A SECond LOOK

- SEC enters its 75th season of play in 2007.
- The SEC has six teams ranked in the pre-season Top 25 polls, the most of any conference.
- Since the inception of the Bowl Championship Series, the SEC leads all conferences with three national championships (Tennessee-1998; LSU-2003; Florida-2006).
- Since SEC expansion in 1992, the SEC and Big 12 are tied for the most national championships (AP, USA Today) with five each. During that time, the SEC has had more teams with national titles than any other conference (Florida-1996,2006; LSU-2003; Tennessee-1998; Alabama-1992).
- Since 2000, the SEC has had more teams ranked in the final USA Today coaches poll than any other conference (34).
- Since 2000, the SEC has the nation's top non-conference winning percentage (including bowl games) since 2000 (247-95, 72.2 percent).
- The SEC has led the nation in total attendance for 26 straight seasons.
- Using current conference alignments, SEC teams have appeared in more bowl games (352) than any other conference. Since 2000, the SEC has more bowl appearances (52) and bowl wins (29) than any other conference.
- SEC intra-conference games had the closest scoring margin than any other conference in 2006 (11.14 points per game).

SEC FOOTBALL VIDEO REPLAY

THE OBJECTIVE

To allow for specific types of officiating calls to be immediately reviewed during all games hosted by SEC teams.

THE COACHES' CHALLENGE

Each head coach is allowed one Instant Replay challenge per game, which is exercised by requesting a team timeout. A head coach may issue a challenge only if his team has one or more timeouts remaining in the half. If the challenged ruling is overturned, the timeout is not charged, but the coach has no more challenges during that game.

THE SOURCE

All reviewable video comes direct from either the television network broadcasting the game (CBS Sports, ESPN, ESPN2, Lincoln Financial) or other TV production facilities that meet established conference standards. The Southeastern Conference, following approval by the NCAA Football Rules Committee, will implement the use of video replay on an experimental basis beginning with the 2005 football season.

THE PLAYS

Reviewable

1. Plays governed by Sideline, Goal Line, End Zone, and End Line:
 - a. Scoring Plays, including a runner breaking the plane of the goal line
 - b. Pass complete/incomplete/intercepted at sideline, goal line and end line
 - c. Runner/receiver in or out of bounds
 - d. Recovery of loose ball in and out of bounds
2. Passing Plays:
 - a. Pass ruled complete/ incomplete/ intercepted in the field of play and end zones
 - b. Touching of a forward pass by an ineligible receiver
 - c. Touching of a forward pass by a defensive player
 - d. Quarterback (Passer) forward pass or fumble (if ruled incomplete, play is finalized)
 - e. Illegal forward pass or illegal handing off beyond the line of scrimmage
 - f. Illegal forward pass or illegal handing off after change of possession
 - g. Forward or backward pass thrown from behind the line of scrimmage
3. Other Detectable Infractions:
 - a. Runner ruled not down.
 - b. Forward progress with respect to first down
 - c. Touching of a kick
 - d. Number of players on field
 - e. Clock adjustments (in conjunction with overturned plays)
 - f. Fourth-down/try fumble plays

THE PROCESS

Each SEC football stadium has a secured replay booth equipped with a DVSPORT Digital Replay System. Three individuals work in the booth for the duration of the game: 1. Replay Official, 2. Communicator, 3. Technician. The Replay Official is selected and assigned by the Conference Office.

A live video feed is sent directly to the replay booth. The Technician watches the feed on an input monitor while capturing/digitizing it into the DVSPORT Digital Replay System. The Technician also marks the beginning of each play as well as any replays as they occur in real time.

Each play and subsequent replay then appears on a touch screen in front of the Communicator. As the Technician marks the incoming video, each view (by mark) will appear as a small picture on the computer touch screen. At any time, the Communicator can touch/click on a thumbnail and immediately send that play/replay to the Replay Official.

With the Communicator's assistance, the Replay Official can quickly jump between replays while playing back the video. All replay video navigation is done via a remote device controlled by the Replay Official. All replays/video are viewed on an output monitor. The touch screen is only used to select the replays.

While most plays are reviewed between the whistle and the beginning of the next play, the Replay Official can stop play on the field by using a pager system. Five onfield officials wear pagers. If play is stopped the Referee announces on the stadium PA microphone that play has been stopped so the previous play can be reviewed. The Referee then proceeds to the sideline headset, which provides direct communication to the Replay Official in the booth. Once the play has been reviewed, the Replay Official notifies the Referee, who then announces the decision on the stadium PA system.

THE EQUIPMENT

Each SEC member institution uses the Digital Replay System developed by DVSPORT of Pittsburgh, Pa. The replay systems are maintained by the home institution with technical support from DVSPORT.

2007 SEC FOOTBALL CHAMPIONSHIP GAME

The SEC's Eastern and Western Division winners will meet in Atlanta's Georgia Dome to battle for the league championship and the right to represent the conference in the Bowl Championship Series. The 16th-annual title game is set for December 1 and will be nationally televised by CBS Sports at 4:00 p.m. ET.

The game is a result of conference expansion, which saw Arkansas and South Carolina become the first members added in SEC history. Under NCAA regulations, a conference with 12 members may play a 12th football game to determine its champion, provided the regular season is played in divisions.

The participants of the game are determined each year during the eight-game regular-season conference schedule as the teams with the best overall SEC winning percentage in each division.

The 1994 SEC Championship Game earned a 10.5 rating and a 26 share, the highest rated SEC Championship Game in history.

The SEC Championship Game has also drawn capacity crowds in its history. 1,120,836 fans have witnessed first-hand the pageantry of SEC Football at the 15 previous Championship Games.

Attendance at the 15 previous championship games has been 102.3 percent of stadium capacity, including 13 sellouts.

CBS SPORTS - The 2007 season marks the 11th year for CBS as the league's national network television partner. CBS will televise up to 15 games per year throughout the season. CBS will normally broadcast its SEC games in the late afternoon window beginning at 3:30 p.m. ET. CBS provides exclusive national network broadcasts of conference home games during the season. CBS will televise the SEC Football Championship Game, which will be on Dec. 1 at 4 p.m. ET.

ESPN/ESPN2, the SEC's national cable provider, may televise up to 18 regular season games each year, with a minimum of nine on ESPN through the season. ESPN GamePlan offers fans extra college football games and is available on television or online. Viewers can order ESPN GamePlan on ESPN.com (search "GamePlan"), or by contacting their cable or satellite Pay-Per-View provider.

LINCOLN FINANCIAL SPORTS (LFS) (Formerly Jefferson-Pilot Sports) will continue its highly successful SEC Football Game of the Week this season. The Charlotte, N.C. company, holds the rights to televise 13 games annually throughout the nine-state SEC region on a syndicated basis. The games will be broadcast in the early afternoon at 12:30 p.m. ET.

FOX Sports Net South (FSNS), FOX Sports Net Southwest (FSNSW) and SUN Sports (SUN) together form **SEC-TV**, the league's regional cable package. SEC-TV Weekly airs Thursday nights and Saturday mornings during the season, highlighting all of the SEC's athletic teams and events.

