- SEC finished opening weekend with an 11-1 record, including a 5-1 mark in games away from home stadiums.

- SEC teams outscored opponents 143-38 in the 4th quarter, and outscored opponents in points off turnovers, 131-26.

- SEC teams held opponents 3-downs-and-out in 44.6 percent of drives in Week 1 (70 of 157 drives).

- Ingram scored one rushing and one receiving TD. His 6-yard TD run put Alabama ahead 24-17 early in the fourth quarter. His 18-yard TD catch with 6:35 left in the game, gave the Tide the final margin, 34-24.
- In fourth quarter, rushed for 81 yards on 10 carries and a score and had 18 yard TD reception.
- His previous rushing high was 113 yards against Arkansas State in 2008.

SEC FOOTBALL VIDEO REPLAY

THE OBJECTIVE

To allow for specific types of officiating calls to be immediately reviewed during all games hosted by SEC teams.

THE COACHES' CHALLENGE

A new rule expands the ability of a head coach to challenge a reviewable play on the field. The head coach now retains a challenge if his initial challenge is successful and thus results in a reversal by the replay official. The coach will then have a single challenge that he may use anytime during the game if his team has not used all its timeouts. Thus a team may have a total of two challenges in the game, but only if the first results in a reversal of the on-field ruling.

THE SOURCE

All reviewable video comes direct from either the television network broadcasting the game (CBS Sports, ESPN, ESPN2, Lincoln Financial) or other TV production facilities that meet established conference standards. The Southeastern Conference has used instant replay since 2005.

THE PLAYS

Reviewable

1. Plays governed by Sideline, Goal Line, End Zone, and End Line:
 - a. Scoring Plays, including a runner breaking the plane of the goal line
 - b. Pass complete/incomplete/intercepted at sideline, goal and endlines
 - c. Runner/receiver in or out of bounds
 - d. Recovery of loose ball in and out of bounds
2. Passing Plays:
 - a. Pass ruled complete/ incomplete/ intercepted in the field of play and end zones
 - b. Touching of a forward pass by an ineligible receiver
 - c. Touching of a forward pass by a defensive player
 - d. Quarterback (Passer) forward pass or fumble (if ruled incomplete, play is finalized)
 - e. Illegal forward pass or illegal handing off beyond the line of scrimmage
 - f. Illegal forward pass or illegal handing off after change of possession
 - g. Forward or backward pass thrown from behind the line of scrimmage
 - h. Quarterback (Passer) starts arm forward, ball comes loss and play is ruled incomplete (if ball is quickly recovered)
 - i. Quarterback (Passer) throws incomplete swing pass that is close to being forward or backward, and pass is ruled forward (if ball is quickly recovered)
3. Other Detectable Infractions:
 - a. Runner ruled not down.
 - b. Runner ruled down (when ball carrier is judged down by rule and the ball is fumbled, play may be reviewed if recovery of ball occurs in the immediate action following fumble and is prior to any official signaling ball is dead. Also reviewable when runner is ruled out of bounds near goal line.)
 - c. Forward progress with respect to first down
 - d. Touching of a kick
 - e. Number of players on field
 - f. Clock adjustments (in conjunction with overturned plays)
 - g. Fourth-down/try fumble plays
 - h. Field Goal Attempts (only when ball is ruled below or above the cross bar, inside or outside the uprights when it is lower than the top of the uprights.)

THE PROCESS

Each SEC football stadium has a secured replay booth equipped with a DVSPORT Digital Replay System. Three individuals work in the booth for the duration of the game: 1. Replay Official, 2. Communicator, 3. Technician. The Replay Official is selected and assigned by the Conference Office.

A live video feed is sent directly to the replay booth. The Technician watches the feed on an input monitor while capturing/digitizing it into the DVSPORT Digital Replay System. The Technician also marks the beginning of each play as well as any replays as they occur in real time.

Each play and subsequent replay then appears on a touch screen in front of the Communicator. As the Technician marks the incoming video, each view (by mark) will appear as a small picture on the computer touch screen. At any time, the Communicator can touch/click on a thumbnail and immediately send that play/replay to the Replay Official.

With the Communicator's assistance, the Replay Official can quickly jump between replays while playing back the video. All replay video navigation is done via a remote device controlled by the Replay Official. All replays/video are viewed on an output monitor. The touch screen is only used to select the replays.

