FEW SECONDS ON THE SEC SEC FOOTBALL RELEASE HIGHLIGHTS

• SEC Football Players of the Week for games of Nov. 7 are Arkansas QB Ryan Mallett (offense), Alabama CB Javier Arenas (defense), Florida P Chas Henry (special teams), Tennessee OT Aaron Douglas (offensive line), Georgia DE Montez Robinson (defensive line) and Kentucky QB Morgan Newton (freshman).

• Alabama clinched the Western Division spot in the SEC Championship Game with a 24-15 win over LSU. The Crimson Tide will play Florida on Dec. 5 in Atlanta's Georgia Dome for the SEC Championship (4 p.m. ET/CBS Sports).

• Florida won its 19th consecutive game (dating back to 2008) with a 27-3 win over Vanderbilt. During that span, the Gators have allowed one touchdown or less eight times.

• The SEC has three teams in this week's AP Top 10. The league has had at least three teams in the AP Top 10 in each week this season.

• The SEC has a 35-6 non-conference record (85.4 percent), which is the nation's highest winning percentage this year.

• More than 5 million fans have attended SEC home games this season. In 66 home games, SEC stadiums have been filled to 97.71 percent capacity.

• SEC teams have combined to have 179 scoring drives of less than 2 minutes while using 5+ minutes on 70 scoring drives this season.

In addition, CBS Sports continues its coverage of SEC regular-season basketball.

In addition to the broadcast rights on CBS Sports, this comprehensive long-team deal includes certain digital, internet, wireless, Video-on-Demand, data and enhanced highlight rights across all CBS platforms, including CBS College Sports Network and CBSSports.com. Also, simulcasts of CBS Sports games will be available for distribution by the CBS College Sports Network.

ESPN

ESPN has acquired rights to every SEC home football game (excluding those on the network broadcast package) and will serve as the exclusive national cable home and the syndication rightsholder for the conference.

ESPN and ESPN2: The networks will increase coverage by combining to televise a minimum of 20 SEC games annually, including Saturday night and two primetime Thursday matchups.

ESPNU: The 24-hour college sports network, which launched in March 2005, will present a package of SEC football for the first time, with a Saturday game-of-the-week (generally in primetime and a minimum of 13 games annually).

SEC Network (ESPN Regional Television): The nation's largest syndicator of collegiate sports programming, becomes the official over-the-air syndication home for the SEC and will feature a game-of-the-week package (generally at 12:30 p.m. ET), with a minimum of 13 games each season throughout the SEC footprint and beyond. In addition, ERT will produce and distribute a studio show.

Also: Simulcasts of SEC game telecasts will be offered on ESPN360.com. Live games will be simulcast on mobile phones. The agreement includes global rights to present live games and encore presentations on ESPN International. ESPN has acquired domestic Spanish-language rights for SEC football on ESPN Deportes (24-hour, U.S.-based network). **ESPN GamePlan, ESPN's** college football pay-per-view service, will offer SEC action. **ESPN Classic** may telecast select SEC live games as well as historic and immediate encore presentations. Extensive SEC content, including highlights, will be presented online ESPN.com.

COMCAST/ CHARTER SPORTS SOUTHEAST

On May 21, 2009, Comcast / Charter Sports Southeast (CSS), the regional sports channel focusing on college sports in the southeast, announced it has reached a five-year agreement with ESPN to televise live Southeastern Conference (SEC) content including a minimum of six football games, twenty men's basketball games, and sixteen women's basketball games as well as fifty SEC Olympic sports each year. SEC FOOTBALL VIDEO REPLAY

THE OBJECTIVE

To allow for specific types of officiating calls to be immediately reviewed during all games hosted by SEC teams.

THE COACHES' CHALLENGE

A new rule expands the ability of a head coach to challenge a reviewable play on the field. The head coach now retains a challenge if his initial challenge is successful and thus results in a reversal by the replay official. The coach will then have a single challenge that he may use anytime during the game if his team has not used all its timeouts. Thus a team may have a total of two challenges in the game, but only if the first results in a reversal of the on-field ruling.

THE SOURCE

All reviewable video comes direct from either the television network broadcasting the game (CBS Sports, ESPN, ESPN2, Lincoln Financial) or other TV production facilities that meet established conference standards. The Southeastern Conference has used instant replay since 2005.

THE PLAYS

Reviewable

1. Plays governed by Sideline, Goal Line, End Zone, and End Line:
 - a. Scoring Plays, including a runner breaking the plane of the goal line
 - b. Pass complete/incomplete/intercepted at sideline, goal and endlines
 - c. Runner/receiver in or out of bounds
 - d. Recovery of loose ball in and out of bounds
2. Passing Plays:
 - a. Pass ruled complete/ incomplete/ intercepted in the field of play and end zones
 - b. Touching of a forward pass by an ineligible receiver
 - c. Touching of a forward pass by a defensive player
 - d. Quarterback (Passer) forward pass or fumble (if ruled incomplete, play is finalized)
 - e. Illegal forward pass or illegal handing off beyond the line of scrimmage
 - f. Illegal forward pass or illegal handing off after change of possession
 - g. Forward or backward pass thrown from behind the line of scrimmage
 - h. Quarterback (Passer) starts arm forward, ball comes loss and play is ruled incomplete (if ball is quickly recovered)
 - i. Quarterback (Passer) throws incomplete swing pass that is close to being forward or backward, and pass is ruled forward (if ball is quickly recovered)
3. Other Detectable Infractions:
 - a. Runner ruled not down.
 - b. Runner ruled down (when ball carrier is judged down by rule and the ball is fumbled, play may be reviewed if recovery of ball occurs in the immediate action following fumble and is prior to any official signaling ball is dead. Also reviewable when runner is ruled out of bounds near goal line.)
 - c. Forward progress with respect to first down
 - d. Touching of a kick
 - e. Number of players on field
 - f. Clock adjustments (in conjunction with overturned plays)
 - g. Fourth-down/try fumble plays
 - h. Field Goal Attempts (only when ball is ruled below or above the crossbar, inside or outside the uprights when it is lower than the top of the uprights.)

