FEW SECONDS ON THE SEC SEC FOOTBALL RELEASE HIGHLIGHTS

• SEC Football Players of the Week for games of Nov. 21 are Arkansas QB Ryan Mallett (offense), Kentucky LB Sam Maxwell (defense), Alabama DB/RS Javier Arenas (special teams), Ole Miss OG Reid Neely (offensive lineman), Tennessee DT Wes Brown (defensive lineman) and Vanderbilt RB/RS Warren Norman (freshman).

• Outside of the teams in the SEC Championship Game, there is just one game separating eight teams in the SEC standings (SEC games only). Using the same teams, there are two games in the overall standings that separate the teams.

• Four SEC teams are ranked in this week's polls. Florida is ranked number one in all four major polls - AP, USA Today, Harris and BCS. Alabama is second in the AP and BCS and third in Harris and USA Today. LSU is 17th in the AP and USA Today, 15th in the BCS and 16th in Harris. Ole Miss is 25th in the BCS, USA Today and Harris and 20th in AP.

• The SEC has a 39-6 non-conference winning percentage. The 86.7 ratio is tops in the nation. With three non-conference games this weekend, the SEC needs two wins to equal its highest win total of 41 (2006) in non-conference games.

• SEC defenses are allowing 4.93 yards per play this season, which leads the nation. The SEC has nine of the top 25 teams in passing defense, four of the top 40 in rushing defense and seven of the top 40 in total defense.

CBS Sports will showcase the top conference matchups each week of the package with the "SEC Game of the Week". The agreement also includes a prime time game and doubleheader opportunities. In addition, CBS Sports continues its coverage of SEC regular-season basketball.

In addition to the broadcast rights on CBS Sports, this comprehensive long-team deal includes certain digital, internet, wireless, Video-on-Demand, data and enhanced highlight rights across all CBS platforms, including CBS College Sports Network and CBSSports.com. Also, simulcasts of CBS Sports games will be available for distribution by the CBS College Sports Network.

ESPN

ESPN has acquired rights to every SEC home football game (excluding those on the network broadcast package) and will serve as the exclusive national cable home and the syndication rightsholder for the conference.

ESPN and ESPN2: The networks will increase coverage by combining to televise a minimum of 20 SEC games annually, including Saturday night and two primetime Thursday matchups.

ESPNU: The 24-hour college sports network, which launched in March 2005, will present a package of SEC football for the first time, with a Saturday game-of-the-week (generally in primetime and a minimum of 13 games annually).

SEC Network (ESPN Regional Television): The nation's largest syndicator of collegiate sports programming, becomes the official over-the-air syndication home for the SEC and will feature a game-of-the-week package (generally at 12:30 p.m. ET), with a minimum of 13 games each season throughout the SEC footprint and beyond. In addition, ERT will produce and distribute a studio show.

Also: Simulcasts of SEC game telecasts will be offered on ESPN360.com. Live games will be simulcast on mobile phones. The agreement includes global rights to present live games and encore presentations on ESPN International. ESPN has acquired domestic Spanish-language rights for SEC football on ESPN Deportes (24-hour, U.S.-based network). **ESPN GamePlan, ESPN's** college football pay-per-view service, will offer SEC action. **ESPN Classic** may telecast select SEC live games as well as historic and immediate encore presentations. Extensive SEC content, including highlights, will be presented online ESPN.com.

COMCAST/ CHARTER SPORTS SOUTHEAST

On May 21, 2009, Comcast / Charter Sports Southeast (CSS), the regional sports channel focusing on college sports in the southeast, announced it has reached a five-year agreement with ESPN to televise live Southeastern Conference (SEC) content including a minimum of six football games, twenty men's basketball games, and sixteen women's basketball games as well as fifty SEC Olympic sports each year. The agreement will begin with the 2009-10 academic year. Events and times will be announced as determined.

SEC FOOTBALL VIDEO REPLAY

THE OBJECTIVE

To allow for specific types of officiating calls to be immediately reviewed during all games hosted by SEC teams.

THE COACHES' CHALLENGE

A new rule expands the ability of a head coach to challenge a reviewable play on the field. The head coach now retains a challenge if his initial challenge is successful and thus results in a reversal by the replay official. The coach will then have a single challenge that he may use anytime during the game if his team has not used all its timeouts. Thus a team may have a total of two challenges in the game, but only if the first results in a reversal of the on-field ruling.

THE SOURCE

All reviewable video comes direct from either the television network broadcasting the game (CBS Sports, ESPN, ESPN2, Lincoln Financial) or other TV production facilities that meet established conference standards. The Southeastern Conference has used instant replay since 2005.

