SEC FOOTBALL VIDEO REPLAY

THE OBJECTIVE

To allow for specific types of officiating calls to be immediately reviewed during all games hosted by SEC teams.

THE COACHES' CHALLENGE

Each head coach is allowed one Instant Replay challenge per game, which is exercised by requesting a team timeout. A head coach may issue a challenge only if his team has one or more timeouts remaining in the half. If the challenged ruling is overturned, the timeout is not charged, but the coach has no more challenges during that game.

THE SOURCE

All reviewable video comes direct from either the television network broadcasting the game (CBS Sports, ESPN, ESPN2, Lincoln Financial) or other TV production facilities that meet established conference standards. The Southeastern Conference, following approval by the NCAA Football Rules Committee, will implement the use of video replay on an experimental basis beginning with the 2005 football season.

THE PLAYS

Reviewable

1. Plays governed by Sideline, Goal Line, End Zone, and End Line:
 - a. Scoring Plays, including a runner breaking the plane of the goal line
 - b. Pass complete/incomplete/intercepted at sideline, goal line and end line
 - c. Runner/receiver in or out of bounds
 - d. Recovery of loose ball in and out of bounds
2. Passing Plays:
 - a. Pass ruled complete/ incomplete/ intercepted in the field of play and end zones
 - b. Touching of a forward pass by an ineligible receiver
 - c. Touching of a forward pass by a defensive player
 - d. Quarterback (Passer) forward pass or fumble (if ruled incomplete, play is finalized)
 - e. Illegal forward pass or illegal handing off beyond the line of scrimmage
 - f. Illegal forward pass or illegal handing off after change of possession
 - g. Forward or backward pass thrown from behind the line of scrimmage
3. Other Detectable Infractions:
 - a. Runner ruled not down.
 - b. Forward progress with respect to first down
 - c. Touching of a kick
 - d. Number of players on field
 - e. Clock adjustments (in conjunction with overturned plays)
 - f. Fourth-down/try fumble plays

THE PROCESS

Each SEC football stadium has a secured replay booth equipped with a DVSPORT Digital Replay System. Three individuals work in the booth for the duration of the game: 1. Replay Official, 2. Communicator, 3. Technician. The Replay Official is selected and assigned by the Conference Office.

A live video feed is sent directly to the replay booth. The Technician watches the feed on an input monitor while capturing/digitizing it into the DVSPORT Digital Replay System. The Technician also marks the beginning of each play as well as any replays as they occur in real time.

Each play and subsequent replay then appears on a touch screen in front of the Communicator. As the Technician marks the incoming video, each view (by mark) will appear as a small picture on the computer touch screen. At any time, the Communicator can touch/click on a thumbnail and immediately send that play/replay to the Replay Official.

With the Communicator's assistance, the Replay Official can quickly jump between replays while playing back the video. All replay video navigation is done via a remote device controlled by the Replay Official. All replays/video are viewed on an output monitor. The touch screen is only used to select the replays.

While most plays are reviewed between the whistle and the beginning of the next play, the Replay Official can stop play on the field by using a pager system. Five onfield officials wear pagers. If play is stopped the Referee announces on the stadium PA microphone that play has been stopped so the previous play can be reviewed. The Referee then proceeds to the sideline headset, which provides direct communication to the Replay Official in the booth. Once the play has been reviewed, the Replay Official notifies the Referee, who then announces the decision on the stadium PA system.

THE EQUIPMENT

Each SEC member institution uses the Digital Replay System developed by DVSPORT of Pittsburgh, Pa. The replay systems are maintained by the home institution with technical support from DVSPORT.

2007 SEC FOOTBALL CHAMPIONSHIP GAME

The SEC's Eastern and Western Division winners will meet in Atlanta's Georgia Dome to battle for the league championship and the right to represent the conference in the Bowl Championship Series. The 16th-annual title game is set for December 1 and will be nationally televised by CBS Sports at 4:00 p.m. ET.

The game is a result of conference expansion, which saw Arkansas and South Carolina become the first members added in SEC history. Under NCAA regulations, a conference with 12 members may play a 12th football game to determine its champion, provided the regular season is played in divisions.

The participants of the game are determined each year during the eight-game regular-season conference schedule as the teams with the best overall SEC winning percentage in each division.

The 1994 SEC Championship Game earned a 10.5 rating and a 26 share, the highest rated SEC Championship Game in history.

The SEC Championship Game has also drawn capacity crowds in its history. 1,120,836 fans have witnessed first-hand the pageantry of SEC Football at the 15 previous Championship Games.

Attendance at the 15 previous championship games has been 102.3 percent of stadium capacity, including 13 sellouts.

2007 SEC DIVISIONAL TIE-BREAKER

In the event of a tie for the division championship, the following procedures will be used to break all ties to determine the SEC Football Championship Game representative. All Conference versus Conference Games (both division and non-division) will be counted in the Conference Standings.

TWO-TEAM TIE. In the event two teams are tied for a division title, the following procedure will be used in the following order:

- Head-to-head competition between the two tied teams;
- Records of the tied teams within the division;
- Head-to-head competition against the team within the division with the best overall (divisional and non-divisional) Conference record, and proceeding through the division (multiple ties within the division will be broken from first to last and a tie for first place will be broken before a tie for fourth place);
- Overall record against non-divisional teams;
- Combined record against all common non-divisional teams;
- Record against the common non-divisional team with the best overall Conference record (divisional or non-divisional) and proceeding through other common non-divisional teams based on their order of finish within their division; and
- The tied team with the highest ranking in the Bowl Championship Series Standings following the last weekend of regular-season games shall be the divisional representative in the SEC Championship Game.

THREE-TEAM TIE (OR MORE). If three teams are tied for a division title, the following procedure will be used in the following order: (Note: If one of the procedures results in one team being eliminated and two remaining, the two-team tiebreaker procedure as stated in No. 1 above will be used):

- Combined head to head record among the tied teams;
- Record of the tied teams within the division;
- Head to head competition against the team within the division with the best overall Conference record (divisional and non divisional) and proceeding through the division (multiple ties within the division will be broken from first to last and a tie for first place will be broken before a tie for fourth place);
- Overall Conference record against non divisional teams;
- Combined record against all common non divisional teams;
- Record against the common non divisional team with the best overall Conference record (divisional and non divisional) and proceeding through other common non divisional teams based on their order of finish within their division; and
- The tied team with the highest ranking in the Bowl Championship Series Standings following the last weekend of regular-season games shall be the divisional representative in the SEC Championship Game, unless the second of the tied teams is ranked within five-or-fewer places of the highest-ranked tied team. In this case, the head-to-head results of the top two ranked tied teams shall determine the representative in the SEC Championship Game.

SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE BOWLS

TEN SEC TEAMS ALREADY BOWL ELIGIBLE

Ten Southeastern Conference teams, the most the SEC has ever had, have already earned the six-win benchmark to be eligible for post-season play in 2007. Vanderbilt has five wins and needs one more win to reach the six-win total.

The most bowl-eligible teams for the SEC in its history in one season prior to 2007 was nine, which was during the 2000, 2001 and 2006 seasons. In eight other seasons, the SEC has had eight bowl-eligible teams, the latest coming in 2002.

While six wins is the basic eligibility to participate in post-season bowl games, NCAA rules state that a "deserving winning team" be eligible for bowl-season play.

The SEC has agreements to send eight of its teams to post-season bowls.

