### SEC HIGHLIGHTS

- SEC Football Players of the Week are LSU RB Stevan Ridley (offense), Alabama LB Courtney Upshaw (defense), Ole Miss RS/WR Jesse Grandy (special teams), Alabama OG Chance Warmack (offensive line), Auburn DT Nick Fairley (defensive line) and Miss. State RB LaDarius Perkins (freshman).
- SEC offenses are using the run this season at a much higher rate than the pass. In 57 games, no other conference is passing as less than the SEC (26.3 attempts per game).
- SEC stadiums have been filled to 97.69 percent capacity this season with 17 of 36 home dates at full capacity.

- The SEC has a national-best six teams ranked in both the Associated Press and USA Today polls. Since 1992, the SEC has had at least six teams ranked in 64 of 218 polls, almost 30 percent of all polls released.
- The SEC is 24-5 (.828) against non-conference foes this season. Since expansion in 1992, the SEC is 663-210-2 (.759) in non-conference games and has won at least 75 percent of its games in every season since 2005.
- SEC leads the nation in number of players on NFL opening weekend rosters (272).

**SEC FOOTBALL VIDEO REPLAY**

**THE OBJECTIVE**

To allow for specific types of officiating calls to be immediately reviewed during all games hosted by SEC teams.

**THE COACHES' CHALLENGE**

The head coach may challenge the ruling of any reviewable play. He retains a challenge if his initial challenge is successful and thus results in a reversal by the replay official. The head coach will then have a single challenge that he may use anytime during the game if his team has not used all its timeouts. Thus a team may have a total of two challenges in the game, but only if the first results in a reversal of the on-field ruling.

**THE SOURCE**

All reviewable video comes direct from either the television network broadcasting the game or other TV production facilities that meet established conference standards. The Southeastern Conference has used instant replay since 2005.

**THE PLAYS**

Reviewable

1. Plays governed by Sideline, Goal Line, End Zone, and End Line:
  - a. Scoring Plays, including the ball in possession of a runner breaking the plane of the goal line
  - b. Runner/receiver in or out of bounds
  - c. Recovery of loose ball in and out of bounds
2. Passing Plays:
  - a. Pass ruled complete/ incomplete/ intercepted in the field of play and end zones
  - b. Touching of a forward pass by a player or an official
  - c. Illegal forward pass or illegal handing off beyond the line of scrimmage
  - d. Illegal forward pass or illegal handing off after change of possession
  - e. Forward or backward pass thrown from behind the line of scrimmage
  - f. Quarterback (Passer) starts arm forward, ball comes loose and play is ruled incomplete (if ball is quickly recovered)
  - g. Quarterback (Passer) throws incomplete swing pass that is close to being forward or backward, and pass is ruled forward (if ball is quickly recovered)
3. Miscellaneous:
  - a. Runner ruled not down.
  - b. Runner ruled down (when ball carrier is judged down by rule and the ball is fumbled, play may be reviewed if recovery of ball occurs in the immediate action following fumble and is prior to any official signaling ball is dead. Also reviewable when runner is ruled out of bounds near goal line.)
  - c. Forward progress with respect to first down
  - d. Touching of a kick
  - e. Number of players on field
  - f. Clock adjustments (in conjunction with reviewed plays)
  - g. Fourth-down/try fumble plays
  - h. Field Goal Attempts (only when ball is ruled below or above the crossbar, inside or outside the uprights when it is lower than the top of the uprights.)
  - i. The game clock expires at the end of a half. If at the end of the game, the time may be restored to the clock only if the score is tied or the team that would next snap the ball trails by eight points or fewer.

**THE PROCESS**

Each SEC football stadium has a secured replay booth equipped with the HD Instant Replay system provided by XOS Digital. Three individuals work in the booth for the duration of the game: 1. Replay Official, 2. Communicator, 3. Technician. The Replay Official and the Communicator are selected and assigned by the Conference Office.

A live HD video feed is sent directly to the replay booth from the TV truck. The Technician watches the feed on an input monitor while recording it into the XOS Digital Replay System. The Technician also marks the beginning of each play while the Communicator marks all incoming replays.

Each play and subsequent replay then appears on a touch screen in front of the Replay Technician. As the Technician and the Communicator mark the incoming video, each view will appear as a small picture on the computer touch screen. At any time, the Replay Technician can touch the thumbnail and immediately send that play or replay to the Replay Official.

With the Communicator's assistance, the Replay Official can quickly jump between replays while playing back the video. All replay video navigation is done via a jog shuttle remote controlled by the Replay Official. All video is viewed on an HD monitor that sits in front of the Replay Official. The touch screen is only used to select the replays and to log specific play data in the event a call is overturned.

While all plays are reviewed between the whistle and the beginning of the next play, the Replay Official can stop play on the field by using a pager system. Five onfield officials wear pagers. If play is stopped the Referee announces on the stadium PA microphone that play has been stopped so the previous play can be reviewed. The Referee then proceeds to the sideline headset, which provides direct communication to the Replay Official in the booth. Once the play has been reviewed, the Replay Official notifies the Referee, who then announces the decision on the stadium PA system.

**THE EQUIPMENT**

Each SEC member institution uses the HD Replay System developed by XOS Digital of Orlando, FL. The replay systems are maintained by the home institution with technical support from XOS Digital.

## SEC FOOTBALL ON TELEVISION

### CBS SPORTS

CBS Sports continues to be the exclusive national network broadcaster of SEC home football games, including the SEC Championship Game. CBS Sports will showcase the top conference matchups each week of the package with the "SEC Game of the Week". The agreement also includes a prime time game and doubleheader opportunities. In addition, CBS Sports continues its coverage of SEC regular-season basketball. In addition to the broadcast rights on CBS Sports, this 15-year contract includes certain digital, internet, wireless, Video-on-Demand, data and enhanced highlight rights across all CBS platforms, including CBS College Sports Network and CBSsports.com. Also, simulcasts of CBS Sports games will be available for distribution by the CBS College Sports Network.

### ESPN

ESPN is the exclusive national cable home and the syndication rights holder for the SEC, including every SEC home football game (excluding those on the network broadcast package).

**ESPN and ESPN2:** The networks have increased coverage by combining to televise a minimum of 20 SEC games annually, including Saturday night and two primetime Thursday matchups.

**ESPNU:** The 24-hour college sports network presents an SEC Game of the Week (generally in primetime and a minimum of 13 games annually) as well as the studio show *SEC Weekly*.

