FEW SECONDS ON THE SEC SEC FOOTBALL RELEASE HIGHLIGHTS

• SEC Football Players of the Week for games of Nov. 14 are Ole Miss RB/WR Dexter McCluster (offense), Florida CB Joe Haden (defense), Auburn DB/RS Demond Washington (special teams), Alabama OG Mike Johnson (offensive lineman), Kentucky DT, Corey Peters (defensive lineman) and Georgia RB Washaun Ealey (freshman).

• Florida became the eighth team since SEC expansion (1992) to go through the regular season undefeated in the conference (Alabama, at 7-0 this season, has one conference game remaining.). The list includes Alabama (1992, 1994, 2008), Florida (1995, 1996), Tennessee (1998) and Auburn (2004).

• With wins this past weekend, Arkansas, Georgia, Kentucky and Ole Miss became bowl eligible. The SEC now has nine bowl eligible teams with Tennessee (needs one win) and Mississippi State (needs two wins) still able to reach bowl eligibility.

• The SEC has a 37-6 non-conference record so far this season. The 86.1 winning rate is tops in NCAA FBS. The SEC has already reached the win total of last season and needs to go 4-1 the remainder of the regular season against non-conference foes to equal its best winning percentage since the season was expanded to 12 games (41-7 in 2006).

• Twenty (20) SEC football players are either semi-finalists or finalists for 11 post-season individual awards.

CBS Sports will showcase the top conference matchups each week of the package with the "SEC Game of the Week". The agreement also includes a prime time game and doubleheader opportunities. In addition, CBS Sports continues its coverage of SEC regular-season basketball.

In addition to the broadcast rights on CBS Sports, this comprehensive long-team deal includes certain digital, internet, wireless, Video-on-Demand, data and enhanced highlight rights across all CBS platforms, including CBS College Sports Network and CBSSports.com. Also, simulcasts of CBS Sports games will be available for distribution by the CBS College Sports Network.

ESPN

ESPN has acquired rights to every SEC home football game (excluding those on the network broadcast package) and will serve as the exclusive national cable home and the syndication rightsholder for the conference.

ESPN and ESPN2: The networks will increase coverage by combining to televise a minimum of 20 SEC games annually, including Saturday night and two primetime Thursday matchups.

ESPNU: The 24-hour college sports network, which launched in March 2005, will present a package of SEC football for the first time, with a Saturday game-of-the-week (generally in primetime and a minimum of 13 games annually).

SEC Network (ESPN Regional Television): The nation's largest syndicator of collegiate sports programming, becomes the official over-the-air syndication home for the SEC and will feature a game-of-the-week package (generally at 12:30 p.m. ET), with a minimum of 13 games each season throughout the SEC footprint and beyond. In addition, ERT will produce and distribute a studio show.

Also: Simulcasts of SEC game telecasts will be offered on ESPN360.com. Live games will be simulcast on mobile phones. The agreement includes global rights to present live games and encore presentations on ESPN International. ESPN has acquired domestic Spanish-language rights for SEC football on ESPN Deportes (24-hour, U.S.-based network). **ESPN GamePlan, ESPN's** college football pay-per-view service, will offer SEC action. **ESPN Classic** may telecast select SEC live games as well as historic and immediate encore presentations. Extensive SEC content, including highlights, will be presented online ESPN.com.

COMCAST/ CHARTER SPORTS SOUTHEAST

On May 21, 2009, Comcast / Charter Sports Southeast (CSS), the regional sports channel focusing on college sports in the southeast, announced it has reached a five-year agreement with ESPN to televise live Southeastern Conference (SEC) content including a minimum of six football games, twenty men's basketball games, and sixteen women's basketball games as well as fifty SEC Olympic sports each year. The agreement will begin with the 2009-10 academic year. Events and times will be announced as determined.

FOX SPORTS NET

SEC FOOTBALL VIDEO REPLAY

THE OBJECTIVE

To allow for specific types of officiating calls to be immediately reviewed during all games hosted by SEC teams.

THE COACHES' CHALLENGE

A new rule expands the ability of a head coach to challenge a reviewable play on the field. The head coach now retains a challenge if his initial challenge is successful and thus results in a reversal by the replay official. The coach will then have a single challenge that he may use anytime during the game if his team has not used all its timeouts. Thus a team may have a total of two challenges in the game, but only if the first results in a reversal of the on-field ruling.

THE SOURCE

All reviewable video comes direct from either the television network broadcasting the game (CBS Sports, ESPN, ESPN2, Lincoln Financial) or other TV production facilities that meet established conference standards. The Southeastern Conference has used instant replay since 2005.