THE PLAYS

Reviewable

1. Plays governed by Sideline, Goal Line, End Zone, and End Line:
 - a. Scoring Plays, including a runner breaking the plane of the goal line
 - b. Pass complete/incomplete/intercepted at sideline, goal and endlines
 - c. Runner/receiver in or out of bounds
 - d. Recovery of loose ball in and out of bounds
2. Passing Plays:
 - a. Pass ruled complete/ incomplete/ intercepted in the field of play and end zones
 - b. Touching of a forward pass by an ineligible receiver
 - c. Touching of a forward pass by a defensive player
 - d. Quarterback (Passer) forward pass or fumble (if ruled incomplete, play is finalized)
 - e. Illegal forward pass or illegal handing off beyond the line of scrimmage
 - f. Illegal forward pass or illegal handing off after change of possession
 - g. Forward or backward pass thrown from behind the line of scrimmage
 - h. Quarterback (Passer) starts arm forward, ball comes loss and play is ruled incomplete (if ball is quickly recovered)
 - i. Quarterback (Passer) throws incomplete swing pass that is close to being forward or backward, and pass is ruled forward (if ball is quickly recovered)
3. Other Detectable Infractions:
 - a. Runner ruled not down.
 - b. Runner ruled down (when ball carrier is judged down by rule and the ball is fumbled, play may be reviewed if recovery of ball occurs in the immediate action following fumble and is prior to any official signaling ball is dead. Also reviewable when runner is ruled out of bounds near goal line.)
 - c. Forward progress with respect to first down
 - d. Touching of a kick
 - e. Number of players on field
 - f. Clock adjustments (in conjunction with overturned plays)
 - g. Fourth-down/try fumble plays
 - h. Field Goal Attempts (only when ball is ruled below or above the crossbar, inside or outside the uprights when it is lower than the top of the uprights.)

THE PROCESS

Each SEC football stadium has a secured replay booth equipped with a DVSPORT Digital Replay System. Three individuals work in the booth for the duration of the game: 1. Replay Official, 2. Communicator, 3. Technician. The Replay Official is selected and assigned by the Conference Office.

A live video feed is sent directly to the replay booth. The Technician watches the feed on an input monitor while capturing/digitizing it into the DVSPORT Digital Replay System. The Technician also marks the beginning of each play as well as any replays as they occur in real time.

Each play and subsequent replay then appears on a touch screen in front of the Communicator. As the Technician marks the incoming video, each view (by mark) will appear as a small picture on the computer touch screen. At any time, the Communicator can touch/click on a thumbnail and immediately send that play/replay to the Replay Official.

With the Communicator's assistance, the Replay Official can quickly jump between replays while playing back the video. All replay video navigation is done via a remote device controlled by the Replay Official. All replays/video are viewed on an output monitor. The touch screen is only used to select the replays.

While most plays are reviewed between the whistle and the beginning of the next play, the Replay Official can stop play on the field by using a pager system. Five onfield officials wear pagers. If play is stopped the Referee announces on the stadium PA microphone that play has been stopped so the previous play can be reviewed. The Referee then proceeds to the sideline headset, which provides direct communication to the Replay Official in the booth. Once the play has been reviewed, the Replay Official notifies the Referee, who then announces the decision on the stadium PA system.

THE EQUIPMENT

Each SEC member institution uses the Digital Replay System developed by DVSPORT of Pittsburgh, Pa. The replay systems are maintained by the home institution with technical support from DVSPORT.

SEC BOWL AGREEMENTS

The Southeastern Conference has agreements to send nine of its member institutions to postseason bowl games following the 2009 season. The winner of the SEC Championship Game will automatically participate in the Bowl Championship Series comprised of the Sugar, Rose, Orange and Fiesta Bowls.

The Capital One (2nd), will then make its pick following the BCS selections. The bowl must select the team with the next best overall record or a team that is within one win of the team with the next best overall record.

The Outback, Chick-fil-A and AT&T Cotton Bowls will work with the conference office to determine picks 3-5. The Cotton Bowl has the first preference of teams from the Western Division and the Outback Bowl has first preference of teams from the Eastern Division. The Cotton or Outback Bowl can select teams outside of its divisional preference, but must not select them before the opposite bowl selects from its divisional preference. The Chick-fil-A Bowl has the selection of preference following the Cotton and Outback Bowls.

In selections 6-7, the AutoZone Liberty and Gaylord Hotels Music City Bowls will make their selections, not in any specific order, but in consultation with the SEC Office. The Bowls will rank available qualified teams in order of preference. If there are no similarities in the order of selection, the bowls will be granted its selection. If the bowls rank the same teams in preference, the team involved in the process would get its preference of which bowl to participate.

The PetroSun Independence Bowl will receive the eighth selection and the Papajohns.com Bowl will have the ninth pick of available SEC teams.

BOWL CHAMPIONSHIP SERIES

The Bowl Championships Series is a five-game arrangement for post-season college football that is designed to match the two top-rated teams in a national championship game and to create exciting and competitive match-ups among eight other highly regarded teams in four other games.

The five bowl games are the Tostitos Fiesta Bowl, the FedEx Orange Bowl, the Rose Bowl Game presented by Citi, the Allstate Sugar Bowl and the BCS National Championship Game that is played at one of the bowl sites. The 2010 Citi BCS National Championship Game will be played in the Rose Bowl in Pasadena, Calif.

Unless a Southeastern Conference champion qualifies to play in the BCS National Championship Game, it will play in the Allstate Sugar Bowl.

Fox Sports will televise the Tostitos Fiesta Bowl, FedEx Orange Bowl and the Allstate Sugar Bowl at the conclusion of the 2009 regular season. ESPN/ABC will televise the Rose Bowl presented by Citi and the Citi BCS National Championship Game.

In the 11 previous years of the BCS, the Southeastern Conference holds a 12-5 mark in BCS games (.706) - the most wins of any other conference and the highest winning percentage of any conference participating in more than two BCS games.

In BCS National Championship Games, the SEC is 5-0 (1.000) and has more BCS titles than any other conference. The SEC has won BCS crowns in 1998 (Tennessee), 2003 (LSU), 2006 (Florida), 2007 (LSU) and 2008 (Florida).

In the history of the BCS, an SEC team has been in the BCS standings 328 times, second only to the Big 12 with 331. The SEC and the ACC have had 11 of its 12 teams ranked in the BCS standings at some point since 1998 - more than any other conference.

