THE TEAMS: South Carolina (8-3, 5-3 SEC) is the Eastern Division Champion and the home team. Auburn (11-0, 7-0 SEC) is the Western Division Champion and the visiting team.

NATIONAL RANKINGS: Currently, Auburn is ranked second in the nation in the all four major polls and rankings (Associated Press, USA Today Coaches, Harris Interactive and BCS Rankings) while South Carolina is 17th in the Harris Interactive and USA Today polls and 18th in the AP and BCS Rankings.

SEC CHAMPIONSHIP GAME: The game, which started in 1992, is in its 19th year. It was a result of conference expansion, which saw Arkansas and South Carolina become the first members added in SEC history. Almost 1.3 million fans have witnessed the pageantry of the game first-hand, with 15 sellouts in its history. The first two games were played at Legion Field in Birmingham and the game has been played at the Georgia Dome since (1994).

SEC CHAMPIONS: Auburn will be vying for its seventh SEC Championship and first since 2004. South Carolina is attempting to win its first SEC football championship. The Tigers' Gene Chizik has never won an SEC title while the Gamecocks' Steve Spurrier won six SEC titles while the head coach at Florida (1991-93-94-95-96-2000).

TELEVISION: CBS Sports will televise the game nationally for the ninth straight year (VERNE LUNDQUIST, Play-by-Play; GARY DANIELSON, Analyst; TRACY WOLFSON, Sidelines). CBS has aired the game nationally since 2001. ABC Sports televised the game from 1992-2000.

TV RATINGS: Last season's SEC Championship game between Florida and Alabama, became the highest rated SEC title game earning a national household rating/share of 11.1/23.

The 1994 SEC Championship Game was the previous high with a 10.5/26.

The 2009 game was an 18 percent increase from the 9.4/20 for the 2008 SEC Championship Game featuring Florida and Alabama. At the time of the game, it was the highest for a non-bowl football game during the 2008-09 seasons.

FULL HOUSE: The previous 18 SEC Football Championship Games have a total accumulated attendance of 1,346,074. The 16 games in the Georgia Dome have attracted 1,186,638 fans. The 74,165 average is 103.0 percent of capacity in the 72,000-seat stadium. 15 of the 18 games have been sold out, including the last 10 contests.

RADIO: Managed by IMG College, the SEC Radio Network will broadcast the game to the 9-state SEC region and around the nation on the Westwood One Radio Network (SEC Radio Network: DAVE NEAL, Play-by-Play; DAVE ARCHER, Analyst; DAVE BAKER, Sidelines / Westwood One Radio: JOHN TAUTGES, Play-by-Play; TERRY DONAHUE, Analyst).

SERIES: Auburn leads the series, 7-1-1. The teams met earlier this year (Sept. 25 at Auburn), with the Tigers claiming a 35-27 win. The teams first met on Nov. 27, 1930 in Columbus, Ga., with Auburn winning, 25-7. Here is a listing of the nine meetings in the series:

IN THE SEC CHAMPIONSHIP GAME: This marks Auburn's fourth appearance in the contest while South Carolina is in the game for the first time. The Tigers are 1-2 in its previous visits to Atlanta. The Tigers lost to Tennessee, 30-29, in the 1997 game; lost to Florida, 28-6, in the 2000 game; and, defeated Tennessee, 38-28, in the 2004 game.

The last time a team made its first trip to the SEC Championship Game was 2002. In a team's first trip to the title game, that team is 4-4 in the contest. Alabama (1992), Georgia (2002), LSU (2001) and Tennessee (1997) won its first appearances in the SEC game while Arkansas (1995), Auburn (1997), Florida (1992) and Mississippi State (1998) lost its first appearances in the game.

LAST MEETING: Auburn defeated South Carolina, 35-27, on Sept. 25, 2010 at Auburn. The game was the fourth of the season for both teams. With the win, Auburn improved to 4-0 while South Carolina fell to 3-1. Cam Newton led Auburn with 176 rushing yards on 25 carries and three touchdowns while also completing 16-of-21 passes for 158 yards and two touchdowns. He was named the SEC Offensive Player of the Week. Auburn DT Mike Blanc was named the SEC Defensive Lineman of the Week with seven tackles, a fumble recovery and a pass deflection. The Tigers held Carolina to just 79 yards rushing. Gamecock WR Alshon Jeffery caught eight passes for 192 yards and two touchdowns.

Carolina raced out to a 20-7 first-half lead before Newton sored his second rushing TD of the game on a three-yard run just before half to close the halftime gap to 20-14. The two teams traded touchdowns in the third quarter before Auburn went ahead for good, 28-27, early in the fourth quarter on a 7-yard TD pass from Newton to TE Philip Lutzenkirchen. Newton connected again with Emory Blake on a 12-yard TD pass midway through the quarter to make the final margin, 35-27.

RECENT HISTORY: Since 2001, Auburn has the SEC's fourth best overall record at 90-34 (.726) while South Carolina has the league's eighth best mark at 67-53 (.558). Since 2006, Auburn has the league's fourth best overall record at 44-18 (.710) while Carolina has the league's seventh best mark at 35-26 (.574).

BOWLING: The winner of the SEC Championship Game receives the conference's automatic berth in the Bowl Championship Series. Auburn will be looking to get into a BCS bowl for the second time (def. Virginia Tech, 16-13, in 2005 Sugar Bowl) while Carolina has never been in a BCS bowl game. Auburn is 20-13-2 in post-season bowl games and looking for a second consecutive bowl trip. South Carolina is 4-11 in post-season bowl games and looking for its third consecutive post-season bowl trip.

EIGHT SEC TEAMS BOWL ELIGIBLE

Eight Southeastern Conference teams have earned the six-win benchmark to be eligible for post-season play in 2010. Two other teams could reach the six-win total by winning its remaining games this season.

The most bowl-eligible teams for the SEC in its history in one season was 10, which was during the 2009 season. In four other seasons (2000, 2001, 2006 and 2007), the SEC has had nine bowl-eligible teams, the latest coming in 2007.

While six wins is the basic eligibility to participate in post-season bowl games, NCAA rules state that a "deserving winning team" be eligible for bowl-season play.

The SEC has agreements to send nine of its teams to post-season bowls.

NCAA Rule 18.7.2.2 states, "A contest shall be licensed only if it serves the purpose of providing a national contest between deserving winning teams. A "deserving winning team" shall be defined as one that has won a number of games against football bowl subdivision opponents that is equal to or greater than the number of its overall losses. Tie games do not count in determining a team's won-lost record. Further, when forfeiture of a regular season football victory is required by the Committee on Infractions or a conference, or is self-imposed by an institution as a result of a violation of NCAA rules, neither of the competing institutions may count that contest in satisfying the definition of a "deserving team."

Exceptions to NCAA Rule 18.7.2.2 exist. Those are:

"An institution with a record of six wins and six losses may be selected for participation in a bowl game under the following circumstances:

18.7.2.2 Exception—Football Bowl Subdivision Opponent. [FBS] Each year, a football bowl subdivision institution may count one victory against a football championship subdivision opponent toward meeting the definition of "deserving team" provided the opponent has averaged 90 percent of the permissible maximum number of grants-in-aid per year in football during a rolling two-year period.

18.7.2.2.1 Waiver. [FBS] The Football Issues Committee may approve a waiver of the 90 percent requirement to permit a football bowl subdivision institution to count a victory against a football championship subdivision opponent in football toward meeting the definition of a "deserving team," if a unique or catastrophic situation affects the football championship subdivision institution's ability to average 90 percent of the permissible maximum number of grants-in-aid per year in Division I-AA football over a rolling two-year period.

SEC SCORING TOUCHDOWNS IN BUNCHES

After 12 weeks, SEC teams have scored 493 offensive touchdowns and 160 field goals. That equates to 75.5 percent of all offensive scores coming from touchdowns and 24.5 percent from field goals. It is the lowest percentage of field goals in a single-season in the SEC since 2001, when SEC teams accounted for 143 field goals (24.0 percent) and 452 offensive touchdowns (76.0 percent). Below is a breakdown of offensive touchdowns and field goals since 1992:

SEC FOOTBALL VIDEO REPLAY

THE OBJECTIVE

To allow for specific types of officiating calls to be immediately reviewed during all games hosted by SEC teams.

