## FEW SECONDS ON THE SEC SEC FOOTBALL RELEASE HIGHLIGHTS

- SEC Football Players of the Week for Oct. 10 games are Tennessee QB Jonathon Crompton (offense), Florida LB Brandon Spikes (defense), Arkansas RS Dennis Johnson (special teams), Alabama C William Vlachos (offensive lineman), Kentucky DT Corey Peters (defensive lineman) and South Carolina WR Alshon Jeffery (freshman).

- Five SEC teams are ranked in the Harris Interactive Top 25 poll this week, while four are ranked in the AP and USA Today polls.

- The SEC is 25-5 in non-conference games in 2009, an 83.3 winning percentage. The percentage is the best in NCAA FBS.

- SEC games this season have attracted 3,084,875 fans in 40 games this season, an average of 77,122 fans per home game. Stadiums are filled to 98.54 percent of capacity.

- SEC teams are 36-6 when scoring first this season, a 85.7 winning percentage.

- Since 1992, the SEC has had three teams ranked in the AP Top 10 in 120 of 294 polls (40.8 percent).

- Since 2004, the SEC has had 84 intra-conference games decided by 5-points-or-less. The 31.82 percent rate of these games is the highest in NCAA FBS.

## SEC FOOTBALL ON TELEVISION

### CBS SPORTS

CBS Sports and the SEC announced a history 15-year contract extension to broadcast its football and basketball games. In the new agreement, beginning with the 2009-10 season, CBS Sports continues to be the exclusive national network broadcaster of SEC home football games, including the SEC Championship Game. CBS Sports will showcase the top conference matchups each week of the package with the "SEC Game of the Week". The agreement also includes a prime time game and doubleheader opportunities. In addition, CBS Sports continues its coverage of SEC regular-season basketball.

In addition to the broadcast rights on CBS Sports, this comprehensive long-team deal includes certain digital, internet, wireless, Video-on-Demand, data and enhanced high-light rights across all CBS platforms, including CBS College Sports Network and CBSsports.com. Also, simulcasts of CBS Sports games will be available for distribution by the CBS College Sports Network.

### ESPN

ESPN has acquired rights to every SEC home football game (excluding those on the network broadcast package) and will serve as the exclusive national cable home and the syndication rightsholder for the conference.

ESPN and ESPN2: The networks will increase coverage by combining to televise a minimum of 20 SEC games annually, including Saturday night and two primetime Thursday matchups.

ESPNU: The 24-hour college sports network, which launched in March 2005, will present a package of SEC football for the first time, with a Saturday game-of-the-week (generally in primetime and a minimum of 13 games annually).

SEC Network (ESPN Regional Television): The nation's largest syndicator of collegiate sports programming, becomes the official over-the-air syndication home for the SEC and will feature a game-of-the-week package (generally at 12:30 p.m. ET), with a minimum of 13 games each season throughout the SEC footprint and beyond. In addition, ERT will produce and distribute a studio show.

Also: Simulcasts of SEC game telecasts will be offered on ESPN360.com. Live games will be simulcast on mobile phones. The agreement includes global rights to present live games and encore presentations on ESPN International. ESPN has acquired domestic Spanish-language rights for SEC football on ESPN Deportes (24-hour, U.S.-based network). ESPN GamePlan, ESPN's college football pay-per-view service, will offer SEC action. ESPN Classic may telecast select SEC live games as well as historic and immediate encore presentations. Extensive SEC content, including highlights, will be presented online ESPN.com.

### COMCAST/ CHARTER SPORTS SOUTHEAST

On May 21, 2009, Comcast / Charter Sports Southeast (CSS), the regional sports channel focusing on college sports in the southeast, announced it has reached a five-year agreement with ESPN to televise live Southeastern Conference (SEC) content including a minimum of six football games, twenty men's basketball games, and sixteen women's basketball games as well as fifty SEC Olympic sports each year. The agreement will begin with the 2009-10 academic year. Events and times will be announced as determined.

### FOX SPORTS NET

FOX Sports Net (FSN), the nation's leader in local sports, today announced a new multi-year television rights agreement with ESPN that expands its long-time partnership with the Southeastern Conference (SEC).

Beginning with the 2009-10 academic year, FSN's three regional sports networks serving the SEC territory – FOX Sports South, Sun Sports and FOX Sports Southwest – will be the outlets for a minimum of 91 SEC athletic events each year. Events will include seven live, exclusive football games, 20 men's basketball games, 24 women's basketball games (16 regular season, eight tournament), 16 baseball games (10 regular season, six tournament) and 24 additional Olympic sporting events (softball, volleyball, soccer, gymnastics). FSN will distribute these events to more than 24 million cable and satellite households across the SEC coverage area.

### SEC FOOTBALL SHOWS ON TELEVISION

#### SEC Weekly on ESPNU

SEC Weekly, a one-hour program will air Thursdays at 4:30 p.m. on ESPNU, throughout the academic year and will cover SEC sports, including sport-by-sport previews, reviews, specials and features on student-athletes. The show will be hosted by Cara Capuano, who will anchor, and new analyst Matt Stinchcomb, a former University of Georgia All-America and NFL player. SEC Weekly is a product of ESPN's landmark 15-year agreement with the Southeastern Conference. ESPNU will complement the show with SEC game telecasts, including football, basketball, Olympic sports and select conference championships.