THE PLAYS

Reviewable

1. Plays governed by Sideline, Goal Line, End Zone, and End Line:
 - a. Scoring Plays, including a runner breaking the plane of the goal line
 - b. Pass complete/incomplete/intercepted at sideline, goal and endlines
 - c. Runner/receiver in or out of bounds
 - d. Recovery of loose ball in and out of bounds
2. Passing Plays:
 - a. Pass ruled complete/ incomplete/ intercepted in the field of play and end zones
 - b. Touching of a forward pass by an ineligible receiver
 - c. Touching of a forward pass by a defensive player
 - d. Quarterback (Passer) forward pass or fumble (if ruled incomplete, play is finalized)
 - e. Illegal forward pass or illegal handing off beyond the line of scrimmage
 - f. Illegal forward pass or illegal handing off after change of possession
 - g. Forward or backward pass thrown from behind the line of scrimmage
 - h. Quarterback (Passer) starts arm forward, ball comes loss and play is ruled incomplete (if ball is quickly recovered)
 - i. Quarterback (Passer) throws incomplete swing pass that is close to being forward or backward, and pass is ruled forward (if ball is quickly recovered)
3. Other Detectable Infractions:
 - a. Runner ruled not down.
 - b. Runner ruled down (when ball carrier is judged down by rule and the ball is fumbled, play may be reviewed if recovery of ball occurs in the immediate action following fumble and is prior to any official signaling ball is dead. Also reviewable when runner is ruled out of bounds near goal line.)
 - c. Forward progress with respect to first down
 - d. Touching of a kick
 - e. Number of players on field
 - f. Clock adjustments (in conjunction with overturned plays)
 - g. Fourth-down/try fumble plays
 - h. Field Goal Attempts (only when ball is ruled below or above the crossbar, inside or outside the uprights when it is lower than the top of the uprights.)

THE PROCESS

Each SEC football stadium has a secured replay booth equipped with a DVSPORT Digital Replay System. Three individuals work in the booth for the duration of the game: 1. Replay Official, 2. Communicator, 3. Technician. The Replay Official is selected and assigned by the Conference Office.

A live video feed is sent directly to the replay booth. The Technician watches the feed on an input monitor while capturing/digitizing it into the DVSPORT Digital Replay System. The Technician also marks the beginning of each play as well as any replays as they occur in real time.

Each play and subsequent replay then appears on a touch screen in front of the Communicator. As the Technician marks the incoming video, each view (by mark) will appear as a small picture on the computer touch screen. At any time, the Communicator can touch/click on a thumbnail and immediately send that play/replay to the Replay Official.

With the Communicator's assistance, the Replay Official can quickly jump between replays while playing back the video. All replay video navigation is done via a remote device controlled by the Replay Official. All replays/video are viewed on an output monitor. The touch screen is only used to select the replays.

While most plays are reviewed between the whistle and the beginning of the next play, the Replay Official can stop play on the field by using a pager system. Five onfield officials wear pagers. If play is stopped the Referee announces on the stadium PA microphone that play has been stopped so the previous play can be reviewed. The Referee then proceeds to the sideline headset, which provides direct communication to the Replay Official in the booth. Once the play has been reviewed, the Replay Official notifies the Referee, who then announces the decision on the stadium PA system.

THE EQUIPMENT

Each SEC member institution uses the Digital Replay System developed by DVSPORT of Pittsburgh, Pa. The replay systems are maintained by the home institution with technical support from DVSPORT.

SEC CHAMPIONSHIP GAME MATCHUP SET

Alabama and Florida will play in the SEC Championship Game on Dec. 5 at the Georgia Dome in Atlanta. Kickoff is 4 p.m. ET and will be televised on CBS Sports.

Florida, 8-0 in the SEC, is the Eastern Division champion and will represent the division in the SEC Championship Game.

Alabama, 7-0 in the SEC, has claimed a share of the Western Division title and would win a tie-breaker with the only team that can reach it - LSU.

It is the earliest by calendar date (by one day) that both teams have clinched a spot in the SEC Championship Game.

The earliest clinches in SEC Championship Game history belong were Oct. 29, 1994 (Florida); Oct. 30, 2004 (Auburn), Oct. 30, 1993 (Alabama), Oct. 31, 2009 (Florida), Nov. 4, 2006 (Florida), Nov. 7, 2009 (Alabama) and Nov. 8, 2008 (Alabama and Florida).

Florida reaches the SEC Championship Game for the 10th time while Alabama enters the game for the seventh time. The UF-UA matchup will be the seventh time these two teams have met in the SEC Championship Game with the Gators holding a 4-2 advantage.

SEC LEADS NATION IN PASS DEFENSE

The Southeastern Conference leads the nation in holding down opposing quarterbacks passing efficiency rating. In 123 total games, SEC defenses are holding opposing QBs to a 111.09 PE rating, which is the lowest in NCAA FBS.

SEC opponents are 1949 of 3609 (54.0 percent) for 22,691 yards with 125 TDs and 129 interceptions. The SEC is the only conference in NCAA FBS where opponents have thrown more interceptions than passing touchdowns.

The SEC has seven of the top 25 teams in pass efficiency defense led by Florida and Alabama. The Gators lead the nation with an 87.18 rating while the Tide are second with an 88.27 rating. Eight SEC defenses have recorded more interceptions than passing touchdowns this season.

The SEC has eight of the top 25 teams in pass defense, led by Florida, which is second in the nation, giving up 139.6 yards per game. Vanderbilt is second in the SEC and 7th in the nation, giving up 159.8 yards per game.

SEC BOWL AGREEMENTS

The Southeastern Conference has agreements to send nine of its member institutions to postseason bowl games following the 2009 season. The winner of the SEC Championship Game will automatically participate in the Bowl Championship Series comprised of the Sugar, Rose, Orange and Fiesta Bowls.

