- SEC Football Players of the Week (Games of Oct. 17) are Mark Ingram, RB, Alabama (offense), Micah Johnson, LB, Kentucky (defense), Caleb Sturgis, PK, Florida (special teams), Daverin Gerald, C, Ole Miss (offensive lineman), Geno Atkins, DT, Georgia (defensive lineman) and Corey Broomfield, DB, Mississippi State (freshman).
- SEC has two different top-ranked teams in latest polls. Alabama is #1 in Associated Press while Florida is top-ranked in USA Today, Harris Interactive and BCS rankings.
- SEC's 27-5 non-conference record remains best among NCAA FBS conferences.
- SEC and Big 12 have each had seven different teams in AP Top 25 this season, most in nation.
- SEC teams have scored field goals at the highest rate since 1992.
- Florida's Tim Tebow is now SEC career leader in touchdown responsibility.
- More than 3.4 million fans at 98.31 percent capacity have been in SEC stadiums this season.

SEC FOOTBALL ON TELEVISION

CBS SPORTS

CBS Sports and the SEC announced a history 15-year contract extension to broadcast its football and basketball games. In the new agreement, beginning with the 2009-10 season, CBS Sports continues to be the exclusive national network broadcaster of SEC home football games, including the SEC Championship Game. CBS Sports will showcase the top conference matchups each week of the package with the "SEC Game of the Week". The agreement also includes a prime time game and doubleheader opportunities. In addition, CBS Sports continues its coverage of SEC regular-season basketball.

In addition to the broadcast rights on CBS Sports, this comprehensive long-team deal includes certain digital, internet, wireless, Video-on-Demand, data and enhanced highlight rights across all CBS platforms, including CBS College Sports Network and CBSSports.com. Also, simulcasts of CBS Sports games will be available for distribution by the CBS College Sports Network.

ESPN

ESPN has acquired rights to every SEC home football game (excluding those on the network broadcast package) and will serve as the exclusive national cable home and the syndication rightsholder for the conference.

ESPN and ESPN2: The networks will increase coverage by combining to televise a minimum of 20 SEC games annually, including Saturday night and two primetime Thursday matchups.

ESPNU: The 24-hour college sports network, which launched in March 2005, will present a package of SEC football for the first time, with a Saturday game-of-the-week (generally in primetime and a minimum of 13 games annually).

SEC Network (ESPN Regional Television): The nation's largest syndicator of collegiate sports programming, becomes the official over-the-air syndication home for the SEC and will feature a game-of-the-week package (generally at 12:30 p.m. ET), with a minimum of 13 games each season throughout the SEC footprint and beyond. In addition, ERT will produce and distribute a studio show.

Also: Simulcasts of SEC game telecasts will be offered on ESPN360.com. Live games will be simulcast on mobile phones. The agreement includes global rights to present live games and encore presentations on ESPN International. ESPN has acquired domestic Spanish-language rights for SEC football on ESPN Deportes (24-hour, U.S.-based network). **ESPN GamePlan, ESPN's** college football pay-per-view service, will offer SEC action. **ESPN Classic** may telecast select SEC live games as well as historic and immediate encore presentations. Extensive SEC content, including highlights, will be presented online ESPN.com.

COMCAST/ CHARTER SPORTS SOUTHEAST

On May 21, 2009, Comcast / Charter Sports Southeast (CSS), the regional sports channel focusing on college sports in the southeast, announced it has reached a five-year agreement with ESPN to televise live Southeastern Conference (SEC) content including a minimum of six football games, twenty men's basketball games, and sixteen women's basketball games as well as fifty SEC Olympic sports each year. The agreement will begin with the 2009-10 academic year. Events and times will be announced as determined.

FOX SPORTS NET

FOX Sports Net (FSN), the nation's leader in local sports, today announced a new multi-year television rights agreement with ESPN that expands its long-time partnership with the Southeastern Conference (SEC).

Beginning with the 2009-10 academic year, FSN's three regional sports networks serving the SEC territory – FOX Sports South, Sun Sports and FOX Sports Southwest – will be the outlets for a minimum of 91 SEC athletic events each year. Events will include seven live, exclusive football games, 20 men's basketball games, 24 women's basketball games (16 regular season, eight tournament), 16 baseball games (10 regular season, six tournament) and 24 additional Olympic sporting events (softball, volleyball, soccer, gymnastics). FSN will distribute these events to more than 24 million cable and satellite households across the SEC coverage area.

SEC FOOTBALL SHOWS ON TELEVISION

SEC Weekly on ESPNU

SEC Weekly, a one-hour program will air Thursdays at 4:30 p.m. on ESPNU, throughout the academic year and will cover SEC sports, including sport-by-sport previews, reviews, specials and features on student-athletes. The show will be hosted by Cara Capuano, who will anchor, and new analyst Matt Stinchcomb, a former University of Georgia All-America and NFL player. SEC Weekly is a product of ESPN's landmark 15-year agreement with the Southeastern Conference. ESPNU will complement the show with SEC game telecasts, including football, basketball, Olympic sports and select conference championships.