#### SEC Gridiron Live

SEC Gridiron LIVE, a 60-minute studio show offering game previews, expert analysis and a fast-paced social networking component that enables fan interaction, will air on FOX Sports South, FOX Sports Southwest and SUN Sports. The show is hosted by broadcasting veteran Charles Davis, with analysts Randy Cross and David Pollack and social media reporter Cassidy Hubbarth. The live studio show also incorporates a dynamic social networking component, providing viewers with the opportunity for lively and immediate interaction with the on-air broadcast team and SEC football fans across the country.

#### CBS College Sports SEC Tailgate

CBS Sports and CBS College Sports Network have announced 2009 SEC football coverage, beginning, Saturday, Sept. 19. CBS Sports will start with live pre-game show "SEC Game of the Week" and CBS College Sports Network kick off with SEC TAILGATE. The show captures all the excitement, traditions and festivities from the various campuses and stadiums across the SEC, as well as previews the match-ups, providing highlights and news from games in-progress. CBS will conclude its game coverage with the SEC Post Game Show on CBS College Sports.

## SEC FOOTBALL VIDEO REPLAY

### THE OBJECTIVE

To allow for specific types of officiating calls to be immediately reviewed during all games hosted by SEC teams.

### THE COACHES' CHALLENGE

A new rule expands the ability of a head coach to challenge a reviewable play on the field. The head coach now retains a challenge if his initial challenge is successful and thus results in a reversal by the replay official. The coach will then have a single challenge that he may use anytime during the game if his team has not used all its timeouts. Thus a team may have a total of two challenges in the game, but only if the first results in a reversal of the on-field ruling.

### THE SOURCE

All reviewable video comes direct from either the television network broadcasting the game (CBS Sports, ESPN, ESPN2, Lincoln Financial) or other TV production facilities that meet established conference standards. The Southeastern Conference has used instant replay since 2005.

### THE PLAYS

#### Reviewable

1. Plays governed by Sideline, Goal Line, End Zone, and End Line:
  - a. Scoring Plays, including a runner breaking the plane of the goal line
  - b. Pass complete/incomplete/intercepted at sideline, goal and endlines
  - c. Runner/receiver in or out of bounds

### THE PROCESS

Each SEC football stadium has a secured replay booth equipped with a DVSPORT Digital Replay System. Three individuals work in the booth for the duration of the game: 1. Replay Official, 2. Communicator, 3. Technician. The Replay Official is selected and assigned by the Conference Office.

A live video feed is sent directly to the replay booth. The Technician watches the feed on an input monitor while capturing/digitizing it into the DVSPORT Digital Replay System. The Technician also marks the beginning of each play as well as any replays as they occur in real time.

Each play and subsequent replay then appears on a touch screen in front of the Communicator. As the Technician marks the incoming video, each view (by mark) will appear as a small picture on the computer touch screen. At any time, the Communicator can touch/click on a thumbnail and immediately send that play/replay to the Replay Official.

With the Communicator's assistance, the Replay Official can quickly jump between replays while playing back the video. All replay video navigation is done via a remote device controlled by the Replay Official. All replays/video are viewed on an output monitor. The touch screen is only used to select the replays.

While most plays are reviewed between the whistle and the beginning of the next play, the Replay Official can stop play on the field by using a pager system. Five onfield officials wear pagers. If play is stopped the Referee announces on the stadium PA microphone that play has been stopped so the previous play can be reviewed. The Referee then proceeds to the sideline headset, which provides direct communication to the Replay Official in the booth. Once the play has been reviewed, the Replay Official notifies the Referee, who then announces the decision on the stadium PA system.

### THE EQUIPMENT

Each SEC member institution uses the Digital Replay System developed by DVSPORT of Pittsburgh, Pa. The replay systems are maintained by the home institution with technical support from DVSPORT.

## SEC BOWL AGREEMENTS

The Southeastern Conference has agreements to send nine of its member institutions to postseason bowl games following the 2009 season. The winner of the SEC Championship Game will automatically participate in the Bowl Championship Series comprised of the Sugar, Rose, Orange and Fiesta Bowls.

The Capital One (2nd), will then make its pick following the BCS selections. The bowl must select the team with the next best overall record or a team that is within one win of the team with the next best overall record.

The Outback, Chick-fil-A and AT&T Cotton Bowls will work with the conference office to determine picks 3-5. The Cotton Bowl has the first preference of teams from the Western Division and the Outback Bowl has first preference of teams from the Eastern Division. The Cotton or Outback Bowl can select teams outside of its divisional preference, but must not select them before the opposite bowl selects from its divisional preference. The Chick-fil-A Bowl has the selection of preference following the Cotton and Outback Bowls.

In selections 6-7, the AutoZone Liberty and Gaylord Hotels Music City Bowls will make their selections, not in any specific order, but in consultation with the SEC Office. The Bowls will rank available qualified teams in order of preference. If there are no similarities in the order of selection, the bowls will be granted its selection. If the bowls rank the same teams in preference, the team involved in the process would get its preference of which bowl to participate.

The PetroSun Independence Bowl will receive the eighth selection and the Papajohns.com Bowl will have the ninth pick of available SEC teams.