The Capital One (2nd), will then make its pick following the BCS selections. The bowl must select the team with the next best overall record or a team that is within one win of the team with the next best overall record.

The Outback, Chick-fil-A and AT&T Cotton Bowls will work with the conference office to determine picks 3-5. The Cotton Bowl has the first preference of teams from the Western Division and the Outback Bowl has first preference of teams from the Eastern Division. The Cotton or Outback Bowl can select teams outside of its divisional preference, but must not select them before the opposite bowl selects from its divisional preference. The Chick-fil-A Bowl has the selection of preference following the Cotton and Outback Bowls.

In selections 6-7, the AutoZone Liberty and Gaylord Hotels Music City Bowls will make their selections, not in any specific order, but in consultation with the SEC Office. The Bowls will rank available qualified teams in order of preference. If there are no similarities in the order of selection, the bowls will be granted its selection. If the bowls rank the same teams in preference, the team involved in the process would get its preference of which bowl to participate.

The PetroSun Independence Bowl will receive the eighth selection and the Papajohns.com Bowl will have the ninth pick of available SEC teams.

BOWL CHAMPIONSHIP SERIES

The Bowl Championships Series is a five-game arrangement for post-season college football that is designed to match the two top-rated teams in a national championship game and to create exciting and competitive match-ups among eight other highly regarded teams in four other games.

The five bowl games are the Tostitos Fiesta Bowl, the FedEx Orange Bowl, the Rose Bowl Game presented by Citi, the Allstate Sugar Bowl and the BCS National Championship Game that is played at one of the bowl sites. The 2010 Citi BCS National Championship Game will be played in the Rose Bowl in Pasadena, Calif.

Unless a Southeastern Conference champion qualifies to play in the BCS National Championship Game, it will play in the Allstate Sugar Bowl.

Fox Sports will televise the Tostitos Fiesta Bowl, FedEx Orange Bowl and the Allstate Sugar Bowl at the conclusion of the 2009 regular season. ESPN/ABC will televise the Rose Bowl presented by Citi and the Citi BCS National Championship Game.

In the 11 previous years of the BCS, the Southeastern Conference holds a 12-5 mark in BCS games (.706) - the most wins of any other conference and the highest winning percentage of any conference participating in more than two BCS games.

In BCS National Championship Games, the SEC is 5-0 (1.000) and has more BCS titles than any other conference. The SEC has won BCS crowns in 1998 (Tennessee), 2003 (LSU), 2006 (Florida), 2007 (LSU) and 2008 (Florida).

In the history of the BCS, an SEC team has been in the BCS standings 328 times, second only to the Big 12 with 331. The SEC and the ACC have had 11 of its 12 teams ranked in the BCS standings at some point since 1998 - more than any other conference.

2008-09 ANOTHER BANNER ATHLETIC YEAR FOR THE SEC

The SEC claimed five national championships in the 2008-09 year, tying it with the total from the 2007-08 season.

In 10 of its 20 sponsored sports, the SEC had either the national champion or the national runners-up.

The SEC had national championships in football (Florida), men's swimming & diving (Auburn), women's indoor track & field (Tennessee), gymnastics (Georgia) and baseball (LSU). The SEC also had national runners-up finishes in men's golf (Arkansas), gymnastics (Alabama), softball (Florida), women's swimming & diving (Georgia) and men's indoor track & field (Florida).

In its 76 year history, the Southeastern Conference has won 179 team national championships, including 63 since 2000. In this decade, the SEC has won at least one national championship in 16 of its 20 sponsored sports with the exception of women's cross country, volleyball, soccer and softball.

SEC LEADS ALL CONFERENCES IN 2008-09 MEN'S SPORTS CONFERENCE VS. CONFERENCE SURVEY; 2nd in WOMEN'S SPORTS

In a statistical survey that is based on NCAA championship and rankings, the Southeastern Conference placed first in the nine men's sports it sponsors and second in the 11 women's sports the league sponsors.

The survey, compiled each year since 1986 by Bo Carter, takes into account final NCAA championship standings in each sport and poll rankings in football. Each conference gets 20 points for a team that wins a national championship, 19 for a second place finish and down to 1 point for a 20th place finish.

In the nine men's sports the SEC sponsors, the SEC had 440.5 points with the Pac-10 coming in second with 375 points, followed by the Big 12 with 337.5 points, ACC with 214 points, Big East 102.5 points and the Big Ten with 80 points.

In the 11 women's sports the SEC sponsors, the Pac-10 was first with 615 points followed by the SEC with 431 points, the Big 12 with 337 points, Big Ten with 318.5 points, ACC with 277.5 points and the Big East with 161.5 points.

Combining the 20 sponsored sports, the Pac-10 had 990 points followed by the SEC with 806 points, Big 12 with 674.5 points, ACC with 491.5 points, Big Ten with 398.5 points and the Big East with 264 points.

The SEC has had the highest men's point total in 15 of the last 17 seasons (exceptions: 2007-08; Big 12; 1997-98; Pac-10). The Pac-10 has had the highest women's point totals each year since 1986 with the exception of four years the SEC has had the highest total (1990-91; 1995-96; 2004-05; 2006-07).

