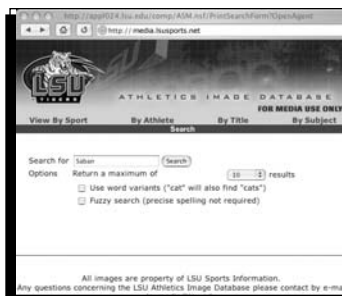
MATCH CREDENTIALS

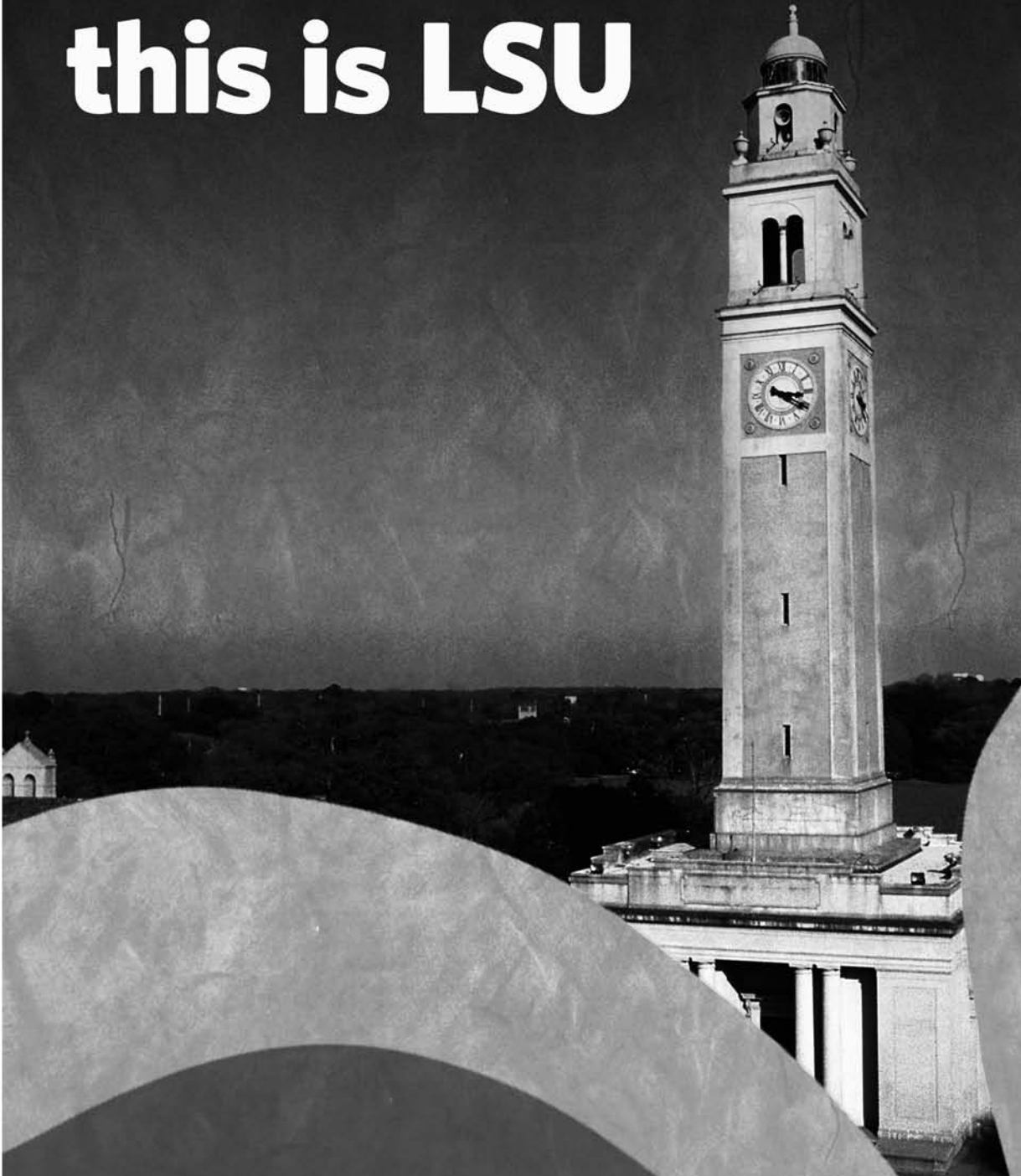

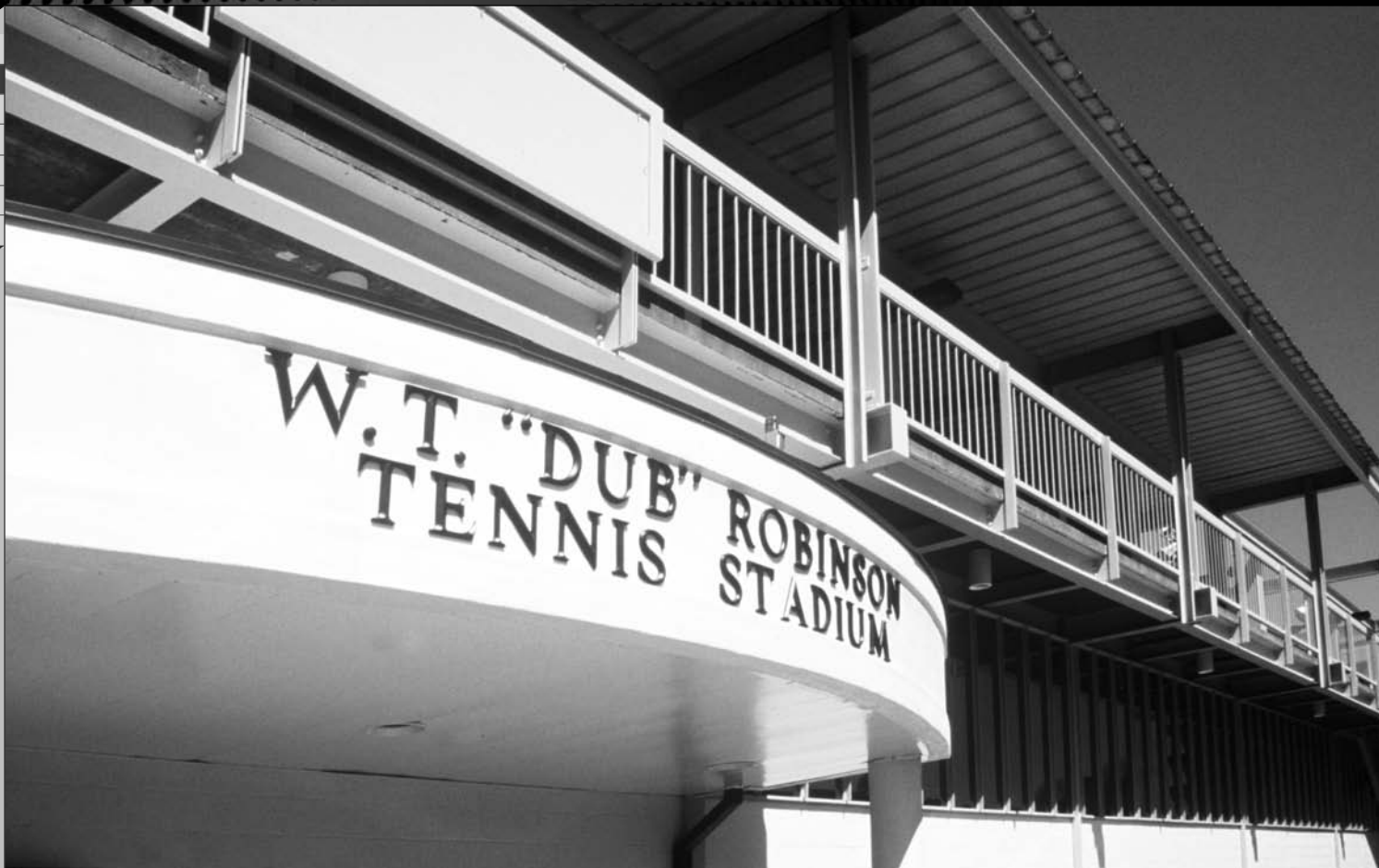

HISTORY



Since 1970, the W.T. Robinson Tennis Stadium has been the home of the LSU tennis program. The "Dub", as it is affectionately referred to, has undergone numerous renovations and improvements to keep up with collegiate tennis facilities across the nation.