## BOWL CHAMPIONSHIP SERIES

The Bowl Championships Series is a five-game arrangement for post-season college football that is designed to match the two top-rated teams in a national championship game and to create exciting and competitive match-ups among eight other highly regarded teams in four other games.

The five bowl games are the Tostitos Fiesta Bowl, the FedEx Orange Bowl, the Rose Bowl Game presented by Citi, the Allstate Sugar Bowl and the BCS National Championship Game that is played at one of the bowl sites. The 2010 Citi BCS National Championship Game will be played in the Rose Bowl in Pasadena, Calif.

Unless a Southeastern Conference champion qualifies to play in the BCS National Championship Game, it will play in the Allstate Sugar Bowl.

Fox Sports will televise the Tostitos Fiesta Bowl, FedEx Orange Bowl and the Allstate Sugar Bowl at the conclusion of the 2009 regular season. ESPN/ABC will televise the Rose Bowl presented by Citi and the Citi BCS National Championship Game.

In the 11 previous years of the BCS, the Southeastern Conference holds a 12-5 mark in BCS games (.706) - the most wins of any other conference and the highest winning percentage of any conference participating in more than two BCS games.

In BCS National Championship Games, the SEC is 5-0 (1.000) and has more BCS titles than any other conference. The SEC has won BCS crowns in 1998 (Tennessee), 2003 (LSU), 2006 (Florida), 2007 (LSU) and 2008 (Florida).

In the history of the BCS, an SEC team has been in the BCS standings 328 times, second only to the Big 12 with 331. The SEC and the ACC have had 11 of its 12 teams ranked in the BCS standings at some point since 1998 - more than any other conference.

**SEC ALL-TIME IN BCS STANDINGS**

In the history of the Bowl Championship Series standings, the SEC is second in most appearances with 328 (since 1998). Here is a capsule look:

The SEC and the ACC have put the most schools in the history of BCS standings at 11 each. The Big 12 and the Big Ten have put 10 teams each in the BCS standings.

Three SEC teams have been ranked at one time or another as the top team in the nation in the BCS standings during its history - Alabama (5 times all in 2008), LSU (twice in 2007) and Tennessee (five teams in 1998) [Reminder that there are no BCS standings after the bowl games.]

Texas leads all schools in the BCS rankings, having been listed 77 times. Florida is second with 76 times while Georgia is ninth at 54 times each, Tennessee was 10th at 52 and LSU 12th at 49.

Here is a listing of the amount of times each SEC team has been ranked in the BCS Standings: Alabama (26), Arkansas (16), Auburn (30), Florida (76), Georgia (54), Kentucky (4), LSU (49), Ole Miss (7), Mississippi State (7), South Carolina (7) and Tennessee (52).

## THIS IS THE SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE

### 2008-09 ANOTHER BANNER ATHLETIC YEAR FOR THE SEC

The SEC claimed five national championships in the 2008-09 year, tying it with the total from the 2007-08 season.

In 10 of its 20 sponsored sports, the SEC had either the national champion or the national runners-up.

The SEC had national championships in football (Florida), men's swimming & diving (Auburn), women's indoor track & field (Tennessee), gymnastics (Georgia) and baseball (LSU). The SEC also had national runners-up finishes in men's golf (Arkansas), gymnastics (Alabama), softball (Florida), women's swimming & diving (Georgia) and men's indoor track & field (Florida).

In its 76 year history, the Southeastern Conference has won 179 team national championships, including 63 since 2000. In this decade, the SEC has won at least one national championship in 16 of its 20 sponsored sports with the exception of women's cross country, volleyball, soccer and softball.

### SEC LEADS ALL CONFERENCES IN 2008-09 MEN'S SPORTS CONFERENCE VS. CONFERENCE SURVEY; 2nd in WOMEN'S SPORTS

In a statistical survey that is based on NCAA championship and rankings, the Southeastern Conference placed first in the nine men's sports it sponsors and second in the 11 women's sports the league sponsors.

The survey, compiled each year since 1986 by Bo Carter, takes into account final NCAA championship standings in each sport and poll rankings in football. Each conference gets 20 points for a team that wins a national championship, 19 for a second place finish and down to 1 point for a 20th place finish.

In the nine men's sports the SEC sponsors, the SEC had 440.5 points with the Pac-10 coming in second with 375 points, followed by the Big 12 with 337.5 points, ACC with 214 points, Big East 102.5 points and the Big Ten with 80 points.

In the 11 women's sports the SEC sponsors, the Pac-10 was first with 615 points followed by the SEC with 431 points, the Big 12 with 337 points, Big Ten with 318.5 points, ACC with 277.5 points and the Big East with 161.5 points.

Combining the 20 sponsored sports, the Pac-10 had 990 points followed by the SEC with 806 points, Big 12 with 674.5 points, ACC with 491.5 points, Big Ten with 398.5 points and the Big East with 264 points.

The SEC has had the highest men's point total in 15 of the last 17 seasons (exceptions: 2007-08: Big 12; 1997-98: Pac-10). The Pac-10 has had the highest women's point totals each year since 1986 with the exception of four years the SEC has had the highest total (1990-91; 1995-96; 2004-05; 2006-07).

### SEC LEADS DIVISION I CONFERENCES IN MOST ESPN THE MAGAZINE CoSIDA ACADEMIC ALL-AMERICANS

The Southeastern Conference had 41 of its student-athletes each ESPN The Magazine Academic All-America Team mention, the most of any Division I conference in the nation.

