POLLS: The Rebels are receiving votes in this week's polls. Ole Miss rose to No. 4 in the rankings on Sept. 20 for the first time since sitting fourth in the rankings on October 12, 1970. The last time the Rebels were ranked higher than fourth was September 1964, when the team was the nation's No. 1. The Rebels' No. 4 ranking marked the highest ever by a **Houston Nutt** coached team. LSU is No. 8 in the BCS and No. 10 in the AP and Coaches polls.

SERIES INFO: This game will be the 98th all-time between the Ole Miss Rebels and LSU Tigers dating back to 1894. LSU is Ole Miss' second-most played opponent besides Mississippi State, whom the Rebels will play for the 106th time on November 28. LSU holds a 55-38-4 advantage in the series. The Rebels ended a six-game skid in the series with last year's 31-13 victory at Tiger Stadium. LSU holds an 8-4-1 edge in Oxford and have won four straight at Vaught-Hemingway Stadium. Ole Miss' last home win in the series was a 37-31 overtime triumph in 1998.

WHAT TO WATCH FOR: This will mark the second game of the Magnolia Bowl series and first to played in Oxford ... The Rebels are bowl eligible for the second straight year ... Ole Miss is off to its best start since 2003 ... The Rebels are aiming for their first three-game win streak of the season ... **Dexter McCluster** is averaging 197.0 rushing yards and 262.3 all-purpose yards with five TDs over the last three SEC games ... **Shay Hodge** is averaging 105.0 receiving yards over the last five games ... The Rebels are making their 22nd all-time appearance on CBS and second straight ... In their final home game, the Rebel senior class will be distinguished in pre-game ceremonies ... Ole Miss will also be honoring the 1959 team, which defeated LSU 21-0 in the Sugar Bowl en route to the program's first national championship.

OLE MISS HEAD COACH HOUSTON NUTT: Houston Nutt (Oklahoma State, 1981) is in his second season at the Ole Miss helm, after being named the University's 36th head football coach on Nov. 28, 2007. His first season in Oxford saw him lead the Rebels to a Cotton Bowl victory and earn SEC Coach of the Year billing for the third time in his career and Region top coaching honors for the fifth time. During his 10 years as the head coach at Arkansas, Nutt guided the Razorbacks to eight bowl berths, three SEC Western Division titles, two SEC Championship game appearances and an average of more than seven wins per season. He also served head coaching stints at Boise State and Murray State, where he captured two OVC Championships. Nutt is 5-6 against LSU as a head coach.

LSU HEAD COACH LES MILES: Les Miles is 50-13 in his fifth season as the head coach of the LSU Tigers. Miles guided the Tigers to a BCS Championship in 2007 and has led the team to three top-five final rankings. He has a career mark of 78-34 in nine seasons as a collegiate head coach. Prior to LSU, Miles served four seasons as the head coach at

Oklahoma State from 2001-2004, posting a 28-21 record and guiding the Cowboys to three bowl appearances. One of those postseason berths was the 2004 Cotton Bowl, where his OSU squad lost to Ole Miss 31-28 in Miles' first confrontation with the Rebels. The 2002 Big 12 Coach of the Year, Miles served as an assistant with Michigan, Colorado and the Dallas Cowboys before taking over at OSU. He is 3-2 in his career against Ole Miss.

LSU SCOUTING REPORT: For the Tiger offense, sophomore QB Jordan Jefferson is averaging 170.6 passing yards per game and has totaled 12 TDs and four interceptions. Among his targets is one of the SEC's top receiving tandems in Brandon LaFell (43-560-9) and Terrance Toliver (42-547-3). Defensively, LSU ranks third in the SEC in scoring defense (13.7 ppg) and fourth in total defense (311.8 ypg). Junior LB Kelvin Sheppard is the team leader in tackles with 87, including 8.0 TFLs. The Tiger special teams unit is highlighted by senior returner Trindon Holliday, who averages 23.1 yards per kickoff and an SEC-best 14.0 per punt.

LAST FIVE MEETINGS VS. LSU

November 22, 2008 • Baton Rouge, La.: Ole Miss 31, LSU 13: Jevan Snead threw two TD passes. Marketh Summers ran for a 13-yard score out of the "Wild Rebel" formation and Ole Miss won its fourth straight game with a 31-13 triumph over No. 18 LSU.

8:46, including a fourth down scoring toss to Dwayne Bowe in the final seconds of regulation. LSU could have won after that TD, but the Rebels blocked the extra point to force overtime.

November 17, 2007 • Oxford, Miss.: LSU 41, Ole Miss 24: Trindon Holliday returned a kickoff 98 yards for a score, and LSU forced two turnovers during goal-line stands to defeat Ole Miss, 41-24.

November 19, 2005 • Oxford, Miss.: LSU 40, Ole Miss 7: JaMarcus Russell threw two TD passes in a 40-7 victory for LSU, who held Ole Miss to 7 yards rushing. The Rebels avoided their first shutout since 1998 when Micheal Spurlock threw a 7-yard TD pass to Taye Biddle with under three minutes to play.

