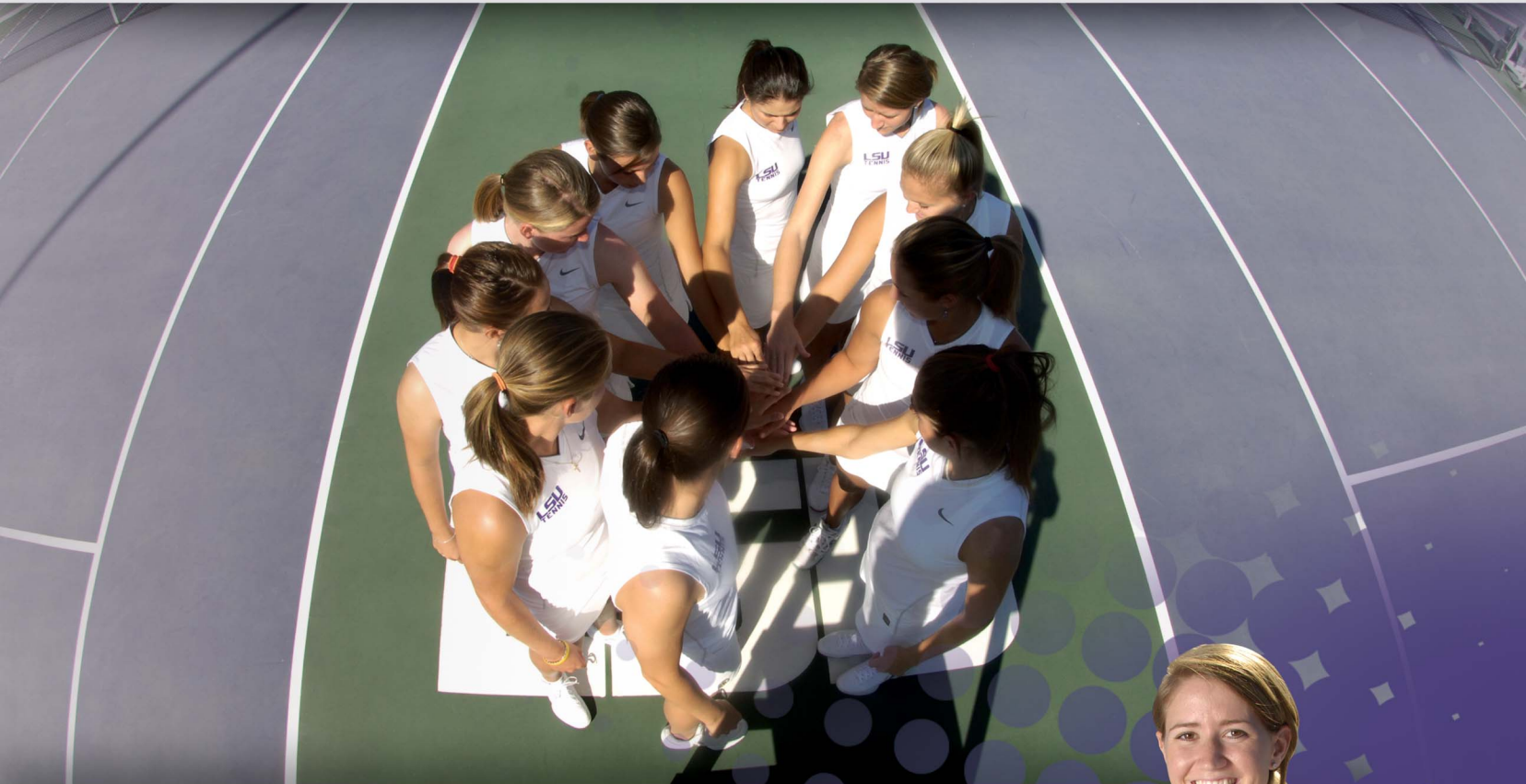

# W.T. "Dub" Robinson TENNIS STADIUM

Since 1970, the W.T. Robinson Tennis Stadium has been the home of the LSU tennis program. The "Dub", as it is affectionately referred to, has undergone numerous renovations and improvements to keep up with collegiate tennis facilities across the nation.

Both the nationally-ranked Tigers and Lady Tigers enjoy state-of-the-art locker rooms, a squad room and brand new showers and bathrooms. The "Dub" was totally refurbished after the 2002 season to include a media room, an equipment room and a ground-floor viewing area for handicapped tennis fans.

Robinson Stadium, named in honor of LSU's former winningest tennis coach, was completed in 1970 and is the site of the Tigers' and Lady Tigers' home outdoor matches. It features six varsity courts and six practice courts that were resurfaced

prior to the 2007 season. In addition, new lights were added to the varsity courts after the 2007 season. The varsity courts feature an electronic scoreboard and can accommodate up to 550 spectators.

The latest addition to the "Dub" came prior to the 2009 dual season when six individual court scoreboards were added on the varsity courts to enhance the fan experience at each match.

Since Tony Minnis took over the LSU women's tennis program, the Lady Tigers have accumulated a 155-65 overall record at home. Their best season came in 2000 when the Lady Tigers remained perfect at home throughout the year. They advanced all the way to the NCAA Tournament Sweet 16 that year as well. LSU has only had one losing season at home since 1992 with the rest of the years producing above .500 marks.

# Athletic TRAINING

LSU boasts the largest and most complete athletic training facilities in all of collegiate athletics with both the Football Operations Center and the Broussard Center for Athletic Training in Tiger Stadium. Both are furnished with the latest in technology and equipment. The Football Operations Center training room features a full view of the practice fields, two hot/cold jacuzzis and an underwater treadmill. The Broussard Center includes an on-site x-ray room, an in-house pharmacy, as well as the largest hydrotherapy pool in both collegiate and professional sports and is one of the few collegiate training centers with a full-service pharmacy and a full-service vision center.



## Hydrotherapy Treatment

An integral part of rehabbing and developing LSU student-athletes is the operations center's hot/cold jacuzzis and an underwater treadmill in a fully equipped Hydrotherapy room. The Broussard training center (above) boasts the largest hydrotherapy pool in both collegiate and professional sports.



## Broussard Athletic TRAINING CENTER

The two story, 22,000 square foot facility contains 20 treatment tables with the newest forms of modalities available, 14 taping stations, a 1,600 square foot rehabilitation area which contains the latest rehabilitation equipment including the Cybex Norm, Woodway treadmills and Body Master select rise equipment. LSU's multi-million dollar athletic training facility is named in honor of Dr. Martin J. Broussard (left), the legendary trainer whose career spanned over 40 years at LSU.





# Strength & CONDITIONING

The LSU strength and conditioning facility was built in 1997 and features the latest in both strength training and cardiovascular training equipment. Measuring 10,000 square feet, LSU has one of the finest strength and conditioning facilities in the nation.

LSU's strength and conditioning team took a new direction in 2000 under strength coach Tommy Moffitt. Moffitt is in charge of the LSU strength and conditioning facilities, located in Tiger Stadium and in the Football Operations Center. The LSU women's tennis program works with Melissa Moore.

Strength and conditioning can be the heart and soul of an athletic program's success, and LSU has taken great strides to improve its strength program and facilities.

“Since we have started working with Melissa, she has improved everybody's physical strength and agility on the court. Working with her has helped our team increase strength in all areas of our game. LSU Women's Tennis also utilizes the state-of-the-art LSU Football Operations Center which houses one of the most complete strength training facilities in the nation. Completed in 2006, the weight room area includes 16 multi-purpose platform, bench, incline, squat and Olympic lifting stations, along with 12 dumbbell bench stations.



### **Bo Campbell Auditorium**

The 1,000-seat auditorium is used through the year as a classroom and lecture hall. Each seat in the auditorium has space for a laptop and a modem hookup, providing each student unlimited learning opportunities. The auditorium also contains a movie theatre size screen to aid professors with lectures and classroom activities.

# LSU ATHLETICS Championship TRADITION

2007-2008 ATHLETICS YEAR IN REVIEW

## The Nation's Elite Teams



### Football

The Tigers celebrated the 10th SEC Championship in school history and capped an amazing season with the program's third national title and second since 2003. LSU posted a 12-2 overall record and a 6-2 mark in SEC play. The Tigers tallied their fourth BCS bowl victory as LSU defeated Ohio State, 38-24, in the 2008 BCS National Championship Game.



### Women's Basketball

The Lady Tigers reached their fifth-straight NCAA Final Four with a 31-5 overall record after wins over Jackson State, Marist, Oklahoma State and North Carolina in the NCAA Tournament. LSU claimed the SEC regular-season title with an unblemished 14-0 mark, representing the second time in the last four seasons the Lady Tigers ran through the conference schedule unbeaten.



### Track and Field

The LSU women's track and field team claimed the 14th NCAA Outdoor championship in school history, and the Lady Tigers were NCAA runners-up during the indoor season. The LSU men's track and field team placed second at the NCAA Outdoor Championships. The Lady Tigers swept both the SEC Indoor and Outdoor titles, while the men's team captured league runner-up honors during both seasons.