SEC BOWL AGREEMENTS

The Southeastern Conference has agreements to send eight of its member institutions to postseason bowl games following the 2007 season. The winner of the SEC Championship Game will automatically participate in the Bowl Championship Series comprised of the Sugar, Rose, Orange and Fiesta Bowls.

The Capital One (2nd), will then make its pick following the BCS selections. The bowl must select the team with the next best overall record or a team that is within one win of the team with the next best overall record.

The Outback, Chick-fil-A and AT&T Cotton Bowls will work with the conference office to determine picks 3-5. The Cotton Bowl has the first preference of teams from the Western Division and the Outback Bowl has first preference of teams from the Eastern Division. The Cotton or Outback Bowl can select teams outside of its divisional preference, but must not select them before the opposite bowl selects from its divisional preference. The Chick-fil-A Bowl has the selection of preference following the Cotton and Outback Bowls.

In selections 6-7, the AutoZone Liberty and Gaylord Hotels Music City Bowls will make their selections, not in any specific order, but in consultation with the SEC Office. The Bowls will rank available qualified teams in order of preference. If there are no similarities in the order of selection, the bowls will be granted its selection. If the bowls rank the same teams in preference, the team involved in the process would get its preference of which bowl to participate.

The PetroSun Independence Bowl will receive the eighth selection of available SEC teams.

2008 BOWL CHAMPIONSHIP SERIES SCHEDULE

Following the 2007 college football regular season, the Bowl Championship Series will determine the National Championship. The BCS National Championship Game, which will stand alone from the four traditional BCS bowls but will be hosted by each of the bowls once during a four-year cycle.

The BCS consists of the FedEx Orange, Allstate Sugar, Rose presented by Citi, Tostitos Fiesta Bowl and the Allstate BCS National Championship Game. The conferences with automatic berths include the Atlantic Coast, Big East, Big Ten, Big 12, Pac-10 and Southeastern Conferences.

FOX Sports will televise all of the Bowl Championship Series games, with the exception of the Rose Bowl, which will be televised by ABC Sports.

The Bowl Championship Series guarantees a matchup between college football's top two teams in a true national championship game.

At the conclusion of the 2007 regular season, the Allstate BCS National Championship Game will be hosted in New Orleans on Jan. 7 at 8 p.m. EST. The Allstate BCS National Championship Game will have the top two teams ranked in the BCS final regular season standings.

The BCS uses regional consideration regarding team selection. Specifically, as a member of the BCS, the Rose Bowl will host the Big Ten and Pac-10 champions in those years in which either the Rose Bowl does not have the national championship game or the Big Ten and Pac-10 champion is not ranked No. 1 or No. 2. Other "regional consideration" tie-ins include the SEC champion in the Sugar Bowl, the ACC champion in the Orange Bowl and the Big 12 champion in the Fiesta Bowl.

Other BCS games following the 2007 regular season include the Rose Bowl on Jan. 1 at 4:30 p.m. EST, Sugar Bowl on Jan. 1 at 8:30 p.m. EST, Fiesta Bowl on Jan. 1 at 8:30 p.m. EST, and the Orange Bowl on Jan. 3 at 8 p.m. ET.

THIS WEEK IN SEC FOOTBALL HISTORY

As the Southeastern Conference celebrates its 75th anniversary, here is a look at some of the highlights during this week in its history:



Aug. 27-Sept. 1

Aug. 27, 1986 -- #5 Alabama defeated #9 Ohio State, 16-10, in the Kickoff Classic at East Rutherford, N.J.

Aug. 30, 1997 -- In just the third overtime game ever involving an SEC team (and the first against a non-conference foe), Ole Miss opens its season with a 24-23 win over Central Florida in extra periods.

Aug. 30, 1997 -- Peyton Manning throws for a school-record tying five TDs in leading #5 Tennessee to a 52-17 win against Texas Tech in Knoxville.

Aug. 30, 2003 -- #11 Georgia goes on the road and defeats Clemson, 30-0. It was the first shutout of the Tigers in Clemson since 1998.

Aug. 30, 2003 -- #14 LSU opens its National Championship season with a 49-7 win over UL-Monroe. WR Michael Clayton catches six passes for 152 yards and two TDs in the win.

Aug. 31, 1991 -- In Jackie Sherrill's first game as Mississippi State's head coach, the Bulldogs defeat Cal State-Fullerton, 47-3, in Starkville.

Aug. 31, 1996 - Florida scores a school-record four defensive touchdowns as it opens its first national championship season with a 55-21 win over Southwestern Louisiana in Gainesville. Senior quarterback Danny Wuerffel becomes the all-time leader in SEC history for TDs responsible for in the first contest of his Heisman Trophy winning season.

Sept. 1, 2002 -- Kentucky upset #18 Louisville, 22-17, in Louisville. The Wildcat forced three Cardinal turnovers and held UL to just 55 rushing yards.

Sept. 1, 2005 -- In Steve Spurrier's first game as South Carolina's head coach, the Gamecocks defeat Central Florida, 24-15, in Columbia.

Sept. 1, 2005 -- Jay Cutler opens his senior campaign throwing for 276 yards as Vanderbilt defeats Wake Forest, 24-20.

SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE TEAM NOTES



ALABAMA CRIMSON TIDE

Alabama is 88-21-3 (.799) in regular season openers winning its last four, including last season's 25-17 win over Hawaii. The Crimson Tide returns 47 lettermen and 16 starters from last year's squad. Nick Saban is in his first year at the Capstone, returning to the SEC after two years with the Miami Dolphins. Senior WR D.J. Hall needs just 153 receiving yards to become Alabama's career leader. Last year, Hall caught 62 passes for 1,056 yards and has 1,918 career yards. Senior DB Simeon Castille was named 1st team pre-season All-SEC by the the league's coaches and media.

LSU TIGERS



The Tigers are 80-28-5 (.730) in opening day games. LSU returns 46 lettermen and 15 starters from last year's 11-2 team. For the fourth straight season, LSU will start the season in the top 10 in the Associated Press poll as the Tigers are selected second in the pre-season AP Top 25. LSU has won 13 consecutive games at Tiger Stadium, the fourth longest streak in school history (17, 1935-38). Senior DT Glenn Dorsey is on watch lists for the Outland, Nagurski, Bednarik, Lott and Lombardi Awards. Dorsey, OL Will Arnold, LB Ali Highsmith and DB Chevis Jackson were first-team pre-season All-SEC choices by the league's coaches and media.

ARKANSAS RAZORBACKS

The Razorbacks have won 10 straight season openers with their last loss coming in 1996 to SMU. The Razorbacks return 47 lettermen and 13 starters from last year's 10-4 team. Houston Nutt is 67-44 in nine seasons at the helm at Arkansas. The Razorbacks are attempting to become the first team to pace the SEC in rushing five times in six seasons since Ole Miss led the league in six consecutive seasons (1957-62). RB Darren McFadden was the only unanimous choice on both the pre-season All-SEC coaches and media teams ... Junior C Jonathan Luigs also earned first-team All-SEC pre-season accolades by the media and coaches.



