Since 1970, the W.T. Robinson Tennis Stadium has been the home of the LSU tennis program. The "Dub", as it is affectionately referred to, has also undergone numerous renovations and improvements to keep up with collegiate tennis facilities across the nation.

Both the nationally ranked Tigers and Lady Tigers enjoy state-of-the-art locker rooms, a squad room, and brand new showers and bathrooms. The "Dub" was totally refurbished after the 2002 season to include a media room, an equipment room and a ground-floor viewing area for handicapped tennis fans.

Robinson Stadium, named in honor of LSU's former winningest tennis coach, was completed in 1970 and is the site of the Tigers' and Lady Tigers' home outdoor matches. It features six varsity courts and six practice courts. The varsity courts were resurfaced prior to the 2002-03 academic school year, while the six practice courts received new surfaces in the spring of 2001 as a part of the facilities makeover. The varsity courts feature an electronic scoreboard and can accommodate up to 550 spectators.

Since Tony Minnis took over the LSU women's tennis program, the Lady Tigers have accumulated a 126-49 overall record at home. Their best season there came in 2000, where the Lady Tigers remained perfect at home throughout the season. They advanced all the way to the NCAA Tournament Sweet 16 that year as well. LSU has only had one losing season at home since 1992 with the rest of the years producing above-.500 marks.

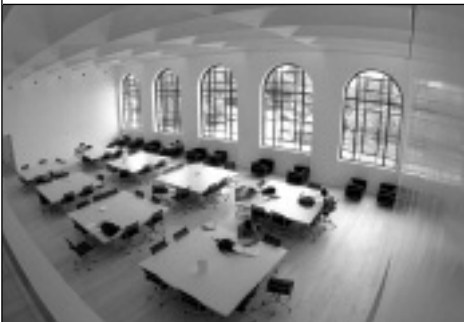
### Computer Stations

Throughout the Academic Center are 75 computer stations, providing student-athletes with a quiet working environment for research, writing and studying.



### Bo Campbell Auditorium

The 1,000-seat auditorium is used through the year as a classroom and lecture hall. Each seat in the auditorium has space for a laptop and a modern hookup, providing each student unlimited learning opportunities. The auditorium also contains a movie theatre-size screen to aid professors with lectures and classroom activities.



### The Library

The library provides a perfect setting for individual study, or with a tutor as a group.

### Study Area

Included in the 54,000 square feet of the Academic Center are individual study areas as well as 14 private computer rooms for student-athletes to work one-on-one with tutors or by themselves.



## COMMUNICATIONS LAB



**A**long with the success of the LSU Women's Tennis team comes a great deal of media attention and Dr. Tommy Karam, the Director of the Communications Lab, uses his facility, located on the fourth floor of the Cox Communications Academic Center for Student Athletes, to work with LSU student-athletes on their interactions with the media and interview skills. Karam's lab is a mock press conference setting to get the student-athletes used to handling themselves in front of both print and electronic media. He videotapes the mock interview sessions and reviews these with the student-athletes to help them become more comfortable in an interview setting. Karam also helps the LSU players get prepared for a professional career by working closely with those players on the interview process.



### Lights, Camera, Answer

Dr. Karam teaches LSU's student-athletes to interact with all phases of local and national media by working one-on-one in a press conference setting. The Communications Lab includes a working camera for Karam to review the session with the student-athletes.

# A Champions



The 2004-05 athletics year was another wonderful year for LSU. The Tigers and Lady Tigers enjoyed success from the fields and courts to the classroom. All in all it was an exciting year for LSU's student-athletes, coaches and fans.

#### Postseason Presence

Of LSU's 20 sports, 14 teams advanced to postseason play. Among the highlights: the football team advanced to a New Year's bowl game for the fourth straight year ... the women's basketball team won the SEC title and reached the Final Four for the second straight season ... the men's outdoor track & field team finished No. 3 in the country ... and the men's tennis team reached the NCAA Sweet Sixteen ... LSU was one of only four schools in the country to send its football team to a New Year's Bowl game and both of its basketball teams to the NCAA Tournament.



## In the Classroom

Seven of 16 sports posted a team grade point average of 3.0 or higher, and 13 of the 16 were above 2.8, with women's tennis leading the way with a team GPA of 3.40.

**50%**

Nearly 50 percent of the student-athletes - 48.5 percent to be exact - recorded a grade point average of 3.0 or higher. A total of 79 had a GPA of 3.5 or higher and 22 Tigers had a perfect 4.0 GPA in the spring semester.

Four Tigers - Chelsea Agar in soccer, Brandon Bass in men's basketball, Jason Determann in baseball and Paul White in men's tennis - were named SEC Scholar-Athletes of the Year in their respective sports.

LSU had a total of 136 student-athletes earn Academic All-SEC selections in 2004-05, the second-most selections in the conference. To receive the award each student-athlete must have a 3.0 grade point average.

Our men's tennis doubles team of Ken Skupski and Mark Growcott advanced to the finals of the NCAA doubles championships.

#### Coaching Excellence

Gymnastics head coach D-D Breaux and women's basketball head coach Pokey Chatman each earned the Southeastern Conference's top billing as Coach of the Year, while Chatman was named the National Coach of the Year by the Women's Basketball Coaches Association, Naismith and the United States Basketball Writers Association.

#### Conference Crowns

The women's basketball team won the Southeastern Conference championship and two teams - men's basketball and baseball - finished first in the SEC Western Division.