While most plays are reviewed between the whistle and the beginning of the next play, the Replay Official can stop play on the field by using a pager system. Five onfield officials wear pagers. If play is stopped the Referee announces on the stadium PA microphone that play has been stopped so the previous play can be reviewed. The Referee then proceeds to the sideline headset, which provides direct communication to the Replay Official in the booth. Once the play has been reviewed, the Replay Official notifies the Referee, who then announces the decision on the stadium PA system.

THE EQUIPMENT

Each SEC member institution uses the Digital Replay System developed by DVSPORT of Pittsburgh, Pa. The replay systems are maintained by the home institution with technical support from DVSPORT.

SEC FOOTBALL ON TELEVISION

CBS SPORTS

On Aug. 14, 2008, CBS Sports and the SEC announced a history 15-year contract extension to broadcast its football and basketball games.

In the new agreement, beginning with the 2009-10 season, CBS Sports continues to be the exclusive national network broadcaster of SEC home football games, including the SEC Championship Game. CBS Sports will showcase the top conference matchups each week of the package with the "SEC Game of the Week". The agreement also includes a prime time game and doubleheader opportunities. In addition, CBS Sports continues its coverage of SEC regular-season basketball.

In addition to the broadcast rights on CBS Sports, this comprehensive long-team deal includes certain digital, internet, wireless, Video-on-Demand, data and enhanced highlight rights across all CBS platforms, including CBS College Sports Network and CBSSports.com. Also, simulcasts of CBS Sports games will be available for distribution by the CBS College Sports Network.

ESPN

ESPN has acquired rights to every SEC home football game (excluding those on the network broadcast package) and will serve as the exclusive national cable home and the syndication rightsholder for the conference.

ESPN and ESPN2: The networks will increase coverage by combining to televise a minimum of 20 SEC games annually, including Saturday night and two prime-time Thursday matchups.

ESPNU: The 24-hour college sports network, which launched in March 2005, will present a package of SEC football for the first time, with a Saturday game-of-the-week (generally in primetime and a minimum of 13 games annually).

SEC Network (ESPN Regional Television): The nation's largest syndicator of collegiate sports programming, becomes the official over-the-air syndication home for the SEC and will feature a game-of-the-week package (generally at 12:30 p.m. ET), with a minimum of 13 games each season throughout the SEC footprint and beyond. In addition, ERT will produce and distribute a studio show.

ESPN360.com: Simulcasts of SEC game telecasts will be offered on the broadband network.

ESPN Mobile TV: Live games will be simulcast on mobile phones.

ESPN International: The agreement includes global rights to present live games and encore presentations.

ESPN Deportes: ESPN has acquired domestic Spanish-language rights for SEC football on the 24-hour, U.S.-based network.

ESPN GamePlan: The out-of-market college football pay-per-view service, will offer SEC action.

ESPN Classic: The network may telecast select SEC live games as well as historic and immediate encore presentations.

ESPN.com: Extensive SEC content, including highlights, will be presented online.

COMCAST/ CHARTER SPORTS

SOUTHEAST

On May 21, 2009, Comcast / Charter Sports Southeast (CSS), the regional sports channel focusing on college sports in the southeast, announced it has reached a five-year agreement with ESPN to televise live Southeastern Conference (SEC) content including a minimum of six football games, twenty men's basketball games, and sixteen women's basketball games as well as fifty SEC Olympic sports each year. The agreement will begin with the 2009-10 academic year. Events and times will be announced as determined.

FOX SPORTS NET

FOX Sports Net (FSN), the nation's leader in local sports, today announced a new multi-year television rights agreement with ESPN that expands its long-time partnership with the Southeastern Conference (SEC).

Beginning with the 2009-10 academic year, FSN's three regional sports networks serving the SEC territory – FOX Sports South, Sun Sports and FOX Sports Southwest – will be the outlets for a minimum of 91 SEC athletic events each year. Events will include seven live, exclusive football games, 20 men's basketball games, 24 women's basketball games (16 regular season, eight tournament), 16 baseball games (10 regular season, six tournament) and 24 additional Olympic sporting events (softball, volleyball, soccer, gymnastics).

FSN will distribute these events to more than 24 million cable and satellite households across the SEC coverage area.