### Baseball

The baseball team completed one of the most remarkable turnarounds in SEC history as the Tigers reached the College World Series for the 14th time. The Tigers, who once held a 6-11-1 record in SEC play, won the SEC Western Division, the SEC Tournament, the NCAA Baton Rouge Regional and the NCAA Baton Rouge Super Regional. The turnaround was sparked by an SEC-record 23 consecutive wins down the stretch.



### Gymnastics

The gymnastics team advanced to the NCAA Super Six for the first time in program history after the Tigers won the NCAA Central Regional. LSU finished fifth at the NCAA Championships. The fifth-place ranking marked the highest finish for a Tiger gymnastics team since 1988, which was prior to the establishment of the NCAA Super Six. LSU now has 24 consecutive postseason appearances.

## How The West Was Won

LSU became the first school to claim the SEC Western Division title in all three fall sports -- football, volleyball and soccer -- and the Tigers added another divisional championship in the spring with baseball. The volleyball team won its third-straight Western Division title with a 25-8 overall record, and the soccer team finished with a 12-5-7 overall mark to win the program's first division crown.



## Elite Athletes

### Kelly Baptiste

#### WOMEN'S TRACK & FIELD

Kelly Baptiste led the Lady Tigers to their 25th NCAA championship by scoring a team-high 19 points at the outdoor nationals. She became the fifth Lady Tiger to be crowned NCAA champion in the 100-meter dash, while she also added All-America honors in the 200 meters, 4x100 relay and 4x400 relay.

### Blake Dean

#### BASEBALL

Blake Dean will go down in LSU lore as one of the greatest hitters in postseason history, batting .404 in the Tigers' postseason run to the College World Series. The sophomore was a first-team All-American by Baseball America, and he provided game-winning hits in four postseason contests, including a memorable walk-off, three-run double to lead LSU past Rice in the CWS.

### Kevin Dessauer

#### MEN'S TENNIS

Kevin Dessauer led the Tigers to their 14th-straight NCAA Tournament appearance as the 2008 team captain. On the courts, Dessauer finished second on the team with 21 singles victories. Off the courts, he ended his undergraduate career with a perfect 4.0 grade-point average and was the recipient of the Southeast Regional ITA/Arthur Ashe Award for Leadership and Sportsmanship.

### Glenn Dorsey

#### FOOTBALL

Glenn Dorsey became the most decorated defensive player in school history and led the Tigers to their third national championship. Dorsey, the fifth pick of the 2008 NFL Draft by the Kansas City Chiefs, was a consensus first-team All-American. The senior was the recipient of the Outland, Nagurski, Lombardi and Lott Awards as college football's top defensive player.



### Megan Falcon

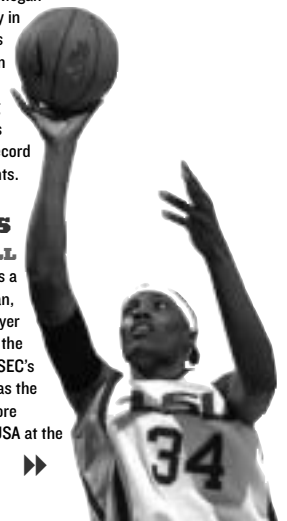
#### WOMEN'S TENNIS

A two-time singles All-American, Megan Falcon continued her brilliant play in 2008, earning All-America honors and first-team All-SEC recognition in her junior campaign. Falcon received a Top 20 singles ranking for the second-straight season as she finished with a 27-7 overall record with 12 wins over ranked opponents.

### Sylvia Fowles

#### WOMEN'S BASKETBALL

Sylvia Fowles closed her career as a unanimous first-team All-American, the WBCA National Defensive Player of the Year and the SEC Player of the Year. The 6-6 senior became the SEC's all-time leading rebounder and was the No. 2 pick in the WNBA Draft before winning a gold medal with Team USA at the 2008 Olympics.



# The Most Successful LSU Athletics Season In School History



LSU capped the most successful athletics season -- from top to bottom -- in school history by recording an eighth-place finish in the U.S. Sports Academy Director's Cup. The eighth-place finish is the highest for LSU since the inception of the director's cup in 1993-94. The Tigers accumulated an all-time high 1,085 points in 17 of a possible 20 sports, a first in school history. In all, the Tigers sent 19 of their 20 teams to NCAA post-season play in 2007-08. Eight teams finished in the top five nationally of their respective sports.



## Susan Jackson ▲

### GYMNASTICS

Susan Jackson became the fourth LSU gymnast to win an NCAA individual title in school history as she was the 2008 NCAA national champion on the vault with a score of 9.8563 at the individual event finals at the NCAA Championships. The sophomore also earned All-America honors on the beam, floor, vault and all-around.

## Andrew Loupe

### MEN'S GOLF

Andrew Loupe was one of three LSU golfers to earn SEC All-Freshman honors in 2007-08. Loupe led the squad with a scoring average of 74.06 in 11 appearances, and his two Top 10 finishes tied for a team-best mark.

## Christoph Lubenau

### MEN'S SWIMMING & DIVING

Christoph Lubenau shattered the school record in the 100-yard butterfly at the NCAA Championships (46.24) while earning NCAA All-America honors with a ninth-place finish. Lubenau added another All-America finish as part of the Tigers' school-record-setting 200 freestyle relay.

## Michelle Makasini

### SOCCER

Michelle Makasini was chosen as a Top Drawer Soccer Honorable Mention All-American and became the second LSU soccer player in school history to earn first-team All-SEC honors as she helped lead the Lady Tigers to their first NCAA Tournament berth and an SEC Western Division title.

## Elena Martinez

### VOLLEYBALL

The 2007 SEC Defensive Player of the Year, the senior libero also earned honorable mention AVCA All-America honors and was a second-team All-SEC selection. Martinez led the conference in digs and digs per game, breaking the 21-year-old SEC record for digs in a season as LSU won its third-straight SEC West title and earned a third-straight NCAA Tournament berth.

## Rachel Mitchell

### SOFTBALL

A second-team NFCA All-South Region selection, the junior outfielder also earned first-team All-SEC honors. Mitchell ranked in the top 10 in the SEC in 10 offensive categories and was in the top 100 in the NCAA in five.

## Anthony Randolph

### MEN'S BASKETBALL

Anthony Randolph, after a stellar freshman season, became the 13th LSU player drafted in the first round of the NBA Draft when he was chosen with the 14th pick by the Golden State Warriors, the final pick of the NBA lottery teams.

## Alexis Rather

### WOMEN'S GOLF

Alexis Rather chipped in from off the green on the first playoff hole to give the Lady Tigers the eighth and final spot in the NCAA Division I Women's Golf Championships. LSU would go on to finish 15th, and after the season the senior would be named an assistant coach of the Ole Miss Rebels.



## Richard Thompson ▲

### MEN'S TRACK & FIELD

Richard Thompson proved to be the nation's most dominant sprinter in 2008 as he was named the NCAA Men's Outdoor Track Athlete of the Year. He became the first LSU athlete in program history to sweep NCAA titles in the 60-meter dash and 100-meter dash in the same season, but he did not stop there as he went on to win silver medals in the 100 meters and 4x100-meter relay for his native Trinidad & Tobago at the 2008 Olympic Games in Beijing.

## Rachel Ware

### WOMEN'S SWIMMING & DIVING

Rachel Ware, the 2007-08 SEC Diver of the Year, recorded her third career NCAA All-America accolade when she finished 12th in the 1-meter springboard at the NCAA Championships.

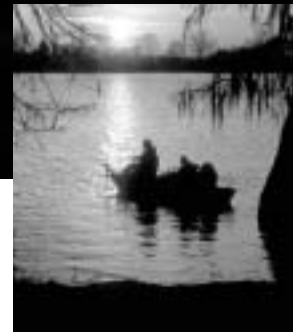

## Dr. Michael V. Martin

Chancellor, LSU



Dr. Michael V. Martin was approved as the eighth chancellor of LSU by the Board of Supervisors on June 5, 2008. Dr. Martin, formerly the president of New Mexico State University, had served at NMSU since 2004.

In his time at NMSU he was praised for his reorganization of the university's athletic department and physical plant, as well as his fundraising prowess. A 1969 graduate of Mankato State College, Dr. Martin received a Ph.D. in applied economics from the University of Minnesota in 1977 and has since worked in both academic and administrative capacities at universities such as Minnesota, Oregon State University and the University of Florida.

An agricultural economist, Dr. Martin is considered an expert on land-grant universities.

Dr. Martin became president of New Mexico State University on July 1, 2004. An academic leader dedicated to the land-grant mission of teaching, research and extension service, he was awarded the 2008 Distinguished Leadership Award by Leadership New Mexico. Dr. Martin was recognized as a strong voice for education and the agriculture industry in New Mexico. The Leadership New Mexico Distinguished Leadership Award recognizes an individual who has used his/her leadership abilities to improve the quality of life for New Mexico citizens and future generations.