Both the nationally ranked Tigers and Lady Tigers enjoy state-of-the-art locker rooms, a squad room and brand new showers and bathrooms. The "Dub" was totally refurbished after the 2002 season to include a media room, an equipment room and a ground-floor viewing area for handicapped tennis fans.

Robinson Stadium, named in honor of LSU's former winningest tennis coach, was completed in 1970 and is the site of the Tigers' and Lady Tigers' home outdoor matches. It features six varsity courts and six practice courts. The varsity courts were resurfaced prior to the 2002-03 academic school year, while the six practice courts received new surfaces in the spring of 2001 as a part of the facility's makeover. The varsity courts feature an electronic scoreboard and can accommodate up to 550 spectators.

Since Tony Minnis took over the LSU women's tennis program, the Lady Tigers have accumulated a 135-54 overall record at home. Their best season came in 2000, where the Lady Tigers remained perfect at home throughout the season. They advanced all the way to the NCAA Tournament Sweet 16 that year as well. LSU has only had one losing season at home since 1992 with the rest of the years producing above-.500 marks.

The LSU strength and conditioning facility, located in Tiger Stadium, was built in 1997 and features the latest in both strength training and cardiovascular training equipment. Measuring 10,000 square feet, LSU has one of the finest strength and conditioning facilities in the nation.

LSU's strength and conditioning team took a new direction in 2000 under strength coach Tommy Moffitt, who was named the 1999 Collegiate Football Strength and Conditioning Coach of the Year by the Professional Football Strength and Conditioning Coaches Society.

Strength and conditioning can be the heart and soul of an athletic program's success, and LSU has taken great strides to improve its strength program and facilities.

Paramount to the success of the “student” half of the term student-athlete is providing LSU athletes with the best possible resources to excel in the classroom. For more than 20 years, the LSU Academic Center for Student-Athletes has helped to build well-rounded student-athletes. But as times change and technology advances, the need for further improvements still exists. As a result, the Cox Communications Academic Center for Student-Athletes opened its doors in November of 2002. A \$15 million renovation to the Gym Armory not only made it among the nation’s premier centers, but put it at the forefront. Improvements to the existing center give LSU student-athletes the best opportunity for success by providing access to the latest technology, as well as an array of expanded services.

Computer Stations

Throughout the Academic Center are 75 computer stations, providing student-athletes with a quiet working environment for research, writing and studying.

The 1,000-seat auditorium is used through the year as a classroom and lecture hall. Each seat in the auditorium has space for a laptop and a modern hookup, providing each student unlimited learning opportunities. The auditorium also contains a movie theatre-size screen to aid professors with lectures and classroom activities.



The Library

The library provides a perfect setting for individual study, or with a tutor as a group.

Study Area

Included in the 54,000 square feet of the Academic Center are individual study areas as well as 14 private computer rooms for student-athletes to work one-on-one with tutors or by themselves.



COMMUNICATIONS LAB



Along with the success of the LSU Women's Tennis team comes a great deal of media attention and Dr. Tommy Karam, the Director of the Communications Lab, uses his facility, located on the fourth floor of the Cox Communications Academic Center for Student Athletes, to work with LSU student-athletes on their interactions with the media and interview skills. Karam's lab is a mock press conference setting to get the student-athletes used to handling themselves in front of both print and electronic media. He videotapes the mock interview sessions and reviews these with the student-athletes to help them become more comfortable in an interview setting. Karam also helps the LSU players get prepared for a professional career by working closely with those players on the interview process.



Lights, Camera, Answer

Dr. Karam teaches LSU's student-athletes to interact with all phases of local and national media by working one-on-one in a press conference setting. The Communications Lab includes a working camera for Karam to review the session with the student-athletes.

A Championship Tradition



The 2005-06 athletics year was another wonderful one for LSU. The Tigers and Lady Tigers enjoyed success from the fields and courts to the classroom. All in all, it was an exciting year for LSU's student-athletes, coaches and fans.

Postseason Presence

Of LSU's 20 sports, 12 teams advanced to postseason play. Among the highlights: Both of LSU's basketball teams advanced to the NCAA Final Four, the football team defeated Miami in the Chick-Fil-A Peach Bowl, the men's track and field team finished second at both the indoor and outdoor NCAA Championship meets, while the women placed seventh at both meets. The gymnastics team finished the season ranked eighth in the nation and softball was 15th.



In the Classroom

Nine of LSU's sports posted a cumulative grade point average of 3.0 or better during 2005-06.

50%

50 percent of student-athletes (207 of 314) recorded a grade point average of 3.0 or higher. 79 of those student-athletes recorded at least a 3.5 GPA and 28 finished with a perfect 4.0 GPA.

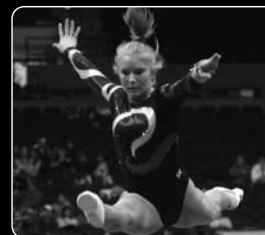

X Factor

Track's sprinter Xavier Carter sprinted his way into the record books in 2006. Carter won six NCAA titles and became the first athlete in NCAA history to ever win both the 100 and 400 meters at the championship meet and was the first male to win four titles in one meet since Jesse Owens in 1936. Carter was named the NCAA Indoor and Outdoor Track Athlete of the Year.

Augustus Again

Seimone Augustus earned women's basketball's National Player of the Year honors for the second straight season. She received the Wade, the Naismith and the John R. Wooden Awards and was named the Associated Press' Player of the Year. Augustus, a Kodak All-American, also led the nation in scoring averaging 22.7 points per game.

National Champions

Gymnast April Burkholder earned the individual NCAA title on the balance beam. Track star Xavier Carter was a six-time NCAA champion in 2006, winning the 100m and 400m races at the NCAA Outdoor Championships and the 400m race at the NCAA Indoor Championships. He also led the 4x100m relay to a national title and both the indoor and outdoor 4x400m relays to titles. The LSU women's 4x400m relay claimed the NCAA indoor and outdoor titles as well.

Hoops Sweep

LSU's duo of Glen Davis and Seimone Augustus were named the Southeastern Conference Men's and Women's Players of the Year, respectively. Davis helped lead the men's program to its first SEC title since 2000, while Augustus guided the Lady Tigers to a second straight league title. Tyrus Thomas was crowned the SEC's Freshman of the Year as well.

Tops in the League

Xavier Carter and Seimone Augustus swept the SEC Male and Female Athlete of the Year honors. Carter, the NCAA Indoor and Outdoor Track Athlete of the Year, was a three-time individual NCAA champion, winning the outdoor 100 and 400 meter races and the 400m indoors. Augustus led the SEC in scoring and help guide the Lady Tigers to a second straight conference title.

Rare Feat

LSU joined North Carolina as the only schools in NCAA history to have its football team and men's and women's basketball teams finish their seasons ranked in the top 5 in the nation during the same athletic year. LSU's football team finished fifth in the nation after a solid victory over Miami in the Peach Bowl. The men's basketball team finished third in the polls after advancing to the NCAA Final Four, while the women's basketball team competed the season ranked fourth after a third straight trip to the NCAA Final Four.

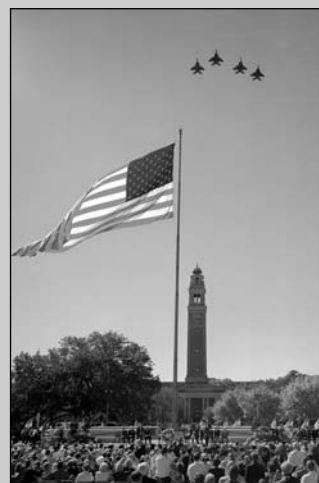

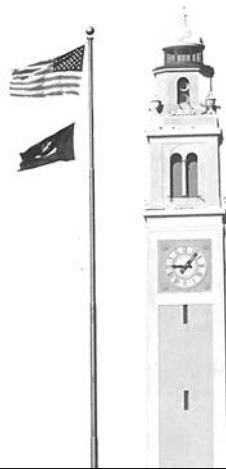

Strong supporters of education throughout the state have provided resources for a variety of innovative projects that are attracting world-class researchers and their expertise to LSU. The National Flagship Agenda is working to improve the standing of the University, as well as strengthen its position as an economic engine for the state of Louisiana. As a result, the University community is even more determined to achieve excellence at every level.

