SEC FOOTBALL VIDEO REPLAY

THE OBJECTIVE

To allow for specific types of officiating calls to be immediately reviewed during all games hosted by SEC teams.

THE COACHES' CHALLENGE

Each head coach is allowed one Instant Replay challenge per game, which is exercised by requesting a team timeout. A head coach may issue a challenge only if his team has one or more timeouts remaining in the half. If the challenged ruling is overturned, the timeout is not charged, but the coach has no more challenges during that game.

THE SOURCE

All reviewable video comes direct from either the television network broadcasting the game (CBS Sports, ESPN, ESPN2, Lincoln Financial) or other TV production facilities that meet established conference standards. The Southeastern Conference, following approval by the NCAA Football Rules Committee, will implement the use of video replay on an experimental basis beginning with the 2005 football season.

THE PLAYS

Reviewable

1. Plays governed by Sideline, Goal Line, End Zone, and End Line:
 - a. Scoring Plays, including a runner breaking the plane of the goal line
 - b. Pass complete/incomplete/intercepted at sideline, goal line and end line
 - c. Runner/receiver in or out of bounds
 - d. Recovery of loose ball in and out of bounds
2. Passing Plays:
 - a. Pass ruled complete/ incomplete/ intercepted in the field of play and end zones
 - b. Touching of a forward pass by an ineligible receiver
 - c. Touching of a forward pass by a defensive player
 - d. Quarterback (Passer) forward pass or fumble (if ruled incomplete, play is finalized)
 - e. Illegal forward pass or illegal handing off beyond the line of scrimmage
 - f. Illegal forward pass or illegal handing off after change of possession
 - g. Forward or backward pass thrown from behind the line of scrimmage
3. Other Detectable Infractions:
 - a. Runner ruled not down.
 - b. Forward progress with respect to first down
 - c. Touching of a kick
 - d. Number of players on field
 - e. Clock adjustments (in conjunction with overturned plays)
 - f. Fourth-down/try fumble plays

THE PROCESS

Each SEC football stadium has a secured replay booth equipped with a DVSPORT Digital Replay System. Three individuals work in the booth for the duration of the game: 1. Replay Official, 2. Communicator, 3. Technician. The Replay Official is selected and assigned by the Conference Office.

A live video feed is sent directly to the replay booth. The Technician watches the feed on an input monitor while capturing/digitizing it into the DVSPORT Digital Replay System. The Technician also marks the beginning of each play as well as any replays as they occur in real time.

Each play and subsequent replay then appears on a touch screen in front of the Communicator. As the Technician marks the incoming video, each view (by mark) will appear as a small picture on the computer touch screen. At any time, the Communicator can touch/click on a thumbnail and immediately send that play/replay to the Replay Official.

With the Communicator's assistance, the Replay Official can quickly jump between replays while playing back the video. All replay video navigation is done via a remote device controlled by the Replay Official. All replays/video are viewed on an output monitor. The touch screen is only used to select the replays.

While most plays are reviewed between the whistle and the beginning of the next play, the Replay Official can stop play on the field by using a pager system. Five onfield officials wear pagers. If play is stopped the Referee announces on the stadium PA microphone that play has been stopped so the previous play can be reviewed. The Referee then proceeds to the sideline headset, which provides direct communication to the Replay Official in the booth. Once the play has been reviewed, the Replay Official notifies the Referee, who then announces the decision on the stadium PA system.

THE EQUIPMENT

Each SEC member institution uses the Digital Replay System developed by DVSPORT of Pittsburgh, Pa. The replay systems are maintained by the home institution with technical support from DVSPORT.

2007 SEC FOOTBALL CHAMPIONSHIP GAME

The SEC's Eastern and Western Division winners will meet in Atlanta's Georgia Dome to battle for the league championship and the right to represent the conference in the Bowl Championship Series. The 16th-annual title game is set for December 1 and will be nationally televised by CBS Sports at 4:00 p.m. ET.

The game is a result of conference expansion, which saw Arkansas and South Carolina become the first members added in SEC history. Under NCAA regulations, a conference with 12 members may play a 12th football game to determine its champion, provided the regular season is played in divisions.

The participants of the game are determined each year during the eight-game regular-season conference schedule as the teams with the best overall SEC winning percentage in each division.

The 1994 SEC Championship Game earned a 10.5 rating and a 26 share, the highest rated SEC Championship Game in history.

The SEC Championship Game has also drawn capacity crowds in its history. 1,120,836 fans have witnessed first-hand the pageantry of SEC Football at the 15 previous Championship Games.

Attendance at the 15 previous championship games has been 102.3 percent of stadium capacity, including 13 sellouts.

THIS WEEK IN SEC FOOTBALL HISTORY

As the Southeastern Conference celebrates its 75th anniversary, here is a look at some of the highlights during the upcoming game dates in its history:



Oct. 20

1933 - In the first year of the Southeastern Conference, Georgia ventures outside of conference play and defeats Mercer, 13-12, in Macon, Ga. Harry Mehre's Bulldogs finish the season 8-2 overall. In five more games that season, Mercer allows just six points.

1945 - Unranked LSU goes to Athens and shuts out #12 Georgia, 32-0. The Tigers move to #13 in the AP poll following the game and finish the season with a 7-2 overall and 5-2 SEC record.

1990 - In a 30-20 loss at LSU, Kentucky linebacker Randy Holleran sets a school record with 29 total tackles. Holleran finishes the season with 174 total tackles, which at the time, was tied for second (currently tied for third) in Wildcat history.

In a battle of two top 10 teams, #5 Auburn defeats #7 Florida State, 20-17, on the Plains. The Tigers move to #2 in the AP polls after the victory and finish the season with a 8-3-1 overall and 4-2-1 SEC record.

CBS SPORTS - The 2007 season marks the 11th year for CBS as the league's national network television partner. CBS will televise up to 15 games per year throughout the season. CBS will normally broadcast its SEC games in the late afternoon window beginning at 3:30 p.m. ET. CBS provides exclusive national network broadcasts of conference home games during the season. CBS will televise the SEC Football Championship Game, which will be on Dec. 1 at 4 p.m. ET.

ESPN/ESPN2, the SEC's national cable provider, may televise up to 18 regular season games each year, with a minimum of nine on ESPN through the season. ESPN GamePlan offers fans extra college football games and is available on television or online. Viewers can order ESPN GamePlan on ESPN.com (search "GamePlan"), or by contacting their cable or satellite Pay-Per-View provider.