Dr. Martin also was named the recipient of the Justin Smith Morrill Memorial Award in 2007. This national award, named after the author of the bill creating land-grant universities, honors and recognizes outstanding service on behalf of the land-grant mission. Only six individuals have been designated to receive this award since it was first given in 1980.

Dr. Martin established at NMSU the One University concept and called for a five-year plan titled "Living the Vision" to take the university to "the next level." He laid the groundwork for university wide extension and created the J. Paul Taylor Social Justice Symposium.

During his tenure at NMSU, the first capital campaign was established with a goal of raising \$150 million by 2010. The campaign met its goal in the first half of the seven-year fundraising plan. Dr. Martin also oversaw the establishment of a system of research clusters that revolve around five areas in which NMSU scientists and researchers have expertise: 21st century aerospace, information sciences, bioscience, southwest border issues, and natural resources.

Dr. Martin was a recognized leader in New Mexico, being named a powerbroker by the New Mexico Business Weekly in 2006. He continues to be active as a scholar and has written numerous book chapters and articles for academic journals, trade publications and the popular press. He recently has published pieces for The Chronicle of Higher Education and University Business. Named the Outstanding Alumnus of Minnesota State University Mankato in 2006, Dr. Martin

also received the NMSU Social Justice Award in 2005.

Before arriving at NMSU, he served for six years as vice president for agriculture and natural resources at the University of Florida, leading the university's Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences with more than 3,000 employees statewide. He was elevated to senior vice president of the University of Florida shortly before being selected as NMSU's president.

Previously, he was vice president for agricultural policy and the dean of the College of Agricultural, Food and Environmental Sciences at the University of Minnesota. He began his academic career at Oregon State University as a faculty member in the Department of Agricultural and Resource Economics.

A native of Crosby, Minn., Dr. Martin completed a bachelor's degree in business and economics and a master's degree in economics at Mankato State College (Minnesota State University) in Minnesota. He received his Ph.D. in applied economics from the University of Minnesota in 1977. His areas of specialization are marketing, prices, international trade, public policy, transportation and business logistics.

Some of his philosophy is summed up in the following quote: "It is the tradition of land-grant universities to be non-traditional," written as part of a 2001 article titled "The Land-Grant University in the 21st Century," published in the Journal of Agricultural and Applied Economics. He traced the history of the land-grant movement from the mid-1800s and concluded that "the fundamental land-grant principles of accessibility, practical as well as classical education, research and discovery in the public interest, and connectedness to all the people remain powerful and profound."

He has been active in professional and community service organizations, including the Farm Foundation's Bennett Agricultural Round Table, the National Agricultural Biotechnology Council and the Florida Agricultural Resource Mobilization Foundation. He is a member of the American Economic Association, the American Agricultural Economics Association, the International Association of Agricultural Economics, the International Agricultural Trade Research Consortium, the Sigma XI Scientific Research Society and the Economic History Association.

Dr. Martin and his wife Jan have two children, both adopted from South Korea. Amanda, a graduate of the University of Wisconsin-Eau Claire, is a graphic artist in Saint Paul, Minn. Sam, with a bachelor's degree from the University of Minnesota and a master's from Sarah Lawrence College, is a genetics counselor at Beth Israel Hospital in New York City.



## Dydia DeLyser

Faculty Athletics Representative

Dydia DeLyser, an associate professor in the Department of Geography and Anthropology, serves in her second year as LSU's Faculty Athletics Representative.

DeLyser, a native of Santa Monica, Calif., earned her bachelor's degree in 1992 from UCLA, and her master's and doctoral degrees from Syracuse University (in 1996 and 1998).

DeLyser arrived at LSU in August 1998 as an Instructor before becoming an assistant professor one year later. She was promoted to associate professor with tenure in August 2005.

DeLyser is a cultural-historical geographer. Her research has been both ethnographic and historical, and most of it questions how different built landscapes can help make the past meaningful in the present.

Much of her published research has focused on two different studies. One was a many-year ethnographic study of a ghost town in California (Bodie State Historic Park) where she examined how images and ideas about the American mythic West became meaningful

to the tourists who visited the town. The second was an historical study that examined a 19th century novel (Ramona) and how it changed the way people understood (and still understand) southern California's past.

Her current research concerns early women aviators and how they used their practices of flying to advance feminism in the post-suffrage era.

DeLyser teaches graduate courses in cultural geography, qualitative research, and academic and professional writing. She has also taught undergraduate courses in cultural, and urban geography, and an introductory world-regional geography course.

DeLyser is a first-generation American -- her parents were Dutch immigrants and English is her second language. She also has language abilities in Russian and Spanish.

DeLyser's hobbies include driving/riding antique cars and motorcycles. She is also a licensed pilot and co-owns a Citabria, which is a two-place aerobatic airplane.



## Joe Alleva

LSU Director of Athletics



Joe Alleva officially became the Director of Athletics at LSU on July 1, 2008, after spending the last 10 years in the same position at prestigious Duke University. Under Alleva's direction, the Duke athletic department experienced unprecedented growth and success.

"Joe Alleva brings a wealth of experience and accomplishment to LSU," said President John Lombardi. "I'm confident we've found a new leader for LSU athletics who exemplifies the vision and integrity needed to lead our sports programs to new heights, a champion of student-athletes who believes in the highest standards of competition both on the field and in the classroom."

At LSU, Alleva is responsible for the administration and direction of the Tiger athletic program, which has a current annual budget of approximately \$70 million, includes 20 teams and more than 400 student-athletes.

At Duke, Alleva oversaw more than 190 staff members, a \$50 million budget, 26 sports and more than 600 student-athletes. Duke athletics flourished under Alleva's direction.

Alleva, 55, has built his professional career on service to student-athletes and the commitment to individual development in athletics, academics and community service. Alleva is well-respected for sustaining high standards of excellence and integrity in the athletics program, the quality of coaches he has hired and the high level of success that was achieved across athletic programs at Duke under his leadership.

Alleva's tenure as AD at Duke propelled the university into the ranks of America's top all-around collegiate programs. The Blue Devils consistently finished high in the annual Directors' Cup standings, ranking as high as fifth in 2005. Prior to 1998-99, Alleva's first full year as director of athletics, Duke had never placed higher than 21st in the Directors' Cup standings. Since then, Duke has enjoyed seven Top 20 finishes, including five in succession (2004-08).

In the 2006 National Collegiate Scouting Association Power Rankings that combine a school's Directors' Cup finish, its athletic graduation rates and its academic ranking in U.S. News and World Report, Duke was the top-ranked Division I school in the nation. Duke also finished first in this listing in 2005 and second in 2004.

Alleva's outstanding list of accomplishments includes Duke winning more ACC and NCAA championships than in any other 10-year period in school history. Six Duke teams won national championships under Alleva's leadership and 46 Blue Devil teams recorded ACC championships, the second-highest total among ACC schools since 1997-98.

Under Alleva's commitment to education, Duke's graduation rates continued to rank among the best in the nation. Duke regularly led the ACC in Academic Honor Roll honorees as Alleva increased the financial commitment to academic support by ten-fold during his tenure as AD.

While continuing to excel in competition and in the classroom, Alleva instituted a number of innovative community service programs for Duke student-athletes to benefit the community. Duke student-athletes regularly volunteered nearly 3,000 hours in community outreach.

Fundraising under Alleva's guidance reached extensive heights during his career at Duke. Alleva and his fundraising team generated more than \$173 million in gifts and funded more than \$85 million in new facilities or renovations. Annual giving to the Iron Dukes increased 50 percent since the year 2000.

New facilities built under Alleva's supervision include the Michael W. Krzyzewski Center Dedicated to Athletic and Academic Excellence, Yoh Football Center, Sheffield Tennis Center, Schwartz-Butters Athletic Center, Ambler Tennis Stadium, Karcher-Ingram Golf Center, Rod Myers Teaching Center, the

Skandalaris Fieldhouse at Koskinen Stadium and the fieldhouse at Williams Field. Facility upgrades were made to Cameron Indoor Stadium, Wallace Wade Stadium, Jack Coombs Stadium, Koskinen Stadium, Williams Field, Murray Athletic Building and Brooks Field at the football practice facility.

Alleva is active on the national collegiate athletics scene, having served on the Football Bowl Certification Committee. He sat on several Atlantic Coast Conference committees and served on the NCAA Division I Championships/Competition Cabinet.

Alleva majored in Finance at Lehigh University and received his bachelor's degree in 1975. While at Lehigh, Alleva was the quarterback of the football team and team captain in 1974. Alleva also played on the Lehigh baseball team. He served as a graduate assistant football coach and earned an MBA in 1976.

Alleva began his career at Duke working for the vice president of business and finance in 1976 and joined the Duke athletic department in 1980 as director of finance. He became the assistant director of athletics in 1986 and was soon promoted in 1987 to associate director before his tenure as

Director of Athletics in 1998.