LSU remains firmly focused on attaining national flagship status by 2010, the University's 150th anniversary. The resolve of the LSU community and the support of the state make these goals attainable. And, if the last five years are any indication of success, the next phase of this agenda will guarantee LSU's place in the arena of national prominence.

Because of its designation as a doctoral/research university by the Carnegie Foundation, LSU ranks in the top 2 percent of the nation's colleges and universities. History and tradition began with LSU's founding in 1853 by the General Assembly of Louisiana as the Louisiana State Seminary of Learning and Military Academy near Pineville,

Louisiana. The institution opened January 2, 1860. When the Civil War began, the school's first superintendent, William Tecumseh Sherman, resigned to assume a command in the Union Army. The seminary reopened in 1869, but was soon destroyed by fire. The institution moved to Baton Rouge, opening on Nov. 1, 1869.

In 1870, the Seminary was renamed Louisiana State University. In 1874, under the United States Morrill Act, the Louisiana State Agricultural & Mechanical College was established in New Orleans. The two institutions were merged by the Legislature in 1877 to become Louisiana State University and Agricultural & Mechanical College.

Construction on the present campus began in 1922 and the first classes were held in 1926. LSU experienced major growth in the 1930s and 1940s, expanding its student body, curricula, and services. During the 1960s, the University began to place increasing emphasis on research.

Recognizing the importance and extent of statewide agricultural activities of units in the LSU System, the LSU Board of Supervisors established the Center for Agricultural Sciences & Rural Development in 1972. This unit was renamed the LSU Agricultural Center in 1982. Components of the LSU Agricultural Center include the Louisiana Agricultural Experiment Station, the Louisiana Cooperative Extension

Service and International Programs.

The primary mission of the LSU Agricultural Center is to conduct research in agricultural and natural resource development and to provide off-campus extension education that disseminates technological, economic, and management information to Louisiana residents.

In 1977, the Paul M. Hebert Law Center, established as the LSU Law School in 1906, was made an autonomous division of the LSU System. The Law Center provides legal education characterized by an unyielding demand for academic excellence. Its unique curriculum, based on civil law as well as substantial elements of common law, provides law graduates with qualifications and training for not one, but two legal systems. The Hebert Law Center holds membership in the Association of Law Schools and is on the approved list of the American Bar Association.

LSU, located on more than 2,000 acres in the southern part of Baton Rouge, Louisiana, is bordered on the west by the Mississippi River. The University's more than 250 principal buildings are grouped on a 650-acre plateau that constitutes the main part of the campus.

LSU and A&M College is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools.

Chancellor, LSU

The Honorable Sean O'Keefe assumed the office of Chancellor of Louisiana State University and A&M College on February 21, 2005. Prior to his appointment as LSU's seventh chancellor, O'Keefe established a distinguished career in higher education and United States government service.

Chancellor O'Keefe earned his Bachelor of Arts from Loyola University in New Orleans in 1977 and his Master of Public Administration from the Maxwell School of Syracuse University in 1978. He held an endowed chair at the Syracuse University Maxwell School of Citizenship and Public Affairs and served as the Director of National Security Studies, a partnership of Syracuse University and Johns Hopkins University for delivery of executive education programs. He was also Professor of Business Administration and Assistant to the Senior Vice President for Research and Dean of the Graduate School at the Pennsylvania State University.

He served on four separate occasions as a presidential appointee. Most recently, until February 2005, he served as the 10th Administrator of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration. O'Keefe joined President George W. Bush's Administration as Deputy Assistant to the President and as the Deputy Director of the Office of Management and Budget until December 2001.

Appointed Secretary of the Navy in July 1992 by President George Bush, O'Keefe served as Comptroller and Chief Financial Officer of the Department of Defense since 1989. Before joining then-Defense Secretary Dick Cheney's Pentagon management team in these capacities, he served on the United States Senate Committee on Appropriations staff for eight years and was Staff Director of the Defense Appropriations Subcommittee. His public service began in 1978 upon his selection as a Presidential Management Intern.

Chancellor Sean O'Keefe is a Fellow of the National Academy of Public Administration, a Fellow of the International Academy of Astronautics, and member of the Naval Postgraduate School Board of Advisors. During his academic postings, he was a Visiting Scholar at the Wolfson College of the University of Cambridge in the United Kingdom, a member of the Naval Postgraduate School's civil-military relations seminar team, and conducted seminars for the Strategic Studies Group at Oxford University. He served on the national security panel to devise the 1988 Republican platform and was a member of the 1985 Kennedy School of Government program for national security executives at Harvard University.

In 1993, President Bush and Secretary Cheney presented him the Distinguished Public Service Award. He was the 1999 faculty recipient of the Syracuse University Chancellor's Award for Public Service; recipient of the Department of the Navy's Public Service Award in December 2000; and has been awarded five honorary doctorate degrees from several prestigious educational institutions. In 2003 and 2004, he was recognized and honored by the Irish American Magazine as one of the Top 100 Irish Americans.

He is the author of several journal articles and contributing author of *Keeping the Edge: Managing Defense for the Future* released in October 2000. In 1998, he co-authored *The Defense Industry in the Post-Cold War Era: Corporate Strategies and Public Policy Perspectives*.

He is married to Laura McCarthy O'Keefe, and they have three children - Lindsey, Jonathan, and Kevin.

Already a Louisiana Legend and one of the greatest college baseball coaches of all time, J. Stanley "Skip" Bertman has made the seamless transition into the athletics director's chair with the same enthusiasm, vision and demand for excellence that were trademarks of his stellar coaching career.

In just four years as LSU's director of athletics, Bertman has already added to his impressive list of on-the-field achievements. Under his direction, LSU enjoyed arguably the greatest athletics years in the history of the institution. In 2003-04 three teams won national championships, nine teams finished in the nation's top ten, and fourteen teams ranked in the top 25 and in 2004-05 14 teams advanced to the post-season. LSU teams also enjoyed improved grade point averages across the board, making the LSU student-athlete experience a success on and off the fields of competition.

While supervising the Tigers' progress on the playing fields, he has begun to implement measures necessary to realize his vision of building the LSU athletics department into the best in the country. Bertman's bold and innovative plans promise to keep the Tigers among the nation's elite in all phases of collegiate athletics.

Bertman is now in the midst of upgrading LSU's athletics complex. Working hand in hand with the Tiger Athletic Foundation, Bertman has already overseen the completion of the Cox Communications Academic Center for Student-Athletes while renovating Tiger Stadium and the Pete Maravich Assembly Center, and constructing the Football Operations Center.

It was also Bertman who took the bold but essential move to implement a seat contribution program in Tiger Stadium to fund facility improvements and ensure the financial stability of the LSU Athletics Department for the next decade.

Bertman was named LSU's athletics director on January 19, 2001. With Bertman, LSU gained an athletics director who provides the leadership and experience necessary to manage the Tigers' \$52 million budget.

Bertman guided LSU to five NCAA baseball titles, and his teams drew huge crowds to venerable Alex Box Stadium, as the Tigers led the nation in attendance in each of his final six seasons (1996-2001).

He also served as head coach of the 1996 U.S. Olympic team which captured the bronze medal in Atlanta.

Bertman continues to be honored for his remarkable coaching tenure, as he was inducted in June, 2002, into the Louisiana Sports Hall of Fame. He was inducted into the American Baseball Coaches Association Hall of Fame in January, 2003. Bertman was also inducted into the College Baseball Hall of Fame this past summer.

In a Baseball America poll published in 1999, Bertman was voted the second greatest college baseball coach of the 20th century, trailing only Rod Dedeaux of Southern California. Bertman and Dedeaux are the only coaches to win five CWS titles.

He had previously earned recognition as one of the nation's brightest assistant coaches while at the University of Miami (Fla.) for eight seasons (1976-83). Before working at Miami, Bertman was renowned for his coaching excellence. In 11 seasons at Miami Beach High School, he directed the Hi-Tides to a state championship and two runners-up finishes and he was named Florida's Coach of the Year on three occasions.