LINCOLN FINANCIAL SPORTS (LFS) (Formerly **Jefferson-Pilot Sports**) will continue its highly successful SEC Football Game of the Week this season. The Charlotte, N.C. company, holds the rights to televise 13 games annually throughout the nine-state SEC region on a syndicated basis. The games will be broadcast in the early afternoon at 12:30 p.m. ET.

FOX Sports Net South (FSNS), FOX Sports Net Southwest (FSNSW) and SUN Sports (SUN) together form **SEC-TV**, the league's regional cable package. SEC-TV Weekly airs Thursday nights and Saturday mornings during the season, highlighting all of the SEC's athletic teams and events.

SEC BOWL AGREEMENTS

The Southeastern Conference has agreements to send eight of its member institutions to postseason bowl games following the 2007 season. The winner of the SEC Championship Game will automatically participate in the Bowl Championship Series comprised of the Sugar, Rose, Orange and Fiesta Bowls.

The Capital One (2nd), will then make its pick following the BCS selections. The bowl must select the team with the next best overall record or a team that is within one win of the team with the next best overall record.

The Outback, Chick-fil-A and AT&T Cotton Bowls will work with the conference office to determine picks 3-5. The Cotton Bowl has the first preference of teams from the Western Division and the Outback Bowl has first preference of teams from the Eastern Division. The Cotton or Outback Bowl can select teams outside of its divisional preference, but must not select them before the opposite bowl selects from its divisional preference. The Chick-fil-A Bowl has the selection of preference following the Cotton and Outback Bowls.

In selections 6-7, the AutoZone Liberty and Gaylord Hotels Music City Bowls will make their selections, not in any specific order, but in consultation with the SEC Office. The Bowls will rank available qualified teams in order of preference. If there are no similarities in the order of selection, the bowls will be granted its selection. If the bowls rank the same teams in preference, the team involved in the process would get its preference of which bowl to participate.

The PetroSun Independence Bowl will receive the eighth selection of available SEC teams.

2008 BOWL CHAMPIONSHIP SERIES SCHEDULE

Following the 2007 college football regular season, the Bowl Championship Series will determine the National Championship. The BCS National Championship Game, which will stand alone from the four traditional BCS bowls but will be hosted by each of the bowls once during a four-year cycle.

The BCS consists of the FedEx Orange, Allstate Sugar, Rose presented by Citi, Tostitos Fiesta Bowl and the Allstate BCS National Championship Game. The conferences with automatic berths include the Atlantic Coast, Big East, Big Ten, Big 12, Pac-10 and Southeastern Conferences.

FOX Sports will televise all of the Bowl Championship Series games, with the exception of the Rose Bowl, which will be televised by ABC Sports.

The Bowl Championship Series guarantees a matchup between college football's top two teams in a true national championship game.

At the conclusion of the 2007 regular season, the Allstate BCS National Championship Game will be hosted in New Orleans on Jan. 7 at 8 p.m. EST. The Allstate BCS National Championship Game will have the top two teams ranked in the BCS final regular season standings.

The BCS uses regional consideration regarding team selection. Specifically, as a member of the BCS, the Rose Bowl will host the Big Ten and Pac-10 champions in those years in which either the Rose Bowl does not have the national championship game or the Big Ten and Pac-10 champion is not ranked No. 1 or No. 2. Other "regional consideration" tie-ins include the SEC champion in the Sugar Bowl, the ACC champion in the Orange Bowl and the Big 12 champion in the Fiesta Bowl.

Other BCS games following the 2007 regular season include the Rose Bowl on Jan. 1 at 4:30 p.m. EST, Sugar Bowl on Jan. 1 at 8:30 p.m. EST, Fiesta Bowl on Jan. 1 at 8:30 p.m. EST, and the Orange Bowl on Jan. 3 at 8 p.m. ET.

2007 SEC DIVISIONAL TIE-BREAKER

In the event of a tie for the division championship, the following procedures will be used to break all ties to determine the SEC Football Championship Game representative. All Conference versus Conference Games (both division and non-division) will be counted in the Conference Standings.

TWO-TEAM TIE. In the event two teams are tied for a division title, the following procedure will be used in the following order:

- A. Head-to-head competition between the two tied teams;
- B. Records of the tied teams within the division;
- C. Head-to-head competition against the team within the division with the best overall (divisional and non-divisional) Conference record, and proceeding through the division (multiple ties within the division will be broken from first to last and a tie for first place will be broken before a tie for fourth place);
- D. Overall record against non-divisional teams;
- E. Combined record against all common non-divisional teams;
- F. Record against the common non-divisional team with the best overall Conference record (divisional or non-divisional) and proceeding through other common non-divisional teams based on their order of finish within their division; and
- G. The tied team with the highest ranking in the Bowl Championship Series Standings following the last weekend of regular-season games shall be the divisional representative in the SEC Championship Game.

THREE-TEAM TIE (OR MORE). If three teams are tied for a division title, the following procedure will be used in the following order: (Note: If one of the procedures results in one team being eliminated and two remaining, the two-team tiebreaker procedure as stated in No. 1 above will be used):

- A. Combined head to head record among the tied teams;
- B. Record of the tied teams within the division;
- C. Head to head competition against the team within the division with the best overall Conference record (divisional and non divisional) and proceeding through the division (multiple ties within the division will be broken from first to last and a tie for first place will be broken before a tie for fourth place);
- D. Overall Conference record against non divisional teams;
- E. Combined record against all common non divisional teams;
- F. Record against the common non divisional team with the best overall Conference record (divisional and non divisional) and proceeding through other common non divisional teams based on their order of finish within their division; and
- G. The tied team with the highest ranking in the Bowl Championship Series Standings following the last weekend of regular-season games shall be the divisional representative in the SEC Championship Game, unless the second of the tied teams is ranked within five-or-fewer places of the highest-ranked tied team. In this case, the head-to-head results of the top two ranked tied teams shall determine the representative in the SEC Championship Game.

SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE TEAM NOTES



ALABAMA CRIMSON TIDE

Alabama rallied to score 10 points in the fourth quarter to capture a 27-24 win over Ole Miss Saturday. Terry Grant led the Tide with 62 yards on 16 carries and one touchdown. Grant's three-yard run for a TD in the fourth quarter gives him six rushing TD's this year, tying Shaun Alexander (1996) for the freshman record for rushing TD's. John Parker Wilson was 26 of 40 with one interception and threw for 265 yards. DJ Hall led the receiving corps with 11 catches for 140 yards. The 11 catches tied his career-high and it extended his streak of games with a catch to 26. Hall also recorded just his second 100-plus receiving game this season, 12th in his career. Javier Arenas led in all-purpose yards with 164 (93 kicking, 71 punt returns). He recorded a 54-yard punt return win the fourth to set up an Alabama touchdown that tied the game 24-24. Arenas is now second in the SEC in punt returns with 16.1 and 10th in kicking returns (22.6). The win also marked the first Tide victory at an opponent's stadium when trailing entering the fourth quarter since a 28-17 win at Auburn in 1999. This also marked the fifth consecutive Alabama game this season that has been decided by a touchdown or less.

FLORIDA GATORS



After a bye week, the Florida Gators return to action this week when they travel to Lexington, Ky. and face the Kentucky Wildcats. The meeting will be the 58th between the two teams and Florida leads the series 40-17, including a current 20-game win streak over the Wildcats. This marks the third time in the history of the series that both teams enter the game ranked. Florida is coming off of back-to-back losses for the first time since 2004. The Gators first loss came to the Auburn Tigers, 20-17, and then fell 28-24 to then-top-ranked LSU in Baton Rouge. Tim Tebow currently leads the Gator offense and ranks third in the league in passing (242.5 yards p/game) and 10th in rushing (83.3 yards p/game). He leads the league in total offense with 325.8 yards p/game. Also among conference leaders for the Gators is receiver Percy Harvin. Harvin is fourth in the SEC in receptions p/game with 5.33 and averages 16 yards per catch. As a team, Florida is second in the league in scoring offense with 39.7 and sixth in the league in scoring defense.

ARKANSAS RAZORBACKS

Arkansas suffered a heartbreaking 9-7 loss to Auburn Saturday as AU kicker Wes Byrum kicked a 20-yard field goal with 21 seconds left in the game to carry the Tigers over the Razorbacks. Quarterback Casey Dick connected with Lucas Miller for a 13-yard touchdown pass for Arkansas' only touchdown of the game. The TD gave the Razorbacks the lead with 1:36 to go in the game, but then Auburn drove 50-yards in 1:15 to set up the Byrum field goal. Despite being held to only 43 yards in the game, Darren McFadden broke Arkansas' all-time rushing record with a 13-yard rush in the third quarter. McFadden now has 3,582 yards rushing during his 31-game career. With a five-yard rush in the first quarter, McFadden also became the Razorbacks' all-time leader in all-purpose yards, passing Gary Anderson. McFadden now has 4,576 career all-purpose yards. The Arkansas offense was held scoreless in the first half, marking the first time since October 11, 2003 this has happened. The Razorbacks were held to just 67 yards rushing, a season low. It is the fewest yards rushing since Nov. 25, 2005 against LSU. The Tigers held Arkansas to just 35 yards in that game. Arkansas' seven points against Auburn marked its lowest output in 47 games, since Oct. 25, 2003.



GEORGIA BULLDOGS



Kicker Brandon Coutu snagged a 37-yard field goal as time expired to lift the Georgia Bulldogs over Vanderbilt 20-17 Saturday night in Nashville. With the win, Georgia improves to 5-2 and 3-2 in the SEC. The Bulldogs shutout Vanderbilt in the second half as Georgia rallied from being down 17-7. In the fourth quarter, linebacker Darryl Gamble forced a fumble and Dannell Ellerbe recovered it, which eventually set the scene for Coutu to tie the game with a 31-yard field goal. Tailback Knowshon Moreno rushed for a career-high 157 yards on 28 carries. Georgia's two touchdowns came from Sean Bailey and Brannan Southerland. In the first, Bailey caught a 32-yard pass from quarterback Matthew Stafford. Southerland scored the Bulldogs second touchdown in the third quarter with a one-yard run. Georgia recorded 368 total offensive yards to Vanderbilt's 310. Stafford was 16 of 31 for 201 yards with a touchdown. Tony Wilson led the team with four passes for 57 yards. Geno Atkins led the Bulldogs defensively with eight (three solo, five assists) total tackles. Ellerbe and Marcus Howard followed with six each. Georgia has a bye week this week and returns on Oct. 27 against Florida in Jacksonville.

AUBURN TIGERS



For the second time in three weeks, Auburn kicker Wes Byrum kicked the game-winning field goal for the Tigers as Auburn edged out Arkansas 9-7. The win puts Auburn back in the race for the SEC West title as the Tigers are now 5-2 and 3-1 in Southeastern Conference play. Byrum capped off the night with a 20-yard field goal with 21 second remaining on the clock. Despite missing two field goals, Byrum accounted for all nine of Auburn's points by making three field goals, a 22-yarder in the first quarter, and a 38-yard and 20-yard in the fourth. Defensively, Auburn held Arkansas to 193 offensive yards, a season low for an Auburn opponent. The Tigers also held Arkansas to 67 yards rushing, which was 271.4 yards below the Razorbacks' season average of 338.4. The AU defense held Darren McFadden to 43 yards rushing. Auburn did not allow a point in the first half for the third consecutive game. The Tigers have outscored their opponents 45-0 in the first half of their last three games. Ben Tate led in rushing with 93 yards on 23 carries, while Brad Lester followed with 89 yards on 21 carries. With 101 yards, Brandon Cox passed Pat Sullivan for third in AU history in career pass completions and now has 456 pass completions in his career.

KENTUCKY WILDCATS



The Kentucky Wildcats kept their SEC East title hopes alive Saturday as they upended top-ranked LSU in triple overtime, 43-37. A wide open Steve Johnson caught a 7-yard pass in the endzone from Andre Woodson for the victory. UK scored 13 straight points starting with a minute left in the third quarter to come from behind and tie the game 27-27. Both teams scored touchdowns in the first OT and field goals in the second OT before UK went up in the third and prevented LSU from getting a first down in the final four plays of the game. The Wildcats improve to 6-1 overall and 2-1 in SEC play and are tied for second in the East. The win also marks the first time in school history that UK has knocked off two top-10 ranked opponents at home in the same season. The Wildcats also set a Commonwealth Stadium record by winning its eighth straight home game with their 5-0 record this season. Kentucky had 375 yards of total offense, marking the 13th straight contest that the Wildcats have gone over the 300-yard total offense mark. Woodson finished 21 of 38 for 250 yards with three touchdown passes. He has thrown at least two touchdowns in eight straight games and is the third player in school history to record 7,000 career offensive yards.

SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE TEAM NOTES

LSU TIGERS



The top-ranked LSU football team lost for the first time in 14 games, as the No. 17 Kentucky Wildcats overcame the Tigers in three overtime periods, 43-37, on Saturday at Commonwealth Stadium. LSU (6-1, 3-1 SEC) led by 13 points late in the fourth quarter, 27-14, but was unable to hold off the Wildcats. LSU's streak of 25 straight games with a sack (dating back to North Texas in 2005) was broken at Kentucky. LSU's streak of nine straight successful fourth down conversions was snapped on the final play of the game. Prior to that the Tigers were a perfect 7-7 this season and had converted on the final two fourth-down attempts last season. LSU has scored points (4 TDs and 2 FGs) on its first possession of the second half in six of the seven games this season, including a touchdown in today's game. The South Carolina game is the only time the Tigers did not score on its first drive of the second half. Defensively, LSU has held six of seven opponents scoreless on the opening drive of the second half. Florida was the only team this season to score in its first possession of the second half against the Tigers.

SOUTH CAROLINA GAMECOCKS



The Gamecocks inched up in this week's national polls, rising one spot to sixth in the Associated Press poll and four spots to eighth in the USA Today/Coaches' poll, both announced today. In addition, the Gamecocks are ranked sixth in the country in the first edition of the BCS Standings. The Gamecocks are 6-1 on the season, 3-1 in the Southeastern Conference, following a 21-15 non-conference win at North Carolina. The No. 6 ranking in the A.P. poll is the highest for the Gamecocks since they were 9-0 and ranked No. 2 in the country in November of 1984. They dropped a 38-21 decision at Navy on Nov. 17, dropping them to ninth, before splitting their last two contests of that season. Chris Smelley threw a career-high three touchdown passes in the first half at North Carolina. The redshirt freshman improved to 4-0 as a starter, helping South Carolina (6-1) build a 21-3 lead through three quarters and successfully defend its first top 10 ranking since 2001. Smelley completed 17 of 26 passes for 172 yards with scoring passes to three different receivers, covering 3 yards to Dion Lecorn, 30 yards to McKinley and 12 yards to Jared Cook. Cory Boyd rushed 20 times for 95 yards for South Carolina.

OLE MISS REBELS



Ole Miss fell to Alabama, 27-24, at a packed Vaught-Hemingway Stadium on Saturday. The Rebels took a 24-17 lead into the fourth quarter, when the Crimson Tide used a 54-yard punt return and 28-yard interception return to score 10 points in the final eight minutes. Rebel running back BenJarvus Green-Ellis rushed for 131 yards on 20 carries in recording his third 100-yard game of the year, while Seth Adams completed 22-of-40 passes for 284 yards with two TDs and three interceptions. Green-Ellis' 57-yard third-quarter run was the longest of his career. Adams has thrown for 200 or more yards in five of seven games. Receiver Dexter McCluster hauled in a first-quarter TD pass for the second straight game and finished with a team-high and career-high seven catches for 75 yards. Ole Miss defensive lineman Greg Hardy posted career highs of 13 total tackles, nine solos, five TFLs, three sacks, two forced fumbles and two QB hurries. Making his second career start, junior LB Brandon Thomas registered a career-high 11 stops, including five solos.

TENNESSEE VOLUNTEERS



Senior quarterback Erik Ainge now owns a 21-8 record as a starter, including a 10-3 mark on the road. Ainge's 51-yard touchdown pass to Lucas Taylor in the second quarter at Mississippi State tied him with former Auburn signal caller Pat Sullivan for 19th place on the SEC's all-time passing touchdowns list. Ainge is one of three Vols in the league's all-time top 20. Taylor racked up a career-high 186 receiving yards today that marked the highest receiving total by a Vol since 2002. Taylor hauled in passes of 32, 51 (TD), 26 and 24 yards and leads the Vols this season in both catches (41) and receiving yardage (618). Junior tailback Arian Foster logged his seventh career 100-yard rushing game, totaling 139 yards on 21 carries. It was his third-best career single-game rushing total. He also added one touchdown to bring his career total to 18 (UT's active career leader). Tennessee's offense has allowed no quarterback sacks since the second game of the season and has allowed just two on the year. The Vols lead the FBS in sacks allowed. Starting quarterback Erik Ainge has been sacked just once this year. He has attempted 218 straight passes without being sacked.

MISSISSIPPI STATE BULLDOGS



MSU's offense, which tallied 338 total yards against Tennessee, got another 100-yard effort from running back Anthony Dixon, who tallied 108 yards and a touchdown on the ground. Dixon has rushed for 100+ yards four times this season, six in his career. Rookie quarterback Wesley Carroll, in just his third collegiate start ever, completed 18-of-33 passes for 203 yards and two scores. Tony Burks and Jamayel Smith were the bulk of the receiving end of those throws, each making five receptions and recording a score. Burks' first quarter touchdown was his second of the season and seventh of his career. Burks is now two touchdowns away from entering the MSU career touchdown receptions list. The last time MSU accomplished this feat was against Houston in 2005. Mississippi State did not record a turnover in Saturday's contest. With his 1.5 tackles for loss, senior defensive lineman Titus Brown has now matched his season high from a year ago with 7.5 tackles for loss. Brown has also recorded at least one tackle for loss in six of seven contests this season.

VANDERBILT COMMODORES



Earl Bennett caught three passes for 31 yards versus Georgia. He moved into second place all-time in receptions in the SEC among receivers with 205 receptions. Bennett was held to under 4 receptions in a game for the first time since October 8, 2005 (vs. LSU) - breaking a streak that lasted 22 games. D.J. Moore became the Commodores' first two-way player since Lorenzo Parker played tailback and cornerback against Tennessee on Nov. 23, 2002. Moore was effective in multiple roles - contributing tackles and a defended pass as a cornerback, rushing for 48 yards on two carries on offense, and averaging 21.3 yards on kickoff returns. Mackenzi Adams was efficient in his most productive minutes of the season. He completed 7 of 10 passes for 125 yards and a touchdown, and ran for 46 yards on a career-high 14 carries. Senior linebackers Jonathan Goff and Marcus Buggs led the Commodore defense with 14 and 8 total tackles. Goff also added a quarterback sack, his second of the year. Goff's 12 solo tackles and 14 total tackles ties his career single-game high.