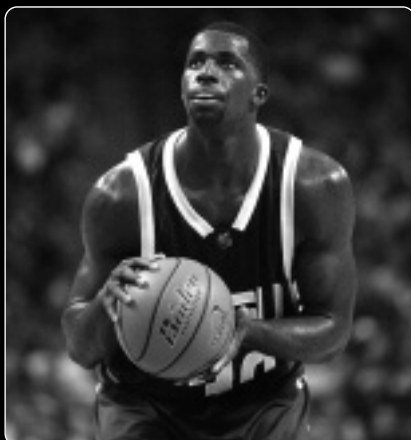
#### Elite Teams

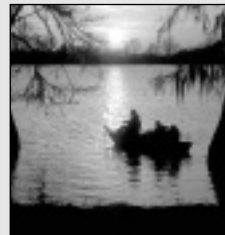


The St. Louis Cathedral in Jackson Square is located in the heart of the historic French Quarter area of New Orleans.

This designation is shared by only 59 public and 29 private universities across the nation. LSU is also one of only 25 universities nationwide designated as both a land-grant and sea-grant college.

History and tradition began with LSU's founding in 1853 by the General Assembly of Louisiana as the Louisiana State Seminary of Learning and Military Academy near Pineville,

Louisiana. The institution opened January 2, 1860. When the Civil War began, the school's first superintendent, William Tecumseh Sherman, resigned to assume a command in the Union Army. The seminary reopened in 1869, but was soon destroyed by fire. The institution moved to Baton Rouge, opening on Nov. 1, 1869.

In 1870, the Seminary was renamed Louisiana State University. In 1874, under the United States Morrill Act, the Louisiana State Agricultural & Mechanical College was established in New Orleans. The two institutions were merged by the Legislature in 1877 to become Louisiana State University and Agricultural & Mechanical College.

Construction on the present campus began in 1922 and the first classes were held in 1926. LSU experienced major growth in the 1930s and 1940s, expanding its student body, curricula, and services. During the 1960s, the University began to place increasing emphasis on research.

Recognizing the importance and extent of statewide agricultural activities of units in the LSU System, the LSU Board of Supervisors established the Center for Agricultural Sciences & Rural Development in 1972. This unit was renamed the LSU Agricultural Center in 1982. Components of the LSU Agricultural Center include the Louisiana Agricultural Experiment Station, the Louisiana Cooperative Extension

Service and International Programs.

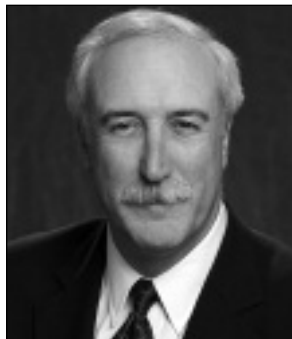
The primary mission of the LSU Agricultural Center is to conduct research in agricultural and natural resource development and to provide off-campus extension education that disseminates technological, economic, and management information to Louisiana residents.

In 1977, the Paul M. Hebert Law Center, established as the LSU Law School in 1906, was made an autonomous division of the LSU System. The Law Center provides legal education characterized by an unyielding demand for academic excellence. Its unique curriculum, based on civil law as well as substantial elements of common law, provides law graduates with qualifications and training for not one, but two legal systems. The Hebert Law Center holds membership in the Association of Law Schools and is on the approved list of the American Bar Association.

LSU, located on more than 2,000 acres in the southern part of Baton Rouge, Louisiana, is bordered on the west by the Mississippi River. The University's more than 250 principal buildings are grouped on a 650-acre plateau that constitutes the main part of the campus.

LSU and A&M College is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools.

# Sean O'Keefe

Chancellor, LSU

The Honorable Sean O'Keefe assumed the office of Chancellor of Louisiana State University and A&M College on February 21, 2005. Prior to his appointment as LSU's seventh chancellor, O'Keefe established a distinguished career in higher education and United States government service.

Chancellor O'Keefe earned his Bachelor of Arts from Loyola University in New Orleans in 1977 and his Master of Public Administration from the Maxwell School of Syracuse University in 1978. He held an endowed chair at the Syracuse University Maxwell School of Citizenship and Public Affairs and served as the Director of National Security Studies, a partnership of Syracuse University and Johns Hopkins University for delivery of executive education programs. He was also Professor of Business Administration and Assistant to the Senior Vice President for Research and Dean of the Graduate School at the Pennsylvania State University.

He served on four separate occasions as a presidential appointee. Most recently, until February 2005, he served as the 10th Administrator of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration. O'Keefe joined President George W. Bush's Administration as Deputy Assistant to the President and as the Deputy Director of the Office of Management and Budget until December 2001.

Appointed Secretary of the Navy in July 1992 by President George Bush, O'Keefe served as Comptroller and Chief Financial Officer of the Department of Defense since 1989. Before joining then-Defense Secretary Dick Cheney's Pentagon management team in these capacities, he served on the United States Senate Committee on Appropriations staff for eight years and was Staff Director of the Defense Appropriations Subcommittee. His public service began in 1978 upon his selection as a Presidential Management Intern.

Chancellor Sean O'Keefe is a Fellow of the National Academy of Public

Administration, a Fellow of the International Academy of Astronautics, and member of the Naval Postgraduate School Board of Advisors. During his academic postings, he was a Visiting Scholar at the Wolfson College of the University of Cambridge in the United Kingdom, a member of the Naval Postgraduate School's civil-military relations seminar team, and conducted seminars for the Strategic Studies Group at Oxford University. He served on the national security panel to devise the 1988 Republican platform and was a member of the 1985 Kennedy School of Government program for national security executives at Harvard University.

In 1993, President Bush and Secretary Cheney presented him the Distinguished Public Service Award. He was the 1999 faculty recipient of the Syracuse University Chancellor's Award for Public Service; recipient of the Department of the Navy's Public Service Award in December 2000; and has been awarded five honorary doctorate degrees from several prestigious educational institutions. In 2003 and 2004, he was recognized and honored by the Irish American Magazine as one of the Top 100 Irish Americans.