SEC LEADS DIVISION I CONFERENCES IN MOST ESPN THE MAGAZINE CoSIDA ACADEMIC ALL-AMERICANS

The Southeastern Conference had 41 of its student-athletes each ESPN The Magazine Academic All-America Team mention, the most of any Division I conference in the nation.

The Academic All-America Program is administered and voted on by the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA).

The SEC had 15 student-athletes earn first-team mention, 14 earn second-team and 12 earn third-team mention.

The Big 12 was second with 38 total student athletes listed while the Big Ten was third at 34 and the ACC fourth at 26. The Big Ten led all conferences in first-team honorees with 18, followed by the SEC's 15.

Each SEC institution had at least one student-athlete earn first, second or third-team mention. Florida led the SEC with seven student-athletes on the lists while Tennessee had six, South Carolina and Arkansas had five each. Alabama, Florida and Tennessee each led the SEC with three on the various first-team lists.

Florida's Stacey Nelson (softball) and Tim Tebow (football) were named Academic All-Americans of the Year in their respective sports.

SEC LAUNCHES ACADEMIC NETWORK TO PROMOTE 12 MEMBER INSTITUTIONS

The 12 institutions of the Southeastern Conference institutions have joined together in the launch of the SEC Academic Network, a website (www.secacademicnetwork.com) designed to promote the academic programs of SEC universities. The SEC Academic Network is being established by the SEC in partnership with ESPN and the member universities.

The Academic Network, developed using technology and coordination from ESPN Digital Media and Origin Digital, will feature content from every institution ranging from research, innovation and economic development to community partnerships, civic engagement and service.

"Our commitment to highlight the accomplishments of SEC member institution's academic programs was a key component of our new television agreements," said SEC Commissioner Mike Slive. "We are grateful to ESPN for providing the technology, expertise and tools they use in sports media to our institutions in support of academic pursuits."

Each institution has its own page on the website that includes videos categorized by topic. Alumni, fans and students worldwide will have the ability to learn more about SEC academics in one place through video features that are posted by the league institutions.

The Academic Network is a component of the SEC's 15-year television package with ESPN, which is the most comprehensive in the history of intercollegiate athletics. Also part of ESPN's commitment to SEC academic programs is the production of an annual Campus Connection telecast at each SEC institution, in which students take part in the production; telecasts of two programs annually dedicated to the academic accomplishments of SEC student-athletes; a weekly academic feature segment on ESPN's SEC show; and selection of one undergraduate student from every SEC institution to participate in ESPN's summer internship program.

SEC SPORTSMANSHIP STATEMENT

- The SEC has developed a sportsmanship statement for its institutions to follow. It states:

"Coaches and student-athletes of a member institution, as well as individuals employed by or associated with that institution, including alumni, fans, patrons and boosters, shall conduct themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their behavior shall at all times reflect the high standards of honor and dignity that characterize participation in the collegiate setting. For intercollegiate athletics to promote the character development of participants, to enhance the integrity of higher education and to promote civility in society, coaches, student-athletes and all others associated with these athletics programs and events should adhere to such fundamental values as respect, fairness, civility, honesty and responsibility. These values should be manifested not only in athletics participation but also in the broad spectrum of activities affecting the athletics program. It is the responsibility of each member institution to establish policies for sportsmanship and ethical conduct in intercollegiate athletics consistent with the educational mission and goals of the institution. Furthermore, member institutions are responsible for educating on a continuing basis all constituencies about these policies."

THE COACHES

Russ Huesman is in his first season at UTC and overall. The Mocs' offensive coordinator is Marcus Satterfield and the defensive coordinator is Adam Fuller.

Nick Saban is in his second season at Alabama with a record of 29-8 (.784) and 16th overall with a record of 135-67-1 (.667). The Crimson Tide's offensive coordinator is Jim McElwain and the defensive coordinator is Kirby Smart.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN CHATTANOOGA HAS THE BALL

The Mocs' offensive line has only allowed nine sacks on the season, the second fewest in the SoCon and tied for 4th fewest in the nation. UTC has not allowed a sack in the last three games, a string of 149 pass plays. B.J. Coleman, a Tennessee transfer, is currently third in the SoCon in total offense (228.3/game) and passing yards (231.2/game). Blue Cooper is currently second in the SoCon and 4th in the nation with 8.2 receptions-per-game and is second in the league and 19th in the nation with 81.7 receiving yards-per-game. He has 38 catches for 372 yards in his last three games.

UA ranks 15th nationally while ranking second in the SEC in sacks with 2.80 per game. Defensive end Marcell Dareus leads the Tide and the SEC with .65 sacks per game (6.5) while Javier Arenas and Eryk Anders are second on the team with 4.0 and Rolando McClain has three sacks. UA also ranks tied for 16th nationally in tackles for loss, averaging 7.30 per game. That mark ranks also leads the SEC and accounts for 359 lost yards by UA opponents. Arenas leads the Tide with 10.5 tackles for loss (-74) while McClain is second with 10.0 (-45 yards), Dareus is third with 8.5 and Anders is fourth with 8.0 (-56). McClain not only leads the team in tackles with 77, but is the on-field coach for Alabama. McClain is responsible for making all of the defensive calls and is especially proficient at checking the Crimson Tide into the correct play.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN ALABAMA HAS THE BALL

Senior DE Josh Beard leads the nation and has tied a single-season school record with 12.0 sacks on the year. Senior linebacker Joseph Thornton has started 37 consecutive games heading into the Alabama contest. He leads the team and is No. 7 in the SoCon with 86 tackles on the year. His 260 career stops is tied for ninth on the Mocs' all-time list. He will have a tough time catching Troy Boeck (1987-90) who is in eighth place with 276. Freshman Josh Williams has set a new UTC freshman record with seven sacks on the season. Jordan Tippit is second in the SoCon with five interceptions.