THE COACHES' CHALLENGE

The head coach may challenge the ruling of any reviewable play. He retains a challenge if his initial challenge is successful and thus results in a reversal by the replay official. The head coach will then have a single challenge that he may use anytime during the game if his team has not used all its timeouts. Thus a team may have a total of two challenges in the game, but only if the first results in a reversal of the on-field ruling.

THE SOURCE

All reviewable video comes direct from either the television network broadcasting the game or other TV production facilities that meet established conference standards. The Southeastern Conference has used instant replay since 2005.

THE PLAYS

Reviewable

1. Plays governed by Sideline, Goal Line, End Zone, and End Line:
 - a. Scoring Plays, including the ball in possession of a runner breaking the plane of the goal line
 - b. Runner/receiver in or out of bounds
 - c. Recovery of loose ball in and out of bounds
2. Passing Plays:
 - a. Pass ruled complete/ incomplete/ intercepted in the field of play and end zones
 - b. Touching of a forward pass by a player or an official
 - c. Illegal forward pass or illegal handing off beyond the line of scrimmage
 - d. Illegal forward pass or illegal handing off after change of possession
 - e. Forward or backward pass thrown from behind the line of scrimmage
 - f. Quarterback (Passer) starts arm forward, ball comes loose and play is ruled incomplete (if ball is quickly recovered)
 - g. Quarterback (Passer) throws incomplete swing pass that is close to being forward or backward, and pass is ruled forward (if ball is quickly recovered)
3. Miscellaneous:
 - a. Runner ruled not down.
 - b. Runner ruled down (when ball carrier is judged down by rule and the ball is fumbled, play may be reviewed if recovery of ball occurs in the immediate action following fumble and is prior to any official signaling ball is dead. Also reviewable when runner is ruled out of bounds near goal line.)
 - c. Forward progress with respect to first down
 - d. Touching of a kick
 - e. Number of players on field
 - f. Clock adjustments (in conjunction with reviewed plays)
 - g. Fourth-down/try fumble plays
 - h. Field Goal Attempts (only when ball is ruled below or above the crossbar, inside or outside the uprights when it is lower than the top of the uprights.)
 - i. The game clock expires at the end of a half. If at the end of the game, the time may be restored to the clock only if the score is tied or the team that would next snap the ball trails by eight points or fewer.

Not Reviewable

THE PROCESS

Each SEC football stadium has a secured replay booth equipped with the HD Instant Replay system provided by XOS Digital. Three individuals work in the booth for the duration of the game: 1. Replay Official, 2. Communicator, 3. Technician. The Replay Official and the Communicator are selected and assigned by the Conference Office.

A live HD video feed is sent directly to the replay booth from the TV truck. The Technician watches the feed on an input monitor while recording it into the XOS Digital Replay System. The Technician also marks the beginning of each play while the Communicator marks all incoming replays.

Each play and subsequent replay then appears on a touch screen in front of the Replay Technician. As the Technician and the Communicator mark the incoming video, each view will appear as a small picture on the computer touch screen. At any time, the Replay Technician can touch the thumbnail and immediately send that play or replay to the Replay Official.

With the Communicator's assistance, the Replay Official can quickly jump between replays while playing back the video. All replay video navigation is done via a jog shuttle remote controlled by the Replay Official. All video is viewed on an HD monitor that sits in front of the Replay Official. The touch screen is only used to select the replays and to log specific play data in the event a call is overturned.

While all plays are reviewed between the whistle and the beginning of the next play, the Replay Official can stop play on the field by using a pager system. Five onfield officials wear pagers. If play is stopped the Referee announces on the stadium PA microphone that play has been stopped so the previous play can be reviewed. The Referee then proceeds to the sideline headset, which provides direct communication to the Replay Official in the booth. Once the play has been reviewed, the Replay Official notifies the Referee, who then announces the decision on the stadium PA system.

THE EQUIPMENT

Each SEC member institution uses the HD Replay System developed by XOS Digital of Orlando, FL. The replay systems are maintained by the home institution with technical support from XOS Digital.

SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE FOOTBALL NOTES

A PRIMER FOR NCAA RULES FOR FOOTBALL SAFETY [From NCAA.com]

For years, the NCAA has been at the forefront of student-athlete safety and implemented initiatives to make competition as safe as possible. Rules changes have expanded beyond the traditional notion of helmet-to-helmet contact and added a focus on all hits targeting and contacting defenseless players above the shoulders.

“The health and safety of student-athletes is the reason the NCAA was created,” said NCAA President Mark Emmert. “We have to remain vigilant to that mission, and these types of injuries require our careful attention.”

Rogers Redding, football rules secretary-rules editor and Southeastern Conference Coordinator of Football Officials, noted that the NCAA Football Rules Committee continually reviews player safety and has implemented rules to remove the word intent from head-down contact, penalize the horse-collar tackle, eliminate wedge-blocking and strengthen penalties regarding the tackling of defenseless players.

“Student-athlete safety is of the utmost importance, and the Association will continue to protect its student-athletes,” Redding said.

Football student-athletes who target the head and neck area of defenseless players will continue to be penalized for initial contact with a forearm, elbow, shoulder or helmet. A 15-yard penalty is enforced on these violations. In egregious situations, officials may eject the offending player. Last season, five Division I football student-athletes were ejected from games for these violations.

Following the rules change in 2009 requiring conferences to further examine these fouls after games, 73 plays were reviewed, resulting in four suspensions from games. In addition, some conferences sent letters of reprimand to coaches and student-athletes following post-game reviews.

“We believe the committee’s decision has helped to reduce the unnecessary roughness penalties involving hits to the head,” said David Parry, national coordinator of football officials. “We have seen a decline in them.”

Rules changes for the 2010 season mandate that injured student-athletes, including those who exhibit signs of a concussion, must be cleared by appropriate medical personnel as determined by the institution before returning to competition. An injured player must also miss a play before he is allowed to take part in the game again. Previously, a player could return to action before the next play if a time-out was called.

Receiving teams are no longer allowed to have wedge-blocking formations of three or more players on kickoffs. (NCAA research showed that one of every five injuries that occur on kickoffs resulted in a concussion.) Two-player wedges remain legal, but the formation of three or more players in a wedge is now a foul that results in a 15-yard penalty. It also will be considered a live-ball foul, regardless of whether there is contact between opponents.

The NCAA’s health and safety needs are addressed through the collaborative efforts of national office staff, governance committees, sports rules committees, sports issues committees and external associations. The NCAA Football Rules Committee works closely with the NCAA Committee on Competitive Safeguards and Medical Aspects of Sports and other medical experts.

NCAA football rules changes timeline

1976 – Rule changes for the 1976 football season eliminate the head and face as a primary and initial contact area for blocking and tackling.

2002 – The NCAA Football Rules Committee adds specific language to define when a student-athlete is defenseless and adds a point of emphasis for protection of these players.

2005 – The NCAA Football Rules Committee changes college football rules regarding spearing and head-down contact, removing any reference to “intent” from the rule. In addition to the rule change, the NCAA focuses on the education of student-athletes, coaches, officials and administrators regarding prevention of head and neck injuries. The NCAA partners with several membership groups (coaches, athletic trainers, etc.) to produce educational materials to teach proper tackling technique and prevention of head contact.

2008 – The NCAA makes the horse-collar tackle illegal, revamps illegal contact of an opponent and simplifies the chop-block rule. More emphasis is placed on eliminating hits on defenseless players and blows to the head. No player is permitted to initiate contact and target an opponent with the crown

of his helmet, and no player is permitted to initiate contact and target a defenseless opponent above the shoulders.