He is the author of several journal articles and contributing author of *Keeping the Edge: Managing Defense for the Future* released in October 2000. In 1998, he co-authored *The Defense Industry in the Post-Cold War Era: Corporate Strategies and Public Policy Perspectives*.

He is married to Laura McCarthy O'Keefe, and they have three children - Lindsey, Jonathan, and Kevin.



## Kenneth E. Carpenter, Faculty Athletics Representative

Kenneth E. Carpenter is in his fourth year as LSU's faculty representative in NCAA and Southeastern Conference matters.

Carpenter, a professor in the School of Architecture, has taught at LSU since 1986. He received his bachelor's degree in architecture from the University of Oklahoma in 1962 and his master's from the University of Minnesota in 1967. Before joining the LSU faculty, he served at Clemson University as associate professor of architecture from 1967-77; Ball State University, where he was professor and chairman of the Department of

Architecture, 1977-81; and, Iowa State University, serving as professor and chairman, Department of Architecture from 1981-86.

At LSU, he served as the dean of the College of Design from 1986-97; Interim Executive Director of International Programs from 1997-98; and Interim Dean of the College of Art and Design from 2001-02.

Carpenter is a member of Phi Kappa Phi, the American Institute of Architects, and the American Association of University Professors.

**A**lready a Louisiana Legend and one of the greatest college baseball coaches of all time, J. Stanley "Skip" Bertman has made the seamless transition into the athletics director's chair with the same enthusiasm, vision and demand for excellence that were trademarks of his stellar coaching career.

In just five years as LSU's director of athletics, Bertman has already added to his impressive list of on-the-field achievements. Under his direction, LSU enjoyed arguably the greatest athletics years in the history of the institution. In 2003-04, three teams won national championships, nine teams finished in the nation's top 10, and 14 teams ranked in the top 25, and in 2004-05, 14 teams advanced to the postseason. LSU teams also enjoyed improved grade point averages across the board, making the LSU student-athlete experience a success on and off the fields of competition.

While supervising the Tigers' progress on the playing fields, he has begun to implement measures necessary to realize his vision of building the LSU athletics department into the best in the country. Bertman's bold and innovative plans promise to keep the Tigers among the nation's elite in all phases of collegiate athletics.

Bertman is now in the midst of upgrading LSU's athletics complex. Working hand in hand with the Tiger Athletic Foundation, Bertman has already overseen the completion of the Cox Communications Academic Center for Student-Athletes while renovating Tiger Stadium and the Pete Maravich Assembly Center, and constructing the Football Operations Center.

It was also Bertman who took the bold but essential move to implement a seat contribution program in Tiger Stadium to fund facility improvements and ensure the financial stability of the LSU Athletics Department for the next decade.

Bertman was named LSU's athletics director on Jan. 19, 2001. With Bertman, LSU gained an athletics director who provides the leadership and experience necessary to manage the Tigers' \$52 million budget.

Bertman guided LSU to five NCAA baseball titles, and his teams drew huge crowds to venerable Alex Box Stadium, as the Tigers led the nation in attendance in each of his final six seasons (1996-2001).

He also served as head coach of the 1996 U.S. Olympic team which captured the bronze medal in Atlanta.

Bertman continues to be honored for his remarkable coaching tenure, as he was inducted in June, 2002, into the Louisiana Sports Hall of Fame. He was inducted into the American Baseball Coaches Association Hall of Fame in January, 2003.

In a *Baseball America* poll published in 1999, Bertman was voted the second greatest college baseball coach of the 20th century, trailing only the late Rod Dedeaux of Southern California. Bertman and Dedeaux are the only coaches to win five CWS titles.

He had previously earned recognition as one of the nation's brightest assistant coaches while at the University of Miami (Fla.) for eight seasons (1976-83). Before working at Miami, Bertman was renowned for his coaching excellence. In 11 seasons at Miami Beach High School, he directed the Hi-Tides to a state championship and two runners-up finishes and he was named Florida's Coach of the Year on three occasions.

In 1975, Bertman coached at Miami-Dade Downtown, leaving after one season to join legendary head coach Ron Fraser at Miami. The move was a homecoming of sorts, as Bertman spent his collegiate playing days with the Hurricanes as an outfielder and catcher from 1958-60. He earned his B.A. in health and physical education from Miami in 1961 and received his master's degree from UM in 1964.

Bertman and his wife Sandy are the parents of four daughters -Jan, Jodi, Lisa and Lori. The Bertmans have four grandchildren - Sophie Faith and Isaac Stanley, the children of Emile and Lori Bertman Guirard, and Samuel Aaron and Ezra Michael, the sons of Drew and Lisa Bertman Pate.

**W**hen it comes to collegiate tennis, the Southeastern Conference is as good as it gets. SEC member schools remain the most consistently dominant in the NCAA in both men's and women's competition.

In 2005, the SEC sent 10 teams to the NCAA Tournament for women's tennis, the most of any conference in attendance. And for the 19th consecutive year, the SEC sent a team to the semifinal round. Florida earned that spot after defeating Southern California in the quarterfinal round. The final team rankings featured two SEC schools in the top five with Florida second and Kentucky fourth. In addition, four SEC teams broke into the top 10 and 10 teams into the top 50.