- During the last eleven years, the SEC has had 19 winners of the NCAA Today's Top VIII Award, which is given annually to eight outstanding senior student-athletes. Since 1997, no other conference has had as many student-athletes honored with this prestigious award. In 2006, Alabama track & field athlete Beth Mallory was named a recipient of this award.
- Florida's Chris Leak was named by the National Football Foundation as a National Scholar-Athlete. During the last five years, the SEC has had 11 student-athletes honored, the most of any conference. LSU's Rudy Niswanger won the Vincent dePaul Draddy Award given by the National Football Foundation in 2005 as the nation's top football scholar-athlete. Niswanger became the sixth SEC student-athlete to claim the "Academic Heisman" since the award was established in 1990.

FOR THE STUDENT-ATHLETE

- The 12 member institutions of the SEC provide nearly \$65 million in scholarships for the more than 4,200 student-athletes each year.
- The SEC distributed nearly \$675,000 during the 2006-2007 academic year from the NCAA Special Assistance Fund for Student-Athletes. This program was implemented to provide financial aid to student-athletes with specific needs such as clothing and shoes, medical or vision care, academic course supplies and family emergencies.
- During the 2007-08 academic year, the SEC will distribute more than \$1 million to directly benefit student-athletes from the Student-Athlete Opportunity Fund.
- The SEC awards post-graduate scholarships totaling \$130,000 to 24 student-athletes each year. The top male and female nominee each receive the H. Boyd McWhorter Scholar-Athlete Award, named for the league's fourth commissioner, and a \$10,000 scholarship. Last year, 22 additional student-athletes (11 female and 11 male) received \$5,000 to continue their education. Alabama baseball player Emeel Salem and Vanderbilt track & field athlete Erika Schneble were named McWhorter Scholar-Athlete Award winners in 2006-07.
- The SEC has established a Community Service Award to honor a male and female student-athlete with a \$5,000 scholarship for outstanding service in the community. Tennessee swimmer Brad Boswell and Florida softball player Stacey Stevens were named recipients of this award in 2006-07.

A LEADER IN WOMEN'S SPORTS

- The SEC has developed a "Principles for Gender Equity," which, calls for each league school to provide equitable funding for women's sports, promotions and marketing and other support services. The SEC currently conducts championships in 11 women's sports and nine men's sports.
- The SEC had four sport winners of the Collegiate Woman of the Year Award sponsored by Honda. Tennessee's Candace Parker won for women's basketball, Courtney Kupets of Georgia took top honors in gymnastics, Georgia's Kara Lynn Joyce won in Swimming & Diving and Tennessee's Monica Abbott was the top athlete in softball.
- Since 1987, SEC schools have won 66 NCAA women's national championships, an average of more than three per year in the 11 women's sports the SEC sponsors. Nine of the 12 SEC institutions have won a national women's team championship since 1987.

COMPLIANCE AND EDUCATION

- The SEC Task Force Committee on Compliance and Enforcement has issued a report of recommendations that represents an important initial step in a formal process of establishing a new standard of compliance excellence within the Southeastern Conference. Among the recommendations included in this report was how institutions will handle reports of allegations, strengthening the relationship between the league's institutions and the conference office, developing new orientation programs and establishing an annual review of compliance issues.
- The SEC also conducts a New Coaches Orientation Program four times a year, which supplements institutional orientation programs and enhance the professional development of coaches. Topics of discussion range from the role of the SEC and NCAA to the role of athletics in higher education.

SPORTSMANSHIP

- The SEC has developed a sportsmanship statement for its institutions to follow. It states:
 "Coaches and student-athletes of a member institution, as well as individuals employed by or associated with that institution, including alumni, fans, patrons and boosters, shall conduct themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their behavior shall at all times reflect the high standards of honor and dignity that characterize participation in the collegiate setting. For intercollegiate athletics to promote the character development of participants, to enhance the integrity of higher education and to promote civility in society, coaches, student-athletes and all others associated with these athletics programs and events should adhere to such fundamental values as respect, fairness, civility, honesty and responsibility. These values should be manifested not only in athletics participation but also in the broad spectrum of activities affecting the athletics program. It is the responsibility of each member institution to establish policies for sportsmanship and ethical conduct in intercollegiate athletics consistent with the educational mission and goals of the institution. Furthermore, member institutions are responsible for educating on a continuing basis all constituencies about these policies."

IN THE COMMUNITY

- The SEC launched its education initiative in 2002, utilizing the platform of intercollegiate athletics to provide elementary school teachers with relevant resources they can use to educate and prepare children for life. The SEC became the nation's first conference to develop customized educational software, providing a CD-ROM containing SEC-branded content correlating to national educational standards. Since the CD-ROM was produced, the SEC has initiated an online program for K-8 students on education content and character development.
- SECKids.com is a website uniquely designed for school-age students. Now fans of all ages can access exciting, interactive and educational information on the SEC and its universities. SECKids.com features exclusive behind-the-scenes access at championship events, profiles of student-athletes and coaches, along with games and video highlights. Teachers can also register online to utilize the SEC Kids's college software in their classroom. The SEC is the only conference in the country to develop a site of this kind.

OVERALL ATHLETICS SUCCESS

- Since 1990, the SEC has won 118 team and 805 individual national championships. Since that time, the SEC has had at least one team ranked in the top five nationally in 76.8 percent of the total sports win which the league has competed (268 of 349). Ten of the SEC's 12 schools have won at least one national championship since 1990.
- In the SEC's 20 sponsored sports since 2000, the SEC has won more team national championships than any other conference in the nation. The SEC won 50 team titles since 2000, while the Pac-10 won 45 and the Big 12 won 21. The SEC won team titles in 16 different sports since 2000, also the most of any conference.

THE COACHES

Phillip Fulmer is in his 16th season at Tennessee and overall with a record of 141-42 (.770). The Volunteers' offensive coordinator is David Cutcliffe and the defensive coordinator is John Chavis.