The Academic All-America Program is administered and voted on by the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA).

The SEC had 15 student-athletes earn first-team mention, 14 earn second-team and 12 earn third-team mention.

The Big 12 was second with 38 total student athletes listed while the Big Ten was third at 34 and the ACC fourth at 26. The Big Ten led all conferences in first-team honorees with 18, followed by the SEC's 15.

Each SEC institution had at least one student-athlete earn first, second or third-team mention. Florida led the SEC with seven student-athletes on the lists while Tennessee had six, South Carolina and Arkansas had five each. Alabama, Florida and Tennessee each led the SEC with three on the various first-team lists.

Florida's Stacey Nelson (softball) and Tim Tebow (football) were named Academic All-Americans of the Year in their respective sports.

### SEC LAUNCHES ACADEMIC NETWORK TO PROMOTE 12 MEMBER INSTITUTIONS

The 12 institutions of the Southeastern Conference institutions have joined together in the launch of the SEC Academic Network, a website ([www.secacademicnetwork.com](http://www.secacademicnetwork.com)) designed to promote the academic programs of SEC universities. The SEC Academic Network is being established by the SEC in partnership with ESPN and the member universities.

The Academic Network, developed using technology and coordination from ESPN Digital Media and Origin Digital, will feature content from every institution ranging from research, innovation and economic development to community partnerships, civic engagement and service.

"Our commitment to highlight the accomplishments of SEC member institution's academic programs was a key component of our new television agreements," said SEC Commissioner Mike Slive. "We are grateful to ESPN for providing the technology, expertise and tools they use in sports media to our institutions in support of academic pursuits."

Each institution has its own page on the website that includes videos categorized by topic. Alumni, fans and students worldwide will have the ability to learn more about SEC academics in one place through video features that are posted by the league institutions.

The Academic Network is a component of the SEC's 15-year television package with ESPN, which is the most comprehensive in the history of intercollegiate athletics. Also part of ESPN's commitment to SEC academic programs is the production of an annual Campus Connection telecast at each SEC institution, in which students take part in the production; telecasts of two programs annually dedicated to the academic accomplishments of SEC student-athletes; a weekly academic feature segment on ESPN's SEC show; and selection of one undergraduate student from every SEC institution to participate in ESPN's summer internship program.

### SEC SPORTSMANSHIP STATEMENT

- The SEC has developed a sportsmanship statement for its institutions to follow. It states:

"Coaches and student-athletes of a member institution, as well as individuals employed by or associated with that institution, including alumni, fans, patrons and boosters, shall conduct themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their behavior shall at all times reflect the high standards of honor and dignity that characterize participation in the collegiate setting. For intercollegiate athletics to promote the character development of participants, to enhance the integrity of higher education and to promote civility in society, coaches, student-athletes and all others associated with these athletics programs and events should adhere to such fundamental values as respect, fairness, civility, honesty and responsibility. These values should be manifested not only in athletics participation but also in the broad spectrum of activities affecting the athletics program. It is the responsibility of each member institution to establish policies for sportsmanship and ethical conduct in intercollegiate athletics consistent with the educational mission and goals of the institution. Furthermore, member institutions are responsible for educating on a continuing basis all constituencies about these policies."

**THE COACHES**

Mark Richt is in his ninth season at Georgia and overall with a record of 85-25 (.773). The Bulldogs' offensive coordinator is Mike Bobo and the defensive coordinators are Willie Martinez and John Jancek.

Bobby Johnson is in his eighth season at Vanderbilt with a record of 29-61 (.322) and in his 16th season overall with a record of 89-97 (.478). Ted Cain serves as the offensive coordinator and the defensive coordinator is Jaime Bryant.

**WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN GEORGIA HAS THE BALL**

Georgia sophomore A.J. Green is building on a successful freshman season and is currently leading the SEC in total receiving yards (587), receiving yards per game (97.8) and rec. per game (6.3). His 587 yards ranks 12th in the nation. Senior Joe Cox had a career-high 19 completions on 34 attempts (also a career high) during the Bulldogs' loss to Tennessee. Cox tied the school record with five touchdown passes against Arkansas. The Bulldog offensive line has allowed only five sacks this season.

The Vanderbilt unit ranks among the SEC's top five in total defense, scoring defense, pass defense and pass defense efficiency, and first downs allowed. Chris Marve reached double digits in tackles for the fourth time this season by posting 10 total stops against Army. Marve, who tops the SEC with three forced fumbles, ranks second in the league in total tackles (9.3 per game) behind Georgia LB Rennie Curran. Joel Caldwell continues to play well as the replacement of Ryan Hamilton, who suffered a season-ending pectoral injury against LSU. Caldwell finished with a career high 11 tackles. Caldwell ranks fourth on the defense with 37 total tackles. He also had a forced fumble and two defended passes.

**WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN VANDERBILT HAS THE BALL**

Junior WLB Rennie Curran leads the SEC with 63 tackles this year. He is the top returning tackler in the SEC after recording 115 stops in 2008. Curran set a new career high with 16 tackles versus #4 LSU in 2009. Senior Darius Dewberry returned to the lineup against ASU and then matched his career high against #4 LSU with four tackles. He had a career-high five tackles during the loss to Tennessee. Bacarri Rambo snagged his second interception of the season against the Volunteers and returned it 28 yards for a touchdown, which was the first defensive TD for the Bulldogs this year.