SEC Gridiron Live

SEC Gridiron LIVE, a 60-minute studio show offering game previews, expert analysis and a fast-paced social networking component that enables fan interaction, will air on FOX Sports South, FOX Sports Southwest and SUN Sports. The show is hosted by broadcasting veteran Charles Davis, with analysts Randy Cross and David Pollack and social media reporter Cassidy Hubbarth. The live studio show also incorporates a dynamic social networking component, providing viewers with the opportunity for lively and immediate interaction with the on-air broadcast team and SEC football fans across the country.

CBS will conclude its game coverage with the SEC Post Game Show on CBS College Sports.

SEC FOOTBALL VIDEO REPLAY

THE OBJECTIVE

To allow for specific types of officiating calls to be immediately reviewed during all games hosted by SEC teams.

THE COACHES' CHALLENGE

A new rule expands the ability of a head coach to challenge a reviewable play on the field. The head coach now retains a challenge if his initial challenge is successful and thus results in a reversal by the replay official. The coach will then have a single challenge that he may use anytime during the game if his team has not used all its timeouts. Thus a team may have a total of two challenges in the game, but only if the first results in a reversal of the on-field ruling.

THE SOURCE

All reviewable video comes direct from either the television network broadcasting the game (CBS Sports, ESPN, ESPN2, Lincoln Financial) or other TV production facilities that meet established conference standards. The Southeastern Conference has used instant replay since 2005.

THE PLAYS

Reviewable

1. Plays governed by Sideline, Goal Line, End Zone, and End Line:
 - a. Scoring Plays, including a runner breaking the plane of the goal line
 - b. Pass complete/incomplete/intercepted at sideline, goal and endlines
 - c. Runner/receiver in or out of bounds
 - d. Recovery of loose ball in and out of bounds
2. Passing Plays:
 - a. Pass ruled complete/ incomplete/ intercepted in the field of play and end zones
 - b. Touching of a forward pass by an ineligible receiver

THE PROCESS

Each SEC football stadium has a secured replay booth equipped with a DVSPORT Digital Replay System. Three individuals work in the booth for the duration of the game: 1. Replay Official, 2. Communicator, 3. Technician. The Replay Official is selected and assigned by the Conference Office.

A live video feed is sent directly to the replay booth. The Technician watches the feed on an input monitor while capturing/digitizing it into the DVSPORT Digital Replay System. The Technician also marks the beginning of each play as well as any replays as they occur in real time.

Each play and subsequent replay then appears on a touch screen in front of the Communicator. As the Technician marks the incoming video, each view (by mark) will appear as a small picture on the computer touch screen. At any time, the Communicator can touch/click on a thumbnail and immediately send that play/replay to the Replay Official.

With the Communicator's assistance, the Replay Official can quickly jump between replays while playing back the video. All replay video navigation is done via a remote device controlled by the Replay Official. All replays/video are viewed on an output monitor. The touch screen is only used to select the replays.

While most plays are reviewed between the whistle and the beginning of the next play, the Replay Official can stop play on the field by using a pager system. Five onfield officials wear pagers. If play is stopped the Referee announces on the stadium PA microphone that play has been stopped so the previous play can be reviewed. The Referee then proceeds to the sideline headset, which provides direct communication to the Replay Official in the booth. Once the play has been reviewed, the Replay Official notifies the Referee, who then announces the decision on the stadium PA system.

THE EQUIPMENT

Each SEC member institution uses the Digital Replay System developed by DVSPORT of Pittsburgh, Pa. The replay systems are maintained by the home institution with technical support from DVSPORT.

After seven weeks, SEC teams have scored 245 offensive touchdowns and 114 field goals. That equates to 68.2 percent of all offensive scores coming from touchdowns and 31.8 percent from field goals. It is the highest percentage of field goals in a single-season in the SEC since 1992, when SEC teams accounted for 172 field goals (35.3 percent) and 315 offensive touchdowns (64.7 percent).

SEC BOWL AGREEMENTS

The Southeastern Conference has agreements to send nine of its member institutions to postseason bowl games following the 2009 season. The winner of the SEC Championship Game will automatically participate in the Bowl Championship Series comprised of the Sugar, Rose, Orange and Fiesta Bowls.

The Capital One (2nd), will then make its pick following the BCS selections. The bowl must select the team with the next best overall record or a team that is within one win of the team with the next best overall record.

The Outback, Chick-fil-A and AT&T Cotton Bowls will work with the conference office to determine picks 3-5. The Cotton Bowl has the first preference of teams from the Western Division and the Outback Bowl has first preference of teams from the Eastern Division. The Cotton or Outback Bowl can select teams outside of its divisional preference, but must not select them before the opposite bowl selects from its divisional preference. The Chick-fil-A Bowl has the selection of preference following the Cotton and Outback Bowls.

In selections 6-7, the AutoZone Liberty and Gaylord Hotels Music City Bowls will make their selections, not in any specific order, but in consultation with the SEC Office. The Bowls will rank available qualified teams in order of preference. If there are no similarities in the order of selection, the bowls will be granted its selection. If the bowls rank the same teams in preference, the team involved in the process would get its preference of which bowl to participate.

The PetroSun Independence Bowl will receive the eighth selection and the Papajohns.com Bowl will have the ninth pick of available SEC teams.

