### No. 4 LSU, No. 3 Oregon Meet In Historic Season-Opener in Cowboys Classic

LSU will put the nation's longest non-conference regular-season winning streak on the line Saturday when the fourth-ranked Tigers face No. 3 Oregon in the Cowboys Classic in Arlington, Texas. It's only the fourth meeting between the teams and the first since a 56-17 LSU win in Tiger Stadium in 1977. LSU leads the series between the teams, 2-1. LSU goes into the Oregon game having won 33 straight non-conference regular-season games, a streak that dates back to the 2002 season. LSU's last non-conference regular-season loss came in the 2002 season-opener when the Tigers dropped a 26-8 decision on the road to Virginia Tech. Kickoff between the Tigers and Ducks is scheduled for 7:12 p.m. CT from a sold out Cowboys Stadium. The game will be televised nationally on ABC Sports, marking the fourth consecutive year that the Tigers open a season in prime time on national television. LSU returns 16 starters (9 offense, 7 defense) from last year's team that posted an 11-2 overall mark and finished the year ranked No. 8 in the nation following a 41-24 win over Texas A&M in the Cotton Bowl. Oregon, the national runner-up in 2010, returns 13 starters (7 offense, 6 defense) from its 12-1 team a year ago. LSU is ranked No. 4 in both national polls – Associated Press and USA Today Coaches Poll – as the Tigers have been in the Top 25 for 94 of 98 weeks under **Les Miles**. Now in his seventh season at LSU, Miles is 62-17 with the Tigers and has a chance to reach 100 wins for his career this year. In 10 years as a head coach, Miles has compiled a 90-38 mark. In 2011, Miles joins Charles McClendon (18 seasons), Bernie Moore (13), Gaynell Tinsley (7), and Paul Dietzel (7) as the only coaches in school history to coach into a seventh season at LSU. Offensively, senior QB **Jarrett Lee** will get his 10th career start and the first since a 24-16 win over Louisiana Tech in 2009. Lee has thrown for 2,643 yards and 18 TDs in his career with the Tigers. Sophomores **Michael Ford** (244 yards, 3 TDs in 2010) and **Spencer Ware** (175 yards, 1 TD) lead the running game, while junior **Rueben Randle** (44 rec., 717 yards, 5 TDs for career) is the top receiving hand. The LSU offensive line has eight players with at least one start to its credit and the unit has combined for 78 starts. Defensively, senior LB **Ryan Baker** (87 tackles, 7 sacks in 2010) and sophomore DB **Tyrann Mathieu** (57 tackles, 4.5 sacks) return to lead a unit that ranked among the top 12 in the nation in scoring (18.2), pass defense (169.8) and total defense (307.2) in 2010.

#### STORYLINES

- The LSU-Oregon game marks only the third time two top-five teams have opened the season on a neutral field. The other two times came in 1983 when No. 1 Nebraska beat No. 4 Penn State, 44 and in 1984 when No. 4 Miami beat No. 1 Auburn, 20-18. Both of those games were played at Giants Stadium.

- LSU is 23-0 under **Les Miles** in non-conference regular-season games.

- Les Miles** becomes the first LSU coach to reach seven seasons with the Tigers since Charles McClendon did it in 1968. McClendon, the winningest coach in LSU history with 137 victories, coached the Tigers from 1962-79. Miles is 62-17 in his six years with the Tigers.

- LSU is playing back-to-back games in venues other than Tiger Stadium for the first time since 2005 when the Tigers played consecutive games in the Georgia Dome.

- LSU's won a school-record eight straight season-openers heading into the Oregon contest. LSU hasn't lost a season-opener since a 26-8 setback to Virginia Tech in 2002. The Virginia Tech loss is also the last time the Tigers dropped a non-conference regular-season game. **Les Miles** is 6-0 in season-openers at LSU.

- Oregon is the highest-ranked season-opener in school-history, matching the 1995 season-opener against No. 3 Texas A&M.