He played a key role in Durham's community sports scene. He started Little League Baseball in Durham more than 20 years ago, and also began the American Legion baseball program.

Alleva is a member of the North Carolina American Legion Hall of Fame, Suffern High School Hall of Fame and the Rockland County Hall of Fame.

Alleva and his wife, Annie, have two sons, J.D. and Jeff, along with a daughter, Jenny. J.D. played baseball at Duke and was picked in the 24th round of the 2001 Major League Baseball Amateur Draft by the Kansas City Royals and is now a professional scout for the Houston Astros. Jeff finished his baseball career at Duke in 2003 and signed a free agent contract with the Royals following his senior season. He recently graduated with his MBA from the prestigious Fuqua School of Business at Duke. Jenny, a four-year letterwinner on Duke's women's soccer team, attends law school at the University of North Carolina.

The Southeastern Conference men's and women's tennis programs continue to be among the nation's leaders on the collegiate hardcourt and the trend continued this past season.

The conference made another strong national showing in 2008 as the Georgia men won their second consecutive and sixth overall national title and the Florida women advanced to the semifinals at the 2008 NCAA Division I Tennis Championships in Tulsa, Okla.

On the women's side, the Lady Gators made it to the semifinals before being defeated by eventual

champion UCLA, 4-2. This marked the 23rd straight year that at least one SEC team advanced to the national semifinals.

All six of the SEC's national team titles have come in the last 14 years with Florida's four (1992, 1996, 1998 and 2003) and Georgia's two (1994 and 2000).

In the singles tournament, Arkansas' Aurelija Miseviciute and Auburn's Fani Chifchieva made it to the semifinals.

In doubles, the teams of Alex Haney/Melissa Koning, Auburn; Nika Koukhartchouk/Karen Nijssen, Ole Miss; and Ela Kaluder/Aurelija

Miseviciute, Arkansas all made it to the Round of 16.

The league has garnered five NCAA women's doubles titles since 1989, when Mississippi State's Jackie Holden and Clair Pollard took the title. In 1991, the Lady Gator duo of Jilliam Alexander and Nicole Arendt won the crown. Florida's Dawn Buth and Stephanie Nickitas won back-to-back titles in 1996 and 1997 and advanced to the doubles finals in 1998. The last national double s title won was in 2001 by Florida's Whitney Laiho and Jessica Lehnhoff.

## SEC Commissioner

The office of the commissioner was formed in 1940 in Jackson due to the great amount of detail work developing, especially in recruiting and eligibility. Former Mississippi Governor Martin S. Conner took office as commissioner Aug. 21, 1940. Conner later became ill and the secretary of the conference, Dean N.W. Dougherty of Tennessee, served as acting commissioner during the fall of 1946.

The office moved to Birmingham with the appointing of Bernie H. Moore as the second full-time commissioner on Feb. 21, 1948. Moore, a former LSU coach, guided the SEC to national respect in his 18-year tenure. A.M. (Tonto) Coleman succeeded Moore upon his retirement April 1, 1966. The Alabama native, who was reared in Texas and experienced in athletic coaching and administration, served six and a half years.

Dr. H. Boyd McWhorter, then Dean of Arts and Sciences at Georgia, secretary of the league since 1967, accepted the position upon the retirement of

Coleman Aug. 1, 1972. Under his leadership the SEC experienced unparalleled growth. In McWhorter's first year the SEC distributed \$1.57 million and 14 years later (1986), the league distributed \$15 million in revenue to the member institutions.

Dr. Harvey W. Schiller, an Air Force colonel and faculty chair at the U. S. Air Force Academy, followed McWhorter upon retirement, taking office Sept. 15, 1986. Under his guidance the SEC established itself as a leader in the areas of athletic scholarship and marketing.

Roy F. Kramer succeeded Schiller on Jan. 10, 1990. Kramer, who has served on numerous NCAA committees, joined the league office after spending 12 years as athletic director at Vanderbilt. Kramer held the office of Commissioner for more than 12 years before retiring in the summer of 2002.

Michael L. Slive, who served as Commissioner of Conference USA for seven years, was appointed the seventh Commissioner of the Southeastern Conference on July 2, 2002.



As the governing body of collegiate tennis, the Intercollegiate Tennis Association (ITA) promotes both the athletic and academic achievements of the collegiate tennis community. The ITA, which is based in Skillman, N.J., administers the ITA Collegiate Grand Slam Championships, the ITA Collegiate Summer Circuit, presented by the USTA, and the ITA Rankings for men's and women's tennis at the NCAA Divisions I, II and III, NAIA and Junior College levels. The ITA also has a comprehensive awards program for players and coaches to honor excellence in academics, leadership and sportsmanship.

**Megan Falcon**

One year removed from an appearance in the second round of the NCAA Tournament, the LSU women's tennis team is one year older, wiser and readier than ever to improve upon last season's success and take a step further in 2009.

Without a doubt this is one of the most talented teams head coach Tony Minnis has fielded in his 18 years as coach of the Lady Tigers. LSU has all the components to step onto the courts every match and expect victory.

Two seasons ago LSU had a four-player freshman class that was ranked No. 17 by tennisrecruiting.net and a new sophomore named Megan Falcon who was waiting to reveal herself to the country as one of the nation's best. Last season that group of freshmen had turned into sophomores with a full year of experience in one of the nation's toughest conferences – the Southeastern Conference. Falcon maintained an elite status in singles and doubles as the Lady Tigers advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament for the first time

since 2000.

Now, the 2009 season has arrived with Falcon leading the way as a senior two-time All-American while that all-star freshmen class from 2006 made up of Nicole Kantor, Hannah Robinson and Sloane Mathis are now all juniors. Throw into the mix three other seniors along with Falcon and two outstanding freshmen, and the 2009 LSU Fighting Tigers are a force to be reckoned with on the collegiate tennis scene.

#### THE SENIORS

The 2009 LSU team is led by four seniors, the most since the 2005-06 team that also had four seniors on board. This group of seniors includes some of the most experienced and talented players ever to pick up the racket for LSU.

Chandler Kleinpeter joined the team one season ago as a walk-on, but she made an immediate impact on the team's chemistry. Because she was recovering from a severe back injury Kleinpeter did not compete much at all as a junior, but

she carried herself as an outstanding team player – cheering on her teammates at every match whether home or away and encouraging all of the players at practice and at matches. There is no doubt that her pride in the LSU spirit and her vocal leadership will provide a boost for the Lady Tigers.

“Chandler is a great asset to the team,” Minnis said. “She is always enthusiastic, and she always has a smile on her face.”

Mykala Hedberg enters the 2009 season as a three-time letterwinner and one of the Lady Tigers' most talented players. The moment she stepped onto the courts at W.T. “Dub” Robinson Stadium as a freshman Hedberg ascended to the No. 1 position in singles. Since the emergence of Falcon as one of the nation's top players, Hedberg has positioned herself strongly in the No. 2 spot in singles, and she and Falcon have formed one of the nation's top doubles tandems. Going into her final season with the Lady Tigers, Hedberg will be counted upon as a senior to lead LSU at the top of the

lineup in doubles and singles if the Lady Tigers are to reach lofty goals.

“Mykala is capable of being one of the top players in the country. She has established herself in doubles, and if she can reach her potential in singles, then she will be one of the best players in the nation,” Minnis said.

Staten Spencer can easily be defined as “gutsy” and “determined” because the Memphis, Tenn., native has worked her way through injury after injury since she has been at LSU. In fact, Spencer is the eldest Lady Tiger because she is a fifth-year senior after redshirting in 2005-06. Throughout her career at LSU Spencer has been dominant in the bottom of the singles lineup, competing the last two seasons mostly at the fifth or sixth position. After sitting out the fall, Spencer is the healthiest she has been since her freshman season at LSU and the Lady Tigers will once again look to her court savvy and leadership at the back end of the lineup to lead LSU to victory this season.

“She has had so many injuries,

and she has battled through pain and fought hard," Minnis said. "I don't know if there is a more clutch player than Staten when it comes down to it in tight matches."

Megan Falcon is the fourth senior on the team, and for the third straight season the Lady Tigers will count on her strong and steady performance at the No. 1 singles and doubles spots in the lineup. Entering the dual season Falcon was again ranked in the nation's top five singles players, and she has proven in both her sophomore and junior seasons that LSU is in safe hands with Falcon leading the team on the courts. The Alameda, Calif., native enters the dual season with a 78-14 overall record, including 43 wins against ranked opponents in only two seasons of collegiate tennis. If the Lady Tigers are to experience the success that they hope for, Falcon must once again lead by example on the court, something Minnis fully expects.

"What separates Megan from a lot of players is she is such a great competitor. She has handled adversity, and she shows up every match and gives 100 percent. The things that she has accomplished to this point are phenomenal," Minnis said.

### THE JUNIORS

While the 2009 senior class is full of leaders and talented players, the three juniors on the squad are one of the biggest reasons why LSU is a consistent top 25 team. For the past two seasons this group has soaked up experience, and now as upperclassmen they have the chance to lead the Lady Tigers to greatness.