In 1975, Bertman coached at Miami-Dade Downtown, leaving after one season to join legendary head coach Ron Fraser at Miami. The move was a homecoming of sorts, as Bertman spent his collegiate playing days with the Hurricanes as an outfielder and catcher from 1958-60. He earned his B.A. in health and physical education from Miami in 1961 and received his master's degree from UM in 1964.

Bertman and his wife Sandy are the parents of four daughters - Jan, Jodi, Lisa and Lori. The Bertman's have three grandchildren - Sophie Faith and Isaac Stanley, the children of Emile and Lori Bertman Guirard, and Samuel Aaron, the son of Drew and Lisa Pate.

The Southeastern Conference men's and women's tennis programs continue to be the nation's leaders on the collegiate hard-court and in 2006 the trend continued.

The conference made another strong national showing in 2006 as Georgia's men's team advanced to the final and Florida's women's team advanced to the semifinals at the 2006 NCAA Division I Tennis Championships in Palo Alto, California.

The Lady Gators lost to eventual champion Stanford, 0-4, in the semifinals. Florida defeated Samford, South Florida, UCLA and Baylor to reach the semifinal round. This marked the 21st straight year that an SEC team advanced to the national semifinals.

All six of the SEC's national team titles have come in the last 13 years with Florida's four (1992, 1996, 1998 and 2003) and Georgia's two (1994 and 2000).

In the singles tournament, nine SEC players were selected to the bracket, while three doubles teams were selected. The league has garnered five NCAA women's doubles titles since 1989, when Mississippi State's Jackie Holden and Clair Pollard took the title.

In 1991, the Lady Gator duo of Jilliam Alexander and Nicole Arendt won the crown. Florida's Dawn Buth and Stephanie Nickitas won back-to-back titles in 1996 and 1997 and advanced to the doubles finals in 1998. The last national doubles title won was in 2001 by Florida's Whitney Laiho and Jessica Lehnhoff.

Four of the last 13 women's singles champions belong to SEC players, bringing the SEC's NCAA singles titles to six.

the sky is the limit



The LSU women's tennis team has high expectations this season as they put together what head coach Tony Minnis calls the best recruiting class in team history.

LSU's incoming class was tabbed as the No. 17 class in the nation by tennisrecruiting.net. Additionally, three members of the class were listed as five-star recruits when they signed with LSU. The high profile crew of new faces along with an experienced group of returnees should make for an exciting season of Lady Tiger tennis.

fresh faces

Leading the pack of new players is highly touted sophomore Megan Falcon. The California native was a five-star recruit when she signed with LSU and should be a key contributor for the Lady Tigers this season.

In her collegiate debut this past fall Falcon put together an impressive resume as she defeated nine ranked opponents and was ranked No. 2 in the nation by ITA. This ranking is the highest in LSU history.

"Megan is a tremendous player and really could have gone anywhere in the country," Minnis commented. "We were very fortunate to get her. She has a ton of ability and has had experience playing around the world. With her on the team it really stabilizes the team because she can play with anybody in the country."

Nicole Kantor comes to LSU after an outstanding juniors career. The five-star recruit was sought after by many elite programs but chose LSU because of the coaching staff and players. The Missouri native was listed as the 18th-ranked recruit in the nation when she committed to LSU.

The most familiar name among the new Lady Tigers is Hannah Robinson. The Monroe native's great-grandfather is former LSU men's tennis coach W.T. "Dub" Robinson, for whom LSU's tennis stadium is named after. In addition, both of her grandfathers are former LSU football standouts. Johnny Robinson played on LSU's 1958 national championship team and went on to play professionally for the Kansas City Chiefs. Her other grandfather, Dave McCormick, played for LSU from 1963-65 and went on to play for the San Francisco 49ers. This five-star recruit should have no problem continuing the family tradition of Tiger success after she compiled a remarkable high school résumé, including going undefeated throughout high school.

The city of Memphis, Tenn., has become a popular scouting area for the Lady Tigers as both newcomer Ashley Murdock and sophomore Staten Spencer played their high school tennis at St. Agnes. Murdock is the tallest member of team at 5-10 and is an intimidating force on the court due to her strong work ethic and powerful serve.

"We wanted to make sure we had good depth this season," Minnis said. "When you deal with injuries or setbacks you want to make sure you have players that are prepared to step right in and make an impact."

Adding to that depth is walk-on Sloane Mathis. The New Orleans native has shown promise in the first two weeks of practice and should strengthen an already talented group of newcomers.

returnees' redemption

For the first time in 12 years, the Lady Tigers did not receive a bid to the NCAA tournament last season. LSU had made the field every year since 1995 before last year, including a trip to the Sweet 16 in 2000. Even though they lost four seniors last year, the Tigers have four returnees who still have that bitter taste in their mouth from last season's stunning ending.

"Our four returning players are going to remember that feeling of watching the TV and our name not popping up on the selection show," Minnis explained. "The NCAA tournament is something we expect to make. We want to make a good run in the tourney and to not even get a bid gives you more of a drive for the next year. Not making the tournament really woke the team up in a sense because they realize that it is not guaranteed."

The Lady Tiger most eager to get back on the court is Staten Spencer. Spencer led the team in singles wins (27) her freshman season, but was forced to redshirt last season due to back surgery. She has fully recovered and is very confident heading into the fall season.

"It was frustrating not being able to play last season to say the least," Spencer commented. "Seeing them struggle and not reach the NCAA tournament after we had made it 12 consecutive years was hard."

"When I first started playing again at the beginning of the fall I was very hesitant in what I could do. Now I am very confident in my abilities and I am able to get through some stuff I wasn't able to before."

Sophomore Mykala Hedberg made an immediate impact her freshman season after notching nine wins in dual play at the No. 1 slot. The California native will be in a heated competition for the No. 1 position this season as there will be a group of highly touted recruits eyeing for the slot. After a productive fall season, Hedberg landed on the ITA national rankings at No. 83.

Junior Tiffany Tucker is one of the Lady Tigers' strongest doubles players. Minnis is expecting a lot out of the Texas native this season as she is one of only two upperclassmen, along with Anastasiya Dubova, on the team. Tucker understands her leadership role and is excited about guiding the newcomers this season.

"It's a big change being that we had such a turn around this year losing four seniors," Tucker said. "Now that we have no seniors on this year's squad, I am the oldest on the team and in more of a leadership role. It's always good to have fresh faces and new energy. It has been good so far."

Dubova's play was one of the biggest positives from last season. The Ukrainian native notched 16 singles victories last season as opposed to four her freshman campaign. Minnis called Dubova's level of improvement from her freshman to sophomore year the best he had seen as a coach.

strength of schedule

LSU participated in six tournaments in the fall to help prepare for the regular season. Minnis said participating in so many tournaments allows his team to face a variety of talented competition.

"We always want to make sure that every time we step on the court we face strong competition," Minnis said. "If you are able to beat a number of top notch teams that will set you up in the national rankings and we will be prepared for the regular season."

The Lady Tigers took a break from their fall season to give back to the community. On Oct. 29, 2006, LSU hosted "Duel Under the Oaks," an event that helped raise money for New Orleans Health Sciences.

The main attraction was an exhibition tennis match between tennis legend Pete Sampras and former professional tennis star Todd Martin. Before the exhibition there was a children's clinic run by LSU's coaching staff and players at W.T. Robinson Tennis Stadium.

After the clinic the festivities headed to the Pete Maravich Assembly Center for the tennis exhibitions. Two members from the men's team, Danny Bryan and Ken Skupski, and two members of the women's team, Megan Falcon and Hannah Robinson, competed in exhibition play. The finale featured the Sampras vs. Martin showdown.

"I think it was a great opportunity to raise money and also promote tennis," Minnis said. "This state has always been about football and basketball, but to have one of the greatest players of all time in Pete Sampras and an established pro like Todd Martin is really something special for the fans and our program."

"It put an eye on LSU tennis and brought a community together to continue to help the victims of the hurricanes. Hopefully it is something we can continue to do in the future."

The Lady Tigers continue their strategy of compiling a tough non-conference schedule as they face many elite programs including Texas A&M and Florida State. The Lady Tigers face 11 teams that reached the NCAA tournament last season.

"What we are trying to do is make sure we have a tough all-around schedule," Minnis commented. "I would say this is the toughest schedule we have had and I think it is just going to get tougher year after year."