2009 – A rule is added to require conference review of fouls related to targeting/initiating contact to players. If a foul is not called, conferences are allowed to review plays and impose sanctions. As a result, several conferences enforce suspensions on fouls using supplementary discipline.

2010 – Wedge blocking is eliminated and specific concussion and injury management rules are implemented. Injured student-athletes must be cleared by appropriate medical personnel (as determined by the institution) before returning to competition. The committee also clarifies that contact above the shoulders with any body part is a violation (e.g., forearm, shoulder, etc.). The committee took advantage of the two-year playing rules process that allowed for safety alterations in the non-change year.

SEC - AP POLL HISTORY

The Southeastern Conference has had at least five teams ranked in at least one AP Top 25 poll every year since expansion (1992).

Since 1992, the SEC has had at least 5 teams ranked in the AP Top 25 a total of 223 times, an average of 11.7 times per year. Since 1992, the SEC has had at least 5 teams ranked for at least 10 weeks in 15 of the last 19 years.

The SEC has had seven teams ranked in the AP Top 25 poll eight times since 1992, including this week. The league has also had seven teams ranked three weeks in 1999 and 2007 and one other week this season. Here is a history of multiple teams from the SEC in the AP Top 25 poll.

SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE FOOTBALL NOTES

SEC - FOUR STRAIGHT NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS

• Alabama's 37-21 win over Texas in the 2010 BCS National Championship Game gave the Southeastern Conference its fourth straight BCS National Championship and its sixth BCS title overall. The SEC is now 6-0 in BCS National Championship Games (LSU 2-0, Florida 2-0, Alabama 1-0, Tennessee 1-0).

• Alabama is the fourth SEC team to win a BCS National Championship and the third different SEC team to win it during the last four seasons. Tennessee won the BCS' first national title in 1998, LSU won the crown in 2003, Florida's claimed the national championship in 2006 and 2008 while LSU took the title in 2007 and Alabama claimed the national title this past season. The Big 12 has two BCS national titles followed by the ACC, Big Ten, Pac-10 and Big East with one each.

• The SEC is the first conference to claim four consecutive Associated Press (first poll - 1936), National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame (first poll - 1959), Football Writers Association of America (first poll - 1954) and USA Today or UPI Coaches Poll (first poll - 1950) national championships.

• Since SEC expansion in 1992, the SEC has the most national championships (AP, USA Today) with eight. During that time, the SEC has had more teams with national titles than any other conference (4). Here is a breakdown:

SEC IN BOWL GAMES

• The SEC has the most wins (14) and the highest winning percentage of any conference that has three-or-more appearances in BCS bowl games. The SEC is 14-5 in BCS games (.737 percentage).

• Since conference expansion in 1992, the SEC has won at least five bowl games in nine of 18 seasons. The SEC has won at least six bowl games during the last four seasons (6-3 in 2006; 7-2 in 2007; 6-2 in 2008; 6-4 in 2009).

• The schools that currently comprise the SEC have appeared in 379 bowls (including 2009-10). That is by far the most of any conference in the nation. In its history, the SEC is 196-170-13 in post-season bowl games, a 53.4 winning percentage. The SEC has the nation's top bowl winning percentage surpassing the Pac-10 (120-107-6, 52.8 percentage). Below is a look at how the various conferences have fared in bowl games in its history (using 2009 conference alignments):

MISCELLANY

• Since 2000, the Southeastern Conference has had more teams ranked in the final USA Today Coaches Poll than any other conference. The SEC has had 43 teams ranked in the last nine final USA Today Coaches polls, an average of almost five per season. The Big 12 is second with 36 teams ranked since 2000. The SEC has led or tied for lead in most teams ranked in the final USA Today Coaches Polls in seven of the last nine seasons.

• For the 10th straight year, the SEC has led the nation in total number of former players on NFL opening weekend rosters. The SEC has 272 of its former players on NFL opening weekend rosters followed by the ACC with 228, the Big Ten at 217, the Big 12 at 184 and the Pac-10 at 180. LSU leads all SEC schools with 35, followed by Florida, Georgia and Tennessee with 33 each.

• The SEC had 49 players selected in the 2010 NFL Draft. The number represents the most SEC players ever taken in the NFL Draft. The SEC had the most players taken among conferences in the draft. Behind the SEC's 49 selections were the Big Ten (34), ACC (31), Big 12 (30) and Pac-10 (29).

• Since 1990, the SEC has had 782 total selections in the NFL Draft, an average of 37.2 selections per year. The Big Ten is second with 672 selections.

• The SEC has now led or tied for the most selections in the NFL Draft for 11 of the last 13 seasons and the last four drafts.

SEC BOWL AGREEMENTS

The Southeastern Conference has agreements to send nine of its member institutions to postseason bowl games following the 2010 season.

The winner of the SEC Championship Game will automatically participate in the Bowl Championship Series comprised of the Sugar, Rose, Orange and Fiesta Bowls.

The Capital One Bowl has the second selection, making its pick following the BCS selections. The bowl must select the team with the next best overall record or a team that is within one win of the team with the next best overall record.

The AT&T Cotton and the Outback Bowls share the third and fourth selections from the SEC. The Cotton Bowl has the first preference of teams from the Western Division and the Outback Bowl has first preference of teams from the Eastern Division. The Cotton or Outback Bowl can select teams outside of its divisional preference, but must not select them before the opposite bowl selects from its divisional preference.

The Chick-fil-A Bowl has the fifth selection of preference from the SEC.

New to the SEC bowl rotation this year, the Gator Bowl has the sixth selection from the SEC.

The Franklin American Mortgage Music City Bowl has the seventh selection from the SEC.

In selections 8-9, the AutoZone Liberty and Birmingham Bowls share the selection over the four-year agreement.

2010 BOWL CHAMPIONSHIP SERIES SCHEDULE

Following the 2010 college football regular season, the Bowl Championship Series will determine the National Championship. The BCS National Championship Game, which will stand alone from the four traditional BCS bowls but will be hosted by each of the bowls once during a four-year cycle.

The BCS consists of the Discover Orange, Allstate Sugar, Rose Bowl Game, Tostitos Fiesta Bowl and the Tostitos BCS National Championship Game. The conferences with automatic berths include the Atlantic Coast, Big East, Big Ten, Big 12, Pac-10 and Southeastern Conferences.

ESPN will televise all of the Bowl Championship Series games.

The Bowl Championship Series guarantees a matchup between college football's top two teams in a true national championship game.

The BCS uses regional consideration regarding team selection. Specifically, as a member of the BCS, the Rose Bowl will host the Big Ten and Pac-10 champions in those years in which either the Rose Bowl does not have the national championship game or the Big Ten and Pac-10 champion is not ranked No. 1 or No. 2. Other "regional consideration" tie-ins include the SEC champion in the Sugar Bowl, the ACC champion in the Orange Bowl and the Big 12 champion in the Fiesta Bowl.

CBS SPORTS

CBS Sports continues to be the exclusive national network broadcaster of SEC home football games, including the SEC Championship Game. CBS Sports will showcase the top conference matchups each week of the package with the "SEC Game of the Week". The agreement also includes a prime time game and doubleheader opportunities. In addition, CBS Sports continues its coverage of SEC regular-season basketball. In addition to the broadcast rights on CBS Sports, this 15-year contract includes certain digital, internet, wireless, Video-on-Demand, data and enhanced highlight rights across all CBS platforms, including CBS College Sports Network and CBSsports.com. Also, simulcasts of CBS Sports games will be available for distribution by the CBS College Sports Network.

ESPN

ESPN is the exclusive national cable home and the syndication rights holder for the SEC, including every SEC home football game (excluding those on the network broadcast package).

ESPN and ESPN2: The networks have increased coverage by combining to televise a minimum of 20 SEC games annually, including Saturday night and two primetime Thursday matchups.

ESPNU: The 24-hour college sports network presents an SEC Game of the Week (generally in primetime and a minimum of 13 games annually) as well as the studio show *SEC Weekly*.