Sloane Mathis, like Kleinpeter, is a walk-on, but she has provided and continues to provide depth to the team. Mathis has been a solid contributor throughout her career, but mainly she has been a huge encourager and supporter for the team, especially in tight matches. With Mathis' gained experience as well as her upbeat attitude, Minnis believes She can be a stronger presence for LSU.

"She showed a lot of improvement in the fall and played very well. She has gained a competitive edge where she now understands how to compete and fight at a high level," Minnis said. "Sloane is also about as solid a person as you can have on a team. She works hard and has the best attitude."

Nicole Kantor was one of the top recruits in the country coming out of high school, and she has been a solid contributor in the middle of

the lineup for LSU since she stepped on the courts for the first time. With two years of experience and confidence-building, Kantor will be looked upon to guide the Lady Tigers to greater success in 2009. She certainly stepped up her game in the fall by posting 11 wins, the second most on the team behind Falcon. No doubt that her production will need to stay up for the Lady Tigers to accomplish their goals.

"She is steady and is one of the smartest players in the country. She thinks her game through and gets the most out of it. She fights hard

and plays smart, but we have to get her a little stronger to take that next step," Minnis said.

Hannah Robinson was a top-rated recruit like Kantor coming out of junior tennis in 2006, and she quickly made her presence felt. Since her freshman season in 2006 Robinson only trails Falcon in total wins over the past two years. Her leadership and competitiveness in the middle of the lineup will be counted upon as the Lady Tigers look to achieve higher goals. With her fight and toughness, LSU should be solid in singles and doubles.

"Her first two years here have been unbelievable, but as good as Hannah is, she is capable of being even better because she competes as well as anybody I have coached," Minnis said.

### THE SOPHOMORE

LSU's lone sophomore is Kylie Adamek, a walk-on from Baton Rouge, who has provided solid depth for the Lady Tigers like Mathis and Kleinpeter. Adamek will be looked upon to continue to provide another option to fill in spots in the doubles and singles lineups when needed by the coaches.

"I feel like she is capable of being very competitive, especially in doubles, and if she believes in herself a little more, then she could really be a fantastic player," Minnis said.

### THE FRESHMEN

Minnis and assistant coach Lisa Jackson signed two freshmen for the 2009 season, and both figure to contribute heavily to the success of the team.

"With these two kids we feel very comfortable with them out there on the court, and we feel comfortable that they can contribute early," Minnis said.

Nicole Smith is a native of South Africa – the nation Jackson hails from as well. Smith comes to LSU after being ranked as high as No. 277 in the International Tennis Federation's worldwide junior rankings. Smith also reached as high

as No. 10 in South Africa's overall women's singles rankings, and she ranked fifth in the country's junior singles rankings and third in the doubles rankings. Minnis and Jackson believe her ability will be needed for LSU to accomplish its goals.

"With Nix, she didn't have the advantages of the training that she has here, and she has an unbelievable amount of talent," Minnis said. "When she gains more experience as the season goes on, she can be a very good contributor in SEC play."

Whitney Wolf was rated as the state of Louisiana's No. 1 player by tennisrecruiting.net for the class of 2008 and was also listed as a five-star player. Wolf is expected to make an immediate impact on the middle part of the lineup, and her powerful serve and forceful ground strokes will be a fresh ingredient to the Lady Tigers' already potent lineup.

"Whitney has an unbelievable amount of potential," Minnis said. "I can see her down the line

really developing and becoming one of the top players in the country. As she grows and matures her best tennis is ahead of her."

#### TOUGH ROAD AHEAD

Playing in one of the nation's best conferences – the SEC – LSU will face a slew of ranked opponents all season long. However, not only will the Lady Tigers face at least eight to 11 ranked SEC opponents, but the Lady Tigers will also encounter multiple ranked non-conference foes throughout the season. As usual, Minnis and staff put together a dynamite schedule – one that features 18 out of 24 opponents ranked in the preseason team rankings.

"We have adopted the philosophy to go out and play against the best day in and day out. We have the talent to be very competitive with those teams, so we are putting ourselves in position to have shots left and right to capitalize and do

something special," Minnis said.

One benefit for the Lady Tigers is that three of the SEC's top four teams from a season ago will travel to Baton Rouge to face LSU in the "Dub." Reigning SEC regular season champion Florida, SEC tournament champion Georgia and top 10-ranked Vanderbilt will all make the trek to Baton Rouge to square off with the Lady Tigers. One other benefit of the tough schedule is the spacing that the coaches placed between several matches. There are two stretches in the schedule where LSU will have at least seven days of rest to recover.

"We tried to space out the beginning of our schedule for two reasons: One – to get more indoor experience and, two – to give the kids a little more of a break where they are not playing as many matches over a short period of time," Minnis said.

#### LOFTY GOALS AND HIGH EXPECTATIONS

With seven upperclassmen, including four seniors, and two dynamic freshmen, the 2009 LSU women's tennis team is not short on lofty goals or high expectations. Throw in a schedule that has LSU facing the top teams of the SEC at home with nice breaks in the schedule to rest and recuperate, and it is no wonder that the coaching staff and fan base have high hopes in '09.

"The realistic goal is to make a run at the SEC title and make a run in the NCAA Tournament," Minnis said. "Those are realistic goals based on the experience and talent we have. We should be in a position from a focus and desire standpoint to make a serious run."

If any team is prepared to take a run deep into the SEC and NCAA Tournament, it is the 2009 LSU Lady Tigers. With experience, talent and a little bit of luck, one might not be surprised to find the Lady Tigers reaching new heights this season.

Tony Minnis is entering his 18th season as the head coach of the LSU women's tennis team, and the program continues to flourish under his leadership.

Last season, Minnis guided LSU to the NCAA Tournament for the 13th time in his 17 years as head coach of the Lady Tigers as the team reached the second round of the tournament for the seventh time in his career.

In 2007, Minnis was named the Southwest Regional Coach of the Year. It marked the fourth time in Minnis' career that he received the honor as he was named the coach of the year in 1995, 1999 and 2004.

After a season in 2005-06 in which LSU did not make the NCAA Tournament for the first time in 11 years, Minnis guided a youthful, inexperienced Lady Tiger team to the NCAA Tournament in 2006-07 as the Southeastern Conference Western Division co-champions.

The 2006-07 season marked the second time LSU finished atop the SEC West standings since the conference switched to Eastern and Western divisions in 2002. More than that, Minnis led the team to the top of the SEC West standings even though three, four or sometimes five newcomers started during the season.

Minnis was instrumental in bringing in two-time singles All-American Megan Falcon, who finished her sophomore season in 2007 at 38-3 and raced all the way to the semifinals of the NCAA Individual Championships. Falcon's semifinal finish was the furthest any LSU player has reached at the NCAA Individual Championships, surpassing two other Minnis recruits - Bruna Colosio in 2000 and 2001 and Suzana Rodrigues in 1994 - who both made it to the quarterfinals. Falcon was also named the SEC Player of the Year in 2007, the second player under Minnis to receive the honor after Colosio was selected the league's top player in 2001.

Besides great play on the tennis court, Minnis has also stressed hard work in the classroom, and the results have shown as the team was named an Intercollegiate Tennis Association All-Academic Team with a cumulative grade-point average of 3.385 in the 2007-08 year. Not only was the team as a whole honored for its performance off the courts, but a school-record seven Lady Tigers were named ITA Scholar-Athletes for maintaining a grade-point average of at least a 3.50. In 2007 four Lady Tigers were named ITA Scholar-Athletes. During the 2006 season, LSU captured Minnis' 200th victory of his career, a milestone that LSU's winningest coach contributes to numerous people over the length of his career.

"I think that in everything that's accomplished whether it be making it to 13 NCAA Tournaments or getting 200 wins, there are a lot of kids, former players and assistant coaches who have had a lot to do with that," Minnis explained. "I'm just appreciative and feel very fortunate to be at a great school for as long as I have been, to have been at a program where we've been very consistent

over the years. And I think that is the mark of consistency, to have that many wins over that period of time."

As LSU opens up the 2009 season, Minnis stands 11 wins shy of 250 for his career as his record at LSU is 239-182. During his time at LSU Minnis has coached five All-Americans who have received nine All-America honors and more than 60 Academic All-Southeastern Conference players.

A Baton Rouge native, Minnis returned to his hometown in 1992 to take over the LSU women's tennis team. By earning his 80th career victory at LSU in 1997, he passed Phillip Campbell (1984-88) as the winningest women's tennis coach in Tigers history.

During the 2002 dual-match season, Minnis earned his 150th career victory with a 5-2 win over Tulsa. The achievement was just another milestone obtained by the talented young coach.

"I don't really think about that much," he said. "One thing I've learned as a player and a coach is to instill in yourself and your team an attitude that when one thing is over you move on to the next. It's nice to know I've had those accomplishments in my career here, but I try to focus on each year."

