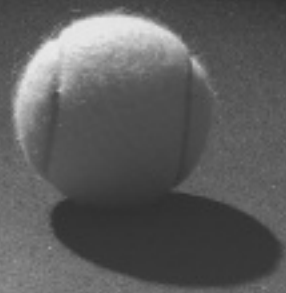

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2005 SEASON PREVIEW



B BACK TO TAME THE WEST

Last year's Lady Tigers tennis team started off the dual-match season ranked at No. 49 and right away faced a great amount of adversity. However, the team was able to fight through some tough situations and work their way to the top.

"Early in the year, we had everything that could go wrong go wrong, and we played under a lot of adverse conditions," coach Tony Minnis said. "We had Amanda Mang, Camila Caliarì

and Rocio Fantilli all get hurt early, and those players just fought through it. To have the winning streak in the latter part of the season that we did against the type of schedule we played is something great, and it says a lot about their determination and focus."

This year's squad hopes to build off that strong finish of last year and make an even stronger impression this year. They begin the season with a No. 23 ranking as the reigning Southeastern Conference Western Division champions.

Five players return from last year, including lone senior Amanda Mang.

"She's been through the wars and she knows what it takes to get to the level where we want to be," Minnis said of Mang.

Four juniors also return in Lauren Seaman, Camila Caliarì, Marina Chiarelli and Daysi Espinal. Newcomers include freshmen Staten Spencer, Tiffany Tucker and Anastasiya Dubova.

"When it's all said and done, this is going to be one of the best classes we've had," Minnis commented. "Tiffany and Staten's potential is unlimited from what I've seen this fall, and Anastasiya will add a lot of fire and intensity to the team."

After a final ITA ranking of No. 20 in 2004, the team knows what it takes to be in the upper echelon of women's collegiate tennis. They know what to expect, and expect only the best in their performance.

"I think last year should have given those that are back a lot of confidence because they know now that they can compete against the top teams in the country," Minnis said. "And the expectations are a lot higher. Until we upset Texas A&M and Kentucky last year, the attitude was less certain. But now that they know, their expectations are a lot higher."

Not only is this team ready physically, but Minnis said this team is one of the strongest in character he has coached.

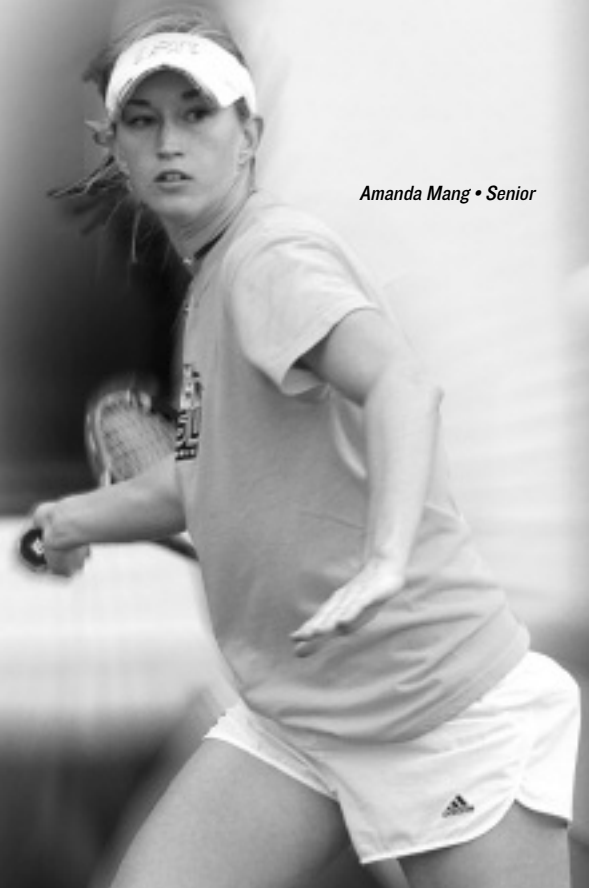
"I'm really excited because this group of players is probably some of the best, especially in their character, that I've had since I've been here," he said. "I just expect them to go out and play hard and compete with the consistency they are capable of."

Just as always, this year's schedule features some very difficult opponents for the Lady Tigers. In SEC play alone, they will face five teams that finished in the Top 25 a year ago.

"Since I've been here, we've tried to establish one of the toughest schedules in the country," Minnis said. "We've done that, and that helps you when you're getting ready for the NCAA Tournament, because every time you step on the court you're having to come with your 'A' game."

"One of the biggest things that helped us last year was having wins over Texas A&M, Tulsa and Florida State. All three of those teams made it to the NCAA Tournament."

The Lady Tigers open the season with two matches at home against in-state foes Centenary and UL-Lafayette. Their remaining non-conference schedule includes road

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matches at Rice, Houston, Texas A&M, Purdue and Tulane and home contests versus Southern, Southeastern, Tulsa and Florida State.

Five of those opponents finished in the top 50 in 2004. Add that to the eight teams other than LSU in the SEC who accomplished that same feat, and the Lady Tigers will face 13 teams this season that finished with top-50 rankings, including No. 2 Vanderbilt and No. 3 Florida.

LSU opens SEC play at home against powerhouse Florida. Other conference teams traveling to W.T. "Dub" Robinson Tennis Stadium include South Carolina, Georgia, Tennessee, Ole Miss and Mississippi State. Road conference games for the Lady Tigers will feature trips to Kentucky, Vanderbilt, Auburn, Alabama and Arkansas.

"Even though the SEC is one of if not the best conference, we still go out and schedule tough non-conference opponents that finish in the Top 25 traditionally," Minnis said. "We're ready to face these teams because we know it will help us prepare for the NCAA Tournament."

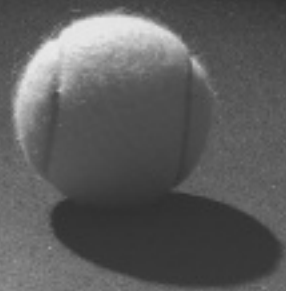

Tony Minnis accomplished a feat last season that not many coaches can claim to have done. He took his 10th consecutive team to the NCAA Tournament.

"Only a few teams have made the tournament that many times, and it's harder than it sounds because you have those years where you have injuries or where things don't go your way," Minnis said.

For this achievement, he was named the 2004 Southwest Regional Coach of the Year for the third time in his career. He is back this year, ready to try for an 11th appearance. He returns five from last year's Southeastern Conference Western Division championship squad and brings in three new members to join the team.

A Baton Rouge native, Minnis returned to his hometown in 1992 to take over the women's tennis team and has long since earned more wins than any other coach in the program's history. In fact, he needs just 16 wins to reach the 200-win career mark.

In 13 seasons as head coach, Minnis has earned a 184-138 overall record. By earning his 80th career victory at LSU in 1997, he passed Phillip Campbell (1984-88) as the winningest women's tennis coach in Tigers history. During the 2002 dual-match season, Minnis earned his 150th career victory with a 5-2 win over Tulsa. The achievement was just another milestone obtained by the talented young coach.

"I don't really think about that much," he said. "One thing I've learned as a player and a coach is to instill in yourself and your team an attitude that when one thing is over you move on to the next. It's nice to know I've had those accomplishments in my career here, but I try to focus on each year."