BOWL CHAMPIONSHIP SERIES

The Bowl Championships Series is a five-game arrangement for post-season college football that is designed to match the two top-rated teams in a national championship game and to create exciting and competitive match-ups among eight other highly regarded teams in four other games.

The five bowl games are the Tostitos Fiesta Bowl, the FedEx Orange Bowl, the Rose Bowl Game presented by Citi, the Allstate Sugar Bowl and the BCS National Championship Game that is played at one of the bowl sites. The 2010 Citi BCS National Championship Game will be played in the Rose Bowl in Pasadena, Calif.

Unless a Southeastern Conference champion qualifies to play in the BCS National Championship Game, it will play in the Allstate Sugar Bowl.

Fox Sports will televise the Tostitos Fiesta Bowl, FedEx Orange Bowl and the Allstate Sugar Bowl at the conclusion of the 2009 regular season. ESPN/ABC will televise the Rose Bowl presented by Citi and the Citi BCS National Championship Game.

In the 11 previous years of the BCS, the Southeastern Conference holds a 12-5 mark in BCS games (.706) - the most wins of any other conference and the highest winning percentage of any conference participating in more than two BCS games.

In BCS National Championship Games, the SEC is 5-0 (1.000) and has more BCS titles than any other conference. The SEC has won BCS crowns in 1998 (Tennessee), 2003 (LSU), 2006 (Florida), 2007 (LSU) and 2008 (Florida).

In the history of the BCS, an SEC team has been in the BCS standings 328 times, second only to the Big 12 with 331. The SEC and the ACC have had 11 of its 12 teams ranked in the BCS standings at some point since 1998 - more than any other conference.

2008-09 ANOTHER BANNER ATHLETIC YEAR FOR THE SEC

The SEC claimed five national championships in the 2008-09 year, tying it with the total from the 2007-08 season.

In 10 of its 20 sponsored sports, the SEC had either the national champion or the national runners-up.

The SEC had national championships in football (Florida), men's swimming & diving (Auburn), women's indoor track & field (Tennessee), gymnastics (Georgia) and baseball (LSU). The SEC also had national runners-up finishes in men's golf (Arkansas), gymnastics (Alabama), softball (Florida), women's swimming & diving (Georgia) and men's indoor track & field (Florida).

In its 76 year history, the Southeastern Conference has won 179 team national championships, including 63 since 2000. In this decade, the SEC has won at least one national championship in 16 of its 20 sponsored sports with the exception of women's cross country, volleyball, soccer and softball.

SEC LEADS ALL CONFERENCES IN 2008-09 MEN'S SPORTS CONFERENCE VS. CONFERENCE SURVEY; 2nd in WOMEN'S SPORTS

In a statistical survey that is based on NCAA championship and rankings, the Southeastern Conference placed first in the nine men's sports it sponsors and second in the 11 women's sports the league sponsors.

The survey, compiled each year since 1986 by Bo Carter, takes into account final NCAA championship standings in each sport and poll rankings in football. Each conference gets 20 points for a team that wins a national championship, 19 for a second place finish and down to 1 point for a 20th place finish.

In the nine men's sports the SEC sponsors, the SEC had 440.5 points with the Pac-10 coming in second with 375 points, followed by the Big 12 with 337.5 points, ACC with 214 points, Big East 102.5 points and the Big Ten with 80 points.

In the 11 women's sports the SEC sponsors, the Pac-10 was first with 615 points followed by the SEC with 431 points, the Big 12 with 337 points, Big Ten with 318.5 points, ACC with 277.5 points and the Big East with 161.5 points.

Combining the 20 sponsored sports, the Pac-10 had 990 points followed by the SEC with 806 points, Big 12 with 674.5 points, ACC with 491.5 points, Big Ten with 398.5 points and the Big East with 264 points.

The SEC has had the highest men's point total in 15 of the last 17 seasons (exceptions: 2007-08: Big 12; 1997-98: Pac-10). The Pac-10 has had the highest women's point totals each year since 1986 with the exception of four years the SEC has had the highest total (1990-91; 1995-96; 2004-05; 2006-07).

SEC LEADS DIVISION I CONFERENCES IN MOST ESPN THE MAGAZINE CoSIDA ACADEMIC ALL-AMERICANS

The Southeastern Conference had 41 of its student-athletes each ESPN The Magazine Academic All-America Team mention, the most of any Division I conference in the nation.

The Academic All-America Program is administered and voted on by the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA).

The SEC had 15 student-athletes earn first-team mention, 14 earn second-team and 12 earn third-team mention.

The Big 12 was second with 38 total student athletes listed while the Big Ten was third at 34 and the ACC fourth at 26. The Big Ten led all conferences in first-team honorees with 18, followed by the SEC's 15.

Each SEC institution had at least one student-athlete earn first, second or third-team mention. Florida led the SEC with seven student-athletes on the lists while Tennessee had six, South Carolina and Arkansas had five each. Alabama, Florida and Tennessee each led the SEC with three on the various first-team lists.

Florida's Stacey Nelson (softball) and Tim Tebow (football) were named Academic All-Americans of the Year in their respective sports.