SEC FOOTBALL SHOWS ON TELEVISION

SEC Weekly on ESPNU

SEC Weekly, a one-hour program will air Thursdays at 4:30 p.m. on ESPNU, throughout the academic year and will cover SEC sports, including sport-by-sport previews, reviews, specials and features on student-athletes. The show will be hosted by Cara Capuano, who will anchor, and new analyst Matt Stinchcomb, a former University of Georgia All-America and NFL player. SEC Weekly is a product of ESPN's landmark 15-year agreement with the Southeastern Conference. ESPNU will complement the show with SEC game telecasts, including football, basketball, Olympic sports and select conference championships.

SEC Gridiron Live

SEC Gridiron LIVE, a 60-minute studio show offering game previews, expert analysis and a fast-paced social networking component that enables fan interaction, will air on FOX Sports South, FOX Sports Southwest and SUN Sports. The show is hosted by broadcasting veteran Charles Davis, with analysts Randy Cross and David Pollack and social media reporter Cassidy Hubbard. The live studio show also incorporates a dynamic social networking component, providing viewers with the opportunity for lively and immediate interaction with the on-air broadcast team and SEC football fans across the country.

CBS College Sports SEC Tailgate

CBS Sports and CBS College Sports Network have announced 2009 SEC football coverage, beginning, Saturday, Sept. 19. CBS Sports will start with live pre-game show "SEC Game of the Week" and CBS College Sports Network kick off with SEC TAILGATE. The show captures all the excitement, traditions and festivities from the various campuses and stadiums across the SEC, as well as previews the match-ups, providing highlights and news from games in-progress.

SEC BOWL AGREEMENTS

The Southeastern Conference has agreements to send nine of its member institutions to postseason bowl games following the 2009 season. The winner of the SEC Championship Game will automatically participate in the Bowl Championship Series comprised of the Sugar, Rose, Orange and Fiesta Bowls.

The Capital One (2nd), will then make its pick following the BCS selections. The bowl must select the team with the next best overall record or a team that is within one win of the team with the next best overall record.

The Outback, Chick-fil-A and AT&T Cotton Bowls will work with the conference office to determine picks 3-5. The Cotton Bowl has the first preference of teams from the Western Division and the Outback Bowl has first preference of teams from the Eastern Division. The Cotton or Outback Bowl can select teams outside of its divisional preference, but must not select them before the opposite bowl selects from its divisional preference. The Chick-fil-A Bowl has the selection of preference following the Cotton and Outback Bowls.

In selections 6-7, the AutoZone Liberty and Gaylord Hotels Music City Bowls will make their selections, not in any specific order, but in consultation with the SEC Office. The Bowls will rank available qualified teams in order of

preference. If there are no similarities in the order of selection, the bowls will be granted its selection. If the bowls rank the same teams in preference, the team involved in the process would get its preference of which bowl to participate.

The PetroSun Independence Bowl will receive the eighth selection and the Papajohns.com Bowl will have the ninth pick of available SEC teams.

2008-09 ANOTHER BANNER ATHLETIC YEAR FOR THE SEC

The SEC claimed five national championships in the 2008-09 year, tying it with the total from the 2007-08 season.

In 10 of its 20 sponsored sports, the SEC had either the national champion or the national runners-up.

The SEC had national championships in football (Florida), men's swimming & diving (Auburn), women's indoor track & field (Tennessee), gymnastics (Georgia) and baseball (LSU). The SEC also had national runners-up finishes in men's golf (Arkansas), gymnastics (Alabama), softball (Florida), women's swimming & diving (Georgia) and men's indoor track & field (Florida).

In its 76 year history, the Southeastern Conference has won 179 team national championships, including 63 since 2000. In this decade, the SEC has won at least one national championship in 16 of its 20 sponsored sports with the exception of women's cross country, volleyball, soccer and softball.

SEC LEADS ALL CONFERENCES IN 2008-09 MEN'S SPORTS CONFERENCE VS. CONFERENCE SURVEY; 2nd in WOMEN'S SPORTS

In a statistical survey that is based on NCAA championship and rankings, the Southeastern Conference placed first in the nine men's sports it sponsors and second in the 11 women's sports the league sponsors.

The survey, compiled each year since 1986 by Bo Carter, takes into account final NCAA championship standings in each sport and poll rankings in football. Each conference gets 20 points for a team that wins a national championship, 19 for a second place finish and down to 1 point for a 20th place finish.

In the nine men's sports the SEC sponsors, the SEC had 440.5 points with the Pac-10 coming in second with 375 points, followed by the Big 12 with 337.5 points, ACC with 214 points, Big East 102.5 points and the Big Ten with 80 points.