**SEC Network (ESPN Regional Television):** The nation's largest syndicator of collegiate sports programming, is the official over-the-air syndication home for the SEC and will feature an SEC Game of the Week (generally at noon ET), with a minimum of 13 games each season throughout the SEC footprint and beyond. In addition, ESPN produces the integrated SEC Studio show, hosted by Dari Nowkhah, with analyst Matt Stinchcomb, a former University of Georgia and NFL standout.

**ESPN360.com:** Simulcasts of SEC game telecasts are offered on the broadband sports network.

**ESPN Mobile TV:** Live games are simulcast on mobile phones.

**ESPN International:** The agreement includes global rights to present live games and encore presentations.

**ESPN Deportes:** ESPN holds domestic Spanish-language rights for SEC football on the 24-hour, U.S.-based network.

**ESPN GamePlan:** The out-of-market college football pay-per-view service, offers SEC action.

**ESPN Classic:** The network may telecast select SEC live games as well as historic and immediate encore presentations.

**ESPN.com:** Extensive SEC content, including highlights, will be presented online.

### COMCAST/ CHARTER SPORTS SOUTHEAST

Comcast / Charter Sports Southeast (CSS), the regional sports channel focusing on college sports in the southeast, has an agreement with ESPN to televise live Southeastern Conference (SEC) content including a minimum of six football games, twenty men's basketball games, and sixteen women's basketball games as well as fifty SEC Olympic sports each year. The agreement began with the 2009-10 academic year and goes for five years.

### FOX SPORTS NET

Fox Sports Net's (FSN) regional sports networks serving the SEC territory – FOX Sports South, FOX Sports Carolinas, FOX Sports Tennessee, Sun Sports, FOX Sports Southwest and FOX Sports Houston – will be the outlets for a minimum of 92 SEC athletic events each year. Events will include eight live, exclusive football games, 20 men's basketball games, 24 women's basketball games (16 regular season, eight tournament), 16 baseball games (10 regular season, six tournament) and 24 additional Olympic sporting events (softball, volleyball, soccer, gymnastics). SEC athletic events on FSN will be distributed to more than 22 million cable and satellite households throughout the SEC territory.

### INSTITUTIONAL MEDIA PACKAGES

As part of the SEC's television contracts, each conference institution was able to maintain a contractual television arrangement of its own. As part of this arrangement, each SEC institution has the ability to televise one pay-per-view football game per year as well as to host its own tape-delayed game package, coaches' TV shows as well as other sport packages.

### SEC FOOTBALL SHOWS ON TELEVISION

#### SEC Weekly on ESPNU

*SEC Weekly*, a one-hour program airs Wednesdays at 5 p.m. ET on ESPNU, throughout the academic year and will cover SEC sports, including sport-by-sport previews, reviews, specials and features on student-athletes. The show is hosted by Cara Capuano with analyst Matt Stinchcomb, a former University of Georgia All-America and NFL player. *SEC Weekly* is a product of ESPN's landmark 15-year agreement with the Southeastern Conference. ESPNU will complement the show with SEC game telecasts, including football, basketball, Olympic sports and select conference championships.

#### SEC Gridiron Live

SEC Gridiron LIVE, airing live every Wednesday at 10 p.m. ET, breaks down every SEC game with footage, interviews and analysis. Tim Couch, former Kentucky standout and top pick in the 1999 NFL Draft, joins the live, weekly one-hour show as an analyst, with host Charles Davis and analyst Randy Cross. Also new to the SEC Gridiron LIVE team is social media host Kristina Akra. SECGridironLIVE.com is the hub for the show's social networking component, allowing viewers to participate in the live show and interact instantaneously with the broadcast team and SEC fans across the country.

#### CBS College Sports SEC Tailgate

Beginning Sept. 18, CBS Sports will start SEC programming with its live pre-game show COLLEGE FOOTBALL TODAY followed by the "SEC Game of the Week" CBS College Sports Network will broadcast SEC TAILGATE on select Saturdays at 2:00 PM, ET, from the site of CBS Sports' SEC Game of the Week. The show brings fans a fast paced and authoritative look at football and life in the SEC. The show captures all the excitement, traditions and festivities from the various campuses and stadiums across the SEC, and features local SEC legends and celebrity alumni.

SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE FOOTBALL NOTES

**SEC - FOUR STRAIGHT NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS**

Alabama's 37-21 win over Texas in the 2010 BCS National Championship Game gave the Southeastern Conference its fourth straight BCS National Championship and its sixth BCS title overall. The SEC is now 6-0 in BCS National Championship Games (LSU 2-0, Florida 2-0, Alabama 1-0, Tennessee 1-0).

Alabama is the fourth SEC team to win a BCS National Championship and the third different SEC team to win it during the last four seasons. Tennessee won the BCS' first national title in 1998, LSU won the crown in 2003, Florida's claimed the national championship in 2006 and 2008 while LSU took the title in 2007 and Alabama claimed the national title this past season. The Big 12 has two BCS national titles followed by the ACC, Big Ten, Pac-10 and Big East with one each.

The SEC is the first conference to claim four consecutive Associated Press (first poll - 1936), National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame (first poll - 1959), Football Writers Association of America (first poll - 1954) and USA Today or UPI Coaches Poll (first poll - 1950) national championships.

Since SEC expansion in 1992, the SEC has the most national championships (AP, USA Today) with eight. During that time, the SEC has had more teams with national titles than any other conference (4). Here is a breakdown:

- SEC - Florida (2008, 2006, 1996), LSU (2003, 2007), Tennessee (1998), Alabama (1992, 2009)
- Big 12 - Texas (2005), Oklahoma (2000), Nebraska (1994, 1995, 1997)
- Big Ten - Ohio State (2002), Michigan (1997)
- Pac-10 - Southern California (2004, 2003)
- ACC - Florida State (1999, 1993)
- Big East - Miami, Fla. (2001)

**SEC IN BOWL GAMES**

The SEC has the most wins (14) and the highest winning percentage of any conference that has three-or-more appearances in BCS bowl games. The SEC is 14-5 in BCS games (.737 percentage).

The SEC finished 6-4 in bowl games this season. Since 2006, the SEC is 25-11 in post-season bowl games (.694). The league has posted a non-losing bowl record for seven straight seasons. The last time the league finished under .500 in bowl games was in 2002 (3-4).