# Les Miles

HEAD COACH • SEVENTH SEASON

The driving force behind the LSU Tigers' continued dominance at the national level is head coach Les Miles. His steadfast approach expects excellence and dedication from his players, coaching staff and all who contribute to the success of LSU Football.

Since taking over as head coach at LSU in January of 2005, Miles has guided the Tigers to the 2007 BCS National Title and to three Top 5 rankings. Miles' six-year record with the Tigers is 62-17, which also includes a Southeastern Conference title, two appearances in the SEC Championship Game and five bowl victories.

LSU's success under Miles hasn't been just on the playing field as the Tigers have also excelled in both the classroom as well as being active participants within the community. With an approach that demands his players strive for excellence and pursue an education while representing the University in first-class fashion, the response by the players has been overwhelming. In addition to averaging over 10 wins for the past six years, the Tigers have also had 104 players earn a spot on the SEC Academic Honor Roll with another 133 earning their college diploma. LSU has graduated 62 of its 80 seniors since the 2007 season.

The Tigers also played an instrumental role in the recovery efforts in 2005 following Hurricanes Katrina and Rita, two of the most devastating natural disasters to hit the Louisiana coast.

On the field, the Tigers have produced 37 NFL Draft picks over the past six years, including a school-record four first-round picks in the 2007 draft. In 2007, senior defensive tackle Glenn Dorsey became the most decorated defender in school history, winning four national awards – the Lombardi, Outland, Nagurski and Lott Trophies.

Cornerback Patrick Peterson claimed two national awards in 2010 - the Thorpe Award as the nation's top defensive back and the Bednarik Award as the country's top defender.

The foundation for LSU football is more stable than ever. After 62 wins over the past six years -- including 23 over foes ranked among the nation's top 25 -- and with six straight Top 10 recruiting classes, Miles and the Tigers have solidified LSU's standing as one of college football's premier programs.

One of Les Miles' most impressive qualities is his selfless desire to assist others. Each year, Miles and his wife Kathy host an event that raises nearly \$100,000 for the Children's Miracle Network. In addition, he is active in community service events such as the Mary Bird Perkins Cancer annual fundraiser, the Special Olympics and the Baton Rouge Children's Advocacy Center Celebrity Waiter Event.

Miles spent a week in June of 2006 taking part in the USO Tour, where the Tiger head coach visited American troops serving in Kuwait and Iraq. Miles was joined on the tour, which serves as a morale booster for the troops serving abroad, by former Notre Dame coach Lou Holtz and Tampa Bay Rays owner Vincent Naimoli.

The week-long trip saw Miles visit several U.S. bases in Kuwait before traveling to Iraq, where he met with hundreds of American troops and even flew over the city of Baghdad in a Black Hawk helicopter.

When Miles isn't overseeing his LSU football family, he can most likely be found in the bleachers supporting his wife and kids at their sporting events.

## NOTEBOOK

### LSU Opens 2011 Against No. 3 Oregon in Arlington, Texas

For just the second time in modern day school history – and the second straight year - LSU will open a football season at a neutral site as the Tigers travel to Arlington, Texas, to face third-ranked Oregon at 7:12 p.m. CT on Saturday. The game will be played at Cowboys Stadium and will be televised in prime time to a national audience on ABC. Last year, LSU beat North Carolina, 30-24, in the Chick-fil-A Kickoff Game in Atlanta. It's also the second straight year that the Tigers will open a season against a higher ranked opponent. Prior to last year, you have to go back to 1995 to find a season when that Tigers faced a higher-ranked opponent when unranked LSU dropped a 33-17 decision to No. 3 Texas A&M in College State in the first game of the Gerry DiNardo era. Oregon is the highest-ranked season-opener in school-history, matching the 1995 season-opener against No. 3 Texas A&M.