Minnis came to LSU knowing what it takes to excel in the sport. He was tennis star at Southwestern Louisiana from 1984-88. He served as team captain his freshman and senior seasons and is USL's all-time winningest singles player with an impressive 94-40 career mark.

He followed his playing career with a job as an assistant tennis coach at USL as well as working as the club professional at several tennis clubs in the Lafayette, La., area. But, Minnis said, his LSU experience has taught him the most about the game.

"I've learned a lot over the last 13 years, especially about how very, very important it is to communicate with your players," he said. "I know the roller coasters that come with coaching and I've learned to take them in stride. I have been so fortunate to be in this tremendous environment at LSU, because you get to learn from every single coach here. There are some great coaches and that's the beauty of having an athletic department as good as this one."

With those years of experience and lessons has come a pile of awards and achievements for Minnis and his Lady Tigers

In 2004, Minnis guided the team to a final ITA ranking of No. 20 in a season that included an NCAA Tournament berth, an SEC Western Division Championship and an appearance in the SEC Tournament semifinals. The Lady Tigers lost to the eventual SEC Champions Florida.

During the 2001 campaign, Minnis and the Lady Tigers put together a solid campaign and finished the season with a 14-10 overall record. The squad advanced to the NCAA Tournament and finished the year with a No. 27 national ranking.

Bruna Colosio, who graduated after a record-breaking senior season in 2002, was one of the top five players in the nation and the 2001 SEC Player of the Year. She excelled under Minnis' constant tutelage and received All-America status in both 2000 and 2001.

During an unexpected run at the NCAA Championships in 2000, Minnis led LSU to its second Sweet 16 appearance in school history. The Lady Tigers upset sixth-ranked Pepperdine, 5-4, in the second round of the tournament. The upset is considered the most impressive victory in team history. LSU fell in the Sweet 16 to USC.

In 1999, he was named the Southwest Regional Coach of the Year after reaching the NCAA Tournament for the fifth straight season. The season was supposed to be a rebuilding one, but Minnis led his squad to upset victories over both 10th-ranked Tennessee and 15th-ranked Arkansas on its way to a final ranking of No. 28 in the nation.

In 1997, Minnis was named the SEC Coach of the Year when he led LSU to the regional finals. The Lady Tigers advanced to the championship match of the Southwest regional by beating Texas A&M, 5-0. Minnis was recognized as the Louisiana Coach of the Year for the third time in four years. Senior Suzana Rodrigues finished her career ranked fifth in all-time singles wins at 108-42 overall. She and teammate Laura Olave won the 1996 National Clay Court Doubles title. The tandem earned All-America honors after placing 10th in the final doubles rankings.

LSU posted its highest national ranking ever under Minnis in April of 1995 when the Lady Tigers leapt from No. 30 to No. 15 after upsetting 11th-ranked Tennessee, 5-3, in the opening round of the NCAA Championships. The Lady Tigers fell to eventual NCAA runner-up Florida, 5-0, in round two. Minnis was named the Southwest Region and Louisiana Coach of the Year after guiding the Lady Tigers to their first-ever win at the NCAAs and their first postseason appearance since 1991.

As a player, Minnis competed in the 1988 NCAA Team Championships and was a semifinalist at the NIT Tournament in 1986. He had a 37-6 three-set record in his first three seasons at USL. During his four years there, the Ragin' Cajuns posted a 78-39 overall record and finished each year ranked in the Top 25. In his senior season, USL was ranked 15th in the final polls and advanced to the second round of the NCAA Championships.

Minnis comes from a family loaded with tennis experience. His father, Howard, was the head tennis coach at Southern University for several years and is now a professor there. His sister, Patricia, was a four-year letter winner at LSU from 1988-91. His brother, Patrick, was USL's No. 1 singles player after his departure. Minnis played high school tennis at Redemptorist in Baton Rouge. He graduated from USL in 1988 with a degree in finance and earned an MBA in 1996.

Sandy Sureephong joined the LSU women's tennis coaching staff in the fall of 2001, bringing another dimension of expertise and energy to the program. Her experience as a player on the professional and collegiate level allow her to add to the team's success, but her off-court leadership is just as valuable.

"Sandy brings a lot of focus and confidence to the team," said LSU head coach Tony Minnis. "She's been through what they're hoping to go through and she's been a great role model for our players. They all have a huge amount of respect for her and I think it's because she's not that far removed from competing at this level. She's been a part of some great collegiate teams and she knows what it's like to be consistently ranked among the top 10 teams in the nation." Sureephong agrees. "I think they respect that I played at a high-calibur university that was ranked in the top four consistently until my senior year. I think that I can relate to them a little more on the court and that helps out a lot."

A native of Haines City, Fla., she was a four-time All-American at the University of Texas from 1995-99 and was ranked as high as No. 3 in the nation in singles play. She is currently the third-winningest player in Texas history and finished her career with an overall record of 86-24. Sureephong also played a major role in Texas' run to the Final Four at the 1997 NCAA Team Championships.

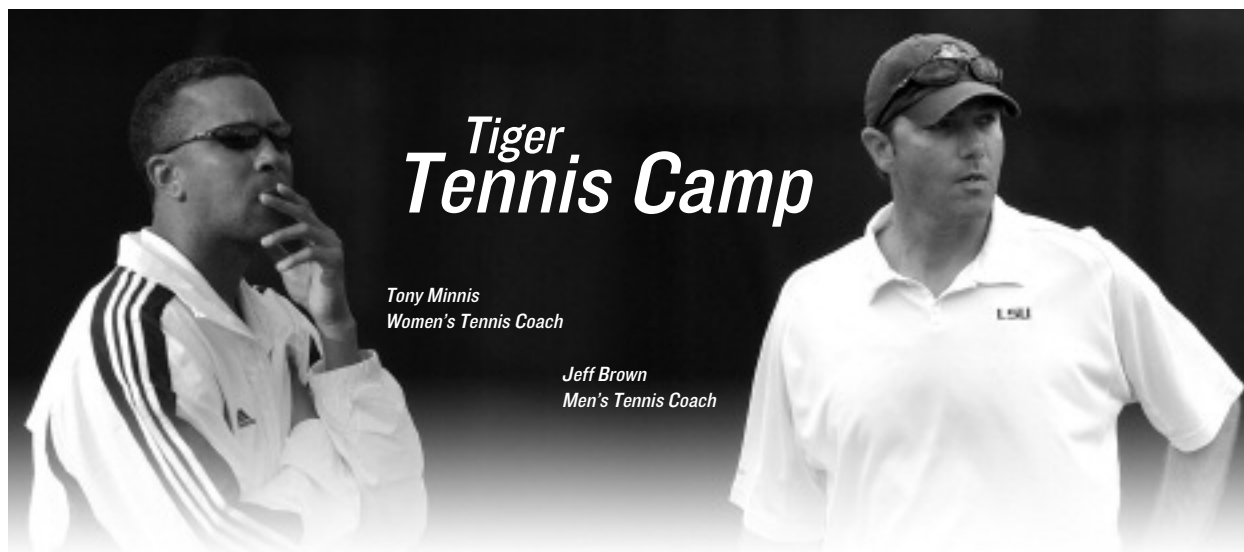
After making history at Texas, Sureephong spent two years playing on the professional circuit. She even recorded victories over both Chanda Rubin and Lindsay Davenport at one point in her career. Sureephong was the 168th-ranked player in the world in doubles play and reached as high as No. 330 in singles.