NCAA Rule 30.9.2 states, "A contest (bowl game) shall be licensed only if it serves the purpose of providing a national contest between deserving winning teams. A "deserving winning team" shall be defined as wone that has won a minimum of six games against football bowl subdivision opponents and that has more wins than losses."

Exceptions to NCAA Rule 30.9.2 exist. Those are:

"An institution with a record of six wins and six losses may be selected for participation in a bowl game under the following circumstances:

(a) The institution or its conference has a primary contractual affiliation, which existed prior to the first contest of the applicable season, with the sponsoring bowl organization. In the case of a conference contractual affiliation, all conference teams with winning records must be placed in one of the contracted bowl games before any institution with a record of six wins and six losses may be placed in a contracted bowl game. There shall be no contingency agreements with other sponsoring bowl organizations intended to enable an institution with a record of six wins and six losses to become eligible for those contests; or

(b) All contractual affiliations per Bylaw 30.9.2.1-(a) have been fulfilled and all institutions with winning records

30.9.2.2 Exception—Football Bowl Subdivision Opponent. [FBS] Each year, a football bowl subdivision institution may count one victory against a football championship subdivision opponent toward the six-win minimum, provided the opponent has averaged 90 percent of the permissible maximum number of grants-in-aid per year in football over a rolling two-year period.

30.9.2.2.1 Waiver. [FBS] The Football Issues Committee may approve a waiver of the 90 percent requirement to permit a football bowl subdivision institution to count a victory against a football championship subdivision opponent in football toward meeting the six-victory requirement when a unique or catastrophic situation affects the Division I-AA institution's ability to average 90 percent of the permissible maximum number of grants-in-aid per year in Division I-AA football over a rolling two-year period.

SEC BOWL AGREEMENTS

The Southeastern Conference has agreements to send eight of its member institutions to postseason bowl games following the 2007 season. The winner of the SEC Championship Game will automatically participate in the Bowl Championship Series comprised of the Sugar, Rose, Orange and Fiesta Bowls.

The Capital One (2nd), will then make its pick following the BCS selections. The bowl must select the team with the next best overall record or a team that is within one win of the team with the next best overall record.

The Outback, Chick-fil-A and AT&T Cotton Bowls will work with the conference office to determine picks 3-5. The Cotton Bowl has the first preference of teams from the Western Division and the Outback Bowl has first preference of teams from the Eastern Division. The Cotton or Outback Bowl can select teams outside of its divisional preference, but must not select them before the opposite bowl selects from its divisional preference. The Chick-fil-A Bowl has the selection of preference following the Cotton and Outback Bowls.

In selections 6-7, the AutoZone Liberty and Gaylord Hotels Music City Bowls will make their selections, not in any specific order, but in consultation with the SEC Office. The Bowls will rank available qualified teams in order of preference. If there are no similarities in the order of selection, the bowls will be granted its selection. If the bowls rank the same teams in preference, the team involved in the process would get its preference of which bowl to participate.

The PetroSun Independence Bowl will receive the eighth selection of available SEC teams.

2008 BOWL CHAMPIONSHIP SERIES SCHEDULE

Following the 2007 college football regular season, the Bowl Championship Series will determine the National Championship. The BCS National Championship Game, which will stand alone from the four traditional BCS bowls but will be hosted by each of the bowls once during a four-year cycle.

The BCS consists of the FedEx Orange, Allstate Sugar, Rose presented by Citi, Tostitos Fiesta Bowl and the Allstate BCS National Championship Game. The conferences with automatic berths include the Atlantic Coast, Big East, Big Ten, Big 12, Pac-10 and Southeastern Conferences.

FOX Sports will televise all of the Bowl Championship Series games, with the exception of the Rose Bowl, which will be televised by ABC Sports.

The Bowl Championship Series guarantees a matchup between college football's top two teams in a true national championship game.

At the conclusion of the 2007 regular season, the Allstate BCS National Championship Game will be hosted in New Orleans on Jan. 7 at 8 p.m. EST. The Allstate BCS National Championship Game will have the top two teams ranked in the BCS final regular season standings.

The BCS uses regional consideration regarding team selection. Specifically, as a member of the BCS, the Rose Bowl will host the Big Ten and Pac-10 champions in those years in which either the Rose Bowl does not have the national championship game or the Big Ten and Pac-10 champion is not ranked No. 1 or No. 2. Other "regional consideration" tie-ins include the SEC champion in the Sugar Bowl, the ACC champion in the Orange Bowl and the Big 12 champion in the Fiesta Bowl.

Other BCS games following the 2007 regular season include the Rose Bowl on Jan. 1 at 4:30 p.m. EST, Sugar Bowl on Jan. 1 at 8:30 p.m. EST, Fiesta Bowl on Jan. 1 at 8:30 p.m. EST, and the Orange Bowl on Jan. 3 at 8 p.m. ET.

SEC DIVISIONAL RACE SCENARIOS

Three of the six teams in the Eastern Division are mathematically alive for the SEC Championship Game berth.

LSU has already clinched a berth in the SEC Championship Game as the Western Division representative. The Tigers have clinched a share of the Western Division title and win any tie-breaker for the SEC Championship Game berth. A win against Ole Miss or Arkansas, clinches the Western Division title outright for LSU.

Tennessee is the team in the Eastern Division that controls its own destiny. If the Vols win out, they will be in the SEC Championship Game on Dec. 1 in Atlanta. Kentucky, South Carolina and Vanderbilt are eliminated from contention in the Eastern Division.

Georgia can clinch the Eastern Division title with a win against Kentucky and a Tennessee loss to Vanderbilt this weekend.

If Georgia and Tennessee both win out, the Vols would be the Eastern Division representative based on its victory over the Bulldogs earlier this year.

Florida wins a four-team tie-breaker between Georgia, Tennessee, Florida and Kentucky at 5-3 since it and Kentucky has the best mark against the tied teams (2-1) and Florida defeated Kentucky earlier this season.

Florida wins a three-team tie-breaker between itself, Tennessee and Florida because of its better record inside the Eastern Division (4-1).

Florida also wins a three-team tie-breaker between itself, Georgia and Kentucky because of its better record inside the Eastern Division (4-1).

STATE OF THE SEC

Georgia has the SEC's best record during the last ten seasons. The Bulldogs are 104-32 (.765) with ten bowls, ten Top 25 AP appearances and two SEC championships during the last ten seasons. LSU has the best 5-year mark with a 61-14 record (81.3 percent). Below is a look at how each SEC team has fared during the last five and ten seasons:

THIS WEEK IN SEC FOOTBALL HISTORY

As the Southeastern Conference celebrates its 75th anniversary, here is a look at some of the highlights during the upcoming game dates in its history:



Nov. 17

1973 -- Ole Miss came into its game in Jackson, Miss. with #16 Tennessee with a 4-5 record, but the Rebels upset the Volunteers, 28-18. The Rebels accounted for 360 rushing yards against the Vols. The Rebels would finish the season at 6-5 while the Vols would finish 8-4 and a Gator Bowl berth.

1979 -- Auburn defeated Georgia, 33-13, in Athens. The Tiger running back duo of James Brooks (200 yards) and Joe Cribbs (166) accounted for 366 rushing yards in the game. In the game, Brooks (1,208) and Cribbs (1,120) became the first SEC rushing tandem to each gain 1,000 yards in a single season.

1984 -- Unranked Mississippi State upset #9 LSU, 16-14, in Starkville. State QB Orlando Lundie completed 13-of-28 passes for 157 yards and rushed 22 times for 115 yards and a touchdown in leading the Bulldogs to the win. Lundie was named National Player of the Week by USA Today for his efforts.