OLE MISS REBELS



Ole Miss is 83-24-5 (.763) in season openers, including 10 of the last 11. The Rebels return 47 lettermen and 17 starters from last year's squad. Ole Miss lost four games by six-points or less last season, including two in overtime. Junior OL Michael Oher was voted pre-season first-team All-SEC by the league's coaches and media. Several pre-season magazines have named Oher first-team pre-season All-America. Senior RB BenJarvus Green-Ellis was voted first-team pre-season All-SEC by the league's coaches. Last season, his first at Ole Miss, Green-Ellis rushed for 1,000 yards and seven TDs.

AUBURN TIGERS

The Tigers are 87-25-2 (.772) in season openers. The Tigers return 49 lettermen and 12 starters from last year's 11-2 squad. Auburn has won outright or tied for the SEC West title five times in the last seven years under Tommy Tuberville (2000, '01, '02, '04, '05). Auburn has earned a school-record 41 victories over the past four seasons. It's 33 wins over the past three seasons is tied for third-best among NCAA Division I-A teams. Senior DE Quentin Groves was voted pre-season first-team All-SEC by the league's coaches and media. He is second in Tiger history with 23 career sacks.



MISSISSIPPI STATE BULLDOGS

The Bulldogs are 74-31-2 (.701) in season openers. State returns 40 lettermen and 16 starters from last year's squad. Sylvester Croom returns for his fourth season as MSU's head coach. Junior DB Derek Pegues was named first-team pre-season All-SEC by the league's coaches and media. Pegues had 32 total tackles, four interceptions and five pass deflections and averaged 23.7 yards per kick return and 14.0 yards per punt return in 2006. Senior DL Titus Brown was named second-team pre-season All-SEC by the league's coaches and media. Brown has 127 career tackles, including 21.5 for losses. State lost four games by three points last season.



FLORIDA GATORS

Florida is 77-24 (.762) in season opening games in its history, including 37-1 in its last 38 season openers. Gators return 38 lettermen and nine starters from last year's National Champions. Florida is 94-11 (.895) at home since 1990, second best winning percentage in the nation during that time. Florida has kicked off the season ranked among the top 25 teams in college football in each of the past 17 seasons. The Gators are the youngest team in the SEC with just 21 scholarship juniors and seniors on the roster (SEC average: 34). Junior DE Derrick Harvey was named first-team pre-season All-SEC by league's coaches and media.



SOUTH CAROLINA GAMECOCKS

Carolina is 73-36-4 (.664) in opening day games, including the last seven in a row. Carolina returns 54 lettermen and 17 starters from last season's 7-5 squad. Since 2000, Gamecocks are 22-10 in August-September games. USC won three straight games to finish the 2006 campaign, the first time Carolina concluded a season on this note since 1973. Senior LB Jasper Brinkley was named first-team pre-season All-SEC by the league's coaches and media. Steve Spurrier is the first Carolina coach to take his team to a bowl game in each of his first two seasons at the University.



GEORGIA BULLDOGS

Georgia is 86-24-3 (.774) in opening day games. The Bulldogs have won 10 straight season openers, by a combined score of 413-122. Bulldogs return 44 lettermen and 11 starters from last year's squad. Since 2001 (Mark Richt's arrival at Georgia), Georgia's 61-17 mark (.782) is second best in the SEC. The Bulldogs are 22-3 in opposing stadium's under Richt and have posted an 8-2 mark against ranked teams on opposing fields. Sophomore QB Matthew Stafford led Georgia to consecutive wins against ranked opponents at the end of last season (#5 Auburn, #16 Georgia Tech, #14 Virginia Tech).



TENNESSEE VOLUNTEERS

Tennessee is 82-22-6 (.773) in season opening games. The Vols have won 11 straight season openers by a combined score of 400-127. The Vols return 43 lettermen and 13 starters from last season's squad. Phillip Fulmer is the longest serving active head coach in the SEC, having been at Tennessee since 1992 (137-41 overall). His .770 career win percentage is tops in the nation for coaches with at least 10 years of experience. Junior LB Jerod Mayo, Senior DB Jonathan Hefney and junior P Britton Colquitt were named first-team pre-season All-SEC by the league's coaches and media.



KENTUCKY WILDCATS

The Wildcats are 78-33-5 (.694) in opening day games. UK returns 60 lettermen including 17 starters from last year's Music City Bowl champion squad. QB Andre' Woodson enters the 2007 season with an active school record streak of 162 consecutive passes without an interception. He is also the SEC's leading active career total offensive yardage (5,354) and passing leader (5,651). Woodson and TE Jacob Tamme were named first-team pre-season All-SEC by the league's coaches and media. Senior LB Wesley Woodyard has reached triple digit tackles in each of the last two seasons (100 in 2005; 122 in 2006).



VANDERBILT COMMODORES

Vanderbilt is 64-35-4 (.641) in season openers. The Commodores return 53 lettermen including 19 starters. Junior WR Earl Bennett and senior LB Jonathan Goff were named first-team pre-season All-SEC by the league's coaches and media. Senior OL Chris Williams was named first-team pre-season All-SEC by the league's coaches and second-team by the media. Bennett needs 48 catches to become the SEC's career reception leader. He has 161 career grabs for 2,022 yards. Goff had 93 stops last season, including six for losses.



THIS IS THE SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE

THE SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE

- The Southeastern Conference sponsors championships in 20 sports - 11 women's sports and nine men's sports. They include baseball, men's and women's basketball, men's and women's cross country, football, men's and women's golf, gymnastics, soccer, softball, men's and women's swimming and diving, men's and women's tennis, men's and women's indoor and outdoor track and field, and volleyball.
- The SEC's mission statement reflects the priorities of the league. "The purpose of the Southeastern Conference is to assist its member institutions in the maintenance of programs of intercollegiate athletics which are compatible with the highest standards of education and competitive sports."

ACADEMIC ACHIEVEMENTS

- During the last five years, the SEC has had more student-athletes honored as CoSIDA/ESPN The Magazine Academic All-Americans than any other conference. The league has had 171 student-athletes named CoSIDA/ESPN The Magazine Academic All-Americans, including 79 named to the first-team.
- During the last eleven years, the SEC has had 19 winners of the NCAA Today's Top VIII Award, which is given annually to eight outstanding senior student-athletes. Since 1997, no other conference has had as many student-athletes honored with this prestigious award. In 2006, Alabama track & field athlete Beth Mallory was named a recipient of this award.
- Florida's Chris Leak was named by the National Football Foundation as a National Scholar-Athlete. During the last five years, the SEC has had 11 student-athletes honored, the most of any conference. LSU's Rudy Niswanger won the Vincent dePaul Draddy Award given by the National Football Foundation in 2005 as the nation's top football scholar-athlete. Niswanger became the sixth SEC student-athlete to claim the "Academic Heisman" since the award was established in 1990.