SEC LEADS NATION IN DEFENSE

Southeastern Conference defenses are leading the nation when it comes to limiting yards per play. In 133 games this season, SEC teams are giving up an average of 4.93 yards per play, which is the lowest of any NCAA Football Bowl Subdivision conference.

The SEC leads the NCAA FBS conferences in passing yards allowed per play (6.31) and is fourth in rushing yards allowed per play (3.82).

In this week's 2009 season statistics, the SEC has four of the top 40 teams in the nation in rushing defense, nine of the top 25 teams in passing defense, nine of the top 40 in pass efficiency defense, seven of the top 40 teams in total defense and seven of the top 40 teams in scoring defense.

2008-09 ANOTHER BANNER ATHLETIC YEAR FOR THE SEC

The SEC claimed five national championships in the 2008-09 year, tying it with the total from the 2007-08 season.

In 10 of its 20 sponsored sports, the SEC had either the national champion or the national runners-up.

The SEC had national championships in football (Florida), men's swimming & diving (Auburn), women's indoor track & field (Tennessee), gymnastics (Georgia) and baseball (LSU). The SEC also had national runners-up finishes in men's golf (Arkansas), gymnastics (Alabama), softball (Florida), women's swimming & diving (Georgia) and men's indoor track & field (Florida).

In its 76 year history, the Southeastern Conference has won 179 team national championships, including 63 since 2000. In this decade, the SEC has won at least one national championship in 16 of its 20 sponsored sports with the exception of women's cross country, volleyball, soccer and softball.

SEC LEADS ALL CONFERENCES IN 2008-09 MEN'S SPORTS CONFERENCE VS. CONFERENCE SURVEY; 2nd in WOMEN'S SPORTS

In a statistical survey that is based on NCAA championship and rankings, the Southeastern Conference placed first in the nine men's sports it sponsors and second in the 11 women's sports the league sponsors.

The survey, compiled each year since 1986 by Bo Carter, takes into account final NCAA championship standings in each sport and poll rankings in football. Each conference gets 20 points for a team that wins a national championship, 19 for a second place finish and down to 1 point for a 20th place finish.

In the nine men's sports the SEC sponsors, the SEC had 440.5 points with the Pac-10 coming in second with 375 points, followed by the Big 12 with 337.5 points, ACC with 214 points, Big East 102.5 points and the Big Ten with 80 points.

In the 11 women's sports the SEC sponsors, the Pac-10 was first with 615 points followed by the SEC with 431 points, the Big 12 with 337 points, Big Ten with 318.5 points, ACC with 277.5 points and the Big East with 161.5 points.

Combining the 20 sponsored sports, the Pac-10 had 990 points followed by the SEC with 806 points, Big 12 with 674.5 points, ACC with 491.5 points, Big Ten with 398.5 points and the Big East with 264 points.

The SEC has had the highest men's point total in 15 of the last 17 seasons (exceptions: 2007-08: Big 12; 1997-98: Pac-10). The Pac-10 has had the highest women's point totals each year since 1986 with the exception of four years the SEC has had the highest total (1990-91; 1995-96; 2004-05; 2006-07).

SEC LEADS DIVISION I CONFERENCES IN MOST ESPN THE MAGAZINE CoSIDA ACADEMIC ALL-AMERICANS

The Southeastern Conference had 41 of its student-athletes each ESPN The Magazine Academic All-America Team mention, the most of any Division I conference in the nation.

The Academic All-America Program is administered and voted on by the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA).

The SEC had 15 student-athletes earn first-team mention, 14 earn second-team and 12 earn third-team mention.

The Big 12 was second with 38 total student athletes listed while the Big Ten was third at 34 and the ACC fourth at 26. The Big Ten led all conferences in first-team honorees with 18, followed by the SEC's 15.

Each SEC institution had at least one student-athlete earn first, second or third-team mention. Florida led the SEC with seven student-athletes on the lists while Tennessee had six, South Carolina and Arkansas had five each. Alabama, Florida and Tennessee each led the SEC with three on the various first-team lists.

Florida's Stacey Nelson (softball) and Tim Tebow (football) were named Academic All-Americans of the Year in their respective sports.

SEC LAUNCHES ACADEMIC NETWORK TO PROMOTE 12 MEMBER INSTITUTIONS

The 12 institutions of the Southeastern Conference institutions have joined together in the launch of the SEC Academic Network, a website (www.secacademicnetwork.com) designed to promote the academic programs of SEC universities. The SEC Academic Network is being established by the SEC in partnership with ESPN and the member universities.

The Academic Network, developed using technology and coordination from ESPN Digital Media and Origin Digital, will feature content from every institution ranging from research, innovation and economic development to community partnerships, civic engagement and service.

"Our commitment to highlight the accomplishments of SEC member institution's academic programs was a key component of our new television agreements," said SEC Commissioner Mike Slive. "We are grateful to ESPN for providing the technology, expertise and tools they use in sports media to our institutions in support of academic pursuits."

Each institution has its own page on the website that includes videos categorized by topic. Alumni, fans and students worldwide will have the ability to learn more about SEC academics in one place through video features that are posted by the league institutions.

The Academic Network is a component of the SEC's 15-year television package with ESPN, which is the most comprehensive in the history of intercollegiate athletics. Also part of ESPN's commitment to SEC academic programs is the production of an annual Campus Connection telecast at each SEC institution, in which students take part in the production; telecasts of two programs annually dedicated to the academic accomplishments of SEC student-athletes; a weekly academic feature segment on ESPN's SEC show; and selection of one undergraduate student from every SEC institution to participate in ESPN's summer internship program.