The Commodores' top two rushers through six games are a pair of true freshmen: Warren Norman (398 yards) and Zac Stacy (282 yards). Norman and Stacy were the Commodores' leading rushers at Army with 62 and 46 yards, respectively. Norman needs 25 yards to move into the team's Top Ten all-time freshman rushers. Stacy will move into the Top Ten with 141 more yards.

**SPECIAL TEAMS**

Brandon Boykin is the first player in SEC history with two 100-yard kickoff returns for touchdowns after picking up his second one during the matchup at Tennessee. Tennessee's Willie Gault holds the SEC record for KOR TDs in a season with three in 1980. Boykin and former Bulldog Gene Washington now share the mark with two kickoff returns for touchdowns in a season. Boykin finished with 128 return yards (32.0 average) on four kicks versus the Vols to give him 529 kickoff return yards this season. Jimmy Campagna holds the school record with three return touchdowns in a season (two punts, one KOR) in 1952.

In addition to Norman's 62 rushing yards against Army, he returned a kickoff 76 yards for Vanderbilt's only touchdown. He also amassed 171 all-purpose yards. Norman ranks second in the SEC in all-purpose yardage (154.0 yards), sixth in kickoff return average (27.7 yards) and eighth in rushing (66.3 yards). Opposing kickers are 100% in field goal attempts, hitting all 11 attempts. They are also 4-of-4 beyond 40 yards. Senior Brett Upson averaged 47.2 yards on six punts, pushing his season average to 41.7 yards.

**SERIES/GAME NOTES**

Since Mark Richt took over as Georgia's head coach in 2001, the Bulldogs have won seven of eight meetings against Vanderbilt. The last time Georgia played in Nashville, the Bulldogs beat Vandy 20-17 in 2007 with a Brandon Coutu field goal as time expired. Vandy won its only game against Georgia during the Richt era in Sanford Stadium after picking up a 24-22 win in 2006. Georgia leads the series 49-18-2 overall and is 22-7-1 in Vanderbilt Stadium (22-11-2 in Nashville).

**THE COACHES**

Dan Mullen is in his first season at MSU and overall. The Bulldogs' offensive coordinator is Les Koenning and the defensive coordinator is Carl Torbush.

Rick Stockstill is in his fourth season at MTSU and overall with a record of 20-22 (.476). The Blue Raiders' offensive coordinator is Tony Franklin, while Manny Diaz serves as the defensive coordinator.

**WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN MISSISSIPPI STATE HAS THE BALL**

Anthony Dixon has racked up 561 yards in five games this season, good for an average of 112.2 yards per game - 11th highest in the nation and second in the Southeastern Conference. Dixon has already entered the SEC record book as he is eighth all-time with 760 career rushing attempts and tied for 14th with 34 rushing touchdowns. Dixon has rushed for 3,164 yards in his four-year career at Mississippi State. With 49 yards this weekend, he will pass Jerious Norwood's school rushing record of 3,212 set from 2002-2005.

LB Danny Carmichael is the leader on defense and is having a strong season. The senior leads the nation with four forced fumbles this year while owning 33 tackles, four TFLs, and two sacks. Carmichael enters the Mississippi State game with 203 career stops after leading the Blue Raiders in 2008 with 89 tackles. Chris McCoy, who shares the Sun Belt Conference lead in tackles for loss with 8.5 and ranks 14th nationally, is fourth on the team with 25.0 tackles. Jamari Lattimore now has 6.5 career quarterback sacks and needs just one more to tie Lonnie Clemons for 10th place on the Blue Raiders' all-time list. Lattimore is second in the SBC in sacks.

**WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN MIDDLE TENNESSEE STATE HAS THE BALL**

Senior linebacker Jamar Chaney and junior K.J. Wright are the team's leaders on defense, and their names appear atop the MSU defense statistics in total tackles. Each has 43 total tackles. Wright has 3.5 tackles for loss, a fumble forced and recovered and a blocked field goal and Chaney has 2.0 tackles for loss, an interception and four quarterback hurries. MSU has two interception returns for touchdowns this season.

After five games, QB Dwight Dasher leads the Sun Belt Conference and ranks 9th nationally in total offense with 315.4 yards per game and has accounted for 80 percent of the team's total yards during that span (1577 of 1983 yards). Dasher, who also leads the Blue Raiders in rushing, has been efficient in the passing game as well. He threw for a career-best 324 yards and two touchdowns in the win over Maryland and followed with a 269-yard effort at North Texas and 245 at Troy to give him five straight 200-yard passing games for the first time in his career. Wide receiver Patrick Honeycutt, who shared the team lead a year ago with 51 receptions, is off to his best start as a Blue Raider. The senior enters the Mississippi State game with a team-high 20 receptions for 220 yards and a touchdown.

**SPECIAL TEAMS**

Head coach Dan Mullen has put an emphasis on special teams and serves as the special teams coach. The Bulldog have made at least one big special teams play each week, including a blocked punt and a kickoff return for touchdown. Against Houston, State blocked a field goal attempt in the final minute of the first half.