FOR THE STUDENT-ATHLETE

- The 12 member institutions of the SEC provide nearly \$65 million in scholarships for the more than 4,200 student-athletes each year.
- The SEC distributed nearly \$675,000 during the 2006-2007 academic year from the NCAA Special Assistance Fund for Student-Athletes. This program was implemented to provide financial aid to student-athletes with specific needs such as clothing and shoes, medical or vision care, academic course supplies and family emergencies.
- During the 2007-08 academic year, the SEC will distribute more than \$1 million to directly benefit student-athletes from the Student-Athlete Opportunity Fund.
- The SEC awards post-graduate scholarships totaling \$130,000 to 24 student-athletes each year. The top male and female nominee each receive the H. Boyd McWhorter Scholar-Athlete Award, named for the league's fourth commissioner, and a \$10,000 scholarship. Last year, 22 additional student-athletes (11 female and 11 male) received \$5,000 to continue their education. Alabama baseball player Emeel Salem and Vanderbilt track & field athlete Erika Schneble were named McWhorter Scholar-Athlete Award winners in 2006-07.
- The SEC has established a Community Service Award to honor a male and female student-athlete with a \$5,000 scholarship for outstanding service in the community. Tennessee swimmer Brad Boswell and Florida softball player Stacey Stevens were named recipients of this award in 2006-07.

A LEADER IN WOMEN'S SPORTS

- The SEC has developed a "Principles for Gender Equity," which, calls for each league school to provide equitable funding for women's sports, promotions and marketing and other support services. The SEC currently conducts championships in 11 women's sports and nine men's sports.
- The SEC had four sport winners of the Collegiate Woman of the Year Award sponsored by Honda. Tennessee's Candace Parker won for women's basketball, Courtney Kupets of Georgia took top honors in gymnastics, Georgia's Kara Lynn Joyce won in Swimming & Diving and Tennessee's Monica Abbott was the top athlete in softball.
- Since 1987, SEC schools have won 66 NCAA women's national championships, an average of more than three per year in the 11 women's sports the SEC sponsors. Nine of the 12 SEC institutions have won a national women's team championship since 1987.

COMPLIANCE AND EDUCATION

- The SEC Task Force Committee on Compliance and Enforcement has issued a report of recommendations that represents an important initial step in a formal process of establishing a new standard of compliance excellence within the Southeastern Conference. Among the recommendations included in this report was how institutions will handle reports of allegations, strengthening the relationship between the league's institutions and the conference office, developing new orientation programs and establishing an annual review of compliance issues.
- The SEC also conducts a New Coaches Orientation Program four times a year, which supplements institutional orientation programs and enhance the professional development of coaches. Topics of discussion range from the role of the SEC and NCAA to the role of athletics in higher education.

SPORTSMANSHIP

- The SEC has developed a sportsmanship statement for its institutions to follow. It states:
 "Coaches and student-athletes of a member institution, as well as individuals employed by or associated with that institution, including alumni, fans, patrons and boosters, shall conduct themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their behavior shall at all times reflect the high standards of honor and dignity that characterize participation in the collegiate setting. For intercollegiate athletics to promote the character development of participants, to enhance the integrity of higher education and to promote civility in society, coaches, student-athletes and all others associated with these athletics programs and events should adhere to such fundamental values as respect, fairness, civility, honesty and responsibility. These values should be manifested not only in athletics participation but also in the broad spectrum of activities affecting the athletics program. It is the responsibility of each member institution to establish policies for sportsmanship and ethical conduct in intercollegiate athletics consistent with the educational mission and goals of the institution. Furthermore, member institutions are responsible for educating on a continuing basis all constituencies about these policies."

IN THE COMMUNITY

- The SEC launched its education initiative in 2002, utilizing the platform of intercollegiate athletics to provide elementary school teachers with relevant resources they can use to educate and prepare children for life. The SEC became the nation's first conference to develop customized educational software, providing a CD-ROM containing SEC-branded content correlating to national educational standards. Since the CD-ROM was produced, the SEC has initiated an online program for K-8 students on education content and character development.
- SECKids.com is a website uniquely designed for school-age students. Now fans of all ages can access exciting, interactive and educational information on the SEC and its universities. SECKids.com features exclusive behind-the-scenes access at championship events, profiles of student-athletes and coaches, along with games and video highlights. Teachers can also register online to utilize the SEC Kids's college software in their classroom. The SEC is the only conference in the country to develop a site of this kind.

OVERALL ATHLETICS SUCCESS

- Since 1990, the SEC has won 118 team and 805 individual national championships. Since that time, the SEC has had at least one team ranked in the top five nationally in 76.8 percent of the total sports win which the league has competed (268 of 349). Ten of the SEC's 12 schools have won at least one national championship since 1990.
- In the SEC's 20 sponsored sports since 2000, the SEC has won more team national championships than any other conference in the nation. The SEC won 50 team titles since 2000, while the Pac-10 won 45 and the Big 12 won 21. The SEC won team titles in 16 different sports since 2000, also the most of any conference.

THE COACHES

Les Miles is in his third season at LSU with a record of 22-4 (.846) and in his 7th season overall with a record of 50-25 (.667). The Tigers' offensive coordinator is Gary Crowton and the defensive coordinator is Bo P elini.

Sylvester Croom is in his 4th season at Mississippi State and overall with a record of 9-25 (.265). The Bulldogs' offensive coordinator is Woody McCorney and the defensive coordinator is Ellis Johnson.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN LSU HAS THE BALL

Senior WR Early Doucet takes over as LSU's "go to" guy at wide receiver due to the departure of Dwayne Bowe and Craig Davis. A year ago, Doucet established himself as one of the best in the SEC, catching 59 balls for 772 yards and eight TDs. Doucet capped his junior campaign by leading the Tigers with eight catches for a career-best 115 yards in the Sugar Bowl win over Notre Dame.

Mississippi State is led on defense by senior DL Titus Brown, who has played in 31 games with 13 career starts. He was a consensus second-team, all-Southeastern Conference performer last year. Brown had 38 total tackles, but 14.5 of those were for loss (minus 75 yards), seven and one-half of which were quarterback sacks (minus 54 yards). Both of those numbers led State's defense and ranked third and fifth, respectively, among his SEC peers.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN MISSISSIPPI STATE HAS THE BALL

The Bulldogs are led by senior WR Tony Burks, who caught 35 passes for 850 yards, a 24.3-yard per catch average, and five touchdowns in his first season at State. RB Anthony Dixon rushed 169 times for 668 yards, a 4.0-yard per carry average, and nine touchdowns during his true freshman season. His rushing attempts, yards gained, and touchdowns all marked true freshman records at State. Croom and his staff have the vast majority of their offense returning, including four regulars up front.

DL Glenn Dorsey has been listed on every preseason All-America team and has been rated as the best defensive tackle in the nation by several publications. Last year, Dorsey earned first-team All-America honors after anchoring an LSU defense that ranked among the top five in the nation in yards allowed and scoring. LB Ali Highsmith, who has eight career sacks and 17 TFLs also returns.

SPECIAL TEAMS

MSU's Derek Pegues returns as one of the league's top specialists. He returned 25 punts for 350 yards, a 14-yard per return average, second best in the SEC and 10th nationally. He also brought back 29 kickoffs for 687 yards, a 23.7-yard average, good for fifth in the league.