Since conference expansion in 1992, the SEC has won at least five bowl games in nine of 18 seasons. The SEC has won at least six bowl games during the last four seasons (6-3 in 2006; 7-2 in 2007; 6-2 in 2008; 6-4 in 2009). Those years are the only ones since 1992 the league has won six bowl games.

The schools that currently comprise the SEC have appeared in 379 bowls (including 2009-10). That is by far the most of any conference in the nation. In its history, the SEC is 196-170-13 in post-season bowl games, a 53.4 winning percentage. The SEC has the nation's top bowl winning percentage surpassing the Pac-10 (120-107-6, 52.8 percentage). Below is a look at how the various conferences have fared in bowl games in its history (using 2009 conference alignments):

**SEC vs. NON-CONFERENCE FOES**

The SEC finished the 2009 season with a non-conference mark of 48-10 (.828). Counting bowl games, the SEC bested its best-ever win total in non-conference games of 47 set in 2007 (40-8 regular season/7-2 bowl mark) and 2006 (41-7 regular season/6-3 bowl mark). Since confer-

ence expansion, the SEC's best non-conference winning percentage (counting bowl games) is 37-5 (.881), set in 1997 (32-4 regular season/5-1 bowl mark).

**SEC LEADS NATION IN ATTENDANCE AGAIN**

For the 29th straight season, the SEC recorded the largest total attendance figure of any conference in the nation. In 2009, a total of 6,560,738 fans attended 86 games, an average of 76,288 per contest, also tops in the nation. SEC stadiums were filled to 98.10 percent of capacity for each home game in 2009. The SEC had seven of the top 15 schools in total attendance in 2009 - Tennessee (3), Auburn (6), LSU (6), Alabama (7), Florida (8), Georgia (13) and South Carolina (15).

**MISCELLANY**

Since 2000, the Southeastern Conference has had more teams ranked in the final USA Today Coaches Poll than any other conference. The SEC has had 43 teams ranked in the last nine final USA Today Coaches polls, an average of almost five per season. The Big 12 is second with 36 teams ranked since 2000. The SEC has led or tied for lead in most teams ranked in the final USA Today Coaches Polls in seven of the last nine seasons.

Three SEC schools were among the top 10 in most players on 2009 opening weekend rosters. LSU and Miami (Fla.) led the nation with 41 each, while Georgia was sixth with 35 and Tennessee seventh with 30.

The SEC had 49 players selected in the 2010 NFL Draft. The number represents the most SEC players ever taken in the NFL Draft. The SEC had the most players taken among conferences in the draft. Behind the SEC's 49 selections were the Big Ten (34), ACC (31), Big 12 (30) and Pac-10 (29).

Since 1990, the SEC has had 782 total selections in the NFL Draft, an average of 37.2 selections per year. The Big Ten is second with 672 selections.

Since 1997, the SEC has had 552 total selections in the NFL Draft, an average of 39.4 selections per year.

**SEC BOWL AGREEMENTS**

The Southeastern Conference has agreements to send nine of its member institutions to postseason bowl games following the 2010 season.

The winner of the SEC Championship Game will automatically participate in the Bowl Championship Series comprised of the Sugar, Rose, Orange and Fiesta Bowls.

The Capital One Bowl has the second selection, making its pick following the BCS selections. The bowl must select the team with the next best overall record or a team that is within one win of the team with the next best overall record.

The AT&T Cotton and the Outback Bowls share the third and fourth selections from the SEC. The Cotton Bowl has the first preference of teams from the Western Division and the Outback Bowl has first preference of teams from the Eastern Division. The Cotton or Outback Bowl can select teams outside of its divisional preference, but must not select them before the opposite bowl selects from its divisional preference.

The Chick-fil-A Bowl has the fifth selection of preference from the SEC.

New to the SEC bowl rotation this year, the Gator Bowl has the sixth selection from the SEC.

The Franklin American Mortgage Music City Bowl has the seventh selection from the SEC.

In selections 8-9, the AutoZone Liberty and Birmingham Bowls share the selection over the four-year agreement.

**2010 BOWL CHAMPIONSHIP SERIES SCHEDULE**

Following the 2010 college football regular season, the Bowl Championship Series will determine the National Championship. The BCS National Championship Game, which will stand alone from the four traditional BCS bowls but will be hosted by each of the bowls once during a four-year cycle.

The BCS consists of the Discover Orange, Allstate Sugar, Rose Bowl Game, Tostitos Fiesta Bowl and the Tostitos BCS National Championship Game. The conferences with automatic berths include the Atlantic Coast, Big East, Big Ten, Big 12, Pac-10 and Southeastern Conferences.

ESPN will televise all of the Bowl Championship Series games.

The Bowl Championship Series guarantees a matchup between college football's top two teams in a true national championship game.

The BCS uses regional consideration regarding team selection. Specifically, as a member of the BCS, the Rose Bowl will host the Big Ten and Pac-10 champions in those years in which either the Rose Bowl does not have the national championship game or the Big Ten and Pac-10 champion is not ranked No. 1 or No. 2. Other "regional consideration" tie-ins include the SEC champion in the Sugar Bowl, the ACC champion in the Orange Bowl and the Big 12 champion in the Fiesta Bowl.

**SEC DIVISIONAL TIE-BREAKER**

In the event of a tie for the division championship, the following procedures will be used to break all ties to determine the SEC Football Championship Game representative. All Conference versus Conference Games (both division and non-division) will be counted in the Conference Standings.

Two-Team Tie. In the event two teams are tied for a division title, the following procedure will be used in the following order:

- A. Head-to-head competition between the two tied teams;
- B. Records of the tied teams within the division;

- C. Head-to-head competition against the team within the division with the best overall (divisional and non-divisional) Conference record, and proceeding through the division (multiple ties within the division will be broken from first to last and a tie for first place will be broken before a tie for fourth place);

- D. Overall record against non-divisional teams;

- E. Combined record against all common non-divisional teams;

- F. Record against the common non-divisional team with the best overall Conference record (divisional or non-divisional) and proceeding through other common non-divisional teams based on their order of finish within their division; and

- G. The tied team with the highest ranking in the Bowl Championship Series Standings following the last weekend of regular-season games shall be the divisional representative in the SEC Championship Game.