THE PROCESS

Each SEC football stadium has a secured replay booth equipped with a DVSPORT Digital Replay System. Three individuals work in the booth for the duration of the game: 1. Replay Official, 2. Communicator, 3. Technician. The Replay Official is selected and assigned by the Conference Office.

A live video feed is sent directly to the replay booth. The Technician watches the feed on an input monitor while capturing/digitizing it into the DVSPORT Digital Replay System. The Technician also marks the beginning of each play as well as any replays as they occur in real time.

Each play and subsequent replay then appears on a touch screen in front of the Communicator. As the Technician marks the incoming video, each view (by mark) will appear as a small picture on the computer touch screen. At any time, the Communicator can touch/click on a thumbnail and immediately send that play/replay to the Replay Official.

With the Communicator's assistance, the Replay Official can quickly jump between replays while playing back the video. All replay video navigation is done via a remote device controlled by the Replay Official. All replays/video are viewed on an output monitor. The touch screen is only used to select the replays.

While most plays are reviewed between the whistle and the beginning of the next play, the Replay Official can stop play on the field by using a pager system. Five onfield officials wear pagers. If play is stopped the Referee announces on the stadium PA microphone that play has been stopped so the previous play can be reviewed. The Referee then proceeds to the sideline headset, which provides direct communication to the Replay Official in the booth. Once the play has been reviewed, the Replay Official notifies the Referee, who then announces the decision on the stadium PA system.

THE EQUIPMENT

Each SEC member institution uses the Digital Replay System developed by DVSPORT of Pittsburgh, Pa. The replay systems are maintained by the home institution with technical support from DVSPORT.

SEC KICKERS GETTING A WORKOUT

After 10 weeks, SEC teams have scored 347 offensive touchdowns and 152 field goals. That equates to 69.5 percent of all offensive scores coming from touchdowns and 30.5 percent from field goals. It is the highest percentage of field goals in a single-season in the SEC since 1992, when SEC teams accounted for 172 field goals (35.3 percent) and 315 offensive touchdowns (64.7 percent).

SEC CHAMPIONSHIP GAME MATCHUP SET

Alabama and Florida will play in the SEC Championship Game on Dec. 5 at the Georgia Dome in Atlanta. Kickoff is 4 p.m. ET and will be televised on CBS Sports.

Florida, 7-0 in the SEC, is the Eastern Division champion and will represent the division in the SEC Championship Game.

Alabama, 6-0 in the SEC, has claimed a share of the Western Division title and would win a tie-breaker with the only team that can reach it - LSU.

It is the earliest by calendar date (by one day) that both teams have clinched a spot in the SEC Championship Game.

The earliest clinches in SEC Championship Game history belong were Oct. 29, 1994 (Florida); Oct. 30, 2004 (Auburn), Oct. 30, 1993 (Alabama), Oct. 31, 2009 (Florida), Nov. 4, 2006 (Florida), Nov. 7, 2009 (Alabama) and Nov. 8, 2008 (Alabama and Florida).

Florida reaches the SEC Championship Game for the 10th time while Alabama enters the game for the seventh time. The UF-UA matchup will be the seventh time these two teams have met in the SEC Championship Game with the Gators holding a 4-2 advantage.

SEC BOWL AGREEMENTS

The Southeastern Conference has agreements to send nine of its member institutions to postseason bowl games following the 2009 season. The winner of the SEC Championship Game will automatically participate in the Bowl Championship Series comprised of the Sugar, Rose, Orange and Fiesta Bowls.

The Capital One (2nd), will then make its pick following the BCS selections. The bowl must select the team with the next best overall record or a team that is within one win of the team with the next best overall record.

The Outback, Chick-fil-A and AT&T Cotton Bowls will work with the conference office to determine picks 3-5. The Cotton Bowl has the first preference of teams from the Western Division and the Outback Bowl has first preference of teams from the Eastern Division. The Cotton or Outback Bowl can select teams outside of its divisional preference, but must not select them before the opposite bowl selects from its divisional preference. The Chick-fil-A Bowl has the selection of preference following the Cotton and Outback Bowls.

In selections 6-7, the AutoZone Liberty and Gaylord Hotels Music City Bowls will make their selections, not in any specific order, but in consultation with the SEC Office. The Bowls will rank available qualified teams in order of preference. If there are no similarities in the order of selection, the bowls will be granted its selection. If the bowls rank the same teams in preference, the team involved in the process would get its preference of which bowl to participate.

The PetroSun Independence Bowl will receive the eighth selection and the Papajohns.com Bowl will have the ninth pick of available SEC teams.

BOWL CHAMPIONSHIP SERIES

The Bowl Championships Series is a five-game arrangement for post-season college football that is designed to match the two top-rated teams in a national championship game and to create exciting and competitive match-ups among eight other highly regarded teams in four other games.

The five bowl games are the Tostitos Fiesta Bowl, the FedEx Orange Bowl, the Rose Bowl Game presented by Citi, the Allstate Sugar Bowl and the BCS National Championship Game that is played at one of the bowl sites. The 2010 Citi BCS National Championship Game will be played in the Rose Bowl in Pasadena, Calif.