Sophomore PK Alan Gendreau enjoyed a career game in the win over North Texas by scoring a personal-best 13 points and connecting on all three of his field goals. Gendreau, who matched his career-high with three-made field goals in the game, connected on a career long 48 yarder to make him a perfect 6-for-6 on the season. During one stretch of 2008, Gendreau equaled the school record by hitting eight straight three-pointers, including three against Mississippi State and he needs just two more to equal that mark this year. Gendreau enters the MSU game with 93 career points.

**THE COACHES**

Bobby Petrino is in his second season at Arkansas with a record of 8-9 (.471) and seventh overall with a record of 52-28 (.650). The Razorbacks' offensive coordinator is Paul Petrino and the defensive coordinator is Willie Robinson.

Urban Meyer is in his fifth season at Florida with a record of 49-9 (.845) and in his ninth season overall with a record of 88-17 (.838). The Gators' offensive coordinator is Steve Addazio and the defensive coordinator is Charlie Strong.

**WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN ARKANSAS HAS THE BALL**

Currently, Arkansas has the top passing offense (318.2) in the SEC and Florida has the top pass defense in the league (115.2). Arkansas leads the SEC in passing touchdowns (15), while the Gators top the conference in passing touchdowns allowed (1). Arkansas' Ryan Mallett leads the conference with 284.4 passing yards per game. Joe Adams (79.0), Greg Childs (69.0) and Jarius Wright (65.6) rank two, three, four in the league in receiving yards per game. Mallett leads the SEC in total offense (282.2) and ranks 18th nationally. Mallett is second in the league in pass efficiency (154.59) and 15th in the nation. Michael Smith had 18 carries for 145 yards and a touchdown against Auburn to lead the team.

Carlos Dunlap has recorded two sacks, 3.5 tackles for loss, two pass breakups and 13 tackles (five solo) on the season. Jermaine Cunningham and Justin Trattou both notched their first sack of the season in the win over LSU. The UF linebacker corps has started Brandon Spikes, Ryan Stamper and A.J. Jones in every game this season. That trio paced the Gators in tackles against LSU, with Spikes posting a season-best 11, Jones a career-high 10 and Stamper adding nine. Spikes leads the Gators with 32 tackles, four tackles for loss and three sacks. Ahmad Black leads UF defensive backs with 27 total tackles.

**WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN FLORIDA HAS THE BALL**

Defensive tackle Malcolm Sheppard leads the SEC with seven tackles for loss this season. His career total (33) are tied for eighth in school history. Sheppard has led the Razorbacks in tackles for loss each of the last two seasons. Sheppard has had at least half of a tackle for a loss in each of the last 13 games. Jerico Nelson made his second-straight start at outside linebacker against Auburn. Nelson finished the game with a team-high 10 tackles, including three for a loss of 21 yards. He also forced a fumble and had a sack for a loss of 15 yards. Jerry Franklin started his 17th-straight game against Auburn.

Tim Tebow has rushed for five touchdowns this season, bringing him to 48 for his career, good for second on the all-time SEC list and just one shy of Herschel Walker (Georgia, 1980-82), who ranks No. 1 in conference history with 49. Tebow's career rating of 173.0 currently ranks No. 1 in SEC history (min. 300 completions). Tebow has thrown a touchdown pass in 31 of his 32 career starts. Jeff Demps paces the Gator running backs with 390 yards and four touchdowns and an 8.9 yards-per-carry average. Riley Cooper and Aaron Hernandez each have two touchdowns. Cooper has tallied 275 yards on 17 receptions, while Hernandez has 268 on 21 grabs.

**SPECIAL TEAMS**

Dennis Johnson leads the SEC and ranks sixth nationally with an average of 33.8 yards per kickoff return this season. Against Auburn, he had a 70-yard return marking his third return of 50-or-more yards this season. Johnson's 417 kickoff return yards this season already rank as the 14th-highest total in school history. Alex Tejada has been nearly perfect this year. On the season, he is 7-of-7 on field goals and 22-of-23 on extra points.

Caleb Sturgis, who had never attempted a field goal in his college career, was perfect on three attempts against Tennessee on Sept. 19. He followed that up by drilling two field goals at Kentucky, his first career attempts on the road, and went 2-of-3 at LSU. Brandon James, UF's all-time punt return yards leader with 1,143, ranks third in the NCAA among active players in career punt return average (12.2) and second in punt return yards. He is also second among active players with four career punt return touchdowns.

**THE COACHES**

Neil Callaway is in his third season at UAB and overall with a record of 8-21 (.276). The Blazers' offensive coordinator is Kim Helton, while Eric Schumann serves as the defensive coordinator.

Houston Nutt is in his second season at Ole Miss with a record of 12-6 (.667) and 17th overall with a record of 123-76 (.618). The Rebels' offensive coordinator is Kent Austin and the defensive coordinator is Tyrone Nix.

**WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN UAB HAS THE BALL**

The Blazer offense is averaging 359.4 yards per game with 228.8 coming on the ground. Senior QB Joe Web accounts for the majority of the offense, rushing for 114.0 yards per game while passing for 128.8. He has rushed for five TDs and thrown for six more. UAB junior wide receiver Frantrell Forrest continues to move up the Blazers' all-time charts for receptions. Forrest now has 102 catches in his first two-plus seasons and currently ranks No. 4 on the school's career list. Through the first five games of the 2009 season, Jeffery Anderson (12 receptions/179 yards/3 TDs) and Zach Lankford (2 receptions/32 yards) have combined for 14 receptions for 211 yards and three TDs.