SEC SPORTSMANSHIP STATEMENT

- The SEC has developed a sportsmanship statement for its institutions to follow. It states:

"Coaches and student-athletes of a member institution, as well as individuals employed by or associated with that institution, including alumni, fans, patrons and boosters, shall conduct themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their behavior shall at all times reflect the high standards of honor and dignity that characterize participation in the collegiate setting. For intercollegiate athletics to promote the character development of participants, to enhance the integrity of higher education and to promote civility in society, coaches, student-athletes and all others associated with these athletics programs and events should adhere to such fundamental values as respect, fairness, civility, honesty and responsibility. These values should be manifested not only in athletics participation but also in the broad spectrum of activities affecting the athletics program. It is the responsibility of each member institution to establish policies for sportsmanship and ethical conduct in intercollegiate athletics consistent with the educational mission and goals of the institution. Furthermore, member institutions are responsible for educating on a continuing basis all constituencies about these policies."

THE COACHES

Nick Saban is in his second season at Alabama with a record of 30-8 (.789) and 16th overall with a record of 136-67-1 (.669). The Crimson Tide's offensive coordinator is Jim McElwain and the defensive coordinator is Kirby Smart.

Gene Chizik is in his first season at Auburn and third overall with a record of 12-23 (.343). The Tigers' offensive coordinator is Gus Malzahn and the defensive coordinator is Ted Roof.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN ALABAMA HAS THE BALL

Mark Ingram has rushed for 1,399 yards and 12 touchdowns in 11 games this season for 127.18 yards per game average to rank fifth nationally and first in the SEC in rushing. Ingram has also added 25 receptions for 225 yards and three scores. Greg McElroy has completed 60.0 percent (159 of 265) of his passes for 1,993 yards and 14 touchdowns with only four interceptions. The junior boasts a 137.59 passing efficiency rating. The UA receiving numbers are headed by preseason All-America wide out Julio Jones, who has 31 receptions for 462 yards, a 14.9 yards per catch average and four touchdowns.

Antonio Coleman, a first-team preseason All-SEC selection, leads the SEC with 13.5 tackles for loss and 7.5 sacks. Coleman also has 41 total tackles, an interception which he returned for a touchdown against Mississippi State, a blocked kick, a forced fumble and a fumble recovery. He ranks third in Auburn history with 22.0 career sacks, which is one ahead of his defensive line coach, Tracy Rocker. Senior Walter McFadden leads the team with four interceptions which is tied for fourth most in the SEC, and his 11 passes defensed (four interceptions, seven pass break-ups) is tied for sixth best. Josh Bynes leads the team and is tied for seventh in the SEC with 84 tackles, while Craig Stevens is 11th with 83.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN AUBURN HAS THE BALL

Rolando McClain not only leads the team in tackles with 84, but is virtually an on-the-field coach for Alabama. The remainder of his stat line: 10.5 tackles for loss (-46 yards), 3.0 sacks (-26 yards), two interceptions (21 return yards), two pass breakups, 11 quarterback hurries and a forced fumble. Defensive end Marcell Dareus leads Alabama with 0.59 sacks per game (6.5 yards in losses) while Javier Arenas and Eryk Anders are second on the team with 4.0. Arenas leads the Tide with 11.0 tackles for loss (-75 yards). Mark Barron is tied for sixth nationally while leading the SEC with six interceptions. He also has 61 tackles to rank second on the Alabama defense.

Running back Ben Tate is having a stellar senior season, ranking third in the SEC and 19th nationally averaging 109.9 yards per game. With 1,209 yards rushing, Tate has posted the 18th 1,000-yard rushing season in Auburn history, and ranks ninth on the school's single-season rushing list. He has six 100-yard rushing games this season. Chris Todd has thrown 19 touchdown passes, which is just one shy of the school single-season record shared by Jason Campbell (2004) and Pat Sullivan (1971). Darwin Adams leads the team in catches (44), receiving yards (717) and touchdown receptions (nine), while Terrell Zachery has 23 grabs for 468 yards (20.3 ypc) and five TDs.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Arenas has already broken all of the Crimson Tide punt return records and the SEC punt returns for touchdowns (7) record, and now has his sights set on other SEC and NCAA records as well. He is the NCAA active leader in career punt returns, yards, touchdowns, returns per game and yards per game. Leigh Tiffin is second nationally in field goals per game at 2.27. He has connected on 25- of-28 field goals this season (89.3 percent).

Junior Wes Byrum has excelled during his junior season, connecting on 14-of-15 field goals and all 46 extra point attempts. Among kickers who have attempted at least 10 field goals, Byrum's percentage of .933 ranks tied for fourth nationally. Byrum has scored 88 points this season, which is seventh best in school history and just 14 shy of the school single-season record, and just six points shy of the most points ever scored by an Auburn kicker in a single season.

SERIES/GAME NOTES

Record: UA, 39-33-1 • **Last:** Alabama, 36-0 (2008 at Tuscaloosa)

This will be just the third time the teams have met on Thanksgiving weekend since 1992 ... Alabama's win last year snapped a school record six straight wins for Auburn in the series, which was the second-longest winning streak in the series for either team ... The Tide won nine straight from 1973-81 ... Since 1980, with the exception of 1982, 1998, and 2003, at least one of the two teams has been ranked in the AP poll for every game ... The team leading at halftime has won 74.0 percent of the time (54-of-73) ... There have been 23 shutouts in the rivalry, with the Tigers winning eight ... Seventeen of the last 21 meetings have been decided by 10 points or less ... The visiting team has won five of the last 10 games after the home team had won the previous seven.

