### FEW SECONDS ON THE SEC SEC FOOTBALL RELEASE HIGHLIGHTS

- SEC Football Players of the Week for games of Oct. 31 are Miss. State RB Anthony Dixon (offense), Auburn DB Walt McFadden (defense), Florida PK Caleb Sturgis (special teams), Arkansas OG Mitch Petrus (offensive lineman), Auburn DE Antonio Coleman (defensive lineman) and Tennessee DB Janzen Jackson (freshman).

- Florida sealed a berth in the SEC Championship Game with its win over Georgia. It's the fourth earliest date that a team has clinched an SEC title spot.

- SEC has two of the top three teams and three of the top 10 in all of the major polls and rankings.

- Florida's Tim Tebow is now the SEC's career rushing touchdown leader with 51.

- Vanderbilt freshman Warren Norman tied an SEC single-season record with his third kickoff return for a touchdown against Georgia Tech.

- LSU recorded its 15th defensive shutout since 1992 against Tulane, tops in the SEC.

CBS Sports will showcase the top conference matchups each week of the package with the "SEC Game of the Week". The agreement also includes a prime time game and doubleheader opportunities. In addition, CBS Sports continues its coverage of SEC regular-season basketball.

In addition to the broadcast rights on CBS Sports, this comprehensive long-team deal includes certain digital, internet, wireless, Video-on-Demand, data and enhanced highlight rights across all CBS platforms, including CBS College Sports Network and CBSSports.com. Also, simulcasts of CBS Sports games will be available for distribution by the CBS College Sports Network.

### ESPN

ESPN has acquired rights to every SEC home football game (excluding those on the network broadcast package) and will serve as the exclusive national cable home and the syndication rightsholder for the conference.

**ESPN and ESPN2:** The networks will increase coverage by combining to televise a minimum of 20 SEC games annually, including Saturday night and two primetime Thursday matchups.

**ESPNU:** The 24-hour college sports network, which launched in March 2005, will present a package of SEC football for the first time, with a Saturday game-of-the-week (generally in primetime and a minimum of 13 games annually).

**SEC Network (ESPN Regional Television):** The nation's largest syndicator of collegiate sports programming, becomes the official over-the-air syndication home for the SEC and will feature a game-of-the-week package (generally at 12:30 p.m. ET), with a minimum of 13 games each season throughout the SEC footprint and beyond. In addition, ERT will produce and distribute a studio show.

**Also:** Simulcasts of SEC game telecasts will be offered on ESPN360.com. Live games will be simulcast on mobile phones. The agreement includes global rights to present live games and encore presentations on ESPN International. ESPN has acquired domestic Spanish-language rights for SEC football on ESPN Deportes (24-hour, U.S.-based network). **ESPN GamePlan, ESPN's** college football pay-per-view service, will offer SEC action. **ESPN Classic** may telecast select SEC live games as well as historic and immediate encore presentations. Extensive SEC content, including highlights, will be presented online ESPN.com.

### COMCAST/ CHARTER SPORTS SOUTHEAST

On May 21, 2009, Comcast / Charter Sports Southeast (CSS), the regional sports channel focusing on college sports in the southeast, announced it has reached a five-year agreement with ESPN to televise live Southeastern Conference (SEC) content including a minimum of six football games, twenty men's basketball games, and sixteen women's basketball games as well as fifty SEC Olympic sports each year. The agreement will begin with the 2009-10 academic year. Events and times will be announced as determined.

### FOX SPORTS NET

FOX Sports Net (FSN), the nation's leader in local sports, today announced a new multi-year television rights agreement with ESPN that expands its long-time partnership with the Southeastern Conference (SEC).

SEC Gridiron LIVE, a 60-minute studio show offering game previews, expert analysis and a fast-paced social networking component that enables fan interaction, will air on FOX Sports South, FOX Sports Southwest and SUN Sports. ## SEC FOOTBALL VIDEO REPLAY

### THE OBJECTIVE

To allow for specific types of officiating calls to be immediately reviewed during all games hosted by SEC teams.

### THE COACHES' CHALLENGE

A new rule expands the ability of a head coach to challenge a reviewable play on the field. The head coach now retains a challenge if his initial challenge is successful and thus results in a reversal by the replay official. The coach will then have a single challenge that he may use anytime during the game if his team has not used all its timeouts. Thus a team may have a total of two challenges in the game, but only if the first results in a reversal of the on-field ruling.

### THE SOURCE

All reviewable video comes direct from either the television network broadcasting the game (CBS Sports, ESPN, ESPN2, Lincoln Financial) or other TV production facilities that meet established conference standards. The Southeastern Conference has used instant replay since 2005.

### THE PLAYS

#### Reviewable

1. Plays governed by Sideline, Goal Line, End Zone, and End Line:
  - a. Scoring Plays, including a runner breaking the plane of the goal line
  - b. Pass complete/incomplete/intercepted at sideline, goal and endlines
  - c. Runner/receiver in or out of bounds
  - d. Recovery of loose ball in and out of bounds
2. Passing Plays:
  - a. Pass ruled complete/ incomplete/ intercepted in the field of play and end zones
  - b. Touching of a forward pass by an ineligible receiver
  - c. Touching of a forward pass by a defensive player
  - d. Quarterback (Passer) forward pass or fumble (if ruled incomplete, play is finalized)
  - e. Illegal forward pass or illegal handing off beyond the line of scrimmage
  - f. Illegal forward pass or illegal handing off after change of possession
  - g. Forward or backward pass thrown from behind the line of scrimmage
  - h. Quarterback (Passer) starts arm forward, ball comes loss and play is ruled incomplete (if ball is quickly recovered)
  - i. Quarterback (Passer) throws incomplete swing pass that is close to being forward or backward, and pass is ruled forward (if ball is quickly recovered)
3. Other Detectable Infractions:
  - a. Runner ruled not down.
  - b. Runner ruled down (when ball carrier is judged down by rule and the ball is fumbled, play may be reviewed if recovery of ball occurs in the immediate action following fumble and is prior to any official signaling ball is dead. Also reviewable when runner is ruled out of bounds near goal line.)
  - c. Forward progress with respect to first down
  - d. Touching of a kick
  - e. Number of players on field
  - f. Clock adjustments (in conjunction with overturned plays)
  - g. Fourth-down/try fumble plays
  - h. Field Goal Attempts (only when ball is ruled below or above the crossbar, inside or outside the uprights when it is lower than the top of the uprights.)