Johnny Brown tops the team and ranks eighth in the SEC in tackles at 7.8 per game. He is also tied for eighth in the conference in passes defended at 1.00 per game (4 PB, 1 INT). Brown has posted a pair of double-digit tackle performances, including 10 against Alabama. Senior LB Patrick Trahan has totaled 17 stops in the last two games. He led the team in stops at Vanderbilt with a career-high 11. Junior DE Kentrell Lockett has been credited with at least a half TFL in each game and leads the team with 5.0. Lockett also boasts team highs of 3.5 sacks and six QB pressures. Greg Hardy has notched 1.0 TFL in each of the four games in which he has played. Of his seven credited tackles, 4.0 are TFLs and 3.0 sacks.

**WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN OLE MISS HAS THE BALL**

The UAB defense is allowing 453.6 yards per outing and 308.6 via the pass. UAB junior S Hiram Atwater is tied for the team lead in tackles with 29 despite playing in only four of the Blazers' five games. He was the C-USA Defensive Player of the Week after his game-clinching interception and 40-yard TD return against USM. Safety Chase Daniel has three interceptions in the season's first five games.

RB Brandon Bolden continues to find different ways to contribute for the Rebels. He current ranks ninth in the SEC in all-purpose yards at 113.6 per game. The Baton Rouge native posted 127 all-purpose yards against Alabama. He notched career bests of four receptions and 76 receiving yards against the Tide and boasts seven catches for 98 yards over his last two games. As a rusher, Bolden has led the team in rushing in three of the five games this year and tops the squad with an average of 61.6 ypg. Jevan Snead had his streak of 13 straight games with a TD completion come to end against Alabama. Dexter McCluster ranks second on the team in both rushing (32.6 ypg) and receiving (14 rec, 177 yds).

**SPECIAL TEAMS**

Trey Ragland had his best game of the season as UAB's punter in the Blazers' game at Troy last month. The Trussville, Ala. native finished with six punts for a 45.8 yards per kick average and had a long punt of 56 yards. Ragland presently ranks No. 33 in the country with a 42.7 yards per kick average. Through the season's first five games, Josh Zahn has connected on 8-of-9 field goals. He was a perfect 3-for-3 vs. USM in the last game and had a 51-yarder, just one yard shy of the UAB record for longest field goal.

Freshman P Tyler Campbell posted a 71-yard punt against Alabama, which is the longest by a Rebel since Cody Ridgeway's 75-yarder in the 2001 Georgia game. Since taking over punting duties the last three games, Campbell is averaging 45.0 yards in eight attempts with four inside the 20 yard line and two longer than 50. Senior K Joshua Shene has converted all five of his FG attempts this year, having drilled his 25-yarder against Alabama. His streak of 88 straight PATs came to an end at Vanderbilt as his third extra point attempt of the game was blocked.

Rich Brooks is in his seventh season at Kentucky with a record of 34-44 (.436) and 19th overall with a record of 125-153-4 (.450). The Wildcats' offensive coordinator is Randy Sanders and Steve Brown serves as the defensive coordinator.

Gene Chizik is in his first season at Auburn and third overall with a record of 10-20 (.333). The Tigers' offensive coordinator is Gus Malzahn and the defensive coordinator is Ted Roof.

**WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN KENTUCKY HAS THE BALL**

Junior quarterback Mike Hartline will be out at least three-to-four weeks after the results of an MRI test were evaluated, Coach Rich Brooks announced Monday. WR Randall Cobb also is a proven all-purpose threat for the Wildcats this season. The sophomore ranks in the SEC's top 10 in receptions per game (2nd - 4.6), punt return average (2nd - 10.5), all-purpose yards (5th - 130.8 per game), receiving yards per game (6th - 62.0) and scoring (7th - 7.2 ppg).

Craig Stevens leads the team and ranks third in the SEC with 55 tackles, while Josh Bynes is fifth with 51. Last year Stevens had 54 tackles all season, and Bynes had 53. Both players have also recorded interceptions, while Stevens leads the team with 5.0 tackles for loss and Bynes recorded a safety against Ball State. Stevens has recorded double-digit tackles in three of his last four games, including a career high 12 at Arkansas. Antonio Coleman, a first-team preseason All-SEC selection, has 19 tackles including 4.5 tackles for loss, 2.5 sacks, an interception which he returned for a touchdown against Mississippi State and a fumble recovery. Coleman ranks tied for sixth in school history with 17.0 career sacks.

**WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN AUBURN HAS THE BALL**

All-America cornerback Trevard Lindley will miss the Auburn game as he continues to heal from a high-ankle sprain. Senior tackle Corey Peters led the Wildcat defense last week, posting seven tackles and a career-high 2.5 quarterback sacks. He was named SEC Defensive Lineman of the Week for that performance. Linebacker Sam Maxwell also made seven stops against the Gamecocks and charted his third career interception. Senior linebacker Sam Maxwell currently leads the SEC and ranks tied for 13th nationally in passes defended, averaging 1.4 per game. He has five pass breakups and two interceptions this season.