2001 -- #22 South Carolina defeated arch-rival Clemson, 20-15, at Williams-Brice Stadium in the regular season finale for the Gamecocks. QB Phil Petty, despite playing with an injured right shoulder, completed 14-of-23 passes for 152 yards and CB Sheldon Brown picked off two Tiger passes. Carolina would end the season 9-3 with a berth in the Outback Bowl.

FOX Sports Net South (FSNS), FOX Sports Net Southwest (FSNSW) and SUN Sports (SUN) together form **SEC-TV**, the league's regional cable package. SEC-TV Weekly airs Thursday nights and Saturday mornings during the season, highlighting all of the SEC's athletic teams and events.

SEC CHAMPIONSHIP GAME RACE RECAPS

1992 - Both races decided before final weekend. Florida and Georgia (6-2 in the SEC) were co-champions in the Eastern Division. The Gators won the tie-breaker by virtue of a 26-24 win over the Bulldogs earlier in the season. Alabama (8-0) was the outright Western Division champion, even with a game against Auburn in the final weekend, which the Tide won, 17-0.

1993 - Both races decided before final weekend. Florida won the Eastern Division and Alabama won the Western Division. The Gators finished 1/2 game ahead of Tennessee (UT tied Alabama, 17-17). Alabama, at 5-2-1, finished two games ahead second-place Arkansas. Auburn was 8-0 in the SEC, but was ineligible for the conference title.

1994 - Both races decided before final weekend. Florida won the Eastern Division, finishing SEC play at 7-1, two games ahead of Tennessee. Alabama won the Western Division with an 8-0 SEC mark, three games ahead of Miss. State.

1995 - Both races decided before final weekend. Florida won the Eastern Division, finishing SEC play at 8-0, one game ahead of Tennessee. Arkansas won the Western Division with a 6-2 SEC mark, one game ahead of Auburn and Alabama.

1996 - Both races decided before final weekend. Florida won the Eastern Division, finishing SEC play at 8-0, one game ahead of Tennessee. Alabama won the Western Division with a 6-2 SEC mark, tying LSU. However, the Tide defeated the Tigers, 26-0, earlier in the year to win the tie-breaker.

1997 - Eastern Division race not finalized until after the final weekend. Tennessee defeated Vanderbilt, 17-10, to win the division on the final weekend. Tennessee, at 7-1 in the SEC, finished one game ahead of Georgia and Florida. Auburn had won the Western Division with a 6-2 SEC mark, tying LSU. However, Auburn defeated LSU, 31-28, earlier in the year to win the tie-breaker.

1998 - Western Division race not finalized until after the final weekend. Miss. State defeated Ole Miss, 28-6, on Thanksgiving night, to win the division on the final weekend. Arkansas and Miss. State finished in a tie for the division title. However, Miss. State defeated Arkansas, 22-21, earlier that season to win the tie-breaker. Arkansas defeated LSU 41-14 on the final weekend, but when State defeated Ole Miss, the chase for the Championship Game had been won. Tennessee had clinched the Eastern Division before the final weekend and defeated Vanderbilt, 41-0, to finished the SEC at 8-0.

1999 - Both races decided before final weekend. Florida won the Eastern Division, finishing SEC play at 7-1, one game ahead of Tennessee. Alabama won the Western Division with a 7-1 SEC mark, one game ahead of Miss. State.

2000 - Both races decided before final weekend. Florida won the Eastern Division, finishing SEC play at 7-1, two games ahead of South Carolina, Georgia and Tennessee. Auburn won the Western Division with a 6-2 SEC mark, one game ahead of LSU. LSU lost to Arkansas in the final weekend, 14-3. Even if the Tigers would have beaten the Razorbacks, Auburn would have won the tie-breaker over LSU due to a 34-17 win earlier in the season.

2001 - Both races go down to the final weekend. Due to game postponements on Sept. 15, games were reschedule for Dec. 1. On that weekend, Tennessee defeated Florida, 34-32, in Gainesville, and LSU defeated Auburn, 27-14, in Baton Rouge, to clinch berths in the SEC Championship Game. The Vols won the East with a 7-1 mark while LSU had a 5-3 mark and tied with Auburn for the West, but won the head-to-head tiebreaker.

2002 - Western division race not finalized until after the final weekend. Georgia clinched the Eastern Division championship on Nov. 16 after defeating Auburn, 24-21, in Auburn. The 7-1 Bulldogs finish one game ahead of Florida, which was 6-2. Arkansas wins the Western Division on the season's final weekend, defeating LSU, 21-20, in Little Rock on Nov. 29. The Razorbacks, LSU Tigers and Auburn Tigers are tied at 5-3 but Arkansas wins the head-to-head tiebreakers.

2003 - Both races decided on final weekend. Tennessee defeats Kentucky, 20-7, to force a three-way tie for the Eastern Division championship between the Vols, Georgia and

Florida. Using a tie-breaker involving the BCS standings, Georgia has the highest BCS ranking and has defeated Tennessee (next highest ranking) during regular season to secure SEC Championship Game berth. LSU defeats Arkansas, 55-24, and Ole Miss beats Mississippi State, 31-0, to force a tie for the Western Division championship. LSU's 17-14 win over Ole Miss the week before earns the Tigers the Western Division berth.

2004 - Auburn clinches berth in the SEC Championship Game on Oct. 30, tying the earliest since the game began in 1992 (Alabama, 1993). The Tigers (8-0) finish two games ahead in the standings of second-place LSU (6-2). Tennessee clinches berth as Eastern Division representative with 38-33 win against Vanderbilt on Nov. 20. The Vols (7-1) would win their next game on the following weekend against Kentucky to claim the division title outright. Georgia was second in the Western Division with a 6-2 mark.

2005 - Georgia (6-2) clinched the Eastern Division Championship with a 45-13 win over Kentucky on Nov. 19. The Bulldogs finish one full game ahead of South Carolina and Florida in the standings. LSU clinched the Western Division title with a 19-17 win over Arkansas on Nov. 25. The Tigers finished tied for the Western Division title (7-1), but defeated Auburn, 20-17, on Oct. 22, to win the tie-breaker.

2006 - Florida (7-1) clinched Eastern Division Championship and berth in the SEC Championship Game on Nov. 4, by defeating Vanderbilt, 25-19. Arkansas clinched the Western Division title and SEC Championship Game berth with a 28-14 win over Mississippi State on Nov. 18.

2007 - LSU (5-1) clinches Western Division berth in the SEC Championship Game on Week 11 after Alabama and Auburn both lose. Georgia, Tennessee and Florida remain alive for the Eastern Division berth going into Week 12.

SEC CHAMPIONSHIP GAME RACE RECAP

The earliest a berth has been clinched in the SEC Championship Game is Oct. 30 (Auburn, 2004, & Alabama, 1993).

In eight of the 30 divisional races prior to 2007, a championship game berth has not been decided until the weekend prior to the SEC Championship Game. That occurred in 1997 (Tennessee), 1998 (Mississippi State), 2001 (Tennessee and LSU), 2002 (Arkansas), 2003 (Georgia and LSU) and 2005 (LSU).