Three-Team Tie (or more). If three teams are tied for a division title, the following procedure will be used in the following order: (Note: If one of the procedures results in one team being eliminated and two remaining, the two-team tiebreaker procedure as stated in No. 1 above will be used):

- A. Combined head to head record among the tied teams;

- B. Record of the tied teams within the division;

- C. Head to head competition against the team within the division with the best overall Conference record (divisional and non divisional) and proceeding through the division (multiple ties within the division will be broken from first to last and a tie for first place will be broken before a tie for fourth place);

- D. Overall Conference record against non divisional teams;

- E. Combined record against all common non divisional teams;

- F. Record against the common non divisional team with the best overall Conference record (divisional and non divisional) and proceeding through other common non divisional teams based on their order of finish within their division; and

- G. The tied team with the highest ranking in the Bowl Championship Series Standings following the last weekend of regular-season games shall be the divisional representative in the SEC Championship Game, unless the second of the tied teams is ranked within five-or-fewer places of the highest-ranked tied team. In this case, the head-to-head results of the top two ranked tied teams shall determine the representative in the SEC Championship Game.

2010 NCAA STATISTICAL TRENDS

After five weeks of the 2010 college football season, the Southeastern Conference teams are favoring the run over the pass. In 57 games, SEC teams are averaging 37.4 rushes per game and only 26.3 passes per game. The 6.3 pass plays per game is the lowest of any FBS conference. A percentage breakdown of each conference shows the SEC tendency to favor rush over pass:

Other Statistical Notes

- SEC teams are averaging 8.13 yards per pass attempt, which is second only to the Big Ten's 8.27 yards per pass attempt. The national average is 7.26 yards per pass attempt.
- SEC teams are tied for the national lead in least amount of turnovers lost. SEC teams are averaging 1.72 turnovers lost per game (tied with the Pac-10). The national average is 1.80 turnovers lost per game. The SEC leads the nation in least amount of fumbles lost per game (0.74).
- The SEC leads the nation in total touchdowns scored (221) but is tied for fourth in scoring average (30.4) with the ACC. The national average is 28.5 points per game.

## THIS IS THE SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE

### SEC MISSION STATEMENT

"The purpose of the Southeastern Conference is to assist its member institutions in the maintenance of programs of intercollegiate athletics which are compatible with the highest standards of education and competitive sports."

### THE SEC

The Southeastern Conference sponsors championships in 20 sports – 11 women's sports and nine men's sports. They include baseball, men's and women's basketball, men's and women's cross country, football, men's and women's golf, gymnastics, soccer, softball, men's and women's swimming and diving, men's and women's tennis, men's and women's indoor and outdoor track and field, and volleyball.

### 2009-10 ANOTHER BANNER ATHLETIC YEAR FOR THE SEC

The SEC claimed four national championships in the 2009-10 year. SEC teams have won at least four national titles every year since 1991. In eight of its 20 sponsored sports, the SEC had either the national champion or the national runners-up. The SEC had national championships in football (Alabama), men's indoor track & field (Florida), women's swimming & diving (Florida) and baseball (South Carolina).

In its 77 year history, the Southeastern Conference has won 183 team national championships, including 67 since 2000. In this decade, the SEC has won at least one national championship in 16 of its 20 sponsored sports with the exception of women's cross country, volleyball, soccer and softball.

### SEC LEADS ALL CONFERENCES IN 2009-10 OVERALL SPORTS CONFERENCE VS. CONFERENCE SURVEY

In a statistical survey that is based on NCAA championship and rankings, the Southeastern Conference placed first in both men's and women's sports. The survey, compiled each year since 1986 by Bo Carter, takes into account final NCAA championship standings in 10 men's and 11 women's sports and poll rankings in football. Each conference gets 20 points for a team that wins a national championship, 19 for a second place finish and down to 1 point for a 20th place finish. Wrestling is included in the men's totals, but the sport is not sponsored by the Southeastern Conference.

In the 10 men's sports for the survey, the SEC had 398 points with the Pac-10 coming in second with 396 points, followed by the Big 12 with 395 points, Big Ten with 279.5 points, ACC with 238 points and the Big East with 83 points. In the 11 women's sports the SEC sponsors, the SEC led the way with 502.5 points followed by the Pac-10 with 480 points, the Big 12 with 382 points, ACC with 369 points, Big Ten with 221 points and the Big East with 164 points.

Combining the 21 sports in the survey, the SEC had 900.5 points to pace all conferences followed by the Pac-10 with 876 points, Big 12 with 777 points, ACC with 607 points, Big Ten with 500.5 points and the Big East with 247 points. The SEC has had the highest men's point total in 17 seasons since 1986-87, the first year this survey was done, and in 11 of the last 12 seasons. The SEC has had the highest women's point total five times since 1986-87, including three of the last six years.

### SEC LEADS DIVISION I CONFERENCES IN MOST FIRST-TEAM ESPN THE MAGAZINE CoSIDA ACADEMIC ALL-AMERICANS

The Southeastern Conference had 15 of its student-athletes earn first-team ESPN The Magazine / CoSIDA Academic All-America status in 2009-10, more than any other Division I conference in the nation. The Big 12 had 14 while the Big Ten and Pac-10 had 13 student-athletes each earn the honor.

The SEC had 36 total student-athletes earn either first, second or third team mention. That total is second overall to the Big 12 Conference, which had 39. The Big Ten was third with 34 total student-athletes earned first, second or third team mention.

The SEC's academic success of its student-athletes in 2009-10 was not just Academic All-Americans. The league honored 2,424 of its own student-athletes who made the SEC Academic Honor Roll. The league also honored Auburn swimmer Jordan Anderson and Tennessee track & field athlete Phoebe Wright with its McWhorter Scholar-Athletes of the Year as well as naming a scholar-athlete of the year in each of its sports.

Among honors given by the NCAA, SEC student-athletes also shined. Three student-athletes from the SEC – Florida's Tim Tebow (football), Georgia's Courtney Kupets (gymnastics) and Alabama's Brittany Rogers (softball) were honored this past year with the Today's Top VIII Award from the NCAA. Since 2004, the SEC has had 10 student-athletes awarded this honor, more than any other conference in the country.

The SEC also had 13 student-athletes receive NCAA Postgraduate Scholarships in 2009-10, more than any other conference in the nation.