In the 11 women's sports the SEC sponsors, the Pac-10 was first with 615 points followed by the SEC with 431 points, the Big 12 with 337 points, Big Ten with 318.5 points, ACC with 277.5 points and the Big East with 161.5 points.

Combining the 20 sponsored sports, the Pac-10 had 990 points followed by the SEC with 806 points, Big 12 with 674.5 points, ACC with 491.5 points, Big Ten with 398.5 points and the Big East with 264 points.

The SEC has had the highest men's point total in 15 of the last 17 seasons (exceptions: 2007-08: Big 12; 1997-98: Pac-10). The Pac-10 has had the highest women's point totals each year since 1986 with the exception of four years the SEC has had the highest total (1990-91; 1995-96; 2004-05; 2006-07).

SEC LEADS DIVISION I CONFERENCES IN MOST ESPN THE MAGAZINE CoSIDA ACADEMIC ALL-AMERICANS

The Southeastern Conference had 41 of its student-athletes each ESPN The Magazine Academic All-America Team mention, the most of any Division I conference in the nation.

The Academic All-America Program is administered and voted on by the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA).

The SEC had 15 student-athletes earn first-team mention, 14 earn second-team and 12 earn third-team mention.

The Big 12 was second with 38 total student athletes listed while the Big Ten was third at 34 and the ACC fourth at 26. The Big Ten led all conferences in first-team honorees with 18, followed by the SEC's 15.

Each SEC institution had at least one student-athlete earn first, second or third-team mention. Florida led the SEC with seven student-athletes on the lists while Tennessee had six, South Carolina and Arkansas had five each. Alabama, Florida and Tennessee each led the SEC with three on the various first-team lists.

Florida's Stacey Nelson (softball) and Tim Tebow (football) were named Academic All-Americans of the Year in their respective sports.

SEC LAUNCHES ACADEMIC NETWORK TO PROMOTE 12 MEMBER INSTITUTIONS

The 12 institutions of the Southeastern Conference institutions have joined together in the launch of the SEC Academic Network, a website (www.secacademicnetwork.com) designed to promote the academic programs of SEC universities. The SEC Academic Network is being established by the SEC in partnership with ESPN and the member universities.

The Academic Network, developed using technology and coordination from ESPN Digital Media and Origin Digital, will feature content from every institution ranging from research, innovation and economic development to community partnerships, civic engagement and service.

"Our commitment to highlight the accomplishments of SEC member institution's academic programs was a key component of our new television agreements," said SEC Commissioner Mike Slive. "We are grateful to ESPN for providing the technology, expertise and tools they use in sports media to our institutions in support of academic pursuits."

Each institution has its own page on the website that includes videos categorized by topic. Alumni, fans and students worldwide will have the ability to learn more about SEC academics in one place through video features that are posted by the league institutions.

The Academic Network is a component of the SEC's 15-year television package with ESPN, which is the most comprehensive in the history of intercollegiate athletics. Also part of ESPN's commitment to SEC academic programs is the production of an annual Campus Connection telecast at each SEC institution, in which students take part in the production; telecasts of two programs annually dedicated to the academic accomplishments of SEC student-athletes; a weekly academic feature segment on ESPN's SEC show; and selection of one undergraduate student from every SEC institution to participate in ESPN's summer internship program.

SEC SPORTSMANSHIP STATEMENT

- The SEC has developed a sportsmanship statement for its institutions to follow. It states:

"Coaches and student-athletes of a member institution, as well as individuals employed by or associated with that institution, including alumni, fans, patrons and boosters, shall conduct themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their behavior shall at all times reflect the high standards of honor and dignity that characterize participation in the collegiate setting. For intercollegiate athletics to promote the character development of participants, to enhance the integrity of higher education and to promote civility in society, coaches, student-athletes and all others associated with these athletics programs and events should adhere to such fundamental values as respect, fairness, civility, honesty and responsibility. These values should be manifested not only in athletics participation but also in the broad spectrum of activities affecting the athletics program. It is the responsibility of each member institution to establish policies for sportsmanship and ethical conduct in intercollegiate athletics consistent with the educational mission and goals of the institution. Furthermore, member institutions are responsible for educating on a continuing basis all constituencies about these policies."

Larry Blakeney is in his 19th season at Troy and overall with a record of 144-74-1 (.660). Neal Brown serves as the Trojans' offensive coordinator and the defensive coordinator is Jeremy Rowell.