Doucet and Craig Davis look to lead an LSU return game who will be starting both a new punter and placekicker in 2007.

For the second straight season, Mississippi State will open the college football season by hosting a conference game nationally on an ESPN Thursday night telecast...The LSU football team was ranked No. 2 by the Associated Press in the writers' preseason poll, its highest AP preseason ranking since 1959...Coming off of consecutive 11-win seasons, the Tigers received two of 65 first place votes...LSU picked up its highest preseason ranking ever in the USA Today Coaches poll as the Tigers enter the 2007 season as the nation's No. 2 ranked team in that poll as well...The No. 2 ranking for the Tigers is the highest preseason ranking in the coaches poll since its inception in 1982... It also marks the highest preseason ranking for LSU since starting the 2004 season ranked No. 3 in the nation...The last Mississippi State victory over LSU was in Starkville, a 17-16 win in 1999 - one of three victories for the Bulldogs over the Tigers since 1984.

David Elson is in his fifth season at WKU and overall with a record of 30-17 (.638). The Hilltoppers' offensive coordinator is Kevin Wright and Elson serves as the defensive coordinator.

Urban Meyer is in his third season at Florida with a record of 22-4 (.846) and in his seventh season overall with a record of 61-12 (.836). The Gators' offensive coordinator is Dan Mullen and the defensive co-coordinators are Greg Mattison and Charlie Strong.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN WESTERN KENTUCKY HAS THE BALL

Curtis Hamilton, the team's leading returning receiver who was a third-team All-America selection last fall after catching 52 passes for 841 yards and 10 touchdowns despite missing two-and-a-half games due to injury, will be looked at to lead the offense.

The defensive players returning in 2007 have combined for a total of just 36 career starts. SS Tony Joiner leads the way with 15 career starts, while FS Kyle Jackson has made 11 starts, but none in 2006. Derrick Harvey returns as the team's leader from 2006 in tackles for loss (13.0), sacks (11.0) and fumble recoveries (three).

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN FLORIDA HAS THE BALL

QB Tim Tebow will be the Gators' top returning passer and rusher in 2007. He finished the 2006 season passing 22-for-33 with five touchdowns and just one interception, while he rushed 89 times for 469 yards (5.3 avg.) and eight touchdowns. The Florida offense will also lose its top receiver, but returns three of its top five wideouts: Andre Caldwell, Percy Harvin and Cornelius Ingram return and combined those three hauled in 121 catches for 1,384 yards and nine touchdowns in 2006.

Marion Rumph, a three-year starter at free safety who has led the Toppers in tackles each of the last two seasons after racking up 87 stops in 2006 on the way to earning first-team all-Gateway Football Conference accolades for the second year in a row, leads the defense. The linebacking corps boasts three individuals who earned second-team all-league honors last season in Dusty Bear, Blake Boyd — also a member of the conference's All-Newcomer Team — and Andre Lewis.

SPECIAL TEAMS

The WKU kicking duties will be left to 2005 All-American Chris James, who enters his final year having converted better than 80 percent of his field-goal attempts while making all 103 points-after-touchdown.

UF returns its kickoff specialist (Joey Iijas), long snapper (James Smith) and kick returner (Brandon James). James led the team in both kickoff returns and punt returns in 2006. He returned 21 kickoffs for 382 yards (18.2 avg.). In the punt return department, James' 33 punt returns for 363 yards for an 11.0 average that ranked fifth in the SEC and 26th nationally.

SERIES/GAME NOTES

Record: First Meeting

WKU is in the process of transitioning to the NCAA Division I-A (Football Bowl Subdivision) level.... Never has WKU played more than two NCAA Division I-A opponents in the same season, but they will be playing six in 2007. The slate, which includes only four home contests, will see the Toppers take on defending national champion Florida to begin the year and both Sun Belt Conference co-champions who participated in bowl games (Troy and Middle Tennessee), and it includes a five-week stretch in which they will play four games in a row on the road. It will mark the second time in as many years that the Hilltoppers will begin the season with a SEC LFS broadcast. WKU kicked off the 2006 campaign at Georgia.

Ed Orgeron is in his third season at Ole Miss and overall with a record of 7-16 (.304). The Rebels' offensive coordinator is Dan Werner and the defensive coordinator is John Thompson.

Tommy West is in his seventh season at Memphis with a record of 34-38 (.472) and in his 13th season overall with a record of 69-73 (.486). The Tigers' offensive coordinator is Clay Helton and West serves as the defensive coordinator.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN OLE MISS HAS THE BALL

With the return of a 1,000-yard rusher in senior running back BenJarvus Green-Ellis and all but one starter back on the offensive forward wall, Ole Miss head coach Ed Orgeron enters the 2007 season knowing that running back and offensive line will be two strengths the Rebels can depend on. Junior Mike Wallace led all receivers last year with 24 receptions for 410 yards and two TDs as he averaged 17.1 yards per reception.

Five linemen return at defensive end who all logged significant action in 2006. Junior Corey Mills, sophomore Jada Brown and junior Clinton McDonald are projected at left end while sophomores Josh Weaver and Greg Terrell are listed at right end. The linebacker corps is probably the most veteran of all the groups on the squad this year. Heath Grant, Jake Kasser and Quinton McCrary all are seniors, and they are joined by juniors Greg Jackson and Tommy Phelps.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN MEMPHIS HAS THE BALL

Junior defensive lineman Peria Jerry, who was a major contributor last season while being limited with an injury, missed spring drills, but should be at full speed by the first game. Sophomore Jonathan Cornell, who started the LSU game last fall, and junior Brandon Thomas are returnees who saw some playing time at linebacker a year ago and both worked at the "Mike" spot in the spring.

Martin Hankins returns for his senior season under center, and the running game is expected to continue to produce with a host of veterans, including senior Joseph Doss. The receiving corps could again be a deep and experienced group with the return of several players from injuries and increased production from standout Duke Calhoun.

SPECIAL TEAMS

The kicking game, which returns sophomore place-kicker Joshua Shene and junior punter Rob Park, is expected to be a strength for the Rebels. As a true freshman in 2006, Shene led the team in scoring with 62 points as he made all 20 extra-point attempts and 14-of-17 field goal tries, with a long of 52 yards. Park, who also holds on placements, averaged 38.9 yards on 58 punts a year ago as he put 16 inside the 20-yard line and had 10 fair caught.

The Tigers return sophomore Matt Reagan at kicker. Reagan played in 2006 as a true freshman and was named to the C-USA All-Freshman Team after leading the Tigers in scoring with 61 points. He was 12-of-17 on field goals and 25-of-26 on PATs.

Ole Miss and Memphis renew their early-season rivalry again in 2007 to start the season...Ole Miss has won two in a row in the series after Memphis won in both 2003 and 2004...Ed Orgeron's first game and first win as head coach of the Rebels came at Memphis in 2005...That 2004 game was the only time since 1995 Ole Miss hasn't opened the season with a victory...This also marks the third straight year the Ole Miss-Memphis game will be televised.