THE COACHES

Dabo Swinney is in his second season at Clemson and overall with a record of 12-6 (.667). The Tigers' offensive coordinator is Billy Napier and the defensive coordinator is Kevin Steele.

Steve Spurrier is in his fifth season at South Carolina with a record of 34-27 (.557) and in his 25th season overall with a record of 223-108-2 (.673). Spurrier serves as the Gamecocks' offensive coordinator and the defensive coordinator is Lorenzo Ward.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN CLEMSON HAS THE BALL

C.J. Spiller is third in the nation in all-purpose running yards this week with 188 yards per game. Spiller is the only player in the nation with a touchdown in every game this year. In the last six games Kyle Parker has completed 91-144 for 1187 yards and 13 touchdowns with just four interceptions. TE Michael Palmer now has 30 receptions for 333 yards and three scores for the season. Jacoby Ford is Clemson's top receiver this year with 32 catches for 440 yards and four touchdowns.

A two-time first-team all-SEC pick, Eric Norwood holds the school record with 29.0 career sacks. Norwood is second in the SEC with seven sacks this season. He is tied for seventh in the league with 10.5 total tackles for loss. He also leads the team with two interceptions. USC ranks seventh in the nation against the pass, allowing just 163.64 yards per game. They are doing it with a couple of true freshmen in the secondary, Stephon Gilmore and DeVonte Holloman. The Gamecocks are 17th in the nation in total defense, allowing 308.73 yards per game.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN SOUTH CAROLINA HAS THE BALL

DeAndre McDaniel had his eighth interception of the year in the win over Florida State. McDaniel is now second in the nation in interceptions behind Rahim Moore of UCLA, who has nine. Clemson now has 33 sacks for the year, best in the ACC and 11th best in the nation. Eight of the 33 sacks have been registered by the "Bamberg Bookends", defensive ends Da'Quan Bowers and Ricky Sapp.

Stephen Gracia 57.1 percent of his passes this season (213-for-373) for 2,607 yards with 14 touchdowns and eight interceptions. He is 7-7 as a starter. Brian Maddox has regained his spot as the featured back in the rotation after strong performances at Arkansas and against Florida. Against the top-ranked Gators, he rushed 17 times for a career-high 82 yards and a touchdown. Alshon Jeffery is the Gamecocks' leading receiver with 39 catches for 670 yards, an average of 17.2 yards per catch, with six scores. He ranks fifth in the SEC in receiving yards per game at 60.9.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Clemson has an average starting field position after a kickoff of its own 38-yard-line. Opponents have an average starting field position of their own 24. That 14-yard difference can certainly be attributed directly to the return ability of Spiller, who has three kickoff returns for touchdowns this year and six for his career. The six tie an NCAA record. He currently ranks fourth in the nation with a 33.9 average on 16 returns. Richard Jackson has made 19-25 field goals so far this year and is fifth in the nation in field goals per game.

Junior Spencer Lanning is handling both the punting and the placekicking responsibilities. He is fourth in the SEC with his 15 field goals and is tied for 33rd in the nation. He was named one of 20 semifinalists for the Lou Groza Award earlier this month. Lanning ranks fifth in the SEC and 37th in the country in punting, averaging 42.2 yards per punt with a long of 56 yards. He is one of 42 punters on the Ray Guy Watch List.

SERIES/GAME NOTES

Record: CU, 65-37-4 • **Last:** Clemson, 31-14 (2008 at Clemson)

This is the 107th meeting between the two Palmetto State rivals in a series that dates back to 1896... The teams have met every year since 1909... Clemson holds the all-time lead in the series, 65-37, while four games have ended in a tie... The Tigers hold a 49-29-3 advantage when the game has been played in Columbia and are 16-8-1 in games played in Clemson... CU has won six of the last seven contests and 10 of the last 12 meetings, including a 31-14 victory in last year's contest at Clemson. The last time in Columbia, the Tigers escaped with a 23-21 win in 2007. For the fourth time in five years, at least one team is ranked heading into the season finale.

Houston Nutt is in his second season at Ole Miss with a record of 17-7 (.708) and 17th overall with a record of 128-77 (.624). The Rebels' offensive coordinator is Kent Austin and the defensive coordinator is Tyrone Nix.

Dan Mullen is in his first season at MSU and overall. The Bulldogs' offensive coordinator is Les Koenning and the defensive coordinator is Carl Torbush.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN OLE MISS HAS THE BALL

Senior Dexter McCluster is averaging 184.8 rushing yards and 238.3 all-purpose yards with seven TDs responsible for (four rushing, one receiving, one passing) over the last four SEC games ... He has topped 120 rushing yards in each outing. Senior WR Shay Hodge is averaging 117.0 yards and 6.5 receptions over the last four games with three 100-yard receiving games and three TDs in that span. Hodge is currently the SEC leader in receiving yards and ranks second in receptions (5.0 rpg).