November 18, 2006 • Baton Rouge, La.: LSU 23, Ole Miss 20: Colt David kicked a 26-yard FG in overtime to lift No. 9 LSU to a 23-20 victory. Ole Miss built a 20-7 lead, before JaMarcus Russell tossed two TDs in the last

November 20, 2004 • Baton Rouge, La.: LSU 27, Ole Miss 24: Alley Broussard ran for a school-record 250 yards with 3 TDs and No. 14 LSU rallied to beat Ole Miss 27-24. The Rebels held a 24-17 lead early in the third quarter after Trumaine McBride intercepted JaMarcus Russell and returned it 48 yards for a TD, followed by a 2-point conversion. Chris Jackson connected on a 42-yard kick to pull LSU to 24-20 at the end of the third, and in the fourth, the Tigers drove 61 yards, with Broussard giving LSU the lead on a 7-yard scoring run with 10:51 left in the game.

MAGNOLIA BOWL: In 2008, student governments from Ole Miss and LSU worked to enhance the spirit of the football rivalry and introduced the Magnolia Bowl. After first garnering the support of the universities' athletics departments and alumni associations, student leaders set forth in April 2008 with a "Name that Rivalry" campaign for students to provide input on the name via text messaging. The student governments then voted in their respective Student Senates. The student body president of the winning school will present the trophy to their team following the game, and the prize will remain with that team until the following year's encounter. Ole Miss prevailed 31-13 in the initial playing of the Magnolia Bowl.

OLE MISS VS. RANKED OPPONENTS

- In No. 8 LSU, Ole Miss encounters its second ranked opponent of the year, having lost to No. 3 Alabama 22-3 on Oct. 10.
- Last year, Ole Miss faced five top-25 foes, all away from from Oxford ... The Rebels posted a 3-2 mark, defeating No. 4 Florida 31-30, No. 18 LSU 31-13 and No. 8 Texas Tech 47-34 (Cotton Bowl) and falling at No. 20 Wake Forest 30-28 and No. 2 Alabama 24-20.
- Prior to last year's Florida win, Ole Miss had dropped 15 straight games against ranked opposition ... The previous victory over a top-25 foe had been a 31-28 road win at No. 25 South Carolina in 2004
- Ole Miss is 56-129-2 all-time versus ranked teams.

LOUISIANA REBELS: Thirteen members of the Ole Miss roster hail from the Pelican state, including a pair of offensive starters from Baton Rouge in RB **Brandon Bolden** and C **Daverin Geraldts**. Other Rebels from Louisiana include FB **Ben Benedetto** (Metairie), QB **Danny Blanks** (Baton Rouge), WR **Lionel Breaux** (New Orleans), CB **Marshay Green** (Bastrop), K **David Hankins** (Shreveport), OL **Rishaw Johnson** (Hammond), S **Kendrick Lewis** (New Orleans), DE **Kentrell Lockett** (Hahville), CB **Jeremy McGee** (New Orleans), LB **Patrick Trahan** (New Orleans) and OL **Alex Washington** (Monroe).

50 WIN CLUB: With the win over Tennessee, Rebel head coach **Houston Nutt** earned his 50th career coaching victory in SEC play (50-46). Nutt is just the 14th conference coach all-time to reach that mark and only the third current coach, joining South Carolina's Steve Spurrier (105) and Georgia's Mark Richt (52). With a 91-55 overall mark as an SEC coach, Nutt ranks 18th all-time in the league in coaching victories and behind only Spurrier (156-54-1) among active coaches.

AMAZING McCLUSTER

- Senior **Dexter McCluster** posted school records of 282 rushing yards and 324 all-purpose yards against Tennessee ... The previous Ole Miss rushing record was 242 by Dou Innocent against Mississippi State in 1995, and the old all-purpose record had been 317 by Deuce McAllister vs. Arkansas in 1999 ... It also marked the most rushing yards ever surrendered by Tennessee.
- McCluster's 324 all-purpose yards is the 8th highest in SEC history and the 7th highest in an SEC intra-conference game ... His 282 rushing yards is the 11th highest in SEC history and the 7th highest in an SEC intra-conference game.
- McCluster's four rushing TDs against the Vols tie four others for the second-most in school history, most recently Randy Baldwin against Arkansas State in 1990.
- McCluster was named the Walter Camp Football Foundation National Offensive Player of the Week and the SEC Offensive

Player of the Week ... It marks his second SEC weekly award in the past four weeks and the third of his career.