### SEC SPORTSMANSHIP STATEMENT

The SEC has developed a sportsmanship statement for its institutions to follow. It states: "Coaches and student-athletes of a member institution, as well as individuals employed by or associated with that institution, including alumni, fans, patrons and boosters, shall conduct themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their behavior shall at all times reflect the high standards of honor and dignity that characterize participation in the collegiate setting. For intercollegiate athletics to promote the character development of participants, to enhance the integrity of higher education and to promote civility in society, coaches, student-athletes and all others associated with these athletics programs and events should adhere to such fundamental values as respect, fairness, civility, honesty and responsibility. These values should be manifested not only in athletics participation but also in the broad spectrum of activities affecting the athletics program. It is the responsibility of each member institution to establish policies for sportsmanship and ethical conduct in intercollegiate athletics consistent with the educational mission and goals of the institution. Furthermore, member institutions are responsible for educating on a continuing basis all constituencies about these policies."

### SEC TOPS IN FAN SUPPORT

The Southeastern Conference has led the nation in total attendance in football every year since 1981 (29 straight years). Since 1988, the SEC has led the nation in average attendance. More than 6.5 million fans witnessed first-hand, the excitement of SEC football in 2009. The average capacity of the 12 SEC stadiums during the last 10 years has been 97 percent. Every year since 1988, the SEC has had at least four teams ranked in the top 10 in average attendance.

In men's basketball, the SEC has finished second in national average attendance for four straight seasons and has finished in the top three every year since 1994 (17 straight years). Kentucky has led the nation in 14 of the last 15 years in attendance. In 2009-10, five SEC schools finished in the top 30 in average attendance.

In women's basketball, after finishing third in the nation for 10 straight seasons, the SEC was second in national average attendance in 2009-10. The SEC has had at least two schools in the top 25 in average attendance every year since 1999-2000. Tennessee has led the nation in attendance in 10 of the last 11 seasons. In 2009-10, the SEC had four schools finish in the top 25 in average attendance.

In baseball, the SEC and one of its institutions have led the NCAA in total and average attendance for the last 13 seasons, and 18 of the last 24 years. The SEC and its member institutions own virtually all regular season, conference tournament, NCAA Regional and Super Regional attendance records. The SEC has broken its own national record each of the last five seasons in total attendance, after having set a goal of 1.5 million fans in 2005 as part of the league's "Drive for 1.5 ... Pack the Parks" promotion.

**THE COACHES**

Derek Dooley is in his first season at Tennessee and in his fourth season overall with a record of 19-23 (.452). The Volunteers' offensive coordinator is Jim Chaney and the defensive coordinator is Justin Wilcox.

Mark Richt is in his 10th season at Georgia and overall with a record of 91-31 (.746). The Bulldogs' offensive coordinator is Mike Bobo and Todd Grantham serves as the defensive coordinator.

**WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN TENNESSEE HAS THE BALL**

Matt Simms ranks fifth in the SEC in passing yards per game at 191.4. Simms was 12-for-23 for 121 yards at LSU, including his first career rushing touchdown. Tauren Poole missed most of the UAB game with a thigh injury but rebounded in the LSU with a 109-yard effort that represented his third 100-yard effort of the year. Poole ranks sixth in the SEC in rushing yards per game at 85.4 and has carried 80 times this season for 427 yards and four TD's. Denarius Moore leads the team with 16 receptions, 239 yards, and four receiving TDs (five overall).

Demarcus Dobbs has a total of 14 tackles through five games this season, including two TFLs. Junior OLB Justin Houston's progression as one of the SEC's dominant pass rushers has continued in 2010. Houston is second in the SEC in sacks (4.0) and tied for fourth in the conference in both tackles for loss (7.5). He exploded for a career-high 10 tackles, including two sacks, and forced a fumble against South Carolina. Senior ILB Akeem Dent has had two straight games with more than 10 tackles after notching a career-high 12 at Colorado. Dent is the team leader in stops with 42. He had the third game of his career with double-digit tackles after finishing with 10 against Mississippi State.

**WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN GEORGIA HAS THE BALL**

Senior linebacker Nick Reveiz led the Vols at LSU with 10 tackles, his 4th consecutive 10-tackle game. Reveiz leads the SEC with 50 tackles this season and also recorded his first career interception in the 4th quarter. Chris Walker leads the front four with 24 tackles (1.5 for loss) this season and is second on the team with four quarterback hurries. Gerald Williams leads the squad with 2.5 sacks and is tied for the team lead with 4 tackles for loss. Prentiss Wagener leads the team with two interceptions, both of which he has returned for TDs.

A.J. Green made his 2010 debut versus the Buffaloes and picked up just where he had left off in 2009. Green had the fifth 100-yard receiving game of his career after hauling in seven catches for 119 yards and two touchdowns. At Colorado, Aaron Murray tied his career high with three TD passes after connecting with eight different receivers. Kris Durham was the leading receiver in each of the first three games. He has 17 catches for 324 yards and one touchdown on the year. Caleb King had his second career 100-yard game against CU last week.

**SPECIAL TEAMS**

Chad Cunningham had a season-best 47.5-yard average on four punts at LSU, with two of 50-plus yards and two downed inside the 20-yard line. His 42.8-yard season average ranks fourth in the SEC and 35th nationally. Although he missed Saturday's game at LSU with a leg injury, Daniel Lincoln remains a perfect 7-for-7 on field goal attempts this season, one short of his Tennessee record to start a season.

So far in 2010, Drew Butler has averaged 44.3 yards on 22 punts, six that went for 50+. Blair Walsh is now 105-for-105 on PATs in his career. Against Arkansas, Walsh drilled a 43 yarder and then was 2-for-3 at Colorado. He is now 9-for-10 on the year. So far in 2010, Brando Boykin has 10 kickoff returns totaling 229 yards.

Nick Saban is in his fourth season at Alabama with a record of 38-8 (.826) and 17th overall with a record of 144-67-1 (.682). The Crimson Tide's offensive coordinator is Jim McElwain and the defensive coordinator is Kirby Smart.

Steve Spurrier is in his sixth season at South Carolina with a record of 38-29 (.567) and in his 26th season overall with a record of 227-110-2 (.673). Spurrier serves as the Gamecocks' offensive coordinator and the defensive coordinator is Lorenzo Ward.

**WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN ALABAMA HAS THE BALL**

Greg McElroy has completed 69.9 percent of his passes for 983 yards and seven touchdowns and three interceptions while ranking 11th nationally in passing efficiency at 166.67. Julio Jones caught four passes for 19 yards against Florida, moving him up to fourth on the Alabama career pass receptions list with 125 for 1,842 yards. Through Mark Ingram's first three games of the 2010 season, Ingram has accounted for 355 yards rushing and 46 yards receiving on five catches. Of his 401 total yards, 165 (41.1 percent) of those yards have come after contact.