SEC Network (ESPN Regional Television): The nation's largest syndicator of collegiate sports programming, is the official over-the-air syndication home for the SEC and will feature an SEC Game of the Week (generally at noon ET), with a minimum of 13 games each season throughout the SEC footprint and beyond. In addition, ESPN produces the integrated SEC Studio show, hosted by Dari Nowkhah, with analyst Matt Stinchcomb, a former University of Georgia and NFL standout.

ESPN360.com: Simulcasts of SEC game telecasts are offered on the broadband sports network.

ESPN Mobile TV: Live games are simulcast on mobile phones.

ESPN International: The agreement includes global rights to present live games and encore presentations.

ESPN Deportes: ESPN holds domestic Spanish-language rights for SEC football on the 24-hour, U.S.-based network.

ESPN GamePlan: The out-of-market college football pay-per-view service, offers SEC action.

ESPN Classic: The network may telecast select SEC live games as well as historic and immediate encore presentations.

ESPN.com: Extensive SEC content, including highlights, will be presented online.

COMCAST/ CHARTER SPORTS SOUTHEAST

Comcast / Charter Sports Southeast (CSS), the regional sports channel focusing on college sports in the southeast, has an agreement with ESPN to televise live Southeastern Conference (SEC) content including a minimum of six football games, twenty men's basketball games, and sixteen women's basketball games as well as fifty SEC Olympic sports each year. The agreement began with the 2009-10 academic year and goes for five years.

FOX SPORTS NET

Fox Sports Net's (FSN) regional sports networks serving the SEC territory – FOX Sports South, FOX Sports Carolinas, FOX Sports Tennessee, Sun Sports, FOX Sports Southwest and FOX Sports Houston – will be the outlets for a minimum of 92 SEC athletic events each year. Events will include eight live, exclusive football games, 20 men's basketball games, 24 women's basketball games (16 regular season, eight tournament), 16 baseball games (10 regular season, six tournament) and 24 additional Olympic sporting events (softball, volleyball, soccer, gymnastics). SEC athletic events on FSN will be distributed to more than 22 million cable and satellite households throughout the SEC territory.

INSTITUTIONAL MEDIA PACKAGES

As part of the SEC's television contracts, each conference institution was able to maintain a contractual television arrangement of its own. As part of this arrangement, each SEC institution has the ability to televise one pay-per-view football game per year as well as to host its own tape-delayed game package, coaches' TV shows as well as other sport packages.

SEC FOOTBALL SHOWS ON TELEVISION**SEC Weekly on ESPNU**

SEC Weekly, a one-hour program airs Wednesdays at 5 p.m. ET on ESPNU, throughout the academic year and will cover SEC sports, including sport-by-sport previews, reviews, specials and features on student-athletes. The show is hosted by Cara Capuano with analyst Matt Stinchcomb, a former University of Georgia All-America and NFL player. *SEC Weekly* is a product of ESPN's landmark 15-year agreement with the Southeastern Conference. ESPNU will complement the show with SEC game telecasts, including football, basketball, Olympic sports and select conference championships.

SEC Gridiron Live

SEC Gridiron LIVE, airing live every Wednesday at 10 p.m. ET, breaks down every SEC game with footage, interviews and analysis. Tim Couch, former Kentucky standout and top pick in the 1999 NFL Draft, joins the live, weekly one-hour show as an analyst, with host Charles Davis and analyst Randy Cross. Also new to the SEC Gridiron LIVE team is social media host Kristina Akra. SECGridironLIVE.com is the hub for the show's social networking component, allowing viewers to participate in the live show and interact instantaneously with the broadcast team and SEC fans across the country.

CBS College Sports SEC Tailgate

Beginning Sept. 18, CBS Sports will start SEC programming with its live pre-game show COLLEGE FOOTBALL TODAY followed by the "SEC Game of the Week" CBS College Sports Network will broadcast SEC TAILGATE on select Saturdays at 2:00 PM, ET, from the site of CBS Sports' SEC Game of the Week. The show brings fans a fast paced and authoritative look at football and life in the SEC. The show captures all the excitement, traditions and festivities from the various campuses and stadiums across the SEC, and features local SEC legends and celebrity alumni.

SEC MISSION STATEMENT

"The purpose of the Southeastern Conference is to assist its member institutions in the maintenance of programs of intercollegiate athletics which are compatible with the highest standards of education and competitive sports."

THE SEC

The Southeastern Conference sponsors championships in 20 sports – 11 women's sports and nine men's sports. They include baseball, men's and women's basketball, men's and women's cross country, football, men's and women's golf, gymnastics, soccer, softball, men's and women's swimming and diving, men's and women's tennis, men's and women's indoor and outdoor track and field, and volleyball.

2009-10 ANOTHER BANNER ATHLETIC YEAR FOR THE SEC

The SEC claimed four national championships in the 2009-10 year. SEC teams have won at least four national titles every year since 1991. In eight of its 20 sponsored sports, the SEC had either the national champion or the national runners-up. The SEC had national championships in football (Alabama), men's indoor track & field (Florida), women's swimming & diving (Florida) and baseball (South Carolina).

In its 77 year history, the Southeastern Conference has won 183 team national championships, including 67 since 2000. In this decade, the SEC has won at least one national championship in 16 of its 20 sponsored sports with the exception of women's cross country, volleyball, soccer and softball.

SEC LEADS ALL CONFERENCES IN 2009-10 OVERALL SPORTS CONFERENCE VS. CONFERENCE SURVEY

In a statistical survey that is based on NCAA championship and rankings, the Southeastern Conference placed first in both men's and women's sports. The survey, compiled each year since 1986 by Bo Carter, takes into account final NCAA championship standings in 10 men's and 11 women's sports and poll rankings in football. Each conference gets 20 points for a team that wins a national championship, 19 for a second place finish and down to 1 point for a 20th place finish. Wrestling is included in the men's totals, but the sport is not sponsored by the Southeastern Conference.

In the 10 men's sports for the survey, the SEC had 398 points with the Pac-10 coming in second with 396 points, followed by the Big 12 with 395 points, Big Ten with 279.5 points, ACC with 238 points and the Big East with 83 points. In the 11 women's sports the SEC sponsors, the SEC led the way with 502.5 points followed by the Pac-10 with 480 points, the Big 12 with 382 points, ACC with 369 points, Big Ten with 221 points and the Big East with 164 points.

Combining the 21 sports in the survey, the SEC had 900.5 points to pace all conferences followed by the Pac-10 with 876 points, Big 12 with 777 points, ACC with 607 points, Big Ten with 500.5 points and the Big East with 247 points. The SEC has had the highest men's point total in 17 seasons since 1986-87, the first year this survey was done, and in 11 of the last 12 seasons. The SEC has had the highest women's point total five times since 1986-87, including three of the last six years.

SEC LEADS DIVISION I CONFERENCES IN MOST FIRST-TEAM ESPN THE MAGAZINE CoSIDA ACADEMIC ALL-AMERICANS

The Southeastern Conference had 15 of its student-athletes earn first-team ESPN The Magazine / CoSIDA Academic All-America status in 2009-10, more than any other Division I conference in the nation. The Big 12 had 14 while the Big Ten and Pac-10 had 13 student-athletes each earn the honor.

The SEC had 36 total student-athletes earn either first, second or third team mention. That total is second overall to the Big 12 Conference, which had 39. The Big Ten was third with 34 total student-athletes earned first, second or third team mention.

The SEC's academic success of its student-athletes in 2009-10 was not just Academic All-Americans. The league honored 2,424 of its own student-athletes who made the SEC Academic Honor Roll. The league also honored Auburn swimmer Jordan Anderson and Tennessee track & field athlete Phoebe Wright with its McWhorter Scholar-Athletes of the Year as well as naming a scholar-athlete of the year in each of its sports.

Among honors given by the NCAA, SEC student-athletes also shined. Three student-athletes from the SEC – Florida's Tim Tebow (football), Georgia's Courtney Kupets (gymnastics) and Alabama's Brittany Rogers (softball) were honored this past year with the Today's Top VIII Award from the NCAA. Since 2004, the SEC has had 10 student-athletes awarded this honor, more than any other conference in the country.