- McCluster is averaging 197.0 rushing yards and 262.3 all-purpose yards with five TDs over the last three SEC games ... He has topped 100 rushing yards and 200 all-purpose yards in each outing ... McClusters' 79-yard TD run at Auburn marked the longest rush of his career and the longest by an Ole Miss player since Deuce McAllister galloped 80 yards for a score against Oklahoma in the 1999 Independence Bowl. Against the Razorbacks ... He finished with 186 rushing yards on the Plains.
- Against Arkansas, McCluster became the first Rebel in the modern era (records dating back to 1965) to top the 100-yard mark in both rushing and receiving ... McCluster posted team highs of 123 rushing yards and a career-high 137 receiving yards off a career high-tying seven grabs ... He finished with 260 all-purpose yards, which had been the most by a Rebel since McCluster's own career-best 268-yard performance in his Ole Miss debut against Memphis in 2006.
- In one week, McCluster jumped from not appearing among the SEC rushing leaders to ranking currently sixth with 755 yards ... He also stands seventh in the league in all-purpose yards with 1,177 ... McCluster is second on the team in receiving (31 rec, 394 yds) ... Last year, McCluster joined Florida's Percy Harvin as the only players to rank top 10 in the SEC in rushing yards, receiving yards, receptions and all-purpose yards.
- McCluster has risen to No. 2 on the Ole Miss career all-purpose yardage list with 3,549, behind only Deuce McAllister's 4,889 (1997-2000).

REBEL NOTEBOOK

- Ole Miss has earned bowl eligibility for the second straight year ... The Rebels previously made consecutive bowl games in 2002 and 2003 ... Ole Miss ranks 17th all-time in bowl appearances (32) and 12th in wins (20).
- Ole Miss is off to its best start since 2003, when the team opened at 8-2 overall ... The Rebels were 6-4 at this point a year ago.
- Ole Miss has opened SEC play 3-3 for the second straight year.
- The Rebels are the second-least penalized team in the SEC, having committed only 48 penalties for an average of 39.7 yards per game.
- The South Carolina loss snapped an eight-game win streak, which was the Rebels' longest streak since reeling off 10 consecutive triumphs during the 1971-72 seasons ... It was the second-longest win streak in the nation ... Ole Miss' previous loss was the 24-20 setback at No. 2 Alabama last year.

OFFENSIVE PRODUCTION

- Ole Miss is averaging 473.0 yards over the last five games.
- The Rebel offense has reached 500 yards of total offense three times this season and finished just eight yards shy of the mark with 492 against Tennessee ... The 553 yards against Arkansas marked the most by a Rebel offense since posting 567 against Wyoming in 2004.
- Ole Miss ranks fourth in the SEC in scoring offense (31.1 ppg) and fifth in total offense (405.6 ypg).
- Ole Miss is averaging 35.2 points per outing over its last 14 games ... Included in this span of games is a 59-0 blanking of Louisiana-Monroe, which was Ole Miss' largest margin of victory since 1969.
- The South Carolina game snapped a school-record streak of four straight games with 45 or more points.

POSTGAME: Coach Nutt will hold a postgame news conference with the media in the team meeting room of the Indoor Practice Facility. Athletics Media Relations office representatives will be available to assist in postgame interviews. Complete postgame plans will be announced on gameday in the press box by the Athletics Media Relations Director. 'THE BLIND SIDE' OPENS IN THEATERS NOVEMBER 20

The Warner Bros. motion picture "The Blind Side," which chronicles the youth of former Ole Miss All-American Michael Oher, arrives in theaters on November 20.

Based on Michael Lewis' 2006 bestselling book "The Blind Side: Evolution of a Game," the movie features Sandra Bullock, Tim McGraw, Oscar winner Kathy Bates and Quinton Aaron as Oher. Among the coaches making special appearances in the film is Ole Miss' Houston Nutt, who recruited Oher as a prep standout and coached him his senior season.

The movie depicts the remarkable true story of Oher, a homeless youngster from a broken home, taken in by the Tuohys, a prominent Memphis family who help him fulfill his potential. At the same time, Oher's presence in the Tuohys' lives leads them to some insightful self-discoveries of their own. Living in his new environment, the teen faces a completely different set of challenges to overcome.

Bullock and McGraw play the roles of Leigh Anne and Sean Tuohy, who was a three-time All-SEC basketball player at Ole Miss (1979-82) and remains the SEC all-time assist leader.

Oher, an offensive tackle, garnered All-America honors each of his final two seasons with the Rebels and All-SEC accolades in his final three. A starter in 47 consecutive games over his Ole Miss career, Oher was the 23rd overall pick of the Baltimore Ravens in the 2009 NFL Draft.

catches, and he was among three true freshmen that scored touchdowns against Southeastern Louisiana, including Grandy on a 46-yard run and LB **D.T. Shackelford** on a 58-yard interception return. A pair of freshmen provided the offensive spark against UAB as Grandy returned the opening kickoff 88 yards for a TD, while RB **Rodney Scott** rushed for a team-high 57 yards and two TDs, the most rushing scores by a Rebel since 2007.