### THE PROCESS

Each SEC football stadium has a secured replay booth equipped with a DVSPORT Digital Replay System. Three individuals work in the booth for the duration of the game: 1. Replay Official, 2. Communicator, 3. Technician. The Replay Official is selected and assigned by the Conference Office.

A live video feed is sent directly to the replay booth. The Technician watches the feed on an input monitor while capturing/digitizing it into the DVSPORT Digital Replay System. The Technician also marks the beginning of each play as well as any replays as they occur in real time.

Each play and subsequent replay then appears on a touch screen in front of the Communicator. As the Technician marks the incoming video, each view (by mark) will appear as a small picture on the computer touch screen. At any time, the Communicator can touch/click on a thumbnail and immediately send that play/replay to the Replay Official.

With the Communicator's assistance, the Replay Official can quickly jump between replays while playing back the video. All replay video navigation is done via a remote device controlled by the Replay Official. All replays/video are viewed on an output monitor. The touch screen is only used to select the replays.

While most plays are reviewed between the whistle and the beginning of the next play, the Replay Official can stop play on the field by using a pager system. Five onfield officials wear pagers. If play is stopped the Referee announces on the stadium PA microphone that play has been stopped so the previous play can be reviewed. The Referee then proceeds to the sideline headset, which provides direct communication to the Replay Official in the booth. Once the play has been reviewed, the Replay Official notifies the Referee, who then announces the decision on the stadium PA system.

### THE EQUIPMENT

Each SEC member institution uses the Digital Replay System developed by DVSPORT of Pittsburgh, Pa. The replay systems are maintained by the home institution with technical support from DVSPORT.

**THREE-OR-MORE SEC TEAMS IN SINGLE WEEK AP TOP TEN SINCE 1992**

In every season since expansion (1992), the SEC has had at least one week where three teams were ranked in a single AP poll. In only two of those years, there was only one week.

This season, the SEC has had four teams in the AP Top 10 for weeks 2-3.

Since 1992, the SEC has had three-or-more teams ranked the AP Top 10 in 124 weeks, including 21 with four-or-more teams and one with five teams. In the 298 weeks of the AP poll since 1992, the SEC has had three-or-more teams in the top ten 41.6 percent of the time.

This week, the SEC has the top two teams in the AP poll and three in the top 10.

**SEC KICKERS GETTING A WORKOUT**

After nine weeks, SEC teams have scored 302 offensive touchdowns and 141 field goals. That equates to 68.2 percent of all offensive scores coming from touchdowns and 31.8 percent from field goals. It is the highest percentage of field goals in a single-season in the SEC since 1992, when SEC teams accounted for 172 field goals (35.3 percent) and 315 offensive touchdowns (64.7 percent).

Should Alabama win, it would have a 6-0 conference record and only LSU would be able to reach the six win number. Since Alabama would have defeated the Tigers, the Crimson Tide would win the tie-breaker.

## SEC BOWL AGREEMENTS

The Southeastern Conference has agreements to send nine of its member institutions to postseason bowl games following the 2009 season. The winner of the SEC Championship Game will automatically participate in the Bowl Championship Series comprised of the Sugar, Rose, Orange and Fiesta Bowls.

The Capital One (2nd), will then make its pick following the BCS selections. The bowl must select the team with the next best overall record or a team that is within one win of the team with the next best overall record.

The Outback, Chick-fil-A and AT&T Cotton Bowls will work with the conference office to determine picks 3-5. The Cotton Bowl has the first preference of teams from the Western Division and the Outback Bowl has first preference of teams from the Eastern Division. The Cotton or Outback Bowl can select teams outside of its divisional preference, but must not select them before the opposite bowl selects from its divisional preference. The Chick-fil-A Bowl has the selection of preference following the Cotton and Outback Bowls.

In selections 6-7, the AutoZone Liberty and Gaylord Hotels Music City Bowls will make their selections, not in any specific order, but in consultation with the SEC Office. The Bowls will rank available qualified teams in order of preference. If there are no similarities in the order of selection, the bowls will be granted its selection. If the bowls rank the same teams in preference, the team involved in the process would get its preference of which bowl to participate.

The PetroSun Independence Bowl will receive the eighth selection and the Papajohns.com Bowl will have the ninth pick of available SEC teams.

### BOWL CHAMPIONSHIP SERIES

The Bowl Championships Series is a five-game arrangement for post-season college football that is designed to match the two top-rated teams in a national championship game and to create exciting and competitive match-ups among eight other highly regarded teams in four other games.

The five bowl games are the Tostitos Fiesta Bowl, the FedEx Orange Bowl, the Rose Bowl Game presented by Citi, the Allstate Sugar Bowl and the BCS National Championship Game that is played at one of the bowl sites. The 2010 Citi BCS National Championship Game will be played in the Rose Bowl in Pasadena, Calif.

Unless a Southeastern Conference champion qualifies to play in the BCS National Championship Game, it will play in the Allstate Sugar Bowl.

Fox Sports will televise the Tostitos Fiesta Bowl, FedEx Orange Bowl and the Allstate Sugar Bowl at the conclusion of the 2009 regular season. ESPN/ABC will televise the Rose Bowl presented by Citi and the Citi BCS National Championship Game.

In the 11 previous years of the BCS, the Southeastern Conference holds a 12-5 mark in BCS games (.706) - the most wins of any other conference and the highest winning percentage of any conference participating in more than two BCS games.

In BCS National Championship Games, the SEC is 5-0 (1.000) and has more BCS titles than any other conference. The SEC has won BCS crowns in 1998 (Tennessee), 2003 (LSU), 2006 (Florida), 2007 (LSU) and 2008 (Florida).

In the history of the BCS, an SEC team has been in the BCS standings 328 times, second only to the Big 12 with 331. The SEC and the ACC have had 11 of its 12 teams ranked in the BCS standings at some point since 1998 - more than any other conference.