Unless a Southeastern Conference champion qualifies to play in the BCS National Championship Game, it will play in the Allstate Sugar Bowl.

Fox Sports will televise the Tostitos Fiesta Bowl, FedEx Orange Bowl and the Allstate Sugar Bowl at the conclusion of the 2009 regular season. ESPN/ABC will televise the Rose Bowl presented by Citi and the Citi BCS National Championship Game.

In the 11 previous years of the BCS, the Southeastern Conference holds a 12-5 mark in BCS games (.706) - the most wins of any other conference and the highest winning percentage of any conference participating in more than two BCS games.

In BCS National Championship Games, the SEC is 5-0 (1.000) and has more BCS titles than any other conference. The SEC has won BCS crowns in 1998 (Tennessee), 2003 (LSU), 2006 (Florida), 2007 (LSU) and 2008 (Florida).

In the history of the BCS, an SEC team has been in the BCS standings 328 times, second only to the Big 12 with 331. The SEC and the ACC have had 11 of its 12 teams ranked in the BCS standings at some point since 1998 - more than any other conference.

2008-09 ANOTHER BANNER ATHLETIC YEAR FOR THE SEC

The SEC claimed five national championships in the 2008-09 year, tying it with the total from the 2007-08 season.

In 10 of its 20 sponsored sports, the SEC had either the national champion or the national runners-up.

The SEC had national championships in football (Florida), men's swimming & diving (Auburn), women's indoor track & field (Tennessee), gymnastics (Georgia) and baseball (LSU). The SEC also had national runners-up finishes in men's golf (Arkansas), gymnastics (Alabama), softball (Florida), women's swimming & diving (Georgia) and men's indoor track & field (Florida).

In its 76 year history, the Southeastern Conference has won 179 team national championships, including 63 since 2000. In this decade, the SEC has won at least one national championship in 16 of its 20 sponsored sports with the exception of women's cross country, volleyball, soccer and softball.

SEC LEADS ALL CONFERENCES IN 2008-09 MEN'S SPORTS CONFERENCE VS. CONFERENCE SURVEY; 2nd in WOMEN'S SPORTS

In a statistical survey that is based on NCAA championship and rankings, the Southeastern Conference placed first in the nine men's sports it sponsors and second in the 11 women's sports the league sponsors.

The survey, compiled each year since 1986 by Bo Carter, takes into account final NCAA championship standings in each sport and poll rankings in football. Each conference gets 20 points for a team that wins a national championship, 19 for a second place finish and down to 1 point for a 20th place finish.

In the nine men's sports the SEC sponsors, the SEC had 440.5 points with the Pac-10 coming in second with 375 points, followed by the Big 12 with 337.5 points, ACC with 214 points, Big East 102.5 points and the Big Ten with 80 points.

In the 11 women's sports the SEC sponsors, the Pac-10 was first with 615 points followed by the SEC with 431 points, the Big 12 with 337 points, Big Ten with 318.5 points, ACC with 277.5 points and the Big East with 161.5 points.

Combining the 20 sponsored sports, the Pac-10 had 990 points followed by the SEC with 806 points, Big 12 with 674.5 points, ACC with 491.5 points, Big Ten with 398.5 points and the Big East with 264 points.

The SEC has had the highest men's point total in 15 of the last 17 seasons (exceptions: 2007-08: Big 12; 1997-98: Pac-10). The Pac-10 has had the highest women's point totals each year since 1986 with the exception of four years the SEC has had the highest total (1990-91; 1995-96; 2004-05; 2006-07).

SEC LEADS DIVISION I CONFERENCES IN MOST ESPN THE MAGAZINE CoSIDA ACADEMIC ALL-AMERICANS

The Southeastern Conference had 41 of its student-athletes each ESPN The Magazine Academic All-America Team mention, the most of any Division I conference in the nation.

The Academic All-America Program is administered and voted on by the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA).

The SEC had 15 student-athletes earn first-team mention, 14 earn second-team and 12 earn third-team mention.

The Big 12 was second with 38 total student athletes listed while the Big Ten was third at 34 and the ACC fourth at 26. The Big Ten led all conferences in first-team honorees with 18, followed by the SEC's 15.

Each SEC institution had at least one student-athlete earn first, second or third-team mention. Florida led the SEC with seven student-athletes on the lists while Tennessee had six, South Carolina and Arkansas had five each. Alabama, Florida and Tennessee each led the SEC with three on the various first-team lists.

Florida's Stacey Nelson (softball) and Tim Tebow (football) were named Academic All-Americans of the Year in their respective sports.

SEC LAUNCHES ACADEMIC NETWORK TO PROMOTE 12 MEMBER INSTITUTIONS

The 12 institutions of the Southeastern Conference institutions have joined together in the launch of the SEC Academic Network, a website (www.secacademicnetwork.com) designed to promote the academic programs of SEC universities. The SEC Academic Network is being established by the SEC in partnership with ESPN and the member universities.

The Academic Network, developed using technology and coordination from ESPN Digital Media and Origin Digital, will feature content from every institution ranging from research, innovation and economic development to community partnerships, civic engagement and service.

"Our commitment to highlight the accomplishments of SEC member institution's academic programs was a key component of our new television agreements," said SEC Commissioner Mike Slive. "We are grateful to ESPN for providing the technology, expertise and tools they use in sports media to our institutions in support of academic pursuits."

Each institution has its own page on the website that includes videos categorized by topic. Alumni, fans and students worldwide will have the ability to learn more about SEC academics in one place through video features that are posted by the league institutions.