Minnis came to LSU knowing what it takes to excel in the sport. He was a tennis star at Southwestern Louisiana from 1984-88. He served as team captain his freshman and senior seasons and is USL's all-time winningest singles player with an impressive 94-40 career mark.

He followed his playing career with a job as an assistant tennis coach at USL, as well as working as the club professional at several tennis clubs in the Lafayette, La., area. But, Minnis said, his LSU experience has taught him the most about the game.

"I've learned a lot over my career, especially about how very, very important it is to communicate with your players," he said. "I know the roller coasters that come with coaching and I've learned to take them in stride. I have been so fortunate to be in this tremendous environment at LSU, because you get to learn from every single coach here. There are some great coaches and that's the beauty of having an athletic department as good as this one."

With those years of experience and lessons has come a pile of awards and achievements for

Minnis and his Lady Tigers.

In 2004, Minnis guided the team to a final ITA ranking of No. 20 in a season that included an NCAA Tournament berth, an SEC Western Division Championship and an appearance in the SEC Tournament semifinals. The Lady Tigers lost to eventual SEC Champion Florida.

During the 2001 campaign, Minnis and the Lady Tigers put together a solid campaign and finished the season with a 14-10 overall record. The squad advanced to the NCAA Tournament and finished the year with a No. 27 national ranking.

Bruna Colosio, who graduated after a record-breaking senior season in 2002, was one of the top five players in the nation and the 2001 SEC Player of the Year. She excelled under Minnis' constant tutelage and received All-America status in both 2000 and 2001.

During an unexpected run at the NCAA Championships in 2000, Minnis led LSU to its second Sweet 16 appearance in school history. The Lady Tigers upset sixth-ranked Pepperdine, 5-4, in the second round of the tournament. The upset is considered the most impressive victory in team history. LSU fell in the Sweet 16 to USC.

In 1999, Minnis was named the Southwest

Regional Coach of the Year after reaching the NCAA Tournament for the fifth straight season. The season was supposed to be a rebuilding one, but Minnis led his squad to upset victories over both 10th-ranked Tennessee and 15th-ranked Arkansas on its way to a final ranking of No. 28 in the nation.

In 1997, Minnis was named the SEC Coach of the Year when he led LSU to the regional finals. The Lady Tigers advanced to the championship match of the Southwest regional by beating Texas A&M, 5-0. Minnis was recognized as the Louisiana Coach of the Year for the third time in four years. Senior Suzana Rodrigues finished her career ranked fifth in all-time singles wins at 108-42 overall. She and teammate Laura Olave won the 1996 National Clay Court Doubles title. The tandem earned All-America honors after placing 10th in the final doubles rankings.

LSU posted its highest national ranking ever under Minnis in April of 1995 when the Lady Tigers leapt from No. 30 to No. 15 after upsetting 11th-ranked Tennessee, 5-3, in the opening round of the NCAA Championships. The Lady Tigers fell to eventual NCAA runner-up Florida, 5-0, in round two. Minnis was named the Southwest Region and Louisiana Coach of the Year after guiding the Lady Tigers to their first-ever win at the NCAAAs and their first postseason appearance since 1991.

As a player, Minnis competed in the 1988 NCAA Team Championships and was a semifinalist at the NIT in 1986. He had a 37-6 three-set record in his first three seasons at USL.

During his four years there, the Ragin' Cajuns posted a 78-39 overall record and finished each year ranked in the Top 25. In his senior season, USL was ranked 15th in the final polls and advanced to the second round of the NCAA Championships.

Minnis comes from a family loaded with tennis experience. His father, Howard, was the head tennis coach at Southern University for several years and was a professor there before he passed away. His sister, Patricia, was a four-year letter winner at LSU from 1988-91. His brother, Patrick, was USL's No. 1 singles player after his departure.

Minnis played high school tennis at Redemptorist in Baton Rouge. He graduated from USL in 1988 with a degree in finance and earned an MBA in 1996.



# Lisa Jackson

Assistant Coach • Fourth Season 2007 Southwest Regional Assistant Coach of the Year



Lisa Jackson is entering her fourth year as assistant coach for the Lady Tigers, and she has been instrumental in the success of the LSU women's tennis program. In 2007-08, the team took a positive step up by advancing to the second round of the NCAA Tournament, only one year after reaching the first round.

In addition to her work with the Lady Tigers on the court, Jackson assisted in signing two top-ranked recruits for the 2008-09 season by bringing in five-star Louisiana native Whitney Wolf and Nicole Smith, a native of South Africa from where Jackson hails.

Before the 2006-07 season, Jackson, along with head coach Tony Minnis, reeled in the nation's 17th-ranked recruiting class according to tennisrecruiting.net, which included current players Hannah Robinson, a four-star recruit out of Monroe, and Nicole Kantor, a five-star player from St. Louis.

Not only has Jackson been an outstanding recruiter for LSU, but she has also been a hands-on coach, picking up the racket and practicing with the team to help them improve. It is not odd to see Jackson at practice volleying back and forth with a player to provide them with a practice partner for the day.

Her hands-on approach helped the Lady Tigers rebound from a 12-12 season in 2005-06 to go 16-10 the following year and guide the team back to the NCAA Tournament. Because of her efforts and the team's improvement, Jackson was awarded by the Intercollegiate Tennis Association as the 2007 Southwest Regional Assistant Coach of the Year.

Jackson has also been steady at helping Minnis manage the day-to-day operations of running the program, something Jackson did when she was at UL-Lafayette. She served as the Ragin Cajuns' associate head coach for two years before arriving in Tiger Town.

"She was like a head coach at ULL, so she has brought that added experience of being a head coach," Minnis commented on his assistant. "She has a lot of enthusiasm, and the work ethic she brings is a real positive for our program."

In her first year in Lafayette, Jackson led the ULL tennis team to a 7-14 record, a vast improvement from the team's 1-13 finish a year before. In 2005, she went even beyond that, leading the team to a 10-9 finish, its first winning season since 2001.

"I think one of the things that was so impressive and one of the major reasons I looked to hire her was what she was able to do at Lafayette," Minnis explained. "We competed against ULL the past couple years and saw the major improvement in the team and how much better they got in that short time span. I was very impressed

with what she did for that program."

Coming all the way from her homeland of Johannesburg, South Africa, Jackson started her own college career at William Carey College in Gulfport, Miss. While there she was selected to the NAIA second-team All-America and was also the MVP of her team.

After a year she decided to transfer and made the move to the other side of Louisiana where she played for the University of Texas at Arlington for the remainder of her collegiate career. Her impressive career there included earning a top-30 national ranking in doubles, becoming a two-time recipient of the Southland Conference Player of the Year Award in 1999 and 2000 and helping her team win the Southland Conference Championship all three years.

At UT-Arlington, Jackson also earned both her bachelor's (2001) and master's (2003) degrees in psychology. She stayed on staff at UT-Arlington as a graduate assistant with the tennis program until earning her master's degree.

# A Season To Build Upon

The 2007-08 season was truly a season to build upon because when the Lady Tigers experienced some ups, downs always seemed to follow. As soon as LSU experienced some success, adversity would slow the progress. Despite the constant struggle for sustained success, the Lady Tigers triumphed with yet another berth in the NCAA Tournament.

## UPS AND DOWNS

LSU began the 2008 dual season on the West Coast, facing four ranked teams in 10 days. The Lady Tigers managed to capture three of the four matches, but in the process LSU lost one of its two seniors for the entire season as Anastasia Dubova went down with a severe ankle injury in the team's second dual match of the season.

After the trip through California, the road-weary Lady Tigers ran into a highly-motivated Texas A&M team that defeated LSU in the home opener. The Lady Tigers responded by winning the next two matches but

fell in a tough loss at Florida State one week later.

With the team's maturity and determination clearly a step above the 2007 team that was full of freshmen, LSU rebounded from its loss to the Seminoles by reeling off three straight victories to open Southeastern Conference play – including an upset of 15th-ranked Kentucky in Lexington. The victories lifted LSU to a No. 21 national ranking, and it seemed as if the Lady Tigers were ready to soar. However, a shoulder injury to LSU's other senior, Tiffany Tucker, caused a hit to the lineup, and the Lady Tigers dropped

three straight conference matches.

"When you have two players who have been through the grind, the ups and downs and know what the league is like and what to expect like Anastasia and Tiffany, it definitely is a help. Unfortunately for them as individuals and us as a team, they both got hurt," head coach Tony Minnis said.

Once again LSU would not stay down for long, and the Lady Tigers rallied to win three straight conference matches to close out the regular season – including a 5-2 upset victory over 15th-ranked Arkansas on LSU's Senior Day. LSU

carried the momentum into the SEC Tournament as the Lady Tigers defeated Alabama for the second time in the season and advanced to the quarterfinals for a re-match with Arkansas. The victory over Alabama was also a major milestone as it marked the program's 500th victory in its history. In the quarterfinals the Lady'Backs won their revenge, but again LSU would refuse to lie down or quit.