SEC LAUNCHES ACADEMIC NETWORK TO PROMOTE 12 MEMBER INSTITUTIONS

The 12 institutions of the Southeastern Conference institutions have joined together in the launch of the SEC Academic Network, a website (www.secacademicnetwork.com) designed to promote the academic programs of SEC universities. The SEC Academic Network is being established by the SEC in partnership with ESPN and the member universities.

The Academic Network, developed using technology and coordination from ESPN Digital Media and Origin Digital, will feature content from every institution ranging from research, innovation and economic development to community partnerships, civic engagement and service.

"Our commitment to highlight the accomplishments of SEC member institution's academic programs was a key component of our new television agreements," said SEC Commissioner Mike Slive. "We are grateful to ESPN for providing the technology, expertise and tools they use in sports media to our institutions in support of academic pursuits."

Each institution has its own page on the website that includes videos categorized by topic. Alumni, fans and students worldwide will have the ability to learn more about SEC academics in one place through video features that are posted by the league institutions.

The Academic Network is a component of the SEC's 15-year television package with ESPN, which is the most comprehensive in the history of intercollegiate athletics. Also part of ESPN's commitment to SEC academic programs is the production of an annual Campus Connection telecast at each SEC institution, in which students take part in the production; telecasts of two programs annually dedicated to the academic accomplishments of SEC student-athletes; a weekly academic feature segment on ESPN's SEC show; and selection of one undergraduate student from every SEC institution to participate in ESPN's summer internship program.

SEC SPORTSMANSHIP STATEMENT

- The SEC has developed a sportsmanship statement for its institutions to follow. It states:

"Coaches and student-athletes of a member institution, as well as individuals employed by or associated with that institution, including alumni, fans, patrons and boosters, shall conduct themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their behavior shall at all times reflect the high standards of honor and dignity that characterize participation in the collegiate setting. For intercollegiate athletics to promote the character development of participants, to enhance the integrity of higher education and to promote civility in society, coaches, student-athletes and all others associated with these athletics programs and events should adhere to such fundamental values as respect, fairness, civility, honesty and responsibility. These values should be manifested not only in athletics participation but also in the broad spectrum of activities affecting the athletics program. It is the responsibility of each member institution to establish policies for sportsmanship and ethical conduct in intercollegiate athletics consistent with the educational mission and goals of the institution. Furthermore, member institutions are responsible for educating on a continuing basis all constituencies about these policies."

THE COACHES

Bobby Petrino is in his second season at Arkansas with a record of 8-10 (.444) and seventh overall with a record of 52-29 (.642). The Razorbacks' offensive coordinator is Paul Petrino and the defensive coordinator is Willie Robinson.

Houston Nutt is in his second season at Ole Miss with a record of 13-6 (.684) and 17th overall with a record of 124-76 (.620). The Rebels' offensive coordinator is Kent Austin and the defensive coordinator is Tyrone Nix.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN ARKANSAS HAS THE BALL

Arkansas has emerged this year as the SEC's top passing attack, led by first-year quarterback Ryan Mallett. He has completed 103-of-187 passes for league highs of 1,646 yards and 14 TDs. Fellow sophomore Greg Childs has been the top target with 25 catches for 480 yards and five scores. Michael Smith did not play in UA's last game at Florida due to injury and Dennis Johnson made his first start of the season and the third of his career. Against the Gators, Johnson carried the ball 14 times for 107 yards and averaged 7.5 yards per carry. Johnson finished the game with 246 all-purpose yards.

Ole Miss ranks third in the SEC and eighth in the nation in scoring defense, allowing just 13.0 points per game this year. Ole Miss is second in the SEC in sacks with 17 and a 2.83 per game average. The Rebels are averaging 3.25 per game over the last four games and posted four at Vanderbilt. Ole Miss notched a pair against Alabama and was also credited with seven QB pressures. Junior DE Kentrell Lockett is tied for second in the SEC with 4.0 sacks, while LB Patrick Trahan and DE Greg Hardy each boast 3.0. Junior S Johnny Brown tops the team and ranks 12th in the SEC in tackles at 6.8 per game.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN OLE MISS HAS THE BALL

The Hog defense leads the SEC in TFLs and ranks second in sacks, led by senior DT Malcolm Sheppard. The two-time team captain boasts 8.0 TFLs and 2.5 sacks. The Razorbacks are atop the league in turnover margin at +7. Jerry Franklin started his 18th-straight game against Florida. Against Florida, DeQuinta Jones made the first two sacks of his collegiate career. In addition, Jake Bequette forced the first fumble of his career and also had two sacks. Zach Stadther had a fumble recovery for the second-straight game.

Junior QB Jevan Snead passed for a season-high 240 yards against UAB on 15-for-22 passing with three TDs, which equaled his season high. His 65-yard TD toss to Markeith Summers is a season-long. Saturday marked Snead's third three-TD performance of the year and 10th multiple-TD outing in the last 12 games. Snead has topped 200 yards passing nine times in his two seasons as a Rebel. Senior WR Shay Hodge is third in the SEC in receiving yards (64.8 ypg) and fourth in receptions (4.3 rpg). Dexter McCluster ranks second on the team in both rushing (27.3 ypg) and receiving (16 rec, 198 yds).