BALANCED BOLDEN: Sophomore RB **Brandon Bolden** continues to find different ways to contribute for the Rebels. The Baton Rouge native posted 127 all-purpose yards against Alabama, notching career bests of four receptions and 76 receiving yards, and against Northern Arizona, he racked up a team-high 85 rushing yards, including a 45-yard TD run, and a pair of catches for four yards. Bolden totaled 80 all-purpose yards against Arkansas with 62 rushing yards on 14 attempts and two catches for 18 yards, and at Auburn, he matched his career best of four receptions for 46 yards, including a career-long 43-yarder. As a rusher, Bolden has led the team in rushing in four games this year and is second on the team with an average of 56.9 ypg. He has topped 60 yards on the ground five times this year. He reached the 100-yard mark for the second time in his career with 105 yards on 13 carries against Southeastern Louisiana. At Vanderbilt, he ran for 89 yards on a career-high 16 carries. He notched a career-high two rushing TDs against Tennessee. As a receiver, Bolden is third on the team with 17 catches and 188 yards. Bolden has also contributed in the return game with an average of 23.1 ypr in his seven kickoff returns.

- A total of 15 Rebels have scored TDs this season, led by the eight scores of **Dexter McCluster**.
- Junior WR **Marketh Summers** is first on the team in yards per catch with a 22.9 average and is tied for second in TD catches with three ... Summers posted a career-high three catches for 25 yards against Northern Arizona ... He hauled in a career-long 65-yard reception against UAB ... He collected two grabs for 60 yards at South Carolina.

JIMMY LEAR NAMED SEC FOOTBALL LEGEND

Former Ole Miss QB Jimmy Lear is among the All-Americans, both on the playing field and in the classroom, and All-SEC performers that comprise the 2009 Southeastern Conference Football Legends Class.

Lear (1950-52) earned first team All-America honors in 1952, playing three years for Coach John Vaught. Lear ranks 23rd on the Ole Miss all-time passing yardage list with 1,773 yards and led the Rebels to their first undefeated regular season in 1952 which was capped off by a berth in the Sugar Bowl against Georgia Tech.

Lear helped lead the No. 11 Rebels to a 21-14 victory over No. 3 and undefeated Maryland in 1952, the game that many consider to have put Ole Miss football on the national map.

Although considered one of the best running quarterbacks in Ole Miss history, Lear made his mark as an outstanding passer, helping the Rebels lead the SEC in passing in 1951 and 1952.

The Legends will be honored at this year's SEC "Weekend of Champions" which culminates with the SEC Football Championship Game on Sat., Dec. 5 at the Georgia Dome.

The SEC Legends Dinner presented by AT&T will feature the legends from the 12 SEC schools on Friday, Dec. 4 at the Hyatt Regency Atlanta. The legends will also be recognized on the field prior to the kickoff of the championship game.

CBS' Verne Lundquist will serve again as the master of ceremonies for the 2009 SEC Legends Dinner.

REBELS AMONG NATION'S PRESEASON TOP 10: Ole Miss earned its highest preseason football ranking in nearly 40 years, as the Rebels are No. 8 by the Associated Press and No. 10 in the USA Today Preseason Coaches' Top 25. The last time Ole Miss reached this high in the polls was the 1970 campaign, when the Rebels entered the year at No. 5 and rose as high as No. 4. Prior to the regular-season finale with Mississippi State on Nov. 26, Ole Miss stood at No. 10 and has not returned to that point until now. The Rebels were last ranked in the preseason in 2000, when they opened the year 18th. The program's highest preseason ranking came in 1964 with the squad starting the year as the nation's top-ranked team. As defending national champion in various polls, Ole Miss began the 1960 and 1963 seasons second in the polls, and the 1960 team went on to earn the second of Ole Miss' three shared national title (*see page 9 for the Rebels' all-time results in ranked games*). NUTTIN' BUT WINNIN': In his first season in Oxford, Rebel head coach **Houston Nutt** immediately reversed the Rebels' fortunes and became just the fifth Ole Miss coach to guide the Rebels to a

bowl in his first season. With a 9-4 record and a 5-3 mark in the SEC, Nutt led one of the greatest turnarounds in school history, reviving a Rebel squad that was coming off four straight losing seasons and a 3-8 campaign with no conference wins in 2007. It marked the team's best improvement from one season to the next since legendary Ole Miss Coach John Vaught's debut in 1947. Nutt's efforts earned him SEC Coach of the Year honors (SEC Coaches and The Touchdown Club of Atlanta) for the third time in his decorated career and AFCA Region Coach of the Year accolades for the fifth time. Including his decade of success at Arkansas, Nutt has guided his teams to nine bowl berths in the past 11 seasons, most of any SEC Western Division coach during this span. Nutt's squads recorded eight or more wins in seven of those 11 campaigns and nine or more victories in seven of those seasons in the SEC.

BATON ROUGE, La. (AP) - Houston Nutt showed once again he knows how to win in Tiger Stadium - which will certainly enhance his popularity at his new school.

Jevan Snead threw two touchdown passes, Markeith Summers ran for a 13-yard score out of the "Wild Rebel" formation and Ole Miss won its fourth straight game with a 31-13 triumph over No. 18 LSU.