"Her experiences both as a collegiate athlete and as a pro athlete benefit our team both on and off the court,"

Minnis said. "She's been through the exact things that our girls are going through and she knows what it takes to win and to be the best."

Sureephong earned her bachelor's degree in sports management from the University of Texas' College of Education in December of 1999. She was included on the 1998 fall and 1999 spring Big 12 Conference Commissioner's Honor Roll, received the Texas Women's Athletics 1999 Donna Lopiano/Jean Kaspar Scholarship and earned the 1998 Anne Haskins Grousbeck Scholarship for Academic Accomplishment and Leadership.

2004 REVIEW



Jessica Ferguson led the Lady Tigers as the No. 1 singles player in 2004, ranking as high as 50th individually in the nation.

The Lady Tigers' 2004 season was nothing short of unbelievable. The team that started the season ranked among the lowest teams in the Southeastern Conference mounted a remarkable turnaround at mid-season. The result was a meteoric rise back to national prominence, including a top-20 finish, a Western Division title and the team's 10th consecutive trip to the NCAA Tournament.

It was unbelievable, that is, to everyone but head coach Tony Minnis and his players.

"I felt that the talent was there and I felt that the opportunities were there," Minnis said. "I really wasn't surprised. What did impress me was the competitiveness and determination that the kids showed throughout the season."

The 2004 roster was identical to the year before when the Lady Tigers finished ranked No. 52 in the nation. But it seemed from the beginning of the season that the same eight players could improve tremendously from then.

Minnis said it was that experience that helped return the program to its usual place among the nation's top teams.

"It had a lot to do with maturity and understanding," Minnis said. "Throughout most of the years here we've been

pretty competitive in the Top 25. We had a dip for about a year and a half, so we wanted to create those expectations of getting to the Sweet 16 and the Top 25 again. The kids responded and played some outstanding tennis."

LSU got off to a fast start, winning its first six matches. That streak included wins over four in-state opponents plus big victories against No. 51 Purdue and No. 75 Rice. The Lady Tigers peaked at No. 44 in the national poll before they hit their first bump in the road.

In their first match away from home, LSU suffered a 5-2 loss to an unranked SMU team. Their ranking plummeted to No. 62.

LSU wasn't discouraged. They edged No. 52-ranked Florida State in Tallahassee in their next match. The win was a costly one, however. During her singles match Amanda Mang fell on her wrist. She finished the match, but her injury required surgery and threatened to end her season.

"It was tough, because at the time she was our No. 2 player," Minnis said. "Any time you lose a player of that caliber it can be rough. Once she got injured, it would have been easy to just pack it in. But those kids bonded together."

Still, the road ahead looked bleak for a team who just lost its No. 1 doubles and No. 2 singles player. LSU's next seven matches were all against top-50 teams, five of them in the top 10.

They lost the first four SEC matches they played on the road at No. 2 Florida, Tennessee and the next weekend at No. 2 Georgia and South Carolina.

"When I first looked at the schedule, I knew those were four really strong teams," Minnis said. "We have a really strong schedule every year inside the conference and out. There's always a patch where you play really good teams back-to-back-to-back. But you have to keep your mind on the entire season because you know those matches are coming."

Things seemed to be headed further south in mid March with No. 16 Texas A&M, No. 15 Kentucky and No. 4 Vanderbilt headed to Baton Rouge.

But the Lady Tigers brought that downward spiral to a halt in their mid-week meeting with Texas A&M. The Aggies won a close doubles point, but senior Jessica Ferguson sparked her team with a straight-sets win over No. 21-ranked Jessica Roland on court one. Camila Caliri and Marina Chiarelli brought the match to a tie with wins, allowing senior Rocio Fantilli to clinch a huge win.

Ferguson was named SEC Player of the Week for her role in the win.

The next match was a return to conference play, where the Lady Tigers desperately needed a victory. It again came down to the final team point. Lauren Seaman rallied from an early deficit in her second set. She dominated in the third to win, 5-7, 6-4, 6-1, and clinch the match for LSU. "It was sheer determination," Minnis said.

LSU lost its next match to Vanderbilt, but after that never looked back. Mang made a speedy recovery and returned to the lineup against Ole Miss. The Lady Tigers won their next three matches to set up a showdown with Alabama for the lead in the Western Division.

Ferguson came up big again in the Alabama match, this time clinching the victory with a win over No. 37 Robin Stephenson on court one. The SEC once again named her

the Player of the Week, and she upped her own ranking to No. 50 in the country.

The Lady Tigers solidified their division crown with a win over Arkansas. By the time they arrived in Nashville for the SEC Tournament, they were ranked No. 19 in the nation and were riding a seven-match winning streak. LSU had not won a tournament match since 2000, but that was about to change. They rolled over Arkansas, 4-0. Next was a rematch against Tennessee, who beat them 6-1 earlier in the season.

LSU used two 9-7 wins to clinch the doubles point, but they traded losses in singles to even the score at 3-3, led by Rocio Fantilli's big upset of No. 86 Sabita Maharaj on court two. Seaman was again put on the spot on court five. She split the first two sets with Majen Immink. Seaman was able to outlast her cramping opponent and pick up the 6-3, 6-7, 7-6 win, her eighth victory in a row. Five hours after the match began, LSU clinched the win and moved into the tournament semifinals.

No. 2-ranked Florida broke LSU's winning streak in the next match.

The Lady Tigers returned home to face Tulane. They lost for the first time in 10 years to an in-state opponent to the No. 12-ranked Green Wave.

LSU just missed the chance to host the first two rounds of the NCAA Tournament, and instead traveled to Austin, Texas, to face Arizona State in the first round.

It was the Lady Tigers' turn to be upset by the No. 44-ranked Sun Devils. LSU lost the doubles point and could not recover in singles.

"We were close to hosting the tournament," Minnis said. "We didn't bring the style of play and the competitiveness we used to put ourselves in that position to the tournament."

"Arizona State played in the strong Pac-10 and lost a lot of tight matches. It's partly my fault, because I don't know if I got across how good Arizona State was. They ended up not only beating us, but beating Texas even worse and almost making it to the tournament quarterfinals."

Ferguson's season continued for one more match in the NCAA Singles Championships. She lost there in the first round against No. 30-ranked Nataly Cahana of Old Dominion.

Minnis and his squad made an impression on themselves and their opponents in 2004. It was one that he knew they could make, and now he thinks the belief in themselves will carry over to this year.

"The biggest thing with this team, and I think it will carry over to this year, is once they saw they were capable of beating top-ranked teams they gained the confidence to know they should be doing that," Minnis said.