THE COACHES

Danny Hope is in his first season at ECU and overall with a record of 26-19 (.578). The Colonels' offensive coordinator is Linwood Ferguson and the defensive coordinator is Donn Landholm.

Rich Brooks is in his fifth season at Kentucky with a record of 17-30 (.362) and in his 23rd season overall with a record of 108-39-4 (.438). The Wildcats' offensive coordinator is Joker Phillips and the defensive coordinator is Steve Brown.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN EASTERN KENTUCKY HAS THE BALL

The offense averaged a league-high 354.5 yards per game in 2006 while putting up 30 points per game in the final six contests of the year. However, turnovers were a problem for the offense at times last season as ECU committed 16 turnovers in the five losses to just eight in the six victories. Most football teams would be happy to have one proven quarterback on the roster while the Colonels are fortunate enough to have two such players in senior Josh Greco and junior Allan Holland.

The anchor of the UK defense is senior weakside linebacker Wesley Woodyard, the team's leading tackler the last two years. He had 122 stops last season, winning All-SEC honors while ranking second in the league in tackles per game. Quick to the ball, Woodyard also led the team with 9.5 tackles for loss. Junior middle linebacker Braxton Kelley had 82 tackles last season.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN KENTUCKY HAS THE BALL

The Wildcats are led by senior QB Andre' Woodson, a second-team All-SEC honoree a year ago while leading the league in passing yardage and total offense. Woodson completed 63 percent of his passes for 3,515 yards, 31 touchdowns, and only seven interceptions. UK's receiving corps is primarily intact, led by senior wide-out Keenan Burton (77 receptions, 1,036 yards, 12 touchdowns last season) and junior Dicky Lyons (50 catches for 822 yards, nine TDs). Burton was named first-team All-SEC as an all-purpose player and second-team all-league as a receiver.

On defense, most of the names will be familiar to Colonel fans, but some of the players will be in new positions this fall led by senior linebackers George Anderson and Jules Montinar. In 2006, Anderson lined up as a defensive end while Montinar was utilized in the secondary.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Junior Taylor Long handled the kicking duties in 2006 for ECU and proved his mettle with a clutch last-second, game-winning 39-yard field goal at then No. 8 Tennessee-Martin. Long struggled early in the year only to rally by making five of his last seven field goal attempts. One of the missed opportunities was from 53 yards.

Special teams have generally been a UK strength under coordinator Steve Ortmayer, and with the kicker, punter, and all kick returners coming back, 2007 could be another top-notch season. Kentucky led the nation in punt returns last season with a 20.4-yard average and was 10th in the nation in kickoff returns (24-yard average), the only school in the nation to rank in the top 10 in both categories, and the second-consecutive year that UK has had the country's best overall return game.

This will mark only the second meeting between the two schools, the only other contest coming nearly a decade ago - a 52-7 UK victory in Lexington...A total of 15 offensive and defensive starters are back from the Wildcat team that went 8-5 last season, topped by a Music City Bowl win over Clemson. The Eastern Kentucky football team heads into 2007 in search of its 30th consecutive winning season. A large veteran group made up of 19 seniors hopes to guide the Colonels back to the NCAA playoffs for the first time in 10 years.

THE COACHES

Mike Gundy is in his third season at OSU and overall with a record of 11-13 (.458). The Cowboys' offensive coordinator is Larry Fedora and the defensive coordinator is Tim Beckman.

Mark Richt is in his seventh season at Georgia and overall with a record of 61-17 (.782). The Bulldogs' offensive coordinator is Mike Bobo and the defensive coordinator is Willie Martinez.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN OKLAHOMA STATE HAS THE BALL

Wideout Adarius Bowman averaged 19.7 yards per reception last season with 60 grabs covering 1,187 yards. He also snared 12 touchdown passes. Bowman figures to get some help on his side from Seth Newton. QB Bobby Reid rushed for 500 yards, passed for 2,266 yards and 24 touchdowns and was the trigger man for one of the nation's highest scoring teams. His 2,766 yards of total offense was the second-best total in OSU history.

The secondary appears to be a strength for the Bulldogs heading into 2007, led by senior Kelin Johnson at strong safety. Johnson (6-1, 194, Sr.) is Georgia's leading returning tackler after he made 60 a year ago. The hard-hitting safety also had 2.5 sacks, 5.5 tackles for loss, two interceptions and two fumble recoveries.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN GEORGIA HAS THE BALL

Matthew Stafford (6-3, 237, So.) was the only Georgia quarterback to see action in all 13 games a year ago. Starting eight games, including the last six, Stafford completed 135 passes for 1,749 yards and seven touchdowns. He capped his year by earning Offensive MVP honors at the Chick-fil-A Bowl and picking up Freshman All-SEC recognition. The Bulldogs have a deep stable of tailbacks as well as experience at fullback entering the fall. At tailback, Georgia has 2006 leading rusher Kregg Lumpkin (6-1, 229, Sr.) and 2005 leader Thomas Brown (5-8, 200, Sr.) back.

Two freshmen, safety Andre Sexton and linebacker Patrick Lavine, were OSU's top two tacklers last season. Those two, along with another linebacker, Chris Collins, were Freshman All-Americans in 2006. OSU returns seven starters on defense, and depth and experience are present nearly everywhere.

SPECIAL TEAMS

OSU also returns its starting placekicker (Jason Ricks), punter (second-team All-American Matt Fodge), holder Cole Reynolds, and snapper Zach Allen.

Brandon Coutu (6-0, 200, Sr.) missed much of last season with an injury, but he still ranked second on the team with 47 points as he converted 10-of-11 field goals and 17-of-17 extra points. When Coutu was out, the Bulldogs were able to turn to Andy Bailey (6-2, 223, Sr.), who was 5-for-8 on field goals and 12-of-14 on PATs.

Kent Briggs is in his sixth season at Western Carolina and overall with a record of 21-33 (.389). The Commodores' offensive coordinator is Doug Malone and the defensive coordinator is Don Powers.

Nick Saban is in his first season at Alabama and in his 14th season overall with a record of 106-59-1 (.642). The Crimson Tide's offensive coordinator is Major Applewhite and the defensive coordinator is Kevin Steele.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN WESTERN CAROLINA HAS THE BALL

Offensively, Western returns a pair of quarterbacks and running backs who saw game action a year ago. WCU will be led by preseason starting QB, Todd Spitzer, with Andy Horn also having game experience, with running backs Mike Malone and Willie Harper set to team to replace last season's 1,000-yard rusher, Darius Fudge.

While the Crimson Tide defense returns five starters, it must replace tons of experience lost from last year's squad. Gilberry and senior defensive end Keith Saunders (Willingboro, N.J.) return to anchor the defensive line. Gilberry and Saunders have played in a combined 67 games with 139 tackles and 33.5 TFLs. Prince Hall (Riverside, Calif.) is the only returning starting linebacker.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN ALABAMA HAS THE BALL

The Crimson Tide offense returns a recordsetting quarterback and the two most prolific pass catchers in school history. Junior quarterback John Parker Wilson (Hoover) set Alabama single-season records in 2006 for most plays, total offense, pass attempts, completions, yards and touchdowns. Hall and Brown combined for 1,646 receiving yards, the most by any receiving duo in school history.