## THIS IS THE SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE

### 2008-09 ANOTHER BANNER ATHLETIC YEAR FOR THE SEC

The SEC claimed five national championships in the 2008-09 year, tying it with the total from the 2007-08 season.

In 10 of its 20 sponsored sports, the SEC had either the national champion or the national runners-up.

The SEC had national championships in football (Florida), men's swimming & diving (Auburn), women's indoor track & field (Tennessee), gymnastics (Georgia) and baseball (LSU). The SEC also had national runners-up finishes in men's golf (Arkansas), gymnastics (Alabama), softball (Florida), women's swimming & diving (Georgia) and men's indoor track & field (Florida).

In its 76 year history, the Southeastern Conference has won 179 team national championships, including 63 since 2000. In this decade, the SEC has won at least one national championship in 16 of its 20 sponsored sports with the exception of women's cross country, volleyball, soccer and softball.

### SEC LEADS ALL CONFERENCES IN 2008-09 MEN'S SPORTS CONFERENCE VS. CONFERENCE SURVEY; 2nd in WOMEN'S SPORTS

In a statistical survey that is based on NCAA championship and rankings, the Southeastern Conference placed first in the nine men's sports it sponsors and second in the 11 women's sports the league sponsors.

The survey, compiled each year since 1986 by Bo Carter, takes into account final NCAA championship standings in each sport and poll rankings in football. Each conference gets 20 points for a team that wins a national championship, 19 for a second place finish and down to 1 point for a 20th place finish.

In the nine men's sports the SEC sponsors, the SEC had 440.5 points with the Pac-10 coming in second with 375 points, followed by the Big 12 with 337.5 points, ACC with 214 points, Big East 102.5 points and the Big Ten with 80 points.

In the 11 women's sports the SEC sponsors, the Pac-10 was first with 615 points followed by the SEC with 431 points, the Big 12 with 337 points, Big Ten with 318.5 points, ACC with 277.5 points and the Big East with 161.5 points.

Combining the 20 sponsored sports, the Pac-10 had 990 points followed by the SEC with 806 points, Big 12 with 674.5 points, ACC with 491.5 points, Big Ten with 398.5 points and the Big East with 264 points.

The SEC has had the highest men's point total in 15 of the last 17 seasons (exceptions: 2007-08: Big 12; 1997-98: Pac-10). The Pac-10 has had the highest women's point totals each year since 1986 with the exception of four years the SEC has had the highest total (1990-91; 1995-96; 2004-05; 2006-07).

### SEC LEADS DIVISION I CONFERENCES IN MOST ESPN THE MAGAZINE CoSIDA ACADEMIC ALL-AMERICANS

The Southeastern Conference had 41 of its student-athletes each ESPN The Magazine Academic All-America Team mention, the most of any Division I conference in the nation.

The Academic All-America Program is administered and voted on by the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA).

The SEC had 15 student-athletes earn first-team mention, 14 earn second-team and 12 earn third-team mention.

The Big 12 was second with 38 total student athletes listed while the Big Ten was third at 34 and the ACC fourth at 26. The Big Ten led all conferences in first-team honorees with 18, followed by the SEC's 15.

Each SEC institution had at least one student-athlete earn first, second or third-team mention. Florida led the SEC with seven student-athletes on the lists while Tennessee had six, South Carolina and Arkansas had five each. Alabama, Florida and Tennessee each led the SEC with three on the various first-team lists.

Florida's Stacey Nelson (softball) and Tim Tebow (football) were named Academic All-Americans of the Year in their respective sports.

### SEC LAUNCHES ACADEMIC NETWORK TO PROMOTE 12 MEMBER INSTITUTIONS

The 12 institutions of the Southeastern Conference institutions have joined together in the launch of the SEC Academic Network, a website ([www.secacademicnetwork.com](http://www.secacademicnetwork.com)) designed to promote the academic programs of SEC universities. The SEC Academic Network is being established by the SEC in partnership with ESPN and the member universities.

The Academic Network, developed using technology and coordination from ESPN Digital Media and Origin Digital, will feature content from every institution ranging from research, innovation and economic development to community partnerships, civic engagement and service.

"Our commitment to highlight the accomplishments of SEC member institution's academic programs was a key component of our new television agreements," said SEC Commissioner Mike Slive. "We are grateful to ESPN for providing the technology, expertise and tools they use in sports media to our institutions in support of academic pursuits."

Each institution has its own page on the website that includes videos categorized by topic. Alumni, fans and students worldwide will have the ability to learn more about SEC academics in one place through video features that are posted by the league institutions.

The Academic Network is a component of the SEC's 15-year television package with ESPN, which is the most comprehensive in the history of intercollegiate athletics. Also part of ESPN's commitment to SEC academic programs is the production of an annual Campus Connection telecast at each SEC institution, in which students take part in the production; telecasts of two programs annually dedicated to the academic accomplishments of SEC student-athletes; a weekly academic feature segment on ESPN's SEC show; and selection of one undergraduate student from every SEC institution to participate in ESPN's summer internship program.

### SEC SPORTSMANSHIP STATEMENT

- The SEC has developed a sportsmanship statement for its institutions to follow. It states:

"Coaches and student-athletes of a member institution, as well as individuals employed by or associated with that institution, including alumni, fans, patrons and boosters, shall conduct themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their behavior shall at all times reflect the high standards of honor and dignity that characterize participation in the collegiate setting. For intercollegiate athletics to promote the character development of participants, to enhance the integrity of higher education and to promote civility in society, coaches, student-athletes and all others associated with these athletics programs and events should adhere to such fundamental values as respect, fairness, civility, honesty and responsibility. These values should be manifested not only in athletics participation but also in the broad spectrum of activities affecting the athletics program. It is the responsibility of each member institution to establish policies for sportsmanship and ethical conduct in intercollegiate athletics consistent with the educational mission and goals of the institution. Furthermore, member institutions are responsible for educating on a continuing basis all constituencies about these policies."