The SEC was equally as impressive last year in individual competition. Two women from SEC schools, Aibika Kalsariva of Kentucky and Jennifer Magley of Florida, advanced all the way to the quarterfinals of singles play. There they faced each other, and Magley won the match for a spot in the semifinals. The final singles rankings saw an SEC player ranked at No. 4, Kentucky's Kalsariva, the SEC Player of the Year. Magley finished at No. 5 and Alabama's Robin Stephenson at No. 9, leaving three singles players in the top 10. Altogether, the SEC placed seven women in the top 25 and 12 total in the top 50. The SEC also claimed the top-ranked doubles team in the nation in Georgia's Caroline Basu and Shadisha Robinson. Five teams in all placed in the top 25 of the final doubles rankings.

"The SEC is tough. And it's the best. You want to play against the best and coach against the best and we get to do that every time out every year," said LSU head coach Tony Minnis. "It's very intense and there are a lot of good coaches. The conference speaks for itself in how we compete."

## A Strong Slate Ahead

The Lady Tigers open their spring season against three Louisiana opponents—Louisiana-Lafayette, Southern and Louisiana Tech are all coming to Baton Rouge in the end of January to face the Lady Tigers.

The next opponent is Rice, and if LSU can defeat its first four opponents as it has done the past nine years, Minnis will grab his 200th career win, adding him to an elite list of LSU coaches to accomplish that feat.

The Lady Tigers remain at home for that match with Rice as well as two more Texas opponents including Houston and Texas A&M. The team faced all three of these foes last season on the road and came out with a 1-2 mark Minnis is hoping can improve this year.

“We’re excited to have teams like Texas A&M, Rice and Houston at our home place because it was tough playing some of them on the road a year ago,” he said. “Now we’ve got them at home and hopefully we can get the victories.”

LSU has its first road test at Florida State on Feb. 22 and then returns home for a match Feb. 26 against Lamar before opening up Southeastern Conference play at Tennessee on March 3 followed by a trip to Georgia on March 5.

The Lady Tigers then take on their next two conference foes - Kentucky and Vanderbilt - at home. They welcome Prairie View A&M and Kansas to the W.T. Robinson Tennis Stadium in a break from SEC play before returning to action in four straight conference matches on the road.

They travel to South Carolina and Florida followed by trips to Ole Miss and Mississippi State the following weekend. Alabama and Auburn come to Baton Rouge April 7 and 9, respectively.

A trip to Tulsa on April 12 gives the Lady Tigers another break from conference action before they return home to complete their regular season against rival Arkansas on April 15.

“One thing that we’ve done here is not shying away from playing a tough schedule,” Minnis explained. “I think that making the tournament year-in and year-out against the type of schedule where you’re not only playing in arguably the toughest conference in the country but also out of the conference you’re playing some of the tougher teams, it’s truly a challenge. If you want to make it far into the tournament, you don’t help yourself if you don’t go out and play the top-notch teams during the season.”

### Going Further

The Lady Tigers made an early exit last year in both the SEC and NCAA Tournaments, and according to Minnis, getting past the early rounds is something this team really needs to strive for.

"For a stretch of the NCAA Tournament, we were getting fairly deep into the tournament," he said. "But the last few years we haven't been able to. We just have to do a better job to make sure that we're going into the tournament playing our best tennis in May, which last year we didn't do."

The SEC Tournament will be held in Gainesville, Fla., on the University of Florida's campus. Regional sites for the NCAA tournament will be determined once the regular season concludes.

Then, if LSU can make it to the Sweet 16, the final four rounds will be hosted by Stanford in Palo Alto, Calif.

According to Minnis, the team has dedicated a lot of time and improved different areas of each players' individual game this offseason in preparing for the year ahead.

"We did something very different this year," he commented. "We went through in the fall and changed a lot of different aspects of the players' games. From that standpoint I think we're looking for significant improvement in the spring based on what we've done in the fall. This team has worked really hard in the fall, it's been a lot of grinding, but we've done a lot of things that should have us better prepared in our spring season."

**T**his season marks the 15th year of Tony Minnis' tenure as head coach of the Lady Tigers tennis team with a 196-150 record in that span, he needs just four more victories to reach the 200-win milestone.

But maybe even more impressive than that record is the fact that Minnis has led his squad to the NCAA Tournament for 11 consecutive years.

"I think it shows that the program has been fairly consistent, because over an 11-year time span, you're going to have years where you have injuries, years where things don't go your way," Minnis commented. "It's really a credit to the kids to sustain that over the course of 11 years, especially in the type of conference we're in."

Minnis, in fact, gives most of the credit of his success to those who have worked with him in his tenure at LSU.

"I think that in everything that's accomplished whether it be making it to 11 straight NCAA Tournaments or getting 200 wins, there are a lot of kids, former players and assistant coaches who have had a lot to do with that," he explained. "I'm just appreciative and feel very fortunate to be at a great school for as long as I have been, to have been at a program where we've been very consistent over the years. And I think that is the mark of consistency, to have that many wins over that period of time."

A Baton Rouge native, Minnis returned to his hometown in 1992 to take over the LSU women's tennis team. In 14 seasons as head coach, Minnis has recorded a 196-150 overall record. By earning his 80th career victory at LSU in 1997, he passed Phillip Campbell (1984-88) as the winningest women's tennis coach in Tigers history. During the 2002 dual-match season, Minnis earned his 150th career victory with a 5-2 win over Tulsa. The achievement was just another milestone obtained by the talented young coach.

"I don't really think about that much," he said. "One thing I've learned as a player and a coach is to instill in yourself and your team an attitude that when one thing is over you move on to the next. It's nice to know I've had those accomplishments in my career here, but I try to focus on each year."

Minnis came to LSU knowing what it takes to excel in the sport. He was a tennis star at Southwestern Louisiana from 1984-88. He served as team captain his freshman and senior seasons and is USL's all-time winningest singles player with an impressive 94-40 career mark.