Injuries plagued the Catamount defense a year ago resulting in allowing the most points (316) since 2000 (371). Hit hardest was the defensive line in which no player started every game in the same position. The return of players such as John Martin (#53), who earned a fifth-year of eligibility, Jeff Bradley, Brandon Drumgoole and Marcus Nelums at ends will bolster the experience level of the squad which lost its leading tackler from a year ago, linebacker Shelton Gaffney.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Junior Jonathan Parsons will handle all of the place kicking on field goals and PAT's for the third-straight season. In his first two seasons as the primary place-kicker, Parsons has connected on a perfect 30-for-30 PAT attempts and is 9-of-13 (69.2-percent) on his field goal attempts, missing four last season in a 6-for-10 year.

Alabama returns all but one of its specialists from last season, including three-year starter at kicker Jamie Christensen (Norcross, Ga.). Christensen, who has also handled kickoffs the last three years, has hit 29 of 42 career field goal attempts and 40 of 42 career extra points.

Larry Blakeney is in his 17th season at Troy and overall with a record of 128-64-1 (.663). The Trojans' offensive coordinator is Tony Franklin and the defensive coordinator is Jeremy Rowell.

Houston Nutt is in his 10th season at Arkansas with a record of 67-54 (.609) and in his 15th season overall with a record of 103-66 (.609). The Razorbacks' offensive coordinator is David Lee and the defensive coordinator is Reggie Herring.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN TROY HAS THE BALL

Settling the situation up front on offense should open the door for Omar Haugabook, the returning Sun Belt Player of the Year, to expand on his successes last year. As a junior, Haugabook completed 61.3 percent of his pass attempts for 2,401 yards and 21 touchdowns. He also rushed for 313 yards and five scores.

Arkansas returns six players on defense, including LT Ernest Michell, RE Antwain Robinson, LB Weston Dacus, S Matt Hewitt, FS Michael Grant and CB Matteredal Richardson.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN ARKANSAS HAS THE BALL

The Arkansas tailback duo of Darren McFadden and Felix Jones were the second-most productive rushing teammates in the country (among the NCAA top 100) last season and the top tailback duo, averaging 201.07 yards per game. 2006, Marcus Monk produced the best numbers of his career with 50 catches for a career-high 962 yards. He caught a school-record 11 touchdown passes and averaged 19.2 yards per catch, which was the second-best in the SEC.

No fewer than six defensive backs have extensive experience on the field, including two who will be returning from injuries. The Troy coaching staff will likely deploy a nickel package on defense most of the time this fall. The headliners in the secondary are the two senior corners. Leodis McKelvin (Waycross, Ga.) is known more for his exploits as a kickoff and punt returner, but became a legitimate shutdown corner last season while also finishing second on the team in tackles (66), along with those of fellow senior Elbert Mack (Wichita, Kan.).

SPECIAL TEAMS

The only major question mark, other than the offensive line, entering the fall is at punter. Senior Adrian Vera (Houston, Tx.) has the best leg, but has struggled with consistency. Senior place kicker Greg Whibbs (Pensacola, Fla.) could challenge for the job in the fall, but so could freshman signee Will Goggans (Douglas, Ga.) and a group of walk-ons.

McFadden and Jones give Arkansas one of the most deadly kickoff return teams in the country. Jeremy Davis returns as the kicker, and will take over punting duties as well for Arkansas.

Bobby Johnson is in his sixth season at Vanderbilt with a record of 15-43 (.259) and in his 14th season overall with a record of 75-79 (.487). The Commodores' offensive coordinator is Ted Cain and the defensive coordinator is Bruce Fowler.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN RICHMOND HAS THE BALL

Senior WR Arman Shields and senior OL Tim Silver were selected to the CAA Football Preseason All-Conference Team. In 2006 Shields was a Second Team All-Atlantic 10 selection... Second Team All-Virginia Sports Information Directors (VaSID) selection... Started 10 games (missed the season-finale with an injury)... Reeled in a career-high five touchdown passes on the season.

Nagurski and Butkus award candidate Jonathan Goff (6-4, 235, R-Sr.) is a physical presence from his middle linebacker position and ranks among the top defensive players in the SEC. Goff and strongside linebacker Marcus Buggs (5-11, 225, R-Sr.) give the Commodores a pair of solid performers and excellent leaders returning for their final year. Goff, highly regarded by NFL draft experts, continues the superb Commodore tradition at linebacker, and enters 2007 with 27 consecutive starts to his resume.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN VANDERBILT HAS THE BALL

The Commodores are led by junior QB Chris Nickson, who threw for 2,085 yards and 15 TDs and also led Vandy in rushing with 694 yards last season. Junior WR Earl Bennett needs 48 receptions to become the all-time leader in SEC career receptions. In two seasons, he has 161 catches for 2,022 yards. Senior OT Chris Williams was named second-team All-SEC by the league's coaches last season. The Commodores were fourth in the SEC in rushing last season, averaging 149.6 yards per game.

Senior defensive end Sherman Logan and sophomore cornerback David Horton were defensive honorees on the CAA Football Preseason All-Conference Team. Last season, Logan was Third Team All-Atlantic 10 and started all 11 games last year recording 52 tackles. Logan collected three sacks and has 14 for his career, just a half sack shy of Richmond's career top-10. Horton was Second Team All-Atlantic 10 selection and played in all 11 games in 2006.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Andrew Howard excelled as a true-freshman kicker, finishing the season 11-for-13 in field goal attempts and a perfect 34-for-34 on extra points... Scored 64 points, which ranked as the third-highest single-season total for kickers at Richmond.

The Commodores return two-year starter Bryant Hahnfeldt (5-11, 190, Jr.) as their placekicking specialist. The junior helped the Commodores defeat Georgia with a last-second field goal, but struggled at other times last year, making just eight of 17 field goals.

Tailback Cory Boyd led the team with 823 yards rushing in 2006. It was the most yards rushing for a Gamecock since the 2000 season when Derek Watson rushed for 1,066. Boyd is 22nd on the Carolina all-time rushing leaders list with 1,364 yards.

Seniors Rodney Hardeway and Greg Hathorn are the key pass rushers at end. Their go-go-go mentality is perfect for the Cajuns style. Hardeway was an honorable mention on the All-Sun Belt Team last season after leading all Cajuns defensive linemen in tackles, tackles-for-loss, sacks and forced fumbles. Starting quarterback Michael Desormeaux led the Cajuns with three fumble recoveries as an all-purpose player in 2006.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Working closely with his kickers, Bustle has produced two First Team All-Sun Belt kickers, including Drew Edmiston in 2006. Edmiston was 8-for-9 on field goal attempts of 40+ yards, with his only miss coming from 50 yards on the road.

Placekicker Ryan Succop led the team with 85 points scored. It was the third highest single season total in school history behind only Collin Mackie (113) and Harold Green (96), who both logged their numbers in 1987. Succop, a semi-finalist for the Lou Groza Award, became the fourth kicker in school history to notch two field goals of 50+ yards, including a 55-yarder against Vanderbilt, the second-longest field goal in school history.