Entering his 16th year as the head coach of the LSU women's tennis team, Tony Minnis has garnered some very impressive accolades in his tenure.

He was already the winningest coach of the program heading into the 2006 season, but Minnis reached a milestone last year that places him among elite company.

With LSU's 4-3 win over Rice on Feb. 4, the Lady Tigers' coach captured the 200th victory of his career.

"I think that in everything that's accomplished, whether it be making it to 11 NCAA Tournaments or getting 200 wins, there are a lot of kids, former players and assistant coaches who have had a lot to do with that," Minnis explained. "I'm just appreciative and feel very fortunate to be at a great school for as long as I have been, to have been at a program where we've been very consistent over the years. And I think that is the mark of consistency, to have that many wins over that period of time."

Minnis' coaching record stands at 208-162 entering the 2007 season. The Lady Tigers have made the NCAA Tournament 11 of the 15 years under his tutelage.

A Baton Rouge native, Minnis returned to his hometown in 1992 to take over the LSU women's tennis team. By earning his 80th career victory at LSU in 1997, he passed Phillip Campbell (1984-88) as the winningest women's tennis coach in Tigers history.

During the 2002 dual-match season, Minnis earned his 150th career victory with a 5-2 win over Tulsa. The achievement was just another milestone obtained by the talented young coach.

"I don't really think about that much," he said. "One thing I've learned as a player and a coach is to instill in yourself and your team an attitude that when one thing is over you move on to the next. It's nice to know I've had those accomplishments in my career here, but I try to focus on each year."

Minnis came to LSU knowing what it takes to excel in the sport. He was a tennis star at Southwestern Louisiana from 1984-88. He served as team captain his freshman and senior seasons and is USL's all-time winningest singles player with an impressive 94-40 career mark.

He followed his playing career with a job as an assistant tennis coach at USL as well as working as the club professional at several tennis clubs in the Lafayette, La., area. But, Minnis said, his LSU experience has taught him the most about the game.

"I've learned a lot over the last 15 years, especially about how very, very important it is to communicate with your players," he said. "I know the roller coasters that come with coaching and I've learned to take them in stride. I have been so fortunate to be in this tremendous environment at LSU, because you get to learn from every single coach here. There are some great coaches and that's the beauty of having an athletic department as good as this one."

With those years of experience and lessons has come a pile of awards and achievements for Minnis and his Lady Tigers.

In 2004, Minnis guided the team to a final ITA ranking of No. 20 in a season that included an NCAA Tournament berth, an SEC Western Division Championship and an

appearance in the SEC Tournament semifinals. The Lady Tigers lost to the eventual SEC Champions Florida.

During the 2001 campaign, Minnis and the Lady Tigers put together a solid campaign and finished the season with a 14-10 overall record. The squad advanced to the NCAA Tournament and finished the year with a No. 27 national ranking.

Bruna Colosio, who graduated after a record-breaking senior season in 2002, was one of the top five players in the nation and the 2001 SEC Player of the Year. She excelled under Minnis' constant tutelage and received All-America status in both 2000 and 2001.

During an unexpected run at the NCAA Championships in 2000, Minnis led LSU to its second Sweet 16 appearance in school history. The Lady Tigers upset sixth-ranked Pepperdine, 5-4, in the second round of the tournament. The upset is considered the most impressive victory in team history. LSU fell in the Sweet 16 to USC.

In 1999, Minnis was named the Southwest Regional Coach of the Year after reaching the NCAA Tournament for the fifth straight season. The season was supposed to be a rebuilding one, but Minnis led his squad to upset victories over both 10th-ranked Tennessee and 15th-ranked Arkansas on its way to a final ranking of No. 28 in the nation.

In 1997, Minnis was named the SEC Coach of the Year when he led LSU to the regional finals. The Lady Tigers advanced to the championship match of the Southwest regional by beating Texas A&M, 5-0. Minnis was recognized as the Louisiana Coach of the Year for the third time in four years. Senior Suzana Rodrigues finished her career ranked fifth in all-time singles wins at 108-42 overall. She and teammate Laura Olave won the 1996 National Clay Court Doubles title.

The tandem earned All-America honors after placing 10th in the final doubles rankings.

LSU posted its highest national ranking ever under Minnis in April of 1995 when the Lady Tigers leapt from No. 30 to No. 15 after upsetting 11th-ranked Tennessee, 5-3, in the opening round of the NCAA Championships. The Lady Tigers fell to eventual NCAA runner-up Florida, 5-0, in round two. Minnis was named the Southwest Region and Louisiana Coach of the Year after guiding the Lady Tigers to their first-ever win at the NAAs and their first postseason appearance since 1991.

As a player, Minnis competed in the 1988 NCAA Team Championships and was a semifinalist at the NIT in 1986. He had a 37-6 three-set record in his first three seasons at USL. During his four years there, the Ragin' Cajuns posted a 78-39 overall record and finished each year ranked in the Top 25. In his senior season, USL was ranked 15th in the final polls and advanced to the second round of the NCAA Championships.

Minnis comes from a family loaded with tennis experience. His father, Howard, was the head tennis coach at Southern University for several years and was a professor there before he passed away. His sister, Patricia, was a four-year letter winner at LSU from 1988-91. His brother, Patrick, was USL's No. 1 singles player after his departure.

Minnis played high school tennis at Redemptorist in Baton Rouge. He graduated from USL in 1988 with a degree in finance and earned an MBA in 1996.

Lisa Jackson just completed the first year of her tenure as the LSU women's tennis assistant coach, traveling to Baton Rouge from Lafayette where she served as the Ragin Cajuns' associate head coach for two years.

"She was the head coach at ULL, so she has brought that added experience of being a head coach," Minnis commented on his assistant. "She has a lot of enthusiasm, and the work ethic she brings is a real positive for our program."

In her first year there, Jackson led the ULL tennis team to a 7-14 record, a vast improvement from the team's 1-13 finish a year before. In 2005, she went even beyond that, leading the team to a 10-9 finish, its first winning season since 2001.

"I think one of the things that was so impressive and one of the major reasons I looked to hire her was what she was able to do at Lafayette," Minnis explained. "We competed against ULL the past couple years and saw the major improvement in the team and how much better they got in that short time span. I was very impressed with what she did for that program."

Coming all the way from her homeland of Johannesburg, South Africa, Jackson started her own college career at William Carey College in Gulfport, Miss. While there she was selected to the NAIA second-team All-American and was also the MVP of her team.

After a year she decided to transfer and made the move to the other side of Louisiana where she played for the University of Texas at Arlington for the remainder of her collegiate career. Her impressive career there included earning a top-30 national ranking in doubles, becoming a two-time recipient of the Southland Conference Player of the Year Award in 1999 and 2000 and helping her team win the Southland Conference Championship all three years.

There Jackson also earned both her bachelor's (2001) and master's (2003) degrees in psychology. She stayed on staff at UT-Arlington as a graduate assistant with the tennis program until earning her master's degree.