Mark Ingram has rushed for 1,297 yards and 10 touchdowns in 10 games this season for 129.70 yards per game average to rank fifth nationally and first in the SEC in rushing. Ingram has also added 25 receptions for 225 yards and three scores. Below is a look at Ingram's season on a game-by-game case. Greg McElroy has completed 60.2 percent (153 of 254) of his passes for 1,913 yards and 13 touchdowns with only four interceptions. The UA receiving numbers are headed by preseason All-America wide out Julio Jones, who has 28 receptions for 397 yards, a 14.2 yards per catch average and three touchdowns.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Fifth-year senior Craig Camay is having an outstanding year as a place-kicker. He is 22-24 on PATs and 16-19 on field goals. He currently leads the SoCon in FGM and FG% (84.2%). He tied his own school record earlier in the season with four field goals against Western Carolina. His 52-yarder against Presbyterian tied for the second longest FG in school history.

Alabama senior place-kicker Leigh Tiffin leads the nation in field goals per game at 2.40. He has connected on 24-of-27 field goals this season (88.9 percent). His 24 field goals are one shy of his own school record of 25 set in 2007 and currently rank as the seventh most by any SEC kicker in a single season. Tiffin also leads the SEC and ranks eighth nationally in scoring at 10.10 points per game. Arenas is the NCAA active leader in career punt returns, yards, touchdowns, returns per game and yards per game.

The Crimson Tide will face Tennessee-Chattanooga in their final home game and final non-conference game of the 2009 season... Alabama has won all 10 games in the series against the Mocs, including a 7-0 record in Tuscaloosa and a 3-0 mark in Birmingham... The last meeting between the two schools was a 42-13 Crimson Tide win in 1994 at Legion Field in Birmingham... It is the first time in 50 years that Chattanooga will travel to Bryant-Denny Stadium, after falling to the Tide 13-0 in 1959.

THE COACHES

Dan Mullen is in his first season at MSU and overall. The Bulldogs' offensive coordinator is Les Koenning and the defensive coordinator is Carl Torbush.

Bobby Petrino is in his second season at Arkansas with a record of 11-11 (.500) and seventh overall with a record of 55-30 (.647). The Razorbacks' offensive coordinator is Paul Petrino and the defensive coordinator is Willie Robinson.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN MISSISSIPPI STATE HAS THE BALL

The Mississippi State offense has relied heavily on its running game this season, running the ball nearly 65 percent of all plays (441 rushes, 680 total plays). MSU has gained 2087 yards (208.7 ypg) on the ground and ranks 15th nationally and fourth in the SEC in rushing yardage per game. Anthony Dixon is approaching some all-time SEC marks, as he is fourth all-time with 857 career rushing attempts and 10th with 39 rushing touchdowns. Dixon is State's all time career leader in rushing yardage, attempts, touchdowns, 100-yard games and points scored.

Defensive tackle Malcolm Sheppard is tied for fifth in the SEC with 10 tackles for loss this season. His career total (36) are tied for fifth in school history. Sheppard has led the Razorbacks in tackles for loss each of the last two seasons. Sheppard has had at least half of a tackle for a loss in 16 of his last 18 games. UA's starting linebackers for the Troy game were Jerico Nelson, Jerry Franklin and Freddy Burton. Nelson led the team with 12 tackles and also had one tackle for a loss. Franklin had one of three Arkansas interceptions in the game. Ramon Broadway leads the SEC in fumbles recovered this season with three.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN ARKANSAS HAS THE BALL

Defensive coordinator Carl Torbush's unit has had a tendency to come up with big plays for the Bulldogs all season long. State is tied for the national lead in touchdowns on interception returns with four (with Texas), and the Bulldogs' 19 forced turnovers is three more than the Bulldogs forced all season in 2008. Jamar Chaney, after missing last season with a leg injury, currently ranks fifth in the conference with 8.1 tackles per game. Against Florida, Johnthan Banks intercepted two passes and returned them both for touchdowns. He became the first SEC player since 1968 and only the third all-time to return two passes for scores in the same game.