THIS IS THE SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE

THE SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE

- The Southeastern Conference sponsors championships in 20 sports - 11 women's sports and nine men's sports. They include baseball, men's and women's basketball, men's and women's cross country, football, men's and women's golf, gymnastics, soccer, softball, men's and women's swimming and diving, men's and women's tennis, men's and women's indoor and outdoor track and field, and volleyball.
- The SEC's mission statement reflects the priorities of the league. "The purpose of the Southeastern Conference is to assist its member institutions in the maintenance of programs of intercollegiate athletics which are compatible with the highest standards of education and competitive sports."

ACADEMIC ACHIEVEMENTS

- During the last five years, the SEC has had more student-athletes honored as CoSIDA/ESPN The Magazine Academic All-Americans than any other conference. The league has had 171 student-athletes named CoSIDA/ESPN The Magazine Academic All-Americans, including 79 named to the first-team.
- During the last eleven years, the SEC has had 19 winners of the NCAA Today's Top VIII Award, which is given annually to eight outstanding senior student-athletes. Since 1997, no other conference has had as many student-athletes honored with this prestigious award. In 2006, Alabama track & field athlete Beth Mallory was named a recipient of this award.
- Florida's Chris Leak was named by the National Football Foundation as a National Scholar-Athlete. During the last five years, the SEC has had 11 student-athletes honored, the most of any conference. LSU's Rudy Niswanger won the Vincent dePaul Draddy Award given by the National Football Foundation in 2005 as the nation's top football scholar-athlete. Niswanger became the sixth SEC student-athlete to claim the "Academic Heisman" since the award was established in 1990.

FOR THE STUDENT-ATHLETE

- The 12 member institutions of the SEC provide nearly \$65 million in scholarships for the more than 4,200 student-athletes each year.
- The SEC distributed nearly \$675,000 during the 2006-2007 academic year from the NCAA Special Assistance Fund for Student-Athletes. This program was implemented to provide financial aid to student-athletes with specific needs such as clothing and shoes, medical or vision care, academic course supplies and family emergencies.
- During the 2007-08 academic year, the SEC will distribute more than \$1 million to directly benefit student-athletes from the Student-Athlete Opportunity Fund.
- The SEC awards post-graduate scholarships totaling \$130,000 to 24 student-athletes each year. The top male and female nominee each receive the H. Boyd McWhorter Scholar-Athlete Award, named for the league's fourth commissioner, and a \$10,000 scholarship. Last year, 22 additional student-athletes (11 female and 11 male) received \$5,000 to continue their education. Alabama baseball player Emeel Salem and Vanderbilt track & field athlete Erika Schneble were named McWhorter Scholar-Athlete Award winners in 2006-07.
- The SEC has established a Community Service Award to honor a male and female student-athlete with a \$5,000 scholarship for outstanding service in the community. Tennessee swimmer Brad Boswell and Florida softball player Stacey Stevens were named recipients of this award in 2006-07.

A LEADER IN WOMEN'S SPORTS

- The SEC has developed a "Principles for Gender Equity," which, calls for each league school to provide equitable funding for women's sports, promotions and marketing and other support services. The SEC currently conducts championships in 11 women's sports and nine men's sports.
- The SEC had four sport winners of the Collegiate Woman of the Year Award sponsored by Honda. Tennessee's Candace Parker won for women's basketball, Courtney Kupets of Georgia took top honors in gymnastics, Georgia's Kara Lynn Joyce won in Swimming & Diving and Tennessee's Monica Abbott was the top athlete in softball.
- Since 1987, SEC schools have won 66 NCAA women's national championships, an average of more than three per year in the 11 women's sports the SEC sponsors. Nine of the 12 SEC institutions have won a national women's team championship since 1987.

COMPLIANCE AND EDUCATION

- The SEC Task Force Committee on Compliance and Enforcement has issued a report of recommendations that represents an important initial step in a formal process of establishing a new standard of compliance excellence within the Southeastern Conference. Among the recommendations included in this report was how institutions will handle reports of allegations, strengthening the relationship between the league's institutions and the conference office, developing new orientation programs and establishing an annual review of compliance issues.
- The SEC also conducts a New Coaches Orientation Program four times a year, which supplements institutional orientation programs and enhance the professional development of coaches. Topics of discussion range from the role of the SEC and NCAA to the role of athletics in higher education.

SPORTSMANSHIP

- The SEC has developed a sportsmanship statement for its institutions to follow. It states:
 "Coaches and student-athletes of a member institution, as well as individuals employed by or associated with that institution, including alumni, fans, patrons and boosters, shall conduct themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their behavior shall at all times reflect the high standards of honor and dignity that characterize participation in the collegiate setting. For intercollegiate athletics to promote the character development of participants, to enhance the integrity of higher education and to promote civility in society, coaches, student-athletes and all others associated with these athletics programs and events should adhere to such fundamental values as respect, fairness, civility, honesty and responsibility. These values should be manifested not only in athletics participation but also in the broad spectrum of activities affecting the athletics program. It is the responsibility of each member institution to establish policies for sportsmanship and ethical conduct in intercollegiate athletics consistent with the educational mission and goals of the institution. Furthermore, member institutions are responsible for educating on a continuing basis all constituencies about these policies."

IN THE COMMUNITY

- The SEC launched its education initiative in 2002, utilizing the platform of intercollegiate athletics to provide elementary school teachers with relevant resources they can use to educate and prepare children for life. The SEC became the nation's first conference to develop customized educational software, providing a CD-ROM containing SEC-branded content correlating to national educational standards. Since the CD-ROM was produced, the SEC has initiated an online program for K-8 students on education content and character development.
- SECKids.com is a website uniquely designed for school-age students. Now fans of all ages can access exciting, interactive and educational information on the SEC and its universities. SECKids.com features exclusive behind-the-scenes access at championship events, profiles of student-athletes and coaches, along with games and video highlights. Teachers can also register online to utilize the SEC Kids's college software in their classroom. The SEC is the only conference in the country to develop a site of this kind.

OVERALL ATHLETICS SUCCESS

- Since 1990, the SEC has won 118 team and 805 individual national championships. Since that time, the SEC has had at least one team ranked in the top five nationally in 76.8 percent of the total sports win which the league has competed (268 of 349). Ten of the SEC's 12 schools have won at least one national championship since 1990.
- In the SEC's 20 sponsored sports since 2000, the SEC has won more team national championships than any other conference in the nation. The SEC won 50 team titles since 2000, while the Pac-10 won 45 and the Big 12 won 21. The SEC won team titles in 16 different sports since 2000, also the most of any conference.

SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE TEAM NOTES



ALABAMA CRIMSON TIDE

The Mississippi State game followed a pattern of recent games in this series as offenses struggled while defensive scores and turnovers were critical to the outcome. Alabama's defense held MSU to 215 total yards today, the lowest offensive output by a Tide opponent this season (previous low: 232 by Vanderbilt). Also, State's 100 yards passing is the lowest by a Tide foe this season (previous low: 150 by Vanderbilt). The Crimson Tide is 2-10 in its last 12 November games, including a seven-game losing streak. Alabama has not won in November since a 17-0 win at Mississippi State on Nov. 3, 2005. Alabama is 46-32-1 in the month of November since 1983. Leigh Tiffin supplied all of Alabama's points with four field goals (39, 29, 51 and 50 yards), the most by a Crimson Tide kicker since Michael Proctor made four against Southern Mississippi in 1993. The four field goals matched Tiffin's career single-game high and tied with multiple other kickers for second on the UA list for a game.