Running back Ben Tate is having a stellar senior season, leading the SEC and ranking eighth nationally averaging 120.7 yards per game. Tate has four 100-yard rushing games this season, which is the most by an Auburn player since Kenny Irons had eight in 2005. Tate has also added 11 catches for 66 yards and four kick returns for 121 yards (30.2 yards per return). His average of 151.8 all-purpose yards per game ranks 21st nationally. Onterio McCalebb is sixth in the SEC averaging 73.2 yards rushing per game. Chris Todd ranks 11th in the nation in yards per completion (14.20) and 20th nationally in passing efficiency (149.45). His 12 touchdown passes are tied for 14th most in the NCAA.

**SPECIAL TEAMS**

RB Derrick Locke leads the SEC and ranks 12th nationally in all-purpose yards. He averages 169.6 all-purpose yards per game. He also ranks third in the league and eighth nationally in kickoff returns with an average of 32.1 per runback. Senior Lones Seiber is UK's all-time leading scorer with 262 career points. The old career scoring record was 246 by Joey Worley.

Junior Wes Byrum has excelled during his junior season, connecting on 11-of-12 field goals and all 27 extra point attempts. Among kickers who have attempted at least eight field goals, Byrum's percentage of .917 ranks tied for second nationally. Byrum, who ranks fifth in school history with 39 career made field goals, is second in the SEC with 12 field goals and tied for second in scoring with 60 points.

Steve Spurrier is in his fifth season at South Carolina with a record of 33-23 (.589) and in his 25th season overall with a record of 222-104-2 (.680). Spurrier serves as the Gamecocks' offensive coordinator and the defensive coordinator is Lorenzo Ward.

Nick Saban is in his second season at Alabama with a record of 25-8 (.758) and 16th overall with a record of 131-67-1 (.661). The Crimson Tide's offensive coordinator is Jim McElwain and the defensive coordinator is Kirby Smart.

**WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN SOUTH CAROLINA HAS THE BALL**

Stephen Garcia has completed 61.2 percent of his passes this season (109-for-178) for 1,268 yards with nine touchdowns and just three interceptions. He is 6-3 as a starter. Redshirt freshman Kenny Miles is penciled in as this week's starter as the team's leading rusher. He is averaging 6.0 yards per carry, rushing 45 times for 270 yards and a touchdown. After only catching five passes through his first five games at Carolina, true freshman Alshon Jeffery had a huge coming-out party against Kentucky. He hauled in 7 passes for 138 yards and 3 touchdowns.

Linebacker Eryk Anders (-32 yards) and defensive end Marcell Dareus lead the way for the Tide with 3.5 sacks each, while cornerback Javier Arenas is second on the team with 3 sacks for losses of 31 yards and linebacker Rolando McClain has two sacks (-19 yards). McClain now has 42 tackles on the season to pace the Tide. He also has a team-high 5.5 tackles for loss (-26). UA is 28th nationally in tackles for loss, averaging 7.0. The defense is allowing a total of 218.0 yards per game in the first six outings of 2009 to rank second nationally.

**WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN ALABAMA HAS THE BALL**

Eric Norwood, with six sacks this season, leads the SEC in that category and is 16th in the NCAA. He is third in the league 6.5 total tackles for loss. Through six games, Devin Taylor has 18 tackles, including a sack and 4.5 for loss. Norwood and Cliff Matthews are first and second, respectively, in the SEC in sacks; Matthews is third and Norwood fourth in tackles for loss. Matthews' 4.0 sacks this season has already surpassed his career total coming into the season. Chris Culliver is third on the squad with 32 tackles, including 18 over the last three games. Darian Stewart is fourth on the squad with 28 stops including a season-high 11 against Georgia. He also has recorded 4.0 tackles for loss.

Mark Ingram has rushed for 659 yards and seven touchdowns through six games this season for a 109.83 yards per game average to rank 14th nationally and fourth in the SEC in rushing. Ingram has also added 17 receptions for 163 yards and three scores. Greg McElroy has been impressive in his first six games as the Crimson Tide's starting quarterback, completing 60.8 percent (93 of 153) of his passes for 1,233 yards and nine touchdowns with only one interception. The junior boasts a 146.58 passing efficiency rating, which ranks 26th nationally. Trent Richardson has rushed for 346 yards and four touchdowns on just 61 attempts.

**SPECIAL TEAMS**

Spencer Lanning is third in the SEC with his 10 field goals and is tied for 17th in the nation. This season he ranks third in the SEC and 40th in the country in punting, averaging 41.9 yards per punt with a long of 56 yards. This season, Culliver has had a 61-yard kickoff return against Kentucky and a 57-yard runback against Georgia. In his two years at Carolina, Culliver has amassed 2,039 yards on his 84 kick returns and averaged 24.3 yards per return.

Arenas is quickly sneaking up on the all-time great punt returners in college football history. He has already broken all of the Crimson Tide punt return records, and now has his sights set on the SEC and NCAA records as well. He is the NCAA active leader in career punt returns, yards, touchdowns, returns per game and yards per game. Arenas, who has 1,546 career punt return yards on 110 returns, is just 150 punt return yards away from breaking Lee Nalley's long-standing SEC record of 1,695 (102 returns for a 14.4 ypr average). Leigh Tiffin converted a personal-best five field goals at Mississippi to give him 67 career field goals, second all-time at Alabama.