After falling in the SEC Tournament, LSU was sent back out West to Berkeley, Calif., to face Washington State in the first round of the NCAA Tournament at the site hosted by Cal. It marked the 13th time out of the past 14 years that LSU had advanced to the NCAA Tournament, a major accomplishment under Minnis.

For the first time since the 2000 season LSU advanced past the first round of the tournament as the Lady Tigers demolished Washington State, 5-0, to set up a showdown with host Cal. The Golden Bears proved too much for LSU as Cal ended the Lady Tigers season in the second round of the NCAA Tournament.

"I give last year's team a lot of credit based on the adversity they went through with a few personal issues and injuries," Minnis said. "They really handled it well and came together at the appropriate time."

#### INDIVIDUAL HIGHLIGHTS

Not only did the team have amazing success by overcoming adversity to advance to the second round of the NCAA Tournament, but several individuals on the team experienced success last season.

For the second straight season Megan Falcon earned All-American honors in singles as she compiled a 27-7 record, including a 19-4 dual mark and a 12-7 record against ranked opponents. Falcon became the first LSU women's tennis player ever to ascend to the No. 1 national singles ranking when the honor was bestowed upon her in the preseason rankings in fall 2007, and Falcon rose to the occasion by earning All-American honors as well as First-Team All-SEC distinction for the second straight season. Falcon was also named Louisiana Player of the

Year for the second year in a row, and she made the NCAA Tournament in both singles and doubles for the second straight season as well.

"Megan was phenomenal with the some of the things she went through, to be able to focus and compete the way she did after a death in the family. I have the utmost respect for her. Megan leads because every time she walks out there you know she is going to give 110 percent," Minnis said.

Falcon was not the only Lady Tiger to shine on the court as Hannah Robinson built upon her successful freshman campaign by putting together an even better sophomore résumé. Robinson finished the season just behind Falcon in total wins with a 25-9 overall record, including a 17-6 dual mark and an 8-3 SEC record. For her efforts Robinson was named Second-Team All-SEC as she, along with Falcon, became LSU's most

consistent singles player every match.

"Hannah impressed me because she came back at the beginning of the season and did not play with a lot of confidence, but when she got her confidence she was as good a competitor as we have seen here. For her to make All-SEC says a lot about her maturity and development since she stepped on campus."

Staten Spencer also had a strong 2008 season as she was second on the team in match clinchers with four. However, it was what Spencer did off the courts that recognized her as a special player last season. Spencer was the recipient of the ITA Southwest Region Cissie Leary Sportsmanship Award that goes to the player who displays inspiring dedication and commitment to her team which exemplifies the spirit of college tennis. On top of that, Spencer was also recognized as a member of the SEC Community Service Team for the countless hours she poured into the local Baton Rouge community.

#### TRUE STUDENT-ATHLETES

One of the greatest achievements of the 2007-08 LSU Lady Tigers was the fact they earned ITA All-Academic Team status for finishing the year with a cumulative grade point average of 3.385. The prestigious ITA All-Academic Team status is awarded to any team with a cumulative 3.20 team GPA or higher on a 4.0 scale.

Not only was the entire team awarded for its success in the classroom, but a school-record seven Lady Tigers earned ITA Scholar-Athlete honors for possessing at least a 3.50 GPA while lettering last season – Kylie Adamek, Megan Falcon, Nicole Kantor, Sloane Mathis, Hannah Robinson, Staten Spencer and Tiffany Tucker. It marked the second straight season Kantor, Mathis and Robinson were named Scholar-Athletes, and it marked Spencer's fourth straight season as an academic elite.

"It is exactly what you want to see from student-athletes," Minnis said. "It makes it easy for Lisa Jackson and I when the players are committed to academic success. When we recruit the kids, we tell them from day one that they are not here just to play tennis but the goal is for them to graduate, and it says a lot about last year's team that they took that to heart."

# Illustrious TENNIS HISTORY

In the fall of 1973 the Lady Tigers tennis team was formed as a club sport with Pat Newman as head coach and Jay McCreary as the Coordinator of Club Sports. The fledgling program began with eight players who bought their own racquets and balls. It has since developed into a national collegiate tennis power over the decades. From the early days of limited schedules and funding, the Lady Tigers have come a long way, becoming a dominant tennis power in the state of Louisiana and making its presence known regionally and nationally.

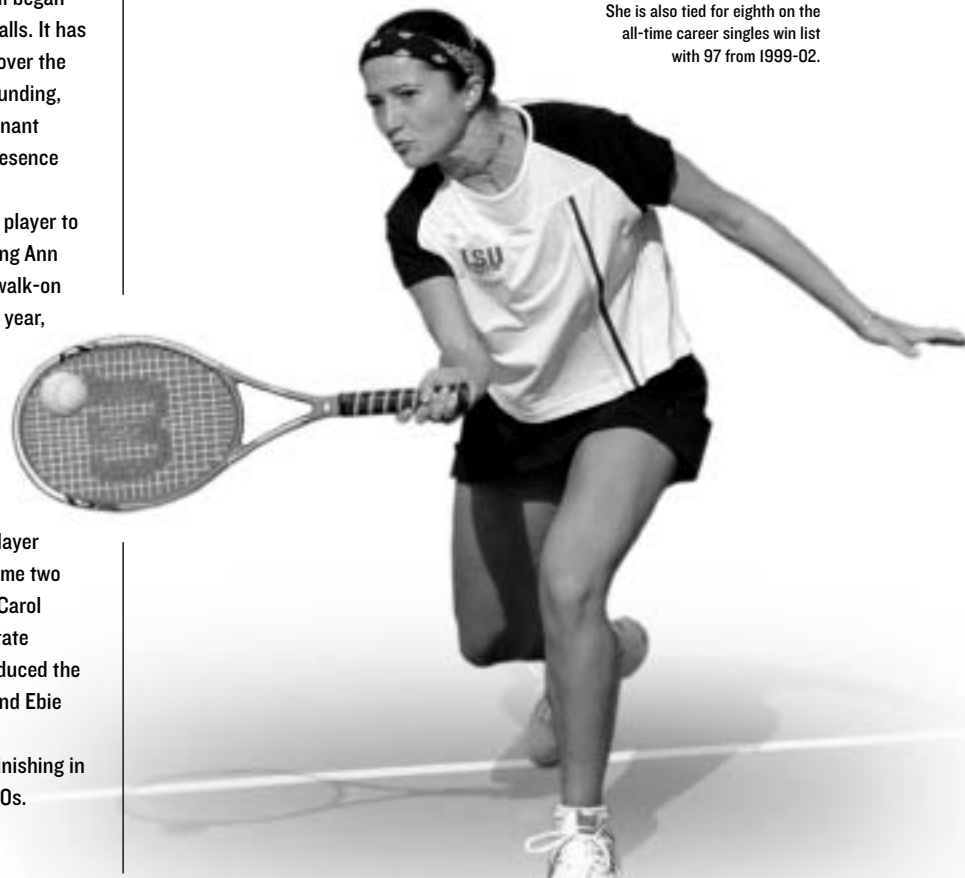
In 1975, the Lady Tigers signed their first collegiate player to an athletic scholarship for the following season, acquiring Ann Ellis from Houston, Texas. Next was Karen McCarter, a walk-on from a big tennis family in Shreveport, La. The following year, Kay McDaniel, another Shreveport product, and Elizabeth Palfrey of Baton Rouge joined the Lady Tiger family and LSU was on its way to becoming a national power, finishing in the top 20 in the nation for the first time.

The Lady Tigers experienced an outstanding recruiting season in 1976-77, signing the No. 1-ranked player in the South in Ebie Taylor of Mobile, Ala. From Texas came two outstanding players in Lisa Boettcher of Pasadena and Carol Reger of Fort Worth. With those players, LSU won the state championship, placed in the top 10 in nationals and produced the first Lady Tiger All-Americans in tennis, Kay McDaniel and Ebie Taylor.

The program has continued to escalate, including finishing in the top 30 in the final rankings nine times since the 1990s.

## **Bruna Colosio**

Colosio is the only three-time All-American in program history. She is also tied for eighth on the all-time career singles win list with 97 from 1999-02.



# WOMEN'S TENNIS All-Americans

In its 33-year history, the LSU women's tennis program has produced an All-American 11 times. Only three years after the official inaugural season, two Lady Tigers were named All-Americans in 1978 in Ebie Taylor and Kay McDaniel, Nos. 2 and 12 on the all-time wins list at LSU, respectively. Then 16 years later, the next selection came in the form of Suzana Rodrigues, who earned her status as a singles All-American as a freshman in 1994. Fifth on the list of all-time wins, Rodrigues was named an All-American again as a senior in 1997, that year receiving recognition for her outstanding doubles play. Her partner Laura Olave shared the All-America distinction that year. Another pair was recognized as All-Americans in 2000 when Bruna Colosio and Ana Paula Mores won the award. Fittingly, they each ended their careers with the same number of match wins, 97, which places them in a tie for eighth on the all-time wins list. Colosio was named a singles All-American again in 2001, finishing her career as one of the top players to wear the Purple and Gold.