Urban Meyer is in his fifth season at Florida with a record of 45-9 (.833) and in his ninth season overall with a record of 84-17 (.832). The Gators' offensive coordinator is Steve Addazio and the defensive coordinator is Charlie Strong.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN TROY HAS THE BALL

Levi Brown completed 61.7 percent of his attempts and threw for 2,030 yards and 15 touchdowns with just three interceptions last year, despite starting just eight games. Brown finished the opening game last week 28-for-44 with 263 yards along with the lone touchdown and two interceptions. Tebairus Gill leads all Troy receivers with eight catches for 102 yards. Duluhan Harris ran for 1,077 yards and 11 touchdowns while averaging 5.1 yards per carry in 2008.

The defense saw 29 different players record a tackle in the opener, led by true freshman Jonathan Bostic with seven (six solo, one assist). With Major Wright's interception, which led to a touchdown, the defense has picked off a pass in a nation's-best 13 consecutive games. The interception was the sixth of Wright's career, and he has recorded a pick in two consecutive games. Brandon Spikes recorded 1.5 tackles for loss in the opening game. Carlos Dunlap paced the Gators and the SEC with nine and a half sacks in 2008.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN FLORIDA HAS THE BALL

Boris Lee lead Troy with 10 tackles at Bowling Green. Chris Bowens and Bryan Willis added seven stops apiece. Brandon Lang posted a team-high 10.5 sacks last year and made them all count, averaging almost 10 yards on each, while Cameron Sheffield showed a nose for the ball with three forced fumbles and two recoveries to go with a blocked kick. Jorrick Calvin started 12 games at corner last year.

Tim Tebow extended his nation's-best streak of consecutive games with a touchdown pass to 29, finding Aaron Hernandez for a 28-yard score in the second quarter. On his lone carry, Rainey jetted 76 yards for a touchdown, becoming just the second player in program history with two rushes of 75-plus yards (Neal Anderson). Rainey had a 75-yard touchdown carry last year against Arkansas. Riley Cooper's five catches last week marked a career high, and Cooper went over 100 yards for the second time as a Gator. A 68-yard catch from Tim Tebow set up Florida's first touchdown of the evening. Jeff Demps totaled 89 yards on five carries (17.8 avg.).

SPECIAL TEAMS

Sam Glusman, a former walk-on, took on the placement duty and had a record-setting season as a junior. He went from a dark-horse to win the job at Troy to a semifinalist for the Lou Groza Award after hitting a school-record 20-of-29 field goal attempts – including his first 12 tries – as well as 48-of-52 PAT kicks. Will Goggans took over as the punter and averaged 39.2 yards while pinning 18 of his 52 attempts inside the opposing 20 yard line.

With an 85-yard second-quarter kickoff return for a touchdown, Brandon James ended Florida's 10-year, 123-game streak without a kickoff return touchdown. James already has four career punt return touchdowns. Only one Gator before James has ever returned both a kickoff and a punt for a touchdown (Harvin Clark, 1969-71).

Rick Neuheisel is in his second season at UCLA with a record of 5-8 (.385) and 10th overall with a record of 71-38 (.651). The Bruins' offensive coordinator is Norm Chow and Chuck Bullough serves as the defensive coordinator.

Lane Kiffin is in his first season at Tennessee and in his third season overall with a record of 6-15 (.286). The Volunteers' offensive coordinator is Jim Chaney and Monte Kiffin serves as the defensive coordinator.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN UCLA HAS THE BALL

Senior wide receiver Terrence Austin set the UCLA all-purpose yardage record (1,878 yards) in 2008 and led the Bruins in receptions (53), while being named second team All-Pac-10 last year. He only found the end zone once in 2008, a scoring total he equaled against San Diego State last week. UCLA redshirt freshman Kevin Prince was named the starter under center just after spring practice. The last time the Bruins faced the Vols with a freshman signal-caller, Tennessee won handily 24-6 over Bret Johnson and UCLA in 1989.

All-America safety Eric Berry is the unquestioned star of the UT secondary, and he has a mixed bag of experience and youth around him. The Vols return one other starter in Dennis Rogan and several experienced backups from the 2008 unit that helped Tennessee finish fourth in the nation in pass defense and tied for 20th in interceptions. Nick Reveiz tied for the team lead with six tackles vs. Western Kentucky after never making more than four stops in a game in his career.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN TENNESSEE HAS THE BALL

Senior Reggie Carter returns at linebacker, where he led the Bruins with 83 tackles and has made 33 career starts. UCLA's best defensive player, however, may be junior defensive tackle Brian Price. A first team all-conference pick as a sophomore, Price led the Bruins with 14.0 TFLs in 2008 and is on the Lombardi, Outland, Bednarik and Nagurski Award Watch Lists.