The Academic Network is a component of the SEC's 15-year television package with ESPN, which is the most comprehensive in the history of intercollegiate athletics. Also part of ESPN's commitment to SEC academic programs is the production of an annual Campus Connection telecast at each SEC institution, in which students take part in the production; telecasts of two programs annually dedicated to the academic accomplishments of SEC student-athletes; a weekly academic feature segment on ESPN's SEC show; and selection of one undergraduate student from every SEC institution to participate in ESPN's summer internship program.

SEC SPORTSMANSHIP STATEMENT

- The SEC has developed a sportsmanship statement for its institutions to follow. It states:

"Coaches and student-athletes of a member institution, as well as individuals employed by or associated with that institution, including alumni, fans, patrons and boosters, shall conduct themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their behavior shall at all times reflect the high standards of honor and dignity that characterize participation in the collegiate setting. For intercollegiate athletics to promote the character development of participants, to enhance the integrity of higher education and to promote civility in society, coaches, student-athletes and all others associated with these athletics programs and events should adhere to such fundamental values as respect, fairness, civility, honesty and responsibility. These values should be manifested not only in athletics participation but also in the broad spectrum of activities affecting the athletics program. It is the responsibility of each member institution to establish policies for sportsmanship and ethical conduct in intercollegiate athletics consistent with the educational mission and goals of the institution. Furthermore, member institutions are responsible for educating on a continuing basis all constituencies about these policies."

THE COACHES

Lane Kiffin is in his first season at Tennessee and in his third season overall with a record of 10-19 (.345). The Volunteers' offensive coordinator is Jim Chaney and Monte Kiffin serves as the defensive coordinator.

Houston Nutt is in his second season at Ole Miss with a record of 15-7 (.682) and 17th overall with a record of 126-77 (.621). The Rebels' offensive coordinator is Kent Austin and the defensive coordinator is Tyrone Nix.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN TENNESSEE HAS THE BALL

Senior quarterback Jonathan Crompton has overcome early season struggles to become one of the top quarterbacks in the Southeastern Conference. The Waynesville, N.C. native ranks third in the league in passing at 216.4 yards per game and leads the league with 21 touchdown passes. In nine starts during the 2009 season, senior tailback Montario Hardesty has averaged 100.1 yards per game and scored eight rushing touchdowns. He ran just 13 times for 60 yards in limited action vs. Memphis after posting 121 yards on 23 carries and scoring twice in UT's romp over South Carolina.

The Rebels, who tied for the nation's lead in TFLs in 2008 averaging 8.62 pg, posted 10 TFLs against both Memphis and Northern Arizona. Junior NT Jerrell Powe is tied for sixth in the SEC with 9.0 TFLs, while senior DE Greg Hardy has notched 6.5 TFLs and a team-high 5.0 sacks (0.62 spg is tied for sixth in the SEC). Senior S Kendrick Lewis topped the team with a career-high 10 tackles against NAU and added a field goal block. Lewis leads the team in tackles (57) and forced fumbles (2) and is second in pass break-ups (6). At Auburn, Lewis finished with seven total tackles, one sack, one forced fumble and one pass break-up. Kentrell Lockett boasts a team-high eight QB pressures and is tied for 10th in the SEC in sacks with 4.0. He is tied for third on the team with 6.0 TFLs.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN OLE MISS HAS THE BALL

Rico McCoy also has four forced fumbles through nine games, which ranks third nationally and atop the SEC. He leads the team and ranks third in the SEC with 76 stops (8.4 per game) after posting 87 (7.3 per game) last season. While Eric Berry is second nationally among active players in interceptions with 14, he is also second on the team in tackles with 62, an average of 6.8 per game. He is also third on the team in tackles for loss with five for nine yards. Dan Williams has seven quarterback hurries, a sack and 3.5 tackles for loss in the last five games. Williams posted 48 tackles last season, and he is on pace to notch 56 in the 2009 campaign.

Senior WR Shay Hodge is averaging 110.75 yards and 6.5 receptions over the last four games and has notched consecutive 100-yard receiving games. For the season, he ranks second in the SEC in both receptions (5.0 rpg) and receiving yards (81.4 ypg). Prior to his light work day against Northern Arizona, senior Dexter McCluster averaged 154.5 rushing yards and 231.5 all-purpose yards over a two-game span. With a career-high 22 carries each outing, he recorded his first two 100-yard rushing games and totaled a career-high 186 at Auburn, which is the most by a Rebel since BenJarvus Green-Ellis ran for 226 yards against Missouri in 2007.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Junior kicker Daniel Lincoln began the season with 31 career field goal makes and now sits sixth in school history with 40 conversions. After not having to punt in the season opener, Chad Cunningham has kicked 36 times for a 41.6-yard average. He kicked three times for a 49.5-yard average vs. UCLA, which was the best single game average of his career. In the Auburn and Georgia games, he played a key role in slowing the opponent's offense, placing seven of 15 punts inside the 20-yard line.

It took freshman Jesse Grandy just a month to carve his name in the Ole Miss record book. In only his fourth game handling returns, Grandy notched his second kickoff return for a TD with an 82-yarder against Auburn. He is only the third Rebel to return two kickoffs for TDs in the same season and the first since John Avery in 1996. The other is Vernon Studdard in 1970. Grandy's current 30.1-yard average ranks second in the SEC and 11th in the nation. The Ole Miss single-season record is 24.6 ypr established last year by Mike Wallace.

This game will mark the 63rd meeting between the Rebels and Volunteers dating back to 1902... Tennessee holds a 43-18-1 advantage in the series and has won 12 straight in the series since a 41-17 win in 1984 and 14 of the last 15 dating back to 1981... The two teams last met in 2005, as the Vols won 27-10 in Knoxville... Tennessee is 3-0 when taking on the Rebels in Oxford.