### Recapping 2010: LSU Wins Fifth Bowl Game Under Miles On Way To Top 10 Finish

LSU put together its fourth top 10 finish in six years under **Les Miles** in 2010 as the Tigers posted an 11-2 overall record and beat 18th-ranked Texas A&M, 41-24, in the Cotton Bowl. LSU, behind a stingy defense and an opportunistic offense, finished the year ranked No. 8 in the nation. The following is a look at some of the accomplishments for the Tigers in 2010:

- LSU swept games against Ole Miss, Florida and Alabama for the sixth time in school history. LSU also did it in 1958, 1982, 2004, 2005 and 2007. Les Miles is the only coach in LSU history to do it more than once as he's swept that trio three times (2005, 2007, 2010).
- LSU closed out its home season with a 7-0 mark, the 13th time in school history, and the first time since 2006, that the Tigers went undefeated in Tiger Stadium.
- LSU won at least 10 games for the 10th time in school history and the fourth time under Les Miles. Miles is the only coach in school history to win at least 10 games in a season more than twice and he's done it four times.
- LSU won six games by 7 points or less and the Tigers were 6-1 in games decided by 7 points or less. It's the most victories in school history by 7 points or less, topping the 5 victories by 7 points or less in 1964.
- LSU reached a bowl game for a school-record 11th straight year, beating Texas A&M in the Cotton Bowl. LSU has appeared in a bowl game every year since 2000.

### LSU vs. The Pac-12

LSU is 20-4 all-time against current members of the Pac-12. LSU last faced a member of the current Pac-12 in 2009 when the Tigers beat Washington in Seattle by a 31-23 count. LSU coach **Les Miles** is 5-2 against the Pac-12, which includes a 3-0 record at LSU. Miles' first LSU victory came against a Pac-12 team as the Tigers rallied for a 35-31 win over Arizona State to open the 2005 season. Miles also beat Arizona in 2006 by a 45-3 count in Tiger Stadium. Here's a look at LSU's series record against current members of the Pac-12: Colorado 5-1, Oregon State 4-0, Arizona 3-0, Washington 2-0, Utah 2-0, Oregon 2-1, Arizona State 1-0, Southern Cal 1-1, and Stanford 0-1. LSU has never played California, UCLA, or Washington State in football.

### LSU In Cowboys Stadium

LSU will be making its second straight appearance in Cowboys Stadium as the Tigers closed out the 2010 season with a 41-24 win over Texas A&M in the Cotton Bowl. LSU played perhaps one of its best overall offensive games of the year in Cowboys Stadium, going for 446 total yards (288 rushing, 158 passing). RB **Spencer Ware** had his best game for the Tigers, rushing for 102 yards on just 10 carries. He also caught 2 passes for 17 yards. Defensively, **Tyrann Mathieu** was named the game's most outstanding defensive player after recording seven tackles, one sack for an 8-yard loss, two forced fumbles, one fumble recovery and an interception. Prior to the Cotton Bowl contest, LSU practiced in Cowboys Stadium for five straight days leading up to the game.

### LSU's At Home In A Dome

LSU will be making its 30th overall appearance in a domed stadium against Oregon. LSU is 22-7 all-time in domed stadiums, which includes a 13-4 mark at the Louisiana Superdome, a 7-1 record at the Georgia Dome, a 1-0 record at Cowboys Stadium and an 0-1 mark at the Astrodome. LSU will also bring a 7-game winning streak in domed stadiums into the



Cowboys Classic. LSU hasn't lost a game in a domed stadium since the 2005 season when the Tigers dropped a 34-14 decision to Georgia in the SEC Championship Game at the Georgia Dome.

### LSU's 33-Game Non-Conference Regular-Season Streak Longest In Nation

LSU brings the nation's longest non-conference regular-season winning streak into the Oregon game at 33 straight. The Tigers haven't lost a non-conference regular-season game since falling to Virginia Tech, 26-8, in the 2002 season opener in Blacksburg, Va. Wisconsin is second on the list with 28 straight non-conference regular-season wins. **Les Miles** has accounted for 23 of the 33 wins during the streak.