He followed his playing career with a job as an assistant tennis coach at USL while as working as the club professional at several tennis clubs in the Lafayette area. But, Minnis said, his LSU experience has taught him the most about the game.

"I've learned a lot over the last 14 years, especially about how very, very important it is to communicate with your players," he said. "I know the roller coasters that come with coaching and I've learned to take them in stride. I have been so fortunate to be in this tremendous environment at LSU, because you get to learn from every single coach here. There are some great coaches and that's the beauty of having an athletic department as good as this one."

With those years of experience and lessons has come a pile of awards and achievements for Minnis and his Lady Tigers.

In 2004, Minnis guided the team to a final ITA ranking of No. 20 in a season that included an NCAA Tournament berth, an SEC Western Division Championship and an appearance in the SEC Tournament semifinals. The Lady Tigers lost to the eventual SEC Champion Florida.

During the 2001 campaign, Minnis and the Lady Tigers put together a solid campaign and finished the season with a 14-10 overall record. The squad advanced to the NCAA Tournament and finished the year with a No. 27 national ranking.

Bruna Colosio, who graduated after a record-breaking senior season in 2002, was one of the top five players in the nation and the 2001 SEC Player of the Year. She excelled under Minnis' constant tutelage and received All-America status in both 2000 and 2001.

During an unexpected run at the NCAA Championships in 2000, Minnis led LSU to its second Sweet 16 appearance in school history. The Lady Tigers upset sixth-ranked Pepperdine, 5-4, in the second round of the tournament. The upset is consid-

ered the most impressive victory in team history. LSU fell in the Sweet 16 to USC.

In 1999, Minnis was named the Southwest Regional Coach of the Year after reaching the NCAA Tournament for the fifth straight season. The season was supposed to be a rebuilding one, but Minnis led his squad to upset victories over both 10th-ranked Tennessee and 15th-ranked Arkansas on their way to a final ranking of No. 28 in the nation.

In 1997, Minnis was named the SEC Coach of the Year when he led LSU to the regional finals. The Lady Tigers advanced to the championship match of the Southwest regional by beating Texas A&M, 5-0. Minnis was recognized as the Louisiana Coach of the Year for the third time in four years. Senior Suzana Rodrigues finished her career ranked fifth in all-time singles wins at 108-42 overall. She and teammate Laura Olave won the 1996 National Clay Court Doubles title. The tandem earned All-America honors after placing 10th in the final doubles rankings.

LSU posted its highest national ranking ever under Minnis in April 1995 when the Lady Tigers leapt from No. 30 to No. 15 after upsetting 11th-ranked Tennessee, 5-3, in the opening round of the NCAA Championships. The Lady Tigers fell to eventual NCAA runner-up Florida, 5-0, in round two. Minnis was named the Southwest Region and Louisiana Coach of the Year after guiding the Lady Tigers to their first win at the NAAs and their first postseason appearance since 1991.

As a player, Minnis competed in the 1988 NCAA Team Championships and was a semifinalist at the NIT Tournament in 1986. He had a 37-6 three-set record in his first three seasons at USL. During his four years there, the Ragin' Cajuns posted a 78-39 overall record and finished each year ranked in the Top 25. In his senior season, USL was ranked 15th in the final polls and advanced to the second round of the NCAA Championships.

Minnis comes from a family loaded with tennis experience. His father, Howard, was the head tennis coach at Southern University for several years. His sister, Patricia, was a four-year letter winner at LSU from 1988-91. His brother, Patrick, was USL's No. 1 singles player after his departure. Minnis played high school tennis at Redemptorist in Baton Rouge. He graduated from USL in 1988 with a degree in finance and earned an MBA in 1996.

### First Year at LSU

Alma Mater: Texas-Arlington, 2000

Served as head coach at UL-Lafayette prior to LSU

**L**isa Jackson begins her tenure as the LSU women's tennis assistant coach this year, traveling to Baton Rouge from Lafayette where she served as the Ragin' Cajuns' associate head coach for two years.

"She was the associate head coach at ULL, so she will bring that added experience of being a head coach," Minnis commented on his new assistant. "She has a lot of enthusiasm, and the work ethic she brings is going to be a real positive for our program. We're very fortunate to have found somebody like this."

In her first year at ULL, Jackson led the Ragin' Cajun tennis team to a 7-14 record, a vast improvement from the team's 1-13 finish a year before. In 2005, she went even beyond that, leading the team to a 10-9 finish, its first winning season since 2001.

"I think one of the things that was so impressive and one of the major reasons I looked to hire her was what she was able to do at Lafayette," Minnis explained. "We competed against ULL the past couple years and saw the major improvement in the team and how much better they got in that short time span. I was very impressed with what she did for that program."

Coming all the way from her homeland of Johannesburg, South

Africa, Jackson started her own college career at William Carey College in Gulfport, Miss. While there she was selected an NAIA second team All-American and was also the MVP of her team.

After a year she decided to transfer and made the move to the other side of Louisiana where she played for the University of Texas at Arlington for the remainder of her collegiate career. Her impressive career there included earning a top-30 national ranking in doubles, becoming a two-time recipient of the Southland Conference Player of the Year Award in 1999 and 2000 and helping her team win the Southland Conference Championship all three years.

At UTA Jackson also earned both her bachelor's (2001) and master's (2003) degrees in psychology. She stayed on staff at UT-Arlington as a graduate assistant with the tennis program until earning her master's degree.

Jackson said she is eager to work with Minnis and to be a part of a great LSU women's tennis program.

"I'm excited to be able to work with Tony, a coach with unbelievable experience," she said. "I think this team's going to have a great year, and I'm glad I will get to be a part of it."