THE COACHES

Rich Brooks is in his seventh season at Kentucky with a record of 37-45 (.451) and 19th overall with a record of 128-154-4 (.455). The Wildcats' offensive coordinator is Randy Sanders and Steve Brown serves as the defensive coordinator.

Bobby Johnson is in his eighth season at Vanderbilt with a record of 29-65 (.309) and in his 16th season overall with a record of 89-101 (.468). Ted Cain serves as the offensive coordinator and the defensive coordinator is Jaime Bryant.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN KENTUCKY HAS THE BALL

Against Eastern Kentucky, Morgan Newton set new career highs with 20 completions on 29 attempts for 187 yards and two passing touchdowns. He was named SEC Freshman of the Week. Derrick Locke ranks fifth in the SEC in rushing yards per game, averaging 74.6 yards per game. Randall Cobb leads UK and is eighth in the SEC in receptions per game. In eight games played (he did not see action vs. Eastern Kentucky with a sprained thumb) he has 30 catches for 381 yards for an average of 3.8 catches per game. He also has four TD receptions.

The VU defense is yielding just 2.7 points and 28.2 yards more this year than in 2008. They are also allowing less first downs and passing yards than a year ago while permitting more rushing yards this season. Linebackers Patrick Benoist and Chris Marve topped the Commodores with nine and seven tackles, respectively, at Florida. Benoist also added a 12-yard quarterback sack, giving him 3.5 sacks this season, tied for the team high with DT Greg Billinger. DE Steven Stone put together his best game since returning from a foot injury, posting a quarterback sack among five tackles.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN VANDERBILT HAS THE BALL

Senior cornerback Trevard Lindley has made several game-changing plays while at Kentucky. He currently has 10 interceptions and 39 pass breakups during his Wildcat career. Despite missing four games with injury, he ranks tied for second on the team with five pass breakups in five games played. Senior defensive tackle Corey Peters is the only returning starter in the defensive line. Peters has 131 tackles in his career, including 23.5 tackles for loss and 11.5 quarterback sacks. He currently ranks tied for 13th in tackles for loss in the SEC and tied for 10th in sacks. Sam Maxwell currently ranks tied for first in the SEC and tied for 11th nationally in passes defended, averaging 1.22 per game.

Warren Norman topped the Commodores with 65 rushing yards at Florida, pushing his season total to 658 yards, second most ever by a Commodore freshman behind Kwane Doster's 2002 total of 798 yards. Norman totaled 170 yards in all-purpose yardage, right at his 169.6-yard average. He ranks first in the SEC and 11th nationally in the category and is on pace to break Herschel Walker's SEC record for all-purpose yardage by a freshman set in 1,805. Norman's freshman running mate, Zac Stacy, needs five yards to join Norman on the VU Freshman Top Ten list.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Senior Lones Seiber is UK's all-time leading scorer with 282 career points. The old career scoring record was 246 by Joey Worley. Sophomore Ryan Tydlacka inherits full-time punting duties from departed All-SEC punter Tim Masthay. He is averaging 39.7 yards per punt. He saw brief action last year at field goal duties, making 3-of-6 field goals, including a 51-yarder. Locke leads the SEC and ranks 10th nationally in kickoff returns with a 31.23 average.

Norman became the SEC's all-time leading single-season kickoff returner during the Florida game, and continued his assault on other team and league records. With 99 yards against Florida, Norman has 951 kickoff return yards this season, enough to surpass the old SEC mark of 902 yards set in 2008 by Arkansas' Dennis Johnson. He has returned three for touchdowns this season.

Urban Meyer is in his fifth season at Florida with a record of 53-9 (.855) and in his ninth season overall with a record of 92-17 (.844). The Gators' offensive coordinator is Steve Addazio and the defensive coordinator is Charlie Strong.

Steve Spurrier is in his fifth season at South Carolina with a record of 34-26 (.567) and in his 25th season overall with a record of 223-107-2 (.675). Spurrier serves as the Gamecocks' offensive coordinator and the defensive coordinator is Lorenzo Ward.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN FLORIDA HAS THE BALL

Tim Tebow has rushed for nine touchdowns this season, bringing him to 52 for his career. Tebow has a rushing and passing touchdown in five games this season, including two of each against Georgia. Jeff Demps paces the Gator running backs with 595 yards, six rushing touchdowns and a 7.8 yards-per-carry average. Florida's receiving corps is led by Aaron Hernandez and Riley Cooper. Hernandez has 541 yards on a team-best 43 grabs along with two touchdowns. Riley Cooper has 32 receptions for 481 yards and a team-leading five touchdowns.

Eric Norwood leads the SEC with seven sacks this season. He is third in the league with 10.5 total tackles for loss. He also leads the team with two interceptions. He has made 35 consecutive starts and has recorded 236 tackles over his three-plus seasons. The Gamecocks will play without team captain Cliff Matthews. Matthews suffered a sprained shoulder in the loss at Tennessee. He is eighth in the SEC in sacks, second in fumble recoveries and tied for second in fumbles forced. USC ranks seventh in the nation against the pass, allowing just 141.33 yards per game. They are doing it with a couple of true freshmen in the secondary, Stephon Gilmore and DeVonte Holloman.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN SOUTH CAROLINA HAS THE BALL

Carlos Dunlap leads the team with six sacks, while Ryan Stamper paces the Gators with 54 tackles. Major Wright and A.J. Jones lead the way with three interceptions each. Jermaine Cunningham lines up on the opposite end from Dunlap and has five sacks and 9.5 tackles for loss, to go with two forced fumbles, a fumble recovery, four quarterback hurries and 24 total tackles (14 solo). Dustin Doe put up a career-high 11 tackles while making his second start of the season against Vanderbilt.