Ryan Mallett leads the SEC and ranks third nationally in pass efficiency (164.96) and he is also tied for fourth in the nation and first in the league in passing touchdowns (23). Mallett is first in the SEC and 13th nationally in total offense (284.7) and he ranks first in the SEC in passing yards per game (288.2). Broderick Green is tied for third in the SEC with 10 touchdowns this season. Eight of Green's nine rushing touchdowns have come in his last six games. This season, Arkansas has had four different players (Joe Adams, Jarius Wright, Greg Childs and D.J. Williams) combine for seven different 100-yard receiving games. Childs has had a touchdown reception in five of the last nine games. He leads the team with six touchdown receptions this season, which is tied for third in the SEC.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Through the first nine games of the 2009 season, State has scored six non-offensive touchdowns. They scored one on a blocked punt, one on a kickoff return and four on interception returns. The school record for non-offensive touchdowns in a season is eight, set by the 1998 squad, and the mark for interception returns for scores is six, set in 1994. Leon Berry had a second kickoff return for a touchdown called back at Vanderbilt due to penalty. Chad Bumphis had an apparent TD on a kickoff return called back versus Alabama when officials ruled he stepped out of bounds during the return. Mullen coaches the special teams.

Dennis Johnson ranks fifth in the SEC and ranks 25th nationally with an average of 27.1 yards per kickoff return this season. Johnson has had four kickoff returns of 50-or-more yards this season. His 894 kickoff return yards rank as the second-highest single-season total in school history. Troy, Dennis Johnson returned two kickoffs for 53 yards to bring his career total to 1,799 yards. With the effort, he broke the UA career kickoff return yard record held by Felix Jones, who had 1,749 return yards.

Mario Cristobal is in his third season at FIU and overall with a record of 9-24 (.273). Bill Legg serves as the Panthers' offensive coordinator and the defensive coordinator is Phil Galiano.

Urban Meyer is in his fifth season at Florida with a record of 54-9 (.857) and in his ninth season overall with a record of 93-17 (.845). The Gators' offensive coordinator is Steve Addazio and the defensive coordinator is Charlie Strong.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN FLORIDA INTERNATIONAL HAS THE BALL

Quarterback Paul McCall has tallied 1,969 passing yards with 13 touchdowns and seven interceptions, with T.Y. Hilton grabbing 50 receptions for 529 yards and five scores. Darriet Perry is FIU's leading rusher with 301 yards, while Kendall Berry has added 237 yards plus six touchdowns on the ground.

Jermaine Cunningham leads the team with seven sacks, while Ryan Stamper paces the Gators with 61 tackles. Joe Haden, Major Wright and A.J. Jones lead the way with three interceptions each. Carlos Dunlap has recorded six sacks (including a career-best three against Mississippi State), 7.5 tackles for loss, five pass breakups and 31 tackles (22 solo) on the season. Brandon Spikes is the only player in the nation to have three interception return touchdowns over the past two seasons.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN FLORIDA HAS THE BALL

Scott Bryant is the leading tackler for FIU with 89, 30 more than Jonathan Cyprien who is second with 59. Bryant has 4.5 TFLs, two sacks and one interception. Peter Riley returned an interception 26 yards for a touchdown last week in the comeback win over North Texas. Toronto Smith and Armond Willis share the team lead with 3.5 sacks. Smith leads the team with 9.0 TFLs while Willis is second with 7.5.

Tim Tebow has rushed for 10 touchdowns this season, bringing him to 53 for his career. He is now tied with Kevin Faulk for the SEC touchdowns scored record (53). Tebow's career rating of 169.4 currently ranks No. 1 in SEC history (min. 300 completions). Tebow has a 32-5 (.865) record since taking the reins as starting quarterback at Florida. Jeff Demps paces the Gator running backs with 577 yards, six rushing touchdowns and averaging 7.3 yards per carry. Florida's receiving corps is led by Aaron Hernandez and Riley Cooper. Hernandez has 571 yards on a team-best 46 grabs along with two touchdowns. Riley Cooper has 35 receptions for 593 yards and a team-leading six touchdowns.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Hilton averages over 30 yards per kickoff return, including a 96 yard touchdown at Alabama. Jason Frierson has 19 punt returns for a 12.8 yard average. Jonathan Faucher blocked a punt in the win last week. Dustin Rivest is 9-12 on field goals in 2009 with a long of 41 yards. Carlos Munera has a 43.2 yard punting average. He has 14 punts over 50 yards and has placed 20 inside the 20 yard line.

Caleb Sturgis hit a 56-yard field goal and a 44-yarder in going 2-for-2 in the win over Georgia. The 56-yard kick was the second-longest in school history and longest in the SEC this season. Sturgis is one of six players nationally to have at least two 50-yard field goals in 2009. Sturgis made multiple field goals in seven of eight SEC games this season and had a streak of eight consecutive made. Brandon James, with four career punt return touchdowns, recorded his first kickoff return for a touchdown in the season opener against Charleston Southern.

Florida plays its third non-conference game of the season after wrapping up its SEC slate with a perfect 8-0 mark in league play, the first time the Gators have gone undefeated in the conference since 1996... Les Miles is in his fifth season at LSU with a record of 50-13 (.794) and ninth overall with a record of 78-34 (.696). The Tigers' offensive coordinator is Gary Crowton and the defensive coordinator is John Chavis.

Houston Nutt is in his second season at Ole Miss with a record of 16-7 (.696) and 17th overall with a record of 127-77 (.623). The Rebels' offensive coordinator is Kent Austin and the defensive coordinator is Tyrone Nix.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN LSU HAS THE BALL

With Charles Scott out of the lineup, LSU's top offensive players are QB Jefferson (1,535 yards, 12 TDs), RB Keiland Williams (328 yards, 4 TDs) and WRs Brandon LaFell (43 catches for 560 yards, 9 TDs) and Terrance Toliver (42 catches for 547 yards, 3 TDs). LaFell and Toliver have combined for more receptions (85) than any other wide receiver tandem in the SEC. Williams had LSU's second 100-yard rushing game of the year last week vs. Louisiana Tech with 116 yards on 15 carries. Jefferson is No. 5 in the SEC in pass efficiency and his four interceptions is ties for the fewest among starting quarterbacks in the league.