Montario Hardesty finished with 160 yards on 18 carries and one touchdown. His previous career high was 78 yards on 16 carries vs. Georgia in 2007. He eclipsed his previous mark on just nine carries and less than 20 minutes into the game. Jonathan Crompton threw for 233 yards on 21-of-28 passing and connected on five touchdown passes. The 21 completions and five scores were career highs. He threw only four touchdowns in all of the 2008 season.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Junior kicker Kai Forbath's 2008 season got off on the right foot as he nailed a 42-yard field goal to beat Tennessee in overtime in the season-opener. He made 19-of-22 field goal attempts last season and was named third team All-American by the AP. He has seven career 50-yard field goals, including a 50-yarder against the Aztecs last Saturday.

Rogan averaged 24.9 yards per kickoff return in 2008 after posting the third-best single-season mark in school history in 2007 at 29.5 yards per return. Rogan finished the 2008 season with 698 kickoff return yards, which is a single-season record at Tennessee. His 28 returns also tied a school record.

Mario Cristobal is in his third season at FIU and overall with a record of 6-18 (.250). The Golden Panthers' offensive coordinator is Bill Legg and the defensive coordinator is Phil Galiano.

Nick Saban is in his second season at Alabama with a record of 20-8 (.714) and 16th overall with a record of 126-67-1 (.652). The Crimson Tide's offensive coordinator is Jim McElwain and the defensive coordinator is Kirby Smart.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN FLORIDA INTERNATIONAL HAS THE BALL

Paul McCall started every game for the Golden Panthers, completing 167 of 317 attempts for a 52.7 completion percentage, the fifth-highest in school history. He threw an FIU record 15 touchdowns. His 2,332 passing yards are the third-highest single-season total in FIU history. T.Y. Hilton set the FIU single-season record for receiving yards with 1,013, as well as tie the mark for receiving touchdowns in a season with seven on his way to being named a freshman All-American.

Leading the linebacking group is junior Rolando McClain and sophomore Dont'a Hightower. McClain was a Butkus Award finalist a year ago and a preseason Playboy All-American in 2009. Hightower was a Freshman All-American a year ago. Marcell Dareus had two total tackles, including 1.5 sacks as he harassed Tech signal-caller Tyrod Taylor into 9-of-20 passing for just 91 yards. Terrence Cody mans the middle of the defensive front for the Tide.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN ALABAMA HAS THE BALL

Scott Bryant was named All-Sun Belt Conference Honorable Mention last season. He led the team with 89 tackles, 48 of them unassisted and recorded 7.5 tackles for loss, tops among returners. He had half a sack for a loss of two yards and broke up two passes and forced two fumbles. He is one of just five returners to start every game in 2008. Anthony Gaitor led the Sun Belt in pass breakups per game with nine, giving him 1.29 per game, which was .43 more than the second place finisher. He broke up 16 passes overall for an average of 1.33 per game and recorded 44 tackles, including 32 solo. Gaitor returned two of his five picks last season for touchdowns.

Sophomore running back Mark Ingram showed a national television audience why he was named to the watch list for the Doak Walker Award after rushing for 150 yards and a touchdown against No. 7 Virginia Tech. He also hauled in three passes for 35 yards, which included an 18-yard touchdown grab to seal the fifth-ranked Crimson Tide's 34-24 win. Greg McElroy made his starting quarterback debut last week against Virginia Tech. The Southlake, Texas native threw for 230 yards on 15-of-30 passing with one touchdown and one interception in leading the Crimson Tide to a win over the No. 7 team in the country.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Hilton, after guaranteeing on National Signing Day that he would score the first time he got his hands on the ball, made true of his word when he returned a punt 74 yards for a touchdown in the season opener against Kansas. He ranked ninth in the country in punt return yards per game with an average of 14.78. He also returned one kickoff for a touchdown.

Senior place-kicker Leigh Tiffin converted 4-of-5 field goal attempts against Virginia Tech, making good on attempts from 49, 34, 43 and 20 yards. That matched his single-game best at Alabama. Javier Arenas is the active NCAA leader in career punt returns for touchdowns and punt return yards in a game. His six career punt returns for touchdowns also ties the SEC record.