Ole Miss (7-4, 4-3 Southeastern Conference) snapped a six-game losing streak against LSU (7-4, 3-4) with its first win in the long rivalry since 2001.

Snead was 16-of-25 for 274 yards. His scoring passes went for 34 and 25 yards, both to Mike Wallace.

Ole Miss was dominant on defense as well, knocking LSU starting quarterback Jarrett Lee out of the game and holding the Tigers to only one touchdown. The Rebels committed to shutting down LSU's powerful running game, holding the Tigers to 37 yards on 29 carries. They dared LSU's young quarterbacks to throw and the Tigers could not answer the challenge. Ole Miss had four sacks.

Lee was 4-of-12 for 49 yards and one interception before he was sidelined with a right ankle injury late in the first half. Jefferson came on to lead LSU on its only touchdown drive. He wound up 10-of-20 for 129 yards, one TD and one interception. He was sacked three times, the final time when LSU tried to pass on fourth-and-23 in the fourth quarter.

The Rebels needed only one possession to take a 7-0 lead. LSU got crossed up in pass coverage on third-and-17, leaving Wallace wide open over the middle for his 34-yard TD.

Colt David's 46-yard field goal made it 7-3. But Ole Miss struck back when Nutt called for a fake punt on fourth-and-4. Upback Jason Cook cut off the long snap and passed to Kendrick Lewis for a 33-yard gain to the LSU 5. Soon after, Brandon Bolden's 3-yard run made it 14-3.

The Rebels went 81 yards in five plays on their next drive, which was capped by Snead's pinpoint loft down the sideline to Wallace in the end zone.

Lee's injury occurred on LSU's next series. He was backpedaling under pressure when he lofted a first-down pass to Brandon LaFell just before being brought down hard by Ole Miss defensive tackle Jerry Peria. The 6-foot-2, 290-pound Peria landed on top of Lee and the quarterback's right leg appeared to fold awkwardly under him.

Jordan came on in relief and threw his 9-yard TD pass to Terrance Toliver four plays later, pulling LSU to 21-10 before halftime. David's 52-yard field goal on the opening series of the second half made it 21-13 and the momentum appeared to be shifting, but Nutt has this Ole Miss squad playing with too much confidence to fold.

Snead recognized another breakdown in LSU coverage and hit a wide open Lionel Breaux down the left sideline for 39-yards to the Tigers 16. Three plays later, the single wing formation known at Ole Miss as the "Wild Rebel" produced points when Summers took a handoff from Dexter McCluster and ran around the left end to make it 28-13.

OXFORD, Miss. (AP) - Dexter McCluster rushed for 282 yards and finished with 324 all-purpose yards, setting records at both Ole Miss and Tennessee as his Rebels ran over the Volunteers 42-17.

His rushing yards broke the Rebels record of 242 by Dou Innocent in 1995. He eclipsed the all-purpose mark of 317 yards by Deuce McAllister in 1999.

McCluster scored on runs of 15, 23, 32 and 71 yards in Ole Miss' first win against the Volunteers since 1983.

It's the most rushing yards given up by the Volunteers. Tennessee had yielded 217 yards to Colorado's Mike Pritchard in 1990 and Alabama's Bobby Humphrey in 1986.

Ole Miss (7-3, 3-3 Southeastern Conference) - off to its best start since 2003 - clinched bowl eligibility for the second straight year with the victory. It was the Rebels first win against Tennessee (5-5, 2-4) in 13 games.

McCluster scored his first touchdown just 1:31 into the game and added another with 1:20 left in the opening quarter. His 32-yard scamper came in the third quarter and Ole Miss opened the fourth quarter with McCluster's 71-yarder.

Brandon Bolden added 46 rushing yards and two touchdowns for the Rebels, who finished with 492 yards of total offense, including 359 on the ground.

It was former Ole Miss coach Ed Orgeron's first return to Oxford since he was fired in November 2007 after three seasons. In his first year at Tennessee as defensive line coach the Vols have improved, but struggled against the Rebels.

Jevan Snead, who was 13 of 20 passes for 133 yards, was sacked only once.

Jonathan Compton finished 20 of 37 for 176 yards and two Tennessee touchdowns. He hit Jeff Cottam with a 16-yard TD in the first quarter and Denarius Moore with a 25-yarder in the second quarter.

But the Vols' offense never got untracked, gaining just 275 yards over all, 99 on the ground. Their only other score was a 27-yard field goal by Daniel Lincoln in the third quarter.

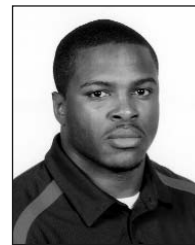

(AP) - Ole Miss quarterback Jevan Snead recovered from a slow start to throw two late touchdowns and Dexter McCluster scored twice to lead the No. 8 Rebels to a 45-14 win over Memphis. Snead hit 4 of 5 passes for 73 yards and two touchdowns in the fourth quarter, breaking open a close game.