SPECIAL TEAMS

Against UF, Dennis Johnson returned five kickoffs for 124 yards to bring his career total to 1,502 yards, which ranks second all-time in school history. Felix Jones holds the record with 1,749 from 2005-07. Dennis Johnson is second in the SEC and ranks eighth nationally with an average of 31.4 yards per kickoff return this season. Johnson has had four kickoff returns of 50-or-more yards this season. His 597 kickoff return yards rank as the fourth-highest single-season total in school history.

Senior K Joshua Shene is the lone SEC kicker that remains perfect in field goals, converting all five of his attempts this year including a pair from 40 or more yards. His streak of 88 straight PATs which stands as the second-longest in school history, came to an end at Vanderbilt as his third extra point attempt of the game was blocked. It marks Shene's only missed kick of the year. Freshman Jesse Grandy returned the opening kickoff of the UAB game 88 yards for a touchdown.

SERIES/GAME NOTES

Record: ARK, 29-25-1 • **Last:** Ole Miss, 23-21 (2008 at Fayetteville)

This game will mark the 56th meeting all-time between Ole Miss and Arkansas dating back to 1908... Ole Miss records show the Rebels trailing the series 25-29-1, while Arkansas' records indicate a 30-24-1 advantage for the Razorbacks... Arkansas claims a forfeit victory in a 1914 game that Ole Miss won 13-7... The two teams met almost yearly from 1937-1969 before the series took a hiatus until 1981... The two schools have played yearly since then, and Ole Miss is 10-17-1 against Arkansas since the series resumed... Arkansas holds a 10-7 edge since it joined the SEC in 1992 and had taken four straight prior to last year's 23-21 Rebel win in Fayetteville... Ole Miss holds a 5-3 all-time edge in Oxford matchups, but have dropped the last two in the series at Vaught-Hemingway Stadium.

THE COACHES

Lane Kiffin is in his first season at Tennessee and in his third season overall with a record of 8-18 (.308). The Volunteers' offensive coordinator is Jim Chaney and Monte Kiffin serves as the defensive coordinator.

Nick Saban is in his second season at Alabama with a record of 26-8 (.765) and 16th overall with a record of 132-67-1 (.663). The Crimson Tide's offensive coordinator is Jim McElwain and the defensive coordinator is Kirby Smart.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN TENNESSEE HAS THE BALL

Senior tailback Montario Hardesty is the feature back in UT's offense after three seasons as a backup. In six starts during the 2009 season, Hardesty has produced rushing efforts of 160, 89, 96, 140, 90 and 97 yards and scored six rushing touchdowns, one in each game. The New Bern, N.C., native is averaging 112.0 yards per game and 5.4 yards per carry. He currently ranks 12th in the nation and fourth in the SEC in rushing yards per game. He is on pace for 1,344 rushing yards in 2009. In his last two games, Jonathan Crompton has completed 40 of 70 passes for 569 yards and six touchdowns vs. just one interception.

Rolando McClain leads the Crimson Tide with 49 total tackles and 32 solo stops. He has 6.5 tackles for loss (-28), two sacks (-19), two interceptions, a pass breakup, a forced fumble and seven quarterback hurries. Terrence Cody boasts 15 tackles, including 5.0 tackles for loss (-10) a pass breakup and two quarterback hurries. Linebacker Eryk Anders leads the Crimson Tide with 4.0 sacks (-35 yards) while defensive end Marcell Dareus has 3.5 sacks (-25). Cornerback Javier Arenas is third on the team with three sacks (-31 yards). Alabama has not allowed a touchdown in eight quarters.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN ALABAMA HAS THE BALL

Rico McCoy led the team in tackles for the third-straight game vs. Georgia, posting nine stops to go with a pass break-up and a quarterback hurry. He leads the team at the halfway point with 53 stops after posting 87 a year ago. His 53 tackles (8.8 per game) rank fourth in the SEC as well. While Eric Berry is second nationally among active players in interceptions with 13, he is also second on the team and seventh in the SEC in tackles with 50, an average of 8.3 per game. He is also tied for third on the team in tackles for loss with 4.5 for eight yards.

Mark Ingram has rushed for 905 yards and eight touchdowns through seven games this season for 129.29 yards per game average to rank fourth nationally and first in the SEC in rushing. Ingram has also added 19 receptions for 186 yards and three scores. Greg McElroy has been impressive in his first seven games as the Crimson Tide's starting quarterback, completing 59.5 percent (103 of 173) of his passes for 1,325 yards and nine touchdowns with only three interceptions. The junior boasts a 137.57 passing efficiency rating, which ranks 40th nationally and fourth in the SEC. Trent Richardson has rushed for 359 yards and four touchdowns on just 66 attempts.

SPECIAL TEAMS

After starting off the 2008 season a shaky one-of-four in field goal attempts, UT placekicker Daniel Lincoln has hit eight of 10 attempts thus far in the 2009 campaign. He converted on a career-long field 49-yard field goal to seal Tennessee's win over Ohio and made 26-yard and 30-yard kicks in the last two games. He has now made a field goal in five-straight contests. After not having to punt in the season opener, Chad Cunningham has kicked 23 times for a 41.8-yard average.