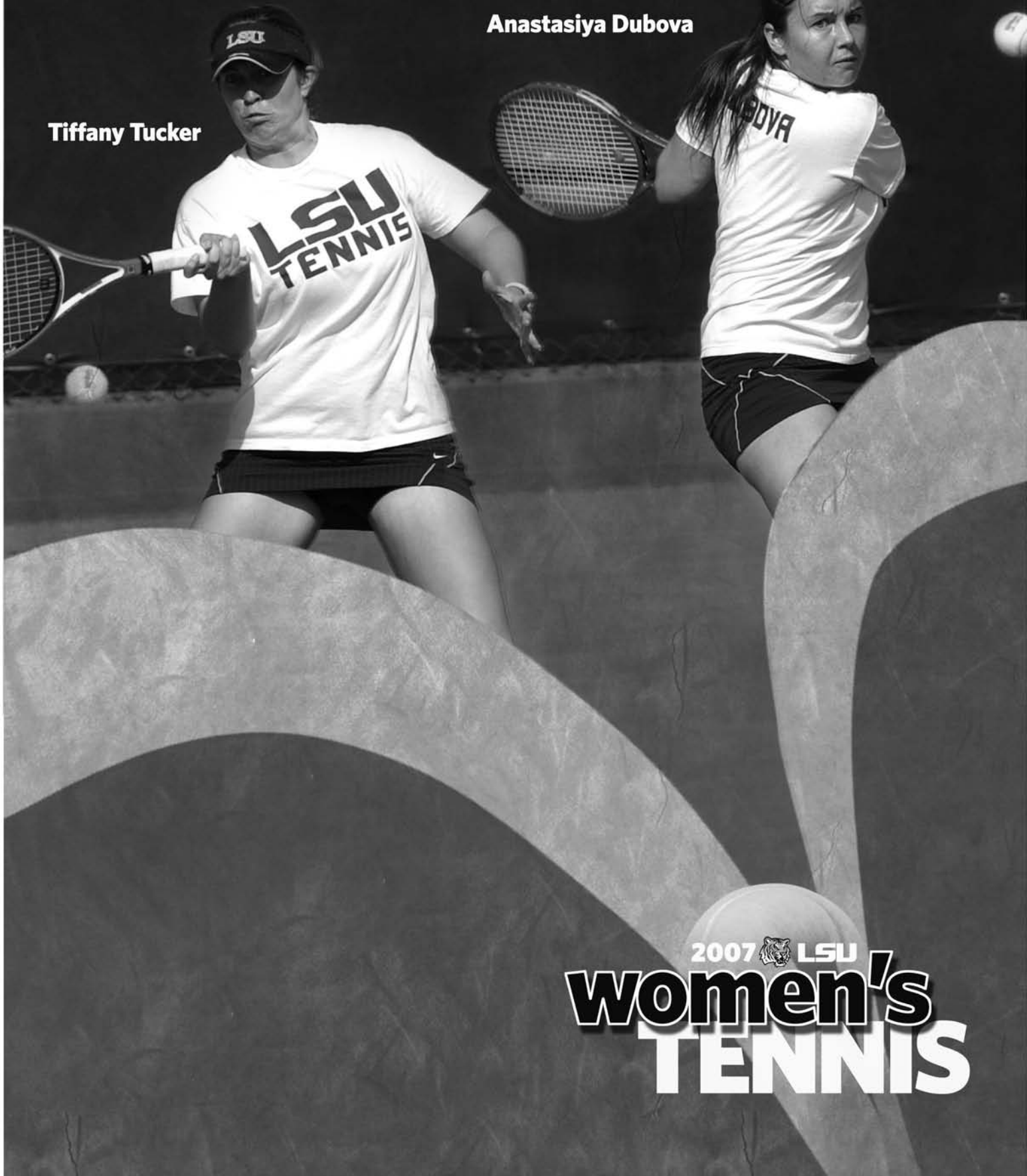

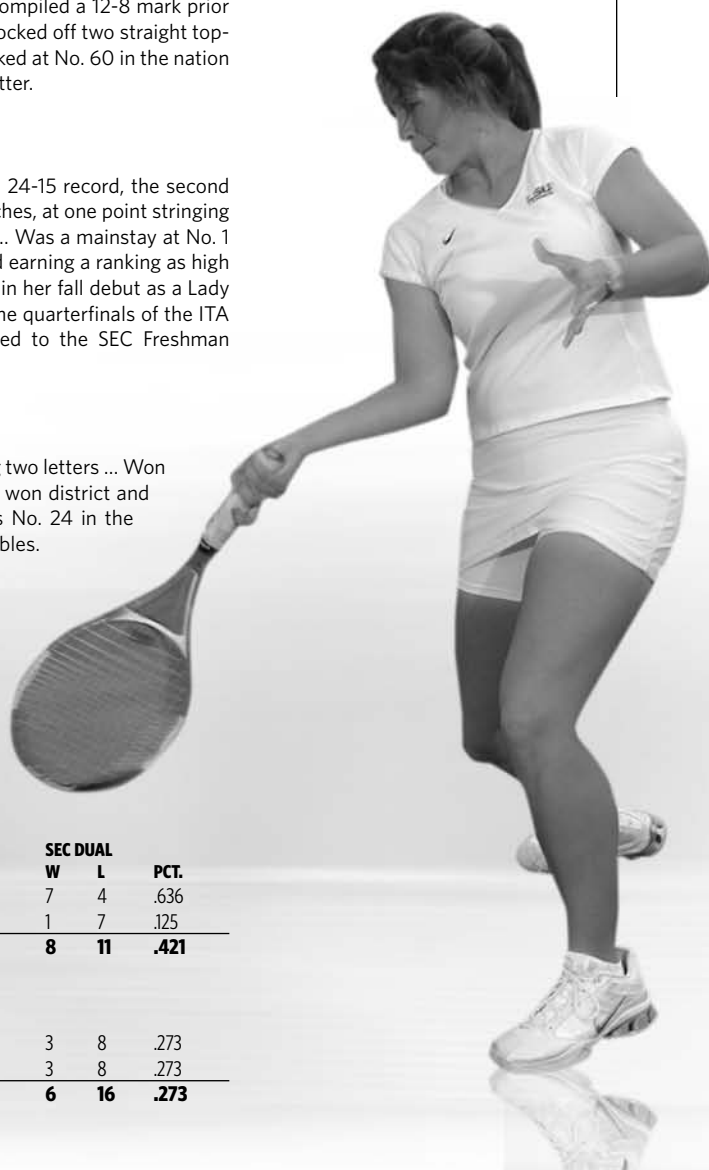

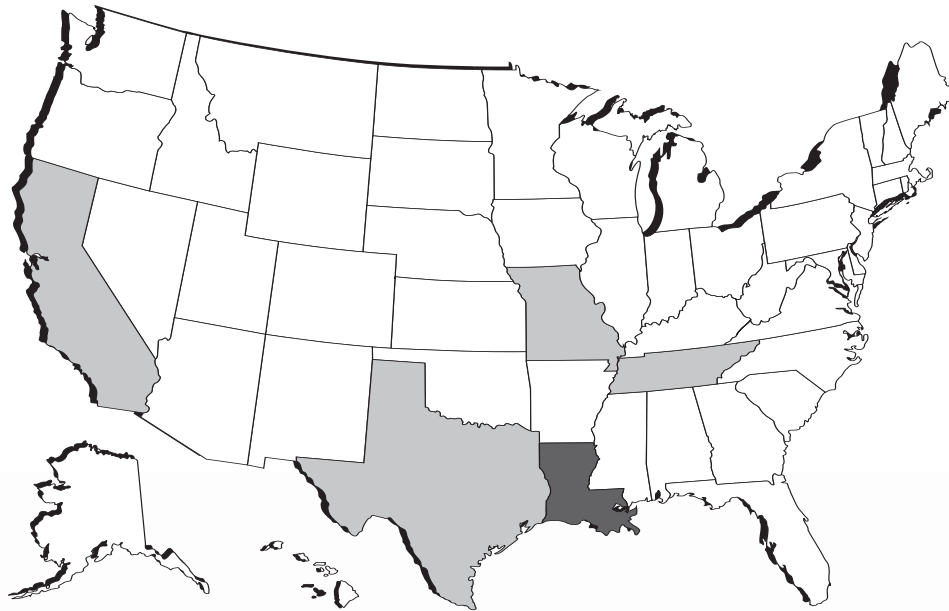

2006 Seniors with Head Coach Tony Minnis

Despite countless injuries and other unforeseen obstacles, head coach Tony Minnis found a way to take the LSU women's tennis team to 11 straight NCAA Tournaments heading into the 2006 season. He was looking to continue that streak.

"I was looking to enhance what we had done the previous couple years," he said. "With four seniors I thought we were capable of making a decent run and not only getting to the tournament but advancing and putting ourselves in a pretty good position."

He knew it wouldn't be easy but wanted the four seniors on the squad to end their careers on a high note. The season marked the final one for Camila Caliarì, Marina Chiarelli, Daysi Espinal and Lauren Seaman. All had been huge contributors to the team for three seasons.

"The progression had been very good throughout their careers, and they had always been competitive through it all," Minnis said of his seniors. "The expectations were to make a push to do something pretty special."

Despite the experience and leadership, however, the Lady Tigers featured a young freshman at the top of the

lineup. Mykala Hedberg earned the role of LSU's No. 1, and was thrown into a very tough schedule at a very early point in her career.

The other three team members were sophomores, including Staten Spencer, who was forced to sit out the year after back surgery in the offseason corrected a degenerative injury. The others - Anastasiya Dubova and Tiffany Tucker - were both playing in the top four spots of the lineup at the beginning of the season.