Snead was the focus of preseason hype and mentioned as a dark horse candidate for the Heisman Trophy. But when the spotlight first hit him in 2009, he struggled. He completed just 8 of 17 passes for 102 yards with two interceptions through three quarters, missing badly at times.

It took a big play by Fon Ingram to wipe away those troubles.

It looked like Memphis might take the lead late in the second quarter. The Tigers trailed 10-7 and appeared to have an opportunity to take the lead with a solid drive when Ingram stepped in front of Arkelon Hall's pass and returned it 38 yards for a 17-7 halftime lead.

That gave Ole Miss confidence going into the second half and Snead completed his personal comeback with a couple of rapid-fire touchdowns of 18 yards to Markeith Summers and 17 yards to McCluster in the fourth.

His counterpart had a much more difficult time in the face of pressure from Ole Miss' defensive line.

Hall completed 15 of 30 passes with two interceptions for 110 yards. He had 37 yards in the first half and limited the Tigers' effectiveness with several poor passes well off the mark.

The Tigers had 284 total yards, three turnovers and were 0 for 2 on fourth-down conversions and 4 for 16 on third down.

The defense's early stand was repaid as the offense gained strength. Brandon Bolden rushed for 71 yards on nine carries, scored one touchdown and set up McCluster's 1-yard plunge in the third quarter with a 28-yard run.

McCluster had 50 yards rushing as both the Wild Rebel quarterback and an I-formation tailback and 65 yards receiving, too. Enrique Davis finished off the game with a 29-yard scoring run.

The Rebels (2-0) won their eighth straight game - their longest winning streak since they won 10 in 1971-72.

Ole Miss, which had about a third of its roster sick with swine flu symptoms during their off week, steps up in class next week with its Southeastern Conference opener at South Carolina on Thursday night.

Shackelford recovered two fumbles and finished off the scoring with a 58-yard interception return for touchdown against the Lions.

Snead completed 16 of 28 passes for 208 yards and Bolden averaged 8.1 yards per carry and was over 100 yards in the first half.

The Ole Miss defense continued to make the plays, though. The Rebels forced five turnovers, turning three into 21 points and ending two scoring threats deep in Rebels territory. They held the Lions to 302 yards and didn't allow a single third-down conversion in 14 tries. Cassius Vaughn intercepted a pass deep in Rebels territory that kept the Lions off the scoreboard early.

The statistics show the Ole Miss offense with 500 total yards and 258 yards rushing after going up 24-0 at halftime.

Snead threw two of his three touchdowns in the first half, extending his school record to eight straight games with multiple scoring passes.

The Rebels scored more than 40 points for the fourth straight game, a school record.

Bolden was a beast in the first half. He broke tackles at the line of scrimmage and downfield and set up Ole Miss' first touchdown with an athletic run that included a whiplash-inducing stiff-arm and a burst of speed at the corner.

Star passer Jevan Snead was hounded all game and the fourth-ranked Rebels never got in gear, losing to South Carolina 16-10.

Spencer Lanning kicked three field goals and fullback Patrick DiMarco a key 2-yard TD catch for the Gamecocks.

Ole Miss (2-1, 0-1) had one last chance at a go-ahead TD that would've extended its eight-game winning streak. But Snead was sacked by Cliff Matthews, then had a fourth-down pass knocked away by Darian Stewart.

Snead, the Ole Miss junior, missed six straight throws during one stretch but did come through with a critical play. His 45-yard TD pass to Markeith Summers with under 10 minutes left in the game that cut it to 16-10.

South Carolina's defense had to come through after that because the offense, which controlled things for much of the first three quarters went three-and-out on its final four possessions.

Snead's 11-yard pass to Pat Patterson brought Ole Miss to the Gamecock 32 with 2:55 to play. Then coach Houston Nutt tried to outfox South Carolina.

Snead had thrown at least two TD passes in each of his past eight games. He finished this game 7 of 21 for 107 yards.

Bolden appeared to get things going with a 59-yard touchdown run. A holding penalty, however, brought that back and the Rebels eventually settled for their only points of the half on Joshua Shene's 42-yard field goal.

Ole Miss came close to scoring just once more, but instead of another field goal, Nutt went with a fake. Holder Justin Sparks' pass to Derrick Davis came up 2 yards shy of a first down.

Garcia fumbled away one drive after a sack on Ole Miss 16 in the first quarter. An illegal shift on the Rebels' 4 led to Lanning's first field goal.

Freshman receiver Tori Gurley caught Garcia's pass and took it in for a 12-yard score right before halftime. But South Carolina was flagged for an ineligible receiver downfield. Lanning converted a 20-yard field goal to put the Gamecocks ahead 6-3 at the break.

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) - Jevan Snead passed for three touchdowns as No. 18 Ole Miss bounced back with a 23-7 victory over Vanderbilt.