Alabama senior placekicker Leigh Tiffin is rapidly moving up the Alabama career scoring chart. After the conclusion of the South Carolina game, when he kicked two field goals and scored eight points, the Muscle Shoals, Ala., native has 325 career points. He sits in third place just one point behind Michael Proctor (326) for second place. Arenas is the NCAA active leader in career punt returns, yards, touchdowns, returns per game and yards per game.

Alabama holds a 48-36-7 advantage in the all-time series dating to 1901, but the series is tied at 4-4 in games played in Tuscaloosa... Bobby Johnson is in his eighth season at Vanderbilt with a record of 29-62 (.319) and in his 16th season overall with a record of 89-98 (.476). Ted Cain serves as the offensive coordinator and the defensive coordinator is Jaime Bryant.

Steve Spurrier is in his fifth season at South Carolina with a record of 33-24 (.579) and in his 25th season overall with a record of 222-105-2 (.678). Spurrier serves as the Gamecocks' offensive coordinator and the defensive coordinator is Lorenzo Ward.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN VANDERBILT HAS THE BALL

Warren Norman moved into the all-time Top Ten for freshmen rushers against Georgia after gaining 52 yards. Norman's freshman teammate, Zac Stacy, needs 112 yards to join Norman on the Top Ten list. Norman passed Lonnie Sadler (423 yards, 1972), Ray Perkins (425 yards, 2000) and Everett Crawford (434 yards, 1984) in the Georgia game. Norman also was the 'Dores' leading rusher against the Bulldogs. He was also the team's leader with 150 all-purpose yards: 52 rushing, 71 on kickoff returns, 27 on two pass receptions. Norman ranks third in the SEC in all-purpose yardage (153.4 yards), sixth in kickoff return average (25.9 yards) and ninth in rushing (64.3 yards).

Eric Norwood, with six sacks this season, leads the SEC in that category and is tied for 25th in the NCAA. He is fifth in the league with 6.5 total tackles for loss. He has played in all 45 games over the past three seasons and has made 32 consecutive starts. Junior free safety Chris Culliver is third on the squad with 43 tackles, including 29 over the last four games. Darian Stewart is fourth on the squad with 33 stops including a season-high 11 against Georgia. He also has recorded 4.0 tackles for loss. Cliff Matthews is third in the SEC in tackles for loss. Matthews' 4.0 sacks this season has already surpassed his career total coming into the season.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN SOUTH CAROLINA HAS THE BALL

The Vanderbilt unit ranks among the SEC's top six in total defense, scoring defense, pass defense and pass defense efficiency, and first downs allowed. Vanderbilt ranks 24th nationally – and fourth in the SEC – with a turnover margin of plus-5. Chris Marve contributed a game-high nine tackles versus Georgia, including one for loss. He has at least nine tackles in five of his last six games. Marve leads the SEC with three forced fumbles and ranks second in the league with 65 total tackles. Greg Billinger has 2.5 sacks on the year, matching his previous single-season high.

Stephen Garcia has completed 57.6 percent of his passes this season (129-for-224) for 1,482 yards with nine touchdowns and just four interceptions. Kenny Miles, the team's leading rusher, has started the last two games. He is averaging 5.1 yards per carry, rushing 60 times for 308 yards and a touchdown. Alshon Jeffery again led in receiving yards against Alabama with 83 in the game, including a career-long 52-yard reception in the second quarter.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Placekicker Ryan Fowler tied a career-long field goal by hitting a 41-yarder early in the second quarter. The first-year kicker is converted on 66.7% of his attempts (8 of 12), including his last three. Senior punter Brett Upson averaged 46.4 yards on seven attempts, and added a successful fake in the first half, running seven yards for a first down. Since struggling in the season opener against Western Carolina, Upson has averaged 44.8 yards per punt in his last six games, pushing his season average to 42.3 yards. Only one punter in the nation is averaging more punts per game than Upson.

Spencer Lanning jumped into the field goal kicking role in a huge way, connecting on 5-of-5 field goal attempts at Georgia to tie a 19-year-old school record held by Collin Mackie. He ran his streak to 12 straight field goals made, as he hit his only attempt vs. Florida Atlantic, connected on all three attempts vs. Ole Miss, then made his only attempt vs. South Carolina State before hitting his first two at Alabama then missing on a 50-yard attempt in the fourth quarter. He is second in the SEC with his 12 field goals and is tied for ninth in the nation. He ranks third in the SEC and 35th in the country in punting, averaging 42.3 yards per punt with a long of 56 yards.

THE COACHES

Charlie Weatherbie is in his seventh season at ULM with a record of 29-47 (.382) and 17th overall with a record of 74-111 (.400). Weatherbie is the offensive coordinator, while Troy Reffett serves as the defensive coordinator.

Rich Brooks is in his seventh season at Kentucky with a record of 35-44 (.443) and 19th overall with a record of 126-153-4 (.452). The Wildcats' offensive coordinator is Randy Sanders and Steve Brown serves as the defensive coordinator.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN ULM HAS THE BALL

LaGregory Sapp leads the team averaging 18.7 yards per catch this season. Sapp made his return to the Sun Belt Conference in style catching seven passes for 96 yards in the Warhawks 27-25 victory at Florida Atlantic. He followed that up with four catches for 82 yards against FIU and a 48-yard touchdown reception against Arkansas State. Darrell McNeal ranks 14th in the nation with a catch in 28 straight games. Frank Goodin has already rushed for nine touchdowns this season, 1.5 per game, to rank eighth in the nation and second in the Sun Belt Conference.