SERIES/GAME NOTES

Record: USC, 1-0 • **Last:** USC, 14-7 (2003 at Columbia)

The only time the two schools have met were the season opener in 2003 as well, a 14-7 Gamecock victory...The 2007 campaign will mark the 114th season of college football at South Carolina, dating back to 1892. The university did not field a team in either 1893 or 1906. This will mark the 101st consecutive year in which Carolina has fielded a football squad. USC owns an all-time record of 515-517-44. The school's only league title came in 1969 when it went 6-0 to win the ACC crown...The Gamecocks were one of only 15 Division I teams to finish the 2006 season with three consecutive wins. It was the first time Carolina has finished the season with three straight wins since the 1973 season.

THE COACHES

Ron Prince is in his second season at Kansas State and overall with a record of 7-6 (.538). The Wildcats' offensive coordinator is James Franklin and the defensive coordinator is Tim Tibesar.

Tommy Tuberville is in his ninth season at Auburn with a record of 71-29 (.710) and in his 13th season overall with a record of 96-49 (.662). The Tigers' offensive coordinator is Al Borges and the defensive coordinator is Will Muschamp.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN KANSAS STATE HAS THE BALL

Sophomore quarterback Josh Freeman is one of 16 players back in the fold who made at least one start for Kansas State in 2006. Seven of those players, including Freeman, were in the Wildcats' opening lineup for at least half of K-State's 13 games last season, so there is plenty of experience to go around. K-State's leading pass catcher in each of the last two seasons, Jordy Nelson has hauled in 84 receptions for 1,216 yards and nine touchdowns during his career. He has also displayed the ability to make both the clutch catch and stretch the field.

Senior defensive end Quentin Groves was named to the Coaches and AP All-SEC First Team in 2006 after finishing with 37 tackles and a team-leading 9 ½ sacks. He also had twelve tackles for loss which also led the Tigers. He has 23 sacks for his career, which places Groves second on Auburn's alltime list. He needs just three to tie the AU career record. Groves has seven multiple-sack efforts for his career. He has been named to the watch lists for the Bronko Nagurski Trophy and the Chuck Bednarik Award.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN AUBURN HAS THE BALL

Senior quarterback Brandon Cox leads the offense. Cox started all 13 games last season, throwing for 2,198 yards and 14 TDs. He is 19-5 as a starter and has thrown at least one touchdown in 20 of his 24 career starts. Has thrown for 200 or more yards in a game 12 times. King Dunlap is a veteran offensive tackle and is the only returning starter on the offensive line for the Tigers in 2007.

A total of 15 players who started at least one game on defense last season return, including six who were in KState's lineup for seven or more contests, giving the Wildcats plenty of experience across the board. Junior Ian Campbell, a candidate for Big 12 Defensive Player of the Year after tying the school record for sacks last season with 11.5 and leading the Big 12 in tackles for losses with 17.5, is the headliner among the group and will be called upon to line up at both defensive end and outside linebacker in 2007 depending on the front being employed.

SPECIAL TEAMS

The Wildcats appear to be in great shape at punter with three-year starter Tim Reyer back in the fold for 2007. The Wildcats appear to be all set in the kickoff return game with three of the nation's best in Patton, McKinney and James Johnson. All three returned kicks for touchdowns last season as the Wildcats led the nation in kickoff-return average and set a new school record for kickoffs returns for touchdowns in a season with three.

The Tigers' return game will be strong with the return of Brad Lester, Tristan Davis and Robert Dunn, however, Auburn must replace both their award-winning kicker and punter from a year ago.

Auburn and Kansas State will be meeting for the first time since 1979, when the two met at Auburn to open the season, a which which ended in a 26-18 Auburn victory. The two also met at Kansas State in 1978 for the first ever meeting between the two schools.

THE COACHES

Phillip Fulmer is in his 16th season at Tennessee and overall with a record of 137-41 (.770). The Volunteers' offensive coordinator is David Cutcliffe and the defensive coordinator is John Chavis.

Jeff Tedford is in his 6th season at Cal and overall with a record of 43-20 (.683). The Golden Bears' offensive coordinator is Jim Michalczyk and the defensive coordinator is Bob Gregory.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN TENNESSEE HAS THE BALL

The presence of Erik Ainge for a final fling puts the Vols one-up on most of the competition going into the 2007 campaign. The most accurate passer in Tennessee history, with his 67-percent completion mark edging out such notables as Peyton Manning and Daryl Dickey, Ainge is masterful at finding the bull's-eye. He had two games in which his consistency was especially notable, hitting 15 straight against Air Force and 11 against Vanderbilt. Ainge in 2006 had 19 touchdown passes, bringing his career total to 41.

Cal is led on defense by junior linebacker Zack Follett. A Butkus Award candidate, he was All-Pac-10 as a sophomore in 2006 with 12.5 tackles for loss and 5.5 sacks. He also tallied 62 tackles and four forced fumbles. The Golden Bears return four starters in the secondary in 2007. However, three are safeties and only one is a cornerback, as Cal must develop a replacement for consensus All-American Daymeion Hughes at one corner.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN CALIFORNIA HAS THE BALL

Nate Longshore stepped into the starting role at quarterback in 2006 and established himself as one of the top signal-callers in the Pac-10, if not the nation. As a sophomore, Longshore connected for 24 touchdowns while directing the Cal offense to a Pac-10 best 32.8 points per game. He became just the second Golden Bear to pass for over 3,000 yards in a single season (3,021).

Longshore completed over 60 percent of his passes and ranked second in the Pac-10 in passing efficiency.

Tennessee is led on defense by senior DB Jonathan Hefney and junior LB Jerod Mayo. Hefney has 226 career tackles, nine interceptions and 16 pass deflections while Mayo had 96 tackles last season with five interceptions, being named second-team All-America by Rivals.com. Tennessee was fifth in the SEC in pass defense (180.8 ypg) and in turnover margin last season.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Jonathan Hefney is UT's top returner, averaging 12.1 yards per punt return. Britton Colquitt was second in the SEC in punting last season (44.9). Colquitt is related, as you might suspect, to three previous Colquitts who have made their mark for the Vols -- Craig (father), Dustin (brother) and Jimmy (cousin).

A 2007 Heisman Trophy hopeful, DeSean Jackson showed why he was one of the most exciting and dynamic players in the country in 2006. Jackson had four punt return touchdowns his sophomore campaign (five in his career) -- both school and Pac-10 records. He set a school-record with 455 total punt return yards, while his 18.2 punt return average was also a school-record for a single-season.

SERIES/GAME NOTES

Record: UT, 2-1 • **Last:** UT, 35-18 (2006 at Knoxville)

This will be the first game in series history played at Cal...The previous three were all played in Knoxville...The past season marked the first time since 1975 that California earned a share of the Pac-10 Conference championship ... Cal secured the co-championship after its 26-17 victory over Stanford (Dec. 2) coupled with UCLA's upset victory over USC in Pasadena also on Dec. 2.