### LSU Runs Top 25 Streak To 33 Straight

By opening at No. 4 in both the AP and USA Today Coaches polls, LSU ran its streak of consecutive weeks in the national rankings to 33 straight. LSU has been ranked in both the Coaches and AP polls every week since the start of the 2009 season. Since **Les Miles** took over at LSU, the Tigers have been represented in the AP and USA Today Coaches' Poll 94 of the 98 weeks. The exception came during the final four polls of the 2008 season. In addition, since the start of the 2002 season, LSU has played 115 of 118 games ranked in the top 25, including 77 of 79 games under Miles. LSU has a 61-16 record in games played as a top 25 team under Miles. The only two games that LSU hasn't played as a Top 25 team during the Miles era came in 2008 vs. Arkansas and Georgia Tech in the Chick-fil-A Bowl. LSU is ranked in the preseason Top 25 for the 11th straight year heading into 2011.

### LSU In Season-Openers

LSU brings an 84-28-5 overall mark in season-openers into the Oregon game. The Tigers have won eight straight and 14 of their last 15 season-openers. LSU's only season-opening loss over the past 15 years came at Virginia Tech by a 26-8 count in 2002. Last year, the Tigers posted a 30-24 win over North Carolina in the Chick-fil-A Kickoff Game in Atlanta to open the season.

### Miles In Season Openers

LSU coach **Les Miles** is 7-3 in season openers during his 10 years as a head coach, which includes a 6-0 record with the Tigers. Miles is the only coach in LSU history to lead the Tigers to a season-opening win in each of his first six years.

### Miles Has 62 Wins at LSU; He's Averaging 10.3 Wins A Year as Head Coach of the Tigers

LSU coach **Les Miles** recorded his 62nd victory at the school in the 41-24 victory over Texas A&M. Now in his seventh year at LSU, Miles is 62-17 in his 79 games with the Tigers. Only two coaches in LSU history have won more games than Miles – Charles McClendon (137) and Bernie Moore (83). In terms of active SEC coaches, only Steve Spurrier (72) needed fewer games than Miles to get to 60 victories. Miles is also averaging 10.3 wins a year at LSU, making him the only coach in school history to average double-figure wins in five or more years.

### More On Miles' List of Achievements

Now in his seventh season with the Tigers, head coach **Les Miles** has put together quite a list of achievements during his 79. The following is a look at some of Miles' highlights during his six seasons with the Tigers:

- Fastest coach in LSU history to 10 wins (11 games), 20 wins (24 games), 30 wins (35 games), 40 wins (48 games), 50 wins (63 games), and 60 wins (76 games) in school history.
- With 62 victories in six years at LSU, Les Miles is averaging 10.3 wins a season as the Tiger head coach ... With the win over Ole Miss, Miles joined Mark Richt, Steve Spurrier and Philip Fulmer as the only coaches in SEC HISTORY to win 10 games in four of his first six seasons as an SEC head coach.
- Led LSU to 10-1 start for the third time in six years (2005, '07, '10)
- Led LSU to first 7-0 start since 1973 in 2010
- Only coach in SEC history to beat Urban Meyer and Nick Saban in the same year twice (2007, 2010)
- Only coach in LSU history to beat Auburn, Florida and Alabama in same season - and he's done it twice (2005, '07)
- Only coach in LSU history to beat Florida and Tennessee in the regular season during the same year (2010).
- Only first-year coach in SEC history to lead team to league's title game (2005)
- Has 11 wins over coaches who have won national titles
- Coached LSU to 10-plus wins in three straight seasons - a first at the school
- Only coach in LSU history to lead Tigers to three straight top five final rankings

### LSU's Won 17 Straight Games In September

In addition to its 33-game non-conference regular season winning streak, LSU also brings a 17-game winning streak during the month of September into the Oregon game. LSU coach **Les Miles** is 20-2 in September games at LSU. The last time LSU lost a game during the month of September came at Auburn during the 2006 season by a 7-3 count.