# 2005 SEASON REVIEW

## Youth, Experience, and Leadership

**T**he LSU women's tennis team placed both youth and experience on the court to begin the 2005 season. Amanda Mang took the leadership role as the team's only senior, joined by four junior returnees in Camila Caliarì, Marina Chiarelli, Daysi Espinal and Lauren Seaman.

But unlike the previous season where the team had no freshmen, the Lady Tigers added three new talents to the roster last year. Staten Spencer, Tiffany Tucker and Anastasiya Dubova all came to Baton Rouge looking to contribute to the LSU women's tennis program.

"I was really excited about our new players last year," head coach Tony Minnis explained. "Anastasiya had just arrived at the beginning of the semester, but Staten and Tiffany had already exceeded the expectations that we had when they came in the fall in the tournaments."

The Lady Tigers played host to four Louisiana opponents to open the season, posting wins over each to own a 4-0 record. They then traveled to Houston for their first road tests of the year to face both Rice and Houston. They came away with a split, falling 4-3 to Rice and then rebounding for a victory of the same score over Houston.

A win over Tulsa at home and a loss to Texas A&M at College Station gave the Lady Tigers a 6-2 mark heading into Southeastern Conference play.

"To be honest, I was a little disappointed with our record going into SEC play because the matches we had lost to Texas A&M and Rice were ones we could have won," Minnis commented. "But by the same token, the reason we play a very tough out-of-conference schedule is to prepare us for the conference."

## A Rocky Conference Start

LSU's opening conference weekend was a tough one, as they faced national powerhouse and then-No. 2 Florida first followed by a top-25 South Carolina team the Lady Tigers had not defeated since 1985. Florida continued its dominance over LSU with a 7-0 win, but the Lady Tigers came roaring back two days later to defeat South Carolina, 4-3. Spencer shined for LSU to clinch the match in her third set. In fact, Spencer had played some of her best tennis in the early part of the season. She began the regular season with an eight-match winning streak and improved to nine wins in her first 10 matches en route to giving her team the victory over the Gamecocks.

"I felt the best match we played all year was against South Carolina," Minnis said. "We came out and played with great intensity and a great attitude, and from that point forward I thought we were going to have another top-25 year." But that win was the last the Lady Tigers would see for a while. Much of this was due to something the team had not been able to escape the past few seasons - injury. Seaman, the No. 1 doubles and No. 2 singles player, suffered a back injury in the South Carolina match, forcing her to sit out for the next few weeks -- the heart of the SEC season.

"It was unfortunate with Lauren's situation getting hurt, but as a team you have to play through it and find a way to get through it, but at the same time it did put a wrinkle in our season."

The Lady Tigers strung together six straight losses, including four on their home court, three were 4-3 losses and two were by a 5-2 margin. One highlight through that span was the biggest win of Mang's LSU tennis career. It took her only two sets to defeat Georgia's Shadisha Robinson, at that time ranked No. 4 in the nation.

Heading into the final stretch of the season, the Lady Tigers had dropped to 7-9 and were in desperate need of some quality wins.

## Taking Charge

The Lady Tigers put those losses out of their mind and instead focused on the possibilities ahead of them. They took charge and finished out the regular season winning five of their last six matches.

LSU was especially successful in doubles play toward the end of the season. They won the point in five of their last regular-season matches, including sweeping it in four of those. Heading into the postseason, the Lady Tigers were 11-1 in matches when controlling the first point of the match.

"I think last year we tried to emphasize doubles because even the year before when we finished 20th in the country, when it got down to NCAA Tournament time our doubles wasn't as strong as it could be," Minnis explained. "Toward the end of the year especially we emphasized doubles, and we did play some solid doubles at that point of the season."

The bottom half of the lineup was also especially responsible for the team's turnaround at the end of the year. Marina Chiarelli, Tiffany Tucker and Camila Caliri all compiled 7-4 records in the tough SEC. Chiarelli won her last four con-

ference matches and six of her last seven overall. Tucker won five straight in the SEC and seven of her last eight to end the regular season. Caliri won a team-high six straight SEC matches and eight of her last nine to end the regular season.

## A Tough Tourney

The draws for the SEC Tournament were released, and LSU received a No. 9 seed and was set to face No. 8-seeded Mississippi State, a team the Lady Tigers had just barely lost to, 4-3, several weeks earlier. They traveled to Tuscaloosa, Ala., the 2005 tournament site, ready to battle.

And that match cannot be described as anything but a battle. At 9 a.m. both teams took the court for doubles play. Two hours later the Lady Tigers came out with the first point of the match. Spencer and Mang won first followed by Chiarelli and Caliri who clinched on court three.

Singles play had barely begun when the rain started pouring down. The rest of the match was forced to indoor courts, a surface on which Mississippi State had excelled that season. Each point, game and match grinded back and forth for several hours. Unfortunately, seven hours after the match began, the Lady Tigers came out with another 4-3 loss to the Bulldogs.

"Marina was on the court with the match tied at three, and if there's anybody I would want on the court in that situation it's Marina," Minnis said. "She lost, but in athletics those kinds of things happen, and you just have to take the good with the bad. It's a situation where you had to give Mississippi State credit."

## Coming to a Close

The last step for LSU was to wait for a bid to the NCAA Tournament. The announcement came and the Lady Tigers did not have to travel far. They headed to Tulane's campus in New Orleans to face TCU in the opening round.

The Lady Tigers could never earn any momentum, as No. 18 TCU handed them their season-ending loss, 4-1. They finished with a .500 record at 12-12.

"We made the tournament again, but it's not just about making it here," Minnis emphasized. "We're looking to advance deep into the

tournament, and what's disheartening about it is that we didn't play very well through the course of the match. I think these kids are going to remember that we didn't play our best tennis in the NCAA Tournament."