Steve Spurrier is in his fifth season at South Carolina with a record of 34-25 (.576) and in his 25th season overall with a record of 223-106-2 (.677). Spurrier serves as the Gamecocks' offensive coordinator and the defensive coordinator is Lorenzo Ward.

Bobby Petrino is in his second season at Arkansas with a record of 9-11 (.450) and seventh overall with a record of 53-30 (.639). The Razorbacks' offensive coordinator is Paul Petrino and the defensive coordinator is Willie Robinson.

**WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN SOUTH CAROLINA HAS THE BALL**

Stephen Garcia has completed 57.3 percent of his passes this season (176-for-307) for 2,094 yards with 12 touchdowns and just five interceptions. Garcia is the only quarterback in the SEC to have topped 300 yards in a game on three occasions. Kenny Miles, the team's leading rusher, has become the chairman of the committee, starting the last four games. He is averaging 5.3 yards per carry, rushing 86 times for 454 yards and a touchdown. True freshman Alshon Jeffery is the Gamecocks' leading receiver with 28 catches for 497 yards, an average of 17.8 yards per catch, with five touchdowns. He ranks eighth in the SEC in receiving yards per game at 55.2.

Defensive tackle Malcolm Sheppard is fourth in the SEC with nine tackles for loss this season. His career total (35) are tied for seventh in school history. Sheppard has led the Razorbacks in tackles for loss each of the last two seasons. He has had at least half of a tackle for a loss in 15 of his last 16 games. Against Eastern Michigan, Freddy Burton had the first interception of his career and returned it 50 yards for a touchdown. Jerry Franklin finished with five tackles against Eastern Michigan. He has had five-or-more tackles in 16 of 20 games in his career. He has also recovered a fumble in two of his last five games.

**WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN ARKANSAS HAS THE BALL**

Eric Norwood, with six sacks this season, leads the SEC in that category and is tied for 46th in the NCAA. He is tied for eighth in the league with 8.5 total tackles for loss. The Gamecocks will play without team captain Cliff Matthews. Matthews suffered a sprained shoulder in the loss at Tennessee. He is seventh in the SEC in sacks, second in fumble recoveries and tied for third in fumbles forced. USC ranks third in the nation against the pass, allowing just 141.33 yards per game.

Ryan Mallett leads the SEC in total offense (268.6) and ranks 21st nationally. Mallett is second in the league in pass efficiency (153.09) and ninth in the nation. He is also first in the SEC in passing yards per game (268.5). Mallett is first in the SEC and tied for sixth nationally with 18 passing touchdowns this season. Broderick Green made the first start of his career against Eastern Michigan and finished the game with career-highs in carries (nine) and yards (134). He also had two rushing touchdowns and leads the team with six this season. After missing the last three games due to a medical reason, Joe Adams returned against Eastern Michigan and finished the game with three catches for 109 yards and two touchdowns.

**SPECIAL TEAMS**

Junior Spencer Lanning is handling both the punting and the placekicking responsibilities. Lanning jumped into the field goal kicking role in a huge way, connecting on 5-of-5 field goal attempts at Georgia to tie a 19-year old school record held by Collin Mackie. He ran his streak to 12 straight field goals made, as he hit his only attempt vs. Florida Atlantic, connected on all three attempts vs. Ole Miss, then made his only attempt vs. South Carolina State before hitting his first two at Alabama then missing on a 50-yard attempt in the fourth quarter. He is third in the SEC with his 14 field goals and is tied for 15th in the nation. Lanning ranks fifth in the SEC and 35th in the country in punting, averaging 42.2 yards per punt with a long of 56 yards. He is one of 42 punters on the Ray Guy Watch List.

Dennis Johnson ranks third in the SEC and ranks 16th nationally with an average of 29.1 yards per kickoff return this season. Johnson has had four kickoff returns of 50-or-more yards this season. His 787 kickoff return yards rank as the second-highest single-season total in school history. Against Eastern Michigan, Dennis Johnson returned three kickoffs for 68 yards to bring his career total to 1,692 yards, which ranks second all-time in school history.

Arkansas and South Carolina will meet for the 18th time and the Razorbacks hold a 10-7 edge in the previous 17 meetings... All 17 of the previous meetings were SEC games played since both institutions joined the league in football in time for the 1992 season... Arkansas is 3-1 all-time against South Carolina in Fayetteville... The game features the top two passing offenses in the SEC... UA leads the league (295.8), while USC is ranked second (237.0). UA is tied for seventh nationally and leads the conference in passing touchdowns this year (20).

**THE COACHES**

Watson Brown is in his third season at Tennessee Tech with a record of 13-18 (.419) and in his 25th season overall with a record of 106-170-1 (.384). Brown serves as the Golden Eagles' offensive coordinator and the defensive coordinator is Billy Taylor.

Mark Richt is in his ninth season at Georgia and overall with a record of 86-26 (.768). The Bulldogs' offensive coordinator is Mike Bobo and the defensive coordinators are Willie Martinez and John Jancek.

**WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN TENNESSEE TECH HAS THE BALL**

Offensively, sophomore Tim Benford had five receptions for 122 yards while quarterback Lee Sweeney finished with 188 passing yards and two touchdowns in the win over TSU. Benford leads the team with 25 receptions for 498 yards and two touchdowns.

Junior WLB Rennie Curran is second in the SEC with 9.9 tackles per game (79 tackles this year) and he has led the Bulldogs in all eight games. He is the top returning tackler in the SEC after recording 115 stops in 2008. The Bulldog defensive line features three seniors as Jeff Owens returns from a 2008 injury to rejoin Geno Atkins and Kade Weston. Brandon Boykin registered a career high seven tackles (all solo) to lead the Bulldogs against #1 Florida. Boykin had his second career interception and the team's third of the year in addition to four solo stops versus #4 LSU. Junior Reshad Jones tied Boykin for the team lead with seven tackles against the Gators. Justin Houston has tallied five sacks through six games, which is sixth in the SEC.

**WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN GEORGIA HAS THE BALL**

Redshirt freshman defensive back Caleb Mitchell led the Golden Eagles with a career performance against TSU. He tallied 13 tackles, 2.5 tackles for a loss, two sacks, two pass breakups, one forced fumble, one fumble recovery and one interception. Dusti Dillehay leads the team 63 tackles while also adding three interceptions and two TFLs. Kelechi Ordu leads the team with 5.5 TFLs, while Dedrick Miley has 4.0 sacks and 5.0 TFLs.

Georgia sophomore A.J. Green is building on a successful freshman season and is currently leading the SEC in total receiving yards (732), receiving yards per game (91.5) and rec. per game (5.5). His 732 yards ranks 19th in the nation. Joe Cox struggled against #1 Florida, throwing a career-high three interceptions. Although he did have two touchdown passes against the Gators, which doubled the total Florida had surrendered on the year. Georgia is looking for a consistent threat at tailback. The Bulldogs have had four different leading rushers through eight games. Sophomore Richard Samuel started the first six games and freshman Washaun Ealey has started the last two. Ealey had a career-high 71 yards against Vanderbilt and followed that up with 70 yards on 17 carries versus the Gators.

**SPECIAL TEAMS**

Timothy Donegan is 2-6 on field goals this season and has not made one over 28 yards. Maurice Wallace averages 32.1 yards per kickoff return, including a long of 81 yards. Henry Sailes returns punts with a 10.1 yard average per return. TTU has punted 49 times this season for a 37.4 yard average.

In his first season as a starter, redshirt sophomore Drew Butler is leading the NCAA with an average of 49.7 yards on 38 punts. The school record is 45.4 set in 1984 by Chip Andrews. Butler continued his success against #1 Florida by averaging 52.5 yards on four punts, including a 61 yarder. Redshirt sophomore SE Zach Renner blocked the third punt of his career late in the opening half against Tennessee for a safety. This ties Renner for the school record in punt blocks.

**THE COACHES**

Dean Hood is in his second season at Eastern Kentucky and overall with a record of 13-7 (.619). Mike Springston serves as the Colonels' offensive coordinator and the defensive coordinator is Hood.

Rich Brooks is in his seventh season at Kentucky with a record of 36-45 (.444) and 19th overall with a record of 127-154-4 (.453). The Wildcats' offensive coordinator is Randy Sanders and Steve Brown serves as the defensive coordinator.

**WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN EASTERN KENTUCKY HAS THE BALL**

Eastern rushed for a season-high 183 yards last week in the win over Southeast Missouri. Senior C.J. Walker led all Colonels with 81 yards on the ground and two touchdowns. Redshirt freshman quarterback T.J. Pryor has completed 63.6 percent of his passes in 2009, which is hovering right above the EKU single-season mark of 62.7 percent set by Lorenzo Fields in 1988. Senior wide receiver Garnett Phelps posted back-to-back 100-yard receiving games against UT Martin (Oct. 17) and Austin Peay (Oct. 24). He finished with personal highs in receptions (15) and receiving yards (119) at Austin Peay.

Corey Peters is the only returning starter in the defensive line. Peters has 129 tackles in his career, including 23.5 tackles for loss and 11.5 quarterback sacks. He currently ranks tied for 11th in tackles for loss in the SEC and tied for 10th in sacks. The Wildcats linebackers are paced by senior Micah Johnson, who leads the team in tackles with 66 stops. Despite a cast on his right hand due to a wrist injury, Danny Trevathan is UK's second-leading tackler with 55 tackles. Trevard Lindley has not seen action in the last four games because of a high-ankle injury sustained during the Alabama game on Oct. 3.

**WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN KENTUCKY HAS THE BALL**

Sophomore Jeremy Caldwell ranks first nationally in FCS football with seven interceptions. He recorded two picks in the season opener at Indiana and added his latest interception last week against Southeast Missouri. Sophomore defensive back Patrick McClellan was involved in three of the five turnovers caused by the Colonel defense against UT Martin on Oct. 17. He tallied his first two collegiate interceptions and also came away with a critical fumble recovery late in the fourth quarter which led to an EKU touchdown. Junior Antonio Fredrick and senior Chris Hall both recorded their 100th career tackle on Oct. 10 versus Tennessee State.

Against Mississippi State, Morgan Newton connected on a career high 11-of-18 pass attempts for a career-high 119 yards. He also scored on an 11-yard run, the second rushing TD of his career. Senior Alfonso Smith has rushed for 879 yards in his career and a 4.5-yard average per carry. Derrick Locke, a junior, has 1,421 career rushing yards with a 5.0 average per attempt. Locke ranks fifth in the SEC in rushing yards per game, averaging 74.6 yards per game. Randall Cobb leads UK and is eighth in the SEC in receptions per game. In eight games he has 30 catches for 381 yards for an average of 3.8 catches per game. He also has four TD receptions.

**SPECIAL TEAMS**

The Colonel special teams unit has blocked a kick (punt, field goal or PAT) in five straight games and six of the last seven contests. Junior Andrew Soucy leads the team with five blocks. EKU has nine blocks on the season which ranks first in the OVC.

Sophomore Ryan Tydlacka inherits full-time punting duties from departed All-SEC punter Tim Masthay. He is averaging 39.8 yards per punt, a mark that ranks ninth in the SEC. Senior Lones Seiber is UK's all-time leading scorer with 275 career points. The old career scoring record was 246 by Joey Worley. Locke leads the SEC and ranks 10th nationally in kickoff returns with a 31.23 average.

**THE COACHES**

Bobby Lamb is in his eighth season at Furman and overall with a record of 60-33 (.645). Tim Sorrells serves as the Paladins' offensive coordinator and the co-defensive coordinators are Jeff Farrington and Steve Wilson.

Gene Chizik is in his first season at Auburn and third overall with a record of 11-22 (.333). The Tigers' offensive coordinator is Gus Malzahn and the defensive coordinator is Ted Roof.

**WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN FURMAN HAS THE BALL**

Senior quarterback Jordan Sorrells has delivered solid play for the Paladins over the first eight games, throwing for 1,738 yards and 14 touchdowns while also rushing for 73 yards and a score. Tersoo Uhaa has found the end zone in seven of the Paladins' eight contests, including a 4-yard scoring run last Saturday against Appalachian State when he rushed 19 times for a career high 104 yards. Adam Mims the Paladins' leader receiver this year with 55 receptions for 613 yards and two touchdowns, continues his advance up the school's career receptions and receiving yards ledger.