### Jarrett Lee To Make 10th Start At QB; First Start In A Season-Opener

Senior **Jarrett Lee** will make his 10th start at quarterback for the Tigers against Oregon. However, Saturday's start will be the first season-opening start for Lee. He went 4-4 as a redshirt freshman in 2008 and then posted a 1-0 mark in 2009. Lee's last start came in November of 2009 as he guided the Tigers to a 24-16 win over Louisiana Tech. During his career, Lee has help rally the Tigers to four fourth-quarter comebacks, including a dramatic game-winning drive last year against Florida. For his career, Lee has thrown for 2,643 yards, 18 touchdowns and he's completed 213-of-398 passes for a 53.5 completion percentage.

## Miles Joins Bear Bryant and Fulmer In Very Elite Company

With the win over Texas A&M in the Cotton Bowl, LSU coach **Les Miles** joined Alabama's Bear Bryant and Tennessee's Phillip Fulmer as the only coaches in SEC history to win 11 games at a league school four different seasons. Bryant did it 10 times (9 at Alabama and 1 at Kentucky), while Fulmer did it four times at Tennessee. Miles won 11 games in 2005, 2006, and 2010 and he led the Tigers to 12 victories during the national championship season in 2007.

## Wing and Alleman Taking Over Kicking Duties For The Tigers In 2011

LSU opens the 2011 season with a pair of new specialists in redshirt freshman punter **Brad Wing** and junior kicker **Drew Alleman**. Wing is the first freshman to hold the punting job for the Tigers since 2000 when Donnie Jones punted for LSU. Wing replaces **Derek Helton** and **Josh Jasper**, who combined to average 43.9 yards per punt with 28 punts downed inside the 20-yard line. Alleman takes over for Jasper, who capped his career as one of the best placekickers in school history. Jasper led the nation and set an LSU record by kicking 28 field goals as a senior in 2010.

## LSU Running Backs Have Gone 305 Carries Without Losing A Fumble

LSU's running backs go into the Oregon game riding a streak of 305 carries without losing a fumble. The streak dates back to the Mississippi State game in 2010 when freshman **Alfred Blue** lost a fumble on LSU's final offensive play of the game. Since then, the Tigers have gone 10 straight games without a lost fumble by a running back. The following is a look at the number of carries by each running back during the streak: Stevan Ridley (194), **Michael Ford** (43), **Spencer Ware** (23), Richard Murphy (19), **Russell Shepard** (15), **Alfred Blue** (10). Note: Ridley and Murphy completed are now in the NFL.

## ESPN's College GameDay On Hand

ESPN College GameDay will be on hand for the LSU-Oregon game live from Cowboys Stadium. The three-hour show starts at 8 a.m. CT on ESPNU and then continues at 9 a.m. CT on ESPN. It will be the 14th time LSU is involved in a game with ESPN College GameDay on location. The Tigers have made at least one appearance on the popular show in now each of the past nine seasons. It is the second straight year LSU has been on the season debut of the show and the third time at a season-opener. The GameDay crew was on hand for the 2004 season-opener in which the Tigers rallied for a 22-21 overtime triumph over Oregon State in Tiger Stadium. They were also live from the LSU-North Carolina game in Atlanta last season. LSU is 9-4 in games in which ESPN College GameDay is on hand. ## Miles Is 23-13 vs. Top 25 Opponents

LSU coach **Les Miles** is 23-13 in games against ranked opponents during his six years with the Tigers. LSU was 5-2 against Top 25 teams in 2010. LSU won a school-record seven games against top 25 teams in 2007, which included a perfect 3-0 mark against top 10 teams. In games against teams ranked in the top 10, Miles is 9-9.