As a team, South Carolina has 12 sacks through four games, an average of 3.0 per game, which ranks third in the SEC for average. That number also rates the Gamecocks No. 11 in the nation. Devin Taylor has three sacks while Travian Robertson has contributed two. SS DeVonte Holloman and FS Akeem Auguste have been all over the place through the first three games with Holloman racking up 26 tackles to lead the team. South Carolina has the SEC's No. 7 rushing defense, holding opposing offenses to 128.2 yards per game on the ground.

**WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN SOUTH CAROLINA HAS THE BALL**

The Crimson Tide leads the nation in scoring defense, surrendering just 9.0 points per game or 45 total points in five games. Alabama has not allowed a 100-yard rusher in an astonishing 39 games. Robert Lester now has four interceptions this season to lead the SEC and rank tied for third nationally at .80 per game. Dre Kirkpatrick is close behind with three picks (one in each of the last three games) on the season to rank tied for 14th nationally and tied for third in the SEC. Dont'a Hightower has 26 tackles, two pass breakups and three quarterback hurries in 2010.

Alshon Jeffery leads the SEC and is third in the nation in receiving yards per game, averaging 124.5 yards per contest. He also leads the league in receptions per game (6.8). Stephen Garcia has completed 69.1% of his passes (56-of-81), ranking second in the SEC. His pass efficiency rating of 161.6 is fourth in the league and ranks 16th in the nation. The Gamecocks lead the SEC in time of possession, controlling the ball an average of 31:37 per game. South Carolina has scored on 15-of-16 red zone possessions this year, scoring touchdowns on 13 occasions. The Gamecocks lead the SEC in red zone offense at 93.8%.

**SPECIAL TEAMS**

Trent Richardson's 91-yard kickoff return for a touchdown on Sept. 18 at Duke was Alabama's first since 2004. Richardson is second in the SEC and ranks 14th nationally in kickoff returns this season with a 30.91 ypr average. He also ranks 10th nationally in all-purpose yards (885 in five games) at 177.0 per game average.

Through three games, Spencer Lanning has punted five times for an average of 46.8 yards per punt; however, he has not punted enough to qualify for the national rankings. He is second in the SEC in that category. Chris Culliver is the school record holder in both career kickoff returns (103) and kick return yards (2,406).

Bobby Petrino is in his third season at Arkansas with a record of 16-13 (.552) and eighth overall with a record of 60-32 (.652). The Razorbacks' offensive coordinator is Garrick McGee and the defensive coordinator is Willie Robinson.

Mike Sherman is in his third season at Texas A&M with a record of 13-16 (.448) and ninth overall with a record of 72-59 (.550). Sherman is the Aggies' offensive coordinator and the defensive coordinator is Tim DeRuyter.

**WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN ARKANSAS HAS THE BALL**

Ryan Mallett leads the SEC and ranks second in the NCAA with 359.5 passing yards per game. His SEC-leading total of 42 completions of 15 yards or more is second in the nation, while his SEC-high 15 completions of 25 yards or more is tied for fourth in the country. Joe Adams leads the NCAA with his 20.47 yards-per-catch average. He also ranks second in the SEC and 12th in nation with 97.3 receiving yards per game. Greg Childs is tied for second in the SEC and tied for 21st in the NCAA with three touchdown grabs this season. He ranks second in the SEC in catches per game.

Entering the Arkansas game, the Aggies were one of only three team in the NCAA FBS with defenses that rank in the top 15 in total defense, rushing defense and pass efficiency defense. Von Miller posted an NCAA-best 17 quarterback sacks in 2009. The Aggies No. 14 in total defense (279.5 yards/G), which makes A&M one of just three teams in NCAA FBS to rank in the top 20 in both categories. In the season opener, Dustin Harris turned in the play of the game with a 38-yard "pick-six" interception for a touchdown, which was A&M's first defensive score since early in 2008.

**WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN TEXAS A&M HAS THE BALL**

Arkansas leads the SEC and ranks third in the NCAA in sacks, averaging 3.75 per game in 2010. Defensive end Jake Bequette leads the team and is tied for sixth in the SEC with 3.0 this season, while fellow DE Tenarius Wright's 2.5 sacks are tied for 10th in the conference. Jerry Franklin led the team with 11 tackles vs. Alabama, which kept the linebacking corps' streak of leading the team in tackles every game this season active. Franklin currently leads Arkansas with 34 tackles this season and is aiming to become just the second Razorback since 1960 to lead the team in tackles for three straight seasons.

Junior wide receiver Jeff Fuller grabbed sole possession of A&M's career touchdown catches record with a pair of TD grabs against Oklahoma State last week. After four games, Ryan Swope leads the team with 27 catches and is second on the team with 282 receiving yards. Doak Walker Award candidates Cyrus Gray and Christine Michael might give the Aggies the nation's top one-two punch at running backs. Jerrod Johnson leads the Big 12 in passing, total offense and points responsible for.

**SPECIAL TEAMS**

Freshman Zach Hocker has opened his collegiate career with four consecutive perfect games. He is 12-for-12 on PATs and 4-of-4 on field goals. In his first SEC game, Hocker made a 48-yard field goal that was the longest for the Razorbacks since 2000. He then matched that with a 48 yarder against Alabama. Arkansas is the only team in the SEC that is perfect on field goal attempts in 2010.

A game-breaker as a punt returner and cornerback, Harris leads the Big 12 (12.8) and ranks No. 20 nationally in punt returns average, and is tied for No. 6 in the Big 12 in interceptions per game (0.50/G). His punt return for a TD versus Louisiana Tech in week two was the first for Texas A&M since 1998.

Les Miles is in his sixth season at LSU with a record of 56-15 (.789) and 10th overall with a record of 84-36 (.700). The Tigers' offensive coordinator is Gary Crowton and the defensive coordinator is John Chavis.

Urban Meyer is in his sixth season at Florida with a record of 61-11 (.847) and 10th overall with a record of 100-19 (.840). The Gators' offensive coordinator is Steve Addazio and the defensive coordinator is Teryl Austin.

**WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN LSU HAS THE BALL**

Junior RB Stevan Ridley made atop the SEC in rushing yards per game after his 123-yard effort against Tennessee. In five games, Ridley is averaging 111.4 yards rushing a contest. Ridley, who has three 100-yard games to his credit this year, has rushed for 557 yards and four touchdowns on 97 carries. He's averaging 5.7 yards per carry. For the first time since 2004, LSU used dual quarterbacks in a game as Jordan Jefferson and Jarrett Lee split time during the win over Tennessee on Saturday. Jefferson rushed for 100 yards, including an 83-yard TD run on the game's first play.