Also new to the team was assistant coach Lisa Jackson, who came to LSU from Louisiana-Lafayette, where she served as the Ragin Cajuns' head coach for two years.

The start of the season was a good one for the LSU women's tennis team. It opened with a sweep of Louisiana Tech followed by wins over ULL and Southern the following day. Those

victories improved the Lady Tigers' record over those in-state rivals to 45-0.

LSU recorded four more wins in the five final non-conference tune-ups, including a 5-2 win at Florida State and a sweep of Houston in the final non-Southeastern Conference match. The team's record stood at 7-1 heading to the SEC slate.

Early SEC Struggles

Despite jumping to a 7-1 start, wins became hard to come by once SEC play began.

Part of this was due to several key injuries in the lineup, including Seaman's back injury sidelining her for several matches. A mainstay at No. 1 doubles and No. 2 singles, the senior's absence caused changes in both singles and doubles lineups the team had to adjust to quickly.

The conference-opener was a match with No. 29 Tennessee in Knoxville, a match in which the Lady Vols dominated, 7-0.

LSU didn't fare much better in the closing match that weekend at No. 23 Georgia. The Lady Bulldogs swept that match as well.

LSU's next two SEC tests were at home, but both resulted in losses as well. No. 27 Kentucky earned a 6-1 win, and No. 12 Vanderbilt swept the Lady Tigers. Of note in the 6-1 loss to the Wildcats, however, was Hedberg's upset of No. 42-ranked Kim Coventry on the No. 1 court in straight-sets, 6-0, 6-2.

"We had a very rough start to the SEC season," Minnis said. "We played some very tough teams. We weren't playing with our whole team, and it made it very difficult to be competitive against the type of competition we played."

The Lady Tigers then welcomed two non-conference opponents to the "Dub" in a much-needed break from SEC action.

The first of these was Prairie View A&M, a match that was supposed to be played the first weekend of the season but had been rescheduled due to a rain out. LSU controlled the match and captured a 6-1 victory.

After winning the doubles point to start the next match against Kansas, the Lady Tigers thought they would earn another win as well. However, the Jayhawks bounced back and won four of the singles matches to get the 4-3 win.

The Lady Tigers looked to recover heading into two straight weekend road trips against fierce SEC competition.

That first road trip proved to be very difficult for LSU, as the team dropped both matches at South Carolina and sixth-ranked Florida. The next weekend featured contests at rivals Ole Miss and Mississippi State. In a rain-shortened match, Ole Miss grabbed the Friday win, 5-0.

Then with a sub-.500 record at 8-9 and winless in conference at 0-7, the Lady Tigers knew they needed to fight hard for a win.

"Going into Mississippi State we knew our backs were against the wall and we needed to find some way to get a win," Minnis explained.

And that they did with a 5-2 triumph at Mississippi State, the team who had knocked them out of the SEC Tournament the previous year in a heart-breaking seven-hour 4-3 loss. And not only did they beat the Bulldogs, but they won three of their last four conference matches to close the regular season.

Season's End

One of those conference wins came in impressive upset fashion over No. 43 Arkansas. The LadyBacks needed to win the match to claim the SEC Western Division title, and LSU had the chance to play the role of spoiler.

They did just that on an emotional Senior Day for four Lady Tigers, 5-2, at the Dub. Fittingly, it was the play of these seniors that helped clinch the win for LSU.

The senior pair of Seaman and Espinal clinched the early doubles point for LSU with their court three victory over Melissa Cornett and Rachel Wilhelm, 8-2. Then, a dramatic third-set comeback by Chiarelli over No. 55-ranked Ela Kaluder on court two clinched the win for LSU.

The senior dropped her first set, 6-4, and then fought for the 6-2 win in the second. Behind 5-3 in the decisive set, Chiarelli staged an impressive comeback to tie the match at 5-all. She fell behind again, 6-5, but managed to return the score to 6-all. In her tiebreaker and down 5-3, she grabbed control and notched the final four points to clinch the win for her team in her Senior Day appearance. She was named the SEC Player of the Week for her performance that weekend.

With an 11-11 record for the regular season, the Lady Tigers traveled to Gainesville, Fla., for the SEC Tournament as the No. 10 seed with hopes of improving their chances for an NCAA Tournament bid. They had to face a rematch with the seventh-seeded LadyBacks in the opening round.

Once again, LSU overcame the higher-ranked Arkansas squad, earning a 4-2 victory to send the team to the tournament quarterfinals. Chiarelli also managed another upset of Kaluder, this time in straight sets, 7-5, 6-2.

The Lady Tigers advanced to face No. 2-seeded and No. 8-ranked Vanderbilt. On that hot Florida Friday, they couldn't quite muster another upset, dropping the contest with the Commodores, 4-0.

With a 12-12 overall record, the Lady Tigers waited for the announcement of the 64-team field for the 2006 NCAA Tournament. LSU had been among those 64 teams for 11 straight years heading into last season.

The streak ended in 2006, however, as the Lady Tigers were not called to make a trip to last year's tournament. Despite a .500 record and the two late-season upsets over Arkansas, LSU did not make the tournament for the first time in 12 years.

"After making the tournament 11 years in a row, the expectation was that we would always make it," Minnis said. "I think this opened up some eyes and showed that it's not a guarantee.

"It was disappointing for the four seniors not to make it, but the positive is that it should open the eyes of all the players coming back and the new players that we have to come out to play consistently with intensity and focus to be successful."

Minnis' Milestone

One of LSU's non-conference wins was a 4-3 triumph over the Rice Owls on Feb. 4 at W.T. Robinson Tennis Stadium. That victory marked an important milestone in Minnis' career. It was his 200th win as a coach.

"It was a pretty special moment," Minnis said. "Rice was a pretty good team who had beaten us before, and it's neat to think about all of the ups and downs throughout the course of all those wins. It's just a great milestone to reach, and I was pretty excited about it."

LSU took an early advantage in the match, sweeping the doubles matches and earning the first point.

After easily handling Rice's Kimberly Patenaude in the first set, 6-1, Caliarì dropped the second set, 1-6. However, the Lady Tiger senior rebounded to close the match, 6-3, in the third set and clinch the win for LSU.

Already the winningest coach in LSU women's tennis history, Minnis improved his overall coaching record to 208-162 last season.

Individual Success

Though, as a team, the Lady Tigers did not achieve the ultimate goal of making the NCAA Tournament, there were several individual performances of note.

Chiarelli had an outstanding senior campaign to close her career. The Curitiba, Brazil, native led the team in wins in both singles and doubles, including winning a title at the Maryland Invitational in the fall. After beating two straight top-60 opponents toward the end of the regular season she was named the SEC Player of the Week. She had two upsets over Kaluder of Arkansas that clinched the team's upset wins over the Lady 'Backs. She also was named to the All-Louisiana first team for her efforts.

Senior Espinal also was named All-Louisiana on the second team. The Santo Domingo, Dominican Republic, native tied for the most singles wins on the team with 17.

Caliarì surpassed the 50-win mark in both singles and doubles in her senior campaign. She recorded a 13-8 record in dual match action last season.

Despite suffering a back injury midseason, Seaman enjoyed her share of doubles success early in the season. She and partner Tucker ranked 60th in the preseason and climbed in the top 50 in rankings after compiling a 12-8 record to begin the year.

Dubova proved to be one of the most improved players on the team, as she moved up to the No. 3 spot while recording 16 wins, the third most on the team. She also paired with Chiarelli to win six of the duo's last seven doubles matches on the year.

Lastly, LSU's lone freshman Hedberg stepped up to assume the role as the team's No. 1. She recorded the biggest win of her young career with the upset of No. 42 Coventry of Kentucky.

Lady Tigers Program History

1976 Lady Tigers: Inaugural Season

In the fall of 1973 the Lady Tigers tennis team was formed as a club sport with Pat Newman as head coach and Jay McCreary as the Coordinator of Club Sports. The fledgling program began with eight players who bought their own racquets and balls. It has since developed into a national collegiate tennis power over the decades. From the early days of limited schedules and funding, the Lady Tigers have come a long way, becoming a dominant tennis power in the state of Louisiana and making its presence known regionally and nationally.