## LSU's Been Good As A Top 10 Team

LSU's top 10 rankings haven't come by accident in recent years as the Tigers have backed up their placement in the polls by winning 56 of the 71 games they've played as an AP Top 10 team. Since returning to the top 10 on a consistent basis during the early 2000s, LSU has recorded a 56-15 record in games in which they have been ranked in the AP Top 10. That record goes back to the 2002 season when LSU cracked the AP Top 10 the week they faced Auburn. LSU was 6-3 in 2009 as a top 10 team and the Tigers were 4-2 a year ago.

## The Chief Back To Run LSU Defense

**John "Chief" Chavis** returns for a third season as LSU's defensive coordinator in 2011. Last year, Chavis led the Tiger defense top 12 national ranking in three defensive categories. LSU led the SEC and ranked 10th nationally in pass defense (169.8 ypg); the Tigers were second in the SEC and No. 11 in the nation in scoring defense (18.2 ppg); and LSU was third in the league and No. 12 in the country in total defense (307.2 ypg). In his first year at LSU in 2009, the Tigers were 11th in the nation in scoring defense as they allowed just six rushing TDs all year.

## Cardiac Tigers Rally For Another Fourth Quarter Victory

For the 17th time under **Les Miles**, LSU won a football game despite trailing in the fourth quarter as the Tigers rallied from deficits of 24-23, 30-29, and 36-35 to beat Ole Miss, 43-36, in Tiger Stadium in week 11 last year. The following is a look at LSU's fourth quarter comebacks under Miles, how many points the Tigers had to overcome in the final frame to win and the quarterback who engineered the comeback:

## LSU Is 34-0 Under Miles When Rushing For 100 Yards and Holding Opponents To Less Than 100 Yards

One look at LSU's results in relation to rushing the football and it's easy to figure out that head coach **Les Miles** is a former offensive lineman who understands the importance of running the football. In 79 games under Miles, LSU's success is easy to predict when it comes to net rushing yards. Get to 100 yards rushing and LSU will more than likely win as the Tigers are 58-6 under Miles when that happens. Hold the opponent to fewer than 100-yards and the Tigers are 36-3. An even more telling stat is that when LSU rushes for 100-plus yards and holds the opponents to fewer than 100-yards, the Tigers are 34-0. ## Brandon Taylor To Wear Jersey No. 18

Jersey No. 18 – one of the new traditions in LSU history – has been passed down to senior safety **Brandon Taylor** this year. The Jersey No. 18 tradition was born in 2003 when quarterback Matt Mauck guided the Tigers to its first national championship since 1958. His number (No. 18) became synonymous with success – both on and off the field – as well as a selfless attitude that has become the epitome of being an LSU football player. After his final year with the Tigers, Mauck passed Jersey No. 18 down to running back Jacob Hester, who then helped the Tigers to another national title in 2007. Richard Dickson wore Jersey No. 18 in 2008 and 2009. RB Richard Murphy, now with the Jacksonville Jaguars, owned the number in 2010. LSU coach **Les Miles**, along with input from the three other players who have worn Jersey No. 18, determined that Brandon Taylor would wear the jersey in 2011.

### Chris Faulk Becomes Just Fourth Starter At Left Tackle for LSU Since Start Of 2002 Season

**Chris Faulk** takes over at left tackle in 2011 as he will become just the fourth player to start at that position for the Tigers since 2002. Faulk replaces Joseph Barksdale, who started all 13 games at that spot in 2010. Prior to Faulk and Barksdale, Ciron Black started a school-record 53 straight games at left tackle from 2006-09. Black was preceded at left tackle by Andrew Whitworth, who made 52 consecutive starts at left tackle from 2002-05.