Florida is the only school in the nation that has three players with at least three interceptions. The Gator defense held Alabama, which came into the game averaging 512 yards of offense, to 273 yards. Duke Lemmens led the team with a career-high eight tackles against Alabama. Lemmens also collected his second sack of the season in that game, also recording one against Tennessee. A.J. Jones has 21 tackles, including one tackle for loss, and two pass breakups this season, while Brandon Hicks has nine tackles and 1.5 sacks. Ahmad Black leads the team for the season with 30 tackles and has 2.5 tackles for loss, as well.

**WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN FLORIDA HAS THE BALL**

LSU goes into the Florida game leading the conference in total defense (246.6 yards per game), rushing defense (79.0 yards per game) and sacks (16). The Tigers are second to only Alabama in scoring defense in the conference with 12.4 points a contest, which ranks No. 5 nationally. Kelvin Sheppard leads the Tigers and ranks fourth in the SEC with 9.6 tackles per game. Senior DT Drake Nevis leads the team and ranks among the SEC leaders with 3.5 sacks, while true freshman DB Tyrann Mathieu has 21 tackles, 2.5 sacks, 3 PBUs, 2 forced fumbles, and an interception and a fumble recovery to his credit, making him one of the most productive rookies in the league this year.

John Brantley has completed 89 of 145 passes (61.4 percent) for 902 yards and six touchdowns with three interceptions for a passer rating of 123.2. True freshman Trey Burton set a UF record and an SEC freshman record scoring six touchdowns in a single game against Kentucky. Jeff Demps leads the Gators with 414 rushing yards through five games, averaging 6.5 yards per carry. Deonte Thompson leads the UF receiving corps with 21 receptions for 308 yards (14.7 avg.), an average of 61.6 yards per game.

**SPECIAL TEAMS**

Patrick Peterson continues to lead the SEC in punt return average (23.6) and he's fifth in kickoff returns (28.2). He already has two punt return TDs this season. Entering the Florida game, Josh Jasper is now 10-of-12 on field goals for the season and 29-of-34 for his career. For his career, he is 6-of-8 from 40 yards or more. Beyond 50-yards, Jasper is 3-of-5.

Demps leads the SEC with a 32.5-yard kick return average. He has returned eight kicks for 260 yards with a long of 54. He had a kickoff return of 40-plus yards in each of the first three games this season. Chas Henry boomed three punts for a 62.3 average against Alabama, including a 75-yard kick that pinned Alabama at its own two-yard line. It ties for the fourth-longest in UF history and is the longest in the SEC this season.

Gene Chizik is in his second season at Auburn with a record of 13-5 (.722) and in his fourth season overall with a record of 18-24 (.429). The Tigers' offensive coordinator is Gus Malzahn and the defensive coordinator is Ted Roof.

Joker Phillips is in his first season at Kentucky and overall. The Wildcats' offensive coordinator is Randy Sanders and the defensive coordinator is Steve Brown.

**WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN AUBURN HAS THE BALL**

Cam Newton leads the SEC and ranks second in the country with a passer rating of 191.44. Newton has been impressive running the ball this season, leading the SEC and ranking 36th nationally in rushing (fourth among quarterback), averaging 94.8 yards per game. Auburn has one of the most experienced if not one of the best offensive lines in the country, with four starters returning who have combined to make 129 career starts.

Kentucky leads the SEC and ranks eighth nationally in pass defense as the Wildcats have limited their opponents to an average of 141.8 yards per game. Danny Trevathan leads the Wildcats with 42 total tackles and eight tackles for loss. He is tied for second in the SEC and tied for 24th nationally in tackles for loss. He charted a career-high 15 tackles at Ole Miss last week. Ricky Lumpkin has 3.5 tackles for loss in the first five games, including a quarterback sack, and also has been credited with a quarterback hurry. Luke McDermott leads the team with three sacks on the year.

**WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN KENTUCKY HAS THE BALL**

Nick Fairley leads the SEC in both sacks (5.0) and tackles for loss (11.5), and has at least 1.5 tackles for loss in every game this season. Josh Bynes led Auburn in tackles last season with 104, and is leading the squad again this season. He currently has a team-best 31 tackles and has 3.5 tackles for loss, an interception, two pass break-ups and four quarterback hurries. Airon Savage is second on the team with 29 tackles, including one for loss.

Senior tailback Derrick Locke leads the SEC and ranks sixth nationally in all-purpose yards, averaging 181.4 yards per game. He has surpassed the 100-yard mark in either rushing or passing yards in all five games this season. Randall Cobb contributes as a wide receiver, quarterback, punt returner, kickoff returner and placekick holder. He leads the team in receptions, is second in rushing, has returned a punt for a touchdown and has thrown for two TDs, including one on a fake field goal. Mike Hartline is 11-8 (.579) in 19 career starts at UK. He ranks second in the SEC in passing yards per game (244.4) and is third in total offense (251.6 per game). Chris Matthews has five TD catches, leading the SEC in that category.

**SPECIAL TEAMS**

Senior kicker Wes Byrum is just 34 points away from becoming Auburn's all-time leading scorer. He currently ranks fourth with 269 career points. Demond Washington ranks seventh in the SEC averaging 26.0 yards per kickoff return, and had 126 kickoff return yards against Arkansas State, which is the 12th best total in school history. Junior Quindarius Carr has averaged 7.7 yards per punt return, which is seventh in the league. Senior Ryan Shoemaker is sixth in the SEC averaging 38.9 yards per kick.

Ryan Tydlacka is in his second season as the starting punter. He averaged a personal-best 50.5 yards per punt vs. Ole Miss, including a career-long 73 yarder. For the season he ranks third in the SEC at 46.4 yards per punt. Joe Mansour has a league-leading 12 touchbacks this season. Craig McIntosh has handled field goals the last three games, making 4-of-6 field goals and 9-of-10 extra points.

**WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN EASTERN MICHIGAN HAS THE BALL**

Kinsman Thomas has 29 receptions and seven touchdown catches in his 13-game EMU career and big plays have been a huge part of his success. Three of his touchdown passes have been for 40 yards or more and two of those have been for 71 and 77 yards. He has caught 29 passes for 594 yards and a 20.5-yard average per catch during his career. Dwayne Priest turned in the fourth 100-yard rushing effort of his career with 117 yards gained on 19 rushes against Ohio, Oct. 2. Priest and sophomore quarterback Alex Gillett both ran for more than 100 yards in the 2010 season opener, Sept. 4, against Army.