The SEC also had 13 student-athletes receive NCAA Postgraduate Scholarships in 2009-10, more than any other conference in the nation.

SEC SPORTSMANSHIP STATEMENT

The SEC has developed a sportsmanship statement for its institutions to follow. It states: "Coaches and student-athletes of a member institution, as well as individuals employed by or associated with that institution, including alumni, fans, patrons and boosters, shall conduct themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their behavior shall at all times reflect the high standards of honor and dignity that characterize participation in the collegiate setting. For intercollegiate athletics to promote the character development of participants, to enhance the integrity of higher education and to promote civility in society, coaches, student-athletes and all others associated with these athletics programs and events should adhere to such fundamental values as respect, fairness, civility, honesty and responsibility. These values should be manifested not only in athletics participation but also in the broad spectrum of activities affecting the athletics program. It is the responsibility of each member institution to establish policies for sportsmanship and ethical conduct in intercollegiate athletics consistent with the educational mission and goals of the institution. Furthermore, member institutions are responsible for educating on a continuing basis all constituencies about these policies."

SEC TOPS IN FAN SUPPORT

The Southeastern Conference has led the nation in total attendance in football every year since 1981 (29 straight years). Since 1988, the SEC has led the nation in average attendance. More than 6.5 million fans witnessed first-hand, the excitement of SEC football in 2009. The average capacity of the 12 SEC stadiums during the last 10 years has been 97 percent. Every year since 1988, the SEC has had at least four teams ranked in the top 10 in average attendance.

In men's basketball, the SEC has finished second in national average attendance for four straight seasons and has finished in the top three every year since 1994 (17 straight years). Kentucky has led the nation in 14 of the last 15 years in attendance. In 2009-10, five SEC schools finished in the top 30 in average attendance.

In women's basketball, after finishing third in the nation for 10 straight seasons, the SEC was second in national average attendance in 2009-10. The SEC has had at least two schools in the top 25 in average attendance every year since 1999-2000. Tennessee has led the nation in attendance in 10 of the last 11 seasons. In 2009-10, the SEC had four schools finish in the top 25 in average attendance.

In baseball, the SEC and one of its institutions have led the NCAA in total and average attendance for the last 13 seasons, and 18 of the last 24 years. The SEC and its member institutions own virtually all regular season, conference tournament, NCAA Regional and Super Regional attendance records. The SEC has broken its own national record each of the last five seasons in total attendance, after having set a goal of 1.5 million fans in 2005 as part of the league's "Drive for 1.5 ... Pack the Parks" promotion.

THE COACHES

Gene Chizik is in his second season at Auburn with a record of 19-5 (.791) and in his fourth season overall with a record of 24-24 (.500). The Tigers' offensive coordinator is Gus Malzahn and the defensive coordinator is Ted Roof.

Nick Saban is in his fourth season at Alabama with a record of 42-10 (.808) and 17th overall with a record of 148-69-1 (.681). The Crimson Tide's offensive coordinator is Jim McElwain and the defensive coordinator is Kirby Smart.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN AUBURN HAS THE BALL

Cam Newton leads the SEC and ranks ninth nationally (second among quarterbacks) in rushing (117.9). He is the only player in the country with five 170-yard rushing games this season. Newton is the first player in SEC history and one of nine different FBS players ever to pass for 2,000 yards and rush for 1,000 yards in a single season. Michael Dyer has rushed for 859 yards and broke Bo Jackson's Auburn freshman rushing record of 829 yards. Onterio McCalebb is averaging 8.76 yards per carry, which is best in the nation among rushers ranked in the top 100 in the country.

The Crimson Tide has allowed just 39 points in their six home games. Alabama's defense has intercepted 21 passes this season, which leads the nation. The Crimson Tide leads the SEC in turnover margin at +12, forcing twice as many turnovers (24) as it has committed (12). DB Robert Lester's seven interceptions lead the SEC. Dont'a Hightower has 63 tackles, three pass breakups and eight quarterback hurries in 2010. Mark Barron leads the team with 71 tackles while recording three interceptions, two sacks (-15), 3.0 tackles for loss (-19), one forced fumble, two quarterback hurries and six pass breakups.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN ALABAMA HAS THE BALL

Nick Fairley leads the SEC and is tied for eighth nationally in tackles for loss with 18.0, which is tied for fourth most in a season in school history (since 1981). He is third in the league in sacks with 7.5. He has had at least four games with at least 2.5 tackles for loss this season. Josh Byrnes led Auburn in tackles last season with 104, and is leading again this season with 58 tackles, including 5.0 tackles for loss. He has also recorded three interceptions, giving him seven for his career. Auburn ranks second in the SEC and 11th nationally this season against the run.

WR Julio Jones has caught 65 passes this season, which is just two shy of the Alabama single-season record of 67 set by DJ Hall in 2007. RB Mark Ingram has 39 career rushing touchdowns, which is just two short of the school record of 41 held by Shaun Alexander (1996-99). Greg McElroy had two touchdown passes against Georgia State, the 35th and 36th of McElroy's Alabama career, which ranks third on the UA career touchdown passes list. He has 17 touchdown passes in the 2010 season, equaling his 2009 total, both ranking as the second-most in a single season in school history. Trent Richardson ranks ninth nationally and second in the SEC in all-purpose yards (1,495 in nine games) at 166.11 per game average.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Demond Washington ranks fourth in the SEC averaging 25.5 yards per kickoff return, and has set an Auburn single-season record for kickoff return yardage with 918, including a 95-yard TD at Ole Miss. McCalebb returned a kickoff 99 yards against Arkansas, and freshman Demetruce McNeal has a team-high 13 tackles on special teams. Wes Byrum has made 30 of his last 35 field goal attempts after hitting just 11-of-19 in 2008.

Marquis Maze made a major impact as a punt return man in the second half of the season. He returned 6 punts for 125 yards (20.8-yard average) including returns of 37 and 20 yards against Mississippi. The yardage against the Rebels ranked third on the Alabama single-game punt returns yardage list. Maze ranks 10th nationally and third in the SEC averaging 15.5 yards per punt return.

Joker Phillips is in his first season at Kentucky and overall. The Wildcats' offensive coordinator is Randy Sanders and the defensive coordinator is Steve Brown.

Derek Dooley is in his first season at Tennessee and in his fourth season overall with a record of 22-26 (.458). The Volunteers' offensive coordinator is Jim Chaney and the defensive coordinator is Justin Wilcox.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN KENTUCKY HAS THE BALL

UK ranks second in the SEC and 20th in the country in pass offense averaging 274.4 yards a game with 25 touchdowns. Mike Hartline ranks second in the SEC in touchdowns passes (22) and passing yards per game (264.2) and is third in total offense (261.8 yards per game). He has thrown over 200 yards in all 11 games this season. Randall Cobb ranks first in the SEC and second nationally in all-purpose yardage with 186.1 all-purpose yards per game. He has 37 touchdowns in just 34 career games and has scored at least one touchdown in 17 of the last 20 games. Chris Matthews' nine touchdown receptions is good for the SEC lead in that category.

Tennessee ranks 3rd in the SEC with 16 interceptions, a total that also ranks tied for 12th nationally. Malik Jackson leads the Vols with 5.0 sacks in 2010, including sacks in each of the last four games. Jackson also has a team-high 10 tackles for loss, including 8.5 in the last four games and at least a half-TFL in each of the last five games. Nick Reveiz ranks 8th in the SEC with a career-high 86 tackles, including double-digit totals five times this season, most recently vs. Alabama (11). Prentiss Waggner set the Tennessee record with his third interception return for a touchdown vs. Ole Miss. Janzen Jackson is tied with Waggner for fourth among SEC interception leaders (4).