### LSU Has Become D-Line U.

You can now refer to LSU as D-line U as the Tigers have made it a habit of producing All-Americans and NFL Draft picks from its defensive line. Since the 2003 season, LSU has had six defensive linemen earn a total of seven First-Team All-America honors and 12 members of its defensive line selected in the NFL Draft. In 2007, DT Glenn Dorsey became the most decorated defensive player in school history - winning four national awards - on his way to becoming the fifth overall pick in the 2008 NFL Draft. In the spring of 2009, Defensive end Tyson Jackson became the highest LSU defender ever picked in the NFL Draft, going No. 3 overall to Kansas City. The 2010 season saw Drake Nevis earn All-America honors prior to being selected in the third round of the 2011 NFL Draft by the Indianapolis Colts. Junior defensive end **Chancey Aghayere** is from Garland, Texas, just northeast of the city of Dallas. Freshman punter **James Hairston** hails from Dallas. Head coach **Les Miles** also spent three seasons as an assistant coach with the Dallas Cowboys from 1998-2000.

### Claiborne Earns Preseason Watch List Recognition

Junior cornerback **Morris Claiborne** is on numerous watch lists for the 2011 season. The Shreveport native is up for the Nagurski Award, Thorpe Award and Bednarik Award -- two of which were won last season by former teammate Patrick Peterson. Claiborne is a consensus first-team preseason All-SEC selection by the league coaches and media, and he is a preseason third-team All-American pick by the Sporting News. Claiborne heads into his third year after leading LSU and ranking fourth in the SEC with 11 passes defended as a sophomore. He picked off a team-high five passes and that ranked third in the league. Claiborne, who is ranked 15th in the ESPN.com Top SEC Players, will be making his 13th career start when the Tigers take the field against Oregon. Peterson, who lined up opposite Claiborne last season, became the first player in LSU history to win the Bednarik and Thorpe Awards.

- LSU began playing football in Tiger Stadium in 1924 and is currently in its 87th year in the venerable stadium. This season marks the 80th year LSU has played under the lights in Death Valley. The Tigers defeated Spring Hill, 35-0, on Oct. 3, 1931 in the first night game in the stadium's history.
- LSU has won 36 of its last 41 games at home and 11 straight. Head coach **Les Miles** is 28-1 in Saturday Night home games.
- More than 85,000 fans have attended each of LSU's last 76 home games. In that span, the Tigers have eclipsed the 90,000 mark 66 times, including a school-record 93,129 for the Oct. 10, 2009 game that pitted No. 4 LSU against No. 1 Florida.
- Since national attendance figures began being kept in 1957, LSU has finished in the nation's top 10 in average attendance in 47 of the past 54 seasons.
- Since 1960, LSU owns a stellar 219-60-4 (.781) record in traditional Tiger Stadium night games. On the other hand, the Tigers are just 24-25-3 (.490) at home during the day in that span.
- LSU has won 28 consecutive home games over non-conference opponents. **Les Miles** is 19-0 in non-conference home games.

## Tigers Set School Rushing Record With 503 Yards in 56-17 Win Over Oregon

As had been the case after the Indiana loss, the Tigers had a relatively easy assignment to "get well" on after the Kentucky defeat. Although Oregon displayed some muscle and scored first the issue was not long in doubt as the Bengals ran up a 21-7 halftime lead and added five more scores thereafter. An interception set the Ducks off on a 94-yard drive for that opening TD, which quarterback Jack Henderson scored from the one. Later in the first period the Tigers punched 54 yards in only four plays, Woodley getting 20 and Murphree the final 31 on a slick run. A few minutes later freshman specialist Chris Williams fielded a punt on his 30 and streaked back 70 yards to put Ole Lou out in front, 14-7. Before the break the Bengals were off on a 69-yard push in eight plays, Ensminger getting in on a keeper from the three. After Oregon had added a field goal early in the third quarter, Alex carried on all but one play in a 67-yard drive and scored from the two. Then Ensminger's 43-yard fling to Carson capped a 56-yard effort. In the final stanza, with the Duck defense all but out on its collective feet, Alex added three more touchdowns to etch his name into the record-books once more, on runs of 20, four and two yards. Meanwhile, Oregon pulled themselves together for one return score. It turned out to be Alex' greatest night: 237 yards rushing and four TDs – both school records. Muphree added 75 yards on ten carries.