Stephen Garcia has completed 57.5 percent of his passes this season (198-for-341) for 2,421 yards with 13 touchdowns and just six interceptions. He ranks second in the SEC in total offense in 2009, accounting for an average of 252.6 yards per game. Redshirt freshman Kenny Miles, the team's leading rusher, has become the chairman of the committee, starting the last five games. He is averaging 5.2 yards per carry, rushing 94 times for 488 yards and a touchdown. True freshman Alshon Jeffery is the Gamecocks' leading receiver with 33 catches for 613 yards, an average of 18.6 yards per catch, with six scores. He ranks fifth in the SEC in receiving yards per game at 61.3.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Caleb Sturgis hit a 56-yard field goal and a 44-yarder in going 2-for-2 in the win over Georgia. The 56-yard kick was the second-longest in school history and longest in the SEC this season. Brandon James, UF's all-time punt return yards leader with 1,229, ranks fifth in the NCAA among active players in career punt return average (11.8) and second in punt return yards. He is also second among active players with four career punt return touchdowns and tied for fourth in combined kickoff and punt return touchdowns.

Junior Spencer Lanning is handling both the punting and the placekicking responsibilities. Lanning jumped into the field goal kicking role in a huge way, connecting on 5-of-5 field goal attempts at Georgia to tie a 19-year-old school record held by Collin Mackie. He ran his streak to 12 straight field goals made before hitting his first two at Alabama then missing on a 50-yard attempt in the fourth quarter. He is third in the SEC with his 15 field goals and is tied for 19th in the nation. Lanning ranks fifth in the SEC and 41st in the country in punting, averaging 42.0 yards per punt with a long of 56 yards. A regular on special teams, Norwood has blocked three kicks this season.

Florida travels to South Carolina to close its regular-season SEC schedule...Following their 27-3 victory over Vanderbilt, the Gators are 9-0 for the third time in team history (1995 and 1996) and looking to finish undefeated in conference play for the first time since 1996...The Gators are in the midst of an 19-game winning streak, the longest active streak in the nation, the longest in school history and the best in the SEC in the past 15 years...UF has also captured 11 straight wins against Eastern Division foes.

THE COACHES

Nick Saban is in his second season at Alabama with a record of 28-8 (.778) and 16th overall with a record of 134-67-1 (.666). The Crimson Tide's offensive coordinator is Jim McElwain and the defensive coordinator is Kirby Smart.

Dan Mullen is in his first season at MSU and overall. The Bulldogs' offensive coordinator is Les Koenning and the defensive coordinator is Carl Torbush.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN ALABAMA HAS THE BALL

Mark Ingram has rushed for 1,148 yards and eight touchdowns through nine games this season for 127.56 yards per game average to rank sixth nationally and first in the SEC in rushing. Greg McElroy has been impressive in his first nine games as the Crimson Tide's starting quarterback, completing 59.3 percent (140 of 236) of his passes for 1,721 yards and 11 touchdowns with only four interceptions. The UA receiving numbers are headed by preseason All-America wide out Julio Jones, who has 24 receptions for 331 yards, a 13.8 yards per catch average and two touchdowns. Ingram is tied with Jones with 24 catches and three touchdowns and 216 yards. Trent Richardson has rushed for 404 yards and four touchdowns on just 80 attempts.

State leads the nation in touchdowns on interception returns with four, and the Bulldogs' 19 forced turnovers is tied for the Southeastern Conference lead. Against Florida, Johnthan Banks intercepted two passes and returned them both for touchdowns. He became the first SEC player since 1968 and only the third all-time to return two passes for scores in the same game. Jamar Chaney, in his fifth year after missing last season with a leg injury, currently ranks fifth in the SEC with 8.1 tackles per game.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN MISSISSIPPI STATE HAS THE BALL

Defensive end Marcell Dareus leads the Tide and the SEC with 7.2 sacks per game (6.5) while Javier Arenas and Eryk Anders are second on the team with 4.0. Rolando McClain and Lorenzo Washington both have two sacks each. UA also ranks 15th nationally in tackles for loss, averaging 7.33 per game. That mark ranks also leads the Southeastern Conference and accounts for 323 lost yards by UA opponents. Arenas leads the Tide with 10.5 tackles for loss (-74) while Dareus is second with 8.5, Anders is third with 8.0 (-56) and McClain is fourth with 7.0 (-28). Terrence Cody has 20 tackles and five tackles for loss on the nation's No. 4 defense.

The Mississippi State offense has relied heavily on its running game this season, running the ball nearly 65 percent of all plays (404 rushes, 623 total plays). MSU has gained 1973 yards (219.2 ypg) on the ground and ranks 12th nationally and third in the SEC in rushing yardage per game. Records continue to fall for Anthony Dixon as he approaches some of the SEC's all-time records. Against Kentucky, AD rushed 33 times for 252 yards, setting the school record for single game rushing yards. Dixon is State's all time career leader in rushing yardage, attempts, touchdowns, 100-yard games and points scored.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Senior place-kicker Leigh Tiffin keeps making big field goals and the Crimson Tide keeps winning. He leads the nation in field goals per game at 2.56 and total field goals with 23, which ranks as the third-most in a single season in school history. Tiffin also ranks sixth nationally and first in the SEC in scoring with 10.44 points per game. Javier is the NCAA active leader in career punt returns, yards, touchdowns, returns per game and yards per game. Arenas, who has 1,590 career punt return yards on 112 returns, is just 106 punt return yards away from breaking Lee Nalley's long-standing SEC record of 1,695 (102 returns for a 14.4 ypr average).