Snead threw for just one touchdown in last week's 16-10 loss to South Carolina, a game that dropped the Rebels (3-1, 1-1 SEC) from a No. 4 ranking that had been their highest since 1970. He matched his season high with three TDs against Vanderbilt in helping the Rebels to their best start since 2002 when they opened 5-1.

The Commodores (2-3, 0-2) picked off four Snead passes a year ago in Oxford, Miss. They nearly matched that with Jamie Graham, Casey Heyward and Myron Lewis each intercepting a pass.

But Ole Miss' Marcus Temple intercepted Larry Smith in the end zone with 10:55 left to help preserve a 23-7 lead.

Ole Miss outgained Vanderbilt 397-240 and held the ball for nearly 36 minutes. The Commodores disintegrated twice inside the Ole Miss 20 in the first half. They missed two field goal attempts and finished with an uncharacteristic 12 penalties for 74 yards.

Ole Miss did its part, sacking Smith four times. Nutt said he thought his defense was outstanding, though Vandy had scored only 12 points combined in its two previous SEC games.

Snead came in having completed 49.3 percent of his passes and ranked 65th nationally in passing efficiency. He looked much more like the quarterback who led the Rebels to a Cotton Bowl win as he guided them to three scoring drives in the first half.

He had two TD passes in the second quarter. His best throw of the night, a 48-yarder down the right sideline to Shay Hodge on third-and-16, set up his 12-yard TD pass to Brandon Bolden for a 17-0 halftime lead.

He made it 23-0 by capping the Rebels' opening drive of the third quarter with a 7-yard TD to Hodge, his second of the game. Snead finished 19 of 34 for 237 yards, all season highs.

The defense rallied and came up big again late in the third quarter after Reamer stripped Dexter McCluster on a punt return and recovered the fumble, giving Alabama the ball at the Ole Miss 40. Jonathan Cornell and Kentrell Lockett sacked McElroy for an 11-yard loss on first down, but Ingram picked up the Tide's third fourth-down conversion, then carried the ball to the 3 with a 24-yard run.

The Rebels, however, forced the Tide back a yard on the next three plays before Kiffin's fourth field goal.

After Kareem Jackson returned an interception deep into Rebels territory in the fourth quarter, the Ole Miss defense forced a fumble. Ole Miss defensive backs also knocked two passes away from Julio Jones in the end zone.

Ole Miss gained 501 yards on offense, compared to 351 for UAB.

Scott led the Rebels on the ground with 57 yards on nine carries, and Brandon Bolden rushed for 56 yards on 12 rushes. Shay Hodge caught a team-high seven passes for 99 yards.

OXFORD, Miss. (AP) - Dexter McCluster set career highs in rushing and receiving, and Jevan Snead threw for a career-high 332 yards to lead Ole Miss to a 30-17 victory over Arkansas.

Ole Miss (5-2, 2-2 Southeastern Conference) jumped ahead 17-0 and controlled the line of scrimmage throughout. The Rebels could have won by more if not for three turnovers.

Arkansas (3-4, 1-4) pulled to 24-17 in the third quarter when Carlton Salters caught a tipped pass for a 58-yard touchdown, but the Razorbacks couldn't finish the rally and Ole Miss added two field goals in the fourth.

McCluster plays a variety of roles for Ole Miss, but he hadn't been much of a factor this season. That changed right away against Arkansas. He touched the ball on about half the Rebels' first-quarter plays and had already run for a career-high 108 yards by halftime.

In the second half, he caught a screen pass, eluded the first line of defense and went 64 yards to a touchdown and a 24-10 lead. He finished with 123 yards rushing and 137 receiving.

Arkansas kept it close with a touchdown on a lucky bounce. Ryan Mallett threw deep for Greg Childs on third-and-long. Childs went up with two Ole Miss defenders, and the ball caromed right to Salters, who jogged the final few feet to the end zone.

That made the score look respectable, but the Rebels controlled this game. They made 31 first downs to Arkansas' 13 and outgained the Razorbacks 553-299.

Snead opened the scoring with a 1-yard touchdown run, then threw a 25-yard scoring pass to Shay Hodge near the end of the first quarter. The Rebels kept Arkansas off balance in the second. Snead lined up out wide in the Wild Rebel formation, and when Ole Miss ran a reverse to him, he threw deep to Markeith Summers for a 39-yard gain that set up a field goal.

Arkansas finally scored to make it 17-7 on Knile Davis' 3-yard run with 2:15 left in the half.

AUBURN, Ala. (AP) - Chris Todd passed for 212 yards, Ben Tate ran for 144 yards and Walt McFadden returned an interception for a touchdown to lift Auburn to a 33-20 win over No. 22 Ole Miss.

The Tigers (6-3, 3-3 SEC) scored 23 points in the third quarter and turned away Jevan Snead and the Rebels (5-3, 2-3) seven times on drives to midfield or beyond.

Ole Miss had appeared to get back on track with two straight wins but couldn't overcome a frenzied third-quarter flurry that led to a 24-point hole.