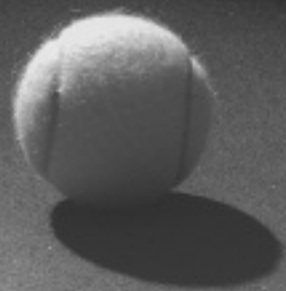

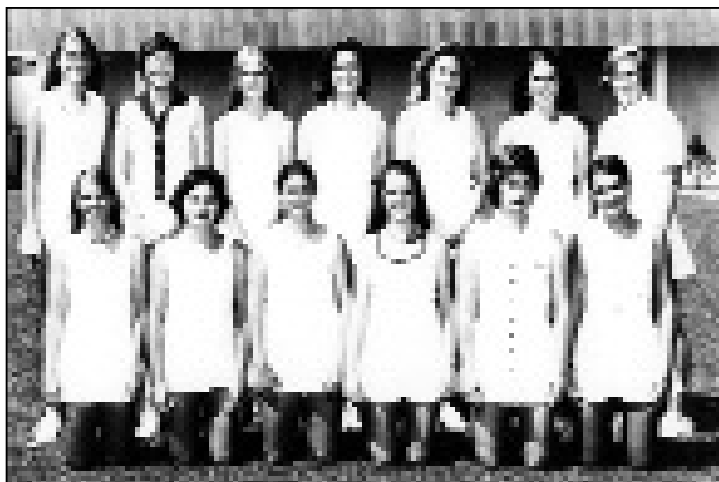

1976 LADY TIGERS: INAUGURAL SEASON

A TRADITION OF EXCELLENCE

Lady Tigers Program History

In the fall of 1973 the Lady Tigers tennis team was formed as a club sport with Pat Newman as head coach and Jay McCreary as the Coordinator of Club Sports. The fledgling program began with eight players who bought their own racquets and balls. It has since developed into a national collegiate tennis power over the decades. From the early days of limited schedules and funding, the Lady Tigers have come a long way, becoming a dominant tennis power in the state of Louisiana and making its presence known regionally and nationally.

In the 1974-75 season, the Lady Tigers signed their first collegiate player on an athletic scholarship, acquiring Ann Ellis from Houston, Texas. Next was Karen McCarter, a walk-on from a big tennis family in Shreveport, La. The following year, Kay McDaniel, another Shreveport product, and Elizabeth Palfrey of Baton Rouge joined the Lady Tiger family and LSU was on its way to becoming a national power, finishing in the top 20 in the nation for the first time.

The Lady Tigers experienced an outstanding recruiting season in 1976-77, signing the No. 1-ranked player in the South in Ebie Taylor of Mobile, Ala. From Texas came two outstanding players in Lisa Boettcher of Pasadena and Carol Reger of Fort Worth. With those players, LSU won the state championship, placed in the top 10 in nationals and produced the first Lady Tiger All-Americans in tennis, Kay McDaniel and Ebie Taylor.

The program has continued to escalate, including finishing in the top 30 in the final rankings nine times since the 1990s.

A ALL-AMERICANS

In its 29-year history, the LSU women's tennis program has produced an All-American eight times. Only three years after the official inaugural season, two Lady Tigers were named All-Americans in 1978 in Ebie Taylor and Kay McDaniel, Nos. 2 and 12 on the all-time wins list at LSU, respectively. Then 16 years later, the next selection came in the form of Suzana Rodrigues. Fifth on the list of all-time wins, Rodrigues earned All-America honors as a freshman in 1994 and then again as a senior in 1997. Also in 1997, Lady Tiger Laura Olave joined her on that list. Two Lady Tigers were dubbed All-Americans in the same year again in 2000 with Bruna Colosio and Ana Paula Mores. Fittingly, they each ended their careers with the same number of match wins, 97, which places them in a tie for eighth on the all-time wins list. Colosio was named an All-American again in 2001, rounding out LSU's selections among the upper echelon of collegiate women's tennis.

K KAY McDANIEL

Earlier this fall, the United States Tennis Association Tennessee Hall of Fame named former LSU tennis All-American Kay McDaniel to its list of 2005 inductees. She was honored at a banquet Feb. 5 at the Nashville Marriott in Nashville, Tenn.

McDaniel, who played for LSU from 1975-79, racked up 92 wins in a Lady Tigers uniform, a number that places her 12th on the list of all-time winningest players in LSU women's tennis history. She is also third on the list of match wins in a single season with 43 in 1977-78. McDaniel became the first LSU women's tennis All-America selection along with Ebie Taylor in 1978, a year that saw the Lady Tigers go 19-5 and earn the title of Louisiana AIAW Champion.

She next toured the professional courts from 1980-86, competing against such players as Billie Jean King, Chris Evert, Martina Navratilova and Steffi Graf. She once ranked as high as No. 30 in singles (1983) and No. 20 in doubles (1986).

1976 LADY TIGERS

Overall Record: 11-5 *Inaugural Season* • Louisiana AIAW Champions • 14th USTA Nationals

LSU won nine of its last 11 matches, including five straight to end its inaugural campaign en route to the Louisiana AIAW Championship. The Lady Tigers opened the season with a 9-0 win over Northwestern State and went on to outscore its opponents 107-37. LSU finished 14th at the USTA Nationals.

1978 LADY TIGERS

Overall Record: 19-5 • Louisiana AIAW Champions

Former head coach Pat Newman guided LSU to its third consecutive state AIAW title in as many seasons. Lady Tiger standouts Kay McDaniel and Ebie Taylor became LSU's first ever All-Americans, earning the prestigious honor after leading the team to a 10th-place finish at the AIAW National Championships. The '78 squad holds the record for most consecutive wins in a season with 12 in a row.

1979 LADY TIGERS

Overall Record: 22-10 • Louisiana AIAW Runner-up

After claiming three straight Louisiana AIAW titles, LSU earned its best at 22-10 but fell shy of its fourth straight title. The Lady Tigers lost, 7-2, to Northeast La. in the finals. LSU won eight straight matches to start the season and 16 of 18 down the stretch. In four seasons, LSU dominated its in-state rivals 26-2, with its only blemish being dual losses to NLU during the '79 season.

1985 LADY TIGERS

Overall Record: 19-7 • SEC Runner-up

LSU's most prolific women's tennis duo, twin sisters Dana De and De Ann Watlington, showcased their outstanding talent by leading an experienced Lady Tiger squad to a second-place finish in the SEC behind Florida. LSU won nine of its final 10 matches of the season under coach Philip Campbell.

1991 LADY TIGERS

Overall Record: 19-6 • NCAA Final 20 • Final Rank: (t)No. 18

The Lady Tigers advanced to the NCAA Championships for the first time in school history, compiling a 19-6 record and finishing third in the SEC. LSU dropped a hard-fought 5-3 decision to Indiana in the opening round at the NAAs, finishing at No. 18 in the nation.

1992 LADY TIGERS

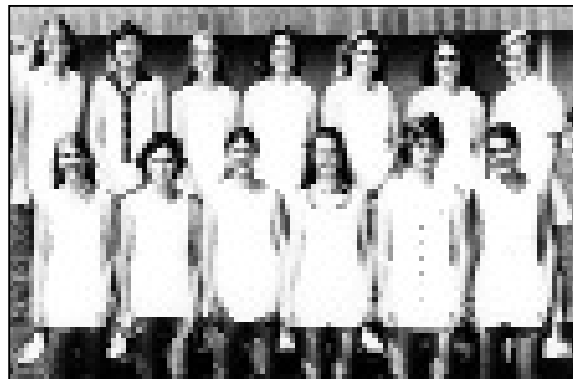

The Lady Tigers opened the year with a perfect 5-0 mark, upset No. 10 Miami (Fla.) and beat No. 20 Kentucky in a season in which they finished ranked at No. 21 in the nation. Vikki Chambers and Sarah Stewart became the first doubles team in Lady Tiger history to play in the NCAA doubles tournament.