Senior S Kendrick Lewis has notched his first two career double-digit tackle performances and added a field goal block in each of the last two games. Lewis leads the team in tackles (67) and forced fumbles (2) and is second in pass break-ups (8). At Auburn, Lewis finished with seven total tackles, one sack, one forced fumble and one pass break-up. Senior DE Kentrell Lockett boasts a team-high eight QB pressures and is second on the team with 8.0 TFLs and 4.0 sacks. In his first year as a starter, junior NT Jerrell Powe has risen to first on the team and fifth in the SEC in TFLs with 10.0.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN OLE MISS HAS THE BALL

Defensively, the Tigers have gone six straight games without allowing a first quarter touchdown. The Tigers are allowing just 13.7 points and 311.8 total yards (126.9 rushing, 184.9 passing) per game. Defensively, a trio of linebackers - Kelvin Sheppard (87 tackles, 8.0 TFL), Perry Riley (77 tackles, 3.5 TFL) and Harry Coleman (63 tackles, 6 TFL, 3 sacks) pace the Tigers. CB Patrick Peterson is No.3 in the SEC in passes defended with 13 (11 PBUs, 2 interceptions). Sheppard ranks No. 3 in the SEC in tackles with 8.7 per game (87 total).

Senior Dexter McCluster posted school records of 282 rushing yards and 324 all-purpose yards against Tennessee. McCluster's 324 all-purpose yards is the 8th highest in SEC history and the 7th highest in an SEC intra-conference game. McCluster is averaging 197.0 rushing yards and 262.3 all-purpose yards with five TDs over the last three SEC games. Senior WR Shay Hodge is averaging 105.0 yards and 6.2 receptions over the last five games and with a pair of 100-yard receiving games in that span. For the season, he ranks second in the SEC in both receptions (5.0 rpg) and receiving yards (81.0 ypg).

SPECIAL TEAMS

LSU ranks No. 2 in the SEC in kickoff coverage with a net average of 45.2 yards. On 49 kickoff returns, LSU is allowing just 17.4 yards per return. LSU is first in the league in punt return average at 16.2 yards. LSU is No. 3 in the SEC in net punting at 38.1 yards per punt. LSU opponents have returned only nine punts for 41 yards against the Tigers this year. Trindon Holliday leads the SEC in punt return average at 14.0 yards a return. Both LSU punt returners - Chad Jones and Holliday - have returned punts for touchdowns during their career. On 46 punts this year, LSU punters have had 12 downed inside the 20-yard line. Alabama.

In only his fourth game handling returns, Jesse Grandy notched his second kickoff return for a TD with an 82-yarder against Auburn. He is only the third Rebel to return two kickoffs for TDs in the same season and the first since John Avery in 1996. The other is Vernon Studdard in 1970. Grandy's current 28.6-yard average ranks second in the SEC and 12th in the nation. Freshman P Tyler Campbell is the No. 2 punter in the SEC and No. 17 in the NCAA with a 43.7-yard average.

Lane Kiffin is in his first season at Tennessee and in his third season overall with a record of 10-20 (.333). The Volunteers' offensive coordinator is Jim Chaney and Monte Kiffin serves as the defensive coordinator.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN VANDERBILT HAS THE BALL

Warren Norman ranks seventh in the SEC with 710 rushing yards. Though limited to 93 all-purpose yards by UK, Norman maintained his SEC lead in the category with a 162.6-yard average. He also tops all freshmen in the NCAA FBS in the category and ranks 13th among all players. Zac Stacy joined Norman on the team's Top Ten rushing list by freshmen. Stacy ranks eighth with 442 yards. John Cole is the team leader in receptions (32) and receiving yards (339).

Rico McCoy leads the team and ranks fourth in the SEC with 84 stops (8.4 per game) after posting 87 (7.3 per game) last season. McCoy also has four forced fumbles through 10 games, which ranks third nationally and atop the SEC. While Eric Berry is second nationally among active players in interceptions with 14, he is also second on the team in tackles with 70, an average of seven per game. He is also third on the team in tackles for loss with five for nine yards. Dan Williams has posted 35 tackles in the last six games after posting only 16 in the first four games of the season. Williams also has seven quarterback hurries, a sack and 5.5 tackles for loss in the last six contests.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN TENNESSEE HAS THE BALL

Myron Lewis notched his fourth interception of the season last week versus Kentucky. It was also Lewis' 10th career pick, moving him into a tie for 8th place all-time among Commodore defenders. Chris Marve had a team-high 13 tackles for the Commodore defense last week. It was his sixth game this season with double-digit tackles. Sean Richardson and Brent Trice supported Marve with 11 and 10 tackles, respectively. Marve is leading the SEC in total tackles, averaging 10 per game. Marve has topped the 100-tackle plateau in each of his first two years as a Commodore.