Chris Marve led all Commodore tacklers with 11 total tackles (7 solo, 4 individual) at UCONN. He was backed up by Sean Richardson with 10 total tackles (5 solo, 5 assisted). Marve and Richardson are tied for second in the SEC in total tackles, both averaging 9.8 stops. Casey Hayward picked off his third pass of the season last week at the 7:16 mark in the second quarter, leading to a Vanderbilt offensive touchdown four plays later. Hayward ranks as the SEC leader with six defended passes and is tied in the conference with three interceptions.

**WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN VANDERBILT HAS THE BALL**

Senior linebackers Tim Fort and Neal Howey are both ranked in the top four in tackles in the Mid-American Conference. Fort is tied for second with an average of 10.4 stops per game while Howey is at 10.20 per game. Matt Boyd was impressive in the first start of his career at Ohio State. The 6-foot, 232-pound Boyd had a career-high 14 stops against the Buckeyes. Neal Howey also had double-figure tackles against OSU, turning in 10 stop on the day.

Larry Smith (compiled 221 yards of total offense last week, passing for 157 yards and rushing for 64 yards. Smith, who was the Commodores' leading rusher, also produced the longest rush of his career (57 yards) in the first quarter. Smith also connected for two TD passes (8 yards to TE Brandon Barden and 48 yards to WR Udom Umoh) for the first time in his Vanderbilt career. Barden's TD catch was the seventh of his career, the highest active total by a Commodore receiver. Since the 2003 opener, Vanderbilt is 14-0 when a running back reaches 100 rushing yards.

**SPECIAL TEAMS**

EMU continues to remain strong in the punting game this season. The Eagles lead the Mid-American Conference and are 17th nationally in net punting at 39.50. Individually, rookie punter Jay Karutz is ranked sixth in the league and 55th nationally with a 40.62 average.

Warren Norman continues to move up Vanderbilt all-time kickoff return charts. Norman moved up one position to No. 9 all-time with a stellar performance at Connecticut. He returned four kickoffs for 162 yards against UCONN, including a long of 72 yards. Norman is currently averaging 30.2 yards per return this year. He ranks third in the SEC – and 19th in the NCAA. Norman's career average continues to rise also. He is now averaging 27.0 yards per kickoff, after setting a modern-day Vanderbilt team record in 2009 with a 26.2 yard average.

Kevin Sumlin is in his third season at Houston and overall with a record of 21-10 (.678). The Cougars' offensive coordinator is Jason Phillips, and the defensive coordinator is Brian Stewart.

**WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN MISSISSIPPI STATE HAS THE BALL**

Vick Ballard has already scored nine touchdowns. Ballard has scored at least one touchdown in each game, and leads the SEC with both a total of 54 points and eight rushing touchdowns. Ballard leads the Mississippi State offense with three rushes over 20 yards, including a 75-yard touchdown against Alcorn State. It was the longest run by a Bulldog since Jerious Norwood ripped off a 76-yarder against Florida in 2005. Last week against Alcorn State, Chris Relf set a new career mark with 209 passing yards while completing 11 of 15 attempts. He has also thrown a pair of touchdowns each of the last two weeks. Chad Bumphis also caught nine passes for 133 yards, both career highs.

Senior cornerback Loyce Means was named the Conference USA's Defensive Player of the Week on Sept. 27 for his two-interception performance in the Cougars' 42-23 win over Tulane. Leading by five points, Means' two picks led to two scores, including his own 42-yard touchdown return, to ensure the win. Marcus McGraw leads the team in tackles for the second straight year with 8.3 per game. This season, he has 33 tackles, including 1.5 sacks and two forced and recovered fumbles including one 33-yard return. McGraw leads Conference USA in both forced fumbles and fumble recoveries per game.

**WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN HOUSTON HAS THE BALL**

K.J. Wright again led the team in tackles with eight against Alcorn State, including a tackle for loss and another pass breakup. Wright now leads the SEC with seven passes broken up on the season. With their output last weekend, State jumped into the national top 20, averaging 7.60 TFL per game. Through five games, the Bulldog defense ranks 32nd nationally in total defense, 22nd in scoring defense and 44th in passing defense. State ranks among the top half of the SEC in each of those categories. Through five games, State has allowed only four touchdowns in 15 times the ball has reached inside its 20 yard line.

Houston ranks in the top-20 nationally in both total and scoring offense. With 44.25 points per game, UH is sixth in the NCAA, while 465.5 total yards per contest is 19th. The UH passing offense is ranked 22nd with 280.0 yards per game. UH started a true freshman at quarterback against Tulane in Terrance Broadway. Bryce Beall is second in the nation in scoring and leads Conference USA with 13.5 points per game. He has nine rushing touchdowns in four games. Beall also leads Conference USA and ranks 25th nationally in rushing with 104.5 per game.

**SPECIAL TEAMS**

Heath Hutchins may not be leading the nation in punting yards, but the senior has punted 18 times and allowed only 14 return yards. After dropping 11 punts inside the 20 a year ago, Hutchins has already pinned opponents inside the 20 eight times this season. State ranks 20th nationally and second in the SEC in net punting. Leon Berry returned a kickoff 97 yards for a TD last week, the second of his short MSU career.

Patrick Edwards leads the conference and ranks 15th nationally with his 14.7-yard average on punt returns. He has returned 11 punts in four games, including a long of 40 vs. Texas State. True-freshman Richie Leone won the punting job during training camp and in four games has averaged 45.8 yards on 11 punts, including four inside the 20 yard line and four over 50 yards. He ranks 10th in the NCAA and third in the conference. Through four games, sophomore placekicker Matt Hogan is 4-for-5 on field goal attempts. He has also made 16-of-17 field goals in his career at Houston, for 94.1 percent.

**SERIES/GAME NOTES**

**Record:** UH, 9-6

Mississippi State and Houston have played 15 times dating back to the first meeting in 1956... The Cougars have a 9-6 advantage in the series, and have won each of the teams' meetings this decade... Prior to renewing the series in 2003, State and Houston had not faced off since 1972... The two schools played 11 times between 1960 and 1972, with the Bulldogs holding a 6-5 record in those meetings...With last week's victory over Alcorn State, the Bulldogs have won three consecutive non-conference tilts for the first time since 2007.