Antonio Coleman, a first-team preseason All-SEC selection, has 35 tackles including a team best of 11.0 tackles for loss and 5.5 sacks, an interception which he returned for a touchdown against Mississippi State, a blocked kick, a forced fumble and a fumble recovery. Coleman is third in the SEC in tackles for loss and sixth in sacks, and he ranks fifth in Auburn history with 20.0 career sacks. Senior Walter McFadden leads the team with four interceptions this season, which ranks tied for second in the SEC and tied for 25th nationally. McFadden's four picks are tied for the most by an Auburn player in a single season since Junior Rosegreen had six in 2004.

**WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN AUBURN HAS THE BALL**

Furman sophomore linebacker Kadarron Anderson has proven to be quite a hit — literally — this year, especially in the Paladins' last four games when he has combined for 74 tackles. He currently leads the SoCon and ranks third nationally in tackles, averaging 12.5 per game. Kyle McKinney saw his first action of the season against Western Carolina on Sept. 26 after missing the entire preseason and first three games due to a fractured foot sustained in late July. A starter in seven games who tallied 24 tackles and 2.5 sacks a year ago, he moved back into the starting lineup against the Catamounts and registered three tackles.

Running back Ben Tate is having a stellar senior season, ranking third in the SEC and 11th nationally averaging 118.6 yards per game. With 1,067 yards rushing, Tate has posted the 18th 1,000-yard rushing season in Auburn history. He has six 100-yard rushing games this season, which is the most by an Auburn player since Kenny Irons had eight in 2005. Tate has also added 14 catches for 67 yards and five kick returns for 139 yards (27.8 yards per return). His average of 141.4 all-purpose yards per game ranks 27th nationally. Chris Todd ranks 22nd in the nation in yards per completion (13.51) and 46th nationally in passing efficiency (135.34). His 13 touchdown passes are tied for 34th most in the NCAA.

**SPECIAL TEAMS**

Spurred by a strong performance against Western Carolina on Sept. 26 when he converted all four field goal attempts and was named SoCon Special Teams Player of the Week following a 33-14 Furman victory, Furman placekicker Matthew Cesari continued his strong work by cashing in both field goal tries versus Elon, including a career long 46-yard effort in the third quarter. Though he missed a 39-yard try against Samford, snapping a string of six consecutive makes, Cesari is still having a fine year (8-of-10). Over the last 13 games, the senior left-footer has made 12 of 14 attempts. He is now 17-of-22 (77.3%) on field goal attempts for his career.

Junior Wes Byrum has excelled during his junior season, connecting on 13-of-14 field goals and all 34 extra point attempts. Among kickers who have attempted at least 10 field goals, Byrum's percentage of .929 ranks tied for fourth nationally. Byrum, who ranks fifth in school history with 41 career made field goals, is fourth in the SEC with 13 field goals and in scoring with 73 points. He made a career-high four field goals in a 26-22 win at Tennessee, earning SEC Special Teams Player of the Week honors.

**THE COACHES**

Les Miles is in his fifth season at LSU with a record of 49-12 (.803) and ninth overall with a record of 77-33 (.700). The Tigers' offensive coordinator is Gary Crowton and the defensive coordinator is John Chavis.

Nick Saban is in his second season at Alabama with a record of 27-8 (.771) and 16th overall with a record of 133-67-1 (.664). The Crimson Tide's offensive coordinator is Jim McElwain and the defensive coordinator is Kirby Smart.

**WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN LSU HAS THE BALL**

Charles Scott rushed for 112 yards and a pair of scores as LSU had its best offensive outing of the season in its 42-0 win over Tulane on Halloween Night in Tiger Stadium. Offensively, the Tigers are averaging 26.4 points and 325.1 yards per game. QB Jordan Jefferson has connected on 123 of 193 passes for 1,421 yards, 11 TDs and just four interceptions. Scott leads the Tigers ground attack with 459 yards and four scores, while Brandon LaFell (37 rec., 478 yards, 8 TDs) and Terrance Toliver (38 rec., 501 yards, 3 TDs) combine to form the league's top receiving tandem.

The Tide boasts the nation's No. 4 overall defense, allowing just 240.88 yards per game, but Alabama also ranks second in the country in pass efficiency defense, surrendering an 88.81 opponent passer rating. UA ranks tied for 14th nationally while leading the SEC in sacks with 2.88 per game. Defensive end Marcell Dareus leads the Tide with 4.5 (-32) while Javier Arenas and Eryk Anders are second with 4.0. Rolando McClain leads the Crimson Tide with 57 total tackles and 33 solo stops. He has 7.0 tackles for loss (-28), two sacks (-19), two interceptions, a pass breakup, a forced fumble and seven quarterback hurries. Terrence Cody boasts 17 tackles, including 5.0 tackles for loss (-10) a pass breakup and two quarterback hurries.

**WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN ALABAMA HAS THE BALL**

A trio of linebackers - Kelvin Sheppard (70 tackles, 7.5 TFL), Perry Riley (55 tackles, 3.0 TFL), and Harry Coleman (52 tackles, 5.0 TFL, 2 sacks) - lead the Tiger defense. LSU is third in the SEC and seventh in the nation in scoring defense at 12.13 per game. Since giving up 23 points and 478 total yards vs. Washington in the season-opener, LSU has held its last seven opponents to an average of 266.6 yards and 10.6 points.

Mark Ingram has rushed for 1,004 yards and eight touchdowns through eight games this season for 125.5 yards per game average to rank fifth nationally and first in the SEC in rushing. Ingram has also added 19 receptions for 186 yards and three scores. Greg McElroy has been impressive in his first eight games as the Crimson Tide's starting quarterback, completing 60.0 percent (121 of 202) of his passes for 1,445 yards and nine touchdowns with only three interceptions. Julio Jones, has 20 receptions for 229 yards, an 11.4 yards per catch average and one touchdown.