Last season, MSU did not score a single touchdown from a non-offensive source - it was all touchdowns, extra points and field goals (and one safety). Through the first nine games of the 2009 season, State has scored an six. One on a blocked punt, one on a kickoff return and four on interception returns. The school record for non-offensive touchdowns in a season is eight, set by the 1998 squad, and the mark for interception returns for scores is six, set in 1994. Leon Berry had a second kickoff return for a touchdown called back at Vanderbilt due to penalty. Mullen coaches the special teams

THE COACHES

Gene Chizik is in his first season at Auburn and third overall with a record of 12-22 (.353). The Tigers' offensive coordinator is Gus Malzahn and the defensive coordinator is Ted Roof.

Mark Richt is in his ninth season at Georgia and overall with a record of 87-26 (.770). The Bulldogs' offensive coordinator is Mike Bobo and the defensive coordinators are Willie Martinez and John Jancek.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN AUBURN HAS THE BALL

Running back Ben Tate is having a stellar senior season, ranking third in the SEC and 12th nationally averaging 114.2 yards per game. With 1,142 yards rushing, Tate has posted the 18th 1,000-yard rushing season in Auburn history, and ranks 13th on the single-season rushing list. He has six 100-yard rushing games this season, which is the most by an Auburn player since Kenny Irons had eight in 2005. Chris Todd's 17 touch-down passes are tied for 14th most in the NCAA. He ranks 22nd nationally in passing efficiency (146.55) and 23rd in the nation in yards per completion (13.69).

Junior WLB Rennie Curran is second in the SEC with 9.1 tackles per game (82 tackles this year) and he has led the Bulldogs in eight of nine games after playing sparingly against Tennessee Tech. The front features three seniors as Jeff Owens returns from a 2008 injury to rejoin Geno Atkins and Kade Weston. Atkins was named the SEC Defensive Lineman of the Week after he equaled his career high with eight tackles after coming off the bench against Vanderbilt. Junior DE Demarcus Dobbs has started all nine games at the other defensive end spot and had 22 tackles and 3.5 sacks.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN GEORGIA HAS THE BALL

Antonio Coleman leads the SEC with 12.5 tackles for loss and is tied for second with 6.5 sacks. Coleman also has 37 total tackles, an interception which he returned for a touchdown against Mississippi State, a blocked kick, a forced fumble and a fumble recovery. He ranks tied for third in Auburn history with 21.0 career sacks. Craig Stevens leads the team and ranks seventh in the SEC with 79 tackles, while Josh Bynes is eighth with 77. Senior Walter McFadden leads the team with four interceptions which is tied for the most in the SEC, as are his 11 passes defended (four interceptions, seven pass break-ups).

A.J. Green is building on a successful freshman season and is currently leading the SEC receiving yards per game (91.5) and rec. per game (5.5). His 732 yards ranks second in the league. Green missed last week's game with Tennessee Tech due to a bruised lung that happened against top-ranked Florida on Oct. 31. Senior Joe Cox connected on his first 10 passes against Tennessee Tech and finished with 140 yards passing with two TDs and no INTs. Cox also had two TD passes against the #1 Gators, which doubled the total Florida had surrendered on the year. Georgia is looking for a consistent threat at tailback and may have found it in freshman Washaun Ealey.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Junior Wes Byrum has excelled during his junior season, connecting on 13-of-14 field goals and all 43 extra point attempts. Among kickers who have attempted at least 10 field goals, Byrum's percentage of .929 ranks tied for fifth nationally. Byrum, who ranks fifth in school history with 41 career made field goals, is second in the SEC in scoring with 82 points and fourth with 13 field goals. He made a career-high four field goals in a 26-22 win at Tennessee, earning SEC Special Teams Player of the Week honors.

In his first season as a starter, redshirt sophomore Drew Butler is leading the NCAA with an average of 49.2 yards on 40 punts. The school record is 45.4 set in 1984 by Chip Andrews. Georgia leads the NCAA in net punting by more than two yards, sporting a 43.95 average. Sophomore defensive back Brandon Boykin set the school record for kickoff return yardage in a single season with 717 kickoff return yards on 28 returns. His next return will mark the most KORs in school history.

Derek Dooley is in his third season at Louisiana Tech and overall with a record of 16-18 (.471). The Bulldogs' offensive coordinator is Frank Scelfo and the defensive coordinator is Tommy Spangler.

Les Miles is in his fifth season at LSU with a record of 49-13 (.790) and ninth overall with a record of 77-34 (.694). The Tigers' offensive coordinator is Gary Crowton and the defensive coordinator is John Chavis.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN LOUISIANA TECH HAS THE BALL

Senior Daniel Porter enters this week's game ranked sixth all-time in Louisiana Tech history with 2,813 career rushing yards, needing only 11 rushing yards to tie Patrick Jackson (2005-08) for fifth all-time. Not only did Louisiana Tech suffer a heartbreaking 23-21 loss at Utah State on Oct. 24, but another notable came to an end that day as Phillip Livas did not record a catch for the first time in 30 games.