Though the season ended on a disappointing note and was not the one the Lady Tigers had hoped for, Minnis said the team learned some valuable lessons that can be used for improvement in the upcoming year.

"What you have to do from a coaching standpoint is look at how you can learn from years like that, and what we can learn is that we have to improve on putting people away," he said. "We were in tons of positions throughout the course of the year where we were controlling the match and had the opportunity to put people away, but we let them hang around and it came back to bite us. The lesson learned is that when you have the opportunity, you have to go for the kill."

# A Tradition of Excellence

## Lady Tigers Program History

**I**n the fall of 1973 the Lady Tigers tennis team was formed as a club sport with Pat Newman as head coach and Jay McCreary as the Coordinator of Club Sports. The fledgling program began with eight players who bought their own racquets and balls. It has since developed into a national collegiate tennis power over the decades. From the early days of limited schedules and funding, the Lady Tigers have come a long way, becoming a dominant tennis power in the state of Louisiana and making its presence known regionally and nationally.

In the 1975, the Lady Tigers signed their first collegiate player to an athletic scholarship for the following season, acquiring Ann Ellis from Houston, Texas. Next was Karen McCarter, a walk-on from a big tennis family in Shreveport, La. The following year, Kay McDaniel, another Shreveport product, and Elizabeth Palfrey of Baton Rouge joined the Lady Tiger family and LSU was on its way to becoming a national power, finishing in the top 20 in the nation for the first time.

The Lady Tigers experienced an outstanding recruiting season in 1976-77, signing the No. 1-ranked player in the South in Ebie Taylor of Mobile, Ala. From Texas came two outstanding players in Lisa Boettcher of Pasadena and Carol Reger of Fort Worth. With those players, LSU won the state championship, placed in the top 10 in nationals and produced the first Lady Tiger All-Americans in tennis, Kay McDaniel and Ebie Taylor.

The program has continued to escalate, including finishing in the top 30 in the final rankings nine times since the 1990s.

# All-Americans

In its 30-year history, the LSU women's tennis program has produced an All-American eight times. Only three years after the official inaugural season, two Lady Tigers were named All-Americans in 1978 in Ebie Taylor and Kay McDaniel, Nos. 2 and 12 on the all-time wins list at LSU, respectively. Then 16 years later, the next selection came in the form of Suzana Rodrigues, who earned her status as a singles All-American as a freshman in 1994. Fifth on the list of all-time wins, Rodrigues was named an All-American again as a senior in

1997, that year receiving recognition for her outstanding doubles play.

Her partner Laura Olave shared the All-American distinction that year. Another pair was recognized as All-Americans in 2000 when Bruna Colosio and Ana Paula Mores won the award. Fittingly, they each ended their careers with the same number of match wins, 97, which places them in a tie for eighth on the all-time wins list. Colosio

was named a singles All-American again in 2001, rounding out LSU's selections among the upper echelon of collegiate women's tennis.

## Kay McDaniel

The United States Tennis Association Tennessee Hall of Fame named former LSU tennis All-American Kay McDaniel to its list of 2005 inductees, and she was honored at a banquet Feb. 5, 2005, at the Nashville Marriott in Nashville, Tenn.

McDaniel, who played for LSU from 1975-79, racked up 92 wins in a Lady Tigers uniform, a number that places her 12th on the list of all-time winningest players in LSU women's tennis history. She is also third on the list of match wins in a single season with 43 in 1977-78. McDaniel became the first LSU women's tennis All-America selection, along with Ebie Taylor, in 1978, a year that saw the Lady Tigers go 19-5 and earn the title of Louisiana AIAW Champion.

She next toured the professional courts from 1980-86, competing against such players as Billie Jean King, Chris Evert, Martina Navratilova and Steffi Graf. She once ranked as high as No. 30 in singles (1983) and No. 20 in doubles (1986).

## 1976 Lady Tigers

**Overall Record: 11-5 \*Inaugural Season\* • Louisiana AIAW Champions • 14th USTA Nationals**

LSU won nine of its last 11 matches, including five straight to end its inaugural campaign en route to the Louisiana AIAW Championship. The Lady Tigers opened the season with a 9-0 win over Northwestern State and went on to outscore its opponents 107-37. LSU finished 14th at the USTA Nationals.

## 1978 Lady Tigers

**Overall Record: 19-5 • Louisiana AIAW Champions**

Former head coach Pat Newman guided LSU to its third consecutive state AIAW title in as many seasons. Lady Tiger standouts Kay McDaniel and Ebie Taylor became LSU's first ever All-Americans, earning the prestigious honor after leading the team to a 10th-place finish at the AIAW National Championships. The '78 squad holds the record for most consecutive wins in a season with 12 in a row.

## 1979 Lady Tigers

**Overall Record: 22-10 • Louisiana AIAW Runner-up**

After claiming three straight Louisiana AIAW titles, LSU earned its best at 22-10 but fell shy of its fourth straight title. The Lady Tigers lost, 7-2, to Northeast La. in the finals. LSU won eight straight matches to start the season and 16 of 18 down the stretch. In four seasons, LSU dominated its in-state rivals 26-2, with its only blemish being dual losses to NLU during the '79 season.

## 1985 Lady Tigers

**Overall Record: 19-7 • SEC Runner-up**

LSU's most prolific women's tennis duo, twin sisters Dana De and De Ann Watlington, showcased their outstanding talent by leading an experienced Lady Tiger squad to a second-place finish in the SEC behind Florida. LSU won nine of its final 10 matches of the season under coach Philip Campbell.