Senior linebacker Sam Maxwell currently ranks tied for fourth in the SEC and ranks 23rd nationally in passes defended, averaging 1.17 per game. Corey Peters has 122 tackles in his career, including 22.5 tackles for loss and 10.5 quarterback sacks. He currently ranks sixth in tackles for loss in the SEC and tied for sixth in sacks. The Wildcats linebackers are paced by senior Micah Johnson, who leads the team in tackles with 38 stops. The first-team Coaches All-SEC team selection last season currently ranks fifth in the SEC in tackles per game. Trevard Lindley currently is tied for fourth in the SEC in passes defended with 1.25 per game. He also is the only defensive player to score a touchdown for the Wildcats this season.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN KENTUCKY HAS THE BALL

Senior linebackers Cardia Jackson and Josh Thomas have started a combined 69 games in their careers. Thomas has started 30 consecutive games, while Jackson has 39 career starts under his belt. Senior all-conference safety Greg James is on pace to set the ULM career interception record this season. James finished 2007 tied for 28th nationally after averaging 0.42 interceptions per game. He is currently tied for third all-time in ULM history and tied for fourth in Sun Belt history with 13 career picks. Through six games this season, Aaron Morgan has already passed his sack total from last season. He has seven sacks on the season to rank seventh in the nation. He is also 15th among all active players in the NCAA with 20 career sacks.

WR Randall Cobb also is a proven all-purpose threat for the Wildcats this season. The sophomore ranks in the SEC's top 10 in receptions per game (7th - 4.0), receiving yards per game (10th - 53.7), scoring (T-2nd - 7.0 ppg), punt return average (3rd - 8.9), and all-purpose yards (5th - 129.5 per game). Morgan Newton earned his first career start vs. Auburn and completed 5-of-13 passes for 39 yards. Derrick Locke rushed 19 times for a career-high 126 yards against Auburn. It marked the first 100-yard game of his career.

SPECIAL TEAMS

McNeal ranks among the NCAA's best in several career categories for active players: 7th in punt returns (56) and 20th in punt returns/game (1.4). Speedster Luther Ambrose leads the Warhawks averaging 9.3 yards per rush and 22.4 yards per kickoff return, and ranks third averaging 14.8 yards per reception. He is averaging 16.4 yards every time he touches the ball in 2009.

Locke leads the SEC and ranks 14th nationally in all-purpose yards (162.0) and leads the SEC and ranks sixth nationally in kick return average (32.1 per runback). Senior Lones Seiber is UK's all-time leading scorer with 265 career points. Ryan Tydlacka is averaging 39.1 yards per punt, a mark that ranks 10th in the SEC. He saw brief action last year at field goal duties, making 3-of-6 field goals, including a 51-yarder.

THE COACHES

Gene Chizik is in his first season at Auburn and third overall with a record of 10-21 (.323). The Tigers' offensive coordinator is Gus Malzahn and the defensive coordinator is Ted Roof.

Les Miles is in his fifth season at LSU with a record of 47-12 (.797) and ninth overall with a record of 75-33 (.694). The Tigers' offensive coordinator is Gary Crowton and the defensive coordinator is John Chavis.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN AUBURN HAS THE BALL

Running back Ben Tate is having a stellar senior season, ranking second in the SEC and seventh nationally averaging 122.3 yards per game. Tate has five 100-yard rushing games this season, which is the most by an Auburn player since Kenny Irons had eight in 2005. Tate has also added 11 catches for 66 yards and four kick returns for 121 yards (30.2 yards per return). His average of 149.0 all-purpose yards per game ranks 22nd nationally. Onterio McCalebb is seventh in the SEC averaging 65.9 yards rushing per game. Chris Todd ranks 17th in the nation in yards per completion (13.61) and 37th nationally in passing efficiency (149.45).

Defensively, LSU's trio of linebackers - Kelvin Sheppard (44 tackles), Perry Riley (42) and Harry Coleman (38) lead the Tigers in tackles. LSU goes into the Auburn game having intercepted a pass in eight straight games. You don't have to look any further than brothers Chad Jones and Rahim Alem (formerly Al Jones) to see who's been the key to LSU's success on defense this year. Alem is the unquestioned leader of the Tiger defensive front, while Jones is the quarterback in the secondary for the Tigers. Alem, a defensive end, leads the Tigers in both tackles for losses (4.5-19 yards) and sacks (2-12 yards), while Jones, the free safety, is first on the squad in interceptions (2) and he's fourth in total tackles (35).

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN LSU HAS THE BALL

Craig Stevens leads the team and ranks third in the SEC with 62 tackles, while Josh Byrnes is sixth with 60. Both players have also recorded interceptions, while Stevens leads the team with 5.5 tackles for loss and Byrnes recorded a safety against Ball State. Stevens has recorded double-digit tackles in three of his last five games, including a career high 12 at Arkansas. Antonio Coleman has 24 tackles including 5.0 tackles for loss, 2.5 sacks, an interception which he returned for a touchdown against Mississippi State and a fumble recovery. Coleman ranks tied for sixth in school history with 17.0 career sacks.