Defensively, a trio of linebackers - Kelvin Sheppard (78 tackles, 7.5 TFL), Perry Riley (63 tackles, 3.0 TFL) and Harry Coleman (55 tackles, 2 sacks) pace the Tigers. The Tigers are among the best in the SEC in defense, allowing only 13.4 points and 310.7 total yards (121.2 rushing, 189.4 passing) per game. CB Patrick Peterson leads the SEC in passes defended with 11 (9 PBUs, 2 interceptions). Sheppard ranks No. 3 in the SEC in tackles with 8.7 per game (78 total). He had his third straight double-digit tackle game with 13 stops against Tulane.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN LSU HAS THE BALL

Louisiana Tech's Antonio Baker enters this week's game with 343 career tackles to his credit, a mark that ranks him third in the nation among active players. Baker has led LA Tech in tackles over the past two seasons, recording 115 in 2008 and 118 in 2007. D'Anthony Smith leads the nation in career assisted sacks (11). Smith's first sack of the season came against New Mexico State on Oct. 17.

The Tigers will be without their leading rusher in Charles Scott (clavicle) who will miss the remainder of the regular season. Scott, who ranks sixth all-time in school history with 2,317 rushing yards, was injured against Alabama. LSU's Brandon LaFell and Terrance Toliver have combined for more receptions (83) than any other wide receiver tandem in the SEC. Toliver leads the Tigers with 42 catches for 527 yards and 3 TDs, while LaFell has 41 receptions for 506 yards and 8 scores. With his 31 receiving yards at Georgia, Richard Dickson shattered the school record for career receiving yards by a tight end. Dickson, who now has 903 receiving yards, eclipsed David LaFleur's old mark of 881 yards set from 1993-96.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Not only is junior Livas a threat as a wide receiver, but Livas was among the national leaders last year in punt returns. Ranked seventh in the nation, Livas averaged 15.31 yards per return and ran back two punt returns for touchdowns. As a sophomore, Livas returned 16 punts for a total of 245 yards. With six total returns for touchdowns to his credit, Livas is slowly approaching an NCAA record. The NCAA record for total kick/punt returns for a touchdown in a career is eight.

LSU leads the SEC in kickoff coverage with a net average of 45.5 yards. On 44 kickoff returns, LSU is allowing just 17.0 yards per return. LSU is first in the league in punt return average at 17.3 yards. LSU is No. 3 in the SEC in net punting at 38.2 yards per punt. LSU opponents have returned only nine punts for 41 yards against the Tigers this year. Trindon Holliday ranks No. 2 in the SEC in punt return average at 14.6 yards a return. Both LSU punt returners - Chad Jones and Holliday - have returned punts for touchdowns during their career. In 41 punts this year, LSU punters have had 10 downed inside the 20-yard line, including three against Alabama.

Larry Blakeney is in his 19th season at Troy and overall with a record of 149-75-1 (.665). Neal Brown serves as the Trojans' offensive coordinator and the defensive coordinator is Jeremy Rowell.

Bobby Petrino is in his second season at Arkansas with a record of 10-11 (.476) and seventh overall with a record of 54-30 (.643). The Razorbacks' offensive coordinator is Paul Petrino and the defensive coordinator is Willie Robinson.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN TROY HAS THE BALL

Freshman running back Shawn Southward picked last week to have his breakout performance, tying a school record with four touchdown runs to propelled Troy to a 40-20 victory. He also became the first Troy back of the season to break the 100-yard barrier with a career-best 19 carries for 139 yards. Levi Brown finished the game completing 20-of-33 passes for 251 yards and a touchdown. He also ran three times for 41 yards, highlighted by a career-best 37 yard scamper in the fourth quarter on a zone read play. DuJuan Harris has eight rushing touchdowns. Jerrel Jernigan is the leading receiver with 615 yards and three touchdowns.

Defensive tackle Malcolm Sheppard is sixth in the SEC with nine tackles for loss this season. His career total (35) are tied for seventh in school history. Sheppard has led the Razorbacks in tackles for loss each of the last two seasons. Sheppard has had at least half of a tackle for a loss in 15 of his last 17 games. Jerry Franklin finished with 10 tackles in the last game against South Carolina. He has had five-or-more tackles in 17 of 21 games in his career. Wendel Davis led the secondary with eight tackles last week and Jerell Norton had his first interception of the season and the sixth of his career.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN ARKANSAS HAS THE BALL

WKU's touchdown on the opening drive of the game last week was the first touchdown the Trojans had surrendered on the first possession of a game in 2009. It's the first time since 11/1/08 at ULM that Troy allowed an opening possession touchdown, a span of 14 games. Boris Lee leads the team with 74 tackles. Brandon Lang leads the team with 6.5 sacks, as well as TFLs with 8.5. Lee is third in total tackles with 51. Bryan Willis patrols the secondary with a team-leading three interceptions.

Ryan Mallett leads the SEC in total offense (273.4) and ranks 12th nationally. Mallett is first in the league in pass efficiency (156.62) and seventh in the nation. He is also first in the SEC in passing yards per game (275.2). Broderick Green is tied for third in the SEC with nine touchdowns this season. Seven of Green's eight rushing touchdowns have come in his last five games and he has rushed for two touchdowns in three games this season, including each of the last two. Against South Carolina, D.J. Williams had a career-high 137 yards on seven receptions, marking the seventh 100-yard receiving effort by a Razorback in a game this season.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Carvel Jones' return of the 2nd half opening kick-off last week was the first of his career. He's the seventh different player for Troy to return a kick-off in 2009. Michael Taylor is 3-3 on field goals and 26-27 on extra point attempts. Will Goggans averages 41.1 yards per punt. He has hit seven over 50 yards and placed 11 punts inside the 20 yard line.

Dennis Johnson is closing in on the Arkansas career and single-season kickoff return records. Johnson has returned 69 kickoffs in his career for 1,746 yards. The total is three yards short of the school record held by Felix Jones (1,749 on 62 returns). Last season, Johnson set the single-season mark for kickoff return yards (905 on 41 returns). He currently has 841 yards on 31 returns this year.