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN TENNESSEE HAS THE BALL

The Wildcats rank second in the SEC and 12th in the country in pass defense, holding opponents to only 11 touchdowns through the air this season and an average 168.4 passing yards a game. Danny Trevathan paces the SEC with 120 total tackles and ranks tied for ninth nationally in tackles per game with 10.91. He has led UK in tackles in eight of 11 games, including double-digit tackles in seven straight games. Trevathan also ranks third in the league in the tackles for loss category with 15 stops behind the line of scrimmage. Winston Guy is second on the team and sixth in the SEC in tackles with 91 stops, including a season- and career-high 18 vs. Vanderbilt.

Justin Hunter ranks second on the team with six touchdown receptions, including TD catches in three consecutive games. Hunter, who is averaging a remarkable 27.1 yards per catch, has set a Tennessee freshman school record with six TD catches in 2010. Gerald Jones leads the team with 40 receptions, six shy of his career-high 46 catches in 2009. Jones has 28 receptions in his last five games. Tauren Poole's six 100-yard rushing games are the second-most by a Tennessee running back in the last 10 seasons since 2001, trailing only the seven recorded by Travis Stephens in 2001. Denarius Moore has 18 catches for 450 yards and four TDs in his last four games.

SPECIAL TEAMS

For the season Ryan Tydlacka ranks fourth in the SEC at 44.5 yards per punt. Joe Mansour has handled most of the kickoffs this season. He now is tied for the league-lead in touchbacks with 15 this season. Cobb is a capable punt returner and ranks sixth in the SEC in punt return average with 7.9 yards per runback. He has two punt return touchdowns in his career. Derrick Locke is UK's all-time leader in kickoff return average at 27.3 per return, including a pair of 100-yarders in his career.

Daniel Lincoln broke his own school record by making his 9th consecutive field goal to begin the 2010 season Saturday at Vanderbilt. Lincoln previously made eight consecutive field goals to begin his All-America year of 2007. He is 9-for-9 overall in 2010 and is two field goals shy of tying John Becksvoort (1991-94) for fifth on the Vols' career field goal list.

Les Miles is in his sixth season at LSU with a record of 61-16 (.803) and 10th overall with a record of 89-37 (.706). The Tigers' offensive coordinator is Gary Crowton and the defensive coordinator is John Chavis.

Bobby Petrino is in his third season at Arkansas with a record of 21-14 (.600) and eighth overall with a record of 65-33 (.663). The Razorbacks' offensive coordinator is Garrick McGee and the defensive coordinator is Willie Robinson.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN LSU HAS THE BALL

LSU is coming off its best performance of the year with 43 points and 470 total yards. The Tigers are averaging 27.3 points and 336.1 total yards (184.2 rushing, 151.9 passing) per game. LSU QB Jordan Jefferson, who got his first career start in Little Rock two years ago, is 19-6 as a starter. Jefferson threw for a career-high 254 yards and one touchdown and added 45 rushing yards and another score in LSU's 43-36 win against Ole Miss. LSU RB Stevan Ridley ranks fourth in the SEC in rushing with 967 yards and 12 TDs.

Defensive end Jake Bequette leads the team and ranks fifth in the SEC with 7.0 this season, tied for the eighth-highest single-season total in school history, and Tenarius Wright is tied for 10th in the conference with 5.0. Jerry Franklin leads the team and is tied for seventh in the SEC with 90 tackles this season. He has paced the team in tackles seven times this season, including with 20 at Mississippi State to tie the 10th highest single-game total in school history. Franklin leads the team and is tied for sixth in the SEC with 12.5 tackles for a loss and also is second among the Razorbacks and ranks sixth in the SEC with 6.5 sacks. Anthony Leon ranks second on the team and ninth in the SEC with 10.5 tackles for a loss and is tied for fourth on the team with 2.5 sacks. Trammie Thomas is tied for fourth in the SEC with a team-leading four interceptions.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN ARKANSAS HAS THE BALL

The Tigers continue to lead the SEC in total defense (286.9) and pass defense (151.8) and they are No. 2 in the league in scoring defense (16.5). LB Kelvin Sheppard leads the Tigers with 98 tackles. Drake Nevis is third on the team with 53 tackles, and ranks among the SEC leaders tackles for losses (12.5) and fifth in sacks (6.0). He's also added an interception, forced three fumbles and recorded a safety.

Ryan Mallett leads the SEC and ranks fifth in the NCAA with 297.5 passing yards per game. His SEC-leading total of 87 completions of 15 yards or more ranks third in the nation and his 31 completions of 25+ yards are tied for second in the conference and fifth in the country. Knile Davis is the 10th player in Arkansas history to post a 1,000-yard rushing season. He leads the team this year with 1,031 yards. His 93.7 rushing yards per game rank third in the SEC. Jarius Wright ranks third in the SEC and eighth in the NCAA with his 19.1 yards-per-reception average this season. Joe Adams ranks sixth in the conference and 25th in the nation with his 16.7 yards-per-reception average.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Patrick Peterson is first in the SEC in kickoff returns (27.5) and second in punt returns (16.7). Josh Jasper kicked three field goals of 31, 25 and 24 yards in helping the Tigers defeat the Rebels. The three field goals ran his season total a SEC-leading 23, the second-highest mark in school history. Jasper has now converted eight straight and 11 of his last 12 field goals.

Freshman Zach Hocker is a perfect 51-for-51 on PATs, the third-highest single-season PAT total in program history, and 12-of-14 on field goals to rank eighth in the SEC with 87 points. At South Carolina, Hocker made a 51-yard field goal that stands as the longest by a freshman in Razorback history and the longest for Arkansas since 1988. Five of his 11 makes have come from 40+ yards, including a 48 yarder at Georgia in his first SEC game.

Urban Meyer is in his sixth season at Florida with a record of 63-14 (.818) and 10th overall with a record of 102-22 (.823). The Gators' offensive coordinator is Steve Addazio and the defensive coordinator is Teryl Austin.

Jimbo Fisher is in his first season at Florida State and overall. The Seminoles' offensive coordinator is James Coley and the defensive coordinator is Mark Stoops.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN FLORIDA HAS THE BALL

John Brantley has completed 188 of 304 passes (61.8 percent) for 1,968 yards and eight touchdowns with eight interceptions for a passer rating of 119.6. Trey Burton has scored 12 of UF's 40 touchdowns (30 percent) this season. Jeff Demps leads the Gators with 487 rushing yards, averaging 6.1 yards per carry. Deonte Thompson leads the UF receiving corps with 36 receptions for 548 yards (15.2 avg.). He had his first career 100-yard game against Appalachian State. Chris Rainey led the Gators in all-purpose yards against Georgia (241), Vanderbilt (136) and Appalachian State (110).

Xavier Rhodes, who had three pass breakups and a critical fourth quarter interception (his team-leading third of the year) in the win over Clemson, ranks second in the ACC with 14 passes defended. His 11 pass break-ups in a league high. Brandon Jenkins leads the teams in sacks (10) and tackles for loss (16.5). Through 11 games he ranks eighth nationally in sacks and 12th in tackles for loss. On the season Markus White has registered FSU career-highs for sacks (7.5), tackles for loss (10.5) and tackles (46). Nigel Bradham and Kendall Smith rank 1-2 on the team in tackles, with 80 and 78, respectively. White has already eclipsed his career total with 7.5 sacks.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN FLORIDA STATE HAS THE BALL

Florida is the only school in the nation that has four players with at least three interceptions. Justin Trattou has 10 tackles for loss, tied for the team lead with Ahmad Black, while Duke Lemmens has a team-best four sacks. Trattou also leads the defensive line with 50 tackles. Jelani Jenkins posted a career-high 11 tackles against South Carolina. He has 64 tackles on the season, second-highest on the team, with four tackles for loss and two sacks. Jonathan Bostic has 47 tackles, including three for loss and two sacks. Black leads the team with 96 tackles, three forced fumbles and two fumble recoveries.