## Megan Falcon

### 2007 ITA SINGLES ALL-AMERICAN 2008 ITA SINGLES ALL-AMERICAN

LSU's latest All-American, Megan Falcon had arguably the most successful season in Lady Tiger history as a sophomore in 2006-07. The Alameda, Calif., native made her debut as a Lady Tiger last season by reeling off win after win at the ITA All-American Championships in the fall. By the time the tournament ended for Falcon, she had defeated nine ranked opponents, including five in the top 50.

After a fast start in the fall, Falcon began last spring ranked No. 2 in the nation. Through all of LSU's dual season matches playing at the No. 1 spot in singles, Falcon went 24-0 and ran her record to an amazing 34-2 heading into the NCAA Individual Championships.

Accomplishing something no other Lady Tiger had ever done before, Falcon raced to the semifinals of the championships, only dropping one set along the way. En route to the final four, Falcon knocked off four ranked opponents, pushing her record against ranked adversaries to 26-2 on the year. However, Falcon's pursuit of the individual national championship was denied when USC's Lindsey Nelson beat her, 7-6(2), 6-2. Overall, Falcon finished 38-3 and tied for seventh in school history with 38 wins in a single season.

After an amazing individual season, Falcon deservedly received several accolades. She was named an ITA All-American in singles finishing ranked No. 2 in the nation, the 2007 Southeastern Conference Player of the Year, First Team All-SEC, Southwest Regional Player to Watch, ITA National Co-Player to Watch, Honda Award Finalist, LSWA Louisiana Player of the Year and the LSWA Newcomer of the Year.

One season later in 2007-08, Falcon followed up on her brilliant sophomore campaign by earning a second singles All-American honor. To open the fall season Falcon was ranked No. 1 in the nation - the first Lady Tiger to be crowned as the nation's top singles player. For the second straight season Falcon led LSU in wins with a 27-7 record including 12 victories over ranked opponents, and she finished the year ranked No. 15. Falcon again captured the ITA All-American Championships consolation title in the fall. Just like 2007, Falcon earned First-Team All-SEC honors and was named LSWA Louisiana Player of the Year as well as earning ITA Scholar-Athlete recognition for the first time in her career.

## Kay McDaniel 1978 SINGLES ALL-AMERICAN

Kay McDaniel, who played for LSU from 1975-79, racked up 92 wins in a Lady Tigers uniform, a number that places her 12th on the list of all-time winningest players in LSU women's tennis history. She is also third on the list of match wins in a single season with 43 in 1977-78. McDaniel became the first LSU women's tennis All-America selection, along with Ebie Taylor, in 1978, a year that saw the Lady Tigers go 19-5 and earn the title of Louisiana AIAW Champion.

She next toured the professional courts from 1980-86, competing against such players as Billie Jean King, Chris Evert, Martina Navratilova and Steffi Graf. She once ranked as high as No. 30 in singles (1983) and No. 20 in doubles (1986).

The United States Tennis Association Tennessee Hall of Fame named McDaniel to its list of 2005 inductees, and she was honored at a banquet Feb. 5, 2005, at the Nashville Marriott in Nashville, Tenn.

## 1976 Lady Tigers

**Overall Record: 11-5 • Inaugural Season\* • Louisiana AIAW Champions • 14th USTA Nationals**

LSU won nine of its last 11 matches, including five straight to end its inaugural campaign en route to the Louisiana AIAW Championship. The Lady Tigers opened the season with a 9-0 win over Northwestern State and went on to outscore its opponents 107-37. LSU finished 14th at the USTA Nationals.

## 1978 Lady Tigers

**Overall Record: 19-5 • Louisiana AIAW Champions**

Former head coach Pat Newman guided LSU to its third consecutive state AIAW title in as many seasons. Lady Tiger standouts Kay McDaniel and Ebie Taylor became LSU's first ever All-Americans, earning the prestigious honor after leading the team to a 10th-place finish at the AIAW National Championships. The '78 squad holds the record for most consecutive wins in a season with 12 in a row.

After claiming three straight Louisiana AIAW titles, LSU earned its best at record at 22-10 but fell shy of its fourth straight title. The Lady Tigers lost, 7-2, to Northeast La. in the finals. LSU won eight straight matches to start the season and 16 of 18 down the stretch. In four seasons, LSU dominated its in-state rivals 26-2, with its only blemish being dual losses to NLU during the '79 season.

## 1997 Lady Tigers

Overall Record: 18-9 • NCAA SW Regional Finalists • Final Rank: No. 20

The Lady Tigers enjoyed another stellar campaign, charting numerous athletic and academic honors en route to an 18-9 mark and a national top-20 finish. LSU fell just short of the NCAA Championships with a 5-2 loss to Tennessee in the NCAA Southwest Regional final. Tony Minnis became LSU's winningest coach and was named both SEC and Louisiana Coach of the Year. Two-time All-American Suzana Rodrigues said farewell in 1997 as the highly successful four-year star ended her collegiate career in record fashion.

## 1998 Lady Tigers

Overall Record: 15-10 • NCAA SW Regional Finalists • Final Rank: No. 26

LSU overcame injuries to two of its top players, Laura Olave and Ana Paula Mores, to qualify for the fourth consecutive year and play host to the NCAA Southwest Regional Championships. After making the final for the second consecutive season, the Lady Tigers were defeated by top-seeded Arkansas, 5-2, to end an impressive run against all odds. Before being upended by the Lady Razorbacks, the Lady Tigers knocked off Baylor and second-seeded Miami (Fla.) Three Lady Tigers seniors, Laura Olave, Jennifer Barr and Jamie Valotton, bowed out by finishing their careers in Baton Rouge.

## 2000 Lady Tigers

Overall Record: 16-11 • NCAA Sweet 16 • Final Rank: No. 21

The Lady Tigers accomplished two amazing feats during the 2000 dual-match season. In the second round of the NCAA tournament, No. 32 LSU upset the sixth-ranked Pepperdine Waves, 5-4, on their home court in Malibu, Calif., to advance to the Sweet 16. The biggest upset in school history allowed the 2000 Lady Tigers to become the second LSU women's tennis team to reach the quarterfinal round. The Lady Tigers were led by their lone senior, Ana Paula Mores, and sophomore Bruna Colosio. Colosio ended the season as the sixth ranked singles player in the nation, while Mores ended her illustrious four-year career with 97 singles wins and a No. 75 national ranking. As a doubles team, the pair finished the 2000 campaign ranked No. 4.

## 2004 Lady Tigers

Overall Record: 18-9 • NCAA First Round • Final Rank: No. 20

For the 10th consecutive season, Tony Minnis led the Lady Tigers to an NCAA Tournament berth. Senior Jessica Ferguson finished the season ranked at No. 57 in the nation in leading the team to an SEC West title. The Lady Tigers upset Tennessee in the SEC Tournament to advance to the semifinals before falling to top-seeded Florida. Minnis was named the Southwest Region Coach of the year for the third time as the Tigers finished at No. 20 in the nation.

## 2008 Lady Tigers

Overall Record: 15-10 • NCAA Second Round • Final Rank: No. 27

The Lady Tigers earned a berth in the NCAA second round for the first time since 2000 after picking up 11 ranked wins during the season. Junior Megan Falcon finished the season ranked 15th nationally as she earned All-American and First-Team All-SEC honors for the second straight year while sophomore Hannah Robinson earned Second-Team All-SEC recognition. Falcon and junior Mykala Hedberg finished No. 28 in doubles after joining together midway through the season, and the duo advanced to the first round of the NCAA Doubles Tournament.

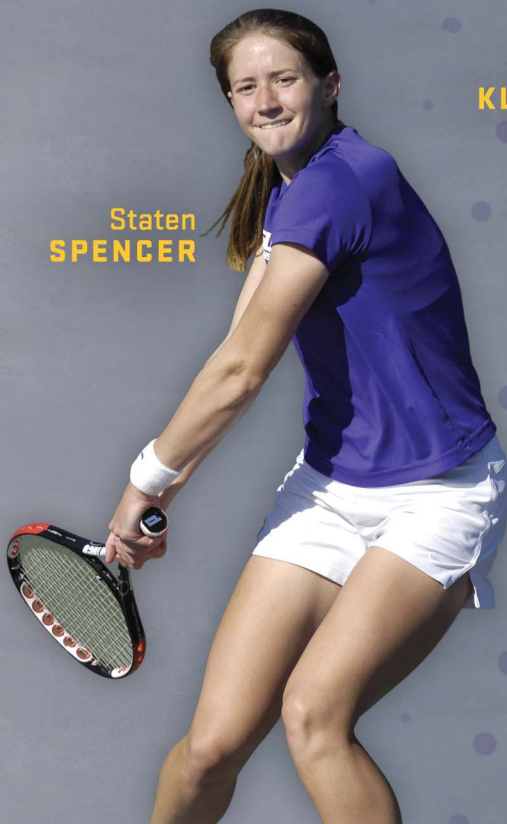