Nick Saban is in his first season at Alabama and in his 14th season overall with a record of 111-60-1 (.648). The Crimson Tide's offensive coordinator is Major Applewhite and the defensive coordinator is Kevin Steele.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN TENNESSEE HAS THE BALL

Wideout Lucas Taylor leads the SEC and is 12th nationally (FBS) with an average of 103.0 receiving yards per game midway through the season. Erik Ainge has thrown just three interceptions in 221 attempts this year. Ainge has amazingly attempted 218 straight passes without being sacked. Junior tailback Arian Foster's 139-yard performance against Mississippi State last weekend propelled him into the top 20 on UT's all-time rushing list.

Wallace Gilberry has been a force up front for the Tide in the last two games, with 16 tackles, 7.5 tackles for loss, four sacks and three pressures. He leads Alabama with four sacks this season and all four have come in the last two weeks. In seven games this season, Simeon Castille has 8 tackles and leads UA with six pass breakups. In his four-year career, Castille leads all UA defenders with 151 total tackles.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN ALABAMA HAS THE BALL

Erik Ainge is 21-8 as a starter in his career and 9-2 in SEC road games ... He has an efficiency rating of 140.8, which is the third-best mark in the SEC this season. He is averaging an interception every 73.6 attempts. Arian Foster has 237 yards rushing and four touchdowns in his last two games, including a 139-yard effort at Miss. St. Lucas Taylor leads the team with 41 catches for 618 yards. He caught a career-high 11 passes for 186 yards and a touchdown at Miss. St.

John Parker Wilson is 11-9 (.550) as the starting quarterback. In 25 career games, Wilson has completed 364 of 643 (.566) passes for 4,318 yards, with 27 touchdowns and 15 interceptions. In seven games this season, D.J. Hall leads the team with 37 catches for 579 yards and three touchdowns. He also leads UA with 15.6 yards per catch. Terry Grant leads all Crimson Tide rushers and ranks 9th in the SEC with 84.7 yards per game.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Daniel Lincoln is 12-of-13 on field goal attempts and 24-of-24 on PATs through six games. Lincoln kicked his career-long 47-yard field goal vs. Southern Miss. LaMarcus Coker is third in the SEC in kickoff return average (26.92). Britton Colquitt is third in the SEC in punting (43.44 yards per attempt).

Javier Arenas is the Crimson Tide's top return specialist. Arenas is second in the SEC and 12th nationally with a 16.06-yard punt return average this season. In seven games, he has 16 punt returns for 257 yards, including a 69-yard return against Vanderbilt on Sept. 8. In 20 career games, he has 47 punt returns for 543 yards (11.6 average) and two touchdowns.

One of college football great traditional rivalries takes place this weekend as Alabama hosts Tennessee in the annual "Third Saturday in October" clash at Bryant-Denny Stadium in Tuscaloosa...Tennessee trails the all-time series with Alabama 44-38-7, dating to 1901... The two teams have played every season since 1944, and the Vols have won eight of their last 10 games against the Crimson Tide...Tennessee's Phillip Fulmer has a 11-2 (.846) record against Alabama since his first meeting as head coach in 1993.

THE COACHES

Bobby Johnson is in his sixth season at Vanderbilt with a record of 18-46 (.281) and in his 14th season overall with a record of 78-82 (.486). The Commodores' offensive coordinator is Ted Cain and the defensive coordinator is Bruce Fowler.

Steve Spurrier is in his third season at South Carolina with a record of 21-11 (.656) and in his 18th season overall with a record of 163-51-2 (.759). Spurrier serves as the offensive coordinator and the defensive coordinator is Tyrone Nix.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN VANDERBILT HAS THE BALL

Vanderbilt junior Earl Bennett needs just four receptions to become the SEC all-time leader. Bennett contributed three catches for 31 yards in the Commodores' last-second 20-17 loss to Georgia. Through six games, Bennett leads the SEC with 44 receptions and ranks second with 530 receiving yards. He is also tied for fifth in the conference with four touchdown catches.

Sophomore defensive end Eric Norwood has performed at an all-league level for the Gamecocks along the defensive line. A Freshman All-American last season, Norwood is second on the squad with 41 tackles this season, including 10.0 tackles for loss, fourth in the SEC. He has 5.0 sacks this season, which places him fifth in the league, and 12.0 sacks in his career in the Garnet & Black. He also has been credited with five quarterback hurries and three pass break ups. A big-play performer, Norwood has a blocked punt and two fumble recoveries for touchdowns to his credit this season.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN SOUTH CAROLINA HAS THE BALL

Jonathan Goff played remarkable game versus Georgia, tying career highs with 12 solo tackles and 14 total tackles. He also contributed a quarterback sack and hurry. A starter in 29 consecutive games and Vanderbilt's leader in the secondary, Reshard Langford contributed a season-high eight tackles and a forced fumble against Georgia. Curtis Gatewood has gone two straight games without a tackle for loss after posting five consecutive games with the stat dating back to the 2006 finale.

Junior WR Kenny McKinley is the top receiving threat for the Gamecocks. He has 37 catches for 446 yards with six of the team's 13 touchdown receptions. Chris Smelley is 4-0 as a starter and threw three touchdown passes at North Carolina a week ago. Cory Boyd leads the team with 482 yards rushing, averaging 4.7 yards per carry with four touchdowns. He is averaging 68.9 yards per contest. Mike Davis has rushed 84 times for 411 yards and five touchdowns this season, an average of 4.9 yards per carry.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Sophomore Brett Upson posted his finest punting performance of the season last week-- and one of the best of his career. Ranked at the bottom of SEC punters entering the game, Upson averaged 44.2 yards on six attempts, including two that were downed inside the Georgia 20-yard line. Commodore coverage units allowed just eight yards on two Georgia punt returns.

Ryan Succop is 7-for-10 in field goal attempts this season. He is 23-for-32 in field goal attempts in his career. He has converted 17 of his last 20 attempts from inside 47. Succop also handles the kickoff and punting duties for South Carolina. He is averaging 41.7 yards per punt this season with a long of 57 after averaging 43.7 yards per punt in 2006, and is averaging 65.5 yards on his kickoffs.

Vanderbilt is trying to snap a seven-game losing streak to the Gamecocks...The Commodores are 1-6 overall in Columbia, and have lost its last three appearances in Williams-Brice Stadium... Vanderbilt's only victory in Columbia was a narrow 11-10 decision in 1999... The last game played in the South Carolina capital city was a highly competitive 35-28 Gamecock win in 2005... Vanderbilt's two victories in the series came in consecutive years - 17-14 in 1998 and 11-10 in 1999. Steve Spurrier is 14-0 against Vanderbilt and will try to match the 15-0 mark he owns against Kentucky.