McFadden stopped the Rebels' final chance by stepping in front of Snead's pass near the Auburn goal line for his second pick in the final minutes. He also had a 29-yard return for a score in the third quarter.

The teams traded huge momentum swings in the third quarter, combining for a wild 36 points. Auburn nearly reached its 24-point total of the previous two games.

The Tigers scored two touchdowns in 12 seconds to take a 24-7 lead with 11:25 left. First, Wildcat quarterback Kodi Burns tossed a 14-yard touchdown pass to tight end Tommy Trott. On the next play, McFadden snagged the ball with his right hand after it bounced off the hands of Markeith Summers, then shook off Summers and headed to the end zone.

Tate then scampered 53 yards for a score, becoming the fifth Auburn back to surpass 3,000 career yards.

Jesse Grandy answered with an 82-yard kick return to push the margin back to 17 points, then the game got even wilder. Dexter McCluster sprinted 79 yards for a touchdown to make it 31-20. Joshua Shene's point after attempt hit a teammate in the back and Demond Washington returned it all the way for two points.

McCluster had his second straight huge game, rushing for 186 yards on 22 carries and catching four passes for another 17 a week after racking up 260 all-purpose yards.

Snead couldn't get going, completing 16 of 35 passes for 175 yards - 105 courtesy of Shay Hodge - and a touchdown and was hurt by several dropped passes.

Ole Miss opened the game by breezing 94 yards for a touchdown without facing a third-down play but trailed 10-7 at halftime.

OXFORD, Miss. (AP) - Shay Hodge scored two touchdowns on a career-high 169 receiving yards and Ole Miss pulled away from Northern Arizona 38-14.

With the Rebels' top offensive weapon Dexter McCluster getting much of the night off, Hodge scored twice, including a 65-yard strike from quarterback Jevan Snead.

The Lumberjacks (5-4) made the game interesting with a pair of second-quarter touchdowns, the second one tying the score at 14 with just under 8 minutes left in the half. But the Rebels (6-3) responded with 24 unanswered points.

Snead threw for two touchdowns and rushed for two more, and Hodge came up with his second consecutive 100-plus-yard game.

It was the fourth time this season that Snead did not throw an interception, with three of those games coming outside of conference play. The junior completed 16 of 29 passes for 235 yards. Hodge caught nearly half of those passes, finishing with seven receptions.

Northern Arizona quarterback Michael Herrick returned to the school that signed him out of high school. The junior who did not play in two seasons with the Rebels, threw for 233 yards on 20-for-31 passing in his first action at Vaught-Hemingway Stadium.

Ole Miss blocked a pair of field goals in the second half. Kendrick Lewis blocked the first and Kentrell Lockett got the second.

Most of the action came during a second quarter, when the two teams combined for 38 of the game's 52 points.

Ole Miss quickly grabbed momentum when Marcus Tillman intercepted Herrick on the first play of the game and returned it to the 15-yard line. Five plays later, Snead completed a 6-yard touchdown pass to Hodge.

OXFORD, Miss. (AP) - Dexter McCluster rushed for 282 yards and finished with 324 all-purpose yards, setting records at both Ole Miss and Tennessee as his Rebels ran over the Volunteers 42-17.

His rushing yards broke the Rebels record of 242 by Dou Innocent in 1995. He eclipsed the all-purpose mark of 317 yards by Deuce McAllister in 1999.

McCluster scored on runs of 15, 23, 32 and 71 yards in Ole Miss' first win against the Volunteers since 1983.

It's the most rushing yards given up by the Volunteers. Tennessee had yielded 217 yards to Colorado's Mike Pritchard in 1990 and Alabama's Bobby Humphrey in 1986.

Ole Miss (7-3, 3-3 Southeastern Conference) - off to its best start since 2003 - clinched bowl eligibility for the second straight year with the victory. It was the Rebels first win against Tennessee (5-5, 2-4) in 13 games.

McCluster scored his first touchdown just 1:31 into the game and added another with 1:20 left in the opening quarter. His 32-yard scamper came in the third quarter and Ole Miss opened the fourth quarter with McCluster's 71-yarder.

Brandon Bolden added 46 rushing yards and two touchdowns for the Rebels, who finished with 492 yards of total offense, including 359 on the ground.

It was former Ole Miss coach Ed Orgeron's first return to Oxford since he was fired in November 2007 after three seasons. In his first year at Tennessee as defensive line coach the Vols have improved, but struggled against the Rebels.

Jevan Snead, who was 13 of 20 passes for 133 yards, was sacked only once.

Jonathan Compton finished 20 of 37 for 176 yards and two Tennessee touchdowns. He hit Jeff Cottam with a 16-yard TD in the first quarter and Denarius Moore with a 25-yarder in the second quarter.

But the Vols' offense never got untracked, gaining just 275 yards over all, 99 on the ground. Their only other score was a 27-yard field goal by Daniel Lincoln in the third quarter.