Overall Record: 19-8 • NCAA Final 16 • Final Rank: No. 18

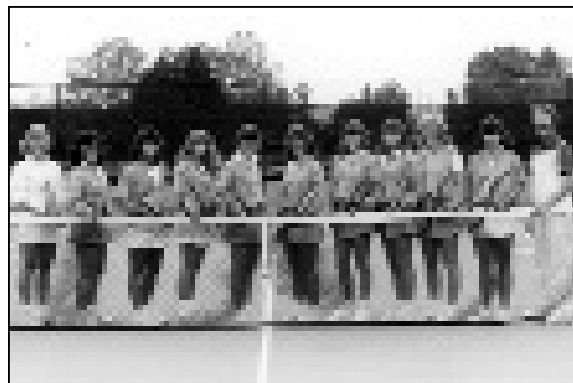

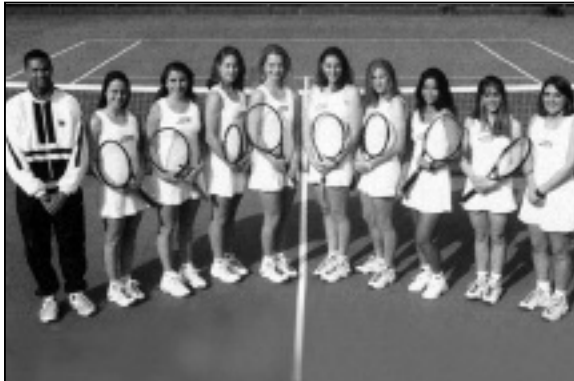

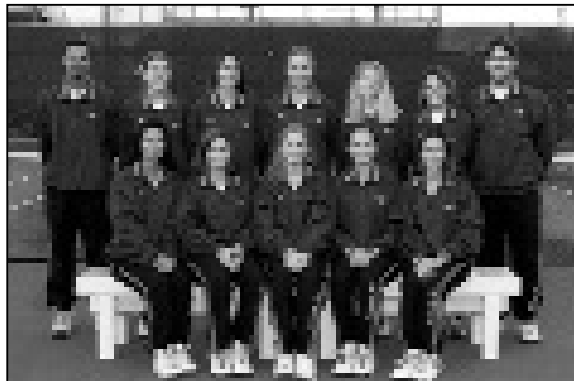

1997 LADY TIGERS

Overall Record: 18-9 • NCAA SW Regional Finalists • Final Rank: No. 20

The Lady Tigers enjoyed another stellar campaign, charting numerous athletic and academic honors en route to an 18-9 mark and a national top-20 finish. LSU fell just short of the NCAA Championships with a 5-2 loss to Tennessee in the NCAA Southwest Regional final. Tony Minnis became LSU's winningest coach and was named both SEC and Louisiana Coach of the Year. Three-time All-American Suzana Rodrigues said farewell in 1997 as the highly successful four-year star ended her collegiate career in record fashion.

1998 LADY TIGERS

Overall Record: 15-10 • NCAA SW Regional Finalists • Final Rank: No. 26

LSU overcame injuries to two of its top players, Laura Olave and Ana Paula Mores, to qualify for the fourth consecutive year and play host to the NCAA Southwest Regional Championships. After making the final for the second consecutive season, the Lady Tigers were defeated by top-seeded Arkansas, 5-2, to end an impressive run against all odds. Before being upended by the Lady Razorbacks, the Lady Tigers knocked off Baylor and second-seeded Miami (Fla.). Three Lady Tigers seniors, Laura Olave, Jennifer Barr and Jamie Vallotton, bowed out by finishing their careers in Baton Rouge.

1999 LADY TIGERS

Overall Record: 13-11 • NCAA Championship Qualifiers • Final Rank: No. 28

LSU finished the 1998-99 season strong despite having only one senior and two freshmen in the starting lineup. Under the leadership of lone senior Nikki Rasheed, the team concluded the season ranked No. 28. Head coach Tony Minnis led the Lady Tigers to their fifth consecutive NCAA post-season appearance, in which they advanced to the second round. Freshmen Bruna Colosio and Tami Botts stepped up for the team, combining for a 31-27 dual-match record. Colosio finished the season ranked 45th in the nation.

2000 LADY TIGERS

Overall Record: 16-11 • NCAA Sweet 16 • Final Rank: No. 21

The Lady Tigers accomplished two amazing feats during the 2000 dual-match season. In the second round of the NCAA tournament, No. 32 LSU upset the sixth-ranked Pepperdine Waves, 5-4, on their home court in Malibu, Calif., to advance to the Sweet 16. The biggest upset in school history allowed the 2000 Lady Tigers to become the second LSU women's tennis team to reach the quarterfinal round. The Lady Tigers were led by their lone senior, Ana Paula Mores, and sophomore Bruna Colosio. Colosio ended the season as the sixth ranked singles player in the nation, while Mores ended her illustrious four-year career with 97 singles wins and a No. 75 national ranking. As a doubles team, the pair finished the 2000 campaign ranked No. 4.

2004 LADY TIGERS

Overall Record: 18-9 • NCAA First Round • Final Rank: No. 20

For the 10th consecutive season, Tony Minnis led the Lady Tigers to an NCAA Tournament berth. Senior Jessica Ferguson finished the season ranked at No. 57 in the nation in leading the team to an SEC West title. The Lady Tigers upset Tennessee in the SEC Tournament to advance to the semifinals before falling to top-seeded Florida. Minnis was named the Southwest Region Coach of the year for the third time as the Tigers finished at No. 20 in the nation.

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Strong supporters of education throughout the state have provided resources for a variety of innovative projects that are attracting world-class researchers and their expertise to LSU. The National Flagship Agenda is working to improve the standing of the University, as well as strengthen its position as an economic engine for the state of Louisiana. As a result, the University community is even more determined to achieve excellence at every level.

LSU remains firmly focused on attaining national flagship status by 2010, the University's 150th anniversary. The resolve of the LSU community and the support of the state make these goals attainable. And, if the last five years are any indication of success, the next phase of this agenda will guarantee LSU's place in the arena of national prominence.

Because of its designation as a doctoral/research university by the Carnegie Foundation, LSU ranks in the top 2 percent of the nation's colleges and universities. This designation is shared by only 59 public and 29 private universities across the nation. LSU is also one of only 25 universities nationwide designated as both a land-grant and sea-grant college.

History and tradition began with LSU's founding in 1853 by the General Assembly of Louisiana as the Louisiana State Seminary of Learning and Military

Academy near Pineville, Louisiana. The institution opened January 2, 1860. When the Civil War began, the school's first superintendent, William Tecumseh Sherman, resigned to assume a command in the Union Army. The seminary reopened in 1869, but was soon destroyed by fire. The institution moved to Baton Rouge, opening on Nov. 1, 1869.

In 1870, the Seminary was renamed Louisiana State University. In 1874, under the United States Morrill Act, the Louisiana State Agricultural & Mechanical College was established in New Orleans. The two institutions were merged by the Legislature in 1877 to become Louisiana State University and Agricultural & Mechanical College.

Construction on the present campus began in 1922 and the first classes were held in 1926. LSU experienced major growth in the 1930s and 1940s, expanding its student body, curricula, and services. During the 1960s, the University began to place increasing emphasis on research.

Recognizing the importance and extent of statewide agricultural activities of units in the LSU System, the LSU Board of Supervisors established the Center for Agricultural Sciences & Rural Development in 1972. This unit was renamed the LSU Agricultural Center in 1982. Components of the LSU Agricultural Center include the Louisiana Agricultural Experiment Station,

the Louisiana Cooperative Extension Service and International Programs.