FLORIDA GATORS



Tim Tebow continued his record-breaking campaign in his first year as a starter, rushing for a career-high five touchdowns while throwing two scores through the air at South Carolina. Tebow broke Florida's single-season rushing touchdown record and padded on to his staggering totals to give him 19 rushing touchdowns on the year. The two-time SEC Offensive Player of the Week garnered a career-best 304 yards passing, completing 22 of 32 passes and totaled 424 yards of total offense. He gained 120 yards on the ground on 26 carries, one rush shy of his personal-best he set earlier this year at Ole Miss. Already the single-season SEC record-holder for touchdowns by a quarterback, Tebow is closing on the all-time Div. I leader mark by a quarterback, Chance Harridge from Air Force, who had 22 rushing touchdowns in 2002. The win over South Carolina completes Florida's conference schedule. The Gators are back in action this weekend against Florida Atlantic University at Ben-Hill Griffin Stadium. The game is set for a noon kickoff.

ARKANSAS RAZORBACKS

Darren McFadden had 117 yards on 22 carries Saturday, the 20th time in his career he has eclipsed the century mark. The junior tailback moved into fourth place on the Southeastern Conference career rushing list, passing Florida's Errict Rhett. McFadden now has 4,191 career rushing yards. The 100-yard effort by McFadden was also his eighth of the season, which sets the single-season school record at Arkansas. He surpassed his 2006 season of seven and Cedric Cobbs' 2003 season of seven. Marcus Monk has now caught at least one pass in 39-of-40 career games and all 39 career starts. Alex Tejada accounted for seven points vs. Tennessee, which moved him past Todd Latourette with 93 points this season. Tejada's 16 field goals are the most since Todd Latourette had 17 (17-24) in 1998. Arkansas has now scored 383 points this season, which is the seventh-best total in school history. The announced attendance of 104,459 at Tennessee is the fourth-largest crowd Arkansas has ever played in front of. The Razorbacks will play Mississippi State at War Memorial Stadium in Little Rock next Saturday at 1 p.m. CT.



GEORGIA BULLDOGS



With Georgia's players wearing black jerseys and most of the Sanford Stadium crowd donning black, the 10th-ranked Bulldogs dispatched No. 18 Auburn 45-20 on Saturday. The blackout was the idea of the Georgia seniors, who approached Coach Mark Richt about it on Monday. Predictably, the team's entrance brought the crowd to a fever pitch. Knowshon Moreno finished with 101 yards on 22 carries, and he now has 11 touchdowns – the most for a Bulldog since Robert Edwards scored 12 in 1997. Moreno is also the first Bulldog since Verron Haynes in 2001 to have four straight 100-yard games. Thomas Brown, returning from a shoulder injury, had 81 yards, including a 53-yarder to set up Southerland's score. Overall, the Bulldogs had 180 yards rushing on 43 carries. Georgia has now scored 40-plus points in three straight games. The last time that happened was in the national championship season of 1942. Linebacker Dannel Ellerbe recorded eight tackles to lead the Bulldogs. Georgia also had four interceptions, two by safety Kelin Johnson and one each by cornerbacks Bryan Evans and Thomas Flowers. The Bulldogs entered the game with four interceptions this season.

AUBURN TIGERS



Auburn's streak of winning 15 consecutive games when wearing all white uniforms came to an end in the loss at Georgia. Auburn has now won 9 of its last 12 games against teams ranked in the top 10 of the Associated Press poll, but has lost its last two at No. 5 LSU (30-24) and at No. 10 Georgia (45-20). The Tigers are now 22-7 in their last 29 games played in November. Auburn has now scored in 61 consecutive games since last being shut out in the 2003 season opener, which is the second-longest streak in team history. The record is 149 straight games from Oct. 4, 1980 through Nov. 14, 1992. Auburn is now 66-7 under Tommy Tuberville when scoring 20 or more points in a game, including a 64-6 mark in the regular season. Auburn's 12-play scoring drive in the first quarter that ended with a Wes Byrum 22-yard field goal was its sixth scoring drive of at least 12 plays this season. The Georgia game marked the first game this season that the Tigers did not hold the lead at the half. Auburn was the only Football Bowl Subdivision team to have led at the half in every game this season.

KENTUCKY WILDCATS



Andre' Woodson threw for 222 yards, Rafael Little had 70 yards rushing and No. 24 Kentucky beat Vanderbilt 27-20 on Saturday to keep its slim hopes of a berth in the Southeastern Conference title game alive. The Wildcats (7-3, 3-3 SEC) snapped their two-game losing skid and clinched consecutive seven-win seasons for the first time since 1976-77. Kentucky still plays SEC East rivals Tennessee and Georgia, and has a chance to sneak into the league title game in Atlanta by defeating both. Rafael Little was sidelined with a leg injury. Little was injured on the opening drive of the second half, and Kentucky announced his return as uncertain. Kentucky is as high as No. 20 in the USA Today/Coaches Poll. UK was No. 22 last week and has been in the poll for nine consecutive weeks. The Cats are No. 22 in The Associated Press Top 25 poll. UK was No. 24 last week and has been in the poll eight of the last nine weeks.

SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE TEAM NOTES

LSU TIGERS



For the first time in school history, LSU is ranked No. 1 in the Bowl Championship Series Standings during the regular season as the Tigers climbed to the top spot on Sunday following their 58-10 win over Louisiana Tech on Saturday night. LSU, now 9-1 overall, returns to Southeastern Conference action on Saturday, traveling to face 3-7 Ole Miss in Oxford. LSU goes into the Ole Miss contest having already clinched a spot in the SEC Championship Game as the western division representative. LSU also moved to No. 1 in all three national rankings – Associated Press, USA Today Coaches and Harris Interactive. It's the second time this year that LSU is holds down the top spot in all three polls. LSU was the consensus No. 1 following its 28-24 win over Florida on Oct. 6. LSU finished the 2003 season as the BCS National Champions following its 21-14 win over Oklahoma in the Sugar Bowl that year. With its move to No. 1 in the BCS Standings, the Tigers have jumped one spot in the poll in each of the last three weeks. LSU was No. 3 in the BCS on Oct. 28 following its open date, No. 2 last week after the victory over Alabama and they hold down the top spot after the win over Louisiana Tech.

SOUTH CAROLINA GAMECOCKS



Kenny McKinley extended his streak of consecutive games with a catch to 32, holding sole possession of third place in that category in South Carolina history behind Sterling Sharpe and Jermale Kelly, who each went 34 straight. McKinley added 95 receiving yards vs. Florida, pushing his season total to 843, which passes Troy Williamson (2004) for seventh place in school history. McKinley moved up a spot in the career receptions list as well, sitting at 145 in sixth place. Cory Boyd tied his career high with three rushing touchdowns. He originally set the mark against Wofford on Sept. 16, 2006. Boyd had three receptions to tie Stanley Pritchett for eighth on Carolina's career receptions list at 116. With 44 yards rushing, Boyd has 829 yards this season, surpassing his previous career high of 823 set last season. Ryan Succop collected seven points with a field goal and three PATs, giving him 158 career points to tie Jeff Grantz for 10th on the South Carolina scoring chart. Blake Mitchell moved into third place on the school's career pass completions list with 464 (26 v. Florida), passing Phil Petty and sitting 101 behind Todd Ellis in second place.