THE COACHES

Houston Nutt is in his 10th season at Arkansas with a record of 70-47 (.598) and in his 15th season overall with a record of 106-69 (.606). The Razorbacks' offensive coordinator is David Lee and the defensive coordinator is Reggie Herring.

Ed Orgeron is in his third season at Ole Miss and overall with a record of 9-20 (.310). The Rebels' offensive coordinator is Dan Werner and the defensive coordinator is John Thompson.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN ARKANSAS HAS THE BALL

The Arkansas offense is scoring 36.7 points per game and boasts the SEC's top rushing attack with a 293.2-yard average. Heisman Trophy candidate Darren McFadden leads the conference in rushing at 137.0 yards per game, while fellow junior RB Felix Jones is third with a 112.2-yard clip. Jones averages 188.5 all-purpose yards, just ahead of McFadden (167 ypg).

Sophomore DL Greg Hardy turned in a career day against Alabama and was named SEC Defensive Lineman of the Week. Hardy posted career highs of 13 total tackles, nine solos, five TFLs, three sacks, two forced fumbles and two QB hurries. One of his hurries forced an interception, and he tackled the Tide holder for a five-yard loss on a fake field goal attempt in the closing minutes, setting up Ole Miss' final drive.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN OLE MISS HAS THE BALL

Senior SS Matt Hewitt leads the D with 52 total tackles and eight QB hurries. Senior CB Michael Grant has 40 tackles and nine pass break-ups, while sophomore Jerrell Norton has 22 stops, three interceptions and seven break-ups at the other corner. On the line, sophomore Malcolm Sheppard tops the unit with 7.5 TFLs, while fellow end junior Antwain Robinson has the most sacks with two.

BenJarvus Green-Ellis rushed for 131 yards on 20 carries against Alabama in recording his third 100-yard game of the year and seventh of his two-year Rebel career. Seth Adams has stood out for the Rebel offense. He ranks fourth in the SEC in total offense (231.9 ypg), passing average (234.4 ypg) and passing efficiency (128.1). He has five 200-yard outings and the Rebels' first two 300-yard outings since 2004. Mike Wallace Wallace leads the SEC in yards per catch (23.0) and is fourth in yards per game (85.3).

SPECIAL TEAMS

Felix Jones also tops the league in kickoff return yards (31.6 ypr). True freshman K Alex Tejada has connected on 10-of-12 field goals and 26-of-27 PATs. Jeremy Davis booted a career-high nine punts versus Auburn for a 40.8 average.

Sophomore Marshay Green is seventh in the SEC in kick return average, with 24.1 yards per return. Sophomore PK Joshua Shene has hit 8 of 12 field goals this season with a long of 40 yards.

This game will mark the 54th meeting all-time between Ole Miss and Arkansas dating back to 1908...Arkansas' records indicate a 29-23-1 advantage for the Razorbacks. Arkansas claims a forfeit victory in a 1914 game that Ole Miss won 13-7... The two teams met almost yearly from 1937-1969 before the series took a hiatus until 1981... The two schools have played yearly since then, and Ole Miss is 9-16-1 against Arkansas since the series resumed... Arkansas holds a 9-6 edge since it joined the SEC in 1992 and have taken three straight, including a 38-3 triumph last year in Fayetteville... The Rebels are 5-2 all-time in Oxford matchups, although the Razorbacks prevailed 28-17 in 2005 in the last encounter at Vaught-Hemingway Stadium.

THE COACHES

Sylvester Croom is in his fourth season at Mississippi State and overall with a record of 13-27 (.325). The Bulldogs' offensive coordinator is Woody McCorvey and the defensive coordinator is Ellis Johnson.

Rich Rodriguez is in his seventh season at West Virginia with a record of 55-25 (.688) and 15th overall with a record of 95-61-2 (.608). The Mountaineers' offensive coordinator is Calvin Magee and the defensive coordinator is Jeff Casteel.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN MISSISSIPPI STATE HAS THE BALL

Anthony Dixon rushed the football 26 times for 108 yards, a 4.2-yard per carry average, and one touchdown this past Saturday against Tennessee. It is the fourth time in the last six games that he has surpassed the 100-yard rushing mark, the sixth time in his career. True freshman quarterback Wesley Carroll set career highs in completions and attempts, and threw his first collegiate touchdown passes against Tennessee in just his third career start. Carroll completed 18-of-33 passes for 203 yards, two touchdowns and no interceptions against the Volunteers.

West Virginia has collected 19 sacks through six games this season. At this point in the season last year, the Mountaineers had 11 sacks. Defensive lineman Johnny Dingle and linebacker Marc Magro lead the team with five sacks, followed by Mortty Ivy with four. Reed Williams leads the team in tackles with 48 after six games.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN WEST VIRGINIA HAS THE BALL

Titus Brown had six tackles, including one and one half for loss (minus 8 yards), against Tennessee this past Saturday. Brown, who has recorded at least one tackle for loss in six of the season's first seven games, is fifth in the league with 1.36 TFL per game. Despite being held without a sack for the second-straight game, his 0.86 sack-pergame average is third best in the SEC. Brown also is tied for fifth in the SEC in fumbles forced (.29 per game). Derek Pegues turned in his first career double-digit tackle game against Tennessee this past Saturday when he totaled 10 hits.

Junior running back Steve Slaton is the nation's best running back by the numbers. As proof, Slaton is the NCAA's active career touchdown leader (47), active points per game leader (9.7), rushing ypg (120.6) and thirds in yards per carry (6.19) by a running back. Slaton has 42 rushing touchdowns in his last 26 games. Quarterback Patrick White is ranked ninth in passing efficiency this week with a 163.49 rating. White had a week to rest his injured shoulder and is expected to play versus Mississippi State.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Pegues has been a threat in the return game, ranking third on the school's all-time kick return (67) and yardage (1,456) lists and, with a 13-yard punt return against the Vols, now ranks seventh all-time at the school in punt return yards (422).

Pat McAfee connected on 2-of-2 field goal attempts at Syracuse and now has hit seven-straight field goals after missing his first attempt. He has hit at least two field goals in three-straight games this season and hit his season-long of 49 yards at Syracuse. Vaughn Rivers is ranked No. 1 in the BIG EAST Conference and No. 36 in the nation in punt return average, returning 20 punts for 212 yards, an average of 10.6 yards per return.