Senior quarterback Jonathan Crompton ranks third in the league in passing at 212.4 yards per game and is tied for the league lead with 23 touchdown passes. His 23 scoring strikes are the fourth most in school history. In 10 games during the 2009 season, senior tailback Montario Hardesty has averaged 95.6 yards per game and scored eight rushing touchdowns. He currently ranks fourth in the SEC in rushing yards per game. In the last six games, Gerald Jones has caught 30 passes for 420 yards and four touchdowns. Denarius Moore has posted 30 catches for 416 yards and five touchdowns in the last seven contests.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Two weeks ago, Norman became just the second player in Southeastern Conference history to record three touchdowns on kickoff returns in a season when he took a Yellow Jacket kick 80 yards for a score in the second quarter. Earlier this year, he had a 76-yard return at Army and 99-yard return at South Carolina for touchdowns. The only other SEC player to duplicate Norman's return feat is former Tennessee standout Willie Gault (1980). Norman also can post the team's best KOR average of the modern era. Brett Upson has 77 punts on the season, tops in the NCAA.

Daniel Lincoln is averaging 1.17 field goals per game, which puts him on pace to kick 57 in his UT career. That number would rank fourth on UT's all-time list. Lincoln began the season with 31 career field goal makes and now sits sixth in school history with 41 conversions. He is also climbing UT's career scoring list as he now ranks ninth with 230 points. David Oku has averaged 33.9 yards per kickoff return in the last two games after averaging 26.5 yards per return in the season's first eight games.

THE COACHES

Rich Brooks is in his seventh season at Kentucky with a record of 38-45 (.458) and 19th overall with a record of 129-154-4 (.456). The Wildcats' offensive coordinator is Randy Sanders and Steve Brown serves as the defensive coordinator.

Mark Richt is in his ninth season at Georgia and overall with a record of 88-26 (.772). The Bulldogs' offensive coordinator is Mike Bobo and the defensive coordinators are Willie Martinez and John Jancek.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN KENTUCKY HAS THE BALL

Morgan Newton has started the last five games. He has completed 43-of-73 passes for 402 yards and he also has rushed for 86 net yards and two touchdowns. Derrick Locke ranks fifth in the SEC in rushing yards per game, averaging 82.3 yards per game. Sophomore Randall Cobb leads UK and is ninth in the SEC in receptions per game. In nine games played (he did not see action vs. Eastern Kentucky with a sprained thumb) he has 32 catches for 384 yards for an average of 3.6 catches per game. He also has four TD receptions.

Junior WLB Rennie Curran is second in the SEC with 9.4 tackles per game (94 tackles this year). Curran is looking to become the first Georgia player since LB Greg Bright to have back-to-back years with more than 100 tackles (1996, 1997). He has led the Bulldogs in nine of 10 games, including a 12-tackle performance versus #25 Auburn. Brandon Boykin registered a career-high eight tackles and added his third interception of the season versus #25 Auburn. A week earlier against #1 Florida, Boykin had seven solo tackles. After registering six sacks versus Tennessee Tech, the Bulldogs had three more against #25 Auburn.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN GEORGIA HAS THE BALL

Kentucky's defense has picked off 13 passes this season, which is tied for 19th nationally. Seven different Wildcats have at least one interception this season. Linebacker Sam Maxwell leads the charge, ranking tied for second in the SEC and tied for 22nd in the country with four. Despite missing four games with injury, Trevard Lindley ranks tied for second on the team with six pass breakups in six games played. Corey Peters has 136 tackles in his career, including 25 tackles for loss and 11.5 quarterback sacks. He currently ranks tied for 9th in tackles for loss in the SEC and tied for 11th in sacks.

After catching three balls for 19 yards, A.J. Green was forced to leave the game against #25 Auburn with an injured left shoulder AC (Acromioclavicular) sprain at the beginning of the second quarter and will not play versus Kentucky. Green is currently leading the SEC receiving yards/game (83.4) and rec./ game (5.2). His 751 yards ranks second in the league. Washaun Ealey exploded for a career-high 98 yards rushing on 18 carries and one touchdown versus Auburn and was named SEC Freshman of the Week. The Bulldogs registered 169 yards rushing against #25 Auburn after piling up 304 versus Tennessee Tech a week earlier.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Locke leads the SEC and ranks 6th nationally in kickoff returns with a 30.93 average. Locke had a 100-yard touchdown return vs. Louisville and became the first player in school history to have two 100-yarders in a career, a feat he first did last season vs. Western Kentucky. Ryan Tydlacka is averaging 40.3 yards per punt. He saw brief action last year at field goal duties, making 3-of-6 field goals, including a 51-yarder. Senior Lones Seiber is UK's all-time leading scorer with 288 career points.

In his first season as a starter, redshirt sophomore Drew Butler is leading the NCAA with an average of 49.0 yards on 45 punts. The school record is 45.4 set in 1984 by Chip Andrews. Georgia also leads the NCAA in net punting by more than two yards, sporting a 43.73 average. Redshirt sophomore SE Zach Renner blocked the third punt of his career late in the opening half against Tennessee for a safety. Boykin set the school record for kickoff return yardage in a single season with 769 kickoff return yards on 31 returns.