OLE MISS REBELS



Four of the last five games in the Ole Miss-LSU series have been decided by three points or less, including the Tigers' 23-20 overtime win a year ago. This will mark the Rebels' fourth TV appearance of the year, fourth game against a top-25 foe and second against a top-five opponent. Senior RB BenJarvus Green-Ellis is 33 rushing yards short of 1,000 for the year. If he reaches that mark, he would become only the second player in school history to reach the 1,000-yard single-season mark twice in his career, joining Kayo Dotley (1949 and 1950). He is averaging 96.7 yards per game and coming off his fourth 100-yard game of the year. The 38 points against Northwestern State was the most scored by the Rebels under head coach Ed Orgeron. The previous high was 28 in the 2006 win over Memphis. Ole Miss is 0-6 in SEC play for the first time since 1982, when the team played only six league games and finished the conference slate with that mark. Junior DL Peria Jerry has been a force of late, totaling 9.5 TFLs and 31 total tackles in the last six games. Junior LB Tony Fein has put on tackling display of late, totaling 37 stops over the last three games.

TENNESSEE VOLUNTEERS



Junior tailback Arian Foster took his second carry of the second half 59 yards for a touchdown Saturday vs. Arkansas. The 59-yard score was the longest run by a Vol this season. Foster finished with 83 yards on 13 attempts. Foster now has 2,084 yards on 436 career attempts which puts him in 11th place on Tennessee's career rushing list. Freshman place-kicker Daniel Lincoln knocked home two of his three field goal attempts Saturday. Lincoln is now 18-of-21 this season. The 18 field goals is the most ever by a UT freshman. Lincoln has 95 points this season which is tied with Jeff Hall (1995) for most by a freshman kicker. Tennessee head coach Phillip Fulmer's record now stands at 144-44 (.766) in 16 seasons with the Vols. Fulmer owns a 36-13 record against opponents from the SEC West. Only five other active coaches in major college football have career records at least 100 games over .500. Junior wide receiver Lucas Taylor caught four passes for 41 yards. The Carencro, La., native now has 56 receptions on the season which is the 11th most in a season by a Vol receiver. Freshman safety Eric Berry notched his third interception of the season on the final play of the first half returning the interception 37 yards.

MISSISSIPPI STATE BULLDOGS



Two Mississippi State interceptions of Alabama quarterback John Parker Wilson - one late in the second quarter and one early in the third - led to 14 key Bulldog points as MSU upset the 21st-ranked Crimson Tide 17-12 Saturday afternoon at Davis Wade Stadium. A school-record crowd of 56,188 fans witnessed the victory, which was MSU's second in as many years over UA and upped State's record to 6-4 overall, 3-3 in Southeastern Conference. It also gave MSU bowl eligibility for the first time since the 2000 campaign. Mississippi State defensive back Anthony Johnson's 100-yard interception return that completely shifted momentum to the Bulldogs in their 17-12 upset win over No. 21 Alabama Saturday has been nominated for this week's Pontiac Game-Changing Performance. Johnson's return set an MSU school-record and tied the NCAA record for longest interception return. It gave MSU a 10-9 lead just seconds before halftime and moments after Alabama was primed to take command of the game at the intermission.

VANDERBILT COMMODORES



On paper, the Commodores topped Kentucky in most offensive statistical categories, including total yards (432-351), first downs (30-19), rushing yards (239-129), pass completions (20-17) and time of possession (35:52-24:08). The 30 first downs by the Commodores were the most since moving the chains 31 times against Arkansas on Sept. 16, 2006. For the first time this season, three Commodores rushed for at least 50 yards in the game. Cassen Jackson-Garrison gained 83 yards on 11 carries, while Jeff Jennings had 70 yards on 12 carries and Jared Hawkins added 50 yards on 7 carries. In total, six players combined to carry the ball 48 times for 239 yards for the Commodores. Sophomore defensive end Broderick Stewart had the biggest game of his career against Kentucky. Stewart registered two sacks, broke up two passes, forced a fumble and had one quarterback hurry. For the third time this season, Vanderbilt Stadium was filled to capacity with 39,773 fans in attendance. The previous sellouts came against Alabama and Georgia. The three home sellouts mark the most in one season since 1996.

THE COACHES

Howard Schnellenberger is in his 7th season at Florida Atlantic with a record of 38-41 (.481) and in his 23rd season overall with a record of 138-118-3 (.535). The Owls' offensive coordinator is Gary Norde and the defensive coordinator is Kirk Hoza.

Urban Meyer is in his third season at Florida with a record of 29-7 (.806) and in his seventh season overall with a record of 67-15 (.819). The Gators' offensive coordinator is Dan Mullen and the defensive co-coordinators are Greg Mattison and Charlie Strong.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN FLORIDA ATLANTIC HAS THE BALL

Willie Rose caught two touchdowns passes and also a 2-point conversion pass as Florida Atlantic came from behind win to beat Arkansas State 34-31. Trailing 31-20, a screen pass from quarterback Rusty Smith to Rose went 56 yards for a touchdown to close the gap to 31-26 with 9:57 left in the fourth. Smith finished 22-of-44 for 268 yards with two interceptions and three touchdowns.

Brandon Spikes and Dustin Doe rank as Florida's leading tacklers with 101 and 67 respectively. Derrick Harvey recorded one and a half sacks at Kentucky to bring his career total to 18.5. With the effort, Harvey improved to ninth on Florida's all-time career list. Harvey has had a tackle for a loss in eight of the last 10 games. Tony Joiner made his second interception of the season at South Carolina, which is tied for the top total on the squad.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN FLORIDA HAS THE BALL

Junior linebacker Frantz Joseph is one of 62 players on the Butkus Watch list. He is just one of two from the Sun Belt. Phill Steele's 2007 Mid-Season Awards were announced recently. On the list was FAU redshirt- freshman Tavous Polo as a member of the 1st Team Defense. He had three interceptions versus Minnesota, including a game saving steal and one at Kentucky, which snapped the NCAA's longest consecutive completion streak.

Tim Tebow's passer rating of 177.1 is the second-highest in the nation. He has completed 67.8 percent of his passes, which is the 12th-highest mark in the country and is the best in the SEC. Tebow has rushed for 19 touchdowns in 2007. The total is tied for the most by any player in SEC history and is the most by any UF player in a single-season. Against South Carolina, Tim Tebow rushed for five touchdowns.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Following Keegan Peterson's performance at Oklahoma State he was added to the Ray Guy Watch List. Junior Warley Leroy kicked a 45 yard long field goal for his career best against Oklahoma State. Leroy was 2-for-2 on the day and scored the Owls only points. He earned 12 points in FAU's 30-20 North Texas victory.

On the season, Chas Henry has punted 28 times for an average of 62.8 yards. His season-long (53 yards) came in UF's outing against Georgia. He has placed 11 inside the 20-yard line this season. Joey Iijas is 53-of-54 on extra points on the year and is eight-of-11 on field goals. Brandon James had his seventh return of 50-plus yards on the year with a 52-yard kick return against Vanderbilt.

SERIES/GAME NOTES

Record: First Meeting

Florida returns to "The Swamp" to face Florida Atlantic... The Owls are led by head coach Howard Schnellenberger... Schnellenberger was the head coach at Miami from 1979-83... During that time, Coach Schnellenberger led the Hurricanes to a 3-2 record over the Gators... The two losses came in 1982 and 1983... In 1983, the Gators were the only team to defeat Miami (28-3 in Gainesville, Sept. 3) as Coach Schnellenberger went on to lead the Hurricanes to an 11-1 record and the national title.

THE COACHES

Rich Brooks is in his fifth season at Kentucky with a record of 23-33 (.411) and in his 23rd season overall with a record of 114-142-4 (.446). The Wildcats' offensive coordinator is Joker Phillips and the defensive coordinator is Steve Brown.