Gene Chizik is in his first season at Auburn and third overall with a record of 6-19 (.240). The Tigers' offensive coordinator is Gus Malzahn and the defensive coordinator is Ted Roof.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN MISSISSIPPI STATE HAS THE BALL

Quarterback Chris Relf led the team in rushing with 82 yards and a score, and also threw for three touchdowns on just 10 pass attempts. True freshman Chad Bumphis caught two touchdowns passes in his collegiate debut last week. All-SEC running back Anthony Dixon is expected back in the lineup this week after serving a one-game suspension versus Jackson State.

Antonio Coleman, a first-team preseason All-SEC selection, had strong season debut for the Tigers, collecting seven tackles, including a sack and 2.5 tackles for losses. His sack gave him 15.5 for his career, moving him into a tie for 10th in school history for career sacks with Stanley McClover (2004-05). He also now has 32.5 career tackles for loss, and his seven tackles were just one shy of his career high. Daren Bates intercepted a pass in the third quarter in his first career game as a Tiger.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN AUBURN HAS THE BALL

Jamar Chaney led the defense in the opener with five tackles, while Corey Broomfield returned an interception 43 yards for a touchdown. Chaney, a preseason All-SEC selection, was seeing his first action since an injury in the 2008 opener caused him to miss the entire season. The Bulldog defense allowed Jackson State just 194 yards of offense, including just 62 rushing. Sophomore DB Charles Mitchell leads the secondary and recorded his first career interception with 13:31 left in the third quarter last week.

Freshman running back Onterio McCalebb has a sizzling debut for the Tigers against Louisiana Tech, rushing for 148 yards and a touchdown. He became the first Auburn freshman to rush for 100 yards in a season opener since Bo Jackson had 123 yards rushing against Wake Forest in 1982. Senior quarterback Chris Todd has a solid game during Auburn's 37-13 season-opening victory over Louisiana Tech, completing 17-of-26 passes for 255 yards and two scores with no interceptions.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Sean Brauchle made the first field goal of his career last week when he put a 25-yard kick through the upright with 13:47 left in the game. Heath Hutchins had a great debut punting for MSU, averaging 49.0 yards on two kicks, including a long of 56 yards and one inside the 20. Leon Berry, a JUCO return specialist, returned the opening kickoff 38 yards versus JSU.

McCalebb also added 49 yards on two kickoff returns last week, giving him 197 all-purpose yards on the night, which leads the SEC and ranks 11th nationally. Junior Wes Byrum has led Auburn in scoring in each of the past two seasons, converting 28-of-42 field goal attempts during his career for 141 career points.

Bobby Johnson is in his eighth season at Vanderbilt with a record of 28-56 (.333) and in his 16th season overall with a record of 88-92 (.489). Ted Cain serves as the offensive coordinator and the defensive coordinator is Jaime Bryant.

Les Miles is in his fifth season at LSU with a record of 43-11 (.796) and ninth overall with a record of 71-32 (.689). The Tigers' offensive coordinator is Gary Crowton and the defensive coordinator is John Chavis.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN VANDERBILT HAS THE BALL

Zac Stacy and Warren Norman became the first Commodore duo to rush for more than 100 yards in the same game since Kwane Doster and Norval McKenzie each gained 101 yards at Ole Miss on Sept. 21, 2002. Vanderbilt produced its highest single-game rushing total, 433 yards, in more than 30 years. Quarterback Larry Smith set single-game career highs with 153 passing yards and 66 rushing yards.

LB Jacob Cutrera's 29-yard interception return for a touchdown was the first by LSU since Jonathan Zenon tallied a pick six against Tennessee in the 2007 SEC Championship Game on Dec. 1, 2007. Cutrera's pick came on his first play of scrimmage of the night. Senior Charles Alexander (24 tackles, 1 sack in 2008) is joined up front by all-SEC defensive end Rahim Alem (29 tackles, 11.5 TFL, 8 sacks), who earned all conference honors despite starting just one game a year ago. The Tigers return both outside linebackers — Perry Riley and Kelvin Sheppard — in 2009.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN LSU HAS THE BALL

Sophomore linebacker Chris Marve posted two forced fumbles and a quarterback sack in the first four minutes of action in the opener. He concluded with four tackles.

The two forced fumbles gives Marve the NCAA lead. Last year, he also topped the SEC with four forced fumbles. Senior cornerback Myron Lewis tied a career-high with three pass breakups. Patrick Benoist is the Commodores' only returning all-conference performer. The shutout last week was the first in the Bobby Johnson Era.