**SPECIAL TEAMS**

LSU leads the SEC in kickoff coverage with a net average of 46.1 yards. On 41 kick-off returns, LSU is allowing just 16.3 yards per return. LSU is first in the league in punt return average at 17.3 yards. LSU is No. 3 in the SEC in net punting at 36.5 yards per punt. LSU opponents have returned only five punts for 30 yards against the Tigers this year. Trindon Holliday ranks No. 3 in the SEC in punt return average at 14.6 yards a return. Both LSU punt returners - Chad Jones and Trindon Holliday - have returned punts for touchdowns during their career. Trindon Holliday had two punt returns of 50 yards each vs. Tulane.

Alabama senior placekicker Leigh Tiffin is rapidly moving up the Alabama career scoring chart. After the conclusion of the Tennessee game, when he kicked four field goals and scored all 12 of the Tide's points, the Muscle Shoals, Ala., native has 337 career points. The Tennessee performance moved him into second place the career points scored list, just eight points from career leader Phillip Doyle, who had 345 points.

Tommy West is in his ninth season at Memphis with a record of 49-57 (.462) and 15th season overall with a record of 84-92 (.477). The Tigers' offensive coordinator is Clay Helton, and the defensive coordinator is Kenny Ingram.

Lane Kiffin is in his first season at Tennessee and in his third season overall with a record of 9-19 (.321). The Volunteers' offensive coordinator is Jim Chaney and Monte Kiffin serves as the defensive coordinator.

**WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN MEMPHIS HAS THE BALL**

Curtis Steele has scored rushing touchdowns in eight of his last 12 games played and totals 11 TDs on the ground during the stretch. He leads the team in scoring (non-kicking) heading into the Tennessee game with 36 points. Following the East Carolina game, Duke Calhoun and Carlos Singleton officially became the top two receivers all-time at the U of M. Calhoun holds the top spot in receptions (194), yardage (2,822) and 100-yard games (10), while Singleton holds the record in TD receptions (22).

Rico McCoy led the team in tackles for the fifth-straight game vs. South Carolina, posting 10 stops and adding two forced fumbles. He leads the team and ranks third in the SEC with 75 stops (9.3 per game) after posting 87 (7.3 per game) last season. While Eric Berry is second nationally among active players in interceptions with 13, he is also second on the team and eighth in the Southeastern Conference in tackles with 57, an average of 7.1 per game. Dan Williams has seven quarterback hurries, a sack and two tackles for loss in the last four games.

**WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN TENNESSEE HAS THE BALL**

Deante' Lamar leads the team in pass defense with six break ups and one interception. He is second in tackles with 48. Senior linebacker Greg Jackson leads the Tigers in tackles this season with 50, including 30 solo stops. He logged his first interception against Southern Miss, and is tied for the leads in forced fumbles with three. True freshman Dontari Poe has registered three FF this season. Jackson missed the East Carolina game after suffering a severe bruise in his leg and a shoulder injury versus USM.

In eight starts during the 2009 season, senior tailback Montario Hardesty has averaged 105.1 yards per game and scored eight rushing touchdowns. He posted 121 yards on 23 carries and scored twice in UT's romp over South Carolina. It was his third 100-yard game this season and his second career multi-touchdown effort. The New Bern, N.C., native currently ranks 19th in the nation and fourth in the SEC in rushing yards per game. In his last four games, Jonathan Crompton has completed 73 of 130 (.561) passes for 966 yards and nine touchdowns vs. two interceptions. In those four games, Crompton averaged 242 yards through the air and an interception every 65 attempts.

**SPECIAL TEAMS**

Entering the Tennessee game, Matt Reagan has now handled all 43 of Memphis' punts and ranks 4th nationally with his average of 45.3 yards per punt. He has dropped 18 punts inside the 20 and totals 13 punts of 50 or more yards, including five against Marshall.

After not having to punt in the season opener, Chad Cunningham has kicked 35 times for a 41.7-yard average. He kicked three times for a 49.5-yard average vs. UCLA, which was the best single game average of his career. In the Auburn and Georgia games, he played a key role in slowing the opponent's offense, placing seven of 15 punts inside the 20-yard line. On those seven drives, opponents managed just three points. At Alabama, he booted a career-long 58-yard punt in the fourth quarter. In the South Carolina game, Cunningham was forced to kick field goals in place of an injured Daniel Lincoln. He converted from 39 yards and was blocked from 40 yards.

**THE COACHES**

Bobby Johnson is in his eighth season at Vanderbilt with a record of 29-64 (.312) and in his 16th season overall with a record of 89-100 (.471). Ted Cain serves as the offensive coordinator and the defensive coordinator is Jaime Bryant.

Urban Meyer is in his fifth season at Florida with a record of 52-9 (.852) and in his ninth season overall with a record of 90-17 (.841). The Gators' offensive coordinator is Steve Addazio and the defensive coordinator is Charlie Strong.

**WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN VANDERBILT HAS THE BALL**

Warren Norman's 60 rushing yards gives him 593 yards, the fourth highest total ever by a Vanderbilt freshman. He passed Cliff Deese (538 yards, 1992) in the Georgia Tech game. He is 16 yards shy of surpassing Rodney Williams (608 yards, 1998) into third place and 206 yards shy of the team record held by Doster (798 yards, 2002). Norman also tops the 'Dores with seven total touchdowns. Zac Stacy needs 36 yards to join Norman on the Top Ten list. Stacy was the Commodore rushing leader with 75 yards Saturday, including a career-long 62-yarder for a touchdown. Norman and Stacy accounted for all four Vanderbilt touchdowns in the loss to Georgia Tech.

Carlos Dunlap leads the team with six sacks, while Ryan Stamper paces the Gators with 48 tackles. Major Wright and A.J. Jones lead the way with three interceptions each. Jermaine Cunningham lines up on the opposite end from Dunlap and has five sacks and 9.5 tackles for loss to go with two forced fumbles, a fumble recovery, three quarterback hurries and 23 total tackles (13 solo). Brandon Spikes is the only player in the nation to have three interception return touchdowns over the past two seasons. Spikes recorded his first multi-sack performance of 2009, tallying three at LSU.

**WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN FLORIDA HAS THE BALL**

Linebacker Chris Marve set a career high defending against the potent Georgia Tech rushing attack. Marve had 18 total tackles, including 11 solo stops, in the loss. Both stats are career bests for the sophomore. Marve is the SEC's leading tackler, averaging 10.0 total stops per game. He also ranks among SEC leaders with three forced fumbles. Casey Hayward notched a 4-yard tackle for loss last week, pushing his team-high total to 8.5 this season. Hayward also earned his first career start at safety after eight straight starts at cornerback.

Tim Tebow has rushed for eight touchdowns this season, bringing him to 51 for his career, breaking the all-time SEC record that was held by Herschel Walker (Georgia, 1980-82). Tebow's career rating of 170.1 currently ranks No. 1 in SEC history (min. 300 completions). Jeff Demps paces the Gator running backs with 494 yards, five rushing touchdowns and a 7.7 yards-per-carry average. Florida's receiving corps is led by Aaron Hernandez and Riley Cooper. Hernandez has 421 yards on a team-best 36 grabs along with two touchdowns. Riley Cooper has 31 receptions for a team-high 474 yards and five touchdowns.

**SPECIAL TEAMS**

Norman became just the second player in Southeastern Conference history to record three touchdowns on kickoff returns in a season when he took a Yellow Jacket kick 80 yards for a score last week in the second quarter. Earlier this year, he had a 76-yard return at Army and 99-yard return at South Carolina for touchdowns. The only other SEC player to duplicate Norman's return feat is former Tennessee standout Willie Gault (1980).

Caleb Sturgis hit a 56-yard field goal and a 44-yarder in going 2-for-2 in the win over Georgia. The 56-yard kick was the second-longest in school history and longest in the SEC this season. Sturgis is one of six players nationally to have at least two 50-yard field goals in 2009. Brandon James is second among active players with four career punt return touchdowns and tied for third in combined kickoff and punt return touchdowns. Norman needs 51 yards to break the SEC all-time single-season record for return yards set by Dennis Johnson of Arkansas last year.

Jerome Souers is in his 12th season Northern Arizona and overall with a record of 66-67 (.496). The Lumberjacks' offensive coordinator is Brian Lindgren and the defensive coordinator is Andy Thompson.

Houston Nutt is in his second season at Ole Miss with a record of 14-7 (.667) and 17th overall with a record of 125-77 (.619). The Rebels' offensive coordinator is Kent Austin and the defensive coordinator is Tyrone Nix.

**WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN NORTHERN ARIZONA HAS THE BALL**

The NAU offense ranks eighth in the FCS (438.4 ypg) and led by the passing of junior QB and former Ole Miss Rebel Michael Herrick. He ranks third in the nation in passing at 309.6 ypg with 18 TDs and five interceptions. The WR duo of Ed Berry and Conrad Meadows are tied for the Big Sky Conference lead in receptions per game and boast 774 and 608 receiving yards, respectively. Senior RB Alex Henderson is adding 96.2 ypg on the ground, which is 15th-best in FCS.

Ole Miss ranks fourth in the SEC and 14th in the nation in scoring defense, allowing just 16.0 ppg this year. Ole Miss has risen to the top of the SEC in sacks with 23 and a 2.9 per game average, which is tied for first in the league. Senior DE Greg Hardy leads the team with 5.0, and his 0.71 per game average is tied for third in the SEC. Kentrell Lockett boasts a team-high eight QB pressures and is tied for 10th in the SEC in sacks with 4.0. He has been credited with at least a half TFL in all but one game this year and has totaled 6.0.

**WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN OLE MISS HAS THE BALL**

The NAU defense is surrendering 26.6 points and 389.2 ypg. Matt Estrada leads the team with 65 tackles. Isaac Bond has 6.5 sacks and 8.0 TFLs on the season. Stevon Thomas adds 54 tackles, 4.5 TFLs and two interceptions on the season. Brandon Vance has five sacks and 6.0 TFLs. The fortunes for the Lumberjacks changed with just over seven minutes left in the second quarter in the loss last week. Senior linebacker Zac McNally intercepted a pass and almost ran it back. Henderson ran it in from two yards on the next play. NAU took the lead on a 52-yard strike to Shanks from Herrick two minutes later setup by an interception by Raphael Mack.

Senior Dexter McCluster has been nearly unstoppable the last two games and rewrote the Rebel record book against Arkansas. He is averaging 154.5 rushing yards and 231.5 all-purpose yards over the last two weeks. With a career-high 22 carries each outing, he recorded his first two 100-yard rushing games and totaled a career-high 186 at Auburn, which is the most by a Rebel since BenJarvus Green-Ellis ran for 226 yards against Missouri in 2007. McClusters' 79-yard TD run Saturday marked the longest rush of his career and the longest by an Ole Miss player since Deuce McAllister galloped 80 yards for a score against Oklahoma in the 1999 Independence Bowl.

**SPECIAL TEAMS**

NAU has had a strong punting tradition this decade, ranking among the top five national leaders in punting eight straight seasons and top 10 over nine consecutive seasons. Ryan Rauschert averages nearly 39 yards per punt and has had seven over 50 yards this season thus far. He's also landed ten inside the 20 yard line. Matt Myers is 11-14 on field goals in 2009, including 3-4 from between 40-49 yards. His long is 47.

It has taken freshman Jesse Grandy just a month to carve his name in the Ole Miss record book. In only his fourth game handling returns, Grandy notched his second kickoff return for a TD with an 82-yarder against Auburn. He is only the third Rebel to return two kickoffs for TDs in the same season and the first since John Avery in 1996. The other is Vernon Studdard in 1970. Grandy's current 30.1-yard average ranks second in the SEC and 14th in the nation.

**SERIES/GAME NOTES**

**Record:** First Meeting

This will mark the first ever meeting between Ole Miss and Northern Arizona, who is facing its second FBS foe of the year after falling at Arizona 34-17 in the season opener...This will mark the second FCS opponent for Ole Miss this season, thus, the Rebels will need seven total wins to become bowl eligible in 2009...The Rebels will host Tennessee and LSU in the coming weeks, before closing the season at Mississippi State.