Jamar Chaney, after missing last season with a leg injury, currently ranks fifth in the conference with 8.0 tackles per game. Pernell McPhee leads the team and is second in the SEC with 12.0 tackles for loss. His five total sacks also rank eighth in the league. A pair of freshman defensive backs have had a knack for big plays this season as redshirt freshman Corey Broomfield and true frosh Johnthan Banks have combined for nine interceptions. Banks has two picks returned for touchdowns and Broomfield has another.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN MISSISSIPPI STATE HAS THE BALL

Junior NT Jerrell Powe is tied for 10th in the SEC with 10.0 TFLs, while senior DE Marcus Tillman is eighth in sacks with 5.5 sacks. Also among the league leaders is senior DE Kentrell Lockett with 5.0 sacks. Senior S Kendrick Lewis leads the team in tackles (71) and forced fumbles (2) and is tied for the team lead in pass break-ups (9). Cassius Vaughn is sixth in the SEC in passes defended at 1.0 per game. He is tied for the team lead with nine pass break-ups.

Records continue to fall for Anthony Dixon as he approaches some of the SEC's all-time records. Dixon now has 3,861 yards and ranks eighth in SEC history. Dixon is approaching other all-time SEC marks, as he third all-time with 881 career rushing attempts (one behind Dalton Hilliard in second place) and tied (with Bo Jackson) for seventh with 41 rushing touchdowns. Dixon is State's all time career leader in all-purpose yardage, rushing yardage, attempts, touchdowns, 100-yard games and points scored.

SPECIAL TEAMS

It took freshman Jesse Grandy just a month to carve his name in the Ole Miss record book. In only his fourth game handling returns, Grandy notched his second kick-off return for a TD with an 82-yarder against Auburn. He is only the third Rebel to return two kickoffs for TDs in the same season and the first since John Avery in 1996. The other is Vernon Studdard in 1970. Grandy's current 27.4-yard average ranks third in the SEC and 19th in the nation.

Through the first 10 games of the 2009 season, State has scored six non-offensive touchdowns. They scored one on a blocked punt, one on a kickoff return and four on interception returns. The school record for non-offensive touchdowns in a season is eight, set by the 1998 squad, and the mark for interception returns for scores is six, set in 1994. Leon Berry had a second kickoff return for a touchdown called back at Vanderbilt due to penalty. Chad Bumphis had an apparent TD on a kickoff return called back versus Alabama when officials ruled he stepped out of bounds during the return. Mullen coaches the special teams.

Bobby Bowden is in his 34th season at FSU with a record of 315-96-4 (.764) and 44th overall with a record of 388-128-4 (.750). The Seminoles' offensive coordinator is Jimbo Fisher and the defensive coordinator is Mickey Andrews.

Urban Meyer is in his fifth season at Florida with a record of 55-9 (.859) and in his ninth season overall with a record of 94-17 (.847). The Gators' offensive coordinator is Steve Addazio and the defensive coordinator is Charlie Strong.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN FLORIDA STATE HAS THE BALL

Freshman Lonnie Pryor ran for a pair of touchdowns, including a 3-yard run with 32 seconds left, and Florida State beat Maryland 29-26 on Saturday to become bowl eligible for the 28th straight year. EJ Manuel, who was making his first start at home last week, completed 17-of-27 passes for 206 yards. He ran for 49, including gains of 15 and 20 yards on the final drive.

Jermaine Cunningham leads the team with seven sacks, while Ryan Stamper paces the Gators with 64 tackles. Joe Haden, Major Wright and A.J. Jones lead the way with three interceptions each. Carlos Dunlap has recorded six sacks (including a career-best three against Mississippi State), 7.5 tackles for loss, six pass breakups and 32 tackles (23 solo) on the season. Brandon Spikes is the only player in the nation to have three interception return touchdowns over the past two seasons.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN FLORIDA HAS THE BALL

This will mark the last regular season game for long-time defensive coordinator Mickey Andrews, who is retiring. Nigel Bradham has registered 39 tackles in the last four weeks. Led by junior defensive end Markus White's career-high 2.5 tackles for loss, the Seminoles' defense recoded a season-high 11 tackles for loss in its victory over Maryland. Senior cornerback Patrick Robinson earned his team-high ninth pass break-up in the Seminoles' victory over Maryland. It marked his career-high ninth pass broken up this season.

Tim Tebow has rushed for 11 touchdowns this season, bringing him to 54 for his career. Tebow's career rating of 169.3 currently ranks No. 1 in SEC history (min. 300 completions). Tebow has a rushing and passing touchdown in seven games this season, including two of each against Georgia. Jeff Demps paces the Gator running backs with 623 yards, seven rushing touchdowns and averaging 7.1 yards per carry, which is No. 6 in the nation (min. five attempts per team game). Florida's receiving corps is led by Aaron Hernandez and Riley Cooper. Hernandez has 571 yards on a team-best 46 grabs along with two touchdowns. Cooper has 38 receptions for 641 yards and a team-leading seven touchdowns.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Freshman cornerback/return specialist Greg Reid was named ACC Specialist of the Week on the strength of his 48-yard punt return which set up the Seminoles' game-winning touchdown drive with less than two minutes to play. Reid, who has three player of the week honors from the ACC this season, finished with 88 yards on three punt returns to grab the national lead with an 18.4 average. He also returned a kickoff 25 yards and registered three solo tackles in the secondary for the Seminoles against Maryland.

Caleb Sturgis is one of six players nationally to have at least two 50-yard field goals in 2009. Sturgis made multiple field goals in seven of eight SEC games this season and had a streak of eight consecutive made. Brandon James has 12 punt returns of 30 yards or more in his career, including four punt return touchdowns of 74-plus yards. Chas Henry, a 2008 and 2009 semifinalist for the Ray Guy Award, has punted 28 times for a 42.8 average. Only two punts have been returned for positive yards (13 total), and 12 have been inside the 20.