LSU QB Jordan Jefferson is fifth in the SEC in pass efficiency, having completed 91 of 145 passes for 1,016 yards, seven touchdowns and only three interceptions. LSU's Brandon LaFell and Terrance Toliver form the SEC's top receiving tandem as the duo has combined for 52 receptions for 686 yards and seven TDs. LaFell's third in the SEC in receptions per game (4.5) as he's caught 27 passes for 326 yards and five scores. Toliver is fifth in the SEC with 4.2 catches per game (25 for 356 yards, 2 TDs). Charles Scott leads LSU's rushing game with 327 yards and a pair of touchdowns.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Junior Wes Byrum has excelled during his junior season, connecting on 11-of-12 field goals and all 29 extra point attempts. Among kickers who have attempted at least 10 field goals, Byrum's percentage of .917 ranks tied for third nationally. Byrum, who ranks fifth in school history with 39 career made field goals, is tied for third in the SEC with 11 field goals and third in scoring with 62 points. He made a career-high four field goals in a 26-22 win at Tennessee, earning SEC Special Teams Player of the Week honors.

Jones' 93-yard punt return for a touchdown early in the fourth quarter against Mississippi State ranks as the second-longest punt return in school history. Eddie Kennison holds the school record with a 100-yard return against Mississippi State in Tiger Stadium in 1994. By returning a punt for a TD, LSU now has two punt returners on its roster - Jones and Trindon Holliday - who have returned at least one punt for a touchdown during their career.

THE COACHES

Urban Meyer is in his fifth season at Florida with a record of 50-9 (.847) and in his ninth season overall with a record of 89-17 (.840). The Gators' offensive coordinator is Steve Addazio and the defensive coordinator is Charlie Strong.

Dan Mullen is in his first season at MSU and overall. The Bulldogs' offensive coordinator is Les Koenning and the defensive coordinator is Carl Torbush.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN FLORIDA HAS THE BALL

Tim Tebow has rushed for five touchdowns this season, bringing him to 48 for his career, good for second on the all-time SEC list and just one shy of Herschel Walker. Tebow's career rating of 172.6 currently ranks No. 1 in SEC history (min. 300 completions). Tebow has thrown a touchdown pass in 32 of his 33 career starts. Jeff Demps paces the Gators with 444 yards and five rushing touchdowns and an 8.4 yards-per-carry average. Florida receivers led by Aaron Hernandez, who has 360 yards on 28 grabs and two touchdowns. Riley Cooper leads UF with three receiving touchdowns.

Pernell McPhee has six tackles for loss and 2.5 sacks, and K.J. Wright leads the defense with 47 tackles. Corey Broomfield recorded two fourth-quarter interceptions which were the second and third of his career. The first was a 43 yard interception return for a touchdown against Jackson State. He is tied for first in the SEC and 36th nationally. Freshman Johnthan Banks also recorded his first two career interceptions at MTSU, both coming in the fourth quarter. Jamar Chaney is second on the team with 46 tackles, including 2.0 TFLs, 1.5 sacks and one interception.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN MISSISSIPPI STATE HAS THE BALL

Carlos Dunlap has recorded two sacks, three tackles for loss, two pass breakups and 16 tackles (eight solo) on the season. Jermaine Cunningham's four tackles for loss against Arkansas were the most by a UF defensive lineman since 2001. The UF linebacker corps has started Brandon Spikes, Ryan Stamper and A.J. Jones in every game this season. That trio paced the Gators in tackles against LSU, with Spikes posting a season-best 11, Jones a career-high 10 and Stamper adding nine. Of the five typical starters in the Florida secondary, four have at least one interception in 2009.

With a 57-yard touchdown run in last weekend's victory over MTSU, senior running back Anthony Dixon surpassed Jerious Norwood's school record of 3,212 rushing yards. Dixon now has 3,299 yards and ranks 17th in SEC history. Dixon has racked up 696 yards in six games this season, good for an average of 116.0 yards per game - 10th highest in the nation and third in the SEC. The Bulldogs average 390.3 yards of total offense per game, which would be the second highest in school history.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Caleb Sturgis drilled a 27-yard field goal with nine seconds remaining to lift UF to a 23-20 victory over Arkansas. It marked the first game-winner by a Gator kicker since Matt Leach hit a 33-yarder in the final minute of the 16-13 victory over Georgia in 2003. Sturgis went 3-for-4 against Arkansas, including a 51-yarder. Brandon James has 11 punt returns of 30 yards or more in his career, including four punt return touchdowns of 74-plus yards.

Leon Berry boasts a 26.3 kick return average, including one for an 89-yard touchdown, the fourth-longest kick return in the SEC this year. He also had one return for a TD called back due to penalty versus Vanderbilt. Berry currently ranks fifth in the SEC and 27th nationally. Heath Hutchins has punted 30 times this season for a 40.4 yard average, including seven inside the 20 yard line and two of over 50 yards.