LSU quarterback Jordan Jefferson was 11-of-19 passing for 172 yards and three touchdowns without an interception. He played the full game under center at Washington. Charles Scott led the LSU running attack with 52 yards on 12 carries, while Keiland Williams finished with 51 yards on seven tries. Jefferson added 42 yards rushing. WR Brandon LaFell has now caught a pass in 28 straight games dating back to the 2007 Sugar Bowl versus Notre Dame. Terrance Toliver earned the second 100-yard receiving game of his career and also had two touchdown grabs.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Brett Upson was superb throughout the 2008 season, blending the best leg strength of his career with an accuracy that frequently pinned opponents deep in their own territory. While just the SEC's eighth best punter with a 40.4-yard average, Upson's hang time and pinpoint direction resulted in the league's fewest punt return yards allowed. He was MVP of the Gaylord Hotels Music City Bowl.

LSU goes into the 2009 season having to replace both its placekicker and punter from a year ago with the departure of Colt David and Brady Dalfrey. Josh Jasper, a junior, has handled spot placekicking assignments in the past, but he will be called on to handle the job full-time during the fall. Derek Helton, a junior college transfer who joined the Tigers in the spring, is thought to be LSU's punter during the fall. Trindon Holliday gives the Tigers a breakaway threat every time he touches the ball in the return game.

Mark Richt is in his ninth season at Georgia and overall with a record of 82-23 (.781). The Bulldogs' offensive coordinator is Mike Bobo and the defensive coordinators are Willie Martinez and John Jancek.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN SOUTH CAROLINA HAS THE BALL

Stephen Garcia was the Gamecocks' starter at NC State on Sept. 3 and took every snap as the Carolina quarterback in the game, completing 13-of-22 passes for 148 yards and one interception. Junior Brian Maddox made his second career start at NC State and did not disappoint, carrying the ball 23 times for 66 yards (both career highs) and the Gamecocks' only touchdown on a one-yard plunge early in the first quarter. Senior team captain Moe Brown caught three balls for 54 yards, including a crucial third-and-long catch in the waning moments of the game to seal the victory.

Junior WLB Rennie Curran is the top returning tackler in the Southeastern Conference after leading the Bulldogs with 115 stops in 2008. Curran and sophomore Marcus Downtin each had eight tackles versus the Cowboys last week. Geno Atkins anchors Georgia's defensive tackles with 19 consecutive starts, including 13 in 2008, after tallying 34 tackles, including 7.5 for a loss, and a team-high 32 quarterback pressures last year.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN GEORGIA HAS THE BALL

Freshman Devin Taylor forced a fumble that was recovered by South Carolina and led to the game's only touchdown. He finished the game with six tackles including a game-high three for losses, including a sack. He also blocked a punt and forced a second fumble. The Gamecocks held the Wolfpack to just 133 yards of offense including 59 on the ground. Eric Norwood had 2.0 sacks in the opener. Norwood needs just 3.5 more to move into the top 10 in all-time SEC history. He had eight total tackles.

In his career, Joe Cox has appeared in 14 games with two starts. He is 48-for-88 for 594 yards with six touchdowns and two interceptions. In the season opener while battling flu-like symptoms, Cox went 15-for-30 for a career-high 162 yards, one TD, one INT and one fumble. A.J. Green looks to build on a successful freshman season where he ranked first in the SEC in receiving yds./game at 74.1. In 2008, Green led the SEC in receiving yardage, yards per game and tied for first in TDs by receivers. Richard Samuel rushed for a career-high 87 yards on 20 carries against OSU

SPECIAL TEAMS

Deep snapper Matthew Grooms joined the Gamecocks after serving as a corporal in the U.S. Marine Corps for four years as a mechanic, including a six-month stint in Iraq. Grooms, a junior, is the oldest player on the squad, as he turned 26 on July 8. Against NC State last week, Spencer Lanning had six punts for an average of 41.7 yards, including a career-long 55-yarder, and he dropped three kicks inside the 20.

Bulldog sophomore Blair Walsh drilled a career-long 53-yard field goal versus #9 OSU. This was the longest FG for the Bulldogs since Brandon Coutu connected on a 55 yarder against UAB in 2006. Drew Butler averaged an NCAA-leading 57.0 yards on six punts against OSU. This is the second-best average for a game since 1958.