THE COACHES

Bobby Petrino is in his second season at Arkansas with a record of 12-11 (.522) and seventh overall with a record of 56-30 (.651). The Razorbacks' offensive coordinator is Paul Petrino and the defensive coordinator is Willie Robinson.

Les Miles is in his fifth season at LSU with a record of 50-14 (.781) and ninth overall with a record of 78-35 (.690). The Tigers' offensive coordinator is Gary Crowton and the defensive coordinator is John Chavis.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN ARKANSAS HAS THE BALL

Ryan Mallett leads the SEC and ranks third nationally in pass efficiency (165.18) and he also leads the league and is tied for third nationally in passing touchdowns (28). Mallett is first in the SEC and 13th in the nation in total offense (287.9) and he ranks first in the SEC in passing yards per game (290.5). Broderick Green is tied for third in the SEC with 11 touchdowns this season. This season, Arkansas has had five different players (Joe Adams, Jarius Wright, Greg Childs, Cobi Hamilton and D.J. Williams) combine for eight different 100-yard receiving games. Childs has had a touchdown reception in six of the last 10 games. He leads the team with seven touchdown receptions this season, which is tied for third in the SEC.

Defensively, LSU hasn't allowed a first quarter TD since the Mississippi State game. The Tigers' four linebackers are the top tacklers on the team with Kelvin Sheppard leading the way with 96 tackles, followed by Perry Riley (84), Harry Coleman (68) and Jacob Cutrera (66). CB Patrick Peterson is No.3 in the SEC in passes defended with 14 (12 PBUs, 2 interceptions). Cutrera goes into the Arkansas game riding a string of three-straight double-figure tackle games. LSU's four linebackers have combined for 25 tackles for losses, four sacks, 10 pass breakups and five forced fumbles.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN LSU HAS THE BALL

Defensive tackle Malcolm Sheppard is tied for fourth in the SEC with 11 tackles for loss this season. His career total (37) are tied for third in school history. Sheppard has led the Razorbacks in tackles for loss each of the last two seasons. Sheppard has had at least half of a tackle for a loss in 17 of his last 19 games. During the span, Sheppard has had 23 tackles behind the line for a combined loss of 85 yards. Against Mississippi State, Ramon Broadway, Elton Ford, Matt Harris and Rudell Crim started in the secondary. Ford led the group with nine tackles, including one for a loss and he also recovered a fumble.

LSU goes into this week's game down to its fourth starter at tailback (Stevan Ridley) as Keiland Williams (ankle) was lost for the year against Ole Miss. LSU has lost three tailbacks for the season due to injuries - Williams, Charles Scott (clavicle) and Richard Murphy (knee). Russell Shepard is LSU's top healthy rusher with 268 yards and a pair of TDs. Jordan Jefferson has thrown for 1,785 yards and 14 scores with Brandon LaFell (48 rec., 635 yards, 9 TDs) and Terrance Toliver (47 rec., 654 yards, 3 TDs) being the top receivers.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Against Mississippi State, Dennis Johnson returned two kickoffs for 46 yards to bring his season total to 940, which broke the single-season school record he set last year (905 yards on 41 returns). Johnson's effort also added to his career total (1,845), which is also an Arkansas record. Johnson ranks fifth in the SEC and ranks 23rd nationally with an average of 26.9 yards per kickoff return this season. Johnson has had four kickoff returns of 50-or-more yards this season.

Peterson returned a blocked field goal 53 yards for a TD vs. Ole Miss. LSU is first in the league in punt return average at 16.2 yards. LSU is No. 3 in the SEC in net punting at 38.1 yards per punt. LSU opponents have returned only 10 punts for 40 yards against the Tigers this year. Trindon Holliday ranks second in the SEC in punt return average at 14.0 yards a return. Both LSU punt returners - Chad Jones and Holliday - have returned punts for touchdowns during their career. Jones returned a punt 93 yards (2nd longest in school history) for a TD in the win over Miss. State.

THE COACHES

Lane Kiffin is in his first season at Tennessee and in his third season overall with a record of 11-20 (.355). The Volunteers' offensive coordinator is Jim Chaney and Monte Kiffin serves as the defensive coordinator.

Rich Brooks is in his seventh season at Kentucky with a record of 39-45 (.464) and 19th overall with a record of 130-154-4 (.458). The Wildcats' offensive coordinator is Randy Sanders and Steve Brown serves as the defensive coordinator.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN KENTUCKY HAS THE BALL

Rico McCoy leads the team and ranks fourth in the SEC with 99 stops (9.0 per game) after posting 87 (7.3 per game) last season. McCoy also has four forced fumbles through 11 games, which ranks fourth nationally and atop the SEC. Dan Williams has posted 39 tackles in the last seven games after posting only 16 in the first four games of the season. While Eric Berry is second nationally among active players in interceptions with 14, he is also second on the team in tackles with 75, an average of 6.8 per game.