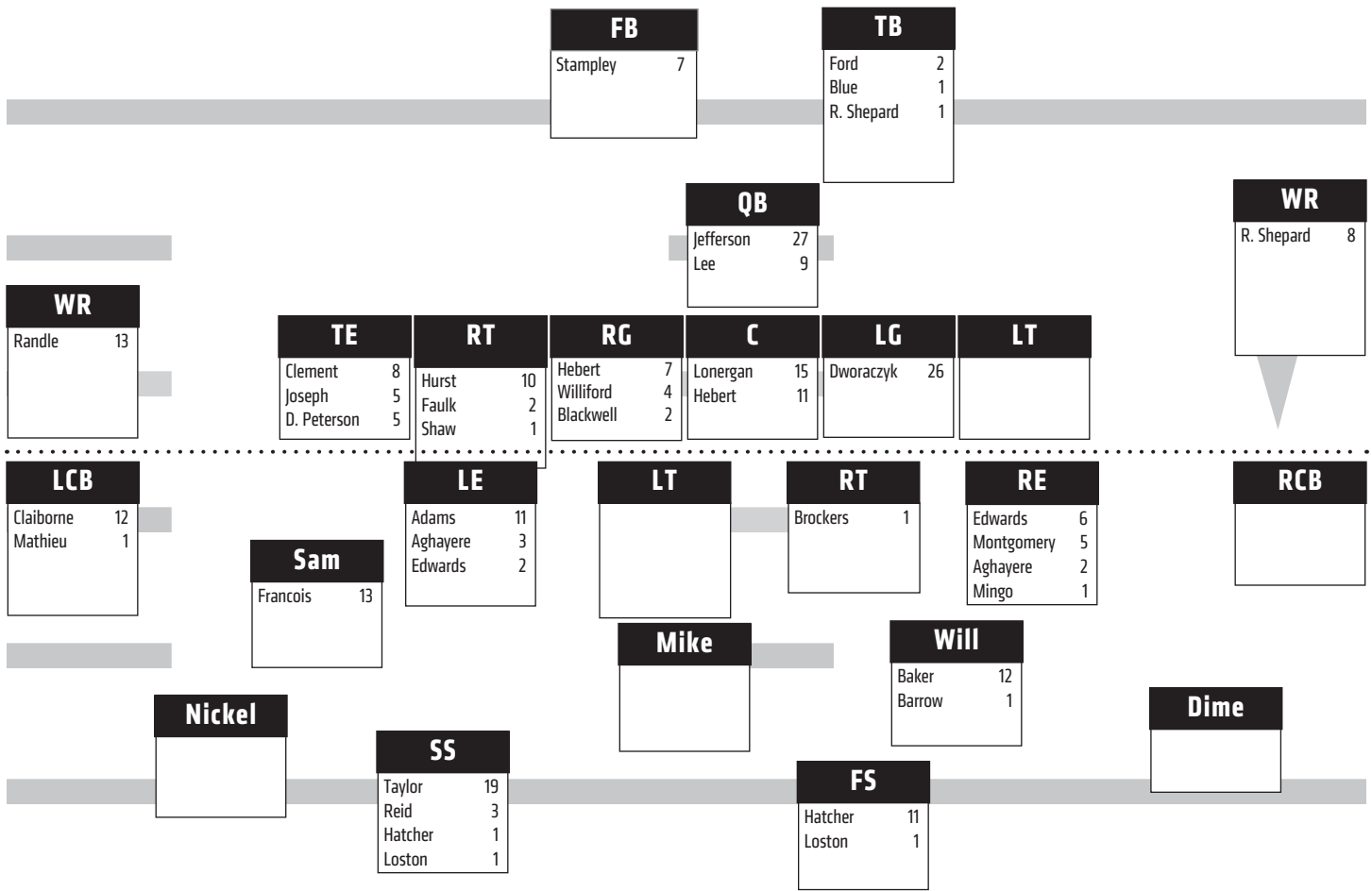