Mark Richt is in his seventh season at Georgia and overall with a record of 69-19 (.784). The Bulldogs' offensive coordinator is Mike Bobo and the defensive coordinator is Willie Martinez.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN KENTUCKY HAS THE BALL

Quarterback André Woodson leads the SEC in passing yards per game, averaging 265.3 ypg. He has thrown for at least 200 yards and one touchdown in 16 straight games. He ranks second in the SEC and 17th nationally in passing efficiency (147.0). Dicky Lyons Jr. ranks second on the team in receiving yards with 45 catches for 523 yards and six touchdowns.

Marcus Howard now leads the team with 5.5 sacks for minus-48 yards. He had one sack through the first six games and 14 tackles, but in his last four games he has tallied 4.5 sacks and 20 tackles. Dannel Ellerbe leads the team with 73 tackles. He has been the leading tackler for the Bulldogs in six games this year and is the only Bulldog linebacker to start every game. Kelin Johnson returned to the lineup against #18 Auburn and responded with a pair of interceptions.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN GEORGIA HAS THE BALL

Linebacker Wesley Woodyard leads the SEC in tackles, averaging 10.1 per game. Woodyard has recorded at least four tackles in 34 consecutive games, every game since the start of the 2005 season. Defensive end Jeremy Jarmon is second in the SEC and 13th nationally in sacks with 9.0 on the year.

Redshirt freshman Knowshon Moreno (1,104 yards) is only the 10th player in Georgia history to have 1,000 yards rushing in one season and the first since Musa Smith in 2002. He is the first back to rush for 100 yards in four straight games since Verron Haynes in 2001. Moreno ranks No. 2 nationally for freshmen in rushing yards per game (110.4). Matthew Stafford is 14-4 as a starter.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Lones Seiber has now made 13-of-17 field goals this season. He has converted 40 extra points and is the team's leading scorer with 79 points. Tim Masthay is averaging a career-best 41.5 yards per punt and UK ranks fourth in the SEC in net punting, averaging 36.7 net yards per punt.

For his career, Brandon Coutu is 49-for-62 in FGs including 5-for-11 from 50+ yards. Also, he is a perfect 105-for-105 in PATs (third in the nation for active kickers). This season, Coutu is 14-19 in FG attempts (two of those attempts were from more than 50 yards). Brian Mimbs is third in the SEC with an average of 42.6 yards on 44 punts.

Georgia and Kentucky meet for the 61st time in a rivalry that began in 1939... Last season, Kentucky celebrated a 24-20 victory over the Bulldogs in Lexington including tearing down one of its goal posts... It was their first win over Georgia since 1996... Georgia leads the series with UK 47-11-2 including a 24-3-2 edge in Athens... In fact, the Bulldogs have won 14 straight over the Wildcats in Sanford Stadium... Kentucky's last win in Athens came in 1977... In its 2005 visit to the Classic City, Kentucky fell 45-13 to Georgia as the Bulldogs clinched the SEC Eastern Division title... This year, Georgia is in position to clinch a share of another division title with a win Saturday... THE COACHES

Sylvester Croom is in his fourth season at Mississippi State and overall with a record of 15-28 (.349). The Bulldogs' offensive coordinator is Woody McCorvey and the defensive coordinator is Ellis Johnson.

Houston Nutt is in his 10th season at Arkansas with a record of 73-48 (.603) and in his 15th season overall with a record of 109-70 (.609). The Razorbacks' offensive coordinator is David Lee and the defensive coordinator is Reggie Herring.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN MISSISSIPPI STATE HAS THE BALL

Anthony Dixon has now rushed 404 times in his career for 1,582 yards and 22 touchdowns. He needs 13 carries to reach the school's all-time top 10 in that category. His rushing total against Alabama (26 carries, 84 yards, one touchdown) moved his career yardage to 16th on the school's all-time list. And his 22 rushing touchdowns have moved him into a fifth place tie on the school's all-time list. True freshman quarterback Wesley Carroll threw his first interception of the season last week vs. 'Bama.

Michael Grant is tied for fifth in the NCAA with 1.50 passes defended per game. The mark also leads the SEC outright. Jerell Norton is making a name for himself as well. He has five interceptions and 10 pass breakups this season and he isn't even listed as a starter. The sophomore ranks tied for 11th nationally in interceptions and is tied for 13th in passes defended (1.40).

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN ARKANSAS HAS THE BALL

Titus Brown, who has recorded at least one tackle for loss in nine of the season's first 10 games, is sixth in the league with 1.20 TFL per game. His 0.80 sack-per-game average is third best in the SEC. His 18.5 sacks are good for seventh place all-time at MSU in that category. Derek Pegues registered his third pass interception this season, the eighth of his career in the Bulldogs' win over Alabama.

Darren McFadden ranks fourth nationally in rushing with 143.1 yards per game. That mark also leads the conference. He is averaging 175.5 all-purpose yards per game, which ranks 13th nationally and tops in the SEC. He enters the Mississippi State game needing 113 yards to pass Auburn's Bo Jackson for third place on the SEC career rushing list and 367 yards to eclipse LSU's Kevin Faulk for second place.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Pegues ranks second on the school's all-time kick return (73) and yardage (1,604) lists, trailing only Tony James (1989-92; 78-1,862) in both categories. He also passed Tom "Shorty" McWilliams and ranks third on the all-time punt returns list (56), tied with Bernard Euell (56, 1992-95), and sixth on the all-time yardage ranking (532).

True freshman PK Alex Tejada is making a big impact early in his Razorback career. Tejada is 16 for 20 on field goal attempts and 45 of 47 on PATs. Tejada is tied for 22nd nationally in field goal made (1.60) and also tied for 22nd in scoring 9.30 points per game.

Mississippi State is 0-6-1 all-time in the state of Arkansas, having lost three times to Arkansas in Fayetteville and three times to the Razorbacks in Little Rock... The Bulldogs' 1993 team tied Arkansas 13-13 in the Natural State's capital city...MSU has now beaten two teams ranked in the nation's top 25 when it played them (in back-to-back weeks), and won three road games in the same season overall, for the first time since 2000... State has not won four true road games in the same season since 1986 and has not won four league games since 2000...State has qualified for post-season bowl consideration for the first time in seven years...Arkansas owns eight-consecutive victories and 12 wins in the last 13 meetings... Arkansas head coach Houston Nutt is 8-1 against Mississippi State in his tenure with the Hogs.

THE COACHES

Charlie Weatherbie is in his fifth season at LA-Monroe with a record of 19-37 (.339) and in his 15th season overall with a record of 64-101 (.388). The Tigers' offensive coordinators are Steve Farmer and Nate Kaczor and the defensive coordinator is Kim Dameron.

Nick Saban is in his first season at Alabama and in his 14th season overall with a record of 112-63-1 (.639). The Crimson Tide's offensive coordinator is Major Applewhite and the defensive coordinator is Kevin Steele.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN LOUISIANA-MONROE HAS THE BALL

Running back Calvin Dawson leads the Sun Belt Conference and ranks 10th nationally with a 125.7 rushing yards per game. He led the Sun Belt Conference in rushing last season as a junior. Dawson rushed for over 100 yards in 10 consecutive games from Oct. 28, 2006 to Oct. 6, 2007. He has now gone over 100 yards in 14 of his last 15 games. Darrell McNeal leads the team with 48 catches, 457 receiving yards and is second with four receiving touchdowns.