In 1975, the Lady Tigers signed their first collegiate player to an athletic scholarship for the following season, acquiring Ann Ellis from Houston, Texas. Next was Karen McCarter, a walk-on from a big tennis family in Shreveport, La. The following year, Kay McDaniel, another Shreveport product, and Elizabeth Palfrey of Baton Rouge joined the Lady Tiger family and LSU was on its way to becoming a national power, finishing in the top 20 in the nation for the first time.

The Lady Tigers experienced an outstanding recruiting season in 1976-77, signing the No. 1-ranked player in the South in Ebie Taylor of Mobile, Ala. From Texas came two outstanding players in Lisa Boettcher of Pasadena and Carol Reger of Fort Worth. With those players, LSU won the state championship, placed in the top 10 in nationals and produced the first Lady Tiger All-Americans in tennis, Kay McDaniel and Ebie Taylor.

The program has continued to escalate, including finishing in the top 30 in the final rankings nine times since the 1990s.

All-Americans



In its 30-year history, the LSU women's tennis program has produced an All-American eight times. Only three years after the official inaugural season, two Lady Tigers were named All-Americans in 1978 in Ebie Taylor and Kay McDaniel, Nos. 2 and 12 on the all-time wins list at LSU, respectively. Then 16 years later, the next selection came in the form of Suzana Rodrigues, who earned her status as a singles All-American as a freshman in 1994. Fifth on the list of all-time wins, Rodrigues was named an All-American again as a senior in 1997, that year receiving recognition for her outstanding doubles play. Her partner Laura Olave shared the All-America distinction that year. Another pair was recognized as All-Americans in 2000 when Bruna Colosio and Ana Paula Mores won the award. Fittingly, they each ended their careers with the same number of match wins, 97, which places them in a tie for eighth on the all-time wins list. Colosio was named a singles All-American again in 2001, rounding out LSU's selections among the upper echelon of collegiate women's tennis.

Kay McDaniel

The United States Tennis Association Tennessee Hall of Fame named former LSU tennis All-American Kay McDaniel to its list of 2005 inductees, and she was honored at a banquet Feb. 5, 2005, at the Nashville Marriott in Nashville, Tenn.

McDaniel, who played for LSU from 1975-79, racked up 92 wins in a Lady Tigers uniform, a number that places her 12th on the list of all-time winningest players in LSU women's tennis history. She is also third on the list of match wins in a single season with 43 in 1977-78. McDaniel became the first LSU women's tennis All-America selection, along with Ebie Taylor, in 1978, a year that saw the Lady Tigers go 19-5 and earn the title of Louisiana AIAW Champion.

She next toured the professional courts from 1980-86, competing against such players as Billie Jean King, Chris Evert, Martina Navratilova and Steffi Graf. She once ranked as high as No. 30 in singles (1983) and No. 20 in doubles (1986).

1976 Lady Tigers

Overall Record: 11-5 *Inaugural Season* • Louisiana AIAW Champions • 14th USTA Nationals

LSU won nine of its last 11 matches, including five straight to end its inaugural campaign en route to the Louisiana AIAW Championship. The Lady Tigers opened the season with a 9-0 win over Northwestern State and went on to outscore its opponents 107-37. LSU finished 14th at the USTA Nationals.

1978 Lady Tigers

Overall Record: 19-5 • Louisiana AIAW Champions

Former head coach Pat Newman guided LSU to its third consecutive state AIAW title in as many seasons. Lady Tiger standouts Kay McDaniel and Ebie Taylor became LSU's first ever All-Americans, earning the prestigious honor after leading the team to a 10th-place finish at the AIAW National Championships. The '78 squad holds the record for most consecutive wins in a season with 12 in a row.

1979 Lady Tigers

Overall Record: 22-10 • Louisiana AIAW Runner-up

After claiming three straight Louisiana AIAW titles, LSU earned its best at record at 22-10 but fell shy of its fourth straight title. The Lady Tigers lost, 7-2, to Northeast La. in the finals. LSU won eight straight matches to start the season and 16 of 18 down the stretch. In four seasons, LSU dominated its in-state rivals 26-2, with its only blemish being dual losses to NLU during the '79 season.

1985 Lady Tigers

Overall Record: 19-7 • SEC Runner-up

LSU's most prolific women's tennis duo, twin sisters Dana De and De Ann Watlington, showcased their outstanding talent by leading an experienced Lady Tiger squad to a second-place finish in the SEC behind Florida. LSU won nine of its final 10 matches of the season under coach Philip Campbell.

The Lady Tigers advanced to the NCAA Championships for the first time in school history, compiling a 19-6 record and finishing third in the SEC. LSU dropped a hard-fought 5-3 decision to Indiana in the opening round at the NAAs, finishing at No. 18 in the nation.

1992 Lady Tigers

The Lady Tigers opened the year with a perfect 5-0 mark, upset No. 10 Miami (Fla.) and beat No. 20 Kentucky in a season in which they finished ranked at No. 21 in the nation. Vikki Chambers and Sarah Stewart became the first doubles team in Lady Tiger history to play in the NCAA doubles tournament.

The Lady Tigers tallied a 19-8 overall record, amassing numerous accolades, including a No. 18 final ranking.

1997 Lady Tigers

Overall Record: 18-9 • NCAA SW Regional Finalists • Final Rank: No. 20

The Lady Tigers enjoyed another stellar campaign, charting numerous athletic and academic honors en route to an 18-9 mark and a national top-20 finish. LSU fell just short of the NCAA Championships with a 5-2 loss to Tennessee in the NCAA Southwest Regional final. Tony Minnis became LSU's winningest coach and was named both SEC and Louisiana Coach of the Year. Three-time All-American Suzana Rodrigues said farewell in 1997 as the highly successful four-year star ended her collegiate career in record fashion.

1998 Lady Tigers

Overall Record: 15-10 • NCAA SW Regional Finalists • Final Rank: No. 26

LSU overcame injuries to two of its top players, Laura Olave and Ana Paula Mores, to qualify for the fourth consecutive year and play host to the NCAA Southwest Regional Championships. After making the final for the second consecutive season, the Lady Tigers were defeated by top-seeded Arkansas, 5-2, to end an impressive run against all odds. Before being upended by the Lady Razorbacks, the Lady Tigers knocked off Baylor and second-seeded Miami (Fla.) Three Lady Tigers seniors, Laura Olave, Jennifer Barr and Jamie Vallotton, bowed out by finishing their careers in Baton Rouge.

1999 Lady Tigers

Overall Record: 13-11 • NCAA Championship Qualifiers • Final Rank: No. 28

LSU finished the 1998-99 season strong despite having only one senior and two freshmen in the starting lineup. Under the leadership of lone senior Nikki Rasheed, the team concluded the season ranked No. 28. Head coach Tony Minnis led the Lady Tigers to their fifth consecutive NCAA post-season appearance, in which they advanced to the second round. Freshmen Bruna Colosio and Tami Botts stepped up for the team, combining for a 31-27 dual-match record. Colosio finished the season ranked 45th in the nation.

2000 Lady Tigers

Overall Record: 16-11 • NCAA Sweet 16 • Final Rank: No. 21

The Lady Tigers accomplished two amazing feats during the 2000 dual-match season. In the second round of the NCAA tournament, No. 32 LSU upset the sixth-ranked Pepperdine Waves, 5-4, on their home court in Malibu, Calif., to advance to the Sweet 16. The biggest upset in school history allowed the 2000 Lady Tigers to become the second LSU women's tennis team to reach the quarterfinal round. The Lady Tigers were led by their lone senior, Ana Paula Mores, and sophomore Bruna Colosio. Colosio ended the season as the sixth ranked singles player in the nation, while Mores ended her illustrious four-year career with 97 singles wins and a No. 75 national ranking. As a doubles team, the pair finished the 2000 campaign ranked No. 4.

2004 Lady Tigers

For the 10th consecutive season, Tony Minnis led the Lady Tigers to an NCAA Tournament berth. Senior Jessica Ferguson finished the season ranked at No. 57 in the nation in leading the team to an SEC West title. The Lady Tigers upset Tennessee in the SEC Tournament to advance to the semifinals before falling to top-seeded Florida. Minnis was named the Southwest Region Coach of the year for the third time as the Tigers finished at No. 20 in the nation.