Florida State is scoring at a clip of 31.7 points a game through 11 contests, nearly eight points more than it averaged in 2009. Christian Ponder has already thrown a single-season, career-high 17 touchdown passes through 10 games. Rodney Smith became the third Seminole this season to post a 100-yard game when he collected four receptions for 121 yards in Florida State's 16-13 victory over Clemson. Willie Haulstead caught 10 passes for 154 yards – each a career-high – in Florida State's heart-breaking loss to North Carolina. With a team-leading 50 receptions, Bert Reed pushed his career total to 133 catches, which is eighth on the Seminoles' all-time list.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Florida ranks No. 3 nationally and No. 1 in the SEC in kickoff returns with a 26.4 average. Andre Debose leads the SEC and is fifth nationally (No. 1 among freshmen) with a 29.3 average. He set a UF single-season record with his second kickoff return for a touchdown and is the only freshman nationally and one of five players overall with two in 2010. Chas Henry leads the nation in yards per punt with a 47.3 average.

Dustin Hopkins has converted 16 of 22 field goal attempts and had a streak of 10 consecutive games with a field goal – which ranked second in the nation – snapped against North Carolina. His long of 55 yards leads all ACC kickers. Junior punter Shawn Powell is the FSU and ACC active leader in career punting with a 42.82 yards per punt average. FSU's kickoff coverage unit leads the ACC with a net average of 47.5 yards, thanks in part of Hopkins' league-leading 35 touchbacks.

Houston Nutt is in his third season at Ole Miss with a record of 22-15 (.595) and 18th overall with a record of 133-85 (.610). The Rebels' co-offensive coordinators are Mike Markuson and Dave Rader and the defensive coordinator is Tyrone Nix.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN MISSISSIPPI STATE HAS THE BALL

Derek Sherrod has been named SEC offensive lineman of the week three times following the last six Bulldog games. Vick Ballard tied the school record with 16 touchdowns for the Bulldogs this season, his first on campus. Ballard has scored at least one touchdown in eight of his 10 games played, and is third in the SEC with an average of 9.6 points per game scored. Chris Relf is the team's second leading rusher, and has posted 20 carries in four separate games - including 31 rushes last weekend. State has been quick to jump on opponents, outscoring foes 95-47 in the first quarter. State has outscored its foes by 38 points in the fourth quarter this season. MSU ranks 16th nationally with a 216.3 ypg rushing average.

Senior linebacker Jonathan Cornell posted 10 tackles (five solo), 2.0 TFLs and 1.0 QB sack at LSU. Cornell leads Ole Miss and ranks 14th in the SEC in tackles (6.8 pg). He also ranks fifth in the league in TFLs (13.0) and 11th in sacks (4.5). Allen Walker is having an outstanding final campaign. He is currently tied for third in the SEC in forced fumbles with three and is fifth on the team in tackles. Fon Ingram grabbed his fourth career interception and first this year when he picked off Jordan Jefferson in the third quarter last week.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN OLE MISS HAS THE BALL

Chris White is currently tied for fourth in the SEC with 96 total tackles and fourth in the conference with 14.0 tackles for loss. Corey Broomfield tied for the national lead among active players with three career pick-sixes and the total has tied the MSU school record. It's also tied for second most in the history of the SEC, and he is only two-thirds through his sophomore season. The Bulldogs have the SEC's third best overall redzone defense, allowing 25 scores on 33 trips, but its TD percentage ranks second in the conference. The Bulldogs have the nation's 25th best scoring defense (third in the SEC).

The Rebels currently rank second in the SEC and 14th in the nation in rushing averaging 220.5 yards per game. Brandon Bolden now has 13 rushing TDs on the season, which is second most in school history. He currently ranks eighth in the SEC averaging 84.6 rushing yards per game. Jeremiah Masoli is one of only nine players in the nation averaging at least 45 rushing yards (48.4) and 160 passing yards (161.6). He currently ranks seventh in the SEC in total offense (210.0 yard/game) and eighth in passing efficiency (123.5). Markeith Summers now has four receiving TDs in his last five games after catching two passes for 73 and a 65-yard touchdown at LSU.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Mississippi State punter Heath Hutchins may not be leading the nation in punting yards, but the senior has punted 47 times and allowed only 52 return yards. Hutchins has pinned opponents deep in their own territory 21 times this season. He's also forced 15 fair catches with three fumbled and turned back over to State.

Tyler Campbell had a game to remember against LSU. The sophomore punted three times for 57, 60 and 69 yards. His average of 62.0 yards per punt is the second highest in school history and earned Campbell National Punter of the Week honors from the College Football Performance Awards. He currently ranks second in the SEC, and third nationally, in punting averaging 46.2 yards per punt, which would be the third highest single-season average in school history.

SERIES/GAME NOTES

Record: UM, 60-40-6

This game will be the 107th meeting of one of the nation's most-played rivalries. Ole Miss holds a 60-40-6 advantage in the series dating back to 1901... The rivalry is also listed as the 10th longest uninterrupted series, as the NCAA considers Saturday's game the 95th consecutive year that the two schools have faced each other... Neither team, however, fielded a squad in 1943 due to World War II... Saturday's game will be the 83rd "Battle of the Golden Egg," as the two schools started playing for the trophy in 1927... The home team has won 10 of the last 11 games.

THE COACHES

Steve Spurrier is in his sixth season at South Carolina with a record of 43-31 (.581) and in his 26th season overall with a record of 232-112-2 (.673). Spurrier serves as the Gamecocks' offensive coordinator and the defensive coordinator is Lorenzo Ward.

Dabo Swinney is in his second at Clemson and overall with a record of 19-13 (.594). Billy Napier serves as the Tigers' offensive coordinator and the defensive coordinators are Kevin Steele and Charlie Harbison.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN SOUTH CAROLINA HAS THE BALL

Marcus Lattimore set the school record for single-season touchdowns in the win over Troy, scoring three times to run his total to 19 for the season. He needs just one more score to tie Tennessee's Reggie Cobb (1987) for the SEC freshman scoring record. Alshon Jeffery broke the school record for single-season receiving yards in Saturday's win over Troy, surpassing a 1,143-yard season by Sidney Rice in 2005. Jeffery leads the SEC and is fifth in the nation in receiving yards per game with 110.0 yards per contest. He also leads the league with 6.4 catches per game. Stephen Garcia is the third quarterback in school history to top 6,000 career passing yards. Lattimore topped the 1,000-yard rushing mark for the season against Troy, giving the Gamecocks a 1,000-yard rusher and a 1,000-yard receiver in the same season for the first time in school history.

Clemson defensive end Da'Quan Bowers has 15.5 sacks so far this season, just a half a sack short of the Clemson single season record. His total is also seventh best in ACC history for one season. DeAndre McDaniel had his fourth interception of the season in the win over NC State. McDaniel leads the Tigers in tackles with 64 for a 6.0 per game average, while Bowers is second with 63. That was the 15th interception of McDaniel's career. The Tigers rank 18th in the nation in pass efficiency defense with a 112.3 figure. Clemson has 14 interceptions to rank 21st in the nation.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN CLEMSON HAS THE BALL

The Gamecocks lead the Southeastern Conference and are ranked No. 3 in the nation with a school-record 36 sacks (3.24 per game). DE Melvin Ingram leads the way with 8.0 sacks on the season, ranking him third in the SEC; DE Devin Taylor has 7.5 sacks to rank fourth. Carolina has scored five defensive touchdowns this season (four interceptions, one fumble), the most since joining the SEC prior to the 1992 season. The Gamecocks had two defensive scores against Troy (INT returns by FS D.J. Swearingen and DE Chaz Sutton). Stephon Gilmore had two sacks against Alabama and one against Arkansas, and he now has 6.0 for his career.