The primary mission of the LSU Agricultural Center is to conduct research in agricultural and natural resource development and to provide off-campus extension education that disseminates technological, economic, and management information to Louisiana residents.

In 1977, the Paul M. Hebert Law Center, established as the LSU Law School in 1906, was made an autonomous division of the LSU System. The Law Center provides legal education characterized by an unyielding demand for academic excellence. Its unique curriculum, based on civil law as well as substantial elements of common law, provides law graduates with qualifications and training for not one, but two legal systems. The Hebert Law Center holds membership in the Association of Law Schools and is on the approved list of the American Bar Association.

LSU, located on more than 2,000 acres in the southern part of Baton Rouge, Louisiana, is bordered on the west by the Mississippi River. The University's more than 250 principal buildings are grouped on a 650-acre plateau that constitutes the main part of the campus.

LSU and A&M College is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools.

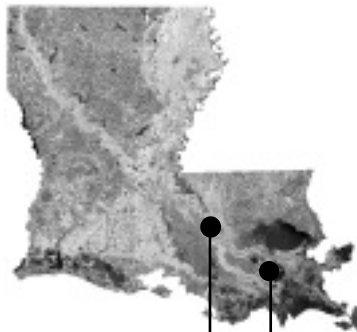

(BASED ON 70 MPH SPEED):

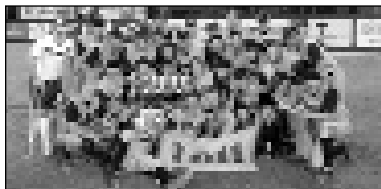
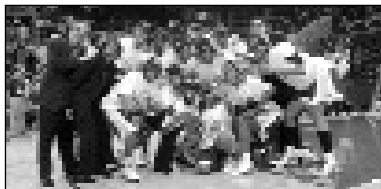

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2003-2004 LSU ATHLETICS

A CHAMPIONSHIP SEASON

LSU enjoyed perhaps its best all-around athletics season ever in 2003-04 as the Tigers claimed three national championships, including the 2003 BCS National Title in football, the first on the gridiron for the school since 1958.

Pat Henry's men's and women's indoor track and field teams became the first program in NCAA history to sweep the national titles at the NCAA Indoor Meet, claiming the school's 42nd and 43rd national championships.

The Lady Tiger basketball team advanced to the Women's Final Four for the first time in school history, while the softball team made its second trip to the Women's College World Series. Smoke Laval led the Tiger baseball team to the College World Series for the second straight year and the 13th time overall.

In all, LSU had nine of its team finish the season ranked among the top 10 in the nation, while 14 of LSU's 20 teams were ranked in the top 25.

In addition to its success on the field of play, the Tigers also had four student-athletes earn Academic All-America honors with another 107 being named to the SEC Academic Honor Roll for the year.

Tiger fans again turned out in record numbers as over 1.2 fans filled LSU stadiums and arenas in 2003-04. The Tiger baseball team led the nation in attendance for the ninth time, while LSU's football team averaged a school-record 90,974 fans per game, a figure that ranked sixth nationally.

LSU's success athletically coupled with its academic achievement made the 2003-04 season one of the best in the history of Tiger athletics.

All-Sports Success

LSU's athletics program has traditionally been strong throughout all of its varsity sports and has fielded nationally competitive teams in most of its sports.

A total of 18 of LSU's 20 athletic teams participated in NCAA postseason play last year with 14 of the sports finishing the year ranked among the top 25 in the nation. LSU had nine of its team ranked in the top 10 for their respective sports last year.

LSU ranked No. 11 in the nation in the United States Sports Academy Directors' Cup for the 2003-04 season.

In all, LSU has won an SEC-leading 43 national titles, including three during the 2003-04 year. In addition, LSU ran its all-time SEC titles to 105 by winning conference championships in football and softball in 2003-04.

Athletics as a Business

Athletics is mistakenly thought of as merely entertainment. In fact, the total revenues of over \$37.5 million generated annually by the Athletic Department is:

- twice that of the sales of an average manufacturing plant in Louisiana
- twice the volume of an average food processor
- about seven times more than the typical apparel plant in the state

Attendance

LSU teams draw some of the largest crowds in all of college athletics:

- More than 1.2 million fans watched LSU athletics in all 20 sports during the 2003-04 athletic year.
- Since 1957, LSU has averaged over 74,000 fans a contest in football, including over 90,000 for the past three seasons.
- In 2003, LSU football set a school-

record by averaging 90,974 fans a contest, a number that ranked sixth nationally. The 90,974 average per game, made Tiger Stadium more populated than 51 of Louisiana's 64 parishes.

- LSU baseball set the standard in college baseball for attendance again in 2004 as more than 291,000 fans watched the Tigers play at Alex Box Stadium in regular and postseason play.

CHAMPS Program

LSU sponsors a fully funded life skills program for student-athletes. The program is called CHAMPS, an acronym for Challenging Athletes Minds for Personal Success. Under the CHAMPS program, LSU sets up a number of projects and workshops that aid student-athletes in addressing day-to-day living situations, handling stress and preparing for post-college life.

Under the CHAMPS program, LSU also establishes community service projects in which student-athletes organize and participate. The LSU CHAMPS program sponsors an annual Halloween "Boo-Zar" on campus. The boozar is a trick-or-treat night in the LSU Field House in which athletes from all sports distribute candy to Baton Rouge area children. Each athletic team participates in CHAMPS workshops, which educate them in life skills and personal development.

Community Involvement

Because of the athletic facilities on the LSU campus, Baton Rouge is able to attract many events and conventions that benefit the community in both public relations and monetary means. LSU has played host to such events as the National Sports Festival

(now called the Olympic Festival) and the International Special Olympics. In 2001, LSU hosted the U.S. Senior Olympics and in the past has played host to the U.S. Junior National Track & Field Championships.

The LSU campus is annually the site of the LHSAA Track & Field Championships as well as the Louisiana High School All-Star Games, bringing to campus thousands of young people and their parents. Most recently, LSU hosted the 2002 NCAA Outdoor Track & Field Championships at Bernie Moore Stadium.

Economic Impact

LSU has a tremendous impact on the economy of the Baton Rouge area. LSU sporting events bring money into the Baton Rouge economy, not only from throughout the state, but throughout the southeast.

According to a study by LSU economics professor Loren Scott, the existence of LSU Athletics generates \$131 million in sales for businesses in the Baton Rouge community, another \$40 million in household earnings and supports over 2,100 jobs in the Baton Rouge area.

Finances

The LSU Athletic Department is a totally self-sufficient auxiliary of the University. No state tax dollars are used to finance LSU athletics. All money spent by the Athletic Department is generated by the department through ticket sales, corporate sponsorships, radio and television revenue, the Tiger Gift Center and concessions, and is supplemented through revenue-sharing resulting from LSU's membership in the Southeastern Conference.

Individual Athletes

Year in and year out, LSU boasts some of the most renowned athletes in all of college athletics.

Former NBA Most Valuable Player and worldwide entertainment superstar Shaquille O'Neal delighted Tiger basketball fans for three seasons. Former PGA Champion David Toms played for the Tigers in the late 1980s, while Major League Baseball standouts Todd Walker and Paul Byrd learned their trade at Alex Box Stadium. Four former LSU football players were members of the 2004 NFL Super Bowl Champions New England Patriots.