Junior free safety Rashad Johnson leads the SEC and ranks third nationally with six interceptions this season. He also leads the league and ranks third nationally with 0.6 interceptions per game. Wallace Gilberry leads the Tide with eight sacks and 18 TFLs this season. Gilberry is second in the SEC and sixth nationally with 1.8 tackles for loss per game.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN ALABAMA HAS THE BALL

Greg James intercepted two passes against Arkansas State pushing his season total to four and career total to nine, just 22 games into his collegiate career. James is currently tied for 32nd nationally averaging 0.40 picks per game. James Truxillo is third on the team with 56 tackles. He also has two interceptions, five pass breakups, 2.5 tackles for a loss and a sack.

In 10 games this season, John Parker Wilson has completed 203 of 373 passes (.544) for 2,231 yards, with 14 touchdowns and eight interceptions. D.J. Hall leads Alabama with 57 catches for 886 yards and a career-high six touchdowns. He is averaging a team-leading 15.5 yards per catch and an SEC-best 88.6 yards per game. Hall's 57 catches rank fourth on UA's single-season charts. Hall enters the ULM game with 17 career touchdown receptions, which leaves him one shy of Alabama's all-time record.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Scott Love are finding a lot of success punting the football this season. Love leads the Sun Belt and is 21st in the nation averaging 42.9 yards per punt and ULM ranks first in the conference and 22nd in the nation averaging 37.7 net yards per punt. Love has placed 17 of his 35 punts inside the 20-yard line.

Javier Arenas has 43 total kick returns for 907 yards and one touchdown. He is averaging 21.1 yards per return this season. The speedster has 19 punt returns for 326 yards and one touchdown. Leigh Tiffin has made nine consecutive field goals and now leads the SEC and ranks third nationally with 2.10 field goals made per game this season. Tiffin is also fourth in the SEC and tied for 22nd nationally with 9.3 points per game.

THE COACHES

Bobby Johnson is in his sixth season at Vanderbilt with a record of 20-48 (.294) and in his 14th season overall with a record of 80-84 (.488). The Commodores' offensive coordinator is Ted Cain and the defensive coordinator is Bruce Fowler.

Phillip Fulmer is in his 16th season at Tennessee and overall with a record of 144-44 (.766). The Volunteers' offensive coordinator is David Cutcliffe and the defensive coordinator is John Chavis.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN VANDERBILT HAS THE BALL

Earl Bennett added to the SEC career receiving record he broke three weeks ago by catching eight passes for 67 yards in Vanderbilt's 27-20 loss to Kentucky. Through 10 games, Bennett leads the SEC with 67 receptions and ranks sixth with 739 receiving yards. He also has four touchdown catches. Bennett is on pace to reach 75 receptions for the third consecutive year. He is the only receiver in SEC history to post consecutive seasons of 75 receptions.

Jerod Mayo led the team with nine stops vs. Arkansas, also returning an interception 34 yards for a touchdown. Ryan Karl had seven tackles and Rico McCoy posted six. Jonathan Hefney led the unit with eight stops vs. Arkansas. Eric Berry posted six tackles and two interceptions vs. the Hogs while earning SEC Freshman of the Week honors. Berry has four interceptions and 207 INT return yards this year, which is a single-season school record. Hefney is fourth on the team with 61 tackles.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN TENNESSEE HAS THE BALL

Jonathon Goff came up big against Kentucky, contributing 12 total tackles and a tackle for loss in the tough loss. Goff leads the team in total tackles, is tied for second in sacks, and has nabbed two interceptions. D.J. Moore had four total tackles before leaving the game in the second quarter. Moore is tied for second in the SEC with five interceptions, and ranks third with a 27.6-yard average on kickoff returns.

Erik Ainge is 24-9 as a starter in his career. He has an efficiency rating of 132.0, which is the fourth-best mark in the SEC this season. He is fourth in the conference in total offense as well (225 yds/gm). Arian Foster has 586 yards rushing and nine touchdowns in his last six games after notching 83 yards and a score against Arkansas. Foster is third in the SEC in rushing touchdowns with 12 and sixth in yards per game with 88.3. He needs just 117 yards to eclipse the 1,000-yard mark for the first time.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Though having entered the Kentucky game converting on 11 of 15 field goal tries, Bryant Hahnfeldt missed field goals from 44 and 33 yards and a key extra point try against the Wildcats. Driving the ball late in the game, Vanderbilt was forced to try to convert fourth downs instead of possibly positioning itself for a winning Hahnfeldt field goal.

Daniel Lincoln is an SEC-best 18-of-21 on field goal attempts and 41-of-41 on PATs through ten games. Lincoln kicked his career-long 48-yard field goal vs. South Carolina ... Dennis Rogan replaced Hefney as the punt returner before the Louisiana-Lafayette game. Against Arkansas, Rogan averaged 8 yards per punt return and had one kick return for 78 yards.

Les Miles is in his third season at LSU with a record of 31-5 (.861) and in his 7th season overall with a record of 59-26 (.694). The Tigers' offensive coordinator is Gary Crowton and the defensive coordinator is Bo Pelini.

Ed Orgeron is in his third season at Ole Miss and overall with a record of 9-24 (.273). The Rebels' offensive coordinator is Dan Werner and the defensive coordinator is John Thompson.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN LSU HAS THE BALL

Senior RB Jacob Hester leads the way for the offense with 706 yards and eight TDs. Senior QB Matt Flynn has completed 144-of-260 passes for 1,856 yards with 14 TDs and 10 interceptions. Sophomore WR Brandon LaFell boasts 39 receptions for 535 yards and two scores, while senior Early Doucet and junior Demetrius Byrd have each hauled in four TDs passes.

Junior LB Tony Fein has put on tackling display of late, totaling 37 stops over the last three games. Fein followed up his 13-tackle performance against Arkansas with a career-high 16 at Auburn. Junior DL Peria Jerry has been a force of late, totaling 9.5 TFLs and 31 total tackles in the last six games. He is currently tied for sixth in the SEC in TFLs with 12.0. Junior DB Jamarca Sanford was credited with a career-high two TFLs and a career-high tying 13 total tackles against Northwestern State.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN OLE MISS HAS THE BALL

Senior SS Craig Seltz tops the squad with 68 total tackles and four interceptions, and sophomore LB Ali Highsmith has collected 60 stops with six QB hurries. On the line, senior ends Kirston Pittman and Glenn Dorsey have each notched 11.5 TFLs and six sacks.

At 967 rushing yards on the year, senior RB BenJarvus Green-Ellis is now 33 yards short of 1,000 yards. If he reaches that mark, he would become only the second player in school history to reach the 1,000-yard single-season mark twice in his career. Sophomore WR Shay Hodge tallied a career-high 88 receiving yards on four catches vs. the Demons with his fourth TD of the year, a 10-yarder from Brent Schaeffer.

SPECIAL TEAMS

With three field goals against Louisiana Tech, LSU PK Colt David tied the school record for field goals in a season, running his 2007 total to 19. The 19 field goals ties the mark set by David Browndyke in 1988. This year, David has converted 19 of 25 field goals. The 19 field goals ranks second in the SEC.

Junior Mike Wallace notched his first return for a TD with his 77-yard kickoff return against Northwestern State. It marked the first kickoff return for a TD by a Rebel since Jason Armstead's 93-yard score in the 2001 Murray State game. Ole Miss has blocked three kicks this year — two punts and one field goal.