Mississippi State is 5-4 all-time against teams that currently comprise the Big East Conference... MSU won two games from the Orangemen in 1985-86, has split series' games with Louisville (2-2) and Cincinnati (1-1)... In addition to last year's meeting with the Mountaineers, those are the school's only games against the Big East Conference... State's visit to Morgantown is the first by an SEC team since Kentucky's visit to old Mountaineer Field on Oct. 6, 1979.

THE COACHES

Urban Meyer is in his third season at Florida with a record of 26-6 (.813) and in his seventh season overall with a record of 65-14 (.823). The Gators' offensive coordinator is Dan Mullen and the defensive co-coordinators are Greg Mattison and Charlie Strong.

Rich Brooks is in his fifth season at Kentucky with a record of 22-31 (.415) and in his 23rd season overall with a record of 113-140-4 (.447). The Wildcats' offensive coordinator is Joker Phillips and the defensive coordinator is Steve Brown.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN FLORIDA HAS THE BALL

Tim Tebow's passer rating of 173.1 is the fourth-highest in the nation. He has completed 65.5 percent of his passes, which is the 23rd-highest mark in the country and is the second best in the SEC. Percy Harvin is first on the team with 698 all-purpose yards and is averaging 116.3 yards per game. He has rushed for 185 yards on 27 carries and has a team-leading 32 catches for 513 yards.

Linebacker Wesley Woodyard leads the SEC and currently ranks tied for 16th nationally in tackles, averaging 10.9 per game. He is the only SEC player to average double-figure tackles this season. Defensive end Jeremy Jarmon ranks second in the SEC and is tied for 16th nationally in sacks with 6.5 on the year. The sophomore has recorded at least one sack in seven of the last nine games.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN KENTUCKY HAS THE BALL

Brandon Spikes and Dustin Doe rank as Florida's leading tacklers with 57 and 41, respectively. Against LSU, Jermaine Cunningham had a career-high 17 tackles. The total was the second-best effort in the SEC this season. Defensive end Derrick Harvey recorded a pair of sacks in Florida's game against Auburn to bring his career total to 17, which are tied for the 10th-highest nationally and are the second-highest total in the SEC as terms of active leaders.

Andre' Woodson completed 21 of 38 passes for 250 yards and three touchdowns in Kentucky's 43-37 triple-overtime win against #1 LSU. His seven-yard completion to Steve Johnson in the third overtime was the eventual game-winner for the Wildcats. He also rushed three times for 16 yards, including a 12-yard TD run. Woodson directed a UK offense that scored 27 points and had 333 yards in regulation - the most LSU had given up this season.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Brandon James had his third return of 50-plus yards on the year with a 55-yard kick return at Ole Miss. He had a 59-yard kickoff return against Troy and 83-yard punt return for a touchdown in the Tennessee game. Joey Iijas is 31-of-31 on extra points through the first six outings and is five-of-seven on field goals. Chas Henry has punted 19 times for an average of 41.6 yards. His long was 50 against Ole Miss and he has placed seven inside the 20 this year.

Tim Masthay is averaging a career-best 42.9 yards per punt and UK ranks fifth in the SEC in net punting, averaging 36.9 net yards per punt. With Masthay's excellent punting height and placement, along with good kickoff coverage, UK has allowed only 19 punt return yards this season. Masthay leads the SEC with 14 touchbacks and UK leads the SEC in net kickoff coverage.

THE COACHES

Tommy Tuberville is in his ninth season at Auburn with a record of 76-31 (.710) and in his 13th season overall with a record of 101-51 (.664). The Tigers' offensive coordinator is Al Borges and the defensive coordinator is Will Muschamp.

Les Miles is in his third season at LSU with a record of 27-5 (.844) and in his 7th season overall with a record of 55-26 (.679). The Tigers' offensive coordinator is Gary Crowton and the defensive coordinator is Bo Pelini.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN AUBURN HAS THE BALL

Brandon Cox has led Auburn on three game-winning scoring drives in the closing minutes this season, including victories over Kansas State, Florida and Arkansas. In the last four weeks, Cox has completed 57-of-85 (.671) passes for 628 yards, two scores and just one interception, for a quarterback rating of 134.53. The return of junior RB Brad Lester has benefitted an already improving running game for Auburn. The Tigers averaged just 93.5 yards rushing in their first two games, but have averaged 194.4 in their last five, with three games over 200 yards rushing.

S Craig Steltz leads the Tigers in defense with 46 tackles, 4 interceptions and 2 forced fumbles, while LB Ali Highsmith has 45 tackles and 5.0 TFL. DT Glenn Dorsey is tops on the team with 4 sacks. Despite giving up season-highs of 43 points and 375 yards against Kentucky, LSU is still ranked No. 2 in the nation in total defense, allowing 223.14 yards per game. The Tigers remain No. 1 nationally in pass efficiency defense with a 68.0 rating.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN LSU HAS THE BALL

Junior linebacker Chris Evans, who leads Auburn with 40 tackles this season. Auburn is ranked ninth nationally in total defense (279.0), 10th in scoring defense (15.6) and is 12th in passing defense (169.7). Trey Blackmon led the Auburn defense with a career-high nine tackles, including six solo, at Arkansas. He was instrumental in helping the Auburn defense hold UA to just 193 yards of total offense, including 67 on the ground.

Offensively, the Tigers are 13th in the nation in scoring offense with 37.7 points per game and 10th in rushing defense with 232.14 yards per contest. LSU RB Jacob Hester leads the Tigers with 494 yards and 5 TDs, while QB Matt Flynn has thrown for 947 yards and 5 TDs, while backup QB Ryan Perrilloux has 414 passing yards and 6 TDs. Perrilloux has also rushed for a pair of scores.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Wes Byrum kicked three field goals during the 9-7 victory at Arkansas, including the game-winner from 20 yards with 21 seconds remaining in regulation. He provided all of the Auburn scoring, which included kicks of 22 and 38 yards, in addition to the game winner. He has made 11 field goals in 15 attempts this season and leads the team with 53 points scored. Byrum has had seven touchbacks in the last four games.

LSU PK Colt David continues to lead the SEC in scoring with a total of 72 points. David, who has kicked 11 field goals and has 33 PATs, scored the first touchdown of his career on a fake field goal against South Carolina in week 4. David's 9.4 points per game is second in the SEC.