Parker enters Saturday's game ranked fifth in school history in touchdown passes (31), sixth in passing yardage with (4,488), and fifth in completions (383). He has a record of 15-10 as Clemson's starting quarterback. Jamie Harper enters this game with 668 yards rushing and 296 receiving for 964 total yards from scrimmage this year, best on the Clemson team. Andre Ellington leads the team in touchdowns with 12 even though he has played in just eight games. Dwayne Allen has 31 receptions for 356 yards and a touchdown.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Through nine games, Spencer Lanning has punted 42 times for an average of 44.0 yards per punt, ranking him sixth in the SEC in punting average. He is also 12-for-16 on field goal attempts on the season, including a long of 51 yards. Lanning has also made his last seven consecutive field goal tries.

Dawson Zimmerman has averaged 43.5 yards per punt on 47 attempts this year. He is on pace to record the fourth best punting average in Clemson history and the best since Chris Gardocki averaged a Clemson record 44.5 yards a punt in 1990. Zimmerman has a net punting average of 41.9 yards per punt and 17 of his 47 punts have been downed inside the 20. Clemson kicker Spencer Benton has six special teams tackles this year and 15 in his career.

SERIES/GAME NOTES

Record: CU, 65-38-4

This will be meeting number-108 between Clemson and South Carolina and the 102nd consecutive year the two schools have met... That is the third longest streak of consecutive years played in a rivalry in the nation... The only rivalries longer are Kansas vs. Nebraska at 105 games and Minnesota vs. Wisconsin at 104 games... Those games have already been played this year... Three of the last five meetings have been decided by five points or less.

THE COACHES

Jim Grobe is in his sixth season at Wake Forest with a record of 61-60 (.504) and 16th overall with a record of 94-93-1 (.503). The Demon Deacons' offensive coordinator is Steed Lobotzke and the defensive coordinator is Brad Lambert.

Robbie Caldwell is in his first season at Vanderbilt and overall. The Commodores' offensive coordinator is Des Kitchings and the defensive coordinator is Jamie Bryant.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN WAKE FOREST HAS THE BALL

Making his first career start, redshirt-freshman RB Josh Harris carved-up the Virginia Tech defense for 241 yards and two touchdowns. Harris had touchdown runs of 33 and 87 yards in the game. Tanner Price continues to set single-season passing marks for a true freshman as the season progresses. His 151 passing yards against Clemson brought his season total to 1,276 yards. Wide receivers Chris Givens, Marshall Williams and Devon Brown have all reached career milestones in recent weeks.

The Vanderbilt defense ranks seventh in the NCAA – and first in the SEC – in tackles for loss. The unit is averaging 7.6 tackles for loss on the season. Casey Hayward and Tim Fugger remain among the national leaders in key defensive stats. Hayward tops the NCAA with 17 defensed passes and ranks fifth in the nation – and second in the SEC – with six interceptions. Fugger ranks fourth nationally with four forced fumbles. Hayward, believed to be the first Commodore of the modern era to achieve interceptions in four consecutive games, also tops the squad with eight career picks.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN VANDERBILT HAS THE BALL

With his 10th career sack against NC State, Kyle Wilber is just one sack shy of moving into the top 10 on the school's career sacks list. For the year, Wilber has made 14.5 tackles behind the line of scrimmage and needs just 1.5 more tackles for loss to move into a tie for eighth. Daniel Mack picked off a pass for the second straight home game and last week and finished with a career-high eight tackles to lead the Wake Forest defense. Hunter Haynes also tied for the team high with eight stops.

The Commodores have lost their top three running backs for the season due to injury. The 'Dores inserted Kennard Reeves into the lineup against Kentucky and Tennessee. He has responded by rushing for 165 yards in the last two games. Jordan Matthews (Fr.) and Tray Herndon set career reception highs last week versus Tennessee with five and four catches, respectively. Matthews also caught a touchdown for the third consecutive game. The Commodores passed for 222 yards, including 146 yards by Jared Funk. It was the team's highest passing total against an SEC opponent this year.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Wake Forest place kicker Jimmy Newman has made 10 straight field goals and is one made field goal away from tying the school record of consecutive made field goals, currently held by Sam Swank, who made 11 straight field goals during the 2005 season. For the season, Newman is 10-of-11 on field goal attempts.

Richard Kent continued his superb net punting versus UT. Kent, who set a team record for punts in a season during the game, averaged 45.2 yards on six punts. The Vols fumbled one of Kent's punts and returned a second for just one yard. Warren Norman, out for the year with a wrist injury, is averaging 25.4 yards per kickoff return this year, ranking sixth in the SEC and 45th in the NCAA.

SERIES/GAME NOTES
Record: VU, 7-5

The Commodores are 7-5 all-time against Wake Forest, though the Demon Deacons have captured the last two games played between the schools, including a 23-10 win in Winston-Salem that served as the 2008 regular season finale...Vanderbilt and Wake Forest are in the midst of a seven-game series every year through 2014.

THE COACHES

Paul Johnson is in his 3rd season at Georgia Tech with a record of 26-12 (.684) and 14th overall with a record of 133-51 (.723). The Yellow Jackets' offensive coordinator is Johnson and Al Groh serves as the defensive coordinator.

Mark Richt is in his 10th season at Georgia and overall with a record of 95-33 (.742). The Bulldogs' offensive coordinator is Mike Bobo and Todd Grantham serves as the defensive coordinator.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN GEORGIA TECH HAS THE BALL

Georgia Tech leads the nation in rushing offense (319.4 yards per game), paced by Anthony Allen (96.3 ypg), who ranks second in the ACC and 24th nationally. Tevin Washington, in his first two career starts at quarterback, has rushed for 216 yards and a touchdown, and has thrown two TD passes. Senior quarterback Joshua Nesbitt will not play the final three regular season games of his college career due to injury.

Justin Houston remains the SEC sack leader with 10.0 and was named the SEC Defensive Player of the Week following his performance against UK. Houston also has the most sacks and tackles for loss of any active SEC player and has had at least one tackle for loss in all 11 games this year. He is also second in the SEC in tackles for loss (17.5) after exploding for 3.0 versus the Wildcats and adding a combined 2.5 more against the Gators and ISU. After recording a team-high 12 stops at #2 Auburn, Akeem Dent pushed his tackle total for the year to 105 and is No. 2 in the league. Bacarri Rambo and sophomore CB Sanders Commings have three picks each through 11 games.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN GEORGIA HAS THE BALL

After seeing limited action in the first four games of the season, Julian Burnett has come on strong, ranking second on the team with 71 tackles. He had double-figure tackles against Duke, Virginia Tech, Clemson and Wake Forest and has forced two fumbles, recovered a fumble and has an interception. Brad Jefferson leads the team in tackles with 75. He has 7.5 tackles for loss, 4.0 sacks and has forced and recovered fumbles. Senior cornerback Mario Butler has started a team-high 38 consecutive games.

A.J. Green recorded the seventh game of his career (third this season) with more than 100 yards after hauling in a career-high nine catches for a career-high 164 yards and two touchdowns at #2 Auburn. With 23 career touchdown catches, Green ranks second in UGA history. QB Aaron Murray has the highest passing efficiency rating for a freshman in the nation (17th overall) at 156.9 and is enjoying one of the best years ever by an SEC freshman quarterback. Washaun Ealey is leading the Bulldogs with 633 yards rushing and nine scores on 128 carries this year. Kris Durham has 25 catches for a team-high 494 yards and two touchdowns on the year.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Scott Blair has made 15-of-17 field goal attempts (.882) and is 32-of-32 on PATs. Blair made three field goals of longer than 40 yards in the win over Duke and he kicked three field goals in the win over North Carolina. Blair booted three field goals of longer than 40 yards in the win over Wake Forest.

Junior CB Brandon Boykin took over UGA's No. 1 mark in career kickoff return yards after reaching 1,708 in 62 returns in the matchup at #2 Auburn. So far in 2010, Drew Butler has averaged 45.0 yards on 43 punts, 14 that went for 50+. The Bulldogs are second in the SEC and third in the nation in net punting with an average of 41.0. Blair Walsh is now 18-for-21 on FGs for the year and 53-for-66 overall. He is on pace to rank in the top 10 for highest FG percentage in SEC history and he has the highest FG percentage of any active SEC kicker.