Sometimes overlooked are some of the finest female athletes in the country in their respective sports: golfer Meredith Duncan, softball All-American Britni Sneed, women's basketball All-American Marie Ferdinand, and track superstar Muna Lee have dazzled LSU fans in recent years.

Job Placement

Is there life after college athletics? LSU is helping to answer that question with a job placement program as part of the Ninth Semester Program. LSU works closely with the Career Placement Center on campus as well as professional recruiting services to offer advice to athletes on entering the job market upon graduation.

National Awards

LSU has had one winner each of the Heisman Trophy, Adolph Rupp Award and Golden Spikes Award, the premier individual awards in football, basketball and baseball. The Heisman Trophy, given annually to college football's best player, was won by Billy Cannon in 1959. The Adolph Rupp Award, which goes to college basketball's top player, was won by Shaquille O'Neal in 1991. The Golden Spikes Award, given to college baseball's most outstanding player each year, was won by Ben McDonald in 1989. In 2001, Josh Reed added his name to the list as he claimed the Biletznikoff Award, which goes annually to the nation's top receiver.

National Championships

LSU has won 43 national titles in its athletic history, the most of any school in the SEC. Most recently, the Tigers claimed three national titles during the 2003-04 season with championships being brought back to Baton Rouge in football and men's and women's indoor track and field.

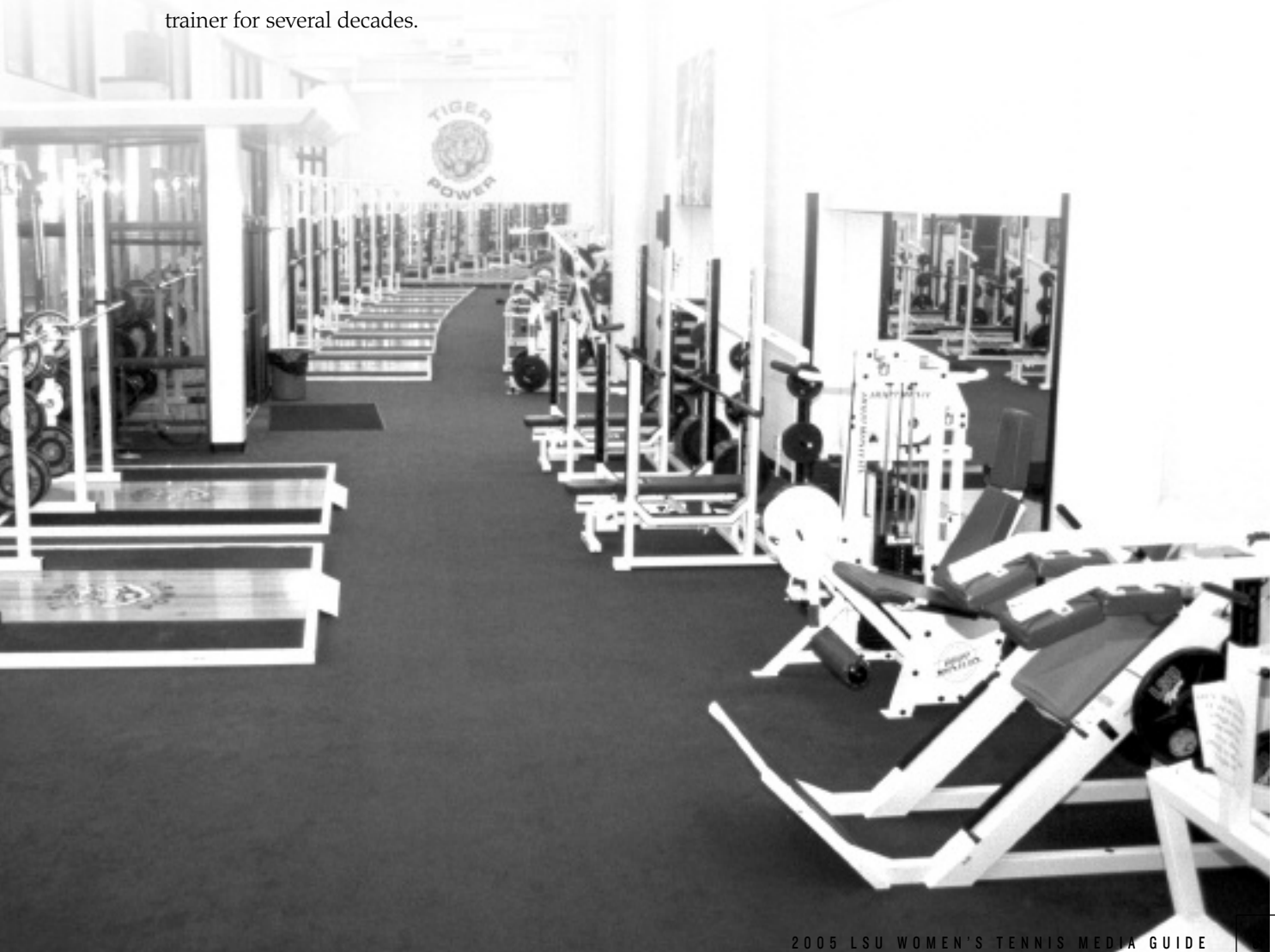
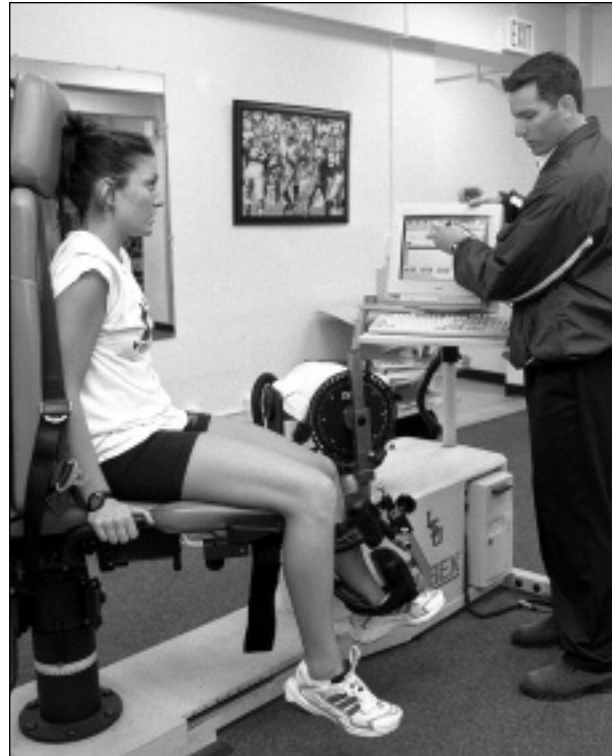
University Involvement

LSU continues to produce profits in its athletic department, despite generally difficult economic times for college athletic programs.

Athletics has contributed over \$10 million to the academic side of the university in the past 13 years. In 1994-95, athletics contributed \$100,000 to the LSU Libraries to assist in buying books and other materials necessary to keep LSU's library system among the finest in the nation, and in 1996 generated over \$30,000 by dedicating all ticket sales from the Spring Football Game to the libraries. Most recently, the LSU athletic department purchased new uniforms for the Tiger Marching Band, which will be on display for the first time during the 2004 football season.