Morgan Newton has started the last six games. He has completed 52-of-90 passes for 539 yards and tossed five touchdowns. He also has rushed for 84 net yards and two touchdowns. Derrick Locke ranks fifth in the SEC in rushing yards per game, averaging 82.1 yards per game. Randall Cobb leads UK and is 12th in the SEC in receptions per game. In 10 games played (he did not see action vs. Eastern Kentucky with a sprained thumb) he has 33 catches for 403 yards for an average of 3.3 catches per game. He also has four TD receptions.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN TENNESSEE HAS THE BALL

Jonathan Crompton ranks fourth in the league in passing at 213.2 yards per game and is second in the league with 25 touchdown strikes. His 25 passing touchdowns are tied for the fourth-most in school history. In 11 games during the 2009 season, senior tailback Montario Hardesty has averaged 102.5 yards per game and scored nine rushing touchdowns. In the last seven games, Gerald Jones has caught 33 passes for 468 yards and four touchdowns. Denarius Moore has posted 34 catches for 451 yards and six touchdowns in the last eight contests.

Corey Peters has 146 tackles in his career, including 27 tackles for loss and 11.5 quarterback sacks. He currently ranks tied for 4th in tackles for loss in the SEC and tied for 15th in sacks. DeQuin Evans ranks second on the team and is tied for seventh in the SEC in tackles for loss, averaging 0.95 FFL this season. The Wildcats linebackers are paced by senior Micah Johnson, who leads the team in tackles with 84 stops. The first-team Coaches All-SEC team selection last season currently ranks tied for seventh in the SEC in tackles per game. Sam Maxwell has five INTs this season. He currently ranks tied for fourth in the SEC and tied for 25th nationally in total passes defended.

SPECIAL TEAMS

David Oku has averaged 32.3 yards per kickoff return in the last three games after averaging 26.5 yards per return in the season's first eight games. On the season, he ranks eighth in the league at 26.0 yards per return on 30 total returns. He posted a career-long 69-yard return vs. Memphis, and his 40.6-yard average on three returns vs. the Tigers was his best single-game effort of the year.

Locke leads the SEC and ranks 6th nationally in kickoff returns with a 30.47 average. Sophomore Ryan Tydlacka inherits full-time punting duties from departed All-SEC punter Tim Masthay. He is averaging 40.5 yards per punt. He saw brief action last year at field goal duties, making 3-of-6 field goals, including a 51-yarder.

Mark Richt is in his ninth season at Georgia and overall with a record of 88-27 (.76). The Bulldogs' offensive coordinator is Mike Bobo and the defensive coordinators are Willie Martinez and John Jancek.

Paul Johnson is in his second season at Georgia Tech with a record of 19-5 (.792) and in his 13th season overall with a record of 126-44 (.741). Johnson serves as the offensive coordinator for the Yellow Jackets and the defensive coordinator is Dave Wommack.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN GEORGIA HAS THE BALL

Georgia has employed a combination at tailback consisting of redshirt sophomore Caleb King and freshman Washaun Ealey. The Bulldogs have registered 669 yards rushing during their last three games, including 196 against Kentucky. Senior Joe Cox had the second-most passing yards in his career during the matchup versus Kentucky this past Saturday. He finished with 291 yards passing and three TDs versus the Wildcats. Bulldog freshmen Rantavious Wooten and Orson Charles both had career days during Georgia's loss to Kentucky. Wooten, who was starting his second game at FLK, finished with two catches, both going for touchdowns.

Derrick Morgan has 12.5 sacks on the season, which ranks first in the ACC and tied for fourth nationally. He is just the seventh player in Tech history to record 10 or more sacks in one season. He has 17.0 tackles for loss, which ranks first in the ACC and tied for ninth nationally. Morgan Burnett is one of the best when it comes to intercepting passes. He has four interceptions this season and 14 for his career.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN GEORGIA TECH HAS THE BALL

Junior WLB Rennie Curran is second in the SEC with 9.7 tackles per game (107 tackles this year). Curran became the first Georgia player since LB Greg Bright to have back-to-back years with more than 100 tackles (1996, 1997). Curran finished with an SEC-leading 115 tackles last year. Marcus Dowtin tied his career high with eight tackles versus Kentucky, including 1.5 TFLs. Junior Akeem Dent returned to the starting line-up following an injury to tally six tackles versus #25 Auburn. Justin Houston has tallied a team-leading seven sacks and 13 tackles for loss.

Josh Nesbitt's 847 yards rushing are the most ever by a Yellow Jacket quarterback and rank as the third-most ever by an ACC QB. Over the last three games, Johnathan Dwyer has rushed for 485 yards and five touchdowns in wins over Vanderbilt, Wake Forest and Duke. He ranks third in the ACC and 21st nationally in rushing yards per game (109.4) and ranks fifth in the ACC in touchdowns scored (11). Demaryius Thomas (86.4 ypg) leads the ACC in receiving yards per game.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Georgia redshirt sophomore punter Drew Butler and sophomore place-kicker Blair Walsh rank among the nation's best at their respective positions. Butler is on pace to be only the third Bulldog in school history to lead the NCAA in punting, joining Zeke Bratkowski (1953, 42.6) and Bobby Walden (1958, 45.3). Butler's current average of 48.8 on 50 punts would rank as the best average by an NCAA leader since 1997. Walsh is on pace to top the school record in Field Goal Percentage for a single season. He has drilled 16-of-17 FGs (94.1 percent) in 2009, including 4-of-4 from 50 or more yards.

Jerrard Tarrant has returned two punts for touchdowns this season. He ranks third in the ACC and 11th nationally in punt return average (14.3 ypa). He already shares the Georgia Tech single-season record for punt return touchdowns, tying three players (see below). Tarrant is just one TD away from tying the Georgia Tech career record of three. Tarrant's punt return average (14.3) is the highest by a Yellow Jacket since 1986.