## 1991 Lady Tigers

**Overall Record: 19-6 • NCAA Final 20 • Final Rank: (t)No. 18**

The Lady Tigers advanced to the NCAA Championships for the first time in school history, compiling a 19-6 record and finishing third in the SEC. LSU dropped a hard-fought 5-3 decision to Indiana in the opening round at the NCAAs, finishing at No. 18 in the nation.

## 1992 Lady Tigers

**Overall Record: 14-9 • Final Rank: No. 21**

The Lady Tigers opened the year with a perfect 5-0 mark, upset No. 10 Miami (Fla.) and beat No. 20 Kentucky in a season in which they finished ranked at No. 21 in the nation. Vikki Chambers and Sarah Stewart became the first doubles team in Lady Tiger history to play in the NCAA doubles tournament.

## 1995 Lady Tigers

**Overall Record: 19-8 • NCAA Final 16 • Final Rank: No. 18**

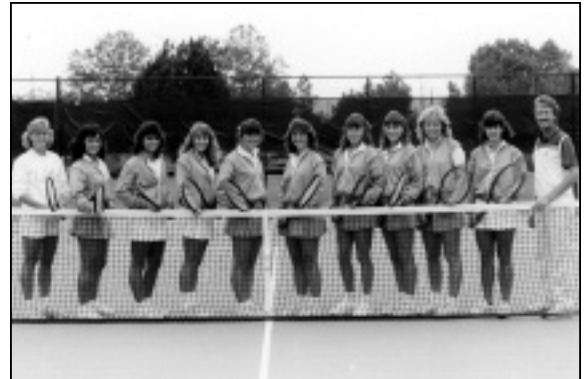
LSU capped off its most successful season in school history with a stunning 5-3 upset of No. 11 Tennessee in the opening round of the 1995 NCAA Championships before falling to national runner-up Florida, 5-0, in round two. The Lady Tigers tallied a 19-8 overall record, amassing numerous accolades, including a No. 18 final ranking.

### 1997 Lady Tigers

**Overall Record: 18-9 • NCAA SW Regional Finalists • Final Rank: No. 20**

The Lady Tigers enjoyed another stellar campaign, charting numerous athletic and academic honors en route to an 18-9 mark and a national top-20 finish. LSU fell just short of the NCAA Championships with a 5-2 loss to Tennessee in the NCAA Southwest Regional final. Tony Minnis became LSU's winningest coach and was named both SEC and Louisiana Coach of the Year. Three-time All-American Suzana Rodrigues said farewell in 1997 as the highly successful four-year star ended her collegiate career in record fashion.

### 1998 Lady Tigers

**Overall Record: 15-10 • NCAA SW Regional Finalists • Final Rank: No. 26**

LSU overcame injuries to two of its top players, Laura Olave and Ana Paula Mores, to qualify for the fourth consecutive year and play host to the NCAA Southwest Regional Championships. After making the final for the second consecutive season, the Lady Tigers were defeated by top-seeded Arkansas, 5-2, to end an impressive run against all odds. Before being upended by the Lady Razorbacks, the Lady Tigers knocked off Baylor and second-seeded Miami (Fla.) Three Lady Tigers seniors, Laura Olave, Jennifer Barr and Jamie Vallotton, bowed out by finishing their careers in Baton Rouge.

### 1999 Lady Tigers

**Overall Record: 13-11 • NCAA Championship Qualifiers • Final Rank: No. 28**

LSU finished the 1998-99 season strong despite having only one senior and two freshmen in the starting lineup. Under the leadership of lone senior Nikki Rasheed, the team concluded the season ranked No. 28. Head coach Tony Minnis led the Lady Tigers to their fifth consecutive NCAA post-season appearance, in which they advanced to the second round. Freshmen Bruna Colosio and Tami Botts stepped up for the team, combining for a 31-27 dual-match record. Colosio finished the season ranked 45th in the nation.

### 2000 Lady Tigers

**Overall Record: 16-11 • NCAA Sweet 16 • Final Rank: No. 21**

The Lady Tigers accomplished two amazing feats during the 2000 dual-match season. In the second round of the NCAA tournament, No. 32 LSU upset the sixth-ranked Pepperdine Waves, 5-4, on their home court in Malibu, Calif., to advance to the Sweet 16. The biggest upset in school history allowed the 2000 Lady Tigers to become the second LSU women's tennis team to reach the quarterfinal round. The Lady Tigers were led by their lone senior, Ana Paula Mores, and sophomore Bruna Colosio. Colosio ended the season as the sixth ranked singles player in the nation, while Mores ended her illustrious four-year career with 97 singles wins and a No. 75 national ranking. As a doubles team, the pair finished the 2000 campaign ranked No. 4.

### 2004 Lady Tigers

**Overall Record: 18-9 • NCAA First Round • Final Rank: No. 20**

For the 10th consecutive season, Tony Minnis led the Lady Tigers to an NCAA Tournament berth. Senior Jessica Ferguson finished the season ranked at No. 57 in the nation in leading the team to an SEC West title. The Lady Tigers upset Tennessee in the SEC Tournament to advance to the semifinals before falling to top-seeded Florida. Minnis was named the Southwest Region Coach of the year for the third time as the Tigers finished at No. 20 in the nation.

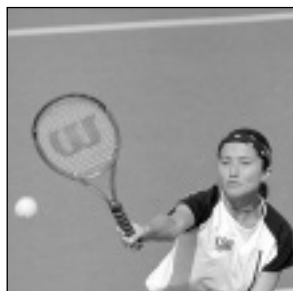

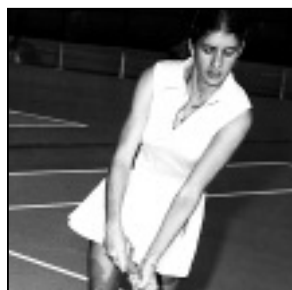