After the 1988-89 fiscal year, LSU Athletics donated \$2 million to the general fund of the university to help offset projected losses. LSU Athletics has also donated sizeable amounts of money to fund professorships and provide for repairs in academic facilities.

LSU boasts the largest and most complete athletic training facility in all of collegiate athletics. Focused on aggressive rehabilitation, the Broussard Center for Athletic Training is furnished with the latest in technology and equipment. Some of the features of the 23,000-square foot facility include an on-site x-ray room, an in-house pharmacy, as well as state of the art hydrotherapy pools. The Broussard Center for Athletic Training is equipped with the largest hydrotherapy pools in both collegiate and professional sports and is one of the few collegiate training centers with a full-service pharmacy, as well as on-site x-ray room. LSU is also the only school in college athletics with a training room equipped with a full-service vision center. The facility is named in honor of legendary trainer Dr. Martin J. Broussard, who served as LSU's athletic trainer for several decades.



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Sean O'Keefe

Chancellor, LSU



Sean O'Keefe has been appointed chancellor of Louisiana State University and Agricultural & Mechanical College, becoming the seventh chancellor to lead the state's flagship University.

Nominated by President George W. Bush and confirmed by the United States Senate, Sean O'Keefe was appointed by the President as the 10th Administrator of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration on December 21, 2001, his fourth Presidential appointment. As Administrator, O'Keefe leads the NASA team and manages its resources as NASA seeks to advance exploration and discovery in aeronautics and space technologies.

O'Keefe joined the Bush Administration on inauguration day and first served as the Deputy Director of the Office of Management and Budget until December 2001, overseeing the preparation, management and administration of the Federal budget and government wide-management initiatives across the Executive Branch.

Prior to joining the Bush Administration, O'Keefe was the Louis A. Bantle Professor of Business and Government Policy, an endowed chair at the Syracuse University Maxwell School of Citizenship and Public Affairs. He also served as the Director of National Security Studies, a partnership of Syracuse University and Johns Hopkins University, for delivery of executive education programs for senior military and civilian officials. Appointed to these positions in 1996, he was previously Professor of Business Administration and Assistant to the Senior Vice President for Research and Dean of the Graduate School at the Pennsylvania State University.

Appointed as the Secretary of the Navy in July 1992 by President George Bush, O'Keefe had previously served as Comptroller and Chief Financial Officer of the Department of Defense since 1989. Before joining then Defense Secretary Dick Cheney's Pentagon management team in these capacities, he served on the United States Senate Committee on Appropriations staff for eight years, and was Staff Director of the Defense Appropriations Subcommittee. His public service began in 1978 upon selection as a Presidential Management Intern.

O'Keefe is a Fellow of the National Academy of Public Administration, a member of the Committee on Climate Change Science and Technology, and a Fellow of the International Academy of Astronautics. During his academic postings, he was a Visiting Scholar at the Wolfson College of the University of Cambridge in the United Kingdom, a member of the Naval Postgraduate School's civil-military relations seminar team, and conducted seminars for the Strategic Studies Group at Oxford University. He served on the national security panel to devise the 1988 Republican platform and was a member of the 1985 Kennedy School of Government program for national security executives at Harvard University.

In 1993, President Bush and Secretary Cheney presented him the Distinguished Public Service Award. He was the 1999 faculty recipient of the Syracuse University Chancellor's Award for Public Service; recipient of the Department of the Navy's Public Service Award in December 2000; and has been awarded honorary doctorate degrees from several prestigious educational institutions. In March 2003 and 2004, he was recognized and honored by the Irish American Magazine as one of the Top 100 Irish Americans.

He is the author of several journal articles, contributing author of "Keeping the Edge: Managing Defense for the Future" released in October 2000, and in 1998, co-authored "The Defense Industry in the Post-Cold War Era: Corporate Strategies and Public Policy Perspectives."

Sean O'Keefe earned his Bachelor of Arts in 1977 from Loyola University in New Orleans, Louisiana, and his Master of Public Administration degree in 1978 from The Maxwell School. O'Keefe and his wife Laura have three children—Lindsey, Jonathan and Kevin.

Already a Louisiana Legend and one of the greatest college baseball coaches of all time, J. Stanley "Skip" Bertman has made the seamless transition into the athletics director's chair with the same enthusiasm, vision and demand for excellence that were trademarks of his stellar coaching career.

In just three years as LSU's director of athletics, Bertman has already added to his impressive list of on-the-field achievements. Under his direction, LSU enjoyed arguably the greatest athletics year in the history of the institution in 2003-04. Three teams won national championships, nine teams finished in the nation's top ten, and fourteen teams ranked in the top 25. LSU teams also enjoyed improved grade point averages across the board, making the LSU student-athlete experience a success on and off the fields of competition.

While supervising the Tigers' progress on the playing fields, he has begun to implement measures necessary to realize his vision of building the LSU athletics department into the best in the country. Bertman's bold and innovative plans promise to keep the Tigers among the nation's elite in all phases of collegiate athletics.

Bertman is now in the midst of upgrading LSU's athletics complex. Working hand in hand with the Tiger Athletic Foundation, Bertman has already overseen the completion of the Cox Communications Academic Center for Student-Athletes while launching renovations to Tiger Stadium and the Pete Maravich Assembly Center, and beginning construction on a new Football Operations Center.

It was also Bertman who took the bold but essential move to implement a seat contribution program in Tiger Stadium to fund facility improvements and ensure the financial stability of the LSU Athletics Department for the next decade.

Bertman was named LSU's athletics director on January 19, 2001. With Bertman, LSU gained an athletics director who provides the leadership and experience necessary to manage the Tigers' \$52 million budget.

Bertman guided LSU to five NCAA baseball titles, and his teams drew huge crowds to venerable Alex Box Stadium, as the Tigers led the nation in attendance in each of his final six seasons (1996-2001).

He also served as head coach of the 1996 U.S. Olympic team which captured the bronze medal in Atlanta.

Bertman continues to be honored for his remarkable coaching tenure, as he was inducted in June, 2002, into the Louisiana Sports Hall of Fame. He was inducted into the American Baseball Coaches Association Hall of Fame in January, 2003.

In a *Baseball America* poll published in 1999, Bertman was voted the second greatest college baseball coach of the 20th century, trailing only Rod Dedeaux of Southern California. Bertman and Dedeaux are the only coaches to win five CWS titles.

He had previously earned recognition as one of the nation's brightest assistant coaches while at the University of Miami (Fla.) for eight seasons (1976-83). Before working at Miami, Bertman was renowned for his coaching excellence. In 11 seasons at Miami Beach High School, he directed the Hi-Tides to a state championship and two runners-up finishes and he was named Florida's Coach of the Year on three occasions.

In 1975, Bertman coached at Miami-Dade Downtown, leaving after one season to join legendary head coach Ron Fraser at Miami. The move was a homecoming of sorts, as Bertman spent his collegiate playing days with the Hurricanes as an outfielder and catcher from 1958-60. He earned his B.A. in health and physical education from Miami in 1961 and received his master's degree from UM in 1964.

Bertman and his wife Sandy are the parents of four daughters - Jan, Jodi, Lisa and Lori. The Bertmans have three grandchildren -- Sophie Faith and Isaac Stanley, the children of Emile and Lori Bertman Guirard, and Samuel Aaron, the son of Drew and Lisa Pate.
